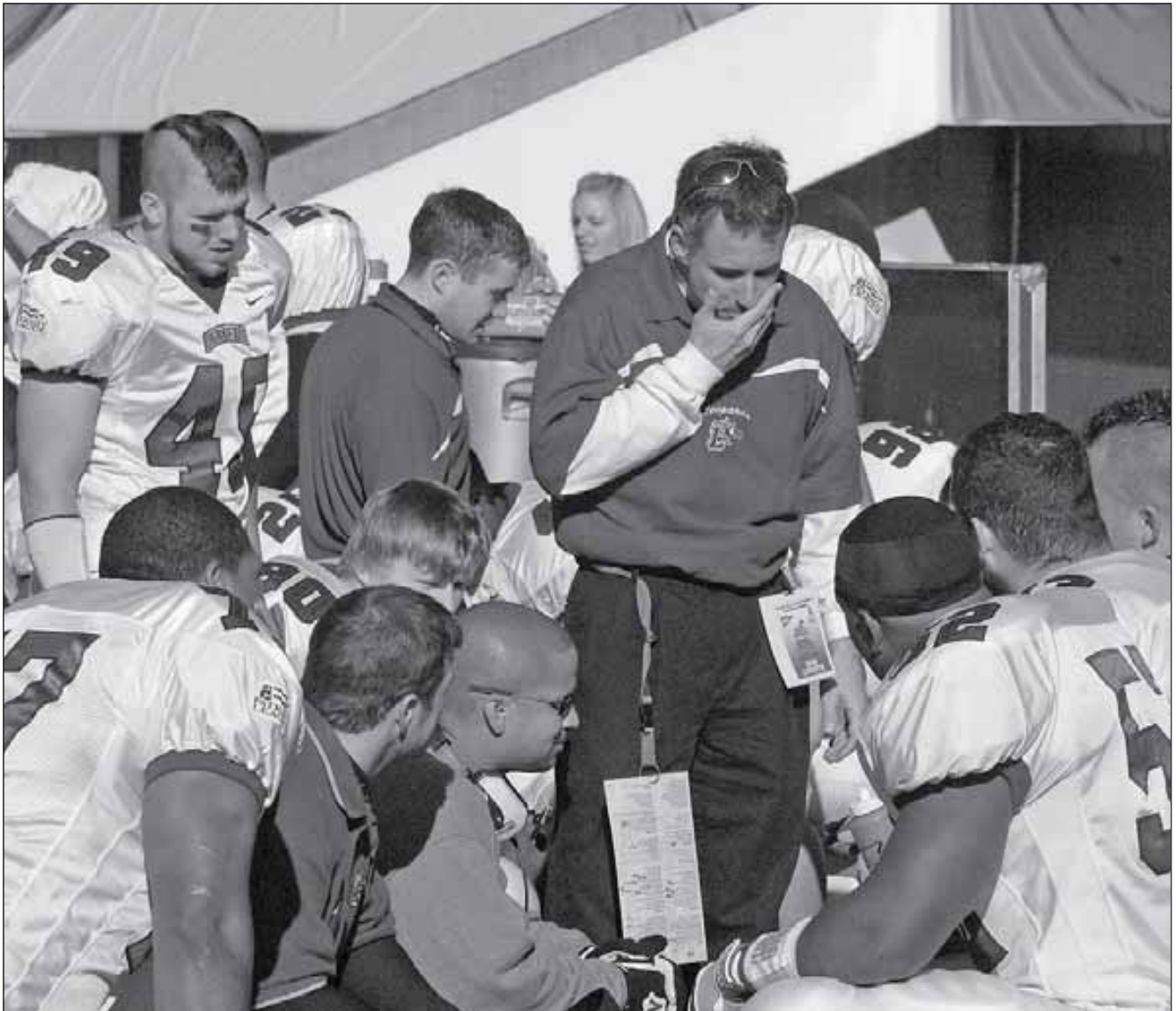

HEAD COACH FRANK TAVANI

When Frank Tavani was hired on December 11, 1999, he was charged with restoring a once proud football program to a championship level. Now under his tutelage, Lafayette is home to the last three Patriot League championships and three straight NCAA Play-off appearances. Tavani and the Leopards are no longer an unknown commodity in the NCAA Division I Football Championship Subdivision. They have arrived and are in search of a record-fourth straight conference title.

One of the top motivators at any level in the country, Tavani has changed the expectations of a program that was at the bottom of the Patriot League when he took control. Eight years later, Lafayette has made the first three postseason appearances in school history, laying claim to the Patriot League's automatic bid to the playoffs in 2004 and 2006, while earning the program's first at-large bid in 2005.

Nearly as important to the College's alumni, the road to the championship has gone through Lehigh every year. The Leopards have won three straight games and four of the last five meetings of the most-played rivalry in college football after their 49-27 victory on Nov. 18, 2006, which punched their latest ticket to the playoffs.

Tavani's ability to get the most out of his team is unmatched. Over the last three years, the Leopards are 15-3 in Patriot League play - and a perfect 8-0 after suffering their first league setback. Lafayette's near upsets of defending national champion Delaware in 2004 and eventual national champion Appalachian State in 2005, both in enemy territory, only cement Tavani's reputation for getting his team ready for big games.

In 2004, Tavani was named Patriot League Coach of the Year after leading the Leopards to their first championship in a decade, despite being picked no higher than fifth in the preseason poll of the league's coaches. He was a finalist for the Eddie

Robinson National Coach of the Year Award for his efforts, and signed a five-year contract extension following the season. Tavani added two more years to his contract after last year's successful title defense, and will patrol the sidelines at Fisher Stadium through at least 2012.

Tavani has been a part of six Patriot League championship teams in his 20 years at Lafayette. He came to College Hill in 1987, and the Leopards captured their first league crown the next year. He was also the running backs coach on the 1992 and 1994 championship teams, and has secured each of the last three titles as the head coach.

Jonathan Hurt, the 2006 Patriot League Offensive Player of the Year, grinded out 1,165 rushing yards as a senior, giving Tavani a 1,000-yard rusher in 10 of his 20 seasons on the Leopards' coaching staff. He has recruited and coached the top four rushers in Lafayette history (five of the top six) and has mentored four different tailbacks to Offensive Player of the Year honors. Erik Marsh '95, the Patriot League's all-time leading rusher, was recognized in 1992 and 1993, while Joe McCourt '05 took the honors in 2004 and Tom Costello '92 was the recipient in 1989.

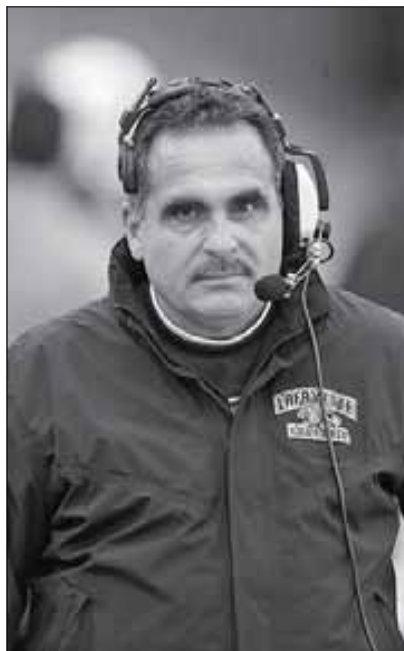
An explosive offense guided by that

running attack has been a staple of Tavani-led football programs. McCourt finished his career in 2004 as the all-time school and Patriot League-leader with 50 rushing touchdowns and is second in Lafayette annals with 4,474 yards on the ground. Marko Glavic and John Weyrauch concluded their careers in 2003 after rewriting the Lafayette record book. Glavic owns nearly every school passing record as well as Patriot League records for passing yards (9,819) and total offense (10,064 yards) while Weyrauch is Lafayette's all-time leader in both receptions (162) and receiving yards (2,406).

While Lafayette won when outside expectations were low in 2004 and defended its championship with an experienced senior class last season, the difficulties of an anticipated "three-peat" may have made the Leopards' 2006 performance Tavani's best coaching job. The Leopards broke into the top 25 early in the season, only to drop the next four against an extremely challenging Ivy League slate, and the losing streak was extended to five by Holy Cross.

Lafayette went to Colgate on Oct. 28 facing a 10-game losing streak to the Raiders, a perennial conference contender, but a convincing 27-10 victory in Hamilton,

N.Y. resurrected the Leopards' season and provided the impetus for the stretch run.

After wins over Fordham and Georgetown, Lafayette entered the 142nd game with Lehigh in a familiar situation - win and you're in. Tavani went back to the black jerseys that the Leopards wore for the 2004 game, which resulted in a 24-10 win over the Mountain Hawks. While the sartorial switch wasn't the reason for Lafayette's 49-27 triumph this time around, it allowed Tavani and the Leopards to claim their third straight championship in style.

The Leopards' postseason performances have been just as impressive against a trio of teams that have competed for the national championship. Last season, Lafayette trailed No. 3 seed Massachusetts 21-14 late in the third quarter before the Minutemen shook the Leopards with a pair of late scores for a 35-14 victory, and UMass went on to play Appalachian State in the national championship game.

In 2005, Lafayette traveled to Appalachian State, the No. 2 seed in the field. The Leopards led 17-10 at the half and entered the fourth quarter tied at 20-all before the Mountaineers emerged with a 34-23 victory, and went on to win the first of two straight national titles. The previous season, Tavani took his team to defending national champion Delaware and gave the

Blue Hens all they could handle. A long touchdown drive capped by a one-yard run by McCourt gave the Leopards a one-point lead in the fourth quarter, before an 87-yard fumble return for a touchdown in the final three minutes turned the tide for Delaware in a 28-14 victory.

Tavani resurrected the program with the second-best turnaround in I-AA football during the 2002 season. Lafayette improved upon a 2-8 season in 2001 with a 7-5 overall record and 5-2 league mark, which included a 14-7 win vs. Lehigh for the first victory over the Mountain Hawks in seven seasons. Although the Leopards finished 5-6 in 2003, the still proved the turnaround was no fluke. Four of those losses were by a touchdown or less, including two against Top 25 opponents.

Tavani's student-athletes are also getting the job done in the classroom, with 23 CoSIDA Academic All-District honorees in his seven seasons as head coach, and a total of 38 Lafayette players have earned the distinction since 1995. Lafayette has also claimed four of the last six Patriot League Football Scholar-Athletes of the Year and three straight (Brad Maurer-2006, Maurice Bennett-2005, Stephen Bono-2004, Stewart Kupfer-2001).

The year before coming to Lafayette, Tavani served as the defensive coordinator at Lebanon Valley College, his alma mater. During that time, he was also Lebanon Valley's director of alumni services and parents' programs, activating 15 alumni chapters. From 1976-85, Tavani was the offensive coordinator at Franklin and Marshall College, helping guide the Diplomats to a 10-year record of 67-23-1.

As an undergraduate at Lebanon Valley, Tavani was an outstanding running back, earning the team's Most Valuable Player honors twice in his career. As a senior, he became the school's first player to rush for more than 1,000 yards in a single season. An Associated Press All-American as a senior, he was inducted into the school's Athletic Hall of Fame in the fall of 1988. Tavani was inducted into the Lebanon Catholic High School Hall of Fame in its inaugural class in March 2004 and joined the Central Chapter of the Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame in November 2006.

Tavani earned a bachelor of arts degree in Psychology from Lebanon Valley in 1975, and has completed postgraduate work in Counselor Education.

Tavani and his wife, Agnes, reside on College Hill with their dog Rocky, and are the parents of four children. Liam and Meghan are graduates of Lafayette, earning their degrees in 2003 and 2006, respectively. Daniel is a senior and a member of the football team at Wofford College, and Bridget attends high school at Notre Dame Green Pond.

ASSISTANT COACHES



Bob Heffner
Associate Head Coach/
Offensive Line

Bob Heffner, who previously served as an assistant football coach with Lafayette teams that captured the 1988 and 1994 Patriot League championships, is in his seventh year back on College Hill after serving as an assistant coach at the University of Maryland. He spent four seasons in College Park, including two as the Terrapins' offensive coordinator. Following one season as Lafayette's assistant head coach, Heffner was promoted to associate head coach during the summer of 2002.

In the six seasons since his return to Lafayette, Heffner has mentored offensive lines that have served as fronts for one of the most prolific offenses in the Patriot League. In 2006, the Leopards were second in the conference in scoring offense (26.3 ppg) spurred by the Patriot League Offensive Player of the Year Jon Hurt who ran behind three All-Patriot League selections. In 2005, Lafayette the league in total offense (365.7 yards per game) and passing offense (214.8 ypg). Lafayette was second in the league with 27.0 points and 212.8 yards rushing in 2004. In 2003, the front five paved the way for the offense to roll up 404.9 yards per game, tops in the

Patriot League. Heffner guided an offensive line in 2002 that finished second in the Patriot League in both passing offense and sacks allowed. Heffner's offensive line also garnered league recognition in 2001, leading the league in sacks allowed with 11, five better than any other league member.

Heffner has mentored 14 All-Patriot League linemen, and eight in his most recent time at Lafayette. **Mike Saint Germain** reached All-America and All-Patriot League First-Team status in his senior season of 2006. Seniors **Jesse Padilla** and **Greg Lippert**, both All-Patriot League Second Team honorees last season, return to anchor the line in 2007. During the Leopards' 2004 championship run, right guard **Stephen Bono** and right tackle **Joe Ungrady** both garnered All-America honors.

In Heffner's first season directing Maryland's offensive unit, the Terrapins posted the 10th-highest scoring average in school history and its best in the previous seven seasons. Maryland ranked first in the Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC) and 12th nationally in rushing yards per game (234.1), and tailback LaMont Jordan earned second-team All-America honors after finishing fifth in the country in rushing. Heffner joined the Maryland staff in 1997 after serving as offensive line coach at Northern Illinois in 1996. Heffner coached at Lafayette for a total of five seasons on two separate occasions prior to Northern Illinois. He was Lafayette's offensive coordinator and offensive line coach from 1993-95 and

offensive line coach in 1988-89.

Between his coaching stops at Lafayette, Heffner spent four years in the professional ranks. He served as the director of player personnel and offensive coordinator for the Arena League champion Tampa Bay Storm in 1993 and as offensive line and running backs coach for the British Columbia Lions of the Canadian Football League. During his time with British Columbia, the Lions' Doug Flutie was voted the CFL's Most Valuable Player after setting the league record for passing yards in a season, and Jim Mills was named the league's Most Valuable Offensive Lineman in 1990 and 1991.

Heffner began his collegiate coaching career with Illinois State as the interior defensive line coach in 1981 before taking over as offensive line coach during a seven-year stay with the Redbirds. Under his guidance, Illinois State had two offensive linemen earn All-American recognition and eight claim first-team all-conference honors.

A 1979 graduate of Temple with a bachelor of science degree in Education, Heffner earned three letters as an offensive guard and played on Owl teams that made Mirage Bowl appearances in 1977 and 1978. He then served as a graduate assistant coach at his alma mater in 1979. One year later, he served as an assistant football coach and teacher at North Hunterdon (N.J.) High School.

Heffner, and his wife, Nancy, a native of Warren Glen, N.J., have three daughters, Katie, Molly, and Shelby.

Mike Faragalli

Offensive Coordinator/
Quarterbacks

Mike Faragalli begins his eighth season at Lafayette as the Leopards' offensive

coordinator and quarterbacks coach. He had served as the offensive coordinator at Bowling Green State University eight of the previous nine seasons before coming to College Hill.

It did not take Faragalli long to make an impact with the Leopards, as he helped implement a passing attack that has ranked either first or second in the Patriot League in five of his first six seasons as offensive coordinator. Four of his student-athletes have earned major Patriot League postseason awards, as tailback **Jonathan Hurt** closed out his career in 2006 by being named Patriot League Offensive Player of the Year. **Joe McCourt** achieved the same honor in 2004 after being named Rookie of the Year in 2001. **Phil Yarberough** was named the 2000 Offensive Player of the Year and

quarterback **Marko Glavic** earned 2000 Rookie of the Year honors.

Glavic and Lafayette's all-time leading receiver **John Weyrauch**, along with McCourt and quarterback **Brad Maurer**, flourished in Faragalli's system, rewriting the record books over their four-year careers. Glavic finished his career as both the Patriot League and Lafayette's all-time leader in total offense and passing yards, while Weyrauch set new standards for receptions in a game and career and receiving yards in a career. Maurer won three Patriot League championships and graduated in 2006 as the all-time leader in passing efficiency. McCourt finished as the school and Patriot League record holder with 50 rushing touchdowns, was second with 4,474 rushing yards and fourth in career receptions.

Faragalli sandwiched two four-year stints as the offensive coordinator at Bowling Green around one season as the head coach of the Canadian Football League's Toronto Argonauts in 1995. Faragalli has a wealth of CFL experience, serving as the offensive coordinator with three different clubs from 1985-1990.

Faragalli guided an explosive offensive attack at Bowling Green. The Falcons led

the Mid-American Conference in scoring offense in four of his eight seasons and never ranked lower than third in total offense. He played a significant role in the development of Bowling Green quarterbacks Erik White, the conference MVP in 1991 and 1992, and Ryan Henry, fourth on the MAC list with 46 career touchdown passes.

Under Faragalli's guidance, Bowling Green ranked 13th in the nation in rushing offense and led the MAC in scoring offense in the 1998 season. He helped lead the Falcons to two bowl championships—the California Raisin Bowl in 1991 and the Las Vegas Bowl in 1992. Both seasons, Bowling Green captured the MAC title.

Prior to his tenure at Bowling Green, Faragalli spent three seasons as the offensive coordinator at Edmonton in the CFL under his father, Joe. Edmonton advanced to the Western Conference title game in each of Faragalli's three seasons. He also played a role in the development of quarterback Tracy Ham, the CFL Most Valuable Player in 1989, helping lead the Eskimos to the Grey Cup.

The Philadelphia, Pa. native also served as the offensive coordinator for one season in Montreal and two in Hamilton. While with Hamilton, he helped lead the Tiger-Cats to the Eastern Conference Championship and an appearance in the Grey Cup game both seasons.

Faragalli began his coaching career at the University of Rhode Island in 1979 and later coached at University of Wisconsin—Madison and the College of William and Mary. He coached the receivers during each of those three stints.

A 1980 graduate of Rhode Island with a bachelor of arts degree in Secondary Education, Faragalli played defensive back for the Rams' football team.

Faragalli and his wife, Kathy, reside in Nazareth, Pa., with their four children, Joseph, Phillip, Theresa, and Laura.

John Loose

Defensive Coordinator/
Defensive Backs

John Loose enters his seventh season as the defensive coordinator at Lafayette, and also coaches the defensive

backs. Loose had previously served as the linebackers coach at Army for eight seasons.

In 2006, Loose guided a defensive that was the best in the conference at stopping the run, allowing just 139 yards per game on the ground. Six players from the 2006 squad earned all-league honors, including graduated seniors **Marvin Snipes** and **Torian Johnson** who were recognized for the second times in their careers along with

first-time selections **Dan Liseno**, **Kyle Sprenkle**, **Adrian Lawson** and **Andy Romans** also collected All-Patriot League honors and will anchor the defense in 2007.

In 2005, the Leopards were ranked among the top 20 teams in the nation in five categories, including ninth in scoring defense (17.0 ppg) and 11th in total defense (296.9 ypg). They also finished in the top two in the league in pass defense (166.9 ypg), rush defense (130.0 ypg), pass defense efficiency (105.6 rating) and third-down defense (31.8 percent). Linebacker **Maurice Bennett** was a finalist for the Buchanan Award and was recognized as an All-American by five national organizations after leading Lafayette with 133 tackles and seven sacks. Fellow linebackers **Blake Costanzo** and **Dion Witherspoon** were also named to the All-

Patriot League team and combined with Bennett for 329 tackles as seniors.

The Leopards' defense stepped up in the 2004 Patriot League championship run, holding their league opposition to 15.2 points and 103.7 rushing yards per game to lead the league in both categories. Loose's charges allowed 14 scoring opportunities inside the 20-yard line and five red zone touchdowns in six games. The 2003 unit forced 15 fumbles with **Wes Erbe** accounting for five himself, tied for second-most nationally.

Loose spent eight years at West Point after arriving in 1992. He spent two seasons assisting with Army's defensive secondary and linebacker positions. During the 1994 and 1995 campaigns, he served as head junior varsity coach while also mentoring the varsity outside linebackers. With his guidance, Army ranked sixth in the nation in rushing defense during a 10-2 season in 1996.

Before signing on with Bob Sutton's staff at Army, Loose spent three seasons at the U.S. Coast Guard Academy as an assistant, serving as both defensive coordinator and defensive secondary coach under head coach Tom Bell.

Following a stellar prep football career at Watkins Glen High School, Loose opted to concentrate on his track abilities and forged a standout collegiate career at Ithaca College. A five-time NCAA qualifier and All-America choice, Loose specialized in the high jump and remains the school record-holder with a leap of 6-10 1/4. He earned four letters each indoors and outdoors prior to graduating in 1987 with a bachelor of science degree in Physical Education and a minor in Psychology.

In addition to his athletic slate at Ithaca, Loose assisted with several local high school squads, serving on the staff at Corning West High School in 1986 after two years at his alma mater, Watkins Glen High. The Watkins Glen, N.Y. native began his coaching career at SUNY Albany in 1987, coaching the Great Danes' defensive backs for two seasons before departing for the Coast Guard Academy in 1989. While at Albany, Loose earned his master of science degree in Curriculum Planning and Development.

Loose and his wife, Marianne, are the proud parents of two daughters—Lauren and Grace.

Matt Hachmann

Recruiting
Coordinator /
Linebackers

Matt Hachmann is in his eighth season as an assistant coach

with the Lafayette football program. After coaching the Leopards' running backs his first season, he will mentor the linebackers for the seventh consecutive campaign. Hachmann, who held the title of special teams coordinator from 2003 to 2006, is now the program's recruiting coordinator.

Hachmann mentored **Andy Romans** to All-Patriot League Second Team honors at middle linebacker in 2006, one of only three sophomores to earn all-league recognition. Romans led the Leopards in tackles (109) and is the second-leading returning tackler in the conference.

In 2005, all three of Lafayette's senior linebackers—**Maurice Bennett**, **Blake Costanzo** and **Dion Witherspoon**—were named All-Patriot League, just the fourth time in the league's history that a school's linebackers accomplished that feat. Bennett earned All-America honors, including first team mention from *The Sports Network* and the *Associated Press*, and was named first team All-Patriot League after leading the league with 133 tackles last season and 119 stops in 2004. Bennett was also a finalist for the Buchanan Award and earned a tryout with the Chicago Bears following graduation.

Costanzo was second team All-Patriot League each of his last two seasons and finished his career with 307 tackles and 18 sacks. He signed a three-year contract with the New York Jets following the 2006 NFL Draft and played for the Rhein Fire in 2007, earning All-NFL Europa honors.

Hachmann's influence on the special teams could be seen through the success of the team's kick returner **Larry Johnson** and punt returner **Brandon Stanford**, both 2006 graduates. Johnson holds the single-season record for kick return yardage (625 yards) and average return (27.5) while Stanford holds the single-season punt return yardage record (438 yards).

Hachmann has served on the football staff at four different BCS programs, most recently as the offensive assistant

and director of football operations at the University of Maryland.

While at Maryland, Hachmann was involved with all game plan sessions and offensive strategy meetings. He was responsible for overseeing the day-to-day operations of the football office and directed the in-house operations in regards to recruiting. A 1993 graduate of the University of St. Thomas in St. Paul, Minn. with a bachelor's degree in marketing management, Hachmann was a three-year letterwinner for the football team that was a Division III quarterfinalist in 1990. He was also a two-year letterwinner on the baseball squad, earning most improved player honors as a senior.

Hachmann served as the assistant offensive line coach at the University of Oklahoma for the 1997 and 1998 seasons. He spent the 1995 and 1996 seasons at Northern Illinois University, also serving as the assistant offensive line coach.

While associated with both Oklahoma and Northern Illinois, he pursued a master of science degree in Sports Management. Following graduation from St. Thomas, Hachmann served as the recruiting assistant at Northwestern University for the 1994 season.

Born in Queens, N.Y., and raised in Chicago, Hachmann and his wife, Kimberly, are the proud parents of three children—Rien, Jake and Justin.

Joe Dougherty

Running Backs

Joe Dougherty is in his second tour of duty on the Lafayette coaching staff where he begins his second season as the running backs coach. Dougherty was the wide receivers coach for the Leopards in 2003 before fulfilling the same responsibilities and coordinating

the special teams at Fordham in 2004 and 2005.

In 2006, when Dougherty returned for his second stint on College Hill, he worked with tailback **Jonathan Hurt** who ripped off 1,165 yards on his way to Patriot League Offensive Player of the Year honors. Hurt scored 17 touchdowns, 15 on the ground and was 14th in the nation and first in the conference in scoring (8.5 ppg).

While at Fordham, Dougherty coached the first team all-Patriot League kicker and punter in 2005, and implemented the league's top punt coverage scheme. In

2004, the punt return unit led the Patriot League in yards per return.

Dougherty mentored two of Lafayette's top six all-time receivers through their senior seasons in 2003. **John Weyrauch**, the school's career record holder in both receptions and yards, and **Jeremy Burkes** combined for 77 catches, 1,152 yards and nine touchdowns. Burkes recorded 234 yards and Weyrauch had 130 yards receiving against Columbia in 2003 as **Marko Glavic** broke the school record with 453 yards passing against the Lions, including three plays of more than 50 yards.

Dougherty was a member of the coaching staff at Rowan for two years before his first stint at Lafayette, serving as quarterbacks coach (2002) and linebackers coach (2001) and the recruiting coordinator both seasons. Rowan was a Division III national semi-finalist in his first season, and finished 2002 ranked second in the country. He was offensive coordinator at Bishop Hafey High School in Hazleton, Pa. in 1999 and 2000.

Dougherty graduated from Dickinson in 1999 with a bachelor of science degree in Biology and a minor in Psychology. He was a four-year letterwinner at wide receiver and wingback and also earned two letters in track and field for the Red Devils.

Dougherty got married to the former Kasey Ryan in June of 2007.

Al Holcomb

Defensive Line

Al Holcomb starts his second season as the defensive line coach at Lafayette. Holcomb last coached at

Division II Kutztown University, where he was the defensive coordinator and defensive backs coach in 2004 and 2005 and served as acting head coach in the winter of 2005.

In his first season on College Hill, Holcomb coached defensive end **Marvin Snipes** and tackles **Dan Liseno** and **Kyle Sprenkle** to All-Patriot League honors. The Leopards led the conference in rushing defense (139 ypg). In 2007, **Keith Bloom** will join his senior classmate, Sprenkle, as the anchors on the defensive line.

In the summer of 2007, Holcomb participated in the NFL's minority coaching internship with the N.Y. Jets. He spent mini camp and training camp working the Jets' defense.

Holcomb has coached 23 all-conference players on the defensive side of the ball over the last 11 seasons. While at Kutztown, he mentored defensive back Mike Baldwin, the 2005 PSAC East Defensive Player of the Year and an *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-American.

Holcomb was the linebackers coach and

special teams coordinator at Bloomsburg for six seasons, beginning in 1998, before moving to Kutztown. Bloomsburg won the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference championship four straight years (2000-03) and made appearances in the NCAA Playoffs in 2000 and 2001. The Huskies played in the national championship game and boasted the eight-ranked defense in the country in 2000, and won the Lambert Cup both years.

Prior to his time at Bloomsburg, Holcomb was linebackers coach, assistant track coach and a physical education instructor at Colby College, a Division III institution in Waterville, Maine. In 1996

and 1997, he was the graduate assistant coach in charge of linebackers at Temple when the Owls were a member of the Big East.

A 1993 graduate of West Virginia with a bachelor's degree in Sport Management, Holcomb earned his master's degree in Athletic Coaching Education from WVU in 1996. He began his coaching career as linebackers coach at Morgantown High School in the fall of 1994, and served as a volunteer administrative assistant with the Mountaineers while pursuing his graduate degree.

Holcomb and his wife, Toni, are the parents of a son, Alex, and reside in Center Valley.

Phil Hallahan
Offensive Assistant

Phil Hallahan is in his third season on the Lafayette coaching staff as an

offensive assistant, working primarily with the Leopards' receiving corps.

Hallahan oversaw a 2006 passing attack that was ranked 37th in the nation in passing efficiency. **Joe Ort '06** and junior **Shaun Adair** posted big numbers with Ort reeling in 50 balls for 814 yards while Adair pulled down 33 catches for 501 yards. Adair highlights a strong group in 2007 and is joined by seniors **Duano Dorsey, James Dixon, Kevin Logan and Kyle Roeder.**

Lafayette's passing attack flourished in 2005, ranking second in the Patriot League with 214.8 yards per game. **Brandon Stanford '06** and Ort had career years, with Stanford earning All-Patriot League First-Team honors after finishing second in the conference with 57 catches and 683 yards. Ort caught 28 passes for 482 yards in nine.

Prior to arriving at Lafayette, Hallahan coached running backs at Amherst College for two seasons, where he mentored tailback Fletcher Ladd to ECAC Division III Northeast Player of the Year honors and the All-New England Division II/III Team.

A 2003 graduate of Syracuse University with a degree in Consumer Studies, Hallahan was the head manager for the Orange football program as an undergraduate. He also spent one summer as an administrative intern for the Syracuse football program and spent time working for the program's video coordinator.



Bob Lockhart

Bob Lockhart is in his second season as a member of the Lafayette coaching

staff. He is serving as an offensive assistant, working primarily with the tight ends.

Lockhart coached **Kevin Ganascioli '07** to All-Patriot League honors at tight end, the second straight season a Lafayette tight end was honored by the conference coaches. Ganascioli, a converted running back, caught 11 passes for 139 and was a key player in the Leopards' running game.

Lockhart, a 2006 inductee into the New Jersey Scholastic Coaches Association Hall of Fame, spent the last 13 years as head coach at Warren Hills Regional and led the Blue Streaks to the New Jersey Group 3 State Championship in 2000. He is reunited with the Leopards' fifth-year senior wide receiver Archie Fisher, who was a junior on Warren Hills' state championship team.

The veteran coach closed his tenure at Warren Hills with Skyland Conference

Coach of the Year honors and leaves with the most wins in school history. He is a three-time recipient of the Newark *Star-Ledger* West Jersey Coach of the Year and was the Easton *Express-Times* and Warren County Coach of the Year in 2000, when Warren Hills was ranked seventh in the state by the Star-Ledger. Lockhart won three conference championships and led the program to five appearances in the state playoffs over the last six years.

Lockhart will continue his duties as a health and physical education teacher at Warren Hills, where he has taught for the last 24 years. He was an assistant football coach for eight years before becoming the head coach, and has also served as head girls basketball coach and an assistant baseball, basketball and track coach. Lockhart was also head football coach at Pen Argyl for two seasons.

He is a 1981 graduate of Trenton State College (now TCNJ) where he was an all-conference quarterback in each of his last three seasons and team captain as a senior. He was named All-East by the ECAC at quarterback for his senior season.

Lockhart and his wife, Donna, have two children — Rob (25) and Stephanie (24).
