JIM FINNEN PUBLIC ADDRESS ANNOUNCER



Jim Finnen has been the "Golden Voice" of Lafayette Athletics for 45 years. Finnen, who has served as the public address announcer for Lafayette football and basketball since 1964, was inducted into the Maroon Club Athletic Hall of Fame in 1998. He is one of just two inductees who were not an athlete, coach or administrator at the College.

Finnen came to Easton in 1961 to serve as the news director at WEST-AM. He left the station in 1964 and was approached immediately to become the public address announcer at Lafayette, with one stipulation. The fall of 1964 brought Lehigh to Fisher Field for the 100th renewal of the rivalry, and announcer Dr. Finley Smith, a professor at the College, made that game, a 6-6 tie, his final appearance behind the microphone. Dr. Smith assumed other football game day responsibilities, and he

and Finnen became close friends until his death several years ago.

Finnen has missed just three of the 214 home football games since he arrived on College Hill: Oct. 26, 1974, a 24-18 loss to Colgate, and a pair of season-opening wins over Kutztown in the late 1980s. Lafayette is 130-90-7 at Fisher Stadium with Finnen manning the public address system. Finnen announced his 200th game in 2003 when the Leopards posted a 35-17 win over Bucknell in the home finale. The longevity of Finnen's service to Lafayette is nearly equaled by that of his sidekick and spotter, Tom Golden.

The legendary announcer has been behind the microphone for all but a handful of the several hundred basketball games at the Kirby Sports Center since his arrival as well. By his estimation, Finnen hasn't missed a home men's or women's game in more than 20 years. He has also coined the phrase familiar to all Lafayette hoops fans, "and now, let's play basketball" to start off all Leopard basketball games.

Finnen and his wife, the former Beatrice Lehan, both graduated from the University at Albany in 1954. They have four children and three grandchildren. He is retired from The Stroh Brewery Company of Detroit, Mich. and currently serves as a government relations consultant.

MEDIA SERVICES

CREDENTIALS

Media credentials for Lafayette home games are issued to working members of the media only and should be requested as early as possible. Requests must be made in writing on company letterhead and are honored only from sports editors of daily newspapers and sports directors of radio and television stations.

Lafayette College follows the guidelines set forth by the NCAA and the Patriot League in governing the issuance of credentials. Season credentials will be granted only to daily newspapers and television/radio stations that cover Lafayette football on a regular basis. Otherwise, television/radio stations and weekly newspapers will be granted credentials on a single-game, space-available basis.

Requests for season credentials should arrive by Aug. 28, 2009. Requests for single-game credentials should arrive no later than one week in advance of the game. All requests for credentials should be made to:

WEEKLY MEDIA LUNCHEONS

Each Tuesday during the season head coach Frank Tavani and at least two members of the squad will address the media and entertain questions. The luncheons will be held at Pfenning Alumni Center overlooking Fisher Stadium and will begin at noon.

MEDIA PARKING

At the intersection of High and Hamilton streets, continue straight on High Street approximately 25 yards and turn right on the east side of Markle Hall which leads to the "visitors parking" deck. The Otis F. Rowland (1895) Press Box in Fisher Stadium is located just below the parking deck. Parking passes will be mailed if the Office of Athletic Communications is notified in advance.

MEDIA WILL CALL

Located at Gate 2, between Markle Parking Deck and Oechsle Hall.

MEDIA SERVICES

Working media at Fisher Field will receive the following:

- "Real Time" statistics displayed throughout the game
- Complete final statistics
- Game programs, pregame notes, and flipcards
- Complete play-by-play
- Complete halftime statistics

TELEPHONES

A limited number of telephone lines are available in the Fisher Stadium press box. Newspapers and radio stations desiring their own private lines to be installed in the press box should contact the Office of Athletic Communications for further assistance.

INTERNET

Wireless internet access is available throughout the Rowland Press Box. A limited number of Ethernet jacks are also available for access to the internet. Please see a member of the Athletic Communications Staff for connection information.

REFEREE MIC FEED

Rowland Press box offers a feed of the referee's microphone for use by radio stations.

INTERVIEW POLICIES

All interviews with Lafayette College football players and coaches must be arranged through the Athletic Communications Office. Players will not be available on game day until after the game.

POSTGAME MEDIA & INTERVIEW ROOM

The postgame media and interview room is located in the multipurpose lounge on the second level of Allan P. Kirby Sports Center.

POSTGAME INTERVIEWS

Following each game, there will be a 10-minute cooling-off period. Approximately 10 minutes after the game ends, the visiting team's press conference will be conducted in the interview room, followed by Coach Tavani and selected Lafayette players. Following the coaches' interview sessions, additional players will be available to members of the media.

PLAYER TELEPHONE INTERVIEWS

All requests for player telephone interviews should be made at least 24 hours in advance through the Office of Athletic Communications. Telephone requests will be scheduled at an appropriate time, so as not to interfere with the academic schedule of the student-athlete.

LEOPARDS ON TELEVISION

For the seventh straight year, fans will be able to watch all 11 games of the 2009 football season live via the Lafayette Sports Network, the national leader in Division I Football Championship Subdivision television coverage. Now in its 13th year of existence, LSN has become a staple for Leopard fans in the Lehigh Valley and across the country.

Fans will hear the familiar voices of RCN's Gary Laubach and Lafayette's own John Leone who will provide play-by-play commentary and color analysis from the booth. Joining the team from the sidelines for the ninth season is RCN's Dan Mowdy.

LSN, named one of the best college or university-run sports networks in the country by *Broadcast and Cable Magazine*, has annually produced the most expansive television package in the Patriot League since its inception.

Each LSN telecast airs live regionally to more than 10 million viewers on RCN-4 and WBPH-60 in the Lehigh Valley, Philadelphia, Western New Jersey and Pocono areas. The Lafayette Sports Network can also be viewed in central New Jersey, New York City and Boston via the RCN cable systems.

Nationally, the telecasts can be seen through MASN (Mid-Atlantic Sports Network), LSN's national DIRECTV and DISH Network partner. The telecasts reach a combined audience of more than 95 million viewers.

MASN is the official television home of the Baltimore Orioles, Washington Nationals and Baltimore Ravens, and in addition to its national distribution, it reaches nearly six million homes in a seven-state area, from Harrisburg, Pa. to Charlotte, N.C.

RCN cable subscribers can also watch LSN telecasts anytime free of charge through RCN's video on demand service.

Inside Lafayette Football

LSN's weekly television show *Inside Lafayette Football* will air on RCN for its third season. Each week, Emmy-nominated regional sports broadcaster Gary Laubach sits down with Lafayette head coach Frank Tavani to discuss the Lafayette football program. Laubach will also interview a different student-athlete each week to discuss life at Lafayette in the classrooms and on the field.

Inside Lafayette Football will kick off on Thursday, Sept. 10 at 5:30 p.m. and can be seen every Thursday evening at 5:30 p.m. throughout the season as well as 30 minutes prior to kickoff of all Lafayette contests.

LEOPARDS ON RADIO

The Lafayette Sports Network will broadcast games on WAEB-AM 790 and WGPA-AM 1100 in 2009, airing Lafayette football on the two top-rated AM stations in the Lehigh Valley.

Veteran broadcaster Dick Hammer begins his 43rd season as the Leopards' play-by-play man. Making regular appearances

on the pre-game and post-game shows will be the Lafayette Sports Network television broadcast crew of Gary Laubach, John Leone and Dan Mowdy.

WAEB-AM 790, the top-rated AM station in the Lehigh Valley, will carry three games.

WGPA-AM 1100, the second-rated

AM station in the Lehigh Valley, will also carry at least seven, including the 145th installment of the Lafayette-Lehigh rivalry.

On the Web

Lafayette fans can watch the Leopards anytime through LSN All-Access, a subscription-based package available exclusively on GoLeopards.com. Each LSN telecast is streamed live on the internet and archived to be available for viewing anytime. More than 75 athletic contests, as well as *Inside Lafayette Football* will be provided through Lafayette Sports Network All-Access this year.

2009 NCAA DIVISION I FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

The NCAA Division I Football Championship Subdivision (formerly I-AA) is under the control, direction and supervision of the eight-member Division I FCS Football Committee appointed by the NCAA Management Council. Lafayette Director of Athletics Bruce McCutcheon is the Patriot League representative on the committee.

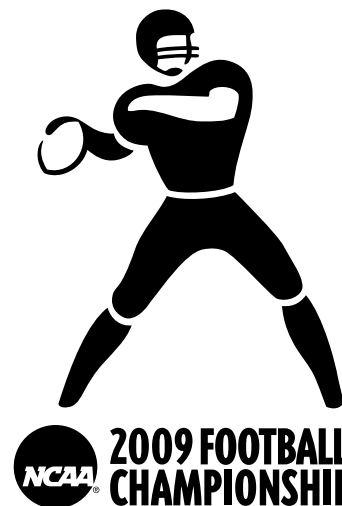
McCutcheon is joined by committee chair and Massachusetts' A.D. John McCutcheon representing the Colonial Athletic Association, Nicholls State's Rob Bernardi representing the Southland Conference, Eastern Kentucky's Mark Sandy representing the Ohio Valley Conference, Montana's Jim O'Day representing the Big Sky Conference, Youngstown State's Ronald Strollo representing the Missouri Valley Conference, Appalachian State's Charles Cobb representing the Southern Conference, Morgan State's Floyd Kerr representing the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference, Coastal Carolina's Warren Koegel of the Big South and Central Connecticut State's Charles Jones Jr. of the Northeast Conference.

Dennis Poppe, NCAA director of championships, works closely with the committee on all matters related to the Division I Football Championship. Selection of teams and conduct of championship competition are the responsibility of the committee.

The Division I Football Championship consists of a 16-team tournament, with games in each of the first three rounds being hosted by the higher seed. The championship game will be held Friday, Dec. 18 at Finley Stadium/Davenport Field in Chattanooga, Tenn. The University of Tennessee at Chattanooga will host the event for the 13th consecutive year.

The champions of eight conferences—Colonial Athletic Association, Big Sky, Mid-Eastern Athletic, Missouri Valley, Ohio Valley, Patriot, Southern and Southland—receive automatic bids to the tournament. The committee selects the remaining teams at large with assistance from four regional advisory committees.

Teams are selected for the championship

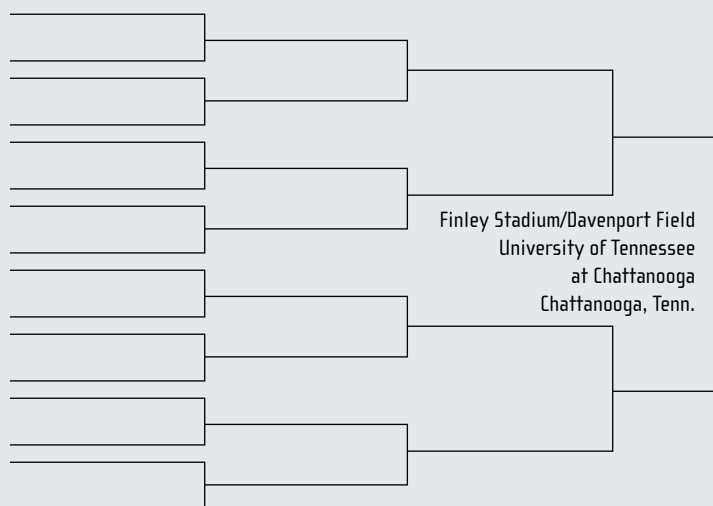


on the basis of the following criteria (not in preferential order): (1) eligibility and availability of student-athletes for NCAA post-season competition, (2) won-loss record, and (3) strength of schedule.

The committee is responsible for all pairings and seedings. The top half of the bracket has the No. 1-and No. 4-seeded teams, while the bottom half holds the No. 2- and No. 3-seeded squads. Teams are placed in the appropriate region according to the seeding of the top four teams.

Lafayette was one of six schools in the nation to earn a spot in the 16-team NCAA FCS Playoff field in each of 2004, 2005 and 2006. ▲

(shorter route) Exit I-78 onto Route 22 (heading toward Pa. Turnpike, LVI Airport/ Whitehall); follow Route 22 for about 20 miles to Easton. Take the Fourth Street exit. Turn left at the end of the exit ramp. Go to the first traffic light and turn left onto Third Street. Third Street goes under Route 22 and becomes College Avenue—a steep hill leading up to the college entrance. Follow "Entering Campus" below.

From I-78 East:

Exit I-78 at Route 33. (Rt. 33 only goes north from I-78.) Take Route 33 to Route 22, exiting onto Route 22 East towards Easton. From I-78 West:

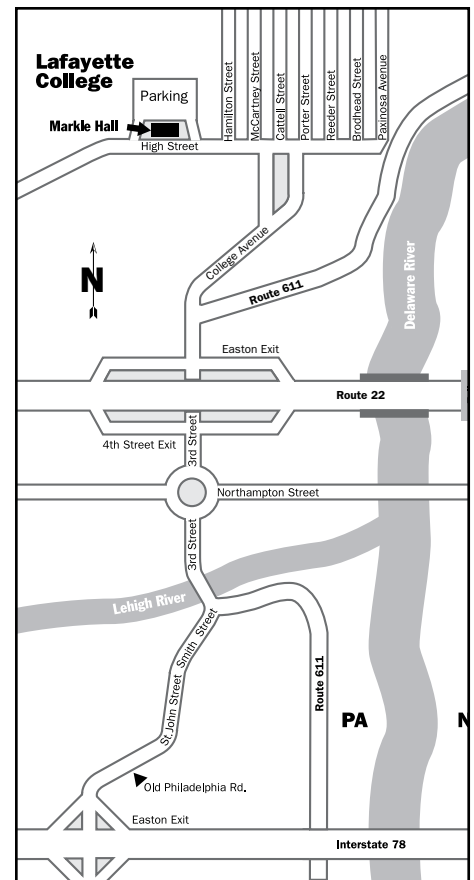

From Northeast Extension of Pennsylvania Turnpike (I-476):

Exit at the Lehigh Valley interchange (Exit 56). Proceed through the toll plaza and take Route 22 East. Follow Route 22 for approximately 15 miles to Easton. Take the Fourth Street exit. Turn left at the end of the exit ramp. Go to the first traffic light and turn left onto Third Street. THE 2009 LEOPARDS



SEASON OUTLOOK

It's a tribute to the recent sustained success of the Lafayette football program that a 7-4 mark, which included a road victory over a Top 25 team, was considered a bit of a disappointment. Consider that since 2004, Lafayette is 36-22 overall and 22-8 in Patriot League play, covering five seasons. A pair of 8-4, 5-1 marks began a Patriot League championship run of three straight years in 2004 and included a 6-6, 5-1 mark in 2006, all with 10-year head coach **Frank Tavani** at the helm. The last two seasons, Lafayette has finished 7-4 overall, with 4-2 and 3-3 league marks, respectively.

Lafayette stands as the only Patriot League program to record a winning record in each of the last five regular seasons while also holding a Top 25 national ranking each year.

With that as the background, the Lafayette coaching staff and players take to the turf of Fisher Stadium in preparation for a return to championship football that begins when the Leopards report to training camp Aug. 12.

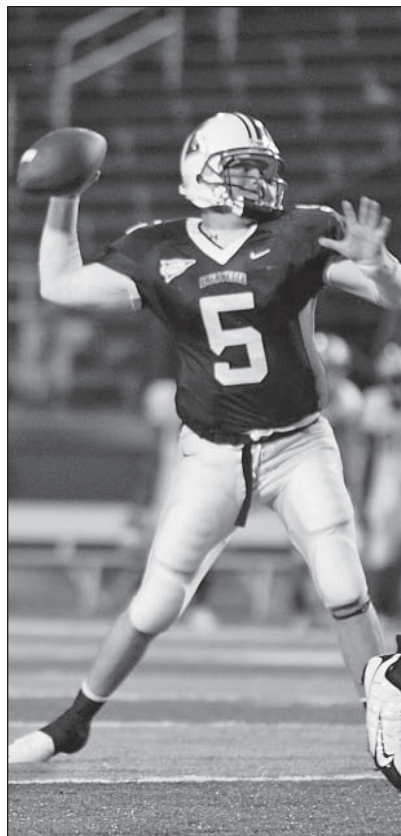

Defense has been the strength for the Leopards in recent seasons. Under the direction of coordinator **John Loose**, the Leopards will have to find a way to make up for the loss to graduation of two-time Patriot League Defensive Player of the Year and All-American Andy Romans.

Senior **Mark Leggiero**, a two-time All-Patriot League selection at linebacker, will be asked to pick up the defensive leadership reins.

Offensively, there are a lot of question marks and potentially an equal amount of correct answers to positional openings at the skill positions under new offensive coordinator **Mickey Fein**. At quarterback, senior **Rob Curley** will get the nod entering preseason camp. He started the first eight games of 2008 and then gave way to junior **Marc Quilling**, who started the final three games. As far as running the ball, the tailback spot looks to be wide open with seniors **Maurice White**, **Tyrell Coon** and **DeAndré Morrow** all vying for time along with sophomore **Jerome Rudolph**.

That group will be able to run behind a line that will return three starters from 2008 and a fourth member, **Joe Moore**, who has starting experience from 2007.

Overall, 14 starters, including three All-Patriot League selections, return along with 40 letterwinners.

QUARTERBACKS

Following spring ball, senior signal caller **Rob Curley** emerged as the Leopards' No. 1 quarterback. Junior **Marc Quilling** and sophomore **Ryan O'Neil** are competing for the backup role.

Curley posted a 3-1 mark as the starter down the final stretch in 2007 and went 6-2 in starts for the 2008 season. The senior completed 57 percent of his passes in 2008, finishing 121-for-212 for 1,424 yards with nine touchdowns and four interceptions. He entered 2008 at the top of the depth chart and started the first eight games. Against Georgetown in the conference opener, Curley racked up Patriot League Offensive Player of the Week honors after a 14-for-24 effort for 175 yards when he also rushed for two touchdowns.

Curley played into week eight, but was knocked out of the Colgate game on Nov. 1 with a concussion. Subsequently, he sat out the Nov. 8 game vs. Bucknell as a precautionary measure, but it was a coaching staff decision that kept him out of the lineup on Nov. 15 vs. Holy Cross and at the start of the Nov. 22 game vs. Lehigh. Trailing 17-12 at halftime vs. Lehigh, Tavani made the move to Curley who was the MVP of the 2007 Lafayette-Lehigh game. He finished 10-for-19 with an interception.

"Rob separated himself in the quarterback situation as you would expect a senior to do because of his experience. He is coming into camp as the starter," Tavani said. "Right now, O'Neil and Quilling are neck and neck to back up Curley."

Quilling made the most of his opportunities in 2008, completing 59 percent of his attempts (45-for-76) while throwing for 555 yards, four touchdowns and one interception. His standout game came in his first start against Bucknell when he was 17-for-26 for 274 yards, the highest single-game output for either QB in 2008.

Incoming freshman **Andrew Shoop**

will join the QB rotation. The three-sport athlete at Danville (Pa.) High School threw for over 5,100 yards and nearly 50 touchdowns in two and a half seasons as a starter.

The passing game, and the entire Leopard offense for that matter, will be under the purview of offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach **Mickey Fein**. Previously the offensive coordinator at Murray State and Tennessee-Martin, Fein was a standout player at the FCS level, graduating from Maine where he was a four-year starter and two-time team MVP. Fein spent the 2008 season as the passing game coordinator and has taken over the offense with the departure of Bob Heffner to Northwestern University.

TAILBACKS

The Lafayette running game has been tailback by committee the last two seasons because of injury, and four players are looking to establish themselves as the committee chairs as the '09 fall season starter.

DeAndré Morrow has shown the

ability to run the ball for the Leopards.

Morrow was third on the team in rushing with 58 carries for 336 yards (5.8 yards per carry). Morrow had 111 of those yards vs. Holy Cross and managed two touchdowns with 38 yards and also caught five passes when he was exceptionally elusive in a win over No. 14 Liberty.

Tyrell Coon carried 102 times in 2008, the most on the team, and finished with 454 yards and two touchdowns. Coon ripped off a career-best 169 yards on 30 carries at Bucknell in week nine. He also managed 96 yards on 14 carries vs. Georgetown.

Fifth-year senior **Maurice White** has been tabbed to be the Leopards' No. 1 the past two seasons, but injuries have interrupted those plans. Despite playing in only five games last fall, White led the team in rushing with 80 carries for 469 yards (5.9 yards per carry) and two touchdowns. The powerful White averaged 94 yards per game in 2008 and is in his fifth year of eligibility in 2009 due to a medical redshirt. He did not participate in

spring practice.

Sophomore **Jerome Rudolph** is the lone underclassman representative in the murky waters of the tailback competition. The shifty Rudolph made the most of his appearances in four games, rushing for 199 yards on 35 carries (5.7 yards per carry). His breakout effort came at Fordham when he churned out 140 yards on 16 carries with two touchdowns.

"Tailback is one of our deepest positions on the roster coming into the season," Tavani said. "I'm confident that running the ball behind an experienced line with an veteran group of backs is going to be a strength of our offense."

FULLBACKS

For the first time since 2005, someone other than Joe Russo will occupy the starting fullback spot, a position that has been used primarily as a run blocker and pass protector in recent seasons. The Leopards lost the two-time All-Patriot League First-Team selection to graduation and will look to fill his proverbial shoes with senior **Jeff Cumming**, junior defensive convert **Mark Hall** and sophomore **Alex Rivas**.

Cumming played in all 11 games in 2008 with a start at Columbia where he had two carries and caught two passes. He also started the final two games of the 2007 season. Hall is a converted linebacker who did play fullback in high school and made his mark on special teams in 2008.

WIDE RECEIVERS

Lafayette lost its top two receivers, Shaun Adair and Tim Watson, to graduation. Adair was a three-year starter, two-time All-Patriot League honoree and the team's top receiver in 2008 with 52 catches for 759 yards and five touchdowns. He left Lafayette with 2,190 receiving yards and 148 career receptions which ranked him third and fourth, respectively, all-time at Lafayette. Watson was the Leopards' most improved player for the 2008 season and ended with 19 catches for 266 yards and a touchdown.

Two juniors and three sophomores will vie for a spot in the wide receiver rotation that will likely feature five players. Juniors **Mark Layton** and **Nathan Padia** bring the most experience. Layton was third on the

team in receiving in 2008 with 17 catches for 194 yards in 10 games while Padia reeled in two catches in eight games.

"Mark had a lot of bright spots last season, and was able to make some big plays in critical situations," Tavani said. "We're looking for more of that in 2009."

Sophomore **Mitchell Bennett** made six grabs in 11 games while classmate **Greg Stripe** played in nine games, but had more of an impact running the ball from the wideout spot, carrying 10 times for 80 yards. Sophomore **Kyle Hayes** and senior **Will Braswell** will also look to compete in the wide receiver rotation.

"We have a lot of talent at the wide receiver spot, but we have guys who need to make the adjustment from 'part-time' to 'full-time'," Tavani said. "Last year we relied mostly on Adair and Watson and our younger guys played smaller roles."

TIGHT ENDS

The starting tight end spot for the last two seasons has been vacated by the graduation of two-time All-Patriot League selection Mike Conte. Senior **Michael Bolton** and a sophomore **Kevin Doty** will both likely spend time at a position that has been de-emphasized on offenses around the Patriot League, but continues to be a crucial component in the Leopards' offensive structure.

Bolton played in 10 games last season with three catches, while Doty saw action in five games as a freshman.

OFFENSIVE LINE

The Leopards' senior-laden front five will be a strength of the team in 2009. They will be guided by first-year offensive line coach **Stan Clayton** who took over for Heffner. Clayton has experience playing and coaching at the highest levels of football. He was a member of Penn State's 1986 national championship team and went on to play four seasons in the NFL. His 15-plus years of coaching have taken him to Penn State, Massachusetts, Princeton, Alabama State and most recently Toledo. He also spent six summers participating in the NFL's minority coaching fellowship program with the Chicago Bears, New York Giants, Philadelphia Eagles and Tennessee Titans.

The Leopards did lose the right side of the line in graduated seniors D.J. Brown and Leo Plenski.

The left side of the line remains intact as seniors **Ryan Hart-Predmore** and **Brian Wycinowski** will reprise their roles as starting tackle and guard, respectively. Hart-Predmore, named a team captain for

2009, will enter his third season as a starter on the offensive line. Wycinowski started all 11 games in 2008 after playing in seven as a sophomore. Sophomores **Bilal Butt** and **Scott Biel** will serve as their backups.

Michael Wojcik enters his third season as a starter at the center spot. He started eight games in 2007 and all 11 in his junior season and will again make the line calls. Sophomore **Matt Welch** and junior **Zach Schleimer** are both capable of playing center. Schleimer, who also plays guard, started 11 games at Iona College in 2008 before the school dropped its program, so he brings game experience to the mix.

Junior **Mick Eck** and senior **Roy Wotring** will battle to be the starting right guard. Wotring played in the majority of the games in 2008. Senior **Joe Moore** is the likely candidate to play right tackle, returning for a fifth year after a medical redshirt. Moore sat out 2008 with a knee injury after playing in eight games with four starts in 2007.

"Everything really starts with Ryan Hart-Predmore on the line," Tavani said. "He's our leader on the line, and along with Mike Wojcik brings a lot of playing experience."

DEFENSE

Statistically, Lafayette has featured one of the top defenses in the country over the past several seasons under the direction of defensive coordinator **John Loose**. Lafayette ranked 10th in the nation in rushing defense (92.2 ypg), 36th in pass efficiency defense (115.9 ypg) and 20th in total defense, surrendering just over 300 yards per game. More impressively, Lafayette ranked eighth in the country in scoring defense, allowing 17.5 points per game, including four

games in which the Leopards held their opponents to fewer than two touchdowns. In 2007, the Leopards were first in the nation in total defense, fourth in rushing defense, eighth in scoring defense and 15th in pass efficiency defense.

LINEBACKERS

Senior linebacker **Mark Leggiero**, the 2009 Patriot League Preseason Player of the Year, returns as one of the team's top playmakers and a team captain. He will face the 2009 season without two-time Patriot League Defensive Player of the Year Andy Romans who graduated.

Leggiero's play over the past two seasons speaks for itself. He finished 2008 with 93 tackles, two sacks and an interception while starting all 11 games. He was inserted into the starting lineup as a sophomore and finished second on the team with 77 tackles (6.5 for a loss) and tallied three sacks. He will hold down the MIKE spot in the Leopards' 4-3 where fellow senior **Spencer Brown** (13 tackles) will be a key backup.

Michael Schmidlein is expected to be the starter at WILL linebacker. Schmidlein played in 11 games with 27 tackles and a sack. He will be backed up by sophomore **Leroy Butler** who played in all 11 games with 23 tackles and received a start vs. Bucknell.

The SAM linebacking role was shaken

up a bit in the spring when returning starter **Neil Goldsmith** tore his ACL. In 2008, the junior intercepted three passes (one per game through the first three games of the 2008 season) and finished with 30 tackles and a sack while playing in nine games and starting six. Classmate **Nate Dixon** is expected to step into that role along with sophomore **Ben Eaton**. Dixon played in nine games in 2009 while Eaton sat out with a broken hand.

"Our linebacking corps certainly looks to be strength of the defense," Tavani said. "We have a lot of depth and experience at that spot, especially with Leggiero."

DEFENSIVE LINE

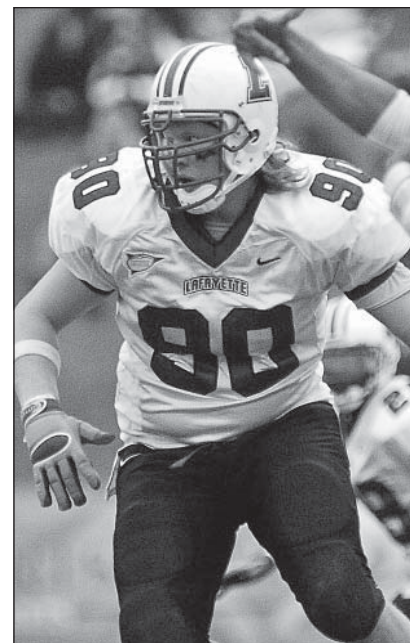
The front four will likely be comprised of three seniors and a junior after suffering the loss of both starting ends -- All-Patriot Leaguer Jason Mills and fifth-year senior Luke Schade. Senior **Allan Whitesell** made 17 tackles with two and a half sacks in 2008 while playing in 10 games with four starts at end. The other end coming out of spring ball is junior **Doug Gerowski**. Both will compete with junior **Lewis Irving**, who made the move from linebacker after playing in 10 games in 2008, and sophomore **Mike Grimaldi**.

Seniors **Andrew Poulson** and **Ian Dell** are penciled in at the tackle spots after each starting nine games last season. The duo combined for 9.5 tackles for loss in 2008 while accumulating a combined 52 tackles. Poulson

will likely line up in a nose position as he did for much of the past two seasons, but will step into a new role as one of three team captains. Junior **Michael Phillips** and sophomores **Andrew Holmes** and **Zack Patterson** will also look for playing time at tackle.

DEFENSIVE BACKS

The Lafayette defensive backs will work under the tutelage of first-year coach **Doug McFadden**. McFadden most recently served as assistant head coach from 2005-09 at Fort Hays State University in Kansas, working as the secondary coach and special teams

coordinator.

Lafayette lost a starter at cornerback (Marvin Clecidor) and strong safety (Nigel Bryant), but will return several experienced players at corner, free safety and strong safety. Hard-hitting senior **Eric McGovern** will move to strong safety from free safety where he started 11 games with one interception and was third on the team in tackles (58) in 2008. His brother, **Evan McGovern**, will be his backup.

At free safety, sophomore **Kyle Simmons** looks to have worked himself into the starting 11 following the Leopards'

spring season, but will compete with versatile senior **Nick Oliver**. An knee injury to **Nick Nardone** will keep him out for a second season.

At cornerback, senior **Carlos Lowe** started 10 games and made 43 tackles with two picks in his junior campaign. His counterpart will be sophomore **Brandon Ellis** who played in the final seven games of 2008. Junior **Donald Ellis**, who started one game and played in all 11, senior **Phillip Vincent**, who played in eight games, and sophomore **Carl Knowles** are all expected to see time.

ON SPECIAL TEAMS

With the exception of long snapper, the primary players on special teams will stay the same. Junior **Davis Rodriguez** was one of just five underclassmen from any Patriot League team to earn All-League honors in 2008. The Leopards' place kicker made 13-of-15 field goal attempts and was 4-of-5 from a distance of 40 to 49 yards, including a career long of 47 at Colgate. Rodriguez also converted 32-of-33 PATs, and at one point had a streak of 48 straight dating back to 2007.

Senior **Chris Cosgrove** will serve as Rodriguez's backup and will handle kickoff duties for the third straight season.

Junior **Tom Kondash** will reprise his role as the Leopards' punter. Kondash averaged 37.7 yards per punt on 57 attempts and placed 22 punts inside the 20-yard line. He booted a career-long 79 yarder vs. Holy Cross and connected for seven punts of 50 or more yards.

Lafayette lost its long snapper of the past three years with the graduation of Leo Plenski. Sophomore **Kevin Doty** and senior **Michael Bolton** both tight ends, are No. 1 and No. 2, respectively, on the depth chart.

As much as Lafayette will miss Adair in the receiving game, he may be an even bigger loss on special teams, as he served as the kick returner for four seasons and as the punt return specialist for his final three campaigns and was a conference leader in both categories. Sophomore **Greg Stripe** is poised to take over both roles.

Stripe was named the Patriot League Special Teams Player of the Week on Nov. 27 after recording an 80-yard kickoff return for a touchdown in Lafayette's 48-13 victory at Fordham. It was the first kick return for a TD

In the punt return game, Adair was the only player to return a kick in 2008, but Stripe, **Nathan Padia** and **Jarred Ricks** will each have opportunities.

THE SCHEDULE

Lafayette is scheduled to play an 11-game slate that kicks off on Sept. 12 at Georgetown and concludes with the 145th playing of College Football's Most-Played Rivalry at Lehigh on Nov. 21. The schedule includes six Patriot League contests and five non-league games with four of the Leopards' non-league opponents boasting winning records in 2008.

The Leopards' season opener at Georgetown comes one week after the bulk of the nation's Division I schools open the 2009 season, as Lafayette's open week will be Sept. 5 instead of during the season as it has been each season since 2002. The matchup at Georgetown will be the Hoyas' first night game since the team made Multi-Sport Field its home during the 2005 season.

After the initial Patriot League battle with Georgetown, Lafayette will play five straight non-conference games beginning with a home tilt vs. Liberty on Sept. 19 at 6 p.m. Liberty captured its second straight Big South Conference title in 2008. Lafayette won the first matchup between the two schools last season, knocking off a Flames'

squad which was ranked No. 14 in the nation at the time and went on to a 10-2 mark.

The first of four straight Ivy League opponents will come to Fisher Stadium on Sept. 26 when Penn makes the short trip north from Philadelphia for Lafayette's Family Weekend. The two teams will meet for the 86th time with Lafayette having won the last two meetings. Lafayette secured a 24-17 victory in 2008 and eked out an 8-7 thriller in 2007.

Lafayette will play Yale for the first time since 2006 when the Leopards travel to New Haven, Conn. on Oct. 3. Tavani will face first-year head coach Tom Williams who takes over for Jack Siedlecki who retired after 12 seasons as Yale's head coach. When the two teams last met, Lafayette was on the short end of a 37-34 shootout in Easton.

Columbia and Lafayette will play in week five and have squared off every season since 2000 with the exception of 2006. Lafayette is 7-1 during that span, but had to battle for a 13-3 win in New York City in 2008. The game will be the final of three home night games all beginning at 6 p.m.

A second New England trip in three weeks potentially will pose the biggest challenge of the Leopards' slew of Ivy League opponents. Harvard is emerging from its second straight Ancient Eight title after posting a 9-1 record. The Crimson have won the last eight meetings between the teams, all of which have come since 2000.

October 24 marks homecoming

weekend at Lafayette when the Leopards will take on Fordham at 1 p.m. at Fisher Stadium. Lafayette roughed up the 2007 Patriot League champs last season, notching a 48-13 victory behind 484 yards of total offense and 140 on the ground from Rudolph. Lafayette has won four out of the last five against the Rams.

The Leopards' second most-played opponent, Bucknell, comes to Easton on Halloween for the second of three straight home games. Lafayette has won seven straight over the Bison, recently having slowed Bucknell's spread option attack with Loose's deft manipulation of the playbook. Lafayette leads the all-time series 48-32-6, having played one more game all-time against the Bison (86) than against Penn (85).

The final of six home dates comes against reigning Patriot League champion Colgate on Nov. 7. The Raiders and their running game have given Lafayette the most trouble of any conference opponent in Tavani's tenure, as the Maroon and White are 1-8 vs. Colgate since 2000 with the Raiders twice accounting for the Leopards' only conference losses in Patriot League championship seasons.

The 145th meeting of college football's most played rivalry will close out the regular season on Nov. 21 when Lafayette and Lehigh square off. Lehigh snapped Lafayette's four-game series win streak in 2008.

HEAD COACH FRANK TAVANI

Frank Tavani begins his 10th season as head coach of the Lafayette football program with the same fire that fueled him when he took over the program in 1999. Boasting the second-longest head coaching tenure of all Patriot League coaches, Tavani has transformed the Lafayette football program into a consistent championship contender. Lafayette has spent time in the Top 25 each of the last five seasons and is the only Patriot League program to claim a winning record in every regular season during that span.

Tavani's teams hold a 22-8 Patriot League record over the last five years when they won three consecutive Patriot League championships from 2004 to 2006. During that championship run, the Leopards made the first three postseason appearances in school history, laying claim to the Patriot League's automatic NCAA Playoff bid in 2004 and 2006, while earning the program's first at-large berth in 2005.

In addition to Patriot League championships and NCAA Playoff appearances, Lafayette has taken care of business close to home. Lafayette has beaten its cross-valley rival Lehigh four of the last five times they met in College Football's Most Played Rivalry. The win in 2007 at Lehigh allowed the Class of 2008 to leave College Hill without ever having lost to its archrival, a feat not equaled since the since the Class of 1950.

Tavani became Lafayette's 27th head coach Dec. 11, 1999 after having served as the Leopards' running backs coach for 13 seasons. His charge upon taking the job was to restore the once proud Lafayette program to glory. With that already behind him, Tavani continues to raise his own program's expectations.

The Leopards are coming off a 2008 season that was highlighted by a 35-14 win at No. 14 Liberty in a hostile environment. The victory was the first for a Patriot League team over a ranked non-league foe in the past three seasons. It showcased Tavani's

ability to get his troops ready for the big games.

From 2004-07, Lafayette compiled 29 wins for the best record since the Class of 1927 won 29 games from 1923-1926. The Leopards' near upsets of defending national champion Delaware in 2004 and eventual national champion Appalachian State in 2005, both in enemy territory, cemented Tavani's reputation in big games.

In 2004, Tavani was named Patriot League Coach of Year after leading the Leopards to their first championship in a decade, despite being picked no higher than fifth in the preseason poll of the league's coaches. He was a finalist for the Eddie Robinson National Coach of the Year Award for his efforts, and signed a five-year contract extension following the season. Tavani added two more years to his contract after 2006's successful title defense and tacked on another two following the 2007 season, allowing him to patrol the sidelines at Fisher Stadium through at least 2014.

Tavani has been a part of six Patriot League championship teams in his 21 years at Lafayette. He came to College Hill in 1987, and the Leopards captured their first league crown the next year. He was also the running backs coach on the 1992 and 1994 championship teams, and has secured each of the last three titles as the head coach.

During his tenure, Tavani has coached some of the top players in the program's history. Andy Romans, the 2007 and 2008

Patriot League Defensive Player of the Year, anchored the No. 1-ranked defense in the country in 2007 which allowed just 85 yards per game on the ground and 175.2 yards per game through the air. He led the Leopards with 113 tackles that season, and is the third Lafayette player, and first under Tavani, to win the award. Romans and the Leopards finished in second place in the Patriot League standings, one conference win away from a fourth straight title.

Jonathan Hurt '07, the 2006 Patriot League Offensive Player of the Year, grinded out 1,165 rushing yards as a senior, giving Tavani a 1,000-yard rusher in 10 of his 20 seasons on the Leopards' coaching staff. He has recruited and coached the top four rushers in Lafayette history (five of the top six) and has mentored four different tailbacks to Offensive Player of the Year honors. Erik Marsh '95, the Patriot League's all-time leading rusher, was recognized in 1992 and 1993, while Joe McCourt '05 took the honors in 2004 and Tom Costello '92 was the recipient in 1989.

An explosive offense guided by that running attack has been a staple of Tavani-led football programs. McCourt finished his career in 2004 as the all-time school and Patriot League-leader with 50 rushing touchdowns and is second in Lafayette annals with 4,474 yards on the ground. Marko Glavic and John Weyrauch concluded their careers in 2003 after rewriting the



Lafayette record book. Glavic owns nearly every school passing record as well as Patriot League records for passing yards (9,819) and total offense (10,064 yards) while Weyrauch is Lafayette's all-time leader in both receptions (162) and receiving yards (2,406).

While Lafayette won when outside expectations were low in 2004 and defended its championship with an experienced senior class in 2005, the difficulties of an anticipated "three-peat" may have made the Leopards' 2006 performance Tavani's best coaching job. The Leopards broke into the Top 25 early in the season, only to drop the next four against an extremely challenging Ivy League slate, and the losing streak was extended to five by Holy Cross. Lafayette went to Colgate on Oct. 28 facing a 10-game losing streak to the Raiders, a perennial conference contender, but a convincing 27-10 victory in Hamilton, N.Y. resurrected the Leopards' season and provided the impetus for the stretch run.

After wins over Fordham and Georgetown, Lafayette entered the 142nd game with Lehigh in a familiar situation - win and you're in. Tavani went back to the black jerseys that the Leopards wore for the 2004 game, which resulted in a 24-10 win over the Mountain Hawks. While the sartorial switch wasn't the reason for Lafayette's 49-27 triumph this time around, it allowed Tavani and the Leopards to claim their third straight championship in style.

The Leopards' postseason performances have been just as impressive against a trio of teams that have competed for the national championship. In 2006, Lafayette trailed No. 3 seed Massachusetts 21-14 late in the third quarter before the Minutemen shook the Leopards with a pair of late scores for a 35-14 victory. UMass went on to play Appalachian State in the national championship game.

In 2005, Lafayette traveled to Appalachian State, the No. 2 seed in the field. The Leopards led 17-10 at the half and entered the fourth quarter tied at 20-all before the Mountaineers emerged with a 34-23 victory, and went on to win the first of three straight national titles. The previous season, Tavani took his team to defending national champion Delaware and gave the Blue Hens all they could handle. A long touchdown drive capped by a one-yard run by McCourt gave the Leopards a one-point lead in the fourth

quarter, before an 87-yard fumble return for a touchdown in the final three minutes turned the tide for Delaware in a 28-14 victory.

Tavani resurrected the program with the second-best turnaround in I-AA football during the 2002 season. Lafayette improved upon a 2-8 season in 2001 with a 7-5

overall record and 5-2 league mark, which included a 14-7 win vs. Lehigh for the first victory over the Mountain Hawks in seven seasons. Although the Leopards finished 5-6 in 2003, they still proved the turnaround was no fluke. Four of those losses were by a touchdown or less, including two against Top 25 opponents.

Tavani's student-athletes are also getting the job done in the classroom, with 23 CoSIDA Academic All-District honorees in his nine seasons as head coach, and a total of 38 players have earned the distinction since 1995. Lafayette has also claimed four of the last eight Patriot League Football Scholar-Athletes of the Year and three straight (Brad Maurer - 2006, Maurice Bennett - 2005, Stephen Bono - 2004, Stewart Kupfer - 2001). The Leopards also boasted 18 student-athletes on the Patriot League Academic Honor Roll in 2008.

Tavani's impact has extended beyond the playing field and the classroom. He worked with college officials and major donors on the \$33 million transformation of Fisher Stadium. The project included new spectator seating, a FieldTurf playing

surface, a new press box, 19'-by-35' video matrix board and the construction of the 24,000 square foot home of Lafayette Football at the Bourger Varsity Football House.

The year before coming to Lafayette, Tavani served as the defensive coordinator at Lebanon Valley College, his alma mater. During that time, he was also Lebanon Valley's director of alumni services and parents' programs, activating 15 alumni chapters. From 1976-86, Tavani was the offensive coordinator at Franklin and Marshall College, helping guide the Diplomats to a 10-year record of 67-23-1.

As an undergraduate at Lebanon Valley, Tavani was an outstanding running back, twice earning the team's Most Valuable Player honors. As a senior, he became the school's first player to rush for more than 1,000

yards in a single season. An *Associated Press* All-American as a senior, he was inducted into the school's Athletic Hall of Fame in the fall of 1988. Tavani was inducted into the Lebanon Catholic High School Hall of Fame in its inaugural class in March 2004 and joined the Central Chapter of the Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame in November 2006. Tavani earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in Psychology from Lebanon Valley in 1975, and has completed postgraduate work in Counselor Education.

Tavani and his wife, Agnes, reside on College Hill, and are the parents of four children. Liam '03 and Meghan '06 are graduates of Lafayette, while Bridget is a freshman on College Hill. Daniel graduated from Wofford College in 2007 where he was a four-year letterwinner for the football team.

Mickey Fein

Offensive
Coordinator/
Quarterbacks

Mickey Fein is in his second season

at Lafayette and first as the offensive coordinator. Fein served as the passing game coordinator in 2008 was promoted to offensive coordinator in the offseason. He will continue to oversee the quarterbacks and wide receivers.

Fein's impact could already be seen on the Lafayette offense in 2008, as the Leopards led the nation in fewest turnovers per game with just 11 in 11 games, down from 27 in 2007. Lafayette was picked off just five times, down from 17 in 2007.

Before arriving on College Hill, Fein spent 2006 and 2007 at Murray State in Murray, Ky. as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach. Murray State finished second in the Ohio Valley Conference and 20th in the nation in total offense with

430.5 yards per game in 2007. The squad finished first in the OVC in passing yardage and first downs and featured freshman quarterback Jeff Ehrhardt who earned OVC Newcomer of the Year Honors after leading the league in total offense, touchdown passes and passing yards.

In 2006, the Murray State offense finished third in the conference with 189.8 passing yards per game. Fein's offense generated 300 yards or more in five games, including a season-best 514 yards against Indiana State.

Fein moved to MSU after spending three seasons (2003-05) at the University of Tennessee-Martin, where he served as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach. In 2005, the Skyhawk offense finished the season ranked second in the Ohio Valley Conference in scoring and rushing offense, and fourth in total offense. Under Fein's guidance, UT-Martin running back Don Chapman led the OVC with an average of 126.9 rushing yards per game, and quarterback Brady Wahlberg finished the season third in total offense and fourth in passing yards per game (216.8).

Before arriving at Tennessee-Martin,

Fein served as the wide receivers coach at his alma mater, the University of Maine in 2002. He helped lead the squad to an 11-3 record and a share of the Atlantic 10 Conference championship that season.

Fein began his coaching career at Barnstable High School in Hyannis, Mass., where he was the team's offensive coordinator during the 1999 and 2000 seasons.

As a player, Fein was the starting quarterback at the University of Maine for four seasons (1995-98). He was the team MVP in 1997 and 1998 and team captain in 1998. When he graduated in 1999, he held 17 school records.

The Barnstable, Mass., native went on to play two seasons of professional football. In 2000 he played for the Albany Firebirds of the Arena Football League, and in 2001 Fein was the starting quarterback for the Norfolk Nighthawks of the AFL2.

Fein earned a bachelor of science degree in Business Administration from Maine in 1999. He and his wife, Courtney, have two children, Jacklyn and Ty.





Stan Clayton

Offensive Line

Stan Clayton, a former Penn State national champion and NFL player, boasts nearly 15 years of coaching experience with offensive lines and begins his first season at Lafayette.

Clayton comes to College Hill after three seasons at Toledo where he coached a 2008 NFL third-round draft pick, John Greco, and led the offensive line to a No. 2 ranking in the Mid-American Conference and a No. 19 ranking in the nation for fewest sacks allowed (16) in 2007. The Toledo offense led the MAC in rushing and total offense and was second in scoring during that season. He also spent six years at Princeton as the offensive line coach and

running game coordinator. While with the Tigers, he coached Ross Tucker and Dennis Norman, both of whom went on to spend at least seven years in the NFL.

Clayton graduated from Penn State in 1988 with a degree in Administration of Justice and a minor in Business Law. While at Penn State, he was a member of the 1986 national championship team and a 1987 All-American honorable mention. He was a 10th-round selection of the Atlanta Falcons in the 1988 draft and played for the next four years in the NFL with Atlanta (1988-89), New England (1990-91) and Pittsburgh (1992).

After his NFL career, the Cherry Hill, N.J. native returned to Penn State as an assistant coach in 1995 for one year before serving stints at Massachusetts and Alabama State. He also spent six summers participating in the NFL's minority coaching fellowship program with Chicago, New York (Giants), Philadelphia and Tennessee.





Phil Hallahan

Running Backs

Phil Hallahan is in the midst of his fifth season on the Lafayette coaching staff and his first

as a full-time staff member. Hallahan will coach the Leopards' deep corps of running backs for the second straight season after mentoring the wide receivers for three seasons.

In 2008, Hallahan's running backs turned the ball over just six times and the team led the nation in fewest turnovers per game. Five different running backs had 150 or more yards with three of them gaining 300 or more. Those three tailbacks, Maurice White, Tyrell Coon and DeAndré Morrow, return as seniors along with

sophomore Jerome Rudolph who enjoyed several breakout performances in 2008.

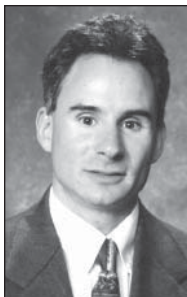
Hallahan oversaw a 2006 passing attack that was ranked 37th in the nation in passing efficiency. Joe Ort and Shaun Adair posted big numbers with Ort reeling in 50 balls for 814 yards while Adair pulled down 33 catches for 501 yards.

Lafayette's passing attack flourished in 2005, ranking second in the Patriot League with 214.8 yards per game. Brandon Stanford and Ort had career years, with Stanford earning All-Patriot League First-Team honors after finishing second in the conference with 57 catches and 683 yards. Ort caught 28 passes for 482 yards in nine.

Prior to arriving at Lafayette, Hallahan coached running backs at Amherst College for two seasons, where he mentored tailback Fletcher Ladd to ECAC Division III Northeast Player of the Year honors and the All-New England Division II/III Team.

A 2003 graduate of Syracuse University with a degree in Consumer Studies, Hallahan was the head manager for the Orange football program as an undergraduate. He also spent one summer as an administrative intern for the Syracuse football program and spent time working for the program's video coordinator.





John Loose

Defensive Coordinator/
Linebackers

John Loose is in his 10th season as Lafayette's defensive coordinator and

has been with Frank Tavani for his entire tenure as head coach. It is no coincidence that during that time, Lafayette has featured a dominant defense under his inventive direction, a corps that consistently ranks in the top 20 statistically. Positionally, Loose will take over coaching the linebackers in 2009, previously focusing on the defensive backs. He will look to team captain and two-time All-Patriot League selection Mark Leggiero to head that group.

Loose is coming off a 2008 season when he selected as the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Assistant Coach of the Year for his work on the gridiron and his dedication to Lauren's First and Goal Foundation, an organization he started in 2004 to raise money for pediatric brain tumor research. His work with Lauren's First and Goal has generated over \$800,000 and blossomed into one of the largest one-day football clinics in the country.

On the field in 2008, under the leadership of two-time Patriot League Defensive Player of the Year Andy Romans, Lafayette finished eighth in the nation in scoring defense (17.6 ppg), 10th in rushing defense (92.2 ypg) and 20th in total defense (303.2 ypg). In 2007, Loose coached the top-ranked defense in the country, as his Leopards allowed a NCAA-best 260.9 yards per game. Lafayette was also ranked fourth in rushing defense (85.7

ypg), eighth in scoring defense (16.9 ppg) and 15th in pass efficiency defense (108.3). That defense included Romans and six All-Patriot League selections.

In 2006, Loose guided a defense that was the best in the conference at stopping the run, allowing just 139 yards per game on the ground. Six players from the 2006 squad earned all-league honors, including graduated seniors Marvin Snipes and Torian Johnson who were recognized for the second times in their career along with first-time selection Dan Liseno. Kyle Sprenkle, Adrian Lawson and Andy Romans also collected All-Patriot League honors and will anchor the defense in 2007.

In 2005, the Leopards were ranked among the top 20 teams in the nation in five categories, including ninth in scoring defense (17.0 ppg) and 11th in total defense (296.9 ypg). Linebacker Maurice Bennett was a finalist for the Buchanan Award and was recognized as an All-American by five national organizations after leading Lafayette with 133 tackles and seven sacks. Fellow linebackers Blake Costanzo and Dion Witherspoon were also named to the All-Patriot League team and combined with Bennett for 329 tackles as seniors. Costanzo is currently playing in the NFL for the Cleveland Browns.

The Leopards' defense stepped up in the 2004 Patriot League championship run, holding the league opposition to 15.2 points and 103.7 rushing yards per game to lead the league in both categories. Loose's charges allowed 14 scoring opportunities inside the 20-yard line and five red zone touchdowns in six games. The 2003 unit forced 15 fumbles with Wes Erbe accounting for five himself, tied for second-most nationally.

Loose spent eight years at West Point after arriving in 1992. He spent two seasons assisting with Army's defensive secondary and linebacker positions. During the 1994 and 1995 campaigns, he served as head junior varsity coach while also mentoring the varsity outside linebackers. With his guidance, Army ranked sixth in the nation in rushing defense during a 10-2 season in 1996.

Before signing on with Bob Sutton's staff at Army, Loose spent three seasons at the U.S. Coast Guard Academy as an assistant, serving as both defensive coordinator and defensive secondary coach under head coach Tom Bell. Following a stellar prep football career at Watkins Glen High School, Loose opted to concentrate on his track abilities and forged a standout collegiate career at Ithaca College. A five-time NCAA qualifier and All-America choice, Loose specialized in the high jump and remains the school record-holder with a leap of 6-10 1/4. He earned four letters each indoors and outdoors prior to graduating in 1987 with a bachelor of science degree in Physical Education and a minor in Psychology.

In addition to his athletic slate at Ithaca, Loose assisted with several local high school squads, serving on the staff at Corning West High School in 1986 after two years at his alma mater, Watkins Glen High. The Watkins Glen, N.Y. native began his coaching career at Albany in 1987, coaching the Great Danes' defensive backs for two seasons before departing for the Coast Guard Academy in 1989. While at Albany, Loose earned his master of science degree in Curriculum Planning and Development.

Loose and his wife, Marianne, reside in Forks Township with their daughters, Lauren and Grace.





Joe Dougherty

Defensive Line

Joe Dougherty is in his second stint on the Lafayette coaching staff and will take over new

responsibilities as the defensive line coach under defensive coordinator John Loose. Dougherty coached the running backs in 2007 and the wide receivers in 2008 and also mentored the Leopard wideouts in his



first coaching tour on College Hill in 2003.

In 2008, Dougherty worked with two-time All-Patriot League wide receiver Shaun Adair who left Lafayette in the top five in career receiving yards receptions and helped Tim Watson emerge as one of the Leopards' top receivers as a senior. This season, Dougherty will have seniors Andrew Poulson, Allan Whitesell and Ian Dell returning to the defensive line after playing significant roles in 2008.

In 2006, when Dougherty returned for his second stint on College Hill, he worked with tailback Jonathan Hurt '07 who ripped off 1,165 yards on his way to Patriot League Offensive Player of the Year honors. Hurt scored 17 touchdowns, 15 on the ground and was 14th in the nation and first in the conference in scoring (8.5 ppg).

Dougherty was the wide receivers coach and special teams' coordinator at Fordham in 2004 and 2005. He coached the All-Patriot League First-Team kicker and punter in 2005, and implemented the league's top punt coverage scheme. In 2004, the punt return unit led the Patriot League in yards per return.

Dougherty mentored two of Lafayette's

top six all-time receivers through their senior seasons in 2003. John Weyrauch '04, the school's career record holder in both receptions and yards, and Jeremy Burkes '04 combined for 77 catches, 1,152 yards and nine touchdowns. Burkes recorded 234 yards and Weyrauch had 130 yards receiving against Columbia in 2003 as Marko Glavic broke the school record with 453 yards passing against the Lions, including three plays of more than 50 yards.

Dougherty was a member of the coaching staff at Rowan for two years before his first stint at Lafayette, serving as quarterbacks coach (2002) and linebackers coach (2001) and the recruiting coordinator both seasons. Doug McFadden

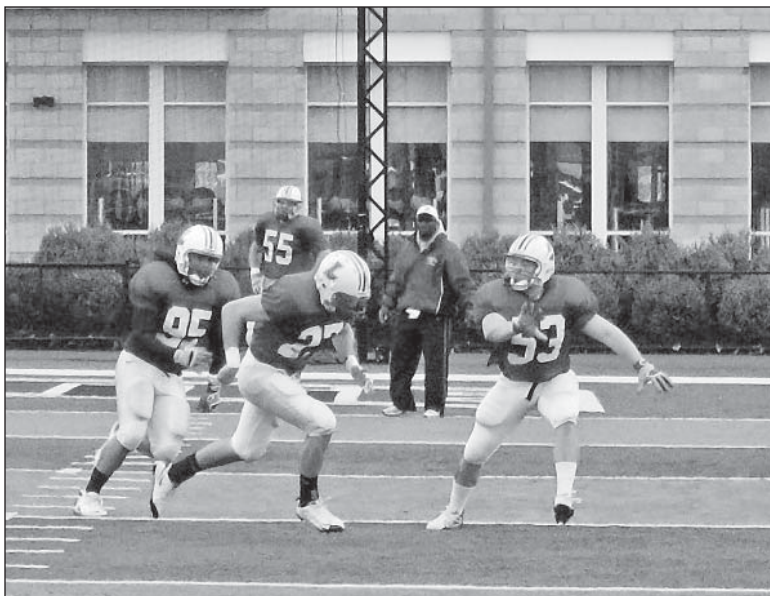
Defensive Backs

Second-Team section in his senior season of 2005 and the former tight end was a member of two Patriot League title teams.

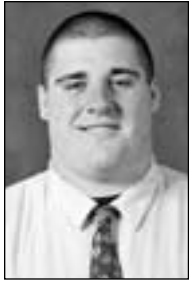

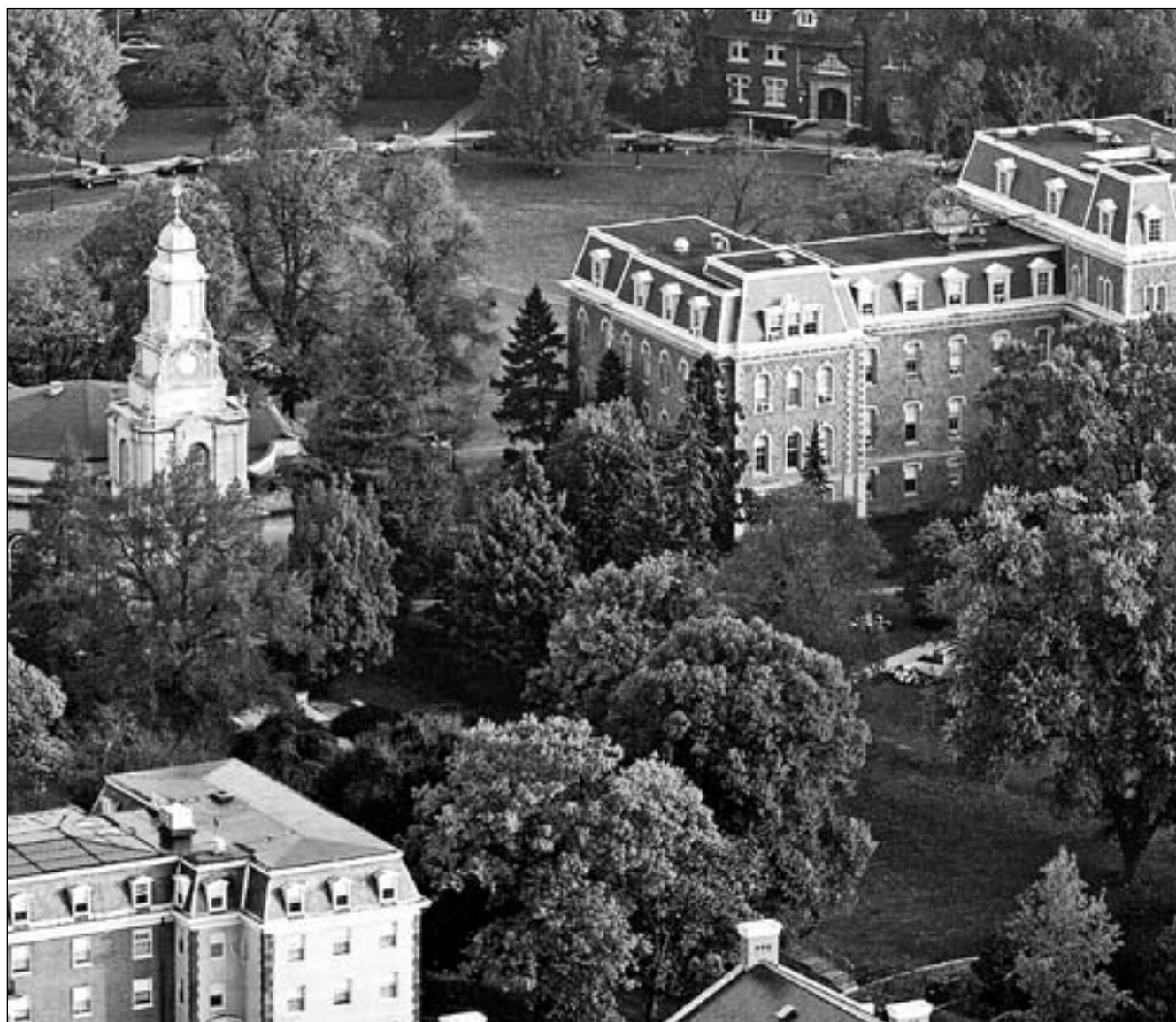

PARDners—COMMUNITY OUTREACH

- **Kick or Treat:** Area youth are given an opportunity to participate in a soccer clinic while dressing up for Halloween.
- **Special Olympics:** Various teams have helped Special Olympians train for their respective events.
- **KIC Camps:** An element of the College's orientation program allows College students to interact in constructive "Kids in the Community" camps.
- **Dr. Seuss' Birthday:** Lafayette student-athletes read Dr. Seuss books at local elementary schools to promote reading and honor Dr. Seuss.

Lauren's First and Goal Football Camp

In 2004, inspired by their daughter Lauren's struggle with cancer, Lafayette defensive coordinator John Loose and his wife Marianne started a one-day football clinic in an effort to raise money for pediatric brain tumor research and cancer services. With the help of the Lafayette coaching staff, current and former players, volunteer coaches from around the country and a host of college staff and community volunteers, the clinic has grown into one of the largest one-day clinics in the nation. It remains one of Lafayette College's premier community service programs.

To date, Lauren's First and Goal has raised more than \$800,000 with 7,000 campers

participating and more than 300 coaches volunteering at the clinic. The proceeds go directly to Lauren's First and Goal Foundation, which distributes the money to organizations involved in pediatric brain tumor research and cancer services.

In 2009, a record 1,733 high school students participated in the sixth annual camp on June 7 at Lafayette's Metzgar Fields Athletic Complex. The one-day clinic featured 275 coaches from all coaching levels. Connecticut head coach Randy Edsall was the featured speaker.

Past guest speakers have included former Penn State defensive coordinator Jerry Sandusky, Phil Simms, Super Bowl XXI MVP for the New York Giants and current

CBS broadcaster, Ben Kotwica, a decorated officer in the U.S. Army and current N.Y. Jets assistant coach, John Harbaugh, head coach of the Baltimore Ravens and Bobby Ross, a retired college and NFL football coach.

For the second straight year, Lauren's First and Goal presented a second camp at the University of South Florida in Tampa, Fla. on June 14. Tampa Bay Buccaneers' head coach Raheem Morris spoke to the 400-plus campers and the event itself raised \$12,000 from campers, in addition to a \$100,000 pledge by Leo Govoni of the Special Needs Trust in Clearwater, Fla.

DANIEL H. WEISS

SIXTEENTH PRESIDENT OF LAFAYETTE COLLEGE



Daniel H. Weiss assumed the presidency of Lafayette College on July 1, 2005. Lafayette, which is located in Easton, Pennsylvania, is a highly selective independent,

coeducational institution enrolling 2,300 undergraduates. The College offers programs of instruction leading to the Bachelor of Arts degree in 32 fields of study, including engineering, and the Bachelor of Science degree in nine areas of science and four fields of engineering.

In the fall of 2007, the trustees and faculty of the College unanimously approved a new strategic plan for Lafayette following a year-long process led by Weiss. The Plan for Lafayette calls for ambitious investment in the academic core of the institution, including a 20% increase in the size of the permanent faculty, an enhanced commitment to student access and community diversity, the development of new programs and facilities in the life sciences and the arts, and a renewed commitment to a strong and vital partnership with the City of Easton. The plan is currently in the first phases of implementation.

Daniel Weiss came to Lafayette from The Johns Hopkins University, where he was the James B. Knapp Dean of the Zanvyl Krieger School of Arts and Sciences. His duties as dean included oversight of all departments and faculty, graduate and undergraduate academic programs, scholarly and scientific research, budget and financial operations, strategic planning, development and alumni affairs, housing and student life, admissions, and enrollment services. Before being named to that position in 2002, he was the Dean of the Faculty at the Krieger School, with responsibility for academic and budgetary oversight of 300 faculty within 30 departments and major centers.

A leading authority on the art of medieval Europe in the Age of the Crusades, Weiss was a professor of art history in the

Krieger School and chaired the art history department from 1998 to 2001. He earned an M.A. (1982) and Ph.D. (1992) in art history at Johns Hopkins and joined the faculty there in 1993. He also holds an M.B.A. (1985) from the Yale School of Management and was a consultant with Booz, Allen & Hamilton, Inc. from 1985 to 1989. He received his B.A. from The George Washington University in 1979, with a double major in art history and psychology.

Weiss has written or edited four books and numerous articles on the art of the Middle Ages, with a special focus on Romanesque, Gothic, and Crusader art and the interaction of Byzantine culture with the Medieval West. He has also published widely in other fields, including American higher education and the Second World War, and has lectured at many colleges, universities, and museums in the United States and abroad. His research has been supported by grants from the National Endowment for the Humanities, Harvard University, Yale University, the Samuel H. Kress Foundation, and the Centro italiano di studi sull'Alto medioevo.

In 1994 he won the Van Courtlandt Elliott Prize, which is awarded annually by

the Medieval Academy of America for a first article in the field of Medieval Studies judged to be of outstanding quality. He was one of the first art historians to receive that award. He received three awards for teaching excellence as a member of the Johns Hopkins faculty and was the recipient of the Aaron O. Hoff People's Choice Award at Lafayette College in 2006. In 2006 he received the Community Partner Award from the Greater Lehigh Valley Chamber of Commerce and in 2007 the Community Service Award from the Two Rivers Area Chamber of Commerce.

Weiss is on the International Advisory Board of the Walters Art Museum in Baltimore, a trustee of the Samuel H. Kress Foundation, a member of the Board of Trustees of the Lehigh Valley Hospital and Health Network, and a member of the Board of Directors of the Association of Independent Colleges and Universities of Pennsylvania. He is married to Sandra Jarva Weiss, a graduate of The George Washington University and its law school. A specialist in health-care law, she is a partner in the firm of Tallman, Hudders & Sorrentino. The Weisses have two young sons, Teddy and Joel.

ATHLETICS ADMINISTRATIVE STAFF



Bruce E. McCutcheon
Director of Athletics

Bruce McCutcheon is in his ninth year as director of athletics at Lafayette. He was named the 10th director of athletics in the history of the College on Sept. 20, 2001.

McCutcheon had spent the previous eight years as Lafayette's associate director of athletics following two years as the assistant director of athletics, where he was responsible for the general administration of the athletic department.

Upon assuming the athletic director reins, McCutcheon quickly began to change the culture of Lafayette athletics and he garnered the support of the College's central administration and the Maroon Club on several major initiatives in the areas of facilities and personnel.

Early in his tenure as director, McCutcheon spearheaded the creation of an athletic facilities master plan. Recent upgrades as a result of that endeavor include the \$23 million renovation of Fisher Stadium, the construction of Kamine

stadium for baseball, renovation of Mike Bourger '44 Field at Oaks Stadium for soccer and the softball field and Maroon Club Strength Center renovation projects. Additionally, the track and field program has been relocated to Metzgar Fields Athletic Complex where a new track will open for competition in 2009. In the summer of 2007, Kamine Varsity House at Metzgar Fields, which houses 11 teams, received a drastic makeover and renovation.

McCutcheon has also upgraded the department by creating full-time positions in several sports, including volleyball and men's and women's soccer, as well as strength and conditioning, athletic training and athletic equipment services.

An experienced administrator, McCutcheon serves on the NCAA Division I Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) Football Committee, the NCAA Division I Football Issues Committee and the Patriot League's Committee on Athletic Administration. He recently completed a four-year term on the NCAA Academics/Eligibility/Compliance Cabinet, was chairman of the ECAC Division I Robbins Scholar-Athlete Committee and was Tournament Director of the 2000 Patriot League Basketball

Tournament. He holds memberships in the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics and the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame.

Prior to being named director, McCutcheon spent 16 years at Lafayette where he was responsible for the general administration of the athletic department while also serving as its NCAA compliance officer.

Prior to coming to Lafayette, McCutcheon spent one year as an assistant director of athletics at Temple University. That followed a five-year tenure as an assistant athletic director at Southern Illinois University in Carbondale, Ill.

McCutcheon graduated from William & Mary in 1976 with a bachelor's degree in Physical Education. He was a two-sport athlete at William & Mary, competing in football and track. He later earned a Master of Arts degree in Sports Administration from The Ohio State University in 1982 and completed his Doctor of Philosophy degree in Sport Management in 1988, also from Ohio State.

A native of Media, Pa., McCutcheon and his wife, Pat, reside on College Hill with their three children, Ian, Meghan and Gavin. Ian, a 2009 Lafayette graduate, is a first-year law student at Temple University while Meghan is a sophomore at Radford University.

George L. Bright

Associate Director of Athletics

George Bright is in his 17th year at Lafayette, and his eighth as associate

director of athletics. He arrived at the College in July of 1993 and served as an Assistant Director of Athletics for nine years.

Bright's primary areas of responsibility at Lafayette are athletic administration, facilities management, event management, business operations, ticket operations, strength and conditioning and equipment management supervision. He is also responsible for the management of all practices and competitive events. He is the immediate supervisor for baseball, volleyball, golf, softball, men's and women's swimming, men's and women's tennis.

Bright has played an integral role in the planning and construction phases of Lafayette's \$23 million transformation of Fisher Stadium. He also assisted in the construction of Allan P. Kirby Sports Center, and a number of improvements at the College's Metzgar Fields Athletic Complex. A synthetic turf field for field hockey and lacrosse has been built, along with new baseball, softball, soccer and track facilities for Lafayette's student-athletes. Bright coordinates and supervises Lafayette's summer camps and preseason team camps, as well as the logistics for internal support areas, and the scheduling of outside events.

During the summer of 2001, Bright was one of 24 athletic administrators selected nationally as the first class for the NCAA Leadership Institute. Bright has completed the Sports Management Institute Executive Program at Notre Dame and the University of South Carolina. He is also a former member of the NCAA Minority Opportunities and Interests Committee.

Prior to arriving at Lafayette, Bright served as the ticket office manager at South Carolina State University in Orangeburg, S.C., since 1988. Bright planned, developed and managed the ticket office systems, operations and fiscal matters at South Carolina State, and performed promotional and marketing duties within the athletic department.

In 1990, while continuing his duties as ticket office manager, Bright received a presidential appointment at SCSU as executive director of the S.T.A.T.E. Club, the University's athletic booster club. Bright's management resulted in increased giving and additional athletic scholarship funds. Bright also played a key role in the development of the Palmetto Football Classic and served on several committees while at South Carolina State.

A 1985 graduate of Claflin University in Orangeburg, S.C., Bright earned a bachelor

of arts degree in liberal arts, and earned his master of arts degree in Rehabilitation Counseling from South Carolina State in May 1993. He has hours towards his doctorate in leadership and administration at East Stroudsburg University.

Scott D. Morse

Director of Athletic Communications and Promotions

Scott Morse is in his 15th year at Lafayette and 11th as director of athletic communications and promotions.

Morse arrived at Lafayette in July of 1995 and worked for four years as the assistant director of athletics for media relations and also held the additional duties of Maroon Club executive director for the last six years.

Morse is responsible for overseeing all athletically related external communications at Lafayette, including the direct oversight of the athletic communications and sports information areas, handling all marketing and promotional efforts, the daily operations of the Lafayette Sports Network, and all Maroon Club promotional activities and events.

Under Morse's guidance, the Lafayette Sports Network (LSN) was created in 1997

as the primary marketing and promotional arm for Lafayette's athletic programs. For the 13th straight year it will lead the Patriot League and most of the nation with a distribution of nearly 10 million viewers regionally, more than 90 million nationally on most telecasts and worldwide via LSN All-Access (video streaming) on all broadcasts. While the primary emphasis lies with promoting the institution and its student-athletes through television production, distribution and advertising sales, LSN also encompasses Lafayette's radio broadcasts, all of the stadium and arena signage, weekly television shows, video streaming, game programs, hospitality areas and game-day promotional events.

In the six years Morse served as executive director of the Maroon Club, total donations nearly doubled and membership increased by 35 percent. Gifts grew from \$438,000 to more than \$750,000 each of the past three years, including a record total of more than \$862,000 during the 2007-08 fiscal year.

Morse created and serves as one of the advisors to Lafayette's Sports Marketing Club, a student organization that has twice been honored for its efforts with one of

Lafayette's prestigious, student-chosen Aaron O. Hoff Awards as the Program of the Year – the Block pARTy in 2002 and the Youth Empowerment Day in 2008. In addition, Morse was honored at the 2009 Hoff Awards with Lafayette's Administrator of the Year Award.

Morse arrived at Lafayette following four years of service in the department of athletics at Wagner College. He was Wagner's sports information director from 1991-92 and was promoted to assistant director of athletics for media relations, business operations and club sports in 1993.

Prior to arriving at Wagner, Morse served as an assistant in Lehigh University's sports information office for one year. At Slippery Rock University, he was a student assistant to both the director of athletics and the sports information and promotions director for two years.

A 1990 graduate of Slippery Rock with a bachelor of science degree in Sports Management, Morse has completed advanced coursework at Wagner toward a master of business administration degree in Marketing. He is a member of the National Association of Athletic Development Directors (NAADD), the National Association of Collegiate Marketing Administrators (NACMA), CoSIDA and ECAC-SIDA.

Morse has volunteered at several national sporting events on the media relations side, working the 2000 U.S. Senior Open, the 1996 NCAA Men's Basketball Final Four, and the 1993 and 1995 NCAA Men's Basketball East Regional. He also served as the director of media operations for the 1991 Eastern Intercollegiate Wrestling Association Tournament.

Philip LaBella enters his 12th year at Lafayette and his seventh as the sports information director at the College. LaBella arrived on College Hill in October of 1998 and began a three-year term as the Publications Coordinator and spent two years as the Sports Information Coordinator.

LaBella supervises the publicity of the school's 23 varsity sports. He works closely with and travels with the men's basketball and football programs. LaBella's first year at Lafayette was highlighted by two trips

to the NCAA Tournament, one by the men's basketball team for the first time in 42 years, and the other by the men's soccer team.

The certified athletic trainer (AT) is a skilled professional specializing in the prevention, treatment, and rehabilitation of injuries. In cooperation with physicians and other allied health care professionals,

an AT functions as an integral member of the healthcare team in secondary schools, colleges, and universities, sports medicine clinics, professional sports programs, industrial settings, and other healthcare environments.

Lafayette's commitment to sports medicine and the overall health of its student-athletes is evidenced by the state-of-the-art, cutting-edge athletic training facility within the Allan P. Kirby Sports Center. The 2,500 square foot facility incorporates a physician exam room with office space for staff athletic trainers, a taping/preparatory area, an advanced primary therapy area, a hydrotherapy center with a seven-foot deep aquatic rehabilitation pool with a variable depth floor, and an orthotic fabrication lab where corrective orthotics can be custom-designed and fabricated in-house.

Recently implemented was the utilization of an electronic injury database, which streamlined injury status updates not only among the athletic trainers and physicians,

but to the coaches as well.

In his 18th year at the College, Matt Bayly oversees Lafayette Sports Medicine. Contributing assistance in the provision of care for all varsity student-athletes are senior associate athletic trainer Dawn Schleiden, associate athletic trainer Chris Meny and assistant athletic trainers Margeritte Abdelkodoos and Tiffany Muir."

The sports medicine area is jointly led by Dr. Jeffrey Goldstein, the college's director of health services/team physician, and Dr. Carl B. Weiss Jr., Lafayette's team orthopaedic surgeon. Dr. Weiss is a board-certified orthopaedic surgeon, fellow of the American College of Sports Medicine, and has his private practice at Coordinated Health Systems in Bethlehem, Pa.

Injured student-athletes are evaluated at a bi-weekly injury clinic in the Sports Medicine area, where the physicians and athletic trainers are joined by Dr. Ray McCarroll, specializing in podiatric care, and Dr. Steven Mazza, a physiatrist.

Matt Bayly begins his 19th season as part of the Lafayette sports medicine team.

As the Director of Sports Medicine, he is responsible for overseeing the operation of the sports medicine office and handles all clearance concerns for student-athletes. He also coordinates staff schedules for the coverage of all athletic practices and competitions, while serving as the primary athletic trainer for football.

While with the Leopards, Bayly has served as both a lecturer at East Stroudsburg University and clinical instructor of their sports medicine interns. His other teaching experience includes acting as a physical education symposium instructor at Lafayette and serving on the faculty of the International Academy of Sports Vision Symposium in 1995.

Before joining Lafayette, Bayly served as a graduate assistant athletic trainer at Virginia Military Institute from 1990-91 and as an athletic trainer at Columbia High School from 1989-90. He also spent a year in Italy as the head athletic trainer for the Padova Saints American Football Team.

Along with his college experience, Bayly has worked numerous camps, including the Adidas Elite Soccer Program at Lafayette, football camps at Santa Clara and Fairfield and the SVS Hockey Camp at Brown. Roger Ruggles

Faculty Mentor

Roger Ruggles is an associate professor in the Civil and Environmental Engineering Department at

Lafayette. He is in the midst of his second term as the department head, a title he has held most recently since 2007.

Ruggles has been at the College since 1985 and has taught courses in instruction of fluid mechanics, surveying, instrumentation, hydrology, planning and design, open channel hydraulics, independent study in geographical information systems and remote sensing, and FORTRAN programming. He also developed an interdisciplinary course to teach engineering methods to non-engineers, and served as a facilitator in the Lafayette College technology clinic.

Selected as a Fulbright Scholar in 2000-01, Ruggles worked through Markere University in Kampala, Uganda where he taught four undergraduate and two graduate level courses. That followed a 1994 faculty research fellowship sponsored by the U.S. Navy/ASEE when he spent a 10 weeks at the Naval Research laboratory's Polar Oceanography branch in Hanover, N.H.

Ruggles earned his bachelor's degree in Civil and Environmental Engineering from Clarkson College in 1980 and followed with his master's degree in Civil Engineering two years later and his Ph.D. in Engineering Science in 1986. He served as an instructor at Clarkson from 1982-85. His time there came after four years in the Air Force (1972-76) where he repaired long-range radar systems. Ruggles also worked as a hydraulic engineer at Acres American, Inc. in Buffalo, N.Y.

Outside of teaching, Ruggles is a member of the Easton City Council and is a Maroon

ACADEMIC ENHANCEMENT

Lafayette College Academic Enhancement and Academic Services Program

Workshops

Several academic enhancement workshops are offered during each semester for student-athletes. Various time-saving skills are taught and effective study skills are stressed so that the student-athletes can learn to balance their many time commitments and pressures.

Progress Requests

During the sixth week of each semester, progress requests are sent by the academic coordinator to all instructors of student-athletes recommended by their coach. As the instructors return reports of student-athletes' attendance and academic performance, the reports are copied and forwarded to the respective coach who will then share the reports with the student-athlete.

Laptop Computer Loan Program

Fully-functional, high-end laptop computers can be checked out from the Academic Resource Center, third floor of Scott Hall, for use during team travel.

Tutors

Tutors are provided for all student-athletes upon request. Tutors are readily available for most 100 and 200 level courses, and may be requested for any course offered at Lafayette College. In order to request a tutor, the student-athlete simply needs to contact the academic coordinator. Tutors can only help those who attend class regularly and who seek assistance in time for the assistance to make a difference.

ALLAN P. KIRBY SPORTS CENTER

Dedicated on June 2, 2000, the \$35 million Allan P. Kirby Sports Center gives Lafayette the finest athletic complex of any college of its size in the country. It includes a new, 110,000-square-foot intramural and recreational sports facility attached to the previously existing Kirby Field House. The field house itself received a \$2.5 million facelift and interior renovations.

The new portion of the center, featuring a distinctive atrium overlooking Fisher Stadium, includes the Kamine Gymnasium, which includes three 50-by-84-foot courts for basketball and other sports and an elevated 1/10-mile jogging track. The

Buck Courts include six courts for racquet sports, two for squash, and four that can be configured for squash or racquetball. A 6,600-square-foot fitness center and weight room includes a full strength-training circuit, spacious free-weight area, and more than 30 cardiovascular machines. There is also a 35-foot climbing wall, an aerobics area, and several offices.

Built in 1973, the original field house, which contains Ruff Natatorium, is home to several varsity sports teams. It has been enhanced to include a new sports medicine area and a new equipment room and renovated locker rooms and administrative

offices. The lobby and Athletic Hall of Fame exhibitry have been completely modernized.

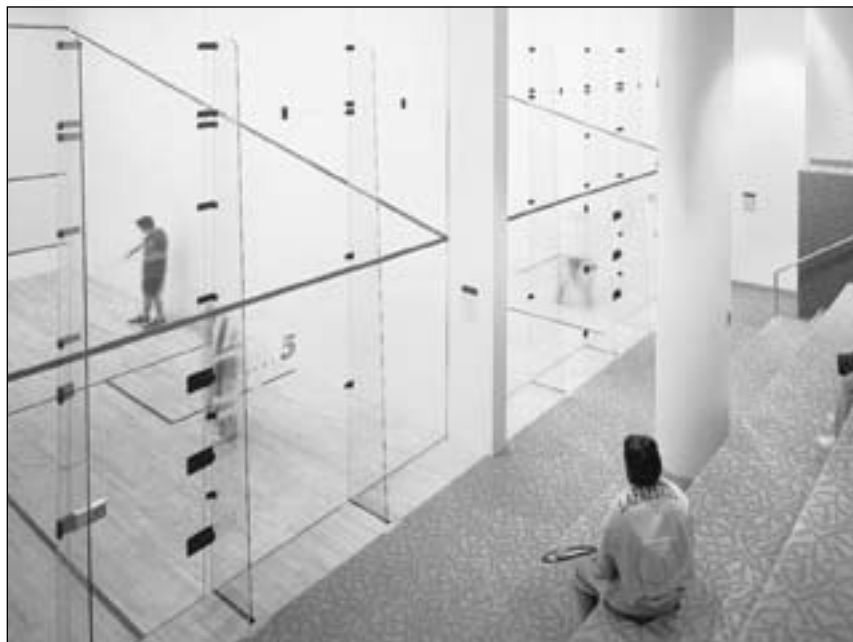
Major support for the sports center was provided by the F. M. Kirby Foundation, which made a \$32.5 million gift to Lafayette, the largest gift ever received by a college, university, or other non-profit organization in the Lehigh Valley.

The \$32.5 million contribution, which Lafayette has received in full, includes \$26.25 million for the sports complex and an additional \$6.25 million in support of other objectives in the Lafayette Leadership Campaign.

The total cost of the Allan P. Kirby Sports Center is \$35 million. This includes \$26.5 million in construction and renovation costs and \$8.5 million in endowment for operation and maintenance of the facility.

Approximately 75 percent of Lafayette students participate in varsity, junior varsity, club, intramural, or other recreational sports. The intramural program includes some three dozen sports. There are 15 club sports.

The Kirby Foundation is the family foundation of the Fred Morgan Kirby family, which has been prominent in the life of Lafayette for nearly a century. Seven family members are alumni, four have served as trustees, and three received honorary doctorates from Lafayette.



MAROON CLUB'S Friends of Lafayette Football

The Lafayette football program's 2004, 2005 and 2006 Patriot League championship seasons would not have been possible without the generous support of the Maroon Club's Friends of Lafayette Football. Head Coach Frank Tavani, his coaching staff and student-athletes have all benefited and will continue to benefit well into the future from the dedication of this network of alumni and friends of the program.



The Maroon Club's Friends of Lafayette Football has enjoyed record-breaking growth over the past five years. In 2008-09, donations totaling more than \$350,000 were received and were specifically designated for the football program. Thank you to everyone who participated.

Chaired by John T. Bourger '71, the Maroon Club's Friends of Lafayette Football provides additional funds for financial aid, recruitment and the purchase of equipment and supplies not included in the football operating budget. The membership of the Friends of Lafayette Football has increased dramatically in the past five years. Those who have made a commitment in support of the football program have assisted in the success of developing a championship-caliber football program in the Patriot League and the NCAA Football Championship Subdivision (formerly I-AA).

The Friends of Lafayette Football offers weekly events throughout the season to enhance the Lafayette football experience for alumni, fans, parents and student-athletes. Pre-game tailgate gatherings are located on the Rowland Press Box plaza area which is adjacent to the lower level of the Markle Parking Deck behind Fisher Stadium. Maroon Club post-game receptions are held on the Bourger Plaza of the Pfenning Alumni Center. In addition, pre- and post-game receptions are held at all road contests.

A number of events are also held throughout the calendar year, including the team banquet, luncheons and receptions with Coach Tavani, and the annual Ladies Leopard Football Clinic.

ROLE WITHIN THE MAROON CLUB

The "Friends of" groups are essential elements of the Maroon Club, an organization consisting of more than 2,000 members raising a total of more than \$750,000 annually each of the past three years. There are several "Friends of" groups which have become increasingly more active in recent years, most notably in football, soccer, basketball and lacrosse. Each of the "Friends



of" groups is under the umbrella of the Maroon Club and works closely with the Maroon Club Executive Committee. All activities performed by these organizations – both friend-raising and fund-raising – directly enhance the sport-specific Maroon Club accounts.

FRIEND OF THE YEAR AWARD

Established on Feb. 24, 2007, the Friend of the Year Award is presented by the Maroon Club's Friends of Lafayette Football to an alumnus or friend of the program who has displayed an inordinate amount of support and passion for Lafayette football.

Maroon Club membership dues – which at the most are \$50 annually per donor – benefit each of Lafayette's 23 varsity sports in several ways:

■ **MAROON CLUB STRENGTH CENTER** – The facility was made possible through Maroon Club membership dues as were the renovations in 2002.

■ **FINANCIAL AID** – The Maroon Club membership dues annually provide \$50,000 toward the athletic department's financial aid pool.

■ **VISUAL IDENTITY PROGRAM** – The Maroon Club membership dues covered all expenses associated with the creation of the current identity program.

■ **ATHLETIC COMMUNICATIONS INTERN** – The Maroon Club membership dues fund the stipend for one of the Athletic Communications Assistants who handle all communications (web site, game programs, press releases, game management assistance, etc.) efforts for several sports.

■ **ASSISTANT STRENGTH COACH** – Membership dues fund the stipend for the Assistant Strength Coach positions which works with each of Lafayette's 23 sports.

MAROON CLUB STRENGTH CENTER

Lafayette College unveiled the Maroon Club Strength Center for varsity student-athletes in the spring of 1990 and greatly enhanced the facility in 2002.

After a 10-year effort with all funding being raised outside of the College's operating budget, the 4,000 square-foot facility more than doubles the space previously used for varsity student-athlete strength and conditioning workouts.

The facility allows all varsity student-athletes the opportunity to build their strength and conditioning on a one-to-one basis with the strength coach who is on duty at all times when the facility is open. The student-athlete can arrange an appointment with the strength coach for an individualized workout as well as the scheduled sessions for various varsity teams. The one-on-one approach allows for a quick and intense, yet controlled and well-supervised workout.

Aside from the strength coach's office, the facility floor space is devoted entirely to workout equipment. Included among the numerous apparatus are complete free weight work stations, and 10 state-of-the-art power stations purchased in 2002. The additional equipment has allowed student-athletes to cut their weight room time in half giving them time for academic work or other activities.

This state-of-the-art facility is located behind the north football stands at Fisher Stadium, about 30 yards west of Kirby Sports Center.



Brad Potts

Head Strength and Conditioning Coach

Brad Potts is in his third year as head strength and conditioning coach at Lafayette. Potts works with all of Lafayette's 23 Division I athletic teams, and is an integral part of the success of the Lafayette football program.

Most recently, Potts was employed as the assistant strength and conditioning coach at Wofford College in Spartanburg, S.C. for one year.

From March 2005 to August 2006, Potts spent time at the University of North Carolina and University of Georgia, working at both institutions as an intern to the head strength and conditioning coach.

Potts is a 2005 graduate of Indiana University of Pennsylvania (IUP), earning his degree in Exercise Physiology. During his time at IUP, Potts earned Division II All-America status as linebacker and was recognized to the all-conference and All-Northeast Region teams. Potts went on to play for the Johnstown Riverhawks, a professional Arena League football team.

Potts received his master's of science degree in Health Science from IUP in 2006. He is certified through the USAW as a sports performance coach and is a member of the National Strength and Conditioning Coaches Association.

Potts and his wife, Tiffany, were married in July 2008.



FISHER FIELD AT FISHER STADIUM

Fisher Field at Fisher Stadium has been home to the Lafayette football program since 1926. The complete \$33 million transformation, which began in 2006, has given Lafayette one of the premier venues in all of Division I football at the FCS level. The project, completed in 2007, consolidated all of the College's football operations on the main campus.

New spectator seating has been built throughout the venue, including chair back seating in select areas of the home stands. Additional visitors' seating has also been added, taking the stadium capacity to 13,132 fans.

The team plays on FieldTurf's state-of-the-art in-fill synthetic surface, allowing for year-round use by the football program. For the first time in the venue's history, night games were played in 2007 thanks to the installation of stadium lighting. A press box atop the home grandstands has been added that includes individual booths for television and radio, coaching staffs and game administrators, while a VIP suite has been added at the end opposite the print media area.

Perhaps the most visible new feature of the venue during gameday is the addition of the state-of-the-art scoreboard which features a 19 by 35-foot video matrix board, capable of showing live game action. Other stadium improvements include new restroom and vending areas in the middle and upper concourses.

The 24,000 square foot Bourger Varsity Football House at the west end of Fisher Field completed the transformation of Lafayette's football facilities into the state-of-the-art Fisher Stadium.

In addition to featuring a spacious lobby and reception area, the first floor of the Bourger Varsity Football House, named in honor of Eugene J. (Mike) '44 Bourger and Ruth P'71 Bourger, contains the team's locker room, strength and conditioning areas and sports medicine facilities, including a hydrotherapy room. The upper level houses coaches' offices, a gallery with displays honoring "Legends of Lafayette Football," and several meeting rooms, one of which is theatre style and large enough to accommodate the entire team. That area, which can also be divided into four separate



spaces, features audio-visual capabilities that match those in the "smart classrooms" in the College's academic buildings.

The principal contributors to the comprehensive Fisher Stadium project were the F.M. Kirby Foundation, Jack Bourger '71 and Selena Vanderwerf and the Brenda Blythe Trust and James R. '77 and Tracey Fisher.

The F.M. Kirby Foundation comes under the leadership of Fred Morgan Kirby '42 whose lifetime of contributions to the College and the game of college football have recently been honored by induction into the Lafayette College Maroon Club Hall of Fame and with his receipt of the Legacy Award presented by the National Football Foundation and the College Hall of Fame.

Now entering its 83rd season, Fisher Field has been host to 405 Lafayette football games with the Leopards enjoying an overall record of 240-152-13. Of the previous 82 seasons, Lafayette has produced 12 undefeated home seasons with the most recent being the 1992 Patriot League champion Leopards who went 5-0, the first undefeated home season since 1970. During the 1991, 1992 and 1993 seasons, Lafayette won 10 straight home games, tying the school record for consecutive wins first set by the 1926 and 1927 squads in the first 10 games ever played in the stadium.

The first football game played in the then 18,000-seat structure came on Sept. 25, 1926, a 35-0 win over Muhlenberg College.



James R and Tracey Fisher, who have a long history of giving to the college, were principal contributors in the Fisher Stadium transformation project, and the scoreboard and video board were named in honor of James' mother, Frances.

The Otis F Rowland Press Box sits atop Fisher Stadium and is home to the Lafayette Sports Network.

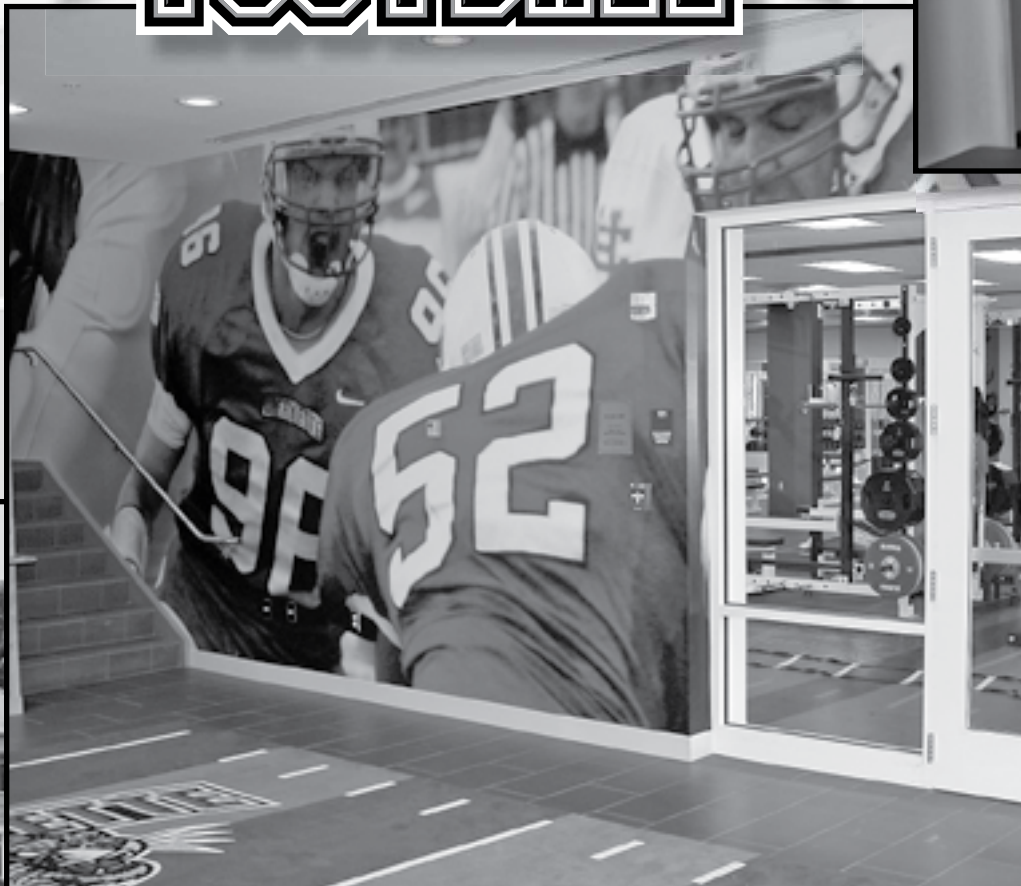

In its second decade of combining academic and athletic excellence, the Patriot League sponsors championships in 23 men and women's sports. Initially started as an NCAA Division I-AA football conference in 1986, the Patriot League became an all-sport conference in 1990 and includes American, Army, Bucknell, Colgate, Holy Cross, Lafayette, Lehigh and Navy as full members, and Fordham and Georgetown as associate members. These institutions are among the oldest and most prestigious in the nation and their alumni have, and continue to play leadership roles in shaping our country.

Since 1998, the Patriot League has ranked first each year among all Division I conferences awarding athletic aid in the NCAA Graduation Rate Report. The League finished at the top spot with 96 percent of its teams reporting a graduation rate of 85 percent or higher in the most recent data. In addition, 76 Patriot League teams earned NCAA Academic Performance Program Public Recognition Awards after posting academic progress rate scores in the top 10 percent of all squads in their respective sports.

The Patriot League's mission is simple, to provide successful competitive athletic experiences while maintaining high academic standards, and to prepare its student-athletes to be leaders in society.

During the 2008-09 academic year, Patriot League student-athletes and teams have accomplished the following:

- 11 student-athletes earned ESPN The Magazine/CoSIDA Academic All-America honors, including First-Team selections for: Army's Elizabeth Betterbed, Sarah Goss, Briana Stremick and Scott Rosenshein; Navy's Lizzie Barnes and Kelly Zahalka; and Colgate's Daniel Kerley.
- 61 student-athletes were recognized as ESPN The Magazine/CoSIDA Academic All-District recipients, with 45 on the First Team.
- Bucknell won its 15th overall and women's Patriot League Presidents' Cup trophy, while Army won the men's trophy for the first time since 2005.
- Army became the first Patriot League team to advance to the finals of the NCAA Baseball Regional, and also the first to win two regional games by beating Texas State and Boston College.
- Lehigh advanced to the finals of the NCAA Softball Regional, knocking off Florida A & M and Texas A & M in elimination games before falling to top-seed Florida.
- Army's Ben Koenigsfeld became the first baseball student-athlete to earn a pair of First-Team All-League honors in the same season, and also the first to win both the Pitcher of the Year and Tournament Most Valuable Player award in the same year.
- Colgate's Nick Hennessey and Steve Jonas and Holy Cross' Brett McDermott all signed NFL free agent contracts.
- Hennessey became the first Patriot Leaguer since 2004 to earn consensus FCS All-America honors with his selection by each of the four major organizations.
- The Lehigh women's basketball team was one of 14 NCAA Tournament participants to record a perfect graduation rate.
- Colgate's Jordan Scott finished his career as the all-time Division I leader in carries (1,240), and fifth in FCS history while breaking the Patriot League record in rushing yardage (5,621).
- Scott became the eighth player in FCS history and first Patriot League with four 1,000-yard rushing seasons in his career.
- Holy Cross quarterback Dominic Randolph led the FCS in passing yards, total offense and completions per game in 2008, while also finishing as a finalist for the Walter Payton Award.
- Holy Cross men's soccer graduate Jerry Dickinson was awarded a Fulbright Grant to work and study in South Africa.

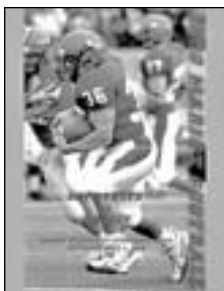

GAME 1 MARIST 6 LAFAYETTE 28



POUGHKEEPSIE, N.Y. [9/6/08] - Junior TB **Maurice White** made a triumphant return from an injury-riddled 2007 season, rushing for 212 yards and two touchdowns in a 28-6 win over Marist. The Lafayette defense held Marist to 37 yards rushing and 58 yards in the air led by 10 tackles and a fumble recovery by preseason All-American **Andy Romans**.

White's career night at Tenney Stadium was the first time a Lafayette back ran for more than 200 yards since Joe McCourt (212) in 2003.

The Leopards got on the scoreboard in the first quarter, culminating a 10-play, 80-yard drive with a 25-yard TD pass from QB **Rob Curley** to TE **Michael Conte** at 4:41. Curley showed his mettle on the drive as he was sacked twice before completing a 22-yard strike to **Mark Layton** to keep the drive

alive. Three plays later Lafayette scored.

A special teams' error proved detrimental in the second quarter, when Marist's Michael Rios broke through the middle of the line and blocked **Tom Kondash's** punt. The Red Foxes recovered on the one-yard line and Bo Ehikioya ran it in on the next offensive play. Marist missed the PAT and trailed 7-6 at 14:10.

Lafayette ran its own version of the "fumblerooski" to score later in the quarter. Curley had trouble with the snap, but scooped it up, burst through the line and ran 27 yards for a touchdown. LC led 14-6 at halftime.

With fewer than nine minutes left in the third, Marist had the ball fourth and inches at the Lafayette 10. Trailing 14-6, Marist went for it, but QB Chris Debowski fumbled the exchange from center and Lafayette took over on downs.

The Lafayette offense responded with a dominating drive that covered 89 yards on 11 plays. White's seventh carry of the drive came on the first play of the fourth quarter. He broke off the left side and scampered 38 yards for a touchdown. Lafayette led 21-6.

Lafayette took over again with 8:33 left, and the running game put it away. White churned out 47 yards and scored on a three-yard run.

GAME 2 GEORGETOWN..... 6 LAFAYETTE 24



EASTON, Pa. [9/13/08] - Though Lafayette tallied nearly 400 yards on offense, the Leopards' stingy defense helped secure the 24-6 win against Georgetown in the teams' Patriot League opener.

Junior QB **Rob Curley** finished the night 14-of-24 passing for 175 yards. **Tyrell Coon** and **Maurice White** dominated the running game with a combined 212 yards on 35 rushes.

The Leopards marched 71 yards on their first drive, which was capped off by Curley's one-yard touchdown run. Sophomore **Davis Rodriguez's** PAT was good and Lafayette took a 7-0 lead at 10:07 in the first quarter.

The Leopards' defense held the Hoyas (1-1, 0-1) scoreless in the first half. The last time Lafayette shut out an opponent in the first half was Oct. 6, 2007 against Columbia.

EASTON, Pa. (9/27/08) - Lafayette held off a second-half Penn comeback to secure a 24-17 win. The Leopards' 3-0 start matched the 2007 squad's best start to a season since 1988.

Rob Curley kicked off Lafayette's first-half scoring frenzy when he hit tight end **Michael Conte** with a 10-yard pass less than five minutes into the first quarter.

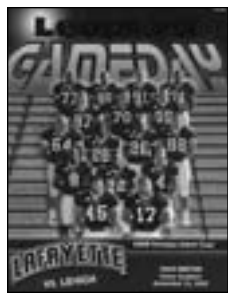

MILESTONE FOOTBALL WINS

Since fielding its first college football team in the fall of 1882, Lafayette has had a proud, colorful gridiron tradition on the way to a total of 633 victories. Football followers on College Hill have been able to lay claim to two outright national championships and a share of still another. In 1896, Lafayette and Princeton both claimed a piece of the national championship following a scoreless tie. The Leopards finished the season 11-0-1 while the Tigers were 10-0-1. Undefeated 9-0 records in 1921 and 1926 gave Lafayette followers reason to believe they were number one in the country both seasons.

Since that win, the Leopards have joined the elite group of institutions with 600 or more football victories. Lafayette played its 1,000th football game on Sept. 16, 1989, and was the first founding Patriot League school to eclipse the 500-victory plateau.

MCGAUGHEY MEMORIAL AWARD



The late George McGaughey, an outstanding football player at Bucknell University and later a coach at Lafayette College, is honored each year through an award established by gifts from his friends at both schools.

The George L. McGaughey Memorial Award is presented each year to the outstanding players on both teams in the Bucknell-Lafayette football game. The selections are made by the coaching staffs at each school, and the first awards were presented for the 1983 game won by Lafayette, 33-3.

The initial winners were both senior co-captains, Lafayette quarterback Frank Novak and Bucknell center Shane Snyder.

A 1935 Bucknell graduate and one of the finest centers in the school's history, McGaughey was a standout on the Bison team that defeated Miami (FL), 26-0, in the inaugural Orange Bowl game on January 1, 1935. McGaughey, who died in June of 1983, was a teacher, intramural director, and assistant football coach at Lafayette for 32 years. He was inducted into Bucknell's Athletic Hall of Fame in November 1982 and entered Lafayette's Hall of Fame the following January.

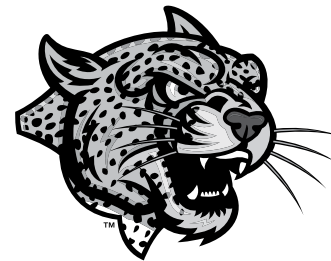

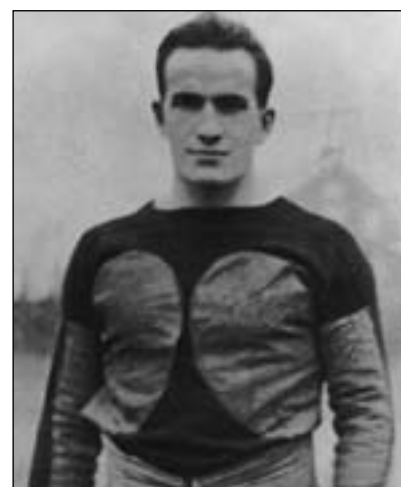
