JOHN SADRI 1975-1978

John Sadri played at a level that all NC State student-athletes should strive to reach. Sadri left the court victorious 131 times- 86 singles and 45 doubles. For his accomplishments, Sadri was inducted into the ITA Collegiate Tennis Hall of Fame. The victories included two ACC singles and doubles championships as the number one seed. In his last two seasons, Sadri dominated opponents with a 55-4 singles record. Sadri became the Wolfpack's first All-American in 1977, advancing to the quarterfinals of the NCAA championship. He repeated as an All-American the following season and advanced to the finals at the NAAs. There he fell in four sets to No. 1 seed John McEnroe of Stanford (see below on "The Match"). Following college, Sadri competed professionally. His achievements include a spot in the 1979 Australian Open Finals, reaching the top 20 in the world rankings and appearing on several Davis Cup squads.

The Match

John Sadri vs. John McEnroe. Power vs. Finesse. No. 11 vs. No. 1. East Coast vs. West Coast. How ever you look at it, the 1978 NCAA singles championship is viewed as one of the greatest college matches of all time. Heading into the match, McEnroe was the heavy favorite, being ranked 15th in the world and coming off a trip to the semifinals in Wimbledon. However, he received a big scare. Sadri lost the four-hour epic battle in four sets 7-6, 7-6, 5-7, 7-6, but the match was even closer. McEnroe, who came in as the highest ranked player ever to compete in the NCAA championship, barely won the overall game total by one, 26-25, and only scored a single point more, 144-143. The difference was the tiebreakers where Sadri lost all three, 5-3. Sadri, the fan favorite, brought his power game smashing 24 aces.

ANDY ANDREWS 1978-1981

Before playing his first match at State, Andrews dreamed of winning eight conference titles (four singles and four doubles). Though he could not reach his high standards, Andrews left a mark on the tennis program with five ACC championships, two singles and three doubles. Andrews received recognition

with All-American honors in 1980 and 1981. He was also a part of States back-to-back championship runs in 1978 and 79. During his career at State the team compiled a record of 69-12. Andrews preferred an aggressive style. He was quoted as saying, "I like to keep the action moving. I like to serve and volley and play at the net, even though my teammates tell me I'm best from the baseline. But, I get restless back there and want to make something happen, so I go to the net and get the point over with."

MATT MCDONALD 1977-1980

McDonald found success at all levels in North Carolina. Born and raised in Charlotte, McDonald won at both the high school and college level. Following a 35-1 record and state championship at East Mecklenburg High, McDonald enrolled at State and won two ACC team championships. McDonald won three double titles, at No. 1 in 1980, No. 2 in 1979 and No. 3 in 1977. In 1980 he received All-American honors. Individually he won two titles in the ACC; at No. 3 singles in 1979 and No. 4 singles in 1978.

ROBERTO BRACONE 1996-99

Bracone's accomplishments at NC State speak loudly. However, they do not come close to telling the whole story. Bracone left State ranked in the top five for the most single season victories (20, in 1999) and tied for career wins in doubles (50). His career in the ACC ended with two singles championships, a player of the year award and All-ACC honors four straight seasons. Bracone's accomplishments were achieved during hundreds of hours of rehab from surgery on his right shoulder and elbow to repair nerve damage, a degenerative vertebrae condition, tendonitis in both knees and a helping of ankle injuries. Not to mention his three heart operations from 1992-94, two of which lasted 24 hours. Still not impressed? Bracone also led the Wolfpack to their first NCAA appearance in over 20 years, earned All-American honors in 1999 and played in the NCAA tournament twice, including an appearance in the Sweet 16.

Practice & Conditioning

PHYSICAL IMPROVEMENT

Proper strength and conditioning is a key to success on the fields of play for all collegiate athletes, and at NC State each athlete is provided an opportunity to build themselves through the Wolfpack's outstanding physical improvement program.

All the facilities needed by the Wolfpack tennis program are available in the recently expanded Reynolds Coliseum Weight Room Facility. Wright Wayne, the Pack's strength and conditioning advisor, is there to provide superior training and guidance to the entire team.



SPORTS MEDICINE

Under the direction of Charlie Rozanski, few programs play a role as essential to the continued success of NC State athletics as sports medicine. It provides preventive care that helps athletes avoid injuries, and post-injury treatment that enables athletes to fully recover as soon as possible.

Care starts with the facilities, and with 23 varsity athletic teams at NC State, the school has a pair of fully equipped training rooms, one in Reynolds Coliseum and one at the Weisiger-Brown Athletics Facility. The Reynolds Coliseum training room, where the men's tennis team is treated, is located on the ground floor of the coliseum, allowing athletes easy access to the facility at all times.

The Wolfpack is assisted by a host of healthcare professionals in the Raleigh community, providing state-of-the-art care in prevention and treatment of athletic injuries. This readily available task force includes physicians, orthopedic consultants and chiropractic consultants.



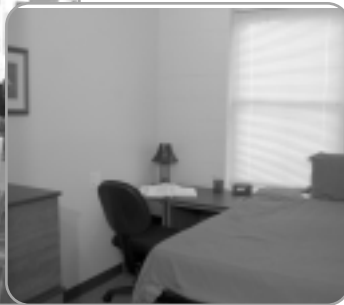
Student-Athlete Life

WOLF VILLAGE

Located on West Campus, the University Housing apartments are an eight building complex that accommodates 1,212 students. Each fully furnished four bedroom apartment contains two full bathrooms, four single bedrooms, living room, kitchen and a washer/dryer unit.

The apartments also feature a fitness room, computer lab, volleyball courts, and Wolfline bus stops. High speed ResNet connections and cable TV are also available.

Convenient for many student-athletes, Wolf Village is a short walk from main campus and just across the street from the J.W. Isenhour Tennis Center and Doak Field.



CASE DINING HALL

Proper nutrition is essential to all Wolfpack athletes. The Case Dining Hall provides well-balanced and appetizing meals needed to maintain winning performances. NC State athletes enjoy the convenience and outstanding

quality of the Case training table. The friendly Case Dining Hall staff does an outstanding job feeding over 400 athletes three meals a day.

The dining hall is located on the bottom floor of Case Athletic Center, which is convenient to main campus, the Weisiger-Brown Facility, Reynolds Coliseum and classrooms.

Each meal is designed to give the athlete a number of healthy options. There is a wide array of food selections including a buffet line, potato and pasta bar, salad bar, cold sandwich buffet with a variety of breads and meats, frozen yogurt and desserts.

The meal schedule is molded around the class and practice schedules of the athletes, which allows them an extra advantage in budgeting their time.

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ACADEMIC SUPPORT

NC State University is committed to providing its student-athletes with all of the tools necessary to achieve excellence on the fields of competition and in the classroom. Evidence of this commitment is the Academic Support Program for Student-Athletes (ASPSA).

Under the auspices of NC State's Division of Undergraduate Studies, the ASPSA complements the university's substantial faculty advising and academic resources, paying special attention to the unique demands and expectations of the Division I student-athlete.

The degree in which Wolfpack student-athletes are involved in ASPSA varies according to individual needs. Generally, all freshmen are expected to be heavily involved, as the transition from high school to university life can be a difficult one.

The purpose of ASPSA is to assist the student-athlete in a move toward academic independence, but the services of the organization are available upon request at any point during a student-athlete's career. Students who have proven themselves to be self-reliant are allowed more optional use of the program, with only moderate oversight.

ASPSA facilities are located in the Weisiger-Brown Building, the Stroud Center and in Reynolds Coliseum. The centers contain modern study areas, as well as computer centers.

Phil Moses oversees the program and is one of seven full-time academic coordinators on the ASPSA staff. Megan Taliaferro is the team counselor. She works with the team to see that they are taking classes that are advantageous to the student and helps to develop a schedule that will help each team member find the curriculum that is best suited to their needs.

SERVICES PROVIDED BY ASPSA

Orientation Courses: A training course in college survival and success meets 75 minutes each week to cover topics such as adjustment to college, time management, stress management, study skills, test-taking skills, cultural diversity, university policies, and other topics.

Academic Advising: The ASPSA's academic coordinators complement the university's departmental advising by providing information regarding policies, procedures, course selection, selection of majors and minors, and NCAA and NC State guidelines for adequate academic progress.

Counseling: Individual work is done with students with specific concerns such as decision making, adjustment to college, communications, relationships, test anxiety and study skills. Appropriate referrals are made to other campus resources as necessary.

Monitoring of Academic Progress: The academic progress of NC State student-athletes is closely and carefully monitored. Monitoring forms are used to gather classroom performance information from professors and this information is shared with the student-athlete and the coaches.

Tutorials: Unlimited personal tutorial services are provided and available for each and every class. These appointments begin at the start of every semester and continue regularly through the end of final exams. Supplemental instructional programs and a departmental learning center are also available.

ASPSA FACTS:

The NC State Academic Support Program for student-athletes spent over \$730,000, including \$225,000 on tutoring last year alone in comprehensive academic support of student-athletes at NC State.

The ASPSA employs seven full-time academic coordinators in addition to director Phil Moses.

ImPACK Program

ImPACK is a "Life Skills" program designed to support the total development of NC State student-athletes. The mission of **ImPACK** is to provide an unmatched comprehensive life skills program for student-athletes that encourages their growth in decision making, enhances their interpersonal relationships, and enables them to make meaningful contributions to their communities. The **ImPACK** program consists of five major components:

THE ACADEMIC COMMITMENT

The primary goal is to educate student-athletes so they not only obtain a degree, but also develop an appreciation for learning in addition to the knowledge and skills that will carry them through life. The following topics are primarily covered in the first-year orientation course taught by academic coordinators in the Academic Support Program for Student-Athletes (ASPSA).

THE ATHLETIC COMMITMENT

NC State pledges that all student-athletes will be provided with quality facilities, equipment, coaching and support services so each student can achieve his or her maximum potential both academically and athletically. Sensitivity to the dignity of the student-athlete is vital to the success of the department.

THE CAREER DEVELOPMENT COMMITMENT

The goal of this component is to explore and develop career options and to prepare student-athletes for an exciting long-term career. The goal is to aid our student-athletes in securing their first professional job in their chosen career after graduation. Services in this area include: Career counseling, job fair, interviewing workshops, networking, resume writing, internships, summer employment, etc.

THE PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT COMMITMENT

The ImPACK program focuses on the individual as a whole person, and provides a system of balanced "life learning" that addresses the needs of the individual before and after graduation. The areas that this commitment addresses include: Social Development, Personal Health, Fundamental Values, Emotional Health, Leadership Training/Citizenship.

THE SERVICE COMMITMENT

The ImPACK program supports the philosophy that student-athletes gain "leadership through service." Through their efforts, they make a positive contribution in an extensive community outreach program as well as develop a commitment to life-long service. Student-athletes are participating in the following programs: School programs, community outreach, and P.A.C.K.

THE STUDENT-ATHLETE DEVELOPMENT STAFF



Tonya Washington is the director of student-athlete development. She is responsible for career development and personal development programs for NC State's student-athletes. Washington is also responsible for leadership development programs, Sisters in Sports activities and the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee. Washington graduated from the University of South Carolina in 1989 with a degree in psychology and earned her M.P.A. in public administration in 1992. After working with the Leadership Center at UNC Wilmington, she came to NC State in 1996.



William "D.D." Hoggard is the coordinator of community/enhancement programs. Hoggard played football at NC State and had a successful career in the NFL, playing with the Cleveland Browns. He graduated from NC State in May 1984 with a degree in Political Science.

He is responsible for community and enhancement programs, which include coordinating former student-athlete relations, community outreach and housing, football mentoring and spiritual guidance programming.



Demar Bonnemere is the Program Coordinator for Student-Athlete Development/Community Outreach. He graduated in 2000 from the State University of New York (SUNY) College at Brockport with a BS in communication (broadcast) and earned his master's of education in student affairs from NC State in 2003. Demar has spent time as a graduate assistant and an intern before joining the staff full-time.

He is responsible for coordinating the community outreach events for the student-athletes, which include speaking engagements, appearances, as well as elementary and middle school visitations. Demar is also in charge of the distribution of tickets to non-profit charities and organizations and requests for autographed paraphernalia.

STUDENT-ATHLETE DEVELOPMENT

ImPACK's outreach program places special emphasis on touching the lives of Wake County's thousands of school children. NC State student-athletes are encouraged to provide tutoring and mentoring activities for children. This program seeks to avoid one-time events such as assemblies, and focuses instead on building long-standing personal relationships between the children and student-athletes. Also, visits are

made to children at local hospitals.

The ImPack and like skills programs are under the direction of Assistant A.D. Tonya Washington. Washington is in her seventh year at NC State. She and her staff have put in many hours of work to ensure that Wolfpack student-athletes are making an ImPACK in their community.

A BRIGHT FUTURE ...

- Of the 20 professions most in demand in the U.S. today, NC State offers degree programs in nine of the top 10 and 17 of the top 20.
- Over 628 corporations and government agencies were on NC State's campus last year interviewing and recruiting NC State students. More than 9,000 individual interviews took place.
- Many of NC State's student-athletes participated in a variety of career development seminars during the past year. Some of the topics included resume writing, job interview techniques, job search strategies and internship information sessions. The career fair for student-athletes was held during April, which gave participants an opportunity to network with employers from a variety of companies.
- Currently, the five largest employers of NC State graduates are DuPont, IBM, General Electric, Proctor & Gamble and Westinghouse, all of which are Fortune 500 companies.
- The world-famous Research Triangle Park (RTP), which is just five minutes from NC State's campus, houses more than 70 international companies, including IBM, Northern Telecom/Bell Northern Research, Glaxo-Smith Klein, Inc. and Ericsson Cellular.
- NC State was listed among the universities with the "best career services" and "best academic facilities" in the 2002 edition of "The Unofficial, Unbiased, Insider's Guide to the 320 Most Interesting Colleges."

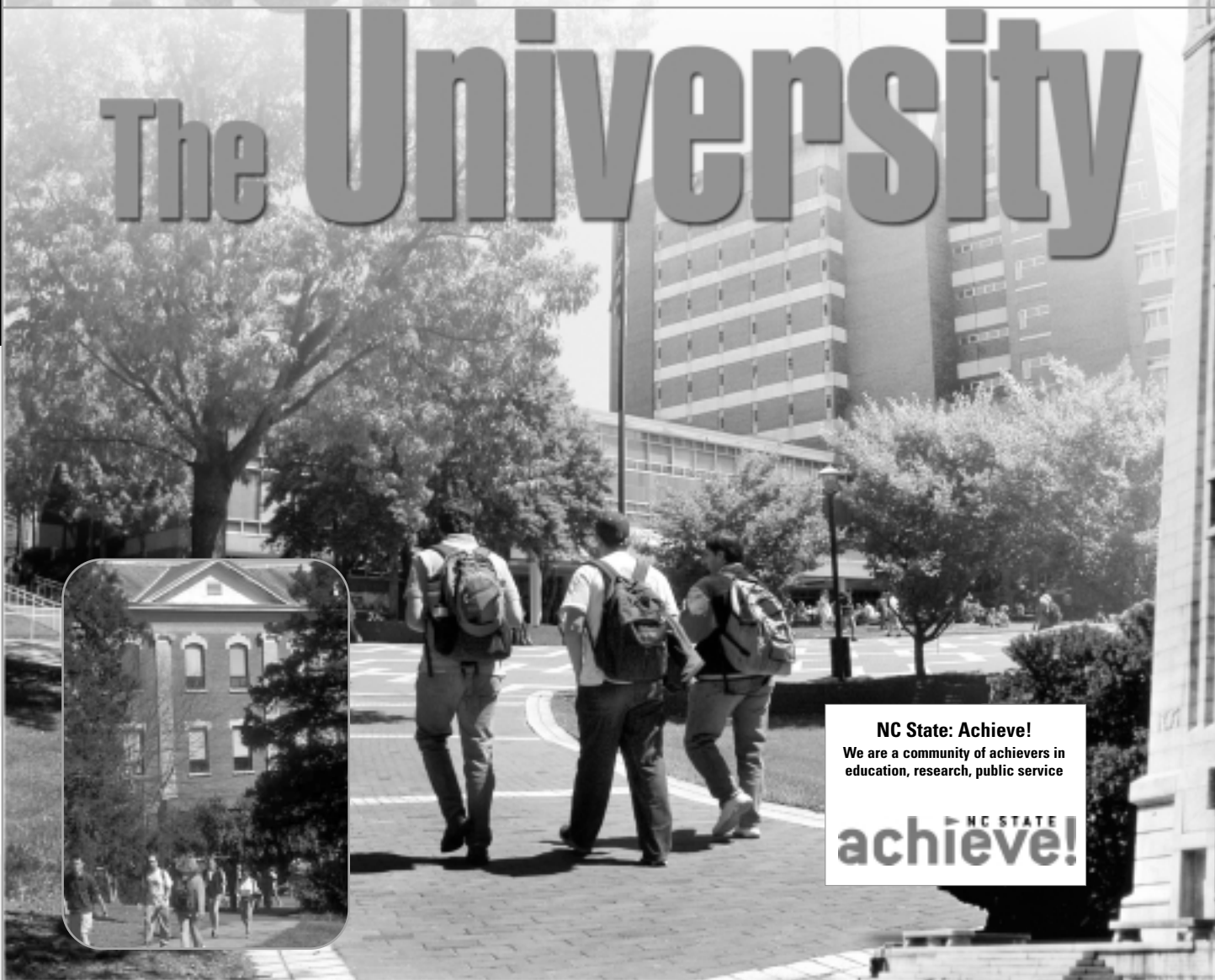

The state's first veterinary school is located nearby on a 182-acre campus near Carter-Finley Stadium, home of Wolfpack Football. In addition, the future of NC State is forming around Centennial Campus. A unique venture between government, private corporations and NC State, Centennial Campus is a model of education in the new millennium. Over time, the master plan for the expansion of the Centennial will more than double the size of NC State.

THE TOOLS FOR SUCCESS

NC State, acclaimed for its outstanding athletics program, is also known as one of the country's top research universities. It is ranked 7th among national research universities in non-federal funded research, 12th among national research universities in industry-funded research, and 30th nationally in total expenditures for research and development. NC State is ranked 1st in total research expenditures in the 16-campus University of North Carolina system, and 2nd in total state and local research funding among national research universities. NC State's expenditures for research and sponsored programs exceed \$440 million.

The University is ranked 17th in the nation for launching start-up companies and has received more than 496 patents for beneficial technologies developed by its world-class faculty. Students interact with and learn from industry, government and business partners every day at NC State's acclaimed Centennial Campus, which is a widely recognized model for how universities can construct academic partnerships with the private sector.

Prestigious Honors

NC State has a chapter of Phi Beta Kappa, the nation's oldest and most prestigious student honorary society. Less than 12 percent of the nation's universities have a chapter of Phi Beta Kappa.

A WEALTH OF CHOICES

Students at NC State have many academic options through our degree-granting colleges. NC State offers 92 baccalaureate degree programs, as well as dual degree programs in which students can combine varied academic interests and increase their career options. There are over 5,000 course options available at NC State. Together with more than 55 research centers, institutes and laboratories, the colleges and schools at NC State support a broad spectrum of more than 1,200 scientific, technological and scholarly research endeavors.

The university is organized into 10 colleges, the School of Design, the Graduate School and the Division of Undergraduate Studies. All students will be assigned an advisor who will help the students select their courses and prepare for life after NC State. Students may select a specific major that they wish to study, or if there is a general idea of an area of interest, choose the undeclared option of the particular college of their choice. The First Year College option allows students the opportunity to explore different programs if they are undecided about a career choice.

A GREAT PLACE TO CALL HOME

In addition to outstanding athletics and academics, NC State offers a chance to grow and learn through a wealth of social opportunities. More than 7,000 students live on campus, putting them within walking distance to classes, labs, the libraries, theaters, concerts, art galleries and sports facilities. In addition, every dormitory room comes with connections to the NC State campus computer network.

University Dining has something for everyone and can accommodate most special nutritional needs. NC State operates a nationally recognized dining program that offers convenience, quality and service. There are 15 locations around campus, ranging from all-you-can-eat Case Dining Hall to the Wolve's Den to campus convenience stores and quick food like Chick-Fil-A and Taco Bell.

A 42,900-square-foot Student Health Center opened in 1999 to consolidate counseling, disability services, health education and medical services. Staffed with full-time physicians, nurses, pharmacy and other medical support staff, NC State's Student Health Services provides routine

medicine, environmental science, and the humanities and social sciences. The 7,000-acre site is the home of 136 organizations, and employs over 43,000 people.

The average high temperature in Raleigh is 70 degrees, while the average low is 47 degrees. The mean annual temperature in Raleigh is 59.1 degrees.

Raleigh-Durham International Airport is just 15 minutes from NC State, boasting 600 daily flights to more than 53 non-stop destinations. North Carolina also has the largest state-maintained highway system in the nation. Three interstate highways intersect the Triangle area.

A COLLEGE TOWN

There are eight colleges and universities within Wake Counties borders. In addition to NC State, Raleigh is home to four other institutions of higher learning: Meredith College (women's college), Peace College (women's college), St. Augustine's College and Shaw University.
