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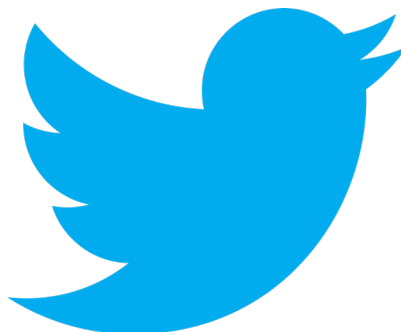

# TIM SANTORO

HEAD COACH

EIGHTH SEASON AT NC STATE

EIGHTH YEAR AS A HEAD COACH

Tim Santoro was named the head coach of the women's soccer program at NC State on November 30, 2012. Santoro came to the Wolfpack from Wake Forest, where he served as associate head coach for the then nationally-ranked Demon Deacons.

Through seven seasons at the helm of the Wolfpack, Santoro has guided the program to four consecutive NCAA Championship berths (2016-19), including three Sweet 16 appearances (2016, '18 and '19) and hosting the NCAA First Round at Dail Soccer Stadium in three straight seasons (2017-19).

In each of the past four seasons under Santoro, the Wolfpack has finished with 10 or more wins. In 2017, the Pack finished with a 15-5-2 mark for the most overall wins since 1995, and its 6-3-1 record in ACC play tied the most wins in school history against league opponents. Additionally, its third-place finish in the regular season standings that year was a program best.

The 2019 campaign saw the program finish fifth overall in the conference standings, its second time in three years earning a top five finish, and its 4-2-4 ledger marked the fewest losses in league play since the expansion of the conference in 2004.

Thanks to strong play against ACC foes, NC State has earned an ACC Championship berth in three of the last four seasons and advanced to the semifinal round in two of the last three years.

Its four straight NCAA Tournament appearances is the longest streak for the program since the 1989-92 seasons, as NC State is one of five ACC schools to reach the NCAA Sweet Sixteen in at least three of the last four years and advance to at least the NCAA Second Round in four consecutive seasons.

Along with its successes at the national stage, the Pack has been selected to host the NCAA First Round at Dail Soccer Stadium for three consecutive seasons. Prior to 2017, NC State women's soccer had never hosted an NCAA Tournament round.

The 2019 senior class was a catalyst for the pro-

gram's recent success and is arguably one of the best classes to come through NC State with 40 career wins. The class has won a combined 54 awards for their individual successes on the field and in the classroom. Included in those awards are nine All-ACC and five all-region mentions, as well as Tziarra King's 2019 All-America honor to become the first player in 24 years to earn the award.

Santoro has brought the Wolfpack back to national prominence, as the squad has finished nationally ranked in at least one major poll in each of the past four seasons. The accomplishment had not been done since the 1989-92 seasons. NC State has also made history each year in the final NCAA rating percentage index (RPI), notching a program best number each season. The 2019 squad boasted an RPI of 15 - the highest ever for the Pack.

2016 was the breakthrough year for the Wolfpack. The head coach of the NSCAA Southeast Regional Staff of the Year and a finalist for NSCAA National Staff of the Year, Santoro guided the program to its first NCAA Tournament appearance in 20 years and led them to their first ever NCAA Sweet Sixteen since the origin of the 64-team tournament.

In addition, Santoro led NC State to its first ACC Tournament postseason berth in 10 years by gaining points in half of its ACC matches and the No. 8 seed. During the regular season the Pack defeated eight teams that were ranked or receiving votes in national polls and was featured in several top 25 polls through the season, climbing as high as 17th despite facing the hardest ACC schedule in the conference.

The 2016 squad was one of the youngest in the country, built primarily of freshmen and sophomores. The top-20 freshmen recruiting class accounted for the team's top three and five of the top-six point scorers. The freshmen recorded 23 goals and 19 assists for 69 percent of the team's points, while all four sophomores made a huge jump from their freshman season and started every match for the team. The team had a strong offensive and defensive year, scoring 32 goals - more than the previous two seasons combined - and lowering its goals against average to 1.10 to tie its best mark since 2011.

"Tim Santoro was identified early in the search process as one of the rising stars in women's soccer" said Sherard Clinkscales, former Associate Athletic Director at NC State upon Santoro's hiring. "His recruiting efforts established Wake Forest as a perennial top-ten program. Coupled with a strong acumen for game strategy and commitment to student-athlete development, it became clear to the search committee and me that Tim was the right choice to lead the women's soccer program. Tim understands the challenges of competing in the ACC and embraces them. He is determined to restore NC State to its past glory as a national contender."

Prior to NC State, Santoro was one of the top assistant coaches and recruiters in the country from 2008-2012, directing and coordinating all aspects of recruiting and developing Wake Forest in his five seasons into one of the premier programs in NCAA Division I and in the Atlantic Coast Conference.

During his tenure at Wake Forest, the Deacons achieved major firsts in the program's history, including the NCAA College Cup and the No. 1 overall seed in the 2011 NCAA Tournament, the 2010 ACC Championship, and a top-5 recruiting class in 2010.

According to Wake Forest head coach Tony da Luz, Santoro was instrumental in those achievements. "I'm very excited for Tim to have this opportunity at NC State. Tim has been a huge part of our success over the past five years. He has a tremendous knowledge of the game, is a hard-working recruiter and has a personality that makes him a coach that players want to play for."

In 2011, the Demon Deacons earned a No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament and advanced to the program's first-ever College Cup, in addition to making a return trip to the ACC Tournament final after first winning the conference title in 2010. In addition, they gave up only 20 goals all season, earning a 0.74 goals against average that ranked as the lowest in school history, and kept 14 shutouts, the second-highest total for a Wake Forest squad.

The 2011 squad reached No. 1 in the NCAA RPI rankings and peaked at No. 3 in the NSCAA poll, with both marks being the highest in school his-



tory. The team also set a school season record for wins (18), finishing with an 18-4-4 record.

In 2010, a so-called "rebuilding year" after graduating seven starters in 2009, Santoro helped the Demon Deacons win their first-ever ACC Championship and receive a final ranking of No. 8 in the Soccer America poll.

Santoro attended Catawba College in Salisbury, N.C., and was a four-year member of the men's soccer program before graduating in 1994. He helped guide Catawba to a pair of NAIA National Tournament appearances, before the school

moved to the Division II level for his final two seasons. He was named an honorable mention All-American as a senior.

Santoro, who hails from a New Jersey soccer family with his older brother, Mat, the Head Coach at Division II men's program University of Southern Indiana, lives in Raleigh with his wife, Pilar, and their three dogs (Nesta, Philly, and Cali).

# GLEN TOURVILLE

ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH  
FOURTH SEASON AT NC STATE  
38TH YEAR IN COLLEGE COACHING

Glen Tourville enters his fourth season as the NC State women's soccer associate head coach, helping the team to reach the NCAA Second Round in 2017 and Sweet 16 in 2018 and '19.

"To add someone of Glen's experience and knowledge was exactly the goal of the search," Santoro said upon Tourville's hiring. "Recruiting the best people is always my goal, whether its players or staff. Glen's got an abundance of successful experience at all levels (youth, ODP, college and professional) and will add the expertise that NC State needs to keep evolving."

"Glen and I have known each other for almost 15 years and have always tried to unite on the same staff. I'm glad the opportunity to work together is finally here."

Tourville has played a significant role in the team's continued success since the Wolfpack's breakthrough in 2016.

In his three seasons with the Wolfpack, NC State has earned an NCAA Tournament berth every year and made a pair of Sweet Sixteen appearances. The program has also finished with 10 or more wins in the three seasons Tourville has been on staff.

Prior to his role with the Classic Eagles, Tourville served as both associate head coach and assistant coach at Ohio State University from 2008-2014. During that tenure, he played a

prominent role in leading the Buckeyes to several program firsts, including the only Big 10 regular season conference title (2010), the program's only appearance in the NCAA College Cup (2010), the program's longest consecutive streak in the NCAA Tournament (five consecutive appearances) and the Buckeyes' most recent Big 10 Tournament championship (2012).

Tourville, who has a Bachelor's and Master's degree from Aurora (Ill.) University, has 17 years of collegiate head coaching experience in addition to 14 years as a coach with USYSA Region II Olympic Development Program.

Tourville's ODP experience included twice serving as Region II Head Coach for teams that played in France (2005) and Costa Rica (2007).

Before Ohio State, Tourville spent one season at West Texas A&M after 11 years as the assistant athletics director and head coach for men's and women's soccer at NCAA Division III Hendrix College in Conway, Ark.

Tourville began coaching in 1982 as an assistant coach with the University of Illinois-Chicago men's soccer program. After playing collegiately at Illinois-Chicago after transferring from Eastern Illinois, Tourville gained professional soccer playing experience over four seasons in the American Soccer League and Major Indoor Soccer League.





# STEVE MCKENNA

ASSISTANT COACH  
FOURTH SEASON AT NC STATE  
EIGHTH YEAR IN COLLEGE COACHING

Steve McKenna recently wrapped up his third season as an assistant coach with the NC State women's soccer team in 2019, as he has assisted in the team building upon its success after a breakthrough 2016 season.

In his three seasons with the Wolfpack, NC State has earned an NCAA Tournament berth every year and made a pair of Sweet Sixteen appearances. The program has also finished with 10 or more wins in the three seasons McKenna has been on staff.

In 2017, his first year, the Pack finished with a 15-5-2 mark for the most overall wins since 1995, and its 6-3-1 record in ACC play tied the most wins in school history against league opponents. Additionally, its third-place finish in the regular season standings that year was a program best.

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Prior to NC State McKenna served as assistant coach at Loyola University (MD) from 2014-16. Prior to Loyola, McKenna spent 2013 as an assis-

tant coach at Georgetown, where the Hoyas went 16-3-2 and made a second consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance.

"Steve is a great fit for this position and for this program," Santoro said upon McKenna's hiring. "I was very patient with this search but after the time spent together and the sharing of ideas, I quickly realized that Steve is the experienced person we need. He will hit the ground running in all facets of our program and make an immediate impact at NC State."

The Northern Ireland native, who holds his United States Soccer Federation "A" license, brings a wealth of knowledge from his international experience before arriving in the U.S., having worked for the Irish Football Association. McKenna led the Centre for Excellence's Grassroots and Primary School programs.

Before arriving at NC State, McKenna worked with Bethesda soccer club ECNL and Maryland ODP. He currently is an Assistant Coach with the NC Courage DA in Raleigh.





# JUSTIN BRYANT

DIRECTOR OF GOALKEEPING

THIRD SEASON OF SECOND STINT AT NC STATE

17TH YEAR IN COLLEGE COACHING

Justin Bryant was named Director of Goalkeeping for the NC State women's soccer program by head coach Tim Santoro on July 23, 2018.

The 2020 season marks the third year of his second stint with the Wolfpack, as he served as Director of Goalkeeping from 2013-15 prior to spending the last year as an assistant coach at UNC Wilmington.

"Justin is as good of a goalkeeping coach as there is and it was a priority to get him back to NC State," said Santoro upon Bryant's hiring. "He was a part of the rebuild when I got here and now he'll be a big part of us taking the next step in the ACC and nationally. He's immersed in the keeper position from his playing days, his coaching and his writing and media background. Our group will learn a lot from him and improve."

Through his two seasons on staff, NC State has advanced to the NCAA Sweet Sixteen in back-to-back seasons.

In his first season, Bryant guided standout Syd-

ney Wootten to a 1.17 goals-against average and 11 wins, including seven shutouts. Wootten played every minute in goal during the 2018 season and finished among the top five all-time in career saves (302, 5th), shutouts (24, T3rd) and GAA (1.27, 5th), becoming the first GK to do so since 1993. She additionally finished top eight all-time with 104 saves and her seven shutouts in the 2018 season.

In 2019, Bryant helped junior Jessica Berlin compile a .95 goals-against average in her first season of action with the Wolfpack. Her average is the seventh-lowest for a single season in program history. Berlin additionally tallied 5.5 shutouts and a .759 save percentage in goal.

A 2001 graduate of Elon, Bryant also spent eight years as an assistant coach with the Phoenix from 1997-2005, helping the program capture the Big South Conference championship in 1999. He also coached goalkeepers for the North Carolina Olympic Development Program during that time.

The Melbourne, Fla., native started his coaching

career at Radford, where he served as an assistant coach for the women's team from 1991-93. He moved on to Queens College in 1994 where he worked as an assistant coach for the men's and women's programs.

A three-year starter in goal at Radford University, Bryant led the Highlanders to the 1986 Big South Conference Championship game, and ranks third all-time in career saves (229).

Among the first Americans to play overseas, Bryant made his debut in goal for Borehamwood FC of England's National League on March 12, 1988. He signed a professional contract with the Orlando Lions of the American Soccer League in September 1988, spent the following season with Dunfermline Athletic of the Scottish Premier Division, and rejoined Borehamwood for the 1990-91 season.

He finished his playing career by leading the Cocoa Expos to the 1995 USISL Championship game, having won all twenty-two of his starts in goal.





# KIM KERN

DIRECTOR OF OPERATIONS  
EIGHTH SEASON AT NC STATE

After serving as the Director of Goalkeeping for the past year, Kim Kern was elevated to Director of Operations for the NC State women's soccer program in the 2018 season.

"Elevating Kim to our Director of Operations position gives her great stability and is a logical step for the program since she's been so entrenched in NC State. I'm thrilled we were able to keep her with us since she knows this program as well as anybody," said Santoro.

Her position includes organizing in-season travel and team nutrition, as well as assisting with the organization of NC State's recruiting and helping

out with summer camps and budgeting.

Kern served both as an assistant coach and Director of Operations for the program from 2012-2015 before stepping down from her position to pursue a professional career with Oulu Nice of the Finnish First Division.

The Raleigh, N.C., native graduated from NC State in May 2012 with a degree in sport management. She was a four-year starting goalkeeper, making 66 career starts in net, including 57 out of 58 games her final three seasons. Kern's 324 career saves rank third-best in school history, while her 1.29 goals-against-average and 15 shutouts rank

fifth and sixth, respectively.

She was a two-time ACC All-Academic Team member and earned Academic All-District First Team honors during her junior season.



# DEVYN WILSON

ATHLETIC TRAINER  
SECOND SEASON AT NC STATE

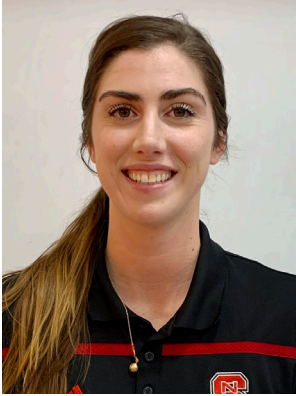
Devyn Wilson recently graduated with a Master's degree in Parks, Recreation, Tourism and Sport Management from NC State. While earning her degree, Wilson was a graduate assistant athletic trainer with the men's and women's cross country and track & field teams. She enters her third year at NC State transitioning into a role with the women's soccer team.

Originally from Ohio, Wilson completed an undergraduate degree from Ashland University in 2016 with a Bachelor of Science in athletic train-

ing. While there, Wilson worked with a variety of sports including women's soccer, wrestling, baseball, and men's and women's swimming, as well as off campus at neighboring high schools.

**GARRETT MUNRO**  
SENIOR ASSOCIATE AD  
FIRST SEASON AT NC STATE

Garrett Munro joined NC State in January of 2020 as Senior Associate Athletic Director. Munro assists in fundraising and development while serving as sport supervisor for both men’s and women’s soccer.

Munro previously served as Senior Associate Athletic Director of Development during Boo Corrigan’s tenure at Army. He spent the prior four years serving as Associate AD of Development and Assistant AD for the Army A Club.

In his six years in West Point, Munro helped the Development operation achieve record levels, as the Army A Club more than doubled the total raised on an annual basis. In addition, Munro helped a fundraising team that raised approximately \$4 million in friends of contributions, more than \$14 million in support of program endowments and more than \$21 million in facility and capital improvements contributions.

Munro played an integral role in the growth of ticket revenue for the athletic department by more than \$2 million from 2013 to 2018.

Prior to his time at West Point, Munro spent three years as Assistant Director of Development at Miami University in Oxford, Ohio. In that role, Munro oversaw all aspects of the Red and White Club annual scholarship fund for nearly three years. He was responsible for design, planning and communication of a new donor based seating model for ice hockey that generated more than \$100,000 in new revenue annually. In addition, Munro served the RedHawks in a major gifts capacity.

Prior to his time at Miami Ohio, Munro spent a year and a half serving in various capacities at Ohio University. Among his roles were Assistant Director of Development where he managed the Bobcat Representative Program and premium seating for football and men’s basketball games. He also assisted with all aspects of the Ohio Bobcat Club annual fund.



# DR. RANDY WOODSON

Dr. Randy Woodson was appointed the 14th chancellor of North Carolina State University on April 1, 2010. He brought to NC State more than 25 years of experience as an internationally renowned plant scientist and academic leader.

Under his leadership, NC State has built upon its reputation as a pre-eminent research institution. It is a time marked by many transformative changes — the opening of the James B. Hunt Jr. Library on Centennial Campus, the launch of the College of Sciences and the completion of the Lonnie Poole Golf Course. Woodson also guided the university in securing leadership roles in groundbreaking research projects, such as the Next Generation Power Electronics National Manufacturing Innovation Institute, the Consortium for Nonproliferation Enabling Capabilities and the Laboratory for Analytic Sciences. During his time at NC State, the university’s two National Science Foundation Engineering Research Centers — FREEDM and ASSIST — have gone from strength to strength.

Even in the face of unprecedented financial challenges, these advances were made possible thanks to Woodson’s strategic plan and the accompanying Strategic Resource Management initiative, which aligned the university for greater effectiveness, efficiency and — most importantly — student success.

At NC State, Woodson has solidified the

spirit of the land-grant university and its hallmarks of commitment and service by spearheading efforts to increase college access. As the landscape of funding for public universities continues to change, NC State consistently ranks in the top five best values among public universities in the U.S., according to U.S. News and World Report and Princeton Review.

During his tenure, Woodson has overseen two of the largest private gifts in university history. Additionally, the university’s endowment nearly doubled and currently stands at \$984 million.

Woodson arrived at NC State from Purdue University, where he served as executive vice president for academic affairs and provost. He also served as the Glenn W. Sample Dean of Agriculture, associate dean of agriculture and director of the Office of Agricultural Research Programs at Purdue.

Woodson grew up in Fordyce, Ark., and attended the University of Arkansas, receiving a B.S. in horticulture. He received his M.S. and Ph.D. in plant physiology from Cornell University. He joined the Louisiana State University faculty in 1983, moving to Purdue University as an assistant professor of horticulture in 1985. Prior to his administrative appointments, Woodson also served as head of the Department of Horticulture and Landscape Architecture at Purdue and was a visiting scholar at the École Nationale Supérieure Agronomique de Toulouse in France.

Over his decades-long career in higher education, Woodson has contributed a substantial body of knowledge to the field of plant science, which has been published in more than 100 journal articles and book chapters. His research has covered topics such as plant genetics, molecular biology, biotechnology and sustainable bioproducts development, spanning the gap between the detailed science of plant physiology and

the practical application of this knowledge in the field of horticulture. His research has been featured in stories published in BusinessWeek, The Futurist and Discover.

Woodson has received a number of professional honors during his career, including the Purdue University Agriculture Research Award, the American Society for Horticultural Science Outstanding Researcher Career Award and the Sagamore of the Wabash Award, the highest award presented by the governor of Indiana for service. He is a fellow of the American Society for Horticultural Science.

He and his wife, Susan, an accomplished artist, have three adult children: Samantha, a librarian at Central Carolina Community College; Patrick, an agricultural engineer at RTI International; and Chloe, a care provider and educator in the TEACCH Autism Program at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. The Woodsons have one granddaughter.





Boo Corrigan was selected by Chancellor Randy Woodson as NC State Director of Athletics on January 29, 2019 and began his tenure in Raleigh on April 30, 2019.

Corrigan arrived at NC State after eight years as director of athletics at West Point. Under his leadership, Army excelled in competition but also surpassed ambitious fundraising goals, upgraded several facilities, added three varsity sports and created a new brand identity, all while cadet-athletes raised the bar academically. He was named a 2017 Athletic Director of the Year by the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics.

At NC State, Corrigan leads a program that includes 23 teams, revenue of about \$86 million and more than 200 full-time employees.

“I am honored to be selected by Chancellor Woodson to lead NC State Athletics, and my family and I are thrilled to be part of the Wolfpack,” said Corrigan. “NC State is a special institution with a long, proud athletic history and an incredible fan base. I’m excited to work with the university’s outstanding coaches, talented student-athletes and dedicated staff to build on the strong foundation developed over the last several years and look forward to moving NC State to even higher levels in all aspects of the student-athlete experience.”

# BOO CORRIGAN

Corrigan presided over one of the most successful eras in Army’s history, setting milestones and records in competition and in the classroom. He oversaw a program that claimed 20 Patriot League regular season or tournament championships and that sent 14 teams to the NCAA postseason. A total of 80 cadets earned a major award from their conference during his tenure.

Meanwhile, Army boasted 16 Academic All-Americans, including eight first-team selections. Since the start of the 2011-12 season, Army had nine Patriot League Scholar-Athletes of the Year.

Corrigan oversaw an unprecedented increase in athletic fundraising during his time at West Point. Through his guidance the Army A Club experienced a 30 percent increase in membership while increasing the total money raised annually by 200 percent from \$2.5 million to approximately \$7.5 million. Corrigan also led significant growth of the Athletic Department’s endowments establishing 16 new funds, more than doubling the number of endowments, and growing the department’s total endowment funds by more than \$18 million in his tenure. In addition, Corrigan raised more than \$35 million in support of new and renovated facilities.

Throughout his career, Corrigan has placed a consistent emphasis on student-athlete wellness, prioritizing mental health and social-media training.

Corrigan is no stranger to the Atlantic Coast Conference. Before joining Army, Corrigan worked for three years in the athletic department at Duke, serving as senior associate athletic director for external affairs. He also served as assistant director of marketing at Florida State University from 1992 to 1996.

Corrigan also served five years as associate athletic director for marketing at the University of Notre Dame and

three years as associate athletic director for marketing at the U.S. Naval Academy.

Corrigan spent much of his youth in Charlottesville while his father, Gene, served as Virginia’s athletic director from 1971-81. Gene Corrigan was later athletics director at Notre Dame and commissioner of the ACC.

Corrigan is married to the former Kristen Aceto, a field hockey and lacrosse player at the University of Virginia, who also earned a master’s degree from the school. The couple have three children, Finley (17), Tre (15) and Brian (14).

Corrigan received his bachelor’s degree in economics from the University of Notre Dame in 1990 and earned a master’s degree in education from Virginia Commonwealth University in 2013.

# PACK PROS

## TZIARRA KING (UTAH ROYALS, UNITED STATES)



On Jan. 16, 2020, Tziarra King became NC State's first player ever selected in the National Women's Soccer League (NWSL) Draft, as she was the eighth-overall pick to Utah Royals FC.

She finished her career ranked third in career starts (88), goals (48) and points (115), and earned a combined 31 conference, regional and national awards throughout her time with the Wolfpack. Her most notable awards came in her final season (2019) when she was named an All-American by United Soccer Coaches, becoming the first player to earn the distinction in 24 years, and becoming the program's first player to win the ACC Scholar-Athlete of the Year Award.

In her professional debut on June 30, 2020, she scored the equalizer in Utah's 3-3 draw with Houston Dash.

She was traded to OL Reign in January 2021.

## RICCI WALKLING (WERDER BREMEN, GERMANY)



Ricci Walkling, an Obergriesbach, Germany native, returned home to continue her professional career as she signed in January 2020 with SV Werder Bremen of 2. Frauen-Bundesliga, the second tier of German soccer.

Prior to NC State, Walkling played for Bayern Munich, one of the top clubs in Germany, as well as the German National Team.

Walkling started 86 matches and tallied 27 assists in her career, the seventh-most in program history in both categories, and was consistently rated as one of the top players in the NCAA.

Additionally, she scored 11 goals from the midfield and earned a combined 14 conference, regional and national awards for her efforts on the field and in the classroom throughout her career.

## TAYLOR PORTER (UDG TENERIFE, SPAIN)



Taylor Porter wrapped up her collegiate career in 2018, and started all 85 matches while racking up six goals and five assists from her defensive midfielder position.

In May 2019, she signed a replacement contract with Orlando Pride, becoming the first NC State women's soccer player to sign a NWSL contract. Porter was one of several who replaced players among the league that were called up for the 2019 FIFA World Cup in France.

After playing for ZFK Spartak Subotica in Serbia for a short time, she signed in January 2020 with UDG Tenerife Egatesa, and most recently joined Spanish organization Racing Santander in September 2020.

## FRANZISKA JASER (FC BASEL, SWITZERLAND)



Franziska Jaser, another member of the German pipeline, played just one season at NC State (2014) before signing a contract with FC Freiburg back home in April 2015.

A member of Germany's 2014 U20 World Cup Team, she joined the Pack prior to its fourth match of the season and started 17 straight as a midfielder. Of the 17 matches she played, Jaser played the entirety of 14 of them and recorded a team-high three assists.

In 2016 Jaser signed with FC Basel in Switzerland, and in December 2020 joined Walking at SV Verder Bremen back home in Germany.

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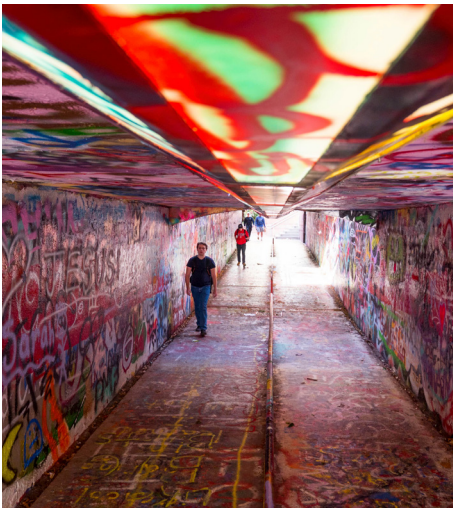


# NC STATE UNIVERSITY

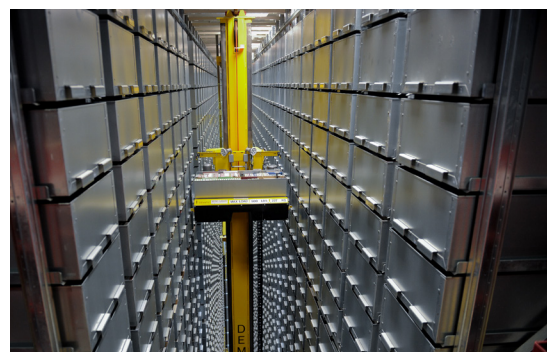


# TALLEY STUDENT UNION AND HUNT LIBRARY

Two large attractions on NC State's campus are the new Talley Student Union and the James B. Hunt Library. Talley is the hub where students experience collaboration, community-building, and personal and professional development. The new design, which was completed in 2015, expands the union to four floors. At 283,000 square feet, Talley is one of NC State's largest, busiest and most sustainably-designed buildings.



The Hunt Library is located on the university's Centennial Campus. The \$115 million facility opened in January 2013 and is best known for its architecture and technological integration, including a large robotic book storage and retrieval system. Designed to be a major competitive advantage for the university, the Hunt Library is a signature building that both enables and reflects NC State's vision as a preeminent technological research university recognized for its innovative education and research.





# REYNOLDS COLISEUM

One of nine “hallowed spaces” on the NC State campus, venerable “old” Reynolds Coliseum is now a place where the Wolfpack’s legendary past meets its promising future.

The largest basketball arena in the southeast when it opened its doors in 1949, Reynolds reopened in the fall of 2016 after undergoing a \$35 million renovation. The basketball court, where Hall of Famers Norm Sloan, Jim Valvano and Kay Yow once coached, has been shifted to the south end, seats have been arranged closer to the playing surface and air conditioning was added for the first time in the building’s 67-year history.



The building serves as the permanent home for NC State’s ROTC programs and women’s basketball, gymnastics, wrestling, volleyball and rifle, while also providing an on-campus gathering place for large-scale campus and student events, such as convocation, graduation, keynote addresses, concerts and shows, befitting one of the nation’s leading public research universities.

Seating capacity has been reduced from 8,300 to 5,500 (can accommodate 6,000 depending on configuration) to provide an intimate home court environment for the Wolfpack. The building boasts new hospitality areas, restrooms, concessions, merchandise stands and other amenities. All building systems have been overhauled, including the addition of new LED sport lighting and a new, center-hung video board and secondary LED displays, which enhance the in-game experience for fans.





# RALEIGH, N.C.

North Carolina's capital city, Raleigh, is the apex of the area known as the Research Triangle - home to more than two million. Ideally situated between the Atlantic Ocean and Blue Ridge Mountains, there are 11 major beaches within a two to three hour drive to the east, while mountain retreats await just a few hours to the west.

There are many reasons to study, live or work in the Raleigh metropolitan region, which is consistently recognized by national publications as one of the 'best places to live' in the United States.

North Carolina's state capital, Raleigh has a mild climate year-round (average high temperature of 71 degrees). It's easy to see why the "City of Oaks" and the surrounding region is rapidly becoming one of the most desirable destinations in America. Raleigh boasts a population of more than 450,000 residents and is home to nine colleges and universities. One-third of the population is comprised of minorities, and one-third of the population is also between the ages of 18 and 32. The Raleigh region has over 1.2 million people.

Raleigh is home to the annual North Carolina State Fair. The state's largest annual event is held for 11 days in mid-October, and attracts more than a million people every year.



Raleigh boasts more than 9,000 acres of parkland and almost 1,300 acres of water, offering recreational activities year-round. A nationally-acclaimed greenway system spans more than 180 miles, providing walking, jogging and hiking trails that connect many of the City of Raleigh's 200+ parks and Town of Cary's 30+ parks.



Raleigh is also home to the Raleigh-Durham International Airport, and NC State is just 11 miles away off of I-40 and I-440. The Raleigh Union Station, which recently opened its doors, now gives Raleigh residents a new method of transportation. Located in downtown Raleigh, the train station is just less than three miles from campus.

# FACILITIES

## DAIL SOCCER STADIUM

Located centrally on campus, Dail Soccer Stadium seats 3,000 Wolfpack fans on match days. The Wolfpack student section, known as the Red Terrors, often represent the loudest supporters, and have reserved seats behind both goals.



## WOLFPACK TRAINING CENTER

Completed in 2012 and located conveniently on campus, the Wolfpack training center features two full fields. One is a hybrid Bermuda grass field that exactly matches the dimensions of the stadium, and features a tile drainage system that allows it to be used under most weather circumstances. The Wolfpack Training Center also features a 100x68 turf field, made of FIFA-certified infill.





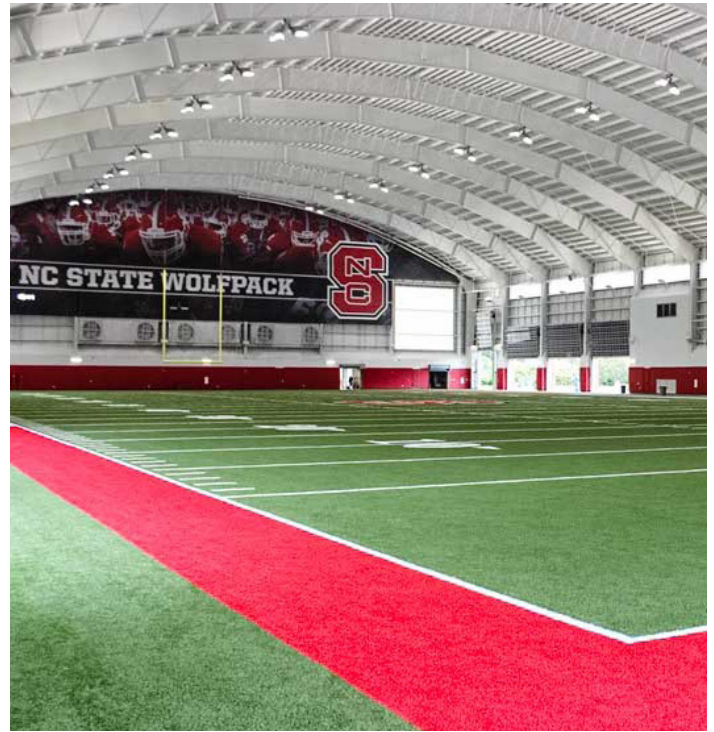
## CLOSE-KING INDOOR FACILITY

In the summer of 2015 the Close-King Indoor Practice Facility opened for business. The facility boasts a full, 120-yard football field with a roof height sufficient for punts and suspended goalposts. In addition to the field, the Wolfpack's new state-of-the-art indoor practice facility boasts additional training and conditioning space beyond both endzones and four sprint lanes down the full length of the field.

The indoor facility allows other outdoor spots like women's soccer to have a space to practice during inclement weather.

Other features include clerestory windows and glass roll-up doors to allow natural daylight, a complete sound system, and support areas for equipment, strength and conditioning and sports medicine.

The privately-funded \$14 million facility is named in honor of NC State alums Derick S. Close ('82) and James S. King ('62), who donated the lead gifts for the project. Close and King currently serve on the Wolfpack Club Board of Directors, while King is a past president of that board.





# STUDENT SERVICES

NC State has always been a leader in providing student-athletes an environment in which they can excel both on and off the field. The dedication to giving student-athletes the tools they need to succeed in every aspect of their lives is the student services department's top objective.



The philosophy in the student services area of the athletic department is to provide world-class facilities for every sport, top nutritionists and trainers to support physical development, top-level mentoring and tutoring to assist with academics and career placement, and of course coaches who are committed to winning and creating leaders in every aspect of life.

To provide the best, you have to plan for success, and the student services goals are to generate winning athletic teams as well as successful well-rounded student-athletes.

## ACADEMIC SUPPORT

The Academic Support Program for Student-Athletes (ASPSA) is certified by the National Association of Academic Advisors for Athletics, and NC State was the first ACC institution to be certified. The ASPSA's tutoring program, which employs over 80 tutors to provide support to all varsity student-athletes, is certified by the College Learning and Reading Association. The Case Academic Center, which is centrally located on campus, houses the 12 full-time staff members of ASPSA and includes tutorial spaces, quiet study areas, and a computer lab for student-athletes to access throughout the day.

## SPORTS MEDICINE

The NC State Sports Medicine Department strives to provide the highest quality comprehensive healthcare to student-athletes at NC State. The primary focus of the department is to protect the health and well-being of the student-athlete by minimizing extrinsic risks.



Few programs play a role as essential to the continued success of NC State Athletics as sports medicine. The NC State athletic training rooms are staffed by an experienced team of professionals, consisting of 18 certified athletic trainers. This highly trained group provides injury recognition, acute injury management, injury rehabilitation, and injury prevention. Athletic trainers at NC State develop relationships with student-athletes and possess a detailed knowledge of student-athletes' medical backgrounds before any medical or injury issues occur. This unique situation provides for an efficient and expedient flow of medical care to our student-athletes if an issue were to occur.





## STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING



The athletic department at NC State places a very high premium on its strength and conditioning programs. Developing a high level of overall fitness is the cornerstone of athletic improvement, and that cornerstone gives each athlete the foundation needed to reach their full potential in their given sport.

NC State's strength and conditioning is an evidence-based program designed around basic exercises (ground based and free weight training dominant), flexibility, movement screening, physical testing and the developmental level of the athlete. Equally important is the cultivation of an atmosphere that will accept no less than an elite level work ethic- a mental edge that can only be created through tenacity and vision.



The NC State women's soccer team utilizes the Weisiger-Brown weight room as its training facility. The strength and conditioning staff is constantly fine tuning strength, speed and agility programs to ensure that each student-athlete is provided the opportunity to compete at the highest level.



## SPORTS NUTRITION

Proper sports nutrition is essential to maintain winning performances. At NC State, two full-time nutritionists work with all of the Wolfpack teams to provide student-athletes with a competitive edge through nutrition. They strive to provide the highest level of care and education for student-athletes to succeed as collegiate athletes and in life.



NC State student-athletes enjoy the convenience and outstanding quality of the training table at Case Dining Hall, which provides well-balanced and appetizing meals. The friendly staff does an outstanding job of feeding more than 400 student-athletes three meals a day. Each meal is designed to provide a number of healthy options. There is a wide array of food selections including a buffet line, potato and pasta bar, salad bar, cold sandwich buffet with a variety of breads and meats, frozen yogurt and desserts.



## APPAREL

The NC State women's soccer team, as well as all 23 varsity programs at NC State, is outfitted by adidas. In an agreement signed between NC State and adidas in 2016, the Wolfpack's athletic department receives at least \$6.45 million per year in retail product and financial considerations from adidas. The new agreement makes the Wolfpack one of the premier global athletic brand's top U.S. collegiate partners.





# WOOD HALL

Each room is equipped with a microfridge, internet and cable TV, and the building provides a 24-hour desk, TV lounge and game room.

Engaging fun team building programs, such as whitewater rafting, volunteering and meditation, coupled with exclusive Village events and the support of a Village mentor will help you discover your balance.

As a member of the Village, you are required to enroll in HESS 295 in the fall, a two-credit course that counts toward your General Education Plan (GEP). The class is an experiential learning opportunity to creatively and critically assess and enhance the seven dimensions of wellness through assignments both in and out of the classroom.
