## FIVE THINGS YOU NEED TO KNOW

**1** No. 16 Minnesota will play in its 21st bowl game when it faces No. 9 Auburn in the Outback Bowl on Jan. 1, 2020, in Tampa, Fla. The game will mark the first-ever meeting between the two schools and will also mark Minnesota's first-ever appearance in the Florida-based Outback Bowl. The Outback Bowl will be the second straight bowl game for the Gophers under head coach P.J. Fleck, as Minnesota played in the Quick Lane Bowl in Detroit last season and beat Georgia Tech 34-10. The 24-point win was Minnesota's largest bowl margin of victory in school history.

**2** This season has been historic for Minnesota under Big Ten Coach of the Year P.J. Fleck. The Gophers won 10 games in the regular season for the first time since 1905 and won seven Big Ten games for the first time in school history. Minnesota won four Big Ten games by at least 20 points for the first time since 1934 and beat No. 5 Penn State at home. The Penn State win was Minnesota's first win against a Top 5 five team since it beat No. 2 Penn State on the road in 1999. It was Minnesota's first home win against a Top 5 team since it beat No. 1 Michigan 16-0 in 1977.

**3** The Gophers are ranked No. 16 in the AP Poll and were ranked as high as No. 7 this year, which was the team's highest ranking since it was No. 5 on Nov. 19, 1962. Minnesota is ranked No. 18 in the College Football Playoffs and was ranked as high as No. 8, which was its highest CFP ranking in school history. The Outback Bowl will be Minnesota's first bowl game between two ranked teams since the 1961 Rose Bowl against Washington. Minnesota was ranked No. 1 in the AP Poll, while Washington was No. 6. The last time the Gophers ended a season ranked in the AP Poll was 2003, when they went 10-3 (beat Oregon in the Sun Bowl) and were ranked No. 20 in the final AP Poll.

**4** Thirteen Minnesota seniors will play in their final game for the Maroon and Gold in the Outback Bowl. They are: Thomas Barber, Shannon Brooks, Carter Coughlin, Winston DeLattiboudere, Tai'yon Devers, Jacob Herbers, Tyler Johnson, Kamal Martin, Alex Melvin, Sam Renner, Rodney Smith, Michael Tarbutt and Chris Williamson. The senior class has won 30 games. The modern day record for most wins by a senior class is 32, set in 2005. The school record is 46 and was set by the 1905 class.

**5** Minnesota has never played a game in Tampa and has played only three games previously in Florida (2000 MironPC.com Bowl in Ft. Lauderdale, 2007 at Florida Atlantic in Boca Raton and 2015 Citrus Bowl in Orlando), but head coach P.J. Fleck is familiar with Tampa and Raymoud James Stadium. Fleck coached the wide receivers for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 2012 prior to being named the head coach at Western Michigan. Tampa Bay's receivers thrived under Fleck, as Vincent Jackson (72 catches, 1,384 yards, 8 TDs) made the Pro Bowl, and Mike Williams (63 catches, 996 yards and 9 TDs) and Tiquan Underwood (28 catches, 425 yards and 2 TDs) had some of the best years of their careers.

## ROW THE BOAT

**The OAR = The ENERGY!** The symbol of strength and purpose. The amount one brings to their life Academically, Athletically, Socially and Spiritually! The only tool that can move the boat forward!

Everyone, not just athletes and athletic teams can share, use and live the ROW THE BOAT lifestyle in their personal and professional lives. By applying ROW THE BOAT, one can have the proper perspective to overcome adversity and humble success by living a lifestyle dedicated to serving and giving.

**FUTURE:** When rowing a boat, as in life, you aren't able to see what is coming your way. Your back is actually facing the future, unable to see what's coming next. Facing the opposite direction can be a very scary and uncomfortable position to be in. However, as in life, worrying about the future only prohibits you from being your absolute best in the present. You aren't able to control the future, but you can control how you react and prepare for it with every stroke you take.

**PRESENT:** You are rowing in the present, which is the **ONLY** thing you can actually control while rowing a boat. You determine whether you take your oar out of the water or keep rowing. You control whether you ROW fast or slow, confident or hesitant, efficient or rushed and whether you ROW for yourself or others! If you stop rowing, you will not go anywhere. ## ABOUT THE TIGERS

The Auburn University Tigers will compete in their 44th bowl and seek their 15th 10-win season at the Outback Bowl.

Auburn finished the 2019 regular season ranked No. 9 in the AP Poll and No. 12 in the CFP rankings. At 9-3, the Tigers only losses on the year came against highly ranked foes: Florida, LSU and Georgia. Auburn finished the regular season with a shootout, 48-45, victory against Alabama in the Iron Bowl.

Auburn played five teams ranked in the AP top-15 this season and has played 41 games against ranked teams in head coach Gus Malzahn's 92 games as the Tigers' head coach (44.5 percent of total games, most of any Auburn coach). Of those, 24 have been against Top-10 opponents. Auburn is 19-22 in games against ranked opponents under Malzahn, including 8-16 against Top-10 teams.

Derrick Brown leads a strong Auburn defense. He was named the Defensive Player of the Year on The Associated Press All-Southeastern Conference football team this week. Brown has been named a finalist for the Outland Trophy, the Bronko Nagurski Award, the Bednarik Award, the Wuerffel Trophy, the Senior CLASS Award and the Pop Warner college player of the year, and a semifinalist for the Lott IMPACT Trophy, the Maxwell Award and the Jason Witten Man of the Year Award.

Bo Nix has put together a strong freshman campaign at quarterback for the Tigers. He holds Auburn freshman records for completions (200), yards (2,366) and touchdowns (15). He has added 301 yards on the ground with seven touchdowns.

Seth Williams has been by far and away the leading Auburn receiver. He has 801 yards and eight touchdowns. Ja'Tarvis Whitlow leads the ground attack with 739 yards and nine touchdowns.

The Tigers defense is a force with 90 total tackles for loss this season. Brown and Marlon Davidson each have 12.5 while K.J. Britt has added 9.0. Jeremiah Dinson leads the team with 79 total tackles. Auburn has forced 15 fumbles and are No. 3 in the country with 13 fumble recoveries. Prior to the Alabama game, Auburn was one of six FBS teams that hadn't allowed more than 24 points in a game this season.

Christian Tutt will put the Gophers top punt return defense in the country to the test. He ranks third in the NCAA with 14.7 yards per punt return.

Malzahn is in his seventh season leading Auburn. He was named the 2013 National Coach of the Year by 11 different outlets in his first year leading the program.

# P.J. FLECK

## HEAD COACH // THIRD SEASON

P.J. Fleck was named head football coach at Minnesota on January 6, 2017. Fleck, 38, is the 30th head coach in the program's history. He has a career record of 52-37 and is 22-15 at Minnesota.

In 2019, Fleck led Minnesota to historic heights as the Gophers won 10 games in the regular season for the first time since 1905. Minnesota won seven Big Ten games for the first time in school history and Fleck was voted the Hayes-Schembechler Big Ten Coach of the Year and was named the AFCA Region 3 Coach of the Year. He is also a finalist for nearly every National Coach of the Year award.

Minnesota won four Big Ten games by at least 20 points for the first time since 1934 and beat No. 5 Penn State at home. The Penn State win was Minnesota's first win against a Top 5 five team since it beat No. 2 Penn State on the road in 1999. It was Minnesota's first home win against a Top 5 team since it beat No. 1 Michigan 16-0 in 1977.

The Gophers ascended to No. 7 in the AP Poll, which was the team's highest ranking since it was No. 5 on Nov. 19, 1962. Minnesota was also ranked No. 8 in the College Football Playoffs, which is its highest CFP ranking in school history.

In 2018, Fleck led Minnesota to wins against Wisconsin, Purdue, Indiana, Fresno State, Miami (Ohio) and New Mexico State. The Gophers beat Georgia Tech 34-10 in the Quick Lane Bowl and the 24-point margin of victory was the largest bowl win in school history.

Under Fleck, a young Minnesota team beat rival Wisconsin for the first time since 2003 and for the first time on the road since 1994 to reclaim Paul Bunyan's Axe. The Gophers also downed Purdue's potent offense, as they held the Boilers to a season low in points (10) and yards (233). Minnesota also beat Fresno State, which finished the season ranked No. 18, to give the Bulldogs one of their two defeats on the season. The win against Fresno State also marked the first time that Minnesota beat a team ranked in the final AP poll since 1999.

The Gophers had 112 players on the roster and 58 (51.7%) were freshmen, which was the most in the nation in 2018. The Gophers had 78 underclassmen (69.6%), which ranked tenth in college football.

In 2017, Fleck led a young and inexperienced Gopher squad, as 49 of Minnesota's 110 players (44.5%) were freshmen and 76 (69%) were underclassmen. Fleck guided Minnesota to a 5-7 record and those five wins were the most by a first-year Gopher head coach new to the program since the legendary Murray Warmath won seven games in 1954.

Fleck won his Gopher debut against Buffalo, which made him the school's first head coach to win his debut since John Gutekunst in 1986 (before Fleck, Minnesota's six most recent head coaches all lost their first game). Minnesota then posted a dominating 48-14 win at Oregon State, which made Fleck the first Gopher coach to win a true road opener since 1954 when Warmath and the Gophers won 46-7 at Pittsburgh.

Minnesota's 34-point win at Oregon State was the Gophers' tenth largest margin of victory in a road game since 1920 and largest since 2006. The 48 points were the most the Gophers scored on the road since they beat Northwestern 49-21 in 1980.

Minnesota posted three 30-point wins in 2017, as it beat Oregon State by 34, Nebraska by 33 and Middle Tennessee by 31. The last time Minnesota won three games by 30 points in the same season was 2005 when it started the year with three straight with three straight 30-point wins.

The Gophers beat Nebraska 54-21 in Fleck's first season. The 54 points were the most that the Gophers scored in a Big Ten game since they beat Indiana 63-26 in 2006. The 54 points were the 14th most scored by Minnesota since 1946 and the fifth most against a Big Ten opponent in the same timeframe.

Off the field, Fleck and his team can often be found at the University of Minnesota Masonic Children's Hospital and annually give back to the community by hosting a diaper drive, canned food drive, school supplies drive and turkey drive. In the classroom, Minnesota has posted program record GPAs under Fleck.

Fleck came to Minnesota after spending four years as the head coach at Western Michigan, where he was 30-22 overall and 21-11 in the Mid-American Conference. While leading the Broncos, Fleck authored one of the most memorable turnarounds in college football history. The Broncos were 1-11 in his first year in 2013, but ended the 2016 season with a No. 12 ranking, a 13-1 record, a conference championship and a berth in the Cotton Bowl.

The Broncos were 12-0 in the 2016 regular season and posted wins against Big Ten opponents Northwestern and Illinois. Fleck then led his team to a 29-23 win against Ohio in the Mid-American Conference championship game before ending the season with a narrow bowl game defeat to Wisconsin. Fleck was named MAC Coach of the Year in 2016 (2014 as well) after leading the Broncos to their first MAC Championship since 1988.

Prior to his time at Western Michigan, Fleck served as the wide receivers coach for the NFL's Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 2012 and coached the receivers at Rutgers from 2010-11. He coached receivers and was the recruiting coordinator at Northern Illinois in 2009 and tutored the receivers for the Huskies from 2007-08. Fleck's coaching career began at Ohio State as a graduate assistant in 2006.

Fleck played receiver at Northern Illinois from 1999-2003 and helped lead the Huskies to a No. 10 ranking, a 10-2 record and wins against Maryland, Alabama and Iowa State in his final season.

Fleck played the 2004-05 seasons with the NFL's San Francisco 49ers. He signed with the 49ers as a free agent in 2004 and spent most of his time on the practice squad before seeing action against New England late in the season. He spent the 2005 season on the injured reserve roster and in 2006 he stopped playing professionally and started his coaching career.

Fleck and his wife, Heather, have four children, Gavin, Carter, Paisley (P.J.) and Harper.

## PUTTING UP POINTS, BALANCED OFFENSE

- ▶ Minnesota, which is 14-4 in its last 18 games, has scored 412 points (third most in a season since 1946) and averages 34.3 points per game (third most in a season since 1946). Minnesota has scored 55 touchdowns this year, which is also the third most in a season since 1946).
- ▶ Minnesota has thrown a school-record 28 TDs this year after tossing 20 in 2018. This is the first time since 2006 (22) and 2007 (25) that Minnesota has consecutive seasons with 20 passing TDs. Minnesota rushed for 23 TDs and threw for 20 TDs last year. This year, Minnesota has rushed for 24 TDs and thrown for 28. This is the first time that Minnesota has consecutive 20 rushing and 20 passing TD seasons since 2005 (34 rush, 20 pass) and 2006 (25 rush, 22 pass) and is only the second time ever since 1955.
- ▶ Minnesota scored at least 28 points in its first nine games this season, which is something it had never done prior to this year. In 1904 - when the Gophers were competing against high school teams - Minnesota scored 28 or more points in its first eight games (107, 77, 75, 65, 47, 35, 32 and 146). Minnesota scored 16 points in its ninth game, which was a 16-12 win against Nebraska.
- ▶ Minnesota scored 31 points or more in eight straight games this year (games two through nine). Minnesota last scored 31 or more points in eight straight games in 1904, as it started the season scoring 107, 77, 75, 65, 47, 35, 32 and 146 points. The streak ended when Minnesota beat Nebraska 16-12.

## RANKED WIN, 20 SOMETHING

- ▶ Minnesota was ranked No. 13 in the AP Poll when it beat No. 5 Penn State, 31-26, on Nov. 6. It was the first game in Minneapolis that featured two Top 15 teams since the No. 5 Gophers beat No. 1 Michigan State 13-0 in 1961. The Penn State win this year was Minnesota's first win against a Top 5 five team since it beat No. 2 Penn State on the road in 1999. It was Minnesota's first home win against a Top 5 team since it beat No. 1 Michigan 16-0 in 1977.
- ▶ Minnesota is ranked No. 16 in the AP Poll, while Auburn is ranked No. 9, which means the Outback Bowl meeting will be the Gophers' third game this year that features two Top 16 teams (games vs. Penn State and Wisconsin were the others). This will be the first season ever that Minnesota will play three games ranked as a Top 16 team against another Top 16 team.
- ▶ Minnesota has won four Big Ten games this year by at least 20 points for the first time since 1934. That year, Minnesota won all five of its Big Ten games by at least 20 points as it was named Big Ten Champions and National Champions.

## HISTORIC START

- ▶ Minnesota started the season 9-0 and had an 11-game winning streak at one point dating back to last season. The last time Minnesota started a season 9-0 was 1904 when it was named National Champions. The last time Minnesota won 11 straight games was when it won 18 straight from 1939-42. Coach P.J. Fleck's win percentage of 59.45% ranks fourth in school history for anyone who coached more than 30 games and is the best since Bernie Bierman, who last coached at Minnesota in 1950.

## MINNESOTA'S MORGAN

- ▶ Minnesota entered 2018 as the only team in the nation with all freshmen quarterbacks and had only one scholarship quarterback in Tanner Morgan. They now have four. Zack Annexstad was put on scholarship last winter and Jacob Clark and Cole Kramer both joined the program in January 2019. Annexstad and Morgan combined to pass for 2,678 yards and 18 touchdowns in 2018 and were poised to battle for the starting quarterback role before Annexstad went down with a foot injury early on in camp and is out indefinitely.
- ▶ Tanner Morgan is 14-4 as a starter and his winning percentage of 77.7% is the highest for any Gopher quarterback with 10 or more starts since 1975. This year, he has completed 191-of-289 passes (66.1%) for 2,975 yards (single season record) and 28 touchdowns (single season record). He has also rushed for a score and caught a two-point conversion from Tyler Johnson against South Dakota State.
- ▶ Tanner Morgan, who is a semifinalist for The Manning Award and was a semifinalist for the Davey O'Brien Award, has thrown a touchdown in all 12 games this season (first player in school history to do so). He has thrown a touchdown pass in 13 straight games, which is a school record. He has thrown three or more touchdowns in five games this season and was named All-Big Ten Second Team.
- ▶ Tanner Morgan has thrown for 4,376 yards (9th in school history) in 21 games. He has completed 280-of-441 passes for 37 touchdowns (all have come in 18 starts), which ranks fifth in school history. Morgan's career completion percentage of 63.4% currently places him first in school history ahead of Mark Carlson (57.2% from 1976-79). Morgan's career pass efficiency rating of 169.1 also currently ranks first in school history, well ahead of Bryan Cupito who had a pass efficiency rating of 138.34 from 2003-06
- ▶ Tanner Morgan has played two of the best games in Big Ten history this year, as he completed 21-of-22 passes (95.45%) for 396 yards and four touchdowns at Purdue and 18-of-20 passes (90%) for 339 yards and three touchdowns against Penn State. Florida State's Jameis Winston is the only other quarterback to have two games with 90% completion percentage, doing so during his Heisman Trophy-winning campaign in 2013. Morgan's 95.45 completion percentage at Purdue is the best ever in Big Ten history for any quarterback who attempted 15 or more passes. His 396 yards tied him for the seventh most in school history and they were the most passing yards by a Gopher since Adam Weber threw for 416 yards against Michigan State in 2009. Morgan's 396 yards were the second most ever by a Gopher on the road behind Cory Sauter (404 yards at Michigan State in 1995).

## MEMORABLE DRIVE

- ▶ Minnesota was attempting a 33-yard field goal with about six minutes remaining against Georgia Southern to go up 11 points. The field goal was blocked and returned 77 yards for a touchdown. A little more than two minutes later, Georgia Southern returned a fumble 44 yards for another score to take a 32-28 lead late in the game. Minnesota, which had zero timeouts, faced a 3rd-and-29 from its own 6-yard line. The Gophers would then march down the field and score the game-winning touchdown with 13 seconds left, showing resolve, resiliency and execution along the way. Minnesota last gave up a blocked field goal returned for a touchdown in a win at Nebraska in 2014. The last time Minnesota gave up a fumble return for a touchdown was in a loss at Northwestern in 2015.

## ALL-BIG TEN

- ▶ Minnesota was well represented when the Big Ten recently announced its individual winners and all-conference teams. P.J. Fleck was voted Big Ten Coach of the Year by his peers, while Rashod Bateman was named Receiver of the Year and Antoine Winfield Jr., was named Defensive Back of the Year. This is the first time Minnesota has had a player named receiver of the year or defensive back of the year.
- ▶ On offense, Rashod Bateman and Tyler Johnson were both named All-Big Ten First Team. According to the Big Ten, this year is the first time in conference history that one school has occupied both receiver spots on the First Team ballots by the coaches and media. Quarterback Tanner Morgan and running back Rodney Smith were named Second Team, while offensive lineman Blaise Andries was named to the Third Team. Morgan is the first Minnesota quarterback to be on a Big Ten postseason team since the coaches voted Adam Weber All-Big Ten Second Team in 2008. On defense Winfield was named to the First Team and Carter Coughlin was named to the Second Team for the second straight year.
- ▶ During the season, Minnesota had eight players named a Big Ten Player of the Week, which tied a school record set by the Gophers last season.

## COACHED UP

- ▶ Minnesota head coach P.J. Fleck was voted the Big Ten Hayes-Schembechler Coach of the Year by his peers after leading Minnesota to a 10 regular season wins for the first time since 1905 and seven Big Ten wins for the first time ever. He was also named a finalist for the George Munger Collegiate Coach of the Year Award and the Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year award. Fleck was also named the AFCA Region 3 Coach of the Year. Offensive Coordinator Kirk Ciarrocca was named a semifinalist for the Broyles Award, which is given to the top assistant coach in college football. Cornerbacks coach Rod Chance was named to the 35 Under 35 program by the AFCA, which annually recognizes 35 top coaches in the country who are under 35.

## SCRIPT FLIPPED

- ▶ Last year, Minnesota lost to Illinois, Maryland, Nebraska and Northwestern and were outscored 174-86 (minus 88). This year, Minnesota beat those four teams and outscored them 164-56 (plus 108).

## NATIONAL EXPOSURE

- ▶ Minnesota's games against Penn State (ABC), Iowa (FOX), Northwestern (ABC) and Wisconsin (ABC) were on network TV. This is the first season ever that Minnesota has played four games on network TV.
- ▶ ESPN College GameDay visited campus on Nov. 30 prior to Minnesota's game against Wisconsin. This was the show's first-ever visit to Minnesota and it drew a season high 2,280,000 viewers.

## GOPHER GREATS

- ▶ Rodney Smith and Tyler Johnson eclipsed career milestones this year. Smith passed 4,000 career rushing yards and now ranks second in school history with 4,053 rushing yards. Smith ranks first in school history in career all-purpose yards with 5,364 (broke Darrell Thompson's record of 5,109). Johnson passed 3,000 career receiving yards and is second in school

history with 3,101 yards. Johnson needs 18 yards in the Outback Bowl to tie Eric Decker's school record of 3,119 yards.

## ACADEMIC SUCCESS

- ▶ Minnesota has 85 players on its roster with a 3.0 GPA or higher and two of them - Blaise Andries and Sam Renner - were named to the 2019 Academic All-America Division I Football Team selected by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA). Andries and Renner were both slotted on the Second Team. Renner was also named to the Second Team last year, but this is the first honor for Andries. Minnesota now has five Academic All-America team members in the last two years, as Payton Jordahl and Gary Moore were also recognized last year. Prior to this, Minnesota last had five players recognized from 2004-15. Renner is Minnesota's first repeat Academic All-America team member since Greg Eslinger in 2004-05. He has already graduated with a degree in Applied Economics and is now working on his Master's of Accountancy. Andries is majoring in Mathematics and is an aspiring actuary.

## MEMBERS ONLY

- ▶ Minnesota is one of two schools to have two 1,000-yard receivers (Tyler Johnson and Rashod Bateman) and one 1,000-yard rusher (Rodney Smith). The other school is LSU (WRs Ja'Marr Chase, Justin Jefferson and RB Clyde Edwards-Helaire). Prior to this season, Minnesota had a 1,000-yard receiver in a season just five times and never had two. Johnson is the first player in school history to record two 1,000-yard seasons, as his 1,169 yards last year set a single-season record. That record was broken by Bateman (1,170) this year and is in danger of being surpassed by Johnson (1,114) as well.

## TERRIFIC TRIO

- ▶ Tyler Johnson, Rashod Bateman and Chris Autman-Bell form one of the best trios in the nation. They have combined for 158 catches, 2,648 yards and 27 touchdowns. Those numbers stack up well against their peers. LSU's top three have 198 catches for 3,250 yards and 42 TDs. Alabama is at 174 catches for 2,878 yards and 29 TDs. Clemson comes in at 134 catches for 2,204 yards and 25 TDs, while Ohio State is at 128 catches for 1,875 yards and 27 TDs.

## DYNAMIC DUO

- ▶ Tyler Johnson and Rashod Bateman are the most prolific receiving duo in school history. This year, they have combined for 131 catches, 2,284 yards and 22 touchdowns. Their emergence harkens memories of another dominant Gopher duo in Laurence Maroney and Marion Barber III. In 12 games in 2004, that duo combined to run for 2,617 yards and 23 touchdowns.

## NORTHSIDE PRIDE

- ▶ Minneapolis North product Tyler Johnson was named All-Big Ten First-Team in 2018 and 2019 (joins Eric Decker as only other U receiver to be named First-Team twice), put the Big Ten on notice last year when he made 78 catches (second most in a season) for 1,169 yards (single-season school record since broken by Rashod Bateman) and 12 touchdowns (single-season school record). He had six 100-yard games, which tied for first in school history in a season and became the first Gopher ever with four straight 100-yard games in Big Ten play. Johnson has six 100-yard games this year and a school-record 15 in his career.

- ▶ Tyler Johnson is one of three receivers in the nation and the only one from a Power Five conference to record consecutive seasons of 1,000 receiving yards. Johnson has 1,114 yards this year after having 1,169 in 2018. The other two receivers are Liberty's Antonio Gandy-Golden and SMU's James Proche.

- ▶ Tyler Jonson is one of the best ever to wear the Maroon and Gold. Johnson ranks second in career receiving yards with 3,101. Eric Decker is the school record holder with 3,119 career yards. Johnson needs 18 more yards to tie Decker's school record. Johnson ranks second in school history with 201 catches (Decker first with 227). Johnson is tied for first in school history with 31 receiving touchdowns with Ron Johnson (no relation).

- ▶ Tyler Johnson has caught a pass in 35 straight games, which is second in school history to Ron Johnson (46 straight games). Tyler Johnson has played in 48 games (missed final two games of 2017 with an injury) and has a school-record 15 100-yard career games on his resume.

- ▶ Tyler Johnson has 11 touchdowns this year (one shy of his single-season school record of 12 set in 2018) and has caught a touchdown in nine of 12 games this season. He has also caught a touchdown in six straight games, which is one shy of Ron Johnson's record of a touchdown reception in seven straight games from Oct. 30, 1999 - Sept. 9, 2000.

- ▶ Tyler Johnson caught three touchdowns against Georgia Southern and is the only Gopher ever to have three receiving touchdowns in three different games in a career (2019 Georgia Southern, 2018 Miami, 2017 Michigan State).

## BATEMAN DELIVERS

- ▶ Rashod Bateman was named the Big Ten's receiver of the year, All-Big Ten First Team and was also one of 12 semifinalists for the Biletnikoff Award. He has 57 catches for 1,170 yards (single season school record) and 11 touchdowns. He ended 2018 with 51 catches for 704 yards (13.80 ave per catch in 2018 and 20.05 ave in 2019).

- ▶ Rashod Bateman has caught at least one pass in all 25 games he has played. He caught seven passes for 203 yards against Penn State and six passes for 177 yards at Purdue. He has five 100-yard games this year and six in his career. In 24 career games, he has 108 catches (15th in school history) for 1,874 yards (eighth in school history) and 17 touchdowns (sixth in school history).

- ▶ Rashod Bateman crossed 1,000 career receiving yards at Purdue (his 17th game) to become the second fastest Gopher to do so. The fastest was Ryan Thelwell (15 games). Notables: Ernie Wheelwright, 20 games; Eric Decker, 21; Tyler Johnson, 26.

- ▶ Rashod Bateman set freshman school records in 2018 in catches (51), yards (704) and his 6 TDs ranked second. This year, he has 57 catches for 1,170 yards (single season school record) and 11 TDs (sophomore record). He is still chasing Eric Decker's sophomore record of 67 receptions.

- ▶ Rashod Bateman had 203 receiving yards against Penn State, which was the second most in a game in school history (most in a Big Ten game) behind



Ryan Thelwell (228 yards against Ball State in 1996). Bateman's last two home games (203 yards against Penn State and 147 yards against Wisconsin) rank first and second as the most receiving yards by a Gopher at TCF Bank Stadium.

## AUTMAN-BELL, DOUGLAS

► Chris Autman-Bell made 28 catches (fourth all-time for a Minnesota freshman) for 449 yards (third all-time for a Minnesota freshman) and led the team with a 16.03 yards per catch average in 2018. He has 27 catches for 364 yards and five touchdowns this year. His first touchdown (first of career too) was at Fresno State. It came on 4th-and-13 and was a 20-yard touchdown from Tanner Morgan. It also came with 46 seconds left in the game and forced overtime.

► Demetrius Douglas caught nine passes for 87 yards and one touchdown in 2018. He returned 24 kickoffs for 594 yards and seven punts for 113 yards. The legacy Gopher (son of Omar Douglas) finished third on the team with 794 all-purpose yards. He has 14 catches for 157 yards this year, but two came on the fourth-quarter, game-winning drive versus Georgia Southern when Minnesota had 3rd-and-30 with no timeouts on its own five yard line.

## BACKS GOTTA EAT

► Between seven backs - Rodney Smith, Shannon Brooks, Mohamed Ibrahim, Treyson Potts, Bryce Williams, Cam Wiley and Preston Jelen - Minnesota has 1,717 carries on its roster for 8,577 yards and 70 touchdowns. Those numbers do not include Seth Green's 374 yards and 13 TDs as a wildcat QB.

► RTB stood for Run The Ball against Illinois, Nebraska and Maryland, as the Gophers rushed for 975 yards and 10 touchdowns in those games. Minnesota has played 77 games at TCF Bank Stadium and those three games rank fourth (332 yards vs. Illinois), fifth (322 yards vs. Nebraska) and sixth (321 yards vs. Maryland) for the school in stadium history.

► Rodney Smith played in two games in 2018, but then missed the season with an injury before being granted a sixth year of eligibility by the NCAA. This year, he leads Minnesota with 212 carries, 1,094 yards and eight touchdowns. He set a career high with 211 yards against Illinois this year. Smith has 16 career 100-yard rushing games, which is third in program history. His streak of five straight 100-yard games (tied for third longest in school history) ended against Penn State.

► Rodney Smith totaled 237 all-purpose yards against Illinois this year and now has three games in his career with at least 237 all-purpose yards (279 against Nebraska in 2017 and 257 against Rutgers in 2016). He is one of four players (joining Tutu Atwell, Tellis Redmon and Chris Darkins) in school history to have three games with at least 237 all-purpose yards, but is the only player to do so against three Big Ten teams. Smith's 5,364 all-purpose yards is a school record.

► Shannon Brooks returned from a February 2018 injury to play against Indiana on Oct. 26, 2018. It was his first game since Oct. 28, 2017, at Iowa. He rushed 22 times for 154 yards and 1 TD against Indiana, but missed the rest of the season when he was injured in the fourth quarter. He returned from that injury on Sept. 28, 2019, at Purdue and has rushed 73 times for 408 yards and 2 TDs this year. He has 20 career rushing TDs and Minnesota is 14-2 when he scores.

► Mohamed Ibrahim scored in the first two games, but then did not record a carry in the next three games as he battled a lingering injury. He returned against Nebraska and rushed for three touchdowns and also scored at Rutgers. Ibrahim has 15 career touchdowns in 20 games. He has rushed 94 times this year for 464 yards and six touchdowns.

## GREEN LINE

► Seth Green scored Minnesota's first touchdown of the season and has five rushing scores this year. After transitioning from quarterback to tight end in spring 2017 and tight end to wide receiver the following fall, Green has found his niche as a Wildcat QB. In 2018, he rushed 76 times for 282 yards (only one negative rush) and eight touchdowns. This year, Minnesota has also scored three rushing touchdowns with Green in the backfield off direct snaps to Rodney Smith. Green has completed 4-of-5 career passes for 36 yards and two touchdowns and also threw for a successful 2-point conversion. He has two catches for 37 yards.

## PIECE OF THE PIE

► Gopher tight ends have graded out as elite blockers, but they have also been more active in the passing game. Jake Paulson has four catches for 51 yards this year, while Brevyn Spann-Ford has three for 26 yards. (1st career catch was TD vs. Illinois).

## MINNESOTA MOVERS

► Minnesota returned four offensive line starters from the Quick Lane Bowl in Blaise Andries (6-6, 325), Curtis Dunlap Jr. (6-5, 345), Daniel Faalele (6-9, 400) and Conner Olson (6-5, 305). The lone loss was Jared Weyler who is putting his double major in Accounting and Entrepreneurial Management to good use.

► Sam Schlueter (6-6, 325) starts at left tackle, which means the U's starting linemen are 6-5 or taller and combine to weigh 1,700 pounds (340 pound average).

► Curtis Dunlap missed the Iowa game and that shuffled the line. Minnesota lined up with Schlueter, Andries, John Michael Schmitz (Fleck calls him the team's sixth starter), Olson and Faalele. Dunlap returned at Northwestern, but Schmitz still sees action at center.

## FINDING A WAY

► The Gophers won four straight one-possession games to start the season becoming the first team since Penn State in 1985 and just the fifth in FBS history, to do so. Penn State won six straight to start the season in 1985, which is the most in FBS history. Texas and Clemson each won four straight in 1958 and Notre Dame won five straight in 1939. The Gophers had previously won only four or more one possession games in a season six times in the modern era, (2016, 1981, 1977, 1968, 1964 and 1961) but had never won more than three in a row prior to this season. With the 31-26 victory against Penn State, the Gophers have now won five one possession games in the same season for just the second time in program history (1961).

## LINE IN THE SAND

► Joe Rossi took over as Gopher defensive coordinator after Minnesota's 55-31 loss at Illinois in 2018. Since then the Gophers are 12-3. In six of those games (2018: Purdue, Georgia Tech, 2019 Illinois, Nebraska, Rutgers, Maryland) the Gophers have allowed 10 or less offensive points. Minnesota did now allow an offensive touchdown against Illinois. It was the first time the Gophers have held a Big Ten opponent

without an offensive touchdown since Nov. 10, 2012 at Illinois. The Gophers did not give up a touchdown against Nebraska until the fourth quarter. That touchdown stopped a stretch of 111:27 without allowing an offensive touchdown. Minnesota went into the fourth quarter without allowing a touchdown against Rutgers and Maryland as well.

► The Gophers have not allowed more than 300 total yards in eight games this year. They are only allowing 312.8 yards per game which is ranked No. 15 in the NCAA. That mark would be the lowest allowed in a single Minnesota season since 1980 when the Gophers also gave up 312.8 yards per game. The Gophers allowed only 41 points in the four straight Big Ten games (17 Illinois, 7 Nebraska, 7 Rutgers, 10 Maryland). However, only 27 of those points were allowed by the defense, as Illinois scored two defensive touchdowns. It was the best defensive stretch for the Gophers in the Big Ten since only allowing 22 points in four games in 1967 (7 Illinois, 0 Michigan State, 15 Michigan, 0 Iowa).

► The Gophers held Fresno State to 57 yards rushing, Illinois to 91 rushing yards and Maryland to 79 yards rushing. They allowed only 75 passing yards against Georgia Southern, 48 to Rutgers and 95 to Northwestern. They have allowed only one 100-yard rusher and two 300-yard passers this season.

## MINNESOTA MADE

► Thomas Barber, Carter Coughlin and Kamal Martin are in their final season. Barber and Coughlin are legacy Gophers, while Martin is from Burnsville, Minn.

► Carter Coughlin has made 154 career tackles in 47 games and 40 of them (25.9%) have been a tackle for loss and 22.5 of them (14.6%) have been a sack. Coughlin ranks fourth in tackles for loss with 40 (Willie VanDeSteege is first with 43.5) and third in sacks with 22.5 (Karon Riley is first with 29.0). Coughlin has 42 tackles, 8.5 tackles for loss and 3.5 sacks this season. He was named All-Big Ten Second Team.

► Thomas Barber has 65 tackles this season and 273 in his career. Barber is on pace to finish just shy of the Gophers top-10 for most tackles in a career (Glenn Howard is No. 10 in school history with 308 career tackles). Barber has also recovered six career fumbles. One more will rank him tied for second in school history, while Stephen Thompson holds the school record (recovered eight career fumbles from 1967-70).

► Kamal Martin has played in only eight games this year, but is second on the team with 66 tackles (8.25 average per game). He made two interceptions against Purdue and led the team in tackles against Illinois, Nebraska and tied for the lead against Rutgers. He forced two fumbles against Illinois and set a career high with 15 tackles against Nebraska. He was named the Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week for his efforts against Nebraska. He now has 176 tackles in 45 career games and has 13 tackles for loss and 3.5 sacks. He has four career interceptions and has forced four fumbles and recovered three.

## PASS RUSH

► Twelve different players have at least assisted on a sack and 20 have a tackle for loss this year. The Gophers have recorded 20 sacks in Big Ten play, including four against Nebraska and 26 this season. In 2018, the Gophers recorded 23 sacks but Carter

Coughlin accounted for 9.5 (41.3%). They notched 71 tackles for loss but Coughlin and now NFL linebacker Blake Cashman accounted for 30 (42.2%).

- ▶ Sam Renner was one of 10 finalists for the Burlsworth Trophy, given to the nation's best player who started his career as a walk-on. Renner has earned more playing time each season and has been a consistent contributor as a starter this year. He is second on the team in both tackles for loss (7.0) and sacks (4.5).
- ▶ Joe Rossi has a new wrinkle on third down this year, as he has four defensive ends – Carter Coughlin, Esezi Otomewo, Boye Mafe and Tai'yon Devers – all come in together to rush the passer.

## LAST LINE OF DEFENSE

- ▶ Three of the team's top five tacklers come out of the secondary in Antoine Winfield Jr. (82), Jordan Howden (55) and Chris Williamson (50). The Gophers are second in the Big Ten with 14 interceptions and they have returned three for a touchdown. It's the most interceptions in a single season for the Gophers since they recorded 15 in 2008. Last season, Minnesota had 11 interceptions in 13 games. Minnesota is only allowing 184.9 passing yards per game which ranks No. 11 in the NCAA.
- ▶ Antoine Winfield Jr., who was named one of five finalists for the Bronko Nagurski Award, leads the team with 82 tackles (58 solo). He also leads the team with seven interceptions (including a pick-six) and has two forced fumbles and three sacks this season. His seven interceptions tied a school record for most in a single season (Jeff Wright had seven in the 1970 season). He is fourth in the NCAA for interceptions this season.
- ▶ Antoine Winfield Jr., is a fourth-year sophomore who was plagued by early season injuries the past two years. He was granted a waiver request for a sixth year of eligibility from the NCAA and has two years (2020, 2021) of eligibility remaining. After a breakout freshman year in 2016, which included an interception returned for a touchdown, he made 20 tackles in 2017, blocked a field goal and broke up two passes before missing the final eight games with an injury. Early in 2018, Winfield found himself going viral in back-to-back weeks with a highlight reel punt return for a touchdown against New Mexico State and a game-clinching interception against Fresno State. He would suffer an injury in the fourth game of the season and would miss the rest of the year.
- ▶ Antoine Winfield Jr. may never be allowed in Fresno, Calif. for the rest of his life. In back-to-back seasons Winfield called game with an interception to take away a Bulldog touchdown. In 2018 it came in the back of the end zone at TCF Bank Stadium with an acrobatic catch in the fourth quarter to prevent a game tying touchdown. This year it came in double overtime as Winfield broke off a route and jumped in front of a Bulldog receiver in the end zone to seal the victory.
- ▶ Chris Williamson is the lone senior in the secondary. He shook off some injuries and totaled 34 tackles in 11 games last year. However, 23 of those tackles – along with one sack, one interception, one forced fumble and four pass breakups – came in the final five games. In 2019, he has a pick-six, three pass breakups, 50 tackles, 2.5 sacks and four tackles for loss.

▶ Jordan Howden was a true freshman walk-on in 2018 (now on scholarship) and played in all 13 games. He recorded 45 tackles, broke up three passes and made one interception. His 55 tackles are fourth on the team this year and his six pass breakups are third. Howden sealed the Gophers win against No. 5 Penn State with a late game interception in the end zone.

▶ Coney Durr has quietly been shutting down half the field for the Gophers and is tied for the team lead (Benjamin St-Juste) with nine pass breakups. He is a big reason why the Gophers have only allowed 184.9 passing yards per game this season. His first interception of the season went 72 yards to the house against Maryland.

▶ Benjamin St-Juste is a graduate transfer from Michigan who has two seasons of eligibility left (2020, 2021). He made his first start against Illinois and made five tackles and two pass breakups. He notched a career high seven tackles at Iowa and has started the last nine games. His nine pass breakups are tied with Coney Durr for the team lead.

## SOMETHING SPECIAL

▶ The Gophers had a fresh look on special teams in 2019 after the graduation of Payton Jordahl and Emmitt Carpenter. Brady Weeks was the No. 1-ranked long snapper in the nation and enrolled in January. The Gophers also signed kicker Michael Lantz. Their first ever field goal attempt was in double overtime from 37 yards at Fresno State. Lantz, who is one of 11 true freshman starting kickers in the nation, is third on the team with 64 points (7 FGs, 43 PATs). Redshirt freshman Brock Walker started against Penn State and also kicked against Iowa. Grant Ryerse is Minnesota's kickoff specialist.

▶ In 2018, Jacob Herbers punted only 51 times (fewest for the Gophers since they punted 38 times in 2005) and averaged 41.24 yards (13th most in school history). He has punted even less in 2019 with just 38 punts. He did not attempt a punt in the final 101:48 of the 2018 season (final Minnesota punt of the season came at Wisconsin with 11:48 remaining in the second quarter). His puntless streak ended during Minnesota's first possession of 2019 when he punted with 11:36 left in the first quarter. Herbers pinned Purdue at the one and two yard lines and was named the Big Ten Special Teams Player of the Week. Eighteen of his 38 punts this season have landed opposing teams inside the 20-yard line. Herbers is also a big reason why the Gophers have the top ranked punt return defense in the country with negative three yards allowed.

▶ Casey O'Brien was named Big Ten Special Teams Player of the Week after Minnesota's win at Rutgers. O'Brien, who is a four-time cancer survivor, saw the first action of his career at Rutgers, as he held on Minnesota's final three point-after attempts. He also held three times against Maryland. O'Brien gave the keynote address at the Big Ten Football Kickoff Luncheon in July. He spoke about being thankful and about how football helped him while he was battling cancer. O'Brien, who received the Disney Spirit Award, has inspired countless fans this year.

## SQUEAKY CLEAN

▶ Minnesota has been one of the least penalized teams in the country under P.J. Fleck. In three seasons under Fleck, the Gophers have been penalized just 141 times. The Gophers have been penalized only

44 times this season which ranks No. 6 in the NCAA and first in the Big Ten. In 2018, the Gophers finished second in the country and in 2017 they finished first for fewest penalties. Under Fleck, the Gophers have taken fewer penalties than their opponents in 27 of 37 games. However, Minnesota is 7-3 when it takes more or the same amount of penalties as its opponent under Fleck.

## KEEP AWAY

▶ The Gophers rank No. 6 in the country (3rd in B1G) with a time of possession of 33:55. Minnesota has 15 scoring drives this season that have taken at least 10 plays and have chewed up more than five minutes on the clock. Last season, the Gophers had 18 scoring drives of more than 10 plays, but just 14 of those drives used more than five minutes. Minnesota's 42:53 time of possession against Maryland was the best for the team in at least 20 seasons and is the most for any Big Ten West team this year.

## NEW FACES

▶ Minnesota welcomed 14 student-athletes in January and has 31 true freshmen on the roster this year. The Gophers also have two coaches who joined the staff prior to the 2019 season coaching in the Outback Bowl in Rod Chance and Joe Harasymiak.

## 50 WINS

▶ Minnesota's win vs. Maryland was Coach Fleck's 50th victory, making him the second youngest active FBS coach to reach that milestone.

## SENIORS, GRADUATES

▶ The Gophers have 11 seniors and four grad transfers (Micah Dew-Treadway, Alex Melvin, Benjamin St-Juste, Michael Tarbutt). Minnesota has only three seniors on offense: Shannon Brooks, Tyler Johnson and Rodney Smith. On defense, the Gophers have seven: Thomas Barber, Carter Coughlin, Winston DeLattiboudere, Tai'yon Devers, Kamal Martin, Sam Renner and Chris Williamson. Minnesota's one other senior is punter Jacob Herbers.

▶ Minnesota has 12 players who have already graduated in Thomas Barber, Winston DeLattiboudere, Micah Dew-Treadway (Notre Dame), Seth Green, Jacob Herbers, Alex Melvin (SMU), Samuel Pickerign, Sam Renner, Rodney Smith, Benjamin St-Juste (Michigan), Michael Tarbutt (Connecticut) and Bryce Witham.

## EXTRA POINTS

- ▶ In middle school, Rodney Smith played the tuba. He claims his teacher thought he was so good that he wouldn't let him play anything else. Smith, who is the son of a high school head football coach, plays football with type 1 diabetes.
- ▶ Tyler Johnson played hockey when he was 7 and baseball until 7th grade. He would go on to lead Minneapolis North to a state title in basketball and a runner-up finish in football.
- ▶ Thomas Barber's first love is hockey. He still skates in the offseason to stay in shape.
- ▶ Tanner Morgan knew his destiny, as four men in his family are bald.
- ▶ Blaise Andries is an aspiring actuary (compiles and analyzes statistics) and does math paradoxes for fun, while Demetrius Douglas is an amateur photographer.

## How Rashod Bateman represents Minnesota's rise under P.J. Fleck

At a satellite camp with dozens of FBS coaches and hundreds of potential FBS prospects, Rashod Bateman lined up to run a 40-yard dash. Bateman had a spattering of interest when he got set, offers from a handful of Group of Five schools. But with programs like Minnesota, Texas A&M and Virginia Tech in attendance, Bateman had a chance to alter his future.

Bateman ran, and the clock flashed 4.4.

That's when Gophers head coach P.J. Fleck sidled over: "Remember what you said earlier?" Bateman did. Fleck liked what he saw, and those words represented the offer Bateman sought. Bateman told Fleck before the camp began that he'd commit if an offer came his way. His 40-time sealed that future partnership.

"At the time I didn't know much about Minnesota or know anybody in Minnesota," Bateman told 247Sports last week. "I just knew Coach Fleck and what he did at Western Michigan. I saw his pregame speeches and they really stuck out to me. ... That's what young people want."

Three years later, Bateman is again running to impress Fleck. This time, it's as his star receiver. Bateman leads Minnesota with 533 receiving yards and a take-the-top-off-a-defense-fast 22.2 yards per catch, which ranks seventh nationally among qualified receivers. The sophomore is half of one the nation's most explosive one-two duos along with senior Tyler Johnson, who finished with 1,169 yards last season.

Johnson represents the upperclassmen base of No. 20 Minnesota's 6-0 start, the first Gopher team to start 6-0 since 2003. But it's Bateman, the No. 205 player in the 2018 Top247, who represents Minnesota's growing talent floor. Look at how Minnesota's rank in the 247Sports Team Talent Composite has climbed each year of Fleck's tenure:

2017: 63rd; 2018: 48th; 2019: 46<sup>th</sup>

That's an incremental but critical rise by the Gophers, the results of which are spattered across a depth chart that features nine underclassmen starters.

"Any championship team you look at, you can always connect the dots backward to recruiting," Fleck told 247Sports in 2017. "They must have had an incredible amount of recruiting success."

Bateman's recruitment and development is representative of that philosophy in real time.

Bateman finished his sophomore season as more of a basketball prospect than football recruit. His high school coach at Tift County (GA), Ashley Anders, described the 6-foot-2 receiver as "long and lanky." Bateman weighed 173 pounds as a high school senior and well under that entering his junior year. As Bateman's frame filled out, he started to perform at a high level. Bateman finished his junior season with 56 catches for 825 yards and five touchdowns.

The satellite camp represented Bateman's breakout moment in the eyes of Power Five schools; Bateman didn't have a 247Sports Composite ranking before he arrived at Mercer University for the event. It's worth noting Fleck's historically excelled with his evaluations. It's a big reason why Western Michigan went from 1-11 in his first year to 13-1 three seasons later. Bateman, who finished as a four-star prospect, is an example of a strong early evaluation. He's not the only one.

Of the 23 high school members of Minnesota's 37th-ranked 2018 class, 16 of them ranked higher in the 247Sports Composite at the end of the cycle than they did when they committed to the Gophers. Part of that is because Minnesota adds the large majority of its commitments prior to a players' senior year. But it's also a testament to Minnesota's early evaluations that their targets continue to rise into their senior seasons. An early entry into Bateman's recruitment wound up being critical.

Bateman proved so dominant as he grew into his frame that Tift County thrice called the same play for a touchdown to open its games in 2017: A deep ball to Bateman. Once, Anders walked over to his offensive coordinator after a couple of slow drives and made a request: "You know that play Rashod runs down the field and you throw a touchdown to him? Run that play." Three plays later, Bateman did exactly that.

The still skinny deep threat finished his senior season with 83 catches for 1,539 yards and 21 touchdowns in Georgia's highest classification. That highlight-worthy season attracted plenty of attention.

Ole Miss offered followed by Virginia Tech, Tennessee, Georgia, South Carolina and Texas A&M. Coaches rolled through Tift County hoping to speak with Bateman. Among them was Georgia head coach Kirby Smart, who happens to hold plenty of sway in the state. Smart wanted Bateman, and he made his pitch to get him to visit.

Bateman politely spurned the Bulldogs.

"Rashod had been committed to Minnesota for so long he declined to go," Anders said. "The rest is history."

Thinking back on his recruitment, Bateman remembers passing on Georgia and some of the other blueblood schools as "tough." But he had a plan. Minnesota offered early playing time and a pass-happy offense. Just as importantly, he wanted to stay loyal to the coaches who believed in him first.

"I sent a message about it's not about the team name or the hype of other schools," Bateman said. "It's about giving yourself the best opportunity for your life."

Bateman ran a straight go-route along the left sideline late in the first half against South Dakota State. The speedster blew past the Jackrabbits' corner and the closing safety wasn't going to catch him. One problem: Tanner Morgan's pass was a tick long. So Bateman stretched his left hand out to its limit: Touchdown.

"I just gave myself a chance and that's what happened," Bateman said with a laugh.

That catch was made with an unbridled joy. But Bateman entered the season with a heavy heart. His uncle, Anthony Bateman, died of a heart attack at age 52 on Aug. 3. Anthony had been a father figure for Bateman and served as an assistant coach at Tift County for 20-plus years. Rashod took the loss hard.

Sitting in the football facility when he heard the news, Bateman broke down in tears. Offensive line Brian Callahan saw Bateman first and quickly alerted wide receivers coach Matt Simon, who came downstairs to comfort his charge. Bateman remembers the message as: "This is part of life and things will be OK. But you're allowed to grieve." Bateman talked with Fleck soon after, and he echoed a similar message. Fleck made sure Bateman knew he had counseling available if it was needed and that letting his emotions show was a natural way to mourn. "We want our men to do that," Fleck said, per CBS Minnesota. "We don't want our men to hold it in."

Thinking back on that time, Bateman is thankful he had a coaching staff that not only allowed him to grieve but advocated for his mental health.

"It really means so much," Bateman said. "A lot of people think football is won in the weight room and on the field. At the same time, you win games inside your head. It's a mental game before a physical game. If you're not mentally right I don't think you'll perform at your best."

"When I was going through that (Coach Fleck) and the rest of the coaching staff being there for me and my teammates, having them by my side, is just what this culture is built upon."

To Bateman, that's the other reason as to why Minnesota is rolling in Year 3 of Fleck's tenure. Yes, Minnesota identifies talent early. Yes, the Gophers recruit those players hard and stay on them. And yes, the developmental culture is strong – Bateman's weight gains serving as an example. But to Bateman, none of those recruiting wins would be possible without a staff and head coach that's managed to continually connect with young athletes.

Thinking back to his recruitment, Bateman is confident he and other Southeastern-based players helped make Minnesota attractive to a different variety of recruits. It's why, he thinks, the Gophers 2019 class currently ranks 32nd nationally, which would be the program's best showing since 2008.<sup>31</sup> Bateman doesn't anticipate the Gophers' rise will stop anytime soon.

"Looking at my freshman year and looking at my sophomore year, I feel like we took a big stride," Bateman said. "It's just going to continue to jump from here."

## **Why P.J. Fleck's latest turnaround changes narrative on him: 'He's not a quack, he may be a genius'**

As the fans poured onto the field at the University of Minnesota last weekend in the euphoric wake of the Gophers' upset of No. 4 Penn State, a generational scene unfolded. Thousands of maroon-and-gold-clad Minnesota fans melted onto the turf, drinking in a flurry of once-a-century feelings for University of Minnesota football.

Minnesota's upset improved the Gophers to 9-0 for the first time in 115 years, back when high school teams popped up on the schedule. Minnesota ranks No. 8 in the most recent College Football Playoff standings, rocketing a college football afterthought into the rarest of airs. Minnesota is having a football moment for the first time since Woodstock, forcing us to rethink everything.

"There's a euphoria and a pause in time that makes everything literally stop," Minnesota coach P.J. Fleck said by phone on Tuesday night, reflecting on the postgame scene. "There's nothing wrong in the world at that moment. It takes over your whole body."

On the College Football Playoff rankings show on Tuesday, the ESPN talking heads at one point mentioned that Minnesota can afford to lose a game and still reach the playoff. Ponder where that chestnut ranks in the lexicon of unexpected college football conversations. That's Minnesota, which hasn't won an outright Big Ten title since 1941, crashing a space reserved for blue-bloods like Alabama, Clemson or Ohio State.

Minnesota coach P.J. Fleck has made a career out of somehow taking alternate realities and turning them into current events. Minnesota is tied for the country's third-longest win streak (11), and the only surprising part about Fleck's unprecedented success is that anyone is still surprised.

The touchstone upset on Saturday afternoon represented what's become a hallmark of Fleck's seven seasons as a head coach – converts flooding to the vast spaces initially occupied by skeptics. Fleck has popped Minnesota football into a time capsule, harkening precedents from the days of Theodore Roosevelt's election, a country with only 45 states and the Wright Brothers taking flight. Along the way, he's flipped countless skeptics – including this reporter – into believers.

The victory by Minnesota on Saturday offered not just a historic victory for the program, but evidence of a pattern that can no longer be dismissed. Fleck has turned consecutive backwater football jobs – Western Michigan and Minnesota – into mainstream destinations.

If Fleck were selling real estate, this would be the equivalent of flipping Dakota property at Nantucket prices. If he were pitching stock, he'd have made BlackBerry sound like Apple.

"I stand at attention and respect," said Texas A&M basketball coach Buzz Williams, long a Fleck admirer. "I have always cheered for the guy everyone thinks is just a quack. He's not a quack, he may be a genius.

"If you study it enough, you might say, 'That's incredibly intuitive. That's lights years ahead of the way the industry is doing it.'"

Minnesota's victory offered an inflection point for divisiveness about Fleck, who has long led college coaching in dismissive comments. (One opposing staff member even burnt an oar, Fleck's program symbol, on the opposing sideline.) It takes a victory like Saturday's for an industry to realize that perhaps he's turning the unconventional into modern convention.

**How Fleck wound up at Western Michigan**

When Kathy Beauregard hired P.J. Fleck as the head coach at Western Michigan in December of 2012, it was greeted with a resounding befuddlement. He'd been Greg Schiano's receivers coach in Tampa Bay, and was basically only known in college circles by Rutgers recruiting junkies and die-hard Northern Illinois fans.



But Beauregard's savvy hire has proven to be this century's boldest and smartest. When she dug into the psyche of her program in the wake of the firing of Bill Cubit, she found a place that was emotionally disconnected. Two principles guided the hire. She wanted a coach she knew could connect with her son, who was then college-aged. She also called her old MAC colleague, Paul Krebs, the former athletic director at Bowling Green, and asked why he hired an unknown wide receiver coach from Notre Dame for the 2001 season. That, of course, was Urban Meyer. Krebs revealed that Urban Meyer had an uncommon ability to motivate and recruit players.

Western Michigan went 1-11 in Fleck's debut in 2013. Transfers poured out of the program and, most surprisingly, Fleck stayed defiantly himself. That's when he showed his knack for converting skeptics to believers, a theme that's woven through two historic rebuilds that have resulted in unlikely programs tasting the rarest of air.

Fleck debuted the "Row The Boat" philosophy that first season at Western Michigan and didn't deviate from it. Not when people complained that boats had nothing to do with Broncos, WMU's mascot. Not when the program looked stuck in a rut.

Fleck believed in "Row The Boat" so strongly because it was so personal. It's connected back to Fleck's son, Colt, who died soon after birth on Feb. 9, 2011. Fleck was at Rutgers as an assistant at the time, and decided then to live life for two, to attack with unbending energy and live for both he and Colt.

So he kept the slogan and kept on rowing at WMU, ducking from the derision and recruiting anyone who'd believe. That could be an under-recruited wide receiver named Corey Davis, who developed into the No. 5 pick in the NFL draft. Or it could be students on the WMU campus, as Fleck drove around and handed out Western Michigan T-shirts to all students wearing Notre Dame, Michigan or Michigan State gear.

"P.J. knows what he wants his program to look like," said Greg Schiano, who Fleck worked for at Rutgers and with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. "The culture, the execution and alignment. Culture is king, and that's what drives his program."

#### Converting Fleck skeptics into believers

In February of 2015, I went to Kalamazoo for a National Signing Day story on Western Michigan. Somehow, Fleck had lured the MAC's top class in the wake of that 1-11 season and he was on the cusp of another historic haul. I'd spoken to him a few times before, the bursts of energy and jargon coming like assaults over the phone. He reminded me of an over-caffeinated basketball assistant.

When I showed up on a snowy winter night, the first thing that struck me about Fleck was his size. He'd starred at wide receiver in college and moonlighted two seasons on the fringes of the NFL. It was striking that this 5-foot-9 guy with a 31-inch waist had played professional football. He looked like a coxswain, sounded like a Peloton instructor and bobbed around like a steel coil of energy.

I spent the next day, from dawn to dusk, with Fleck and one of his assistant coaches – Vinson Reynolds, now at Syracuse – buzzing around metro Detroit. They ducked in and out of high schools, relaying stories of recruits rushing to Fleck to see his Happy Sock collection. The high school coaches believed, flattered by the attention and energy, appreciative of how Fleck's culture shaped the kids already there. By the end of the day, I was tired, cautiously impressed and more curious. "Here's the thing about me, you either really like me or hate me," Fleck said that day.

I stayed in the middle. But I've seen Fleck skeptics manifest themselves in different ways. Former Minnesota coach Jerry Kill, who Fleck worked under at Northern Illinois, chided Fleck for being "about himself" in an interview this summer. Coaches and players have mocked rowing the boat, with Akron going so far as to burn an oar on the sideline. The Zips proceeded to lose 41-0. What few critics mention is the more than \$500,000 that Row The Boat-affiliated charities have raised for varying causes, including local children's hospitals and cancer research.

Those were extreme and insensitive moments, especially considering the oar is tied to Fleck's infant son's death. But general skepticism is relatable, as I was among the ranks until later in 2015 when I spent three days embedded with Western Michigan as they prepared to host Michigan State in the season opener.

Two moments turned my skepticism to belief. The first came on the practice field, as Fleck was bouncing around like a fifth-grader at recess. As Fleck's voice echoed from his aerobics instructor headset through Waldo Stadium, I asked an NFL scout on

the sideline what he thought. NFL scouts attend practice for a living. They can discuss the nuances of how coaches run practice with the authority of biblical scholars deconstructing the Old Testament.

Me: What do you think?

Scout: He reminds me of Urban Meyer in some aspects.

It was a little jarring to hear. And as I bumped into that scout in college press boxes and dive bars at the NFL Combine over the years, I've toasted his foresight. There are plenty of differences in Fleck and Meyer, but this struck the scout: "The total conviction to what he does. It starts with recruiting, and then the total belief in what he did."

That made sense. Recruiting always translates. So does connection. And what got me fully onboard came the next morning in a team meeting. The total belief was clearly reciprocated. I was sitting in the back row when Fleck bounded into the room and greeted the team with his trademark adrenaline shot of energy.

Fleck asked how they were doing. They chanted back "ELITE, COACH!" with such conviction I remember viscerally jostling in my chair. It felt like a religious revival meeting, and I bounced up like someone shocked the base of my spine. "Can't fake that," I thought. I called the scout this week to again compliment his projection. He chuckled at Fleck's impact three years later: "Kids at Western Michigan still say elite when you ask them how they're doing."

From there, it wasn't too hard to believe. If Fleck channeled his energy into recruiting – the most important aspect for any program – and connection, the ultimate motivator, it didn't really matter how unconventional it looked or sounded. And particularly, what anyone else said. After all, even talking about Western Michigan, which never won a bowl game before Fleck's arrival, was an ultimate compliment.

Soon enough, unconventional became convention. Dabo Swinney brought Clemson to the College Football Playoff title game after the 2015 season with a similar philosophical overlay – recruit hard, sell the program and leave the coordinating to the coordinators. It all looks and sounds different, but the same themes are unfolding at LSU, where Ed Orgeron has the Tigers No. 1 in the country through a blend of recruiting, motivation and vision. Football is changing, and part of the derision toward Fleck was because he was so far ahead of the curve.

"I think it's very much a trend, and Dabo is incredibly intentional about it," said a prominent Division I athletic director. "They manage the coaching staff, be a very effective public face and beat the hell out of recruiting."

Why Fleck's approach has worked

Minnesota basketball coach Richard Pitino greeted Fleck with similar skepticism when he arrived on campus. Pitino remembers leaving the building one night and running into Fleck, who immediately made Pitino know how he was doing: "ELITE!"

Pitino remembers thinking to himself as he got in his car: "Am I going to have to listen to this every time I see this guy? Not only is it annoying, but it's grammatically incorrect."

Pitino's roots in the Northeast trend him toward cynical. So you can imagine his reaction when Fleck moved in on the same street. But after a few nights smoking cigars and sipping wine at his backyard fire pit, Pitino warmed to Fleck. Richard and Jill Pitino have grown close to P.J. and Heather Fleck, and the Pitinos have gone through familiar phases of understanding the P.J. Fleck experience: Skepticism to acceptance to full embrace.

"You're not going to like him if you don't know him yourself," Pitino said by phone Tuesday. "But that's the way that he is all the time. He's relentlessly positive. He's a lot more real than you'd think he'd be."

Pitino said there are parts of Fleck's coaching mindset that overlap with his father, Hall of Famer Rick Pitino.

"They're both insanely confident in their plan," Richard Pitino said. "When you start to coach for a while, you realize there's a million different ways to do it. You have to believe in what you're doing. That's what I've taken most from P.J., he believes in it and knows how to sell it."

Long before Fleck became a reality TV star or popped up on the College Football Playoff rankings show, Buzz Williams reached out to Fleck. Williams is a former NAIA manager whose only silver spoons came atop dining hall trays. He reached out to Fleck in 2015, flew up to visit him and the two have remained close.

"I understand guys that only have one chance," Williams said. "And with their one chance, they're so convicted by the fact that this is the only way it will work. It's not a gimmick, it's literally who he is. It's how he lives his life.

"He didn't make it because ... of his search-firm relationships. He took this bad job [at Western Michigan] that no one else wanted, and now they're playing in the Cotton Bowl."

Williams says he tracks coaches who he considers "pioneers," those not blessed with connections or a network that makes for a linear path through the business. Williams howled at the skeptics who said Fleck's success wouldn't translate from Western Michigan to Minnesota. And he's rolling his eyes at the folks pointing out the Big Ten West is down.

"Just say 'Much respect,'" Williams said. "That's the end. No more conversation needed."

This week, fans began lining up 90 minutes before Fleck's radio show. They related stories about rowing their own boat, from fighting cancer to enduring the death of a child. Fleck has emerged as a beacon of hope and inspiration in Minnesota, signs the conversation is indeed changing.

Still, No. 8 Minnesota is a three-point underdog at No. 20 Iowa on Saturday. Skeptics remains, but there's always room in the boat for converts.

## **P.J. Fleck takes full advantage of a chance to earn validation at Minnesota**

MINNEAPOLIS — One hour and 55 minutes after all of the delirium, P.J. Fleck sinks into a sofa chair inside his stadium office just outside the locker room and tries to process everything that just happened in this building.

Not just No. 17 Minnesota's scintillating 31-26 upset of No. 4 Penn State or the TCF Bank Stadium field storming that this victory commissioned. Not just the Golden Gophers' 9-0 start, their first in more than a century. Not just the opportunities that remain ahead of his program: the very real chance to win the Big Ten West in the coming weeks and make it to Indianapolis for next month's league title game.

No, the way the 38-year-old Fleck sees it, all of this — the "Row the Boat" mantra, the large contingent of Gophers alumni in the locker room after the game, the sweet contract extension he agreed to five days ago — is about matters much bigger than football.

"Well, that's what Row the Boat's all about, right? It's about everybody getting in the boat, making the boat bigger and rowing together — same direction, same speed, same efficiency," Fleck says amid a small gathering of friends and family. "Even if you don't like football, I think you'd really love our culture. And I think that's where this is starting to grow. People might not even be football fans, but with (my wife) Heather's work at Masonic Children's Hospital and the Ronald McDonald House, I mean, we're gaining so many more fans of not only just University of Minnesota football, but the Row the Boat culture inside the University of Minnesota football, and I think that's what's really big about this.

"And then connecting it to former players and getting them to see that we're here for them. Our staff, Heather, myself, our coaches, I mean, we took the job for them. We have no ties to Minnesota. We took it to bring back one of the most historical football programs in the country back to them."

Comments like these will surely set off another round of doubters from those who tuned into Minnesota football for the first time all season this weekend and wondered what the heck is up with that hyperkinetic coach and all of those funky sayings. After this, though, after Fleck's visualization materialized and this metropolis was blanketed with excitement over a football program that has not won a Big Ten title in 52 years, this day may also lend validation to all those phrases and promises, and perhaps turn a few skeptics around along the way.

An hour earlier, Fleck had spent part of his postgame press conference essentially throwing his hands up in the air and asking why more folks don't try things his way. ("Just maybe — just maybe — our Row the Boat 'different' might be the way, and maybe we're just ahead of the game.") By the time he settles into his office and is asked if he hopes days and programs like this one inspire more coaches to think in the manner he does, he goes straight to the point.

"I hope so," he begins, "because I think if you don't do that with the way the game is changing, with the way the (name, image and likeness) is going to change college football, the way when all the legality gets in college football, I think if you don't have something that's just bigger than the game and the money, it's going to turn into professional football, which again, this is still collegiate athletics."

Which means that there were scenes like Saturday's, where a sea of students converged at midfield and followed Gophers players to the northwest corner of the end zone to claim the Governor's Victory Bell, this game's rivalry trophy.

Where a security microphone that had gotten its signals crossed and hummed from the madness on the field and into the press elevator the message: "It's the biggest party I've ever been at!"

And, yes, where the stadium roared louder than usual beforehand as the students started a "P.J." chant while their coach was introduced by the public-address announcer.

There were challenges to create this moment, to be sure. Fleck did not become the youngest head coach in the country and take Western Michigan to the Cotton Bowl out of thin air, and getting this town to understand that this would be a process was the hard part in the two-and-a-half years before this season.



But that is also why, away from the hubbub and back in Fleck's office, Zach Terrell and Michael Henry sit here in this intimate postgame gathering. Both played for Fleck during all four of his seasons in Kalamazoo. Both experienced plenty of ups and downs, personally and professionally. Both are thriving in the real world now and wanted to be here for the Gophers' moment in the sun.

"Heather and I have four children of our own, which are the most important children in our entire lives, but we've committed our entire life to raising other people's children," Fleck says, adding: "That's what the Row the Boat culture is all about. It's about connecting for life. It's a lifestyle. And if there's two guys who were tested in the Row the Boat culture in the infant stages, it was these two."

He says this while sitting beneath a large family portrait, across from a wall bearing other family mementos that tie his family's themes together with his program's. He wears a navy Timberwolves hoodie shirt that he received from Wolves coach Ryan Saunders, the same top he wore to his team meeting inside a hotel ballroom on the outskirts of the city the night before.

"Every time he comes home, he's got Timberwolves stuff on," Heather Fleck says. "He's like: 'Just supporting my man.'"

Saunders, a Minnesota alum, wore a maroon suit for Friday's win against the Warriors. When Fleck got to his phone after Saturday's victory, one of the first texts he received came from Saunders, who asked if he could show Fleck off courtside for Sunday's Wolves game against the Nuggets.

Fleck has other plans for Sunday, though. The former sixth-grade social studies teacher always takes time the day after a game to show his players a video lesson of historical events that resonate with that week's game.

Minnesota is 9-0 overall and 6-0 in the Big Ten heading into Iowa next week. The Gophers have not been 9-0 since 1904. What kind of archives could Fleck possibly summon for a history video from 115 years ago?

As it turns out, that is a dangerous question.

"Gosh, I mean, it might have to be like the Cornelius Vanderbilt days," he says. "It's gonna have to be Rockefeller. It's gonna have to be Carnegie, J.P. Morgan. I might have to talk about the banks. I might have to talk about the dirty water, the street sweepers, the men on white horses that developed our sanitation system in New York City."

Heather chimes in, laughing at the absurdity of her husband's memory: "Why'd you get him started?"

"Next question," Terrell says.

But he's still going.

"I know there's a lot of things that were leading up — the issues Europe was having," Fleck continues. "It doesn't take me long to get ready. Just give me an era, and I can go. But there's a lot of things we'll develop."

"You can tell him to stop," Heather adds. "We wanna get out of here at some point."

Finally, they are off on their way toward a little celebration at their house Saturday night, with Fleck's thoughts already drifting toward Sunday's speech.

His audience may be a little different going forward. All eyes in the Big Ten West, for a change, are North.

## Rising Star Coach P.J. Fleck Proving He's More Than Antics with 8-0 Minnesota

MINNEAPOLIS — P.J. Fleck is having an elite morning. Not just good. Not just great. "Elite," he says.

He's dressed elite, too. Not like the football coach at Minnesota, days away from the most important game of his career—drenched in a team hoodie or pullover. But more like a lawyer or a stockbroker.

His crisp long-sleeve white dress shirt with bright blue buttons snugly hugs his athletic frame. It's complemented by a red and blue striped tie that seems to glow under his office lighting. To cap off the look, he wears fashionable blue dress pants and a brown belt. A trendy watch that pulls the ensemble together.

It's fitting that Fleck is donning this outfit a day before his new seven-year, \$33.25 million contract with the school is announced—and one day after Florida State fired head coach Willie Taggart, prompting a slew of rumors surrounding Fleck's future to flow freely.

Not that the contract will stop the rumors entirely. "That energy and his history of winning and putting programs in a positive light without off-field issues is very attractive," one prominent agent tells B/R, noting that there are a handful of programs that won't be scared off by Fleck's \$10 million buyout.

But for now, Fleck is committed and isn't going anywhere.

"I mean what I say," he says of the speculation, knowing the news that awaits. "I expect to be here a very long time. When you don't have a right fit, the marriage doesn't last long. We just saw an example of that down south."

Few coaches have ascended college football as swiftly and boisterously as the 38-year-old Fleck has over the past five years. In 2013, his first year as a head coach, Western Michigan finished with a record of 1-11. In 2016, he and the Broncos were 13-1.

After being named the head coach at Minnesota that offseason, Fleck's program finished 5-7 in year one. Now, smack-dab in the middle of year three, the Golden Gophers are 8-0. On Saturday, Minnesota will take on also-unbeaten Penn State in one of the most momentous games the program has ever been a part of.

In all of its history, Minnesota has never had a coach like this. His voice booms with conviction no matter the topic. In one moment, he's explaining the challenge of moving the ball against Penn State's front seven. In the next, he's exploring his love of history and the concept of time.

He injects words like "elite" so naturally and frequently into the conversation, you start to question why you aren't doing the same. He doesn't just ooze optimism and confidence; it's exploding from him at all times.

"I'm not for everybody," he acknowledges. "And when you're a leader, you know you're not going to be for everybody. You have to be OK with not being for everybody when you're a leader. And if you are for everybody, you're not leading."

From a distance, it would be easy to believe it's an act. No coach dresses like this on an off day. The person we see in press conferences can't possibly be this way at all hours.

But those close to Fleck, many of whom have been around him since he began coaching, will attest to his authenticity. Like most, perhaps they had their doubts at first. But as the expectations and paychecks have grown, Fleck hasn't changed who he is.

"I thought there was no way he could be like this all the time," says Kirk Ciarrocca, Minnesota's offensive coordinator who first worked with Fleck at Rutgers in 2010. "But after we were around him for about a month, we realized that's who he was. And then I started asking him a lot of questions. What were your parents like? How did they bring you up?"

"Cuz I'm curious ... how do you end up like this?"

Every item in Fleck's office has meaning, although the painting of John F. Kennedy positioned on the wall over his right shoulder, nestled between the College GameDay and Cotton Bowl wall decor, is particularly noteworthy.

In the painting, Kennedy's arms are crossed. His head is facing downward toward the ground.

"That was after the Bay of Pigs invasion," Fleck says. "And it obviously didn't go well. As a leader, there are choices you have, and you make them every day. There are times when things go really well and others when they don't. But you can't stop. And every choice you make, you learn from it."

On the wall farthest from his desk, near the entryway, is his leadership wall. Kennedy's face can be found again. He is in one of murals, along with former presidents Abraham Lincoln, George Washington and Barack Obama.

Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., Gandhi and Rosa Parks are also featured, as are Oprah Winfrey and Steve Jobs and others. When he has recruits in his office, Fleck is often curious just how many people on the wall they can name.

Near the ceiling on one side of his office, "I AM DOING ELITE WORK, I WILL NOT COME DOWN" is written in all-caps—spanning from his desk to the entryway. On his desk, a piece of white-colored wood with the message "Positive Attracts Positive" faces toward his guest chairs.

Some of the messaging is direct. Some, implied, like the hand-drawn picture of a Great White Shark.

"A goldfish waits to be fed," Fleck says, explaining its meaning to him. "A shark goes and eats anything in the ocean at any moment. It's never full. It's always attacking."

Perhaps the most meaningful items to Fleck in the room, though, are tucked away on a shelf largely out of sight. Four action figures from his childhood stand side by side. The figurines, which include Superman and Captain America, are gifts from his mother. Each year, she sends him one for Christmas.

Life is much different than it used to be for Fleck, who grew up in Sugar Grove, Illinois, a suburb of Chicago. But the gifts are a reminder of where he comes from.

"If you asked my mom and dad, I was involved in every activity known to man," he says. "Boy Scouts, pottery class, gymnastics, band, choir and every sport you can imagine. I loved everything. I wanted to do it all. And I think that's part of the energy I have right now."

But the items that unquestionably take up the most space inside his office are footballs. Fleck has a game ball from all 50 of his wins, each labeled with the opponent, score and other memorable tidbits. Depending on the visitor, the balls will be strategically placed in certain sight lines.

He points out the ball marked October 11, 2014. That one changed Fleck's life. In his second year at Western Michigan, the Broncos were down 21 points during the second quarter against Ball State. They came from behind to win 42-38 and went on to win their next five games.

"I don't want people to forget the way that this program made them feel," he says of the game balls. "I don't want them to forget how this program changed their life. And that takes the players doing that, not me. It takes the players living that type of lifestyle."

In the center of the room is his proudest ball from Minnesota to date, although a win on Saturday would alter the hierarchy.

After losing six of eight games in 2018, the Gophers closed the regular season at Wisconsin on November 24. Fleck's team won convincingly, 37-15, securing the Paul Bunyan's Axe rivalry trophy for the first time in 15 years.

In the process, Minnesota became bowl-eligible. It has not lost a game since

Tanner Morgan never thought he would wind up at the University of Minnesota. The Gophers' starting quarterback, who has accounted for 19 touchdowns and only four interceptions this season, was set on attending Western Michigan as a senior in high school. From the first day he met Fleck, he knew this was the coach he wanted to play for.

The morning Fleck called and told him he was leaving for Minnesota, Morgan flipped his commitment. He knew little about the program. In fact, he had never been to the state.

He knew it was cold. That was about it. But hours later, he committed to Fleck at his new school.

"I was just blown away with how real and passionate he is about life and football," Morgan says. "It was a no-brainer to me. There was no other coach I'd rather play for."

For Fleck, recruiting has always come naturally. The passion won't resonate with every 18-year-old like it did with Morgan, nor does he expect it to. But Fleck doesn't change who he is, whether it helps or hurts his chances of securing a commitment.

At Western Michigan, Ciarrocca, who served as Fleck's offensive coordinator, identified the unique quality early on. He anticipated that other programs and coaches would proclaim to recruits that Fleck is fake or over-the-top. To counter that, they devised a very simple strategy.

"They can't attack his energy, and they can't attack his messages," Ciarrocca says. "So they attack him. The number one thing we've learned is to get the people around him as much as possible, so they can make their own judgment."

Matt Simon didn't need multiple encounters to know what Fleck was about. In fact, the wide receivers coach and passing game coordinator at Minnesota changed his career path not long after Fleck came into his life.

The two first met at Northern Illinois in 2007. Simon was a wide receiver, and Fleck joined the program to coach the wideouts. After spending time as a graduate assistant at Ohio State, this was Fleck's first job as an assistant.

"To be honest, that's why I got into coaching," Simon says. "It was him. At the time, I was a business major, and coaching wasn't even anything I thought I would ever do. But I watched him change us. I always said when I was done playing, I want to be able to do that for other people."

The significance of Saturday's game doesn't show on his face or in his body language. Having a lucrative new long-term contract in place can't hurt, but mostly: This is just the kind of week Fleck has been waiting for.

His style and personality were built for moments like this one. When the hype and optimism are delivered every day, Saturdays of this magnitude feel smaller.

"This is a huge game," he says. "Don't get me wrong. One of the biggest games of my career, of University of Minnesota's existence. But again, it's a game. It's 60 minutes. If we play our style of football, we have a chance. If we get away from our style football, we don't have a chance."

Leading up to the Penn State game, Fleck did not deny the obvious like other coaches might. Instead, he talked through his 8-0 record with his team. They embraced it together.

"You can't ignore those things with young people," he says. "You can't ignore it when you're on the way to success, because you'll always feel that it's not good enough. You've got to celebrate where you've come from to get to where you really want to be."

A win over Penn State would be the defining moment in Fleck's young coaching career. It would validate Minnesota's season in a way some have refused to do, citing the team's favorable schedule as its primary reason for being unbeaten.

That's at least one way to look at it. To Fleck, this is the new normal. Win or lose. The hope is that years from now, games of this stature will be regular occurrences. With the speculation over his future at the school in the rear view, at least for the time being, the next step is to bottle what has transpired over the past two months and carry it forward.

No matter what happens, it will look different. It will sound different. Not because Fleck wants it to be, but because it's who he is and how he leads. It might not be for you—it's certainly not for everyone. But given where it's brought him, there's no reason to change now.



## How Tanner Morgan became the perfect QB for Minnesota's unlikely 8-0 start

MINNEAPOLIS — The call came at the literal and proverbial last minute, on the eve of Tanner Morgan's high school graduation party, two days before he had planned to pack up the car and drive to Kalamazoo, Mich.

On the line that January morning was P.J. Fleck, the coach Morgan loved and trusted who had convinced him to go to Western Michigan to play quarterback. Fleck told him he was accepting an offer to become the head coach at Minnesota, a big step up from the MAC to the Big Ten for Fleck. And decidedly not Kalamazoo.

"I immediately called him and re-offered him," Fleck says. "I said, 'Do you want to come?' and he's like, 'I'm coming.' I said, 'Do you want to come to the school and visit first?' He's like, 'Nope.' "

Fleck tried once more to impress upon Morgan the seriousness of what he was saying. Did he want to talk to his parents first?

"Nope, they're on the line," Morgan replied. "You're on speaker."

Morgan's room was totally packed up. The car was pretty much ready. He was planning to leave right after his graduation party — which was decked out with Western Michigan flags and various decorations. His mother had ordered cookies from a local bakery that had a "W" on them ... and just flipped them upside down so they looked like an "M" instead.

Six days later, Morgan was in Minneapolis as an early enrollee freshman quarterback for the Golden Gophers.

"The first time I was in Minnesota was when I enrolled," he says. "I didn't know anything about the state. But, I mean, it was definitely God working and putting me here for a reason. Extremely grateful that Coach gave me that opportunity."

Fleck never worried about the caliber of player he was recruiting to a MAC school translating to the Power 5. He'd built the highest-rated class in the MAC for four consecutive seasons and always felt like he was attracting and developing players who could play at the P5 level. So there wasn't a second of hesitation about asking Morgan to come up to the Twin Cities with him — same goes for any of the other members of the class of 2018 he re-offered. Seven previous Western Michigan commits in total enrolled early at Minnesota that year.

It's easy to wonder where Minnesota might have been had Morgan not believed in Fleck so much that he committed sight unseen and had he not been here when an injury vaulted him into the starting role. Probably not 8-0 for the first time since 1941 and No. 17 in the year's first College Football Playoff rankings. Probably not protecting a two-game lead in the Big Ten West. Probably not believing it can win Saturday's highly anticipated matchup against unbeaten No. 4 Penn State.

At 6-2, 215 and balding — he cracks jokes about his (lack of) hair often and his aesthetic that can be summed up as "middle-aged man" — Morgan is perhaps the most unlikely face of a most unlikely unbeaten Power 5 team. And to reach this point, it all started with that phone call.

"It's one of the greatest stories I tell people," Fleck says, "because it's a story of faith, belief and doing something that scares the heck out of you."

Morgan has always been hard on himself. Sometimes too hard, if you ask those around him.

But it's that self-evaluation and introspection that have been hallmarks of his development as a quarterback, dating all the way back to the camps he went to as a middle schooler.

"I want to be, but you can't be a perfectionist playing quarterback because not everything's going to be perfect," Morgan says. "Something that I've definitely had to understand to take the good and the bad from it ... but I want to be the best I can every single day, no matter what happens. If I throw four picks or if I throw 87 touchdowns — obviously that's never going to happen — but it's always about having the mindset that I want to be the best I can be not for me, but for my teammates."

Morgan says his desire for perfection is something he's fought since high school and at Minnesota. He knows he has to be able to shake off a negative play in order to step up and make the next play. "It's definitely a skill you have to develop because it's extremely important," he says.

One of the mantras of the culture Fleck has built at Minnesota helps in this regard. Fleck and his staff define "failing" as "growing." So Morgan has failed a lot. And he'll continue to fail a lot.

Fleck set a goal when he got to Minnesota that he would have a quarterback who completed 70 percent or more of his passes. That's what he felt like he needed to win here.

"You set something so high you know they can't obtain it," Fleck says. "I remember people in my first year saying, like, 'Come on. Coach, we haven't had that in forever at Minnesota.' I said, 'Well, that's what it's going to take. If we don't have it, then we're not going to win the games we never have. And within one year, we completely flipped our quarterback room."

"You get what you demand. As long as you're there to teach them positively and there to catch them when they fall and then push them even more when they succeed to set the bar even higher ... then you are going to continue to grow."

Morgan is not completing 70 percent of his passes this season, so technically he is failing and he is growing, with something to shoot for. He's at 65.3 percent, good for 28th among FBS quarterbacks. Morgan's career completion percentage of 62.2 percent currently puts him first in school history (minimum 300 attempts).

But even if it's not accuracy, there's always something in each practice or game that can be considered a failure. After making history against Purdue when he completed 21-of-22 passes for 396 yards and four touchdowns, the best completion percentage in Big Ten history for a quarterback with at least 15 attempts in a game, Morgan nitpicked his performance and said he walked into a couple of sacks.

"When you have an overachiever, nothing's ever good enough," Fleck says. "Whenever they reach a goal or a vision, they're on to the next one. They're never satisfied, which can be a crutch and a disease, or it can be something that elevates you to unique heights. What we do with him is, yes, he's an overachiever. He's got high expectations. But we also appreciate the moments."

"With overachievers, you've got to get them to appreciate the really, really special times and get them to celebrate and put an end mark to that achievement, where they celebrate it. Now they can move on. If all those achievements run together, that's what you fear."

So even if it's just for a few minutes on a Sunday afternoon before turning the page to the next week's opponent, Fleck and his staff make sure Morgan celebrates the good. And with a 12-2 record as a starter at Minnesota alongside a star-studded receiving corps, there's been a lot of good to celebrate.

Says running back Rodney Smith, "He's never satisfied."

Kirk Ciarrocca has been Fleck's offensive coordinator since 2013, and he's the one who finds his quarterbacks. Ciarrocca has a particularly good eye for what Fleck refers to as "the intangible part."

Ciarrocca and Fleck have to look deeper than a quarterback prospect's natural ability because, both at Western Michigan and now at Minnesota, they're usually not dealing with five-star recruits. They're looking for people that fit their culture and a skill set they can develop.

"He's a kid from Kentucky that had Louisville and had all these people, a lot of coaches, telling them he'd never play in the Power 5 because he wasn't the biggest guy," Fleck says. "I wasn't the biggest guy, either. So he and I clicked immediately when I met him. Kirk had told me I was going to love this kid because he's an overachiever. And I love overachievers."

Morgan says the college offers slowed midway through his career at Ryle High School as coaches realized he might not be growing too much more. "I wouldn't grow," he says. "Well, maybe half an inch." Bigger schools started to look elsewhere.

He didn't know much at all about Western Michigan when he received a direct message on Twitter from Ciarrocca. Morgan was grateful for the offer but knew very little about the program, from its mascot to its location. Once he began to build a

rapport with Fleck, everything started to come into focus. Although he'd promised his father he felt no pressure to commit on the spot, Morgan committed on the spot during his visit to Kalamazoo.

"It was bigger than football," Morgan says. "That's what I wanted."

And so he committed to Fleck, and Fleck remained committed to him, even after the jump to Minnesota. Morgan enrolled early in January 2017, redshirted that first year and entered a quarterback competition with true freshman walk-on Zack Annexstad last August that would stretch all the way through fall camp.

And Annexstad won the job.

"You could ask my wife, Heather, and she'd tell you, it was the hardest decision I've ever had to make as a head coach in terms of roster management," Fleck says. He says at the end of camp, Morgan and Annexstad were virtually tied, a slight 51-49 edge as Fleck would describe it, due to a few physical traits that Annexstad had that Morgan didn't. He and Ciarrocca had also graded both quarterbacks each day in camp and pulled all of that data, evaluating which quarterback won each day. Annexstad had the slight edge, so he got the nod. But Minnesota knew it would need Morgan, too.

Unlike some of his peers who come out on the wrong side of a quarterback competition, Morgan never considered leaving. Even when friends from home kept asking if he would.

"I didn't want to do that to my teammates first and foremost," he says. "We're in this age of quarterbacks where if you don't play, just leave and you'll find instant happiness (somewhere else). We live in an instant gratification world, but it's unrealistic. I don't mean to get on a soap box."

He says he understood he wasn't the right guy for the job at the time, and he's thankful that he'd grown in his faith by that point as well.

Morgan says he also learned how to prepare as if he were the starter as Annexstad took the reins during the first half of the 2018 season. Annexstad went 3-4 in seven starts, playing through a high ankle sprain until he suffered an internal midsection injury against Nebraska in October. Morgan stepped in and the Gophers went 4-2 down the stretch, including a blowout win at Wisconsin and a Quick Lane Bowl win over Georgia Tech.

Annexstad, now on scholarship, was expected to compete with Morgan again in fall camp to determine the 2019 starter. But he suffered a serious foot injury just three days into camp, meaning Morgan would be the guy.

"He responded (to not winning the starting job in 2018) exactly how I thought Tanner Morgan would respond," Fleck says. "Immediately, when I told him, it was complete disappointment. Not hatred towards me or hatred towards anybody else. Not blaming anybody else. Took 100 percent accountability, responsibility for it and came out the next day and practiced his tail off. That's why he's in a position he is now. If he would have gone into a tailspin, there's no way we'd beat Purdue last year. There's no way we beat Wisconsin at Wisconsin first time in 30 years. There's no way that we beat Indiana, and there's no way we win our bowl game."

"That's why we recruited him. And that's why you see us having success now, because it's not just him. That (attitude) is infectious to everybody on this football team."

It's also allowed him to become a relatively young leader on a team with just 12 seniors. He's gained the respect of his teammates through his work ethic and willingness to self-correct. Smith says the team knows when he's in the room; Morgan's voice carries that much weight.

Coaches enjoy him, too. As Ciarrocca put it recently, "You don't have to go into this six-paragraph explanation about what's wrong with the thing. You just show him and he agrees with you. And let's go."

That makes it fun for everyone. Morgan knows how tiny he looks behind a bulky offensive line that features a 6-9, 400-pound offensive tackle in Daniel Faalele. (Faalele gets recognized around campus, obviously, Morgan says, whereas "I look like a normal dude who is bald.") But it's emblematic of something larger: that Morgan doesn't mind ceding the spotlight to his teammates. He happily talks about getting the ball to his playmakers, from Smith and his complementary running backs to elite receivers Rashod Bateman and Tyler Johnson, who both seem destined to play on Sundays.

And it doesn't matter that other schools overlooked Morgan, or that it took injuries to open up this opportunity to shine. Even if he's not what you'd envision if you closed your eyes and imagined the quarterback of an 8-0 Big Ten contender in November.

"It's hard for people to get the typical, prototypical idea of a quarterback out of their minds — that he's 6-4 with an absolute cannon for an arm who can stand in the pocket and deliver the ball," Morgan says. "Really, offenses aren't like that anymore. Kyler Murray is 5-10, but he's one of the most electrifying players in college football history."

There's no resentment in Morgan's voice as he talks about the people and schools who passed on him simply because he stopped growing. He instead prefers to focus on what Fleck saw in him years ago.

It's why he told Fleck he would come with him to Minnesota without hesitation, and without seeing the campus or the city. As Fleck says, it's a story of a player's belief in his coach. And what's happened since is a story of a coach's faith in his player.



## How P.J. Fleck rebuilt Minnesota football using batting doughnuts, 'The Dig' and the Nekton mentality

It has been 78 years since Minnesota football last started a season this well.

At 8-0, the 17th-ranked Golden Gophers are off to their best start since that 1941 season, when they won a national title. They're 5-0 in the Big Ten for the first time since 1961, and hold a two-game lead in the West Division. If No. 1 LSU vs. No. 2 Alabama weren't also happening this Saturday, Minnesota's game against No. 4 Penn State (noon ET on ABC), would top the Week 11 marquee. It's still Minnesota's most anticipated home contest in decades.

Before the recent surge, Minnesota's national relevance had been limited to P.J. Fleck, its 38-year-old spark plug coach -- and owner of a new seven-year contract -- and the messaging that covers every corner of his program. Most college football fans know Fleck and "Row the Boat," the program's ubiquitous motto. There's probably less knowledge of "The Dig" (experiencing the grind of the first 18-20 months in Fleck's program) or Nekton mentality -- that players should model their way of thinking after those aquatic creatures that move independently of the currents.

Is it necessary? When a program that last won a league title in 1967 finally looks like a contender, should the focus be anywhere else but between the lines? On this point, Fleck and his players are emphatic: The football and the messaging don't diverge, even when there's finally reason to take notice of the former.

"Everything's connected," Fleck recently told ESPN. "How we live our life is going to be how we play. It sounds like a lot of slogans and all this other stuff. It's really not. It's very well connected, it's very organized, it's a very detailed culture, there's a standard, and that standard can't be compromised in any area of your life."

That brings us to the baseball bat in Fleck's office.

Fleck devotes most of his day to finding fresh motivational tools for the players.

"Whatever's new today is old within an hour," he said. "Like, old, old." But after Minnesota improved to 7-0, Fleck brought a symbol from his past to Minnesota's 36-player leadership council.

"He gave us the word: doughnuts," senior defensive end Carter Coughlin said.

Added quarterback Tanner Morgan: "Not Krispy Kreme or Dunkin' Donuts, but doughnuts you put on a bat."

Fleck introduced the bat at Western Michigan in 2016. Each time the Broncos won, he added a weighted doughnut with the opponent's name, and positives and negatives from the game. The bat ended up with 13 doughnuts, as Western Michigan reached the Cotton Bowl before falling to Wisconsin.

Here's his thinking: The bat represents the program. The on-deck circle, where weighted bats are swung, represents preparation for each game. Each added doughnut represents knowledge, but also pressure.

"We want them to understand that pressure's a good thing," Fleck said. "If you've having pressure, that means your life is significant, because people expect something from you."

Minnesota's bat, now carrying eight doughnuts, appears at every practice and team meeting. But when the Penn State game kicks off, Fleck wants his players to perform unburdened.

"To the average person, the bat is getting heavier and heavier, and getting harder to swing," Morgan said. "But to us, it's more pressure. We talk about how pressure is always earned. You put that pressure on yourself throughout the week, and before you go play, put that bat on the ground, take those doughnuts off and you're swinging that bat like it's a feather."

Coughlin isn't a yes-man. He's the type to question, research and personally verify everything before absorbing it.

"I have a tough time instantly believing stuff," he said.

When Fleck arrived in 2017, Coughlin questioned the coach's messages and methods. Minnesota was coming off of a 9-4 season -- its most wins since 2003 -- and a Holiday Bowl win. Coughlin had been a solid freshman contributor (25 tackles, two sacks) and, in his mind, an aspiring leader.

"He told me my leadership was terrible and the leadership on the team was terrible, and when I see what it's actually supposed to be, I'll look back," Coughlin said. "I thought he was full of it. Looking back where I'm at right now and where a lot of guys on the team are where right now, it's night and day different."

Although Minnesota had been winning before Fleck showed up, the team threatened to boycott the Holiday Bowl after the university suspended 10 players during a sexual assault investigation. Coach Tracy Claeys tweeted his support for the players, a factor in his eventual dismissal.

"Any time there's a boycott, that's complete separation," Fleck said. "You've got a team that, wins aside, is completely divided, somehow, some way. When you're walking into that, just like our first team meeting, not every player showed up."

Fleck knew "The Dig" would take time at Minnesota, just as it did at Western Michigan, which finished 1-11 in his first season. The Row the Boat approach targets four areas of development, only one of which is athletics. A complete commitment is required.

The roster changed in those months, but key older players stayed -- Coughlin, wide receiver Tyler Johnson, linebacker Thomas Barber, running back Rodney Smith -- and more of Fleck's recruits arrived.

"It's people that have really chosen to be part of this," said Gerrit Chernoff, the Minnesota program's general manager, "and then you start adding some special wins. It shows, 'OK, we are all-in, we see it working, we see it changing our lives.'"

The on-field results didn't surface until late last season. Minnesota chopped Wisconsin 37-15 in Madison, reclaiming Paul Bunyan's Axe for the first time in 15 years. A 24-point bowl win followed. When the Gophers assembled in January, Fleck saw "complete focus and commitment," a team finally ready for players to direct. Minnesota's leadership council meetings have become more discussion than lecture.

"It's easy to let coaches demand things," Coughlin said. "Right now, it's 100 percent on the players. If anything, it's the coaches saying, 'We need to tone this down.'"

As for the team on the field, Minnesota plays complementary football. The defense ranks ninth nationally against the pass (166.4 yards per game allowed), sixth in interceptions per pass attempt (4.8%) and 13th in yards allowed (283.8 YPG). Coordinator Joe Rossi, whom Fleck promoted midway through the 2018 season, has made upgrades.

The offense averages 35.8 points. Minnesota boasts two standout receivers in Johnson and Rashod Bateman, who are featured in a pass attack that ranks sixth nationally in yards per attempt (10.34), behind only Oklahoma, LSU, Alabama, Navy and Air Force. The Gophers also have a proven rusher in Smith and a starting offensive line that weighs a combined 1,700 pounds.

"P.J. is 38 years old, and everyone's expecting all this fast-paced offense," Chernoff said. "That's not what we are. We're a control-the-clock, throwback football team. We're very disciplined. We don't have many penalties. We understand situations."

Fleck, who as a young coach worked under Jim Tressel and Greg Schiano, says he believes more college football games are lost than won. Minnesota's on-field philosophy is hooked around a win probability: 78%. It's a team's likelihood of winning when holding edges in turnover margin, missed tackles vs. broken tackles, and explosive plays generated vs. explosive plays allowed.

During nonconference play, Minnesota drifted between 78% and its counterpart, the dreaded 22%. The Gophers had more turnovers than Fresno State when they played the Bulldogs, but still won in two overtimes -- one of four single-digit wins to begin the season.

"It wasn't a wake-up call, but it brought complete validity to that 78%," Fleck said, "because in those three games, we were flirting in that 22nd percentile. Our last five games, we've won the 78% battle."

The Gophers have defeated their past four Big Ten opponents by a combined score of 168-41. They've scored 28 points or more in their first eight games for the first time since 1904, when they opened with a 107-0 win over Twin Cities Central High School. Minnesota hasn't played a taxing schedule, but one could argue that fellow unbeaten Alabama, Clemson and Baylor haven't either. Penn State begins a revealing stretch for the Gophers, which includes No. 18 Iowa (road) and No. 13 Wisconsin (home).

"It's a really big game because of what's on the line," Fleck said. "We're doing things that haven't been done since World War II. When you've started to do things like that, people take notice."

Many will get their first glimpse of Minnesota on Saturday. They'll see an improved product on the field. They'll also see the cultural markings that follow Fleck and the Gophers everywhere -- by design.

"If there's stuff that doesn't add up, it wouldn't work," Coughlin said. "Everything needs to be interconnected, intertwined. Everything relates back to the 'Row the Boat' culture."

"We know exactly who we are, and who we need to be."
