FIVE THINGS TO KNOW

1 Minnesota (0-1) looks for its first win of the season when it hosts Rhode Island (1-0) Saturday morning at Huntington Bank Stadium. Kickoff is scheduled for 11 a.m. with Peacock providing streaming coverage. The game can also be heard on the Gopher Radio Network.

2 Minnesota is facing an FCS team for the first time since a 2022 game against Western Illinois. Overall, the Golden Gophers are 61-4 against teams currently in the FCS, good for a .938 all-time win percentage (see chart at bottom right). The Gophers have won six straight against FCS teams dating back to a 2012 victory over New Hampshire. During that win streak, Minnesota has outscored FCS foes 263-98, resulting in an average final score of 44-16.

3 Minnesota is handing the keys to the offense to sixth-year transfer quarterback **Max Brosmer** from the University of New Hampshire. A finalist for the 2023 Walter Payton Award and a Second Team All-American, Brosmer last year completed 294-of-459 passes (64.1%) for 3,464 yards and 29 touchdowns against five interceptions, while also rushing 57 times for 126 yards and three scores. He led the FCS in passing yards per game (313.55) and total offense per game (325.0). Brosmer finished his Wildcat career by completing 760-of-1,225 passes for 8,713 yards, 70 touchdowns, 25 interceptions, 191 rushes, 263 rushing yards and 10 rushing touchdowns. In the season opener against North Carolina, Brosmer was 13-of-21 for 165 yards with no touchdowns and no interceptions. He also scored a rushing touchdown.

4 **Justin Walley** had an interception in the second quarter against North Carolina. It was the sixth of his career, and he now has at least one INT in each year of his Gopher career. He returned the pick 70 yards, the longest INT return of his career and the longest for Minnesota since **Coleman Bryson's** 70-yard pick-six in the 2022 Pinstripe Bowl. The third longest interception return in Huntington Bank Stadium history, Walley's return brought his career interception yardage total to 136 yards, putting him three yards away from cracking Minnesota's career top 10 list that dates back to 1965.

5 The 2024 campaign is the eighth for head coach **P.J. Fleck** at Minnesota, where his record is 50-35. He is fifth in program history for overall wins, Big Ten wins (29) and games coached (85). Fleck's .588 win percentage is third best among Minnesota coaches with at least 45 games under their helm behind only **Henry L. Williams** (.786, 1900-21) and **Bernie Bierman** (.716, 1932-41, '45-50). In his 12th season overall as a college head coach, Fleck is 80-57 (.584).



With half a sack in the season opener, Jah Joyner now has a sack in three of his last four games dating to last season.

FACING RHODE ISLAND

► Minnesota and Rhode Island meet for the first time ever Saturday. The Golden Gophers have played 141 different teams across all levels in their history, and they are 107-30-4 when playing a school for the first time, including a 16-0 record in initial games against FCS programs.

► Saturday will also mark the first time that **P.J. Fleck** faces Rhode Island in his coaching career. He is 6-1 all-time as a head coach against FCS programs, including a 2-0 mark at Minnesota with wins over Western Illinois in 2022 and South Dakota State in 2019.

► Gopher offensive line coach **Brian Callahan** and Rhode Island head coach **Jim Fleming** were both at Akron from 2004-09. Callahan was the offensive line coach in 2004 and added "Run Game Coordinator" to his title starting in 2005, while Fleming was the Zips' defensive coordinator and safeties coach over that span.

► In addition, Rams outside linebackers coach and special teams coordinator **Troy Gilmer** was a linebacker at Akron from 2008-12, overlapping with Callahan for Callahan's final two years with the Zips.

► With New Hampshire and Rhode Island both competing in the Coastal Athletic Association, Gopher transfer QB **Max Brosmer** is quite familiar with the Rams. While playing for UNH, Brosmer made three starts against URI and was 84-of-126 for 930 yards and six touchdowns against one interception for a rating of 142.79. He also rushed 23 times for 41 yards and scored twice on the ground.

► Rhode Island opened the season with a dramatic 20-17 win over Holy Cross Saturday as Devin Farrell threw a 31-yard touchdown pass to Shawn Harris with 19 seconds left to help the Rams beat the Crusaders for the first time since 1977.

► Making his first career start, Farrell tallied 341 yards of total offense as he completed 20 of 33 passes for a career-high 287 yards and two touchdowns and ran for a team-best 54 yards on 13 rushes. For his efforts, Farrell was named the CAA Offensive Player of the Week.

► Marquis Buchanan was the Rams' top receiver with four catches for 88 yards, while Greg Gaines was next with five grabs for 70 yards. Tommy Smith matched Gaines with five catches as he totaled 47 yards and a score, while Harris' score came on a day where he had three catches for 45 yards.

► The Rams tallied 396 yards of total offense with 290 coming through the air and 106 on the ground, averaging 5.8 yards per play. Conversely, Holy Cross was held to 271 yards and 5.0 yards per play. The Crusaders threw for 101 yards and ran for 170.

► Defensively, Fredrick Mallay and Emmanuel Gomes tied for the team lead with seven tackles each, and Mallay also tied for the team lead with a tackle for loss.

► Ethan McCann-Carter had a pass breakup, while five different Rams were credited with a QB hurry.

► Devin Walter punted once for 40 yards, while Ty Groff was 2-of-3 on field goals with makes from 25 and 27 yards and a blocked kick on his 37-yard try.

LAST TIME VS. THE FCS

► With assistance from the AP: **Tanner Morgan** passed for 287 yards and a score over 2.5 quarters and had one of Minnesota's seven rushing touchdowns in a 62-10 victory over Western Illinois at Huntington Bank Stadium in 2022.

► **Mohamed Ibrahim** (23 carries for 130 yards) and **Trey Potts** (10 carries for 79 yards) had two scores apiece on the ground for the Gophers, whose 679 total yards were the third most in program history.

► Minnesota's 679 total yards included 372 passing and 307 on the ground. The 372 passing yards were the most for the Gophers since **Adam Weber** threw for 373 yards vs. Northern Illinois on Sept. 25, 2010.

► The Gophers averaged 8.8 yards per play (5.9 per rush, 20.7 per completion). It was the best yards per play since averaging 9.3 yards per play against Indiana on Nov. 4, 2006.

► Morgan went 14 for 18 passing without a turnover before yielding to backups **Athan Kaliakmanis** and **Cole Kramer** for the bulk of the second half. The 62 points scored tied for the fifth most in program history since 1930 and were the most since a 63-26 win versus Indiana in 2006. The 52-point margin of victory was the most since Minnesota defeated Temple, 62-0 on Sept. 16, 2006.

► Morgan had his most passing yards since the late-season loss to Wisconsin in 2019. He hit fellow sixth-year standout **Chris Autman-Bell** five times for 118 yards and tight end **Brevyn Spann-Ford** for a 45-yard touchdown.

RECAPPING NORTH CAROLINA

► With assistance from the AP: Noah Burnette made four field goals, three of them after quarterback Max Johnson was sent to a hospital with a leg injury, highlighted by the go-ahead 45-yarder with 1:44 left for the Tar Heels in a 19-17 victory over the Gophers on Thursday night.

► **Dragan Kesich**, whose 30-yarder with 3:40 to go gave the Gophers the lead, missed his chance to win it as time expired when a 47-yard try went wide right. He also missed a 27-yarder earlier.

► Omarion Hampton rushed 30 times for 129 yards and Jahvaree Ritzie had three sacks for the Tar Heels.

Quarterback Conner Harrell relieved Johnson and had a key 32-yard completion to J.J. Jones to set up Burnette's winner.

► With **Darius Taylor** sitting out with a leg injury, **Marcus Major**, who transferred from Oklahoma, rushed for 73 yards and a touchdown in his first game for the Gophers.

► **Justin Walley** had a 70-yard interception return that set up Major's score to give the Gophers a 14-7 halftime lead. **Max Brosmer** had a rushing touchdown and went 13-for-21 passing for 165 yards in his Minnesota debut.

MILESTONE WATCH

► Already 10th in program history for career receiving yards, **Daniel Jackson** is 123 receiving yards away from hitting 2,000 yards for his career.

► With 135 career receptions, Jackson is also one catch away from tying for seventh place.

► One touchdown reception would move Jackson into a five-way tie for seventh place in program history with 15, while a 100-yard receiving game would be the sixth of his career, also tying for seventh at Minnesota.

► With 180 career punts, **Mark Crawford** is five away from tying for fifth place in program history.

► **Dragan Kesich** (24) needs two field goals to tie for 11th in team history.

► **Quentin Redding** is two kick returns shy of cracking Minnesota's career top 10 and three back of ninth place. His 758 career kick return yards leaves him 91 away from 10th place at Minnesota.

► Holding 1,414 career receiving yards, including 1,324 recorded at Charlotte, **Elijah Spencer** needs 86 to hit 1,500 for his career.

► After rushing for 1,982 yards at Ohio, **Sieh Bangura** is 12 yards away from 2,000 for his career.

► Sitting at 1,332 career rushing yards, **Jaren Mangham** needs 168 more to reach 1,500.

LOOKING AT THE '24 SLATE

▶ Minnesota opens 2024 with four straight home games for the first time since 1987. That year, the Gophers opened 4-0 with wins over Northern Iowa, Cal, Central Michigan and Purdue. This is just the third time since 1968 that the first four games will all take place in Minneapolis.

▶ Minnesota's 2024 opponents combined to go 94-61 in 2023. Seven teams won at least eight games last year, and Michigan (15), Iowa (10) and Penn State (10) all reached double digits.

▶ Nine of the Gophers' 2024 opponents played in a bowl game last year, including national champion Michigan. The Gophers are one of six B1G teams to play nine bowl teams, and only USC (11) faces more.

▶ With four new teams joining the Big Ten, Minnesota will play UCLA for the first time since 1978 and match up with USC for the first time since a home-and-home series in 2010-11. Prior to that, the teams hadn't met since 1980.

▶ In addition, with the divisions going away, Minnesota will not play Nebraska for the first time since the Huskers joined the conference in 2011, Purdue for the first time since 2013 and Northwestern for the first time since 2020.

IN THE POLLS

▶ Minnesota is not receiving votes in either the AP Poll or Coaches Poll, while Rhode Island appears among those receiving votes in the Stats Perform FCS Top 25 Poll.

▶ Four Gopher opponents are in the top 25 of both polls, while three more appear in at least one.

▶ Penn State is ranked eighth by the AP and Coaches, while defending national champion Michigan is ranked ninth by the Coaches and 10th by the AP. USC is ranked 13th by the AP and 14th by the Coaches, while Iowa is 21st in both.

▶ Wisconsin and North Carolina are receiving votes in both polls, while Maryland is among teams receiving votes in the Coaches Poll.

MIGHTY MAX

► As noted on Page 1, **Max Brosmer** is the starting QB for the Gophers after five years at New Hampshire.

► Last year, Brosmer completed 294-of-459 passes (64.1%) for 3,464 yards and 29 touchdowns against five interceptions, while also rushing 57 times for 126 yards and three scores.

► He led the FCS in passing yards per game (313.55) and total offense per game (325.0), and was second in passing attempts and completions, passing yards, passing touchdowns and points responsible for per game (18.9), and finished fourth in completions per game (26.64) and total points responsible for (208).

► In addition to being a finalist for the Walter Payton Award and Brosmer was a Second Team All-American. He was also named CAA First Team Offense QB, was a finalist for the FedEx Ground Doris Robinson Scholar-Athlete Award and earned the CAA Football Chock Boone Leadership and Excellence Award.

► Brosmer was named the FCS National Performer of the Week on Sept. 5 when he posted a rating of 237.4 after completing 19-of-25 passes for 284 yards and a career-high five touchdowns to lead UNH to a 51-17 victory against Stonehill College in the season opener.

► Later in the season on Oct. 22, Brosmer garnered CAA Football Player of the week honors as he accounted for 356 yards of offense and five touchdowns in UNH's 45-14 victory at Stony Brook University. He was 28-of-39 passing for 335 yards and four TDs for a rating of 177.8. He also rushed for 21 yards, including a 9-yard TD run on a fake field goal.

► According to Pro Football Focus, Brosmer had the most attempts and passing yards, and was second in completions and touchdowns, on intermediate passing (10-19 yards) in the FCS last year. He was 63-of-127 for 1,160 yards and 12 touchdowns with four INTs.

► PFF also credited Brosmer as one of the most prolific QBs when it came to short passes (0-9 yards). Brosmer was 149-of-196 for 1,177 yards and seven touchdowns to one interception. He was third in the FCS in the category in attempts, completions and yards, and tied for eighth in TDs.

► Brosmer was also excellent against the blitz, earning a grade of 83.0 from PFF that ranked 14th in the FCS. In those situations, he was credited as completing 123-of-198 passes for 1,473 yards and 16 TDs to 3 INTs. Against the blitz, he led the FCS in dropbacks (211), pass attempts and completions and pass yards, and was second in TD passes.

Meanwhile, when kept clean, Brosmer boasted a rating of 88.8 from PFF as he had a 20:5 TD-to-INT ratio and completed 69.9 percent of his passes (242-346).

► Brosmer has played in three career games against FBS foes, facing Central Michigan last year, Western Michigan in 2022 and Florida International in 2019. In those games, Brosmer completed 73-of-123 passes (59.3 percent) for 878 yards and seven touchdowns to four interceptions. That works out to a QB rating of 131.59.

► Career highs in both passing yards (493) and total offense (486) came against CMU last year for Brosmer.

JACKSON GRABS WR1 SPOT

► The team's top receiver the last two seasons, **Daniel Jackson** is looking to become the third Gopher since 2001 to lead the team in receiving in three straight years. He would join **Tyler Johnson (2017-19)** and **Eric Decker (2007-09)** should he do so.

► In the 2024 season opener against North Carolina, Jackson led the Gophers in targets (5), receptions (4) and receiving yards (55).

► Currently with 137 career catches for 1,877 yards and 14 touchdowns, Jackson could become the 18th player in Big Ten history to attain 200 catches, 2,000 yards and 20 touchdowns in his career. Johnson and Decker are the only other Gophers to accomplish the feat.

► Jackson enters Saturday ranked eighth in team history in career receptions, 10th in receiving yards and 100-yard games (5), and 11th in receiving touchdowns.

► Last year, Jackson had team highs in targets (116), targets per game (8.9), catches (59), receiving yards (831), receiving yards per game (63.9), touchdown grabs (8), yards after catch (208) and YAC per game (16.0).

► Jackson ranked third in the Big Ten and 32nd nationally in touchdown receptions, and he was fourth in the conference in receiving yards, receiving yards per game and receptions per game (4.5), ninth in total touchdowns (8) and 11th in yards per reception (14.08).

► His totals last year ranked eighth for single-season 100-yard games at Minnesota (4), 12th for touchdown receptions, 14th for catches and 15th for receiving yards.

► Jackson was Minnesota's top receiver in nine of 13 games last season. He tied for the longest reception on the team and had seven of the 10 longest receptions. He was the only Gopher to see at least four targets in every contest last season, including five games with at least 10 targets and three with at least 15.

► Jackson became the 18th Gopher to reach 100 career receptions last year, reaching the mark in his 36th career game. That tied him for the ninth-fewest games needed to reach 100 career receptions in school history.

► In last year's season opener against Nebraska, Jackson posted career highs in targets (16) and receptions (9) and also caught a TD. In the fourth quarter alone he had six catches for 41 yards and a highlight-reel 13-yard TD catch to tie the game with 2:32 to play.

► Against Louisiana he had five catches for 89 yards and two touchdowns. It was the third multi-touchdown game of his career, and his first since having two in the 2022 Pinstripe Bowl.

► At Iowa, Jackson posted seven receptions for 101 yards, including a 39-yard catch (tied for the longest by a Gopher last season) that helped lead to the game-winning field goal. It was the second 100-yard game of his career.

► Against Michigan State, he had seven catches for a then-career-high 120 yards, including a 22-yard TD catch late in the second quarter. Combined with the Iowa performance, he was the first Gopher with back-to-back 100-yard receiving games since **Rashod Bateman** in 2020.

► At Purdue, he caught seven passes for 119 yards, one off the then-career high set two weeks prior against Michigan State.

► Closing out the regular season at Wisconsin, Jackson notched his fourth 100-yard game of the year by setting a career high with 121 yards and matching a personal best with nine receptions. His 15 targets were one off his career high set in the 2023 opener against Nebraska.

DYNAMIC DARIUS

► Named to the 2024 Maxwell Award watch list, sophomore running back **Darius Taylor** missed the season opener because of injury.

► Last season, he played in only six games as a true freshman because of injuries. However, in those six games, he rushed 138 times for 799 yards (fifth most ever by a freshman in school history) and five touchdowns. He averaged 133.2 rushing yards per game, which was the third most in school history and he set a true freshman rushing record with 208 yards against Bowling Green in the Quick Lane Bowl. Taylor did not play in enough games to be listed in the NCAA stat rankings last season, but if he were eligible, his 133.2 yards per game would have led the nation and would have been eight yards more than Cody Schrader from Missouri who averaged 125.2 yards per game.

► Despite missing seven games and receiving just one carry for three yards in the season opener, Taylor rushed 138 times for 799 yards (5.8 per carry) and five touchdowns. He's also caught 11 passes for 92 yards.

► His 133.2 rushing yards per game would have led the country if he played enough games to qualify (75% of team's games needed), while his 148.5 all-purpose yards per game would have been the most of any Power 5 player and be third nationally.

► After missing seven of the final eight games of the regular season due to injury, Taylor returned for the Quick Lane Bowl with a career-high 208 rushing yards, the most ever by a true freshman at Minnesota. He added 11 receiving yards for a career-high 219 all-purpose yards.

► It was his third game of the season with at least 200 all-purpose yards, tied for the second most in program history. Only **Tutu Atwell** had more with six such games in 1997.

► Taylor was named Big Ten Freshman of the Week for a third straight week after a standout performance at Northwestern on Sept. 23. Taylor had 216 all-purpose yards at Northwestern as he rushed for 198 yards and had 18 yards receiving. His 216 all-purpose yards came in his fourth career game and ranked 44th in school history.

► Taylor was the first Gopher ever to receive Big Ten Freshman of the Week three straight weeks and only the second ever to be honored three times in a season, joining **Shannon Brooks**, who did it in 2015. Taylor was the first Big Ten player to receive the honor three straight weeks since Wisconsin's running back Jonathan Taylor in 2017.

► Taylor made his Gopher debut with one carry for three yards against Nebraska and followed that with a monster performance against Eastern Michigan, rushing for 193 yards and a touchdown on 33 carries. His numbers in a 25-6 win netted him Big Ten Freshman of the Week honors. His 193 yards were second most in school history for a true freshman. He added 13 receiving yards to finish the game with 206 all-purpose yards.

► Taylor followed that Eastern Michigan performance by gaining 138 yards and scoring one touchdown on 22 carries at then-No. 20 North Carolina to earn his second straight Big Ten Freshman of the Week. He also caught one pass for 25 yards. He was the first Minnesota true freshman to rush for more than 100 yards in consecutive games since the 2021 season and just the second to do so since 2003.

► With his three straight 100-yard rushing games, Taylor became the first Minnesota true freshman to accomplish the feat since **Laurence Maroney** in 2003.

► Taylor's offensive grade of 87.4 from Pro Football Focus was best on the team and fourth among Big Ten running backs.

► Taylor had 519 yards after contact last year according to PFF, which still ranked eighth in the Big Ten despite missing seven games, while his 35 missed tackles forced ranked sixth.

HELLO, NUBIN

► In addition to Taylor, Minnesota also returns redshirt junior running back **Jordan Nubin**, who finished second on the team in rushing attempts (127), rushing yards (559), rush yards per game (43.0) and rushing TDs (3), and was tied for third in yards per rush (4.4).

► In the 2024 season opener, Nubin rushed four times for three yards and caught two passes for 20 yards.

► Nubin was named Big Ten Offensive Player of the Week after his standout performance in Minnesota's 27-12 victory against Michigan State last season.

► Entering the game with 15 career rushing attempts for 51 yards, he rushed 40 times for 204 yards and two touchdowns against the Spartans. His 204 yards were the 28th most in program history.

► Nubin's 40 carries set a Huntington Bank Stadium record and tied for seventh most in program history. For further context, no other player in the country last year had more than 36 carries in a game.

► After rushing 18 times for 79 yards in the first half, Nubin followed with 22 carries for 125 yards and two touchdowns in the second half against the Spartans.

► He was the first Gopher to be named Big Ten Offensive Player of the Week since **Mohamed Ibrahim** on Nov. 21, 2022.

RB ROOM GROWS

► Minnesota added to its running back room with three additions each from the transfer portal and high school.

► Now in his sixth season, **Marcus Major** spent the first five at Oklahoma. He played in 35 games for OU and rushed 194 times for 833 yards and eight touchdowns and caught 23 passes for 177 yards and two scores.

► Major was the Gophers' leading rusher in the 2024 opener as he ran for 73 yards and a touchdown on a career-high 20 carries. He added 27 receiving yards.

► **Sieh Bangura** was at Ohio the last three seasons, playing in 28 career games with 24 starts for the Bobcats while rushing for 1,982 yards and 22 touchdowns on 412 carries (4.8 average) and catching 50 passes for 453 yards (9.1 average) and three touchdowns. He was the 2022 MAC Freshman of the Year and led the team in rushing each of the last two seasons.

► Minnesota is the fourth school for **Jaren Mangham**, who began his career at Colorado (2019-20) and spent two years at South Florida (2021-22) before playing at Michigan State in 2023. Prior to joining the Gophers, he competed in 38 career games with nine starts and rushed 344 times for 1,332 yards and 23 touchdowns in his collegiate career. He added 27 career catches for 162 yards.

► The incoming freshmen include **Fame Ijeboi** from Folcroft, Pa., who was a consensus three-star prospect and touted as the No. 8 recruit in Pennsylvania and the No. 31 running back in the nation by On3, **Jaydon Wright**, a consensus three-star prospect from Kankakee, Ill., the No. 23 recruit in Illinois and the No. 69 running back in the nation by 247Sports, as well as **Kaeden Johnson**, a preferred walk-on from Waseca, Minn.

► Neither Bangura, Mangham, Ijeboi nor Johnson played in the 2024 season opener, while Wright has been deemed out for the season due to injury.

MOST 100/200-YARD RUSHERS

► Since 2021, Minnesota has seen seven different running backs combine for 27 100-yard rushing games: **Mohamed Ibrahim** (10), **Darius Taylor** (5), **Ky Thomas** (5), **Mar'Keise Irving** (3), **Trey Potts** (3), **Jordan Nubin** (1) and **Bryce Williams** (1).

► Within the Big Ten, only Oregon (8) has had more individuals run for 100+ yards in a game since 2021, and Minnesota's 27 100-yard games is tied with Michigan for the most in the conference in that span.

► Ibrahim (2), Nubin (1) and Taylor (1) have also combined for four 200-yard games since 2021.

► No other Big Ten school has had more than two 200-yard games since 2021 and Michigan (2) is the only other B1G school to have multiple players rush for 200+ yards.

O-LINE RELOADS

► Minnesota returns 80 percent of its starts on the offensive line in 2024 with only center **Nathan Boe** needing to be replaced.

► Minnesota primarily used the same starting lineup on the offensive line last year with **Aireontae Ersery** at left tackle, **Tyler Cooper** at left guard, **Boe** at center, **Martes Lewis** at right guard and **Quinn Carroll** at right tackle. Cooper missed two games due to injury with true **Greg Johnson** moving into the lineup at left guard, but Cooper returned for the last four contests of the season. Ersery, Lewis and Carroll all started every game.

► The lineup was much the same in the 2024 opener against North Carolina with Ersery at left tackle, Cooper at left guard, Johnson at center, Carroll at right guard and Lewis at right tackle.

► According to PFF, Ersery was the Big Ten's top-graded lineman at 84.0 a year ago. That grade also ranked fifth among FBS tackles and seventh for all offensive linemen. Named to the Outland Trophy Preseason Watch List, Ersery also led the Big Ten, was third among FBS tackles and fourth overall along the o-line with a run block grade of 86.2. He allowed just two sacks and 15 total pressures in 841 snaps on offense.

► Cooper earned the top pass-blocking grade on the team in 2023 at 83.3, a figure that led all Big Ten guards, was fifth overall in the league and 21st for FBS guards.

► As a unit, the Gophers were fourth in the Big Ten and tied for 18th in the FBS with 56 tackles for loss allowed, while the TFL yardage lost of 193 yards was second lowest in the Big Ten and 15th nationally.

► Minnesota yielded 1.62 sacks per game a year ago, ranking fourth in the B1G, while the 126 yards lost were third fewest in the league.

► Johnson saw 397 snaps after making his collegiate debut at left guard at North Carolina. He was the first true freshman to play on and start on the offensive line for Minnesota since Ersery started against Nebraska in 2020.

ERSERY, LINDENBERG MAKE 'FREAKS' LIST

► Minnesota offensive lineman **Aireontae Ersery** and linebacker **Cody Lindenberg** both made the 'Freaks List,' put together each preseason by The Athletic's Bruce Feldman. Ersery checked in at No. 25, while Lindenberg was No. 72.

► On Ersery, Feldman wrote, "Ersery squatted 640 pounds, bench pressed 412 and did a 409-pound hand clean this offseason, but his wheels are the most impressive aspect of his game. His 1.52-second 10-yard split is a program record for offensive linemen, and he clocked 18.34 mph on the GPS. Ersery posted a 27.5-inch vertical and a 9-2 broad jump along with a pro shuttle time of 4.61."

► For Lindenberg, Feldman said, "According to Gophers coaches, the 6-3, 240-pounder topped out at 21.46 mph; his pro shuttle time was 4.00 — no linebacker has moved that quick at the NFL combine since 2019, when WVU's David Long did it in 3.97 seconds. Lindenberg broad-jumped 10-0 and vertical-jumped 36 inches. His 10-yard split was 1.51. His hang clean was 387 pounds, and he benched 350."

► Feldman also made note of wide receiver **Le'Meke Brockington**, noting that he is "a 6-0, 195-pounder junior who squatted a Minnesota skill position record 614 pounds, did 10-9 1/2 on the broad jump, 42-inches in the vertical and clocked a 1.43-second 10-yard split."

FIRST ON 4TH DOWN

► By converting 14-of-17 fourth down attempts last season, Minnesota led the nation in fourth-down conversion rate at 82.4 percent.

► For context, Boise State (81.8) was the only other FBS team above 80 percent last year, while only two other Big Ten teams converted higher than 70 percent.

GOPHERS 'D' LOOKING TO BE BACK AMONG THE BEST

► Minnesota finished last season with the No. 56 total defense in the country, allowing 368.4 yards per game. It was a step back from 2022 when the Gophers were ninth (294.7) and 2021 when they finished third (278.8). After the departure of the previous defensive coordinator, Minnesota has brought in **Corey Hetherman** to take the reins in 2024.

► Hetherman spent the two previous seasons as the linebackers coach at Rutgers. Prior to that he was the defensive coordinator at James Madison from 2019-21 and was named the AFCA FCS Assistant Coach of the Year in 2021. His defense ranked in the top 10 in both total defense and scoring defense in all three years he was at JMU. Hetherman has also been the defensive coordinator at Maine (2016-18) and Pace College (2014).

► The season opener saw the Gophers give up just 252 yards of total offense against North Carolina, including 105 passing yards allowed, a figure that ranks 18th in the FBS and third in the Big Ten.

► The Gophers are currently tied for the nation's lead in both in fourth-down defense (.000, 0-1) and passing touchdowns allowed (0). They also have top-30 rankings in fumbles recovered (14th with 1), pass yards allowed (18th at 105 yards), pass yards per attempt against (26th at 4.6) and pass attempts against (27th with 23).

► Linebackers Cody Lindenberg (11) and Maverick Baranowski (10) each tied career highs in tackles against North Carolina. Minnesota was the only team in the Big Ten to see two players record at least 10 tackles in the season opener.

SACK NUMBERS UP IN '23

► Minnesota finished 2023 with 26 sacks, its highest total since posting 28 in 2019, the second best performance since 2016 and the No. 3 total since 2008.

► The Gophers averaged 2.0 sacks per game, including seven games with at least two sacks and a season-high five against Illinois.

► They kept that trend going with 2.0 sacks against North Carolina in the season opener. **Anthony Smith** had a solo sack, while **Jah Joyner** and **Danny Striggow** combined on the other.

► Last year's pass rush grade of 79.6 ranked 31st according to PFF, up 89 spots from their 2022 grade. Only Penn State (91.5), Michigan (91.2) and Ohio State (87.4) had higher grades in the Big Ten.

► The 26.0 sacks last year, seven more than the 2022 total of 19.0, were claimed by 11 players, eight of whom return in 2024. Joyner led the team and tied for third in the Big Ten with 7.5 sacks, and Striggow had 6.0 to tie for 10th.

► Joyner ranked third in the Big Ten and tied for 11th nationally with a PFF pass rush grade of 90.8 last season. PFF also noted that his "23.3% pass-rush win rate ranked third among FBS edge defenders and trailed only top-15 pick Laiatu Latu among Power Five players at the position."

► Against Illinois last year, Joyner matched his career high with three tackles, including a career-best 2.0 sacks and tackles for loss, and forced a fumble. Joyner also had a sack and forced fumble the previous week versus Michigan State. That made him the first Minnesota player since **Carter Coughlin** in 2018 to have a sack and forced fumble in consecutive games.

► Joyner ended the season with another strong performance in the bowl game with three tackles and two sacks, tying career highs in both categories, as well as tackles for loss.

WALLEY'S WORLD

► Senior cornerback **Justin Walley** has been one of the top corners in the Big Ten ever since he earned a spot on the 247Sports True Freshman All-American team in 2021 and was PFF's highest graded true freshman CB.

► As noted on Page 1, he had a 70-yard interception return against North Carolina to go along with six tackles.

► He had 45 tackles last year, eight pass breakups to lead the team and rank tied for fifth in the Big Ten, 2.0 tackles for loss, one forced fumble, a fumble recovery and one interception.

► Walley's run defense grade of 75.0 from Pro Football Focus led the team, while his tackling grade of 80.0 is best among Gopher returners.

LINDENBERG HEALTHY IN '24

► Redshirt junior **Cody Lindenberg** was hit by the injury bug last season and appeared in only four contests.

► He's healthy in 2024, though, and made his mark in the season opener by tying his career high with 11 tackles, the fourth time he's reached that total.

► Lindenberg did not make his season debut last year until Oct. 28 against Michigan State when he had three tackles, including one for loss. He broke out, though, against Illinois when he tied a career high with 11 tackles, including 1.5 for loss, and forced a fumble.

► However, he missed the next two weeks before returning in the regular season finale against Wisconsin with a team-high 11 tackles, including 1.0 for loss. In the bowl game, he tied for the team lead with six stops.

► He was second on the team in 2022 with 71 tackles and fourth with 4.0 tackles for loss. He also had 1.0 sacks and two pass breakups. Lindenberg played in all 13 games that year with starts in the final six contests. In that stretch, he posted a team-high 45 tackles.

► He led or tied for the team lead in tackles seven times in 2022, including a career-high 11 tackles in the bowl win over Syracuse.

FOUR ADDED TO DEFENSE

► Four of Minnesota's 13 transfers this year come on defense with defensive linemen **Jaxon Howard** and **Adam Kissayi**, as well as defensive backs **Jai'Onte McMillan** and **Ethan Robinson**.

► Robinson is in his final year of eligibility, while McMillan has two years left and Howard and Kissayi have all four years available.

► An All-Patriot League First Team honoree in 2023, Robinson came to Minnesota after three years at Bucknell. He played in 31 career games and made 154 tackles (124 solo) with 6.5 tackles for loss, one sack, 25 pass breakups, five interceptions and two forced fumbles.

► Robinson started at cornerback in the season opener and posted three tackles, including a TFL, and added a pass breakup.

► McMillan spent four years at TCU, which included the Covid season in 2020 and a redshirt season in 2021 where he played in 33 career games. He recorded 15 tackles, two tackles for loss and one sack, four pass breakups and one interception for the Horned Frogs. He had one tackle in the opener against North Carolina.

► Howard, who had a career-high two tackles in the opener, was the top-ranked player in the state of Minnesota in the 2023 recruiting class when he attended Robbinsdale Cooper High School in New Hope. He spent the 2023 season at LSU where he redshirted as a true freshman. Howard played in five games and recorded two tackles, seeing most of his action on special teams and as a reserve edge rusher.

► Kissayi is a true freshman who enrolled early in the spring of 2024 at Clemson before transferring to Minnesota. A consensus three-star prospect, Kissayi was listed as the No. 29 edge in the nation by 247Sports and as the No. 43 player in Florida by On3. He did not play in the opener.

KESICH THE REIGNING BIG TEN KICKER OF THE YEAR

► **Dragan Kesich** got off to a difficult start in the 2024 opener against North Carolina as he was 1-of-3 on field goals, including a miss from 47 yards as time expired that would've been the game winner. History tells us that performance was likely an anomaly.

► In his first season as the Gophers field goal kicker a year ago, Kesich had one of the best seasons by a kicker in Minnesota program history, resulting in him being named the Bakken-Andersen Big Ten Kicker of the Year. He joined **Emmit Carpenter** in 2016 as the second Gopher to take home the honor.

► Also a semifinalist for the Lou Groza Award and First Team All-Big Ten honoree, Kesich was 23-of-27 on field goals, good for an 85.2 percent conversion rate that ranked second in the Big Ten and 21st nationally. He did not miss more than one kick in any game a year ago.

► Kesich's 1.77 field goals per game led the Big Ten and ranked ninth in the FBS, while his 7.4 points per game were sixth in the Big Ten (fourth among kickers).

► His 23 makes last year were the second most in program history, just two back of **Dan Nystrom's** record of 25 set in 2000. Kesich's field goal percentage was third best by a Gopher kicker since 1977 (min. 10 attempts), and his 99 points ranked ninth in program history and fifth best by a Minnesota kicker since 1965.

► Kesich had eight games last year with multiple made field goals, including three with at least three made and a career-high four at Iowa on Oct. 21. In his career, Kesich is 24-of-31 for an 77.4 success rate that is second best in program history (min. 25 attempts).

► He is tied for 12th in program history with his 24 career made field goals.

► Kesich had a streak of 10 straight made field goals at one point last season that tied for the fifth longest in program history.

► Two times last year Kesich was named Big Ten Special Teams Player of the Week, tying for the most in one season in Gophers history. He's one honor short of the program career record.

► He converted the first two field goals of his career against Nebraska, including a game-winning 47-yarder as time expired. It was the first walk-off field goal in regulation for the Gophers since 2003 when **Rhys Llyod** made a 35-yarder as time expired to defeat Wisconsin.

► Against Michigan, Kesich connected on a career-long 54-yard field goal, which tied for the fifth-longest in program history and is a Huntington Bank Stadium record. It was Minnesota's longest field goal since **Joel Monroe** made a 54-yarder at Iowa on Nov. 10, 2007.

► At Ohio State, Kesich tied his career-long by making a 54-yard field goal. Including a 50-yard make at Northwestern, he is one of five kickers in program history with three or more field goals of 50+ yards in a career, and he joins **Adam Bailey** in 1997 as the only Gopher kickers with three field goals of 50+ yards in one season.

► Kesich established career highs by making four field goals and scoring 12 points at Iowa. His four field goals were the most in a game for Minnesota since Carpenter connected on four FGs at Penn State in 2016. The four field goals made tied for third-most in a single game at Minnesota. Kesich was the 10th Gopher kicker to accomplish the feat, and it was the 14th time it's happened.

► Also last year, he was 53-of-62 on touchbacks. The 85.48 touchback percentage led the Big Ten and ranked fourth nationally, while his 64.71 yards per kickoff sat second in the FBS. Opponents had only eight kickoff returns last year, tied for sixth fewest nationally.

► In the 2024 opener, Kesich was 3-of-4 on touchbacks.

CRAWFORD, THE PUNTER FROM DOWN UNDER

► **Mark Crawford** is in his fifth season as the Gophers' punter. Also the team's holder, he was strong in the season opener with five punts for 228 yards, an average of 45.6 yards per kick that ranks second in the Big Ten and 12th nationally. Two of his kicks landed inside the 20-yard line, coming on boots of 57 and 58 yards.

► Last year, he punted 65 times last year with a career best average of 42.5 yards per kick, which ranked ninth in program history. Eleven of Crawford's punts covered 50+ yards (long of 56), and 25 were downed inside the 20, while 32 were fair caught and only four went for touchbacks.

► Opponents returned only 11 of Crawford's punts in 2023, a number that tied for second in the Big Ten. Those returns have netted just 55 yards, which ranked 26th in the FBS and third in the Big Ten.

► Crawford's career punt yardage total of 7,461 ranks fifth in program history, while his average of 41.45 ranks sixth and his 180 punts are seventh.

► A native of Perth, Australia, Crawford played Australian Rule's Football in the winter until he was 17 and then played cricket in the summer until he was 22.

► He trained in Melbourne with Prokick Australia, which has seen its graduates win eight Ray Guy Awards (all since 2013) and 85 All-America honors.

► At 30 years old (will turn 31 on Dec. 28), he entered the season as the fifth oldest player in college football, according to a preseason survey of FBS SIDs.

ACTIVE CAREER FBS LEADERS

► **Sieh Bangura** is fifth among active FBS players with an average of 14.71 rushes per game, and he's eighth in all-purpose plays per game (16.5), 19th in total TDs scored (25), 20th in rushing touchdowns (22), 22nd in all-purpose plays (462), 23rd in rushes (412), 28th in all-purpose yards per game (86.96) and 29th in rush yards (1,982).

► **Jaren Mangham** is 15th among active FBS players in career touchdowns rushes, and 25th in total touchdowns, with 23.

► **Daniel Jackson** ranks 29th among FBS players in career receiving yards (1,877) and yards per catch (13.7), and 35th in receptions (137) and receptions per game (3.19).

► With 18 career touchdown catches, **Elijah Spencer** ranks tied for 15th among active FBS players.

► **Justin Walley** sits 19th among active FBS players in career interception yardage (136), 32nd in career interceptions (6), 33rd in passes defended (23) and 50th in passes defended per game (0.58).

► With two forced fumbles in 16 career games, **Anthony Smith's** career rate 0.13 forced fumbles per game is tied for 40th among FBS players.

STRONG AWAY FROM HOME

Dating back to a 37-15 win at Wisconsin on Nov. 24, 2018, Minnesota has gone 20-10 (.655) away from home, including five bowl wins. Six of the 10 losses have come against ranked teams and three went to overtime. Since the date of Minnesota's win at Wisconsin, the Gophers rank third in the Big Ten in wins and win percentage away from home. Only Ohio State (.25-6, .806) and Michigan (22-10, .688) rank higher. ► **Mark Crawford** is 13th among active FBS players in career punts (180), 15th in punt yards (7,461), 34th in punt average (41.5) and 37th in punts per game (4.0).

► **Dragan Kesich** is 38th among active FBS players in career field goal percentage (.774) and 48th in field goals made and attempted (24-of-31).

► **Quentin Redding** ranks 22nd among active FBS players in kickoff returns per game (1.33), 26th in kick returns (36), 30th in combined kick/punt return yards (922), 32nd in kickoff return yards per game (28.1), 38th in kick return yards (758), 43rd in punt return yards per game (6.07), 44th in punt return yards (164) and 46th in punt returns (20).

CONTROLLING THE CLOCK

► Minnesota's time of possession figure of 31:52 ranked 20th in the FBS and third in the B1G last year. They won time of possession eight times in 2023, going 6-2 in those contests.

► Eight times in the Fleck era Minnesota has held the ball for more than 40 minutes in a game.

► In 85 games under Fleck, Minnesota has led in time of possession 63 times and gone 44-19 in those contests.

AMONG LEAST PENALIZED

► Minnesota averaged 3.00 penalties and 27.08 penalty yards per game last season. The penalties per game tied for the FBS lead with Michigan and Air Force, while the yards per game were second nationally behind Air Force (24.77).

► The Gophers committed four or fewer penalties in all but two games last year, including just one against both Louisiana and Ohio State. They had 36 or fewer penalty yards in 11 of 13 contests with a low of 8 yards against Bowling Green in the Quick Lane Bowl.

► The highest penalty total was seven (58 yards) at Iowa, while at Northwestern five penalties netted a season-high 59 yards.

► Uncharacteristically, Minnesota had six penalties for 50 yards in the season opener against North Carolina.

OPENER SELLOUT CONTINUES ATTENDANCE TREND

► Attendance for Thursday's season opener was 50,805, marking the 22nd sellout in Huntington Bank Stadium history and the sixth under **P.J. Fleck**. It continued a trend from last season of strong attendance figures.

► Minnesota's figures last year were among the best in the young history of Huntington Bank Stadium, which opened in 2009 and celebrated its 100th game against Illinois on Nov. 4, 2023.

► The average attendance of 48,453 was the fourth best in facility history. The only better marks came in 2015 (52,355) when the Minnesota Vikings shared the stadium while U.S. Bank Stadium was being built and capacity expanded, plus in 2009 (50,805) and 2010 (49,513), the first two years of the stadium.

► Minnesota played last year's season opener in front of a sold-out, "gold-out" crowd of 53,629. It was the fifth largest crowd in Huntington Bank Stadium history and the first sellout since the 2021 season opener.

► Minnesota followed that up in their second and third home games with crowds of 48,101 and 46,843, respectively. Those figures marked the largest attendance figures for the second and third home games of a season since 2015.

► Against No. 2 Michigan, the Gophers announced another sellout crowd at 52,719, the ninth largest attendance in stadium annals. Like the prior two games, it was the most people to see the fourth home game since 2015.

TWO NEW TO STAFF IN '24

► Two new faces joined the Gophers' coaching staff in 2024 with defensive coordinator / linebackers coach **Corey Hetherman** and special teams coordinator **Bob Ligashesky**.

► At Rutgers, Hetherman took over an inexperienced unit that had seven combined career starts prior to his arrival before the 2022 season. That year, the defense improved by allowing 46.7 fewer yards per game compared to 2021, 28.1 fewer passing yards and 18.6 fewer rushing yards. Rutgers posted its best mark in total defense (349.8) in 10 years.

► Ligashesky comes to Minnesota with nearly 40 years of coaching experience, most recently serving as special teams coordinator at Syracuse where his units ranked second in kick return defense in the ACC in 2023 and third in the nation in kickoff return average in 2022.

► The veteran coach spent 12 years in the NFL, mostly coaching special teams, including with the 2008 Super Bowl champion Pittsburgh Steelers. He also has extensive experience at the college level. In addition to Syracuse, he has coached at Bowling Green, Illinois, Pittsburgh, Kent State, Arizona State (graduate assistant) and Wake Forest (graduate assistant).

► He also previously worked with Fleck, as they were on the same 2012 Tampa Bay Buccaneers staff. Ligashesky was coaching safeties and special teams, while Fleck was coaching receivers.

► Along with the new coaching additions, Fleck promoted defensive line coach **Winston DeLattiboudere III** to Assistant Head Coach and named **Eric Koehler** Tight Ends Coach.

NEW UNIFORMS FOR 2024

► Minnesota's new Nike uniforms feature the traditional colors of maroon and gold and include a white uniform for road games. Minnesota will also retain its current alternate black uniforms as an option for the 2024 season.

► The jersey relaunch is the first for Minnesota since it unveiled new uniforms in February 2018. Those uniforms were worn for six seasons from 2018-23.

► The most significant changes to the uniforms are the addition of shoulder stripes to the jerseys and stripes on the side of the pants.

► The state of Minnesota will be featured on the outside collar of all three jerseys, while Minnesota's rallying call of 'Ski-U-Mah' will be emblazoned on the inside of the jersey collar. The iconic 'Block M' will remain on the front of the jersey, situated in the middle of the collar right above the numbers. The Big Ten logo will be on the right chest, while the Nike swoosh will be on the left chest and left hip of the uniforms.

► The maroon jerseys will feature gold numbers, which is a change from the previous maroon jerseys when the numbering was white.

► The official colors for the uniforms unveiled are Night Maroon, University Gold and White. Minnesota's helmet colors for the 2024 season will be maroon, gold and white.

► The uniforms are the Nike Vapor Field Utility Special Edition (F.U.S.E.) variety, which are stronger, lighter and more breathable than Minnesota's previous uniforms.

BEST YEARLY SPANS

► As noted on Page 1, the Gophers are in their eighth season under **P.J. Fleck**. Fleck entered the year 50-34 overall and 29-32 in the Big Ten. He had the most Big Ten wins, the second most overall wins and the third-best overall winning percentage (.595) of any Minnesota coach through his first seven seasons. Below is a look at how other yearly spans compare in Gopher history.

► **Last 7 Years (2017-23; 50-34 overall, 29-32 B1G):** The 50 wins are tied for 10th most in a seven-year span in program history. The .595 win percentage is tied for the third best since 1967 (.631 from 2016-22 and .600 from 2013-19). The 29 B1G wins are second most in a seven-year span since 1973 (31 wins from 2016-22).

The five bowl trips in seven years is tied for seventh best (6 trips in 7 years done 6 times), while **the five bowl wins in seven years is tied for the most in school history** (also 5 from 2016-22 and 2015-21).

► **Last 6 Years (2018-23; 45-27 overall, 27-24 B1G):** The 45 wins are second best in a six-year span at Minnesota since 1908 (46 wins from 2014-19). The .625 win percentage is the best in a six-year span since 1965 and second best since 1949. The 27 Big Ten wins are tied for the second most in a six-year span at Minnesota (won 28 games from 1960-65). The .519 Big Ten win percentage is the team's best in a six-year span since 1973. **The five bowl wins in six years are the most in program history, while the five bowl trips in six years is tied for best in program history.**

► **Last 5 Years (2019-23; 38-21 overall, 24-19 B1G):** The 38 wins are second best in a five-year span in program history since 1907 (39 wins from 2018-22). The .644 win percentage is second best since 1964 (won .661 from 2018-22). **The 24 Big Ten wins are tied for the most in a five-year span at Minnesota, joining the 2018-22 span.** The B1G win percentage of .558 is tied for the best since 1967-71 (.569). **The four bowl wins in five years is tied for the most in school history; it's been done three times.** The four bowl trips in five years is tied for third best in program history.

► **Last 4 Years (2020-23; 27-19 overall, 17-17 B1G):** The .500 win percentage in conference games is just the third time since 1970 the team finished .500 or better in a four-year span (the other two also came under Fleck in 2018-21 and 2019-22). **The three bowl wins in four years are tied for the most in school history; it's happened seven times.**

► **Last 3 Years (2021-23; 24-15 overall, 14-13 B1G):** The 24 wins in a three-year span is the team's best since winning 25 from 2002-04. It's just the third time since 1906 that Minnesota won at least 24 games over three years. The 14 conference wins are tied for fourth most in a three-year span. Minnesota has made a bowl game three straight years for just the seventh time in program history; 2002-04 marks the only other time Minnesota won three bowl games in three years.

► **Last 2 Years (2021-22; 15-11 overall, 8-10 B1G):** Minnesota has won back-to-back bowl games for the sixth time in program history.

► Minnesota's 2024 roster features 19 student-athletes who have already graduated: **Max Brosmer, Quinn Carroll, Tyler Cooper, Mark Crawford, Aireontae Ersery, Lucas Finnessy, Sam Henson, Daniel Jackson, Darnell Jefferies, Jah Joyner, Nick Kallerup, Derek LeCaptain, Martes Lewis, Cody Lindenberg, Jalen Logan-Redding, Marcus Major, Jaren Mangham, Logan Richter and Danny Striggow.**

NUBIN DRAFTED IN 2024

► Minnesota defensive back Tyler Nubin heard his name called in the 2024 NFL Draft when the All-American safety was selected in the second round with the 47th overall pick by the New York Giants.

► Nubin is the 10th Gopher defensive back to be drafted since 2014 and he is the third safety to be drafted since 2020, joining **Jordan Howden** (2021, fifth round to New Orleans) and All-Pro First Team **Antoine Winfield Jr.** (2020, second round to Tampa Bay).

► With Nubin going in the second round, Minnesota has now had a first or second round pick in five straight drafts (2020-24). The last time that happened was 1941-45. Minnesota is one of 13 programs in the country to have a pick in the first or second round in each of the last five drafts along with Alabama, Clemson, Florida, Georgia, LSU, Michigan, Notre Dame, Ohio State, Oklahoma, Oregon, Penn state and USC.

► Minnesota has also now had at least one draft pick in the last six drafts (2019-24). The last time that happened was 2003-08.

► Nubin's selection marks the second straight year that the Giants have drafted a Gopher after they picked center **John Michael Schmitz** last season with the 57th overall pick. New York also recently chose Carter Coughlin and Chris Williamson in the seventh round of the 2020 Draft. All-time, Nubin is the 26th Gopher drafted by the franchise. The only NFL team with more Minnesota draft picks is Green Bay with 41.

SCORIGAMI

► Scorigami is a concept developed by Jon Bois at SB Nation that tracks final scores that have never happened before in NFL history.

► In Minnesota's 1,321 all-time games, there have been 565 unique scores.

HEAD COACH // EIGHTH SEASON

P.J. Fleck was named head football coach at Minnesota on January 6, 2017. Fleck, 43, is the 30th head coach in the program's history. He has a career record of 80-57 and is 50-35 at Minnesota.

In seven years, Fleck has established himself as one of the most successful coaches ever to lead the Minnesota program.

Fleck is fifth in program history for overall wins (50), Big Ten wins (29) and games coached (83). Fleck's .595 win percentage is third best among Minnesota coaches with at least 45 games under their helm behind only Henry L. Williams (.786, 1900-21) and Bernie Bierman (.716, 1932-41, '45-50).

Fleck and Williams are the only two Gopher coaches to record nine or more wins in a season three times, as Minnesota posted 11 wins in 2019 and nine in 2021 and 2022 under Fleck (Williams posted at least nine wins in six straight seasons from 1900-1905).

The 11 wins in 2019 were the most for a Minnesota team since 1904 when that year's team went 13-0 under Williams. Fleck is 5-0 in bowl games, and his five bowl wins are the most in school history by a coach (Glen Mason was 3-4 in bowl games at Minnesota).

Fleck guided the Gophers to a 6-3 Big Ten record in 2021 and a 7-2 mark in 2019, making him the first Minnesota coach since Murray Warmath (1960, 1961 and 1967; six wins each) to win at least six conference games more than once.

At Minnesota, Fleck has coached six All-Americans (Antoine Winfield Jr., Rashod Bateman, John Michael Schmitz, Tyler Nubin and Mohamed Ibrahim twice), nine Academic All-Americans (Blaise Andries three times, Sam Renner twice, John Michael Schmitz, Jack Gibbens, Payton Jordahl and Gary Moore) and 379 Academic All-Big Ten performers. He was named Big Ten Coach of the Year in 2019, paced Minnesota to two top-10 wins (Penn State and Auburn) in the same season since 1956 and led Minnesota to its first New Year's Day bowl win (2020 Outback Bowl against Auburn) since 1962. He has also had 12 players selected in the NFL Draft while at Minnesota.

The 2023 season saw Minnesota beat rival Iowa on the road to reclaim Floyd of Rosedale and win its fifth straight bowl game under Fleck (beat Bowling Green in the Quick Lane Bowl). Defensive back Tyler Nubin was named an All-American as he set a school record for most career interceptions with 13 and Dragan Kesich was recognized as the Big Ten Kicker of the Year.

Minnesota set a program record as nine Gophers were named Big Ten Player of the Week (previous record of eight was set in 2018 and tied in 2019) and true freshman Darius Taylor established himself as one of the best running backs in the nation. Taylor rushed 138 times for 799 yards and five touchdowns in six games of action. He was named Big Ten Freshman of the Week three times and set a school record for most yards by a true freshman when he ran for 208 yards in the Quick Lane Bowl victory.

The 2022 season saw Minnesota post nine wins as the Gophers went 9-4 overall, which included a bowl win against Syracuse and a road win at

rival Wisconsin. Minnesota, which went 5-2 at home, 3-2 on the road and 1-0 in neutral site games, was paced by a stout, family-room defense and a bruising offense that featured two All-Americans.

Minnesota ended the season ranked No. 4 in the nation in scoring defense (13.85), No. 5 in third-down conversion defense (.279) and No. 9 in the nation in total defense (295.1 yards per game).

The 13.85 points allowed per game were the fewest that Minnesota has permitted since 1967 when it allowed 10.6 points per game during the 10-game season. Minnesota posted two shutouts during the season (38-0 against New Mexico State and 31-0 against Rutgers), which is had not done since 2006 and the Gophers were the only team in the nation to shutout two FBS teams in 2022 (Alabama, Georgia and Kansas State each had two shutouts, but one each came against an FCS foe).

First-Team All-American center John Michael Schmitz and Second-Team All-American running back Mohamed Ibrahim paced the Gopher offense, which ranked No. 17 in the nation with 207.3 rushing yards per game. With Schmitz anchoring an offensive line that featured four new starters, Ibrahim set single season records in rushing attempts (320), rushing yards (1,665), rushing touchdowns (20), total touchdowns (20), total points (120) and 100-yard rushing games (10).

The 2022 season also saw three Gophers named either a semifinalist, finalist or winner of a national award. Ibrahim was named Comeback Player of the Year and was also a semifinalist for the Doak Walker Award. Schmitz was a finalist for the Rimington Trophy and was also a semifinalist for the Outland Trophy and the Rotary Lombardi Award. Quarterback Tanner Morgan was a finalist for the Wuerffel Trophy and was a semifinalist for the Jason Witten Collegiate Man of the Year Award.

In 2021, Fleck also became a Wall Street Journal best-selling author when his *Row The Boat* book, which was co-authored with Jon Gordon, peaked at No. 2 on the list in June.

On the field in 2021, Fleck led Minnesota to a 9-4 record and a second place finish in the Big Ten West division with a 6-3 mark. The Gophers beat Wisconsin for the first time at home since 2003 to reclaim Paul Bunyan's Axe and picked up a postseason win against West Virginia in the Guaranteed Rate Bowl.

Minnesota's dominant defense and offensive depth were the stories of the season, as the Gophers won their final three games of the year for the first time since 1973.

The Gophers ended the season with the nation's No. 3 total defense (278.8 yards per game) and the nation's No. 6 scoring defense (17.3 points per game). Minnesota also ended the year ranked fourth in first downs defense (202), eighth in rushing defense (97.5) and eighth in passing yards allowed (181.2). Minnesota held eight opponents to 14 points or less and recorded its first shutout (30-0 road win at Colorado) since 2006 (62-0 against Temple) and its first road shutout of a Power 5 opponent since 1977 (21-0 at Illinois).

On offense, the Gophers boasted the most experienced offensive line in the nation and were a force rushing the ball, despite losing All-American

Ibrahim in the first game of the season and playing much of the season without five scholarship running backs. Still, the Gophers were the only team in the nation to have five different running backs all record at least one 100-yard rushing game. In total, Minnesota rushed for 2,575 yards and 27 touchdowns and passed for 2,106 yards and 12 scores.

In 2020, Fleck guided the Gophers to a 3-4 record as Minnesota played an all-Big Ten schedule in the midst of the global Covid-19 pandemic. The Gophers posted wins road wins at Nebraska and Illinois and beat Purdue at home. They suffered overtime setbacks at Maryland and at Wisconsin. The season was highlighted by Big Ten Running Back of the Year Ibrahim, who set school records in season rushing yards per game (153.7) and touchdowns in consecutive games (8). He tied school records in most rushing touchdowns in a game (4), most rushing touchdowns in a first half (4), most rushing touchdowns in one half (4) and consecutive 200-yard rushing games (2).

Ibrahim, who was named Third-Team All-America, rushed 201 times for 1,076 yards and 15 touchdowns (most ever for a junior at Minnesota) in the abbreviated and unusual season. He led Big Ten in the following categories: rushing attempts (201), rushing yards (1,076), rushing yards per game (153.7), rushing touchdowns (15), scoring (90), points per game (12.9) and all-purpose yards per game (168.4).

In 2019, Fleck led Minnesota to historic heights as the Gophers won 11 games for the first time since 1904. Minnesota also won seven Big Ten games for the first time in school history, beat two top-10 teams, won a Jan. 1 bowl game and ended the season ranked No. 10.

Fleck was voted Big Ten Coach of the Year by his fellow conference head coaches and was named AFCA Region 3 Coach of the Year. He was also named a finalist for the George Munger Award, Dodd Trophy, Eddie Robinson Award, Bear Bryant Award and AFCA National Coach of the Year.

Minnesota won four Big Ten games by at least 20 points for the first time since 1934 and beat No. 5 Penn State at home and No. 9 Auburn in the Outback Bowl. That was the first time that Minnesota beat two top 10 teams in the same season since 1956. It was also the first time that Minnesota won a Jan. 1 bowl game since 1962.

The Penn State win was Minnesota's first win against a top-five team since it beat No. 2 Penn State on the road in 1999. It was Minnesota's first home win against a top-five team since it beat No. 1 Michigan 16-0 in 1977. The Outback Bowl victory against Auburn was Minnesota's best ranked nonconference win in school history.

The Gophers ascended to No. 7 in the AP Poll, which was the team's highest ranking since it was No. 5 on Nov. 19, 1962. Minnesota was also ranked No. 8 in the College Football Playoffs, which is its highest CFP ranking in school history. The Gophers ended the year ranked No. 10, which was their best ranking to end a season since 1962.

Minnesota averaged 34.1 points per game, which was the third most in school history, while the defense allowed only 306.6 yards per game.

On offense, Minnesota was led by quarterback Tanner Morgan (All-

Big Ten Second Team), running back Rodney Smith (All-Big Ten Second Team) and receivers Tyler Johnson (All-Big Ten First Team) and Rashod Bateman (All-Big Ten First Team). Johnson and Bateman became the first teammates ever to both be named All-Big Ten First Team wide receivers.

Morgan set a slew of single-season school records, including passing yards, passing touchdowns and consecutive games with a touchdown. Smith rushed for more than 1,000 yards and became Minnesota's career leader in all-purpose yards. Johnson set single-season school records in receptions, receiving yards and receiving touchdowns and left Dinkytown as the school's career record holder in receiving yards and touchdowns. Bateman was named Big Ten Receiver of the Year and was one of 12 semifinalists for the Biletnikoff Award as he set program records for a sophomore in receiving yards and touchdowns.

Minnesota's defense was anchored by Antoine Winfield Jr. (All-Big Ten First Team) and Carter Coughlin (All-Big Ten Second Team). Winfield was named the program's seventh Unanimous All-American and was one of five finalists for the Bronko Nagurski Award, which is presented to the best defensive player in the nation. He led Minnesota in tackles and tied a school modern-era record with seven interceptions. Coughlin ended his career as one of the best to ever wear the Maroon and Gold, and he ranks third all-time in sacks and fourth in tackles for loss.

In 2018, Fleck led Minnesota to a 7-6 record and regular-season wins against Wisconsin, Purdue, Indiana, Fresno State, Miami (Ohio) and New Mexico State. The Gophers beat Georgia Tech 34-10 in the Quick Lane Bowl and the 24-point margin of victory was the largest bowl win in school history.

Minnesota also made history when it won the final game of the regular season (Wisconsin) and its bowl game (Georgia Tech), as that was the first time ever that the Gophers won the final game of the season and a bowl game.

Under Fleck, a young Minnesota team beat rival Wisconsin for the first time since 2003 and for the first time on the road since 1994 to claim Paul Bunyan's Axe. The Gophers also downed Purdue's potent offense, as they held the Boilers to a season low in points (10) and yards (233). Minnesota also beat Fresno State, which finished the season ranked No. 18, to give the Bulldogs one of their two defeats on the season. The win against Fresno State also marked the first time that Minnesota beat a team ranked in the final AP poll since 1999.

The Gophers had 112 players on the roster and 58 (51.7%) were freshmen, which was the most in the nation in 2018. The Gophers had 78 underclassmen (69.6%), which ranked tenth in college football.

Fleck played two freshmen quarterbacks (Zack Annestad, Tanner Morgan) and both threw for more than 1,200 yards and seven touchdowns. Minnesota's two leading rushers (Mohamed Ibrahim, Bryce Williams) were both freshmen and three of Minnesota's top-four receivers (Rashod Bateman, Chris Autman-Bell, Demetrius Douglas) were freshmen. On

defense, freshman Terrell Smith led Minnesota with eight pass breakups.

Minnesota had eight Gophers named Big Ten Player of the Week and Tyler Johnson became the first Minnesota receiver ever to record 78 catches, 1,169 yards (single season school record) and 12 (single season school record) touchdowns in a season.

In 2017, Fleck led a young and inexperienced Gopher squad, as 49 of Minnesota's 110 players (44.5%) were freshmen or redshirt freshmen and 76 (69%) were underclassmen. Fleck guided Minnesota to a 5-7 record and those five wins were the most by a first-year Gopher head coach new to the program since the legendary Murray Warmath won seven games in 1954.

Fleck won his Gopher debut against Buffalo, which made him the school's first head coach to win his debut since John Gutekunst in 1986 (before Fleck, Minnesota's six most recent head coaches all lost their first game). Minnesota then posted a dominating 48-14 win at Oregon State, which made Fleck the first Gopher coach to win a true road opener since 1954 when Warmath and the Gophers won 46-7 at Pittsburgh.

Minnesota's 34-point win at Oregon State was the Gophers' 11th largest margin of victory in a road game since 1920 and largest since 2006. The 48 points were the most the Gophers scored on the road since they beat Northwestern 49-21 in 1980.

Minnesota posted three 30-point wins in 2017, as it beat Oregon State by 34, Nebraska by 33 and Middle Tennessee by 31. The last time Minnesota won three games by 30 points in the same season was 2005 when it started the year with three straight with three straight 30-point wins.

The Gophers beat Nebraska 54-21 in Fleck's first season. The 54 points were the most that the Gophers scored in a Big Ten game since they beat Indiana 63-26 in 2006. The 54 points were the 14th most scored by Minnesota since 1946 and the fifth most against a Big Ten opponent in the same timeframe.

Off the field, Fleck and his team can often be found supporting the University of Minnesota Masonic Children's Hospital and host an annual diaper drive during training camp and an annual turkey drive during Thanksgiving to give back to the community. Minnesota has also hosted a canned food drive and school supplies drive under Fleck. In the classroom, Minnesota has posted program record GPAs under Fleck.

Fleck came to Minnesota after spending four years as the head coach at Western Michigan, where he was 30-22 overall and 21-11 in the Mid-American Conference. While leading the Broncos, Fleck authored one of the most memorable turnarounds in college football history. The Broncos were 1-11 in his first year in 2013, but ended the 2016 season with a No. 12 ranking, a 13-1 record, a conference championship and a berth in the Cotton Bowl.

The Broncos were 12-0 in the 2016 regular season and posted wins against Big Ten opponents Northwestern and Illinois. Fleck then led his team to a 29-23 win against Ohio in the Mid-American Conference championship game before ending the season with a narrow bowl

game defeat to Wisconsin.

Fleck was named MAC Coach of the Year in 2014 and 2016 and in 2016 he the Broncos to their first MAC Championship since 1988.

Earning FBS Region 3 Coach of the Year from the American Football Coaches Association, Fleck was also named a finalist for the Eddie Robinson Award and the George Munger Award after Western Michigan became the first team in MAC history to win each of its eight league games by 14 or more points.

Fleck turned Western Michigan into a pipeline for the NFL as well, as seven of his players were taken in NFL Drafts.

Fleck coached receiver Corey Davis and offensive lineman Taylor Moton while at Western Michigan. Davis, who was the first Consensus All-American in Western Michigan history, caught 91 passes for 1,427 yards and 18 touchdowns in 2016. He ended his career with 5,212 yards in four seasons, which made him the Football Bowl Subdivision all-time career receiving record holder. Davis, who was selected fifth overall in the 2017 NFL Draft, joined Randy Moss as the only Mid-American Conference receiver to be drafted in the first round. Moton signed one of the NFL's most lucrative contracts (four-year, \$72 million) for an offensive lineman in July 2021.

Off the field, Western Michigan had a program-record seven student-athletes named to the 2016 MAC Distinguished Scholar Athlete team and the Bronco team posted a 3.14 program GPA in Fleck's last semester at the school.

Prior to his time at Western Michigan, Fleck served as the wide receivers coach for the NFL's Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 2012 and coached the receivers at Rutgers from 2010-11. He coached receivers and was the recruiting coordinator at Northern Illinois in 2009 and tutored the receivers for the Huskies from 2007-08. Fleck's coaching career began at Ohio State as a graduate assistant in 2006.

Fleck played receiver at Northern Illinois from 1999-2003 and helped lead the Huskies to a No. 10 ranking, a 10-2 record and wins against Maryland, Alabama and Iowa State in his final season. He ranks in the top five in Northern Illinois history in career receptions (179) and receiving yards (2,162). Fleck holds the school record for punt returns (87) and ranks second in punt return yards (716). He earned First Team All-Mid-American Conference in 2003 and was named Academic All-MAC and Second Team CoSIDA Academic All-American. He graduated in 2004 with a bachelor's degree in elementary education.

Fleck played the 2004-05 seasons with the NFL's San Francisco 49ers. He signed with the 49ers as a free agent in 2004 and spent most of his time on the practice squad before seeing action against New England late in the season. He spent the 2005 season on the injured reserve roster and in 2006 he stopped playing professionally and started his coaching career.

Fleck and his wife, Heather, have four children, Gavin, Carter, Paisley (P.J.) and Harper.

FUTURE: When rowing a boat, as in life, you aren't able to see what is coming your way. Your back is actually facing the future, unable to see what's coming next. Facing the opposite direction can be a very scary and uncomfortable position to be in. However, as in life, worrying about the future only prohibits you from being your absolute best in the present. You aren't able to control the future, but you can control how you react and prepare for it with every stroke you take.

PRESENT: You are rowing in the present, which is the ONLY thing you can actually control while rowing a boat. You determine whether you take your oar out of the water or keep rowing. You control whether you ROW fast or slow, confident or hesitant, efficient or rushed and whether you ROW for yourself or others! If you stop rowing, you will not go anywhere. As a team, you control whether all of you want to ROW together with purpose, or ROW because you have to. If you ROW on just one side of the boat, you will go in circles. ROW in unison with everyone else in the boat, no matter the circumstance (chaotic storms or calm seas), you will come out on the other end better and more experienced for never quitting. Getting everyone in the boat to ROW, no matter what circumstances life throws you, can be very difficult, however... keep ROWING!

PAST: When rowing the boat, the only thing you can actually learn from, but can't change, is the horizon you are looking at. With every passing stroke you learn, but can never go back! You aren't able to change the past, only learn from it and take with you the lessons to make you better today. You must embrace and learn from your past to create your future! Changing your best daily will take you places you thought were impossible!

OTHER STADIUM NOTES

- When completed, Huntington Bank Stadium became the first new football stadium in the Big Ten since 1960 and the first in NCAA FBS since 2006 (additional NCAA FBS stadiums have since been built).
- The Gophers locker room is a state-of-the-art 60 x 25-yard area, shaped like a football with 120 custom-built lockers and 10 LCD televisions.
- The Gophers have a private recruiting room that can accommodate 150 people.
- The main high-definition video display in the stadium is one of the largest in college sports at approximately 48 feet high by 108 feet wide. It boasts Daktronics HD-16 technology and was the first of its kind in the Big Ten Conference.
- The University achieved LEED certification (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) for Huntington Bank Stadium, making it the first LEED certified college football stadium in America. The certification is achieved by accumulating credits for various environmentally and sustainable efforts in design and construction.
- In addition to Minnesota college football games, Huntington Bank Stadium has hosted Gopher hockey games, Monday Night Football (Minnesota vs. Chicago), NHL Stadium Series (Minnesota vs. Chicago), international soccer match (Manchester City vs. Olympiacos), MLB All-Star concert, U2, Rolling Stones, Beyonce, One Direction, Luke Bryan and Florida Georgia Line. The Minnesota Vikings (2014-15) and Minnesota United (2017-18) also played seasons at Huntington Bank Stadium while their new stadiums were being built.
