Cal Poly Football History -- 101 Years of Gridiron Tradition

Cal Poly football celebrated its 100th season in 2018. Ever since that first 1915 team took the field, Cal Poly football has played with pride and tradition.

From the stars of yesterday like **Perry Jeter, Alex Bravo, Stan Sheriff, Bobby Beathard, Ted Tollner, John Madden, Mel Kaufman and Louis Jackson**, to the stars of recent years like **Chris Thomas, Kamil Loud, Seth Burford, Steve Pre-jean, Adam Herzing, David Richardson, Darrell Jones, Jordan Beck, Chris Gocong, Courtney Brown, Kyle and Matt Shotwell, Ramses Barden, Asa Jackson and Deonte Williams**, Cal Poly has earned its place in college football history.

An undefeated and unscored-upon team in 1933, a perfect record in 1953, Division II playoff trips in 1978 and 1990, a national title in 1980 and the school's first four trips to the Football Championship Subdivision playoffs in 2005, 2008, 2012 and 2016 are just some of the many memories that have made Cal Poly football the pride of the campus and community. Several alumni have earned their place in the professional ranks, including Super Bowl champions, NFL front office management and coaching as well as in the television booth.

Now in its 104th season of football, the program continues its excellence under third-year head coach Beau Baldwin and his coaching staff, ready for the school's 29th season of play in the Football Championship Subdivision. After competing in the American West Conference for two years (and winning the conference title in 1994), Cal Poly was a I-AA Independent for eight seasons. The success didn't stop there as the Mustangs earned their first

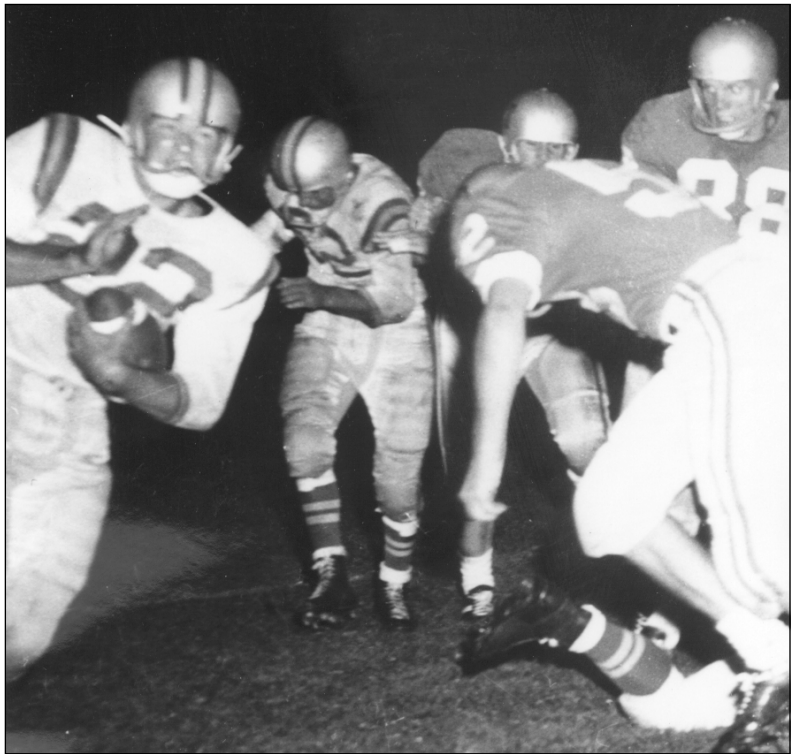
national ranking in 1997, reaching as high as 16th following a win over Northern Iowa at home as the team went 10-1 that year. After eight years in the Great West, Cal Poly moved to the Big Sky Conference in 2012.

Hallmarks of the 21st century include a No. 14 national ranking by the 2003 squad after a 3-0 start; a 9-2 record, No. 5 ranking and inaugural Great West championship in 2004; another Great West title in 2005, advancement to the quarterfinal round of the FCS playoffs, a 9-4 record and No. 6 ranking in the polls; an 8-3 mark, another Great West title, a national ranking as high as No. 3 and another FCS playoff berth in 2008; a share of the Big Sky title in Cal Poly's first year in the conference, a No. 11 national ranking, a second-round FCS playoff berth and a 9-3 record in 2012; and the Mustangs' fourth FCS playoff berth in 2016.

1915 Through the 1940s

Cal Poly played mostly high school and college freshman teams in the first 16 seasons.

Then head coach **Howie O'Daniels** established a little history in his first year at the helm in 1933. His Mustangs enjoyed an undefeated season and did not allow a single point, something only 30 teams in the history of college football have accomplished. The Mustangs continued their defense in 1934, not giving up a single point until

the fifth game of the season.

Cal Poly officially became a four-year school during the 1941 season and posted a 5-3-1 record under Coach O'Daniels. A 32-13 win over San Diego State in '41 followed by a 51-0 win over San Francisco State highlighted the season.

The Mustangs did not play football in 1943 and 1944 due to World War II. **Ronnie Henderson** coached Cal Poly to a 1-5-1 mark in 1945 before

Coach O'Daniels returned to the helm in 1946 and guided the Mustangs to a 6-2-1 mark.

Quarterback "**Pinky**" **Bebernes** of Santa Maria, along with teammates **Marshall Samuels, Dave Cool, Joe Griffin and Al Weimers** helped lead the Mustangs to a 21-13 upset win over San Diego State in 1946. Bruisers **Jim Yates** and **Bud MacDougal** provided the offensive punch much of that year.



1950s

Coach **Roy Hughes** replaced **Chuck Pavelko** in 1950 and vowed, "In three years, we'll be tough." In 1953 he lived up to his promises with an undefeated season. The Mustangs were led by All-American **Stan Sheriff** along with **Don Adams**, **Vic Buccola** and quarterback **Bob Neal** while **Perry Jeter** and **Alex Bravo** led the nation in scoring.

Some consider the 1958 team the best Mustang squad ever. Led by quarterbacks **Bobby Beathard** and **Tom Klosterman**, they were as tough as they come.

Defensive linemen **John Madden** and **Pat Lovell** helped lead the team to 53 forced fumbles while allowing just eight touchdowns all year and only

175.8 yards per game.

Beathard's astute knowledge and leadership abilities later helped him as a scout in the NFL and as part of the front office for seven Super Bowl teams, including four winning squads. He retired as General Manager of the San Diego Chargers and also served as an advisor for the Atlanta Falcons.

Madden, a bruising tackle, went on to coach the Oakland Raiders to a Super Bowl triumph. After four seasons as color analyst for Monday Night Football on ABC, Madden moved over to NBC for its Sunday Night Football telecasts. Madden, who retired in 2009, was honored with 14 Emmys for his work with all four major networks. He also was a catcher on the Cal Poly baseball team in the late 1950s.

In the decade of the 1950s, Cal Poly compiled a 67-29-1 record. All 10 teams were coached by Hughes and the Mustangs beat such teams as San Diego State, Fresno State and Colorado State.

1960s



Fred Whittingham (66) and Gil Stork (51) were members of Cal Poly's 1960 football team. Stork survived the crash; Whittingham was not on the plane.

Tragedy struck the 1960 Cal Poly football team following a game at Bowling Green State University on Saturday, October 29, 1960. Immediately following takeoff at Toledo Airport, the plane carrying the team crashed and killed 22 people, including 16 Mustang football players, the team manager and a booster.

On May 1, 1998, the College Football Hall of Fame in South Bend, Ind., dedicated new bronze plaques honoring the Cal Poly men killed in the plane crash along with the victims of plane crashes involving football teams from Wichita State (1970) and Marshall University (1978). **Dr. Everett Chandler**, Dean of Students at Cal Poly at the time of the crash, helped unveil and dedicate the plaques.

Mounted at the Hall of Fame, the plaques immortalize these individuals' belief in the sport of football and how it symbolizes American society. The names of the deceased are listed for each university on separate plaques.

In 2001, Cal Poly announced plans to change the name of Mustang Stadium to Mustang Memorial Field at Alex G. Spanos Stadium. The Memorial Plaza project was completed in 2006 and formally dedicated on Sept. 29, 2006 (see inside back cover).

After Cal Poly won just 22 of 67 games in seven seasons following the plane crash, Joe Harper was hired as the Mustangs' head coach in 1968 and produced 7-3 and 6-4 marks in his first two seasons.

October 29, 1960 -- Cal Poly Plane Crash

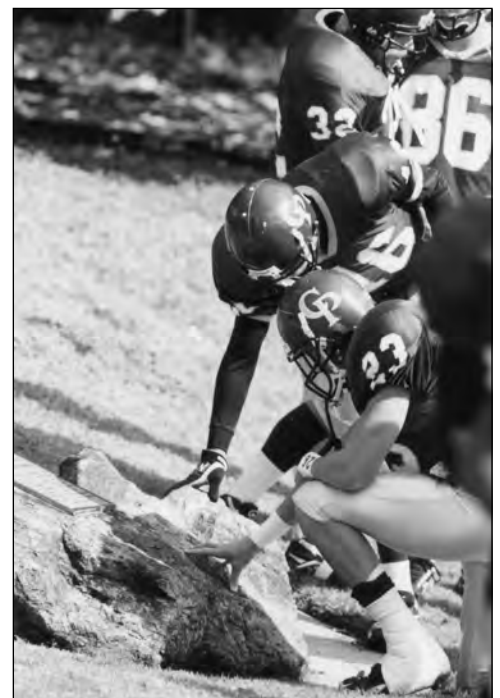

The following is written on a memorial plaque on one of the peristyles at the Los Angeles Coliseum:

On Saturday night, October 29, 1960, a plane carrying the Cal Poly 1960 football team, which was returning from a football game with Bowling Green State University in Bowling Green, OH, crashed at the Toledo, Ohio Airport. As a result of this crash, 16 players and the team manager were killed and many injured. To financially assist the families of these athletes, a football game of mercy between Bowling Green and Fresno State was sponsored and staged in the Coliseum on Thanksgiving, November 23, 1961. All proceeds were donated to the Cal Poly Memorial Fund for this purpose.

1970s

A Mustang defense that included **Tom Duggan, Greg Lee, Chris Smeland, Dave Quirk, Wayne Robinson** and **Tom Chantler** led Cal Poly to an 8-0-1 record in 1972 and a trip to the Camellia Bowl for the NCAA Division II Championship of the Western United States at Hughes Stadium in Sacramento. After **Mike Foley** was injured Oct. 7 against Boise State, fullback **Mike Thomas** carried the load for the remainder of the season from out of the backfield.

The Mustangs were ranked No. 3 in Division II by both the Associated Press and the UPI polls during the year. Cal Poly was also ranked No. 3 in total offense with 448 yards per game and No. 3 in scoring with 37.2 points per game.

Running back **Gary Davis** began a stellar three-year Mustang career by assisting the 1973 squad to a 9-1 record. Davis went on to break most Cal Poly rushing records, finishing with 2,368 career yards.

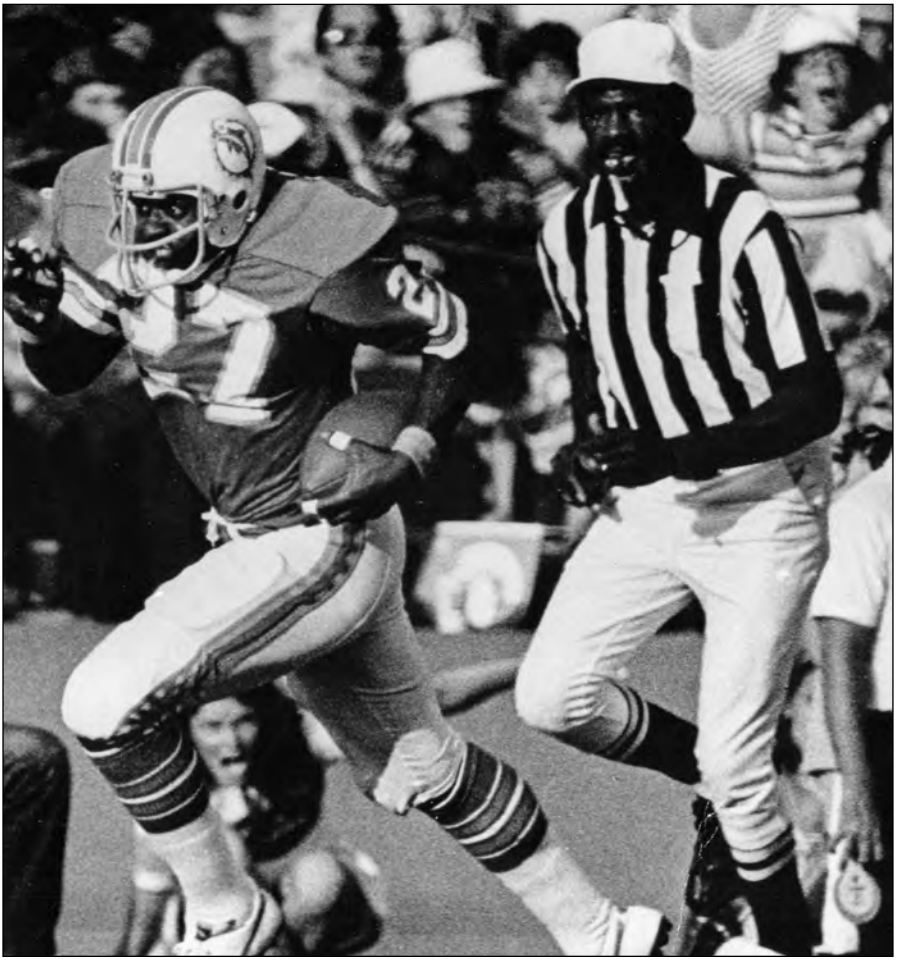
The 1976 Mustangs, with **Joe Harper** at the helm, finished 7-1-1, including a thrilling 17-15 win at Fresno State.

The "Excitement Twins," tailback **Louis Jackson** and receiver **Robbie Martin**, helped lead the 1978 squad to a 7-3 record and an NCAA Division II playoff berth. The two scored half of Cal Poly's 38 touchdowns that year. Individually, Jackson led Division II in rushing the entire season and finished with 126.3 yards per game (including 267 vs. Portland State), while Martin had 23.1 receiving yards a game.

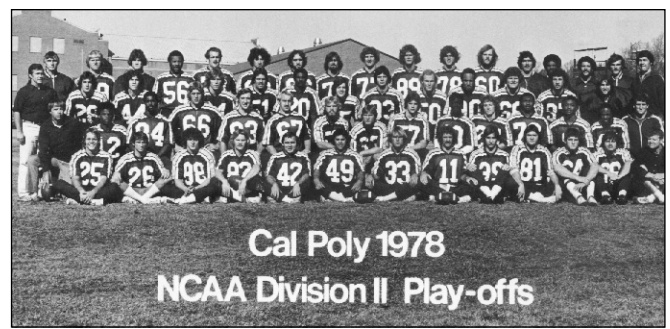
The Mustangs suffered a 17-0 playoff loss to Winston-Salem State (NC) but would get their revenge two years later in the most memorable season in the history of Cal Poly football (see next page).

Each of the 10 Mustang football teams in the 1970s posted a winning record, part of a string of 13 consecutive winning seasons under Harper. The streak ended in Harper's last season, 1981, when Cal Poly went 4-5. Harper went on to coach at Northern Arizona and Cal Lutheran.

Among Harper's 96 wins were seven against Fresno State, three each against Boise State and Nevada and one against UNLV.

1980s

Mustangs Capture National Championship

No success was sweeter for the Mustangs than the 1980 season. Quarterback **Craig Johnston** and senior All-Americans **Louis Jackson** and **Robbie Martin** led the Mustangs to the NCAA Division II National Championship with a win over defending champion Eastern Illinois, 21-13, in the Zia Bowl at Albuquerque, NM.

Martin scored all three touchdowns in the title game, including a diving 33-yard grab with 14:02 left. He also had a 42-yard punt return for the first Mustang TD and finished the day with 164 yards to give the school its first NCAA title in football.

Jackson led the nation in rushing again in 1980 and helped propel the Mustangs to the title game with a strong performance in the semifinals against Santa Clara at Mustang Stadium. Cal Poly played its first two playoff games at home that season, defeating Jacksonville State 15-0 and 38-14 over the Broncos before a standing-room-only crowd at Mustang Stadium and a regional telecast.

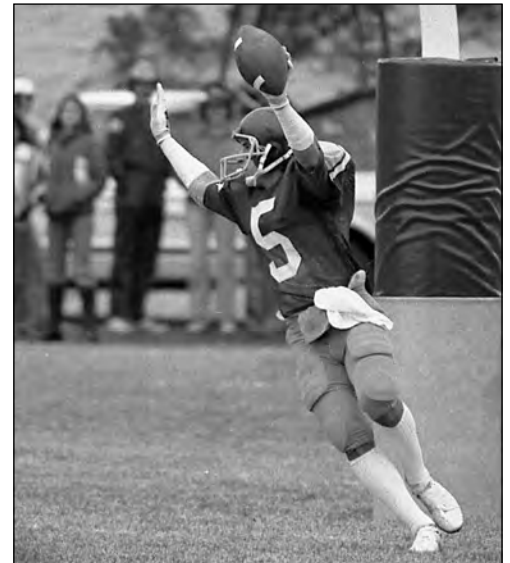
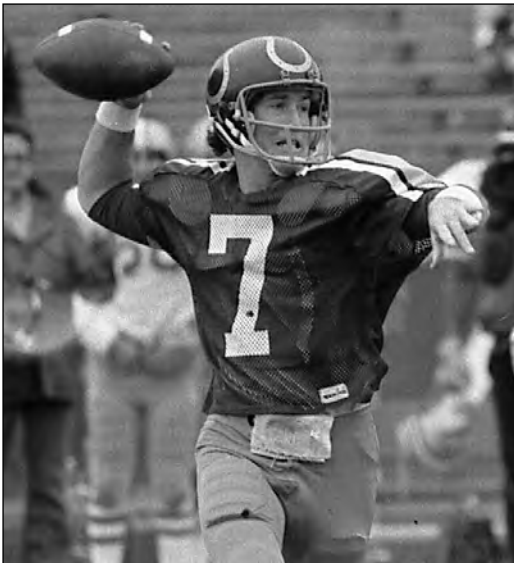
Following the championship win over Eastern Illinois, **Joe Harper** was named Division II Coach of the Year. Cal Poly defeated eventual Division I-AA national champion Boise State 23-20 at home that year.

Cal Poly managed only a 4-5 mark in 1981, Harper's only losing campaign and his last as head coach of the Mustangs. Harper, whose 96 wins are the most by any Cal Poly football coach, went on to coach at Northern Arizona for three seasons and at Cal Lutheran for six years.

Jim Sanderson coached the Mustangs to 6-5 and 6-4 seasons in five years at the helm before **Lyle Setencich** came on board in 1987. Cal Poly went 7-3, 5-4-1 and 5-5 in the first three seasons under Setencich before returning to the playoffs in 1990.

1990s

The winning continued in the 1990s. Coach **Lyle Setencich** led the Mustangs to their first postseason appearance since 1980 with a 10-1 record during the 1990 regular season before a loss to North Dakota State in the first round. Standout wide receiver **Chris Thomas**, who played with the Washington Redskins, St. Louis Rams, Kansas City Chiefs and San Francisco 49ers in the NFL, helped lead the team to a 14-7 win over Cal State Northridge before another packed Mustang Stadium to propel the Mustangs into the Division II playoffs.

In 1994, coach **Andre Patterson** came to Cal Poly from Washington State, where he was an assistant defensive coach, and led the Mustangs to instant success in the school's first season competing at the Division I-AA level. The move proved to be the right thing to do as Cal Poly went 7-4 and captured the American West Conference title with an undefeated conference record, posting wins over Southern Utah, Cal State Northridge and Sacramento State.

Quarterback **Mike Fisher** smashed eight school records and five conference marks with 2,536 yards passing. Fisher went on to become Cal Poly's all-time passer by the time he finished in 1995. His strong supporting cast in 1994 included two explosive freshmen, running back **Antonio Warren** and wide receiver **Kamil Loud**. The Mustangs were ranked fifth nationally against the rush in their maiden season in Division I-AA.

In 1997, the **Larry Welsh** era kicked off with a bang as the Mustangs went 10-1 and just missed making the I-AA playoffs despite a No. 17 national ranking. Warren and **Craig Young** each rushed for more than 1,000 yards during the season and quarterback **Alli Abrew** finished the season as the No. 1-rated passer in all of Division I-AA. After a 7-0 start to the season, with wins over No. 16 Northern Iowa and I-A New Mexico State, the Mustangs fell for the first time on the road at Liberty. But a last-second win over Montana State and a 20-point whipping of previously undefeated Dayton at home capped a memorable season.

Dynamic Duo of Late 1990s



Antonio Warren (left) became Cal Poly's all-time career rushing leader in 1998, passing former standout **Louis Jackson**, with 144 yards vs. Saint Mary's on Sept. 26 at Mustang Stadium. Warren finished his Cal Poly stay with 3,834 career yards and 30 career rushing touchdowns. In 1999, **Craig Young** (right) passed Warren's record with 176 yards against Portland State at home on Oct. 30 to become the new all-time leader. He finished his career with 4,205 career yards. Both rushed for over 1,000 yards in 1997. In 2005, Warren led the Canadian Football League in rushing TDs with 13 and was fourth in combined yards with 2,179 for the BC Lions after rushing for 1,136 yards and catching 34 passes in 2004. He had played briefly for the New York Giants in 2003 and spent the 2001, 2002 and part of the 2003 season with the Calgary Stampeders. Young was an assistant coach at Sacramento State in 2003 and 2004.

While the team may have struggled the following three seasons, posting back-to-back-to-back 3-8 records, the Mustangs certainly entertained and continued to rewrite the record book. November 4, 2000 will be long remembered in the NCAA record book as one of the greatest offensive performances in recent memory. Quarterback **Seth Burford** and receiver **Kassim Osgood** hooked up for a record-setting afternoon against Northern Iowa at Mustang Stadium as Burford finished with a school-record 566 yards passing on the day while Osgood set a new national record with 376 yards receiving to go with his two touchdowns. He caught a school-record 17 passes in the game and was named I-AA Offensive Player of the Week by Sports Network while Burford was honored as the I-AA Player of the Week by ESPN. Osgood was named an Associated Press All-American and played 12 seasons in the NFL at San Diego (7), Jacksonville (2), Detroit (1) and San Francisco (2).

21st Century -- Return to Prominence

The first 21 years of the 21st Century at Cal Poly have produced four Great West Conference championships, one Big Sky Conference title, a quartet of NCAA Division I Football Championship Subdivision playoff berths, six consecutive winning seasons -- a streak that was snapped in 2009 -- and a national ranking as high as No. 3.

of the NFL Draft by Atlanta after breaking most of Cal Poly's records for tackles, finishing with 449 career stops. **Darrell Jones** finished his career with a school-record 177 receptions while defensive end **Chris Gocong** notched 17.5 sacks, another record.

Gocong improved his mark to 23.5 sacks, won the Buck Buchanan Award en route to a spot in the East-West Shrine Game and led Cal Poly to a 9-4 record, another Great West title and the school's first FCS playoff berth and a 35-21 win over Montana in 2005. The Mustangs fell to Texas State 14-7 in the quarterfinal round. **James Noble** rushed for a school-record 1,578 yards and 16 touchdowns while wide receiver **Ramses Barden** caught 40 passes for 655 yards and nine scores as numerous redshirt freshmen made strong contributions. Linebacker **Kyle Shotwell** broke another school record with his 158 tackles. Gocong earned American Football Coaches Association All-American honors while Noble, Shotwell, **Courtney Brown** and **Kenny Chicoine** also were named All-Americans.

was selected in the seventh round of the NFL Draft by the Dallas Cowboys, Shotwell signed a free-agent contract with the Oakland Raiders and Chicoine broke the school career interceptions record.

In 2007, the Mustangs duplicated their 7-4 mark of a year earlier, surpassing the 500-yard mark in total offense four times, shattering the school record for most points scored in one season and scoring 30 or more points seven times. Cal Poly broke 16 all-time school records and tied two others. Barden swept All-America honors across the board and center **Stephen Field** was a second-team All-American. Cal Poly, 2-2 for third place in the Great West, erased an 0-2 start with victories in seven of its final nine games. The Mustangs finished in the top 25 for the fourth straight season -- No. 24 in the Sports Network media poll.

Cal Poly won seven straight games en route to an 8-3 mark, its second FCS playoff berth, its sixth straight winning season and a pair of four-time first-team All-Great West selections (Barden and Field), a first in the five-year history of the conference. The Mustangs defeated San Diego State at Qualcomm Stadium for the second time in three years, but finished with losses to Big Ten Conference member Wisconsin in overtime and Weber State in the playoff opener. With 10 returning starters on offense, Cal Poly finished No. 1 in the nation in scoring (44.4) and

In 2001, Cal Poly football fans had reason to get excited again as **Rich Ellerson** led the Mustangs to a 6-5 record in his first season, thanks to a strong defensive unit and the passing combination of quarterback **Seth Burford** and receiver **Adam Herzing**. The pair, who would later sign professional contracts in 2002, would hook up for a school-record 95-yard touchdown passing play in the team's win over Sacramento State.

The 2002 Mustangs slipped to 3-8 for the fourth time in five years, but Cal Poly won three of its final six games, including a thrilling 28-26 triumph over Weber State in the season finale at Mustang Stadium, and set the stage for six straight winning seasons.

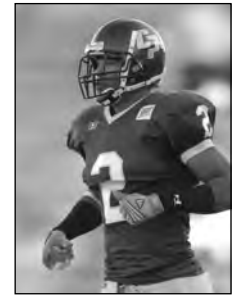
In 2003 Cal Poly posted a 7-4 mark, its best in six years, opening with a 34-13 victory at UTEP and closing with wins in four of its last five games. The Mustangs captured the inaugural Great West Football Conference championship in 2004 and finished 9-2 overall. Linebacker **Jordan Beck** won the Buck Buchanan Award as the nation's best defensive player in the Football Championship Subdivision and was chosen in the third round

21st Century -- Return to Prominence



Defensive tackle James Chen earned an NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship and was named to the FCS Athletics Directors Association Academic All-Star Team in 2010.

Great West Defensive Player of the Year honors.

The Mustangs were 6-5 in 2011, capturing their final Great West title prior to moving to the Big Sky Conference. **Asa Jackson** returned two interceptions for touchdowns, earned numerous postseason All-America honors and was drafted by the Baltimore Ravens in the fifth round. Fullback **Jake Romanelli** rushed for 1,015 yards and quarterback **Andre Broadous** rushed for a school-record 18 touchdowns.

In its first season in the Big Sky Conference (2012), arguably the toughest FCS league in the country with six national titles and 13 appearances in the championship game along with seven Walter Payton Award and six Buck Buchanan Award winners, Cal Poly shared the league crown with Eastern Washington and Montana State, all at 7-1. The Mustangs finished 9-3 and earned their third FCS playoff berth in the last eight years, falling 18-16 in the second round to eventual national runner-up Sam Houston State.

the second year in a row. The Mustangs won six of their last eight games and averaged nearly 34 points and 483 yards per contest offensively, defeating Montana and Montana State on back-to-back weekends in Alex G. Spanos Stadium and ending the year with a win over San Diego. Quarterback **Chris Brown** rushed and passed for over 1,000 yards each and linebackers **Nick Dzubnar** and **Cameron Ontko** earned first-team All-Big Sky honors.

Brown upped his career totals to over 3,000 yards both rushing and passing in 2015 and fullback **Joe Protheroe** earned first-team All-Big Sky honors, rushing for 779 yards in a 4-7 season for the Mustangs. The 2016 squad produced the university's fourth FCS playoff invitation, finished 7-5 overall and was No. 1 in the FCS in team rushing during the regular

total offense (487.45). Barden shattered the Mustang record book in almost all receiving categories, ending his career with 206 catches for 4,203 yards and 50 touchdowns. He finished fourth in balloting for the Walter Payton Award, played in the Senior Bowl and was drafted by the New York Giants in the third round the following April. Cal Poly was ranked No. 3 in the FCS coaches poll for the final seven weeks of the regular season and for the last four weeks in the Sports Network media poll, finishing eighth and 10th respectively.

The **Tim Walsh** era opened in 2009 and, with just six senior starters and an entirely new coaching staff, the Mustangs slipped to 4-7. Fullback **Jake Romanelli** and cornerback **Asa Jackson** earned first-team All-Great West honors.

Cal Poly ran a reverse in 2010 with a 7-4 record, finishing one victory shy of an FCS playoff berth and earning a final No. 23 national ranking. Six of the wins were in come-from-behind fashion, the Mustangs played a gruelling schedule that featured a five-game road trip, and Cal Poly finished fourth in the nation in rushing offense and 14th in rushing defense. Linebacker **Marty Mohamed** earned

Deonte Williams rushed for 1,506 yards, the second-highest total in Cal Poly history, and 12 touchdowns while Broadous completed a stellar Mustang career with 1,459 career rushing yards and 30 touchdowns along with 3,120 career passing yards and 31 more scores. Williams and linebacker **Kennith Jackson** (305 career tackles) were Cal Poly's first-ever first-team All-Big Sky Conference honorees. The Mustangs set a Big Sky record for most rushing yards in a season, finished Nos. 11/12 in the national polls and Williams played in the Casino Del Sol All-Star Game in Tucson, AZ.

The 2013 Mustangs posted a 6-6 mark, finishing No. 1 in the FCS in rushing offense. Defensive tackle **Sullivan Grosz** was named Big Sky co-defensive player of the year, earned eight All-American awards and was joined by offensive guard **Lefi Letuligasenoa**, fullback **Akaninyene Umoh** and safety **Alex Hubbard** on the all-conference first team. Linebacker **Johnny Millard** played in both the East-West Shrine Game and the Medal of Honor Bowl.

The 2014 squad, 7-5 overall, finished No. 1 in the nation in rushing offense for

season for the fourth consecutive year. Protheroe became the 20th Mustang to rush for over 1,000 yards in a season, finishing with 1,334 yards and 13 touchdowns, and earned first-team All-Big Sky honors for the second straight year, joined by linebacker **Chris Santini** and offensive linemen **Joey Kuperman** and **Matt Fisher**.

Jared Mohamed rushed for 1,172 yards in 2017 and was joined on the All-Big Sky first team by defensive tackle **Augustino Elisaia**. In 2018, Protheroe set school records with 1,810 yards for the season and 4,271 for his career on his way to a third All-Big Sky first-team award and seven All-America honors. Cornerback **Dominic Frasch** also was an all-American.

J.J. Koski, Cal Poly's leading receiver for three seasons, earned first-team All-Big Sky honors in 2019, Walsh's final year at the helm, and was drafted by the L.A. Rams. Beau Baldwin was head coach for three years, posting back-to-back 2-9 campaigns in 2021 and 2022 after a pandemic-shortened 2020 season. Baldwin was succeeded by Paul Wulff.

Jordan Beck, 2004 Buck Buchanan Award Winner



Jordan Beck completed an outstanding four-year Mustang career in 2004, breaking numerous school records for tackles. In December he was presented with the Buck Buchanan Award, which goes to the best defensive player in NCAA Division I-AA. He played in the 2005 East-West Shrine Game at SBC Park in San Francisco and, in April 2005, he became Cal Poly's highest NFL draftee at the time, chosen in the third round by the Atlanta Falcons. He signed a free-agent contract with the Denver Broncos in October 2007 but was released in 2008.

Mustang Professionals in 21st Century

During the summer of 2022, a pair of former Cal Poly football players were in the professional ranks.

Linebacker **Nick Dzubnar** played five seasons with the Los Angeles Chargers followed by two years with the Tennessee Titans. He played 65 games with no starts for the Chargers, including all 32 games over the last two seasons with the club, and played all 33 games in 2020 and 2021 for the Titans. Released by the Titans in August 2022, Dzubnar saw action on 114 defensive snaps and 1,977 on special teams and has 89 career tackles (52 solo) in his career. His career high was 21 tackles in 2017 with the Chargers.

Wide receiver **J.J. Koski** signed an undrafted high priority free agent contract with the Los Angeles Rams in April 2020. After a season on the practice squad in 2020, Koski played in five games in 2021, returning two punts (10.0 average) and five kickoffs (17.8 avg.). He was released on March 10, 2023.

Defensive end/linebacker **Chris Judge** was drafted in the eighth round by the Saskatchewan Roughriders of the Canadian Football League in May 2019, but tore an anterior cruciate ligament during a pass-rushing drill May 28. He remains on the team's injured list.

Cornerback **Asa Jackson**, played four games with the Detroit Lions in 2016, recording seven tackles and one pass breakup, after four years with the Baltimore Ravens, where he played 18 games and notched 30 tackles (24 solo) with three pass breakups. He became a free agent in January 2017 and signed a one-year contract with the San Francisco 49ers in August, making one tackle in four games.

Rush linebacker **Josh Letuligasenoa** signed a free-agent contract with the Green Bay Packers after attending a rookie mini-camp in May 2017 but was cut prior to the start of the regular season. Wide receiver **Kyle Lewis** inked a free-agent contract with the Detroit Lions in April 2018 but did not make the roster.

Two other former Mustangs played in the Canadian Football League in 2016. Linebacker **Cameron Ontko** notched 18 tackles for the BC Lions, all on special teams, and was on the roster of the Saskatchewan Roughriders in 2017. **Burton De Koning**, also a linebacker, played for the Ottawa Redblacks in 2016, making one special teams tackle in four games, and signed with Berlin Adler of the German Football League for the 2017 campaign. Linebacker **Chris Santini** signed a free-agent contract with Ottawa in May 2018 but missed the cut.

Wide receiver **Ramses Barden** was drafted by the New York Giants in the third round of the 2009 NFL Draft and was activated for three of the team's 16 games in 2009, catching one pass from Eli Manning for 16 yards. He caught five passes for 64 yards in 2010, missing 10 games due to an ankle injury. Placed on the Active/Physically-Unable-To-Perform List in July, 2011, Barden returned to action on Nov. 6, 2011, catching two passes for 24 yards in a win

against the New England Patriots. He finished his third season with nine catches for 94 yards. Barden signed a free agent contract with the Giants in May 2013 after catching 14 passes for 220 in his fourth season, including nine grabs for 138 yards against Carolina, but was released prior to the start of the season. He signed a futures contract with the Buffalo Bills in January 2014, but was released in July, then signed with the Jacksonville Jaguars in August but was released prior to the start of the 2014 season.

Linebacker **Johnny Millard** (St. Louis Rams) and defensive tackle **Sullivan Grosz** (Houston Texans) signed free agent contracts immediately after the 2014 NFL Draft. Grosz was released by the Texans due to a foot injury. Wide receiver **Cole Stanford** earned a mini-camp invitation from the Green Bay Packers and a tryout with Kansas City and signed with the New England Patriots in late July, but was released.

Slotback **Deonte Williams** was on the active Oakland Raiders roster when preseason training camp opened in July 2013. He signed a free agent contract immediately after the 2013 NFL Draft, but was released prior to the season opener. Quarterback **Andre Broadous** played his second season with the Indoor Football League's Tri-Cities Fever in 2014. He completed nine of 18 passes for 92 yards and four touchdowns. A year ago, Broadous led the Fever to a come-from-behind win over the Colorado Ice by completing nine of 16 passes for 85 yards and one touchdown and also rushing for 24 yards on seven carries, all in the second half.

Defensive end **Chris Gocong** was drafted in the third round by the Philadelphia Eagles seven years ago. He spent the 2006 season on the injured reserve list due to a neck injury, then played all 16 games in 2007 on the strong side of the linebacking corps and recorded 92 tackles, including one sack. He added 61 tackles in 16 games in 2008 and 44 tackles (one sack) in 15 contests, including 11 starts, in 2009. Gocong was traded to the Cleveland Browns in April 2010 and notched 75 tackles (two sacks). In 2011, Gocong earned 70 tackles (49 solo), including 3.5 sacks, forced two fumbles and recovered another. He missed the entire 2012 season due to an Achilles' injury in the preseason and is a free agent after the Browns released him in April 2013.

Offensive lineman **Scott Winnewisser** signed a free agent contract with the New Orleans Saints on May 29, 2012 but was released.

Cornerback **Courtney Brown** was drafted in the seventh round in April 2007 by the Dallas Cowboys and notched 13 tackles in two seasons with the Cowboys before being released prior to the 2009 season. He signed a futures contract with the Giants in January 2010 and was released in September 2010.

leading tackler for the Edmonton Eskimos in 2009, recording 58 defensive tackles and 16 special teams tackles. He played the first two games of the 2010 season before being sidelined with a knee injury, returning in mid-October. In six games he notched 16 tackles. Restelli signed a futures contract with the Miami Dolphins in January 2011 and was released on the final cutdown day, rejoining Edmonton as a back-up. He signed with the Montreal Alouettes in February 2012 but was released in June 2012.

Wide receiver **Dominique Johnson** inked a free agent deal with the Minnesota Vikings just days after the 2011 NFL Lock-out ended, but was released after playing in two preseason games. He was assigned to the Utah Blaze of Arena Football on Sept. 30, 2011 and signed with the Calgary Stampeders on Jan. 26, 2012, but was released prior to the 2012 season.

Another ex-Mustang linebacker, **Marty Mohamed**, signed a contract with the Hamilton Tiger-Cats in June 2011 and made a tackle in a preseason loss to Toronto, but was cut two days later.

Linebacker **Kyle Shotwell** was on the practice squads of five NFL teams in 2007 and 2008 but never played in a regular season game. Linebacker **Jordan Beck** was drafted in the third round by the Atlanta Falcons in 2005, but sat out his first season due to a preseason ankle injury. He was a backup linebacker in 2006, playing in 15 games and recording 13 tackles (11 solo). He was released by Atlanta and signed a free-agent contract with the Denver Broncos midway through the 2007 season, but was released after the 2008 preseason. Playing mostly on special teams in 2007, Beck notched 10 tackles in 11 games. Shotwell, Gocong and Beck all were Buck Buchanan Award winners at Cal Poly.

Ex-Mustang defensive end **Ryan Shotwell** was a player/coach for the Sollerod Gold Diggers of the Danish American Football Federation in 2010 while former Cal Poly wide receiver/return specialist **Tre'dale Tolver** tried out with the Sacramento Mountain Lions of the United Football League in July 2010 but did not play any games.

Ex-Cal Poly placekicker **Navid Niakan** played for the Solano Chiefs in the Pacific Coast Football League in 2011 and 2012. The Chiefs finished 9-3 in 2011 and Niakan made 10 of 11 PAT kicks, two of three field goals, including a 51-yarder, and averaged 27.3 yards on four punts (long of 34). Niakan, who made two field goals in 2012 for the Chiefs (4-7),

played for the Central Valley Coyotes of AFL2 as well.

Running back **Antonio Warren** played seven seasons in the Canadian Football League (2001-07) and played briefly for the New York Giants in 2003.

Quarterback **Jonathan Dally** played in 2011 for the Milan Rhinos in the Italian Football League, rushing for 718 yards and 11 TDs and completing 89 of 166 passes for 1,229 yards and 14 more scores, leading Milan to a 5-4 record. He played for the Danube Dragons in the Austrian Football League in 2012.

Offensive/defensive lineman **Dan Loney** played seven seasons with the Arena Football League's San Jose SaberCats as the starting center after a year on the SaberCats' practice squad. The Templeton High School football coach returned to the SaberCats for the final few weeks of the 2011 season.

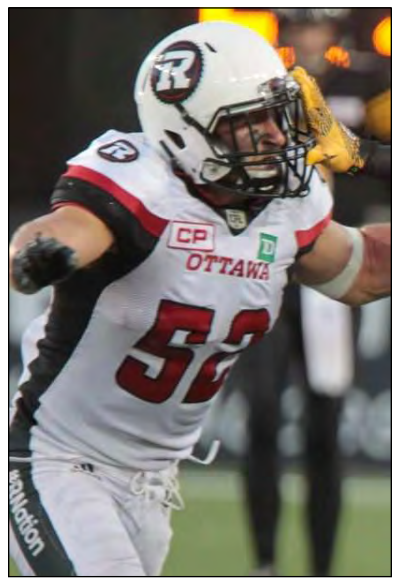
Wide receiver/return specialist **Darrell Jones** played for the Arizona Rattlers in 2006 and 2007. Wide receiver **Jonah Russell** played for the Los Angeles Avengers in 2006 and with AFL2's Amarillo Dusters in 2007 and 2008. Defensive back **Aaron Williams** also played for the Dusters in 2008 and played for the Spokane Shock in 2009. Fullback/linebacker **Josh Mayfield** played for the Dusters in 2008 while defensive lineman **Chris White** played briefly for the Central Valley Coyotes in 2009, recording nine tackles, including one sack.

Other former Mustangs who played professionally in recent years include quarterback **Seth Burford** (Kansas City Chiefs and San Diego Chargers), cornerback **David Richardson** (Jacksonville Jaguars), wide receiver **Adam Herzing** (Colts, Lions, 49ers, Steelers), tackle **Dustin Kroeker** (Seattle Seahawks and Detroit Lions) and placekicker **James Tuthill** (Jacksonville Jaguars, Green Bay Packers, Washington Redskins and San Diego Chargers).

Also, defensive back **Vaughn Jarrett** (Chicago Rush and San Jose SaberCats of AFL) and placekicker **Byungwoo Yoon** (Macon Knights in 2006 and South Georgia Wildcats in 2007, both AFL2 teams). **Richardson** played for the Jacksonville team in the Arena Football League in 2011 and helped the Sharks to their first AFL title. He made three tackles in Jacksonville's win over Iowa on May 13 but was placed on injured reserve June 9. He played 13 games in three NFL seasons (2003, 2004, 2006) with the Jaguars at cornerback, safety and on special teams, notching seven tackles and one pass breakup in his NFL career.

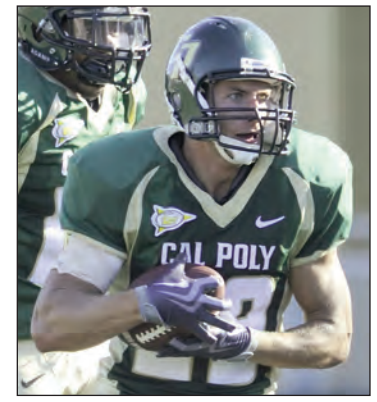

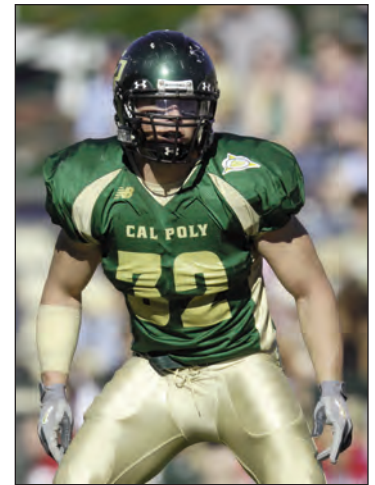

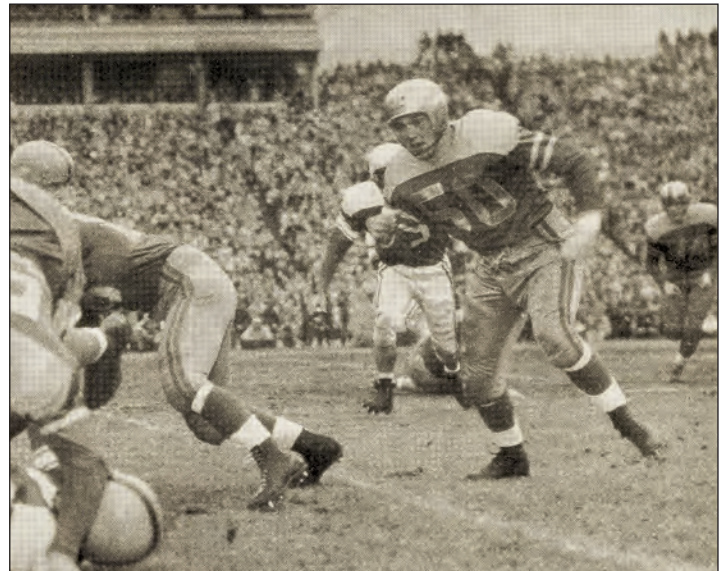
Stan Sheriff (right) played in the 1954 East-West Shrine Classic and 51 years passed before a second Mustang was chosen to play in the contest.

Linebacker Jordan Beck played in the 2005 game at AT&T Park in San Francisco. Just one year later, defensive end Chris Gocong became the third Mustang to play in the prestigious game, moved to the AlamoDome in San Antonio, Texas. And linebacker Kyle Shotwell made it three in a row, playing in the East-West Shrine Game in 2007 at Reliant Stadium in Houston. Shotwell was the leading tackler in the game with seven and earned the Pat Tillman Award.

Wide receiver Ramses Barden played in the 2009 Senior Bowl in Mobile, Alabama, while Asa Jackson played in the 2012 Senior Bowl. Following the 2012 season, slotback Deonte Williams played in the Casino Del Sol All-Star Game in Tucson.

In 2014, linebacker Johnny Millard played in the inaugural Medal of Honor Bowl held in Charleston, S.C. as well as the East-West Shrine Game in St. Petersburg, Florida.

Cal Poly offensive lineman Ben Cobian played in the 2005 Las Vegas All-American Classic in Sam Boyd Stadium. Cornerback David Richardson and punter Gilbert Rocha played in the Las Vegas All-American Classic in 2004 while cornerback Vaughn Jarrett and tackle Brett Nichols played in the 2003 event, then known as the Paradise Bowl, at Dixie College in St. George, Utah.



Center Stan Sheriff was the first Cal Poly player to participate in the East-West Shrine Game, which in 1954 was played at Kezar Stadium in San Francisco.

Members of the 1960 Cal Poly football team and their families gathered at Mustang Memorial Plaza for a reunion on Oct. 29, 2010, the 50th anniversary of the plane crash which claimed the lives of 16 players, the team manager and a booster at Toledo (Ohio) Express Airport.

During the 2010 season, the Cal Poly football program acknowledged two former Mustang teams. On the weekend of Oct. 29-30, Cal Poly paid tribute to the 1960 team on the 50th anniversary of the tragic plane crash in Toledo, Ohio, which claimed the lives of 16 players, the team manager and a booster. More than a dozen of the 26 survivors and their family members returned to San Luis Obispo for a reunion at Mustang Memorial Plaza. One of the survivors, Gil Stork, served as Master of Ceremonies. Two weeks later, the Mustangs marked the 30-year anniversary of the NCAA Division II National Championship -- Cal Poly defeating Eastern Illinois 21-13 on Dec. 13, 1980, in Albuquerque, N.M., to cap a 10-3 campaign under head coach Joe Harper. The anniversaries of the two events planned for 2020 were canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

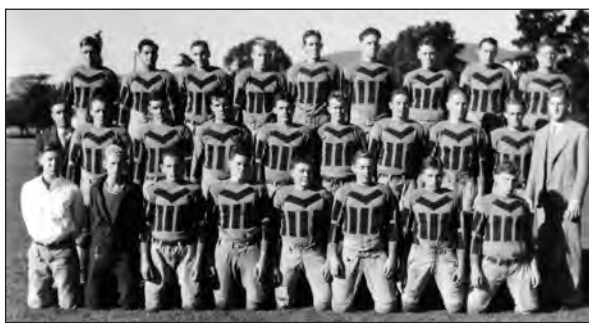

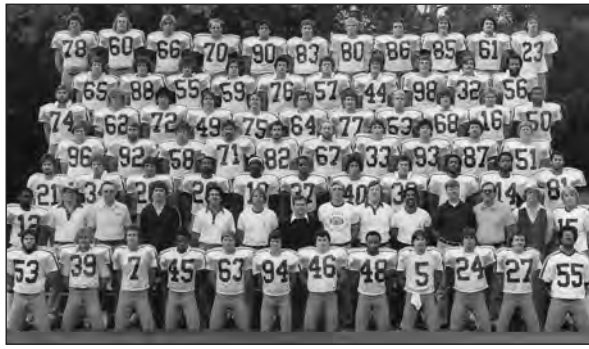

Though the Cal Poly record books show Cal Poly as playing its first football game in 1915, the Polytechnic Journal reported that club teams were formed from 1905 to 1914. D.W. Schlosser became the first paid coach for the 1915 season, signalling the official start of intercollegiate football at Cal Poly.

The Mustangs' rich football history is highlighted by the undefeated, unscored-upon 1933 team of Howie O'Daniels, the much-heralded undefeated, untied 1953 team coached by Roy Hughes, the first team to earn an NCAA playoff berth (1972, coached by Joe Harper), the 1980 NCAA Division II national championship team, also coached by Harper, and the 1990 NCAA Division II semifinal team coached by Lyle Setencich.

Cal Poly moved to Division I in 1994 and four Mustang teams -- 2005, 2008 (both coached by Rich Ellerson) and 2012 and 2016 (both coached by Tim Walsh) -- qualified for the Football Championship Subdivision playoffs.

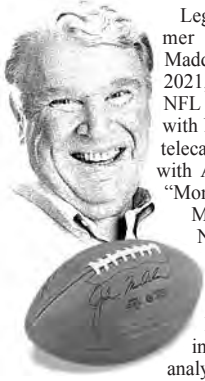

Emmy Award Winner John Madden



Legendary NFL broadcaster and former Cal Poly football player John Madden, who passed away on Dec. 28, 2021, at the age of 85, called his final NFL game in 2008 after three seasons with NBC on its Sunday Night Football telecast. He worked for four seasons with Al Michaels as expert analyst for "Monday Night Football" on ABC.

Madden, who is synonymous with NFL football for millions of fans nationwide, brought his ability to explain the game's finer points along with his unique sense of humor to Monday Night Football in 2002 after 21 seasons as a game analyst for CBS and Fox.

The National Academy of Television Arts and Sciences honored Madden with an unprecedented 16

Outstanding Sports Personality/Analyst Emmy Awards, the most recent in recognition for his work during the 2008 season. In all, Madden has been nominated for a record 20 Emmy Awards. In addition, the American Sportscasters Association named him Sports Personality of the Year in 1985 and 1992 and, in 1982, Madden became the first NFL analyst to receive the Touchdown Club of America's prestigious Golden Mike Award.

Prior to joining the broadcasting ranks, Madden had an outstanding career as head coach of the NFL's Oakland Raiders. He guided the Raiders to an overall record of 103-32-7, leading the team to seven AFC Western Division titles and a victory over the Minnesota Vikings in Super Bowl XI. Madden's winning percentage (.750) is the best of any head coach in NFL history.

A linebacker coach when he began his NFL coaching career with Oakland in 1967, Madden became the head coach in 1969 at age 33, the youngest head coach in the American Football League. Madden retired in 1979 and

started his football broadcasting career at CBS in 1980.

Before coaching in Oakland, Madden was the defensive coordinator at San Diego State from 1964-1966 where the Aztecs were ranked first among small colleges with a 26-4 record. From 1960-1963 Madden coached at Hancock College in Santa Maria.

Madden started on both the offensive and defensive lines as a player for Cal Poly in 1957 and 1958 and was voted to the all-conference team. He was also a catcher on the school's baseball team. He earned a Bachelor of Science degree in 1959 and a Master of Arts degree in 1961, both from Cal Poly. The Philadelphia Eagles selected him in the 21st round of the 1958 NFL draft, but a knee injury in his rookie season prematurely ended his career.

Madden was also the author of several books. His latest effort was a cookbook titled "John Madden's Ultimate Tailgating" released in 1998. His first four books — "Hey Wait a Minute, I wrote a Book," "One Knee Equals Two Feet (and Everything Else You Wanted To Know About Football)," "One Size Doesn't Fit All," and "All Madden," each written with New York Times sports columnist Dave Anderson — all reached the New York Times best-seller list.

Born April 10, 1936 in Austin, Minnesota, Madden was raised in Daly City. At the time of his death, Madden was living in Pleasanton with his wife, Virginia. The couple had two sons and five grandchildren.

Mel Kaufman Award

Mel Kaufman, a linebacker on the Mustangs' NCAA Division II national championship team in 1980 and an eight-year veteran of the Washington Redskins of the National Football League, passed away Feb. 7, 2009, in his Santa Margarita home. He died of hemorrhagic pancreatitis about three weeks shy of his 51st birthday.

Kaufman, inducted into the Cal Poly Athletics Hall of Fame in 1993, played in three Super Bowls with the Redskins. Washington won Super Bowl XVII following the 1982 season and Super Bowl XXII after the 1987 campaign while losing Super Bowl XVIII following the 1983 season. Kaufman also was a scout for the Redskins in Super Bowl XXVI after the 1991 season.



He was hired as linebackers coach at Cal Poly in the spring of 2008 and helped guide the Mustangs to an 8-3 record, a Great West Conference title and their second NCAA Division I Football Championship Subdivision playoff berth.

"It's a tragedy. He was a good man and a compassionate man," said former Cal Poly head coach Rich Ellerson. "He was just a good guy, a passionate guy, a Mustang."

Kaufman had been out of football at the college and professional levels for about 10 years before he was hired to coach the Mustang linebackers.

"I hired him because of his past, the number of guys he played with over the years who were passionate about him and the kind of person he was," said Ellerson. "We took a bit of a chance with him because he hadn't coached before at this level, but there were a lot of compelling things in his background as a player and scout as well as who he was as a person.

"We still needed to teach him how to coach, get a foothold, work up the ranks," Ellerson added. "It was really hard on him. It was learn by doing for him."

Defensive back LeCharls McDaniel was a teammate of Kaufman on the Mustangs' 1980 national championship team under head coach Joe Harper.

"Mel was a great human being on top of being a great football player," said McDaniel. He was a great person, always got along with all people, very likeable. People don't know how good a man he really was, but the people who really knew him know. He affected people in a way he didn't even realize.

"Mel and I came to Cal Poly together," McDaniel added. "Both of us were

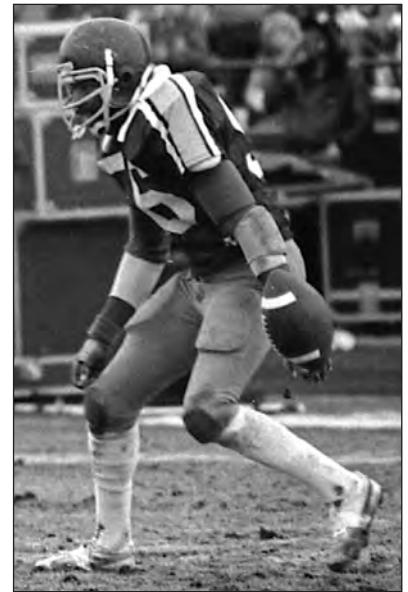
skinny kids and we both knew we had to work to achieve anything. I tried to protect him and we grew up together. We went into pro football doing the same thing. There were tough times, but it's a little easier when doing it with friends. He was a true friend, a great football player. He came into Cal Poly at 170 pounds and played with leverage, played with speed and played with confidence that you can only try to teach kids today."

Born Feb. 24, 1958, in Los Angeles, Kaufman earned two varsity letters in football at Santa Monica High School, graduating in 1976. He played four seasons with the Mustangs after a redshirt year in 1976.

A defensive team leader and team captain with the Redskins from 1981-88, Kaufman was a starting linebacker on three National Football Conference championship teams (1982, 1983 and 1987). Following his playing career, he was a scouting supervisor for the Redskins through 1998, giving him 16 years of NFL experience.

Kaufman obtained his bachelor's degree in social science and industrial relations at Cal Poly in 1984.

The Mel Kaufman Award, established by former head coach Tim Walsh, is presented annually to the Cal Poly player who most exemplifies the virtues Kaufman became known for off the field. Linebacker Carlton Gillespie earned the award in 2008 and 2009 while safety Scottie Cordier was the recipient in 2010, linebacker Kenneth Jackson in 2011, quarterback Doug Shumway in 2012, fullback Akaninyene Umoh in 2013, defensive end Josh Letuligasenoa in 2014, linebacker Tu'uta Inoke in 2015, linebacker Chris Santini in 2016, linebacker Mason Montgomery in 2017, linebacker Anders Turner in 2018 and linebacker Aaron Cooper in 2019.





Osbaldo Orozco: Destined for the Battlefield

Osbaldo Orozco wanted to be a soldier long before he came to Cal Poly. After watching “Rambo” as kids, he and his brothers would use broomsticks and knives to attack a make-believe enemy soldier — a cactus in their back yard.

Indeed, some would say Orozco was destined for the battlefield, where he died April 26, 2003, on the front lines of Operation Iraqi Freedom.

Cal Poly officials held a public memorial May 22, 2003, at the campus’ War Memorial Plaza to honor the 26-year-old alumnus and U.S. Army First Lieutenant.

“Baldo,” as his friends called him, died when the Bradley fighting vehicle he was riding in rolled over while rushing to help other American soldiers under attack near Tikrit in northern Iraq.

At the memorial service, a few hundred people — including family, veterans, students and past teammates — remembered the former school football star who was commissioned as an Army officer on June 16, 2001, the same day he earned his bachelor’s degree in social science.

As the late-afternoon sun reflected off the bronze Mustang Statue, school officials added a 64th name to the plaque below that honors Cal Poly students who died on the battlefield. Orozco’s mother and wife gripped each other’s hands throughout the service and wiped their tears with white tissues through the playing of “Taps.”

Speaker after speaker talked about a big, muscular man full of enthusiasm and passion for his family, school, football team and the Army.

Former football teammate Steve Prejean recalled that Orozco was so proud of his Mexican heritage that he would blare mariachi music from his pickup and sing along.

Prejean also recollected how fired up his old teammate was on the gridiron.

“Here we were on a hot day in August during double days (practices),” Prejean said, “and Baldo is talking as if he wasn’t hot and didn’t have an extra 10 pounds of pads on his body. The guy was just full of energy.”

Orozco was known for his pregame ritual of applying black war paint to his face. He earned All-American honors as a linebacker for the Mustangs and finished his football career in 1999 with 300 tackles — then third on the team’s all-time list.

He brought that same passion to academics, said business professor Colette Frayne.

She remembered the first day she met Orozco, when she tried to tutor 30 football players after they were exhausted from an afternoon practice.

“Most of the players wanted to be somewhere else,” Frayne said. “But Baldo sat front and center and said, ‘Hi, I’m Baldo. Bring it on!’ ”

The whole room erupted into laughter, until the 225-pound Orozco turned around and said, “Hey, be nice to her, man. She’s trying to help us out.”

Toward the end of the memorial service, Orozco’s former teammates gave his wife, Mayra, a framed No. 45 green-and-gold Cal Poly football jersey. Lt. Col. Norma Tovar, a Cal Poly military science professor, also presented her with Bronze Star and Purple Heart awards.

Orozco — who grew up in Earlimart in Tulare County — served in the university’s ROTC program. He was the first member of his family to graduate from college.

He went on to command a platoon in Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, where they guarded Al Qaeda prisoners.

After he returned from Iraq, Orozco and his wife were to start a family.

His brother, Andy Orozco, said he wanted to enroll in a college ROTC program and become an

officer.

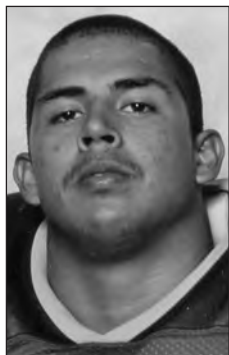
“It pumps me up even more and adds gasoline to the fire,” said the then-18-year-old, who along with his three brothers wore black No. 45 armbands.

Another brother, Jorge Orozco, then 28, said he was proud that “Baldo” fought for his country but saddened to lose his best friend.

“It’s war, and it’s going to happen,” he said. “There’s a price to pay for freedom. And unfortunately, it cost us our brother.”

The Cal Poly Athletics Department honors the memory of Orozco with an award given perpetually to the student-athlete who exemplifies what he represented; leadership, outstanding personal achievement, the ability to overcome obstacles, commitment and someone who reflects sacrifice. The Orozco Inspirational Award is presented at the Night of the Mustang to deserving student-athletes as deemed appropriate. First recipient of the award in 2004 was freshman defensive end Chris White.

In the spring of 2017, Cal Poly also announced the creation of the Osbaldo Orozco Memorial Football Scholarship, funded by a collaboration of five former Cal Poly football players, all of whom co-founded Spico Solutions in Cardiff, Calif. Tom Vorhees, Brett Sagaser, Jon Peck, Jonathan Trotter and Gary Gatiss are supporting a full athletic scholarship annually, beginning with the 2018-19 academic year. Football student-athletes of all positions, majors and class levels are eligible, but the preference of the donors is for a student-athlete from the Central Valley (Kern, Fresno, Kings and Tulare counties) where Orozco was raised.
