SE Southeast Missouri's vision of winning the Ohio Valley Conference Commissioner's Cup became a reality when the Redhawks claimed the league's ultimate symbol of overall athletic excellence in Conference-sponsored championships for the first time in school history.

In 2018, SEMO developed a comprehensive strategic plan designed to guide the athletics department into the future which included the following objective as it relates to competition.

"Win the OVC Commissioner's Cup within the next five years and compete annually thereafter."

Mission accomplished.

In 2020-21, SEMO accumulated a total of 119 points, 7.5 points ahead of second-place Belmont (111.5). While competing in the middle of a COVID-19 pandemic, the Redhawks celebrated a dominating spring season bolstered by first-place finishes in

women's tennis, women's track & field, softball and baseball, and a second-place finish in men's track & field. The Redhawks also posted third-place finishes in women's basketball, soccer and volleyball.

"This is truly a team effort. Winning the Commissioner's Cup takes everyone. From the University administration, to the coaches and staff, to the student-athletes, to our supporters. We couldn't have achieved this level of success without all of these groups buying into our vision," said SEMO Director of Athletics Brady Barke.

The Redhawks storybook season came a year after they were on track to win the OVC Commissioner's Cup. In 2019-20, SEMO was in first place following the winter championships before the remainder of the year was canceled and the honor was not awarded due to COVID.

"Not having the opportunity to finish what we started in 2019-20,

makes this year's achievement extra special," added Barke. "We felt we were poised to win the Commissioner's Cup a year ago, so it was great to be able to carry that momentum into the 2020-21 academic year and achieve our goal."

Prior to 2020-21, SEMO finished no higher than third in the OVC Commissioner's Cup standings. Jacksonville State (110.5), Murray State (109.5), Austin Peay (95.0), Morehead State (92.5), UT Martin (88.5), Eastern Kentucky (86.5), Tennessee Tech (80.0), Eastern Illinois (79.5), SIU Edwardsville (75.0) and Tennessee State (33.0) completed this year's scoring.

Since the start of the 2019 calendar year, the Redhawks have won 11 conference championships, most in the OVC. Five of those titles came during this spring alone. SEMO completed its unprecedented 2020-21 campaign with a 93-42-1 (.688) record in conference regular-season play

for its highest OVC regular-season winning percentage in school history. The Redhawks were the only OVC school that qualified for every conference championship event this season. Additionally, SEMO became the first school in OVC history to win a regular-season championship in baseball, softball and women's tennis in the same year.

Southeast Missouri's athletic programs include football, men's basketball, women's basketball, baseball, men's cross country, women's cross country, softball, women's tennis, volleyball, women's soccer, men's outdoor track & field, men's indoor track & field, women's outdoor track & field, women's indoor track & field and women's gymnastics.

The Redhawks compete at the NCAA Division I level and are part of the NCAA Football Championship Subdivision (formerly I-AA) in football. Southeast first became a member of the Ohio Valley Conference when it moved to NCAA Division I in 1991-92. The Redhawks have

won 57 OVC regular-season championships and 20 OVC tournament titles during their first 29 years in the league. Southeast also won seven Women's All-Sports trophies in that span.

Southeast Missouri joined the growing Under Armour roster of NCAA partners that includes the University of California, Los Angeles, University of California, Berkeley, University of Wisconsin, University of Notre Dame, Naval Academy Athletic Association, University of Maryland, Texas Tech University, Northwestern University, University of Cincinnati, Boston College, University of Utah, University of South Carolina and Auburn University.

The Southeast Softball Complex will serve as the home of the Redhawks for the 23rd year in 2022.

The complex contains three regulation softball fields, all of which have lights. The facility includes batting cages, an air-conditioned press box large enough to accommodate print and broadcast media, and bleacher seating for 600. In addition, there is a hill beyond the right field fence that provides fans with a unique view of the action.

SEMO played Northern Iowa in its first game at this facility on Mar. 6, 1999. Prior to that, the Redhawks played their home games at Parker Field, located in the heart of the Southeast Missouri campus.

The Southeast Softball Complex was constructed as part of Southeast Missouri's effort to improve its sports facilities. At the time, that project

also included new tennis courts, a FieldTurf artificial playing surface for the football and soccer teams, the resurfacing of the Abe Stuber track and new locker rooms for the volleyball, baseball and men's and women's basketball programs.

Recent renovations to the Southeast Softball Complex include a fenced backstop with concrete base and netting, reconfiguration of batting cages (including new turf and netting) and concrete under the bleacher areas.

A windscreen along the outfield wall and protective fencing in front of both dugouts were other upgrades made to the Southeast Softball Complex in recent years.

Additionally, a state-of-the-art video board and padded outfield wall were installed in 2020.





ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

ALWAYS A STUDENT FIRST

The Holcomb Success Center offers Southeast Missouri student-athletes a place to study and develop as students and campus leaders.

It is located in the Student Recreation Center, just south of Houck Field. The Holcomb Success Center offers a computer lab with 18 work terminals, study areas and rooms for group meetings. The facility houses the Southeast Academic Services staff and main weight room for Redhawk student-athletes.

The beautiful facility has enhanced the outstanding work in the classroom already enjoyed by SEMO student-athletes.

Redhawk student-athletes overcame an enormous amount of adversity and disruption during the COVID-19 pandemic to cap a record 2019-20 academic year.

After recording a 3.39 grade point average in the fall, SEMO accumulated a Department of

Athletics record 3.53 spring semester GPA.

A total of 12 teams achieved a 3.21 or higher GPA during the spring term alone.

Also, five different programs, including gymnastics (3.82), women's soccer (3.78), women's basketball (3.42), men's basketball (3.26) and football (2.94) registered their highest semester GPA ever.

Women's tennis led the spring semester with a 3.88 GPA. Women's cross country (3.76), women's track & field (3.66), softball (3.60), volleyball (3.44), baseball (3.35), men's cross country (3.32) and men's track & field (3.21) completed the team GPAs in the spring term.

Tutors are available for all student-athletes as needed. In addition, both attendance and academic progress is monitored through regular checks with faculty.

A special course is required for all first time student-athletes at SEMO. The course, which offers three credit hours, is part of a comprehensive program developed to address study skills and life skills topics, and thus, enhance retention and academic success for student-athletes.

Entering student-athletes are evaluated for academic preparedness and assigned to appropriate categories. Student-athletes can also receive individualized academic programs which include meeting with a

mentor bi-weekly to discuss academic progress.

The Holcomb Success Center staff works to get athletes involved in campus and community projects, as well. This is done to provide a support structure and greater opportunity for academic success. Through the NCAA's CHAMPS/Life Skills Program, the Holcomb Success Center gives student-athletes personal and professional skills in order to facilitate successful and productive futures.



SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT

GIVING BACK & SERVING THE COMMUNITY

Student-athletes and coaches at Southeast Missouri are dedicated to giving back to the community that so generously supports them.

Redhawk softball student-athletes have opportunities to participate in a variety of community service activities each year. Community involvement helps provide a support structure and greater opportunity for academic success.

We are proud of the level of commitment shown by our student-athletes and always encourage them to participate in community service projects here at SEMO.

SEMO student-athletes also have the opportunity to participate in the Redhawks BRIDGE Program. The mission of the Redhawks BRIDGE Program is to develop a comprehensive student-athlete development program by Building Responsible

Individuals and Delivering Gainful Experiences. This program provides student-athletes with both leadership and life skills experiences through interactive programming that will prepare them to be successful in life after athletics. The leadership programming will teach student-athletes about Southeast's culture and allow them to learn, develop, and apply leadership skills. The life skills programming provides educational programs designed to assist student-athletes in identifying and applying transferable skills and experiences to prepare them to succeed outside of the athletic arena.





COMPETITIVE SUCCESS

SPORTS PERFORMANCE

Southeast Missouri's Strength and Conditioning program is committed to developing the total student-athlete through their experiences within a competitive training environment.

SEMO's weight room renovations at the Holcomb Success Center were completed in January, 2016.

Indoor turf, weights, equipment and lifting platforms were added as part of the renovation, which

cost \$500,000. The facility now has more space and equipment to handle SEMO's larger teams or multiple teams training at the same time. Branding and new lighting were also included in the overall project.

The newly-renovated weight room enhances training with the best equipment available and is able to accommodate larger teams or multiple teams training at the same time.



SPORTS MEDICINE

PROVIDING THE BEST CARE POSSIBLE

Southeast Missouri's sports medicine staff strives to provide the best care possible for its student-athletes.

On Aug. 14, 2019, SEMO and SoutheastHEALTH entered a collaborative partnership in which SoutheastHEALTH will serve as comprehensive providers of orthopedic and sports medicine services for the University's NCAA Division I athletics program, its intramural and club sport participants and for the University's performing arts students.

Under the agreement, SoutheastHEALTH orthopedic and sports medicine physicians provide orthopedic, primary medical care, athletic training and physical therapy services, and invest in the University by providing diagnostic equipment and athletic training supplies, as well as scholarships for students.

SoutheastHEALTH

orthopedists Dr. Anthony McPherron, Dr. Matthew Baker and Dr. Charity Jacobs, and SoutheastHEALTH sports medicine physician Andrew Lawrence serve as the official team physicians of SEMO.

The sports medicine staff begins treatments and rehabilitation starting as early as 6 a.m., and is available until the last student-athlete is through.

There are currently four sports medicine facilities on campus. The staff treats out of the Rosengarten Athletic Complex, where the primary training room is located. There are two other satellite athletic training rooms, including one at Houck Field House and one at the Show Me Center.

Dr. Carlos Vargas became the 18th president of Southeast Missouri State University July 1, 2015, after having served as acting president at Kutztown University of Pennsylvania.

Since becoming president, Dr. Vargas has launched initiatives to marshal the resources, leverage opportunities and address a variety of challenges and needs of Southeast Missouri State University. He has set as primary goals for the institution the support for student persistence and retention.

He has encouraged and supported the identification and development of innovative academic programs, including bachelor's degrees in Unmanned Aircraft Systems, Geographic Information Science, and industrial and systems engineering. He has continued

to support the globalization of the campus through expansion of study-abroad experiences, extensive engagement of international students, and encouragement of students on campus and abroad to explore cultural interaction. He has championed the work of the President's Task Force on Diversity Education and continued emphasizing the expectations for enhancement of the teacher-scholar model. Under President Vargas' leadership, regional partnerships and collaborations have been solidified, including several joint initiatives with Three Rivers, Mineral Area and other community colleges.

Prior to assuming the presidency at Southeast, Dr. Vargas served one year as acting president of Kutztown University, where he also served as the provost and vice president for academic and student affairs.

Prior to his tenure at Kutztown, Dr. Vargas was at Central State University in Wilberforce, Ohio, where he served as provost and vice president for academic affairs. He previously served in several roles at Kent State University (Ohio) for a total of 18 years, including founding director of the program on electron beam technology. He was also Kent's associate dean for research, interim assistant dean for research and interim assistant dean for the School of Technology. He started his tenure at Kent State in 1985 as a professor, and continued to teach until his departure from the university in 2003.

Dr. Vargas began his career in higher education at the National Autonomous University of Mexico (UNAM), from which he received a Bachelor of Science in physics.

He earned his Ph.D. in physics and aerospace science from the

University of Michigan and he has Master of Science degrees from Michigan in both physics and aerospace science. He is married to Pam Vargas, who currently serves as director of Research and Grant Development at Southeast, and they have a son, a daughter, and two granddaughters.





BRADY BARKE

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Southeast Missouri Athletics has reached unprecedented success under the leadership of Brady Barke.

In 2020-21, SEMO claimed its first-ever Ohio Valley Conference Commissioner's Cup, the league's ultimate symbol of overall athletic excellence in Conference-sponsored championships.

While competing in the middle of a COVID-19 pandemic, the Redhawks won five OVC titles and one national championship. Women's tennis (regular-season), softball (regular-season), women's outdoor track & field and baseball (regular-season and tournament) all celebrated OVC championships, and gymnastics won the 2021 USA Gymnastics Women's Collegiate National Championship.

All that success came after the Redhawks were on track to win the OVC Commissioner's Cup the previous year. In 2019-20, SEMO was in first place following the winter championships before

the remainder of the year was canceled and the honor was not awarded due to COVID.

Since the start of the 2019 calendar year, the Redhawks have won a total of 11 conference championships, most in the OVC. SEMO completed its remarkable 2020-21 campaign with a 93-42-1 (.688) record in conference regular-season play for its highest OVC regular-season winning percentage in school history. The Redhawks were also the only OVC school that qualified for every conference championship event in 2020-21, the best season in SEMO's NCAA Division I history.

Barke looks forward to keeping the momentum going as he begins his sixth year as SEMO's Director of Athletics.

Barke served as the Interim Director of Athletics since July, 2015, before being named to the permanent position of Director of Athletics on June 7, 2016.

He has built a culture that thrives on academics just as much as it does on competitive success.

Academically, SEMO's athletic teams are strong year-in and year-out.

Athletics achieved a 3.23 departmental GPA for the 2020-21 academic year. Fourteen of SEMO's 15 sports finished with a team GPA of 3.0 or higher.

Before that, student-athletes overcame an enormous amount of adversity and disruption brought on by a global COVID-19 pandemic to close out the 2019-20 academic year with a Department of Athletics record 3.53 spring grade point average.

That mark was the highest GPA of any semester for the Redhawks who had a total of 12 teams achieve a 3.21 or higher GPA in the spring term alone.

Also, five different programs, including gymnastics (3.82), women's soccer (3.78), women's basketball (3.42), men's basketball (3.26) and football (2.94) registered their highest semester GPAs ever.

The upcoming 2021-22 campaign marks SEMO's fourth

year with Under Armour. Barke reached a multi-year agreement with the Baltimore-based global leader in performance footwear, apparel and equipment that made Under Armour the official outfitter of SEMO Athletics on July 1, 2018.

As part of the multi-year agreement, Under Armour provides on-field and training gear for 15 sports. Additionally, Under Armour outfits members of the athletic department including coaches and staff.

Barke also secured bids to host SEMO's first home football playoff games. Additionally, he helped the University reach a collaborative partnership with SoutheastHEALTH. Under the agreement, SoutheastHEALTH orthopedic and sports medicine physicians provide orthopedic, primary medical care, athletic training and physical therapy services, and invest in the University by providing diagnostic equipment and athletic training supplies, as well as scholarships for students.

More recently, new state-of-the-art Formetco digital video scoreboards were installed at both Houck Field and the Southeast Softball Complex under Barke's leadership.

A 4,000-square foot baseball training facility was completed prior to the 2020 season. The \$400,000 indoor facility can fit up to four batting cages.

Barke hired Brad Korn as the Redhawks head men's basketball coach on Mar. 24, 2020, while navigating through the challenging times during the COVID-19 pandemic. Korn was the fourth head coach Barke hired during his tenure as Director of Athletics.

During his first year in 2016-17, Barke introduced Andy Sawyers as the Redhawks head baseball coach and worked tirelessly on two major renovation projects.

Nearly a month after Sawyers was hired, Southeast Missouri State and the City of Cape Girardeau officially broke ground on Capaha Field. New synthetic turf, new fencing and a digital scoreboard in the outfield were added as part of the \$1.8 million project that was completed before SEMO's season-opener.

Gymnastics Coach Ashley orchestrated a big turnaround in SEMO women's gymnastics during her first three years as head coach.

Women's Tennis Coach Mary Beth Gunn was Barke's other hire.

Sawyers, Lawson and Gunn each claimed Coach of the Year honors in 2021. SEMO's baseball team won the OVC regular-season and tournament titles, and made the NCAA Tournament under Sawyers. The gymnastics team won the USA Gymnastics Women's Collegiate National Championship with Lawson at the helm. And, Gunn led the women's tennis team to its first OVC regular-season title in program history.

On Feb. 3, 2017, SEMO formally dedicated Holcomb Success

Center. To honor the long-time service and philanthropy of Dr. John and Judy Holcomb, the University named the facility the Holcomb Success Center located in the Student Recreation Center-South. Indoor turf, weights, equipment and lifting platforms were added as part of the renovation at a cost of \$500,000. The facility now has more space and equipment to handle SEMO's larger teams or multiple teams training at the same time. Barke helped secure the Holcombs gift, the largest single cash gift in SEMO Athletics history. Major improvements were also made to the second floor of the building where athletic academic services are housed. This space provides student-athletes with places to study and features a computer lab with 30 work terminals and rooms for group meetings. Staff members assist student-athletes with life skills development, academic advising and academic progress toward degree requirements and NCAA eligibility.

Additional renovations have been made to the nutrition area that serves as a fueling station for SEMO student-athletes at the Holcomb Success Center.

Fundraising continues to increase under Barke's direction.

The 2018-19 campaign marked the highest level of giving to the Redhawks Club general fund in 15 years.

Barke also worked with donors to establish two new endowed scholarships for student-athletes and raised over \$60,000 to support the SEMO football program and summer school scholarships.

More than \$250,000 in pledges for the Redhawks Club unrestricted booster fund has been raised with Barke as Director of Athletics.

Improved branding has been a priority. Redhawk banners, S-E! M-O! billboards, Welcome to Redhawk Country and Redhawks yard signs are prominently

displayed all over Cape Girardeau.

On July 1, 2020, SEMO unveiled refreshed spirit marks, including a new primary logo, wordmark and variations for its 15 athletic programs. The new brand identity will allow SEMO's athletic teams to display consistent logos, lettering and numerals, and is independent of the existing University marks.

A year later on July 1, 2021, SEMO partnered with Affinity Licensing to manage its trademark licensing program. As part of the agreement, Affinity Licensing will act as the exclusive agency to manage the University's consumer products licensing relationships with manufacturers and retailers.

Barke helped develop the Redhawks Trivia Night & Auction, a sold out event that generated over \$200,000 in net revenue over five years. In addition, he launched the Redhawks BRIDGE program which provides student-athletes with both leadership and life skills experiences through interactive programming that will prepare them to be successful in life after athletics.

Barke served as Interim Associate Director of Athletics for Compliance & Student Support Services before being named the Senior Associate to the President and Secretary to the Southeast Missouri State University Board of Regents in 2013.

He began his tenure at Southeast in 2008 as Assistant Director of Athletics for Compliance & Eligibility. Barke previously served as a governance intern with the NCAA national headquarters in Indianapolis, and as a law clerk with the Southern Illinois University-Carbondale Department of Athletics Compliance Office.

Barke has served as a member of the National Association of Athletics Compliance (NAAC), chaired the NAAC Education Committee, and was a member of the NAAC Board of Directors. He has facilitated the NCAA Regional Leadership Academy, and served on both the NCAA Sports Wagering Task Force and the Olympic Sports Liaison Committee.

Barke has a juris doctorate degree from Southern Illinois University School of Law, an MBA from Southeast Missouri State University, and a bachelor of science degree in biology from Webster University. While a student at Webster, Barke was a member of both the basketball and golf teams and was inducted into the Webster Athletic Hall of Fame.

He and his wife, Halley, are parents of three children, Mabrie, Jackson, and Kolbe.







2022 SOUTHEAST MISSOURI SOFTBALL GUIDE SEASON PREVIEW

The reigning back-to-back Ohio Valley Conference Champion Southeast Missouri softball team carries a lot of momentum into its upcoming 2022 campaign.

SEMO, this year's preseason OVC favorite, has its sights set on a three-peat, something that's been done only once in school history since the program turned Division I in 1991-92.

If there's any difference from last season to this year, it is that the Redhawks will field a much younger team under eighth-year Head Coach Mark Redburn this spring.

"We want to keep our expectations high due to all the recent success we've had in our program," said Redburn. "At the same time, we are a really young team. We still want to go out and win the OVC, conference tournament and even make it to an NCAA Regional. I look forward to seeing how this young squad comes together."

SEMO has a 22-member roster predominantly full of underclassmen, including nine sophomores and eight freshmen. The Redhawks also return five position starters and their top three pitchers from 2021.

In addition, SEMO has a pair of veteran fifth-year seniors back in OVC Pitcher of the Year Rachel Rook and outfielder Kaylee Anderson, the team's second-leading home run hitter.

"We're in a much better situation having both Rachel and Kaylee returning," said Redburn. "They are great leaders with a lot of experience. We are going to rely on them a lot. Overall, I'm really excited about our talent level. It's just a matter of how quickly we can put it all together."

SEMO secured 16 of the possible 20 first-place votes in this year's OVC Preseason Poll assembled by the league's Head Coaches and Communication Directors. Austin Peay, Murray

State, Eastern Illinois and UT Martin filled out the top five. SIU Edwardsville, Tennessee Tech, Belmont, Tennessee State and Morehead State completed the voting.

The Redhawks wrapped up their 2021 season with an overall record of 30-17 and topped the OVC with a 23-6 mark. Statistically, SEMO led the conference in on-base percentage (.369), opposing batting average (.213), strikeouts looking (69), saves (8), fewest hits allowed (247), fewest runs allowed (139) and fewest earned runs allowed (121). Additionally, the 23 OVC wins were a school record.

In the last two-plus seasons alone, SEMO compiled an overall record 121-60 and 55-18 in the OVC with Redburn at the helm, a two-time OVC Coach of the Year. Since 2019, the Redhawks won a pair of OVC regular-season titles, one conference tournament crown and advanced to one NCAA Tournament.

Here is an extensive look at this year's Redhawks:

Catcher

Marshall University transfer **Kat Sackett (Erie, Colo.)** looks to assume the starting role as SEMO's catcher in her first season with the Redhawks this spring.

Sackett is a shutdown catcher with a great arm and, according to Redburn, has all the potential to be one of the best arms behind the dish the Redhawks have had.

She started 19 of 24 games for Marshall as a freshman in 2021. Sackett hit .254 with seven runs, seven doubles, five home runs and 16 RBI.

Sophomore **Karsyn Davis (Harrisburg, Ill.)** will comple-



ment Sackett after playing in 36 games and making 27 starts at catcher last season.

Pena shared starting duties with Davis a year ago and is another possibility.

Meanwhile, freshmen **Tori Bradley (Blue Springs, Mo.)** and **Sydney Melton (Eddyville, Ky.)** stretch the depth at catcher.

Infield

Junior **Alyson Tucker (Farmington, Mo.)** and sophomore **Kynzie Wrigley (Mt. Zion, Ill.)** are the two returning starters on SEMO's infield.

Tucker is back at shortstop after starting 41 games there during her first season of Division I softball a year ago. She hit .289 with 17 runs, 28 hits, 12 RBI and three stolen bases. Tucker (.338) was one of nine Redhawks who hit over .300 in league play.

Wrigley, after spending a strong rookie season as SEMO's starting second baseman, moves to third this spring. She ranked third on the team with a .336 batting average as a true freshman. Wrigley added 20 runs scored, eight doubles, two home runs and 13 RBI in 34 starts.

At first base, SEMO has a huge hole to fill following the departure of its all-time career home run and RBI leader Ashley Ellis. Ellis will remain with the Redhawks as a volunteer assistant coach after her remarkable playing tenure.

True freshman **Aubrie Shore (Mahomet, Ill.)** is the leading candidate to take over at first base.

Shore was a First-Team All-Conference pick at Mahomet-Seymour High School, where



she hit .526 with 40 runs scored, 14 doubles, three triples, seven home runs and 27 RBI as a senior.

Fellow freshman **Kileigh Grisham (Eureka, Mo.)** has made good strides after redshirting last season. Grisham will also look to contribute after shifting from third to first.

Either sophomore **Abigail Rickermann (Festus, Mo.)** or freshman **Sydney Dennis (Eureka, Mo.)**, both left-handed hitters, will get the starting nod at second base.

Rickermann saw action in 35 games and made six starts as a freshman in 2021.

Dennis was an All-Conference and All-District honoree during all four of her prep seasons at Eureka High School.

Junior **Chelsy Pena (Columbia, Ill.)** is also in the mix and could see time at shortstop or third base.

Outfield

Another big loss for SEMO comes in center field, where the Redhawks are working to fill the void left by Rachel Anderson, arguably the greatest player in program history.

A four-time First-Team All-OVC pick and the league's Player of the Year in 2019, Anderson broke 11 different career records during her phenomenal career, where she never missed a start in 231 games.

Paige Halliwill (Mogadore, Ohio), a transfer from Marshall University, should settle nicely into that position.

Halliwill, who was teammates with Sackett, started all 33 games for the Thundering Herd last season. She hit .263 with 14 runs, four doubles, a team-high two triples, four home runs

and 15 RBI.

Halliwill will be between returning starters **Jillian Anderson (Rochester, Ill.)** and **Kaylee Anderson (Warrenton, Mo.)**.

J. Anderson started 43 games in left field and hit .268 with 22 runs scored, 11 doubles, one triple and 15 RBI en route to claiming OVC All-Newcomer Team accolades.

K. Anderson garnered OVC All-Tournament laurels last season. She hit .311 as one of five players hitting over .300.

Anderson led the team in runs scored (33) and ranked second in hits (42), home runs (14) and RBI through 47 games and 46 starts.

Returnees **Kelby Robinson (Wentzville, Mo.)** and **Kimmy Fleming (Park Hills, Mo.)**, and newcomer **Tatum Gerwitz (O'Fallon, Mo.)** are the rest of SEMO's outfielders.

Pitcher

SEMO was among the top two in the OVC in earned run average (2nd, 2.76), opposing batting average (1st, .213), strikeouts (2nd, 285), strikeouts looking (1st, 69), wins (2nd, 30) and saves (1st, 8). Redhawk pitchers gave up the fewest runs, earned runs and hits out of anyone in the league, as well.

Fifth-year senior **Rachel Rook (Republic, Mo.)** is back as SEMO's ace in the circle after a spectacular 2021 campaign which saw her become only the second Redhawk in program history to claim the coveted OVC Pitcher of the Year honor.

Also a First-Team All-OVC and Third-Team National Fastpitch Coaches Association (NFCA) All-Mideast Region selection, Rook went 20-9 with a 2.36 ERA

in 35 appearances and 28 starts. She tossed seven shutouts and 13 complete games to go along with a team-high four saves. Rook recorded 196 strikeouts in 163 innings and pinned opponents to a .191 batting average.

In conference play alone, Rook fashioned a 14-3 record and 1.53 ERA. She broke SEMO's all-time single-season record in strikeouts per seven innings (8.4) and led the OVC in wins, innings pitched, strikeouts, shutouts and opposing batting average.

Paytience Holman (Mexico, Mo.) and left-hander **Marisa Davis (Kansas City, Mo.)** are the Redhawks other two returning pitchers.

Holman put together a 7-7 record and 3.02 ERA as SEMO's number two starter in 2021. She appeared in 24 games and logged 18 starts, while ranking second behind Rook with 53 strikeouts in 92.2 innings.

Holman came on strong in OVC play, where she posted a 6-2 mark with four shutouts. She is currently out with an injury and could return as early as the conference season if not sooner.

Davis saw her innings increase significantly out of the bullpen a year ago. She compiled a 3-0 record with three saves and 30 strikeouts in 40 innings over 23 relief appearances.

Freshmen **Delaney Kell (Salem, Ill.)** and **Emma Rote (Broken Arrow, Okla.)** are the newest additions to SEMO's pitching staff, while **Kaylee Anderson (Warrenton, Mo.)** is another option if the need arises.

2022 Schedule

Southeast Missouri has 56 games scheduled, including 15 at the Southeast Softball Complex this upcoming 2022 season.

SEMO will play its first 26 contests outside of Cape Girardeau with trips to six different tournaments and a midweek visit to Southeastern Conference member Ole Miss (Mar. 2).

The Redhawks will participate in the Southeastern Louisiana (Feb. 11-13), Western Kentucky (Feb. 18-19), Arkansas (Feb. 25-27), Lipscomb (Mar. 4-6), Kansas (Mar. 11-13) and Kansas City (Mar. 15) tournaments.

SEMO also has five teams which made the NCAA Tournament a year ago on its 2022 slate. Those opponents are Western Kentucky (Feb. 19), Arkansas (Feb. 25, Feb. 26), Ole Miss (Mar. 2), Wichita State (Mar. 11) and Southern Illinois (Mar. 23, Mar. 30).

The Redhawks will play a 28-game OVC schedule which opens with a three-game home series vs. Tennessee State (Mar. 19-20). Morehead State (Apr. 2-3), Eastern Illinois (Apr. 9-10), UT Martin (DH, Apr. 7) and Belmont (May 7-8) also come to Cape Girardeau this season.

The road portion of SEMO's league schedule consists of trips to Tennessee Tech (Mar. 26-27), UT Martin (DH, Apr. 6), Austin Peay (Apr. 15-16), Murray State (Apr. 23-24) and SIU Edwardsville (Apr. 30-May 1).

Postseason play will begin with the OVC Tournament, May 11-14, in Oxford, Alabama. This year marks the sixth where the tournament will be held at Choccolocco Park in Oxford.

SEMO opens its season in Louisiana on Feb. 11-13.







MARK REDBURN

HEAD COACH

Mark Redburn enters his eighth year at Southeast Missouri which is coming off back-to-back Ohio Valley Conference regular-season titles and one OVC Tournament crown since 2019.

In the last two plus seasons, the Redhawks put together an overall record of 121-60 and 55-18 mark in OVC play. In seven years with Redburn at the helm, SEMO has produced one NFCA All-American, seven NFCA All-Region selections, 16 All-OVC picks, one OVC Player of the Year, one OVC Pitcher of the Year, one OVC Tournament Most Valuable Player and two CoSIDA Academic All-Americans.

Last year, Redburn guided the Redhawks to their third 30-win campaign in four seasons. SEMO finished 30-17 overall and registered a program

record 23 OVC wins en route to its second-straight regular-season conference title. The Redhawks headed into the OVC Tournament as the No. 1 seed and ended the year with a pair of one-run losses to Eastern Kentucky.

SEMO led the league in on-base percentage (.369), opposing batting average (.213), strikeouts looking (69), saves (8), fewest hits allowed (247), fewest runs allowed (139) and fewest earned runs allowed (121).

All of the Redhawks success during the 2021 campaign culminated with Redburn claiming his second-straight OVC Coach of the Year honor. Additionally, Rachel Rook was tabbed OVC Pitcher of the Year becoming only the second player in program history to win the coveted award.

Offensively, SEMO outscored its opponents by a +100 (165-65) margin in conference games. The Redhawks' 165 runs were the most scored by any OVC team in conference play.

The year before in 2020, SEMO was off to a great start and had all the makings for a big season, but a global COVID-19 pandemic abruptly shut things down only 17 games in.

The Redhawks won nine in a row and posted a 9-1 record in their first 10 games of the season. SEMO finished with an overall record of 12-5 and did not get a chance to play any OVC games when play was cancelled.

Although the 2020 season lasted just 23 days (Feb. 14-Mar. 8), the Redhawks accomplished a lot in a short amount of time.

SEMO led the OVC in slugging percentage (.528), on-base

percentage (.411), triples (14), stolen bases (41), hits allowed (84) and earned runs allowed (40). The Redhawks also rated second in the league in batting average (.310), home runs (19), opposing batting average (.204), runs allowed (51), stolen bases per game (2.4) and triples per game (0.8).

Nationally, SEMO was among the top 25 in triples per game (2nd), stolen bases per game (8th, 2.4), scoring (16th, 6.7), slugging percentage (21st) and on-base percentage (24th).

Individually, Rachel Anderson led the OVC in batting average (.480), slugging percentage (.880), on-base percentage (.541) and triples (5) following a season that culminated with her winning the league's Player of the Year honor. Anderson, who didn't strike out all year, capped her 2020 campaign as

only the sixth player in program history to claim First-Team CoSIDA Academic All-America accolades.

Pitcher Rachel Rook was atop the OVC in earned run average (0.70) and opposing batting average (.119), while Ashley Ellis ended the year as the league's leader in home runs (8).

Redburn guided SEMO to its first OVC regular-season and tournament championship, and NCAA Regional appearance in 20 years the year before that in 2019.

What a year 2019 was for SEMO which set an all-time program record with 46 wins, the only 40-win season in the school's entire NCAA Division I era. The Redhawks went 46-18 overall and 17-5 in the OVC before going 1-2 at the NCAA Regional in Oxford, Mississippi.

SEMO had so much to celebrate over the course of its magical 2019 campaign.

Redburn and his staff were honored as the National Fastpitch Coaches Association (NFCA) Mideast Region Coaching Staff of the Year. For Redburn himself, he was voted OVC Coach of the Year for the first time in his career.

Four players earned All-OVC honors, three claimed NFCA All-Region accolades and one garnered NFCA All-America distinction. Outfielder Rachel Anderson became SEMO's first All-American in 28 years and the program's first All-American in the NCAA Division I tenure. TEAM 43 was also recognized by the NFCA for achieving the fourth highest grade point average among all NCAA Division I schools. SEMO

recorded a team GPA of 3.678 with 17 players securing NFCA All-America Scholar-Athlete honors.

Redburn certainly has the Redhawks trending in the right direction as his teams averaged nearly 40 wins (39.5) in the last two seasons alone. SEMO put together a 79-38 (.678) record and went 32-12 (.727) in conference play over that span.

Statistically, SEMO's 2019 team broke a total of 17 single-season records in slugging percentage (.510), on-base percentage (.382), game played (64), runs (363), hits (501), home runs (74), RBI (318), total bases (850), walks (180), stolen bases (89), stolen base attempts (117), wins (46), saves (11), batters struck out (331), batters struck out looking (90), innings pitched (414) and putouts (1242).

In 19 years as an NCAA Division I head coach, Division I assistant coach and National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) head coach, Redburn has made 13 postseason appearances which include one NCAA Women's College World Series, two NCAA Super-Regionals, four NCAA Regionals and two NJCAA National Tournaments.

In 2018, the Redhawks finished at 33-20 overall and fourth in the OVC with a 15-7 mark. SEMO locked down its first winning campaign in seven years.

The Redhawks heated up to win 11 of their final 14 regular-season games and advanced to the eight-team OVC Tournament.

SEMO's 2018 club finished with a 74 RPI among the nation's

296 NCAA Division I softball teams, quite a jump from its 173 ranking in 2017. The Redhawks collected eight doubleheader sweeps along the way.

Defensively, SEMO improved tremendously. After ranking eighth in the OVC in fielding percentage a year ago, the Redhawks were the league's second-best fielding team in 2018. SEMO had 43 errors and committed 16 less than it did in 2017. The Redhawks went error free in 25 games equating to 47 percent of their entire season.

The year before that, SEMO finished the 2017 campaign among the school's top single-season leaders in slugging percentage (6th, .427), on-base percentage (5th, .356), triples (4th, 21), home runs (9th, 31), total bases (9th, 567), stolen bases (2nd, 65), stolen base attempts (1st, 88), opponent batting average (7th, .282), strikeouts/7 innings (7th, 4.17), strikeouts looking (3rd, 61) fewest doubles allowed (8th, 49), fielding percentage (8th, .960), fewest errors (7th, 59) and fewest stolen bases against (3rd, 38).

Redburn picked up his 200th career victory when SEMO beat Austin Peay, 7-4, on Apr. 30, 2016. His 2016 club

ranked among the school's top-10 teams in doubles (6th, 69), stolen bases (3rd, 58), walks (8th, 138), home runs (6th, 35) and slugging percentage (6th, .412).

In his first season, Redburn led the Redhawks to an overall record of 19-27 and 12-12 in OVC play during 2015. His 19 victories came after SEMO won no more than 15 games in each of the previous two seasons. Redburn's first club at Southeast also had 12 OVC wins, a +9 increase from the 2014 campaign. In addition, the Redhawks made the OVC Tournament, snapping a streak of three years where they missed the event.

Not only did Redburn earn his 100th career NCAA Division I win in his inaugural season with the Redhawks, but he coached three All-OVC selections and one NFCA All-Region honoree.

Statistically, SEMO finished among the top-five OVC teams in batting average (3rd), slugging percentage (5th), on-base percentage (5th) and hits (5th). The 2015 Redhawks also broke two single-season records with Kayla Fortner in home runs and single-game mark and set a single-game school record with six home runs, as well.

Academically, the Redhawks accumulated a 3.35 grade point average during the 2014-15 academic year as a total of nine players earned NFCA All-America Scholar-Athlete status for achieving a 3.5 or higher GPA.

Redburn coached a total of four first-team All-OVC selections, three second-

team All-OVC picks, one OVC Freshman of the Year, three NFCA All-Region honorees and three OVC All-Newcomer selections in his first four years as SEMO's head coach.

The fourth head coach in Redhawk softball history, Redburn won 90 games in five years as head coach at the University of Evansville before accepting the job at Southeast on June 26, 2014.

In 2014, Redburn coached a UE team with five starters that were underclassmen, including four freshmen and one sophomore. The Purple Aces achieved their highest batting average since 2007. Additionally, UE had a freshman lead the team in stolen bases and home runs.

Despite a season that allowed 53 games, the 2013 team had its best season in Redburn's five years at UE. Entering the Missouri Valley Conference Tournament as the No. 7 seed, the Purple Aces beat the No. 6, No. 3 and No. 2 seeds to make their first MVC Championship appearance since 2003. UE finished second with three players garnering All-Tournament team honors.

The 2013 campaign resulted in the most overall wins in a season since 2008 and the best regular-season and conference tournament finish since Redburn's arrival. UE continued its aggressive baserunning with 89 stolen bases, ranking second in the MVC. The pitching staff also rated fourth in the conference.

Redburn's 2012 club saw improvement as well, winning

more games than it had the previous season. The Purple Aces stole 79 bases and had two all-conference and one National Fastpitch Coaches Association All-Region selection that year.

In 2011, Redburn exposed a young and inexperienced team to some of the top programs in the nation as UE played one of its most difficult schedules. Tennessee, Georgia Tech, Missouri, Ohio State, Texas Tech, South Alabama and Chattanooga were among the stiff competition.

Redburn quickly started to transform the UE program during his first year in 2010. The Purple Aces secured a berth in the MVC Tournament after winning 10 conference games. UE led the MVC with 31 doubles and hit 36 home runs, while producing two all-conference picks.

Academically, Redburn's teams consistently enjoyed success. In fact, each of his last four UE teams accumulated a 3.1 or higher grade point average. He had several student-athletes obtain over a 3.5 GPA and earn academic recognition along the way.

Prior to UE, Redburn spent three years as an assistant coach at the University of Missouri working primarily with the pitchers and catchers, and serving as recruiting coordinator.

He was part of a coaching staff that compiled an overall record of 137-53. The Tigers registered a school record for victories (50), won the Big 12 Conference Tournament, won their Regional and defeated host

UCLA in the Super Regional to advance to the College World Series in 2009. Overall, Redburn coached four all-conference pitchers, including USA National Team Pitcher Chelsea Thomas at Missouri.

Redburn began his collegiate coaching career as head coach at St. Charles (Mo.) Community College from 2001-04. He led the 2003 team to its first Region 16 championship and a seventh-place finish at the National Junior College Athletic Association Division I National Tournament. His 2004 squad set a school record with 33 victories.

Following his stay at St. Charles CC, Redburn spent two seasons as head coach of the new softball program at Jefferson College. In the program's first year of competition, 2006, he led Jefferson to a 49-16 record, Region 16 championship and ninth-place finish at the NJCAA Division I National Tournament. Redburn was honored as the Midwest Community College Athletic Conference Coach of the Year following that season.

A native of St. Charles, Missouri, Redburn graduated from the University of Missouri-St. Louis in 1993 and received his master's degree in Athletics/Activities Administration from William Woods University.

He and his wife, Tracy, have two sons, Joe and Jack.

The 2022 campaign marks the seventh season at Southeast Missouri for assistant coach Kristen Jones.

Jones works primarily with the catchers and handles the team's travel logistics, as well as overseeing the team's academics, compliance and recruiting efforts.

The 2019 National Fastpitch Coaches Association (NFCA) Division I Mideast Regional Coaching Staff of the Year, which has posted 144 wins over the last five years, led the Redhawks to a program record 46 wins in 2019. That season marked just the second 40-win season in program history and capped the most successful four-year stint since the 1998-2001 teams won a combined 125 games over a four-year stretch.

In 2018, catcher Abby Tillotson earned All-OVC honors under Jones' tutelage. Tillotson batted .287 with seven homers and 24 runs scored. In the field, Tillotson recorded 157 putouts and eight assists with no errors.

The Redhawks eclipsed the 30-win mark for the first time in seven seasons in 2018, collecting the most wins since the 1998 team won 38 games and improving their win total by 10. SEMO used 15 OVC wins to advance to the

OVC Tournament for the first time since 2015.


In Jones' second season (2017), the Redhawks won 23 games, showing a +7 improvement in wins from the previous season after helping SEMO to a 16-33 record, including a 10-17 mark in OVC play in her first season with head coach Mark Redburn and the Redhawks.

Prior to coming to Cape Girardeau, Jones worked as the Coordinator of New Media and Championships for the Peach Belt Conference located in Augusta, Georgia.

Jones first joined the Peach Belt Conference as a New Media & Programming Intern, a position she held from January 2012-June 2014. She then moved to full-time status in July 2014.

She received her bachelor's degree in kinesiology at Augusta State University in 2012 and then earned her master's degree in 2014.

Jones enjoyed a successful playing career at Augusta State, garnering National Fastpitch Coaches Association (NFCA) Second-Team All America and NFCA & Daktronics First Team All-South Region honors in 2011. In addition, Jones was a two-time First-Team All Peach Belt Conference selection (2010, 2011).

Guemmer, who worked primarily with the outfielders and was the camp director of the Pete D'Amour softball camps, was instrumental in Virginia Tech winning an ACC regular-season title and Coastal Division crown. It was Tech's first-ever time winning the Coastal and just its second time being regular-season champs.

His outfield unit led the charge at the plate for Tech, with all three players hitting over .330 and collecting more than 50 hits. Leading the crew was left fielder Emma Strouth, who broke two school records with 68 RBI and 50 runs scored, while right fielder Al Velazquez tied Strouth with a school-record 50 runs scored herself.

Center fielder Darby Trull led the team with a .406 batting average, the fourth highest in the ACC. Trull and Strouth would earn two major awards together, claiming All-America honors from Softball America and

First-Team NFCA All-Region (Mid-Atlantic). Strouth also picked up First-Team All-ACC honors.

Before his time at Virginia Tech, Guemmer was the head coach of the girls' softball team at De Soto High School. Guemmer led the Dragons to a MSHSAA 3A state championship and a 25-4 record in his first year on the job. The team owned a .351 batting average and 1.41 ERA, respectively, as well.

Prior to the stint at his alma mater, Guemmer worked as an assistant coach at Mineral Area in Park Hills, Missouri, a two-year junior college, for four years. He helped mold four NJCAA All-Americans and four NJCAA Academic All-Americans. The Cardinals earned two trips to the NJCAA World Series Qualifier in 2009 and 2011.

Guemmer graduated from the University of Missouri in 2013 and while in Columbia served as a student manager for two years.

OVC HISTORY

Now in its 74th year, the Ohio Valley Conference continues to build on the success that has made it the nation's eighth-oldest NCAA Division I conference.

Beth DeBauche was named the seventh full-time Commissioner in league history on July 28, 2009. The last three commissioners of the OVC have moved onto jobs as the commissioner of the Big Ten, Big 12 and the Mid-American Conferences.

The OVC's proud history dates back to 1948, but seeds for the new league were actually planted in 1941. It was then that Roy Stewart, the athletics director at Murray State, Charles "Turkey" Hughes, the athletics director at Eastern Kentucky, and Kelly Thompson, the public relations director at Western Kentucky, first broached the idea of forming a new conference. Discussions were put on hold by World War II, but reemerged February 27-28, 1948 at the Kentucky Hotel in Louisville as the three original institutions combined with Morehead State, Louisville and Evansville to form the OVC.

In the 1950s, the OVC became a pioneer on a much more significant scale socially. During times of racial segregation, league member Morehead State became one of the first non-traditionally black mid-southern institutions to accept a black student. In 1958 Marshall Banks earned athletically-related aid at Morehead, which signed a second black athlete, Howard Murphy, a year later. In 1961 Murphy earned all-conference recognition as a halfback in football. With racial barriers broken, the rest of the institutions in the league began to provide educational and athletic opportunities to African-Americans.

After Title IX legislation passed in 1972, women's athletics began

a rebirth on the national scene as the NCAA began sponsoring and marketing women's sports. Recognizing the need to provide increased opportunities for female athletes, the OVC began formulating plans for women's athletics in 1975 and established women's championships in the sports of basketball, tennis and track in 1977, with cross country and volleyball added over the next four years. Those sports were initially governed by the Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (AIAW), but the overall strength of women's programs in the league was demonstrated by the automatic bids the OVC instantly received when the NCAA became the governing body in 1982. The conference added women's golf and softball in 1994 and women's soccer in 1998.

Through the past 73 years, 15 teams have won or shared the league's football title. The list is led by former member Eastern Kentucky, winner of 21 outright or shared football crowns. Former member Middle Tennessee is next with 11 titles and followed by Tennessee Tech with 10, former member Jacksonville State with nine and Murray State and former member Western Kentucky with eight apiece. Eastern Illinois has seven crowns while Austin Peay, Morehead State, Southeast Missouri, Tennessee State and former members Evansville and East Tennessee State have captured two apiece. UT Martin and former member Youngstown State have one title apiece.

Murray State and Evansville tied for the initial football championship, and the Racers participated in the first-ever bowl game by an OVC team, tying Sul Ross State 21-21 in the 1948 Tangerine Bowl. From 1948 to 1975, OVC teams played in 15

bowl games, winning eight of them. Eastern Kentucky and Western Kentucky were also participants in the NCAA Division II playoffs in the early and mid-1970s prior to the NCAA's reclassification of football programs into Division I-AA. The term "I-AA" lasted until the end of the 2006 season when it was changed to Division I Football Championship Subdivision (FCS).

The first Division I-AA/FCS football playoff was held in 1978 with only four teams, which is the only year through present day that the OVC did not field a playoff representative. In 1979, four of the nation's top teams were invited to the playoffs, and two of them - Eastern Kentucky and Murray State - were from the OVC. Murray dropped its semifinal game to Lehigh, but the Colonels nipped Nevada-Reno in double overtime and claimed the national championship a week later with a 30-7 victory over Lehigh. EKU was coached by former All-America quarterback Roy Kidd, who was in his 16th year at the helm of his alma mater and who skippered the Colonels to a second national title three years later. Following the 2002 season, Kidd retired after 39 years at EKU; upon retirement, he ranked sixth all-time among Division I coaches with 315 victories, earning him a spot in the College Football Hall of Fame.

In addition to Kidd, other coaching legends in the OVC include Charles "Bubber" Murphy, who coached at Middle Tennessee from 1947-1968, Western Kentucky's Jimmy Feix (1968-83), Wilburn Tucker (1954-67) and Don Wade (1968-82) of Tennessee Tech, Bill Ferguson (1967-77) of Murray State, Guy Penny (1959-67) of Morehead State and Boots Donnelly (1977-78 at Austin Peay; 1979-1998 at Middle Tennessee). Following the 2011

season Eastern Illinois head coach Bob Spoo retired after 25 years at the school (the last 16 as members of the OVC). In his time as an OVC coach he compiled 92 total victories (fifth-most in league history) and 68 OVC wins (fourth-most in league history) and was inducted into the OVC Hall of Fame in 2012. In 2016 former Murray State head coach Frank Beamer (1981-86) was inducted into the OVC Hall of Fame; he introduced his wide tackle six defense to the OVC and compiled a 43-23-2 record with the Racers before leaving for his alma mater Virginia Tech where he won 280 games in 29 seasons.

A sampling of former OVC football stars, some of whom were All-Americans during their collegiate careers before achieving stardom at the professional ranks, include Jim Youngblood and Larry Schreiber (Tennessee Tech), Phil Simms (Morehead State), Virgil Livers and Dale Lindsey (Western Kentucky), Myron Guyton and Chad Bratzke (Eastern Kentucky), Cortland Finnegan (Samford) and Tony Romo and Jimmy Garoppolo (Eastern Illinois). In 2008, former Tennessee State standout Dominique Rodgers-Cromartie became just the fourth NFL First Round draft pick in OVC history when he was selected 16th overall by the Arizona Cardinals. He would break into the starting lineup halfway through his rookie season and started at cornerback for the Cardinals in Super Bowl XLIII.

The 2007 season marked a return to scholarship football and the OVC for the Austin Peay Governors. Following the 1996 season the Governors dropped scholarship football and competed as both an independent (1997-00, 2006) and as a member of the Pioneer Football League (2001-05).

The 2007 season also brought



new vernacular to the Ohio Valley Conference and the division formerly known as I-AA. Beginning with the 2006 National Championship game the term I-AA was changed to NCAA Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) in a decision by the Division I Board of Directors. The new label was chosen to communicate in a positive and clear manner the unique differences between Division I football categories (chiefly, the post-season opportunity) while still defining them within the Division I experience. The FCS includes programs that compete in an effort to participate in the NCAA championship postseason structure (one of 90 NCAA national championships) as opposed to the Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) which competes in an effort to participate in the postseason bowl system (the 40 NCAA-licensed events which includes the College Football Playoff).

In 2010 Southeast Missouri State, picked to finish seventh in the preseason poll, compiled a 7-1 Conference record on the way to its first OVC Championship since joining the league in 1991. Overall the Redhawks were 9-2 during the regular season and earned a berth in the FCS Playoffs, its first playoff berth at any level in the program's 104-year history. Southeast would lose to eventual national champion Eastern Washington in the second round of the playoffs. Head coach Tony Samuel capped the year by winning the Sports Network's Eddie Robinson Award, given to the National Coach of the Year. Samuel was the second OVC coach to win the award (joining Murray State's Houston Nutt who won the award in 1995).

In 2012 Eastern Illinois became just the fourth football team in OVC history to go from worst-to-first in

winning the OVC Championship. The Panthers were led by head coach Dino Babers who became just the fourth first-year head coach to win an OVC Championship (joining Boots Donnelly in 1977, Jason Simpson in 2006 and Dean Hood in 2008 - two others have since joined the group). During the year Eastern Illinois junior wide receiver Erik Lora shattered the FCS single-season receptions record, hauling in 136 passes in 12 games; that mark was 13 more than the previous NCAA record and 44 more than the previous OVC mark.

In 2013 Eastern Illinois repeated as OVC Champions behind Walter Payton Award winner Jimmy Garoppolo. The quarterback became just the second OVC player to earn the National Player of the Year Award, joining former EIU signal caller Tony Romo (2002). Garoppolo passed for 5,050 yards (second most in NCAA single-season history) and 53 touchdowns (fourth in NCAA history) in leading the Panthers to a 12-2 record and berth to the quarterfinals of the FCS Playoffs.

Garoppolo was drafted by the New England Patriots in the second round of the 2014 NFL Draft, becoming just the fifth OVC player selected in that round and just the fifth OVC quarterback ever selected (and first since 1998). Garoppolo was a part of Patriots teams that won Super Bowls in 2015 and 2017. In 2020 Garoppolo became just the eighth quarterback who played in the FCS (which began in 1978), to start a Super Bowl, taking the snaps for the San Francisco 49ers in Super Bowl LIV against the Kansas City Chiefs. The Chiefs would win, preventing Garoppolo from becoming only the fourth FCS quarterback to start and win a Super Bowl.

The 2013 season saw the OVC

snap a 19-game playoff losing streak dating back to the 2000 season. Tennessee State shutout Butler (marking the first OVC road playoff victory since 1986) to snap the streak while later that day Jacksonville State smashed Samford in the first round. A week later Eastern Illinois beat Tennessee State while Jacksonville State won at McNeese State to each advance to the quarterfinals; that marked the first time the OVC put two teams in the quarterfinals in the same season since 1991.

In 2015 Jacksonville State ascended to No. 1 in both major Top 25 polls, becoming the first OVC team to be ranked No. 1 since the 1999 season. The Gamecocks would go on to complete its second-straight 8-0 Conference mark and won three playoff games to become the first OVC team to advance to the Division I National Championship Game since 1982 (Eastern Kentucky). JSU lost to North Dakota State in the title game but finished the year 13-2 overall and ranked No. 2 in the final Top 25 polls. Head coach John Grass became the first OVC coach honored as the AFCA National Coach of the Year while quarterback Eli Jenkins was named the FCS ADA National Quarterback of the Year, finishing the year with 2,788 passing and 1,161 rushing yards (one of just three Division I quarterbacks - FBS or FCS - to achieve those numbers during the year).

Jenkins would conclude his career in 2016 with 3,796 rushing yards, the seventh-most ever by a FCS quarterback. Jenkins, who was named OVC Male Athlete of the Year in back-to-back seasons, capped his career with 11,448 yards of total offense, second-most in OVC history (behind only Garoppolo).

In 2017, Jacksonville State senior

defensive end Darius Jackson became the first OVC player to win the Buck Buchanan Award, given to the FCS National Defensive Player of the Year. Jackson tallied 51 tackles, 19.0 tackles-for-loss, 7.0 sacks, 19 quarterback hurries, 3 forced fumbles and 2 fumbles recoveries in 11 regular season games

2017 also saw the third OVC coach named the winner of the Eddie Robinson Award as the FCS National Coach of the Year. The honor went to Austin Peay second-year coach Will Healy who orchestrated a tremendous turnaround for the Govs program. After going 0-11 during his initial season and starting 2017 with back-to-back losses to FBS opponents, the team's losing streak had reached 29 games and overall the team had won just one of its previous 48 games overall. But a win during week three catapulted the team to an 8-4 record and 7-1 OVC record and second-place league finish. The eight wins matched the school record, while the seven Conference wins established a new school record. Along the way the team snapped a 21-game OVC losing streak and a 45-game road losing streak and finished the year with four road victories, which was more than the program won in the previous nine years combined.

The OVC made it back-to-back Buck Buchanan Award winners in 2018, as Southeast Missouri junior linebacker Zach Hall took home the prestigious award. He finished the season with 168 tackles, the most of any FCS player and a new Southeast Missouri single-season record, while leading his team to just in second-ever playoff appearance.

In 2019, Austin Peay won a school record 11 games, claimed its first OVC Championship since

1977 and appeared in its first-ever FCS Playoffs, advancing to the quarterfinals. The Govs would finish the year ranked No. 8 in the national polls.

The 2020 Conference season was unprecedented in nature, as the COVID-19 pandemic postponed it until the spring, with teams playing a seven-game Conference schedule from February through April.

Football was not the only sport in which the OVC was quickly gaining respect. In 1955, the OVC became only the second six-member league nationally to earn an automatic bid to the prestigious NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament, which, at that time, was limited to only 24 participants. The Conference quickly proved worthy of that bid, as Morehead State defeated Marshall (107-92) and Wayne State (95-84) in the 1956 tournament.

Fifteen years later, former OVC member Western Kentucky became the first and only Conference team to reach the Final Four. The Hilltoppers defeated Jacksonville, Kentucky and Ohio State before losing to Villanova in double overtime in the national semifinals. WKU went on to finish in third place after beating Kansas 77-75 in the consolation game.

Since that time, the OVC has recorded some of the biggest upsets in the history of the NCAA Tournament. Perhaps the most famous moment came in 1987, when Austin Peay came from fourth place in the regular season to win the OVC Tournament and earn the league's automatic bid. The Governors drew powerful Illinois, and were such big underdogs, that ESPN broadcaster Dick Vitale promised to stand on his head if APSU won the game. After a 68-67 victory over the Illini, and a narrow 90-87 overtime loss to eventual Final Four participant Providence

in the second round, Vitale made good on his promise in a visit to Clarksville two months later.

Murray State added to the OVC's string of upsets in 1988 when it knocked off 14th-ranked North Carolina State, 78-75. The Racers' M&M Boys - Jeff Martin and Don Mann - combined for 39 points in the win. MSU nearly went on to the Sweet 16 that year, losing to eventual national champion Kansas, 61-58. A bank shot by Mann that would've given the Racers a one-point lead rolled off the rim with three seconds left. In 1990 as a No. 16 seed, Murray State took No. 1 seed Michigan State into overtime before falling 75-71. More recently, Murray State has dominated the OVC Tournament, reaching the championship game every year in the 1990's. The Racers' 17 OVC Tournament Championships are the most among all OVC schools.

After former member Middle Tennessee State won a first round game in 1989, the league had a drought as no other OVC team won a NCAA Tournament game for the next 19 years. But Morehead State, coming off a thrilling double overtime OVC Tournament victory over Austin Peay, topped Alabama State 58-43 in the 2009 Opening Round game at University of Dayton Arena in Dayton, Ohio. The game was played in front of an Opening Round record crowd of 11,346 and included many MSU fans who made the three-hour drive from Morehead for the game.

In 2009-10, Murray State made OVC history by winning a record 31 games (31-5) on its way to the league's regular season and tournament championships. In the first round of the NCAA Tournament, the No. 13 seed Racers topped Vanderbilt in thrilling fashion when senior Danero Thomas hit a jumper as time expired to lift

MSU to a 66-65 victory. It marked the first OVC team to advance to the second round of the NCAA Tournament since 1989 and snapped a skid of 71-straight losses to Southeastern Conference foes (dating back to 2000-01). In the second round, the Racers pushed eventual national runner-up Butler to the brink before losing 54-52.

In 2010-11 Morehead State would make it three NCAA Tournament wins in as many years for the league and got a bit of revenge for the 2009 tournament loss to Louisville in the process. After finishing second in the regular season and winning the OVC Tournament Championship, the No. 13 seeded Eagles were shipped to Denver to play the in-state foe Cardinals. MSU jumped out to a 15-2 advantage but were down four points (61-57) with just over a minute to play in regulation. After two free throws from two-time OVC Player of the Year Kenneth Faried, the Eagles held for one final shot attempt and senior Demonte Harper pulled up off a cross-over dribble to nail a 3-pointer with 4.3 seconds left that gave Morehead State a 62-61 lead. UofL had one last attempt but Faried blocked the Cardinals last shot, giving MSU the win, its first over Louisville since the 1956-57 season.

In 2011-12 Murray State put together one of the greatest seasons in OVC history, beginning the year 23-0 (an all-time OVC best) and being ranked as high as No. 7 in the coaches poll on Feb. 6. The squad was the first OVC team to be nationally-ranked since Murray State was ranked in 1997-98; in addition, the top 10 ranking was the first for an OVC team since the 1970-71 campaign (WKU). The Racers would top nationally-ranked Memphis and Saint Mary's during the season and win the league's

regular season and tournament championships. MSU earned a No. 6 seed in NCAA Tournament, the highest-ever seed for an OVC team since the NCAA began seeding the field in 1979. The Racers would top Colorado State 58-41 in the second round before falling to Marquette in the third round. Murray State would win 31 games overall, tying the OVC all-time record the Racers set in 2009-10.

After the Murray State win in 2011-12, the league had won NCAA Tournament games in four-straight seasons, something that had never happened in league history (three-game winning streaks from 1960-62 and 1987-89 had been the previous best streaks). Over that time period (2009-12) the OVC was one of just nine conferences nationally to win a NCAA Tournament game in each season and one of only three non-BCS leagues (joining the Atlantic 10 and WCC) to do so.

In 2013-14 Murray State won five games to claim the Collegen Insider.com Postseason Tournament (CIT) and in the process became the first OVC men's basketball team to ever play games in the month of April.

The 2014-15 season saw five OVC men's basketball teams earn postseason bids, the most in league history, and a year later (2015-16) that number was eclipsed with six teams making national postseason tournaments.

For just the second time in league history (the other being 1987), the OVC placed two teams in the NCAA Tournament in 2019, as Murray State won the OVC Tournament crown for the second-straight season and Belmont earned an at-large bid after going 26-5 overall (16-2 OVC) with a NET ranking of 47. As a No. 11 seed, Belmont would top Temple in the Opening Round in Dayton (its first-ever NCAA Tournament victory)



before narrowly falling to Maryland in the next round, while No. 12 seed Murray State crushed Marquette 83-64 in the first round (the second-biggest margin of victory ever by a 12 seed over a No. 5 seed in tournament history) before losing to Florida State. It marked the first time since 1971 that the OVC had two wins in the same NCAA Tournament and marked the first time two different OVC teams won a tournament game in the same year.

In 2007-08, UT Martin guard Lester Hudson became the first men's Division I player to record a quadruple-double in a game, when he registered 25 points, 12 rebounds, 10 assists and 10 steals in a victory over Central Baptist College. Hudson, who ranked fourth in scoring nationally as a junior, returned for his senior season in 2008-09 and was second nationally in scoring (behind Davidson's Stephen Curry) at 27.5 points a contest. Hudson earned numerous honors (including OVC Player of the Year and OVC Male Athlete of the Year in each 2008 and 2009 and All-American status from several outlets) before being drafted by the Boston Celtics with the No. 58 pick of the 2009 NBA Draft.

During the 2010-11 year, Faried, the nation's leading rebounder during the season, became the NCAA's Modern Era (since 1973) career rebounding leader, totaling 1,673 rebounds which passed Tim Duncan for the record (he is 11th all-time in NCAA history). Faried also finished his career with 86 double-doubles, second all-time to only Duncan. He is one of only six players in NCAA history to finish with 2,000-plus career points (2,009) and 1,600-plus career rebounds. Faried was drafted 22nd overall by the Denver Nuggets in the 2011 NBA Draft, becoming the first OVC player selected in the

first round since Tennessee State's Carlos Rogers 1994.

Murray State guard Isaiah Canaan, a first-team All-American in 2011-12, capped his illustrious career in 2012-13 by becoming just the 17th player in OVC history to score 2,000 or more career points. Canaan, who was a key part of Murray State NCAA Tournament victories in both 2010 and 2012, earned a pair of OVC Player of the Year honors (2012 and 2013) during his career as well as being named OVC Freshman of the Year (2010), OVC Tournament MVP (2010) and OVC Male Athlete of the Year (2012). He was drafted by the Houston Rockets with the 34th overall pick (No. 2 pick of the second round) of the 2013 NBA Draft.

In 2014-15 Murray State became just the fifth OVC men's team to complete a perfect Conference season (16-0). The Racers were led by sophomore Cameron Payne who was named OVC Men's Basketball Player of the Year, OVC Male Athlete of the Year and earned third-team All-American honors from CBSSports.com. Following the season Payne declared for the NBA Draft, becoming the first sophomore in OVC history to do so and one of just four OVC players all-time to enter and stay in the draft with eligibility remaining. Payne was selected in the lottery by the Oklahoma City Thunder (pick No. 14 overall), making him just the ninth First Round NBA Draft pick in OVC history.

Austin Peay made history in winning the 2016 OVC Men's Basketball Tournament as the Governors became the first No. 8 seed to claim the championship. APSU had to win its final two regular season games just to qualify for the event and then won four games in four days to capture its fifth tournament crown. Along the

way the Govs topped a No. 5 seed, No. 4 seed, No. 1 seed and No. 2 seed and were paced by MVP Chris Horton who averaged 22.5 points, 14.0 rebounds and 3.5 assists/game during the event including a 37-point, 21-rebound and 30-point, 16-rebound performance during the run.

In 2016, former Belmont All-American and 2012-13 OVC Co-Player of the Year Ian Clark became the first former OVC player to advance to the NBA Finals since former Tennessee State star Anthony Mason played for the New York Knicks in 1994. Clark was part of a Golden State Warriors team that won an NBA record 73 regular season games but lost in Game 7 of the Finals. A year later, Clark was part of the Warriors team that topped Cleveland to win the 2017 NBA Championship, becoming the first OVC player to win the crown since 1970-71 (Murray State's Dick Cunningham and Western Kentucky's Greg Smith with the Milwaukee Bucks).

Murray State guard Ja Morant put together arguably the greatest season in League history in 2018-19, earning first-team consensus All-American honors (only the third player in OVC history to achieve that feat joining WKU's Clem Haskins in 1967 and WKU's Jim McDaniels in 1971) while becoming the first player since the NCAA began officially tracking assists (1983-84) to average 20-plus points (24.5) and 10-plus assists (10.0) in the same season. Morant, who won the Bob Cousy Award as the nation's top point guard, finished the year with 331 assists, the sixth-most in NCAA single-season history. During the year he had three triple-doubles (including just the ninth in NCAA Tournament history) and became the first Division I player in 20 years to record 40

points, 11 assists and five steals in a regulation game.

Morant was picked No. 2 overall by the Memphis Grizzlies in the 2019 NBA Draft, equaling the highest-ever draft pick in OVC history (tied with Eastern Kentucky's Jim Baechtold who went No. 2 in 1952). Overall he was just the third NBA Lottery Pick (which began in 1985) in OVC history. Belmont senior Dylan Windler was selected by the Cleveland Cavaliers No. 26 overall in the 2019 NBA Draft, giving the OVC two First Round picks in the same draft for only the second time in history (Western Kentucky's Tom Marshall and Jack Turner were selected with the seventh and eighth picks of the First Round in 1954). Overall Morant and Windler were the 10th and 11th players in OVC history to be First Round NBA Draft Picks.

Morant was named the 2019-20 NBA Rookie of the Year after averaging 17.8 points, 7.3 assists, 3.9 rebounds and 0.9 steals per game in 67 contests. He hit 47.7 percent from the free throw line in leading the Grizzlies to more wins and a ninth place finish in the Western Conference (after the team finished 12th the previous year). Dating back to 1983-84, he is one of just three players to attend a non-Power 5 college to win the award, joining Damian Lillard of Weber State (2012-13) and Larry Johnson of UNLV (1991-92).

During the 2020-21 season, Austin Peay's Terry Taylor became just the fifth player in OVC history with 2,000 career points and 1,000 career rebounds. In addition, Taylor is the only player in OVC history to rank in the Top 10 in both career scoring and career rebounding. Taylor was named OVC Player of the Week 17 times during his career, establishing an OVC record.

Through its 73 years, 13 teams have won or shared the league's regular season men's basketball title. Murray State heads the list with a Conference-record 27 outright or shared basketball crowns. Other past champions include former member Western Kentucky (19), Morehead State (9), Austin Peay (8), Tennessee Tech (7), Belmont (7), former member Eastern Kentucky (6), former member Middle Tennessee (5), Tennessee State (2), former member East Tennessee State (2), Southeast Missouri State (1), UT Martin (1) and former member Akron (1).

Among the coaching greats in men's basketball have been Western Kentucky's E.A. Diddle, who retired with 759 victories and 10 OVC titles; John Oldham, who was a member of the very first All-OVC squad and went on to win seven OVC crowns during his coaching tenure at Tennessee Tech and Western Kentucky; Paul McBrayer, who guided Eastern Kentucky to 219 wins and three OVC crowns; and Cal Luther, who is the only person in Conference history to win men's basketball Coach of the Year honors at two league schools - Murray State and UT Martin. Following the 2016-17 season, Austin Peay's Dave Loos retired as the winningest coach in OVC history (he passed Luther for that crown in 2009-10). Loos, a five-time OVC Coach of the Year, finished his career with 420 wins in 27 years at Austin Peay (including a 258-194 OVC record) and 502 total wins in 31 years as a head coach. Loos was inducted into the OVC Hall of Fame in 2018. Belmont's Rick Byrd retired following the 2018-19 season with 805 career victories in 38 seasons (33 with the Bruins). In seven seasons in the OVC Byrd compiled a 168-62 record (97-19 in conference

play) and won five OVC regular season crowns, two tournament titles and four OVC Coach of the Year awards (second all-time only to Loos).

There have been an equal number of great players including Western Kentucky's Clem Haskins, who is the only three-time OVC Player of the Year. Several players have won OVC Player of the Year honors twice: Western Kentucky's Jim McDaniels (1969-70 and 1970-71), Murray State's Les Taylor (1971-72, 1972-73), Jeff Martin (1987-88, 1988-89), Popeye Jones (1989-90, 1990-91) and Marcus Brown (1994-95, 1995-96), Austin Peay's Otis Howard (1976-77, 1977-78), Middle Tennessee's Jerry Beck (1980-81, 1981-82), Akron's Joe Jakubick (1982-83, 1983-84), Tennessee State's Carlos Rogers (1992-93, 1993-94), UT Martin's Lester Hudson (2007-08, 2008-09), Morehead State's Kenneth Faried (2009-10, 2010-11), Murray State's Isaiah Canaan (2011-12, 2012-13), Belmont's Evan Bradds (2015-16, 2016-17) and Austin Peay's Terry Taylor (2019-20, 2020-21).

The OVC also has the honor of being the only conference to boast the nation's leaders in scoring, rebounding and assists all in one season. That feat was accomplished in 1991-92 by Morehead State's Brett Roberts (28.1 ppg), Murray State's Popeye Jones (14.4 rpg) and Tennessee Tech's Van Usher (8.8 apg).

In 2018, the OVC once again served as host for the NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Championship First and Second Rounds at Bridgestone Arena in Nashville. It marked the fourth-time the OVC served as hosts of the event (2000, 2005, 2012 and 2018).

Tennessee Tech has won or shared 18 regular-season women's basketball championships in

addition to nine OVC Tournament crowns; both are tops in OVC history. UT Martin added its name to the list of championship by capturing its first OVC Tournament title in 2011 and also winning championships in 2012, 2013 and 2014. The Skyhawks became just the fourth team in OVC history (and first since Austin Peay from 2000-03) to win four-straight tournament titles, while Belmont joined that club after winning its fourth-straight title in 2019 (2016-19).

Several coaches have made their mark in the history of OVC women's basketball. Former Tennessee Tech coach Marynell Meadors posted an amazing 363-139 (72.3%) record at Tech, becoming the first woman in NCAA or AIAW history to win 300 games at the same institution, while former Tennessee State skipper Teresa Phillips earned National Coach of the Year honors from USA Today in 1990 for turning around the Lady Tigers' program before going on to lead TSU to the NCAA Tournament in 1994 and 1995. Phillips was inducted into the OVC Hall of Fame in 2021 after completing a career in administration that saw her serve as TSU's Director of Athletics from 2002 through 2019. Tennessee Tech coach Bill Worrell capped a stellar 20-year career in 2005-06 and was inducted into the OVC Hall of Fame in 2007; he compiled a 408-190 record while leading the Golden Eagles to an unprecedented 16 OVC regular-season titles and eight NCAA Tournament appearances, including five straight from 1989-93. Larry Joe Inman, who retired at the conclusion of the 2007-08 season and was inducted into the OVC Hall of Fame in 2009, won more than 100 games at both Middle Tennessee and Eastern Kentucky, and earned OVC Coach of the Year honors a record eight times - five

times at ECU and three at MTSU. In 2012-13 Inman came out of retirement to take the Tennessee State job; in 2014-15 he led the Lady Tigers to its first OVC Tournament Championship since 1995. Inman once again retired following the 2016-17 season, with 545 career victories.

Many great players have graced the hardwood over the years, including former OVC Players of the Year Brooke Armistead and Gerlonda Hardin from Austin Peay, Pam Chambers, Jerilynn Harper, Cheryl Taylor, Angela Moorehead, Roschelle Vaughn, Diane Seng, Janet Holt and Emily Christian from Tennessee Tech; Morehead State's Donna Murphy, Priscilla Blackford and Chynna Bozeman; Eastern Kentucky's Kim Mays; Southeast Missouri's Gray C. Harris; Murray State's Ashley Hayes; UT Martin's Heather Butler, Jasmine Newsome and Chelsey Perry; and Belmont's Darby Maggard.

Morehead State center Brittany Pittman set new school, league and NCAA standards for blocked shots in 2008-09. Pittman swatted 164 shots during the season, setting a new NCAA single-season record (which has since been broken).

In 2012-13 the UT Martin duo of Jasmine Newsome and Heather Butler finished fifth and sixth nationally among NCAA scoring leaders. Newsome, the 2012 and 2013 OVC Player of the Year, averaged 22.6 points per game on the way to All-American honors while Butler averaged 22.4 points per contest. Butler set a NCAA record during the season by connecting on a 3-pointer in her 80th-straight game.

In 2013-14 Butler and Newsome capped their brilliant careers by ranking first and second in scoring in OVC history. Butler, the 2013-14 OVC Female Athlete of the Year,

finished her career with 2,865 points, which ranked first in OVC and 16th in NCAA history. She also finished her career with 392 career 3-pointers (which was tied for the most in NCAA history following her career but now ranks second) and scored in double figures in all 129 career games, which ranks fifth in NCAA history. Following the season Butler was signed by the WNBA's San Antonio Stars where she became the first OVC player to make an active WNBA roster. Newsome capped her career with 2,566 points, second only to Butler in OVC history.

The league also had another historical moment in November 2008 when the NCAA awarded Nashville the 2014 NCAA Women's Division I Final Four. The OVC served as the host of the prestigious event, which is one of the biggest sporting events the city of Nashville can host. The event was held April 6 and 8 at Bridgestone Arena in downtown Nashville and was played in front of sold-out crowds for both the semifinals and championship as UConn topped Notre Dame in a battle of undefeated teams to win its ninth national title.

In 2017-18, Belmont completed its second-straight undefeated league season, increasing its winning streak in Conference games (both regular season and tournament) to 46 games. The Bruins were ranked in both the USA Today Coaches Poll and Associated Press Poll during the year, becoming the first OVC team to be nationally-ranked since 1992-93. The Bruins finished the year ranked No. 23 in the AP poll.

Belmont guard Darby Maggard capped her career in 2018-19 by earning her fourth-straight first-team All-OVC honor in addition to earning her fourth-straight OVC All-Tournament honors. She became

the first player in NCAA history to make at least 400 3-pointers and dish out at least 650 assists in a career while her 92.4 percent career free throw percentage ranks first in NCAA history, her 2.77 assist-to-turnover ratio is third and her 430 made 3-pointers is fourth. She was one of just 19 players in OVC history to reach 2,000 career points (2,031) and she finished her career third in OVC history for assists (683). After the season Maggard finished as the national runner-up at the College 3-Point Championship.

In 2020-21, Belmont would become the first OVC women's basketball team to win a NCAA Tournament game since 1990 (Tennessee Tech), topping Gonzaga 64-59 in the first round in San Marcos, Texas.

UT Martin's Chelsey Perry, a two-time OVC Player of the Year, was selected 26th overall by the Indiana Fever in the third round of the 2021 WNBA Draft. It marked the highest-ever selection for an OVC player and the first UTM player selected in the Draft. Perry would end up making the Fever's roster and appear in regular season games.

Over its 73 years, OVC teams have garnered national championships and bowl games in football, along with national team or individual titles in the sports of rifle, cross country, track and golf.

The OVC has also produced several Olympic athletes, including Murray State's Morgan Hicks, who was a member of the 2004 United States Olympic Rifle Team and Morehead State's Brian Shimer who competed in five Winter Olympics in bobsled (winning a bronze medal in 2002) and coached the 2010 United States bobsled team to its first gold medal since 1948. Former Morehead State football and Eastern Kentucky track and field athlete Dallas Robinson competed with the U.S.

bobsled team during the 2014 Sochi Winter Olympics. In addition, some of the greatest players in professional sports were educated at OVC institutions. The list includes former greats such as football's Phil Simms (Morehead State) and Tony Romo (Eastern Illinois), basketball's Clem Haskins (Western Kentucky) and Kenneth Faried (Morehead State) and two-sport star Steve Hamilton (Morehead State) to present-day standouts like basketball players Ja Morant (Murray State), Robert Covington (Tennessee State) and Chelsey Perry (UT Martin), football player Jimmy Garoppolo (Eastern Illinois) and baseball player Alec Mills (UT Martin), who threw a no-hitter for the Chicago Cubs in 2020. Hamilton is the only athlete to ever play in the NCAA Basketball Championship, a Major League Baseball World Series (New York Yankees) and an NBA Championship Series (Los Angeles Lakers).

The OVC's first volleyball tournament was held in 1981, the same year Eastern Kentucky began a string of six-straight tournament crowns. Former ECU skipper Dr. Geri Polvino compiled a 627-439 record in 32 seasons as head coach of the Colonels, earning OVC Coach of the Year honors eight times. More recently, former Austin Peay coach Cheryl Holt and former Southeast Missouri skipper Cindy Gannon also earned their peers' recognition multiple times with four awards each.

Throughout the last 38 years, 11 different teams have won an OVC regular-season or tournament volleyball crown. Since joining the league in 1991, Southeast Missouri has dominated the scene, winning seven of its eight regular-season titles during the 1990's, including five straight from 1993-97. The Redhawks have

also won six tournament crowns (1994, 1996, 1998, 1999, 2000, 2019). Jacksonville State won back-to-back OVC Tournament Championships (2005, 2006) including going through the OVC undefeated (16-0) in 2006 and winning a NCAA Tournament match in 2010, the league's first NCAA victory since 2000.

Following the 2007 season, Jacksonville State's Abbey Breit was named the OVC Offensive Player of the Year for the third-straight season, becoming the first player in OVC history to accomplish that feat. She was later joined by Murray State's Scottie Ingram who won three-straight awards from 2014-16. Four other individuals - Eastern Kentucky's Angela Boykins (1985-86), Morehead State's Dayle Hammontree (1988-89), Southeast Missouri's Tuba Meto (1996-97) and Morehead State's Amy Almond (2001-02) - were back-to-back winners of the award.

Morehead State won its fourth-straight OVC volleyball regular season championship in 2013. Over that four-year period (2010-13) the Eagles compiled an impressive 67-3 league record.

During the 2020-21 season, Morehead State would compile a 15-1 record during the Conference-only spring season, top Jacksonville State in the OVC Tournament Championship match and go on to knock off Creighton 3-2 in the First Round of the NCAA Tournament. It marked the first NCAA win for the Eagles program.

Beach volleyball was introduced as the OVC's 19th-Championship sport prior to the 2020 campaign. That season was cut short due to the COVID-19 pandemic, making the 2021 season the first to be played to completion. Morehead State would finish 9-1 in league play to claim the regular season crown. The first-ever

OVC Championship was hosted by UT Martin and saw Austin Peay knock off the host Skyhawks to claim the title.

In 2007, Eastern Kentucky's Jacob Korir won his fourth-straight Conference cross country title becoming just the third OVC student-athlete and 13th athlete nationally to accomplish that feat. Korir was a three-time All-American in cross country, earning two top-10 finishes at the NCAA Cross Country Championship. The Nairobi, Kenya, native was also named a track and field All-American twice during his career, was selected as the OVC Male Athlete of the Year in 2006-07 and received the NCAA post graduate scholarship in 2008.

In 2011 the Eastern Kentucky men's cross country team earned a national ranking in the USTFCCCA poll, climbing to as high as No. 17; the ranking was the highest for an OVC team since the polls began in the early 1980s. The EKU men would qualify for the NCAA Championship, becoming the first OVC team to reach the national championship meet since 1980. Eastern Kentucky finished 26th overall at the event as junior Soufiane Bouchikhi was 47th in a field of 252 runners. On the women's side Eastern Kentucky senior Lydia Kosgei became the first EKU woman to ever qualify for the NCAA Championship and went on to finish 37th at the national meet to earn All-American honors.

A year later (2012) the EKU men's cross country team was ranked as high as No. 11 nationally and finished 24th at the NCAA Championship. Wade Meddles led the team with a 38th place finish at the event while Bouchikhi was 40th. In 2013 Eastern Kentucky placed 15th at the NCAA Championship, the highest national finish for an OVC team since 1980. Soufiane

Bouchikhi capped his career by winning his fourth-straight OVC Championship and earning National Runner of the Week honors during the season. Bouchikhi finished 26th at the NCAA Championship in 2013, earning All-American honors for the second-straight season. In 2014 EKU qualified for its fourth-straight NCAA Championship and finished 23rd overall and in 2015 earned its fifth-straight bid and finished 17th overall. EKU is only the second OVC team to ever qualify for five-straight NCAA Championships (ETSU being the other).

In 2016, Eastern Kentucky's Charlotte Imer finished 31st at the NCAA Championship, the second-highest finish ever by an OVC female (trailing only a 24th place finish by Samford's Lauren Blankenship in 2007). In 2017, the Eastern Kentucky women's team earned its first national ranking as well as becoming the first OVC women's team to qualify for the NCAA Championship. The Colonels finished 23rd at the National Championship meet.

Following the 2017-18 season, long-time coaches Tom Akers (Eastern Illinois) and Rick Erdmann (Eastern Kentucky) retired. The duo combined for 118 OVC Championships and 115 OVC Coach of the Year Awards.

In 2007 the Conference had two teams in the NCAA Women's Soccer Tournament for the first time in league history, as former OVC member Samford earned an at-large selection while Southeast Missouri was the Conference's automatic bid.

Former Austin Peay standout and 2012 OVC Soccer Player of the Year Tatiana Ariza represented her native country of Colombia in both the 2012 Summer Olympics in London (earning a start against

the United States) as well as the 2015 FIFA Women's World Cup. In the 2015 event she assisted on the first World Cup goal in her country's history and in the following match helped her team to a 2-0 victory over France, giving Colombia its first-ever win at the event.

In 2016 SIUE turned in a major upset in the first round of the NCAA Division I Soccer Championship, advancing on penalty kicks 5-4 over No. 11-ranked Notre Dame. The Cougars became just the second OVC team to advance to the second round (joining Samford who topped Vanderbilt on penalty kicks in 2005).

For the first time under the current format, OVC men's golfers qualified for the NCAA National Championship in back-to-back years in 2013 and 2014. Austin Peay's Dustin Korte advanced from the regional to the national championship in 2013 (finishing 116th overall) while APSU's Marco Iten won the Auburn Regional in 2014 to qualify for the National Championship (finishing 55th). In 2015 OVC three individual men's golfers competed in the NCAA Regionals (one automatic berth and two at-large berths) in addition to the Eastern Kentucky team; the three individuals were the most from the OVC to qualify in one year under the current format.

In April 2016 Danny Willett won The Masters Championship in Augusta, Georgia. The former JSU standout, who was the 2006 OVC Freshman of the Year and the 2007 OVC Championship Medalist, entered the final round tied for fifth, three shots behind 2015 champion Jordan Spieth after rounds of 70-74-72. In the final round Willett fired a 5-under par round of 67 to finish at 283 (-5) and top the field by three shots. He became just the eighth player in Masters' history to win the

event in his first or second start and just the second Englishman to win the event.

Prior to 2018, no female women's golf had earned an at-large spot in the NCAA Regionals field. That changed when Jacksonville State junior Valentina Giraldo and Eastern Kentucky junior Elsa Moberly earned two of the 24 at-large spots in the NCAA field.

Another first for women's golf came in 2019 as Murray State senior Linette Holmslykke became the first OVC female golfer to qualify for the National Championship after finishing second at the Auburn Regional with a three round total of 211 (-5). Holmslykke finished 54th at the National Championship in addition to winning the NCAA's Elite 90 Award for having the highest G.P.A. among those competing at the Championship.

In 2009 it was OVC softball that accomplished several firsts as UT Martin (tournament champion) and Jacksonville State (at-large) were each selected for the NCAA Championship. Jacksonville State would take it a step farther by winning the Knoxville Regional (beating No. 13 national seed Tennessee along the way) to become the first OVC softball program to advance to a Super Regional. Jax State would fall to No. 4 Alabama in that Super Regional but finished the season 43-16 (19-2 OVC) and ranked 21st nationally in the ESPN.com/USA Softball poll and 24th nationally in the USA Today/NFCA poll.

In 2016 the OVC Softball Championship was held at a neutral site for the first time, as it was played at Choccolocco Park in Oxford, Alabama.

The league's baseball presence has continued to evolve since its inception. The OVC baseball tournament moved to a neutral



site for the first time in 2001 with Paducah, Kentucky and Brooks Stadium hosting the tournament in front of raucous crowds. The success of the tournament led to Jackson, Tennessee and The Ballpark at Jackson (the home of the Seattle Mariner's Class AA affiliate) – hosting the event for the first time in 2010. The championship moved to Choccolocco Park in Oxford, Alabama for two years (2017-18) before agreeing to a stay at Rent One Park in Marion, Illinois (home of the Frontier League Southern Illinois Miners) in 2019 and returning to Jackson in 2021.

The OVC also has made a statement in the NCAA Baseball Championship in recent years, with its teams involved in several memorable contests in the last decade. Tennessee Tech surprised Wake Forest in the opening round of the 2001 tournament and Southeast Missouri stunned host Alabama in the opening round of the 2002 championship. Five years later, Austin Peay captured the collegiate baseball world's attention by taking Vanderbilt, the 2007 No. 1 overall seed, to extra innings. Eastern Illinois pushed host Nebraska to the limit in 2008 followed by Tennessee Tech's memorable contest against Florida and Valparaiso to advance to the regional final for the second-straight season before losing to host Indiana. Govs senior closer Tyler Rogers was a big part of his team's success during the year, setting the NCAA single-season record for saves (23 – a mark that was later eclipsed during the College World Series).

In 2016 six OVC teams reached the 30-win plateau for the first time in league history; the previous single-season high had been four teams. In 2017 the league could have been named the "Offensive Valley Conference" as teams combined for 753 home runs during the season, the most in league history. That was highlighted by a record 50 combined home runs being hit in 13 games at the OVC Tournament. to top Indiana State and Cal State Fullerton at the Eugene Regional, before falling to host Oregon in the regional final. It marked the first time since the 2000 season (Middle Tennessee) that an OVC team had won multiple NCAA Tournaments games in the same season.

Austin Peay completed a "3-Peayt" by winning its third-straight OVC Tournament crown in 2013. Along the way the Govs garnered the first nationally-ranking by an OVC team since 2009 (climbing to as high as 21st nationally) and tied the OVC single-season record with 47 victories. The Govs earned the No. 2 seed in the NCAA Bloomington Regional, becoming the first OVC team in the current regional format (since 1999) to earn anything other than a No. 4 seed. The squad topped Florida and Valparaiso to advance to the regional final for the second-straight season before losing to host Indiana. Govs senior closer Tyler Rogers was a big part of his team's success during the year, setting the NCAA single-season record for saves (23 – a mark that was later eclipsed during the College World Series).

In 2016 six OVC teams reached the 30-win plateau for the first time in league history; the previous single-season high had been four teams.

In 2017 the league could have been named the "Offensive Valley Conference" as teams combined for 753 home runs during the season, the most in league history. That was highlighted by a record 50 combined home runs being hit in 13 games at the OVC Tournament. Included in that was Morehead State sophomore Niko Hulsizer who hit his 27th home run of the season, establishing a new OVC single-season record.

In 2018 Tennessee Tech had

a 28-game winning streak in becoming a consensus nationally-ranked team across the six major Division I polls (reaching as high as No. 10, an all-time high rank by an OVC team). The Golden Eagles won a record 27 OVC games after losing in the OVC Tournament Championship game, became the first OVC team to earn an at-large berth into the NCAA Baseball Championship. Tech would go on to win three-straight elimination games in the Oxford Regional (including back-to-back games on the same day against host and No. 4 national seed Ole Miss) to become the first OVC team to reach the Super Regionals. The Golden Eagles would win game one against Texas before eventually losing two-straight to the Longhorns. Tennessee Tech finished the season with an OVC record 53 overall victories.

In 2018, a record 16 OVC players were selected in the Major League Baseball First-Year Player Draft (breaking the previous record of 12). Among the 16 players were eight Tennessee Tech players, a new record for an OVC school in a single-season.

In 2020, former Belmont standout Matt Beaty was on the 28-man active roster for Los Angeles as the Dodgers topped Tampa Bay four games to two to capture the World Series Championship. In the process he became the first former OVC player on an active roster for a World Series champion.

In 2021 Eastern Illinois shortstop Trey Sweeney was selected in the first round of the MLB Draft by the New York Yankees while Southeast Missouri pitcher Dylan Dodd was selected in the third round. Sweeney was just the third first round pick in OVC history, and he had Dodd were two of just 11 top three round selections from the league all-time;



it marked the first time the league had two top three round picks in the same draft.

A first in the OVC occurred in 2008, when the league had a first round draft pick in both the NFL (Tennessee State's Dominique Rodgers-Cromartie) and Major League Baseball (Eastern Kentucky's Christian Friedrich) Drafts in the same school year. A year later (2009) the league had a Major League Baseball First Round Compensation Round pick (Eastern Illinois' Tyler Kehrer who was No. 48 overall) and NBA Second Round pick (UT Martin's Lester Hudson) in the same season.

In March 2020 due to the COVID-19 public health emergency, spring sports were canceled across the OVC and the NCAA (including all winter and spring NCAA Championships). Conference play for Fall 2020 sports (football, soccer, volleyball, cross country) was pushed to the spring which saw every OVC Championship successfully completed in just a 112-day span (and all but one taking place in a 90-day span).

The playing field is not the only place where OVC athletes are working hard. The league also recognizes excellence in the classroom. Six Scholar-Athlete Awards are presented yearly to male and female athletes, while others are commended for their academic success by being Medal of Honor recipients or earning a spot on the Commissioner's Honor Roll. Additionally, the league annually presents one institutional Academic Achievement Award, as well as separate team awards in each Conference-sponsored sport. Since the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) Academic All-America program began, the Ohio Valley Conference has had 298 student-



athletes honored with the award.

Through the early years of the league, administrators wrestled with fan behavior due to the close proximity of the Conference members and the intense rivalries which developed. Just as it did decades ago, the OVC took the leadership role on what has become a national issue. In 1995, the OVC implemented a first-of-its-kind "Sportsmanship Statement," a policy which promotes principles of fair play, ethical conduct and respect for one's opponent. The statement has become a model for others to follow across the nation and has answered the challenge of the NCAA Presidents Commission to improve sportsmanship in collegiate athletics.


Additionally, the OVC annually presents the Steve Hamilton Sportsmanship Award, in honor of the former Morehead State student-athlete, coach and athletics director, to a junior or senior student-athlete with significant athletic contributions who best exemplifies the characteristics of sportsmanship and citizenship. Most recently, the Conference has also implemented the OVC Institutional and Team Sportsmanship Awards, which are presented to one institution and 18 sport-specific teams voted by their peers to have best exhibited the standards of sportsmanship and ethical conduct as outlined by the OVC and NCAA.

The vision of leadership demonstrated by the Founding Fathers in 1948 remains alive today as the Ohio Valley Conference prepares for the future. One example is in regard to the current trend in collegiate athletics administration for increased involvement of university presidents in setting policies and making rules. The presidents of OVC institutions,

however, have always governed the Conference, long before presidential governance became a national theme.

The Ohio Valley Conference sponsors the following sports: baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, tennis and track for men, and basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, softball, tennis, track, volleyball and beach volleyball for women. In addition, the OVC also sponsors the combined men's and women's sport of rifle.

Now in its seventh decade of competition, the Ohio Valley Conference has grown significantly from its humble beginnings while increasing the number of athletics opportunities it provides for students. Current league representatives include charter members Morehead State University and Murray State University, along with Austin Peay State University, Belmont University, Eastern Illinois University, Southeast Missouri State University, Southern Illinois University Edwardsville, Tennessee State University, Tennessee Technological University and the University of Tennessee at Martin. The University of Tennessee at Chattanooga is an affiliate member for the sport of beach volleyball.



The 2022 Ohio Valley Conference Softball Championship will be held May 11-14 at Choccolocco Park in Oxford, Alabama.

It marks the 28th time the Championship has been held and the sixth-straight year it has been held at the neutral site in Oxford instead of at the site of the No. 1 seed.

In 2019, Southeast Missouri topped three-time defending champion Jacksonville State in back-to-back games to claim the title, its sixth overall and first since 1999.

SEMO was the No. 1 seed in the 2021 OVC Tournament, where it fell to Eastern Kentucky in the championship.
