// Championship Saturday

#5 Southeast Missouri (18-16) and #2 Tennessee Tech (16-16) play in the Ohio Valley Conference Tournament Championship Saturday. Tip-off is set for 7 p.m., CT at the Ford Center. The game will be televised live on ESPN2.

// Follow the Redhawks

Fans can listen live on the radio at Real Rock 99.3 FM. Erik Sean will be on the call. The game will be televised live on ESPNU with Robert Ford and Richie Schueler calling the action. Live stats are available at OVCsports.com and Twitter updates will be provided @SEMOMBB.

// Series History

Southeast Missouri and Tennessee Tech meet for the 58th time Saturday. TTU holds a 38-19 lead in the all-time series. SEMO and TTU split their season series with each team winning at home in thrilling fashion. The Redhawks defeated the Golden Eagles, 84-77, in double overtime on Jan. 21 in Cape Girardeau. The Golden Eagles edged the Redhawks, 82-80, on a buzzer beater in Cookeville.

// First Title Game Appearance in Over Two Decades

The Redhawks are in the Ohio Valley Conference Tournament championship game for the first time in 23 years. Southeast Missouri last made the title game in 2000, where it upended #1 Murray State, 61-56, at the Gaylord Entertainment Center in Nashville, Tennessee. To date, that is SEMO's only OVC Tournament title and NCAA Tournament appearance in program history. Overall, this is SEMO's third OVC Championship game berth.

// One More Win for the Dance

The winner of Saturday's matchup will be the first to punch their ticket in this year's NCAA Tournament. The men's 68-team bracket and field will be announced during the selection show on Sunday, Mar. 12. Time is 5 p.m., CT on CBS.

// March Madness

#5 Southeast Missouri won three games in three days to earn its shot at this year's Ohio Valley Conference Tournament crown. SEMO beat #8 Lindenood, 84-65, on Mar. 1; #4 Tennessee State, 91-83, on Mar. 2; and took down #1 Morehead State, 65-58, on Mar. 3. SEMO is the first #5 seed to make the tournament final in 18 years. Austin Peay was the last to do that in 2005.



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// Second Half Fury

Southeast Missouri trailed by 11 points in the first half and did not get its first lead against Morehead State until Dylan Branson made two free throws with 4:45 remaining. SEMO outscored the Eagles, 20-7, in the final 8:43 of the game to claim its spot in the Ohio Valley Conference Tournament Championship. The Redhawks took over in the second half beating MSU, 36-24, in the final 20 minutes.

// Step Back Dagger

After Morehead State made it a three-point game (61-58) with 50 second on the clock, Phillip Russell drilled a step back 3-pointer 19 seconds later to bury the Eagles for good. The 3-pointer was Russell's team-high 77th of the season.

// Earley Goes for a Double-Double

Josh Earley is coming off a big night in the Ohio Valley Conference Tournament semifinals against #1 Morehead State (Mar. 3). Earley scored 11 points to go along with a career-high 13 rebounds in 24 minutes off the bench. He made 5-of-6 field goals along the way. Earley earned his second double-double of the season.

// Harris Enjoying Big Tournament

Chris Harris is Southeast Missouri's top scorer in this year's Ohio Valley Conference Tournament with 18.3 points per game. Harris has scored 25 of his 55 points at the free throw line. He opened the tournament with 11 points vs. Lindenwood (Mar. 1), scored a tournament-high 29 against Tennessee State (Mar. 2) and followed that up with 15 vs. Morehead State (Mar. 3). Harris also had 12 rebounds against TSU for the first double-double of his career.

// Senior Driven

Southeast Missouri's senior trio of Chris Harris, Nate Johnson and Israel Barnes don't want this season to end anytime soon. The three have stepped up when they needed to most getting

the Redhawks in position to win their first Ohio Valley Conference Tournament in 23 years. Harris is averaging 18.3 points per game, Johnson follows with 9.3 and Barnes is scoring seven per game in the tournament entering Saturday's final. They have accounted for 43 percent of the Redhawks scoring output in postseason play thus far.

// Last Time vs. Tennessee Tech

Phillip Russell scored 29 points and made two free throws to tie the game with five seconds left, but Brett Thompson buried a game-winning shot at the buzzer to send Tennessee Tech to an 82-80 win on Feb. 4 in Cookeville. Thompson fouled Russell behind the 3-point line with 5.2 seconds left and Russell calmly made all three of his shots. Thompson redeemed himself by making a pullup jumper in the paint as time expired.

// Russell 20 Points Away From 1,000

Phillip Russell, who leads the Redhawks with 579 points and an 18.1 points per game average this season, has 980 points in his career. Russell needs 20 more to join Southeast Missouri's 1,000-point club and give the Redhawks their second 1,000-point scorer this season. Chris Harris went over 1,000 points in SEMO's final home game vs. Southern Indiana (Feb. 18).

// Third-Straight OVC Tournament

Southeast Missouri is in the Ohio Valley Conference Tournament for the third year in a row under Head Coach Brad Korn. Korn has taken the Redhawks to the league's postseason tournament all three of his seasons as head coach. In his first year at the SEMO helm, Korn led the Redhawks to their first OVC Tournament in five years during the 2020-21 campaign. The last time SEMO made three-straight OVC Tournament appearances was 2013-15.

// Another OVC Tournament Win for Korn

Friday's 65-58 win over #1 Morehead State gave Head Coach Brad Korn his fourth Ohio Valley Conference Tournament victory. Korn is now 4-2 all-time at the league's postseason tournament. He picked up a win at the event in two-straight seasons.

// 18th OVC Tournament Berth

This year marks the Redhawks 18th trip to the Ohio Valley Conference Tournament in program history. Southeast Missouri made the league's postseason event in 1997, 1998, 1999, 2000, 2001, 2002, 2003, 2005, 2007, 2011, 2012, 2013, 2014, 2015, 2017, 2021, 2022 and 2023. SEMO is 15-16 all-time in the OVC Tournament. The Redhawks won their only OVC Tournament title and made their only

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NCAA Tournament appearance in 2000. The Redhawks have been in the championship game twice (1999, 2000) and the semifinals on four occasions (1999, 2000, 2005, 2022) prior to this season.

// #5 Seed

Southeast Missouri is the #5 seed in the Ohio Valley Conference Tournament for the fifth time in its program history. SEMO was also the #5 seed in the 1998, 2001, 2012 and 2017 tournaments. The Redhawks hold a 5-4 OVC Tournament record as the #5 seed. A #5 seed has never won the OVC Tournament.

// Against the #2 Seed

The Redhawks are 0-4 against the #2 seed in their Ohio Valley Conference Tournament history. Against the seeds it has already played in the tournament this year, Southeast Missouri is a combined 6-7 (2-3 vs. #1, 1-4 vs. #4, 3-0 vs. #8) in its tournament history. SEMO beat a #4 seed for the first time when it defeated Tennessee State Thursday.

// Third-Straight Win

Southeast Missouri claimed its third-straight win with a 65-58 victory over #1 Morehead State Friday. Both SEMO and Tennessee Tech carry three-game winning streaks into Saturday's Ohio Valley Conference Championship.

Meanwhile, Phillip Russell is in his second-straight trip to the league's postseason tournament. Israel Barnes, Josh Earley, Aquan Smart, Evan Eursher, Tevin Gowins, Josh Mitchell, Mason Hanback and Adam Larson are at the OVC Tournament for the first time.

// Thursday Win

For the second-straight year, the Redhawks eliminated Tennessee State from the Ohio Valley Conference Tournament when they beat the Tigers, 91-83, Thursday. Southeast Missouri made a season-high 34 free throws and outscored TSU, 34-17, at the charity stripe.

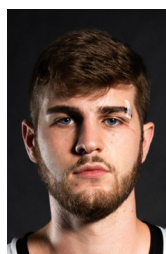

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In the last two games between SEMO and TSU, there were a combined 109 fouls, including 55 Thursday. In addition, 11 of those were technical fouls during the Redhawks and Tigers matchup in Nashville on Feb. 9.

// Strong Start

The Redhawks started the Ohio Valley Conference Tournament with a win for the second year in a row when the beat #8 Lindenwood on Mar. 1. In 2022, Southeast Missouri, then seeded #4, beat Tennessee State, 79-55, in the quarterfinals before falling to eventual tournament champion Murray State, 71-67, in the semifinals. SEMO last won its first OVC Tournament game in two-straight seasons during the 2013 and 2014 campaigns. The Redhawks won first-round games in each of those years.

// OVC Tournament Titles

Of the teams who made this year's Ohio Valley Conference Tournament, Morehead State, Tennessee State, Tennessee Tech and Southeast Missouri have won the league's postseason championship. MSU leads the conference with five OVC Tournament titles and TSU is second with two. TTU and SEMO have each won the event one time.

// Postseason Momentum

Southeast Missouri put an end to a two-game losing skid when it defeated #8 Lindenwood, 84-65, on Mar. 1. A day later, SEMO knocked out #4 Tennessee State with a 91-83 victory. Prior to the Ohio Valley Conference Tournament, the Redhawks had lost five of eight games.

// 10 OVC Wins

With its 85-80 victory over Southern Indiana (Feb. 18), Southeast Missouri picked up its 10th Ohio Valley Conference win of the season. It is the first time in 23 years where SEMO recorded 10 or more conference wins in a season. The Redhawks last went 14-4 during the 1999-2000

campaign. Overall, it is just the fourth time SEMO won 10 or more OVC games in a season in program history. The Redhawks also went 10-8 in 1997-98, 15-3 in 1998-99 and 14-4 in 1999-00. SEMO finished conference play with a 10-8 mark.

// Senior Power

Veterans Chris Harris and Nate Johnson had the biggest Ohio Valley Conference Tournament game of their careers vs. Tennessee State (Mar. 2). Harris turned in a double-double 29 points and 12 rebounds, and Johnson notched a career-best 17 points. Harris also made a career-high 16-of-18 free throws in that game en route to his second double-double this season.

// That is Clutch

In the final minute of Southeast Missouri's quarterfinal matchup against Tennessee State, the Tigers made it a two-possession game on four occasions. SEMO, however, answered with 8-of-8 free throws to nail down its win.

// Approach the Bench

Josh Earley and Evan Eursher gave Southeast Missouri a big lift off the bench to help Southeast Missouri to its first-round Ohio Valley Conference Tournament win over Lindenwood (Mar. 1). Earley scored 14 points and grabbed 12 rebounds for the second double-double of his career, while Eursher dropped in a season-high 13 points. Both Earley and Eursher played 21 minutes.

// Winning OVC Record

For the eighth time in program history, the Redhawks claimed a winning season in Ohio Valley Conference play. Southeast Missouri's 10-8 record assured its first OVC winning campaign since 2016-17 (9-7).

// Nice Work Underneath

Southeast Missouri never trailed for the final 21:34 of its win over #8 Lindenwood (Mar. 1). SEMO man-handled LU on the boards for a 50-34 (+16) advantage. The

Redhawks had 17 offensive rebounds and outscored the Lions, 17-0, in second-chance points. Josh Earley had 12 rebounds, while Dylan Branson and Nate Johnson followed with seven and six, respectively.

// Overtime Games

Southeast Missouri played its second overtime game of the season at Lindenwood (Feb. 23). SEMO also went double overtime with Tennessee Tech on Jan. 21. That game resulted in a 84-77 home win for the Redhawks.

// Season-High 102 Points

The Redhawks scored a season-high 102 points in their latest game at Lindenwood (Feb. 23). Three players, including Chris Harris (36), Aquan Smart (22), and Israel Barnes (20) scored 20 or more points. Interestingly enough, Southeast Missouri last scored over 100 points in a game during a 102-66 win over Quincy on Nov. 12, 2018.

// Harris Springs for Career-High 36 Points

Chris Harris became the second Redhawk to score over 30 points in a game this season when he finished with a career-high 36 at Lindenwood (Feb. 23). Harris shot 11-of-13 from the field and made a career-best 13 free throws. His 36 points are second-most to Phillip Russell in a game this season. Russell scored 37 points on two occasions.

// Smart Nabs New Career-High

Aquan Smart put up a new career-high 22 points at Lindenwood (Feb. 23). Smart shot 8-of-14 from the field, made three 3-pointers and went 3-of-6 at the free throw line. He also dished out four assists and had four steals. Smart scored over 20 points for the first time as a Redhawk.

// Welcome to the Club

Chris Harris, Southeast Missouri's second-leading scorer with 15 points a game, recently went over 1,000 career points when he scored 20 vs. Southern

Indiana (Feb. 18). Harris now has 1,105 points and is the 25th member of SEMO's 1,000-point club.

// Harris Goes for 20 or More

Chris Harris scored 20 or more points in four of his last six starts. Harris scored 20 points vs. Southern Indiana (Feb. 18) and at SIU Edwardsville (Feb. 25), dropped in a career-high 36 at Lindenwood (Feb. 23) and finished with 29 vs. Tennessee State (Mar. 2). He increased his scoring average from 13.8 to 15 points per game during that stretch.

// Senior Farewell

Seniors Israel Barnes, Nate Johnson and Chris Harris all played their final home game at Southeast Missouri when the Redhawks beat Southern Indiana, 85-80, on Feb. 18. Barnes and Harris each scored double figures with 12 and 20 points, respectively.

// OVC Second-Leading Scorer

Southeast Missouri has second-leading scorer in the Ohio Valley Conference. Phillip Russell is averaging 18.1 points per game through 32 starts. He went over 500 points (579) this season. He scored double figures in 31 of his 32 starts. Along the way, Russell had 20 or more points 10 times and 30 or more points on three occasions in 2022-23. His 579 points just passed Tyler Stone (578, 2013-14) for 10th on SEMO's all-time single-season list.

// Redhawks Wrap Up Home Slate

Southeast Missouri finished with a 9-4 record at the Show Me Center with wins over Lyon College (83-46, Nov. 12), William Woods (87-49, Nov. 22), SIU Edwardsville (82-73, Dec. 31), Lindenwood (94-71, Jan. 12), Tennessee Tech (84-77 2OT, Jan. 21), Tennessee State (92-75, Jan. 26), Little Rock (99-98, Feb. 2), Eastern Illinois (78-64, Feb. 16) and Southern Indiana (85-80, Feb. 18), and losses to Purdue Fort Wayne (89-68, Dec. 7), Southern Illinois (70-68, Dec. 21), UT Martin (80-60, Jan. 19) and Morehead

State (65-59, Feb. 11). SEMO scored over 80 points in nine of its 13 home contests. SEMO's nine wins are presently the most home victories in a season under Head Coach Brad Korn.

// Balanced Effort

Eight different Redhawks got in the scoring column during Southeast Missouri's win over Eastern Illinois (Feb. 16). Aquan Smart matched a career-high 14 points to lead the way. Dylan Branson followed with 12 points, while Phillip Russell added 11 and Nate Johnson pitched in 10. SEMO also forced 20 turnovers and assisted 17 of its 28 made field goals.

// Hanback Steps Up

Mason Hanback scored a season-high eight points in seven minutes off the bench against Eastern Illinois (Feb. 16). Hanback did not miss a field goal going a perfect 4-of-4.

// 37 Again

For the second time this season, Phillip Russell tied Southeast Missouri's NCAA Division I single-game record when he poured in 37 points at Tennessee Tech (Feb. 4). Russell is one of only six players in the nation to score 37 or more points in a game twice. Drew Pember (UNC Asheville), Jalen Cone (Northern Arizona), Antoine Davis (Detroit Mercy), Josh Cohen (Saint Francis) and James Bishop (George Washington) are the others.

// Second OVC Player of the Week Honor

Phillip Russell picked up his second Ohio Valley Conference Player of the Week honor on Feb. 6. A native of St. Louis, Russell had another huge week, this time averaging 33 points and nine assists in two games. He started the week by scoring 37 points in a 99-98 win over Little Rock (Feb. 2) to tie SEMO's NCAA Division I single-game scoring record for the second time this year. Russell made 9-of-16 field goals, made four 3-pointers and made 15-of-18 free throws to go along with a career-high 10 assists against the Trojans.



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Two days later, he scored 29 points, including 22 in the second half at Tennessee Tech (Feb. 4). Russell had eight assists, buried four 3-pointers and made 9-of-10 field goals. In addition, he made three free throws to tie the game with five seconds left against the Golden Eagles. Lindenwood's Keenon Cole (Newcomer) and Tommie Williams (Co-Freshman), and Eastern Illinois' Cameron Haffner (Co-Freshman) rounded out the week's honorees.

// Comeback Bid Falls Short at Tennessee Tech

Southeast Missouri trailed by 17 points with 15:46 left to play in the second half before coming all the way back to tie it game at Tennessee Tech (Feb. 4). Phillip Russell was fouled behind the 3-point line and made three free throws to tie the game at 80-80 with five seconds remaining. Brett Thompson, who fouled Russell on the play, then made the game-winning shot at the buzzer.

// How Sweep it Is

The Redhawks posted two series sweeps of Ohio Valley Conference opponents this season. Southeast Missouri swept both Eastern Illinois and Little Rock in two games this season. The Panthers and Trojans are the teams not in the OVC Tournament this year.

// He Did That Twice?!!

For the second time this season, Phillip Russell tied Southeast Missouri's NCAA Division I single-game scoring record of 37 points. Russell recently dropped in 37 points and had a career-high 10 assists for only the second double-double of his career vs. Little Rock (Feb. 2). He shot 9-of-16 from the field, buried four 3-pointers and made 15-of-18 free throws. Russell averaged a point per minute in his 37 minutes of action.

// 30-Point Threat

Phillip Russell scored 30 or more points for an Ohio Valley Conference high third time this season when he finished with 37 against Little Rock (Feb. 2). Russell has scored 30 or more in three of his last six starts. He also dropped in 37 at Morehead State (Jan. 14) and 30 vs. Tennessee State (Jan. 26). Russell scored 30 or more points a total of four times in his career.

// Scoring in Bunches

Phillip Russell scored over 20 points a total of 10 times this season. Three of his starts resulted in 30 or more points. Russell scored double figures in 30 of his 31 games. He has sixteen 20-plus point games in his career. Additionally, Russell registered the first point-assist double-double of his career with 37 points and 10 assists vs. Little Rock (Feb. 2). Overall, it was his second double-double in a Redhawk uniform.

// What a Month!

The Redhawks wrapped up January with a 6-2 record after taking down Eastern Illinois (Jan. 28), 79-68, on the road. Southeast Missouri's strong January push put the Redhawks in a first-place tie at the top of the Ohio Valley Conference standings. SEMO scored over 80 points five times and went 3-1 on the road in January contests. It is the best January record in three years under Head Coach Brad Korn. SEMO has finished with a .500 or winning record in January each of Korn's first three seasons as the Redhawks head coach.

// On the Road

Southeast Missouri has five true road wins this season. SEMO finished the regular-season with a 5-11 record on the road.

// Russell Dominates

Phillip Russell put together a strong week once again leading Southeast Missouri to a pair of wins. Russell averaged 24.5 points and 7.5 assists to guide the Redhawks to victories over Tennessee

State (Jan. 26) and Eastern Illinois (Jan. 28). He scored 30 points, shot 8-of-15 from the field, buried four 3-pointers and finished with a season-high nine assists to help SEMO overcome an early 16-point deficit against the Tigers. Two days later, Russell led the Redhawks with 19 points at EIU. For the week, he shot 52.7 percent (12-of-23) from the field, made seven 3-pointers, shot 85.7 percent (18-of-21) at the free throw line and dished out 15 assists.

// Russell Clears 200 Career Assists

Phillip Russell went over 200 assists in his career against Eastern Illinois (Jan. 28). Russell officially reached the mark with his third assist of the game at the 11:00 mark in the first half. Russell has 251 assists in his career. His 160 assists in 2022-23 are sixth-most in a single-season at SEMO.

// Seventh-Most Threes

The Redhawks have made 272 three-pointers through 34 games this season. That total ranks third all-time in Southeast Missouri's single-season history.

// Spreading it Around

Southeast Missouri put four players in double figures at Eastern Illinois (Jan. 28). Phillip Russell led the way with 19 points, while Israel Barnes and Adam Larson followed with 11 and Josh Earley chipped in 10. Barnes, Larson and Earley accounted for all 32 of SEMO's points off the bench. Three or more players have scored double figures a total of 18 games this season.

// Big Lift Larson

Adam Larson drained three 3-pointers and had three blocks in his recent 11-point effort at Eastern Illinois (Jan. 28). Larson finished with four field goals made in 21 minutes. He made three 3-pointers and scored nine points vs. Little Rock (Feb. 2). Larson scored double figures five times this year.



// Comeback Kids

Southeast Missouri pulled off its largest come-from-behind win when it overcame a 16-point deficit to beat Tennessee State (Jan. 26), 92-75. SEMO trailed, 17-1, a little over five minutes into the game. The Redhawks then outscored TSU, 49-31, and shot 51.5 percent (17-of-33) from the field in the second half to close out their victory. SEMO scored over 90 points for the third time in five games.

// Russell Drops in 30

For the second time this season and third in his career, Phillip Russell scored 30 points in a game. Russell finished with a game-high 30 points in his latest outing against Tennessee State (Jan. 26). He shot 8-of-15 from the field, buried four 3-pointers and made a near-perfect 10-of-11 free throws. Russell also dished out nine assists in 35 minutes. He also scored 37 at Morehead State (Jan. 21).

// Clark Out for Season

Forward Kobe Clark will miss the rest of the 2022-23 season with a knee injury. Clark initially suffered his season-ending injury during the second half of SEMO's game against UT Martin on Jan. 19. A native of St. Louis, Clark is the Redhawks top rebounder and shot blocker. He averaged 8.7 rebounds and accumulated 23 blocks in 19 games and 15 starts. Clark also ranked sixth on the team in scoring with 6.6 points per game and had 10 or more rebounds on seven occasions.

// First Career Double-Double for Harris

Chris Harris matched career-high 23 points and pulled down a career-best 11 rebounds to lead Southeast Missouri to its win over Tennessee Tech (Jan. 21). Harris shot 8-of-17 from the field and made four 3-pointers in his second 20-point effort in three games. It was SEMO's third double-double of the season.

// Redhawks Survive Double Overtime Thriller

The Redhawks, once ahead by 22 points, rallied late to pull off an 84-77 double overtime victory over then-Ohio Valley Conference co-leader Tennessee Tech (Jan. 21). Southeast Missouri scored the final six points of the second overtime period and outscored TTU, 14-7, in the last five minutes of the contest. It was the seventh time SEMO played an overtime game in three years under Head Coach Brad Korn. The Redhawks improved to 3-4 in those contests.

// Branson on the Boards

Dylan Branson posted a career-high 12 rebounds in his latest start vs. Tennessee Tech (Jan. 21). Branson had six offensive rebounds, six points, four assists and three steals, as well.

// Marginally Speaking

Southeast Missouri dominated Tennessee Tech on the glass and, as a result, matched its largest rebounding margin of the season at +17. SEMO outrebounded the Golden Eagles, 50-33, and held a 15-3 advantage on the offensive end. The 50 rebounds are the Redhawks most in a game this season and most since they outrebounded Eastern Illinois, 50-25, on Jan. 30, 2021.

// Russell Ties SEMO NCAA Division I Single-Game Record

Phillip Russell tied Southeast Missouri's NCAA Division I single-game scoring record when he dropped in 37 points at Morehead State (Jan. 14) and vs. Little Rock (Feb. 2). The 37 points are the most scored by an Ohio Valley Conference player this season. He tied Tyler Stone (37 points, at SIU Edwardsville, Feb. 6, 2014) for the program's top Division I single-game scoring mark.

// High Scoring Redhawks

The Redhawks scored 80 or more points in 11 of their 17 Ohio Valley Conference games. Southeast Missouri surpassed 90 points five times with a 92-75 win over

Tennessee State (Jan. 26), 94-71 win vs. Lindenwood (Jan. 12), 91-86 victory at Morehead State (Jan. 14), a 99-98 win over Little Rock (Feb. 2) and 105-102 loss at Lindenwood (Feb. 23). SEMO led the OVC with 81.6 points per game in league play.

// OVC Single-Game High

Southeast Missouri shot an Ohio Valley Conference single-game high 63.6 percent (35-of-55) from the field in its 94-21 win over Lindenwood (Jan. 12). It is the best field goal percentage in three years under Head Coach Brad Korn. SEMO last shot over 60 percent in a OVC game vs. Tennessee Tech on Jan. 10, 2017. Two days after that, the Redhawks shot 58 percent (31-of-53) at Morehead State (Jan. 14).

// Russell Named OVC Player of the Week

Southeast Missouri point guard Phillip Russell picked up his first Ohio Valley Conference Player of the Week honor on Jan. 16. A native of St. Louis, Russell averaged 26.6 points, five assists and 1.5 steals to lead SEMO to a pair of victories. He shot 55.2 percent (16-of-29) from the field, 57.1 percent (8-of-14) from 3-point range and 86.7 percent (13-of-15) at the free throw line. He tied SEMO's NCAA Division I single-game scoring record with 37 points at Morehead State (Jan. 14). The 37 points are also most by any OVC player this year. Russell opened the week with 16 points vs. Lindenwood (Jan. 12). He has scored double figures in 18 games this season and surpassed 20 on six occasions. Eastern Illinois' Kinyon Hodges (Newcomer) and Tennessee Tech's Jerome Beya (Freshman) rounded out the week's honorees.

// Top of the OVC

Southeast Missouri led the Ohio Valley Conference in scoring (81.4 ppg) and turnover margin (+2.1) in league games. SEMO scored 80 or more points in 11 of



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its OVC contests. The Redhawks are also forcing a league-high 14.8 turnovers a game in OVC action.

// About Morehead State

Morehead State enters the Ohio Valley Conference Tournament on a five-game winning streak and is this year's OVC regular-season champion. Mark Freeman was named OVC Player of the Year and Alex Gross was voted Freshman of the Year. Preston Spradlin claimed this year's Coach of the Year as the Eagles posted a near-sweep of the league's specialty awards. MSU has the OVC's top scoring defense allowing just 66.5 points a game. The Eagles are holding opponents to a conference best 32.1 percent from 3-point range. Freeman averages 14.8 points per game and ranks 10th among OVC scoring leaders.

// Russell Surpasses 100 Assists

Phillip Russell, who ranks second in the Ohio Valley Conference with 5.1 assists per game, recently went over 100 this year. Russell has a league-high 159 assists and has dished out five or more a total of 16 times in 2022-23. He had a career-high 10 assists against Little Rock (Feb. 2).

// Russell 19th Nationally in Free Throws

Phillip Russell ranks 19th in the nation in free throws made. Russell is 160-of-196 at the free throw line this season. His .818 free throw percentage is fifth in the Ohio Valley Conference.

// Barnes Nabs Game-High

Israel Barnes scored a game-high 20 points in his latest effort vs. Lindenwood (Jan. 12). Barnes came off the bench to shoot 9-of-12 from the field in 29 minutes. He scored 13 of his points in the first half alone. Barnes scored 20 or more points for the fourth time this season. He posted his sixth game with 10 or more points when he scored 10 vs. Tennessee Tech (Jan. 21).

// Big Game Branson

Dylan Branson notched a career-high 19 points to lead Southeast Missouri in its win at Little Rock (Jan. 7), SEMO's first meeting with the Trojans in over 20 years. Branson shot 7-of-12 from the field and scored 11 of his points in the second half. It was his third double-digit effort in four games. Branson started 11-straight games for the Redhawks.

// Advantage SEMO

Southeast Missouri won the battle of the boards, 39-35, at Little Rock (Jan. 7). SEMO had been outrebounded in six-straight games prior to that matchup. The Redhawks outrebounded their opponent eight times this year. Most recently, SEMO posted its largest rebounding advantage of the season with a +17 (30-13) performance vs. Lindenwood (Jan. 12).

// Cutting Down the Turnovers

Southeast Missouri turned the ball over a season-low seven times at UT Martin (Jan. 5). Before that, the Redhawks had just eight miscues vs. SIU Edwardsville (Dec. 29). The seven turnovers against the Skyhawks are the fewest SEMO had in a game in three years under Head Coach Brad Korn.

// Harris is Rolling

Chris Harris is second on the team in scoring with 15 points per game through 33 games and 31 starts. He scored double figures in 21 of his last 24 contests and leads the Redhawks with 60 career double-digit scoring games.

// Winning the Second Half

For the 21st time this season, Southeast Missouri won the second half when it outscored Morehead State, 36-24, on Mar. 3. SEMO is 15-6 in games where it outscores its opponent in the final 20 minutes. The Redhawks 58 points vs. Little Rock are their most in a second half through 33 games this year.

// 10 or More 3-Pointers

The Redhawks matched a season-high 13 three-pointers in their 87-82 loss to UT Martin (Jan. 5). Southeast Missouri has made 10 or more 3-pointers in nine games this year. SEMO is third in the Ohio Valley Conference with 265 threes through 33 games. The Redhawks 265 threes rank seventh-most in a season in program history.

// OVC Home-Openers

With its win over SIU Edwardsville (Dec. 31), Southeast Missouri evened its record to 15-15 in Ohio Valley Conference home-openers. It marked Brad Korn's second-straight OVC home opening win as the Redhawks head coach.

// 40-Minute Win

For the fourth time this season, Southeast Missouri led for the entire game en route to victory. SEMO led from start to finish in its latest 78-64 win over Eastern Illinois (Feb. 16). The Redhawks also led SIU Edwardsville (Dec. 31), Lyon College (Nov. 12) and William Woods (Nov. 22) for all 40 minutes of play.

// Battling Through It

Southeast Missouri played with a full roster just four times this season. SEMO had all 13 of its players active vs. SIU Edwardsville (Dec. 31), at Southern Indiana (Dec. 29), at UT Martin (Jan. 5) and vs. Lindenwood (Jan. 12). The Redhawks were short-handed in 16 games this year, at times playing with three or more inactive players. SEMO also used seven different starting lineups.

// Veteran Milestones

Chris Harris went over 100 three-pointers made and 200 rebounds in his career this season. Harris presently has 133 threes and 313 rebounds as a Redhawk. He went over 200 career assists (235) at UT Martin (Jan. 5), as well.



// Redhawks Drop OVC Opener

The Redhawks dropped their Ohio Valley Conference opener by a score of 86-81 to Southern Indiana on the road Thursday. Southeast Missouri fell behind by 23 points and outscored USI, 55-43, in the second half. The Redhawks comeback bid, however, came a bit too late as the Screaming Eagles hung on for their first OVC win in program history. SEMO fell to 10-22 all-time in league openers.

// MVC Foes

Southern Illinois marked the third Missouri Valley Conference opponent Southeast Missouri played this season. SEMO went 1-2 against the MVC this year with a road win at Evansville (67-61, Nov. 16), road loss at Bradley (73-60, Nov. 19) and home loss to Southern Illinois (70-68, Dec. 21).

// Larson Delivers

In only his second career start, Adam Larson pitched in a career-high 19 points to lead the Redhawks at Arkansas State (Dec. 14). All five of Larson's field goals made were 3-pointers. He also went a perfect 4-of-4 at the free throw line en route to his third double-digit scoring game this season. Larson is third on the team with 35 three-pointers made.

// Three-Straight 20-Point Games

Israel Barnes had over 20 points in three consecutive contests prior to missing three contests due to illness. Barnes pitched in a season-high 23 vs. Purdue Fort Wayne (Dec. 7). Russell scored 25 points and Israel Barnes had 23 vs. Purdue Fort Wayne (Dec. 7) and Russell had 26 points and Barnes finished with 21 at Missouri (Dec. 4). Russell (9), Barnes (5) and Harris (4) have accounted for 18 of SEMO's 20-point games this year.

// Barnes Named Both OVC Co-Player and Newcomer of the Week

Guard Israel Barnes was named Ohio Valley Conference Co-Player and Newcomer of the Week on Dec. 5. A native of Wichita, Kansas, Barnes recorded back-to-back 20-point performances last week. He averaged 21.5 points and four rebounds in two games, while shooting 53.8 percent (14-of-26) from the field and 50 percent (7-of-14) from 3-point range. Barnes opened the week with a season-high 22 points and four 3-pointers in 22 minutes off the bench at Milwaukee (Nov. 28). He followed that up with 21 points in his first career start at Southeastern Conference member Missouri (Dec. 4). UT Martin's Parker Stewart (Co-Player), Eastern Illinois' Kyle Thomas (Co-Freshman) and Little Rock's Ethan Speaker (Co-Freshman) rounded out the week's honorees.

// OVC Top Two

Individually, Phillip Russell is second in the Ohio Valley Conference in scoring (18.2 ppg) and second in assists (5.1 apg).

// Cream City Classic Recap

Southeast Missouri played three games in three days at the Cream City Classic in Milwaukee, Wisconsin (Nov. 26-28). SEMO went 1-2 at the four-team event. The Redhawks defeated Boston (63-52) and fell to both UC Davis (73-71) and host Milwaukee (84-68). Phillip Russell averaged 16 points, dished out 10 assists, added eight rebounds and had three steals to lead the Redhawks in the tournament.

// November Wrap

The Redhawks finished their opening month of the season with a 5-3 record as one of three Ohio Valley Conference teams above .500 to begin the year. SIU Edwardsville (5-2) and Tennessee State (4-2) are the others. Southeast Missouri's five wins are currently second-most in the league. SEMO posted its first winning record in November since 2018-19 (4-3).

// Barnes Rises

After missing the first five games with a sprained knee, Israel Barnes made his Southeast Missouri debut at the Cream City Classic. Barnes played in all three of SEMO's games at the event. Against host Milwaukee, he scored 22 points off the bench to lead the Redhawks. Barnes scored 11 points in a row and wound up with 13 in the first half. He shot 7-of-14 from the field, 4-of-8 from 3-point range and 4-of-4 at the free throw line in 22 minutes.

// Branson Logs First Start

Dylan Branson re-joined Southeast Missouri's starting lineup at the Cream City Classic (Nov. 26-28). Branson, after missing the first four games of the season with an ankle injury, started all three games in Milwaukee. It was the first time he started since SEMO's Ohio Valley Conference Tournament semifinal game against Murray State on Mar. 4, 2022.

// Redhawks Blow Out William Woods

Southeast Missouri improved to 2-0 at home with its 87-49 blowout win over William Woods (Nov. 22). SEMO's 38-point win gave Brad Korn his largest victory over any opponent since he became the Redhawks head coach. SEMO also beat Lyon College (Nov. 12), 83-47, by more than 30 points this year.



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// Redhawks Beat Evansville

Chris Harris scored 14 points to lead Southeast Missouri to a 67-61 road win at Evansville (Nov. 16). SEMO trailed just once in the game, which saw Brad Korn get his first win against the Purple Aces at the Ford Center. The Redhawks used a 15-3 run to get a double-digit lead and led, 36-23, at the half. SEMO withstood an early second-half run by UE and held off the Purple Aces down the stretch.

// Home-Opening Win

With its 83-46 victory over Lyon College (Nov. 12), Southeast Missouri improved to 24-8 all-time in home-openers since joining the NCAA Division I ranks in 1991-92. SEMO opened its home slate with a win for the eighth time in 11 years and posted The Redhawks won their home-opener in their home-opener in five of their last seven seasons.

// Over 80

For the 16th time this season, Southeast Missouri scored 80 or more points in a game when it put up 91 vs. Tennessee State (Mar. 2). SEMO also scored 84 vs. Lindenwood (Mar. 1), 102 at Lindenwood (Feb. 23), 85 vs. Southern Indiana (Feb. 18), 80 at Tennessee Tech (Feb. 4), 99 vs. Little Rock (Feb. 2), 84 vs. Tennessee Tech (Jan. 21), 91 at Morehead State (Jan. 14), 94 vs. Lindenwood (Jan. 12), 82 at UT Martin (Jan. 5), 82 vs. SIU Edwardsville (Dec. 31), 81 at Southern Indiana (Dec. 29), 87 vs. William Woods (Nov. 22), 83 vs. Lyon College (Nov. 12), 89 at Missouri (Dec. 4) and 99 vs. Little Rock (Feb. 2).

// Mitchell Delivers

Josh Mitchell came off the bench to get the first double-double of his career when he scored 14 points and grabbed 10 rebounds vs. William Woods (Nov. 22). Mitchell led Southeast Missouri in scoring for the first time this season and posted four dunks to go along with his nice performance.

// Against Non-Division I

Southeast Missouri ran its winning streak to 33-straight victories against non-Division I foes with its 87-49 drubbing of William Woods (Nov. 22).

// Redhawks Take Down South Florida

Southeast Missouri began its 2022-23 campaign with a 64-61 road win at American Athletic Conference foe South Florida on Nov. 7. SEMO opened a season with a win for the third year in a row. The Redhawks were one of three Ohio Valley Conference schools that won on the opening night of this year's college basketball season.

// Season-Openers

With its win over South Florida (Nov. 7), Southeast Missouri improved to 3-0 in season-openers under Head Coach Brad Korn. SEMO opened its season away from home for the 16th time in 17 years this 2022-23 campaign. The Redhawks won three-straight season-openers outside of Cape Girardeau for the first time in program history.

// Great Game!

The Redhawks and South Florida went back-and-forth to eight ties and 15 lead changes in their season-opener that resulted in Southeast Missouri posting a close 64-61 win on Nov. 7. Phillip Russell buried a huge pull up 3-pointer with 29 seconds left and made two free throws 37 seconds earlier to help get SEMO a 63-58 advantage. USF's desperation 3-pointer at the buzzer missed and the Redhawks held on.

// Redhawk Debuts

Five players saw action in their first career game at Southeast Missouri during this year's season-opener at South Florida (Nov. 7). Kobe Clark and Aquan Smart each made their first career start, while Adam Larson, Tevin Gowins and Josh Earley came off the bench. Clark finished with eight points and eight rebounds, while Earley added nine points and eight boards.

// 3-Point Advantage

Southeast Missouri outscored South Florida by a count of 30-12 from 3-point range on Nov. 7. SEMO buried 10 three-pointers with Adam Larson (2), Aquan Smart (2), Chris Harris (2) and Phillip Russell (3) accounting for nine.

// Season 116

Southeast Missouri begins its 16th season of basketball when it heads to the Sunshine State Monday. This year marks SEMO's 32nd as an NCAA Division I program. The Redhawks are 385-555 since joining the Division I ranks in 1991-92. SEMO has a total of eight winning seasons as an NCAA Division I program with its last coming in 2013-14 (18-14).

// Lots of New Faces

Southeast Missouri's 2022-23 roster consists of five returnees and 10 newcomers. Guards Phillip Russell and Dylan Branson are the only returning starters back from a year ago. SEMO added four Division I transfers in Aquan Smart (Florida International), Kobe Clark (Georgetown), Josh Earley (Tulsa) and Gavyn Elkamil (Tulsa). The Redhawks also have a pair of 7-footers with centers David Idada (Netherlands) and Mason Hanback (Jackson, Tenn.) joining the team. Idada, however, is currently not eligible due to NCAA Division I regulations.

// Redhawks Sign Two Talented Guards

Southeast Missouri signed talented guards Marqueas Bell and BJ Ward for the 2023-24 season on Nov. 10. A native of Kansas City, Missouri, Bell was named to the Missouri Basketball Coaches Association Class 6 All-State Team after leading Park Hill High School to its second consecutive 16-win season a year ago. He averaged 19.7 points per game and made 39 percent of his 3-pointers. Bell comes from a talented athletic family that includes Ronnie Bell, a star wide receiver at the University of Michigan, and his twin brother, Kendrick Bell, who received an offer from the Wolverines. His younger



sister, Iaila, also holds an offer from Michigan. Ward, who hails from St. Louis, averaged 11.8 points, 3.2 rebounds and 4.5 assists leading the Red Devils to a 23-9 record and fourth-place finish in the state tournament as a junior. He spent the summer playing for Brad Beal Elite's 17U team. Ward will enter his third season as the starting point guard for Chaminade College Preparatory School, which made back-to-back trips to the Final Four of the Class 6 State Tournament.

Ward is one of the top point guards in the state of Missouri who is currently ranked seventh in the Class of 2023 according to Prep Hoops Missouri.

// Russell and Harris Named Preseason All-OVC

Guards Phillip Russell and Chris Harris earned Preseason All-Ohio Valley Conference honors ahead of the 2022-23 campaign. A native of St. Louis, Russell claimed Second-Team All-OVC accolades in his first year at Southeast Missouri in 2021-22. He ranked second on the team in scoring with 13.4 points per game in 30 starts. Russell led the team with 95 assists and 37 steals. He rated ninth in the OVC in scoring, 10th in assists (3.2 apg), 11th in free throw percentage (.733), 12th in steals (1.2 spg), 13th in 3-point field goals made (1.6 per game), 10th in assist/turnover ratio (1.5) and 15th in minutes played (30.4 mpg). Harris, who hails from Antioch, Illinois, secured Preseason All-OVC laurels for the second-straight year. He was SEMO's third-leading scorer with 9.4 points per game last season. Harris also ranked second on the team with 76 assists and tied for fourth with 20 steals. He was 13th in the league in assists (2.7 apg), eighth in free throw percentage (.763) and 14th in 3-point field goal percentage (.347).

// Redhawks Fourth in OVC Preseason Poll

Southeast Missouri was picked fourth in the Ohio Valley Conference Preseason Poll selected by the league's Coaches and Communication Directors. SEMO accumulated a total of 115 points and two first-place votes. Morehead State is the preseason favorite with 138 points and seven first-place nods. Tennessee State (130 pts., 2 first-place votes) and UT Martin (120 pts., 7 first-place votes) were also picked ahead of the Redhawks. SIU Edwardsville (111 pts., 2 first-place votes), Little Rock (102 pts.), Southern Indiana (68 pts.), Tennessee Tech (62 pts.), Eastern Illinois (31 pts.) and Lindenwood (23 pts.) completed the predicted order of finish.

// Korn in Third Year

Brad Korn has the Southeast Missouri basketball program trending in the right direction entering his third year as head coach in 2022-23. Korn guided SEMO to its first Ohio Valley Conference Tournament semifinal appearance in 17 years and fourth in program history last season. The Redhawks finished fourth in the OVC with an overall record of 14-18 and 8-9 against league foes. SEMO's win total increased by a +3 margin from 11 (2021-22) to 14 (2022-23) victories since Korn took over the helm. Statistically, the Redhawks finished in the top three in the OVC in scoring offense (3rd, 75.6 ppg), free throw percentage (2nd, .732), turnover margin (3rd, +0.41) and 3-point field goals made (1st, .281).

// 3-Point Accuracy

The Redhawks led the Ohio Valley Conference with 281 three-pointers made in 2021-22. Southeast Missouri fell just nine 3-pointers made of breaking its program record (289, 2017-18). SEMO brings back two of its top three 3-point shooters in Phillip Russell and Chris Harris. Russell (48) and Harris (35) accounted for 83 made threes.

// Redhawks Win Two Exhibition Games

Southeast Missouri went 2-0 in exhibition play with wins over Fontbonne (67-52, Oct. 25) and Aurora University (84-51, Oct. 30). Chris Harris led SEMO in both games with 18 and 15 points, respectively. Phillip Russell also scored double figures in each of those preseason contests.

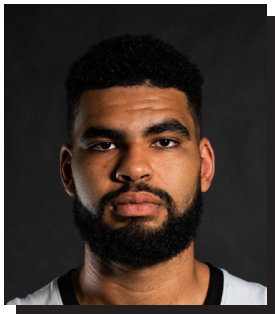

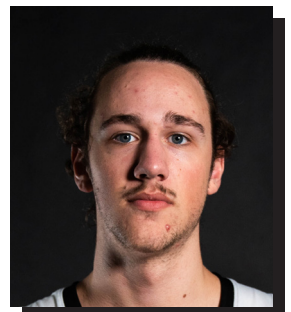

REDHAWK BASKETBALL

Brad Korn has the Southeast Missouri basketball program trending in the right direction entering his third year as head coach in 2022-23.

Korn guided SEMO to its first Ohio Valley Conference Tournament semifinal appearance in 17 years and fourth in program history a year ago. The Redhawks finished fourth in the OVC with an overall record of 14-18 and 8-9 against league foes.

SEMO had a pair of All-OVC performers in Eric Reed, Jr. (First-Team) and Phillip Russell (Second-Team). It marked the first time the Redhawks had a player on both the OVC first and second teams in a season since 2016-17.

The Redhawks win total increased by a +3 margin from 11 (2021-22) to 14 (2022-23) victories since Korn took over the helm.

Statistically, SEMO finished its 2022-23 campaign ranked among the top three in the OVC in scoring offense (3rd, 75.6 ppg), free throw percentage (2nd, .732), turnover margin (3rd, +0.41) and 3-point field goals made (1st, 281). SEMO's 281 three-point field goals made were second-most in a season in

program history.

Korn's first head coaching job has been anything but easy as he took over at SEMO in the middle of a global COVID-19 pandemic.

Throughout all the challenges and uncertainties during an unprecedented 2020-21 season, Korn led his first SEMO team to an overall record of 11-16 and seventh-place finish in the OVC.

The Redhawks made the OVC Tournament for the first time since 2016-17 and saw a +4 improvement in total wins and a +6 jump in OVC victories from the year before. SEMO's nine (9-11) conference victories matched the program's most in a season in 20 years.

SEMO ranked among the top five in the OVC in 3-point field goal percentage (5th, .352), rebounding margin (5th, +2.2), defensive rebounds (5th, 25.6 per game) and defensive rebound percentage (1st, .764).

Korn was officially introduced as SEMO's head coach on Mar. 23, 2020 and is the seventh head coach in SEMO's NCAA Division I era (since 1991-92).

Prior to arriving in Cape Girardeau, Korn spent five years at Big 12 Conference member Kansas State working the four seasons as an

assistant coach and one as the program's Director of Operations.

In his final four years back at K-State after returning following a three-year stint at Missouri State (2013-16), Korn helped the Wildcats to 82 wins and three-straight NCAA Tournament appearances. K-State posted back-to-back 25-win campaigns for the first time in school history (2017-18, 2018-19).

During his first year back in 2016-17, the squad won 21 games, including eight over teams that advanced to the postseason, and knocked off Wake Forest in the NCAA First Four before losing to #18

Cincinnati in the NCAA South Regional First Round.

Working primarily with the post players, Korn was a big influence on the development of two-time All-Big 12 First Team selection Dean Wade, who became the fourth Wildcat to earn All-Big 12 First-Team honors in 2018 and just the second to do so in back-to-back seasons. Wade is one of just three players to rank in the school's Top 10 in both career scoring (1,510) and rebounding (685). He was instrumental in the progress of Makol Mawien, who has started all 103 games in his K-State career and emerged as one of the top big men in the





Big 12.

Korn was also key in the growth of All-Big 12 selections Wesley Iwundu and D.J. Johnson during his first season as an assistant coach in 2016-17. Iwundu, who was twice named Third Team All-Big 12, became the first Wildcat since 2008 to be taken in the NBA Draft when he was selected with 33rd overall pick by the Orlando Magic. Johnson, an honorable mention all-league selection, broke the career field goal percentage record at 59.5 percent, while setting the single-season mark for the second consecutive season at 62.3 percent in 2016-17.

Korn spent one season on Bruce Weber's inaugural staff at K-State as Director of Operations in 2012-13, helping the Wildcats to a 27-8 overall record and their first-ever Big 12 regular-season title. It was the school's first conference title since 1977, while the 27 wins rated second-most in school history.

Overall, he has 15 years of Division I experience, which includes time at his alma mater – Southern Illinois (2004-12). Korn has extensive ties to Weber after playing his first four years (1999-2003) for him at Southern Illinois. He redshirted in 1999-2000 before playing the next three years for Weber. He concluded his playing career for (current Purdue head coach) Matt Painter in 2003-04 before spending the next eight years (2004-12) at SIU as an assistant for then-Saluki head coach and current K-State associate head

coach Chris Lowery.

Korn returned to Manhattan in May 2016 after three seasons at Missouri State, where he served as an assistant coach to then-head coach Paul Lusk from 2013-16. At MSU, he helped the Bears to 44 wins, including a 20 -win season and a trip to the CollegiateInsider.com Tournament in 2013-14.

Korn helped mentor a number of All-Missouri Valley honorees during his stay at Missouri State, including 2014 All-MVC Second-Team selection Jarmar Gulley and 2016 MVC Newcomer of the Year Dequon Miller. In addition, he coached three MVC All-Freshman Team honorees in Austin Ruder in 2014 and Obediah Church and Jarred Dixon in 2016 as well as two Most Improved Team members (Dorrian Williams in 2015 and Chris Kendrix in 2016).

Prior to his first stint at K-State, Korn spent eight years (2004-12) at Southern Illinois, including his final six years as a full-time assistant under Lowery. He helped the Salukis post a 145-116 (.556) overall record with four postseason appearances, two Missouri Valley Conference championships and one State Farm Missouri Valley Conference Tournament title. The squad won 20 or more games and advanced to the NCAA Tournament on three occasions (2005, 2006, 2007) during his tenure as an assistant coach, including a 2007 trip to the Sweet 16. He was a graduate assistant at SIU his first two years before being elevated to a full-time assistant coach on Jan.



31, 2006.

A native of Plano, Illinois, Korn helped the Salukis through one of their greatest periods of success from 1999 to 2004. The squad went from 16 wins his redshirt-freshman season to three consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances under Weber and Painter. He was also a part of three Missouri Valley regular season championships as a player.

The 6-foot-9 forward saw action in 121 games in his career, averaging 5.2 points and 2.3 rebounds in 14.5 minutes per

game. As a senior, he averaged 9.7 points on 41 percent shooting with four rebounds and 1.9 assists in helping SIU to 25 wins and a 17-1 mark in MVC play. He was named to the league's Most Improved Team.

Korn earned a bachelor's degree in Marketing from Southern Illinois in 2004 and his master's degree in Administrative Studies from Missouri State in 2016. He resides in Cape Girardeau with his wife, Kristin, and daughters Brielyn and Ashtyn.
