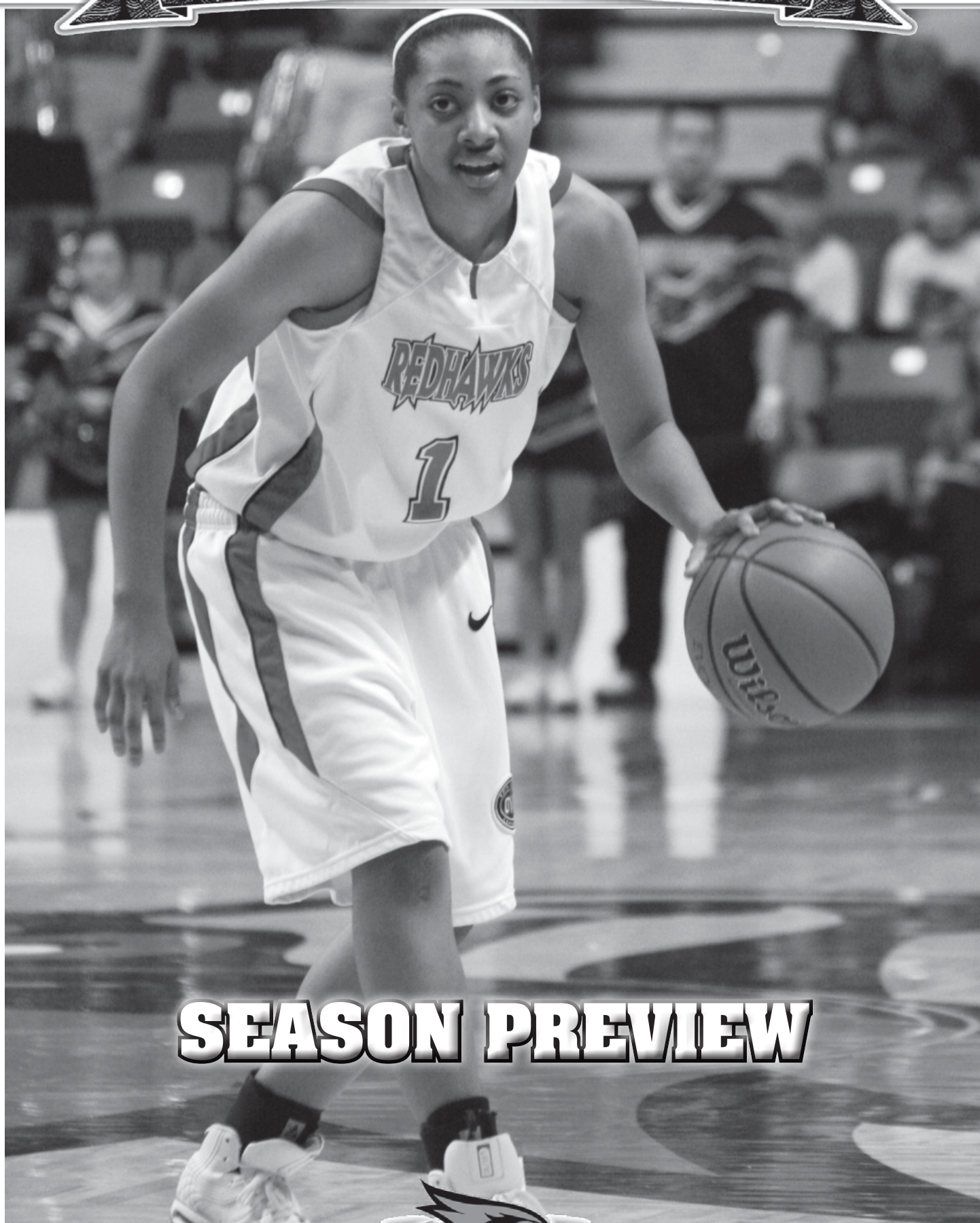

## 2009-2010 PREVIEW



Head Coach John Ishee has a career .741 winning percentage in OVC games

How does a program replace seven players including four starters that were part of the most successful run in Redhawks basketball history? In his fourth season at the helm of the program, Head Coach John Ishee will attempt to answer that question with youth. Coach Ishee brings in the largest freshman recruiting class in school history in hopes of starting a new era of success.

The nine freshmen make up the second-straight top-100 recruiting class by Coach Ishee. These newcomers combined with four returnees will have to replace 77 percent of the team's scoring and 78 percent of the team's rebounding from last season.

The freshmen will have to step-up quick as the Redhawks will need them to provide not only depth but valuable playing time and starts as the Redhawks again embark on another tough schedule. Their non-conference schedule features some of the top teams in such power conferences as Conference USA, the Sun Belt, the Missouri Valley and Horizon League.

Coach Ishee likes the make-up of this year's squad as he sees youthful enthusiasm and energy along with the valuable experience that returns as blueprint for success.

### **BACKCOURT**

The Redhawks lost five players to graduation at the guard positions including two starters who happened to be the team's top two scorers last season. Tarina Nixon and Sonya Daugherty combined for 49 starts and finished their successful careers as members of the 1,000 Career Point Club.

In the Redhawks season opener last season Bianca Beck became the first true freshman in the history of the program to start at point guard in the opening game. Beck would go on to start in 14 games and was one of just three players to play in all 30 games.

This season she is again slated to start at the point and is one of the team's leaders despite being a sophomore. Beck will no doubt improve on her per game averages of 2.8 points, 1.7 rebounds and 1.5 assists average she recorded as a freshman.

This offseason Beck has worked tirelessly on

her outside shooting and her free throw shooting. She also worked on her strength and conditioning to prepare for the long season. That strength will come in handy when she drives the lane for one of her patent lay-ins.

After having Nixon as a mentor last season, Beck will have to be the teacher this year as the Redhawks welcome five freshmen to the backcourt.

All five prep stars will challenge not only for playing time but for a starting spot at the guard positions.

Shelah Fields (St. Louis, Mo.), Jasmine Davis (Cincinnati, Ohio) and Erika Lane (Knoxville, Tenn.) are all capable of playing the point guard position.

Fields looks to follow in the tradition of great St. Louis prep players that have seen success at Southeast. She was a three-time First Team All-Conference selection at Riverview Gardens where she averaged 16.7 points, 4.0 assists and 2.5 steals per game for her career. Her speed and athleticism will benefit the Redhawks in their uptempo game.

Davis was considered one of the top guards out of Ohio after she was named her conference's Player of the Year after scoring 19.0 ppg. She finished as Hughes Center High School's all-time career scoring leader. She too can push the ball up the court and her slashing style will get the Redhawks more open looks in the lane.

Lane is a dynamic point guard from Knoxville, Tennessee who was a two-time All-Conference selection for West High School. She was ranked among the top 125 point guards nationally by The Collegiate Girls Basketball Report.

Monica Miller (Memphis, Tenn.) and Katie Norman (Freeport, Ill.) are versatile enough to play either guard or forward positions for the Redhawks. Both players saw time at point guard in high school but will be looked upon for their scoring more than their passing.

Miller was an All-State selection at Lausanne Prep where she led her team to back-to-back state finals appearances.

Her poise in big games and ability to hit big shots should get her on the court and challenge for minutes.

Norman is a versatile prime-time player with range beyond the three-point arc. She was a All-State selection at Freeport High School and left the program ranking in the school's top-ten in scoring, assists and steals.

### FRONTCOURT

In the frontcourt the Redhawks lost two players that started all 30 games and combined to average over 12 rebounds and 16 points per game. Crysta Glenn led the team 243 rebounds last year which ranks tenth on the program's single season charts.

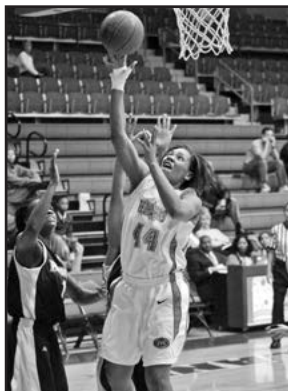
She was also the team's third leading scorer at 10.1 points per game and was the team's leading free throw shooter.

Rachel Blunt started in 72 games in her Redhawks career and left the team as one of the top free throw shooters in the program's history. Blunt's loss will be felt in her leadership on and off the court. She was a two-time CoSIDA/ESPN the Magazine Academic First Team All-District selection, the only player to accomplish the feat.

Lauren Sharpe is the team's top returning offensive and defensive player. One the OVC's top defenders she finished fourth in the league in steals at 2.1 per game. She recorded three or more steals in 11 games last season including seven in the team's season opener vs. Missouri State. She also was the team's top shot-blocker with 13 rejections.

On the offensive end she averaged 8.0 ppg and led the team with a .429 field goal percentage and shot .337 percent from beyond the arc.

Senior Lesley Adams will also look to fill the void in production and leadership not only in the frontcourt but on the team. The highly touted junior college player played in 27 games last season including six starts. Despite averaging 2.5 ppg and 2.9 rpg she showed flashes of brilliance as evidence by her being named OVC Newcomer of the Week last season after averaging 10.0

points and 7.0 rebounds per game while shooting a team-best .538 from the field and .667 from the free throw line.

Sophomore Amber Holmes looks to make an impact this season after a freshman campaign in which she saw action in 26 games. Though she averaged just 1.1 ppg and 1.3 rpg, she gained valuable playing time and is one of the team's top post defenders. Her long arms and soft touch gives her the ability to shoot over taller players. She spent the offseason working on her footwork and technique.

As with the backcourt the Redhawks have freshmen that will challenge for starting spots and playing time on the wings and down in the block. Brittany Harriel (Cincinnati, Ohio), Shanece Miller (Cincinnati, Ohio), Patricia Mack (Columbus, Ohio) and Bailie Roberts (Maryville, Tenn.) give the Redhawks much needed competition and options in the frontcourt.

Harriel is an unheralded player with plenty of experience from a powerhouse high school program. She was an understudy to Tennessee recruit Amber Gray as a junior and stepped up as a senior. She was a Cincinnati Enquirer All-Ohio Honorable Mention who averaged 8.0 ppg, 7.0 rpg, shot over 50-percent from the field and 70-percent from the free throw line as a senior.

Miller played at Anderson Senior High School where she was a two-time All-conference selection averaging nearly a double-double per game her senior season. She offers an emerging interior game with mobility on the blocks and in the open court that should prove valuable for the Redhawks.

The long and lean Mack was an All-Ohio Honorable Mention as a senior after averaging 12.0 ppg and 8.0 rpg as a senior. She is still developing her game for the post but has outstanding faceup skills.

Roberts gives the team toughness and hustle in the frontcourt. She averaged 18.2 ppg, 7.0 rpg and 2.3 apg her senior season and was named All-District for the third-straight year. Her versatility has her projected to play in a number of positions for the Redhawks and her sound fundamentals and solid shooting skills should translate into playing time.

4th SEASON

SOUTHERN MISS

Since his return to Cape Girardeau in 2006, no coach has had as much success as Redhawks women's basketball coach John Ishee over the course of the last three seasons. Three years at the helm; two Ohio Valley Conference Championships and two postseason berths including the program's first NCAA Women's Tournament appearance in 2007.

Since taking over the program as acting head coach on Nov. 9, 2006 and later officially named the team's head coach on March 5, 2007, coach Ishee has compiled a record of 62-32. That mark and his .659 winning percentage is the best in the OVC during that span and the best start of a coaching career by any Redhawks coach in the program's successful history.

Last season Coach Ishee led the Redhawks to their 12th-straight OVC Tournament appearance after the team finished 15-15. Guiding the team through one of the toughest non-conference schedules in the program's history, the team found more success in OVC play as they finished 10-8 in league play. Among the highlights of the 2008-09 season was the Redhawks winning 16-straight OVC road games, at the time the nation's second longest streak and having two players eclipse the 1,000 career points milestone.

In 2007-08, Coach Ishee led the team to a 23-9 overall record including a OVC record of 17-3 to claim the Redhawks second-straight regular season OVC Championship. Those 17 conference wins set a new OVC best for conference wins in a season. The Redhawks also went an amazing 10-0 in OVC road games, the first time the Redhawks have went undefeated on the road and the first time a team has accomplished that in the OVC since 2002. The regular season title gave the Redhawks an automatic berth to the Women's National Invitational Tournament (WNIT), the first appearance at the prestigious event for the program.

During the 2006-07 season Ishee guided the Redhawks to the best single-season mark in the program's NCAA Division I history by posting a 24-8 record, their first outright Ohio Valley Conference regular-season title in school history along with an OVC Tournament championship and NCAA Tournament appearance. For his efforts, Ishee was named the 2007 OVC Coach of the Year, while two players (Lachelle Lyles and Missy Whitney) captured All-OVC accolades. Southeast ranked first among the OVC and NCAA Division I leaders in several categories, including rebounding margin (1st/9th) and defensive field goal percentage (1st/28th).

Ishee, a 21-year veteran at the collegiate level, came to Southeast from New Mexico Highlands University, an NCAA Division II institution, where he served as head coach of the Cowgirls' basketball team in which he recorded a 7-11 record that season.

During the 2001-02 season, he finished with a 22-10 record at the helm of the women's basketball program at Life University in Georgia. He guided the Runnin' Eagles to a No. 18 ranking and a Sweet 16 appearance in the NAIA Division I National Tournament before Life University dropped collegiate athletics late that summer, which led

Ishee to his first stint at Southeast where he served as a volunteer assistant coach during the 2002-03 season.

After leaving Southeast, Ishee moved on to New Mexico State University, where he served as the team's top assistant coach and recruiting coordinator for two seasons. During the 2003-04 season, he helped lead the Aggies to the program's first and only Sun Belt Conference Tournament semifinal appearance. That team also earned the program's only victory against a top-25 nationally ranked opponent. His 2004-05 recruiting class was rated one of the top-50 in the nation by the All-Star Girls Basketball Report.

Prior to his head coaching stint at Life University, he served as an assistant at Saint Louis University for the 2000-01 campaign and spent three seasons at Ole Miss as the team's recruiting coordinator. During his stint at Ole Miss, the Lady Rebels made the (WNIT) in 2000.

During the 1996-97 season, the Gulfport, Miss., native was with McNeese State University as the team's Associate Head Coach, where the Cowgirls made it to the Southland Conference tournament semifinals with a record of 17-9. It was the ninth-best turnaround in the NCAA that season.

In 1995, he was an assistant coach at the University of Pacific, who made an appearance at the Big West Conference tournament championship game.

From 1991 thru 1994, he served as an assistant coach at his alma mater, Southern Mississippi. Those teams made two NCAA Tournament appearances, including a Sweet 16 appearance during the 1993-94 season. Ishee recruited and helped lead the squad to a school best national ranking and finished with a record of 26-5.

He served as a graduate assistant coach for the Southern Mississippi men's team from 1989 thru 1991, assisting the team to a 1990 NCAA Tournament appearance.

From 1987-1989, he served as the head coach for both the men's and women's basketball teams at Prentiss High School in Prentiss, Miss. There he captured two division championships and two state playoff berths while compiling a combined record of 77-40 at the prep level.

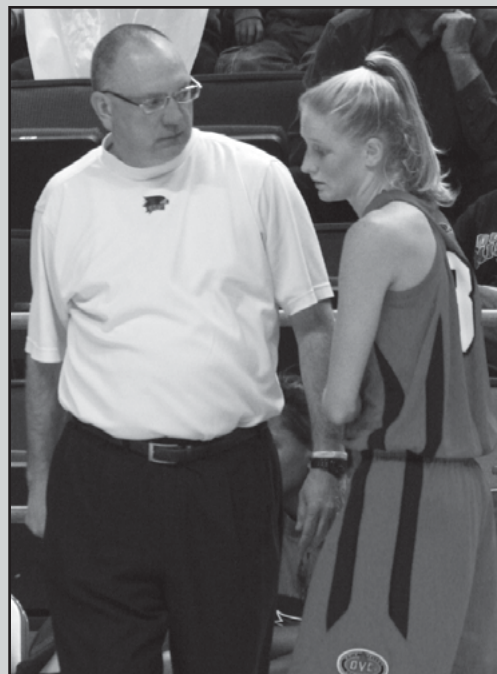

Elizabeth Cansdale begins her second season as a member of the Redhawks coaching staff. Her duties include serving as the team video coordinator, monitoring academic progress, planning and arranging travel arrangements, conduct film exchange, scouting, handle various administrative duties, recruiting and coaching.

Prior to coming to Southeast, Cansdale was the video coordinator for the women's basketball team at Tulsa.

A four-year letterwinner at Ole Miss where she played from 2001-2005, she helped lead the Lady Rebels to back-to-back NCAA Tournament appearances in her junior and senior seasons. She averaged 4.3 points per game over her career that saw her play in 89 games including 14 starts. Cansdale tallied 384 career points, including 85 of 239 three-point attempts for a percentage of .357. She completed her career ranked third on the school's all-time three-pointers made per game list, knocking in a career-best six against both Mississippi State and Vermont. Cansdale also registered 107 rebounds during her collegiate career.

Her senior season she averaged a career-best 7.4 ppg as she led the Lady Rebels in three pointers made (50) and attempts (134). She played in all 29 games including 13 starts.

A native of Boulder City, Nevada just outside of Las Vegas, Cansdale served as the Girl's Varsity Assistant Coach and Girl's Freshman Head Coach at her alma mater Bishop Gorman High School. She led the freshman squad to a two-year 26-2 record, and helped the varsity post a 62-3 mark in that same time. The varsity was ranked 17th-nationally by USA Today, as well as ranked as the top team in the state of Nevada, and won back-to-back class 4A State Championships in 2006 and 2007.

As a prep she averaged 20.6 points, 8.9 rebounds, 5.1 steals and 2.9 assists as a senior and was named Gatorade Player of the Year for the state of Nevada. She earned All-State first team honors both her junior and senior seasons. She finished her career as the school record holder for career points by scoring over 1,400 points.

Cansdale has the distinction of having her name on a plaque in the Naismith Basketball Hall of Fame. In 1986 she was the Elks Lodge National Hoop Shot Free Throw Champion which was held in Springfield, Mass. which garnered her the Hall of Fame honor.

In 2005, Cansdale received her bachelor's degree in business administration from Mississippi. She's currently pursuing her masters at Southeast Missouri State in Higher Education with an emphasis in Athletic Administration.

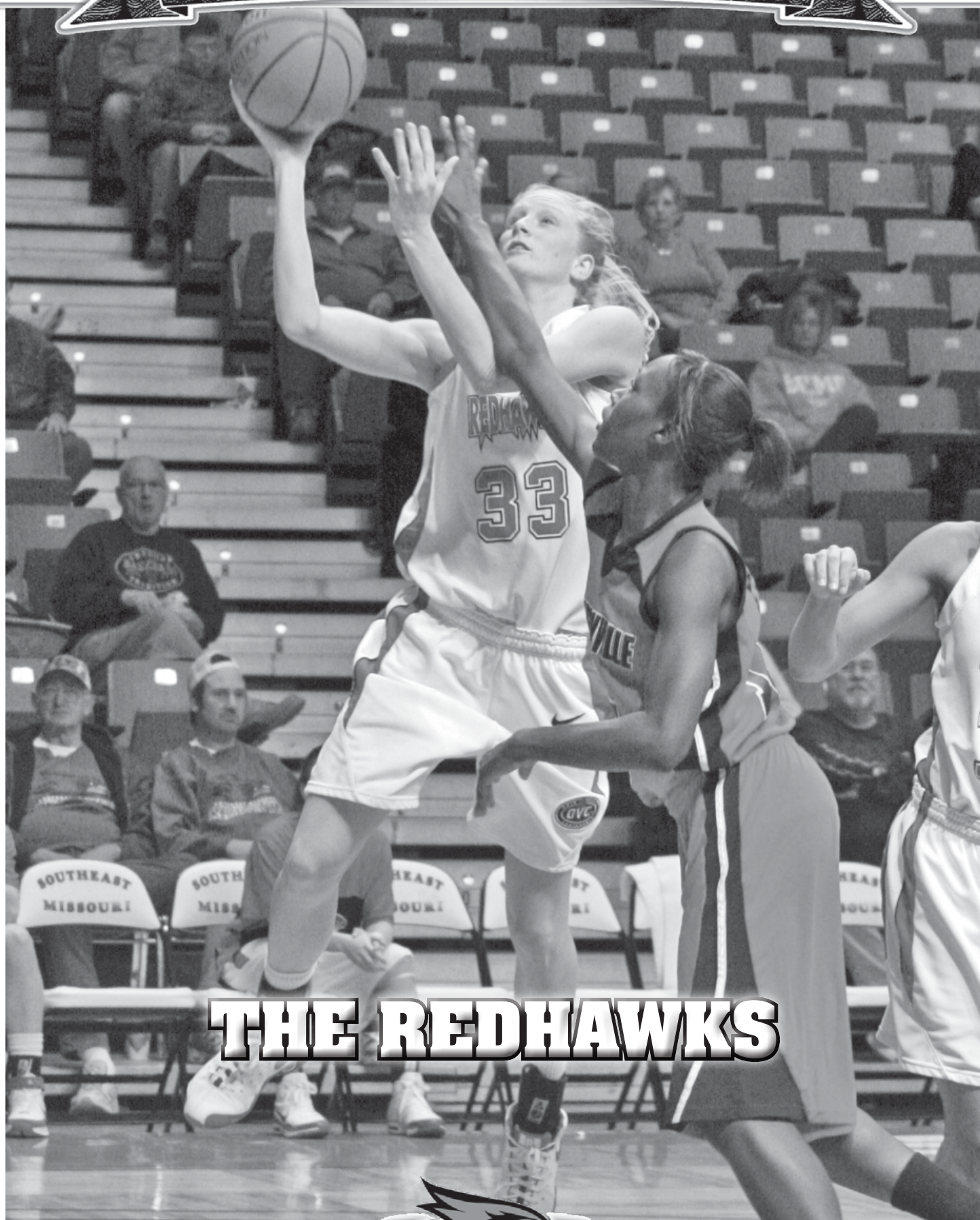

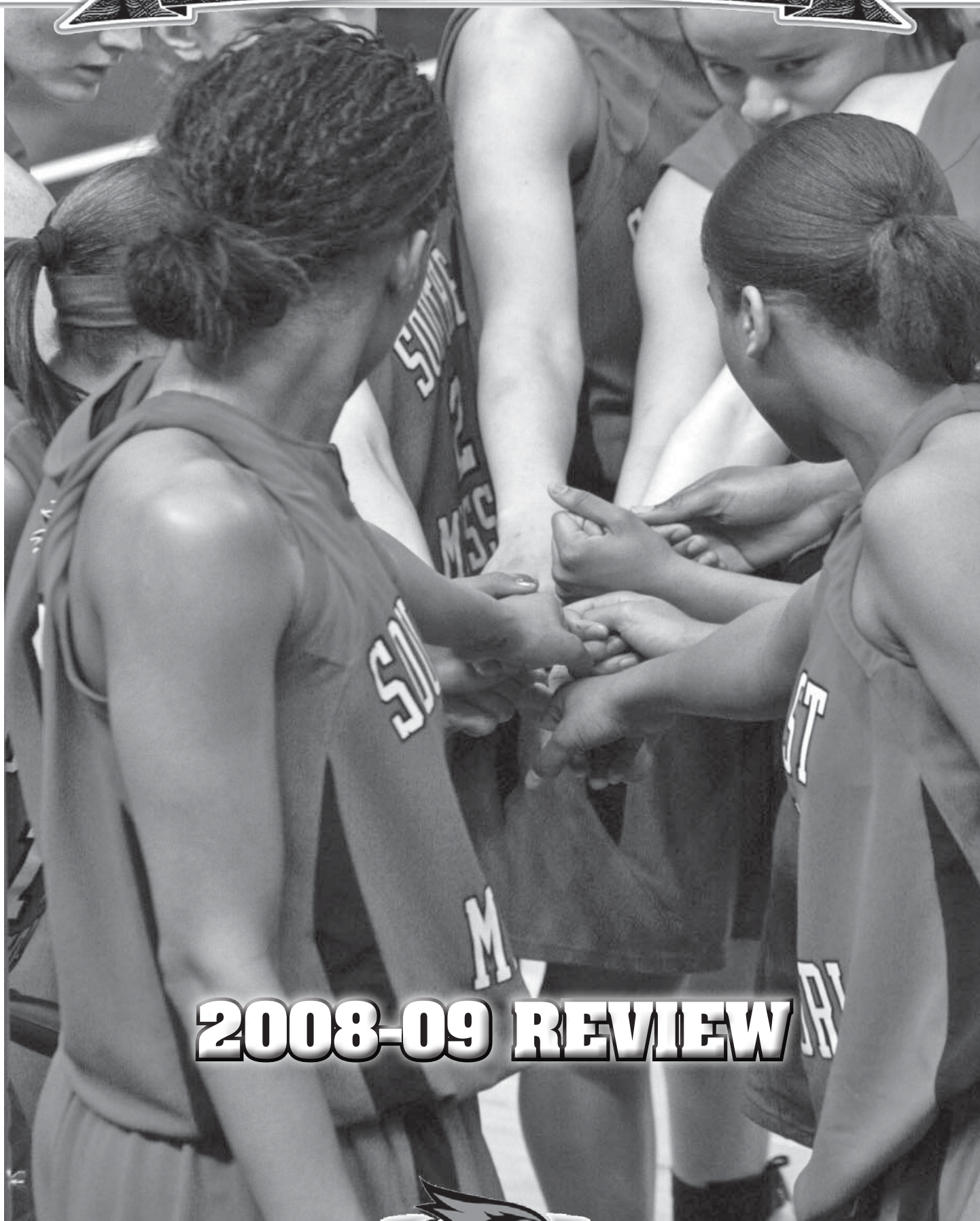

The expectations for the Redhawks women's basketball team were high during the 2008-09 season. However it was expected after the team returned ten letterwinners including seven seniors from a team that won the OVC regular season and received the program's first WNIT bid. These ten letterwinners were a major reason why the team was the top women's program in the OVC over the previous seasons.

During that span the team won two regular season OVC titles, one OVC Tournament title, a NCAA and the for mentioned WNIT berth.

However it's just as hard to stay on top as it is climbing there. Picked to finish third by coaches in the OVC Preseason Poll the Redhawks still felt that they had a target on their back. That challenge was one of many that the Redhawks had to face during the course of the season.

The toughest non-conference schedule since the team jumped to DI was the first test. The schedule featured four teams that participated in post season play the previous year.

With Preseason All-OVC selections Tarina Nixon and Son-ya Daugherty leading the way the Redhawks started the season undefeated in their first three home games with wins against in-state rival Missouri State and regional rivals Central Arkansas and Arkansas-Little Rock. The 67-64 win against the Bears at the Show Me Center snapped a

three-game losing streak to their non-conference rivals. That win propelled them to their 60-41 win over the Sugar Bears and 57-45 victory over the Trojans.

The Redhawks then embarked on a tough road trip that saw them travel to the Sunshine State to face nationally ranked Florida State. The Seminoles were too much for the Redhawks and won 62-31 to give the Redhawks their first loss of the season. That loss started a four-game losing streak including a 0-2 start in OVC play as they fell to Austin Peay and Tennessee State at home. The losses also coincided with the team getting hit by injuries. The Redhawks two leaders, Nixon and Daugherty both missed games during that span. Both would return for their 73-54 home win over Bethel College to snap their losing streak.

The Team then embarked on another tough stretch of road games as they spent the whole month on December on the road. The Redhawks started the road trip 0-4 and fell to 4-8 on the season after dropping a 64-47 contest to Head Coach John Ishee's Alma Mater Southern Miss and then going 0-2 at the Tulane Double Tree Classic in New Orleans, La. The Redhawks ended the 2008 calendar year with a 60-31 loss to Missouri in Columbia.

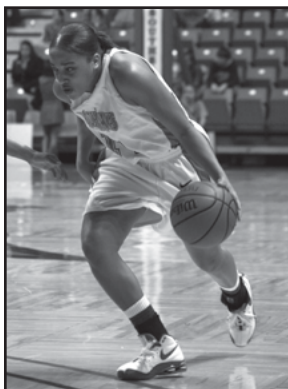

stop the Redhawks momentum with a 74-68 win at the Show Me Center. The highlight of that game was Daugherty becoming the 15th member of the school's 1,000 point club.

The Redhawks bounced back with two more OVC wins including a 62-54 win at UT Martin that saw Nixon join Daugherty in the 1,000 point club. That win gave them a 5-3 conference record heading into an OVC road showdown

with Preseason OVC favorite Murray State. The Redhawks played the Racers tight in the first half but couldn't stop them in the second as the Racers snapped the Redhawks 16-game OVC road winning streak which at the time was the nation's second longest streak.

The Redhawks headed back to the Show Me Center for three home contests and successfully defended their home court as they went 3-0 matching their longest winning streak of the season and put them at 12-10 and 7-4 in the OVC.

The team struggled on the road winning just one of their three OVC contests. A one-point, 55-54 loss at the buzzer to Morehead State is all that stood in the way of the Redhawks gaining some much needed momentum with four OVC games remaining.

The veteran squad erased the tough loss from their minds and defeated first place Murray State 69-51 and UT Martin, 58-39 in their final home contests. The wins gave the Redhawks a 10-6 record and in position to clinch a top-three seed in the OVC Tournament.

But the Redhawks road woes continued as they struggled at Tennessee State losing 70-54 and then the team lost their OVC Tournament home game as they were ambushed by eventual OVC Tournament Champions Austin Peay, 80-74 in overtime.

The Redhawks finished with a 10-8 OVC record which qual-

ified them to their 12th-straight OVC Tournament. However the Redhawks were in unfamiliar territory as they had to play the first round on the road for the first time in four seasons. The No. 6 seed Redhawks would return back to Nashville to face the No. 3 seed Tennessee State for the second time in a week. Despite a spirited comeback the team couldn't overcome the loss of Nixon to an injury in the second half and lost 77-66. It was their first time the Redhawks failed to advance out

of the opening round of the OVC Tournament since 2002.

The Redhawks finished with a final record of 15-15, their fourth-straight .500 or better finish. Nixon was named to the All-OVC Second Team for the second-straight season as she finished her career ranking in the program's top-ten in steals and assists and coming up five three-pointers short of the three-pointers made record. Daugherty finished her career with 1,170 points to crack the team's career top-ten in scoring. Senior Crysta Glenn recorded 243 rebounds, the tenth most rebounds collected in a single season. Senior Rachel Blunt repeated as a First Team CoSIDA/ESPN the Magazine Academic All-District selection, the first women's player to accomplish that feat. It wasn't a fairy tale ending for this group of seniors but it was a memorable one filled with more ups than downs.

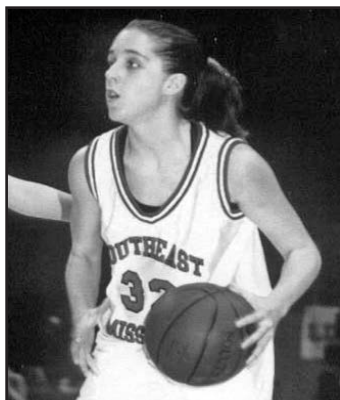

## Natalie Purcell

New Zealand



Became the first Southeast Missouri State graduate to compete in an Olympic Games when she represented her native country New Zealand at this year's Beijing Summer Olympics. Her national team (nicknamed the Tall Ferns) earned a berth by winning the Oceania Championships. The team went 1-4 in pool play at the Olympics defeating Mali in their opening game. Purcell played in all five games as the team's top player off the bench averaging 3.2 ppg and 3.2 rpg. She scored her personal Olympic best six points against the USA gold medal team. She also plays for the Christchurch Saints of the WBL in New Zealand. Purcell played at Southeast from 2004-06 and is second on the school's career three pointers list and tied for the single season three-pointers made school mark.

Brazil

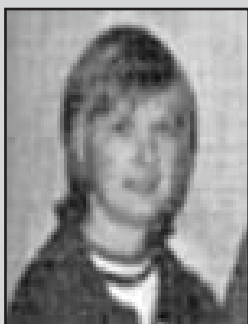

Conceicao played for the Redhawks from 2004-06 where she was the OVC's 2005 Player of the Year and MVP of the 2006 OVC Tournament. A two-time first team All-OVC selection, Conceicao is one of only 16 players in the Redhawks 1,000 Point Club where she ranks 14th on the school's career scoring charts despite playing only two seasons in a Redhawks uniform. She ranks third on the single season scoring charts and seventh on the school's single season steals chart.

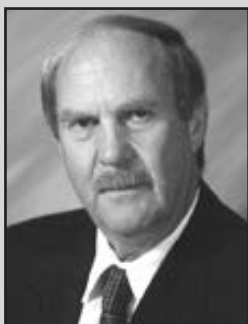

## THE OHIO VALLEY CONFERENCE

the commissioner of the Big Ten, Big 12 and the Mid-American Conferences.

The OVC's proud past dates back to 1948, but seeds for the new league were actually planted in 1941. It was then that Roy Stewart, the athletics director at Murray State, Charles (Turkey) Hughes, the athletics director at Eastern Kentucky, and Kelly Thompson, the public relations director at Western Kentucky, first broached the idea of forming a new conference. Discussions were put on hold by World War II, but reemerged Feb. 27-28, 1948 at the Kentucky Hotel in Louisville as the three original institutions combined with Morehead State, Louisville and Evansville to form the OVC.

In the 1950s, the OVC became a pioneer on a much more significant scale socially. During times of racial segregation, league member Morehead State became one of the first non-traditionally black mid-southern institutions to accept a black student. In 1958, Marshall Banks earned athletically-related aid at Morehead, which signed a second black athlete, Howard Murphy, a year later. In 1961, Murphy earned all-conference recognition as a halfback in football. With racial barriers broken, the rest of the institutions in the league began to provide educational and athletic opportunities to African-Americans.

In the late 1970s, women's athletics began somewhat of a re-birth on the national scene as the NCAA began sponsoring and marketing women's sports. Recognizing the need to provide increased opportunities for female athletes, the OVC established women's championships in the sports of basketball, tennis and track in 1977, with cross country and volleyball added over the next four years. Those sports were initially governed by the Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (AIAW), but the overall strength of women's programs in the league was demonstrated by the automatic bids the OVC instantly received when the NCAA became the governing body in 1982.

Women's basketball in the OVC has been dominated by Tennessee Tech, which has won or shared 16 regular-season titles and owns nine OVC Tournament crowns. In fact, the Golden Eagles have reached the championship game of the OVC Tournament 19 times in the past 28 years. Although Tennessee Tech remains the standard-bearer, four other teams have won 12 of the last 16 OVC Tournaments. Murray State became the latest program to add its name to the list, capturing its first OVC Tournament title in 2008. Austin Peay leads the quartet with six crowns, including four straight from 2000-03 and the 2009 title, while Tennessee State, Eastern Kentucky and Southeast Missouri each have won titles during that span.

Several coaches have made their mark in the relatively short history of OVC women's basketball. Former Tennessee Tech coach Marynell Meadors posted an amazing 363-139 (72.3%) record at Tech, becoming the first woman in NCAA or AIAW history to win 300 games at the same institution, while former Tennessee State skipper Teresa Phillips earned National Coach of the Year honors from USA Today in 1990 for turning around the Lady Tigers' program before going on to lead TSU to the NCAA Tournament in 1994 and 1995. Tennessee Tech coach Bill Worrell capped a stellar 20-year career in 2005-06 and was inducted into the OVC Hall of Fame in 2007; he compiled a 408-190 record while leading the Golden Eagles to an unprecedented 16 OVC regular-season titles and eight NCAA Tournament appearances, including five straight from 1989-93. Eastern Kentucky's Larry Joe Inman,

who retired at the conclusion of the 2007-08 season and was inducted into the OVC Hall of Fame in 2009, won more than 100 games at both Middle Tennessee and EKU, and earned OVC Coach of the Year honors a record eight times - five times at EKU and three at MTSU. He finished his career with 480 career victories.

Many great players have graced the hardwood over the years, including former OVC Players of the Year Brooke Armistead and Gerlonda Hardin from Austin Peay, Pam Chambers, Jerilyn Harper, Cheryl Taylor, Angela Moorehead, Roschelle Vaughn, Diane Seng, Janet Holt and Emily Christian from Tennessee Tech; Morehead State's Donna Murphy and Priscilla Blackford; Eastern Kentucky's Kim Mays; Southeast Missouri's Gray C. Harris; and most recently Murray State's Ashley Hayes who was the OVC Player of the Year in 2007-08 and 2008-09.

Morehead State center Brittany Pittman set new school, league and NCAA standards for blocked shots in 2008-09. Pittman swatted 164 shots during the season, setting a new NCAA single-season record. During the campaign, only her second with the Eagles, she also set career block records for both Morehead State and the OVC (287).

The league also had another historical moment in November 2008 when the NCAA awarded Nashville the 2014 NCAA Women's Division I Final Four. The OVC will serve as the host of the prestigious event, which is one of the biggest sporting events the city of Nashville can host. The event will be held at the Sommet Center in downtown Nashville.

The playing field is not the only place where OVC athletes are working hard. The league also recognizes excellence in the classroom. Six Scholar-Athlete Awards are presented yearly to male and female athletes, while others are commended for their academic success by being Medal of Honor recipients or earning a spot on the Commissioner's Honor Roll. Additionally, the league annually presents one institutional Academic Achievement Award, as well as separate team awards in each Conference-sponsored sport. Since the College Sports Information Directors of American (CoSIDA) Academic All-America program began, the Ohio Valley Conference has had 179 student-athletes honored with the award, including 25 over the last three years (2006-07 to the present).

Through the early years of the league, administrators wrestled with fan behavior due to the close proximity of the Conference members and the intense rivalries which developed. Just as it did decades ago, the OVC took the leadership role on what has become a national issue. In 1995, the OVC implemented a first-of-its-kind "Sportsmanship Statement," a policy which promotes principles of fair play, ethical conduct and respect for one's opponent. The statement has become a model for others to follow across the nation, and has answered the challenge of the NCAA Presidents Commission to improve sportsmanship in collegiate athletics.

Additionally, the OVC annually presents the Steve Hamilton Sportsmanship Award, in honor of the former Morehead State student-athlete, coach and athletics director, to a junior or senior student-athlete with significant athletic contributions who best exemplifies the characteristics of sportsmanship and citizenship. Most recently, the Conference has also implemented the OVC Institutional and Team Sportsmanship Awards, which are presented to one institution and 18 sport-specific teams voted by their peers to have best exhibited the standards of sportsmanship and ethical conduct as outlined by the OVC and NCAA.

The vision of leadership demonstrated by the Founding Fathers in 1948 remains alive today as the Ohio Valley Conference prepares for the future. One example is in regard to the current trend in collegiate athletics administration for increased involvement of university presidents in setting policies and making rules. The presidents of OVC institutions, however, have always governed the Conference, long before presidential governance became a national theme.

The Ohio Valley Conference sponsors the following sports: baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, tennis and track for men, and basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, softball, tennis, track and volleyball for women. In addition, the OVC also sponsors the combined men's and women's sport of rifle.

Now in its seventh decade of competition, the Ohio Valley Conference has grown significantly from its humble beginnings while increasing the number of athletics opportunities it provides for students. Current league representatives include charter members Eastern Kentucky University, Morehead State University and Murray State University, along with Austin Peay State University, Eastern Illinois University, Jacksonville State University, Southeast Missouri State University, Southern Illinois University Edwardsville, Tennessee State University, Tennessee Technological University and the University of Tennessee at Martin.

## THE OHIO VALLEY CONFERENCE



For the 16th time in 17 years, the Ohio Valley Conference invades downtown Nashville to crown it's women's basketball champion.

The site of the tournament this year is the Sommet Center (formerly known as the Gaylord Entertainment Center) in downtown Nashville, marking the 11th time the event has taken place in the building.

The Tournament was first held at the Sommet Center in 1997 (marking the first basketball event in the building) and has been there every year since with the exception of 2002, 2004, and 2008.

The state-of-the-art facility has received rave reviews from OVC players, coaches and fans. Among the building's amenities is a new Megatron scoreboard which was installed in 2007. The building, which is home to the NHL's Nashville Predators, seats up to 20,000 people for select basketball events.



Eight teams will make up the field for the 2009 OVC Tournament, with first-round games set for Tuesday, March 2 at the on-campus sites of the top four seeds. The winners of those games will come to Nashville for the semifinals on Friday, March 5. The OVC championship game is set for Saturday, March 6, with the winner earning the Conference's automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament.



The OVC is contracted to have its tournament in the Sommet Center through the 2014 season.

Last season No. 5 seed Austin Peay topped the No. 2 seed Eastern Illinois 69-65 in a thrilling double-overtime game to claim the school's sixth OVC Tournament Championship.

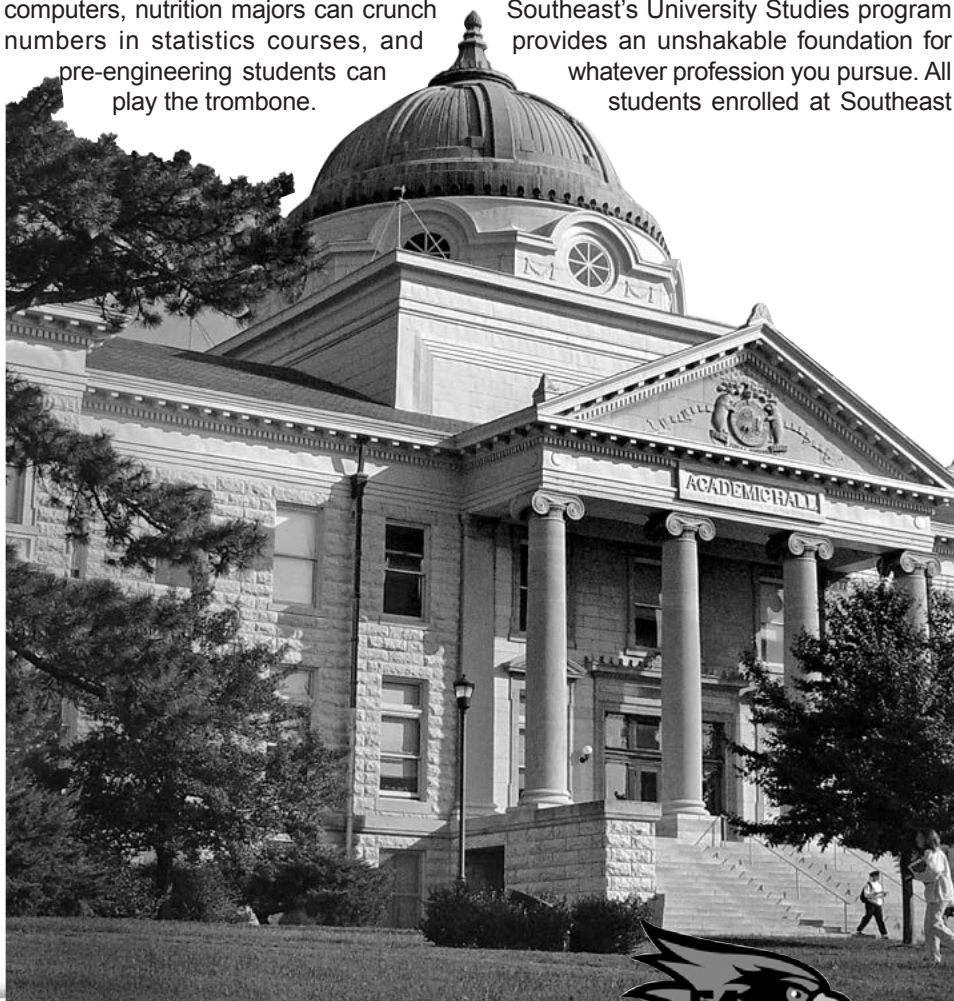

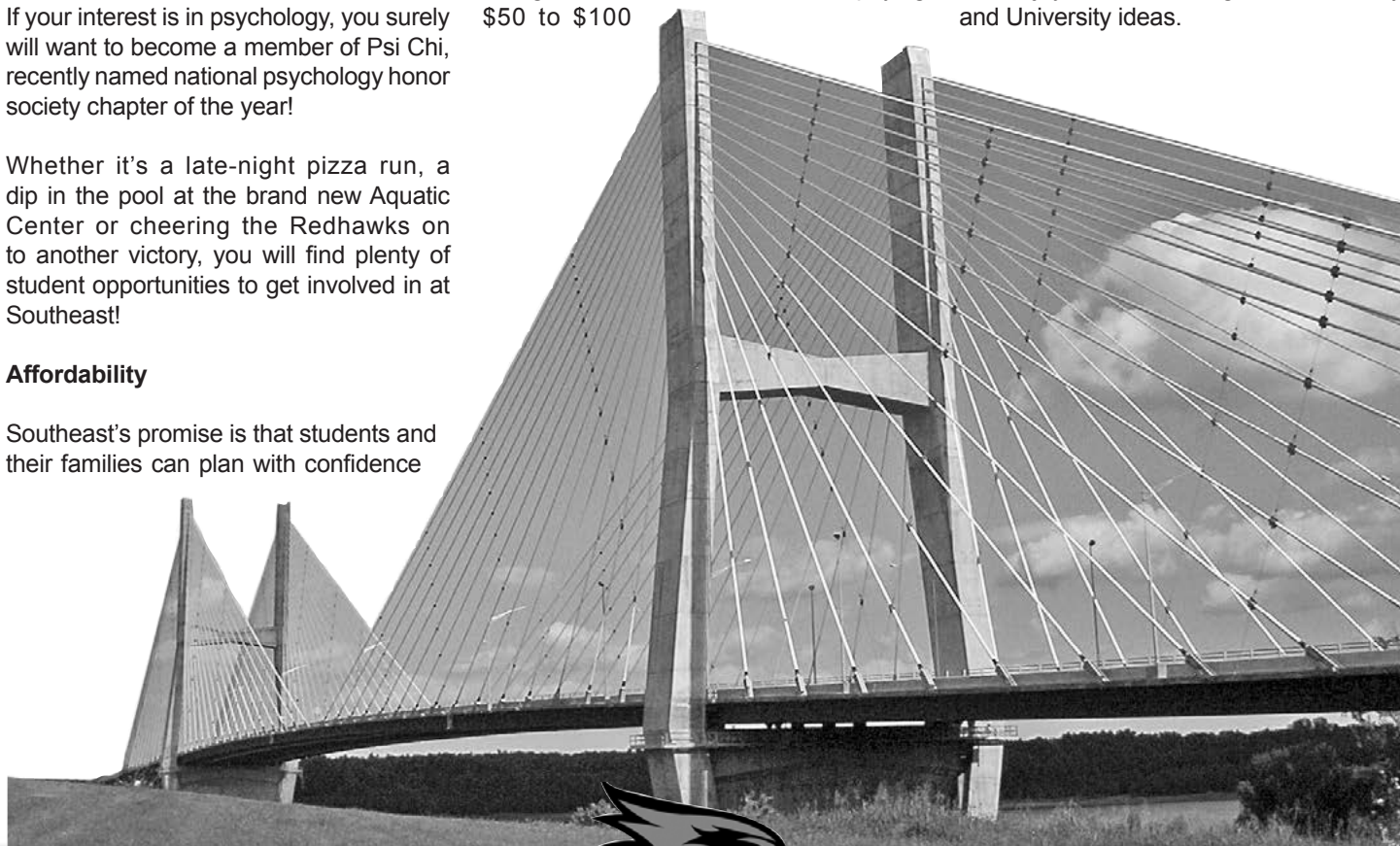

## DR. KENNETH W. DOBBINS

### University President

**D**r. Kenneth W. Dobbins became the seventeenth president of Southeast Missouri State University on July 1, 1999, after serving in several positions in higher education administration both at Kent State University in Ohio and at Southeast.

During his tenure at Southeast, academic programs have been enhanced, including establishment of a School of Polytechnic Studies and the Earl and Margie Holland School of Visual and Performing Arts which opened in Fall 2007 on the new \$50 million River Campus. The Donald L. Harrison College of Business has been recognized for the last four years by a Princeton Review publication as one of the best business schools in the nation and the Department of Communication has achieved national accreditation of its programs in journalism, advertising, public relations, radio, and video production. The Department of Industrial and Engineering Technology also received its initial ABET accreditation under President Dobbins' leadership.

Enrollment has increased significantly, topped 10,000 for the first time in Fall 2005, and stood at over 10,800 in 2008. Record enrollments in higher education have occurred in the University's 25-county service region during his tenure due to the establishment of new regional campuses in

Sikeston and Kennett and a higher education center at Perryville serving place-bound students in and near those rural communities.

An innovation center and business incubator to promote entrepreneurship and enhance the region's economy opened on the campus in 2005; a University Research Village is being planned on the 400-acre former University farm on Interstate-55 and the Department of Agriculture has relocated the farm to a new site; a comprehensive review of all academic and nonacademic programs has been accomplished to maintain quality and minimize student fee increases in the face of significant state appropriation reductions; and capital construction projects totaling over \$200 million have been completed to expand and modernize the University's physical plant.

Dr. Dobbins has served a two-year term as president of the Missouri Council on Public Higher Education (COPHE), the organization for presidents and chancellors of Missouri's public universities. He serves on and is a past chairperson of the Committee on Professional Development for the American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU). He also serves on the AASCU Board of Directors, and in November 2008 was elected as the secretary-treasurer. He is also one of five presidents selected to teach at the AASCU New Presidents' Academy. He is the immediate past president of the Ohio Valley Conference (OVC), a position he also held for a previous two-year term, and is currently a member of the OVC Finance Committee. In addition, he is a vice president of the

executive board of the Greater St. Louis Council, Boy Scouts of America.

He earned his B.S. degree in accounting from the University of Akron (Ohio) in 1971 and served as a commissioned officer and civilian executive in the U.S. Air Force for almost 10 years. He received the M.B.A. degree in 1979 from Old Dominion University (Virginia), and the Ph.D. in higher education administration in 1987 from Kent State. He is also a Certified Public Accountant in Ohio.

From 1981 until 1991, Dr. Dobbins held several positions at Kent State. He came to Southeast in 1991 as Vice President for Finance and Administration, and served as Executive Vice President from July 1993 until his appointment as President six years later.

Dr. Dobbins and his wife, Jeanine Larson Dobbins, founding coordinator for the Missouri Statewide Early Literacy Intervention Program based at Southeast, have a son, Paul, and a daughter-in-law, Stacey, who are both Southeast graduates.

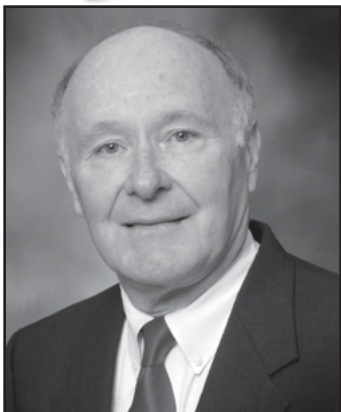

## JOHN SHAFER Director of Athletics

**A**ll it takes is five minutes to see how determined John Shafer is to build on the success of the Southeast Missouri State University Athletic Department.

Shafer was named the eighth Director of Athletics at Southeast on December 16, 2008 and officially began his duties on February 1, 2009.

Shafer says his first nine months on the job have been better than he expected.

"The people within the university and city of Cape Girardeau have been tremendous," he said. "The staff has been very supportive during this transition."

Shafer made his first big hire when he announced Dickey Nutt as the Redhawks head men's basketball coach on March 12, 2009. Nutt coached 13 seasons at Arkansas State before taking over the Southeast helm.

"I knew coming in that hiring a new men's basketball coach would be my first charge," said Shafer. "Dickey met and exceeded all the criteria I was looking for. I believe his reputation, knowledge of the area and respect he gets from other coaches will help us be successful sooner than later."

Shafer, who turned 63 in August, has worn many different hats throughout his career in college athletics.

He last served as a Director of Athletics at Eastern Kentucky University in 2003-04.

In just one year, Shafer helped ECU establish a new academic record when 188 student-athletes were named Colonel Scholars. ECU also finished second for the Ohio Valley Conference Academic Award, as its men's programs nabbed the league's All-Sports Trophy and its women's teams garnered a share of that award. The Colonels, who won their first All-Sports Trophy since the mid-1990s, won conference titles in women's cross country and softball during that year, as well.

When asked what he missed most during the time he was away from college athletics, Shafer mentioned two things.

"I missed the student-athletes and the competition," he said. "I was always around young people as an athletic administrator. Quite honestly, I've been fortunate to endure success both on and off the field at every place I've been. This particular job is a great fit for me and I believe the administration from the President on down wants us to be successful in intercollegiate athletics."

Prior to his tenure at ECU, Shafer held a number of different positions in the Southeastern Conference. He was the Director of Athletics at Mississippi from 1998-02, Senior Associate Athletic Director at the University of Georgia from 1982-98, Assistant Athletic Director for Business at Vanderbilt from 1981-82 and Assistant Business Manager, Football Administrative Assistant and Assistant Baseball Coach at Auburn.

While Shafer was at Ole Miss, the Rebels became the only Division I school in the nation to go to a football bowl game, men's basketball "Sweet Sixteen" and NCAA Baseball Regional in 2001. In addition,

Shafer began a capital campaign that raised more than \$6 million for expansion and renovations to the school's athletic facilities.

At Georgia, Shafer worked under Director of Athletics and legendary football coach Vince Dooley. He coordinated and oversaw all men's and women's conference and NCAA events which the Bulldogs hosted. Shafer also served as the liaison between the Atlanta Olympic Committee and the University of Georgia for the 1996 Summer Olympics. Responsibilities for that position included scheduling, supervising ticket operations, preparing a budget of more than \$23 million and managing its entire insurance program.

A native of Alexandria, Va., Shafer earned both his bachelor's degree in health, physical education and recreation, and master's degree in physical education from Auburn. After earning all-SEC honors as a shortstop, Shafer went on to play professional baseball in the Kansas City Royals organization from 1969-70.

Shafer and his wife, Dianne, celebrated their 40th Wedding Anniversary in December. They have a son, Michael, daughter-in-law, Erin, and two granddaughters, Sophie (5) and Sumner (3). Michael, a 1994 graduate and former basketball player at William and Mary, is currently the head women's basketball coach at the University of Richmond.

Prevention. Treatment. Rehabilitation. Education. Those are the four primary phases of athletic training, and the Southeast Missouri State University Athletic Training staff strives to fulfill all four areas when working with the student-athletes on a daily basis.

Southeast Missouri State student-athletes are offered the best care possible by the Athletic Training staff that includes four full-time athletic trainers, five graduate assistants and several student assistants. The staff serves the student-athletes nearly around-the-clock and at numerous facilities on campus.

The Athletic Trainers begin treatments and rehabilitation as early as 6:30 a.m. and are available until the last student-athlete is through. There are currently three athletic training facilities on campus. The staff treats out of Rosengarten Athletic Complex, where the primary athletic training room is located, with two other sat-

ellite athletic training rooms, located at Houck Field House and the Show Me Center.

The IPF and Starnes Center training rooms are stocked with equipment such as stationary bikes, hand weights, therapeutic modalities, and recent physical therapy equipment. Each component is strategically designed to not only give the student-athletes the best care, but also to aid in returning them to competition as quickly and safely as possible. Southeast Missouri State University Athletic Training has strong working relationships with local physicians and the two hospitals located within Cape Girardeau. It's from these hospitals that the Athletic Training department is assisted by four orthopaedic physicians.

Southeast Missouri State University Athletic Training prides and commits itself to providing comprehensive, personalized and efficient health care to its student-athletes.

Delivery of healthcare focuses on the prevention and management of athletic-related injuries or illnesses while adhering to the National Athletic Trainers' Board of Certification's Standards of Professional Practice. Our high quality of athletic healthcare is provided in combination with the education of athletic training students.

## STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

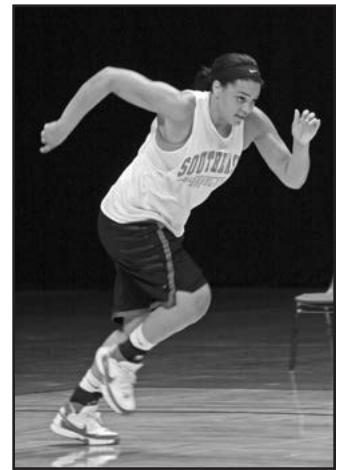

In the weight room, we take a simple, yet comprehensive approach to training. Programs are ground-based, founded on the Olympic Lifts (Snatch, Clean, Jerk) and traditional strength training (Front/Back Squat, Dead Lift, Pressing & Pulling). The concept is simple. Find something heavy, move it in a way that mimics the actions of your sport, as fast as you can. Repeat.

terns so that agility & change of direction are razor sharp.

Once refined, our movements become exceedingly aggressive and intense. "It means very little if we can "lift a house", but can't apply that force at game speed." Accordingly, we spend a great deal of time on both explosive movements and body control to develop first step quick-



ness, acceleration & deceleration, balance & coordination. Finally, we condition our minds and bodies in a way that mimics game circumstances so that by game time, its fun-not work.

It is our hope that through the countless lessons learned in sport and competition, we are helping to develop the leaders of tomorrow. "Since most student athletes will spend more time with me than any other person they come across in their college experience, I take my role as a mentor very seriously. Its not about the destination, but the journey that takes you there."



In the training arena, we attempt to take the foundational strength and power we have developed, and refine it into sport-specific movements and skills. We start by emphasizing correct motor skill and muscle recruitment patterns in order to maximize athletic potential, and minimize the risk of injury. We drill tirelessly on proper movement pat-

## THE REDHAWKS SUCCESS CENTER



The Redhawks Success Center offers Southeast Missouri State athletes a place to study and develop as students and campus leaders.

The Redhawks Success Center is located in the Student Recreation Center South, which is just south of Houck Stadium. The facility offers a computer lab with 18 computers, study areas and conference areas for group meetings.

The area is under the guidance of Cindy Gannon, Associate Director of Athletics; with assistance from Director of Academic Services Sharon Burgard, full-time assistant Sonya Bain and two graduate assistants - Lauren Scannell and Geoff Wester.

The compliance offices for the Redhawks athletics teams are located in the success center and are currently overseen by Assistant Athletics Director of Compliance Brady Barke and his graduate assistants Matt Carter and Rachel Blunt.

The beautiful facility should enhance the outstanding work in the classroom already enjoyed by Southeast student-athletes. Over 52 percent of the student athletes at Southeast maintain a 3.0 or higher cumulative grade point average.

During the 2008-09 school year, Southeast had a total of 141 scholar-athletes. Tutors are available for athletes as needed. In addition, both attendance and academic progress are monitored through attendance checks and regular grade checks with faculty.

A special course is required for all first time athletes at Southeast. The course, which offers three credit hours, is part of a comprehensive program developed to address study skills and life skills topics and thus, enhance retention and academic success for student-athletes.



Entering student-athletes are evaluated for academic preparedness and assigned to appropriate categories. Student-athletes who are deemed "at risk" based on ACT scores and an assessment of their high school or junior college transcripts are provided with individualized academic programs that includes meeting with a mentor at least bi-weekly to discuss academic progress.

The Student-Athlete Excellence Center staff also works to get athletes involved in campus and community projects. This is all done to provide a support structure to allow greater opportunity for academic success for student-athletes.

The Redhawks women's basketball team is one such team that has reaped the benefits of the Success Center and its excellent staff. Last season the team recorded a cumulative GPA of 3.050 and had eight players accumulate GPAs of over 3.0 for the academic year. Five players recorded cume GPAs over 3.667 including a perfect 4.0 GPA by Rachel Blunt. During the 2008-2009 academic year five players were named to the OVC Commissioner's Honor Roll and Blunt was awarded the OVC Medal of Honor for achieving the highest GPA in the conference in her particular sport. Additionally eight more Redhawks basketball players were named Southeast Scholar Athletes.

Blunt was named to the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA)/ESPN The Magazine Academic All-District First Team for District 7 for the second-straight season for academic achievements. Blunt is the first women's basketball player to be named multiple Academic All-District team's in the program's history.





## THE SHOW ME CENTER



The 7,000-seat Show Me Center (SMC) is the home of the Southeast Missouri men's and women's basketball teams.

Completed in August of 1987, the building is designed for a variety of events. The facility is a joint-venture of Southeast Missouri State University and the city of Cape Girardeau.

The floor is portable parquet, which was purchased from the 1987 NCAA Division II Midwest Regionals in Indianapolis

The combined SMC and Student Recreation Center, which received a complete renovation and expansion in 1999, were originally built at a cost of \$18 million.

The Student Recreation Center is adjoined to the Show Me Center and houses the Redhawks' practice facilities and weight rooms. The center has seven basketball courts, including three hard courts, five racquetball courts, an indoor track and a new indoor lap pool and climbing wall.

Men's and women's locker rooms at the Show Me Center have been completely remodeled and new basketball offices on the north side of the Show Me Center were completed during the fall of 2003.

# PinkZone®



The WBCA Pink Zone® initiative is a global, unified effort for the Women's Basketball Coaches Association's (WBCA) nation of coaches to assist in raising breast cancer awareness on the court, across campuses, in communities and beyond.

encouraging all in attendance to wear pink and themselves wearing pink t-shirts during warm-up and pink shoe laces on their basketball shoes, the Redhawks raised \$1,673.25 towards the cause from that game.

The WBCA began the WBCA Pink Zone®, formerly known as "Think Pink", in 2007 as an initiative to raise breast cancer awareness in women's basketball, on campuses and in communities. Kay Yow, former North Carolina State University head women's basketball coach, served as the catalyst for the initiative after her third reoccurrence of breast cancer in 2006. In 2007, more than 120 schools unified for this effort and helped make the inaugural year a success. In 2008, over 1,200 teams and organizations participated, reaching over 830,000 fans and raising over \$930,000 for breast cancer awareness and research. The 2009 campaign raised over \$1.3 million, reached over 912,000 fans, unified more than 1,600 participating teams and organizations, and saw 56+ schools break attendance records at their event. The WBCA's charity of choice is the Kay Yow/WBCA Cancer Fund®, in partnership with The V Foundation. The WBCA strongly encourages all donations from Pink Zone games to be given to this Fund.

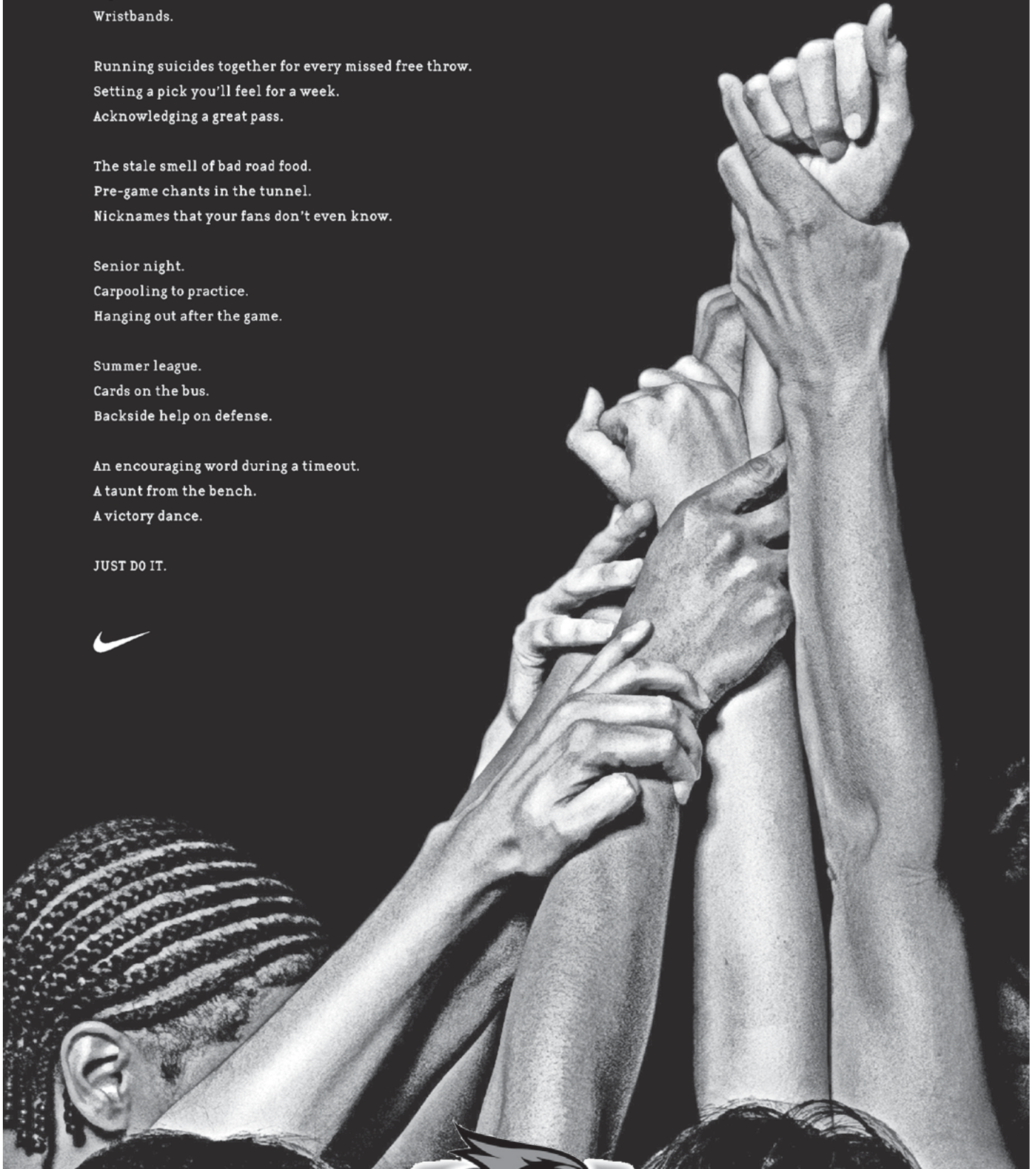

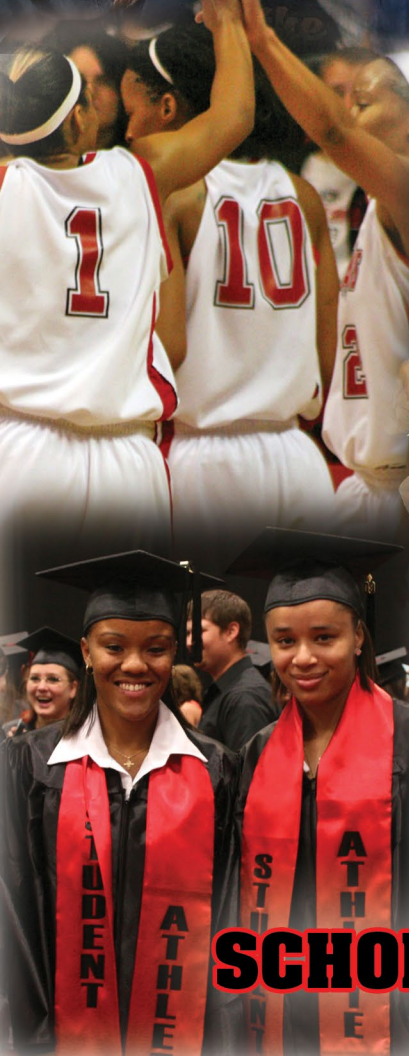
