#### ▶ IN THE PAINT

- ♦ The **Green-and-White** of **Delta State University** continues to prove they are a force to be reckoned with this season as they have **won ten games in a row**.
- ♦ Although the **Lady Statesmen** suffered their only loss early this season, **Delta State** has proven to be the best team in the **Gulf South Conference** with a **perfect 6-0 mark** in conference play.
- ♦ **DSU** has jumped to **No. 9** in the recent **WBCA poll**. A No. 13 ranking was the highest the **Lady Statesmen** received in the poll last season.
- ♦ This week **Delta State** will face conference rival **North Alabama** for the **50th time** in program history. **DSU** leads the series 44-5 over the Lions.
- ♦ Last season saw **UNA** taking the season series 2-1 as **DSU** fell to the Lions twice in regular season. The **Lady Statesmen** sought and found redemption in the third meeting of the season between the two squads at the **NCAA South Region Tournament** opening round.
- ♦ **Delta State** ended the season for the Lions with a **51-41 win** as **Seneca Walton** guided **DSU** to the victory with a **double-double**, 15 points and 11 boards.
- ♦ Perennial powerhouse programs **Delta State** and **Union University** will meet on the hardwood for just the fourth time on Saturday, Jan. 18. **DSU** leads the series 2-1 with the only loss being from the 1984-1985 season.
- ♦ The **Lady Statesmen** are coming off **two big conference wins** over **Shorter** and **Lee University**. Both Shorter and Lee are in the transition phase to **NCAA DII** as both teams have made the move from **NAIA**.
- ♦ **DSU** defeated Shorter **64-48** as four of the **Green-and-White** placed in double figures- **Chelsey Rhodes** (18), **Becca Ruckes** (12), **Rhandi Ball** (10), and **Rhandi Ball** (10).
- ♦ Snapping a **43-game home win streak**, **Delta State** routed Lee University on its home turf with a **final 71-64**.
- ♦ Junior center **Seneca Walton** played with intensity against **Lee** as she posted a **season-high 22 points** and 11 boards for her **seventh double-double** of the season.
- ♦ Crosset, Ark., native, **Shanae Govan**, is playing lights-out for her last season as a **Lady Statesman**. She is averaging **7.2 points per game** and **4.8 assists per game** to rank **2nd in the GSC**.
- ♦ Nationally, two **Lady Statesmen** rank in the top 20 in respective categories. **Walton** ranks **15th in double-doubles** with seven so far this season. **Govan** is currently ranked **No. 13 in steals** with 3.18 steals per game.

#### UP NEXT

♦ **Delta State** will hit the road again for its longest road trip of the season when they travel to Valdosta, Ga., and Pensacola, Fla. The **Lady Statesmen** will face the **Lady Blazers** of **Valdosta State** on Thursday, Jan. 23 at 5:00 p.m. Then, they will travel east to take on the **Argos** of **West Florida** on Saturday, Jan. 25 at 2:00 p.m.

**David Midlick** (30-11) enters his second season at the helm of the Delta State University Lady Statesmen basketball program. He was formally introduced as the fifth head coach in Lady Statesmen history on Monday, July 9, 2012.

In his first campaign as head coach at Delta State, Midlick led the Lady Statesmen to a 21-10 overall record and an NCAA Sweet 16 finish after advancing to the championship game of the NCAA South Region Tournament. The Green-and-White captured the Gulf South Conference regular season title after finishing conference play 13-5.

The Lady Statesmen marched their way to the title game of the NCAA South Region Tournament with a 51-41 victory over the University of North Alabama and an 81-58 win over the University of Alabama-Huntsville. DSU fell in the title tilt to Nova Southeastern University 78-56.

Midlick's 21 wins are the most ever by a first year coach of the Lady Statesmen. The legendary Margaret Wade won 16 in her first season at DSU while another DSU legend Lloyd Clark established the previous record of 20 in 1983-84.

Two Lady Statesmen were also recognized as All-Gulf South Conference players, as Rhandi Ball was named to the First Team and Seneca Walton was tabbed for the Second Team.

Guard Chelsey Rhodes was named GSC Freshman of the Year and established a new freshman record for 3-pointers made with 45.

The Memphis, Tenn., native brought nine years experience at the NCAA Division I level back to the Mississippi Delta. During his time with Tennessee State and Austin Peay State, Midlick established himself as a great evaluator of talent and once on campus the ability to develop student-athletes into successful players on and off the court.

Prior to coming to DSU, Midlick spent the last two seasons as an assistant coach at Austin Peay State University, where he served under head coach Carrie Daniels and the Lady Governors. Midlick was in charge of forwards and centers development, while assisting with recruiting, academic tracking, scheduling, compliance and game planning. Two of his signees in the 2011 APSU class were ranked nationally by ESPN.

Midlick spent four seasons at Tennessee State University prior to joining the Austin Peay coaching staff. While with the Lady Tigers, Midlick helped engineer a complete turnaround from winless squad to Ohio Valley Conference contender. As the program's recruiting coordinator and director of post development, Midlick turned Tennessee State's standout post players Obiageli Okafor, a first-team All-Ohio Valley conference selection in 2010, and Jasmine Smith, an OVC All-Newcomer team selection in 2009, into difference makers for the Lady Tigers.

Before taking on the challenge at Tennessee State, Midlick began his dream to be a collegiate coach as an assistant coach for the legendary Dave Loos at Austin Peay State. He served the Governors from 2003-2006 and honed the skills that have served him at every stop along the way. Under Loos' leadership, Midlick was responsible for preparing scouting reports and video preparation, while assisting with the evaluation and recruitment of student-athletes.

Midlick was an established and successful physical therapist in Greenville, Miss., before embarking on the path to becoming a college head coach. He twice served as head boys basketball coach (1994-97, 1999-2003) at Washington School and also served as varsity girls coach from 1999-2002. In between his stints at Washington, he coached varsity boys and girls at Indianola Academy.

During his time at Washington School, Midlick was named the Mississippi Independent Association of Schools North AAA Coach of the Year in 1996 and MAIS District I-AAA Coach of the Year in 1999.

Midlick enjoyed a strong playing career at the University of Mississippi under head coach Ed Murphy. During his time with the Rebels, Midlick played in 80 games with 33 starts at guard. In his three-year career, Midlick scored 459 points for an average of 5.8 points per game, while leading the Rebels in free throw percentage (83.7) all three seasons and three-point field goal percentage in 1989.

The Rebels were a National Invitational Tournament participant in 1989 and a Southeastern Conference Tournament finalist the following season. Midlick was a three-time Academic All-SEC selection (1989-91), a 1991 SEC Male Scholar-Athlete and a finalist for SEC Scholar-Athlete of the Year.

PREVIOUS PERFORMANCES

The Delta State University Lady Statesmen continue to prove they are a force to be reckoned with in the Gulf South this season. The Green-and-White defeated the Shorter Lady Hawks 64-48 in the two squad's fourth meeting all time. Sophomore guard Chelsey Rhodes guided the Lady Statesmen to the win with 18 points. Shanae Govan, Rhandi Ball and Becca Ruckes joined Rhodes in double figures. Govan contributed 10 points, career-tying 9 assists and 3 steals. Ball added a double-double with 10 points and 10 boards, while Ruckes finished with 12 points and 2 rebounds. DSU shot 47.5 percent from the field in its victory over Shorter. Delta State snapped a 43-game home win streak held by Lee University since the 2010-2011 season when DSU beat the Lady Flames 71-64 at Walker Arena. The Lady Statesmen shot 49.1 percent from the field in the victory that also marked the first meeting between the two programs.

A 1-1 record on the week left the University of North Alabama women's basketball team with a 8-4 overall record and 3-3 mark in Gulf South Conference play. Two days after holding off Valdosta State, the Lions lost a home decision to West Florida. UNA will hit the road for its next two GSC games, beginning with a Thursday afternoon showdown at Delta State. West Florida dominated the glass and forced 21 turnovers in a 67-52 win at Flowers Hall. It was the first home loss of the season for the Lions. UNA had trouble finding its offensive rhythm throughout the game, hitting only 31.5 percent from the floor, including only 29 percent in the second half. Many of the misses were from point blank range. North Alabama held a brief 19-14 lead after a three-point basket by Dakota Doss. UWF, however, closed the half on an 18-9 run to take a 32-28 lead into the break. UNA never led in the second half. Rebounding proved to be a big factor as the Argonauts held a commanding 56-37 advantage in the category. UWF grabbed 24 boards at the offensive end, leading to 20 second-chance points. Against VSU, the Lions overcame a slow offensive start to grind out a 51-49 home victory. Faris scored 15 points, including a

pair of free throws with 11 seconds remaining to seal the win. UNA hit only 24 percent from the floor in the first half, including an 0-for-7 showing from three-point range. After connecting on just 6-of-25 shots from the floor in the opening 20 minutes of play, the Lions trailed 22-18 at the break. Madry helped key an 11-2 run to get the Lions back in the game. The junior from Decatur connected on three straight three-point baskets during the spurt. Her three-pointer from the right wing gave UNA a 33-32 lead at the 12:17 mark. Neither team led by more than three points the rest of the way until Faris' free throws down the stretch.

The Union women posted a 1-2 week in their three home games. It was the first time going back to the 1981-82 season when home/away locations could be tracked, that Union has lost two straight home games. Former NAIA and conference foe Lee knocked of Union for just the third time in the 24 meetings on a shot in the final seconds. Union then saw their rally come up short in a 69-60 loss to West Florida Thursday night. Union trailed 10-0 to start the game and were down by as many as 18 points in the second half, before cutting the deficit to just six in the final minute. However, Union was finally able to shake the second semester rust as they exploded for an 80-45 win over Valdosta State. Union hit 17 3-pointer in the win.

INSIDE THE SERIES

The Lions of North Alabama and the Lady Statesmen of Delta State University have had a long contested rivalry since the two teams joined the Gulf South Conference. The two squads have met 49 times since the initial meeting in the 1980-1981 season. DSU holds the commanding 44-5 lead in the series. However, two of the losses came during the regular season last year.

DSU and UNA met three times last season with UNA taking the series 2-1. Game one was played at Walter Sillers Coliseum on Jan. 15 and saw Delta State lose a tight 58-59 ballgame. Chelsey Rhodes led with 14 points, while UNA's Sarah Bailey led the Lions with 11 points. Game two came on Feb. 9 at Flowers Hall in Florence and once again saw Delta State fall 42-52 to the Lions. Seneca Walton led the Lady Statesmen with 13 points, while UNA's Nichelle Fillmore led the game with 15 points.

The Lady Statesmen sought and found redemption a few weeks later at the NCAA South Region Tournament. The opening round featured DSU and UNA. Delta State came out on top with the 51-41 victory to end the season for North Alabama and continue down the road to an NCAA Elite Eight appearance. Walton guided the Green-and-White to the victory with a double-double, 15 points and 11 boards. UNA's Corinne White posted 14 points.

PERENNIAL POWERHOUSES

New to NCAA Division II basketball and Gulf South Conference competition, Union University has made a name for itself as it enters its last season of the provisional stage in the transition to NCAA DII. Union finished last season with the best record in the GSC but was ineligible for postseason play. Delta State and Union are both well known for producing talented basketball programs year after year.

The two programs have only met on the hardwood three times, two last season and one in 1985. DSU leads the series 2-1 over the Lady Bulldogs.

Delta State swept Union last season. Game one was played at Fred DeLay Gymnasium in Jackson, Tenn., and saw DSU defeat UU 77-67. Rhandi Ball finished with 18 points and 10 boards, while Union's Shelby Ashcraft posted 19 points and 8 rebounds. Game two, played at Walter Sillers, was a nail bitter but Delta State was victorious once again as they routed Union 49-46. Seneca Walton led with 10 points and 8 boards, while Union's Amber Rechis dropped 26 points.

LADY STATESMEN ATOP THE GSC

Nearing the halfway mark of the conference schedule, the Green-and-White sit at the top of the Gulf South Conference standings with the only perfect record, 6-0. Not only does Delta State rank No. 1 in the standings but it also ranks at the top of several categories.

As a team, the Green-and-White are number one in scoring defense (52.4 ppg), field goal percentage (47.9%), field goal percentage defense (31.3%), assists (16.92 apg), and rebounding defense (31.6 rpg).

Several Lady Statesmen rank in individual categories. Chelsey Rhodes and Seneca Walton are among the top 10 in scoring. Rhodes ranks fifth with 15.3 points per game and Walton ranks ninth with 13.7 points per game. Walton also leads the GSC in defense (9.3 rpg) and field goal percentage (53.2%). Senior Shanae Govan is making her mark in her last season with Delta State. She ranks second in assists (4.8 apg) and assist/turnover ratio (1.5). Ranking fourth, Govan averages 3.2 steals per game and 33.5 minutes per game.

**LADY STATESMEN OWN GSC TOURNAMENT RECORD BOOK**

The Lady Statesmen made their 26th appearance in the GSC Tournament last season, boasting a league best 15 championships and an all-time mark of 51-11 in GSC postseason play. DSU has appeared in a record 24 semifinals and 21 finals. DSU's 15 championships are 11 more than any other GSC school.

**CLEVELAND - TITLE TOWN**

The Delta State University Lady Statesmen have dominated the Gulf South Conference over the years. The Lady Statesmen own virtually every GSC and NCAA Tournament record in the books. In NCAA history, DSU has appeared in a league-record 24 NCAA regionals with an all-time record of 57-21 (.731).

The Lady Statesmen have made 13 NCAA Elite Eight appearances and nine Final Fours, including 2007-08 and 2008-09, and four championship appearances.

The Lady Statesmen have claimed three NCAA National Championships (1989, 1990, and 1992) and three A.I.A.W. crowns (1975, 1976, and 1977). No other school in the GSC has claimed a national championship in women's basketball.

**THERE'S ONLY ONE...**

In the modern era of Lady Statesmen Basketball, Delta State has suffered just one losing season since 1975-76 and that was in 1979-80 under former head coach Frances Garmon.

DSU is the only school in NCAA history to top 1,000 wins, as the Lady Statesmen boast a 1,063-265-3 record. The Lady Statesmen also hold the GSC record for all-time wins with a 688-144 mark.

Delta State claimed their first GSC title played at the BancorpSouth Arena in Tupelo, Miss., back in 2001-2002 and the first at the Desoto Civic Center in Southaven, Miss., in the 2005-2006 campaign.

**OLYMPIC & NBA LINKS**

Former Lady Statesmen great Lusia Harris-Stewart holds the distinction of scoring the first basket in Olympic Women's Basketball history. Harris was also drafted by the NBA's New Orleans Jazz following the 1977-78 season, becoming the first female drafted into the National Basketball Association.

**LADY STATESMEN BOAST SIX NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS**

Delta State claimed three-straight championships from 1975-1977. The trifecta marked the first time in women's basketball history that a team claimed a three-peat in the AIAW Large University National Tournament. DSU would almost repeat the feat under Lloyd Clark, claiming three titles in four years. The Lady Statesmen were crowned NCAA Division II national champions in 1989, 1990, and 1992. No other current GSC member has claimed an NCAA or AIAW crown.

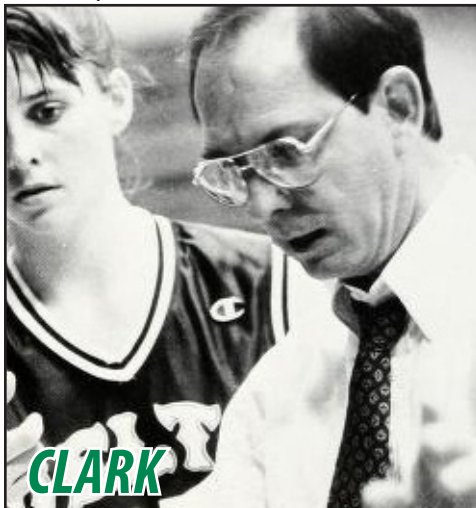

**DSU TIED TO BEGINS OF WOMEN'S COLLEGIATE BASKETBALL**

In the early 1970's, the Association for Intercollegiate Athletics for Women began a push to make women's basketball accessible to college and universities across the country. Delta State was one of the first to make it a priority.

Under Naismith Hall of Famer Margaret Wade, the Lady Statesmen enjoyed unprecedented success from 1974-75 to 1976-77, claiming three straight AIAW National Championships. During her tenure as head coach, the Lady Statesmen went 157-23, including 93-4 during their national championship seasons.

After moving to NCAA Division II in 1986, the Lady Statesmen have continued to be one of the game's most successful programs. DSU claimed NCAA DII national championships in 1988-89, 1989-90 and 1991-92.

The Lady Statesmen also boast the most wins by an NCAA DII member institution with 980 (980-241-3).

**"FAB FIVE" THE FIRST OF MANY AT DSU**

Coach Margaret Wade built a dynasty at Delta State around a group of players, known simply as the "Fab Five." Lusia Harris-Stewart (C), Debbie Brock (PG), Cornelia Ward (F), Wanda Hairston (F) and Ramona Von Boeckman (F) became the first and potentially only starting five named All-American in the same year. All five DSU starters were named to the Hanes 1976-77 All-American Team following a 32-3 season and their third-straight AIAW national championship.

**BASKETBALL HALL OF FAME HOME TO TWO LADY STATESMEN**

Delta State is the only university in Mississippi and the Gulf South Conference to boast two inductees into the Naismith Basketball Hall of Fame - Lily Margaret Wade (1986) and Lusia Harris-Stewart (1992).

Wade became the first female inductee in 1986 after a storied career as a collegiate and high school coach. Her career record stands at 610-112 in 19 seasons at Cleveland High and six seasons at DSU.

Harris-Stewart simply changed the game when arrived on the scene in 1975. The 6-foot-3 center still stands as one of the game's all-time greats. In four years at DSU, she scored 2,981 career points (25.9 ppg), grabbed 1,662 rebounds (14.4 rpg), and graduated with fifteen of eighteen DSU team, single game and career records.

Harris-Stewart led DSU to a 109-6 record and three straight AIAW National Championships. Harris-Stewart was a member of the first-ever women's silver medal Olympic team in 1976, and held the distinction of being the team's leading scorer and leading rebounder.

**2,000 POINTS - 1,000 REBOUNDS**

The Lady Statesmen boast four players in the 2,000 point/1,000 rebound Club. Lusia Harris-Stewart (1974-77) headlines the club, as DSU's all-time leading scorer (2,981) and rebounder (1,662). Deborah Temple (1982-84) joined the club following the 1984 season with 2,225 points and 1,047 rebounds. La'anya Patty (1990-93) joined the club in 1993, finishing her career with 2,106 points and 1,061 rebounds, and Veronica Walker became the latest addition in February 2012 with 2,188 points and 1,088 rebounds.

**LEGENDS COACH HERE**

Very few coaches have had the impact on their respective universities like Margaret Wade and Lloyd Clark. The two coaches combined to win 651 games and six National Championships while prowling the sidelines at Delta State. Wade is often referred to as "the Mother of modern women's college basketball," while Clark's teams were widely known for their defensive prowess and athleticism.

Wade coached the Lady Statesmen to three straight AIAW National Championships, and players under her direction remain on top of the DSU record books. Coach Wade had such an impact, that in 1978, the Women's Basketball Coaches Association named their Player of the Year award after coach Margaret Wade, The Wade Trophy.

Coach Wade had an unheard of record of 109-6 during her first four years at the helm of DSU Women's Basketball. In 1986, Wade became the first woman to be inducted into the National Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass.

During his 19 years as head coach, Lloyd Clark became one of the greatest coaches in women's basketball history. Clark compiled an amazing 494-98 record from 1983-2002. His teams won three NCAA DII National Championships, including back-to-back titles in 1989 and 1990.

Clark's teams reached the NCAA Tournament in 16 of his 19 seasons, and advanced to the Elite Eight 11 times. Clark was named Gulf South Conference Coach of the year five times. In 2006, Clark was inducted into the MS Sports Hall of Fame.

**WBCA HONORS PLAYER OF THE YEAR WITH THE WADE TROPHY**

Each year the best player in NCAA Division I women's basketball is bestowed the most distinct award of its kind, named after a woman who changed the face of the sport forever. The setting: Delta State University, Cleveland, Mississippi. This landmark is the plateau where Lily Margaret Wade pioneered a movement in women's collegiate basketball, first, as a student-athlete, then as an administrator, but most notably as a coach. Garnered as "The Mother of Modern Women's Collegiate Basketball," Wade pioneered an unprecedented dynasty in women's basketball, which led to the growth and popularity of the sport during the 1970's. Today, Lily Margaret Wade's legacy is remembered and symbolized through the oldest and most prestigious award presented in Division I women's basketball, The State Farm Wade Trophy.

# SIX-TIME NATIONAL CHAMPIONS



## 1974-1975 • 28-0 • A.I.A.W National Champions • Coach Margaret Wade

The second year of the Margaret Wade regime would pave the way for over 30 years of success on the hardwood, as coach Wade guided the Lady Statesmen to an undefeated 28-0 record and the program's first national championship. The Lady Statesmen walked through the A.I.A.W. Mississippi State Tournament with victories over Ole Miss (76-52) and Mississippi College (89-87). In the A.I.A.W. National Tournament, the Lady Statesmen reeled off four straight wins to claim the title in Harrisburg, Penn. DSU defeated Federal City (77-75, OT), Tennessee Tech (88-66), Southern Connecticut (71-68), and Immaculata (90-81) en route to the title.



## 1975-1976 • 33-1 • A.I.A.W National Champions • Coach Margaret Wade

The Lady Statesmen became the first major college women's basketball team to claim back-to-back A.I.A.W. championships with a 33-1 record. Led by the "Fab Five" and consensus All-American Lusia Harris, the Lady Statesmen proved to be better than advertised. Delta State shook off a 64-53 loss to Immaculata on Feb. 23, 1976 to refocus and begin an improbable march to history. Coach Wade wasted little time with four straight wins at the A.I.A.W. Mississippi State Tournament to advance to nationals. Once again faced with hostile road crowds, DSU reeled off seven straight wins, including a 69-64 victory over Immaculate for the crown.



## 1976-1977 • 32-3 • A.I.A.W National Champions • Coach Margaret Wade

Dynasty is a word too often used to describe one school's dominance in a sport. With Margaret Wade and the Lady Statesmen, it's understood. The Lady Statesmen erased any doubt of a potential let-down after two straight national championships by rolling to their third straight and a 32-3 overall record. Lusia Harris and the "Fab Five" etched their names in the annals of sport with wins over Minnesota (87-43), Southern Connecticut (75-49), Tennessee (62-58) and Louisiana State (68-55) to claim the nation's first women's collegiate basketball three-peat. DSU went 14-0 at home that year and all five starters were named "All-Americans."



## 1988-1989 • 30-4 • NCAA DII National Champions • Coach Lloyd Clark

In his fourth season at the helm of the Lady Statesmen basketball program, coach Lloyd Clark returned Delta State Women's Basketball to the top's of NCAA Division II as national champions! With a nucleus of Crystal Hardy, Jo Lynn Davis, and many others, the Lady Statesmen rolled to a 30-4 finish en route to the national title. DSU defeated Jacksonville State (76-67), and West Georgia (77-72, OT) to claim the GSC title. Both teams would factor into the national tournament as well. After fighting off four regional foes, DSU blasted California-Poly Pomona, 88-58, for the title and became the first school in NCAA history to win a title at home.



## 1989-1990 • 32-1 • NCAA DII National Champions • Coach Lloyd Clark

Building off the legacy of Margaret Wade and the great teams of the 1970s, coach Lloyd Clark and the Lady Statesmen captured a second straight national title in 1989-1990. The Lady Statesmen posted an impressive 32-1 overall record, and successfully defended Walter Sillers Coliseum 16 times with no home defeats. DSU would do more than enough to win the Gulf South Conference, out right, posting a 16-0 GSC record. Entering the Division II National Tournament, the Lady Statesmen obliterated Albany State by a score of 74-42. Delta State defeated Bentley, 77-43, to claim a second straight national championship.



## 1991-1992 • 30-4 • NCAA DII National Champions • Coach Lloyd Clark

Coach Lloyd Clark and the Lady Statesmen collected their third title in four years in 1991-1992 with a 30-4 overall record and a narrow 65-63 victory over North Dakota State in Fargo, N.D. After failing to claim the program's second three-peat in the 1990-1991 season, the Lady Statesmen were focused and ready to return Delta State to the national championship. DSU marched to the national title led by NCAA Tournament MVP Leslie McKiernon, downing Fla. Tech, W. Georgia, N. Dakota, and Bentley en route to the title game.

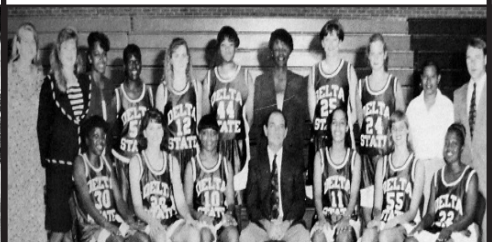
