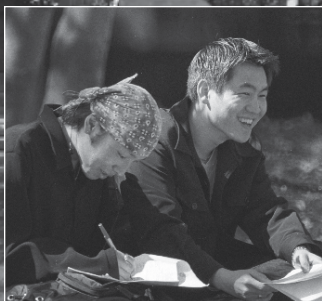
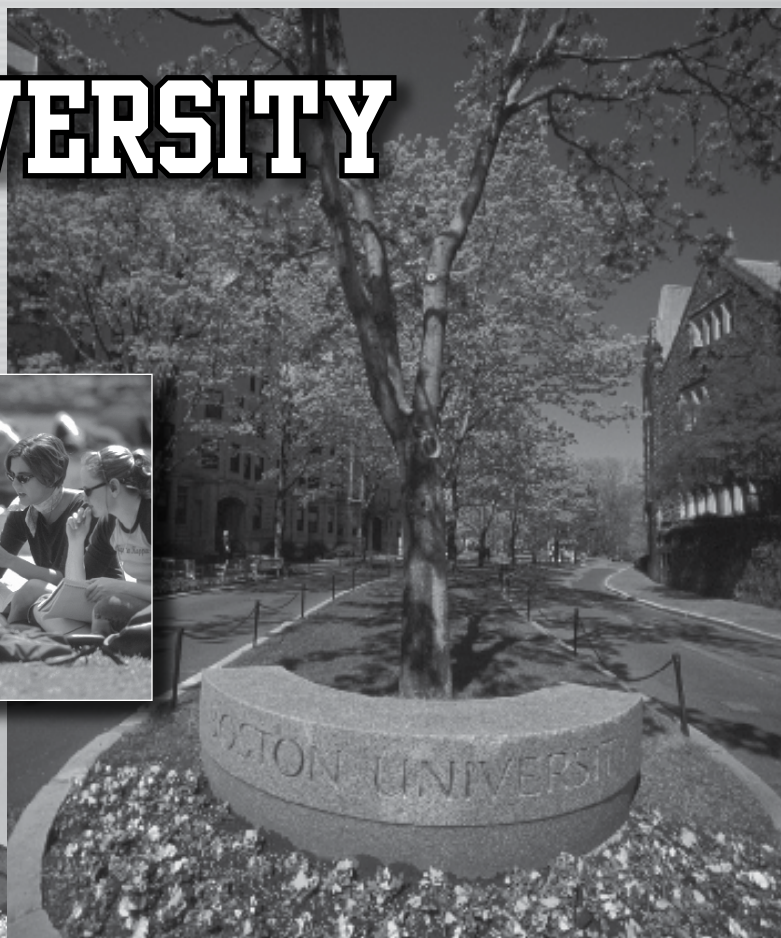
Harry Agganis and Hall of Famer Mickey Cochrane and NCAA Men's Ice Hockey Hobey Baker award winner Chris Drury.

## UNIVERSITY OVERVIEW

Boston University is an international leader in undergraduate education, advanced research and professional studies. With a faculty of more than 3,000 scholars, teachers and researchers, and 30,000 students from all 50 states and 140 nations, the University is the fourth-largest independent university in the United States. The University's 17 schools and colleges offer more than 250 degree programs, including numerous interdisciplinary programs that provide many opportunities to combine career goals and personal interest.

## THE CAMPUS

Boston University's main campus encompasses 135 acres stretching for a mile along the picturesque Charles River from the historic Back Bay section of Boston westward. ## MICHAEL LYNCH

**ASSISTANT VICE PRESIDENT &  
DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS**



Michael P. Lynch was named Director of Athletics at Boston University in April 2004 and immediately launched an aggressive new course for Terrier athletics. Over the past three years since his arrival, Boston University has won 18 league and 67 individual conference championships, and teams or individuals have advanced to participate in NCAA championship competition 25 times. BU student-athletes

have performed admirably in the classroom as well during this time, with nearly half achieving a grade point average of 3.0 or better, while dedicating thousands of hours of service to the greater Boston community. During the 2006-07 academic year, Lynch helped guide the athletic department to six league championships and its fifth Stuart P. Haskell, Jr. Commissioner's Cup — recognizing the America East's top athletic program — in the past six years.

Among the other major accomplishments of Lynch's tenure, Terrier athletics has introduced a new scholarship program to support the educational aspirations of student-athletes, integrated fundraising and marketing operations, reorganized central business functions, completed a branding initiative to strengthen program visibility and notoriety, pushed the utilization of technology as a differentiating medium for the department including a complete relaunch of the athletics department website, GoTerriers.com, initiated a new community service program, enhanced coaching and administrative salaries to improve recruitment and retention, and undertaken additional capital improvements including new locker and training facilities for women's teams. Boston University has also successfully hosted numerous conference and national events, including the 2006 NCAA Women's Lacrosse Championship, which drew record attendance. BU will play host to the 2009 NCAA Women's Frozen Four at Agganis Arena.

In addition to leading Boston University's athletic efforts, Lynch also plays a leading role in helping to shape conference initiatives. He currently serves as a member of the Executive Committee of both the America East Conference and the Hockey East Association. He is also a contributing member to America East's Strategic Planning Committee and Hockey East's Marketing Committee.

Lynch's previous work experience includes over 13 years of management in higher education administration, university advancement and athletics administration, during which time Lynch has:

- Planned and executed fundraising strategies resulting in highly successful capital campaigns totaling over \$100 million in gift income at three different institutions.
- At Boston University, increased annual support for athletics by greater than 200 percent to over \$9 million annually.

Prior to being named AD, Lynch served as Assistant Vice President of Development for Athletics and Student Life at BU. Lynch implemented best practices and developed and expanded fundraising models that saw year over year increases averaging 11 percent in annual support and helped generate close to \$60 million in capital commitments. Lynch is also credited with leadership roles in two capital fund-raising campaigns at the University of Miami (FL) where he served as Assistant AD for Development prior to coming to Boston University.

A native of Binghamton, N.Y., Lynch is a former professional and collegiate All-American baseball player. Lynch earned a B.A. in Political Science from Rollins College and an M.S. in Educational Administration from the University at Albany.





# NICKERSON FIELD

## HOME OF BOSTON UNIVERSITY SOCCER

- An historically rich stadium located in the heart of the Boston University community, Nickerson Field is currently home to the Terrier men's and women's soccer and women's lacrosse teams.
- The former home to the Boston Braves National League baseball club, Nickerson Field was known as Braves Field when Babe Ruth signed his last professional contract on-site in 1935.
- Renovated in May of 2001, Nickerson Field is a 10,412 seat, FIFA-approved FieldTurf facility that has recently played host to the 2006 NCAA women's lacrosse tournament.
- It also served as home to the Boston Breakers of the WUSA from 2001-2003 and the Boston Cannons of the MLL from 2005-2006.



JUNIOR FORWARD JIN OH

The Boston University men's soccer team reached several peaks in 2006 and will be looking to build off of them to reach new heights in 2007. The Terriers had their best start in 12 years, going undefeated in their first five games, including four straight wins to open the season. The defense limited opponents to 12 goals, one short of the program record for least allowed in a season, and BU recorded its first victory over a Big Ten team (Ohio State, 1-0 on Sept. 8) in program history.

"We have our usual tough schedule, but I believe our strength up front and the players' chemistry and willingness to work hard can make the team competitive nationally," stated head coach Neil Roberts, now in his 23rd season leading the program.

BU had a solid spring season and topped off the roster with nine quality newcomers that hail from up and down both coasts, as well as Texas. The Terriers will be a young group – with just two seniors – but BU returns 18 letter winners and four starters from a group that went 10-4-5 in '06 and ultimately fell in penalty kicks to nemesis Binghamton in the semifinals of the America East tournament. Roberts believes senior co-captain Derek Puerta, juniors Neil Hlavaty and Petur Sigurdsson, and sophomore Sammy Appiah will become focal points of a 2007 squad that has the unity, work ethic and talent to make this year's edition a very successful group.

## FORWARDS

Sophomore Shaun Taylor, junior Jin Oh and Sigurdsson are key returners up front for BU. Sigurdsson was the Terriers' leading scorer in 2006 with eight goals and one assist for 17 points. He earned second-team All-America East honors after starting 17-of-18 games played, including seven-of-eight league contests. Sigurdsson rebounded last season after suffering through an injury-ridden rookie campaign in which he saw action in just two matches.

Taylor is a proven international player who has represented his native England on its U-18 team. He, too, fell victim to injury as a freshman and will look to fully display his offensive talents in 2007. Taylor had a quality spring season, scoring a goal against Northeastern and turning in strong supporting performances.

"Petur and Shaun, when they are 100 percent fit and healthy, are dynamic players," said Roberts. "They are both scoring threats and are capable of holding the ball or putting away chances."

Oh suffered no sophomore slump for the Terriers last season. After taking just three shots in five games in 2005, the junior exploded last season, playing in all 18 games and becoming the team's second-leading scorer with five goals (on 27 shots) and one assist for 11 points. He blossomed during conference games, leading BU with four goals – including two game-winners – in eight contests.

Freshmen Timmy Akinsanya and Aaron O'Neal are ex-

pected to compete for spots up front. O'Neal was a two-year member of the Virginia state team as well as a two-time state finalist and a member of the All-State First Team as a junior. Akinsanya will be a utility man for the Terriers. His versatility will allow coach Roberts to insert the rookie in several different spots in the line up. Akinsanya spent four years with the California North Olympic Development Program (ODP) team and is a two-time member of the Region IV ODP team.

## MIDFIELD

Junior Neil Hlavaty and a trio of sophomores – Richy Dorman, Sammy Appiah and Tommy Strackhouse – are expected to fill in the void at midfield left by the graduation of Steve Gahl and Jarryd Goldberg, who each started all 19 games in 2006 and had a knack for generating scoring opportunities. A pair of talented newcomers and a mix of other returners will be available to provide further depth.

"The midfield is very young," said Roberts. "But I believe it will be our strongest area, and we have the potential to be very good. Neil, Richy and Tommy all gained experience and performed well for us last year, and we have some talented newcomers in the Sheas, who will push for spots as well."

Hlavaty earned first team All-America East honors in 2006. He is the only veteran to have started all 19 games and was the team's third-leading scorer with four goals and two assists for 10 points. The Lombard, Ill. native has started every game of his career and doubled his goal production since his rookie year. He has earned All-American honors from [topdrawersoccer.com](http://topdrawersoccer.com) in each of the past two years.

"Neil has continued to improve in the two years he's been here," noted Roberts. "He's really come on as a top player in the New England region, and I see no reason why he will not continue to make big strides as a player for us. He is very good at creating chances and is a leader on the team."

Appiah, Strackhouse and Dorman jumped right into the fray as freshman last season. Dorman and Appiah each received spots on the America East All-Rookie team. Dorman started seven-of-18 games played in the midfield, notching an assist for one point. Appiah was the freshman class's leading scorer, chipping in two goals and two assists for six points. The sophomore started 14-of-19 games, including five-of-eight against America East foes.

Twins Matthew and Ryan Shea will make a push for playing time in the middle. The Sheas were members of the Massachusetts ODP team that was a two-time Region I champion. Matt was a *Boston Globe* and *Boston Herald* All-Star with 73 career assists, while Ryan had 76 goals and 69 assists in his career at Hanover High School.

"Matt was one of the best passers we saw last year," stated the coach. "He has great timing in the air too. Ryan is quick with a good left foot. He gives us a much-needed left side player."

Sigurdsson, Oh, sophomore Jon Jonsson and junior Andrew Bassi can add depth and step into flank positions.

## BACKS

The loss of defensive mainstay Zach Kirby to graduation leaves a question mark in the back. Kirby was the America East Defender of the Year, a draft pick by the Los Angeles Galaxy, a three-time NSCAA Division I First Team All-Northeast Region member and a first team All-America



East selection.

"We'll be depending a lot on our captains Derek Puerta and Paul Mignogna, as well as Jon Jonsson and Dan Schultz, who has made a very smooth transition from forward to center back," said Roberts. "But defense is definitely our biggest unknown."

The veterans will be joined in the back by freshmen Richard Gadbois, Stephen Frazier and Matt McFarland. All will be in the hunt in the wide-open race for the defensive roster spots.

Puerta and Mignogna were a big part of the defensive success the Terriers enjoyed in 2006, and their combined experience will be a boon to a backfield looking for leadership. Puerta saw action in all 19 games, starting 18, while Mignogna played in 15 games. Mignogna also contributed on offense, reverting to his midfielder's tendencies in generating offense. Jonsson stepped up as a freshman, playing in 19 games and starting 15 in back.

Schultz made the move from offense to defense in the off-season and had an outstanding spring. "Schultzie's athleticism, speed and toughness will make him an excellent defender," stated Roberts. "He is technically sound and his one-on-one defense is superb."

"Rich [Gadbois] is a sizable player who thrives in the air and is hard on the tackle," continued the coach. "He has all the physical tools to play Division I soccer."

The native of Corona del Mar, Calif., is a two-time state cup champion with his club team, the Irvine Strikers. He led his team to the Patedores Cup and Nomads Cup title games in 2005 and was an Orange County All-Star. Frazier, a product of Round Rock, Texas, scored 51 career goals and earned first-team All-District honors twice. McFarland graduated from the IMG Academy having served for two years as a team captain and earned the 2006 team MVP trophy.

#### GOALKEEPERS

The Terriers took a hit in goal as well, losing keeper Zach Riffett to graduation after the 2006 season. He backstopped BU all last season and earned All-America honors from topdrawsoccer.com.

Coach Roberts has returners Hrafn Davidsson and Joe Cullaro vying for the starting position and newcomer Jason Lucas in the stable. Davidsson, a sophomore, tallied a shutout in his only start of the season, a 1-0 win over conference rival Binghamton on Sept. 29. He brings experience to the table for BU, having excelled for Iceland's U21 team.

Red-shirt sophomore Cullaro has three years of collegiate experience under his belt and had a solid spring in net for the Terriers. Lucas, who walked onto the team during the spring season, recorded a shutout in his first collegiate appearance against the New Hampshire Phantoms.

#### COACHES

There will be some new faces on the sidelines this season. In the off-season, Roberts welcomed back Francis Okaroh (BU '87, '90) and hired former Penn State and Virginia Tech assistant coach Scott Black.

Okaroh played in MLS from 1996-2002 and won an MLS Cup and earned MLS Defender of the Year honors in 1999. During his collegiate career he was named an All-American three times and was a four-time All-New England selection. Okaroh started all four years and led the Terriers to

back-to-back berths in the NCAA Tournament in 1985 and 1986, including an appearance in the national quarterfinals in 1986.

Black has helped lead PSU and Virginia Tech to the NCAA Tournament. At Penn State he guided the Nittany Lions to the NCAA Sweet 16 twice and the Elite Eight once, while PSU played into

the round of 32 once. Penn State won the 2002 and 2005 Big Ten titles and won one conference regular-season championship. A four-year varsity starter at Wisconsin-Green Bay, Black was a three-year All Mid-Western Collegiate Conference selection as a central midfielder.

#### SCHEDULE

Coach Roberts habitually schedules tough non-conference opponents to give his teams the best chance to excel during the America East slate. The 2007 season is no different. BU will face seven teams that earned bids to the 2006 NCAA tournament, including squads that come from the ACC, the Big Ten, the Big East and the West Coast Conference.

Penn State has participated in three of the last four NCAA tournaments. URI, Brown, Harvard and Binghamton all made the NCAAs last fall, and Santa Clara reached the national quarterfinals in 2006.

"Once again, we have presented our players with a very demanding schedule," noted Roberts. "We are excited to continue our long-standing rivalries with New England's top programs, while the likes of Penn State, Santa Clara and others will help get our young team ready for what should be the deepest conference group in quite some time."

BU hosts cross-town rival Boston College in the team's home-opener on Sept. 1 and follows the Eagles with another city foe, Northeastern. The Terriers will face Fordham and Santa Clara in the adidas-Brown Classic, hosted by the Bears, on Sept. 7 and 9. They will play most of the rest of their non-conference schedule on the road, hosting only Central Florida and Penn State. BU travels to Harvard, URI, UMass and Brown. The Terriers play their America East schedule from Oct. 6 to Nov. 3, opening with defending conference champion Binghamton in Vestal, N.Y., on Oct. 6.

## NEIL ROBERTS

HEAD COACH  
23rd Season

Southern Connecticut '79

Neil Roberts, who is entering his 23rd year as Boston University's men's soccer coach, has guided the Terriers to unparalleled success for the past two decades.

Since his first season in 1985 when BU rolled to a 14-4-1 record and a bid in the NCAA tournament, Roberts has established the BU men's soccer program as one of the elite in the nation.

The team had its finest start in 12 years (4-0-1) in 2006 and finished with a 10-4-5 record and a berth in the America East Tournament semifinals, where BU fell in penalty kicks, 6-5, to Binghamton for the second straight year. The Terriers earned the program's first win over a Big 10 program with a 1-0 defeat of Ohio State, and Roberts picked up his 250th career win, 1-0, against N.J. Institute of Technology on Sept. 3.

Ranking 22nd in the nation among active coaches in winning percentage, Roberts has guided the Terriers to a 257-122-60 overall record, registering an unprecedented 21 winning seasons.

Under Roberts' direction, the Terriers have appeared in 11 NCAA tournaments, advancing past the first round six times. During the 1985 season, the Terriers reached the national quarterfinals. In 1988, 1990, 1993, 1994 and 2004, the Terriers won their first-round matches before being eliminated in the second round.

BU has enjoyed similar success in the America East Men's Soccer Championship during Roberts' tenure. The Terriers won five straight conference titles in the 1990s and, during that stretch, had a 10-game tournament winning streak. In the 17-year history of the postseason competition, BU has advanced to the finals eight times and boasts an overall record of 14-6-4 (.700).

Similarly, in 19 years of regular-season conference play, the Terriers have won the regular-season title six times and posted an overall record of 98-31-20 (.760). From September 1989 through October 1993, Roberts' clubs were undefeated in 29 consecutive conference games, compiling a mark of 28-0-1.

One of the highlights of Roberts' career came in 1994 when the Terriers posted a 16-0-1 regular-season record, making them the only undefeated team in the nation. The season opened with a stunning 3-2 upset win over No. 1 ranked and eventual national champion University of Virginia. The Terriers set seven team records and finished the regular-season ranked first in the nation. They ended the year with a 19-1-1 (.929) mark, including a first-round win in the NCAAs.

The all-time winningest soccer coach in program history, Roberts has coached 12 All-Americans and seven Academic All-Americans. In 1994, Nick Bone, who went on to become the Terriers' all-time leading scorer, was voted the National Freshman of the Year.

Roberts' association with Boston University soccer began in 1979, when he served as an assistant coach under Hank Steinbrecher, who is the former executive director of the United States Soccer Federation. In 1985, when Steinbrecher left the University, Roberts was named the head coach.

The Terrier coach has been recognized 12 times for his coaching excellence. He was the NSCAA New England Coach of the Year in 1985, 1986, 1988, 1994 and 2004. In 1986, 1990 and 1994, he was also the New England Soccer Coach of the Year as selected by the Eastern Massachusetts High School Soccer Coaches Association, and in 1991, 1994, 2001 and 2004, he was the America East Coach of the Year. Also, in 1995, he received the William French Award for coaching excellence from the Boston University Athletic Hall of Fame.

Roberts is equally proud of his players' accomplishments in the classroom. During the 2005 season, 13 players earned America East academic honors, while Steve Walker (1993) and Ola Olsen (1994) received the conference's Scholar-Ath-

lete Award as the outstanding student-athlete in men's soccer.

The holder of a USSF license, Roberts has been actively involved with soccer at all levels. 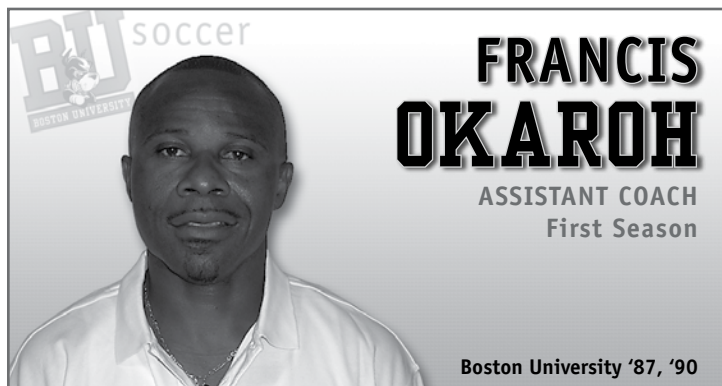
Dan Colwell, a 2004 graduate of the University of Massachusetts at Amherst, enters his second year as a member of the men's soccer coaching staff.

Supervising all strength and conditioning programs for the Terriers' 23 varsity teams, head coach Glenn Harris and his staff aim to improve an athlete's size, speed, strength and power using the latest training techniques.

A 1994 graduate of Springfield College, Harris earned his master's degree in exercise science from Appalachian State in 1996 as a graduate assistant. At ASU, Harris assisted with all 19 varsity teams, including the NCAA-tournament-bound football and women's basketball programs.

Harris came to BU in May 1996, serving first as an assistant strength and conditioning coach. In that role, he supervised the strength and conditioning regimens for the 1996-97 America East champion men's basketball, field hockey and men's soccer teams. He also trained members of the 2004 U.S. women's soccer team. In addition, he conducted classes with student athletic trainers, which emphasized the practical applications of strength and conditioning research.

Harris has authored several articles involving strength and conditioning, including "Pre-Season Conditioning for College Basketball", which appeared in the July 2000 issue of *Perform Better's News and Views Newsletter*. He co-authored "Training for Ice Hockey", which appeared in the February 2000 issue of *Muscular Development*. He also co-authored an article entitled "Short-Term Performance Effects of High Power, High Force, or Combined Weight-Training Programs" in the February 2000 issue of the *Journal of Strength and Conditioning Research*. He has also been published in the Spring 1998 issue of College Athletic Trainers' Society newsletter. Most recently, his article "Offseason Conditioning for Women's Lacrosse" was published in the February 2006 issue of *Strength and Conditioning Journal*.

## ATHLETIC TRAINING

### The Terrier Athletic Training Room

"Our goal is to provide the athlete with the best care possible," said Boston University director of sports medicine Maria Hutsick, who has worked with the Terrier athletes for 25 years. "And, because we are in a city like Boston, and with our affiliation with the Boston University medical school, we are able to achieve our objective."

In addition to Hutsick, the athletic training room staff includes six full-time assistants, two graduate assistants, one part-time assistant, and more than 30 students who are enrolled in Boston University's rigorous athletic training program. These students carry a full academic workload, each week completing clinical work in the athletic training room.

"We also have on our staff two orthopedic surgeons and family practice physicians who are considered experts in the field of sports medicine," Hutsick pointed out.

The entire athletic training room staff

is constantly updating and improving their knowledge in the athletic training field, and they all work with isometrics, aqua-therapy and manual-therapy.

"The athletic administration has been very supportive in maintaining the highest level of athletic training equipment," said Hutsick.

What's more, if the athletes require additional care, Hutsick's years of experience in Boston have allowed her to network with the area's doctors and have access to the finest facilities.

"Athletes receive care quickly," said Hutsick. "This is a key to complete recovery, because, the quicker an athlete receives care, the quicker that individual can get back into action."

"We are proud that we have better than a 90 percent success rate of athletes returning to competition."

## ACADEMIC SUPPORT

### The Elliot H. Cole Academic Support Center for Boston University's Student Athletes

Boston University's Student-Athlete Support Services (SASS) provides a comprehensive program that supports all student-athletes in their overall personal development and their pursuit of academic and athletic goals.

As a member of the NCAA CHAMPS/Life Skills program, SASS is committed to student-athletes' development in five major areas: academic excellence, athletic excellence, career development, personal development and community service. The various components of the SASS program are designed to recognize and respond to the unique demands faced by student-athletes in these areas.

The Cole Academic Support Center houses Student-Athlete Support Services and is available to all student-athletes as a place where they can focus on their academic work during study hall, tutoring sessions and individual quiet study time. A computer lab, laser printer, and wireless network are available for use in the academic center, and

laptop computers are available for student-athletes to take with them when they travel for competition. The Center also serves as a hub for seminars, information, and resources on topics such as time management, alcohol and drug education, nutrition, study skills, career planning, and stress management.

The Director of Student-Athlete Support Services, Phil DiCarlo, and the Assistant Directors Logan Hamilton and Clare Turkington, work with Boston University's 31 athletic teams, providing pro-active and individualized support for all student-athletes. The various components of SASS enable them to monitor and assist student-athletes in their progress toward graduation and in their personal development.

It is the goal of Student-Athlete Support Services to provide Boston University student-athletes with the information, resources, and encouragement they need to gain the most from their college experiences.



## STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING

A state-of-the-art facility designed to improve the speed and explosive power of the Boston University athletes, the Terriers' 12,000 square-foot strength and conditioning facility was completed prior to the 2003-04 academic year.

The area features not just eight power racks and eight Olympic lifting platforms, but also a 2000-square foot speed and plyometric area. Athletes are now able to stretch and perform speed workouts, as well as plyometric programs that were once unable to complete in one location.

"The biggest change in athletics in recent years has been the rise of scientific training methods in weight training and fitness for enhanced performance on the field," said former Boston University President Jon Westling, whose support of the facility made the project possible. "This weight room provides a first-rate facility

for these training methods."

Overseeing the facility is Glenn Harris, who became the Terriers' second strength and conditioning head coach in September 1997.

"When I first came to Boston University, we operated out of a much smaller and more antiquated facility," said Harris. "We were essentially limited in our ability to design programs for the different sports due to the natural size and design of that room."

"By comparison, this room enables us to serve the needs of more teams and the freedom to be more creative in our approach," said Harris. "I've visited the strength and conditioning facilities at Wisconsin, North Carolina State, Georgia Tech, and Virginia Tech, and this room is the equal of any."

## 2006 HIGHLIGHTS

- Senior Zack Kirby was drafted by the Los Angeles Galaxy in the 2007 Major League Soccer (MLS) Supplemental Draft on Jan. 18, 2007. The ninth pick in the sixth round, Kirby becomes the fourth Boston University men's soccer player to be taken in the MLS draft, following Francis Okaroh ('86), Mike Emenalo ('90) and current New England Revolution player Andy Dorman ('04) into the professional ranks.
- Senior Zach Kirby was named to the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) Division I All-Northeast Region First Team. This marked the third time in his career Kirby received honors from the NSCAA.
- Senior Zach Riffett and sophomore Petur Sigurdsson were selected to the 2006 America East Tournament All-Championship team. This was both Riffett's and Sigurdsson's first selection to the All-Championship team.
- Senior back Zach Kirby was named America East Defender of the Year. Kirby joined sophomore midfielder Neil Hlavaty on the All-Conference First Team, while sophomore forward Petur Sigurdsson, senior midfielder Steven Gahl and graduate student Moshe Shalchon received second-team honors. Freshmen Richy Dorman and Samuel Appiah landed spots on the All-Rookie team.
- Senior goalie Zach Riffett and sophomore midfielder Neil Hlavaty each earned spots on topdrawsoccer.com's Team of the Year Fourth Team.
- Collegesoccernews.com named senior Steve Gahl's goal against Boston College the site's 2006 Goal of the Year. An improbable 40-yard strike with the seconds ticking down in double overtime, Gahl's goal gave BU a 2-1 overtime win over BC, the Terriers' first win over the Eagles since 1998.
- BU advanced to the America East tournament semifinals against Binghamton, but ultimately succumbed to the Bearcats on penalty kicks, 6-5, for the second straight year. This was Binghamton and BU's third straight meeting in the America East tournament, each of which ended in penalty kicks, with the Bearcats advancing in 2005 and 2006. The Terriers advanced in 2004 on penalty kicks, 5-3.
- The 12 goals allowed in 2006 is one short of the program record for fewest allowed (11), established in 1985. New Hampshire was the only team this season to score more than one goal against the Terriers.
- Senior goalkeeper Zach Riffett and sophomore forward Petur Sigurdsson each earned America East Player of the Week honors. Riffett received his for posting his second shutout of the season against Ohio State after stopping eight first-half shots, and holding Penn State scoreless through the first 66 minutes of the match. Sigurdsson scored four goals in BU's first three games to help the team begin the season on a four-game win streak.
- Boston University's 1-0 win over Ohio State in the opening round of the Penn State Nike Classic was the Terriers' first victory over a Big 10 team in program history.
- The Terriers achieved a national ranking, rising as high as 19th in the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) poll and third in the Northeast.
- The team's 4-0-1 start, with wins against Boston College, Georgia Southern, New Jersey Institute of Technology and Ohio State, marked the best start for a BU team in 12 years.
- Head coach Neil Roberts recorded his 250th career win when BU downed NJIT by the score of 1-0 on Sept. 3, 2006. He went on to post his 21st winning season in 22 years at the helm of the Terriers.

## BU IN THE NCAA TOURNAMENT

For more than two decades, the Boston University men's soccer program has annually demonstrated it ranks among the nation's more prominent teams.

As a direct result of its success, the program has enjoyed a rising level of recognition and respect. In 1994, after posting the nation's only unbeaten regular-season record (16-0-1), the Terriers were ranked number one in the final regular-season poll. The club advanced to the second round of the NCAA tournament for the sixth time in program history.

Overall, Boston University has made 12 trips to the NCAA tournament. Under Head Coach Neil Roberts, the Terriers have made 11 appearances, including five straight from 1993 to 1997.

The club's rise in stature can be traced back to the latter half of the 1970s, when four-time leading scorer Mike Pilger and three-year starting goalie Howie Friedman led the club on a climb to the top of the regional ladder.

In 1977, the Terriers made their first appearance in the ECAC tournament, where they suffered a first-round loss to Oneonta State, 3-2. The following year, BU returned to the ECAC Championship, and defeated Army, 3-2, in overtime of the semifinals, before losing to Massachusetts by an identical 3-2 overtime score in the finals. Returning to the ECAC tournament in 1979, the Terriers culminated a season-ending 14-game unbeaten streak by defeating New Hampshire, 2-0, in the semifinals,

and Oneonta State, 2-1, in overtime to claim their first ECAC title.

Having introduced itself as a regional contender the previous decade, BU began to acquaint itself with the national scene in the 1980s.

The 1980 campaign marked the first time in the 32-year history of the sport at Boston University that the Terriers received a bid to the NCAA tournament. After suffering a humbling 6-0 loss at the hands of national power Connecticut in their NCAA debut, the Terriers gained an opportunity for vindication in 1985.

Under the guidance of first-year head coach Neil Roberts, Boston University overcame a 4-14-2 campaign in 1984, to post a stellar 14-4-1 slate in 1985. Included in the victories was a 2-1 overtime win over UConn, as the Terriers won the New England Championship in the opening round of the NCAA tournament. Then, in the second round, they were eliminated by Hartwick, 1-0, in a penalty kick shootout.

In many respects, the 1985 season marked a transition for BU soccer. No longer just a regional contender, the Terriers returned to the NCAA tournament the following year, and have made nine additional appearances since then.

The following is a closer look at the games, individuals and teams that have provided Boston University with a rich tradition of NCAA tournament memories.

### 1980 THE BEGINNINGS

The 1980 season marked Boston University soccer's first step into the national spotlight. Under the direction of Head Coach Ron Cervasio, the Terriers qualified for the NCAA tournament and completed the year with a 14-3-1 mark. Although they dropped a 6-0 decision in the opening round against Connecticut, the Terriers could still take pride in earning the bid, which was gained in part by an eight-match mid-season winning streak that featured a victory over North Carolina State. Standouts on the squad included John Primiano, the Terriers' first All-American since 1971, and co-captain Paul Fisher, whose eight goals and two assists paced the offense.

### 1985 GREAT STRIDES

The 1985 Terriers won 14 contests and advanced to the NCAA quarterfinals, although they were just one year removed from a disappointing 4-14-3 campaign. Neil Roberts, in his first season as head coach, guided the team to a school-record nine-match winning streak and put together a defense that posted 12 shutouts. The Terriers knocked Connecticut out of the NCAA's, registering a 2-1 win decided on penalty kicks. Eddie Tadlock scored in regulation for the victors, while Mike Emenalo, who led the team with 14 goals and six assists, won the game with his

penalty-kick tally. In the quarterfinals, the Terriers were nipped by Hartwick, 1-0.

### 1986 WINNING BIG

In many ways, the 1986 season is remembered as the most successful in program history. The Terriers not only made their second-straight appearance in the NCAA's, but also set a school record for wins by finishing 16-2-3. When they entered the tournament, they were ranked number one in New England and number five nationally, however, their tournament success of 1985 was not duplicated. Facing Harvard, the Terriers could not make a first-half goal by Ben Okaroh stand up and were felled by a 2-1 count. John Glynn, playing in his lone season with the club, was the scoring leader with 12 goals and one assist, while Francis Okaroh ranked second with 11 goals and two assists. Both Okarohs were named to the All-America team. Other highlights from the year included a 10-0-2 start and goalkeeper John Moe's school-record 0.54 goals-against average.

### 1988 NEW ENGLAND'S FINEST

The Terriers worked their way to a 15-4-3 season and won the New England Championship by defeating Connecticut, 3-1, in the first round of the tournament. Mike Bertos, who equalled a school record with 17 goals, put the Terriers on the board

first, and Tim Horton and Jorge Zapata also tallied in a victory that sent the club to Indiana University for a second-round contest. The Terriers were defeated by the eventual national champions, 3-1, in Bloomington. This was an offensive-minded club all season long, with the result being an unprecedented 53 goals in 22 matches. It was also a year that saw Mike Emenalo erase a 25-year-old mark and become the University's all-time scoring leader, ending his distinguished career with 36 goals and 32 assists.

### 1990 DEFENSE DOMINATES

The Terriers opened the new decade by earning their fifth NCAA tournament bid in the last 11 years. Led by goalkeepers Jeff Hooper and Brad Rubin and defensive anchors Jeff Schultz and Phil Dunn, the Terriers never allowed more than two goals in a game, and recorded seven shutouts. Offensively, Tim Horton, Emma Okonkwo and Christophe Verhaegen were the top goal scorers, while seven players registered 10 or more points. Tim Horton's magic gave the Terriers a first-round victory. The junior tallied three goals within 15 minutes in the second half to lead the Terriers to a miraculous 3-2 come-from-behind victory over Boston College in the Terriers' first-ever home NCAA tournament match. Traveling to meet top-ranked Evansville in the second round, BU battled the Purple Aces through 90 scoreless minutes, before the hosts scored the game-winner at 102:17.

### 1991 CLIMBING TO THE TOP

Firmly establishing itself as one of the nation's premier soccer programs, Boston University made its second-straight trip to the NCAA tournament and fifth in the past seven years. Fielding an experienced, senior-dominated lineup, which included starting goalie Brad Rubin, co-captains Phil Dunn and Jeff Schultz, defensive back Chris Brumbaugh, midfielders Dave Silke and Peter Verplancke and striker Tim Horton, the Terriers cruised to an overall mark of 15-5-1, a final New England ranking of number one and a national ranking of 11th. The Terriers drew Yale in the opening round, and took a quick 1-0 advantage on a goal by Emesih Okereke. Yale tied the affair shortly after the intermission, but Tim Horton put the Scarlet

and White back in front midway through the second stanza. However, Yale scored a pair of goals within a span of 59 seconds to take the lead for good at 70:23.

### 1993 THE BIG UPSET

After capturing their first-ever North Atlantic Conference Tournament crown, the Terriers earned their seventh NCAA tournament appearance, where they proceeded to stun previously unbeaten St. John's (18-0-3) in the opening round. Trailing 1-0, Bjarte Skuseth, from Gisle Sørli, pulled the club even before Okereke Emesih put the Terriers ahead in the closing minutes of the half. Robert Forde turned aside three shots to preserve the win, and send the upstart Terriers to Oneonta, N.Y., for a second-round date with Hartwick. Boston University took a 1-0 lead on Chris Vincent's first-half goal, but the momentum turned moments before the half, when the Terriers received a red card and were forced to play the remainder of the contest shorthanded. The Warriors netted the equalizer five minutes following the break, and, despite Forde's eight-save performance, Hartwick scored the game-winner in the 108th minute. Ola Olsen (5-8—18) and Emesih Okereke (7-4—18) shared the leading scorer honors, while Forde tied a University record with 11 shutouts, and senior captain Steve Walker received Second Team All-America recognition.

### 1994 NUMBER ONE

The most successful season in the 45-year history of Boston University soccer, the 1994 campaign witnessed the Terriers advance to the NCAA tournament for the eighth time, register an overall mark of 19-1-1, and capture the number-one ranking in the final Intercollegiate Soccer Association of America national poll. After posting a 16-0-1 final regular-season mark, and standing as the nation's only undefeated team, the Terriers downed Maine and New Hampshire to capture their second consecutive NAC tournament crown. In the ensuing NCAA tournament, the club eliminated Harvard, 2-0, before falling to Brown, 3-2. Trailing 2-0 at the half, the Terriers staged a near-impossible second-half comeback while playing a man down, and tied the game in the 84th minute of play, but Brown regained the

advantage in the 88th minute. The Terriers established seven team records, including marks for wins (19) and unbeaten streak (20), while senior goalie Robert Forde established the career shutout mark (31), and freshman Nick Bone equalled single-season marks for goals (18) and points (43). Forde and Ola Olsen received All-America recognition.

#### 1995

##### BACK AGAIN

For the third-straight year, and fourth time in the past five years, Boston University earned an invitation to the NCAA tournament. The bid served as a pleasant conclusion to an uncharacteristically inconsistent year. After opening the year in impressive fashion against stiff national competition at a pair of tournaments, the Terriers stumbled when confronted with regional opposition. However, the side played well in conference action, and secured its third consecutive league tournament championship. The NCAA tournament pitted the Terriers against Brown, and, similar to the match in 1994, the club conceded a pair of early goals, before rallying in the second half. Nick Bone pulled the club within 2-1, but it was unable to net the equalizer.

#### 1996

##### THE UNDERDOG

After securing the last spot in the four-team America East tournament on the final day of the regular-season, the Terriers quickly dispatched of Hartford and Northeastern to claim their fourth-straight conference championship. Advancing to the NCAA tournament for the sixth time in the past seven years, and 10th time in

program history, the Terriers drew a Harvard team which was ranked among the top 10 nationally and entered the tournament sporting a 15-game unbeaten streak. However, it took the Terriers just 52 seconds to answer the challenge. Nick Bone scored his school-record 45th career goal off a Dean Smith feed on a corner kick to provide the Terriers with a 1-0 advantage. Just over 10 minutes later, Sigurd Dalen doubled the margin with an unassisted goal. The advantage held until midway through the second half, when Harvard netted a pair of goals in a span of 1:16 to pull even in the 72nd minute. With time winding down, the game appeared headed for overtime, before Harvard netted the game-winner in the 89th minute.

#### 1997

##### FIVE-IN-A-ROW

The Terriers continued their string of America East tournament titles and NCAA tournament appearances. After finishing second in the final league standings, the Terriers eliminated Vermont in the semifinals and top-seeded Hofstra in the conference tournament title game en route to their fifth straight championship. In the NCAA play-in game, Christian Steen's header in the 88th minute of play provided the Terriers with a 1-0 win over Long Island University. Keith Poole registered the shutout with two saves. The Terriers then journeyed to Dartmouth to take on a Big Green team they had tied, 1-1, in double overtime earlier in the year. The Terriers fell behind 1-0 at the half. Dartmouth increased its lead to 3-0 with a pair of goals in less than five minutes (65:19 and 70:37) before the Terriers' Dean Smith scored on a free kick

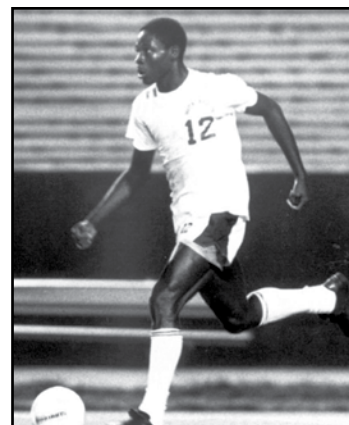
at the 71:37 mark to cut the deficit to 3-1. Dartmouth then scored at 83:05 and 87:26 to close out the scoring, and end the Terriers' hopes of advancing to the second round of the NCAA tournament.

#### 2004

##### BACK TO THE TOP

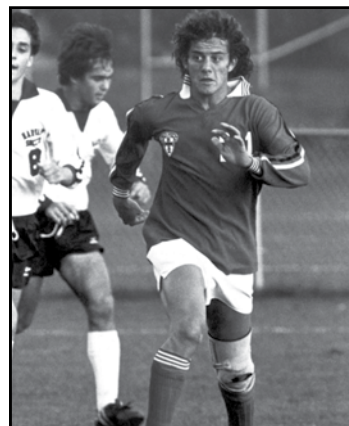
After a six-year hiatus from the NCAA tournament, BU bounced back in a big way by moving on to the second round of the NCAAs for the first time since 1994 and the sixth time in program history. Following a disappointing four-game losing streak to open the season, the Terriers went on to finish the regular season with a 9-7-1 record having only been beat three times in the final 13 games. From there, BU went into the America East tournament as the No. 1 seed and posted a 2-0 shutout over Stony Brook in the semifinals. In the conference championship game, the Terriers topped defending champion Binghamton by means of a penalty kick shootout to gain a bid in the NCAAs. Drawing Dartmouth in the first round, BU played to a 2-2 tie through 110 minutes of play for the second time in its last two games, before beating the Big Green, 4-3, in the penalty kick shootout. From there, the Terriers traveled to Queens, N.Y., where they fell to St. John's, 3-1, in the second round.

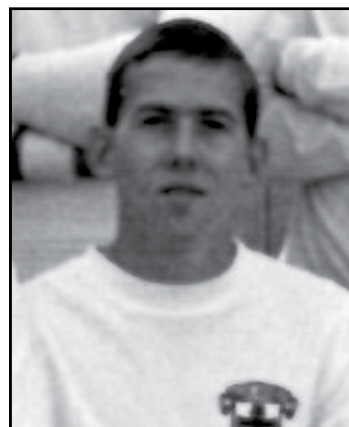
