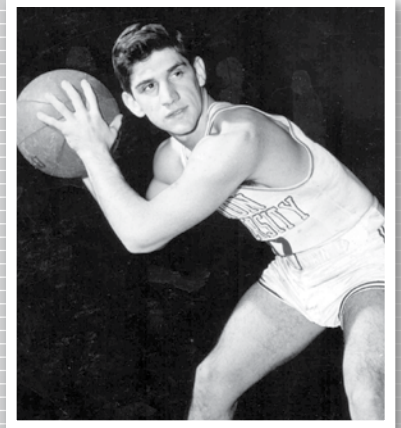
Mel Collard coached the Terriers from 1935-45 and led BU to a 64-63 record.



The 1908-09 Team



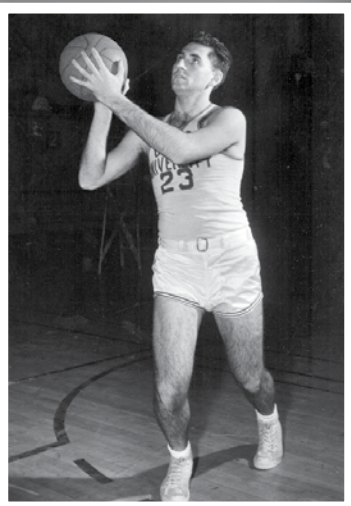
The 1911-12 Team



Johnny Nunziato (1951-54) was the first recipient of the Lou Cohen Award for team MVP.

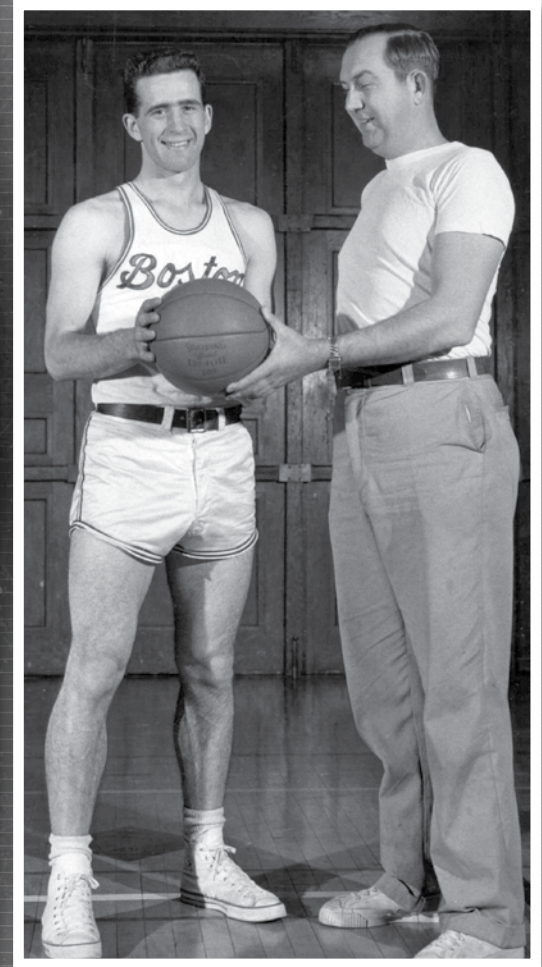
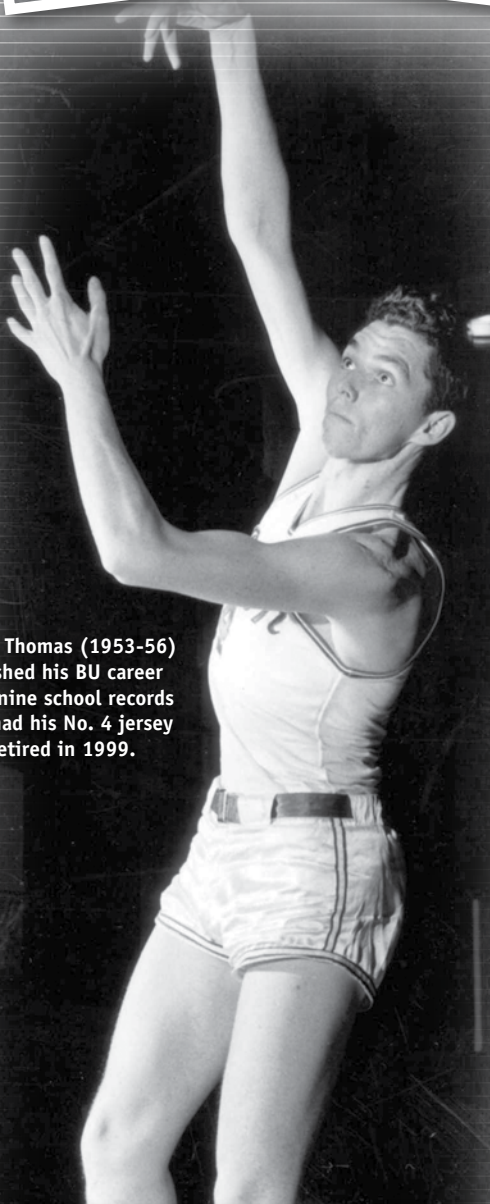


Russ Peterson was BU's head coach from 1945-48, recording a 36-18 record in three seasons.



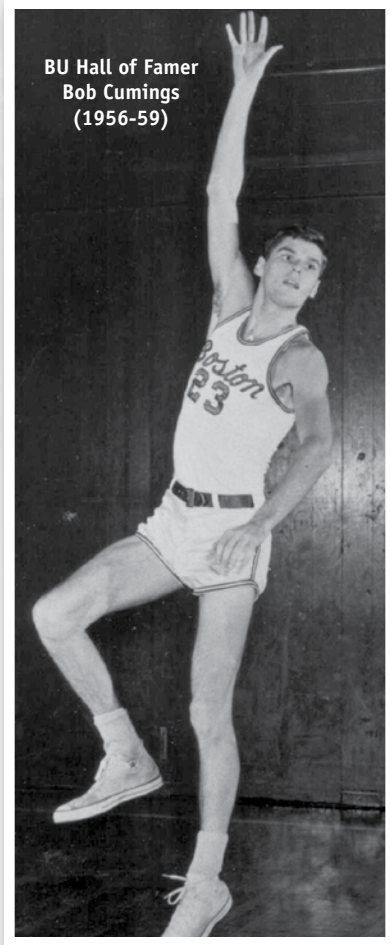
Marty Reisner '52 was the first BU player to score over 30 points in a game (1/20/51)

Kevin Thomas (1953-56) finished his BU career with nine school records and had his No. 4 jersey retired in 1999.



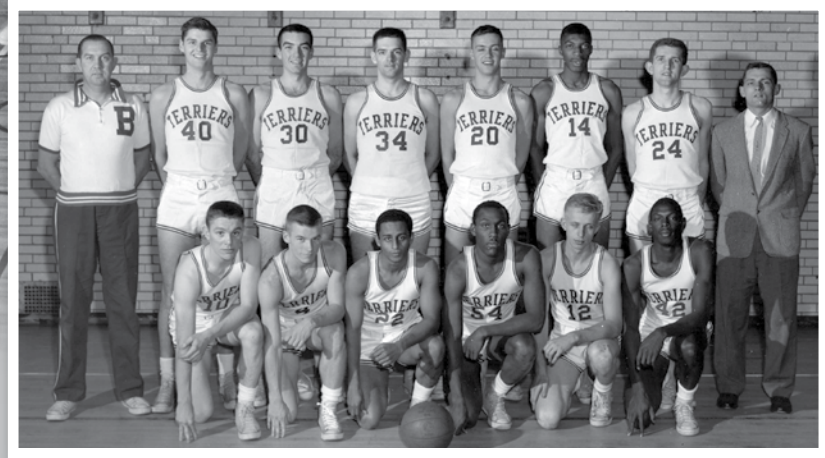
BU Hall of Famer Tom Gastall (1952-55) with head coach Matt Zunic, who compiled a 96-58 record from 1952-59.

The 1958-59 Terriers made history as the first BU squad to make the NCAA tournament.

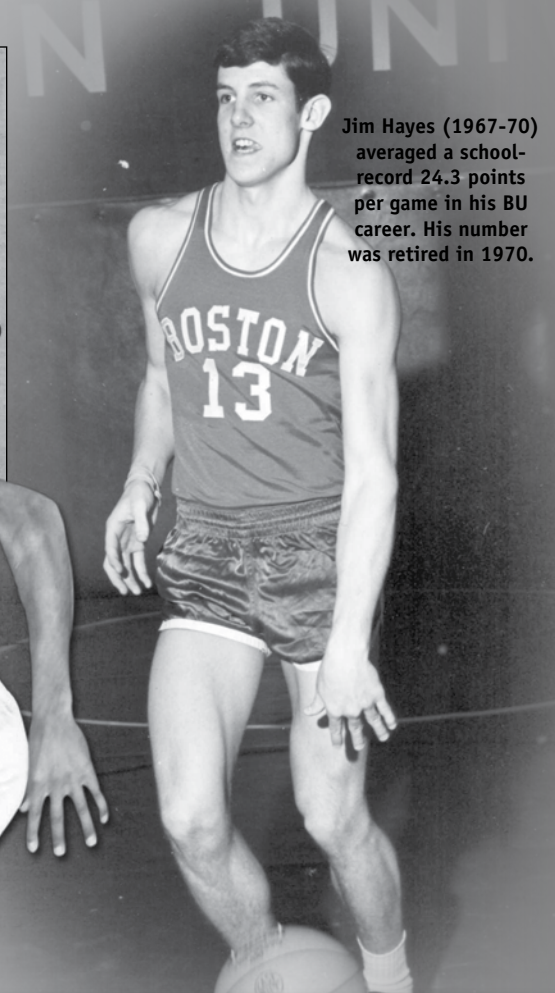
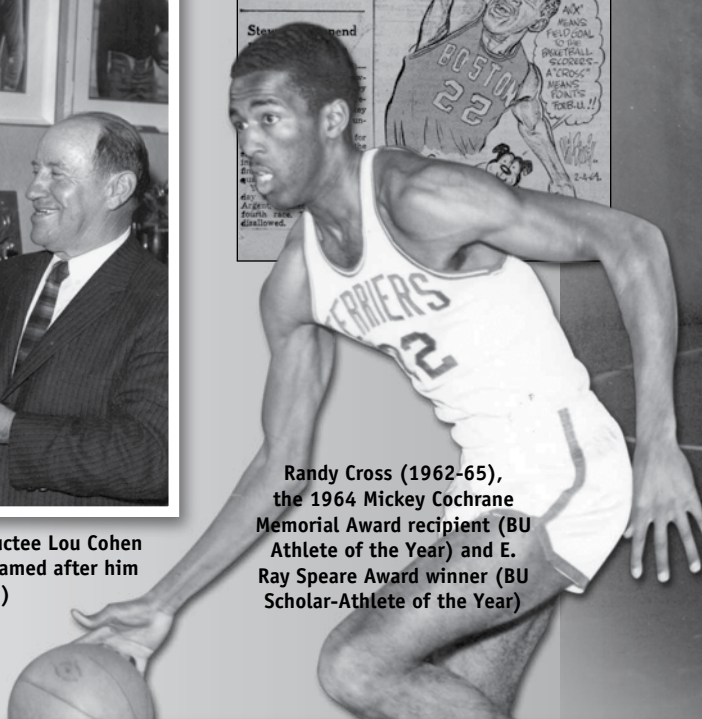

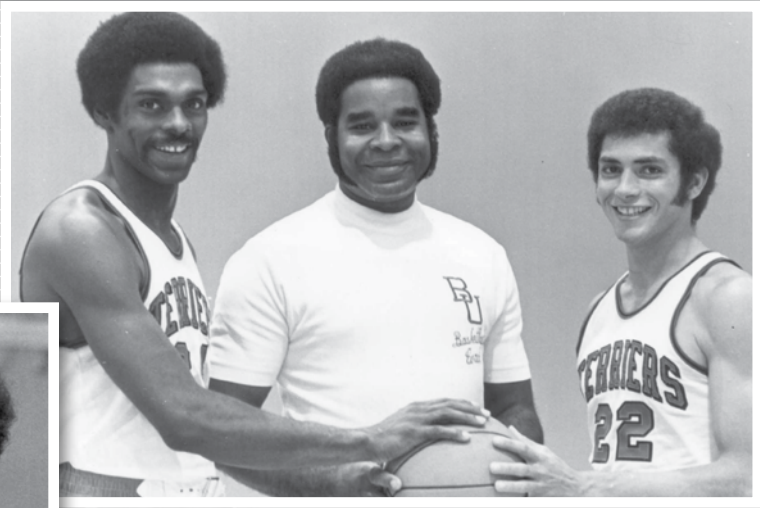
BU's first basketball hall of fame inductee Lou Cohen (1926-28) presents the MVP award named after him to Larry McNulty (1962)

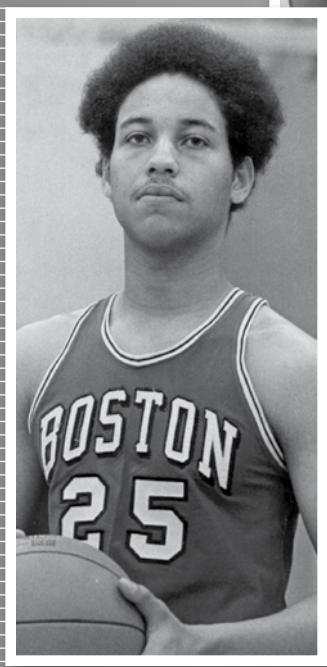
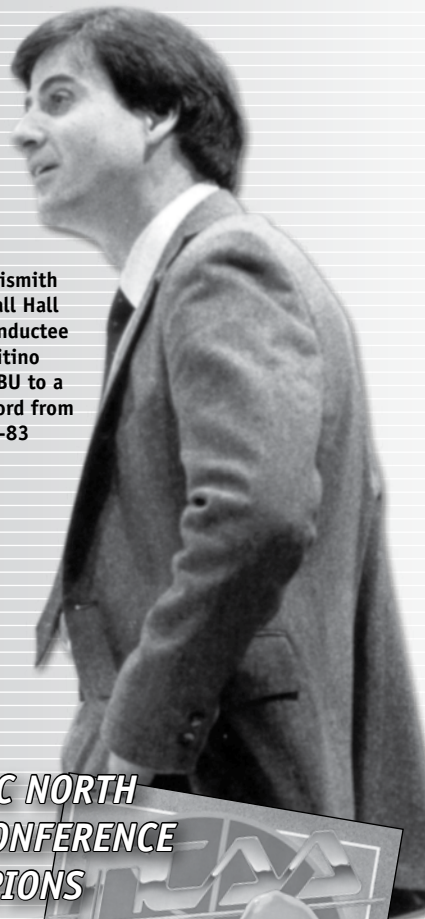


Jim Hayes (1967-70)

was retired in 1970.



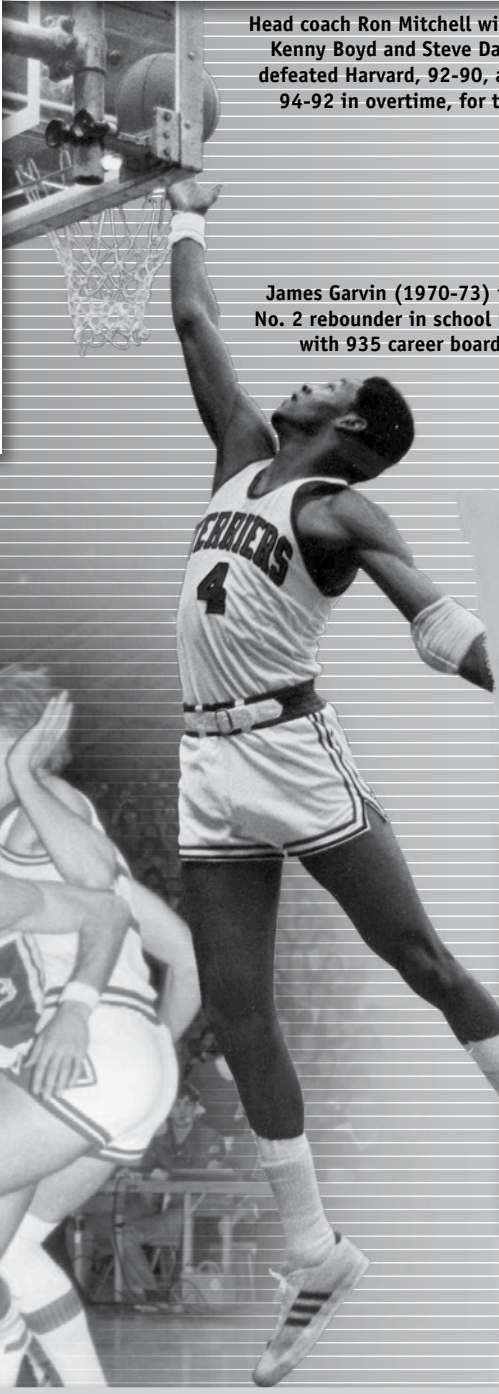

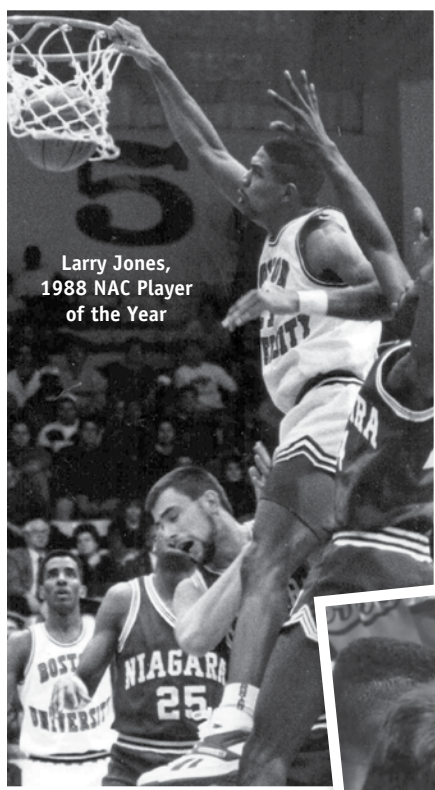
Steve Wright (1976-80) led the Terriers to their first NIT appearance in 1980. His #33 is retired by the University.



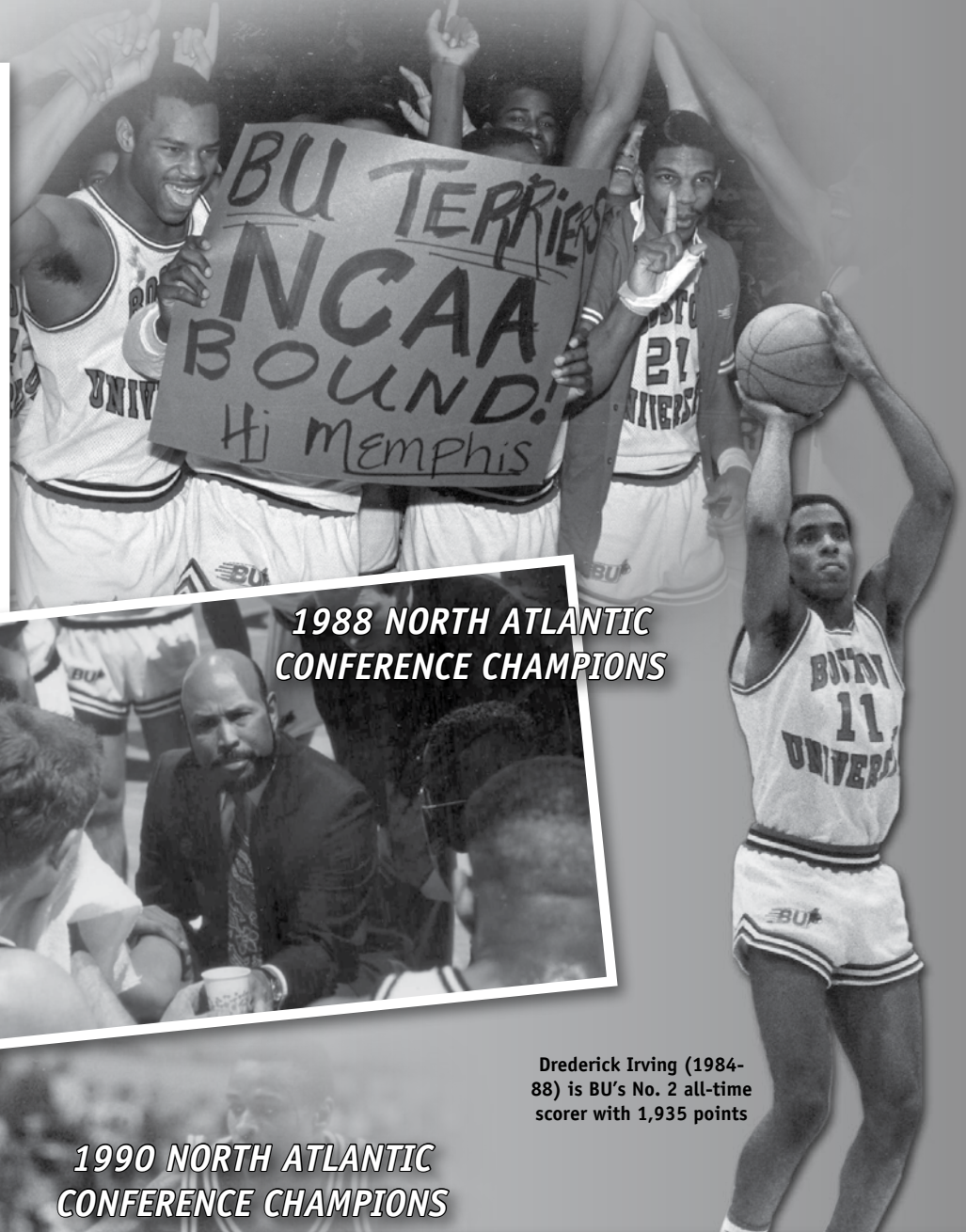
James Garvin (1970-73) is the No. 2 rebounder in school history with 935 career boards.

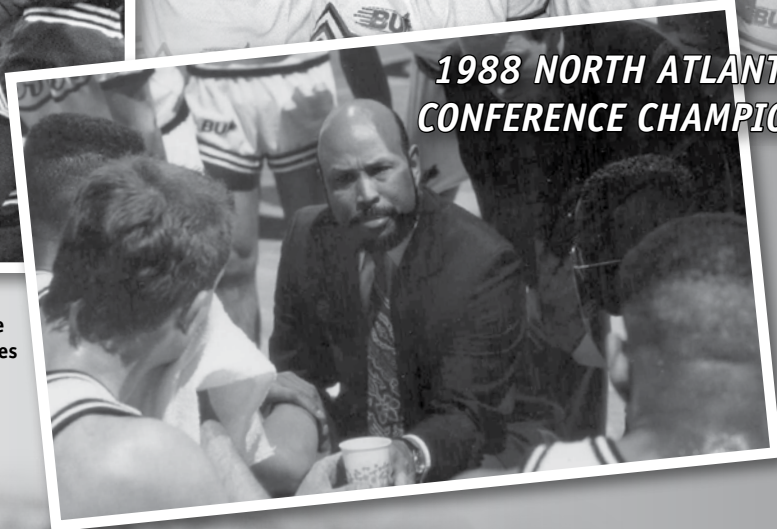

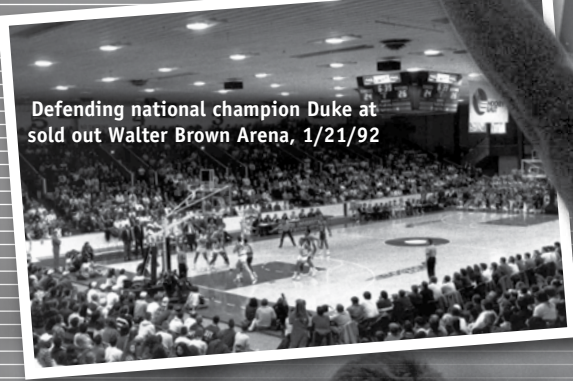

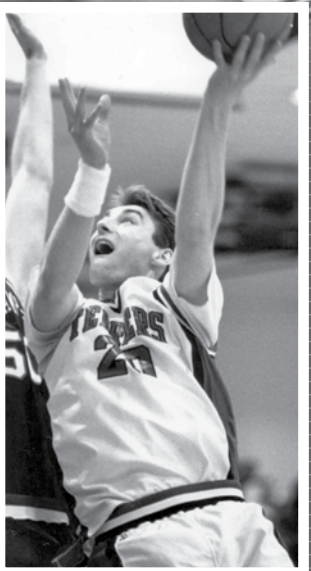

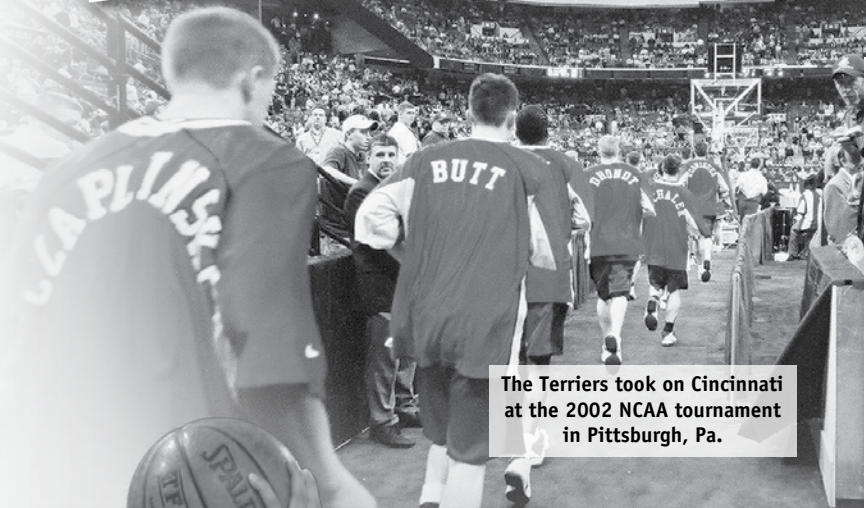
