freshman last year, handled himself quite well in 24 games; 6'8" Steve Meacham, 6'6" John Kilzer and 6'0" Buster Hancock return for their senior years. All played in games or more last year. Sophomore Lee Sanders, 6'0" guard from Memphis, who played in 9 games, rounds out the nine returning players.

Memphis State has signed six players to national letters; five of them eligible to compete this coming season. The six are made up of three freshmen, one sophomore, one junior and one senior transfer. The senior is Tony Rufus, a transfer from Baylor, who will red shirt this season. The three frosh include: Kevin Fromm, 6'4" guard from Raytown South High School in Kansas City, who carried an 18.5 ppg average, while leading his team to the state championship. He is joined by Hank McDowell, 6'8" forward from Memphis Treadwell with 15.0 ppg and 12.0 rpg, and Greg Moore, 6'3" guard from Memphis Melrose, who carried a 10.4 ppg and 7.3 rpg in high school.

They will be joined by sophomore Tommy Lowery, a 6'11" center, who transferred from Shelby State Community College in Memphis, where as a freshman, he averaged 17.6 ppg and 14.5 rpg in leading his team to the quarterfinals of the national junior college tournament. In addition, 6'7" forward Ken Dunek, who spent two seasons at Paducah (Ky.) junior college, joins the Tigers with a 22.9 ppg and 12.8 rpg from last season.



1977-78 Outlook

With the loss of four starters (one part time) and the return of only three starters (one part time), Head Coach Wayne Yates feels that the 1977-78 season will be a rebuilding year for Memphis State.

The Tigers lost three seniors and a junior, and two of them were experienced "big-men" at the post position. Gone is All-American Dexter Reed, the guard-forward who was a four year starter and had a scoring average of 16.5 with 1,678 points in 102 games, making him the third all-time leading scorer in Tiger history. In addition, John Washington, a 6'11" center from Columbus, Georgia, played his final season, averaging 12.3 points per game (ppg) and 9.3 rebounds per game (rpg). He also broke an MSU record by blocking 61 shots his senior year. The other senior is Dave Brown, who started half the games last season and finished up averaging 5.1 rpg and 4 ppg. Brown's quickness and hustle, especially on defense, will be greatly missed. The fourth man is junior John Gunn, who died after three games last season. The All-American candidate would have been relied on heavily for his upcoming senior year. John thru two plus seasons was averaging 11.2 ppg and 9 rpg. He was big, strong, quick and aggressive, and his hustle set a standard for the rest of the team.

In addition to the loss of four outstanding players, the Tigers will be playing their toughest schedule in recent years. For the first time since the conference was formed, the Metro will be playing a double round robin, plus the conference tournament at the end of the season. In addition to two regular season games (home and home) against Cincinnati, Louisville, Florida State, Georgia Tech, Tulane and St. Louis, MSU has games against toughies like Dayton, Arkansas, Western Kentucky, Baylor, Ole Miss, and the Sun Bowl tournament involving Kansas State, Army, and UTEP. The Tigers, who have been playing 17 or 18 home games per season the past few years, will play only 15 at home and 11 on the road, plus the Metro Conference tournament in Cincinnati next March.

The Tigers have nine lettermen returning, led by senior Alvin Wright, a three year starter at guard, who is averaging 10.3 ppg with 886 points in 86 games. In addition, Wright has broken the single game and career assist records at MSU each of his three seasons. He is joined by James Bradley, a super sophomore last year who averaged 15.3 ppg (second behind Reed) and 8.7 rpg. Bradley, a 6'8" forward from Memphis, was a .446 field goal percentage shooter last season and .794 from the line. The other returning starter is Rodney Lee, 6'7" forward from Philadelphia, Pa., who came on strong to start the last half of the season and ended up with 8.3 ppg and 6.7 rpg. Lee was recipient of the John Gunn Mr. Hustle award last April. Six other players return along with last year's three starters. They include Darrell "Smokey" Hollimon, 6'2" guard, who played in 28 games with a 5.8 ppg average; Dennis Isbell, who was a

James Bradley, a transfer from Connors State Junior College (Okla.), will be this year's leading returning scorer (15.3) and rebounder (8.7). An all NJCAA-tournament selection during his freshman year at Connors, he averaged 26.0 points and 16.0 rebounds per game for the Cowboys. Bradley is a product of Melrose High School and Coach Verties Sails, now an MSU assistant coach. In his first year at Memphis State, Bradley led the Tigers in scoring in 10 games. His best effort was a 26 point outing against Tulane in the opening round of the Metro Tournament. He led the team in free-throw shooting last season with a .794 percentage (62-78) and his 253 rebounds was second on the squad behind John Washington. He was also second in scoring (444 points) behind Dexter Reed. Bradley was an honorable mention all-american at Connors State and for his play last year, he has been named to the Basketball Quarterly All-American team. During his three years at Melrose, the Golden Wildcats compiled a record of 96-10 and won the state championship his junior year with a record of 35-0. He was an all-conference, all-city and all-state selection both his junior and senior years.

Ken Dunek, an all-state performer in both high school and junior college, became the MSU Tigers fifth basketball signee for the 1977-78 season. The 6-7 forward from Marengo, Illinois will be an immediate help in the front line which was depleted by graduation. Ken was a two year letterman in both basketball and baseball at Marengo High School and was the captain of the 1975 basketball squad. He helped guide his team to the conference and regional championships in 1975 and for his play, was named to the all-city, all-conference and all-state teams. He was selected as the conference MVP in 1975. From high school, Ken went to Paducah Junior College and starred for the Indians for two years. He was captain of the 1977 Paducah squad and was named to the all-state, all-region and all-regional tournament teams in 1977. An excellent student, Dunek averaged 22.9 points per game and 12.8 rebounds per game as a sophomore at Paducah Junior College. Paducah's overall record for the two years Ken played was 42-22.

Kevin Fromm has returned to his hometown to continue his basketball career. It was in Memphis that Fromm's basketball days began — at St. Dominic's School for Boys. He also participated in MSU's basketball camps as a fifth and sixth-grader before his parents moved to Kansas City, Missouri. In Kansas City, Fromm grew to a muscular 6-3, 195 pounds, while attending Raytown South High School. He helped lead Raytown to the state championship last year. Kevin, a two-time all-conference, all-city and all-state performer, averaged 18.5 points per game as a guard-forward last year. As a Tiger, Fromm will be used solely as a guard. During his three seasons on the varsity, Raytown's record was a remarkable 73-11. He was also a standout in football and baseball earning three letters in both sports and will hopefully continue his baseball career with the Memphis State Tigers. Kevin owns the Raytown South career scoring record with 1,352 points. Fromm stood in the top ten percent of his graduating class and was a honor student throughout high school.

Over the past three years, Buster Hancock has been a great help to the MSU basketball program through his hustle and desire both in practice and in the Tigers' games. Playing behind dependable floor leader Alvin Wright, the versatile Hancock has seen duty mostly as a defensive spark plug. His career statistics total only 73 points, but his scrappy performance is more than enough to offset any deficit there. Buster came to Memphis State from White Station High School in Memphis where he was an outstanding all-around athlete. He was an all-conference and all-city selection in basketball. In baseball, he was selected all-conference, all-city and all-state and originally signed a baseball scholarship with Memphis State before settling with the basketball Tigers. In his senior year in high school, Hancock broke the Tennessee state record for most points scored in the decathlon (8,951). A scrappy performer, Hancock should see considerable action in the Tiger backcourt this year.

Darrell Hollimon saw action in 28 games last season but played behind All-American guard Dexter Reed throughout the year. Even so, the 6-2 guard scored 167 points and came on strong near the end of the year, scoring 16 points against Oklahoma City in the regular season finale. Hollimon came to MSU from Amarillo Junior College where he averaged 21.0 points per game and helped lead his team to the regionals of the NJCAA Tournament for two years. In the finals of the region, Hollimon scored 46 points to set a tournament record for the most points scored. Darrell received all-region, all-district and All-American honors while playing for Amarillo JC. He was selected to play in the Junior College All-American game and scored 18 points in that contest. Hollimon prepped at South Side High School in Memphis, where he led his team to the state finals both his junior and senior years. "Smoke" averaged 14.0 points as a junior and 18.0 points as a senior.

Dennis Isbell, the tallest Tiger recruit last year, returns for his sophomore season. The 6-8 center-forward saw considerable action last year playing in 24 games and with the graduation of John Washington, Dennis will be called on for the experience he gained last season. "Bell" scored 66 points and grabbed 69 rebounds during his freshman campaign and demonstrated his jumping ability by blocking 22 shots, second only to center John Washington. Isbell, who played for MSU assistant coach John Robinson while in high school, led his team to the finals of the state championship his senior year. During that same year, Dennis set a Class AAA conference record by averaging 18.1 rebounds per game. For his play he was named to the all-conference team for three years and added all-state recognition his junior and senior years. The versatile athlete also ran track and is currently the Arkansas high jump record holder at 6'7½". Dennis will be counted on heavily in the Tigers' front line this year.

John Kilzer, the tallest of the Tiger guards, has seen limited playing time since arriving at Memphis State, but considering he has been playing behind the likes of All-Americans Bill Cook and Dexter Reed, that's understandable. John played in 19 games last year, scoring 55 points and snaring 43 rebounds. His high game was an eight point effort against South Dakota State but his most outstanding game came against the Arkansas Razorbacks in Little Rock when he came off the bench to score four points and grab a game high seven rebounds. The Tigers won the game, 69-62. It was the Hogs' only loss during the regular season. While in high school Kilzer was an all-conference selection for three years and an all-state choice two years. His senior year, in addition to those honors, he was an all-american selection. He captained his squad during both his junior and senior years and helped lead his team to two conference championships. In his three years at Jackson Central Merry, John set a school record for the most points scored in a career with 1,809, while his team produced a three-year record of 72-9.

Rodney Lee, alias "Hot Rod", demonstrated his hustle and desire on the basketball court last year and by midseason had earned a starting position. Lee, a 6-7 forward, started the season as the Tigers' sixth man but after several outstanding performances, was elevated to a starting role for the Georgia Tech game. During that game Lee led the Tigers in scoring with 23 points and continued to play well for the duration of the year scoring 234 points and grabbing 188 rebounds. His 8.3 points per game average ranked him fifth on the Tigers scoring list and his 6.7 rebounds per game placed him third. Rodney came to MSU from Shelby State Junior College where he was a stalwart for coach Joe Proctor. He saw action in 11 games for the Saluqis, averaging 14.0 points per game. During his high school days at Edison High, Lee won numerous honors for his sportsmanship and play. Following his senior year, he was invited to play in the Dapper Dan Classic, a prestigious high school game. In that contest, Rodney totaled 16 points and 11 rebounds and was named the game's most valuable player. His high school honors include all-conference, all-city, all-state and All-America.

Junior college transfer Tommy Lowery is the tallest of the Tigers, 1977 recruits and may be heir apparent to the role of center on the basketball team. Lowery, a two year letterman and two year member of the all-area, all-conference and all-state teams, originally signed with Memphis State out of high school but attended Shelby State Junior College for one year before transferring to MSU. The 6-11 center led Winona to the state championships for two years and in his senior year scored 39 points in the finals of the state. In only two years of high school play, Tommy set and still holds every Winona High School record. Last year the slender center helped lead his Shelby State JC team to the NJCAA tournament by averaging 17.6 points per game and 14.5 rebounds. The Saluqis finished the season with a record of 27-7, the highest number of victories by any Shelby State team.

With the graduation of John Washington and David Brown, the Tigers needed height and talent for their front line and that is what they found in 6-8½ Hank McDowell. The Treadwell High School star averaged 15.0 points per game and 10.0 rebounds per outing while leading his team to the state class AA championship. McDowell was a three year letterman for the Eagles and was a mainstay on their squad. His most outstanding performance was a 27 point, 17 rebound effort in the state playoffs. For his play during the 1976-77 season, he was named first team all-city, all-conference and all-state. He was also named to the all-tournament team following the state championship. For his contributions to both the athletic and scholastic programs in high school, Hank was named "Mr. Treadwell" last year.

Steve Meacham, a 6-8 center-forward from the Philadelphia area, could muscle his way into the line-up this season at the center position. With the graduation of John Washington, the center position is wide open and should boil down to a battle between Meacham, Isbell and Lowery. Steve played in 23 games last year scoring 37 points and caroming 50 rebounds. His high game was an eight point effort against Southern Mississippi. His aggressiveness and quickness will be a great asset for the Tigers this year. His great shooting touch and hustling defense will also be called on when the Tigers need more speed on the court. While in high school "Meach" was an all-area, all-league, all-scholastic, all-surburban, all-state and Prep Magazine All-American selection in both his junior and senior seasons. He was also selected to the High School All-American team in 1974-75. During his junior season Steve led the league in scoring, rebounding and shot-blocking. For his career at Hatboro-Horsham High, Steve set the record for most rebounds and is second on the school's all-time scoring list.

Memphis State University kept its connection with Melrose High School intact this year with the signing of 6'4" guard Greg Moore. The Tigers, Alvin Wright and James Bradley are also Melrose products. (Other Melrose players to star for MSU were Larry Finch, Ronnie Robinson and the late John Gunn) Moore, who was the floor leader for the Golden Wildcats for the past two seasons, helped lead his team to a 33-3 record last year. He averaged 10.4 points per game and 7.3 rebounds per contest while working as a point guard. He should see considerable action this season playing behind senior Alvin Wright. Greg was a three year letterman in basketball at Melrose and received all-conference, all-city and all-state honors in 1977. He is an excellent passer and penetrator and has great quickness for a big guard.

Two years ago Lee Sanders was the leading scorer in the state of Tennessee, averaging 31.6 points per game while shooting close to 50% from the floor. Last year as a Tiger, Lee saw playing time in nine varsity games, scoring 22 points and bring down 8 rebounds. But for the junior varsity, he played in 15 games scoring 211 points for a 14.1 average. During his first two years of high school basketball, Lee demonstrated average scoring ability (averaged 10 a game as a sophomore and 17 points a game as a junior). But his senior year he came into his own, leading the state in scoring. His greatest game was against Memphis Overton in 1976 when he scored 56 points, grabbed 14 rebounds and added 12 assists. He was captain of his high school squad and led them to the district play-offs his senior year. Among his high school honors, he was named to the United Press Prep All-American team and all-conference, all-city and all-state teams. Outside of basketball, Sanders was named to Who's Who Among High School Students and received the Lord Sheffield Award for outstanding leadership. Lee's hobbies include acting and he has appeared in numerous plays around Memphis including "Raisin in the Sun" and "Room 222".

In his first two years at Memphis State, Alvin Wright was known as an assist man, giving up his chance to score, while feeding a teammate for the score. But during the 1976-77 campaign, Wright came into his own as both a scorer and a floor leader. Once again, as in the past two years, he broke his own assist record but in addition he poured in 394 points (13.5 average) and finished the year as the Tigers' third leading scorer. His 178 assists during the 1976-77 season broke his sophomore record of 159 assists in a single season. As a freshman, Alvin tallied 128 assists to break the old mark which had stood at MSU for 10 years. In addition, he owns both the single game assist record (14 vs Brandeis) and the career assist record (465). Not known for his inside shooting, Wright's long range bombs have netted him scoring honors such as a 23 point output against Pepperdine, 20 points against Oral Roberts in the NIT and a career high 26 points against the Drake Bulldogs last year. In high school, Wright was an all-conference, all-city and all-state selection in basketball. He was a member of the 1974 Memphis Melrose team which won 35 consecutive games and the state championship. In addition to his basketball talent, Alvin is an excellent student. In high school he was a member of the National Honor Society and the Society of Outstanding High School Students.

Wayne Yates

Head Basketball Coach



In his first three seasons as head basketball coach at Memphis State University, Wayne Yates has accomplished what a mere handful of active coaches have done; that of winning 20 or more games a season the first three years as a head coach.

Coach Yates, who assumed his present duties in March, 1974, has put together the following records: 20-7 in 1974-75, 21-9 in 1975-76 and 20-9 in 1976-77, totaling 61 wins against only 25 losses for a .709 percentage. Additionally, the Tigers have been to three post season tournaments under Coach Yates, and now have a string of six NCAA or NIT bids in a row.

As a matter of fact, in the 9 aggregate years Yates has been at MSU as a player, assistant coach and head coach, the Tigers have been to 8 post season tournaments. He helped the Tigers to two NIT bids as a player in 1960 and 1961, while he was busy making numerous all-tournament and all-American teams, and being voted the outstanding visiting player in the Palestra in Philadelphia. Following graduation he was a first round draft choice with the Los Angeles Lakers, and after a stint in pro basketball, decided on a career in coaching. In 1969, he returned to MSU as a graduate assistant, and was named full assistant in 1970-71; Gene Bartow's first year as head coach. That was the only year the Tigers did not get a bid in the past seven seasons, even though MSU had an 18-8 season. But, starting in 1971-72, Memphis State has received 2 NCAA bids and 4 NIT selections. In the last 22 seasons, the Tigers have received 14 post season invitations and 8 of those have been with Wayne Yates as player, assistant coach or head coach.

Coach Yates, who is the first former Tiger player to become a head coach at MSU, believes in fast, high scoring basketball. In 3 years his teams have poured 7,497 points through the baskets of coliseums and arenas throughout the nation. In 86 games over the past 3 seasons the Tigers have averaged 87.1 points per game and have compiled an outstanding 48-6 record at the Mid-South Coliseum good for .888 percent at home.

Yates is a native of Arkansas; born at Gurdon on

November 7, 1937, and raised in North Little Rock, where he was a star basketball player in high school. His senior year he made the Arkansas all-state team, and was named most valuable player in the state finals, where he set a (then) tournament scoring record of 105 points. Ironically, his 50th win as a head coach came last December when the Tigers whipped the Razorbacks in Little Rock 69-62. It turned out to be Arkansas' only regular season loss.

As Memphis State's 11th head basketball coach, Yates' teams have broken 12 major records in three short seasons including; most points in a game and in a season, most assists in a game (twice) and in a season (three times).

He and his wife, Dala, have four children; Dawayna, 14, Ward, 12, Kathy, 8, and Mary Elizabeth, one and a half.

Wayne Yates — Words From The Coach

RECRUITING: "We had a good recruiting year. We got some fine young men with high moral character, who possess a genuine desire to win. I believe their attitude and desire will be reflected offensively and defensively. Tommy Lowery is a candidate to start and Kevin Fromm and Greg Moore will make their presence felt early. Ken Dunek will add strength on the boards and Hank McDowell needs experience, but has great potential."

OFFENSE: "We will be similar to what we were last year — a running, fast-break team. This year we will be more team oriented, since we do not have a great super star like Bill Cook or Dexter Reed. All players are willing to hit the open man and play unselfish basketball."

DEFENSE: "We will do a lot of different things this year. We will run our 1-2-1-1 and 2-2-1 zone presses, along with our 1-3-1 half-court trap. We will give our opponents a lot of different looks defensively this year, and we will constantly change our defense throughout the game."

OVERALL: We are smaller, but maybe a little quicker. We are going to work hard and we are going to hustle."

Verties Sails *Assistant Coach*



Verties Sails, in his fourth year as assistant coach at Memphis State University, did an outstanding job for the Tigers last season scouting opponents, recruiting, and working with the varsity.

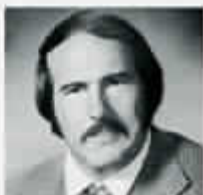
Coach Sails, 34 came to MSU on July 1, 1974, with one of the most outstanding high school records ever compiled in the state of Tennessee.

During his four seasons at Memphis Melrose, the Golden Wildcats were 132-35 and in 1973-74, went undefeated to win the state championship. He sent five outstanding players to the Tigers: Larry Finch, Ronnie Robinson, James Thompson (who played football at MSU), John Gunn and Alvin Wright.

Coach Sails was twice voted Coach of the Year (1970 and 1974) and his last high school team holds the Memphis City record for the longest winning streak at 35 consecutive games.

A native of Memphis, Coach Sails attended Woodstock High School and was a 1964 graduate of LeMoyne-Owen College. He received his masters degree from Memphis State in 1969. He is married to the former LaFrancina Wilson of Memphis. They have one child, Francesca Monique, age two.

John Robinson *Assistant Coach*



The newest member of the Memphis State basketball coaching staff is 38-year-old John Robinson. Robinson, a native of Kansas City, Missouri was hired by MSU April 1 of 1976.

Coach Robinson was a standout athlete at Little Rock Central High School, lettering four years in basketball and three years in track. He was named to the 1957-All-State basketball team and helped lead his team to the 1957 state championship.

After high school, John Robinson attended the University of Central Arkansas, lettering four years as a guard for the Bears. He was named to the All-Arkansas Intercollegiate team for three years and was the conference leading scorer in 1960 and 61.

Upon graduation in 1961, Robinson began his brilliant coaching career that led him to Memphis State. Spanning two states, Texas and Arkansas, Robinson ran his overall record to 268-50 before entering the college ranks at MSU.

Coach Robinson and his wife Sandra have three children; John 17, Lisa 16 and Sherri 14.

Steve McHugh

Assistant Coach



Steve McHugh, a graduate assistant coach who has handled the junior varsity for the past two seasons, is in his third year with the Tigers. Over the past two years, Steve has compiled a record of 28 wins against 9 losses with the JVs and will be in charge of scouting and will handle some recruiting for the Tigers this year.

McHugh, a graduate of Duquesne University, was a three year letterman in basketball for the Dukes before entering the coaching ranks. During his playing career, he helped lead Duquesne to two NCAA Tournaments and to the NIT. Following graduation Steve became the head coach at Fairport Harbor High School in Fairport, Ohio. In 1974 he left Fairport and became a graduate assistant under Bill Musselman at the University of Minnesota.

McHugh is an avid golfer and tennis player.

Dr. Billy M. Jones

*MSU's 8th
President*



Dr. Billy M. Jones is Memphis State's eighth President. He assumed the Presidency on Sept 1, 1973, after being named to the position in June of that year.

Before his Memphis State appointment, Dr. Jones was President of Southwest Texas State University at San Marcos, Texas, from 1969 to 1973. Preceding that appointment he spent seven years with Angelo State University in San Angelo, Texas, as professor and chairman of the history department, dean of students and director of curriculum development.

He received his B.A. degree from Vanderbilt in 1950, his M.A. degree in 1952 from George Peabody College, Nashville, and the Ph.D. degree in history and political science from Texas Tech University, Lubbock, in 1963. Dr. Jones attended the University of Colorado in 1967-68 for post-doctoral studies in academic administration.

Originally from Abilene, Texas, Dr. Jones has written extensively on various aspects of Texas history and has served as president of the Texas State Historical Association. He is on the board of directors of the American Council on Education and a life member of the National Education Association.

Among Dr. Jones' honors are his selection as Piper Professor of 1967 (outstanding teacher in Texas colleges and universities) by the Minnie Stevens Piper Foundation of San Antonio. In 1947 he was selected on the Williamson All American football team. Then, in 1975, he was selected for the National Collegiate Athletic Association's Silver Anniversary Top Five Award. This award recognizes former athletes who have distinguished themselves in their professions for 25 years.

Dr. Jones is married to the former Miss Doris Hudson and they have four sons.

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR

Billy J. Murphy

Billy J. Murphy, who compiled one of the nation's winningest coaching records as Memphis State's head football coach for 14 seasons, decided in early 1972 to take on an even bigger challenge than the one which brought him to the university and devote his full time efforts to the duties of athletic director, a position he has jointly held since 1966.

One of the most respected figures in the southern athletic community, his record as Athletic Director has been just as impressive as it was on the gridiron. In addition to establishing Memphis State as a southern football power, Murphy has maintained a "self-supporting" athletic program and budget; and has recently added some of the "nation's finest" athletic facilities.

As football coach, he guided the Tigers to three MVC conference titles, a 28-9 victory in the 1971 Pasadena Bowl — the Tiger's first appearance in a major bowl — and was voted MVC Coach-of-the-year three out of the four years in the conference. His 14-year record of 91-44-1 at Memphis State was, at the close of the 1971 season, the 11th best in the nation and was fifth in scoring, ninth in rushing and 14th in both total offense and scoring defense. In 1963, five years after he arrived on the scene with the challenge of establishing "a major football program at Memphis State," Murphy coached the Tigers to one of the nation's few undefeated seasons, and was named Coach of the Year by a national publication.

Before coming to Memphis State, Murphy spent coaching stints at Mississippi State and Minnesota under Murray Warmath.

Coach Murphy is a graduate of Mississippi State where he starred as a tailback in 1941, 1942, and 1946. A former Marine Lieutenant in the Pacific Theater from 1943 to 1945, Coach Murphy returned to Mississippi State following active duty and captained the Bulldogs to a fine season and was named to the All-SEC team.

A native of Siloam Springs, Arkansas, Coach Murphy and his lovely wife, the former Elizabeth Parrish of Starkville, have two children Mike (25) and Libby (21).

Memphis State University

While the vast majority of Memphis State's 22,000 students are from Tennessee, there are representatives from nearly every state and 45 foreign countries. The University was founded in 1912 as West Tennessee State Normal School, became a senior college in 1925, and achieved university status in 1957. The original site has been expanded to 140 acres and the University now owns more than 1,100 acres. The South Campus provides space for research facilities including the Center for Nuclear Studies, spacious living accommodations for married students, and varsity athletic practice fields.

The University is fully accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. Individual colleges and departments are accredited by appropriate professional accrediting agencies.

Memphis State is committed to excellence in each of its roles—teaching, research and public service.
