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# 1980-81 MEMPHIS STATE BASKETBALL

## *"A New Era at MSU"*

The 1980-81 basketball season marks the second year of Dana Kirk's reign as basketball coach at Memphis State University, and like last year, the challenge remains. Kirk's 1979-80 Tiger team finished the season with a 13-14 record but showed much improvement over the course of the campaign. During the season, there were victories over teams like Arkansas, Ole Miss and Virginia Tech, teams highly favored to defeat the Tigers. Now with the return of four starters from last year's squad, hopes are high for 1980-81.

On paper, prospects look very good. The Tigers return four starters, as well as a much stronger bench and some excellent recruits. There is still a lack of experience among the younger players but if they continue to make strides as they did at the end of the 1979-80 season, MSU could well be on its way to an outstanding year.



## *"Four Starters Return"*

Back for the 1980-81 season are starting guard OTIS JACKSON (6'1, 170), forwards DENNIS ISBELL (6'7, 195) and JEFF BATTLE (6'4, 195) and center HANK McDOWELL (6'9, 210). Jackson led the team in scoring and assists during the 1979-80 campaign and received honorable mention all-conference honors. Three year starter Dennis Isbell and junior-to-be Jeff Battle worked out of the forward positions last year but will receive a strong challenge from several young players this fall. Isbell, a three year letterman for the Tigers, led the team in blocked shots while averaging 11.3 points per game. Battle was hailed throughout the season for his hustling style of play. Hank McDowell, a two year starter at center, averaged 10.1 points per game and led the Tigers in rebounding. More of the same can be expected from him again this year. Greg Moore, a starter at guard last year, will not return to school this fall due to an illness.



## *"Depth at Guard"*

Sophomores JOE PARKER (6'3, 175) and BUBBA LUCKETT (6'2, 175) return for the 1980-81 season after lettering as guards last season. They can be expected to see far more playing time this year but will also receive a major challenge from super freshmen recruits PHILLIP HAYNES (6'3, 180) and BOBBY PARKS (6'5,

185). Both Haynes and Parks were named to high school all-american squads and led their teams to Tennessee state championships. They can be looked to as future stars at Memphis State. The Tigers can look for help at guard from walk-on freshman JON ALBRIGHT (6'3, 185). Jon came to Memphis State from Grimsley High School in Greensboro, North Carolina.

### *"Strength at Forward"*

Sophomore TONY HUBBARD (6'7½, 220) and red-shirted junior GARRY TAYLOR (6'6½, 220) return as forwards along with junior college transfer JOHNIE GIPSON (6'8, 195). Taylor started the first three games of the 1979-80 season but was forced to red-shirt after a shoulder injury. Hubbard, a 6'7½ forward from St. Petersburg, Florida, played sparingly for the varsity but was the leading scorer for the MSU junior varsity team. Gipson, a 6'8 transfer from Northwest Mississippi Junior College, could supply immediate help in the front line with his speed and ability to shoot from outside.



### *"Centers With Size"*

Joining Hank McDowell at center are sophomore A. MACEO BATTLE (6'9, 195) and freshman red-shirt DERRICK PHILLIPS (6'8½, 230). Phillips received his hardship red-shirt early last season after breaking a bone in his foot. He is expected to be at full strength for the upcoming season. Battle saw action in 14 games with the varsity and came on strong at the end of the year.

### *"Schedule is Much Tougher"*

As a team, Memphis State should be much improved this fall, but the 1980-81 schedule is also much improved with teams like national champion Louisville, Marquette, Kansas, Penn State, Vanderbilt and more.

With the return of four starters, a stronger bench to turn to and a sure bet that the Mid-South Coliseum will be packed with excited Tiger fans . . . one can only guess how far the Tigers will go in 1980-81.

# A HISTORICAL SKETCH

## MEMPHIS STATE KEEPS ROLLING ALONG . .

Ole Man River has pushed a lot of water past Memphis, Tennessee, since the doors of West Tennessee State Normal School opened for the first time in September of 1912. In the meantime, the school has grown from a two building normal school on the site of an old plantation to a major university of 31 academic buildings. The enrollment has climbed from 200 in 1912 to a gigantic 21,500 students in all levels of academic endeavor.

The history of Memphis State University, covering a brief six decades, is the story of growth from infancy to maturity of a great educational institution.

Founded after a struggle of several years by various communities in West Tennessee to have the new "normal" (teacher education) school located in their area, West Tennessee State Normal began with a faculty of 12.

By the spring of 1913, the enrollment had jumped to 900. Shortly thereafter, in 1916, the first yearbook, **The DeSoto**, was published. **The Columns**, an organizational newsletter, now the alumni magazine, became a monthly publication that same year.

Even during those early years, sports were not neglected. As a matter of fact, the 1921 girls' basketball team were City Champs, Tri-State Champs, Mississippi Valley Champs and World Free-Throw Champs.

In 1925 (Aerial shot below), along with being made a full four-year college, the name was changed to the West Tennessee State Teachers College. This was shortened five years later to State Teachers College, and in 1941 the school became Memphis State College.



During World War II, Memphis State was chosen as a pilot training center for the Army Air Corps and a training center for officers and men in the Armed Forces.

In 1947, Memphis State received national attention when coed Barbara Walker was crowned Miss America in Atlantic City, N.J. Memphis State has now become known as a campus of Southern beauties.

The next big step academically for MSC came in 1950 when a Graduate Division of study was opened primarily for teachers and school administrators.

MSC began its fight to gain university status in 1951, a year in which the state legislature defeated a proposal to make Memphis State a branch of UT.

Memphis State, determined to prove it was ready for university status, continued its academic growth. In 1953 the college was divided into three schools: Arts and Sciences, Business and Education. The Graduate School was expanded, and in 1956, journalism was officially separated from the English department.

Finally in 1957 the legislature granted university status to Memphis State.

The School of Law, opened in 1962, was accredited by the American Bar Association two and one-half years later and enrolls almost 600 aspiring young attorneys annually.

The Herff College of Engineering, originally established as a graduate program in 1964 with a \$100,000 gift from the estate of the late Herbert Herff, has its own three-building complex at the northeast corner of the main campus.

The Graduate School, which awarded its first doctorate in 1968, has 2,400 students enrolled in courses which eventually will lead them to a master's, specialist or doctoral degree in one of 35 departments offering 82 majors.

In 1970, the MSU Speech and Drama Department became the first non-professional group of any kind anywhere to do the now-famous Broadway rock musical **Hair**. The one-week run was a sell-out after the first day of ticket sales and through special arrangements with the authors, **Hair**, its nude scene deleted for the MSU production, was extended for another week of packed houses.

Memphis State University has come a long way since its meager beginning. Its student body today, which also includes extension and non-credit, special interest course enrollment, represents three-fourths of Tennessee's 95 counties, 45 of the 50 states and more than 50 foreign countries.

The University's vast growth, coupled with its recent maturity, has placed it in a demanding and prominent role in the future of Memphis and the Tri-State area. Memphis State long ago set its objectives as education, research and service. These are now being met daily and the former rural teachers institution now influences minds of all ages while it formulates new ideas to help solve current problems.



# THE PRESIDENT



**DR. THOMAS GLENN CARPENTER**  
MSU's 9th President

Dr. Thomas Glenn Carpenter, an alumnus of Memphis State University, is the new president of MSU. Dr. Carpenter replaces Dr. Billy M. Jones, who resigned the position to accept an academic position at Wichita State University.

Dr. Carpenter, president of the University of North Florida at Jacksonville, was named to the position on May 22 by the Board of Regents of the State University and Community College System. He assumed the presidency on August 1 of 1980.

Dr. Carpenter, age 54, was born in Atlanta, Georgia and was educated in the public schools of Winston-Salem, North Carolina. He received his bachelor of science degree in business administration from Memphis State in 1949. He went on to receive his master's degree in economics from Baylor University in 1950 and his Ph.D. from the University of Florida in 1963.

Dr. Carpenter has 23 years professional experience, serving four institutions of higher education. He began in 1957 at the University of Florida as an instructor of economics and statistics and also served there as the assistant director of housing.

From 1964 to 1965 he served as director of auxiliary services at Florida Atlantic University. Then in 1965 he went to the University of West Florida as business manager. During the next four and a half years there, he served as dean for administration, vice president for administrative services and acting vice president for academic affairs.

In 1969 he became president of the University of North Florida and served in that capacity for eleven years.

Dr. Carpenter is married to the former Oneida Pruette of Memphis, also a Memphis State graduate. They have two children.

# ATHLETIC DIRECTOR

## BILLY J. MURPHY

[1975 Inductee to Tennessee Sports Hall of Fame and 1977 Inductee to Mississippi State Hall of Fame]



Billy J. Murphy, who in 14 years, compiled one of the nation's winningest coaching records as Memphis State's head football coach, decided in early 1972 to take on an even bigger challenge than the one which brought him to the university. It was in 1972 that Murphy decided to devote his full time efforts to the duties of athletic director, a position he had jointly held since 1966.

One of the most respected figures in the southern athletic community, Murphy's record as Athletic Director has been just as impressive as it was on the gridiron. In addition to establishing Memphis State as a southern football power, Murphy has maintained a self-supporting athletic program and budget; and has added some of the nation's finest athletic facilities.

As football coach, he guided the Tigers to three MVC conference titles and a 28-9 victory in the 1971 Pasadena Bowl, the Tiger's first appearance in a major bowl. Murphy was voted MVC Coach-of-the-year three out of the four years in the conference. His 14-year record of 91-44-1 at Memphis State was, at the close of the 1971 season, the 11th best overall won-loss record in the nation. In 1963, five years after he arrived on the scene with the challenge of establishing "a major football-program at Memphis State," Murphy coached the Tigers to one of the nation's few undefeated seasons, and was named Coach of the Year by a national publication.

Before coming to Memphis State, Murphy spent coaching stints at Mississippi State and Minnesota under Murray Warmath.

Murphy is a graduate of Mississippi State where he starred as a tailback in 1941, 1942, and 1946. A former Marine Lieutenant in the Pacific Theater from 1943 to 1945, Murphy returned to Mississippi State following active duty and captained the Bulldogs to an outstanding season and was named to the All-SEC team.

A native of Siloam Springs, Arkansas, Murphy and his lovely wife, the former Elizabeth Parrish of Starkville, have two children Mike (28) and Libby (24).

**ELMA ROANE**  
Assistant AD  
for Women's Athletics

On May 30, 1980, a joint press conference was held joining the men and women's athletic departments at Memphis State and **Ms. Elma Roane**, the backbone of women's athletics at MSU for more than 30 years, was named as the assistant athletic director in charge of women's athletics.

A native of Memphis, she began her affiliation with Memphis State in the late 1930s as an undergraduate at MSU, then called West Tennessee State Teachers College.

After graduating in 1940, she began her career on the high school level, but returned to MSU in 1946 as a physical education instructor and also the director of the women's division of physical education at Memphis State. She was also appointed coordinator of women's athletics, which at that time offered no scholarships and was short on uniforms and equipment.

An all-around athlete herself, she was selected in 1973 to the Memphis Park Commission's Hall of Fame in softball. On the national level her forte was badminton. In 1969, she finished runner-up in the Veteran's Ladies Doubles division of the U.S. National Badminton Tournament.

During her career, she has chaired numerous national committees and has received many awards for her service including a Certificate of Recognition in 1977 by the Tennessee Commission on the Status of Women "for her outstanding efforts in promoting opportunities for women in athletics and physical education."



**HAYWOOD SMITH**  
Assistant AD-Promotions

**Col. Haywood Smith** (USMC, ret.), a graduate of Memphis State University and a former aide to President Lyndon B. Johnson, is beginning his first year as the assistant athletic director in charge of promotions at MSU.

Smith attended Memphis State from 1949 through 1953 and played varsity baseball for the Tigers. Following graduation, he entered the Marine Corps and served the United States in that capacity until his retirement in 1974. During his stint in the Marine Corps, Smith gained experience in the field of public relations and promotions by serving as director of the 8th Marine Corps Dist., including the states of Arkansas, Louisiana, Oklahoma, Texas and New Mexico. During that time, he supervised more than 4,500 regular and reserve marines and formulated policies for training.

From 1968 through 1969, he was Armed Forces aide to President Johnson and acted as a liaison for the President with the office of the Secretary of Defense. He headed the joint military staff at the White House and attended the President at official and state events and on trips, both foreign and domestic.

Smith, a long-time member of the Memphis Touchdown Club, worked with a company until recently that handled Arab investments in the United States and elsewhere.

He and his wife Jeannie have three children, Cindy, 23, Sunny, 20, and Major, 12.

**RUFFNER MURRAY**  
Assistant Athletic Director  
[1980 Inductee Tennessee  
Sports Hall of Fame]

Ruffner Murray, a prominent Mid-South figure in both the athletics professions, enters his 13th year as Memphis State's full-time assistant athletic director.

Primarily responsible for the athletic scholarship fund and the coordinating of MSU's spring sports program, since his arrival, there has been a noticeable increase in the scholarship fund and the spring sports program is vastly improved.

Murray, who is the first full-time assistant to the A.D. the school has had, came to MSU after serving 30 years as head football coach at Memphis Central High School. During his 30 years at Central, his teams won 175 games, lost 71 and tied 11. During his coaching tenure he produced eight city championship teams, four of which won it in succession from 1952-55. In addition, Murray, who received several coaching awards and honors, produced a countless number of high school football stars who went on to become collegiate greats.

A high school football player himself at Central from 1931-33, Murray went on to play college ball at Virginia Tech from 1933-37. He assumed the Central coaching duties in 1937.



**DANNY FELKER**  
Athletic Business Manager

Danny Felker, a native of Corinth, Mississippi, is entering his 6th year as Memphis State's athletic business manager and is a vital link in the workings of the athletic department.

Felker, who was the assistant manager of the university bookstore for six years, began his duties as business manager in November of 1974. In addition to working in the bookstore, he served as an assistant athletic dorm advisor for five years.

Felker received his undergraduate degree in history and his masters degree in educational administration. Both came from Memphis State. While attending MSU, he was elected to ODK Honorary Fraternity and Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities.

He is married to the former Judy Weigel of Dayton, Ohio. Judy is a graduate of the Memphis Art Academy.

**Lou Strasberg** is now in his tenth year of service at Memphis State University.

A native Memphian, Strasberg grew up in Marianna, Arkansas, where he graduated from T.A. Futrell High school in 1964.

In addition to his duties in Continuing Education, Strasberg handles all travel details for the athletic department at Memphis State as well as for the entire university.

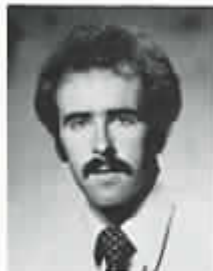


**JACK BUGBEE**  
Assistant to Athletic Director

**Jack Bugbee**, who was Memphis State University's first full-time Sports Information Director in 1958, returned to that position in 1973 and was promoted to Asst. to the AD in charge of public relations in July of 1980. A native Memphian, Bugbee has been involved in Memphis and Mid-South area sports for over 20 years. He graduated from Memphis Central High School in 1952 where he played baseball and basketball for Coach Ruffner Murray, now assistant Athletic Director at MSU.

He played football, basketball and baseball at Southwestern College in Memphis from 1952 through 1955. Bugbee played professional baseball in 1955 in the minor league "farm systems" of the Chicago White Sox and New York Yankees, before entering the U.S. Army Signal Corps. He was hired at Memphis State University in 1958 as SID, a position he held until 1963 when he joined the Memphis based sports public relations firm of Early Maxwell Associates. During his 10 years with the PR firm, Bugbee coordinated national publicity for Memphis Memorial Stadium, was a member of the Liberty Bowl Team Selection Committee, and handled press relations for the Danny Thomas Memphis Classic golf tournament.

**Michael Finn**, 25, came to Memphis State University in July of 1978, when he was appointed MSU's first full-time women's sports information director. Now with the merger of men's and women's athletics, both offices have been combined.

A native of Waterloo, Iowa, Finn graduated from the University of Iowa, where he received his bachelors degree in 1978 in journalism with an emphasis in sports communication.

While at the University of Iowa, Finn served for one year as an assistant sports information director for UI's women's sports relations department.

During his tenure at Memphis State, Finn helped bring women's basketball to the national spotlight as he was named a regional coordinator in charge of national statistics for the Association for Intercollegiate Athletics for Women.

A sports nut in both activities and trivia, Finn's interests include fast-pitch softball, weightlifting, cycling and photography.

**Bob Winn**, a native of Roanoke, Virginia, is in his 7th year with the Sports Information Department at Memphis State University. A 1974 graduate of MSU, he holds a B.A. degree in Journalism and Public Relations.

Outside of working as associate SID, Winn is in charge of the statistics crew for both Memphis State football and basketball and the crew for the Liberty Bowl Classic. He is the official scorer and statistician for MSU baseball, as well as being the Radio-TV coordinator for the Danny Thomas Memphis Classic and the technical advisor for both the Richard Williamson and Dana Kirk television shows.

A graduate of Patrick Henry High School in Roanoke, Bob played baseball for nine years including two seasons as the starting shortstop for the state championship Connie Mack team and was a first team, all-military selection at shortstop for Greenbriar Military Academy during his one year of prep school.

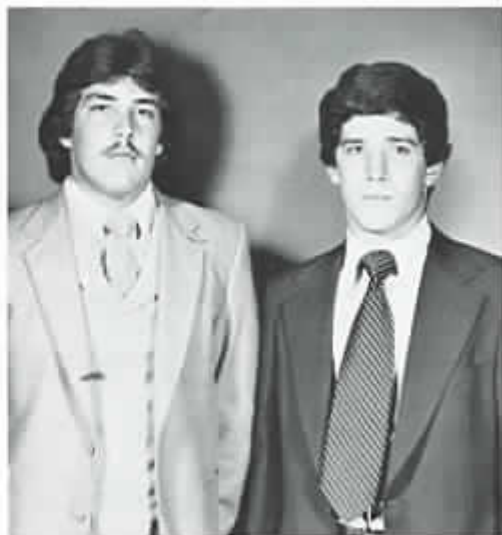

**DANA KIRK**  
**Tiger Basketball Coach**

Dana Kirk begins his second year at Memphis State University, after being named basketball coach on March 20, 1979. He inherited a team virtually stripped of its scoring punch (30 points per game and 17 rebounds per game from three graduated forwards) and a team without much experience. Kirk went to work immediately to build a cohesive unit, designed "not to run and gun, but to run and make it." His philosophies paid off, as the Tiger clawed out a 13-14 record that included big wins over Arkansas, Ole Miss, Murray State, Virginia Tech (twice in overtime), Cincinnati, Tulane and St. Louis, the last four being members of the tough Metro Conference.

Kirk, a native of Logan, West Virginia, graduated from Marshall University in Huntington, West Virginia, in 1958. He was a two sport letterman at Marshall, playing center on both the football and basketball teams. Upon graduation, he spent six years coaching West Virginia high school basketball before entering the college ranks at the University of Tampa in 1965. His combined coaching record in high school and at Tampa was an impressive 197-94. When Tampa discontinued football and basketball after the 1970-71 season, Kirk became an assistant coach at the University of Louisville under Denny Crum. During the five seasons he aided Crum, the Cardinals were 118-28 and went to five post season tournaments, finishing third in the NCAA one year and fourth another. Kirk left Louisville in 1976 to become head coach at Virginia Commonwealth University (Richmond, Virginia) and during his three seasons with the Rams, led them to records of 13-13 (1976-77), 24-5 (1977-78) and 20-5 (1978-79). The 44 year-old Kirk has been a part of over 500 basketball games as either an assistant coach or head coach and has a combined record of 385-159 for a .708 won-loss percentage.

Kirk and his wife Ann have two daughters, Koby, age 12 and Kasha, age 10.

# DANA KIRK—THE MAN, THE COACH

**COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT:** From the day Dana Kirk became basketball coach at Memphis State University, he has worked tirelessly in the community, not just for Tiger basketball but for the overall university as well. In the off season, and after recruiting, he has donated his time to countless telethons, em-ceed charitable events, spoken to hundreds of civic, fraternal, student and booster groups, ranging from a few dozen in attendance to several hundred. For instance, he is on the Board of Directors for Boy's Club and Easter Seals, Chairman of the Tennessee State Employee's Section of United Way and Honorary Coach for the Special Olympics. He works closely with fund raising campaigns for Muscular dystrophy, Multiple Sclerosis, Cerebral Palsey and St. Jude's Hospital.

Kirk's typical day starts with an early morning radio show (WMC), where he discusses current sports at all levels. He is quite knowledgeable in all sports, and has an uncanny knack of not only picking winners, but guessing the exact score. Following his radio show, he returns to campus for a brief workout "to keep in shape", and then heads for the office, where he answers calls, writes letters, checks with his assistants, Larry Finch and Lee Fowler on day-to-day operations. Then, it's off to lunch, like as not a speaking engagement, somewhere. His afternoons are varied and just as busy, ranging from meetings with players to working on long range scheduling which has already shown a major improvement in the short time he has been here. After work, he just might have another speaking engagement, or he may attend a Highland Hundred meeting (MSU football booster group) or pull for the Tigers on Saturday night at a football game. If he's not at one of those places, he'll be with his wife and two daughters, or playing golf or spending a few hours at his favorite fishing hole. Whatever, it's all helping Memphis State University and the basketball program.

**THE COACH:** Marked improvements have been made during Kirk's first year at MSU, and in many areas. Thanks to his philosophies on class attendance and study hall, the overall team grade point average has increased to a solid 2.7 on a 4.0 scale. In addition, the scheduling of opponents has been upgraded to include Marquette, Kansas and Penn State along with Metro Conference members and perennial rivals Ole Miss, Vanderbilt and others. When he took the job, he said "As far as scheduling, I have to play out some commitments made by MSU, but my belief is that you must play a different schedule to prepare your team for conference action." 1980-81 ranks as one of the toughest in Tiger history. Included in the 14 home games is a season opening double header in the Mid-South Coliseum. MSU will play Southern Illinois on Friday night, Nov. 28, following the game between Tulane and Oklahoma City. On Saturday, the Tigers play Oklahoma City, following the Tulane-Southern Illinois clash. It's the first two-night double header in MSU history, and

has already been announced as an annual event. The double header concept pleases Kirk, who worked long and hard with MSU Athletic Director Billy J. Murphy, and Metro Conference Commissioner Larry Albus in putting the idea together.

"It's a tremendous idea for several reasons," Kirk says. "First, we can bring in teams from different sections of the country, and get an early test as to how we stack up against national opposition. Second, we will always be able to see another Metro Conference team and evaluate them for future games that season. And third, the total concept is going to give us a wider range of scheduling and we are always going to try to bring in two schools with good basketball tradition. I prefer the individual pressure of two games instead of the tournament concept," he said. "Sometimes, I feel you can go to a tournament too early."

His hard work on scheduling prompted Athletic Director Murphy to say: "Dana has done an outstanding job. He has provided the type of opposition our loyal fans want, and deserve this year, as well as in the future, because all of our opponents are on a home-and-home basis."

Kirk is just as involved on the court with the game as he is off the court with community involvement. Last year, in 13 close games, decided by 8-points or less, the Tigers wound up 10-3, a tribute by itself to good coaching, communication with the players, discipline and organization.

Kirk manages to weld the two areas of coaching and civic involvement together in many ways, but, perhaps the best ways are through his Sunday television show, already recognized as the best in the area, and his basketball camp for kids, during the summer months. His television show (WMC-TV) attracts basketball fans, no matter what their loyalty. It is fast moving, well planned and well executed every Sunday morning. His basketball camp is the fastest growing in the area, and is the same way . . . busy, well planned and well coached. Kids are flocking to it, because they have a good time, and they learn some basketball, and they meet Coach Kirk.

Dana Kirk . . . the man, the coach . . . active, varied and involved, benefitting his community, his university, his staff and players and Tiger basketball fans, everywhere.

Memphis State's largest winning margin is 68 points. In 1955-56 the Tigers defeated Union University 138-70. The largest losing margin is 39 points, by Ohio State in 1959-60 and Western Kentucky in 1965-66.

**LARRY FINCH**  
**Assistant Coach**  
**(Memphis State, 1973)**



Larry Finch, who captained Memphis State to its finest basketball hour, the finals of the NCAA in 1973, is beginning his second year as an assistant coach on Dana Kirk's staff.

Finch had been an assistant coach at the University of Alabama-Birmingham under Gene Bartow for two seasons.

Finch, a native of Memphis, was an all-state and all-america guard at Melrose High School, before joining the Tigers in 1971. His name still dots the MSU basketball record book, including the most points scored in a career (1,869), most points scored in two seasons (1,390), most points scored in a single season (721), most points scored in a game (48) and most consecutive double figure games (33).

Finch was an All-Missouri Valley Conference selection, twice, and was named to the Basketball Weekly, Basketball News, Helms Foundation and Converse All-American teams in both his junior and senior seasons. During his three seasons with the MSU varsity, the Tigers were 18-8, 21-7 and 24-6 (63-21 total). In addition, the Tigers went to two post-season tournaments: the NIT in 1972 and the finals of the NCAA in 1973. He was named to numerous all-tournament and all-district teams during that time.

Following his playing days at MSU, Finch was drafted by the Los Angeles Lakers of the NBA but signed with the Memphis Pros of the old ABA. He remained with the franchise until it's demise. From there Larry began his coaching career, first at Richland Junior High and then at Messick High School in 1976.

Larry and his wife Vickie have three children, Shanae, age 5, Larry, Jr. age 3, and Allawrence, 6 months.

**LEE FOWLER**  
**Assistant Coach**  
**(Vanderbilt, 1974)**



Lee Fowler, a former assistant coach under both Roy Skinner and Wayne Dobbs at Vanderbilt University, is entering his second year as an assistant coach at Memphis State University. Fowler served as a part-time assistant under Roy Skinner in 1974-75 and returned to his alma mater in 1978 as a fulltime assistant under Wayne Dobbs.

A native of Columbia, Tennessee, Fowler was a three year starter and letterman for the Commodores and helped lead his team to a combined three year record of 59-21. In 1973-74, the Commodores finished the season with a record of 23-5 and went to the finals of the NCAA Regional Tournament. The 6'7" forward scored 718 career points and grabbed 430 career rebounds. He was named to the VIT All-Tournament team in 1973 (Larry Finch was named as MVP of the same tournament) and was selected to the Tennessee-Kentucky All-Star team in 1974. Fowler led Vanderbilt in free throw percentage in both his junior and senior seasons (87.5 percent and 78.0 percent) and averaged over 50 percent from the field for his career. Following graduation, Fowler was drafted by the San Antonio Spurs of the NBA.

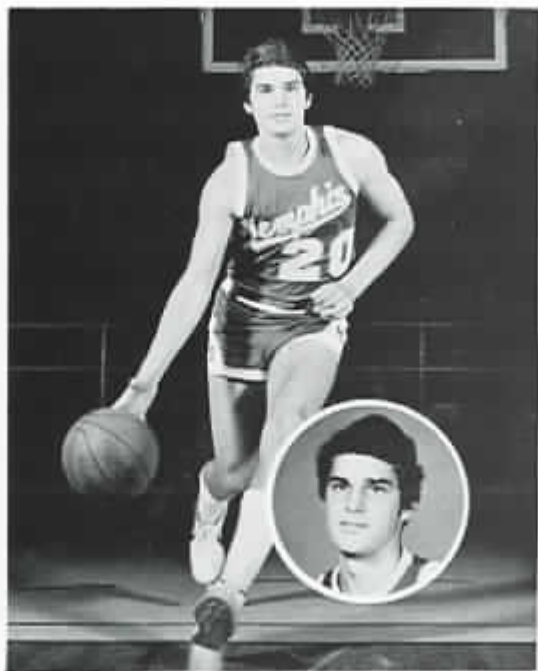
Fowler was a three year letterman at Columbia High School and was named the All-Middle Tennessee MVP by both the Nashville Banner and the Nashville Tennessean. 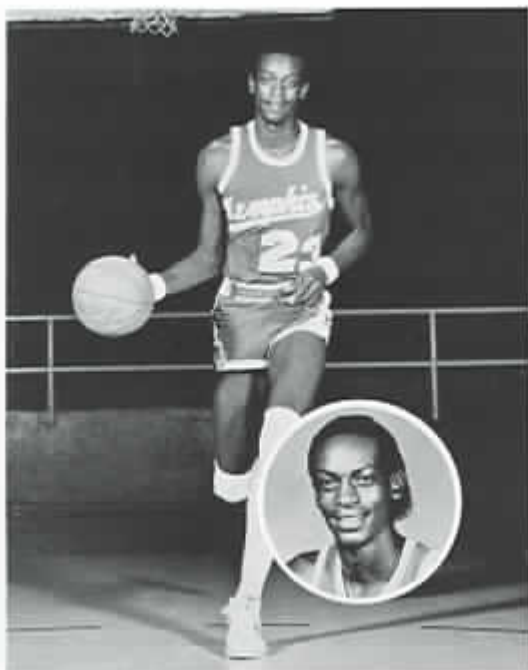
# 23. A. MACEO BATTLE

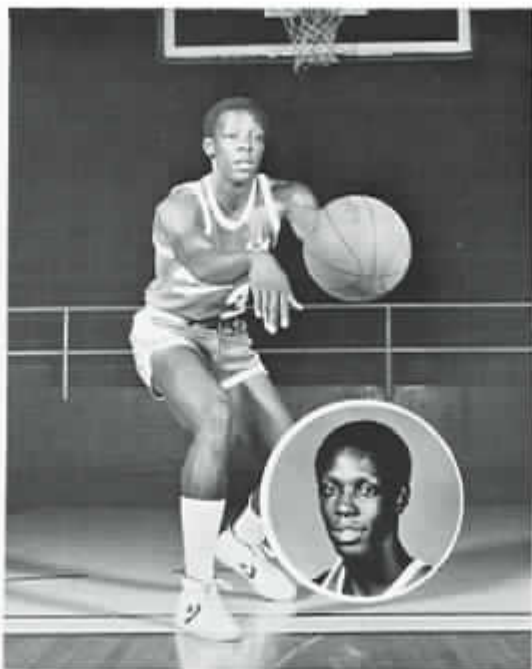
# 31. JEFF BATTLE

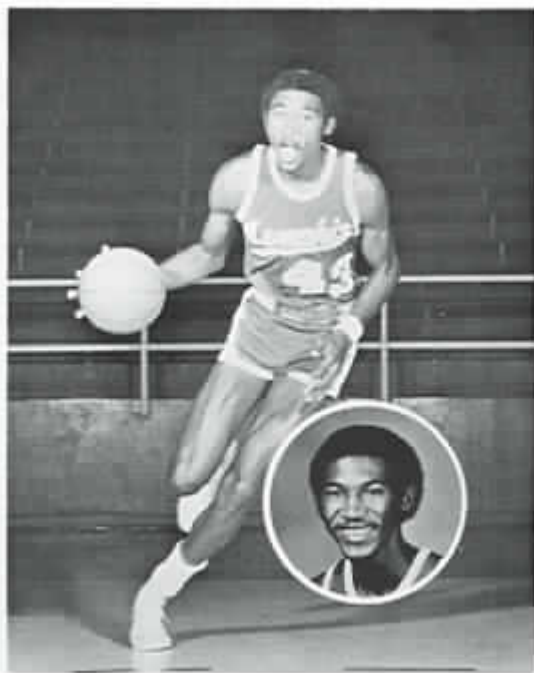

**F—6'8—197—Junior—Vance, Mississippi**

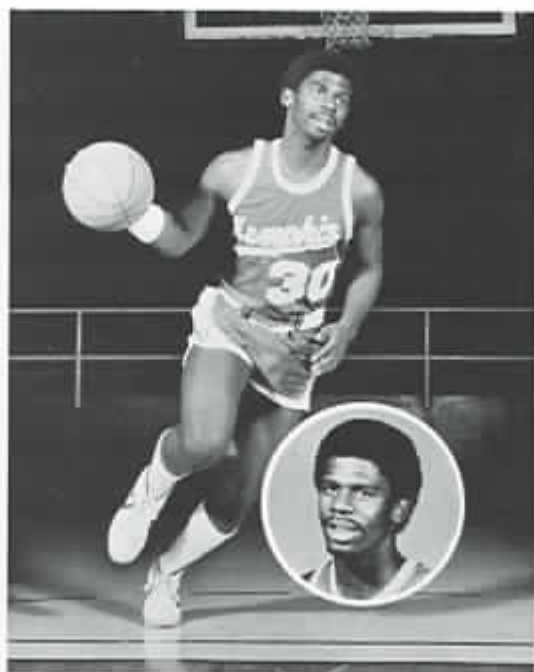

Phillip scored a career high 31 points against Westwood High School and became Northside's all-time leading scorer, midway through the 1979-80 season. For his play, Phillip was named all-conference, all-city, All-MIAA, all-district, all-region, all-tournament and all-state. This past summer, he was named 1st team All-American by the Orlando Sentinel-Star and was voted as one of the Top 150 Players in the Nation.



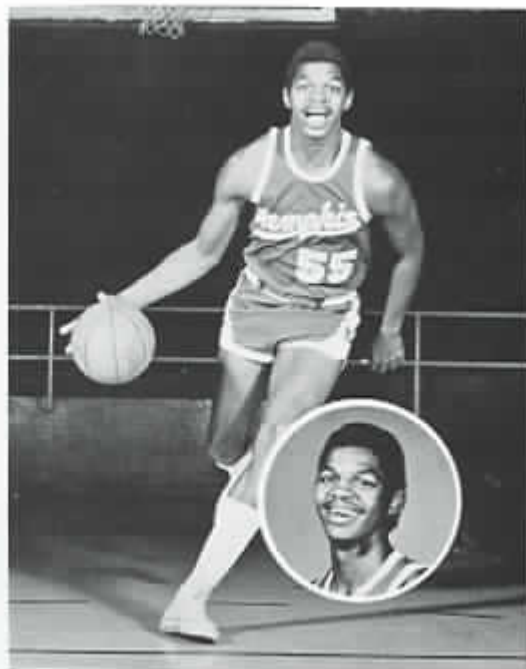
# 55. TONY HUBBARD

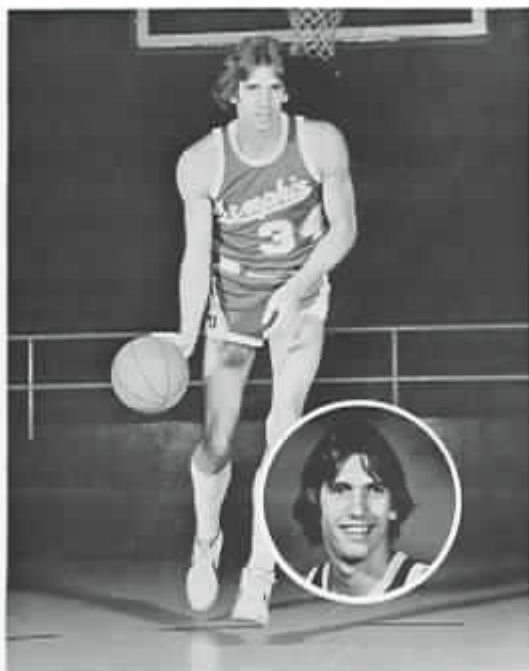
# 32. DENNIS ISBELL

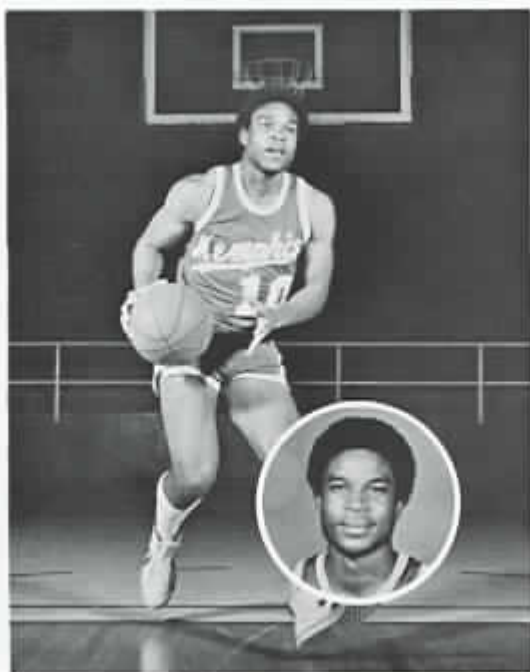
# 10. OTIS JACKSON

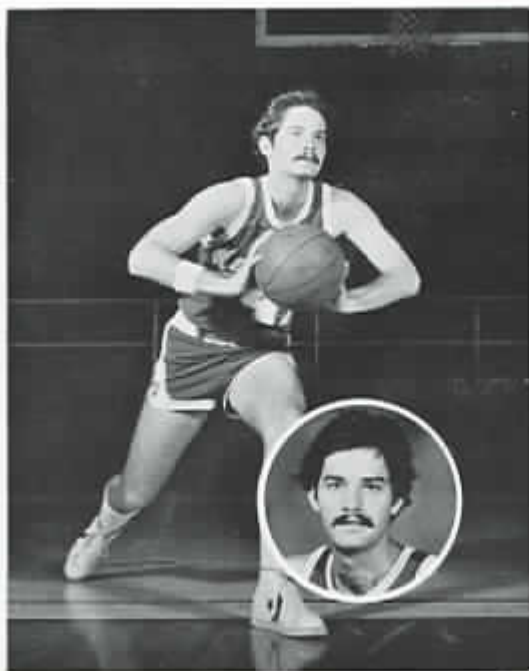
# 41. BUBBA LUCKETT

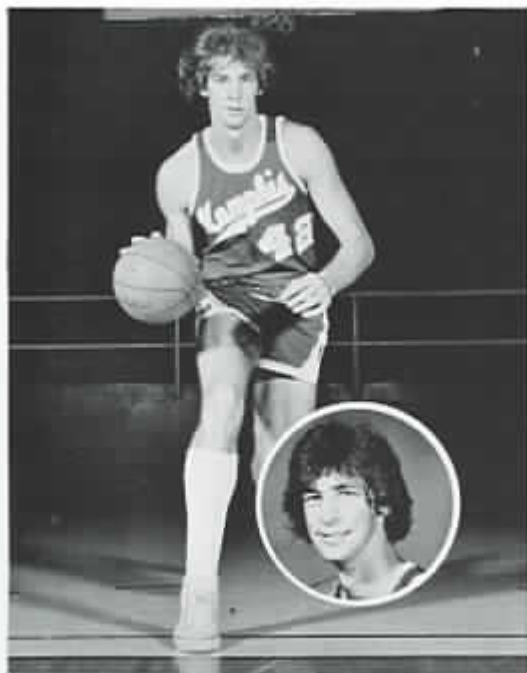
# 42. HANK McDOWELL

A returning three year letterman, Hank McDowell was voted Co-MVP of the 1979-80 Memphis State basketball team. 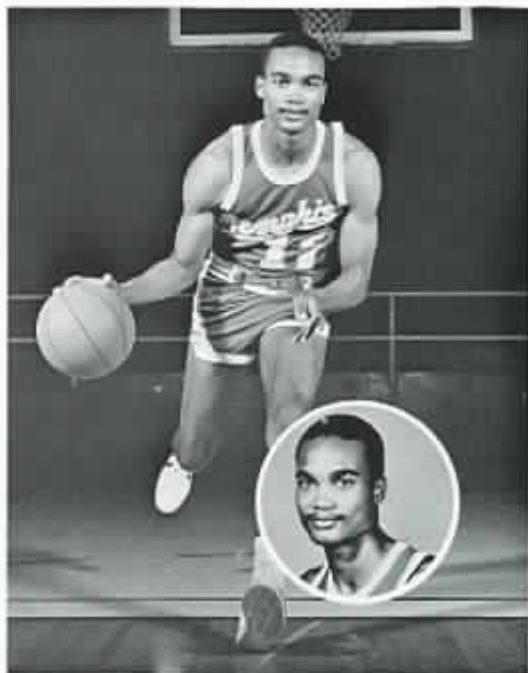
# 12. JOE PARKER

G—6'3—175—Sophomore—Louisville, Kentucky

Joe Parker returns for his sophomore season after lettering for the Tigers in 1979-80. The 6'3 guard averaged 2.1 points per game while playing in 17 of the Tigers 27 games. He scored a career high 12 points against Eastern Montana and tallied eight against Oklahoma Christian. Parker, who shot 90% from the free throw line, supplied his teammates with 14 assists during last season. Joe came to Memphis State from Central High School in Louisville, Kentucky, where he helped lead his team to three district championships, two regional championships and a state runner-up finish. During his senior season, Parker averaged 23.5 points per game and 13.1 rebounds per outing. He scored a career high 42 points in a single game as a senior and for his play during the 1978-79 campaign, Parker received all-city, all-district, all-region, all-conference, all-state and honorable mention All-American honors. He was also selected to play in the Derby Classic his senior year.

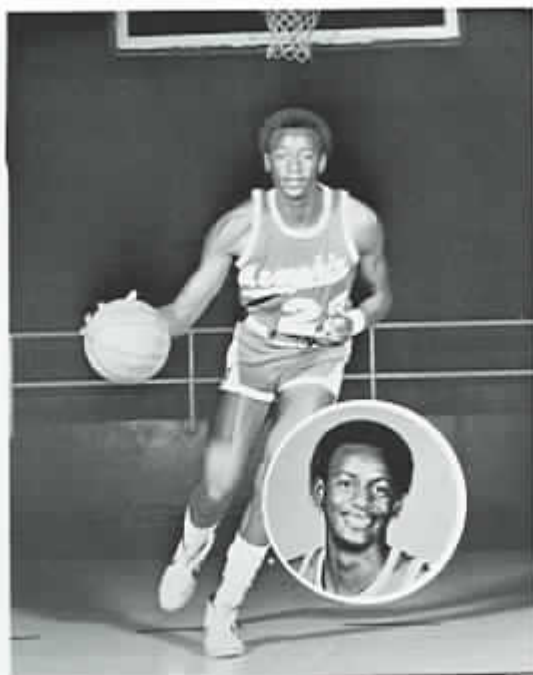

**G—F—6'5"—180—Freshman—Grand Junction, Tennessee**

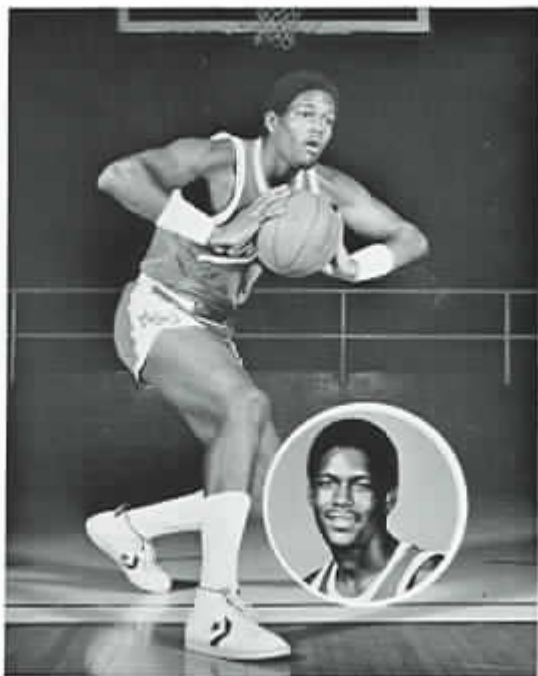
Once again hitting the ranks of the Tennessee state champions, Dana Kirk signed 6'5 guard-forward Bobby Parks from Grand Junction, Tennessee. Parks led his Middleton High School team to the 1979-80 class A state championship. He was a three year basketball letterman and was captain of the 1980 state championship team. Bobby averaged an outstanding 28.7 points per game and 15.0 rebounds per game during the 1979-80 campaign. He scored a career high 44 points in a single game during his senior season. Parks was a three year all-region and all-area selection and was twice an all-state selection as well as being named the MVP of the 1980 state tournament. This past summer, he was named 2nd team All-American by the Orlando Sentinel-Star and was also selected as one of the Top 150 Players in the Nation.



# 35. DERRICK PHILLIPS

C—6'8½—230—Freshman—St. Louis, Missouri

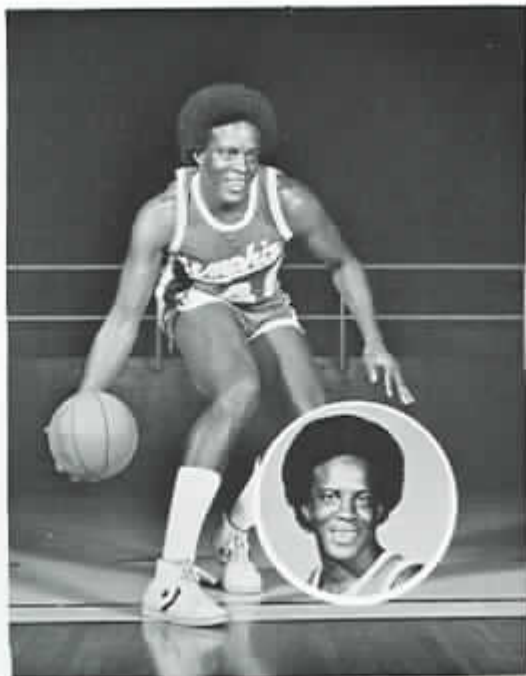
Derrick Phillips, a center who has been described as "out of the same mold of the late John Gunn", never had a chance to prove his basketball ability last season. Just two games into the 1979-80 campaign, it was discovered that Phillips had a broken bone in his foot. It was an injury that forced him to miss the remainder of the season. Derrick was granted a hardship redshirt and will re-play his freshman season this year. Phillips is a product of Sumner High School in St. Louis, Missouri. He lettered for four years as a center and forward but also received three letters as a football player. He averaged 23.1 points per game and 10.3 rebounds per contest during his senior season and nailed down a career high 35 points and 13 rebounds against Soldan High in 1978-79. Derrick was named a member of the all-city, all-conference, all-state and Prep All-American team his senior season. He also played in the Missouri All-Star game in 1979. During his high school career, Phillips was a member of two championship basketball teams and holds the school record for the most consecutive points scored.



# 40. GARRY TAYLOR

F—6'6½—225—Junior—Cincinnati, Ohio

Garry Taylor was the second Memphis State basketball player to gain a hardship red-shirt during the 1979-80 season. The 6' 6½ forward was injured in the third game of the season and was granted a hardship red-shirt. The Cincinnati native separated his shoulder in the Vanderbilt game and had surgery shortly thereafter. Garry started the Vanderbilt game and had scored eight points through the first two games. Taylor came to Memphis State from Northwest Mississippi Junior College and Hughes High School in Cincinnati. He was a two year starter for Northwest Mississippi Junior College and averaged 14.0 points per game and 12.0 rebounds per outing. He received all-state junior college honors during both seasons at Northwest. Taylor was a four year basketball letterman at Hughes High School. He averaged 28.0 points per game and 18.2 rebounds per game as a senior. For his outstanding play, Garry was named 1st team all-conference, 1st team all-city and 1st team all-state in 1976-77. Taylor is a "super leaper" and will be a strong contender for a forward position this fall.

MSU's cage home is one of the most beautiful, functional and versatile public facilities ever constructed in the Mid-South. Built by both the City and County Governments, the 11,200-seat building was opened in 1964. Memphis State's 82-73 victory over Texas A & M, before some 9,000 fans, was the first basketball game ever played in the Coliseum.

In addition to the two end-line bleachers, the Coliseum has 9,081 permanent, theater-style seats, 10 fully equipped concession stands and three major patron entrances.

# THE METRO

## THE CONFERENCE OF THE 1980 NCAA CHAMPION LOUISVILLE CARDINALS

Five years ago the Metro Conference was the new kid on the college basketball block.

Last spring the league came of age when Louisville, behind college basketball player of the year Darrell Griffith, won the NCAA championship in dramatic fashion by beating heralded UCLA.

That feat made history for the Metro. By Louisville winning the national championship, the Metro became the first of nearly a half-dozen conferences formed in the last five years to have one of its members win a national title.

But that's not all. The league set a record for attendance last season also and had the second largest attendance increase of any conference in the country. Over three-quarters of a million fans saw Metro basketball last year, an increase of some 96,000 fans over a year ago.

The 1980-81 season should be even better. This figures to be the most competitive season from top to bottom in the history of the league as six of the seven Metro teams return at least three starters from a year ago.

Louisville, the defending national and Metro champion, has four starters back, including second-leading scorer Derek Smith and U. S. Olympic team member Rodney McCray.

Florida State, which finished second to Louisville in the regular-season Metro race and league tournament has returning flashy guard-forward Mickey Dillard, who returns as the highest scoring player in the league (he was second last year behind Griffith with a 22.5 average).

Virginia Tech, which like Louisville and Florida State participated in the NCAA tournament, returns all-league forward Dale Solomon. In addition, the Hokies recruited six players, the most in the league.

Memphis State, picked to finish last in the league a year ago, surprised everyone and finished fourth. The Tigers have nearly everybody back from that team, including center-forward Dennis Isbell and smooth-shooting guard Otis Jackson.

Cincinnati, under coach Ed Badger, has four starters returning, including forward Bobby Austin and forward-center David Duarte, who before he was declared academically ineligible early in the season last year was one of the top big men in the league. The Bearcats also recruited prep All-American Brad Waller, a 6-3 guard who could step in immediately as a starter.

Tulane returns all five of its starters as well, headed by last year's freshman of the year in the league, forward Paul Thompson.

St. Louis loses the most of any team in the league — three starters — but the Billikens return All-American candidate David Burns at guard and recruited five players, including the leading prep scorer in St. Louis last year, Tony Lawrence.
