WHY VANDALS?

Don't use your dictionary to find Idaho's definition of a Vandal.

No, Idaho's student-athletes go by a name earned nearly a century ago by a basketball team coached by Hec Edmundson, whose teams played defense with such intensity and ferocity that sports writers said they "vandalized" their opponents.

The mark made by that 1917 team went far deeper than wins and losses on the court. In 1917, Harry Lloyd "Jazz" McCarty – a writer for the student newspaper, the Argonaut – subtly tagged the team with a new nickname in a pregame write-up: "The opening game with Whitman will mark a new epoch in Idaho basketball history, for the present gang of 'Vandals' have the best material that has ever carried the 'I' into action." McCarty's indirect suggestion stuck.

By 1921, McCarty and Edward Maslin Hulme, the dean of the College of Liberal Arts, succeeded in their push to have Vandals officially adopted as the nickname for Idaho teams.

Adding a special touch were Edmundson's roots. He was from Moscow and made a name for himself at Idaho as one of the nation's top distance runners. He eventually left Idaho to coach at the University of Washington where the Huskies still play basketball in the building bearing his name – the Edmundson Pavilion.

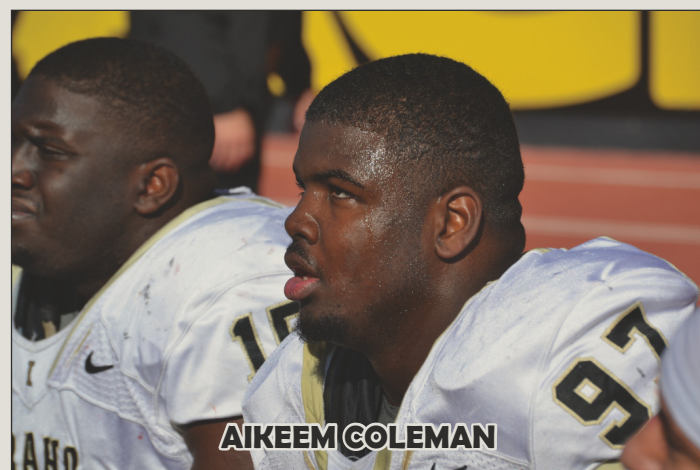


SEASON IN REVIEW

A season to remember



COACH PAUL PETRINO

2016 will go down as one of the most memorable seasons in Vandal football history.

Idaho is making its third bowl appearance – and first since 2009, in a year during which coach Paul Petrino’s vision came to fruition based on the tenets that are the foundation of his program – hard work, belief, effort, character, family, commitment, teamwork. Not only are those words on the walls of the meeting rooms and the backs of their workout T-shirts, but they have become part of the players themselves.

The Vandals started the season 1-2 with a home victory over Montana State before road losses to Washington, fourth-ranked and in the College Football Play-offs, and Washington State, which spent four weeks in the top 25 and climbed as high as No. 22. Next was a road trip to Las Vegas, which the Vandals won in an overtime thriller.

Idaho went on to win six of its last eight games, which includes its last four, against a schedule that included six teams that are advancing to post-season bowls. Along the way, it developed into a cohesive team that didn’t need to rely solely on a single player or one element of the game. The victories came with contributions from all phases.

The running game, which led by Aaron Duckworth’s 615 yards, was a three-pronged force. Isaiah Saunders, who came on strong in the latter part of the season to average 104 yards during each of the final regular-season games, had 584 yards. Denzal Brantley contributed 227 and quarterback Matt Linehan showed his ability to run when needed with 163 yards.

Linehan completed 61.46 percent of his passes for 2,803 yards en route to climbing into the top five in a handful of Vandal career records – a list that includes his dad, Scott.

His receiving corps is deep. He completed passes to 12 players with four with 30 or more catches. Deon Watson led the way in yards with 555 (on 36 catches) and Buck Cowan was the leader in receptions with 46 (for 532 yards). Cowan also was the scoring leader with six touchdowns. Jordan Frysinger came on strong as the season progressed and was third in total yards with 396, which includes two games of 100 or more yards.

Enough can’t be said about punter/kicker Austin Rehkow, who will leave Idaho with all-time career records in punting average, field

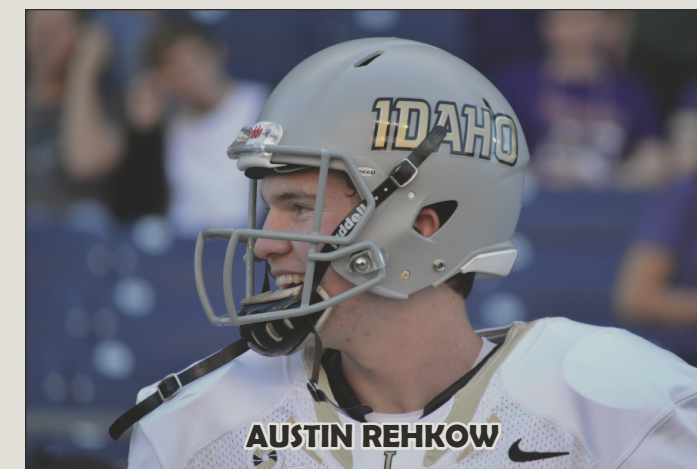

goals attempted, field goals made, and field goal percentage – and with the most points by a non-running back. While his punting average may have dipped during his senior season, it was the result of a more effective Vandal offense. Instead of punting from deep in Idaho territory, he was either close to mid-field or in the opponents’ territory where a shorter, more accurate kick was needed.

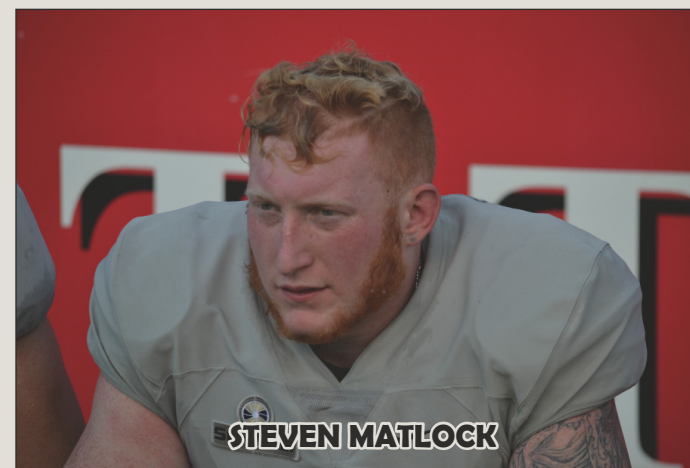
Defensively, some familiar names were gone but the players who took over made names for themselves. Tueni Lupeamanu will leave as one of the most effective defensive linemen in school history. His regular-season total 71 tackles are the most among FBS defensive linemen. Joining him up front in making his presence known was junior college transfer Aikeem Coleman, who was voted the league’s Newcomer of the Year after recording eight sacks, seven quarterback hurries and 11 tackles for loss.

Behind them were a rock solid linebacking corps led by sophomores Kaden Elliss, Tony Lashley and Ed Hall – a formidable trio that combined for 225 tackles, 21 tackles for loss, and five sacks.

Then there was a secondary that collectively may be one of the best in school history. Jayshawn Jordan is the second-leading tackler (89) behind Lashley (99) and battled Elliss all season for the interceptions lead – both have five going into the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl.

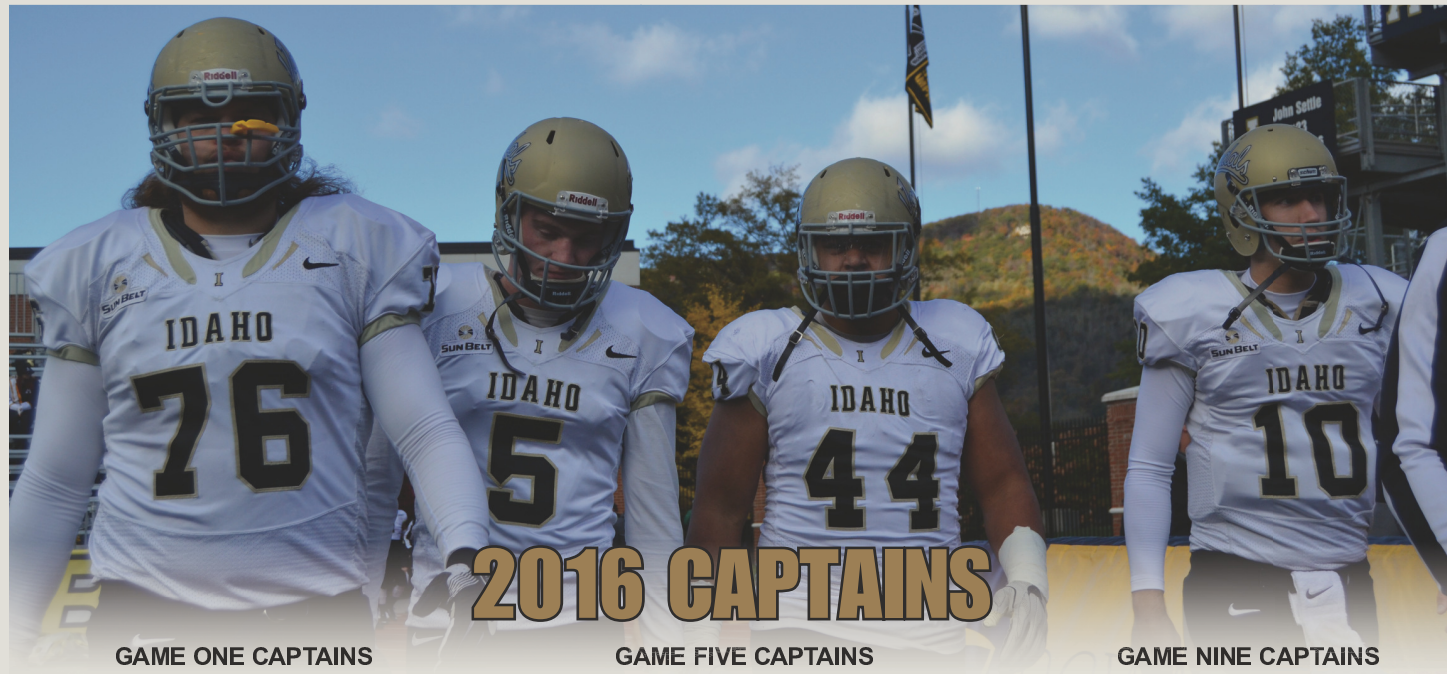

Rehkow was recognized after kicking four field goals, including the game winner, in Idaho's victory at ULM. His 27-yard game-winning kick came as time expired. He also was good on two PATs and averaged 40.7 yards per punt with three being down at or inside the 10.

WEEK #7 ~ OFFENSE

QB Matt Linehan – Junior
Linehan threw for the fourth-most yards in school history with his 476 total against New Mexico State. He completed 29 of 36 throws with four going for touchdowns. He was intercepted once. He also earned recognition in star of the week voting by the Manning and Hero awards. He also was voted the conference Offensive Player of the Week by College Football Performance Awards.

RB Isaiah Saunders – Sophomore

TIDBITS

A DEFENSIVE MENACE

Idaho defensive lineman Tueni Lupeamanu, who played quarterback in high school, is making his name know on the Vandals' defensive line. His 71 tackles this fall are third for Idaho but tops among FBS defensive linemen.

DOUBLE DUTY

As mentioned, Lupeamanu has an offensive background. While his suggestions to the offensive staff to let him throw a pass or two didn't gain any traction, the notion of using his size, strength and quickness on offense did gain their attention. So, he was inserted in at fullback on occasion and, at Texas State, scored two rushing touchdowns – both one-yard runs. His defensive lineman Kevin Shelton, also with an offensive background (he played on that side of the ball as a true freshman for the Vandals), has taken his turn at fullback, too.

EVERYBODY LENDS A HAND

Idaho didn't have one go-to receiver. Instead, quarterback Matt Linehan mixed passes to 13 receivers. Tight end Buck Cowan led the way with 46 catches and Deon Watson was the yardage leader with 555. All told, six players had a least 20 catches with three of those pulling in 30 or more.

ENDS OF THEIR CAREERS

Twenty players played their final games at the Kibbie Dome in the Vandals' regular-season finale on Dec. 3. Of those, 12 played their entire careers at Idaho and eight were transfers. Of the 12 who spent their full careers with the Vandals, four are from Paul Petrino's first recruiting class and played as true freshmen.

ETCHING HIS NAME IN THE BOOKS

One of the fifth-year seniors is Jayshawn Jordan, who played his freshman season but was injured in 2015 and redshirted. Not only did he earn a trip to a bowl game with his teammates but his two interceptions against Georgia State give him a career total 13, which puts him in a tie for third in career interceptions. Sophomore Kaden Elliss might catch him by the time he graduates – he joined Jordan with a two-pick game with his double at UNLV.

WELL MANNERED

The disciplined style of play coached by the Vandal staff shows up in their – for the past two seasons, being one of the least penalized teams in the nation.

BLOCK!!

The Vandals have scored twice off of blocked punts this season – Kendrick Trotter's 19-yard return in a key road victory at Louisiana-Monroe and Lloyd Hightower's 25-yard return against Georgia State

BUSY, BUSY, BUSY

Austin Rehkow kicked at least one field goal in every 2016 game – except the Vandals road trip to Washington.

A TURN IN THE SPOTLIGHT

Not only did the Vandals score twice off of blocked kicks, the defense had its turn with a safety at Texas State and Kaden Elliss' 31-yard interception return against UNLV.

VANDAL FAMILY

Idaho has eight sons who are following in their fathers' footsteps as Vandals. Gunnar Amos (Shawn), Zach Cable (Tom), Cade Coffey (Travis), Buck Cowan (Dave), Jaden Gardner (Bryson), Matt and Mike Linehan (Scott, and uncles Ron and Rick), Isaiah Saunders (Walt) and Deon (Deon) Watson. Additionally, Jayshawn Jordan (uncle Jeff Jordan, cousin Aaron Grymes), Russell Siavii (brother Russell) and Koa Wilkins (cousin Shiloh Keo) have family ties to Idaho.

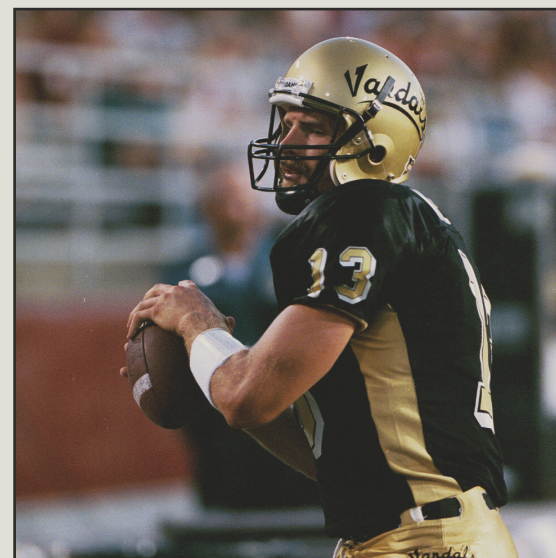

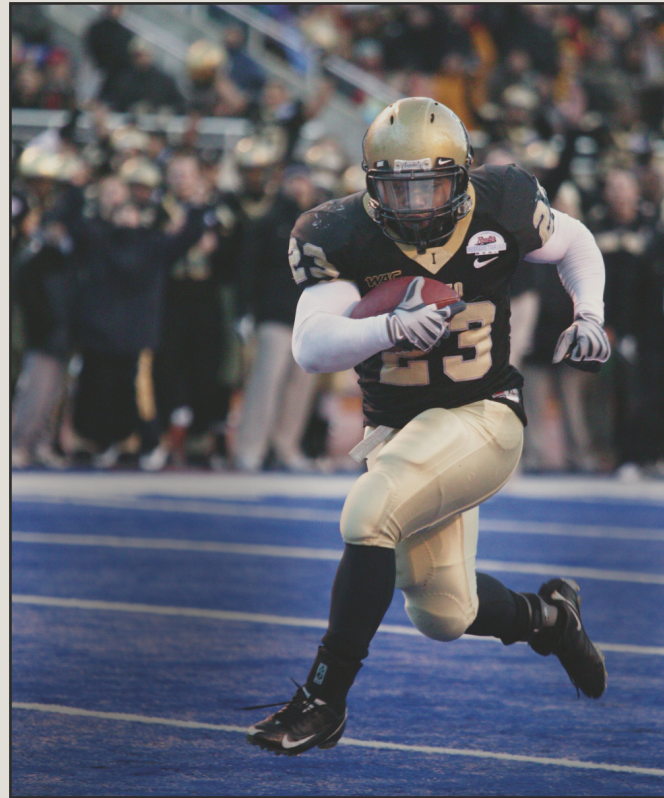

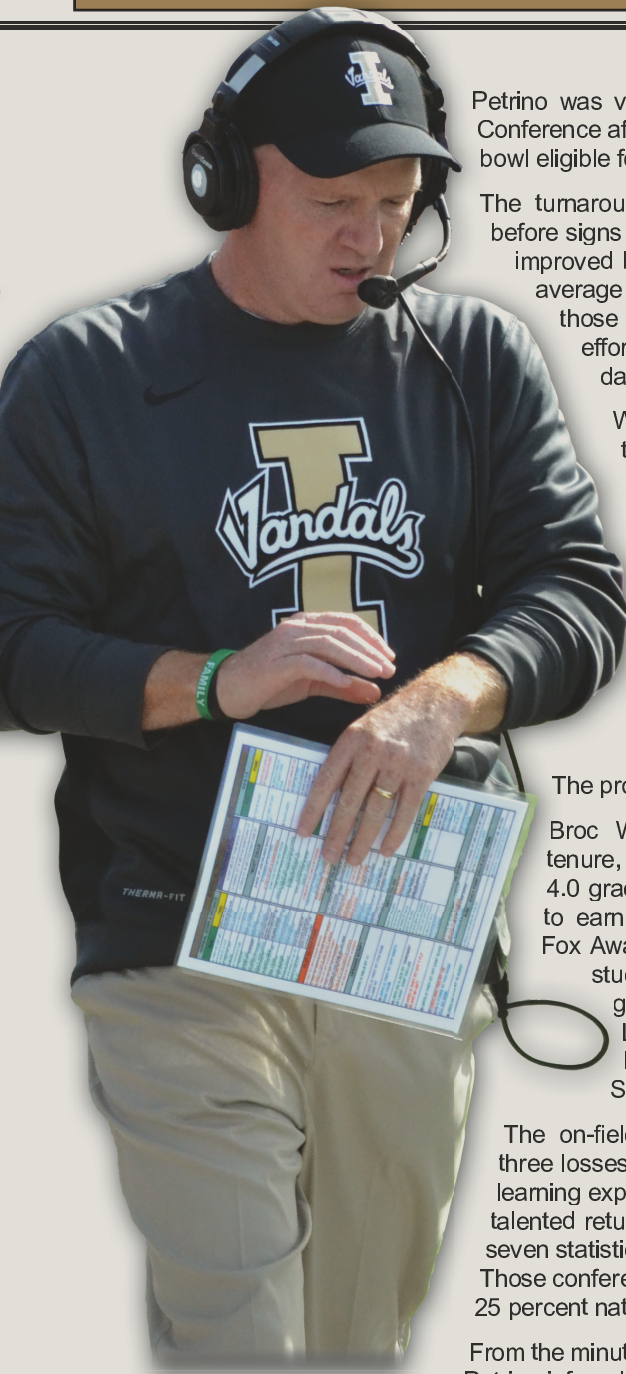

Petrino was voted the Coach of the Year by the Sun Belt Conference after a season during which the Vandals became bowl eligible for the first time since 2009.

The turnaround was a process that started off the field before signs started to show on the field. The Vandals' APR improved by more than 100 points and their grade-point average increase was equally impressive. The path to those achievements was starting on the field where effort and discipline were being preached day in and day out.

While he's quick to admit he was hoping to see the on-field successes earlier, he knew deep down it would take longer. After going 2-21 his first two seasons, Idaho was 4-8 in 2015 with three losses by a touchdown or less.

Now, the Vandals are bowl eligible with the best regular-season record since the 1998 team (Idaho's first bowl team) went 8-3.

It took an unfaltering work ethic and a commitment to doing everything right for the program to be on the solid footing it is today.

The progress has been showing bit by bit.

Broc Westlake, a linebacker throughout Petrino's tenure, graduated in December 2015 with a perfect 4.0 grade-point average and was one of two Vandals to earn the department's prestigious Rich and Mary Fox Award, which is given annually to the graduating student-athlete(s) with the highest cumulative grade-point average. In graduating Summa Cum Laude, he also was recognized as a National Football Foundation's Hampshire Honor Society.

The on-field strides resulted in four wins in 2015 and three losses by one touchdown or less – painful losses but learning experiences for a young team that boosts a host of talented returners. In 2015, the Vandals led the Sun Belt in seven statistical categories and were second in another five. Those conference rankings translated to their being in the top 25 percent nationally in 11 categories.

From the minute he arrived on the University of Idaho campus, Petrino infused the Vandals with an intensity that reverberated around the Kibbie Dome and throughout the Vandal Family. His practices mirror his personality – focused, intense and determined.

In his first season back at Idaho, he took the Vandals against a schedule that featured not only the eventual national champion, but a total of seven bowl teams, which included four teams that, at one time or another, were ranked among the nation's top 25. While the Vandals didn't finish with the win-loss mark he would have liked, his first class of recruits showed it can provide the base for

Petrino also had his first Vandal All-American in Rehkow, whose record-setting season earned him a spot on the Walter Camp All-American team. A true freshman, Rehkow's average of 47.8 yards per kick is an NCAA record for a freshman as well as the overall record for a player who punted at least 75 times in one season.

In year two of his tenure, he took the Vandals back to the Sun Belt Conference after one season as an FBS independent.

The record didn't necessarily reflect the strides the Vandals made during Petrino's second season. A passing game fueled by Linehan, a redshirt freshman at the time, and senior receiver Joshua McCain was one of the nation's best and Rehkow again repeated as the national punting average leader and was a finalist for the Ray Guy Award. The Vandals were significantly more competitive and off the field they made huge improvements in the classroom. The team posted one of its highest grade-point-averages in team history and made improved its APR by leaps and bounds.

Coaching football is in Petrino's blood. Tagging along with his dad, Bob Petrino, Sr., as he coached the Carroll College (Montana) Saints into national prominence, Petrino knew from the time he was six years old he wanted to coach. He played for his dad at Carroll and was the Football Gazette NAIA Division II Player of the Year and a two-time Kodak All-American quarterback after setting 16 school records during a career that included four conference titles and a 36-6 record from 1985-88.

He's paid his dues – and along the way has put together a résumé of success and envisions doing it at Idaho, where his Division I coaching career began.

He was clear in his mission when he was hired: "We want to win a whole bunch of games and go to bowls."

That is what he is accustomed to doing. During his 23 years as an assistant, he coached in 12 bowl games and five I-AA playoff games. He spent one season (2007) with the NFL's Atlanta Falcons. As a Division I coach, he was on staffs who combined for a 152-93 record – a 65 percent winning percentage.

He already made his mark at Idaho when he coached three players who have been inducted into the Vandal Athletics Hall of Fame – running back Sherriden May, and receivers Kasey Dunn and Yo Murphy. They are just a small sampling of the successes of his players. In the 2012 NFL draft, five offensive players under his tutelage were drafted. The group, which included four receivers, represented the greatest number of players coached by one coach in that year's draft.

For Petrino, the return to Moscow is a return to his Northwest roots. A native of Butte, Mont., he was raised in Helena where his football legacy began.

Petrino's coaching career began at his alma mater before he was hired at Idaho in 1992. Among the players he coached at Idaho was All-American and Vandal Athletics Hall of Famer Sherriden May – one on what has become a lengthy list of standout players, record-holders and NFL draftees coached by Petrino.

A LOOK AT PETRINO'S CAREER:

At Idaho, his offenses already have enabled Matt Linehan, who has two seasons to play, to tie for third in single-game completions with 36. He also is tied for 10th on that all-time list with two games of 33. With two full seasons ahead of him, Linehan is third in average yards per game for his career and fourth in completion percentage. Additionally, he already has thrown for more than 300 yards nine times in the 21 games he has played. He is one of just seven quarterbacks in Vandal history to accumulate nine or more games of 300 or more yards.

Displaying the discipline needed for success, the 2015 team led the Sun Belt Conference in fewest penalties, fewest penalty per game, fewest penalty yards and fewest penalty yards per game. All of those numbers were in top 20 percent of FBS teams.

In 2012, Petrino directly oversaw quarterback Tyler Wilson's continued assault on the Arkansas record books. Wilson wrapped up his career holding 28 school records, including career passing yards, career completions and career completion percentage. Wilson led the SEC and ranked ninth in the NCAA in passing yards per game, while wide receiver Cobi Hamilton led the SEC and ranked fifth in the NCAA in receiving yards per game and led the conference and tied for 12th in the country in receptions per game. Wilson also ranked in the top 18 in the NCAA in total offense, total offense yards per play and passing yards per attempt. Hamilton also ranked in the top five in the SEC in all-purpose yards per play and all-purpose yards per game and broke UA records for single-season receptions, single-season receiving yards and 10-catch games along with the school's career records for receptions and 10-catch games.

Petrino coached the Razorbacks in their 29-16 win vs. No. 11 Kansas State in the 2012 AT&T Cotton Bowl after completing his second season as offensive coordinator at Illinois. In the Cotton Bowl, Arkansas averaged 5.7 yards per play, including more than four yards per rush and 7.0 per pass attempt, while totaling 345 yards of offense. Wilson was named the bowl's Offensive MVP after passing for 216 yards and two touchdowns while completing 20-of-31 passes.

In 2011, Petrino, while at Illinois, coached Jenkins to one of the best seasons by a receiver in Illinois history, as Jenkins led the Big Ten with 90 catches and was a first-team all-conference performer. His 1,276 yards ranked second in school history, just two yards shy of the Illini record, and he also ranked in the top five of the school's list for season receptions, season 100-yard receiving games, career receptions, career receiving yardage, career receiving touchdowns and career 100-yard receiving games.

In 2010, Petrino guided an Illini offense that broke school records for total points (423) and points per game (32.54) and featured running back Mikel Leshoure, who broke the single-season school rushing record with 1,697 yards. Illinois averaged 42.1 points and 448.9 total yards over the last seven games of the season and notched a 38-14 win over Baylor in the 2010 Texas Bowl

In 2009, Petrino was the offensive coordinator at Arkansas as the team averaged 37 points per game, which ranked eighth in the NCAA,



After his stint at Idaho, he coached at Utah State, Louisville, Illinois, Southern Mississippi and, most recently, Arkansas. He also spent one season with the NFL Atlanta Falcons. Everywhere he has been, his offenses have produced record-setting numbers. While also posting top-15 rankings in passing offense at No. 10 (303.3 yards per game) and total offense at No. 14 (439.3 yards per game). Quarterback Ryan Mallett was the nation's sixth-rated passer, averaging 285 yards per contest and throwing 29 touchdowns. The Razorbacks broke the school record for passing yards with 3,640, eclipsing the previous record that was set under Petrino in 2008

In 2007, he was with the Atlanta Falcons of the NFL. He was the receivers coach in Atlanta after working the four previous years as offensive coordinator and receivers coach at Louisville. Playing for Petrino, Roddy White posted then-career-highs with 83 catches and 1,202 yards

From 2003-06, Petrino coached at Louisville where his teams averaged 41.1 points per game from 2003-06; 34.6 in 2003; 49.8 in 2004; 43.3 in 2005 and 37.8 in 2006. Texas Tech was the only other school to rank in the top 10 nationally in total offense during those years. In 50 games over that four-year span at Louisville, Petrino's teams went 41-9 and scored 40 or more points 28 times and 60 or more seven times.

In 2006, the Cardinals went 12-1, won the Big East title and finished the year ranked No. 6 in the nation. Louisville was second in the country in total offense (475.3 yards per game), seventh in passing (290.0 yards per game) and fourth in scoring (37.8 points per game). In 2005, Louisville was ninth in the nation in offense (482.1 yards per game) and third in scoring (43.4 points per game) with six offensive players earning first-team All-Big East Conference honors. Running back Michael Bush led the nation with 24 touchdowns, while receiver Mario Urrutia was second in the nation in yards per catch.

The 2004 team won the Conference USA title, beat No. 10 Boise State in the Liberty Bowl to end the season 11-1, finished ranked No. 7 in the nation, and led the country in total offense (539.0 yards per game) and scoring offense (49.8 points per game). The Cardinals set school records for total yards, rushing yards and points in a season (597), also scoring 50-plus points seven times. Russell earned All-Conference USA honors for the second straight season after catching 73 passes. He had 75 catches for a school-record 1,213 yards in 2003.

Petrino coached three wide receivers who set single-season yardage records at Louisville. Arnold Jackson totaled 1,209 yards in 1999, J.R. Russell broke the record in 2003 with 1,213 yards and Harry Douglas had 1,265 yards in 2006.

From 2000-02, he was the quarterbacks coach at Southern Mississippi. In his three seasons, the Golden Eagles went 8-4, 6-5 and 7-6 with two bowl bids.

In 1998, Petrino left Utah State for his first stint at Louisville. In 1998, UL set records for points, scoring average, touchdowns, passing yards, passing touchdowns, pass attempts, pass completions and total offense. In 1998, the Cardinals ranked No. 1 in the nation in passing offense and ranked second in 1999.

From 1995-97, Petrino was at Utah State as receivers coach and special teams coordinator. In 1995, Aggies' receiver Kevin Alexander was second in the nation in receptions and third in yards.

When he was at Idaho the first time, the Vandals won one Big Sky Championship and were runners-up twice while compiling a 29-9 record and appearing in the Division I-AA playoffs all three seasons. He coached some of the most prominent players in Vandal football history during that span. As receivers and running backs coach, he guided Vandal Athletics Hall of Famers Sherriden May (running backs) and Yo Murphy (receiver).

Cinkovich is building his reputation as someone who can take a young unit and create a cohesive, effective group that excels within the structure of the team. He first did it at Idaho when he was hired as offensive coordinator and receivers coach. When he took over the offensive line in his second season with the Vandals, he welded the young players into a group that enabled Idaho to have one of the top offenses in the Sun Belt – and one that led the league in scoring during the regular season.

Cinkovich's players have made impacts and set records everywhere he's been. In the 2012 NFL Draft, Arkansas receivers tied a draft record as for the 14th time in draft history, and third time by the SEC, a school had three wide receivers selected in the same draft. Cinkovich also tutored Cobi Hamilton to the best season by a wide receiver in Arkansas history and one of the top seasons ever put together in the SEC. During the 2011 season, Cinkovich again molded the UA receivers into one of the most dominant groups in the country. Arkansas led the SEC in passing offense (300.7), total offense (438.1) and scoring offense (36.8) to become just the fifth

different school to lead the conference in all three categories in a single season and the first since Florida in 2001. The Razorbacks topped the conference in passing offense for the third straight season and became the second SEC team since 1992 to lead the conference in passing offense for at least three straight seasons. Arkansas was one of two schools to place two receivers in the top 10 in the SEC in receiving yards per game and receptions per game.

In 2010 during the Razorbacks' campaign toward the school's first BCS appearance, Cinkovich's unit tied for the SEC lead with nine games featuring a 100-yard receiver. UA was one of two schools in the conference to have four receivers top 100 yards. Arkansas also was one of two schools in the SEC to have two receivers rank in the top 10 in the conference in receiving yards per game.

Before Arkansas, Cinkovich coached three of the top four all-time reception leaders in UNLV history. Cinkovich also assisted with a passing attack that ranked in the top 50 nationally in 2008 and 2009, accounting for 40 passing touchdowns. UNLV also led the nation in red zone production in 2008 (95 percent) and third-down efficiency in 2009 (46.39 percent).

Cinkovich came to UNLV in 2003 from Las Vegas High School, where he oversaw the Wildcats for nine seasons and built one of the state's top programs en route to compiling a record of 79-24. In 1995, he took LVHS to the playoffs for the first time in 15 years and in 2001 brought the school its first state championship since 1959. Cinkovich's squads won three regional titles and were ranked among the best on the west coast three times by USA TODAY. He was inducted into the Southern Nevada Football Coaches Association Hall of Fame in 2004.

Cinkovich played at Spokane Falls Community College from 1979-80 and Carroll College from 1981-82 as an offensive lineman. A 1984 graduate of Carroll College in Helena, Mont., Cinkovich earned his master's degree from Central Washington in 1987. He and his wife, Joanie, have two daughters, Carly and Stephanie.

Mike Breske joined Paul Petrino's staff as the Vandals' defensive coordinator and safeties coach after the 2014 season. Breske brought with him a scheme new to the Vandals but one that would utilize the talent and depth on Idaho's defensive front.

This season, with Sun Belt Conference newcomer of the year Aikeem Coleman on the defense, Breske's unit made a difference. A formidable front seven that put constant pressure on opposing quarterbacks led to the Vandals totaling 15 sacks and 25 tackles for loss along with 15 interceptions, 37 pass breakups, 20 quarterback hurries and 10 fumble recoveries.

Breske most recently was at Washington State and previously coached at Montana (twice), Wyoming, North Dakota State, Northern Colorado and Wayne State. He is a 1981 graduate of South Dakota State University, where he was a four-year starter at cornerback, a team captain and all-conference selection.

Along the way, he coached All-Americans, all-conference players, future professionals and had defensive units that turned in historic efforts. His 2013 Washington State defensive unit held USC to 54 passing yards and enabled the Cougars to win at the Coliseum for the first time in a decade. His 2012 unit was eighth nationally in tackles-for-loss per game and 11th in sacks per game.

He was a part of the Montana staffs that led the Grizzlies to the FSC semifinals in 2011, to the FCS (I-AA) Championship in 2001, to the 2000 runner-up FCS runner-up finish, and the 2002 quarterfinals.

"We are excited to have him lead the Vandal defense," Petrino said. "He will do a great a job of leading and teaching."

Breske has more than 30 years of coaching experience in the collegiate ranks under his belt. Prior to his second stint at Montana, he served a one-year stint as the defensive coordinator/ secondary coach at North Dakota State in 2009.

From 2003-08 he served as the assistant head coach/defensive coordinator and secondary coach for Glenn at the University of Wyoming. In 2006 the Cowboys were ranked ninth in the nation in total defense, while they were 22nd in 2007 and 43rd in 2008.

During his first stint at Montana (2000-02), the Grizzlies prospered, winning the Football Championship Subdivision (I-AA) national championship in 2001, finishing as runner-up in 2000 and advancing to the quarterfinals in 2002. In 2000 Montana finished eighth in total defense (265.00 ypg), second in rushing defense (76.64 ypg) and 33rd in scoring defense (19.27 ppg).

During that three-year stretch he coached two players to All-America status, Vince Huntsberger (2000) and Trey Young (2001-02).

Prior to Montana he was the defensive coordinator for Northern Colorado's powerhouse teams from 1987-99. He was also the defensive coordinator at Wayne State College (Neb.) from 1983-87; the secondary coach at Yankton (S.D.) College in 1982-83, and was a graduate assistant coach at Northern Iowa from 1981-82.

Eric Brown joined the University of Idaho football staff as the linebackers coach prior to the 2013 season.

In his first season with the Vandals, he coach Idaho's top tackler in linebacker Marc Millan, who led the team with 91 total tackles (70 solo and 21 assists). Millan also had 11 tackles for loss (second on the team) and four sacks (third on the team).

In Brown's second season, Millan again led all-tacklers for Idaho with 102 total stops. He had 72 solo tackles and 30 assists. Among those tackles were 15.5 tackles for loss and a single-game best of 18 total tackles – 17 solo and one assist.

The story was the same for the 2015 season when the Vandals' top three tacklers – Broc Westlake, Kaden Elliss and Millan, came from his linebacking corps. Between them, they combined for 233 tackles and 14 tackles for losses totaling 47 yards. He'll have Elliss – one of the top defensive talents in the Sun Belt Conference, back for his sophomore season.

His impact on the group continues to be a driving force on the defense.

Brown, like head coach Paul Petrino, grew up with football. The son of the late Dan Brown, a long-time coach at Fresno State, Eric Brown comes to Idaho from Indiana State University.

"Eric is a coach's son," Petrino said. "You can tell he's been around football all his life."

That inherent knowledge of the game is something Petrino prizes.

"He's probably one of the greatest young minds in college football," Petrino said.

Brown played for and graduated from Fresno State University. After graduating in 2011, he was a graduate assistant for the Bulldogs. He helped guide Bulldogs' defensive tackle Logan Harrell to first-team all-Western Athletic Conference honors in 2011 – a season during which Harrell recorded 16 tackles for loss.

At Indiana State, Brown was the outside linebackers coach. Among the players under his guidance were two players ranked in the top three in the Missouri Valley Football Conference and top 25 in the Football Championship Subdivision in tackles per game, as well as the league's No. 5 player in quarterback sacks. The Sycamores were ranked third nationally in total defense in 2012. He also coached Connor Underwood to a Freshman All-American season.

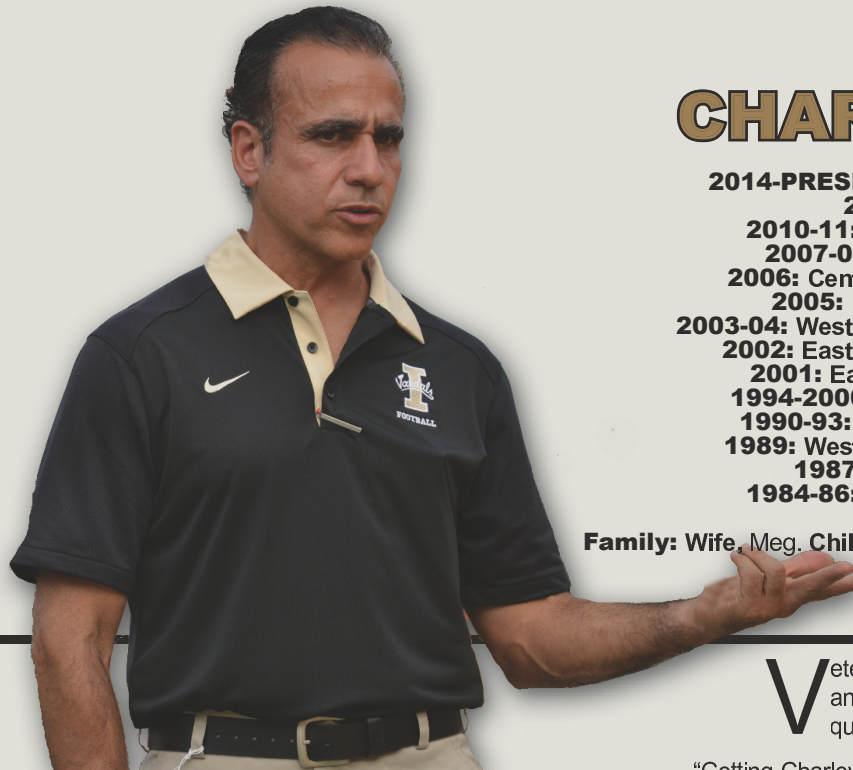

Veteran coach Charley Molnar joined Paul Petrino's staff in 2014 and coached the receivers for two seasons before taking over the quarterbacks during the spring of 2016.

"Getting Charley to join are staff was a home run for us," Petrino said. "He has been one of the best offensive minds in college football. He is a great teacher of technique and details of his position."

In his first season with the Vandals, he took quarterback-turned-receiver Joshua McCain and turned him into one of the nation's top receivers – despite McCain asking to make the move during winter conditioning. McCain finished the season ranked 10th in receiving yards per game, 13 in receptions per game, and 16th in total receiving yards. He had similar successes with the 2015 receivers as the Vandals had one of the top 25 passing games in all of FBS.

Molnar was the head coach at the University of Massachusetts in 2012 and 2013 and was been an assistant at Notre Dame (2010-11), Cincinnati (2007-09) and Central Michigan (2006) as well as Indiana State (2005), Western Michigan (2003-04), Eastern Michigan (2002), Eastern Illinois (2001), Kent State (1994-2000), Illinois State (1990-93), Western Carolina (1989) and Virginia (1987-88). His coaching career began in 1984 at his alma mater, Lock Haven.

He has helped lead teams to seven bowl games, which includes Cincinnati's top-five ranking and Sugar Bowl appearance in the 2009 season. His career includes two seasons as a head coach, 11 as an offensive coordinator and 17 as a quarterbacks coach. Under Molnar's guidance, players and teams set records in the passing game everywhere he has been. Both quarterbacks and receivers have been ranked among the NCAA's best.

Molnar helped Notre Dame earn a bowl game bid in 2011 thanks in part to the play of quarterback Tommy Rees. In 2010, his first year with the Irish, Molnar helped install a new offensive system and developed both Dayne Crist and Rees as first-time starting quarterbacks. Under Molnar's tutelage, Rees set Notre Dame freshman records in touchdown passes (12) and completion percentage (61.0). He also ranked in the top five among freshman Irish quarterbacks in completions (third, 100), yards (second, 1,106) and passing efficiency (second, 132.70).

From 2006-09, Molnar was at Cincinnati and Central Michigan and helped develop record-breaking quarterbacks and wide receivers. With the Bearcats, he oversaw the two most prolific passing seasons in Cincinnati history and mentored a pair of record-setting receivers.

Prior to Cincinnati, Molnar was at Central Michigan staff in 2006 when he helped the Chippewas win 10 games for the first time since 1979. Central Michigan won its Mid-American Conference division, the MAC championship and was victorious in the Motor City Bowl. Molnar completed a rare coaching feat at the conclusion of the 2006 season. Not only was he on the sidelines for 15 contests, including the 2006 MAC Championship Game, 2006 Motor City Bowl and 2007 International Bowl, but he coached the MVP in all three postseason games. Molnar directed another record-setting quarterback during his only season at Indiana State in 2005. He coached quarterbacks from 2003-04 at Western Michigan and was forced to develop multiple signal-callers each season.

A one-year stop at Eastern Michigan in 2002 as quarterbacks coach followed a one-year stint as wide receivers coach at Eastern Illinois in 2001. From 1990-2000, Molnar spent time as an offensive coordinator as well as working with quarterbacks and wide receivers at two universities. He spent seven seasons at Kent State (1994-2000) after he worked in the same position at Illinois State from 1990-93. Prior to Illinois State, Molnar called the offensive plays and coached quarterbacks at Western Carolina in 1989. He made his first foray into major college football as a graduate assistant in 1987-88 at Virginia. With the Cavaliers, he assisted the quarterbacks coach. Molnar's first coaching job came at his alma mater, Lock Haven University. From 1984-86 he worked with the wide receivers, tight ends, running backs and kickers.

Troy Purcell and Paul Petrino have reunited on the football field. Once teammates at Carroll College, Petrino reached out to Purcell to coach Idaho's inside linebackers shortly after Purcell notched his fourth state high school title in Montana.

"We're very excited to have Troy," Petrino said when he brought Purcell on board. "He'll bring great knowledge, enthusiasm and fire to our defense. That will be exciting."

Purcell, in joining forces with Eric Brown to coaching the linebackers, had an instant impact as the group not only grew but grew cohesively into one of the most formidable units in the league.

Purcell's and Petrino's roots go back to their high school days at Helena's Capital High School. Both graduated in 1986. While Petrino headed to the college ranks after graduating from Carroll, Purcell started on a path that led to an immensely successful career at three Montana high schools.

He capped his high school career with his third state title at Bozeman High School. The championship wrapped up a 13-1 season and was Bozeman's fourth state championship game appearance. Under Purcell, Bozeman, in 2010, won its first state title since 1917. It added another one in 2013 – to cap a perfect season, to add to Purcell's collection.

"I feel very fortunate to have this opportunity to join Coach Petrino," Purcell said. "We've grew up together in football and have very similar styles."

In addition to his success at Bozeman, he also coached Havre to a state championship in 2004 – its first in 36 years.

Purcell and his wife, Krista, have one daughter, Brooklyn. In addition to his degree in Elementary Education and Health Enhancement, he has a master's degree in Learning Development from Montana State-Northern.

Former San Diego Charger and one-time FCS single-season receptions record holder Al Pupunu is in his seventh season with the Vandals as coach of the Idaho tight ends.

And his players continue to have a tremendous impact on the Vandal offense. In 2016, junior Buck Cowan – a converted receiver, led all Idaho receivers with 46 catches and six touchdowns, while fellow tight end Deon Watson (also a receiver at one time) led the team in receiving yards with 555.

Cowan was following in his predecessors footsteps. In 2014, Justin Podrabsky also was third among Idaho receivers from his tight end position with 37 catches for 380 yards. Prior to Podrabsky, senior Mike LaGrone the team's fourth-leading receiver in 2013 with 18 catches for 257 yards.

Pupunu, who came to Idaho in 2010 after two seasons at Southern Utah University, spent nine seasons in the NFL - seven with the Chargers. A tight end, he was the Offensive Player of the Game in the 1994 AFC Championship game and averaged 9.8 yards per catch during his career.

He made his collegiate mark at Weber State when he led the FCS in receptions with 93 in 1991. That mark still stands as the second-best ever by a tight end in FCS history.

He was able to parlay that playing knowledge to coaching with Daniel Hardy, who was in

Pupunu's first tight ends group at Idaho, being drafted by Tampa Bay.

A native of Tonga, Pupunu attended Dixie State College for two years before transferring to Weber State. Not only was he an all-conference performer at Weber State, he was a Walter Camp All-American and is in the Wildcats' Hall of Fame as well as the Dixie College Hall of Fame and Utah Sports Hall of Fame. He was presented with the Distinguished Utahn Award by former Prime Minister of England Margaret Thatcher.

He and his wife, Mindi, have five children - Miley, Kade, Brynnli, Kenna and Noah.

Shumaker's responsibilities with the Vandals are two-fold – coaching the running backs on the team now and leading the way to locating the talent for the future as Idaho's recruiting coordinator.

In the shortened recruiting for the transition staff in the winter of 2013, Shumaker and head coach Paul Petrino assembled players who had an immediate impact for the Vandals. With a full recruiting year to prepare for the 2014 signing day, Shumaker was able to help develop a class that had an even greater immediate impact.

His running backs have excelled – even though, as in this season, three are sharing the role. They are unselfish and hard working in helping mold an effective running game.

Special teams had one its better seasons with two blocked punts returned for touchdowns – on by senior Kendrick Trotter against ULM and the other by true freshman Lloyd Hightower against Georgia State.

As special teams coordinator, he has dual threat kicker/punter Austin Rehkow at his disposal. Rehkow is one of just a handful of FBS players who both kicks and punts for his team, and he's one of just two on the Ray Guy (nation's best punter) and Lou Groza (nation's best kicker) watch lists for 2016.

Shumaker came to Idaho after serving one year as Arkansas' Director of High School Relations. Prior to joining the Arkansas staff, he spent seven years of collegiate coaching at small colleges from Eastern New Mexico to Midland University. At Midland, he was the associate head coach/offensive coordinator in 2011 and the run game coordinator/head junior varsity coach in 2010. The Warriors' offense finished in the top 30 nationally in nearly every offensive category in 2011.

Shumaker was hired as the head coach of Dana College in December of 2009 and served in that role until the school closed in June of 2010.

Prior to his time at Dana, he was at the University of Saint Mary at Leavenworth, Kan., for three seasons as the offensive coordinator/recruiting coordinator and offensive line and tight ends coach. The offense he directed finished in the top 30 in the nation in several categories over two seasons with four games of 500 yards total offense. Because of this success, he was chosen the 2008 KCAC Assistant Coach of the Year.

Shumaker went to USM from Eastern New Mexico, where he served as fullbacks coach and defensive line coach over two seasons and coached three All-Lone Star Conference players. Prior to his time at ENMU, he was a teacher and a coach at Rowlett, Texas.

Shumaker was born in Salina, Kan., and went to high school in Grand Prairie, Texas. From there, he attended the University of Kansas, where he played fullback for the Jayhawks. He was also a five-time Jayhawk Scholar and was named to the Big XII Commissioner's Honor Roll five times. Shumaker graduated from the University of Kansas with a Bachelor of Science in education in 2003 and received his Master's Degree in sports administration from Eastern New Mexico University in 2007. Aric Williams, a former all-Pac-10 selection for Oregon State University, joined the Vandals prior to the 2015 season as the cornerbacks coach.

"Aric was a great player at Oregon State," Idaho coach Paul Petrino said when he brought Williams onto his staff. "He will be a great recruiter for us in southern California. He is one of the top young coaches in college football."

The secondary has improved by leaps and bounds with Williams as one of the coaches. In 2016, they had nine of the Vandals' 15 interceptions and 28 of the team's total 37 pass breakups.

Williams comes to Idaho from the University of Montana, where he spent five years as the Grizzlies' cornerbacks coach. His player consistently were among the Big Sky's best and in 2010 and 2011

Trumaine Johnson was a multiple All-American selection as well as a first-team all-conference choice and a third-round NFL pick.

"Aric did a great job at Montana," Petrino said.

Williams' coaching success mirrors the successes he had as a player.

Williams was a standout cornerback at Oregon State and four-year letterman from 2001-04. He was a first team All-Pac-10 selection for the Beavers as a senior (2004), when he had 56 tackles, five interceptions, and 14 pass break-ups. He was a second team all-conference pick his junior season at both cornerback and as a kick-off returner. His junior year he had 39 tackles, four interceptions, and 12 pass deflections.

Following his playing days at OSU, he played for the Philadelphia Eagles for a season (2005), and then played in NFL Europe for the Cologne Centurions (2006). After that he played two seasons of Arena Football for the Philadelphia Soul (2007) and Arizona Rattlers (2008).

He then turned his attention to coaching. He spend one season as an assistant at his high school alma mater, Diamond Bar. From there, he headed to Arizona State where he oversaw defensive quality control and assisted with cornerbacks and special teams.

Williams earned his B.A. degree at OSU in fine arts with an emphasis in graphic design in 2005.

BRANDON MITCHELL



Mitchell played professionally for the Colorado Crush (name Ice 2015) before season ending ACL injury. He completed 189-282 passes for league-leading 41 touchdowns and only seven interceptions, rushed 76 times for 498 yards, and was second in the league with 14 touchdowns. He was a five-time player of the week and player of the game for eight of the 11 games in which he played. After graduating from Arkansas in July 2013, he still had one season of eligibility remaining and spent one season at North Carolina State. He broke his foot in the opener but came back to play in the final three games. At Arkansas, he played receiver as a junior after playing quarterback his redshirt freshman and sophomore seasons. Mitchell also played basketball at Arkansas during his redshirt football season. He is a graduate of Amite (La.) High School where he was an all-state player in basketball and football. He was a highly-touted quarterback as a dual-threat with 2,888 passing yards and 1,464 rushing yards his senior season.

STEVE OLIVER



A 2011 graduate of Hamilton High School at Chandler, Ariz., Oliver was an all-conference offensive lineman, National Football Foundation Scholar-Athlete, and earned three 5A-1 State Championships in a row with a record of 42-1 over his last three seasons. Oliver graduated with second honors from University of San Diego in January 2016 with a degree in Finance and minor in Marketing. A three-year letterman, he played in 30 games, while starting his final 22 at center. San Diego won conference championships in four out of five seasons with Oliver at center (2011, 2012, 2014, 2015). As a junior, he was a starter on the team that received the school's first bid to the NCAA Division I FCS playoffs (2014). He was on his team's leadership council and was the Vice President of USD's Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC). Oliver joined the Vandal staff in 2016.

BRIAN READER



After graduating high school from Palma High School at Salinas, Calif., Reader began his college career in 2007 as a preferred walk-on for the Arkansas Razorbacks. He redshirted for the Razorbacks before transferring to Monterey Peninsula College. While at Monterey Peninsula, Reader assumed the starting quarterback role, and guided the Lobos to a 10-0 regular-season record and a Coast Conference championship. He was named the Coast Conference Offensive Player of the Year. He transferred and played in 27 games and completed 281-of-506 passes for 3,343 yards and 21 touchdowns for his career. He finished his collegiate career ranked eighth on Idaho's all-time pass efficiency list (132.05). After his senior season at Idaho, Reader signed with the Iowa Barnstormers in the Arena Football League, where he played two seasons. In 2015, Reader finished his professional career with the New Orleans Voodoo, throwing 21 touchdowns and 1,143 yards in six games before sustaining a season-ending knee injury. Reader has coached in his off-seasons for his alma mater, Palma High School, coaching quarterbacks and receivers from 2013-2015. Joined Paul Petrino's staff as a Graduate Assistant at the University of Idaho in 2016.

MOSCOW



Settlers were first drawn to the area in 1871, with abundant grassland and available timber for building. The area was first named "Hog Heaven" which was later changed to "Palouse Valley." In 1877, Samuel Neff filed for a postal permit under the name of Moscow because the area reminded him of his hometown of Moscow, Pa. In 1875, the city's first store was opened on what is now Main Street. Moscow grew with the arrival of the railroad in 1885. The town became incorporated in 1887 and was chosen as the site for a land-grant institution, the University of Idaho, in 1889. Idaho achieved statehood in 1890.

Today, Moscow is home to more than 23,000 residents and students. The area boasts a highly skilled and educated work force employed by Moscow's many thriving businesses and the University of Idaho. Merchants offer an extensive selection of quality products and services.

In addition to Moscow's fine business and educational reputation, the City's arts community has gained national attention. The Lionel Hampton International Jazz Festival, Festival Dance, Idaho Repertory Theatre, Renaissance Fair, Rendezvous in the Park, Artwalk and the Prichard Art Gallery are reasons why Moscow is known as the "Heart of the Arts." Moscow also has been rated as one of the "Best 100 Small Art Towns in America."

IDAHO

Veins of silver and gold were found in the mountains of central Idaho and it wasn't long before thousands of pioneers had settled all over the territory in an attempt to get rich. As the pioneers mined for gold, they happened upon a pleasant surprise. In addition to the silver and gold, Idaho was abundant in gems such as topaz and jade. Hence Idaho's nickname: the Gem State.

Idaho is one of the most scenic states in the nation. It holds claim to numerous world famous sites. Here are just a few of the many wonders Idaho offers.

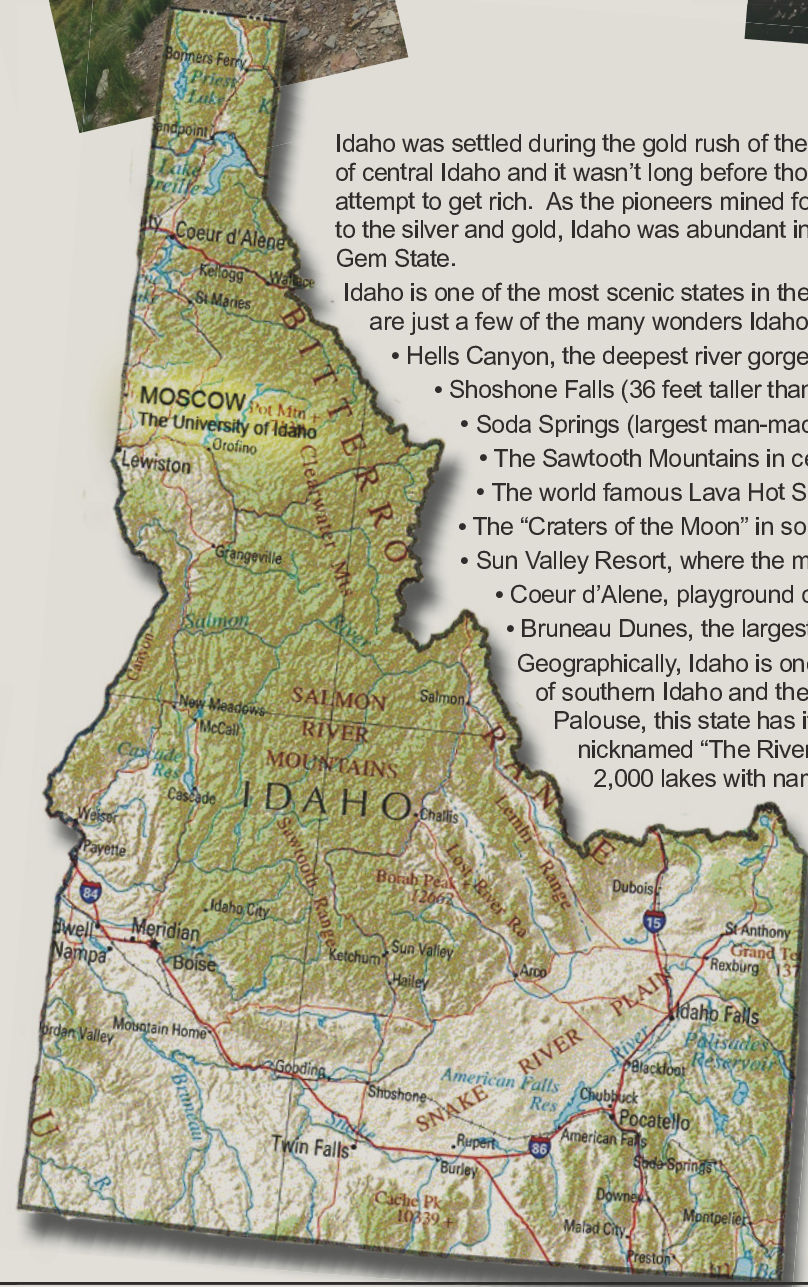
- Hells Canyon, the deepest river gorge in the U.S. – 8,000 feet deep at some points.
- Shoshone Falls (36 feet taller than Niagara falls)
- Soda Springs (largest man-made geyser)
- The Sawtooth Mountains in central Idaho
- The world famous Lava Hot Springs
- The "Craters of the Moon" in south-central Idaho
- Sun Valley Resort, where the movie stars play
- Coeur d'Alene, playground of the Pacific Northwest
- Bruneau Dunes, the largest sand dunes in North America

Geographically, Idaho is one of the most diverse in the country. From the rolling deserts of southern Idaho and the forested mountains of central Idaho to the rolling plains of the Palouse, this state has it all. If you're into river rafting, Idaho has the Salmon River, nicknamed "The River of No Return." If you like water sports, Idaho has more than 2,000 lakes with names, and many more without. One of the most famous is Pend Oreille, which is more than 1,100 feet deep in some parts. The Navy has tested some of its submarines at Lake Pend Oreille.

Idaho is an outdoorsman's dream come true. The state offers thousands of miles of trails for backpackers. Hunting and fishing locales are abundant all over the state. Idaho is home to part of the famous Lewis and Clark Trail. You can learn first-hand how the expedition was saved from certain starvation by the Nez Pierce Indian tribe.

Idaho is the 13th largest state in the nation, but is sparsely populated with 1.3 million residents. The benefit of this is low crime rates and a healthy lifestyle.

Last but certainly not least, Idaho indeed does have great potatoes. In 1937, the Idaho Potato Commission was formed. The state-run agency's responsibilities include researching and expanding the Idaho potato market.



ROB SPEAR

When Rob Spear took the reins of the University of Idaho Department of Athletics in the winter of 2003-04, he was inheriting a program in flux. The Vandals needed updates and enhancements to their 30-year-old facility. They needed new revenue streams and more fans in the seats.

As he set about tackling the facility and funding issues, he was resolute in continuing to hold Vandal student-athletes to the high academic standards that reflect very favorably the University of Idaho's legacy of producing leaders of vision and integrity.

With a staff in place to guide the academic progress of the Vandals, he started chipping away at the laundry list of facility and financial needs.

First was a new Strength and Conditioning Center, which remains one of the jewels in the renovation project with two-story, floor-to-ceiling windows that provide an expansive view of the campus. Among the state-of-the-art training and rehabilitation equipment is a hydro-therapy pool – one of the first in an on-campus setting in the Western United States. With the old weight room vacated, an ambitious locker room project began. When it was finished, football, women's basketball, track and field, and swimming had new facilities in place to match the oak-and-marble rooms already in existence for volleyball and men's basketball.

That is what was happening indoors. Outside, the grass field used for football practice as well as intramurals was undergoing its own update. By the time it was completed, the Vandals had back-to-back 70-yard SprinTurf practice fields – with lights. Next was the turf inside the Kibbie Dome. Because of the multiple uses of the building, it has to be portable. Spear secured funding for Real Grass Pro, which, when it's not in use for football, can be stored to make way for basketball, commencement, track and field, and even an annual home and garden show.

He worked collaboratively across campus to secure the funding for life safety improvements, which included replacing the 30-year-old plywood end walls with translucent panels. The panels, along with a facelift for the entire stadium, make for a sense of daylight. Even when it's 30 degrees and snowing outside, it's warm, dry and windless inside the Dome.

There was much more to what he wanted the Kibbie Dome to become. He wanted it to provide the best premium seating in college football. In 2011, it became reality with the opening of the Lite-house Center/Bud and June Ford Club Room. The club seats, loge seats and suites are up-close and personal.

The student-athlete wasn't put aside as the facilities were transformed. Before the premium seating project was launched, private monies were raised for a suite of team rooms and the complete renovation of the athletic training and equipment rooms. Alongside the team rooms are study centers to ensure the continued academic success of the Vandals, who continued to graduate at a rate 30-40 percent higher than the general population at the University of Idaho, which in and of itself is by far the highest in the state. Collectively, Vandal student-athletes have a 3.05 grade-point average.

He touched the hearts of Vandals far and wide, young and old when he established the Vandal Athletics Hall of Fame. A charter class of 100 individuals and five teams was inducted over a two-year period to make up for more than 100 years of the absence of a way to honor Idaho's most cherished players, coaches and contributors. That legacy continues today with a bi-annual induction ceremony.

CHUCK STABEN

Building his career block by block, Chuck Staben has found his capstone as the 18th president of the University of Idaho.

"I love what the University of Idaho has to offer, and I am extremely excited to serve the students, faculty, and staff and see where we can go together," says Staben. "I love the mountains; I love the West; I feel like this is home."

A long-time supporter of land-grant universities, Staben is especially excited to lead the University of Idaho to continue and expand its research, academic excellence and outreach throughout the state. He also is committed to growing enrollment and expanding education beyond the classroom. Staben officially became president March 1, 2014.

"I really want to focus on communication and developing a shared vision for the university. It's going to take some time to create an effective vision, but it will be fun to see what direction we want to take together," says Staben.

He will be joined on the Palouse by his wife Mary Beth, who looks forward to practicing medicine in the area. Their children, following in both of their parents' footsteps, are studying across the country: Mac is working on his master's degree in Massachusetts, Cal is working on his bachelor's degree in Kentucky and Rae is working on her bachelor's degree in California.

As a father of university students, Staben identifies with parents sending their children off to school for the first time. He encourages those who interact with students to treat them like they would want their own children to be treated, whether it's tough love or being supportive.

"I want students to have a positive experience and to grow into themselves," says Staben. "University is a time for students to mature and establish their character."

Once settled in Idaho, Staben looks forward to pursuing outdoor recreation activities, like skiing, hiking and biking to Pullman on the Chipman Trail.

"This really is a beautiful place," says Staben. "I want to reconnect with the wilderness in my spare time."

Since 2008, Staben has served as the provost and vice president for academic affairs at the University of South Dakota. Previously, he worked at the University of Kentucky in several capacities from 1989-2008. He served as the acting vice president for research, associate vice president for research and in faculty administrator roles, chair and acting chair in the biology department and professor, associate professor and assistant professor of biology.

Staben earned his doctorate in biochemistry at the University of California, Berkeley and his undergraduate in biochemistry at the University of Illinois, Champaign. He conducted postdoctoral training at Stanford University in the biology department and at Chiron Research Laboratories in Emeryville, Calif. with the virology department. While Staben is no longer an active researcher, his work has been cited over 1,300 times.

He brings a wealth of professional memberships to the University Idaho and serves on many national boards, including the National Research Council, and the Committee to review EPSCoR and EPSCoR-like programs. He is also a peer evaluator for the Higher Learning Commission. Previously he served on the National EPSCoR/IDeA Foundation Board, as an AAAS Consultant, Delaware INBRE Program and was a representative for the Southeast University Research Association.
