MONDAY MEDIA PRESS CONFERENCES

Each game week during the football season, Grambling State will hold a media press conference at 10 a.m. in the Stadium Support Facility in the media room, located on the second floor. Head coach Mickey Joseph will speak at 10 a.m. and selected assistant coaches (one offense and one defense) will be available to the media immediately following Joseph's weekly press conference. In the event of special games (State Fair Classic and Bayou Classic), the press conference will move that week to Tuesday at 10 a.m. Players will only be available upon request at least 48 hours prior to the Monday press conference. Contact the Athletic Communications Office for more details. GSU will hold and conduct interviews during the open weeks of the season.

Joseph's portion of the news conference will be available each week on www.gsutigers.com on Monday afternoons.

MEDIA PRESS CONFERENCE PARKING & ENTRY

<u>The Monday Press conference</u> is located at the Stadium Support Facility. Members of the media should enter through the front doors and take the elevator to the second floor.

PLAYER INTERVIEW AVAILABILITY

All interviews with Grambling State student-athletes should be coordinated through the Athletic Communications Office. During the season, GSU players are available after the weekly Monday Press Conference and after practice on Tuesdays. This also includes during the week of the State Fair Classic, Bayou Classic, SWAC Championship Game and Celebration Bowl, players will only be available on Monday and Tuesday only. Telephone interviews may be arranged by contacting Brian Howard in the Athletic Communications Office. <u>ALL</u> interview requests should be made at least 48 hours in advance. GSU's first-year players (true freshmen) are not available for interviews.

COACH INTERVIEW AVAILABILITY

Interviews with head coach Mickey Joseph should also be arranged through the Athletic Communications Office. Head Coach Mickey Joseph is available at GSU's weekly media press conference on Mondays during the season. Telephone interviews with the head coach can be arranged by contacting the Athletic Communications Office. As with the student-athletes, interview requests should be made at least 48 hours in advance.

SWAC CONFERENCE CALL

Head coach Mickey Joseph is available via teleconference on Mondays as part of the SWAC Conference call. Contact the SWAC Conference communications staff for more information.

SEASON MEDIA CREDENTIALS

Season credentials for Grambling State must be requested through GSU's official website. To begin the process, visit www. gsutigers.com/media. Only media covering

the Tigers on a consistent basis and on assignment will be considered for season credentials. A lost season credential will

result in credentials being issued on a game-by-game basis as available.

The deadline for requesting season credentials is Friday, August 18. No season credentials will be issued after that date.

SINGLE-GAME MEDIA CREDENTIALS

Credentials for individual games should be requested at least one week (seven days) in advance. Credentials will not be mailed, but will be available to be picked up at least 24 hours prior to kickoff at the Courtyard by Marriott (Ruston, La.) at the front desk. Parking passes will be issued to media who covers the team on a consistent basis. Those requests should also be made at www. gsutigers.com/media.

Credentials will only be granted to media on assignment and to those who cover the Tigers or their opponent on a regular basis.

Approved passes will be available at the Hampton Inn at least 24 hours prior to kickoff.

CREDENTIAL TYPES

--- MEDIA ---

This credential is for writers. It includes press box access and a press box seat, as well as access to postgame Interview rooms. It does <u>not</u> allow sideline access until postgame. The media pass is also good for visiting radio network/television crew members who do not require sideline access.

--- PHOTO ---

This credential includes sideline access, interview room access, as well as access to the press box and the photo/video work room. Photo credential holders will not have a reserved seat in the press box. Photographers wishing to obtain a media credential must submit ALL gameday photos within 24 hours after the completion of the game. Failure to do so will result in having the credential revoked from any future games.

--- RADIO ---

This credential is for institutional radio members only. It includes press box access and a radio booth seat, as well as access to postgame interview rooms. Each institution will be given up to six (6) radio credentials, which will include two (2) sideline credentials for working radio/sideline reporters. Radio members who do not carry the game on their flagship stations will be subjected to one (1) credential which will allow press box access only during the game. That credential will allow one (1) press box seat and access to postgame interview rooms. It does <u>not</u> allow sideline access until postgame.

--- PROFESSIONAL SCOUTS ---

This credential is for NFL and Canadian Football League scouts. It includes press box access and a press box seat, as well as access to postgame interview rooms. It does <u>not</u> allow sideline access until postgame.

--- TELEVISION ---

This credential includes press box access, sideline access and interview room access. The television broadcasters will have three (3) seats in the press box television booth.

--- VIDEO ---

This credential includes sideline access, interview room access, as well as access to the press box and the photo/video work room. Video credential holders will not have a reserved seat in the press box.

MEDIA PARKING ON GAMEDAY

Media parking for GSU home games is located behind the Fredrick C. Hobdy Assembly Center and is unreserved. The press box will be available to the media at least two (2) hours prior to kickoff.

UPLINK TRUCK PARKING

Media outlets looking to park an uplink truck should notify Alan Blakeney (ablakeney@gram.edu) no later than Monday the week of the game. Uplink trucks that have made arrangements will be parked in an area designated by Alan Blakeney or Jeffrey Sims on a first-come. first-served basis.

MEDIA CREDENTIAL PICKUP ON GAMEDAY

Media members wishing to pick up credentials on gameday will need to visit the Hampton Inn in Ruston, La. and go to the front desk. The credentials will remain at the front desk until kickoff.

ENTERING THE STADIUM ON GAMEDAY

Working members of the media should enter Eddie G. Robinson Memorial Stadium from Gate 1 located on the south side of the stadium. Once you enter from Gate 1, elevators to the press and broadcast levels will be located to the left.

THE PRESS BOX

The press box is located at Gate 1 and opens two hours prior to kickoff on gamedays. The media meal will be served at least a half hour prior to kickoff. After entering the press box, make a right off the elevators and the working press box will be on your left.

ANY FOOD SERVED IN THE MEDIA PRESS BOX IS STRICTLY FOR MEDIA MEMBERS ONLY

Suite meals that are provided during home games are NOT for media members, but only for Suite Guests.

VISITING RADIO

The visiting radio booth is located in the press box. Upon leaving the elevator, go left and look toward the glass doors, where the farthest on the right is the visiting radio booth. Only the official radio network of the

school will have access to the booth. Contact the Athletic Communications Office for more information.

FIELD ACCESS

To access the field at Eddie G. Robinson Memorial Stadium, use the ramp located in the east end zone (Stadium Support Facility Side) of the stadium. Media credentials do not permit field access until postgame. Photographers are the only members of the media allowed on the field before and during the game.

SIDELINE POLICIES

Photographers are the only members of the media permitted on the sidelines during games. Shooting areas at Eddie G. Robinson Memorial Stadium are limited to the outside of the 25-yard lines and in the end zones. The designated areas allow space for working media as well as GSU and visiting spirit groups to co-exist. The GSU Athletic Communications Office will have a representative on the field to assist the media in their game-day efforts.

The bench areas of both sidelines are off-limits to media. While passing through from one end of the field to the other, members of the media should walk behind the bench areas without stopping in that space.

Members of the media should not approach Tiger players or coaches until the designated time for interview availability after the game.

PHOTO/VIDEO WORK ROOM

The photo work room is in the Robinson Stadium Support Football Facility and is located on the second level and is available immediately following the conclusion of the game.

GAMEDAY INTERVIEW AREAS

The visiting team locker room and interview room are located in the Stadium Support Facility. To access the interview area, please enter through the Stadium Support entrance. Grambling State will provide an escort for visiting media and athletics communications directors.

Interviews with Tiger coaches and players take place in the Stadium Support Facility in the media room on the second floor. GSU will provide an escort to that location as well.

Hue Jackson's postgame news conference will be available in the Stadium Support Facility (football fieldhouse) inside the weight room after the NCAA 10-minute cooling off period. GSU players will be available

Members of the media should not approach GSU players or coaches for comments on the field. The GSU locker room is closed.

PRACTICE AVAILABILITY

Grambling State's football practices are primarily closed to the public and media with limited exceptions (media will be notified in advance of those dates). The first portion of the workouts (generally the first 15-20 minutes) is open to photographers. Again, media will be notified in advance of those opportunities.

Members of the media planning to shoot practice should contact the GSU Athletic Communications Office in advance to confirm arrangements and practice times.

PRACTICE LOCATION

The Tigers practice on the practice field next to the Football Stadium Support Facility or inside Eddie G. Robinson Memorial Stadium.

ACCESSING INFORMATION

In addition to the Gramblina State Athletics website (www.asutiaers. com), the latest news, weekly releases, updated depth charts, rosters and season and single-game statistics can be sent on a daily or weekly basis via e-mail. Contact Curtis Ford to request to be added to the football e-mail list.

WE ARE GRAMBLING STATE

When referring to Grambling State University, please only use the terms GRAMBLING STATE or GSU. Please refrain from acronyms of the name GRAM, Grambling St. or GRAM State, GRAM St. In addition, Grambling State plays in the Southwestern Athletic Conference

SWAC WEEKLY HONORS

Each week during the regular season, the SWAC will name an offensive, defensive, newcomer and special teams player of the week.

SWAC WEEKLY TELECONFERENCE

The SWAC football head coaches will be available on a weekly teleconference Mondays from August 28 -November 20 from 10:00 am until noon central time. Each coach will be available for 8-10 minutes each week for auestions and reviews.

Media representatives who wish to participate should consult the conference weekly release. For credible media members only who wish to participate in the weekly coaches teleconference, the call in number is 1.800.356.8278. You will be prompted for a participant code and dial: 298779#. Media Members are asked to mute your line until you have a question. To Mute and Unmute your line, please us 4*.

Directions to Grambling State University

From Little Rock, AR (3hrs 8min, 176 mi):

Take appropriate route to US-167 S. Follow US-167 S for approximately 157 miles to Interstate 20 W. Ride down I-20 W for approximately 4.1 miles, then take Exit 81 in Grambling, LA and merge right onto RWE Jones Street and continue straight. After you pass through the first traffic light, you will drive across a small overpass and arrive at a second traffic light. You will then arrive on the campus of Grambling State University.

From Baton Rouge, LA (3hrs 59min, 224 mi):

Take appropriate route to US-61 N towards Natchez, MS. Travel north on US-61 for approximately 80 miles into Natchez, MS. Use the left two lanes to turn left onto US-425 N. Continue north on US-425 for approximately 76.5 miles into Rayville, LA, then take the appropriate route to Interstate 20 W. Ride down I-20 W for approximately 57 miles, then take Exit 81 in Grambling, LA and merge right onto RWE Jones Street and continue straight. After you pass through the first traffic light, you will drive across a small overpass and arrive at a second traffic light. You will then arrive on the campus of Grambling State University.

From Jackson, MS (2hrs 24min, 156 mi):

Take appropriate route to Interstate 20 W. Travel west on I-20 for approximately 152 miles, then take Exit 81 in Grambling, LA and merge right onto RWE Jones Street and continue straight. After you pass through the first traffic light, you will drive across a small overpass and arrive at a second traffic light. You will then arrive on the campus of Grambling State University.

From Dallas, TX (3hrs 45 min, 250 mi):

Take appropriate route to Interstate 20 E. Travel east on I-20 for approximately 248 miles, then take Exit 81 in Grambling, LA and merge right onto RWE Jones Street and continue straight. After you pass through the first traffic light, you will drive across a small overpass and arrive at a second traffic light. You will then arrive on the campus of Grambling State University.

Directions to Campus Athletics Facilities

Wilbert Ellis Field at RWE Jones Park (Baseball Stadium):

At the light, turn left onto College Ave. Continue straight at the stop sign and go around the curve behind Lee Hall on S. Main St. Immediately after coming out of the curve, turn left onto Hutchinson St. Continue straight past Dunbar Hall (on your left) and the dorms on your right (Attucks Hall, Garner Hall, & J.D.E. Bowen Hall) until you come to the entrance of the hasehall nark

Eddie G. Robinson Memorial Stadium (Football Stadium):

At the light, continue straight on RWE Jones Dr. past Jacob T. Stewart building and Tiger Village Clubhouse (on your right). Turn right on Central Ave. and continue straight past Martha Adams Hall (on your left) and Tiger Village Clubhouse (on your right). Merge left at the small intersection just past the basketball courts (on your right) and continue straight until you come to the parking lot of football stadium.

Fredrick C. Hobdy Assembly Center (Basketball/Volleyball Arena):

At the light, continue straight on RWE Jones Dr. past Jacob T. Stewart building and Tiger Village Clubhouse (on your right). Turn right on Central Ave. and continue straight past Martha Adams Hall (on your left) and Tiger Village Clubhouse (on your right). Merge left at the small intersection just

past the basketball courts (on your right) and continue straight, past the parking lot of football stadium. Fredrick C. Hobdy Assembly Center will be on your left.

GSU Lady Tigers Softball Field:

At the light, continue straight on RWE Jones Dr. past Jacob T. Stewart building and Tiger Village Clubhouse (on your right). Turn right on Central Ave. and continue straight past Martha Adams Hall (on your left) and Tiger Village Clubhouse (on your right). Merge left at the small intersection just past the basketball courts (on your right) and continue straight, past the parking lot of football stadium. GSU Lady Tigers Softball Field will be straight ahead from the parking lot.

GSU Lady Tigers Soccer Field:

At the light, continue straight on RWE Jones Dr. past Jacob T. Stewart building and Tiger Village Clubhouse (on your right). Turn right on Central Ave. and continue straight past Martha Adams Hall (on your left) and Tiger Village Clubhouse (on your right). Merge left at the small intersection just past the basketball courts (on your right) and continue straight, past the parking lot of football stadium. GSU Lady Tigers Soccer Field will be straight ahead from the parking lot and behind the Softball Field.



MICKEY JOSEPH

HEAD COACH

University of Nebraska, 1991

SECOND SEASON

Grambling State University has named Mickey Joseph as the 15th head football coach, announced by Vice-President and Director of Intercollegiate Athletics Dr. Trayvean Scott.

Jospeh brings a wealth of coaching experience spanning three decades to Grambling. His most recent stop was at the University of Nebraska, his alma mater, where he served as associate head coach, wide receivers coach and passing game coordinator during the 2022 season. He completed the 2022 campaign as interim head coach for the Cornhuskers.

Prior to NU, he spent five seasons on staff at LSU. In 2017, he joined the Tigers as wide receivers coach. He was elevated to associate head coach in 2020. Joseph was a key member of LSU's 2019 national championship staff. His receivers set an FBS record with 60 touchdown receptions and helping Joe Burrow claim a Heisman Trophy amassing 5,671 passing yards.

In 2019, LSU assembled the best group of receivers in SEC history. The Tigers' three starters—Ja'Marr Chase, Justin Jefferson and Terrace Marshall—combined for 241 receptions for 3,991 yards and 51 touchdowns.

His reputation and for recruiting and developing wide receivers were highlighted at LSU when he was recognized as a Rivals Top 25 recruiter, had four wide receivers selected in the first three rounds of the 2020 and 2021 NFL Drafts (2020 and 2021). That includes Chase, who was the 2021 NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year after being selected with the No. 5 overall pick in the 2021 Draft and Jefferson, the 22nd pick in the 2020 NFL Draft.

The Marrero, La. native was part of an offensive staff that helped LSU set several SEC records in 2019, including passing yards (6,024), passing TDs (61) and total offense per game (568.4) en route to a 15-0 season and national championship. Joseph also helped LSU post a 10-3 record in 2018 and a 9-4 mark in 2017.

In 2016, Joseph worked as running backs coach at neighboring Louisiana Tech. He helped the Bulldogs to a 9-5 record and win in the Armed Forces Bowl. The Bulldogs ranked No. 2 in the nation in scoring in 2016, averaging 44.3 points per game. Tech averaged 514.9 total yards game, which included 363.4 passing and 151.6 on the ground.

Joseph is no stranger to Grambling State. From 2014 to 2015 he served as wide receivers coach and special teams coach for the G-Men. When he arrived at Grambling, the Tigers were coming off a 1-10 record in 2013. In the two years he spent with the G-Men, Grambling finished 7-5 (2014) and 9-3 with a SWAC West Championship in 2015.

In 2015, Joseph's receivers totaled 2,250 receiving yards and 25 touchdowns as Grambling's scoring offense ranked fourth and passing offense ranked 21st among all FCS programs nationally.

Prior to Grambling, he was the special teams coordinator and wide receivers coach at Alcorn State in 2013, helping the school to a 9-3 record, its most wins in 30 years.

He spent five seasons at Langston University from 2008 to 2012, elevating to head coach in 2011. He led the Lions to 13-7 record in two seasons.

Joseph got his first collegiate coaching job at Wayne State College in Nebraska in 1997.

which he followed with a season at his high school alma mater Archbishop Shaw High School in New Orleans in 1998. From there, Joseph served as a graduate assistant at Tulane in 1999 and then coached receivers at Alabama State in 2000.

He coached quarterbacks at Nicholls State for three years (2001-03) and then spent two seasons as the running backs coach at Central Oklahoma (2004-05).

Before his tenure at Langston, Joseph served as the head football coach and Director of Athletics for Desire Street Academy, a private school in the New Orleans' Ninth Ward area. His main goal was to help get young kids out of the underprivileged area to improve their overall quality of life through sports. At the time of Hurricane Katrina, Joseph was responsible of moving the private school to Florida along with relocating the student- athletes. That year, the team had a record of 1-3, however, in 2008 Joseph turned the team around to a 10-3 record. Seven out of 25 players were able to sign with NCAA Division I programs.

During the summer of 2012 he also spent time with Houston Texans as part of an NFL minority internship. While in Houston, Joseph worked with the running backs and all aspects of the special teams units.

Joseph played guarterback at Nebraska from 1988-91. As a junior Joseph led the Cornhuskers to a 9-3 overall mark after accounting for 21 touchdowns (11 rushing, 10 passing). In his four years at Nebraska, the Cornhuskers posted a 39-9-1 overall mark and appeared in the Orange Bowl twice, the Citrus Bowl and the Fiesta Bowl.

In four years with the Cornhuskers, Joseph played in 34 regular season games and accounted for 30 touchdowns (16 rushing, 14 passing). His best season came as a junior in 1990 when he played in all 12 games, throwing for 624 yards and 11 touchdowns to go along with 554 rushing yards and 10 TDs.

Joseph was the top recruit coming out of Archbishop Shaw High School in Marrero when he was recruited to the University of Nebraska. In 1987, he was awarded Gatorade Player of the Year and First-Team Parade All-American. The standout football player was also a twotime All-State MVP and three-time All-District MVP.



JASON ROLLINS

ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

McNeese State University, 1996

SECOND SEASON

Rollins enters his second season at GSU after having served as interim head coach of Southern University during the 2021 season.

Prior to his stint at SU, he was a member of the staff at the University of Texas at San Antonio where he served as the defensive coordinator for two seasons and spent two years as associate head coach and linebackers coach.

In his first year as the defensive coordinator and safeties coach, UTSA displayed an aggressive scheme by recording 78 tackles for loss, 23 sacks and 19 turnovers, including 10 fumble recoveries, which ranked fourth in Conference USA and 36th nationally. Linebacker Josiah Tauaefa registered 113 tackles — the second-highest total in program history — en route to being named one of 10 semifinalists for the Butkus Award, second-team all-conference by Pro Football Focus (PFF) and honorable mention all-conference by the league's head coaches. Defensive end Lorenzo Dantzler picked up second-team all-conference honors by PFF, while safety C.J. Levine and defensive tackle Kevin Strong, Jr. earned honorable mention all-conference accolades.

Rollins helped mentor one of the nation's top defenses in 2017, as the Roadrunners led C-USA in seven different statistical categories and ranked in the top 10 among all Football Bowl Subdivision teams. UTSA held eight of its 11 opponents to 300-or-less yards of total offense, including a school record 149 allowed in the 51-17 win against Southern, and five foes rushed for 100-or-less yards, highlighted by a program-record 37 allowed in the 44-14 victory at Texas State. Linebacker La'Kel Bass earned honorable mention all-conference accolades after leading the team with 68 tackles to go along with 7.5 tackles for loss, two sacks and a pair of fumble recoveries.

In his first season with the Roadrunners, he helped guide the team to six wins and the program's first-ever bowl game, the 2016 Gildan New Mexico Bowl. His linebackers combined for 267 tackles, 24 tackles for loss, 12 sacks and 12 quarterback hurries. Josiah Tauaefa broke UTSA's single-season record for tackles with 115 en route to becoming the Roadrunners' first Freshman All-American (Football Writers Association of America), C-USA Freshman of the Year and a first-team all-conference selection. Bass tied the school standard for single-season tackles for loss with 11 as part of his 87 total stops.

Rollins came to San Antonio from Tulane, where he spent nine seasons as secondary coach, including serving as co-defensive coordinator in 2015 and special teams coordinator in 2014. He played a key role in the development of three All-Americans and four NFL players in draft picks Lorenzo Doss and Taurean Nixon, as well as free agents Derrick Strozier and Jordan Sullen.

In 2013, Rollins' secondary was a big reason why the Green Wave made their first bowl appearance since the 2002 season. Tulane ranked second nationally in turnovers forced with 35, including 19 interceptions with 15 by the defensive backfield. Doss, an All-America cornerback, picked off seven passes, returning a pair for touchdowns, and forced two fumbles. Additionally, Tulane allowed just 352.1 yards per game, which ranked 22nd in the Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS).

In 2014, Rollins helped lead the secondary to a combined 15 interceptions, seven fumble recoveries and a pair of forced fumbles, as the unit contributed to 22 of the team's 28 takeaways, which ranked 21st nationally. Parry Nickerson led the Green Wave and all FBS freshmen with six picks and garnered Freshman All-America accolades.

Rollins' impact on Tulane's secondary was immediate from the time he joined the staff prior to the 2008 campaign. In his first season in New Orleans, the group combined for 23 pass breakups, five interceptions, five forced fumbles and five recoveries.

During the next four years, his defensive backs combined for 31 interceptions and 120 pass breakups while helping the Green Wave defense consistently rank near the top of Conference USA in most major statistical categories.

Prior to his tenure at Tulane, Rollins was co-defensive coordinator and secondary coach at his alma mater, McNeese State, for two seasons (2005-06). He helped the Cowboys to a 23-10 record, two Southland Conference championships and a Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) playoff appearance in in his final season.

Rollins got his coaching start as an assistant coach for the defensive backs at McNeese State in 1997-98. He was an assistant coach in the Texas prep ranks at Galveston Ball (1999-2000) and La Maraue (2001).

He spent three seasons (2002-04) as the defensive backs coach at Northwestern State, where he helped the Demons to the 2004 Southland title on the strength of the top defense in the FCS.

Rollins was an all-state and all-district performer at Newton (Texas) High School and he went on to play safety at McNeese State where he earned his bachelor's degree in health and human performance in 1996.

He and his wife, Danna, have one son, Tieler.

FOURTH SEASON

Kris Peters begins his fourth year the running backs coach at Grambling State University.

Peters' comes to Grambling State after spending the previous 12 years in the high school ranks as an offensive coordinator at West St. John High School, Scotlandville Magnet High School and East St. John High School.

Peters was a two-sport athlete — baseball and football — at Alcorn State University. On the gridiron, Peters was selected a 2001 Don Hansen FCS All-American and All-Southwestern Athletic Conference (SWAC) wide receiver, 2002 Lindy's FCS All-American and All-SWAC wide receiver.

While at Alcorn State, Peters finished his career with 118 catches for 1,829 yards, along with 24 touchdowns. He also became the fastest wide receiver in school history to reach the 20-touchdown plateau.

In 2016, Peters was voted one of the top 50 greatest players in Alcorn State

University history.

On the baseball diamond, Peters was a 2002 All-SWAC First Team selection as centerfielder and a 2003 Preseason SWAC Player of the Year.

Peters graduated from Alcorn State in 2003 with a Bachelors Degree in Health and Physical Education. He is a native of Baton Rouge, La., where he attended Southern Lab High School, where he lettered in baseball and football.

Peters has two children, Nijah Harris and Matt Jones.







ERIK LOSEY

OFFENSIVE LINE

Western Kentucky, 2006

FIRST SEASON

Erik Losey (pronounced: LOW — C) enters his first season at Grambling State University as the Offensive Line Coach and Run Game Coordinator with seventeen years of coaching experience in the collegiate ranks.

Losey comes to Grambling State after spending the 2024 season coaching the offensive line coach for The Sayre School in Lexington, KY. In his only season for the Spartans, Losey served under Head Coach, Chad Pennington, where his unit paved the way in help winning the Single A State Championship in the Commonwealth of Kentucky and finished with a historical record of 15-0 in just it's seventh season as a football program. The entire offensive line unit were selected to First Team All-State in Class A and recorded zero sacks for the entire season. The Spartans finished ranked number one in scoring offense for all classifications in the Commonwealth, along with being ranked top twenty-five in rushing.

Prior to Sayre, Losey served as the Offensive Line coach for Eastern Kentucky University, where his offensive line units recorded multiple All-Conference and All-American honors in his four seasons for the Colonels. Highlighted players include Payton Collins, John Stone, Vincent Munlin Jr., K'Rojhn Calbert and Josiah Ezirim, who was drafted by the New Orleans Saints in the 2024 NFL Draft in the seventh round. In the 2021/2022/2023 seasons; Losey's units finished top thirty and top twenty with least given up sacks in the nation, and helped the Colonels achieve a top ten finish in 2022/2023 seasons in total offense. In the 2024 Season; Losey's unit ranked top three in the nation with least given up negative plays and was recognized by Matrix Analytical as one of the top five offensive line coaches in the nation. Losey also served as the Colonel's Recruiting Coordinator for his first two seasons where the Colonels were responsible for the number one recruiting class in the Ohio Valley Conference.

For the 2019 season, Losey served as a strength and conditioning intern at the University of South Carolina under Head Strength Coach, Jeff Dillman and Head Coach, Will Muschamp. He worked specifically with the Gamecock offensive line, who was coached by Offensive Line Coach, Eric Wolford.

Before South Carolina, Losey spent the 2018 and 2017 seasons as the Offensive Line coach under Head Coach, Jay Hopson. Losey unit helped the Golden Eagles to an 8-5 record in the 2017 season that earned them a trip to the Independence Bowl. That season, Losey's offensive line led Conference U.S.A. and was eleventh overall in the nation at the FBS level in fewest sacks allowed. In addition, the Golden Eagles ranked third in the conference in total offense and fourth in passing, rushing and scoring. Under Losey's tutelage, Devin Farrior, Drake Dorbeck, and Arvin Fletcher all received All-Conference honors after the 2017 season. The next year, Trace Clopton earned All-American honors, along with All-Conference as a true freshman. Arvin Fletcher repeated All-Conference honors after the 2018 season as well.

For the 2014-2016 seasons, Losey served as the Offensive Line coach for East Tennessee State University, under Head Coach Carl Torbush. This was the restart of the ETSU program that had been cut back in 2003. During Losey's time at ETSU, in just the second season in 2016, Ben Blackmon earned All-Conference honors.

Losey came to ETSU from Alcorn State University, where he served as the Offensive Line coach in the 2013 season, under Head Coach, Jay Hopson. Isaac Sampson was a first team selection to the All-American team, along with All-Conference. Jon Scott and Detonio Dade were also All-Conference selections post

the 2013 season. During the 2013 season, Alcorn State was ranked first in the Southwestern Athletic Conference in fewest sacks allowed and ranked second in scoring offense.

During the 2012 season coaching Running Backs for Campbell University in Buies Creek, NC. In his only season in Buies Creek, Losey tutored Freshman Fullback, Dalton Dillon, to All-Conference honors.

Prior to Campbell, Losey spent the 2011 season at Webber International University where he coached the offensive line and was responsible for writing up the Warrior run game. He had two offensive linemen that were nominated for All-American honors under his direction.

During the 2009-2010 Seasons, Losey served as the Offensive Line Quality Control Coach with Florida State University. As a member of the Seminoles' staff, Losey assisted with the offensive line under legendary Offensive Line Coach, Rick Trickett, and served under Head Coaches, Jimbo Fisher (2010), Bobby Bowden (2009). At the end of his two seasons with the Seminoles, Florida State finished with an overall record of 17 & 10, Atlantic Division Champs in the ACC, and two bowl victories in both the 2010 Gator Bowl and the 2010 Chick-Fil-A Bowl.

The Hixson, Tenn. native began his coaching career as the Offensive Graduate Assistant for Western Kentucky University during the Hilltoppers transition from Division I FCS to Division I FBS, joining the Sun Belt Conference. Losey worked under Offensive Line Coach, Walter Wells and Head Coach, David Elson in the 2007 and 2008 seasons.

Losey enjoyed a decorated playing career at both East Tennessee State, and Western Kentucky, starting all 47 games of his college career.

He began his college playing career at ETSU in 2002, where he was a Southern Conference Freshman of the Year nominee. In addition to gaining All-American status in 2005, Losey was named First Team All-Gateway Conference, while receiving National Lineman of the Week for his play against SEC member, Auburn University, and collected Conference 'Player of the Week' twice during the season.

FIRST SEASON

Willie Mack Garza Joins Grambling State after previously serving as the defensive coordinator at Montana State University.

Garza's defensive unit at Montana State ranked inside the top 25 in FCS and helped guide the Bobcats reach the FCS playoffs. MSU led the Big Sky in sacks, finished third in forced fumbles and fourth in interceptions in 2023 after his 2022 defense finished second in the Big Sky in sacks and forced fumbles and third in picks.

Prior to joining the staff at MSU, he spent time at McNeese State as safeties coach from 2020-21. He serves in the same capacity at Wyoming in 2019. Garza coached defensive backs at Texas A&M in the spring of 2019 and at Utah Tech from 2017-18.

Before heading to Utah Tech, Garza served as cornerbacks coach at Lamar University in 2016.

Prior to his stop at Prairie View, Garza spent two seasons at Pearl River Community College where he served as the team's defensive coordinator. During his time at Pearl River, Garza helped construct one of the nation's top defensive units. PRCC ranked fifth nationally in scoring and 10th in pass defense. Six of Garza's players went on to sign scholarships with four-year institutions.

A native of Refugio, Texas, Garza has coached at the highest level college football has to offer as the defensive backs coach at the University of Southern California under former head coach Lane Kiffin for one season in 2010. Prior to his stint at USC, Garza spent 2009 as the defensive backs coach at Tennessee also under Kiffin. The Volunteers were 12th nationally in both pass defense and pass efficiency defense as they finished second in the SEC East and made an appearance in the Chick-fil-A Bowl.

Before moving to Tennessee, Garza spent four years (2005-09) at North Dakota State as the secondary coach for one season and the defensive coordinator in his final three. NDSU compiled 35 wins under his watch. The Bison recorded 10-1 seasons twice and defeated three FBS schools, including Minnesota, Central Michigan and Ball State.

Garza began his coaching career at Texas, his alma mater, as a graduate assistant working with the cornerbacks and special teams for three years (1994-96). The Longhorns played in the 1994 Sun Bowl, 1995 Sugar Bowl and 1997 Fiesta Bowl.

He then was the defensive backs coach at Western Michigan for four seasons (1997-2000). In 2000, the 9-3 Broncos were 13th nationally in pass defense and played in the Mid-American Conference championship game. He spent the next

three years (2001-03) coaching cornerbacks at TCU. In 2002, two-time all-league cornerback Jason Goss tied the school season record with eight interceptions. The Horned Frogs won the 2002 Conference USA title and played in three bowls.

Reggie Moore enters his first season as wide receivers coach at Grambling State. Moore comes to GSU after spending the past three seasons as the pass game coordinator at Prairie View A&M.

He also coached the receivers at PVAMU from 2015-17 under then head coach Willie Simmons. He brings a wealth of experience from the FBS, FCS, and the NFL level that spans over 25 years of coaching. He has had previous stops at the University of Washington (2003), North Dakota State (2004-2007), UCLA (2008-2010), and most recently at the University of Colorado (2020-2021). He has participated in several Minority Internships in the NFL with the Jacksonville Jaguars, Denver Broncos, Baltimore Ravens, Seattle Seahawks and Green Bay Packers.

A native Houstonian, he began his coaching career in 1999 at his high school alma mater (James Madison High School) under one of Prairie View A&M's favorite sons, the legendary Ray Seals. Moore has mentored and tutored a number of professional athletes over his career as well. Currently KhaDarel Hodge (Atlanta Falcons), and Quinton Bell (Miami Dolphins) were both under his tutelage at PV during his first tour, as well as Josh Simmoms (formerly of the USFL Pittsburgh Maulers) an All-USFL Special Teams award winner for the 2023 season. Just this past spring, Jaquan Bloomfield was selected by the Canadian League Ottawa Red Blacks in the 4th round (35th overall pick) in the 2024 draft.

As a collegiate player, Moore went on to be a 3-year starter at UCLA under the late Terry Donahue from (1986-1991) and was a Sporting News Magazine Sophomore All-American (1988). He was a favorite target of NFL Hall of Fame quarterback Troy Aikman, who went on to be the 1st pick in the 1989 NFL Draft by the Dallas Cowboys. As a professional he spent 2 seasons with the NY Jets (1991-1992) and went on to the LA Rams (1993) where an injury derailed his career. A talented touted infielder out of high school (shortstop) he was selected in the 44th round by the Texas Rangers in the 1990 MLB Amateur Draft after years away from the sport.

While attending his alma mater, James Madison High School, he finished 9th in his graduating senior class in 1986. There he received several National Honors including being selected to the 1986 Parade Magazine All-American Team, the National Honor Society, and received the Adidas Scholastic Achievement Award. He was also selected to play in the then Whataburger Texas High School All-Star game. His father Zeke Moore spent 12 seasons with the Houston Oilers (AFL 1967-69, NFL 1970-78) and was selected to 2

Pro Bowls. His younger brother, Trey Moore, played basketball at Mississippi State, and went on to a lengthy career in the European League earning MVP honors, and is currently still with the famous Harlem Globetrotter Organization.



DEL LEE-COLLINS

DEFENSIVE BACKS

McNeese State University, 1998

SECOND SEASON

Del Lee Collins returned to Grambling State as the cornerback's coach prior to the start of the 2024 season. .

A native of New Orleans and former professional football player, Del Lee-Collins joined the Lion coaching staff as cornerbacks coach prior to the 2020 season.

In his first season with the Lions, which was moved to spring of 2021, Lee-Collins oversaw a talented group of SLU cornerbacks. Under his direction, junior Ferlando Jordan was named All-America by Stats Perform and Phil Steele, while also earning first team All-Southland Conference and All-Louisiana honors.

In 2021, Lee-Collins' troops once again featured an All-American, as Zy Alexander finished among the FCS leaders with a Southland Conference-high six interceptions. Alexander earned All-America honors from Stats Perform, Associated Press, and Phil Steele, while also claiming first team All-SLC and All-Louisiana accolades. Both of his starting cornerbacks earned first team All-Southland Conference honors for the 2022 conference champions. Jordan was named first team All-SLC for the third time in his career, while Alexander was a repeat selection.

Lee-Collins' previous coaching stints include Grambling and his alma mater Mc-Neese

Lee-Collins started his coaching career at St. Augustine High School. He worked as defensive backs coach, defensive coordinator, and assistant head coach. He has subsequently served as co-defensive coordinator at both Landry Walker High School and John Ehret High School, as well as head coach at Sophie B. Wright Charter in New Orleans.

Lee-Collins played from 1994-98 at McNeese, helping the Cowboys to a pair of Southland Conference championships. Collins finished his collegiate playing career as the program's career leader in blocked field goals. Following his time in Lake Charles, he played professionally for five years in the NFL and Arena Football League.

A 1998 graduate of McNeese, Lee-Collins and his wife, Cheryl, have two sons, Caleb and Kiazer.

Reggie Nelson is in his second stint as the offensive line coach for GSU after serving as the offensive line coach from 2014-2021

Nelson mentored Trenton Scott, who signed a free-agent contract with the Los Angeles Chargers and is currently with the Washington Commanders having completed his sixth season as a player in the NFL. Scott was an All-SWAC performer in 2017 and 2016 and was named to the AFCA coaches All American team in 2017.

As the offensive line coach at Grambling State University, Nelson helped to develop All-American offensive linemen Justin Miller, William Waddell and 2021 Senior bowl participant David Moore. During his five years at McNeese State, Nelson developed two first team All-Americans and seven first-team all-conference players and two second-team all-conference players.







More than 800 courses and 68 degree programs are of- fered a Grambling. There are five colleges, including an honors college, two professional schools, a graduate school, and a Division of Continuing Education. National and local employers recruit graduates from Grambling's excellent nursing, computer science, teacher education, and other programs.

A wide variety of student clubs and organizations at Grambling ensure that every student will find an activity of interest. Hon- or societies, sports, art, religion, politics, and Greek organizations are just a few of the or-ganizations that appeal to a diverse group of students. As a member of one of Gram-bling's student organizations, students learn to give of themselves while participating in worthwhile campus and community projects.

MISSION

Grambling State University is a comprehensive, historically black, public institution that offers a broad spectrum of undergraduate and graduate programs of study. Through its undergraduate major courses of study, which are undergirded by a traditional liberal arts program, and through its graduate school, which has a professional focus, the University embraces its founding principle of educational opportunity. With a commitment to the education of minorities in American society, the University seeks to reflect in all of its programs the diversity in the world. The University advances the study and preservation of African American history, art, and culture.

Grambling State University is a community of learners who strive for excellence in their pursuit of knowledge and who seek to contribute to their respective major academic disciplines. The University prepares its graduates to compete and succeed in careers related to its programs of study, to contrib- ute to the advancement of knowledge, and to lead productive lives as informed citizens in a democratic society. The University pro- vides its students a living and learning environment which nurtures their development for leadership in academics, athletics, cam-



pus governance, and in their future pursuits. The University affords each student the opportunity to pursue any program of study provided that the student makes reasonable progress. Grambling fosters in its students a commitment to service and to the improve- ment in the quality of life for all persons.

The University expects that all persons who matriculate and who are employed at Grambling will reflect through their study and work that the University is indeed a place where all persons are valued, "where everybody is somebody."

<u>HISTORY</u>

Grambling State University opened on November 1, 1901 as the Colored Industrial and Agricultural School. It was founded by the North Louisiana Colored Agriculture Relief Association, organized in 1896 by a group of African-American farmers who wanted to organize and operate a school for African Americans in their region of the state.

In response to the Association's request for assistance, Tuskegee Institute's Booker T. Washington sent Charles P. Adams to help the group organize an industrial school. Ad- ams became its founding president.

In 1905, the school moved to its present location and was renamed the North Louisiana Agricultural and Industrial School. By 1928, after becoming a state junior college and being renamed the Louisiana Negro Normal and Industrial Institute, the school began to award two-year professional certif- icates and diplomas. In 1936, the curriculum emphasis shifted to rural teacher education; students were able to receive professional teaching certificates after completing a third academic year. The first baccalaureate de- gree was awarded in 1944, in elementary education

In 1946, the school became Grambling Col- lege, named after P.G. Grambling, the white sawmill owner who had donated the parcel of land where the school was constructed. In addition to elementary educators, Grambling prepared secondary teachers and added cur- ricula in sciences, liberal arts and business, transforming the college from a single pur- pose institution of teacher education into a multipurpose college. In 1949, the col-

lege earned its first accreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS).

In 1974, the addition of graduate programs in early childhood and elementary education gave the school a new status and a new name — Grambling State University. The university expanded and prospered between 1977 and 2000. Several new academic programs were in- corporated and new facilities were added to the 384-acre campus, including a business and computer science building, school of nursing, student services building, stadium, stadi- um support facility and an intramural sports center.

UNIVERSITY PRESIDENTS

Following Founding President Charles P. Adams, who served for 35 years, Ralph Waldo Emerson Jones became the second president in 1936. Five presidents served from 1977 to 2001: Dr. Joseph Benjamin Johnson, Dr. Harold W. Lundy, Dr. Raymond Hicks, Dr. Leonard Haynes III and Dr. Steve A. Favors. Grambling State University's first female president, Dr. Neari Francois Warner, served a three-year interim term until the selection of Dr. Horace Judson, who became the in-stitution's seventh president in 2004. After leading an ambi- tious five-year campaign to rebuild the institution's facilities, Judson resigned in 2009. After Judson's resignation, Frank G. Pogue, Ph.D., a highly respected educator and administrator with a distinguished 47-year career in higher education was named GSU's president.

Prior to his selection as president, Dr. Pogue served as the president of Edinboro University of Pennsylvania, interim president at Chicago State University and State University of New York (SUNY)-Cobleskill. Dr. Pogue retired after serving a five-year term as president, and Dr. Cynthia Warrick, Ph.D., RPh. was named as interim president in 2014 during the presidential search.

Warrick ventured into higher education 16 years ago serv-ing in multi-faceted leadership roles as an administrator, public servant, healthcare professional, environmental re-search scientist, faculty member, and accreditation reviewer.

Dr. Willie D. Larkin, Ph.D. was named ninth university president in 2015 (May) and server a one-year term. Dr. Larkin had previously served as Chief of Staff to leaders of Morgan State University and the University of Wisconsin Colleges, where he worked directly with the chancellor, and the president at Morgan State University, to provide oversight of nearly 3,000 employees and an operating budget of more than \$300 million. At Auburn University, he was the faculty advisor to the university's Board of

Trustees and the first African American to chair the university's 90-member University Senate.

Our current president is Richard J. Gallot, Jr. The University of Louisiana System (ULS) Board of Supervisors announced (07/26/2016) that the tenth President of Grambling State University (GSU) will be former Louisiana state senator, and state representative, Richard J. Gallot, Jr. Gallot is a 1987 GSU graduate where he received a bachelor of arts in Arts & His-tory. He earned his Juris Doctorate from Southern University in 1990. From 2000 to 2012, Gallot held the District 11 seat in the Louisiana House of Representatives. He served three terms in the house before winning his first term in the senate in 2011. Gallot did not seek re-election in the October 24, 2015 election.

Located in the small north central Louisiana town of Grambling, Grambling State University offers a personalized educational experience with a big city atmosphere. The campus houses students in its 19 residence halls, enhances and promotes student life through its impressive student union and bookstore, and appeals to other areas of life and improvement through buildings such as the dining hall, library, intramural center, and health center. More than 800 courses and 68 degree programs are offered at Grambling.

There are five colleges, including an honors college, two professional schools, a graduate school, and a Division of Continuing Ed-ucation. National and local employers recruit graduates from Grambling's excellent nursing, computer science, teacher education, and other programs. CAMPUS LIFE

Grambling State University recognizes that clubs and social organizations are an important part of college life. By joining one of these, students discover an avenue to meet new faces with similar interests and have the opportunity to learn about new subjects. As students' commitments to their clubs develop, leadership positions may be another step within the activity's hierarchy that a student can explore.

One of the most popular campus organizations is the Tiger Marching Band, touted as the number one collegiate show band in the world. Formed in 1926 by President R.W.E. Jones, the Mighty Tiger Marching Band has become a household name. The band has been featured in television ads, the major motion picture Drumline, appeared as guest entertain- ment on televisions shows, and entertained Liberian President William R. Tolbert at his 1972 inauguration. In 1999, the band was selected to represent the Pageantry of Bands section of the NCAA Hall of Fame. Through an impressive list of accomplishments and honors, the Grambling Tiger Band has become known as "The Best In The Land"

Intercollegiate athletics has also made Grambling State University a household name among national universities. The football program has been successful in landing prominent coaching staffs over the years. Professional football player, Doug Williams, a Super Bowl Most Valuable Player, served as head football coach, succeeding Coach Eddie Robinson, the "winningest coach in the history of football." Known as the "Cradle of Pros," Grambling also produced the first black football player in the NFL and the first black quarter-back to start in the NFL.

ACADEMIC SUPPORT

Under the watch of Provost and Vice President Dr. Robert M. Dixon, the Office of the Provost & Vice President for Ac-ademic Affairs is designed to provide leadership and super-vision for all undergraduate and graduate degree programs. Continuing education initiatives, the military science pro-gram, and a variety of support and outreach units also fall under its auspices.

The office espouses a philosophy of excellence from which a rigorous plan for enhancing and strengthening the academ- ic environment continuously evolves. The office is committed to realizing the overarching goals of preparing students for success in their chosen careers, motivating them to pursue graduate and advanced study, and equipping them with skills for effective interaction with diverse groups of people. To this end, the instructional program is delivered through four academic colleges and two professional schools. Within this structure, one certificate program and seventy-two degree programs, ranging from associates to the doctorate, are offered.

This office is committed to providing faculty with opportunities and activities for professional growth and develop-ment. Moreover, the office is responsible for monitoring and maintaining the integrity of the academic program.

LOUISIANA 40, GRAMBLING STATE 10

LAFAYETTE, La. | The Grambling State University football team put forth a valiant effort but couldn't upset FBS opponent Louisiana in head coach Mickey Joseph's debut, falling 40-10 on Saturday night at Cajun Field.

GSU (0-1) showed flashes of what could be, making big plays in spurts and coming up with defensive stops in the second half. The Tigers surrendered 30 points in the first half but played the Ragin' Cajuns tough in the season limited the UL to 10 points over the final two periods.

Starting quarterback Myles Crawley had an efficient night, going 19-for-28 for 166 yards and one interception. His top target was Nick Howard who snagged five passes for 68 yards.

Ke'Travion Hargrove led the GSU rushing attack with 61 yards on 12 carries.

Defensively, GSU newcomer Blake Davis had a solid night racking up a game-high eight total tackles with seven solo stops. He also had an interception and a sack.

Another positive note for the Tigers came in the penalty department. A year ago, GSU was the penalized team in the country, averaging 81.4 yards in penalties per game. On Saturday night, Grambling State committed just six penalties for just 25 yards.

"I was happy because they didn't quit and they fought to the end," said Joseph "I've got to do a better job of getting ourselves ready to play in games like this where you are playing up. Louisiana is a well-coached football team and they're postseason football team, but we still know we're a good football team."

Louisiana got things going early, moving into GSU territory on its first play from scrimmage, courtesy of a 50-yard completion by Harvey Broussard. A few plays later, the Ragin' Cajuns got on the board on a 6-yard run by Dre'lyn Wahsington to go up 7-0 with 9:04 to go in the first quarter.

The Ragin Cajuns made 14-0 after Ben Wooldrige found Broussard for 13-yard TD pass with 13:30 remaining in the half. UL pushed its lead to 30-0 heading into the half.

On Louisiana's first drive of the second half, Davis nabbed his first interception of the year, giving the Tigers the ball at their own 44-yard line. Grambling State couldn't convert the takeaway into points, however.

Following another UL touchdown, Grambling State puts its best drive of the game together going 75 yards in nine plays, culminated in a 1-yard touchdown gallop by Hargrove. That score made it a 37-7 game with 4:35 to go in the third quarter.

Trailing 40-7 with 1:55 remaining in the contest, Reed Harradine capped the scoring with a 50-yard field goal. It was the first time a Grambling State kicker made a field goal greater than 50 yards since Marc Orozco nailed 52-yard field goal against Alcorn State on Oct. 20, 2018.

Wooldridge paced Louisiana's passing game, throwing for 308 yards, three touchdowns and an interception on 25-of-33 passing.

GRAMBLING STATE 37, TUSKEGEE 20

GRAMBLING, La. | Grambling State University starting quarterback Myles Crawley had a career day on Saturday afternoon at Eddie G. Robinson memorial Stadium, throwing for a career-high 304 yards with four touchdowns in GSU's 37-20 win over Tuskegee.

GSU improved to 1-1 on the year while TU fell to 0-2.

The redshirt-senior from Lithonia, Ga. lit the Golden Tigers defense up, going 16-of-26 in two and a half quarter of work.

Grambling State's Brenden Barley picked off Tuskegee's Christopher Roberson on the Golden Tigers' first drive of the game, setting GSU up at the TU 24-yard line. Three plays later, Crawley connected with tight end CJ Knighten for a 2-yard TD pass. It was Knighten's first collegiate TD ctahc.

The extra point was missed wide left, giving Grambling State a 6-0 lead with 11:44 on the clock.

GSU pushed its lead to 13-0 when Crawley connected with Nick Howard for a 9-yard score with 8:38 remaining in the first quarter.

Marcellius Johnson came up with GSU's second INT of the day near the end of the first quarter, giving the Tigers great field position at the TU 35-yard line. After a 27-yard reception by Javon Robinson gave GSU a first and goal at the 4-yard line. Freshman running back Tony Phillips scored his first career touchdown with a 4-yard TD reception, extending Grambling's advantage to 20-0 with 13:27 left in the half.

On Tuskegee's ensuing drive, the Golden Tigers drove to the GSU 5-yard line. The Grambling State defense stood tall, forcing a field goal attempt that TU's Lorcan Ryans would miss wide left.

Reed Harradine made it a 23-0 game with a 36-yard field goal with 2:38 to go until the break. Grambling State quickly made it 30-0 when Crawley connected with Javon Robinson for a 53-yard TD pass at the 1:32 mark.

GSU stretched the lead to 37-0 when Bryce Cage forced a fumble on a sack with Josh Darling scooping it up and returning it 45 yards for another GSU TD. Grambling carried a 37-3 lead heading into the half as TU tacked on a field goal as time expired.

Crawley finished the first half going 14-of-22 for 297 yards and four touchdowns. Robinson was equally as spectacular catching four passes for 151 yards before halftime. His 151yard performance was also a career-best.

The second half was quieter for GSU. Tuskegee outscored Grambling State 17-0 in over the final two quarters of play. The Golden Tigers scored its final touchdown of the game when Raequan Beal found Rodricus Magee for a 15-yard touchdown with 35 seconds to play. Grambling State gained 384 yards of total offense with 322 coming through the air.

Defensively, Andrew Jones led the charge with 11 total tackles, six solo stops, two tackles for loss and 0.5 sacks.

GRAMBLING STATE 35, EAST TEXAS A&M 28 (OT)

COMMERCE, Texas | The Grambling State University football team used several key defensive stops and a late touchdown to force overtime and defeat Texas A&M-Commerce 35-28 on Saturday night at Memorial Stadium

Grambling State improved to 2-1 — the first time GSU has started a season with a 2-1 record since 2017. Texas A&M-Commerce dropped to 0-3.

The GSU defense came up big, forcing six turnovers on the day. Patrick Marshall came up with biggest takeaway of the day, picking off a pass on TAMUC's first possession of the extra period.

Grambling State's offense struggled with inconsistency but made crucial plays when the Tigers needed it. Starting quarterback Myles Crawley was 14-of-30 for 125 yards, two touchdowns and two interceptions.

Tre Bradford led the Tigers' running game with 73 yards and two scores on 15 carries.

The Grambling State defense forced three turnovers within the Lions' first four possessions. Brenden Barley picked off Lions' QB Ron Peace, setting the G-Men up with a first and 10 at the TAMUC 23-yard line with 12:16 on the clock. A missed 40-yard field goal attempt kept the score tied 0-0.

Another interception by Markel Linzer set the Tigers up their own 45-yard line. Grambling State's offense once again couldn't convert that takeaway into points.

GSU's defense took matters into hands on the next Texas A&M-Commerce drive when Marshall forced a fumble and Blake Davis scooped it up and returned it for a 35-yard touchdown. GSU nabbed a 6-0 lead after the PAT was missed wide right with 6:43 to go in the opening quarter.

TAMUC responded with a 69-yard touchdown by B.K. Jackson, giving the Lions a 7-6 lead at the 6:02 mark

GSU's Caleb-Lee Collins picked another TAMUC pass at the Lions 25 yard-line with 14:19 to go until halftime. A few plays later, GSU's offense converted the turnover into a TD when Crawley found Jacoby Bellazar for a 10-yard TD. Grambling converted a two-point conversion to take a 14-7 lead.

After back-to-back TD drives for the Lions, Bellazar set GSU up in prime territory with a kickoff return to the TAMUC 41-yard line. On first down, Tre Bradford kicked into high gear, sprinting 41 yards for another Tiger TD, tying the game 21-21 4:17 on the clock.

Both teams went into the half tied at 21.

GSU's defense nabbed its fifth takeaway when David Jones forced another TAMUC fumble at the 50 yard line on the Lions opening possession of the second half. However, GSU gave the ball right back when the Lions' Jaden Rios picked off Crawley at the GSU 44-yard line.

After driving inside the Tigers' 5-yard line, TAMUC took a 28-21 lead Braxton Garmon carried the ball into the end zone for a 3-yard score with 8:56 to go in the third quarter.

Grambling State had an opportunity to tie the game at the beginning of the fourth quarter, but a fumble at the 1-yard line by Hargrove gave the Lions a first down at their own 20-yard line with 14:01 to play.

Texas A&M tried to put the game away but going for a fourth down conversion with 3:41 to play and the ball resting at the GSU 26 yard, but linebacker Andrew Jones came up with a clutch tackle to give the Tigers the ball back.

A 27-yard touchdown catch by Nicholas Howard capped off a 6-play, 75-yard drive to tie the game 28-28 with 1:18 left in regulation.

In overtime, with Grambling State need seven yards on third down, Ke'Travion Hargrove made a 17-yard reception inside the 5-yard line to set up first and goal. Bradford finished the drive with a 3-yard TD run giving the Tigers a 35-28 advantage.

On the Lions first play of overtime, Marshall made an interception at the 15-yard line to preserve the win.

GRAMBLING STATE 41, JACKASON STATE 20

GRAMBLING, La. | In front of a crowd of 19,085, the Grambling State University football team sailed past Jackson State for a 41-20 victory at Eddie G. Robinson Memorial Stadium on Saturday night.

The story of the night was the opportunistic defense for GSU (3-1). Grambling State's defensive unit forced five turnovers and scored two touchdowns in the win. It was the fourth consecutive game that GSU registered a takeaway and the third game in a row that the defense scored a touchdown.

GSU's defense which leads the nation in interceptions, takeaways, and defensive touchdowns, surrendered 438 yards of total offense. JSU (2-2) put up 279 passing yards, with touchdown passes of 70 and 66 yards.

Andrew Jones, who was named the SWAC Defensive Player of the Week earlier in the week, had another big game making a team-high 11 total tackles with six solo stops. He also registered a sack and with 2.5 TFLs.

Offensively, Grambling put up 271 yards of offense. Myles Crawley completed 16-of-28 passes for 167 yards and a touchdown. His top target was Javon Robinson who made five receptions for 44 yards.

Ke'Travion "Bull" Hargrove led the GSU ground attack, rushing for 81 yards and two TDs on 12 carries. As a team, Grambling ran for 104 yards.

Grambling State got things started quickly driving 77 yards in eight plays on its first drive to take a 7-0 lead with 12:01 on the clock. The score was set up by a pair of big gains by Hargrove. On first and 10 from its own 34-yard line, a 36-yard run put Hargrove moved the into JSU territory and the 30-yard line. Hargrove caught a short pass that he turned into a 20-yard gain, giving GSU 1st and goal at the 10-yard line. On 3rd and goal, Hargrove carried the ball into the end zone for a 7-yard score.

After forcing a Jackson State punt, Grambling's JR Waters caught a 22-yard TD pass from Crawley, giving GSU a 14-0 cushion heading into the second quarter.

Leading 14-13 with 57 seconds remaining in the first half, GSU's Caleb Lee-Collins stepped in front of Cam'Ron McCoy's pass and turned it into a 22-yard pick six, giving GSU a 21-13 lead a halftime.

JSU cut the lead down to 21-20 on a 66-yard touchdown throw from Jacobian Morgan to Ja'Naylon Dupree with 3:23 left in the third quarter. On Jackson State's next drive, Morgan fumbled on JSU's 4-yard line and Patrick Marshall fell on top of it in the end zone for another GSU touchdown, making it 28-20 with 42 seconds left in the third.

Grambling State forced another turnover on Jackson State's ensuing possession when Brenden Barley picked off Morgan at the JSU 38-yard line. It was Barley's nation-leading third interception of the season.

GSU converted that turnover into points when Hargrove scored a 1-yard TD to put GSU ahead 35-20 with 13:19 remaining in the game.

Kicker Reed Harradine wrapped up the scoring by drilling field goals of 29 and 32 yards.

GRAMBLING STATE 34, PRAIRIE VIEW A&M 36 (50T)

DALLAS, Texas | The Grambling State University football team dropped its Southwestern Athletic Conference (SWAC) opener to Prairie View A&M, 36-34, in a five-overtime marathon on Saturday evening in the 99th State Fair Classic at the Cotton Bowl Stadium.

GSU (3-2 overall, 0-1 SWAC) led 17-7 at halftime, but couldn't find its rhythm in the second half, allowing PVAMU (2-3, 1-2) to rally back for its first conference win of the year.

Offensively, Grambling State out-gained Prairie View A&M 386 to 303. Starting quarterback Myles Crawley accumulated 286 of those yards through the air. He completed 29-of-48 passes with two touchdowns and two interceptions.

Crawleys top targets were Javon Robinson and Julien Lewis who both caught six passes. Robinson had 48 receiving yards while Lewis had 47.

Ke'Travion "Bull" Hargrove ran for 61 yards on 15 carries. Dedrick Talbert and Tre Bradford accounted for the rushing touchdowns for the Tigers with Talbert running for 36 yards and a score on three touches and Bradford rushing for eight yards and a score.

Andrew Jones once again led the GSU defense in tackles with 11 total stops, three solo tackles and one tackle for loss.

Grambling State got the scoring started in the second quarter when Crawley connected with Khris Simmons for a 23-yard touchdown, giving GSU a 7-0 lead with 14:52 to go in the half. It was Simmons' first TD reception of the season.

Prairie View A&M responded two drives later with a 1-yard run by Lamagea McDowell, tying the game 7-7 with 8:46 remaining in the half.

With 6:26 on the clock, Caleb Lee-Collins picked off PVAMU's Cameron Peters at the GSU 49-yard line. That takeaway led to another GSU TD; a 9-yard gallop by Tre Bradford, making it 14-7 Tigers with 4:18 left until halftime.

Reed Harradine's 29-yard field goal with four seconds left in the half gave GSU a 17-7 cushion heading into the break.

The Panthers pulled within a touchdown, 17-10, on their first drive of the second half on a 42-yard field goal by Guillermo at the 9:47 mark.

After PVAMU's Cameron Franklin intercepted Crawley's pass to Jacoby Bellazar at the GSU 37-yard line with 2:07 remaining in the third quarter, the Panthers utilized the short field, eventually scoring on a 9-yard run by quarterback Jaden Johnson and tying the game 17-17 with 13:50 remaining regulation.

Prairie View A&M picked off another pass when JR Coleman snagged an errant throw and set the Panthers up at the GSU 39 yard-line with 9:52 left. PVAMU immediately made GSU pay on a 39-yard TD run by Connor Wisham, giving the Panthers their first lead of the day, 24-17.

Grambling State tied the game on its final drive of regulation, moving the ball to the Panther's 47-yard line. No play, however, was bigger than Marquise Harris helping GSU convert a 4th and 18 but making a 38-yard reception near the Tigers' sideline to keep game alive and giving GSU 1st and goal at the 9-yard line.

Two plays later, Crawley tossed the game-tying touchdown, a 12-yard strike, to a wideopen Jalen Johnson with 38 seconds to go.

In the first overtime, Grambling State started on offense. On third down from the PVAMU 16 yard, Talbert scampered into the end zone to GSU a 31-24 lead.

PVAMU responded with a 4-yard TD pass to Jaden Jonson to send the game to a second overtime period.

After trading field goals in the second OT, both defenses would make big stops to keep the game alive.

In the fifth OT, after GSU's offense was stopped, Grambling State's defense seemingly made another stop, but pass interference set the Panthers up just outside the 1-yard line. McDowell burst into the end zone for the game winner.

ALCORN STATE 17, GRAMBLING STATE 15

GRAMBLING, La. | Alcorn State's Noah Kiani's game-winning 27-yard field goal late in the fourth quarter was enough to hand Grambling State a 17-15 loss at Eddie G. Robinson Memorial Stadium on Saturday afternoon.

GSU (3-3 overall, 0-2 SWAC) was plagued by missed opportunities on offense. The Tigers struggled to convert trips to the red zone into touchdowns, scoring two field goals and one touchdown on four possessions inside the redzone.

Grambling State quarterback Myles Crawley was 16-for-28 for 149 yards and one interception. Saturday snapped Crawley's four-game streak of throwing at least one touchdown. Crawley was also sacked four times.

GSU found some success on the ground, rushing for 157 yards. The Tigers had three running backs run for over 50 yards. Tre Bradford led the way with 58 yards on 11 carries. Dedrick Talbert added 52 yards a touchdown on 11 attempts and Bull Hargrove toted the ball for 50 yards on nine touches.

Defensively, Grambling State gave up 335 yards of total offense. Linebacker Andrew Jones led the Tigers with 11 total tackles with five solo stops. Blake Davis nabbed an interception in the second quarter. He finished with eight total tackles.

Alcorn State got on the scoreboard first with Jacorian Sewell broke loose for a 65-yard touchdown run, giving the Braves a 7-0 lead with 6:21 left in the first quarter.

Reed Harradine gave GSU its first points of the day when connected on a 30-yard field goal on the Tigers' ensuing drive. Harradine made it a 7-6 game when he knocked 22-yard field goal with 10:53 remaining in the second quarter.

ASU stretched its advantage to 14-6 when quarterback Xzavier Vaughn found Stemarion Edwards for a 75-yard score with 9:32 remaining until halftime.

Grambling State pulled within two points of Alcorn State 38 seconds left in the third quarter when Talbert capped a 12-play, 63-yard drive with a 3-yard run. The two-point conversion attempt failed, making it a 14-12 game.

Harradine gave GSU its only lead of the game when he drilled a 44-yard field goal with 10:53 to go in the contest.

Alcorn State starting quarterback Xzavier Vaughn 10-for-18 for 149 yards with one touchdown and one interception. Jacorian Sewell ran for 102 yards and a touchdown on 13 carries.

GRAMBLING STATE 31, ARKANSAS-PINE BLUFF 21

GRAMBLING, La. | The Grambling State University football earned a hard-fought 31-21 victory over Arkansas-Pine Bluff, sending the homecoming crowd of 17,135 satisfied on Saturday afternoon at Eddie G. Robinson Memorial Stadium.

The victory gave GSU (4-3 overall, 1-2 SWAC) its first conference win of the season. It was also head coach Mickey Joseph's first SWAC win as a head coach. UAPB fell to 2-5 and 1-2 in the SWAC play.

The Tigers rolled up 310 yards on total offense with 175 coming through the air and 130 coming via the run game.

GSU starting quarterback Myles Crawley was an efficient 15-of-25 for 170 yards and one touchdown. His top receiving target was Javon Robinson who caught four passes for 28 yards, but it was tight end Marquis Harris who led the receiving corps in yards with one catch for 71 yards and a TD.

Backup QB Ashton Frye also saw action, completing 3-of-5 passes for five yards.

Three GSU running backs found the end zone on Saturday, with Ke'Travion Hargrove, Tre Bradford and Dedrick Talbert all finding pay dirt. Hargrove led the Tigers with 75 yards on 10 carries.

Andrew Jones and David Jones led the Grambling State defense. Andrew Jones registered a game-high 12 total tackles with 4.5 tackles for loss and 0.5 sacks. David Jones registered nine total stops, 0.5 TFLs and an interception.

Grambling State's first touchdown of the day was set up by a blocked punt by Marquis Harris, starting the scoring drive at the UAPB 21-yard line. Bradford gave the Tigers a 7-0 lead with 9:00 remaining in the quarter on a 7-yard run.

Arkansas-Pine-Bluff drove 75 yards on 13 plays on the ensuing, tying the game on a 2-yard TD reception by Isaac Jaxon with 4:34 on the clock.

GSU blacked its second punt of the game in the second quarter when Ken Pierre-Charles deflected a ball that rolled out of bounds at the Tigers' 35-yard line. Reed Harradine pushed GSU's lead to 10-7 on a 48-yard field goal with 10:29 to go until halftime. That score would remain going into the break.

Grambling State used a 12-play, 64-yard drive on its opening drive of the third quarter to push its lead to 17-7. Hargrove scored on a 15-yard scamper into the end zone.

After UAPB cut the lead to 17-14 with 3:39 to go in the third, GSU quickly responded when Crawley connected with Harris on a 71-yard touchdown pass, stretching Grambling's lead to 24-14 with 2:01 left in the quarter.

The Golden Lions continued to stick around, however. Arkansas-Pine Bluff made it a 24-21 game with 14:05 remaining in the game on a 12-yard TD pass from Mekhi Hagins to Kristian Gammage.

The Grambling State defense came up with the biggest stop of the game with 1:46 left. With UAPB backed up at their own 9-yard line and facing fourth and 12, David Jones batted a pass away from Golden Lions receiver Aramoni Rhone.

One play later, Dedrick Talbert sprinted into the end zone for a 9-yard score and secure the homecoming victory for the Tigers.

Arkansas-Pine Bluff tallied 332 total yards of offense with 230 of those coming through the air. Hagins led the UAPB air attack completing 27-of-41 passes with two TDs and one interception. He also added a rushing touchdown to his stat line.

The Golden Lions ran for 102 yards with Za'Marion Webber gaining 93 yards on 15 attempts.

TEXAS SOUTHERN 24, GRAMBLING STATE 17

GRAMBLING, La. | The Grambling State University football team suffered a 24-17 loss to Texas Southern on Saturday night at Shell Energy Stadium.

GSU fell to 4-4 overall and 1-3 in Southwestern Athletic Conference (SWAC) play, while TSU improved to 3-4 and 2-2 in the SWAC.

After an early injury to starting quarterback Myles Crawley on GSU's first drive of the game, Grambling State turned to backups Ashton Frye and Deljay Bailey to lead the offense. Bailey went 7-of-12 for 70 yards, adding 35 rushing yards and a touchdown on five

Frye completed his only pass attempt for four yards.

The G-Men relied primarily on its run game to pick up yards, rushing for 154 yards and two scores. Ke'Travion Hargrove led the ground game with 73 yards and a TD on 13 carries.

As a team, Grambling churned out 256 yards of total offense.

Calvin Henderson led the GSU defense with seven total tackles and five solo stops.

After Texas Southern forced a punt from GSU from its own end zone, TSU took a 7-0 lead on a 6-yard run by quarterback Jace Wilson with 14:22 left in the second quarter.

Later in the period, an interception by Joel Williams set GSU up near midfield at their 49-yard line. Reed Harradine got Grambling State on the board with a 38-yard field goal, cutting the deficit to 7-3 with 4:02 left in the half.

TSU stretched its lead to 14-3 before halftime when backup QB Jordan Davis connected with Donald McKinney on a 49-yard TD pass with 11 seconds on the clock.

On Grambling State's first drive of the third quarter, with backup QB Deljay Bailey in the game, the Tigers drove 78 yards on eight plays for their first touchdown of the game. The drive was capped by a 31-yard TD run by Ke'Travion Hargrove to make it a 14-10 game with 10:26 to go in the third quarter.

A 46-yard field goal by Gustavo Romero pushed Texas Southern's advantage to 17-10 with 4:41 to go in the third.

With 9:07 remaining in the fourth quarter, a 6-yard scamper by Bailey toed the game 17-17.

Texas Southern responded on the ensuing drive, taking nearly five minutes off the clock on a 10-yard play, and a 75-yard drive that was punctuated by a 2-yard touchdown run by Quinn Quintell to give TSU a 24-17 lead with 4:24 left.

GSU wasn't able respond on its next drive and Texas Southern escaped with the victory.

TSU gained 366 yards of offense with 189 of those yards coming on the ground.

Wilson was the key to TSU's offense, throwing for 128 yards on 11-of-18 attempts and running for 86 yards and a touchdown on 12 touches. Davis was 1-of-1 for 49 yards and a touchdown.

Javius Williams was Texas Southern's leading tackler with nine total tackles.

BETHUNE-COOKMAN 24, GRAMBLING STATE 21

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. | For the fourth time this season, the Grambling State University football team found itself on the wrong side of game that came down to the wire. GSU fell 24-21 to Bethune-Cookman at Daytona Stadium on Saturday.

Grambling State fell to 4-5 overall and 1-4 in the SWAC, while BCU improved to 2-7 overall and 2-3 in conference play.

All four of GSU's SWAC losses have been by seven points or less, wity three of those losses being by three points or less.

GSU starting quarterback Deljay Bailey was 18-of-33 for 206 with two interceptions.

Keilon Elder led GSU's rushing attack, churning out 50 yards and touchdown on eight carries. As a team, the Tigers ran for 122 yards.

Sophomore receiver Javon Robinson had a big day for Grambling State, catching seven passes for 91 yards and returning a punt for a 72-yard touchdown.

Andrew Jones tallied 11.0 total tackles with 2.0 tackles for loss.

On Bethune-Cookman's opening drive of the game, the Grambling State defense showed why it's one of the best in the nation at forcing turnover when Joel Williams picked off BCU's Luke Sprague at the GSU 17-yard line.

On Grambling State's second possession of the day, the Tigers drove 89 yards in eight plays for the first score of the day. Robinson's 39-yard reception to the

BCU 25-yard line set GSU up on the edge of the red zone. Two plays later, Keilon Elder scampered 22 yards for a touchdown, giving Grambling a 7-0 lead with 2:27 left in the first quarter.

GSU extended its advantage to 14-0 with five minutes remaining until halftime on a 72yard yard punt return by Robinson.

Bethune-Cookman made a 14-7 game just before the break when backup QB Cam Ransom found Thomas Nance for a 14-yard touchdown with 51 second on the clock.

Grambling State pushed its lead to 21-7 when Deljay Bailey took a quarterback keeper into the end zone for a 9-yard TD with 12:15 left in the third quarter.

BCU snatched momentum scoring 17 unanswered points in the third quarter. Cade Hetcher nailed a 40-yard field goal to make it 21-10 with 7:05 on the clock. That scored was followed by a 58-yard touchdown reception by Darnell Deas cutting GSU's lead to 21-17. Dennis Palmer added a 42-yard touchdown gallop, giving the Wildcats a 24-21 lead 10 seconds to go in the period.

After forcing a punt with 11:22 to go in the fourth, Grambling State took over at its own 5-yard line. The Tigers inched the ball downfield, using 15 plays to reach the Wildcats' 39-yard line. However, with GSU facing a 4thand 13, BCU's Caleb Blake picked off Bailey to give the Wildcats the ball at their own 32-yard line.

Bethune-Cookman worked the GSU 21-yard line. The Wildcats ended up attempting a 37yard field goal, but Calvin Henderson blocked it, giving GSU one more opportunity on offense. However, the Tigers threw another interception to hand the Wildcats the win.

BCU's Cam Ransom was nearly perfect on the day, completing 18-of-20 passes for 199 yards and two touchdowns.

Grambling State outgained Bethune-Cookman 328 to 315.

GRAMBLING STATE 24, ALABAMA STATE 23

GRAMBLING, La. | Grambling State used a 14-point fourth quarter to sprint past Alabama State 24-23 on Saturday afternoon at Eddie G. Robinson Memorial Stadium.

GSU (5-5 overall, 2-4 SWAC) trailed 23-10 heading into the final period but outscored the Hornets 14-0 in the fourth quarter to secure the win. Alabama State had a chance to snatch victory from the jaws of defeat, but kicker Brandon Gilliam missed a 28-yard field goal in the closing moments

Grambling State gave ASU (5-4, 4-2) a heavy dose of its run game, racking up a season-high 171 yards with three touchdowns. Senior Keilon Elder stepped up big in his final game at Robinson Stadium, sprinting for 104 yards and a touchdown on 17 carries.

Starting quarterback Deljay Bailey went 6-for-12 for 76 yards with an interception.

Defensively, Andrew Jones led the charge racking up 14 total tackles with seven solo stops and 2.0 tackles for loss. Freshman linebacker Jamal Jordan also came up big, making eight total tackles with one forced fumble and a fumble recovery.

The first points of the afternoon came via the big leg of Reed Harradine. Harradine drilled a 50-yard field, tied for his longest of the season, with 7:56 left in the first guarter to give the Tigers a 3-0 lead.

Alabama State responded with a 45-yard field goal by Gilliam with five seconds left in the opening period.

Grambling State drove 72 yards in 10 plays on the ensuing drive with Elder finishing it off with a 9-yard touchdown run to give the Tigers a 10-3 lead with 11:14 to go until halftime.

The Hornets tied the game once again with a 4-yard QB keeper by Kareem Keye, making it 10-10 with 7:39 until halftime. Grambling State seemingly regained the lead on a kickoff returned for a touchdown by Elder, but a holding call nullified the score.

After forcing GSU to punt, ASU took its first lead of the game, 17-10, with 3:21 remaining in the half on a 1-yard run by Keye. The Hornets added a field goal just before the half to carry a 20-10 lead into the break.

Gilliam extended ASU's advantage to 23-10 with a 22-yard field goal with 6:22 left in the third

With Grambling State facing 4th and 2 at the Alabama State 6-yard line with 13:47 to go in the fourth quarter, Tre Bradford burst through the middle of the Hornets defense for a touchdown to make it a 23-17 game.

Alabama State's Rhoody Jean-Louis came up with an interception at the GSU 47-vard line with 9:13 left in regulation, but freshman linebacker Jamal Jordan gave immediately gave the Tigers the ball back after strip sacking Keye an recovering the ball at the Alabama State 43-yard line.

After moving the ball to the Hornets 14-yard line, running back Dedrick Talbert toted the ball 14 yards to the end zone for the go-ahead TD, giving the Tigers a 24-23 lead with 6:19 to play.

Alabama State's began its final drive of the day at its own 20-yard line. The Hornets quickly marched down the field, setting up the potential game-winning field goal. Gilliam wasn't able to knock his fourth field goal of the day through the uprights, missing the 28-yard attempt wide right with 53 seconds remaining.

Keye completed 16-of-28 passes for 280 yards. He added six rushing yards and two rushing touchdowns.

Marcus Harris II led the Hornets on the ground, running for 68 yards on 16 carries.

ALABAMA A&M 22, GRAMBLING STATE 17

HUNTSVILLE, Ala. | The Grambling State University football team fell to Alabama A&M 22-17 on Thursday night at Louis Crew Stadium.

In what has become a familiar theme, GSU (5-6 overall, 2-5 SWAC) lost its fifth conference game by less the seven points. The Tigers, who held a 17-6 lead at halftime, were shut in the second half. Penalties and costly turnovers plagued GSU throughout the evening.

The Tigers were penalized 15 times for 134 yards and committed three turnovers.

Grambling State accumulated 263 yards of total offense with 169 yards coming through the air. Alabama A&M (5-5, 3-3) racked up 388 yards.

GSU quarterback Myles Crawley, who missed the Tigers previous two games with an injury, returned to the starting lineup on Thursday night. He was 12-for-27 for 169 yards, a touchdown and two interceptions. Javon Robinson was his top target with four catches for 44 yards.

Ke'Travion Hargrove led GSU on the ground with 38 yards on eight carries. GSU ran for 94 yards as a team. It was the first time since facing Tuskegee on Sept. 7 that the Tigers didn't eclipse 100 rushing yards.

Defensively, Andrew Jones continued to prove why he's one of the best linebackers in the nation, racking up a game-high 15 total tackles, five solo stops, one tackle for loss and fumble returned for a touchdown.

After forcing a punt on AAMU's opening drive, Crawley's first pass attempt of the game was picked off by Dorian Wesley. The Bulldogs couldn't turn the takeaway into points.

On Grambling State's drive of the game, Jalen Johnson took a screen pass 67 yards to the Alabama A&M 7-yard line, giving GSU a prime scoring opportunity. The Tigers ended up settling for a 23-yard field goal from Reed Harradine to take a 3-0 lead with 8:31 to go in the first quarter.

Alabama A&M's Austin McCready tied the game 3-3 on a 45-yard field goal with 2:07 remaining in the opening period.

GSU jumped back in the lead early in the second quarter with Jalen Rudolph strip sacked Cornelius Brown. Andrew Jones scooped up the loose ball and sprinted 30 yards for a touchdown, giving GSU a 10-3 lead with 14:06 on the clock. It was Grambling State's fifth defensive score of the season.

The Tigers extended its lead to 17-3 with Crawley connected with JR Waters for a 10-yard TD pass with 10:09 left until halftime.

Alabama A&M's Victor Barbosa added a 38-yard field goal as time expired to make it a 17-6 game at the break.

Grambling State opened the second half with the ball, but a fumble by Dedrick Talbert gave the Bulldogs the ball at the Tiger 34-yard line. AAMU immediately made GSU pay when Brown threw a 34-yard dart to Keenan Hambrick. The Bulldogs converted a two-point conversion, cutting GSU's lead to 17-14 with 13:49 to go in the third quarter.

Alabama A&M tied the game 17-17 on a 44-yard field goal by Barbosa with 7:04 left the period. The Bulldogs took its first lead of the night on a safety with 46 seconds on the clock. With Grambling State lining up to punt from its own 25-yard line, an errant snap sailed over punter Johnny Schifano's head and through the end zone.

AAMU extended its advantage to 22-17 on a 19-yard field goal by Barbosa.

On Grambling State's next drive, with the Tigers facing 4th and 15 from its on 44-yard line, GSU had a chance to move the ball into Bulldog territory, but a dropped pass at the Alabama A&M 40-yard line resulted in turnover on downs with 3:22 on the clock.

GSU had a once more opportunity to mount a game-winning drive, regaining possession on its own 4-yard line with 1:44 left in the game. However, Crawley was intercepted on first down by Kaleb Dawson.

Brown completed 20-of-35 passes for 228 yards and a touchdown. Donovan Eaglin paced the Alabama A&M run game, rushing for 123 yards on 25 carries.

Hambrick caught eight passes for 99 yards and a TD for the Bulldogs.

NEW ORLEANS, La. | The Grambling State University football team suffered a 24-14 loss to archrival Southern University in the 51st Bayou Classic on Saturday afternoon at the Caesars Superdome.

GSU (5-7 overall, 2-6 SWAC) struggled to find consistency on offense, gaining a season-low 148 yards of total offense. On the other side of the ball, the Tigers had no answer for Southern's rushing attack, surrendering 209 yards on the ground.

Grambling State's Myles Crawley and Deljay Bailey both saw action at quarterback. Crawley was 6-for-16 for 34 yards and an interception, while Bailey went 5-for-8 for 65 yards.

Keilon Elder paced the GSU running game, churning out 47 yards and a touchdown on 10 carries.

Bryce Cage earned the Bayou Classic MVP for the defense after registering nine total tackles, with 2.5 tackles for loss. Andrew Jones notched another double-digit tackle game, logging 10 total stops.

Grambling State's special teams unit started the game on fire, when Ken Pierre-Charles blocked SU's first

Southern broke the scoreless tie on a 2-yard run by CJ Russell with 5:20 left in the first quarter. The TD was set up by 42-yard reception by Chandler Whitefield.

In the second quarter, the Jaguars stretched their lead to 10-0 on a 26-yard field goal by Joshua Griffin with 9:37 to go until halftime.

Tylon Williams gave the Tigers a spark when he returned the ensuing kickoff 98 yards for a touchdown. Reed Harradine split the uprights on the PAT making it a 10-7 game with 9:07 left in the half.

Both defenses stepped up to keep the score set at 10-7 heading into halftime.

The third quarter got off to a rocky start for the Tigers after Crawley was picked off by SU's Herman Brister at the GSU 45-yard line on the first play from scrimmage. Grambling State's defense held the Jaguars to a field goal attempt that was blocked by Blake Davis and returned to the Tigers' 49-yard line.

Neither team scored again until SU's Whitfield took a pass from Jalen Woods 41 yards for a touchdown, growing the Jaguars lead to 17-7 with 2:04 left in the third quarter. Whitfield caught five passes for 146 yards.

Grambling State responded on its ensuing drive on a 4-yard TD tun by Keilon Elder, making it a 17-14 game with 13:13 remining in the fourth quarter.

Southern's Kendric Rhymes put the game away on a 45-yard touchdown run with 3:24 left.

The Tigers did get one more possession, but a three and out ended any hopes of a comeback.

SU's Jalen Woods threw for 188 yards, one touchdown and one interception on 9-of-17 attempts. Kendric Rhymes ran for 110 yards and a TD on 12 carries.



Eddie G. Robinson Memorial Stadium is a 19,600-seat multi-purpose stadium in Grambling, La. The stadium opened in 1983 and is named in honor of famous Grambling State University head football coach, Eddie G. Robinson. It replaced Grambling Stadium. The stadium is oftentimes affectionately referred to as "The Hole" due to the topography of the stadium area.

In 2017, approximately \$2 million worth of stadium upgrades were completed. Included in the upgrades $were\ installing\ new\ artificial\ turf,\ a\ new\ larger\ scoreboard,\ additional\ parking\ and\ additional\ tailgating\ areas.$



For legendary Grambling State University football coach Eddie G. Robinson, football was always the driving force motivating one of the most successful men to ever have set foot on a football field.

Coach Robinson spent 57 seasons consistently fielding stellar football teams and guiding his young charges to successful lives both on and off the gridiron. He earned an unprecedented 408 college football victories to set the NCAA's benchmark for wins in Division I. Coach Robinson retired with an overall record of 408 wins, 165 losses and 15 ties. More than 200 of his players went on to play in the National Football League, including Super Bowl XXII MVP quarterback Doug Williams, who would ultimately succeed Robinson as Grambling's head coach in 1998.

Though the ultra-successful Coach Robinson has always remained humble, crediting his players, his family, his loving wife Doris, the media and football fans from all over the world with making the name Eddie Robinson synonymous with the best that college football has to offer.

On October 7, 1995, Coach Robinson became the first college football coach to break the 400-win barrier, a mark once thought to be unreachable. The 42-6 triumph over Mississippi Valley State came before a national television audience on ESPN2.

"Nobody has ever done or will do what Eddie Robinson has done for this game," legendary Penn State football coach Joe Paterno said. "Our profession will never, ever be able to repay Eddie Robinson for what he has done for this country and the profession of football."

Time after time Coach Robinson proved that hard work, dedication and determination could lead to unimaginable accomplishments.

Neither of Coach Robinson's parents graduated from high school, but they encouraged their son's desire to stay in school and earn a college degree. A young Robinson moved on

from high school to become a quarterback at Leland College under Reuben Turner, a Baptist preacher who introduced Robinson to the concepts of playbooks and coaching clinics.

With no coaching opportunities available following college, Robinson took a job in the Baton Rouge feed mill before learning from a relative that there was an opening for a football coach at Louisiana Negro Normal and Industrial Institute, later to become Grambling State University. After an interview with school president Dr. Ralph Waldo Emerson Jones, Robinson was chosen as the sixth head football coach of the Tigers.

It didn't take Coach Rob, as he is affectionately known, long to prove his worth. Following his initial season, Coach Robinson took command and dismissed some players who he felt were not living up to expectations. The results came soon thereafter, as the next season Coach Robinson's team posted a perfect 9-0 season with the team going undefeated, untied and unscored upon. Grambling was only the second collegiate team to have shut out every opponent, a feat which has not been repeated since.

By 1949, Grambling's football program was receiving national acclaim after former Tigers running back Paul "Tank" Younger signed with the Los Angeles Rams of the National Football League, this becoming the first player from a historically black college to be taken to the NFL.

In 1955, Grambling claimed the National Black College Championship by going 10-0 (the best record in school history) and outscoring opponents by a 356-61 margin. After picking up his 100th career coaching victory against Bethune-Cookman in 1957, Coach Robinson and his Tigers joined the Southwestern Athletic Conference (SWAC) in 1959. The following season he led the Tigers to the first of 17 SWAC titles under his guidance.

Another of Robinson's former Tigers made NFL waves in 1963, as the late Junious "Buck" Buchanan became the first player from a Historically Black College and University (HBCU) to have been chosen first overall in the NFL Draft.

By 1984, Coach Robinson was poised to become college football's winningest coach. After surpassing Amos Alonzo Stagg's 314 coaching victories that year, he tied legendary coach Paul "Bear" Bryant's 323-win mark with a 23-6 win over Oregon State before becoming the career wins leader the next week with a 27-7 win over Prairie View A&M.

Coach Robinson finally relinquished his reigns to the tigers following the 1997 season, but his contribution to the game will be remembered forever. Also during the same year, he was officially inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame.

The Football Writers of America's Coach of the Year award is named after Coach Robinson. Grambling also named its football stadium, Robinson Stadium.

Robinson graduated from McKinley Senior High School in Baton Rouge, Louisiana in 1937. He went on to earn his bachelor's degree from Leland College of Baker, Louisiana, then went on to obtain his master's degree from the University of Iowa in 1954. He passsed away on April 3, 2007.

It was a simple twist of fate just after World War II, a lack of communication never connected.


The end result, however, was the building of an award-winning career in sports information that spanned 30 years and played an immeasurable role in developing the world-wide reputation of one of America's best known black colleges, Grambling State University.

Collie J. Nicholson was fresh out of the Marines finishing a three-year stint in the South Pacific during World War II when he and a friend made a stop at Grambling State. They were really on their way north to the University of Wisconsin, but it was years before anyone at Grambling knew the story.

Nicholson, who had started school at Grambling before the war, ran into the school's president, Ralph Waldo Emerson Jones, during his brief stopover. Having known Collie when he first attended Grambling, "Prez", as he was affectionately known, invited him to his office to discuss some ideas for the young journalist.

Not wanting to tell Prez he was actually on his way to another school, Collie went to the bus stop, grabbed his bags and headed to the dorm. More than 30 years later, in 1978, Collie J. Nicholson retired as the school's only sports information director and more than that, one of the profession's most creative members.

In the summer of 2002, nearly 25 years after retiring, Nicholson was named the recipient of the prestigious College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) Trailblazer Award. This award is given annually to a pioneer in the field of sports information who has mentored and helped improve the level of ethnic and gender diversity within

What Collie accomplished was to put Grambling on the map around the world. When he started his job Collie convinced Prez all he really needed were stamps, envelope and stationery, plus a trusty typewriter.

He began by sending advances to 400 black newspapers nationwide. After football games, he would drive 75 miles to Shreveport Western Union Station, where he would wire the stories to selected newspapers across the country. Collie's reports made every game, regardless of the outcome, sound exciting. Through his creative writing style, more and more papers ran accounts of Grambling's games.

But Nicholson with the support of President Jones and Eddie G. Robinson, envisioned a much bigger picture, and he rarely

accepted a no when it came to developing ideas that would further spread the word about Grambling athletics.

In the 1960's he pounded the pavement of New York City, looking for sponsors who would help stage a football game in Yankee Stadium, pitting Grambling against another team from a black college. It wasn't easy, but Collie with his "never quit" efforts found the sponsors and in 1968 Grambling and Morgan State played before 64,000 fans in a packed-to-the-brim Yankee Stadium.

Television was another target Collie set in his sights. Some might say he hounded the national networks, but whatever he did, it worked. ABC signed on and televised its first football game between the two black colleges.

Collie also believed Grambling could take its football team and well-known marching band on the road to capture attention. Over the years and through his persistence, Grambling broke ground with appearances in huge venues like Pittsburgh's Three Rivers Stadium, Detroit Silverdome and the Louisiana (New Orleans) Superdome.

The now traditional Bayou Classic was also a product of Collie's efforts. In 1974, he convinced officials at both Grambling and Southern University that they could create something special by moving their annual game to New Orleans. Before long, the classic was born, and the game was played before capacity crowds.

Nicholson also took great pride in the Tiger Marching Band. He considered the band and the athletic teams as a marriage and promoted them as one package. It was Nicholson who garnered exposure for the band in three Super Bowl games and a 14-day tour to Liberia. He also arranged for Grambling State football games to be played in Tokyo, Japan, in 1976 and 1977 with part of the draw the now well-known Tiger Marching Band. While building support for the Tokyo package in the mid-1970's, Collie learned Japanese so he would not embarrass himself, the school or his hosts in Japan.

It is Nicholson's efforts that helped the Los Angeles Rams discover Paul "Tank" Younger, the first player from a black college to make it in the National Football League. He launched the Heisman and All-America campaign for Doug Williams when he finished fourth in the Heisman race and was a first team All-America selection by the A.P. — which was a first for any athlete from a black school.

When Collie was not knocking on doors, he was producing unique and award-winning press guides, with recognition from the NCAA, NAIA and CoSIDA. Two of his publications were voted best in the nation. He also served for several years as the sports information director of the Southwestern Athletic Conference.

Nicholson is a member of the Grambling State University Hall of Fame and following his career was recognized with numerous awards, including the Distinguised Service Award in Sports Journalism by the Louisiana Sports Writers Association in 1990.

Nicholson, 85, died peacefully in Shreveport, Louisiana on September 13, 2006.

Dennis the Menance (GSU: 1948-1978)



Albert Dennis III was born June 24, 1951, at Independence in south Louisiana and honed his skills as an Iarrupin' lineman at Greenville Park High School in Hammond.

"His daddy was a tackle, too, and was captain of the team with 'Tank' Younger," recalls Eddie Robinson. "We were in a hot battle with Tulane trying to get young Albert but we hung on and signed him. His daddy was upset over publicity. He said we were making Albert an All-American and he had not played one down."

There were photos in the newspapers on the signing, and the press. His daddy said he had never gotten that kind of recognition.

Like his father, Albert as a senior would captain the Tigers and would also be named a second team All-American by the Pittsburgh Courier. And this was not just a "Fat Albert." He was solid and tough, big and quick. He came on like gangbusters after a leg injury sidetracked his sophomore campaign, crashing onto the All-SWAC team as a junior.

Albert was easily recognizable with a "curious straddling gait," and he was conscientious when it came to protecting quarterback Matt Reed. Eager to learn and easy to teach, Albert was a devastating tackle on a 1972 club that won 10 of 12 game including a 56-6 walloping of North Carolina Central in the Pecan Bowl.

The Tigers of 1972 were overloaded with standout lineman. On offense there were Willie Robinson, Andrew Jackson, Bobby Simon and Dennis. On defense the front four included Robert Barber, Gary Johnson, Jesse O'Neal and Sylvester Bates.

Dennis was also sharp in the classroom, an honor student who earned his degree in marketing. Paired down to 250 pounds, with an eye on playing guard in the NFL, Albert hooked on with the Cowboys as a free agent in 1973, but before he could pack his bags for Dallas he was waived and claimed by San Diego. He played in seven games for the Chargers and caught the eyes of line coach Forrest Gregg. When Forrest joined Cleveland



the following season, young Dennis was given a brief trial in September. When Gregg took over as head coach of the Browns in 1975, he remembered Al, who would see guard service in 1976 and 1977.

Albert Jr., in the meantime, would have to content himself with recognition as an outstanding high school coach in New Orleans and at BTW and Green Oaks High School in Shreveport.

In November of 2000 Dennis was appointed director of athletics at Grambling State University after serving a 10 month stint as the interim AD. Dennis, a veteran of the Grambling athletic department for over 25 years, brought an extensive background and keen sense and knowledge of the Grambling athletic program, having served as business services manager, athletic coordinator and auxiliary/athletic accountant.

He received his bachelor's degree in business administration from Grambling in 1972 and a master's in sports administration in 1982. Dennis is a member of several organizations, including the College Athletic Business Management Association, the Louisiana Athletic Business Management Association and Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc.

Dennis is married to the former Sarah Dangerfield and is the proud father of three GSU graduates, Swanie (1995), Kadar (2002, 2004) and Blythe (2011).

"The Buck" stops here (GSU: 1959-1962)



Junious "Buck" Buchanan. That says it all. "Our first, first round draft choice," reminds

For thirteen years he was an awesome defensive tackle for the Kansas City Chiefs. But, it was not Kansas City that made Buck the first ever player chosen in the inaugural American Football League Draft in 1963.


That honor went to Oakland; the Raiders subsequently transferring their claim on Buck to the Chiefs. He was the first player from Grambling State to have ever been selected in the first round of the NFL Draft.

With that generally-ignored fact disposed of, turn your attention to now one of the greatest defensive linemen who ever tightened a chin strap. He came in at 6-foot-6 and 225 pounds as a freshman, class of '59 at Grambling. He went out a 6-foot-7 and 275-pound behemoth as a 13-year Chief in 1975.

In between, he demolished everything in sight and climbed the peak of his profession in two Super Bowls. "Someone called me one night," remembers Eddie of his introduction to Buchanan, who was born September 10, 1940 in Gainesville, Ala., but would play his prep ball at Parker High School in Birmingham. "The man said, 'There is a football player here you need.' I said, 'Who?' He said, Junious Buchanan."

Arrangements were made for Buchanan to enroll at Grambling in mid-semester. "He came in and weighed 210 pounds," fondly recalls Robinson. "Ernie Ladd was coming off of a knee injury. Ladd, before Buck got here, was our fastest interior lineman. When Buck got here, he and Ladd would be fighting to the tape.

"But to be honest, I didn't think Buck would be much of a ball player because he had his foot in a bucket. It didn't look like he could move with lateral movement. Then we would start running our plays. If we went to the right he would tackle us. If we went to the left he would tackle us. . . Boy, he was really



tough."

Buchanan checked in at Grambling with a skilled freshman group that included the ill-fated Stone Johnson, Lane Howell, Fred Collins, Bob Burton, Willie Brown, Charles Cook and colorful Willie "Special Touchdown" Houston. Older backfield star Jamie Caleb, fullback Preston Powell, punter Curtis Cotton and the ponderous Ladd. There also a half-dozen scintillating sophomores—Clifton McNeil, Jerry Robinson, Roosevelt Taylor, Garland Boyette, Leon Simmons and Eugene Hughes.

It was, for the most part, a young ball club in the making. After struggling through a 4-6 season in 1959, the Tigers took off on the turn into the '60s. They posted a 23-5-2 record during Buck's three seasons through 1962. Buck was named an All-American all three seasons, was elected team captain and in 1961 was voted lineman of the year in the Southwestern Athletic Conference (SWAC). That same year, he was named to the SWAC All-Academic team for maintaining a 3.20 grade point averagewhile majoring in physical education.

Also while at Grambling State, Buck participated in both basketball and track and field as a member of the sprint relay teams in addition to playing football. In 1968, he was inducted into the NAIA Hall of Fame.

He was just starting to make waves. After playing for the 1963 College All-Star squad that upset Green Bay's mighty Packers, he joined the Chiefs. It was Buchanan who cemented the tremendous defenses fashioned by Coach Hank Stram. Up front, Buck would battle ferociously for a decade alongside Jerry Mays, Paul Rochester, Aaron Brown, Curley Culp and for brief stretches Grambling teammates Al Dotson and Ernie Ladd. Behind them roamed linebackers Bobby Bell, Willie Lanier, "Beast" Holub and Jim Lynch. Further back would lurk Dave Grayson, Willie Mitchell, Johnny Robinson, Fred "The Hammer" Williamson, Emmitt Thomas, Jime Marsalis, Jim Kearney and Grambling ex Goldie Sellers. Right there in the middle of it all was team captain Buck Buchanan. Among his feats: -Played in the first AFC-NFC Pro Bowl game in 1970, also the first Pro Bowl of 1971.

- Voted the Chiefs' Most Valuable Player in 1965 in 1967.
- Named to All-AFL teams in 1967 through 1969 and the All-NFC squad in 1970.
- Played in six straight AFL All-Star games from 1964 through 1969.
- Played in AFL Championship games in 1966 and 1969, followed by Super Bowls I and IV.

Those were just samplings. It was worth noting that Buck also played in all but one of 182 regular season games scheduled by the Chiefs. He missed his first game in 1974 with a broken hand. Despite the injury, he played in 13 of the team's 14 games.

Away from the playing fields, Buck was active in civic affairs, serving as director of the Kansas State Special Olympics for mentally and physically retarded children in 1972 through 1975.

After peeling off his pads a final time, Buck hooked on as an assistant coach with the New Orleans Saints. Buck had finally stopped here in Louisiana. He was officially inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1990. He passed away on July 16, 1992, after a long battle against lung cancer.

Buchanan was inducted into the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame on August 17, 1996. He was also inducted into the American Football League, Louisiana Sports and Southwestern Athletic Conference Hall of Fame.

The Sports Network national news service named its national NCAA Division I-AA Defensive Player of the Year award in his honor.

WILLIE BROWN WILLIE BROWN

He was no 'Assassin' (GSU:1959-62)




Yazoo City, Mississippi, is probably best know in these parts for three native sons. . country philosopher Jerry Clower, positive thinker Zig Zigler and football cornerback William Freddie Brown.

Willie Brown played 16 years in the American and National Football Leagues and picked off a record 54 interceptions. He was the only player in NFL history to intercept at least one pass in 16 consecutive seasons, which puts him three years up on the nearest challengers Emlen Tunnell, Dick "Night Train" Lane, Larry Wilson and Jimmy Johnson.

That, in itself, is very select company in the NFL. Beyond that, Willie also played a dozen seasons in an Oakland defensive backfield with two of the most ferocious head-hunters in the business — George Atkinson and Jack Tatum.

It was Tatum who wrote the book, "They Call Me Assassin."

Brown was never an "assassin" all those years he dressed out as one of the guys who wore black with the Raiders. Willie would hit you hard enough, but his forte was finesse. Steal the ball and run. Twice he scored touchdowns on interception returns in playoff games against Miami in 1970 and Pittsburgh in 1973. However, the play that he is most recognized for was the 75-yard interception that he returned for a touchdown in the Raid-



ers' 32-14 victory over the Minnesota Vikings in Super Bowl XI in 1977.

Willie did not even look malicious. He looked like a guy who you would vote for as senior class president, which he was at Grambling.

"Tom Williams recruited Willie Brown," recalls Eddie Robinson. "He went into Mississippi and got him over some other schools. From the very beginning, Willie was just a clean-cut athlete, extremely fast. We played him as an end. He was one of the guys with great ability. It was not real important where we put him. He could have been a great running back, or a great tight end, because he was an exceptional blocker. And he had character."

Solidly built at 6-foot-1 and 210 pounds, Willie was spotted at split end "because he was beating everybody on the deep passes with his speed" and he played outside line-backer on defense. He was a Tiger from 1959 through 1962, won four letters and picked up another two block G's with the track team. In the classroom, he earned a degree in health and physical education.

Willie could run with the best in his day, but hardly anyone noticed because his college career paralleled those of Olympian sprinter Stone Johnson and "Gray Ghost" Jerry Robinson. The team's tailback Don Stephenson, once returned a kickoff 100 yards for a touchdown in Shreveport.

"On that particular team, almost the whole defensive group got into pro football," reminds Robinson. "(Ernie) Ladd, (Buck) Buchanan, Lane Howell, Simmons, Boyette, Wilson, (Goldie) Sellers and Rosey Taylor."

It was easy to see why Willie got lost in the crowd. And it explains why the Houston Oilers landed him as a free agent in 1963.

But he was cut loose by the Oilers — we all make mistakes — and picked up by Denver during that same August. Willie played four seasons with the Broncos, intercepting nine passes as a professional sophomore in 1964 and holding a school reunion in 1966 when he was joined in the Denver secondary by old mates Goldie Sellers and Nemiah Wilson. That may have been Grambling's finest hour for producing defensive backs, three regulars on the same pro club. The old gang was broken up a month after the season ended, however. Willie and Louisiana Tech quarterback Mickey Slaughter were traded to Oakland. It was a start of a lasting relationship. Willie, born December 2, 1940, was 26 years old when he joined the "pride and poise" Raiders. When he hung up his tack, he was 38.

Using guile, a dash of speed and a bushel of experience, Willie in 12 seasons with the Raiders intercepted a total of 39 passes, which is a club record. One year, he helped the Raiders to set an all-time theft record at 35. He played in five AFL All-Star games and four NFL Pro Bowls. He captained the Raiders on defense and in 1969, won the Gorman Award as the "player who best exemplifies the pride and spirit of the Oakland Raiders." He still shares an NFL record with four interceptions in one game November 15, 1964

Willie Brown was a winner all the way. Eight years in postseason championship playoffs including Super Bowl II.

"He was just a real good football player," says Eddie Robinson.

against the New York Jets.

Brown was officially inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1984. In addition, he was honored as one of the Best Black College Athletes of All-Time by Family Digest magazine in July of 2004. He is also a member of the American Football League, Louisiana Sports, Grambling State, SWAC and Mississippi Sports Hall of Fame.

The Means to an End (GSU:1952-55)



Was there ever a more awesome sight on the playing fields of the NFL than the sweeping strength thrown into battle by the Green Bay Packers of the 1960's?

The legions drummed together by Vince Lombardi six times barreled into the league's championship game during the decade and five times emerged triumphant, including a string of three in a row from 1965-67.

Ten years later there would come another dynasty, forged by the Pittsburgh Steelers. The Steelers would hit with the big play. The Packers would hurt you for sixty minutes. Little finesse, more like brute strength. Bart Starr operated with surgical precision, handing the ball off to Jim Taylor and Paul Hornung behind pulverizing blocks laid down by Jerry Kramer, Fuzzy Thurston, Forrest Gregg and Bill Curry.

And the defense. In the 14-game season of 1966, the Packers gave up 163 points, less than twelve a game. Nobody ran through much daylight against the likes of Ray Nitschke, Lee Roy Caffey, Dave Robinson, Herb Adderly, Herb Adderley, Willie Wood and Willie Delford Davis.

A legendary football game, and Willie Davis was right there in the middle. Actually, Willie hung around the fringes. He played end, a gentle giant at 6-foot-3 and 245 pounds. Gentle, that is, until he strapped on his helmet.


Willie was a classic performer as a defensive lineman, probably the best he has ever seen, says Eddie Robinson. Born in Lisbon, Arkansas on July 24, 1934, he prepped at Booker T. Washington High School in Texarkana.

"We finally convinced his Mama," Robinson recalls of the recruiting. "We promised her that we would see that he got to Sunday school and church. When we told her that, he didn't have a chance."

Young Davis may have been genteel on the Sabbath, but he was less than gentle on Saturdays.

"At first, while he was here," remembers Robinson, "he wanted to play end. He weighed around 210, 215. But we changed him to guard. That was in 1952."

As a guard, Willie was a two-time black college All-American in 1954-55. With him



in the lineup in 1955, Grambling would win its first national championship (eleven more would follow through to the present day).

The 1955 season was culminated by a trip to the Orange Blossom Classic.

"We were invited to Tallahassee to play Florida A&M University," reflects Robinson. "They were outstanding with Willie Galimore and Adolphus Frazier. Each of them scored 16 touchdowns that year. They were really tough."

The Rattlers also fielded an All-American guard, Carl Crowell.

Grambling was no slouch, either, having gone unbeaten through nine games without breaking a sweat.

"We had Bo Murray," agrees Robinson. "On the first play of the game Bo went back to throw a pass and he faked a run to fullback Leon Gafford. This tackle from Florida broke it up. He said after the tackle, 'I'm up for All-America, so don't come this way again.' On the next play, Murray called a trap. Willie came form the opposite side and he really trapped this boy. When Willie got up, he said 'You're up for All-American? I can see why you're not going to make it.' Willie had hitting power. And he was our captain, an outstanding leader."

Grambling turned back FAMU by 28-21. More important for Willie, scouts who had been dispatched by the Cleveland Browns to analyze Galimore went back home singing the praises of Davis. The Browns had an inside track. Ruston's Dub Jones, who had been a great running back for Cleveland, once scoring six touchdowns in a single game, had begun working with Willie on the blocking sled.

"And Tank Younger in Los Angeles was predicting that Davis was going to be a player," reminds Robinson.

The Browns, encouraged by their Orange Blossom eyewitnesses and Dub Jones' recommendation, drafted Willie in the 15th round of the 1956 draft, thus making him the first ever player in Grambling history to have ever been drafted. It does not sound like a high ranking now, but this was less than seven years after Younger had become the first black college player to join an NFL team. Before joining the Browns, however, Willie had more pressing business; he picked up his bachelor of science degree in industrial arts in the spring of 1956, then fulfilled a military obligation over a two-year stretch. By 1958 he was free to sign with the Browns.

Cleveland, like Green Bay in later years, was then a powerhouse under coach Paul Brown. Try Jim Brown for starters, and add Bobby Mitchell and Lou Groza. Thrown into a defensive line company with the likes of Paul Wiggins, Bob Gain, Don Colo and Henry Jordan, rookie Davis played in all 24 games over two seasons before being traded to the Packers for end A.D. Williams in 1960.

He would spend ten seasons in Green Bay before his retirement at age 36. Davis never missed a kickoff in his dozen years as a professional player in 286 games including 262 as a Packer. Three times he was tabbed as a Western Conference All-Star, during the glory years from 1965 through 1967. He would play in no less than five Pro Bowls. He was there when Green Bay whipped Kansas City 35-10 in the first Super Bowl, and when the Packers routed Oakland 33-14 in Super Bowl II. He was on the premises, too, when the Packers outskidded Dallas 21-17 in the 1967 Ice Bowl at Green Bay. Willie also captained the Packers.

There were not many places Willie Davis could not go, if he had a mind to. And he had a mind. He received his master's degree in business administration in 1968 from the University of Chicago and is now a successful businessman in Los Angeles, California.

Davis was officially inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1981.

On and On and On, Etc. (GSU:1968-69)



Charles Joiner Jr. was once described as the quintessential professional.

"From the way he conducts himself in each practice each day to the manner in which he runs his precise pass patterns," explained the front office people in San Diego, a western bastion of the National Football League. The Chargers' owner, Eugene Klein, and this is according to the gospel as preached by Eddie Robinson, "thinks the sun rises and sets on Charlie Joiner."

Sufficient reason exists for the affection. Since joining the Chargers in April of 1976—an even swap for defensive lineman Coy Bacon bringing him from Cincinnati—Charlie has grabbed 190 passes as a favorite companion of quarterback Dan Fouts. Net worth of same, 3,213 yards spread over four seasons. It means, too that Charlie has been good for 17 yards a pop every time he gets his sensitive hands on the football.

There is an added dimension, in that Charlie's best season as a wide receiver with the Chargers came in 1979 when he caught 72 passes for 1,008 yards in the wide-open aerial bombardment navigated by Fouts. Charlie at the time was 32 going on 33, and we are not talking about his uniform number.

Charlie for the record, turned 33 on October 14, 1980, and there he was still running those "precise patterns" and eluding defensive backs in San Diego. He knew all the steps, having gone about this business for 12 years since coming off the dusty drillfields at Grambling.

"Charlie goes all out," says an admiring Robinson. "He spends a lot of time with young receivers, too. He has a lot of class."

Joiner, born in Many, LA, turned up at Grambling after impressing his prep coach, Wiley Stewart, at W.O. Boston High School in Lake Charles.



"Stewart once told us Charlie was a good receiver and he could play," Robinson recalls. "He teamed here with James Harris. There it was, touchdown after touchdown."

"Charlie, had some of Dub Jones' influence, too. Dub told me one day that Charlie Joiner ran some of the finest patterns he'd ever seen. Beating the man, that's where he excelled."

Charlie, not overly large at 5-foot-11 and 188 pounds, but blessed with 4.4 speed over 40 yards, learned his trade from the very best while at Grambling. He ran his patterns in summer workouts against Willie Brown, then an established cornerback with Oakland, and he was lectured on offensive strategy by both Dub Jones and Clifton McNeil, at the time an all-league receiver with San Francisco.

This football education coincided with the arrival at Grambling of a 200-pound quarter-back out of Monroe, the man called James Harris. Harris between 1965 and 1968, would deliver 289 pass completions for 4,705 yards and 53 touchdowns. And Joiner caught his share—78 receptions— along with Bob Atkins, Frank Lewis, Essex Johnson and big tight end Terry Williams.

The Tigers went 23-6-1 in three years with Harris throwing downfield to Joiner and others. An All-Southwestern Athletic Conference finish as a senior drew the interest of Houston, and the Oilers made Charlie a fourth round choice in the combined AFL-NFL Draft of 1969. Joiner as a rookie impressed the Oilers with "fluid moves, excellent hands and the ability to make the tough catch in the crowd," but a broken arm derailed him for most of the 1969 season and part of 1970.

Once healed, he led the Oilers with seven touchdowns and 681 receiving yards in 1971. "Just a matter of time before he reaches stardom," predicted the Oilers.

Patience, however, was not to be an Oiler virtue, and Charlie, along with linebacker Ron Pritchard, was dispatched to Cincinnati six games into the 1972 season in exchange for running backs Fred Willis and Paul Robinson.

Reunited with Essex Johnson and deployed with standout receiver Isaac Curtis, Joiner would be an integral part of the Bengals' attack arsenal for three years, catching 37 passes for 726 yards in 1975. His first season in San Diego, 1976, he hauled in 50 throws for 1,056 yards—better than 20 yards per catch—and played in the Pro Bowl.

Not bad for a 29-year old gaffer who was back on the same side with old buddy James Harris.

In eleven seasons, Charlie had chalked off 6,156 yards and 38 touchdowns on the payoff end of 354 long shots lobbed behind some of the best deepbacks in the league. And he will keep on catching them because he is good at it. It is something he likes to do. He does not have to do this for a living; he earned his degree in accounting in 1969 and is a ten-year man with Gulf Oil in Houston. Joiner is currently working as the receivers coach with the Kansas City Chiefs.

But quitting in mid-stride, that is not Charlie Joiner. He finished his pro career by catching 750 passes for 12,146 yards and 65 touchdowns while averaging 16.2 yards per catch. He also had 50 or more receptions in seven years and 70 or more catches for three of those seasons.

Charlie Joiner was officially inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in July 1996.

In the North, A Star (GSU:1972-75)



You could call him Sammie. Or you could call him Sammy. Whatever. But make no mistake about the last name-White.

"Frank Lewis and Sammie White had so much in common," submits Eddie Robinson." Either one could take a screen pass...and score."

Sammie, from 1972 through 1975, scored 43 touchdowns, one more than Frank. Sammie also caught 26 career touchdown passes, eight more than Frank. Where Lewis' name used to be in the record books, it has been replaced by White.

Sammie's tenure at Grambling spanned three quarterbacks - Matt Reed, Joe Comeaux and Doug Williams - and with this arsenal of firepower the Tigers forgot how to lose. They went 10-2 in 1972 and whipped North Carolina Central, 56-6, in the Pelican Bowl; finished 10-3 in 1973 while dumping Delaware, 17-8 in the Boardwalk Bowl; closed at 11-1 in 1974 while routing South Carolina State, 28-7, in the Pelican Bowl; and rumbled to a 10-1 record in 1975. Grand total in wins and losses: 41-7.

One of the 1973 losses came in the NCAA playoff, a 28-20 heartbreaker against Western Kentucky in the Grantland Rice Bowl.

Born March 16, 1954, in Winnsboro, Sammie prepped at Richwood High School in Mon-

"We watched him all the way," says Robinson. "We knew what he could do. He was almost unbelievable in high school..."

Not as unbelievable as he would become at Grambling. Sammie had deceptive speed his time for the 40-yard dash was 4.6 - but beyond that he had exceptional moves and reflexes.

"His first year he took over at wingback in his fourth game," remembers Robinson. "He was a climax runner and could make the big play."



Sammie was compactly constructed at 5-foot-11 and 189 pounds. Three times he was voted All-SWAC; twice he was named an NCAA Division II All-American. He caught 100 passes as a collegian, a school record matched only by Michael Moore, who would benefit as Doug Williams recipient through 1977.

"Sammie, too, was a fine person," Robinson adds. "He could come into a room and if you didn't ask him, you wouldn't know who he was."

The Minnesota Vikings knew who Sammie White was after his senior season of 1975. He rushed the ball 63 times for 479 yards, caught 37 passes for 802 yards and scored 17 touchdowns, 12 on receptions. In four years he contributed 3,287 yards to Grambling's attack. He had gained 2,169 of those yards on pass catches, a school record. The Vikings made Sammie their second round drafts pick in 1976.

Sammie, with good hands and quick feet, joined the Vikings fresh from the College All-Star game in Chicago. In the four years since, coming into this season, he would catch 187 passes for 3,122 yards. What is remarkable about his performance in the NFL is the reminder that the Vikings have long regarded a dump pass out of the backfield as a significant achievement. Yet he averaged better than 15 yards per catch, holds a club record with touchdown catches in four consecutive games, had caught at least one pass in sixty straight games, and in 1977 hauled in a 69-yard bomb from Tommy Kramer against San Francisco.

As a rookie with the Vikings, White started every game scoring 10 touchdowns and set a team rookie receiving yards record with 906 yards, which stood until it was broken by former Minnesota wideout Randy Moss in 1998. He also held team records for both touchdowns and yards in a game by a rookie which were both broken by Moss in the same year. He was named the NFL Offensive and NFC Rookie of the year in 1976 and has appeared in three Pro Bowls. Although the Viking was humbled by Oakland, 32-14, in Super Bowl XI, White scored one of the losers' two touchdowns on an 8-yard third period pass from Fran Tarkenton.

Following a career with the Vikings, White coached at Carroll High School in Monroe, LA before returning to Grambling where he has enjoyed a stint as an offensive coach with the Tigers. During this tenure on the coaching staff, he has helped the Tigers earn four National Black College and SWAC Championship titles. During those runs, GSU's offense twice led the nation in passing offense, scoring offense and ranked in the top on several occasions in other categories.

White, a member of the Vikings 25th Anniversary team, is married to the former Penny Fortner and they have two children: Sammy III and Samantha and two grandchildren: Lauren and Taylor.

DOUG WILLIAMS

From All-American Quarterback to Head Coach to NFL Executive



History was made in December of 1997 when Doug Williams returned to his alma mater to take over for retired legend Eddie Robinson as the first new head coach at Grambling for more than 50 years. Williams finished six seasons as the "Head Tiger" leading the team to three straight NCAA Division I-AA National Black College and SWAC Championships before leaving the university in February 2004 to take on a new role as a Personnel Executive with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

A natural for the position, having been the most prolific quarterback in Grambling State's history combined with an outstanding professional career, Williams brought several intangibles to the football program, including his vast football knowledge built on a wealth of experience and a love for Grambling that is unmatched by anyone, anywhere.

Williams' impact on the football program was immediate as the Tigers went from a 3-8 record in 1997 to a 5-6 mark in his first season in 1998. His second season saw even more success as the Tigers finished with a 7-4 mark. Williams' third season proved to be the charm with a 10-2 mark en route to their first SWAC title since sharing it with Alcorn State in 1994 and the first outright title since 1989.

The Tigers were also named the 2000 National Champions in the NCAA Division I Black College Football Poll.

In 2001, Williams proved that the previous year's success was no fluke as he guided the Tigers to a 10-1 mark en route to both undisputed SWAC and National Black College championships.

In 2002, Williams completed the hat trick by leading GSU to its third straight SWAC and National Black College championships with an 11-2 record. At the conclusion of each of those three seasons, the Tigers finished in the top ten in several national polls.

Also during this stretch, Williams brought home some serious Coach of the Year hard-



ware such as the SWAC; 100-percent Wrong Club of Atlanta and the Pigskin Club of Washington, D.C. SWAC Coach of the Year awards for three straight years. In addition, he was named the Street and Smith's Magazine Black College Coach of the Year (2000); Shutt Sports Division I-AA Coach of the Year (2000) and the Sheridan Broadcasting Network Black College Coach of the Year (2001, 2002).

Growing up as a young boy in the 1960s, Williams could only dream of the day he would get the chance to play in the NFL, let alone quarterback a team to a world championship and earn MVP honors. It was a day and age when black men and women gave up much just to achieve basic equality, and imagining a black man a leader of champions was only a dream in the minds of greats like Martin Luther King Jr. But he would end up turning that dream into his life's story.

Williams attended Chaneyville High School in Zachary, LA in the early 1970s and became a star quarterback for the football team.

He was recruited out of high school by Coach Robinson, who was coaching one of the most successful black college football programs at the time at Grambling State.

After spending time as a backup early on during his freshman year at Grambling, Williams finally got his chance to start in which he wasted no time in leading the team to victory in the fifth game of the season with a 21-7 victory over Tennessee State. In his first year as a starter, he would help to lead the team to a 10-2 record en route to the both the 1974 SWAC Co-Championship and the National Black College Championship. The Tigers were Williams' team from that point on as he would go on to start every game that he played at Grambling State. In his sophomore season as a full-time starter, he helped to lead the team to a 10-2 season en route to another National Black College Championship in 1975.

In his senior season of 1977, Williams' passing statistics were staggering in which he would lead the Tigers to a 10-1 record en route to both the SWAC and National Black College Championships while earning SWAC Player of the Year and All-America honors. As a direct result of his efforts, this vaulted him to a fourth place finish in the Heisman Trophy race behind the University of Texas running back Earl Campbell.

That spectacular college career earned Williams plenty of attention from NFL scouts and the changing times saw him get selected in the first round of the 1978 NFL draft by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

Williams turned in a strong career at Tampa Bay which included a playoff berth before the fledgling United States Football League gave the young signal caller the respect that he deserved for so long. The Oklahoma Outlaws signed him to a lucrative contract and showed a resounding vote of confidence in him as a true team leader in 1984. Williams led the Outlaws into first place before a knee injury sidelined him halfway through that initial USFL season. He played a second season with the Outlaws until the league suddenly folded in 1985.

In 1986, Tampa Bay traded the NFL rights to Williams to the Washington Redskins, and a year later he shared the starting quarterback position with Jay Schroeder. But it was Williams who shined in the postseason, leading the Redskins through the playoffs en route to a 42-10 Super Bowl victory the Denver Broncos in 1988. He was the first black quarterback to ever start in a Super Bowl who made the most of a monumental opportunity by setting several Super Bowl passing records en route being named the game's MVP.

Williams is a 1978 graduate of Grambling State. He and his wife, Raunda, are the parents of Ashley, Adrian, Doug Jr., Jasmine, Laura, Temessia and Carmeleta.

Tanks for the Memories (GSU: 1945-1948)



Paul Younger, homegrown, moved up to the college varsity in 1945. Before he ran out of eligibility in 1948 he would score a record 60 touchdowns and 369 points; rush for a nation-leading 1,207 yards in a single season (1947) and 2,631yards in four seasons of eight-and-nine-game schedule; rumble 86 yards for a non-touchdown against Morgan State in 1946, and would become the first of more than 70 Grambling All-American.

"He was the fastest man on our team," appends Robinson. "Most of the time in high school whenever he got the ball he'd score a touchdown. On end-around he was knocking people down. In college he scored a helluva lot of touchdowns, 25 of them as a tackle on end-arounds. His junior year we moved him to running back and defensive halfback."


Eddie Kotal, a scout for the Los Angeles Rams, caught sight of Younger in Birmingham, Alabama, during the now defunct Vulcan Bowl. Tank scored three touchdowns in 28-27 loss to Wilberforce University of Ohio.

There are two popular misconceptions connected with Younger's joining the Rams in 1949. He was not first black player with the Rams, nor was he the first black college player to suit up as a pro in Los Angeles.

As far back as 1946, the Rams - just one year removed from Cleveland - had signed two stellar black athletes out of UCLA - giant defensive end Woody Strode and all-purpose halfback Kenny Washington. Across LA the rival All-American Conference Dons in 1947 signed two black college players, end Ezzret "Sugarfoot" Anderson from Kentucky State and center-linebacker John Brown from North Carolina Central.

Younger, however, would tread new ground as the first black college player in the National Football League.

"Just like the film, 'One Hundred Yards to Glory' if Younger made it, it would open doors for others ball players," Robinson said of that day and age. "We talked about it quite



a bit. When he left here to go to report, he was the best conditional athlete in the Rams' camp when he got there. All slimmed, and trained like a fighter. He weighed between 218 and 223."

Eddie also imparted some wisdom to Tank: "In dummy drills run out the play 25 to 30 yards. Don't turn and come back after 10 like the others do. The longer you have the ball under your arm, the longer the man is watching..."

The "man" was general manager Tex Schramm, later to build a dynasty in Dallas, and the head coach was the innovative plotter of the T-formation, Clark Shaughnessy. Tank gained 191 yards on 52 carries while alternating with Fred Gehrke at fullback in his rookie season and the Rams won the Western Conference.

But Younger was not yet being called Tank. His nickname was "Bass Eyes," a label hung on him by another rookie, quarterback Norm Van Brocklin. Younger would tip defenses by rolling his eyes in the direction the play would go, accused the Dutchman. Late in the 1950 season, Younger asked the team's other quarterback, Bob Waterfield, "What do you want for Christmas?"

"I'd like a tank that runs," replied Waterfield. This was the birth of "Tank" Younger.

The Rams fielded the most explosive offense in NFL history in the fifties. There was Waterfield and Van Brocklin throwing long-rang missiles to Tom Fears, Hirsch and track sprinter Bob Boyd. Running the ball were the Bull Elephants and halfbacks Vitamin T. Smith and Glenn Davis. In the 12- game season of 1950, the attack scored 466 points-more then 38 a game-and they would win by score of 45-28 and 45-35. In one period they ran up 41 points against Detroit.

In time, Tank, who stood 6-foot-3, built up to 230 pounds. It was a time of Bull of Elephant. Hoerner led Rams in rushing in 1948-49, Towler from 1951-53 and Younger in 1954 (91 carries, 610 yards).

Tank wore his No. 35 jersey nine years with the Rams and finished up as a Pittsburgh Steelers in 1958. His career totals in the NFL were 770 carries and 3,640, yards, 100 catches for 1,167 yards, and 35 touchdowns. He was also a savage blocker and smashing linebacker, the last player selected to both the offensive and defensive All Star teams in the NFL.



Millions watching Super Bowls and NBA All-Star games have witnessed electrifying and energizing performances. It has been seen and heard in international places such as Liberia, Panama, Korea and Cuba. "It" is none other than the stimulating, exhilarating and invigorating Grambling State University Marching Band.

When the committee for the first Super Bowl wanted a super band and Coca-Cola wanted "the real thing" for its commercial, the Marching Tigers got the call. Since that time many years ago, the band has made two other appearances at Super Bowl games, including Super Bowl 9 (IX).

It has been hailed as the "Number One Band in the Land" for years, but 1997 was a year that holds many fond memories for the Tiger Marching Band. For that was the year the talented musicians received an invitation to play at Super Bowl 32 (XXXII) in San Diego, Calif. and the band started its march to greater heights than before.

In what has been labeled as the "Greatest Super Bowl halftime of all-time," the Tigers electrified the world as they performed with Motown greats such as the Temptations, Smokey Robinson, Martha Reeves and the Vandellas, the Four Tops, Queen Latifiah and Boyz II Men. Performing at the Super Bowl is nothing new for the Tiger Band and the talented students took care of business like seasoned show veterans.

The Grambling State Band got its first big break in 1964 when it performed at halftime of the American Football League's championship game in San Diego.

Members of the news media covering the event labeled the marching band as "The Band that Never Gets Tired." San Diego Union reports jumped on the bandwagon. One article describing the band read, "The band looked better getting on the bus than most bands do on the field."

Since that time, the band has also performed halftime shows for several professional teams.

The Tiger Band continues to be one of the most visible recruiting tools at Grambling State University. Young and old, black and white, foreign and American are all attracted to this band.

Though they work hard on the field, band members work even harder off the field as they go to various high schools to host workshops as well as to perform. That is in addition to the regular school work assigned do as they work on their degrees as university students.

More than 30 years after those first national-attention grabbing performances, the Tiger Band is still the most sought after band in the land. In 2001, they performed at the Delchamps Senior Bowl college all-star football game at Ladd Stadium in Mobile, Ala; the Miami Dolphins' Monday Night Football game; the Black History Parade in Anaheim, Calif. Mardi Gras Celebration in Shreveport and a host of other activities.

While the band has the solid cornerstone of a spectacular past, the Tiger Band's foundation is firmly being made in technology, the band has computerized its field shows and musical arrangements.

"Its all about keep pace with what's happening in the world," Pannell said. "We are making sure that the Grambling State Band sets the pace in the next millennium."

Pannell fully understands about keeping pace. He played in the famed Tiger Band over 35 years ago under the late, great bandmaster Conrad Hutchinson.

Through sheer genius, "Hutch" as he was called by thousands, erected, directed and perfected the matching sensation known as The Tiger Band. During the four decades "Hutch" spent at Grambling State, the Grambling State Hall of Famer directed the Tiger Band during performances and appearances that spanned this country and landed them on foreign soil all over the world.

But forget about the sassy, yet classy Orchesis Dance Troupe. What is a band without dancers?

Thirty-three years ago, the Orchesis became an official band auxiliary, mesmerizing audiences around the world. Today, under the tutelage of Mrs. Diane Grigsby, this ground can still "rock the house," as well as move an audience with their jazzy, classy and upbeat performances.

One thing, though will never change - the Grambling State University Tiger Marching Band will always be the best in the land. Like other greats, it is often imitated, but never duplicated.



World Famed Tiger Marching Band Highlights

- In 1967 and 1968, the band performed in Super Bowls I and II, respectively, prior
 to the NFL championship game being officially called The Super Bowl. Grambling's
 1967 performance has been named "One of the Top 10 Super Bowl Halftime Shows"
 by Sports Illustrated magazine.
- In 1972, the marching Tigers played in Monrovia, Liberia, at the inauguration of Liberian President William R. Tolbert.
- \bullet In 1976, the GSU band performed in the first-ever Pioneer Bowl in Tokyo, Japan.
- In 1977, GSU World Famed Tiger Marching Band performed in Mirage Bowl, Tokyo, Japan.
- In 1978, GSU World Famed Tiger Marching Band, pushed back at Half-Time, Bayou Classic, to introduce their first all female dance line "ORCHESIS" to the world, lead by artistic director/choreographer Virgie Broussard (Pradia). One original member of "ORCHESIS" was choreographer/producer Deborah A Gibson (MC HAMMER Too Legit Tour), and cousin to Erykah Badu/National recording artist.
- In 1978, GSU World Famed Tiger Marching Band were halftime guest performers for Dallas Cowboys at the Original Texas Stadium in Irving, Texas where they showcased their Original 10 Members of GSU Orchesis Dance Line.
- In 1981, The band performed in the Hollywood films Grambling's White Tiger (1981).
- In 1981, the band appeared in "Marching Band/Coke Is It," an award-winning television commercial developed for Coca-Cola USA by Burrell Communications Group.
- In 1982, the Grambling State University World Famed Tiger Marching Band was special guest to the Emperor of Japan, performed in Osaka, Japan and were the halftime performers at the Tokyo, Japan Mirage Bowl game.
- In 1999, U.S. President Bill Clinton performed (on saxophone) with the band for a halftime show in Grambling, Louisiana.
- In 1999, the Tiger Marching Band along with GSU's acclaimed dance troupe "The Orchesis Dance Company" was featured in a nationally televised commercial as part of Procter & Gamble's "Tampax Was There" marketing campaign.
- In 1999, the band was featured in commercial bumpers for Cartoon Network's "Cartoon Cartoon Fridays" block. They performed the main Cartoon Cartoons theme, as well as the theme songs for other Cartoon Network shows.
- In 1998, the band was featured in Super Bowl XXXII, alongside Boyz II Men, Martha Reeves and Smokey Robinson.
- In 2001, the GSU World Famed Tiger Marching Band was included in the inaugural parade for U.S. President George W. Bush.
- In 2002, the GSU World Famed performed in the motion picture Drumline.
- In 2005, the band recorded an album entitled "A Tribute To Motown" with Motown Records
- In 2006, "Season of the Tiger," a six-part docudrama aired, following members of the Grambling State University marching band and football team during the 2005-2006 football season. Produced by DAFT films and Black Entertainment Television (BET), "Season of the Tiger" was the second BET reality show to focus on life at a historically black institution (HBCU), and the first to highlight the competitive environment of marching bands at some HBCUs.
- In 2007, the band performed in the award-winning Denzel Washington film, The Great Debators.
- In the 118th Tournament of Roses Parade (2007), Grambling State's marching band was the marching band in the Star Wars Spectacular, in which all members were wearing Imperial officer uniforms. This was the band's second time in the Tournament of Roses Parade: 1980 being the first time an HBCU band was selected to march and lead in the Tournament of Roses Parade.
- In 2009, the GSU World Famed Tiger Marching Band was included in the inaugural parade for U.S. President Barack Obama.
- In 2010, the band's drumline, "Chocolate Thunder", performed at halftime in the NBA All-Star Game with artist Shakira.
- In 2013, the band was included in the second inaugural parade for U.S. President Barack Obama.
- In 2015, Drake mentioned the band in his hit song "Used to" featuring Lil' Wayne on his If You're Reading This It's Too Late mixtape.

HISTORY OF THE TIGER MARCHING BAND

BAND STARTED IN 1926

The plot began in 1926 when President R.W.E. Jones struck up an instrument deal with Sears and Roebuck. As the years passed, the script became juicer. So, here is our story: " How a once small, country band became not only the best band in the land, but also a household word...

GRAMBLING STATE WITHOUT A BAND?

Yes, that was the situation in 1926 when then President Charles P. Adams asked new faculty member Ralph Waldo Emerson Jones to form a group of marching musicians. Jones, who later served as the institution's President for over 50 years, began the tough task by obtaining 17 instruments from Sears and Roebuck and the Tigers were ready to take their first giant step.

At that time, there was no Music Department at Grambling, so sharps, flats, lines, spaces, notes and rest were mysteries to members of that initial group. But the inexperienced Tigers persisted, and soon they were performing their first "melody strained" concert.

Later, the action switched from chairs to grassy fields as the tiny group began marching at football games. Since several band members were usually on the arid squad, interesting situations frequently developed. It was a common sight to see Ralph Jones substituting for a band member who had suffered a football injury.

Tiger tunes became more sophisticated during the 1930s, and Grambling musicians began to perform at concerts and dances in neighboring towns. By 1936, Jones, affectionately known as Prez, became the President, but he still directed the band and coached baseball. For the musical aroup to continue its development, Prez decided a full-time director was needed. So "Sarge" A.D. King, former college band leader and big band director, was hired. Tiger musicians were under his direction until 1949 when Langston hand leader J.S. "Pop" Lee took over. Faltering health caused the Oklahoma product to step down and trumpet instructor Sheldon Rooth filled-in as interim director until Conrad Hutchinson Jr. was hired in 1952.

"Hutch Jr.," a Tuskegee institute graduate, had directed high school for over 12 years in Mobile, Ala., Covington, Ky., and Cincinnati, Ohio. The professional musician and jazz band performer frequently performed at theatrical events and stage shows and on television and radio programs.

During World War II the multi-talented musician was in charge of the U.S. Army bands in the China-Burma-India Theater. His years of experience would be put to excellent use at Gramblina

"BEST BAND IN THE LAND"

When Conrad Hutchinson Jr. arrived here in 1952, he had a plan to make the Grambling College Marching Band the best in the land. It didn't happen overnight and it certainly wasn't easy, but "Hutch" and his staff began molding embryo noise makers into superb musicians and magnificent marchers. And today, his prized unit is frequently labeled, "The Best in the Land."

GROUP ENTERTAINS USO AUDIENCES

Having made a name for themselves in the states, the Grambling College band members began developing international reputations in the mid-1960s when the "Mixed Notes" toured numerous foreign countries.

The 15-member group was composed of comedians, musicians, dancers, actors, actresses, and singers, and it entertained USO audience in Panama, Puerto Rico, Cuba, Korea, the Philippines and the Bahamas Islands.

Directed by Conrad Hutchinson Jr., the touring party included Peetie McDaniel, Erleen Borne, Norma Watson, Gene Davis, Inez Reddo, Leon Dickerson, George Herts, Dock Edwards, Conrad Hutchinson III, Isaac Paggett, Maurice Johnson and Charles Minifield.

WORLD TRAVELERS

During the early 1960s, the Grambling College Marchina Band, a unit known for its sedentary habits, became restless and hit the road. No longer would it be known as a small, country band, for it was soon to become the "traveling band from tiger land." Initially, only a few felines ventured afar. They were known as the "Mixed Notes" and they performed in 1964 during USO shows in the Caribbean and later in the Far Fast

GRAMBLING UNIT IN FIRST SUPER BOWL

When the old AFL and NFL decided to stage Super Bowl I, they realized that a super unit was also required for halftime. What was needed was a well-disciplined collection of musicians, who could hypnotize the crowd with their delicious music and aerodynamic movements. Of course, Grambling College received the invitation, and the rest was history. In early 1975, another Conrad Hutchinson creation took the field in Tulane Stadium for a halftime happening during Super

A SUPER "SHOW BAND"

Band members captured the hearts and souls of Super Bowl I and IX fans with sensational shows that had the Los Angles Coliseum and Tulane Stadium spectators swaving in their seats

During the 1967 California game, feet started stomping early as Grambling College, University of Arizona, and UCLA units put on a pre-game show.

Then the "Bayou Band" staged one eye-opening halftime happening before it combined with other units for the finale. "The Band That Never Gets Tired" certainly lived up to its reputation.

In January of 1975 the the G-Men once again entertained Super Rowl fans. This time, the scene was Tulane Stadium in New Orleans. From the initial balloon releasing ceremony to the final delightful dance routine, Super Bowl IX observers had all the heart-throbbing excitement they could possibly absorb without medical

GSU WINS "BATTLE OF BANDS"

Although there are no longer any nationally organized collegiate band contests, the marching Tigers

were winners of one such event in 1972. Held in Dallas. Texas by Braniff Airlines, the "Battle of the Bands" featured competition between GSU, Southern, Jackson State, Mississippi Valley State, Kentucky State, and Bishop. The Tigers won the overall trophy as well as awards for showmanship and continuity.

TIGERS CUT TWO ALBUMS

As a tribute to its outstanding sound, two records have been cut from the Grambling State University Marching Band.

Mercury Records produced the first soundtrack in 1972 and it featured such numbers as "Ball of Confusion," "Six-Fifty East" and "The Love You Saved." Entitled "Tiger Time," the album was recorded in T.H. Harris before a live audience.

A Japanese company produced the other soundtrack prior to Mirage Bowl I. The 1977 album included that year's top hits and was targeted for the Japanese mar-

BICENTENNIAL BAND

Over one million people watched the Grambling State University Marching Band perform during the nation's bicentennial celebration in Washington D.C.

The gyrating Tigers marched in the July 4, 1976, parade and then performed at the Washington Monument that evenina

"COKE, BAND ARE IT"

When Coca-Cola began filming a commercial featuring the Grambling State University Marching Band, no one imagined it would become that firm's highest ranking advertisement.

Sub-freezing temperatures greeted the film makers in December of 1981, and it took a while to crank those Tigers engines. But once in motion, there was no stonping them. The commercial, which dubbed GSU as, "The No. 1 Band in the Land," became Coke's most popular promotional piece.

PIONEER BOWL

The GSU band first stepped foot on Japanese soil during the autumn of 1976 when it performed during the first Pioneer Bowl in Tokyo.

TIGERS JAM IN JAPAN

Take exotic Japan, a country deeply-rooted in ancient traditions. Stir in a lot of jazz. Finally, blend with the GSU Marchina Band.

What have you created? It's a happening and it's been happening since 1976 when the Tigers performed in the Pioneer Bowl, but this time after having participated in the Osaka Mitsubishi Jazz Festival.

ORCHESIS DANCERS JOIN THE GSU SQUAD

Women have played an important part in the Grambling State University Marching Band, serving as musicians, majorettes, featured twirlers, and most recently as Orchesis dancers

Members of the latter group were phased into the band routines in 1977, and they have been electrifying audience ever since.

Actually, females were part of Prez's first band and they continued as Marching Tigers until the 1963-64 school year when travel and lodging arrangements forced the band to go "all-male."

Except for featured twirlers, the unit was without women until 1977 when they were once again allowed to try out.

BASKETBALL MUSICIANS

Another first was recorded by the Marching Tigers during the winter of 1984. They performed for the first time on a professional basketball court. Fans at the Dallas Mavericks-Philadelphia 76ers' game got their money's worth that night.

ALWAYS A TIGER

A feeling of "togetherness" surrounds the marching band, and that special closeness remains even after graduation. The band has a very dedicated alumni following that frequently returns to campus, especially for homecoming. Time is turned back during homecoming halftime as Alumni Band members recreate their magical performances of yesteryear.

It's their way of proving they still "have what it takes," and also saying, "Thanks for the memories."

FROM HUMBLE BEGINNINGS TO JAMMIN' WITH THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES

During the week of GSU's Presidential Performance. the hand received a call from the NCAA. The hand had been selected to represent the Pageantry of Bands section of the NCAA Hall of Fame. A request was made that the band send a drum majors uniform. Strange enough the uniform didn't fit. A day later GSII's Rand Staff and a call from the NCAA requesting permission to fly up one of the bands drum majors to cast a mold of the actual

Dianitary's from across Louisiana and surrounding areas gathered in Grambling's Robinson Memorial Stadium to hear the President's speech. President Bill Clinton's commencement address was well received. Not only did The President get a chance to interact with some of the finest minds of Historically Black Institutions, he also picked up something extra while he was

GSU's Band staff presented the President a jacket making him an honorary director of bands at the university. "The President says he's always been a fan of our band," Dr. Larry Pannell, Director of Bands GSU said at the time, "He mentioned that he'd been following us since his days as governor in Arkansas".

In addition, thanks to Ensilon Rho (K.K. Psi), Members of Kappa Kappa Psi and Tau Beta Sigma will also be proud to know that on that same day the President became a member of their Honorary Band Fraternity.

HISTORY AT A GLANCE

In 1920, athletic officials from six Texas HBCUs — C.H. Fuller of Bishop College, Red Randolph and C.H. Patterson of Paul Quinn College, E.G. Evans, H.J. Evans and H.J. Starns of Prairie View A&M, D.C. Fuller of Texas College and G. Whitte Jordan of Wiley College — met in Houston, Texas, to discuss common interests. At this meeting, they agreed to form a new league, the SWAC.

Paul Quinn became the first of the original members to withdraw from the league when it did so in 1929. When Langston University of Oklahoma was admitted into the conference two years later, it began the migration of state-supported institutions into the SWAC. Southern University entered the ranks in 1934, followed by Arkansas AM&N (now the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff) in 1936 and Texas Southern University in 1954. Rapid growth in enrollment of the state-supported schools made it difficult for the church-supported schools to finance their athletics programs and one by one they fell victim to the growing prowess of the state-supported colleges. Bishop withdrew from the conference in 1956, Langston in 1957 and Huston-Tillotson (formerly Samuel Huston) in 1959, one year after the admittance of two more state-supported schools: Grambling College and Jackson State College.

The enter-exit cycle continued in 1961 when Texas College withdrew, followed by the admittance of Alcorn A&M (now Alcorn State University) in 1962. Wiley left in 1968, the same year Mississippi Valley State College entered. Arkansas AM&N exited in 1970 and Alabama State University entered in 1982.

Arkansas—Pine Bluff (formerly Arkansas AM&N) rejoined the SWAC on July 1, 1997, regaining full-member status one year later. Alabama A&M University became the conference's tenth member when it became a full member in September, 1999 after a one year period as an affiliate SWAC member. Most of the former SWAC members that have left the conference are currently a part of the Red River Athletic Conference of the NAIA.

Current championship competition offered by the SWAC includes competition for men in baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, indoor track, outdoor track & field and tennis. Women's competition is offered in the sports of basketball, bowling, cross country, golf, indoor track, outdoor track & field, soccer, softball, tennis and volleyball.

THE MISSION AND PURPOSE OF THE SWAC

The Southwestern Athletic Conference, Inc. (the "SWAC", the "Conference") is organized exclusively for the purpose of encouraging, promoting, advancing, and conducting intercollegiate sports activities and other recreational and not-for-profit activities among the members of the Conference. Its purposes are:

- To uphold the principles of institutional control of, and responsibility for all collegiate sports conducted by the members of this organization in conformity with the Constitution and Bylaws hereof;
- To stimulate and improve intercollegiate athletic sports;
- To comply with satisfactory standards of scholarship and amateur standing and good sportsmanship;
- To preserve and maintain the collegiate athletic records of the members of the Southwestern Athletic Conference, and make them available upon request;
- To cooperate with other amateur athletic organizations in the promotion and conduct of intercollegiate athletic contests;
- To maintain fiscal management; and
- To legislate through Bylaws or Resolutions on subjects of general concern to the membership.

The members of the conference are committed to the philosophy of maintaining intercollegiate athletics as an integral part of the overall educational program. To this end, the conference believes in and subscribes to the fundamental principles of amateurism, institutional control, sound academic standards, financial aid, recruiting, and ethical conduct that governs intercollegiate athletics, and the enforcement of rules and regulations as adopted by the National Collegiate Athletic Association.
