Rob Sgarlata (C'94, S'12) begins his third season as the Georgetown University football head coach in 2016. Sgarlata, who previously served on the Hoya coaching staff for 18 seasons, including eight as assistant head coach / defensive coordinator, quickly began by setting a foundation for the program based on three principles, four for 40, men for others and "sisu" a Finnish phrase that translates into courage in the face of adversity.

Sgarlata became just the fourth person to have played football and graduated from Georgetown before earning the head coach title, joining Joe Reilly, Jack Hagerty and Maurice Dubofsky.

Sgarlata has guided a one-game improvement in each of his first two seasons on the Hilltop, as GU earned the first Lou Little Trophy, by defeating Columbia in 2015. GU finished fifth in the Patriot League and the Hoyas had seven players selected to All-Patriot League teams. Kyle Nolan became GU's all-time leader in pass attempts, completions and total offense, helping him earn an invitation to Baltimore Ravens Rookie mini-camp and Ettian Scott led Division I FCS with 19 pass breakups. In the classroom, for the second-straight season the Hoyas led the Patriot League and finished among the FCS leaders in academic progress rate (APR), scoring a perfect 1,000 for the 2014-15 season. In addition GU had 31 players selected to the Patriot League Academic Honor Roll.

In his first season at the helm of the program, Sgarlata led GU to its first home victory over an Ivy League program, defeating Brown, 17-3. He helped guide Alec May to an All-America season, as May also broke the program's single-season sack record and led the nation with 16.5. Nick Alfieri became the third player in program history to eclipse 300 tackles, all happening during Sgarlata's tenure. Both Alfieri and May were named First Team All-Patriot League and four others earned All-PL honors. Sgarlata's emphasis on excellence in the classroom showed as the program set a Patriot League record with 45 student-athletes earning PL Academic Honor Roll distinction, while also having the highest APR in the PL and among the 10 best in the nation.

Prior to being named the 31st head coach in program history, Sgarlata served as defensive coordinator under Kevin Kelly. Between 2010 and 2012 he helped guide the Hoyas to their best stretch since joining the Patriot League, as GU possessed the top-ranked scoring defense in the PL in 2011 and featured the second-ranked scoring defense in the league in 2012. During his tenure as defensive coordinator, the Hoyas featured four ECAC First Team selections and 20 All-Patriot League selections on defense.

Sgarlata has helped develop five All-Americans, including Michael Ononibaku in 2005, Alex Buzbee in 2006, Andrew Schaetzke, just the ninth consensus All-American in Patriot League history, in 2011, Robert McCabe in 2012 and May. Buzbee would go on to play in the NFL with the Washington Redskins and the Canadian Football League (CFL) with the Toronto Argonauts. Schaetzke, McCabe, Dustin Wharton and May each went to NFL rookie camps.

Within the defense, Sgarlata worked with the defensive line in 1995-96 and again from 2002-04, where he coached Buzbee, Ononibaku and 1996 MAAC Defensive Player of the Year Janne Kouri. He worked with the defensive backs from 2005-12, where he worked with All-Patriot League performers Brian Tandy, Travis Mack, Jayah Kaisamba and Jeremy Moore.

Prior to his work on defense, Sgarlata worked with wide receivers and tight ends from 1996-2000, helping the Hoyas to consecutive MAAC Championships in 1998 and 1999 and an appearance in the 1998 ECAC Bowl. In addition to coaching, Sgarlata has also served as an academic advisor, career and alumni liaison, financial aid liaison, internship director and computer and technology liaison during his 18 years with the football program.

Sgarlata, a four-year letterwinner at Georgetown is among the program's all-time leading rushers. He was a team captain in 1993 and the recipient of the John J. Hagerty Award presented annually to Georgetown's outstanding back, following his senior season. He also excelled in the classroom, being named to the 1993 GTE District II Academic All-America Football Team and was also named to the MAAC Football League Academic All-Star Team.

Sgarlata graduated from Georgetown in 1994 from the College of Arts & Sciences with a degree in government and international relations. In May 2012, he completed his master's degree in sport industry management from the School of Continuing Studies at Georgetown.

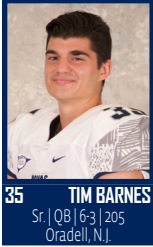

2015: Appeared in five games at quarterback during his junior season ... Finished the season completing 10-for-22 pass attempts for 79 yards, while rushing for 42 yards on 11 carries ... Completed 6-for-12 attempts for 61 yards, while rushing for seven yards on three carries at Bucknell (10/24).

2014: Played in eight games during his sophomore season at quarterback ... Finished with nine carries for 32 yards, while completing 1-of-3 pass attempts for six yards ... Had two carries for six yards in the season opener vs. Wagner (8/30) ... Completed 1-of-1 pass attempts for six yards and rushed for 13 yards at Fordham (11/15) ... Selected to the Patriot League Academic Honor Roll.

2013: Played in one game, making his collegiate debut against Fordham (10/12) ... Completed 16-of-31 passes for 124 yards and one touchdown, while rushing for 28 yards on 16 carries in his only action.

High School: A nine-time letterwinner, earning three in football, as a two-year starter at quarterback, three in baseball, two in basketball and one in swimming ... Named captain of football, swimming and baseball team during his senior year ... Selected first team all-league and third team all-county as a junior and honorable mention all-league as a senior ... 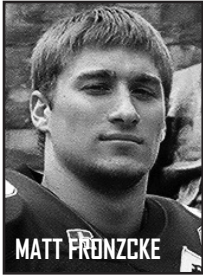

NO. 35 JOE EACOBACCI MEMORIAL JERSEY

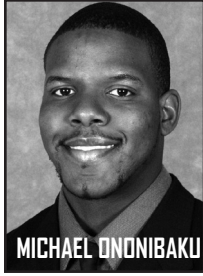


MATT FRONZKE

On September 11, 2001 the Georgetown community lost former Hoya football standout Joe Eacobacci. A 1996 graduate of the College of Arts and Sciences, he was an energy trader for the investment firm Cantor Fitzgerald on the 105th floor of the North Tower of the World Trade Tower. Since the 2003 season, the No. 35 has been awarded as a LIVING MEMORIAL to the spirit and memory of Joey.

Joe was a football student-athlete for former head coach Bob Benson between 1993 and 1995 and was the team's tri-captain his senior season. Benson believed that Eacobacci's mark on Georgetown was inked not only on the gridiron but also on the entire Georgetown campus.

"He had more friends than anybody, and that was what made him a beautiful person," Benson said in an interview with GU's student newspaper, The Hoya. "He would light up a room, he really could make people smile and bring enjoyment and pleasure to a room."



MICHAEL ONONIBAKU

Joe is survived by his parents, Ann and Mitch Eacobacci, his older brother, Tom (a 1993 graduate of the McDonough School of Business and former football player), his younger sister, Michelle, and by his girlfriend of many years, Denise Mauro.

The Eacobacci family and Georgetown University have set up a need based scholarship fund in Joe's name.

The student-athletes chosen to wear the No. 35 jersey have been selected based not only on on-field performance, but a combination of skills and intangibles that have cemented Eacobacci's place in Georgetown football history.

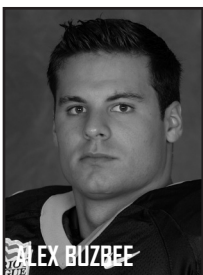

#35 Joe Eacobacci Memorial Jersey Recipients

Matt Fronzke, DB, 2003

Fronzke a two-time captain was the first player at Georgetown to wear the #35 jersey after it was dedicated to the memory of Joe Eacobacci ... A native of Downers Grove, Illinois, Fronzke wore the jersey during the 2003 season, when he capped off a stellar four-year career ... A player who was known for his strength, Fronzke is considered one of the best athletes in the history of the program ... He became the first Hoya player since 1986 to captain the team in consecutive years ... He finished his career with 243 tackles, the third-best mark in program history and was a 2004 Patriot League Second Team selection.

"I am still in awe that I was chosen. During my junior year, we played Holy Cross to open the season, then 9/11 occurred. The next week's game versus Wagner was cancelled. The following week we went to Fordham and drove past Manhattan and the whole world had changed. I did not know Joey personally, but I feel as if we are all drawn together as a family by the tradition. I am very proud of the past selections and hope that I will continue to do honor to the tradition and Joey's memory."

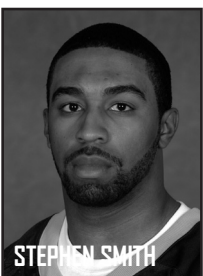


ALEX BUZBEE

Michael Ononibaku, DE, 2004-05

An All American and 2005 Duffy Award winner. Two-time No. 35 jersey recipient Ononibaku was the second Georgetown player to don the #35 jersey and was the first to wear it in back-to-back years, as he was honored with the prestigious jersey in 2004 and 2005 ... A native of Amherst, Massachusetts, he graduated from Georgetown in May 2006 with a degree in finance and management and is considered one of the top players in program history ... Finished his career ranked second all-time at Georgetown in sacks with 29, and sixth all-time in tackles with 212 ... Served as a team captain during the 2005 season ... Named a first team All-American by the American Football Coaches Association as a senior in 2005 ... Earned first team All-Patriot League honors in 2004 and 2005 and was a second team honoree in 2003.

"The Eacobacci Award represents more than just an honor, but also a legacy. The tragic loss of former captain Joe Eacobacci, who perished in the 9/11 attacks hits the hearts of many associated with the Georgetown football program. Esteemed by coaches and players, past and present, Joe Eacobacci was a class act on and off the field. When I was fortunate to receive the award, I felt the best way to honor Eacobacci's legacy was to strive to embody what he stood for. We have had great players who have since worn the jersey, and held his name with great honor. I myself will forever be grateful for the opportunity to receive the award and carry on this legacy."

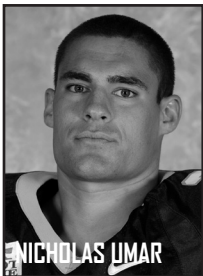


STEPHEN SMITH

Alex Buzbee, DE, 2006

Buzbee was a three-time All Patriot League performer, earning a spot on the first team in 2006, while garnering All-America honorable mention from the Don Hansen Football Gazette ... A three-year starter, Buzbee was a strong and physical player with excellent athletic ability who finished third in program history with 27.5 career sacks which ranks him in the top 20 all-time in the Patriot League ... Buzbee was the first Hoya football player since Jim Ricca to play in the NFL, as Buzbee was activated to the Washington Redskins active roster in 2007 ... Buzbee has also played for the Toronto Argonauts in the Canadian Football League.

"It is definitely the most coveted award I have ever gotten. Every time I suited up to play I was trying to represent the qualities of hard work and dedication that go along with the award. It is not one of those awards that you hang on the wall. You wear it on your back every time out and you want to live up to that responsibility."



NICHOLAS UMAR

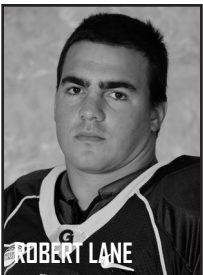
Steve Smith, DE, 2007

Smith, an Upper Marlboro, Md. native, was awarded the No. 35 jersey and named one of the Hoyas tri-captains for the 2007 season ... A starter at defensive end during his final two seasons on the Hilltop, compiling 63 tackles during his four-year career ... Tied his career high in tackles three times, recording eight stops against Holy Cross, Brown and Columbia, all during the 2006 season. Upon graduation, Smith began work as a US Uniformed Supreme Court Police Officer.

"When I hear the name Joe Eacobacci, more comes to mind than just another Georgetown football alum. When I his name, I think of the legacy he left behind at this program, as well as this campus and across the nation. He set a high standard of excellence, dedication and leadership for those that follow. Nick Umar, DE, 2008

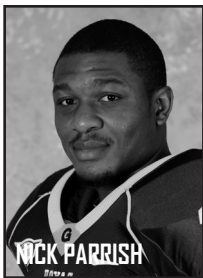

Robert Lane, SLOT, 2009

Lane, a Greensboro, N.C. native, became the first offensive player to be awarded the No. 35 jersey for the 2009 season ... Will wear the prestigious No. 35 jersey this season ... Lane is the first offensive player to wear the jersey ... Lane saw action on the offensive side of the ball since arriving on the Hilltop in 2006, spending time at quarterback, running back and in the SLOT, as well as special teams ... Led the Hoyas in receiving during his senior season making 55 catches for 503 yards, the most for any Hoya since 2003 ... Lane finished his career with 819 receiving yards and two receiving touchdowns during his career.

"Everyone connected to the Georgetown football program knows exactly what type of person Joe Eacobacci was even 10 years after the attacks on the World Trade Center. Every time I put his prestigious jersey on, both in practice and on Saturdays, I played with him in mind. He inspired me, just like he has inspired everyone who knows his story. I think the values he stood for should not only be adopted by those guys who have worn No. 35, but by everyone. I am so thankful to be included in this group of men who have worn No. 35 and will never forget the spirit and character of Joe Eacobacci.



Nick Parrish, LB, 2010

Parrish, a two-time team captain, was the recipient of the No. 35 jersey for the 2010 season ... Parrish's leadership was instrumental in the Hoyas rebounding from a winless season to winning four games, including two in the Patriot League in 2010 ... Nick became the program's all-time leading tackler with 349 career tackles ... He coincidentally surpassed Eacobacci's college roommate Tom Wonica, on Sept. 11, 2010 when the Hoyas defeated Lafayette College ... Parrish was a two-time All Patriot League postseason, leading the league in tackles per game in 2009 (10.0 per game) ... Started 39 consecutive games at inside linebacker ... In 2008, against Holy Cross he was named the Patriot League Defensive Player of the Week and became only the 23rd player at the FCS level, and the second ever in the Patriot League, to return two interceptions for touchdowns in one game to go with 11 tackles.

Wayne Heimuli, S, 2011

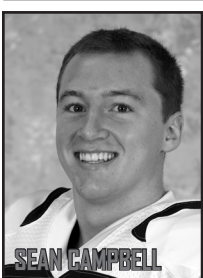
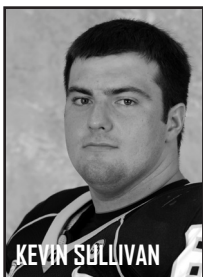
Heimuli was named the eighth recipient of the No. 35 jersey and captain following the 2010 season ... Heimuli was joined by fellow honorees, Ononibaku, Buzbee, Smith, Umar and Parrish at the ceremony. Heimuli served as a strong role model for his teammates and an inspirational leader on and off the field during a 2011 season that saw the Hoyas transform from Patriot League doormat to power. Heimuli helped the defense to its finest season during the Kevin Kelly era, ranking among the nation's best in scoring defense and takeaways. Individually, Heimuli had a productive season, making 54 tackles, intercepting three passes and recovering one fumble. Despite battling injuries throughout the season, Heimuli started in all 11 games providing stability in the defensive backfield. After serving as a team captain in 2011, Heimuli returns to the team in 2012 as a Student Assistant Coach, where he will work with the defense.

"It's a great honor to follow in the footsteps of such great guys, especially Nick Parrish, who I've gotten to know over the years and someone who has been a great leader and a great role model." Heimuli said.

Kevin Sullivan, OL, 2012

Sullivan, a Maywood, N.J. native, became just the second offensive player and first offensive lineman to earn the No. 35 jersey honor. Sullivan was the ninth player overall to accept the No. 35 jersey, which was awarded to him during the team's spring banquet by Rob Sgarlata and former No. 35's Nick Parrish and Wayne Heimuli. Sullivan was a starter along the offensive line in 29 games during the past four-year career, spending his senior season at center. Kevin will also be remembered as one of the Hoyas top performers in the weight room during his time on the Hilltop.

"I'm honored to receive the Joe Eacobacci Memorial Number 35 Jersey," Sullivan said. "I am inspired by Joe and the players who have worn his number 35 jersey in the past and proudly represented him and the Georgetown Football family. Building off of last season and a productive spring ball, the team is excited to work toward bringing the first Patriot League Championship to Georgetown."



Sean Campbell, LB, 2013

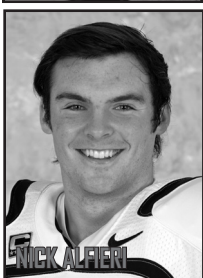
Campbell, a Middletown, N.J. native and a 2013 Preseason All-Patriot League selection becomes the tenth Georgetown student-athlete to earn the No. 35 jersey honor. Campbell, who moved into the starting lineup at outside linebacker at the beginning of his sophomore season was welcomed into the No. 35 fraternity by the two previous honorees, Kevin Sullivan and Wayne Heimuli. Campbell moved to defensive end in the Hoyas 4-3 scheme after compiling 52 tackles, 9.0 TFL of 28 yards, 3.0 sacks for a loss of 17 yards, two forced fumbles, one fumble recovery and a pass breakup during his junior season. A noted leader on and off the field, coaches credited Campbell's attention to detail and the fact that he "goes hard all of the time" and has fully utilized his tools on the field. Campbell has set a strong example off the field, as well, Rob Sgarlata calling him, "a tough kid from day one and a guy that you'd want to start program with."

"It's such a great honor and I was so surprised," Campbell said. "I was just sitting there listening in awe, because the No. 35 tradition is such a great story, and when my name was called it was an overwhelming sense of joy. Just hearing the names of the people who have worn this jersey, they are all people you hear about for being great leaders, great people and who have gone on to do great things."

Nick Alfieri, LB, 2014

Alfieri, a Portland, Oregon native, is a 2014 Preseason All-Patriot League selection and team captain in addition to being the 11th Hoya to earn the No. 35 jersey. During his career on the Hilltop, Alfieri's versatility has allowed him to play both safety and linebacker, giving the Hoyas' defense options. In both spots he has racked up tackles, compiling 216, the 10th best total in program history.

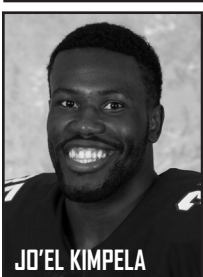
"Hearing my name called at the banquet for the award was so surreal," Alfieri said. "It's still hard to believe that I was chosen. I obviously never knew Joe Eacobacci, but the characters of my former teammates that have previously worn the jersey like, Wayne Heimuli, Kevin Sullivan and Sean Campbell, help give me an idea about the type of person that he was. It is such an honor to be associated with him. I can only hope to adequately represent the number and help keep Joe's spirit alive, both on and off the field."



Jo'el Kimpela, RB, 2015

Kimpela, a Kinshasa, Democratic Republic of the Congo native and a 2014 Second Team All-Patriot League selection becomes the 12th Georgetown student-athlete and just the third offensive player to earn the No. 35 jersey honor. Kimpela is also the second No. 35 from Euleless Trinity High School, joining 2011 recipient Wayne Heimuli.

"It's definitely a blessing to receive the 35 jersey this season, my heart was just beating after my name was called," Kimpela recalled. "When I got to Georgetown I didn't know much about the number 35, it wasn't a really swaggy number, but after you spend some time on the Hilltop you see players such as Sean Campbell, Nick Alfieri and Kevin Sullivan. They are hard-working guys that I have looked up to and I'm positive their character exemplified Joe Eacobacci. To be mentioned with the list of guys who have worn the number is truly an honor. Receiving the 35 jersey is not something I could have done on my own. I'm grateful for teammates who challenge and push me every day to be the best football player I can be. I thank God for the opportunity to represent the 35 jersey and am excited for the upcoming season."



NO. 35 JOE EACOBACCI MEMORIAL JERSEY



Tim Barnes, QB, 2016

Senior Tim Barnes is the 12th recipient of the No. 35 Joe Eacobacci Memorial Jersey, and just the fourth offensive player. He has earned his opportunity to lead the Hoya offense as the starting quarterback job after serving as the backup for his first three years on the Hilltop.

“It is a true honor to be named the No. 35 Jersey recipient for this year and I hope to honor the Eacobacci name, and the No. 35, to the best of my ability both on and off the field,” Barnes said. “To have my name mentioned with all of the previous recipients, is a privilege. I look up to guys like Jo’el Kimpela, Nick Alfieri, Sean Campbell and others that have worn the jersey and I hope that I can continue the tradition honoring the Eacobacci family and Georgetown football community along the way. SISU is a term we use on the team and it is one of the key identities of the team. The 35 jersey is one of the best representations of SISU, so for me, it means representing the Eacobacci family in everything I do, and to wear the No. 35 with pride and dedication.”

HOYA FOOTBALL TIMELINE

1789

Georgetown University founded by John Carroll.

1889

Georgetown begins intercollegiate football with a game against Virginia. The Hoyas win the game, 34-0.

1890

The Hoyas face Fordham for the first time. The Rams are Georgetown's oldest rival in the Patriot League.

1903

Princeton and Georgetown meet for the first time on the gridiron.

1941

Georgetown faces Mississippi State in the Orange Bowl. The Bulldogs defeat the Hoyas by a score of 14-7.

1943-45

Football is suspended at Georgetown due to World War II.

1950

The Hoyas play Texas Western in the Sun Bowl.

1951-63

Football discontinued on the Hilltop.

1964

Club football returns to campus.

1969

Georgetown football moves from club standing to a varsity team. The Hoyas become a member of NCAA Division III Football.

1993

The Hoya program becomes part of NCAA Division I-AA Football. Georgetown joins the MAAC Football League.

1997

Georgetown finishes the season 7-0 in the MAAC and wins its first MAAC Championship.

1998

J.J. Mont sets a Georgetown single-game record with 401 passing yards in a 34-0 win over Iona.

2000

The Hoyas announce they accept an invitation to join the prestigious Patriot Football League. GU plays an independent schedule.

2001

Patriot League football on Georgetown's campus begins.

2002

The Hoyas earn their first Patriot League victory, 32-31 at home against Bucknell.

2003

Georgetown faces its first Ivy League opponent since 1937 and defeats Cornell, 42-20.

2005

Multi-Sport Field opens on Sept. 17 as the Hoyas host Brown.

2006

Freshman running back Charlie Houghton wins the Patriot League Rookie of the Year Award, becoming the first Hoya to win one of the league's

major awards since joining the league; defensive end Alex Buzbee earns All-American honors and is signed to a free agent contract by the Washington Redskins.

2007

Senior fullback Kyle Van Fleet earns Second-Team All-Patriot League honors and is named the winner of the Patriot League Scholar-Athlete of the Year Award.

2008

Georgetown defeats Howard, 12-7, in the D.C. Cup, the first meeting between the only two Division I-FCS colleges that sponsor football in the Nation's Capital.

2010

Hoyas bounce back from winless season to become most improved team in the Patriot League, winning four games, its most since 2005. GU also wins two Patriot League games, defeating Lafayette and Holy Cross. No. 35 Joe Eacobacci Memorial Jersey Recipient LB Nick Parrish becomes the Hoyas all-time leading tackler, surpassing Eacobacci's roommate Tom Wonica during the Hoyas September 11 win over Lafayette...DE Andrew Schaezke and CB Jayah Kaisamba earn First Team All Patriot League honors.

2011

Georgetown posts its most wins since 1999 and plays for the Patriot League Championship for the first time since joining in 2001. Head Coach Kevin Kelly earns PL Coach of the Year, while DE Andrew Schaezke earns Defensive POY, becoming just the ninth consensus All-America selection in PL history. Robert McCabe breaks the program's single season tackles mark with 134, joining Schaezke and Jeremy Moore on the PL First Team. Kaisamba, RB Nick Campanella PK Brett Weiss and freshman OL Mike Roland all made the PL Second Team.

2012

LB Robert McCabe broke his own single-season tackles record with 154, to lead Division I FCS in the category, helping earn All-America honors, as well as Patriot League and ECAC Defensive Player of the Year honors. McCabe also became the leading tackler in program history with 407 tackles, CB Jeremy Moore also etched his name in the record books, breaking the program's all-time mark for interception return yardage (318), while posting the best the kick-off return average (23.9) in program history. GU again had six-players named All-Patriot League, including Nick Campanella, earning his second honor and LB Dustin Wharton earning first team honors.

2013

LB Dustin Wharton became the second consecutive Hoyas linebacker to earn Preseason Patriot League Defensive Player of the Year. He was joined on the Preseason Patriot League squad by LB Sean Campbell and OL James Spaly..Wharton named First Team All-Patriot League.

2014

Rob Sgarlata named 31st Head Coach of Georgetown football program. The Hoyas defeat Brown for their third win in program history over an Ivy League opponent. The win came during the 50th Anniversary of the return of football to the Hilltop. DE Alec May leads FCS with 16.5 sacks, setting a GU program record.

2015

Georgetown defeats Columbia, 24-16, to earn The Battle for Lou Little Trophy. CB Ettian Scott leads FCS with 19 passes defended.
