

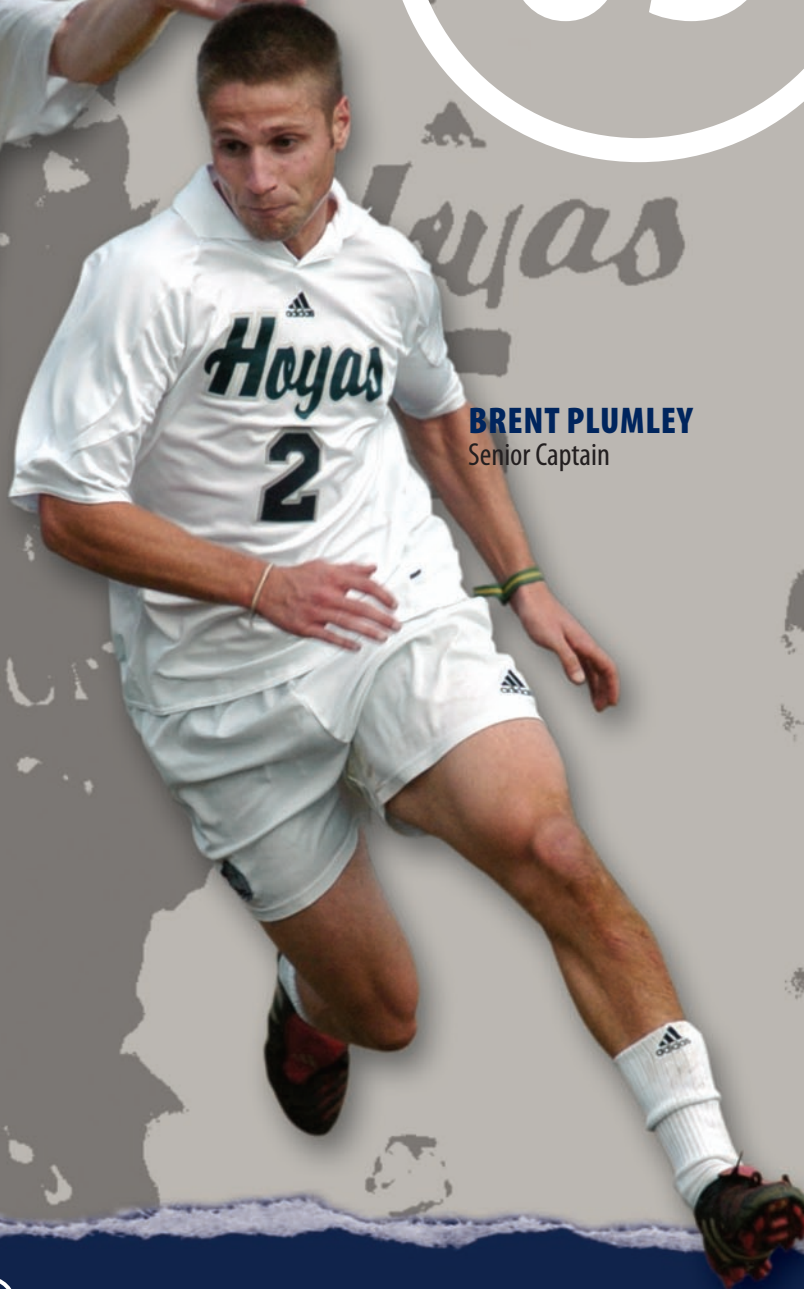

Title IX And NCAA Peer Review

The Georgetown University Athletics Department has recently undergone two extensive reviews of its athletic programs: an audit by the Department of Education concerning Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, and Georgetown's inaugural review under the NCAA's new Athletics Certification program. The Department of Education has found Georgetown's athletic programs to be in compliance with Title IX, and the University was certified by the NCAA in November of 1995.

NCAA Position on Gambling

The NCAA opposes all forms of legal and illegal sports wagering. Sports wagering has the potential to undermine the integrity of sports contests and jeopardizes the welfare of student-athletes and the intercollegiate community. Sports wagering demeans the competition and competitors alike by a message that is contrary to the purposes and meaning of "sport." Sports competition should be appreciated for the inherent benefits related to participation of student-athletes, coaches and institutions in fair contests, not the amount of money wagered on the outcome of the competition. For these reasons, the NCAA membership has adopted specific rules prohibiting athletics department staff members and student-athletes from engaging in gambling activities as they relate to intercollegiate or professional sporting events.

2005 OUTLOOK

The seniors on Georgetown's 2005 men's soccer team have tasted success in their previous three seasons but not the type of success they hope to accomplish this year. In two of the past three years the Hoyas have advanced to the BIG EAST Championship semifinals and fallen just short of advancing to the NCAA tournament. This year's squad hopes to buck that trend and make a statement in the BIG EAST and in the nation. Georgetown lays claim to the 2005 BIG EAST Preseason Defensive and Offensive Players of the Year in senior Jeff Curtin and junior Ricky Schramm, and they are rejoined with six other starters from last year's 11-8-2 squad. A total of 15 letterwinners from last year are on the roster for head coach Keith Tabatznik's 22nd season, and they are grouped with eight newcomers to try and build upon the past three seasons of Hoya success.

DEFENSE

The key cogs to Georgetown's defensive effort last year return this season. All-America candidate Jeff Curtin returns to his starting center back position for the fourth consecutive year. He has been an All-BIG EAST Second-Team performer the past three years and has proven to be one of the best defensive players in the nation. Curtin takes over co-captain duties this season, and outside of his defensive shutdown ability he also brings offense to the table, standing 20th on the Hoya all-time goals scored list with 11.

Junior Tim Convey has been a starter from day one and played in 20 games last season. He and Curtin may be the only defensive duo in collegiate soccer that have two brothers currently playing professionally, as Jim Curtin plays for the MLS' Chicago Fire and Bobby Convey is with Reading FC, and both are in the player pool of the US National squad.

The other returning starter is sophomore Richard Diaz, who as a freshman emerged immediately as a solid wide defender and did not miss a game. Another veteran defender is senior Ethan Caskey, who sat out all of 2004 with an injury but saw 18 games of action in 2003. Three newcomers will be battling for backline time as freshmen Sean Bellomy, Harri Halonen and Alex Pangraze all sport Hoya Blue and Gray for the first time.

FORWARDS

Offensively all eyes focus on junior forward Ricky Schramm who as a sophomore earned the BIG EAST's Offensive Player of the Year Award and All-BIG EAST First-Team honors, plus led the league in goals and points with 13 and 32 respectively. Schramm is a proven scorer and ranks 10th all-time at Georgetown for goals with 22. He will team up with some old and some new faces in 2005. Senior Chris Tansey has 32 games of experience and notched his career first goal last year. Sophomore Mike Glaccum emerged as a welcome addition to the offense last season and played in all 21 contests, totaling three goals. Two freshmen, Richard Frank and Peter Grasso, will also be relied upon to produce scoring opportunities.

MIDFIELD

The Hoyas' midfield has been a strong suit for numerous seasons, contributing to both the offense and defense. This year's group is laden with senior experience and talent as center midfielders Kevin Sindelar, Dan Pydo and Benjamin Jefferson-Dow and wide midfielders Brent Plumley and Danny McAnally all play their senior seasons on the Hilltop.

Sindelar enters his fifth season with the squad after sitting out the 2003 season as a medical redshirt. He has played in 53 games during his career and can dominate games with goal scoring or as a defensive stopper. Pydo started 14 games last season and has 50 career games of action under his belt. Fellow middle midfielder Jefferson-Dow sat out last year after transferring from SMU but already had a history with the Hoyas, playing the 2002 season at Georgetown and tying for the team lead in scoring with 13 points. He will have one more year of eligibility remaining.

The wide midfielders are led by the other co-captain Plumley. Plumley spent his first two collegiate seasons at UMass and Penn before joining Georgetown for the first time last season. He played in 20 games with 15 starts and totaled one goal and three assists. McAnally secured the other wide midfield position last year and earned Georgetown's Most Improved Player award at the end of the season. He started 18 of 21 contests and finished third on the team in scoring with 14 points off three goals and eight assists. One other veteran returns to the midfield



in junior Daniel Grasso. Grasso played in 20 games as a sophomore and started 11. He has totaled nine points in two straight campaigns along with earning GU's Rookie of the Year Award in 2003. Rounding out the Hoya midfielders in their first season are freshmen Alex Fairman, Hunter Joslin and Corey Zeller.

Three strong keepers stand in goal for Georgetown in 2005. Junior Andrew Keszler returns to his starting goalkeeping duties after leading the BIG EAST in saves with 86 and recording four shutouts last year. He started 19 games and finished the year with a 1.42 goals against average. The other two keepers wait in the wings as sophomore Joe Devine and junior Ted Shanahan both are in their second season with the Hoyas. Devine saw three games of action in 2004 and had seven saves, while Shanahan's only action came against Mount St. Mary's.

2005 SCHEDULE

A loaded schedule faces the Hoyas in 2005 as Georgetown plays BIG EAST powers Notre Dame, Rutgers, Seton Hall and Connecticut along with other perennial national title contenders outside of the league in VCU, Santa Clara, Creighton and Maryland. North Kehoe Field plays host to 10 opponents including the Hoyas' first two games of the year when GU hosts the annual D.C. College Cup. Georgetown opens the Cup with Howard on Sept. 2 before facing off with American on Sept. 4.

The University of Maryland Tournament is the next weekend with Georgetown facing VCU and Santa Clara. GU opens its BIG EAST slate with road matchups against DePaul and South Florida, two of five new programs joining the conference in 2005, on Sept. 16 and Sept. 18, respectively. Villanova and Rutgers visit Georgetown at the end of September, and a non-league home matchup against Manhattan is sandwiched in before the Hoyas host Providence on Oct. 1.

Away trips to Seton Hall and West Virginia precede a local rivalry game with Maryland on Oct. 11. The Maryland game starts a three-game home stand for Georgetown against the nation's best as Notre Dame comes to the Hilltop on Oct. 15 and Creighton is right behind the Irish on Oct. 19. Conference foe Marquette is next before senior day at Georgetown against Pittsburgh on Oct. 26 and a trip to Storrs, Conn., to face UConn closes the regular season on Oct. 29.

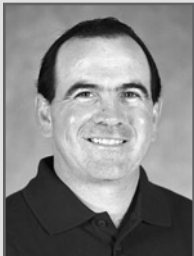

COACHING STAFF

KEITH TABATZNIK

Head Coach • 22nd Season
Career Record: 210-178-22 (.539)

Keith Tabatznik has guided Georgetown University soccer to national prominence and in 2005 enters his 22nd season as head coach. He has led the Hoyas to a pair of NCAA tournament appearances as well



as a BIG EAST championship during his tenure. With a 21-year record of 210-178-22, Tabatznik is Georgetown's all-time winningest soccer coach and is among the top 40 active collegiate coaches in wins.

The 2004 season was a successful year for Georgetown. In the Hoyas first home game

against Delaware on Sept. 1, Tabatznik earned his 200th career win as head coach. The Hoyas also advanced to the semifinals of the BIG EAST tournament, losing in overtime to Seton Hall, and just narrowly missed a berth to the NAAs. Tabatznik also saw two of his student-athletes drafted by the Major Indoor Soccer League, with Dan Gargan playing for the Philadelphia Kixx and Trevor Goodrich selected by the St. Louis Steamers. Gargan was also drafted by Major League Soccer and plays for the Colorado Rapids. The Hoyas compiled an 11-8-2 overall record and a 5-4-1 mark in BIG EAST play.

The 2003 season was the 50th anniversary for the men's soccer program, and Georgetown started the year by winning its first ever D.C. College Cup. During the season the Hoyas played five overtime games and six one-goal games, including a 2-2 tie with eventual national champion Indiana and a last minute 2-3 loss to No. 2 Maryland. The season ended with an 8-9-2 overall record and 3-7-0 mark in conference play.

Tabatznik led the youngest Hoya squad he has ever tutored

to its 11th straight BIG EAST tournament in 2002. The Hoyas compiled an 8-9-1 overall mark and a 5-4-1 record in BIG EAST play ending the season with a run to the BIG EAST Championship semifinals. Georgetown began the year in a 0-3 hole but maturation and a nearly impenetrable defense allowed the Blue and Gray to shutout four opponents, including a 0-0 tie with No. 1-ranked St. John's.

GU's 2001 season ended with a 1-0 heartbreaker in the first round of the BIG EAST Championship. It marked the 10th straight season Georgetown earned a spot in the postseason tournament. The Hoyas completed the season with a 9-9-1 overall mark and a 6-4 finish in the BIG EAST. Highlighting GU's season were four shutouts and a 1-0 victory over defending national champion Connecticut on October 20, 2001.

The Hoyas finished their 2000 season with an overall record of 9-8-1 and a BIG EAST mark of 5-5-1. Georgetown earned a berth into the BIG EAST Championships for the ninth-straight year. During the season, GU was ranked as high as 13th in the nation in the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) Poll.

In 1999, Tabatznik led Georgetown to its second-consecutive appearance in the BIG EAST championship game. Georgetown shutout nationally-ranked St. John's and Rutgers before falling to Connecticut in the finals.

The Hoyas were 11-9-1 that season, which marked their third-consecutive winning campaign. Tabatznik's team won 15 games in both 1997 and 1998. The Hoyas advanced to the BIG EAST championship game and were ranked in the top 25 throughout the season.

The 1997 season was spectacular for Tabatznik and the Hoyas, as GU captured

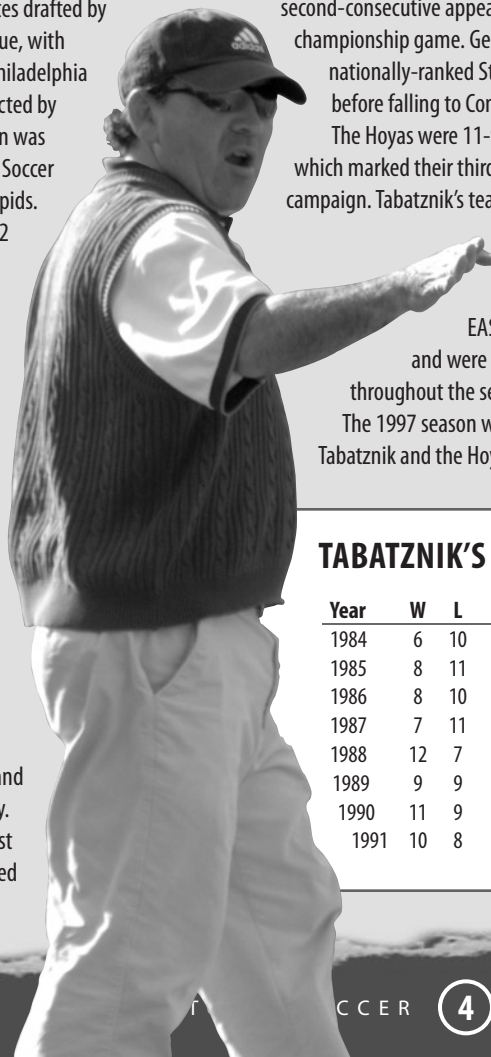

its first-ever NCAA tournament victory with a 2-1 triumph over Virginia Commonwealth on Nov. 23. The Hoyas finished 1997 with a 15-7 overall record and were second in the extremely competitive BIG EAST Conference with a 9-2 mark. For his efforts, Tabatznik was named the 1997 BIG EAST Coach of the Year.

In 1994, Tabatznik was named the South Atlantic Region and BIG EAST Coach of the Year after leading the Hoyas to an incredible 18-4 record and the school's first-ever berth in the NCAA tournament as well as its first BIG EAST regular-season title. Tabatznik was the recipient of Georgetown's Outstanding Coaching Achievement Award for 1994-95.

Tabatznik, holder of a USSF "A" Coaching License, has led Georgetown to 13 berths in the BIG EAST tournament. The berths into postseason play are the continuation of many successful seasons since the Hoyas' first BIG EAST Tournament appearance in 1988 season, in which the team was 12-7-1 and set a then-school record for wins in a single season. During Tabatznik's tenure, 12 former Hoyas have played for professional teams.

In addition to taking Hoya soccer to new heights, Tabatznik is an integral part of taking U.S. soccer to its highest levels ever. In 2005 Tabatznik was appointed as the Boy's Olympic Development Program Director for the Maryland State Youth Soccer Association. He had held this position in the late 80's and early 90's. He was charged with bringing Maryland ODP back to the prominence it had in the past. In his first year back Maryland won two of three regional championships, narrowly missing the clean sweep as his U-17s lost on penalty kicks.

Tabatznik was also the U.S. National Amateur Team Head Coach from 1997-2000, and in 1997 he was selected as the Region I and National Coach of the Year. In 1997, as head coach for the East Team in the U.S. Soccer Festival, Tabatznik led the East to the Gold Medal. His team, which included former Hoyas Tyler Purtil (C '03), Tom Greaser (B '98) and Chris Jones (B '95), went undefeated in the Festival, winning the gold, 1-0, over the U.S. World University Team. He served as Team Administrator for the United States Under-16 National Team that represented the U.S. in the Youth World Cup in Scotland in 1989. Also in 1989, Tabatznik was appointed Head Olympic Development Coach for the Maryland State Youth Soccer Association. Tabatznik also served on the Regional Olympic Development Youth staff from 1985 to 1989. In 1992, he led Maryland to an unprecedented three Region I Olympic Development Championships in six age groups.

As a player-coach with the Journal Soccer Club for ten years, Tabatznik led his team to two Capitol Soccer League titles as well as the finals of the D.C.-Virginia State Cup in 1990. Tabatznik was a Capitol Soccer League All-Star as well as a member of the Virginia Senior Olympic Development Team. He has coached one of the elite senior amateur teams in the country, the Greek Americans, the 1993 and 1994 Mid-Maryland Premier League, Maryland Open and Amateur Cup Champions. The "Greeks" advanced to the final eight in the nation in 1994.

Prior to coming to Georgetown, Tabatznik served as an assistant coach at George Washington University. A 1980 graduate of American University, he lettered three years for the Eagles. Although he is known for his attacking philosophy toward the game, he played in two NCAA tournaments as part of a defensive unit that set AU's shutout record.

Tabatznik was also a member of the Washington '94 World Cup Committee that was responsible for staging World Cup games in D.C., and has played an important role in developing soccer leagues in Washington's inner city.

JONATHAN PASCALE

Associate Head Coach - Fifth Season

Jonathan Pascale enters his fifth season as a coach at Georgetown, second as the Associate Head Coach. For the past four seasons Pascale has shared in all



aspects of the coaching duties with particular emphasis on the technical development of the team and recruiting. He will continue in those responsibilities in 2005.

Pascale came to GU after serving as an assistant coach at the University of Pennsylvania for three seasons. While at Penn, Pascale was responsible for recruiting,

on-field coaching, conditioning and travel planning in addition to numerous other duties. He has also served as the head coach for both the New Jersey ODP and the Under-18 Voorhees Soccer Club.

A 1998 graduate of American University, Pascale played four seasons for the Eagles. He graduated with a degree in elementary education. Pascale also played for the Greek Americans Soccer Club in Washington, D.C., that was coached by Tabatznik. Pascale has been the director, head coach and the founder of Jr. Quaker Soccer Camp at the University of Pennsylvania, and is director of the Georgetown University Soccer Camp.

JAMES FELIX

Assistant Coach - Second Season

James Felix will begin his second season with the Hoyas. Felix brings a wealth of coaching experience at the collegiate and prep levels to the coaching staff, and will continue his role of evaluating team and individual performance.



Prior to coming to Georgetown, Felix served a four-year stint as Assistant Men's Soccer Coach at the University of South Florida. From 1995-99, he was head coach at the prestigious Buckingham Browne & Nichols School in Boston. Prior to this, he was an assistant coach at

both Boston University (1994) and Harvard (1991-94). Felix has collegiate head coaching experience from the University at Stony Brook in New York from 1987-91.

Felix was a star on the National Junior College Champion Monroe Community College soccer team in

1974-75. He then moved on to South Florida where he was a key player on the repeat champions of the Sun Belt Conference in 1977 and 1978.

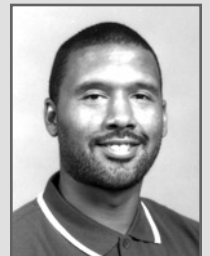
Felix holds a Premier License from the National Soccer Coaches Association of America, as well as "A" and "B" Licenses from the United States Soccer Federation.

TOMMY GRAHAM

Goalkeeper Coach - 19th Season

Tommy Graham is a former All-Metropolitan (D.C./Md.) standout at St. John's College High School and is a 1982 graduate of the University of Tampa School of Business. He has spent the past 18 years helping tutor Georgetown's goalkeepers and rejoins the Hoyas this year in the same capacity. Graham is widely considered as one of the most experienced and talented goalkeeper coaches in collegiate soccer.

Graham led Tampa to the NCAA Division II national championship in 1981 and regular-season No. 1 rankings in 1981 and 1982. During this period, Tampa established the NCAA record for most consecutive victories without a loss (34). Graham was also a two-time All-Conference and All-State selection in his final two collegiate seasons.



Upon graduation Graham had established all single season and career school goalkeeping records while compiling a 50-3-3 record as a four-year letterman. In 1982, he participated in the U.S. Olympic Sports Festival.

Graham played professionally for the American Soccer League's Jacksonville Tea Men, helping them to the league title in 1983. In club soccer, he played for the 1985 Open Cup semifinalist and 1986 Amateur Cup National Champion Greek-American Spartans Soccer Club in Northern Virginia. In 1994, he helped the Greek-Americans reach the Amateur Cup Regional Finals.

He was a member of the Maryland Olympic Development Program staff for ten years. He has coached five youth Maryland state championship teams. In 1996, Graham coached Kevin Shaw (B'00) on the Columbia Darby team that won the Under-18 U.S. Youth Soccer Association Region I Championship and advanced to the national championship game.

Graham, a Regional Manager - Prince George's County Affairs for Pepco, has two sons, is single and resides in Bowie, Md.

The men's soccer team ended a successful 2004 campaign with its best record since 1998. The team finished with an overall record of 11-8-2 and a 5-4-1 record in BIG EAST play. The 2004 team advanced to the BIG EAST semifinals for the second time in three years, defeating Villanova in penalty kicks 5-4, before losing to Seton Hall 1-0 in overtime to end the season. Head coach Keith Tabatznik recorded his 200th career victory in the 2-1 season-opening win over Delaware.

The 2004 Hoyas were honored with postseason accolades as sophomore Ricky Schramm was chosen as the BIG EAST Offensive Player of the Year. Schramm is only the second person ever in the history of Georgetown soccer to receive this honor, joining Eric Kvello (1997). In addition, Schramm was named All-BIG EAST First Team and junior Jeff Curtin and senior co-captain Dan Gargan were named All-BIG EAST Second Team. One member was honored as CoSida Academic All-America as senior defender Paul Brandley earned All-District II Second-Team honors.

The Hoyas also received several individual honors throughout the season, beginning with the D.C. College Cup where Tim Convey, Curtin, and Gargan were named to the All-Tournament Team after

defeating GW 1-0 and losing to American 2-1 in overtime. During the week of October 4, Schramm was named BIG EAST Offensive Player of the Week for his efforts, as well as being named to the *Soccer America* Team of the Week. Sophomore Andrew Keszler was named BIG EAST Goalkeeper of the Week during the week of Nov. 1 as well as being honored as ECAC Goaltender of the Week during the week of Nov. 3. Junior defender Jeff Curtin was named BIG EAST Defensive Player of the Week for Nov. 1.

Several Hoyas climbed the Georgetown records ladder during the 2004 season. In the single-season records, Schramm tied for sixth with 32 points, tallying 13 goals and six assists. Schramm also tied for sixth in single-season goals with 13. Senior Trevor Goodrich tied for sixth in single-season assists with 11, while goalkeeper Keszler tied for sixth in single-season shutouts with four. In the career records, Gargan reached 17th in career points with 40. Gargan also tied for 19th all-time in career goals with 11, while Schramm is 10th with 22. Goodrich ended his career

with 25 assists, placing seventh. Keszler also finished the year ninth in career shutouts with four.

The Hoyas got the season off to a winning start when they rallied to defeat Delaware 2-1 off a winning goal by junior Danny McAnally with 10 minutes remaining in the game. Freshman Mike Glaccum notched his first career point for the Hoyas. The win was Tabatznik's 200th career victory.

For the next two games, Georgetown traveled to American for the annual D.C. College Cup. The Hoyas added another win in the 1-0 shutout against George Washington, with keeper Keszler notching his first career shutout. Junior defender Jeff Curtin scored the lone goal of the game off assists by McAnally and Gargan. In the second game of the D.C. College Cup, American outlasted the Hoyas 2-1 in overtime to hand Georgetown its first loss of the season.

In the next two games, the Hoyas would face two nationally ranked opponents. Georgetown next traveled to College Park, Md., where they would first face No. 14 Penn State. Despite Georgetown getting off to an early lead off a goal by Schramm, the Hoyas would fall 3-2 in overtime. After losing two in a row, the Hoyas were looking for a win, but they would not get one as they fell 4-3 to No. 3 Maryland.

With the BIG EAST regular season rapidly approaching, the Hoyas looked to rebound against Towson. The Hoyas defeated the Tigers 2-0 with Gargan notching the game winning goal 24 minutes into the game, for the second shutout of the year.

The Hoyas would enter the BIG EAST regular season on a one-game win streak, hoping the win would carry them against two nationally ranked opponents. In the first BIG EAST matchup of the year, Georgetown traveled to No. 4 Notre Dame. Despite scoring first, the Irish would defeat the Hoyas 4-1. Georgetown would then travel to No. 5 St. John's, hoping for a little luck, but none would fall as the Red Storm shutout the Hoyas 1-0.

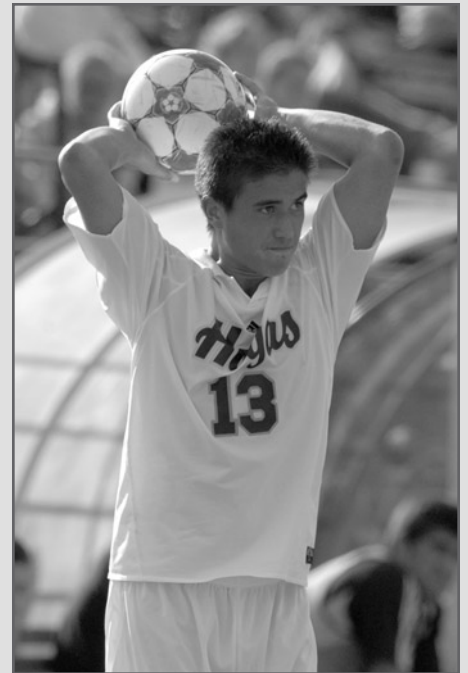
After dropping their first two BIG EAST games, the Hoyas made up for their losses by stomping on non-league opponent Mount St. Mary's 8-1. Senior Kaiser Chowdhry led Georgetown with two goals and two assists, while Schramm added two goals and an assist. The Hoyas kept their momentum as they topped BIG EAST opponent West Virginia 2-1 and Chowdhry again led the squad with a goal and an assist.

Georgetown kept on the winning streak as Schramm lifted the Hoyas over the Orange of Syracuse 3-2 where he notched a hat trick. Six days later, the Hoyas faced Providence where they outlasted the Friars 1-0 in double overtime off a goal by Schramm. The Hoyas carried the momentum of the wins with them as they faced the Scarlet Knights of Rutgers. Jeff Curtin scored the game-winning goal for Georgetown with the final score of 3-2.

After winning four straight games, it looked as though Georgetown was going to keep on rolling through Villanova after Curtin knocked in the first goal only seven minutes into the game off an assist from Gargan, but the Wildcats came back to defeat the Hoyas and end their four-game win streak with a 2-1 victory. Georgetown next traveled to Pittsburgh to hopefully get back on a win streak, but the Panthers denied the Hoyas that chance as Georgetown lost 2-1.

Next on the docket for the Hoyas was 12th-ranked Boston College. Both

teams played an even game through the first half and the second yet the Eagles knocked in a goal with 13 minutes remaining. With the Hoyas realizing time was running out and just missing scoring opportunities, Curtin snuck a goal past the BC keeper with only 20 seconds remaining in regulation to tie the game off assists from Schramm and Goodrich. The score remained 1-1 after two overtime periods. Georgetown used the momentum of the



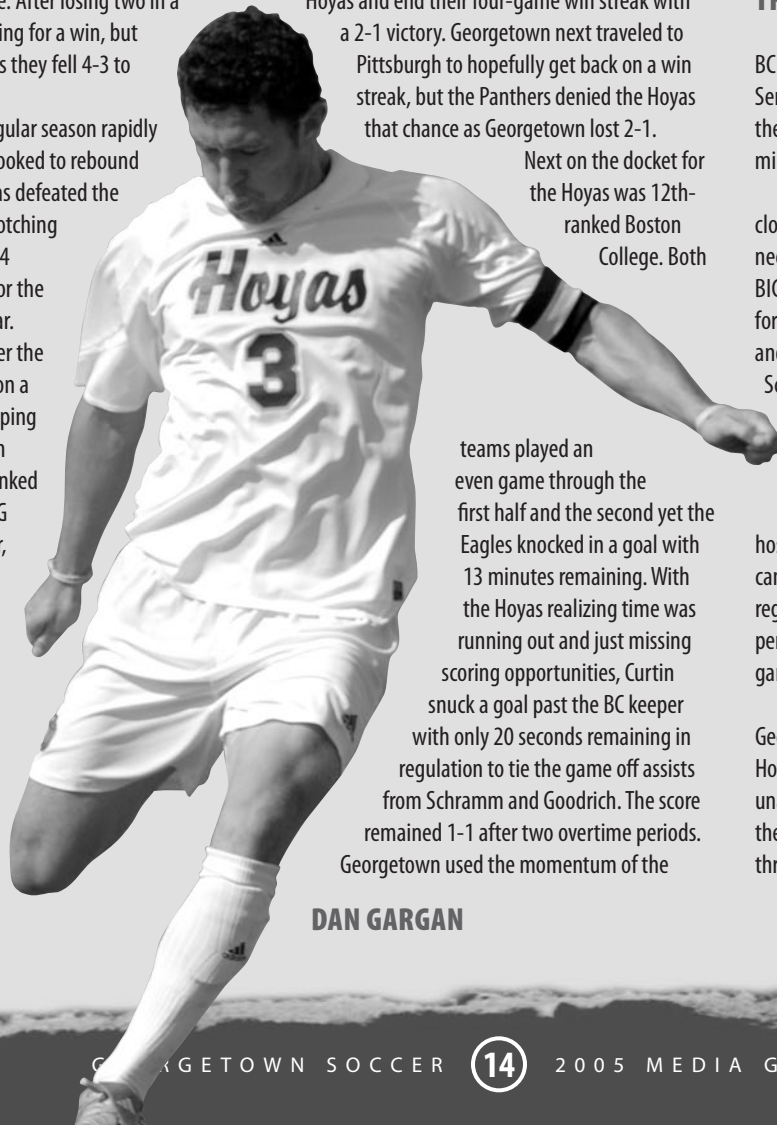

BC game to claim victory over Navy in a 2-1 victory. Senior Paul Brandley scored the first goal 17:35 into the game, and Goodrich scored the game-winner two minutes into the second half.

With the BIG EAST regular season coming to a close, the Hoyas faced No. 14 Seton Hall where they needed a victory to secure a spot in the postseason BIG EAST Championships. After a scoreless first half for both squads, Georgetown needed a little luck and a few goals. The Hoyas got what they needed as Schramm scored four minutes into the second half for the game winner as Seton Hall fell 4-0 on North Kehoe Field. The win clinched the fifth spot in the BIG EAST Championships.

In their final regular season game, the Hoyas hosted VMI. After having a 2-1 lead at the half, VMI came back to tie the game at three at the end of regulation. Both squads played an even first overtime period, but in the second overtime Gargan ended the game on a header from Goodrich.

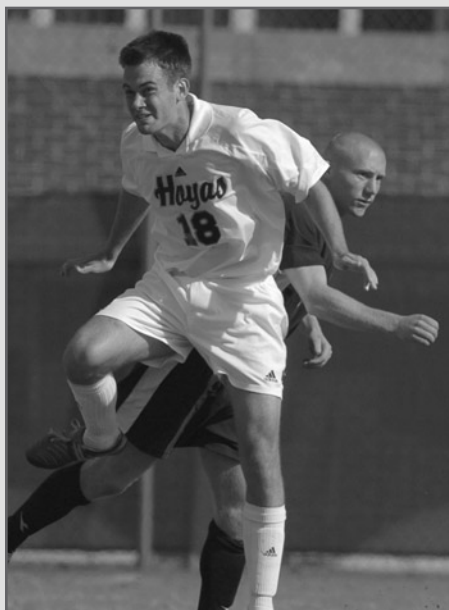
In the first round of the BIG EAST tournament, Georgetown traveled to the No. 4 seed, Villanova. The Hoyas scored first at the 69-minute mark, yet were unable to hold the Wildcats off as they scored to tie the game at 78:46. That's where the score remained through a pair of overtime sessions, setting up the

penalty-kick finale. Villanova inserted freshman Jason Friel into net for the session. Curtin converted his opening kick for Georgetown and Brett Stassfurth did the same for the Cats. After a miss by each squad, Glaccum converted for the Hoyas with Villanova's Felix Vincent answering with a conversion. Gargan knocked in Georgetown's fourth attempt while Pat Gallagher

duplicated the feat for Villanova. Brandley beat Friel on the Hoyas' fifth attempt before VU's Chris Edgar sent his attempt wide. By virtue of the penalty kicks, Georgetown advanced to the BIG EAST semifinals for the second time in three years.

For the semifinals of the BIG EAST tournament, Georgetown faced Seton Hall. After a scoreless regulation, the teams advanced to overtime. Unfortunately for the Hoyas, Seton Hall capitalized on a scoring opportunity and claimed victory, defeating the Hoyas 1-0. The loss ended the 2004 season for Georgetown.

With a final mark of 11-8-2 and a 5-4-1 BIG EAST record, the Hoyas set the sights of returning to the BIG EAST Championships in 2005. Georgetown departs five seniors as Ellery Bledsoe, Brandley, Chowdhry, co-captain Gargan and Goodrich ended their careers with their most successful season on the Hilltop.

ATHLETIC ADMINISTRATION

JOHN DEGIOIA

University President

John J. "Jack" DeGioia is Georgetown University's 48th President. He began working at Georgetown after graduating in 1979 and has held various positions of increasing responsibility throughout the University. From 1998 until June 2001 DeGioia served as Senior Vice President, overseeing University-wide operations for financial affairs, information technology, facilities and student housing, human resources, athletics, general counsel and other areas.

From 1992 to 1998 DeGioia served as Chief Administrative Officer of Georgetown's Main Campus, which consists of undergraduate and graduate programs. He oversaw an annual budget in excess of \$200 million and all of Georgetown University's Main Campus operations, including undergraduate admissions, student financial aid, finance and budget, athletics, student affairs, academic computing services, facilities, minority student affairs and the student career center.

DeGioia served as Georgetown University's Dean of Student Affairs from 1985 to 1992. In this capacity, he supervised the departments of student life, student services and facilities, athletics, career planning, student health, counseling and psychiatry and public safety, with combined budgets of more than \$35 million and a staff of 250.

DeGioia earned a bachelor's degree in English from Georgetown University in 1979 and his Ph.D. in philosophy in 1995. He served as assistant to then-Georgetown University president Timothy S. Healy, S.J. from 1982 to 1985. He is married to Theresa Miller DeGioia (C '89). They have one child.



BERNARD MUIR

Director of Athletics

Georgetown University named Bernard M. Muir to be Director of Athletics, effective July 1, 2005. As Director of Athletics, Muir oversees the operations of all Georgetown University intercollegiate and intramural athletic programs, which include more than 100 coaches and staff who support more than 650 student-athletes participating in 27 sports, the majority of which compete in the BIG EAST Conference. He is the 10th person in Georgetown's history to serve as Director of Athletics.

Muir previously served as Deputy Director of Athletics for Administration and Facilities at the University of Notre Dame, where he oversaw campus athletics facilities, game management operations and club and intramural sports and recreation. He has served as primary administrator for a number of sports and as secondary administrator for football. Prior to that position, he served as Senior Associate Athletic Director for Student Welfare and Development, where he handled issues related to student-athlete recruitment, integration into campus life and academic performance.

Muir was an eight-year staff member at the NCAA and the director of the Division I NCAA Men's Basketball Championship. He joined the NCAA staff in December 1992 as assistant director of the Division I Men's Basketball Championship and was promoted to director in August 1998. While in that position, he administered all policies and procedures relating to tickets for the championship, administering the men's and women's basketball officiating programs, monitored the actions of other select committees within the NCAA governance structure as it pertained to the work of the Division I Men's Basketball Committee and served as the primary liaison to institutions participating in the Division I Men's Basketball Championship.

Before joining the NCAA, Muir briefly worked as an academic affairs and compliance assistant at Auburn University and as event director



for Streetball Partners International in 1992. He also gained administrative experience at Brown, Butler and Ohio Universities, as well as with the Atlanta Falcons.

A 1990 graduate of Brown University with a bachelor's degree in organizational behavior and management, the Gainesville, Fla., native was a four-year letterwinner and co-captain of the Bears' basketball team. Muir was awarded the J. Richmond Fales Trophy presented to a member of the team for the vast contributions he made to his team and also earned the L. Stanley Ward Quiet Man Award. In addition, he served as Senior Class Marshall at the '90 Brown commencement exercises.

Muir, the recipient of an NCAA Ethnic Minority Postgraduate Scholarship for Careers in Athletics, attended Ohio University and earned a master's in sports administration and facility management in 1992. During the 1991-92 school year, he served as class president.

Born July 22, 1968, he and his wife, Liz, a former NCAA membership services representative and now the assistant athletics director for rules education at Notre Dame after serving as the director of equipment operations the past three years for the Fighting Irish, have two daughters—Libby and Millie.

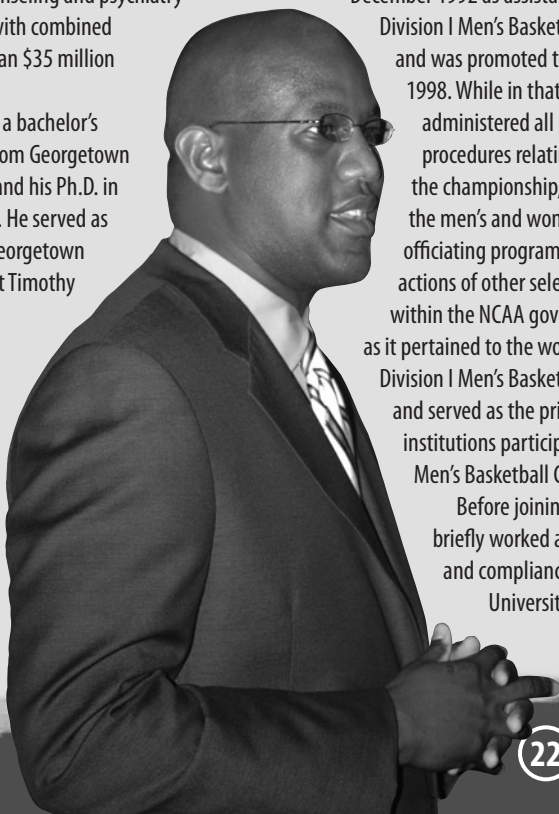
PATRICIA THOMAS

DWIGHT DATCHER

Associate Director of Athletics

Dwight Datcher, Associate Director of Athletics, is a native Washingtonian. Datcher enters his sixth year at Georgetown and has 28 years of experience in college athletics. His primary responsibilities are in the areas of Sports Medicine, NCAA compliance, men's basketball home game management, support services and the infrastructure of McDonough Gymnasium. Datcher also served as Assistant Tournament Manager when Georgetown hosted the first and second rounds of the 2002 NCAA Men's Basketball Championship at MCI Center.

Datcher is a 1974 graduate of Roger Williams University in Rhode Island where he was a four-year starter in men's basketball. After graduating, Datcher came to Georgetown as an assistant coach for the Hoyas until 1976. He spent the next eight years (1976-84) as the head boy's basketball coach at St. Anthony's High School where he compiled a record of 144-44. Datcher returned to his alma mater in 1985 to become head men's basketball coach, a position he would hold until 1992. While at Roger Williams, Datcher became the assistant director of athletics in 1987 and the director of athletics in 1989, all while continuing to coach. He also served as Roger Williams' sports information director from 1986-87. During the 1988 Olympics, Datcher was named an assistant men's basketball coach by the U.S. Olympic Association.

In 1992, Datcher became the director of athletics at the University of the District of Columbia, a position he held until joining the Georgetown staff in the summer of 1997.

Datcher resides in Temple Hills, Md., and is the proud father of two daughters, Chantee and Monikka.

DAVID SWANSON

Assistant Director of Athletics-Finance

David Swanson returned to the Hilltop in September of 1998 after spending 10 years at George Mason University. Swanson is primarily responsible for the athletic department's finances.



Swanson began his first stint at Georgetown in 1976, when he served as the assistant director of financial aid. He was promoted to associate director in 1978, a position he held for two years. In 1980, Swanson became the finance officer for the division of student affairs and athletics. In this position, he was the financial

manager for a division which included four auxiliary enterprises and five departments. Swanson stayed at GU until 1988, when he left to serve as director of auxiliary enterprises at George Mason University. In this capacity, one of the programs begun by Swanson was university licensing, using the Georgetown model.

DAVID HOLM

Assistant Director of Athletics for Compliance

David Holm was named Assistant Director of Athletics for Compliance in March 2005. Prior to being named Assistant Director of Athletics, Holm was involved in the Georgetown football program since 1999. He was named Assistant Head Football Coach in 2004, where he was responsible for recruiting, team operations, linebackers and athletic development and fundraising, and was Director of Football Operations from 2002-04. In 2003, Holm coached the Patriot League's seventh and 10th leading tacklers in William Skultety and Andrew Clarke, respectively. In 2002 Holm



coached the league's leader in Clarke. Holm oversaw the running backs in the 2000 season. He coached the defensive ends between 1999-00. Holm also coached first-team All-MAAC defensive end Paul Miller.

Prior to coming to Georgetown, Holm was the Dean of Students at Fenwick High School from 1997-99, and was the assistant Dean of Students from 1996-97. He also split time as the head sophomore football coach and as the varsity quarterbacks coach from 1996-99. Holm also taught social studies for three years.

Holm was the assistant football coach at Patterson High School in Louisiana from 1991 to 1995, before being promoted to head coach and athletic director for the 1995 season. During his tenure, the varsity squad qualified for the state playoffs every year, and was 1995 Bi-District Champions. While at Patterson, he was also the head girls basketball coach from 1990-95. In addition, Holm was also the Social Studies Department Chairman and teacher.

Holm graduated with a B.A. in History from the University of Wisconsin-Madison in 1988. In 1995, he received his master's of education in administration and supervision from Nicholls State University. He lives in Washington with his wife, Evelyn, and their three children, Annie, Sarah and Ben.

BRIAN MCGUIRE

Asst. Director of Athletics for Facilities, Operations & Game Management

Brian McGuire joined the Georgetown University Athletic Department in July of 1978. A 1972 Georgetown graduate, he was a member of the GU men's lacrosse team during his time as a student on the Hilltop.

McGuire lives with his wife, Colleen, in Arlington, Va. The couple has one son, Michael.



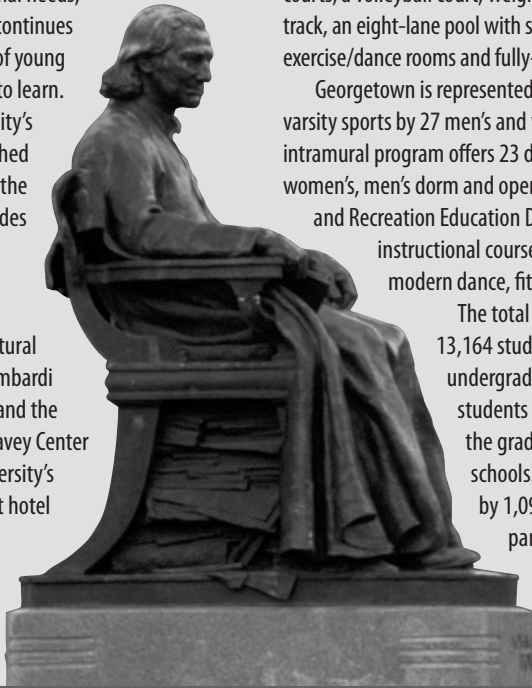

WELCOME TO GEORGETOWN

Combining the tradition of being the oldest Catholic institution of higher learning in the United States (founded in 1789) with an awareness of ever-changing educational needs, Georgetown University continues to challenge the minds of young women and men eager to learn.

Georgetown University's 104-acre campus is perched on a hilltop overlooking the Potomac River and includes more than 60 buildings. Among these buildings are the solar-powered Edward B. Bunn Intercultural Center, the Vincent T. Lombardi Cancer Research Center and the Thomas and Dorothy Leavey Center which contains the University's bookshop and a Marriott hotel with 150 rooms.

The Yates Field House, a four-level complex opened in



1979, offers recreational and relaxation opportunities for sports-minded University students. Among the features at Yates are four basketball courts, four squash courts, a volleyball court, weight training area, jogging track, an eight-lane pool with separate diving well, two exercise/dance rooms and fully-stocked Pro Shop.

Georgetown is represented in intercollegiate varsity sports by 27 men's and women's teams. The intramural program offers 23 different leagues with women's, men's dorm and open divisions. The Leisure and Recreation Education Department offers

instructional course in such activities as modern dance, fitness and aerobics.

The total enrollment of 13,164 students includes 6,537 undergraduates and 6,627 students seeking degrees in the graduate, law and medical schools. The University is served by 1,095 full-time and 317 part-time faculty.

Georgetown University focuses its wide-ranging



curriculum on international studies, languages and linguistics, government, politics, business and nursing. The School of Foreign Service was the first of its kind and is the largest in the nation; the Law Center is the largest in the country, with an active clinical program; and the Medical Center includes a 535-bed private teaching hospital.

The success of the University's philosophy and endeavors is reflected in the student body and applicant pool. Students come from all 50 states and 132 foreign countries. Georgetown maintains competitive admissions standards, accepting only 23 percent of its applicants for the freshman class of 2008.
