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Mission & Goals Statement of the Department of Athletics

The Georgetown University Department of Athletics, as part of a university with roots in the Jesuit tradition of education, commits itself to the comprehensive development of the student. The interdependence of the physical, emotional, moral and intellectual aspects of personal growth requires simultaneous and balanced focus. This objective does not imply that each facet of an individual's psychological, social and academic growth is of equal importance. It does require that Georgetown provide the means and encouragement for each person to develop according to his or her own interests and abilities. This is especially true in athletics, whether at the recreational, intercollegiate, intramural or instructional level. In addition to physical development, the Department of Athletics promotes principles of character, development and sportsmanship within the framework of an abiding and broadened commitment to community. Accordingly, the Athletics Department is committed to, fosters and pursues the fair and equitable treatment of both men and women, and the provision of equitable access and opportunities for minority students and institutional personnel.

NCAA Position on Gambling

The NCAA opposes all forms of legal and illegal sports wagering. Sports wagering has the potential to undermine the integrity of sports contests and jeopardizes the welfare of student-athletes and the intercollegiate community. Sports wagering demeans the competition and competitors alike by a message that is contrary to the purposes and meaning of "sport." Sports competition should be appreciated for the inherent benefits related to participation of student-athletes, coaches and institutions in fair contests, not the amount of money wagered on the outcome of the competition. For these reasons, the NCAA membership has adopted specific rules prohibiting athletics department staff members and student-athletes from engaging in gambling activities as they relate to intercollegiate or professional intercollegiate or professional sporting events.

Title IX and NCAA Peer Review

The Georgetown University Athletics Department has undergone two extensive reviews of its athletic programs: an audit by the Department of Education concerning Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, and Georgetown's inaugural review under the NCAA's new Athletics Certification program. The Department of Education has found Georgetown's athletic programs to be in compliance with Title IX, and the University was certified by the NCAA in November of 1995 and again in 2001.

In accordance with the requirements of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, and the implementing regulations promulgated under each of these federal statutes, Georgetown University does not discriminate in its programs, activities, or employment practices on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, age or disability. The University's compliance program under these statutes and regulations is supervised by Rosemary Kilkenny, Special Assistant to the President of Affirmative Action Programs. Combining the tradition of being the oldest Catholic institution of higher learning in the United States with an awareness of ever-changing educational needs, Georgetown University continues to challenge the minds of young men and women eager to learn.

Founded in 1789 as Georgetown College, a small gathering of 12 students and a handful of professors, it has grown into a major international university that includes four undergraduate schools, respected graduate programs, a law school and a medical school.

Georgetown's 104-acre Main and Medical Center campus is located in a historic neighborhood of the nation's capital and overlooking the Potomac River.

Ranked among the nation's most distinguished institutions of higher learning, the success of the University's philosophy and endeavors is reflected in its enrollment

and applicant pool. Its student body, one of the most geographically diverse in the country, consists of individuals from all 50 states and 132 foreign countries.

Today more than 14,000 students are enrolled in undergraduates and graduate programs at Georgetown University. Georgetown today is a major student-centered, international, research university offering respected undergraduate, graduate and professional programs in Washington, DC, Doha, Qatar and around the world.

700 full-time and 350 part-time professors teach undergraduates on the main campus. Distinguished professors include former Secretary of State Madeleine Albright, former USAID Administrator Andrew Natsios, best-selling author and commentator Michael Eric Dyson, best-selling author and linguist Deborah Tannen and former National Security Advisor Anthony Lake.

SCHOOL COLORS

Blue and gray were adopted as the official school colors in 1866 following the Civil War, to symbolize the reunification of the North and the South. The war had such a profound impact upon the University, which housed the Union Army as it moved south to occupy the surrounding area.

WHAT IS A HOYA?

The Georgetown mascot, the Hoya, is derived from the Greek and Latin phrase "Hoya Saxa," which, loosely translated, means "What Rocks!" Some say it originated in a cheer referring to the stones that comprised the school's outer walls; others say it began in the 19th century with the birth of Georgetown's Stonewalls baseball club; a third version has a "hoya saxa" cheer arising after an impressive goal-line stand by the defense of the Hoya football team. The name proved popular and the term "Hoyas" was eventually adopted for all Georgetown teams.

WHO IS JACK?

Georgetown's mascot is Jack the Bulldog. The name "Jack" and the breed of English Bulldog was formally adopted in 1962, after a long line of breeds "auditioned" for the position during the first half of the century. Georgetown was one of the first schools to employ a "human mascot." A familiar blue and grey costumed student appears at all major athletic and social events and is one of the most recognizable college mascots in the nation.

Division I level, most of them in the nationally-recognized BIG EAST Conference. Georgetown's 800-plus student-athletes are a major portion of the University's enrollment, with more than one of every 10 undergraduates, competing on a team.

Athletics at Georgetown enjoys a rich history dating back to the first documented athletic contest, a baseball game on May 10, 1870. Georgetown's tradition includes a total of 17 team and 18 individual national championships, while boasting numerous Olympians, National Players of the Year and All-Americans.

The success continued for Georgetown athletics during the 2007-08 academic year. Eighteen student-athletes earned All-America honors, while an additional 60 earned all-conference recognition, including six major conference award winners, and 254 received academic acknowledgement.

The highlight of the year was the men's basketball team winning its second-straight BIG EAST Regular Season Championship – a feat accomplished by only four other teams in the league and for the first time since 1994-95 -

The track and field program had another strong season. The women's team finished in second place at the BIG EAST Indoor Championships, while the men's team finished in third place. Sophomore Andrew Bumbalough, who ran a sub-four minute mile during the season, finished in second place in the 3,000m and four student-athletes earned All-American honors.

HISTORY

For more than 220 years, Georgetown University has overlooked the banks of the Potomac River. Georgetown owes its existence to Archbishop John Carroll, whose desire for an academy to educate the Catholic youth of the nation that gave root to the founding of Georgetown. Construction began on the first building in 1788, but the first student, William Gaston, arrived from North Carolina in 1791 before it was even completed. Two years later, Charles and George Dinnies, brothers from New York, were awarded the degree of Bachelor of Arts and became the College's first graduates.

By 1871, Georgetown had expanded to include two professional schools: medicine and law, and gradually moved towards establishing itself as a university. During

grew and a host of building were constructed including Yates Field House, the Intercultural Center and the Leavey Center.

Georgetown has continued to see a significant amount of growth over the last two decades. The building boom on all three campuses is the most visible sign and the undergraduate students rank among the finest in the country. Faculty members are increasingly gaining recognition for their cutting edge research and widely acclaimed scholarship. The graduate school is concentrating on attaining distinction in certain fields, and the medical center continues to build upon the excellent tradition of research in oncology, neurosciences and genetics. The law center has not only, again, become one of the largest schools in the country but ranks among the top law institutions in terms of faculty and programs.

Under the 46th president, John J. DeGioia, Georgetown has renewed a focus on interreligious dialogue and intercultural understanding. In 2006, the university established the Berkley Center for Religion Peace and World Affairs, which explores the intersection of religion with contemporary global challenges. Now, in its third century, Georgetown is poised to continue its dynamic mission of excellence and has gone far to fulfill the vision of founder John Carroll.

FACILITIES

A major new addition to Georgetown's campus is the Southwest Quadrangle, a \$188.5 million initiative that was the largest construction project in Georgetown history. Part of an ongoing effort to enhance the quality of campus life, the project provided a new 784-bed residence hall, a multi-level underground parking facility, a 1,200-person Leo J. O'Donovan S.J. dining hall, and a new home for Georgetown's Jesuit Community. Additionally, the Davis Performing Arts Center and the Wagner Alumni House opened in Fall 2005. A new home for the McDonough School of Business is under construction and a new Science Center is now planned.

In October of 1988 the Leavey Center was constructed to house the Office of Student Affairs, the University Bookstore, a cafeteria, several restaurants, a hotel and conference center with 150 rooms, and a parking garage. For recreation and relaxation, students and faculty head to Yates Field house, a four level sports complex. Among the features of this facility are 12 multi-purpose courts for tennis, basketball, racquetball, squash, and volleyball; a four-lane, 200-meter indoor jogging track; a dance studio; and an eight-lane swimming pool with separate diving area.

DIVERSITY

Georgetown University's commitment to diversity is manifested in its student body -- which includes people of many different ethnic and religious backgrounds -- and in its commitment to the recruitment of outstanding women and minorities to join its community of faculty and staff. Georgetown is an equal opportunity employer, and makes a concerted effort to achieve ethnic and gender diversity throughout its workforce.

Georgetown University has long been a leader among America's most selective institutions in promoting a



and earning its third-straight bid to the NCAA Tournament. Senior center Roy Hibbert was named a Second-Team Associated Press All-American and was selected in the first round of the 2008 NBA Draft, while classmate Patrick Ewing, Jr. was named the BIG EAST's Sixth Man of the Year and was a second round NBA pick.

The women's soccer team enjoyed one its best seasons ever, posting a 14-8 overall record and being selected to the NCAA Tournament for the first time. Head Coach Dave Nolan was named the BIG EAST Coach of the Year and freshman Ingrid Wells was named the BIG EAST Rookie of the Year.

The women's lacrosse team advanced to the championship game of the BIG EAST Tournament and was selected for the NCAA Tournament. The Georgetown sailing team, under the direction of Head Coach Mike Callahan, won its first-ever Fleet Racing National Championship and senior Chris Behm was awarded the Everett B. Morris Trophy, given to the College Sailor of the Year.

this time, the school was guided by the efforts of Patrick F. Healy, S.J., who is often referred to as its second founder. The son of an Irish immigrant and a former slave, Father Healy became the first African-American to earn a Ph.D. and the first to head a predominantly white university. President from 1874 until 1882, he is credited with guiding Georgetown from a small liberal arts college to a modern university.

Women began to study at Georgetown when the School of Nursing was founded in 1903. Their enrollment increased gradually through the first part of the century and by 1952 was admitted to all schools but the College of Arts and Sciences. At the end of the 1960's, the University became fully coeducational, as women were admitted to the college.

The 1980's were highlighted by intense growth and prosperity through the leadership of its 46th President Timothy S. Healy, S.J. Its academic reputation improved, its endowment increased five-fold, minority enrollment

diverse student body. Nearly 30 percent of Georgetown's undergraduate population is from a multi-cultural background; the breakdown is as follows: African American, 6.7 percent; Asian American, 8.7 percent; Hispanic, 6.4 percent; and Native American, less than one percent.

VOLUNTEERISM AND SERVICE

At Georgetown, community service and volunteerism have long been defining characteristics of students' education and the University's mission. Georgetown embraces and lives out the Catholic, Jesuit ideal of service in its undergraduate, graduate, law and medical schools. Georgetown currently sponsors more than 100 community service initiatives that involve countless students, faculty, staff and alumni, and range from teaching children to offering pro bono legal services and providing health care for the medically underserved.

As a Catholic, Jesuit university, Georgetown undergraduates have historically chosen service careers in high numbers after graduation; in 2003, according to a voluntary survey of graduating seniors, more than 139 chose jobs in the public sector -- non-profit institutions, volunteer service, education, government service, Jesuit Volunteer Corps and other organizations in addition to the Peace Corps.

In 2007, Georgetown University produced the fifth highest number of Peace Corps volunteers among all private universities in the country, with 42 Georgetown alumni joining the Peace Corps. In 2008, Teach for America accepted 59 Georgetown graduates to their program, making Teach for America the No. 1 private employer of Georgetown graduates.

INTERNATIONAL EDUCATION

Cultural immersion and a rigorous educational experience abroad are an integral part of the Georgetown tradition of liberal education. Georgetown University takes great pride in its international character and is recognized as a national leader in international learning, providing overseas study opportunities for its students and hosting international students on campus.

In 2005, Georgetown University's School of Foreign Service opened a campus in Doha, Qatar. Building on Georgetown's tradition of educating future leaders in the international arena, the Qatar campus provides an interdisciplinary liberal arts undergraduate program focused on international affairs.

The Office of International Programs at Georgetown University fosters the international character of the University by promoting, supporting and developing a wide range of international and intercultural opportunities for members of the Georgetown community. Through study abroad and internationally focused study, students can increase their awareness of the global community, learn about another country's culture and history and broaden their language and communication skills.

Approximately 50 percent of Georgetown University students decide to participate in academic programs overseas. Students who study overseas return with valuable new perspectives on the world. Graduating seniors consistently list these experiences as one of the five top areas of satisfaction with their Georgetown education.

Additionally, international students, researchers, and faculty are an extremely important part of the George-

town community. Nearly 2,200 individuals, including 300 undergraduates, from more than 120 foreign countries study, conduct research, and teach at Georgetown.

International students make up approximately 12 percent of the Georgetown student body. The Office of International Programs provides a variety of support services to international students, researchers, and faculty at Georgetown, including cultural and educational programming, immigration advising and personal counseling.

UNDERGRADUATE PROGRAMS

Georgetown College: While the College has changed much during its 220-year history, it continues to draw on the dynamic tradition of Jesuit education in promoting not only the intellectual disciplines but also the search for personal and social values. The College has maintained its emphasis on the liberal arts, although it has grown and developed consistently by complementing traditional disciplines with courses reflecting today's world.

The student body has increased in recent years to 3,200 students, an enrollment which allows for diversity and yet enables the College to look to the interests of each individual student. Through their research, the faculty makes valuable contributions to scholarship, while continuing to give priority to excellence in teaching and to the development of a community of learning.

The College offers flexible curricula that encourage breadth and depth of exploration within the classroom — and without. Washington, D.C. — with its resources such as the Smithsonian Institution, The National Archives and the Library of Congress — and the world beyond become extensions of the classroom through internships and foreign study programs. Its curriculum is designed to enable its graduates to continue redefining their goals and maturing their thoughts throughout their lives.

Edmund A. Walsh School of Foreign Service: The Edmund A. Walsh School of Foreign Service is the oldest and largest School of International Affairs in the United States. With an enrollment of over 1,400 undergraduate students, the School is the foremost institution of its kind and enjoys a world wide reputation.

The School of Foreign Service seeks to motivate and

prepare its students for effective performance in international affairs careers. Throughout its history, the scope of "foreign service" has grown dramatically, while the modes of entry into professional employment have also changed in educationally significant ways. Today an increasing number of career fields have major international aspects and both the public and private sectors require personnel with knowledge of international affairs, government, commerce, finance, education, law and journalism.

Taking advantage of its location in one of the world's major diplomatic arenas, the School offers a four-year multi-disciplinary liberal arts program in international relations. Enhancing the curriculum are issue and policy-oriented seminars taught by faculty from the Washington foreign affairs community as well as resident professors. Further, the international composition of the student body itself lends an immediacy and reality to the study of foreign affairs.

The School of Foreign Service welcomes applications from students who wish to devote themselves to the careful study required for future international service and who are eager to test their abilities against the demands and opportunities of a unique educational program.

The Robert Emmett McDonough School of Business: The mission of the Robert Emmett McDonough School of Business at Georgetown University has been to integrate liberal arts and professional education. The McDonough School of Business prepares students for positions of responsibility in business, finance and government.

As members of an international university in an international city, students participate in the nation's living history. They balance the academically rigorous curriculum with attendance at concerts, cultural events, symposia and government hearings unique to the nation's capital.

The Bachelor of Science degree provides students with a versatile background, competently preparing them for either immediate employment or for graduate study. More than 60 percent of those graduating from the McDonough School of Business eventually pursue postgraduate work. Graduates have been highly successful in obtaining admission to top-ranked Master's of Business Administration programs.



School of Nursing and Health Studies: Students of the Georgetown School of Nursing and Health Studies have a unique opportunity to secure a broad education in the humanities and sciences while earning degrees. Its programs offer excellence in liberal studies, in addition to a professional education, which is made possible through University offerings. In addition to major, students may select a minor of concentrations and courses through the Georgetown University Medical Center, which allows students an opportunity to participate and to learn within the full range of its health care facilities.

The School of Nursing also utilizes health care settings and other appropriate agencies in the metropolitan Washington area for clinical and internships experiences.

GRADUATE PROGRAMS

School of Medicine: Committed to training physicians in all dimensions of the delivery of humane patient care, the School of Medicine works in association with the 407-bed Georgetown University Hospital and nine affiliated federal and community hospitals in the Washington metropolitan area. The Medical Center provides an environ-

ment that promotes training and educational opportunities, and includes a \$23-million Concentrated Care Center with a modern 12-room surgical suite, 24 preoperative and postoperative surgical suites, and state-of-the-art emergency, X-ray, and transplant facilities. The campus also contains a modern health science library, basic and preclinical science buildings, classrooms, laboratories, and a new research building.

Georgetown University is located in one of the most concentrated regions for medical research in the country. The National Institutes of Health and other nationally prominent health care and research facilities are within minutes.

Law Center: Georgetown Law Center occupies three city blocks in downtown Washington, where it forms a dynamic, diverse community of thinkers. Georgetown law professors moot 25 percent of the cases that are argued before the Supreme Court. The Law Center's program in clinical legal education consistently ranks as the best in the nation, and programs in environmental, international, and tax law and in trial advocacy regularly place among

the top ten of the nation's law schools.

As a leading national law school, Georgetown traditionally has attracted students of demonstrated ability from every section of the country and the world. Equally diverse, the Law Center faculty is a community of highly distinguished scholars with a deep commitment to vigorous research and a firm dedication to teaching legal concepts and philosophies.

Graduate School of Arts and Sciences: The Graduate School offers degrees in 42 departments and more than 40 joint programs. Its growth has been matched by increases in both faculty and financial aid devoted to graduate education.

Throughout its history, the Graduate School's development has been guided by the principles of inclusiveness and freedom of inquiry, and by commitment to the highest standards of teaching and scholarship and to Jesuit ideals of service to society. Today the Graduate School offers its students all the resources of a major research university, focused to deliver outstanding graduate education in a select number of fields.

M STREET

Georgetown University sits on the western edge of the area of the same name, which is highly regarded as Washington's most fascinating and lively urban neighborhood. Steeped in history and architectural design, modern Georgetown is a world renowned destination for shopping, dining, and entertainment, in addition to being home to scores of celebrities and dignitaries.

SHOPPING

From the hip to the avant garde, the shopping in Georgetown is hard to beat. Centered at the intersection of Wisconsin Avenue and M Street, Georgetown is a paradise to the discerned shopper. In addition to sidewalk shops hosting everything from Abercrombie & Fitch to April Cornell there are several larger venues, including Ralph Lauren, H & M and Benetton. A historic facade disguises the three-story underground "Shops at Georgetown Park," featuring an array of high end boutiques and fashion options. Everything from antiques to formal attire is available to the Georgetown shopper.

DINING

If coming to the area to grab a bite to eat, the neighborhood features a vast array of ambiance and cuisine. Hoose to dine on fresh seafood while basking in the sun at a riverfront table or rub elbows with celebrities and dignitaries at a Prospect Street sidewalk cafe. Georgetown is sure to please any palate or craving for the hard to find cuisines.

NIGHTLIFE

Long considered a must-do area for Washington nightlife, Georgetown is the gathering place for D.C.-area college students and young professionals. The area features The Third Edition, a restaurant used as a location in the movie "St. Elmo's Fire." John J. DeGioia
UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT

For nearly a quarter century, John J. DeGioia has helped to define and strengthen Georgetown University as a premier institution for education and research. Since graduating from the University in 1979, he has served both as a senior administrator and as a faculty member. On July 1, 2001, he became Georgetown's 48th president.

UNIVERSITY LEADERSHIP

As president, Dr. DeGioia is deeply committed to sustaining academic excellence at Georgetown. He has helped to recruit intellectual leaders to the faculty and secured substantial funding for scholarly research and academic programs.

Under Dr. DeGioia's leadership, the University completed in December 2003 the largest fund-raising effort in University history, the Third Century Campaign. The \$1 billion capital campaign benefited Georgetown's Main, Medical, and Law Center campuses to secure endowment funds for curriculum and faculty support, increase student financial aid, and build and renovate facilities. In 2002-2003, Dr. DeGioia oversaw the largest expansion of

campus facilities, with the Southwest Quadrangle - a one million square-foot complex of student housing; study, seminar and music rooms; and a new Jesuit Community - at the forefront.

Dr. DeGioia addresses broader issues in higher education as a board member of the American Council on Education, the Association of American Colleges and Universities, and the Campus Compact, and as an executive committee member of the Council on Competitiveness. He is chair of the Consortium on Financing Higher Education and serves on the Business-Higher Education Forum.

INSTITUTIONAL PRIORITIES

To prepare young people for leadership roles in the global community, Dr. DeGioia has expanded opportunities for intercultural and interreligious dialogue, welcomed world leaders to campus, and convened international conferences to address challenging issues. He is a member of the U.S. National Commission for UNESCO and Chair of its Education Committee and he represents Georgetown at the World Economic Forum and on the Council on Foreign Relations.

Dr. DeGioia has enhanced Georgetown's relationship with the many political, cultural, corporate, and economic resources of Washington, D.C. He serves on the Greater Washington Board of Trade and the Federal City Council. Dr. DeGioia is also a strong supporter of Georgetown's social justice initiatives that seek to improve opportunities

for Washington's underserved neighborhoods.

As the first lay president of a Jesuit university, Dr. DeGioia places special emphasis on sustaining and strengthening Georgetown's Catholic and Jesuit identity and its responsibility to serve as a voice and an instrument for justice. He has also been a strong advocate for inter-religious dialogue. He is a member of the Order of Malta, a lay religious order of the Roman Catholic Church dedicated to serving the sick and the poor.

ACADEMIC, PROFESSIONAL, AND PERSONAL

Dr. DeGioia is a Professorial Lecturer in the Department of Philosophy. He earned a bachelor's degree in English from Georgetown University in 1979 and his PhD in Philosophy from the University in 1995. He has most recently taught "Ethics and Global Development," "Human Rights: A Culture in Crisis," and a seminar on "Ways of Knowing." Prior to his appointment as president, Dr. DeGioia held a variety of senior administrative positions at Georgetown, including senior vice president, responsible for university-wide operations, and dean of student affairs. In 2004, he was presented with a Lifetime Achievement Award for Excellence in Academia from the Sons of Italy.

Dr. DeGioia was raised in Orange, Connecticut, and Hanford, California. He and his wife, Theresa Miller DeGioia, a Georgetown alumna, and their son, John Thomas, live in Washington, D.C.



Bernard M. Muir
DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Georgetown University named Bernard M. Muir its 13th Director of Athletics (Francis X. Rienzo Chair), effective July 1, 2005. As Director of Athletics, Muir oversees the operations of all

Georgetown University intercollegiate and intramural athletic programs, which include more than 100 coaches and staff who support more than 700 student-athletes participating in 29 sports, the majority of which compete in the BIG EAST Conference.

Muir previously served as Deputy Director of Athletics for Administration and Facilities at the University of Notre Dame, where he oversaw campus athletics facilities, game management operations and club and intramural sports and recreation.

Muir was an eight-year staff member at the NCAA and the director of the Division I NCAA Men's Basketball Championship. He joined the NCAA staff in December 1992 as assistant director of the Division I Men's Basketball Championship and was promoted to director in August 1998. As Director, he administered both the policies relating to tickets for the championship, and the men's and women's basketball officiating programs. He also monitored other select committees within the NCAA governance structure and served as the primary

liaison to institutions participating in the Division I Men's Basketball Championship.

A 1990 graduate of Brown University with a bachelor's degree in organizational behavior and management, the Gainesville, Fla., native was a four-year letterwinner and co-captain of the Bears' basketball team. He also earned a master's degree in sports administration from Ohio University.

Muir serves on the NCAA Committee on Women's Athletics.

Born July 22, 1968, he and his wife, Liz, a former NCAA membership services representative have two daughters - Libby and Millie.

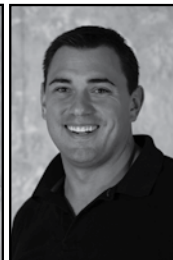

TENTH SEASON

The 2009 season marks the 10th season at the helm of the Georgetown baseball team for head coach Pete Wilk. Since taking over the Hoyas in the summer of 1999, Wilk has rebuilt the program and his 166 wins make him the all-time winningest coach in the program's history.

In 2004 and 2005, Wilk guided the team to its most successful two-season win total (50) since the 1984-85 seasons. Wilk also was named Coach of the Year by The Hoya for his efforts in 2004.

During his tenure on the Hilltop, Wilk has implemented a Career Night for current Hoya baseball players to get career advice and network with GU baseball alumni. Wilk has also initiated the pre-season First Pitch Dinner which is a fundraiser exclusively for the baseball program. The inaugural First Pitch Dinner in 2005 featured Terry Francona, manager of the World Champion Boston Red Sox, as the guest speaker and television and radio personality Mike Barnicle as the emcee.

Wilk has seen six Georgetown players move onto the professional ranks: Matthew Bouchard, Parker Brooks (C'05), Brandon Davis (B'07), Michael Lombardi (B'04), Eddie Pena (B'05) and Eric Sutton (B'02).

Before becoming head coach at Georgetown in 2000, Wilk served as an assistant coach with the Hoyas for the 1998 and 1999 season.

Wilk came to the Hilltop in the fall of 1997 after serving as the head baseball coach at Acton-Boxboro High School in Massachusetts, where he helped turn around a program that previously went 3-17 into a 13-10 team that made an appearance in the 1996 state semifinals.

Prior to coaching at Acton-Boxboro, Wilk served as an assistant coach at Harvard University for four years (1992-95). He began his collegiate coaching career at Boston University where he was an assistant coach for two seasons (1990-91).

In addition to his Georgetown coaching duties, Wilk was an assistant coach for the Harwich Mariners of the prestigious Cape Cod summer league, which won the Eastern Division title in 1997 before the Barrington, R.I., native took over the helm of the Mat-Su Miners of the Alaska Baseball League in 1998 and 1999.

Wilk has a wealth of international baseball experience. He has previously worked baseball clinics in the Dominican Republic (2000-02, 2005), as well as in Germany (1996) and Sweden (1994) for Major League Baseball. In January 2001, he worked a clinic in Oslo for the Norwegian Baseball Federation.

Wilk is a 1987 graduate of Rollins College, where he earned a degree in American Studies and married his wife Erin in June of 2008.

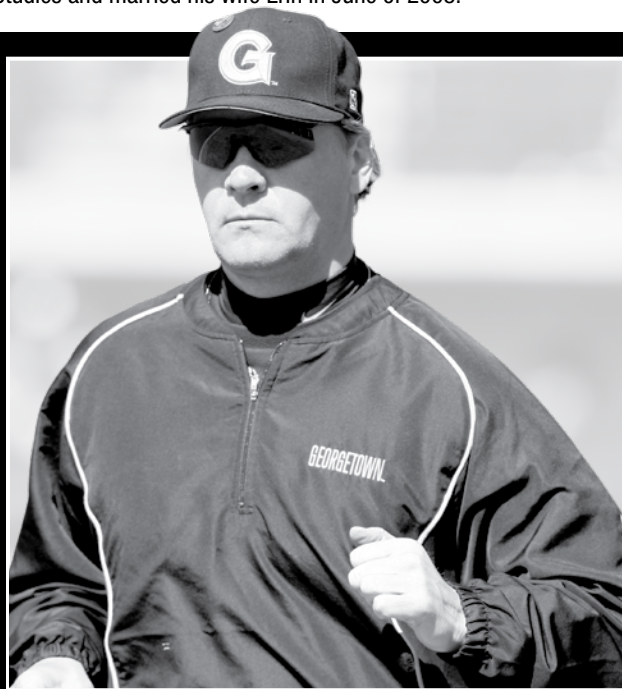

SECOND SEASON

Brown is entering his second year as the pitching coach and recruiting coordinator at Georgetown after previous stops at Radford, Richmond and most recently, Wake Forest. As the pitching coach, Brown assists in all facets of running the baseball program. His duties include recruiting, travel, scouting, academic review, and budget maintenance.

For the past year, Brown has worked with Bethesda-Chevy Chase Baseball Inc. He has served as the head coach of the U16 Maryland Patriots and the BCC Bulldogs. During his time in Bethesda, he has also been the Director of College and Prep Presentations while providing lessons and clinic instruction. From 2004-06, he was the Personal Recruiting Director for Baseball Factory Inc., which entailed assisting both high school seniors in their college search, and coaches in their quest to find the right players.

Previous to Wake Forest, Brown was the pitching coach and recruiting coordinator at the University of Richmond from 2000-03. During his tenure there, Brown was either involved in, or in charge of, every aspect of the Spiders program. During 2002 and 2003, Richmond posted the fourth-best winning percentage in the entire country. The Spiders won consecutive Atlantic-10 regular season championships and the pitching staffs finished in among the top 20 in 2002 and top 10 in 2003. Numerous players coached by Brown went on to win all-conference, all-region and national accolades.

From 1998-2000, Brown coached at Radford University, where he was promoted from volunteer assistant coach after one season to pitching coach and recruiting coordinator. In 2000, the Highlanders posted their most wins in nine seasons and the team's pitching staff posted their lowest ERA in school history.

During the summer of 1999, in between the seasons at Radford, Brown worked as a coach in the Coastal Plain League in Florence, S.C. While coaching in the CPL, he worked with college ballplayers and helped them develop their overall baseball skills.

Brown played at Richmond from 1994-98 and was a team captain during his senior season. While there, the Spiders reached the NCAA Regionals on three separate occasions and were two-time Colonial Athletic Association Champions. He also served on the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee during his sophomore and junior seasons.

THOMAS SHAFFER

Volunteer Coach

FIRST SEASON

Shaffer comes to Georgetown after working as the head baseball coach for Montgomery College Rockville and as an adjunct faculty member for health enhancement, exercise science, and the physical education department.

This season with the Hoyas, Shaffer's duties will consist of working with the outfielders and aiding Coach Brock in working with the hitters. He will also be handling office duties including clerical tasks associated with recruiting.

Shaffer is a 2001 graduate of Frostburg State University, where he obtained a bachelor of science degree in health and fitness. In 2008 he received a masters degree in sports sciences in sport administration from Delaware State University.

J.J. BROCK

Assistant Coach



SECOND SEASON

Brock is entering his second season at Georgetown after spending three seasons as an assistant coach at the University of Toledo. Brock assists in all aspects of the program, but his main responsibility is working with the infielders. He also helps coordinate the Hoyas' diverse offering of baseball camps.

At Toledo, Brock helped lead the Rockets to the team's first appearance in the Mid-American Tournament since 1999, and only their fourth trip since 1981. As the infield coach, the 2005, 2006 and 2007 teams ranked first, second and third for assists in school history, with the 2006 team finishing 12th in the nation, averaging 1.15 double plays per game.

Brock also served as an assistant coach at Saint Mary's College in Moraga, Calif. from 2001-2003. At Saint Mary's, Brock served as the infield and hitting coach and also assisted with recruiting and scouting for the Gaels.

During the 2002 season, the Gaels tied the school record for wins in the West Coast Conference (WCC) and turned 64 double plays on the season and had the highest per game mark in the NCAA that season.

While at Saint Mary's, Brock coached three players - third baseman Mark Teahen (supplemental first round, Oakland A's), outfielder Jason Waugh (11th round, Toronto Blue Jays) and shortstop Brett Wayne (22nd round, Los Angeles Dodgers) - who were selected in the 2002 Major League Baseball Draft. He also worked with catcher Nick Conte, who was drafted in the 13th round by the San Francisco Giants in 2003.

Prior to his coaching stint at Saint Mary's, Brock was an assistant coach for the Danville Dans (Danville, Ill.) in 2001 and helped coach Danville's championship summer team of the Central Illinois Collegiate League (CICL).

A native of Colorado, Brock played two years professionally in the Arizona Diamondbacks' organization in 2001. He started his career at Class A South Bend (Ind.) before moving to AA El Paso for one season.

Brock was a four-year letterwinner at Notre Dame from 1995-98 and graduated with a bachelor of science in mathematics. He served as the team captain during the 1997 and 1998 seasons. The 1997 Fighting Irish squad won the BIG EAST regular season championship. Brock started 238 games in the infield and was the team's MVP as a senior. He was also named a First Team All-BIG EAST shortstop in 1998 and was named a GTE Academic All-District selection as both a junior and as a senior.

Before his coaching stops at St. Mary's and Danville, Brock earned a master's degree in physical education athletic administration at Ohio University from 2000-01. While at Ohio, he spent one season working with the Bobcats' outfielders and hitters as a graduate assistant coach.

2009 PREVIEW

Redshirt sophomore Dan Capeless will return at first base for the Hoyas and will hit in the middle of the order.

Last season, he led the team in hits, finished second in runs and home runs and third in runs batted in. The Massachusetts native also finished among the top 20 in the BIG EAST batting average, proving to be a difficult out for conference pitchers. Third base will be manned by sophomore standout Sean Lamont who led the team with a .564 slugging percentage (11th in the BIG EAST), 36 runs scored and batted in and 12 home runs (sixth in the BIG EAST). Lamont and Capeless make up the cornerstones of a potent infield offense.

Junior Tom Elliott should start the season at shortstop, while junior Chip Malt could join him in the middle infield at second base. Elliott finished second on the team with a .325 batting average and also accumulated a .392 on-base percentage and a .470 slugging percentage. Malt finished fifth on the team with a .295 batting average, improving on his freshman numbers and growing into a solid option. These two players complement Capeless and Lamont while providing interior defense.

Andy Lentz, a four-year starter at Brother Rice in Michigan who received All-Catholic, All-League in the Detroit Catholic League, and All-District honors, will spell Elliott and Malt at second base and shortstop.

Sophomore Dan Godefroi, junior Tommy Lee and senior Kelly Muir form the starting trio in Georgetown's outfield. Lee, one of the 2009 co-captains, started all but one game in his first season, led the team in at bats and finished second on the team in hits and runs. He has the ability to cover a lot of ground in the outfield which cuts down on hits and runners taking extra bases. Muir, led the team in triples, was second on the squad in stolen bases and possesses the strongest arm of the three.

Sophomore Erick Fernandez will handle the designated hitter position and will be in the lineup as a backup infielder and catcher due to his bat. On days where he is not used at the DH spot, senior Sean Baumann will step in to fill the role. Fernandez finished second on the team in RBI and third on the team in hits, total bases and batting average and teamed with Baumann, who was named to the BIG EAST Weekly Honor Roll during the 2008 season and finished third on the team in home runs, makes this duo a formidable combination.

Behind the plate, senior Greg Pustizzi will get the nod due to his proficient understanding of the

game and baseball instincts. Serving as the other co-captain on the 2009 squad, Pustizzi's ability to communicate with the pitchers and other players is a vital factor to his success.

Last season, Georgetown hurlers set the school-record for fewest walks allowed and this year's starting pitchers will look to build on that accomplishment in 2009.

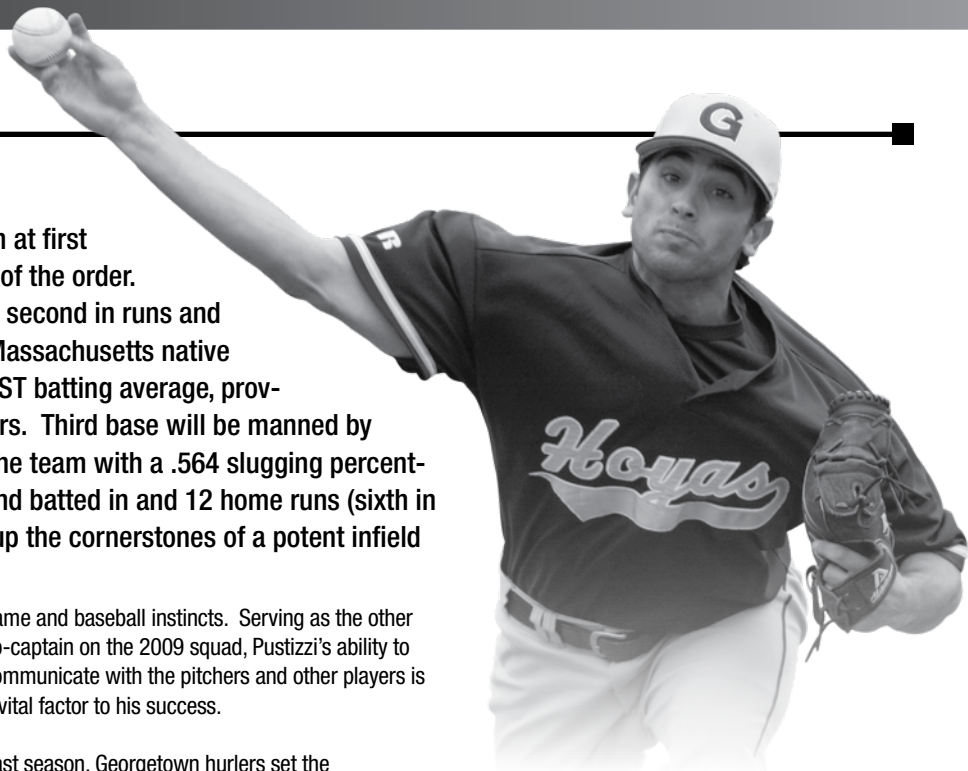
Saris is the elder statesman of the staff as he led the Hoyas in starts and recorded a team-high six wins, good for seventh in the BIG EAST. The senior right-hander only allowed 70 hits and 22 walks, which also placed him in the top 10 for the conference in both categories and allowed three earned runs or less in nine of 12 starts.

Adleman finished second on the team in starts and victories while finishing second in innings pitched and strikeouts. If he is able to continue pitching like he did this past summer in the Coastal Plain League after finding his changeup and working on locating his pitches, he could be a force for the Hoyas.

Meyer appears to be the glue that would hold the rotation together as he has all the physical tools and pitches to be a successful pitcher. He will be counted upon to help ease the loss of last year's left-handed ace Michael Gaggioli. Waiting in the wings are two young freshmen, Will Harris and Bobby Kirby.

Both freshmen are big, right-handed hurlers who will have the chance at some point this season to impress. Harris and Kirby should expect to soak up the mid-week starts for the Blue & Gray as the tandem has shown good velocity and the ability to throw strikes with their breaking pitches. Also, sophomore Tommy Isaacs will return after having off-season elbow surgery.

Out of the bullpen, the Hoyas will turn to three junior right-handers, Jack Bender, Cary Piligian, and

Billy Concannon. The trio appeared in 38 games for the Hoyas last season and will be the core of Georgetown's relief. Bender has pitched well this fall and has the inside track to be the team's closer and Concannon has vastly improved since arriving on the Hilltop.

On days when he's not playing in the field, Godefroi will be used in certain lefty vs. lefty matchups to help bolster the bullpen. Freshman Billy Cosmopulos, a three-sport athlete at Moses Brown in Massachusetts has raw talent, walk-on Mike Smith is a right-handed submariner and sophomore Pablo Vinent rounds out the group of relievers after appearing in a handful of games last season.

Off the bench, Georgetown's options include senior Rob Begin, sophomores Ethan Root and Billy Henig, and freshmen Alex Johnson, Rand Ravnaas, Nick Geary and Kevin Johnson. Alex Johnson possesses strength, a good arm and adds a strong right-handed bat when necessary, while Ravnaas runs well, hits for power and may be one of the best athletes recruited by Wilk in his tenure. Begin's specialties are pinch-running and defense as he entered more game as a pinch-runner than any other Hoya and maintained a perfect fielding percentage.

Henig played in 24 contests and started nine while Root will look to make an impact in his first healthy season as a Hoya. Geary is a good catch-and-throw guy and should provide depth at the catching position. Kevin Johnson is a versatile player that can handle duties at shortstop, second base, and third base.

THE BIG EAST CONFERENCE

The 2008-09 academic year will be the 30th for The BIG EAST Conference. While the league has gone through membership changes since its birth, it has never been stronger. This academic year will mark the conference's fourth year as the nation's largest Division I-A conference.

The goals of the BIG EAST have never changed. The league aims and expects to compete at the highest level and does so with integrity and sportsmanship. The student-athletes of the member schools continue to maintain the league's proud tradition of success.

BIG EAST teams earned their share of recognition at the highest levels in 2007-08. Four women's teams advanced to their respective NCAA Final Fours: Connecticut field hockey and women's basketball, Notre Dame soccer and Syracuse lacrosse.

Individually in men's sports, Villanova's Bobby Curtis was the NCAA outdoor track champion in the 5,000 meters. Connecticut's O'Brian White won the M.A.C. Hermann Trophy, the highest individual honor in soccer. Two years ago, BIG EAST male and female student-athletes were Hermann Trophy winners.

In men's basketball, the BIG EAST tied its own record set in 2006 by earning eight NCAA Championship bids. BIG EAST women's teams have received eight NCAA invitations in each of the past two years. The combined 16 men's and women's berths in 2008 was an NCAA first.

The quality of BIG EAST football has never been more advanced. Six of the league's eight squads were nationally ranked in 2007. For the third straight year, the BIG EAST representative in the Bowl Championship Series won its BCS bowl game.

The BIG EAST continued to produce student-athletes who were at the forefront of athletic and academic achievement. Nineteen BIG EAST players were chosen to their respective ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America Teams, including eight first-team selections.

The BIG EAST became the nation's largest Division I-A group in 2005-06 when five new members began competing. The new schools were: University of Cincinnati, DePaul University, University of Louisville, Marquette University and the University of South Florida.

BIG EAST institutions reside in nine of the nation's top 34 largest media markets, including New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, Washington, D.C., Tampa, Pittsburgh, Hartford, Milwaukee and Cincinnati. With its newest members, BIG EAST markets contain almost one fourth of all television households in the U.S.

Since opening its doors in 1979, the league has won 25 national championships in six different sports and 125 student-athletes have won individual national titles.

The BIG EAST has always been able to boast that some of its best students are also some of its best athletes. More than 370 student-athletes have earned academic all-America honors. Last year in football, Louisville quarterback Brian Brohm, who finished his career as the BIG EAST's career passing leader, was one of the league's eight first-team ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America team picks.

Also, Connecticut's Rebecca Lobo, one of the most heralded women's basketball players in the history of the sport, was named to the CoSIDA Academic All-America Hall of Fame in 2008. Lobo, a two-time BIG EAST Player of the Year, led the Huskies to the 1995 NCAA national championship.

The BIG EAST has enjoyed tremendous basketball success, especially in this decade. In 2003-04, Connecticut became the first school in NCAA history to win the men's and women's NCAA titles in the same season. In '02-03, the BIG EAST became the first conference in NCAA history to win the men's and women's titles in the same year when the Syracuse men and the Connecticut women captured their respective national championships. In men's basketball, BIG EAST squads have won three of the last 10 NCAA championships. BIG EAST women's teams have taken five of the last nine NCAA titles.

Proactive movement has been a signature strategy for the conference that was born in 1979. The BIG EAST continually turns challenges into opportunities to become stronger.

In the spring of 2001, the BIG EAST added women's lacrosse and rowing to its growing list of sports. The first women's golf championship was held in the spring of 2003. In 2007, the league conducted its first women's lacrosse championship tournament. In 2009-10, the BIG EAST will begin sponsorship of men's lacrosse, its 24th sport.

The BIG EAST became a reality on May 31, 1979, following a meeting of athletic directors from Providence College, St. John's, Georgetown and Syracuse Universities. Seton Hall, Connecticut and Boston College completed the original seven school alliance.

While the membership has both increased and changed, the focus of the BIG EAST has not wavered. The conference reflects a tradition of broad based programs, led by administrators and coaches who place a constant emphasis on academic integrity. Its student athletes own significantly high graduation rates and their record of scholastic achievement notably shows a balance between intercollegiate athletics and academics.

Any successful organization needs outstanding leadership. Michael Tranghese, the league's first full-time employee, and for 11 years the associate to Dave Gavitt, became Commissioner in 1990. In his first year, he administered the formation of The BIG EAST Football Conference.

For 2009-10, the BIG EAST will undergo one significant change. Tranghese has announced that he will step down from his position on June 30, 2009.

The league has long been considered a leader in innovative concepts in promotion and publicity, particularly regarding television. Those efforts have resulted in unparalleled visibility for BIG EAST student athletes. The conference has enjoyed long-standing relationships with CBS, ESPN, Inc. and ABC.

While BIG EAST basketball games are regular sellouts at campus and major public arenas, including the annual men's BIG EAST Championship in Madison Square Garden, attendance figures also are significant in soccer, women's basketball and baseball games.

More than 550 BIG EAST student-athletes have earned all America recognition and dozens have won individual NCAA national championships. The BIG EAST has been well represented in U.S. or foreign national and Olympic teams. Several athletes earned gold medals in each of the last six summer Olympiads.

The BIG EAST has its headquarters in Providence where the conference administers to more than 5,500 athletes.

2008 REVIEW

Georgetown University Baseball

The 2008 season started with a trip down the east coast to take part in a tournament at Davidson College in North Carolina. After defeating the host Wildcats, the team continued south for an exhibition contest against the Washington Nationals at Space Coast Park in Viera, Fla. The game featured the Hoyas playing against a handful of major league players, including Dmitri Young, Ronnie Belliard, Austin Kearns, Jason Bergmann and Ryan Zimmerman.

On an unseasonably cold and windy Florida day that made the Blue & Gray feel like they were suiting up for a home game, the squad gathered for a team picture on the field before play began. After the game, Washington Nationals manager Manny Acta

stated, "We would really like to make this an annual event." Saying this while speaking with the Georgetown team led to obvious excitement from the Hoyas who then proceeded to reflect on the game they had just participated in, along with taking some photos from the dugout.

The team stayed in the Sunshine State the following week and took part in Rollins College's Baseball Week. The Hoyas were victorious against Saint Joseph's, host Rollins College and Holy Cross. Georgetown's first home series of the season marked the beginning of conference play as the team hosted the UConn Huskies. After winning the first game, 12-7, the next two dogfights went to extra innings but the Hoyas were unable to harness a victory.

Georgetown's next road game featured a hitting clinic as the team scored its most runs in a game since 1999 when they cruised past Mount St. Mary's, 23-3. The Hoyas broke the school record for home runs in a game with six and came within two hits of the school record for a single game, which stands at 25. Sean Baumann entered as a pinch-hitter and still managed to drive in a season-high six runs. In all, the team's catchers went 4-for-5 with five runs and eight driven in.

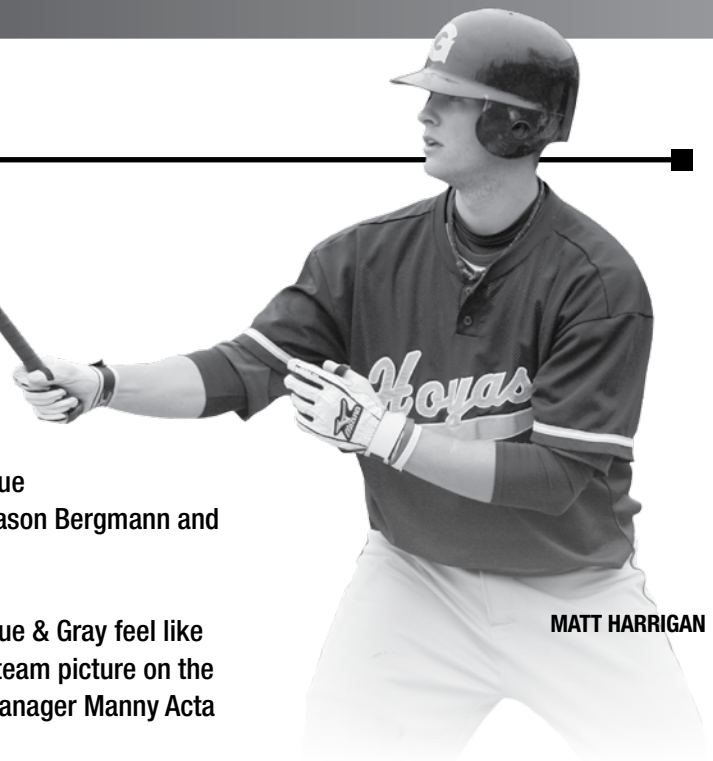
GU hit the road in conference play to earn its first series win of the season, taking 2-of-3 from South Florida. In the second game, the Hoyas scored six runs in the seventh inning to come from behind and snap a six-game conference losing streak as Michael Gaggioli earned his first win of 2008 for the Blue & Gray, striking out eight batters in seven innings. The squad earned another dramatic win

in Tampa the next day, scoring seven runs in the seventh and eighth innings en route to an 8-7 win. The Hoyas erased a 7-1 deficit and received a two-out, two-run double by Matt Harrigan in the eighth to get the win.

The Hoyas would follow the series win with a non-conference victory over Coppin State and a home-and-home sweep of the U.S. Naval Academy. After hitting the road again, Georgetown earned an 8-5 win over one of the top teams in the conference, Cincinnati. First baseman Dan Capeless had three hits, all doubles, scored three runs and drove in another and Jimmy Saris pitched six strong innings, allowing only one run on five hits while striking out seven. In its next set of games, the team responded from a day loss in a doubleheader with Pittsburgh with a 7-4 win in the second game. Thanks to six strong innings from Saris and some timely hitting, the Hoyas never trailed in the nightcap.

The season ended with a series victory over Seton Hall in the final homestand. The Hoyas sent their seniors off in style with a doubleheader sweep on the last day of the regular season. The Pirates came to Shirley Povich Field trying to clinch a spot in the BIG EAST Tournament, but Saris and Gaggioli earned wins and Sean Lamont, Matt Iannetta and Kelly Muir provided the offensive support the hurlers needed. Georgetown was able to take two-out-of-three and ship the Pirates into the offseason.

The Hoya pitching staff led by Gaggioli, Saris, Erick Chandler and Tim Adleman helped set a new school record for fewest walks allowed in a season. Another small honor was bestowed upon Tommy Lee, who broke the school record for times being hit by a pitch in a season. His ability to get on base by any means possible helped the team drive in runs throughout the 2008 campaign.

FACILITIES

Batting Cages

In the fall of 2007, the Georgetown University baseball program welcomed a new addition that should pay dividends in the years to come. Thanks to an anonymous donor, three batting tunnel cages were constructed on top of Yates Field House, adjacent to Kehoe Field.

“This is a huge improvement to our program as a whole,” Head Coach Pete Wilk said. “Not only does it aid in the development of our players, but everything is state-of-the-art. It truly is an impressive place to practice.”

The cages are each 12 feet tall, 45 feet wide and 180 feet long and all contain a surface made up of a synthetic grass surface along with a pitchers mound, a plate and brand new pitching machines. In addition to the three tunnels, there are two bullpen areas for the

pitchers to throw and a practice area equipped to help the players analyze their mechanics.

“It’s not just built for our hitters, but the bullpens provide the pitchers with a place to come and improve as well.”

The four-month process concluded with the installation of 10 light towers, each measuring 16 feet in height. This allows for practice at any time of day in almost every weather condition.

“The lights allow the kids to go up there at any time and no other facility fills those needs.”

In addition to the baseball aspects, numerous benches have been installed and a storage area for the players’ equipment is located next to the cages.



Shirley Povich Field

Shirley Povich Field has been the home of the Georgetown baseball team since 2000. It is located at Cabin John Park in Rockville, Maryland. With a seating capacity of 1,500, the dimensions are 330 down the left field line, 375 to center and 330 down the right field line.

Shirley Povich Field is named for the renowned Washington D.C. sports columnist and reporter. Shirley attended Georgetown prior to beginning a 75-year career with the Washington Post where he covered nearly all of the major sporting events of the 20th century, from Walter Johnson to Cal Ripken, Jr.

Baseball was Povich’s true passion. The prolific and profound Povich covered the Washington Senators’ lone World Championship in 1924 and wrote his final column the day before his death at age 92 in 1998. Generations of Washington readers learned about the sport and life reading Povich’s, “This Morning” column. In 1976, Povich was inducted into the writers’ wing of the Baseball Hall of Fame.

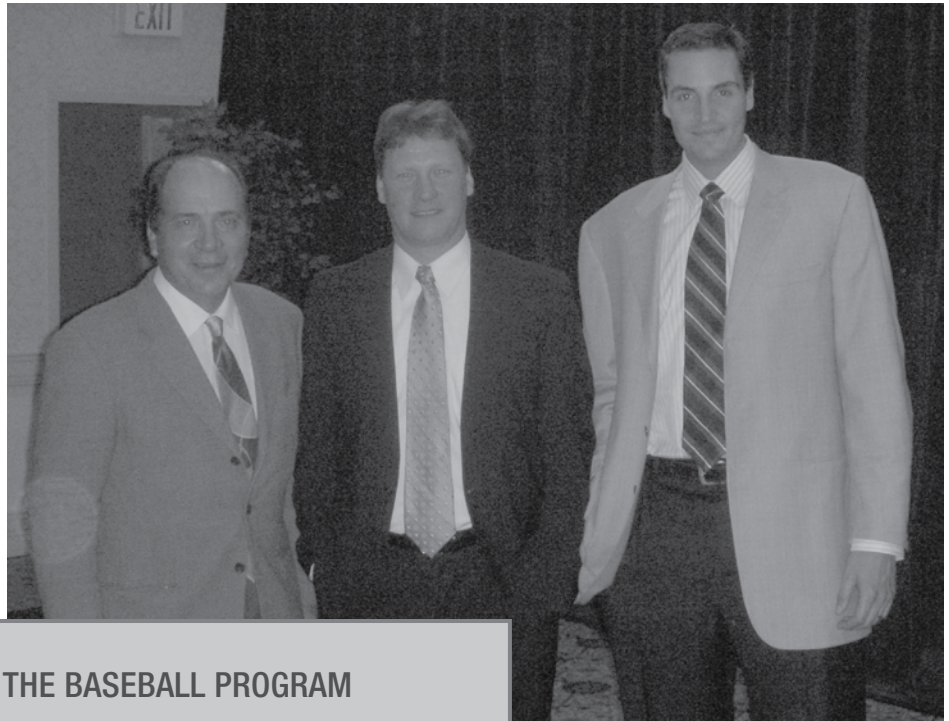
The stadium is also home to the Bethesda Big Train, a team of college all-stars that competes in the Cal Ripken, Sr. Collegiate Baseball League from June through August.



HOYA DIAMOND CLUB

The Hoya Diamond Club is an organization of alumni, parents, and friends of Georgetown Baseball whose primary purpose is to promote a heightened awareness of and an active interest in the Georgetown University baseball program.

The Club began in 1974 and, since then, members have been actively involved in raising funds to supplement the budget and provide opportunities to the baseball program through annual, current-use donations. In the 2007-08 school year, the Hoya Diamond Club raised over \$230,000 from 178 donors which helped with equipment and travel costs, scholarships as well as the team's annual spring break trip.

First Pitch Dinner speakers have included Boston Red Sox manager Terry Francona, Meet the Press moderator Tim Russert, Oakland A's assistant general manager David Forst, San Diego Padre Chris Young and Major League Baseball Hall of Famer Johnny Bench. The evening also includes a silent auction which has featured items such as Yankee vs. Red Sox tickets, foursomes at exclusive golf courses, signed memorabilia from major leaguers, and even a third base from the 2006 World Series.

GEORGETOWN COMPLIANCE PROGRAM

The Athletics Compliance Office coordinates the athletics compliance efforts of Georgetown University and acts as a resource and solution center concerning NCAA regulations and compliance issues. The primary functions of the Athletics Compliance Office are to coordinate, administer, monitor and verify the accurate and timely completion of NCAA-required procedures and to assist in maintaining institutional compliance with all NCAA, Conference and University rules. In addition, the Athletics Compliance Office provides educational programming and interpretive support to ensure that all individuals involved with the athletics program fully understand the University's compliance expectations.

The following general information is provided by the Georgetown University Athletics Compliance Office for supporters and friends of Georgetown Athletics as well as prospective student-athletes who may be recruited by Georgetown University.

KEY DEFINITIONS

Prospective Student-Athlete: A prospective student-athlete ("prospect") is a student who has started classes for the ninth grade, regardless whether he or she participates in athletics. A prospective student-athlete maintains his or her identity as a prospect, even after he or she signs a National Letter of Intent or financial aid agreement, until he or she attends the first day of classes of a regular term or participates in an official team practice, whichever is earlier.

Representative of Athletics Interests: A representative of the institution's athletics interests (a.k.a. Booster) is an individual who:

- has ever made a financial contribution to the athletic department or any organization that promotes Georgetown's athletics (e.g., HOYAS UNLIMITED).
- is a member of an organization that promotes a HOYA athletic team.
- has or is involved in promoting Georgetown's athletics program in any way.
- has been otherwise in promoting the institution's athletics program. Once an individual is identified as a representative, the person retains that identity forever.

WHO IS PERMITTED TO RECRUIT FOR GEORGETOWN?

Only Georgetown University coaches who have successfully completed the NCAA Recruiting Rules Examination

on an annual basis may be involved in the recruitment process. Boosters may not make any recruiting contacts. This includes letters, telephone calls or face-to-face contact on or off campus with a prospect or the prospect's parents. Representatives of Georgetown's Athletics Interest MAY:

- Offer summer employment to prospective student-athletes who have signed a National Letter of Intent and to enrolled student-athletes, after contacting the Athletics Compliance Office.
- Support Georgetown's athletics program by attending HOYA athletics contests and by making financial contributions to Georgetown athletics.

Representatives of Georgetown's Athletics Interest MAY NOT:

- Be involved in the recruitment of prospective student-athletes in any way.
- Provide extra benefits (i.e., discounts, gifts, transportation) to prospective student-athletes, enrolled student-athletes or their parents, legal guardian(s), relatives or friends; and
- Provide any financial assistance to prospective student-athletes, enrolled student-athletes or their parents, legal guardian(s), relatives or friends.
