Thundering Herd Notes

Notes from FIU

The game captains were senior receiver Marcel Williams and senior lineman Jordan Dowrey on offense, and senior linebacker Chase Hancock, senior lineman Ryan Bee and safety Malik Gant on defense.

Marshall snapped a two-game skid in the series.

Marshall senior receiver Tyre Brady recorded a reception for the 22nd consecutive game. He snagged a pair of touchdowns for the fifth time in two seasons with the Herd.

Junior linebacker Omari Cobb returned an interception 26 yards for a touchdown in the first quarter. The interception was the first of Cobb's career, and the touchdown was his first at the college level.

Freshman quarterback Isaiah Green threw a touchdown pass for the eighth consecutive game. He had a streak of 94 passes without an interception snapped on the first play of the third quarter.

Freshman running back Brenden Knox made his first career start and led the team in rushing for the third consecutive game.

Freshman running back Sheldon Evans had his first career rushing attempt.

The Thundering Herd defense allowed a 37-yard run to FIU's Napoleon Maxwell in the first quarter, the first run of 30-plus yards allowed by the MU defense this season. Marshall was the last FBS team to have not allowed a rush of 30 yards or longer this season.

The Marshall defense allowed more than 150 team rushing yards for the first time this season. The Herd was one of two FBS programs left that had not allowed at least 150 team rushing yards in 2018 (Texas A&M).

Senior running back Anthony Anderson set personal career bests with three receptions for 37 yards.

The last time Marshall blocked a punt for a touchdown was at Old Dominion in 2014, when Raheim Huskey blocked a Monarchs' punt that was recovered in the end zone by Brandon Byrd. The last time that Marshall blocked two kicks in the same game was against Central Florida in 2012, when Deon Meadows and Marquise Aiken both blocked PATs.

Marshall's third down defense was a difference maker. Going into the game, FIU had converted 47% of its 3rd downs on the season - the best in Conference USA and in the Top 20 in the nation. But Marshall had held opponents to 32%, which was No. 17 in the nation. Not only did Marshall hit its mark - it was even better. FIU only converted on 4-of-14 third downs - 29%.

The Panthers' 5.3 yards per pass attempt is their lowest of the season, and their quarterbacks had no touchdown passes and two interceptions, snapping an 11-game streak of tossing at least one TD pass.

Great Eight

Marshall picked up its eighth win for the fourth time in five seasons. There are 25 teams in major college football who can say the same, per Chuck McGill's research. The Herd is the only current Conference USA program with 8-plus wins in four of the last five years.

Feeling the Sunshine

Since the beginning of the 2013 season, Doc Holliday is 11-3 in games contested in the state of Florida and/or against Florida schools.

Holliday Moves into Second

The Herd's victory over FIU was career win No. 69 for coach Doc Holliday, which moves him past Cam Henderson and all alone in second place on the Herd's all-time coaching wins list (Bob Pruett, 94).

First Quarter Dominance

After outscoring FIU 14-3 in the first quarter, Marshall's first quarter scoring advantage over the opposition is now 74-22 for the season. Herd opponents have managed just one touchdown (Charlotte) and five field goals in the first quarter all year long. The Thundering Herd has now won 17 consecutive games when scoring first and has won its last eight when leading after the first quarter. Related: since the beginning of the 2013 season, the Herd is 37-1 when scoring first.

Getting Off the Field

Since Marshall's loss to NC State, Thundering Herd opponents are only 36-for-126 on third downs (.286). In fact, the Thundering Herd is fourth nationally in 3-and-out percentage (42.6) and ninth in 3-and-outs per game (5.27).

<100

Marshall still has not allowed a 100-yard individual rusher this season, a streak that is at 12 games (including the New Mexico Bowl). Only three other teams have not allowed a 100-yard rusher this season: Clemson, Northern Illinois and Southern Miss.

Cobb in Rare Company

Omari Cobb is one of eight players in all of college football with at least 50 tackles, four sacks, one interception and a defensive touchdown. He was the Co-Defensive Player of the Week in Conference USA last week.

Perfect Versus Texas at Home

Interestingly enough, Marshall has never lost to a school from Texas at home. The Thundering Herd is a perfect 13-0 against Texas schools in games played in Huntington. Marshall owns two wins over North Texas (1988, 2015), two wins over Houston (2008, 2012), three wins over Rice (2007, 2011, 2014), two wins over SMU (2005, 2009), two wins over UTEP (2006, 2010) and two victories over UTSA (2013, 2018).

Gant in the Backfield

Marshall safety Malik Gant is the only player in the league with at least nine tackles for a loss and two interceptions, and he is tied for sixth nationally in tackles for a loss by a defensive back.

Stingy D

The Herd has won 37 of its last 42 when holding offenses to 5.0 yards per play or fewer. The Herd has won 22 of its last 23 when allowing fewer than 300 yards. Fourteen (14) times in Doc Holliday's eight-plus seasons has the Herd allowed 125 yards passing or fewer. Marshall is 13-1 (.929) in those games.

Marshall is 26-3 (.897) under Doc Holliday when the defense does not allow a rushing touchdown.

Bee Climbs the Charts

Senior defensive lineman Ryan Bee was credited with 1.5 sacks against Charlotte, giving him 18.5 for his career. Bee is 10th on Marshall's all-time list, trailing Gary Thompson for ninth place (19.0 sacks).

Keion Closing in on Top 15

Senior running back Keion Davis rushed for 49 yards, giving him 1,920 for the year and moving him past Jack Mahone (1,902, 1962-64) for No. 16 on the program's career rushing list.

Feel the Rush

The Herd is now 36-4 (.900) in the last six seasons when rushing for 150+ yards and 28-3 (.903) the last six years with 200+ on the ground. All-time, Marshall is 9-0 under Doc Holliday when rushing for 300+ yards.

30+

Marshall's 30 points in the win over Charlotte makes the Herd 38-3 (.927) in its last 41 games when scoring 30+ points. All of those games are under Doc Holliday.

Fourth-Down Fortitude

Marshall is second nationally in fourth-down conversion percentage at 76.9 (10-for-13). The Thundering Herd was 4-for-4 on fourth down conversions against Middle Tennessee. That ties the school record for most fourth downs converted in a game - the previous best was four converted (in 5 attempts), also against Middle Tennessee, in 2014.

Protecting the Home Turf

Marshall is nationally known for being one of the toughest places to play in college football. The program has won 82.4 percent (159-34) of its home games in Joan C. Edwards Stadium, the fourth-highest mark in the country.

Herd Finishes under Holliday

Since Doc Holliday became head coach in 2010, the Herd has an excellent record of finishing off its opponents once it takes the lead. Marshall is 52-7 (.881) when it scores first, 47-7 (.870) when leading after the first quarter, 56-4 (.933) when leading at halftime and 56-4 (.933) when leading after three quarters. In fact, Marshall was won 42 of its last 44 contests (2016 vs. Charlotte, 2018 vs. Middle Tennessee) when it has the halftime lead.

Hang on!

It's easy to see why Herd Coach Doc Holliday talks about ball security so often. His nine Marshall teams have provided a strong indicator of why turnover margin is so important. Holliday's Herd teams have a combined 69-45 (.605) record. When Marshall has an edge in turnover margin, it is 38-8 (.826). When the turnover number is equal, Marshall is 16-6 (.727). When the opponent is more sure-handed, the Herd is 15-31 (.326).

Of Marshall's 114 games under Holliday, the Herd has played 56 while committing zero or one turnover, amassing a record of 42-14 (.750) in those games.

Marshall is 22-4 (.846) under Holliday when it has a turnover margin of +2 or better. In 2018, it is 8-0 when the margin is minus-1 or better.

The Thundering Herd had five takeaways in 2018 wins over Eastern Kentucky and FAU, giving Holliday nine consecutive wins when his team forces four or more turnovers.

Defensive coordinator Adam Fuller aims for at least two takeaways per game. Marshall is 6-1 this season and 11-1 in the last two seasons when that happens.

Marshall won the turnover battle against UTSA, the Herd's ninth consecutive win when coming out on the right side of that battle.

Bowl Prowess

Marshall enters 2018 featuring an .846 winning percentage (11-2) in all NCAA-sanctioned bowl games, the highest mark nationally among programs that have made at least five appearances. (The Thundering Herd also participated in the 1948 Tangerine Bowl, at which point it was not sanctioned). The top are below:

Doc Holliday is 5-0 in bowl games with the Thundering Herd and has appeared in 26 bowls since entering the coaching ranks.

50+

Marshall's 62-0 win over Morgan State in 2016 was the 16th time that the Thundering Herd has reached the 50+-point plateau under coach Doc Holliday, one more than Jim Donnan (1990-95) for the all-time school mark. Bob Pruett (1996-2004) reached that mark 14 times and Cam Henderson (1936-42, 1946-49) did it on 13 occasions.

Take Two

In the two games against Charlotte and UTSA, Marshall has held the opposition to 185 yards (vs. Charlotte) and 137 (UTSA). The last time that Marshall held opponents to under 200 yards of offense in back-to-back games was against The Citadel (197 yards) and ETSU (188) in 1995. The last time Marshall held two consecutive opponents to a combined total of fewer than the 322 yards of total offense gained by Charlotte and UTSA was in 1993, when the Herd held Morehead State to 157 yards (56-0 win) and Murray State to 155 yards (29-3 win), 312 combined yards. The 3.03 yards per play allowed to Charlotte and 2.49 to UTSA are the top two performances against an FBS opponent in the Doc Holliday era.

Marshall-South Carolina Cancelled

The Thundering Herd's September 15 contest at South Carolina was cancelled due to severe weather caused by Hurricane Florence.

Notes from UTSA

The game captains were senior receiver Marcel Williams and senior lineman Jordan Dowrey on offense, and senior linebacker Chase Hancock and senior lineman Ryan Bee on defense.

After Saturday's win, Marshall leads its series with UTSA, 2-1. Marshall has won both meetings in Huntington (2013 and 2018).

The shutout is the fifth for Marshall under Doc Holliday, and the fourth consecutive season the Herd defense has shut out an opponent.

Marshall improved to 5-0 this season when leading after the first quarter.

UTSA rushed for minus-26 yards, which is a Marshall program record for fewest rushing yards allowed in a single game (BYU, 1999, minus-16 yards). Marshall allowed 137 yards overall to UTSA, the fewest since the Herd held Ohio to 123 total yards in the 2009 Little Caesars Pizza Bowl in Detroit. The Roadrunners' minus-1.2 yards per carry is also a school record.

UTSA's long run of the game was 5 yards. Marshall is the last remaining FBS team that has yet to allow a rush of 30-plus yards this season.

Freshman quarterback Isaiah Green made his seventh start of his collegiate career on Saturday, and has thrown a touchdown pass in every game. He set a new career high for passing yards in a game (387), the most passing yards by a Marshall quarterback since Chase Litton threw for 413 against Akron on Sept. 17, 2016. Green's passing yards tied for No. 40 for a single game in Herd history (Tony Petersen vs. JMU in '87). It is also the best single game by a Herd freshman quarterback in Joan C. Edwards Stadium history. Litton's 486 yards as a freshman in 2015 came at Charlotte. Green averaged 10.8 yards per attempt vs. UTSA, the most by a Herd quarterback against an FBS opponent since Rakeem Cato's 14.7 vs. Ohio in 2014. Cato had 425 yards on 29 attempts in that game. Green had 387 yards on 36 attempts vs. UTSA.

Senior receiver Tyre Brady caught a pass for the 21st consecutive game. Brady had a 50-yard reception in the second quarter, his longest of the season. Brady recorded his seventh 100-yard receiving game of the season and fourth of 2018, and tied a season high with 162 receiving yards. That total is the most he's had in two years at the Joan, and is the 21st-best receiving total by a Marshall player in the stadium's history. Brady ranks fourth in C-USA in receiving yards per game.

Senior receiver Obi Obialo caught five passes for a career-best 103 yards. Brady and Obialo are the first set of Marshall teammates to go over 100 receiving yards in the same game since Davonte Allen and Tommy Shuler against Western Kentucky in 2014.

Senior linebacker Chase Hancock forced a fumble on a kickoff return in the first quarter, his second forced fumble of the season and third of his career.

Junior kicker Justin Rohrwasser recovered a fumble on a kickoff return, his second fumble recovery of the season. Rohrwasser is the only FBS player with at least two fumble recoveries who has zero tackles.

Herd kicker Justin Rohrwasser is one of two players in ALL of FBS since at least 2000 to have two fumble recoveries in one season without making a tackle. Texas RB Kirk Johnson did it in 2015 (vs. Oklahoma and Kansas). Rohrwasser recovered fumbles vs. ECU and UTSA.

Notes from Charlotte

The game captains were senior receiver Marcel Williams and senior lineman Jordan Dowrey, and junior safety Malik Gant and senior lineman Ryan Bee.

Marshall leads the all-time series with Charlotte 3-1. The 49ers dropped to 0-5 on the road this season.

Charlotte managed only 185 total yards of offense against the Thundering Herd defense, the fewest Marshall has allowed to an FBS opponent since

Nov. 15, 2014 against Rice (180 yards). Charlotte gained 72 passing yards, the fewest allowed by a Herd defense since Dec. 6, 2014 against Louisiana Tech, also 72 yards, in the Conference USA championship game.

The Marshall defense allowed a first quarter touchdown for the first time this season. The Thundering Herd defense had not allowed a first quarter touchdown in 11 consecutive games, the longest streak among FBS programs entering Saturday's game.

Redshirt freshman Brenden Knox receiving his first collegiate career and caught his first pass in Saturday's first half. He is the first player to rush for 100 yards against Charlotte this season. His 116 rushing yards rank third all-time in the annals of Marshall running back debuts.

Marshall improved to 4-0 this season when leading after the first quarter.

The Thundering Herd is 6-0 this season when it has a turnover margin of minus-one or better. MU is 0-3 when the turnover margin is minus-two.

With six wins, Marshall will be bowl eligible for the sixth time under coach Doc Holliday.

Junior receiver Artie Henry set career-bests for receptions (three) and receiving yards (43).

Senior linebacker Frankie Hernandez established a new career high for tackles with 11. His previous best came at North Carolina State on Sept. 9, 2017 (10 tackles). Hernandez also had 1.5 sacks, a career best, and 2.5 tackles for a loss, his most since Oct. 8, 2016 at North Texas.

Justin Rohrwasser made all three of his field goal attempts against Charlotte and is now 11-for-14 on the season. He also made three PATs - the last time a Marshall kicker scored more points in a game was Justin Haig's 14 (4 FG, 2 PAT) against Louisiana Tech in the 2014 C-USA title game.

Notes from Southern Miss

The game captains were junior lineman Levi Brown and senior lineman Jordan Dowrey on offense, and senior defensive lineman Malik Thompson and junior safety Malik Gant on defense. Thompson is a game captain for the first time.

This is the 14th consecutive season Marshall and Southern Mississippi have met in football – every year since the Thundering Herd joined Conference USA.

The Marshall defense did not allow a first quarter touchdown for the 11th consecutive game.

Junior receiver Obi Obialo forced a fumble on a botched punt attempt in the second quarter and freshman running back Brenden Knox recovered the ball and turned it for a touchdown. The forced fumble was Obialo's first of his career and Knox had his first recovery and touchdown of his career.

The forced fumble by senior defensive lineman Ryan Bee in the second quarter was his second of the season and career. Junior defensive back Chris Jackson recovered the fumble, his first of the season and second of his career.

Senior receiver Marcel Williams set a new career high for receiving yards with 139. Williams' previous best single-game performance was 122 receiving yards at FAU on Nov. 3, 2017, exactly one year ago from Saturday's game.

Senior running back Anthony Anderson scored a rushing touchdown for the third consecutive game. He scored one time against Middle Tennessee and three times at Old Dominion, and then missed the FAU game. Junior linebacker Omari Cobb recorded a sack in the third quarter, his first of the season and seventh of his career.

Junior Channing Hames recorded four tackles for a loss, a career high. His previous career best was 2.5 tackles for a loss in the New Mexico Bowl win against Colorado State on Dec. 16, 2017, a performance for which he was named the bowl game's Defensive MVP. The last player to record at least four tackles for a loss in a game was James Rouse, in 2014, at Southern Miss.

Notes from Florida Atlantic

The game captains were junior lineman Levi Brown and senior receiver Marcel Williams on offense, and senior defensive lineman Ryan Bee and junior safety Malik Gant on defense.

After the win, Marshall leads the series with Florida Atlantic, 5-1, in six meetings. The Owls are 0-3 in trips to Huntington.

Senior linebacker Artis Johnson intercepted a pass and returned it 48 yards in the first quarter. It was his first interception this season and second of his

career. Johnson also set a career high in tackles with 10. He twice had seven tackles last season (vs. North Carolina State and Kent State).

The interception by junior Chris Jackson late in the first half was the first of his season and sixth of his career.

Senior defensive lineman Malik Thompson recorded his first career interception early in the third quarter. Thompson also established a new career high for tackles with nine (previous best: six vs. Middle Tennessee). Five of Thompson's nine tackles happened to be of FAU star Devin Singletary.

Junior tight end Armani Levias had his first career two-touchdown day. He caught a 29-yard touchdown in the second quarter and a 13-yard score in the third quarter. Levias' 47 receiving yards set a new career high.

Freshman cornerback Steven Gilmore set a career high with seven tackles. He entered Saturday's game with two career tackles.

Sophomore running back Tyler King had his third consecutive 100-yard rushing game, the first Herd player since Devon Johnson to do so (seven straight in 2014). He has seven 100-yard rushing games in his career.

Junior quarterback Alex Thomson had his first career rushing touchdown. Thomson's 50 rushing yards were a career high.

Senior running back Keion Davis' 41-yard run in the fourth quarter was the longest of the season (previous best: 15 yards).

FAU's 7-point output is the lowest in two seasons under Lane Kiffin. The Herd's margin of victory is the second-largest of a team against FAU under Kiffin (Oklahoma, 2018, 49 points).

Owls running back Devin Singletary was held to his lowest single-game rushing total of the season (39 yards), and had a 19-game touchdown streak snapped.

On the day, Marshall had 18 possessions and Florida Atlantic 17. Marshall's average starting field position was on the Herd's 45-yard line. The Owls average starting field position was inside their own 19.

Robert LeFevre continues to shine as Marshall's punter. Against FAU, he averaged 43.8 yards per punt on nine attempts. LeFevre pinned the Owls inside their own 20-yard line on five different occasions, which is tied for the third-most times doing that in a game in Marshall history. In Marshall's last four games, LeFevre is averaging 43.9 yards per punt on 24 boots.

Florida Atlantic was just 3-for-17 on third downs. The 14 failures on third down are tied for 6th-most in a game by Marshall opponents.

Notes vs. ODU

The game captains were senior lineman Jordan Dowrey and junior receiver Obi Obialo on offense, and senior defensive lineman Ryan Bee and junior safety Malik Gant on defense.

Marshall leads the all-time series with Old Dominion, 4-1. The Herd has won two straight meetings between the teams.

Doc Holliday passed Jim Donnan for sole possession of third place in career wins by a head coach in Marshall football history. Holliday has 65 wins, trailing Cam Henderson's 68 and Bob Pruett's 94.

Representatives from five National Football League teams watched Saturday's game: Carolina Panthers, Cleveland Browns, Indianapolis Colts, Los Angeles Rams and San Francisco 49ers.

Senior linebacker Frankie Hernandez stripped the ball and recovered the fumble in the first quarter. He has five career fumble recoveries, but that is his first forced fumble in college.

Junior safety Malik Gant came up with a tipped pass for his first career interception in Saturday's first quarter.

Senior running back Anthony Anderson scored on a 22-yard run in the second quarter, the longest scoring rush by Marshall this season. None of the team's first five rushing touchdowns this season were longer than 5 yards. Anderson scored three times, the first three-touchdown rushing game by a Marshall player since Nov. 8, 2014 when Remi Watson did it against Southern Miss.

Junior quarterback Alex Thomson connected with senior receiver Tyre Brady for a 33-yard pass, the longest of Thomson's FBS career.

Junior defensive lineman Ty Tyler recorded a sack for the third consecutive game.

The Marshall defense held ODU without an offensive touchdown in the first half, the first time the Monarchs have not scored a TD in the first two quarters this season.

Tyre Brady recorded his third 100-yard receiving game of the season, giving him six in his two-year Marshall career.

The last time that Marshall scored more than 42 points in a game was in the 62-0 win over Morgan State to open the 2016 season. The last time Marshall scored more than 42 points against a Conference USA team was in the 52-0 win over Florida International in 2015. The last time Marshall scored more than 42 points in a C-USA road game was in the 63-14 win at Southern Miss in 2014.

As a team, Marshall had 45 rushing attempts for 319 yards at ODU. That's the Herd's most rushing yards since 326 (47 att.) at Florida Atlantic in 2015.

Marshall's five rushing touchdowns at ODU are the Herd's most in a game since seven in that 2014 game at Southern Miss.

Tyler King finished with 22 carries for 195 yards - and his fourth quarter (12-165) was nothing short of incredible. The last time a Marshall player rushed for 100+ yards in one quarter was Devon Johnson, who had five carries for 106 yards in the second quarter at Ohio in 2015. King's 195 rush yards are the most by a Marshall man since Steward Butler's 233 (on 24 attempts) against Western Kentucky in 2014. King's 195 yards were the second-highest FBS rushing total of the weekend behind Darrell Henderson's 199. King's 159 fourth-quarter yards were a school record, while his 175 second-half yards ranked third all-time.

Marshall CB Chris Jackson was credited with a career-high four pass breakups against ODU. He's just the second Marshall player with four PBUs in a game since 2012, joining Rodney Allen, who had four at Southern Miss in 2016.

Notes from Middle Tennessee

The game captains were senior receiver Tyre Brady and junior center Levi Brown on offense, and senior defensive lineman Ryan Bee and junior safety Malik Gant on defense.

Junior Alex Thomson made his first career start at quarterback in place of redshirt freshman Isaiah Green.

Sophomore Cain Madden made his first career start, subbing for fellow sophomore Alex Mollette at right guard. Mollette started the first four games this season.

Sophomore Tyler King made his eighth career start at running back in place of senior Keion Davis. Davis started the first four games the 2018 season.

Sophomore running back Tyler King set a career high in carries (27) and rushing yards (165), eclipsing the 129 yards he gained against Middle Tennessee in 2017. The attempts are the most for a Marshall player since Tony Pittman had 32 carries (127 yards) against ODU in 2015. The yards are the most since Devon Johnson gained 170 (21 attempts) at Ohio in 2015. Friday's performance was also King's fifth career 100-yard rushing game and the first for the Herd this season.

Tyler King's second carry, a 5-yarder in the first quarter, pushed him past the 1,000-yard mark for rushing yards in a career.

Alex Thomson completed his first FBS touchdown pass to junior tight end Armani Levias with 17 seconds left of the second quarter.

Armani Levias' 11-yard touchdown reception in the second quarter was his first at the FBS level. Levias caught seven touchdown passes in two seasons at Laney Community College.

Freshman defensive end Darius Hodge recorded a sack in the first half, the first of his collegiate career.

Senior defensive end Juwon Young's strip-sack in the first half was his first sack of the season and third forced fumble of his career. Senior linebacker Frankie Hernandez recovered the forced fumble, the second fumble recovery for him this season and the fourth of his career.

Senior running back Anthony Anderson scored his third rushing touchdown of the season, and had his most rushing yards in a single game since a 109-yard performance on Nov. 12, 2016 vs. Middle Tennessee.

Notes from WKU

The game captains were senior receiver Marcel Williams (Palm Coast, Florida) and senior running back Keion Davis (Fairburn, Georgia) on offense,

and senior defensive lineman Ryan Bee (Ashland, Ohio) and junior safety Malik Gant (Washington, D.C.) on defense.

Marshall's win evens the series at 5-5. The Herd has won the last two games. Marshall's win in Bowling Green was the first for the program since Oct. 7, 1950, a 47-13 decision.

With a win, Doc Holliday ties Jim Donnan for the third-most coaching wins in program history with 64. Cam Henderson is second on the list with 68 wins, and Bob Pruett won 94 games from 1996-2004.

Senior receiver Tyre Brady (Homestead, Florida) eclipsed 100 yards in receiving for the second time this season and the sixth time in his two-year career with the Herd. Brady had his third career two-touchdown game, and the 162 receiving yards rank as the third most in his career.

Senior running back Keion Davis passed Ron Lear for 18th place on the program's career rushing list. Lear had 1,779 yards. Davis has 1,789 yards.

With his fourth tackle in the first half against WKU, Chase Hancock (Beckley, West Virginia) reached 250 career tackles for his four-year career.

Redshirt junior Alex Locklear (Huntington, West Virginia) started at right tackle in place of Tarik Adams (Valdosta, Georgia). It was Locklear's second career start. Kereon Merrell (Vienna, Georgia) started at cornerback in place of Jaylon McClain-Sapp (Jacksonville, Florida). It was also Merrell's second career start.

Senior offensive lineman Jordan Dowrey (Winchester, Virginia) made his 40th career start for Marshall. Dowrey is the active leader for career starts.

Senior linebacker Donyae Moody had his first career forced fumble.

Junior receiver Obi Obialo equaled a career high with 80 receiving yards.

Junior tight end Armani Levias established a new career long with a 35-yard reception.

Sophomore running back Tyler King had the longest rush by a Herd running back this season (20 yards).

Sophomore safety Nazeeh Johnson's interception was the second of his career (both vs. WKU – one in 2017).

Marshall's game-winning score came with 1:44 left in the fourth quarter. The last time Marshall scored later in a game to turn a deficit into the final margin of victory was on Justin Haig's field goal on the final play to beat FAU 24-23 in 2013.

Western Kentucky ran for only 61 yards (on 32 attempts). That's the fewest rush yards Marshall has allowed in a game since last season's matchup with the Hilltoppers, when WKU rushed for 34 yards (19 att.).

The Thundering Herd held WKU to just 4-for-16 clip on third down and an 0-for-2 effort on fourth down.

Notes from NC State

The game captains were senior receiver Tyre Brady and junior receiver Obi Obialo on offense, and senior linebacker Chase Hancock and junior safety Malik Gant on defense.

Saturday's attendance of 32,349 was the 12th-largest in Joan C. Edwards Stadium history.

Marshall and North Carolina State met for the fifth time. NC State has won all five meetings. Saturday was the first time the teams have met outside of Raleigh, North Carolina.

Marshall quarterback Isaiah Green connected with receiver Marcel Williams for an 82-yard touchdown in the second quarter. It was Green's longest pass of his career and the longest reception of Williams' career. The pass play is the longest by the Herd offense this season, tied for the 16th-longest pass play in program history and the 25th pass play of 80-plus yards in MU history.

Marcel Williams' touchdown reception was the third of his career and first of the season. His previous career long was 59 yards. The touchdown reception was his first since Oct. 28, 2017 against Florida International.

Senior running back Keion Davis set a new single game best for receptions (six) and receiving yards (99), and had a career long reception (31 yards). The 99 receiving yards ranks No. 4 on Marshall's all-time list for running backs in a single game. The record of 111 yards is held by Jackie Hunt, which came on eight receptions against Wake Forest in Fairfield Stadium in 1941.

Davis finished with 203 all-purpose yards, the second-highest total of his career.

The forced fumble by sophomore linebacker Jaquan Yulee was the third of his career, all as a member of Marshall's kickoff team.

Senior linebacker Artis Johnson scored a non-offensive touchdown for the second time in his Herd career. He returned an interception for a touchdown in Marshall's win at Middle Tennessee last season.

Notes from ECU

The game captains were senior receiver Tyre Brady and senior offensive lineman Jordan Dowrey on offense, and senior linebacker Chase Hancock and junior safety Malik Gant on defense.

Marshall improved to 11-8-1 all-time against Eastern Kentucky.

MU head coach Doc Holliday has now won eight consecutive home openers.

Marshall had three interceptions, the first time its defense has had three or more interceptions in the same game since Sept. 6, 2015 in a win against Purdue. This is the 10th time in the Holliday era the MU defense has had three or more interceptions (9 wins, 1 loss).

Junior receiver Obi Obialo's 20-yard touchdown reception in the first quarter was his first touchdown at Marshall. Obialo added a 40-yard touchdown reception in the third quarter.

Sophomore tight end Xavier Gaines established career highs in receptions (three) and receiving yards (60).

The last time Marshall won a game while committing at least four turnovers was Dec. 6, 2014 in the Conference USA championship game against Louisiana Tech (26-23). The Herd had four turnovers that day and finished minus-2 in turnover margin.

Marshall created five turnovers (3 interceptions and 2 fumble recoveries) - for the first time since it had five takeaways against Southern Miss in 2015.

Junior defensive back Jaylon McClain-Sapp intercepted ECU quarterback Austin Scott in the first quarter. It was McClain-Sapp's first collegiate interception.

Junior receiver Artie Henry's 5-yard reception on the last play of the first quarter was his first reception at Marshall.

Sophomore receiver Willie Johnson rushed for 20 yards in the first quarter, his first rushing attempt in college. He had a game high 36 rushing yards on two carries.

Sophomore receiver Simino Walden caught a 6-yard pass in the first quarter, his first college reception.

Senior linebacker Frankie Hernandez intercepted a pass in the second quarter and returned it 29 yards, his first career interception.

Junior defensive lineman Ty Tyler forced a third quarter fumble that was recovered by senior linebacker Artis Johnson for Marshall's fourth forced turnover of the game. For Tyler, it is his second career forced fumble. It was Johnson's first career fumble recovery.

Marshall linemen Ty Tyler and Channing Hames each had two sacks. The Herd had six sacks as a team, the seventh time Holliday's defense has produced six or more sacks in a game under his direction. Marshall is 6-1 in those games.

Kicker Justin Rohrwasser's 35-yard field goal in the fourth quarter was the first of his MU career.

Eastern Kentucky ended up with just 187 yards of total offense, the fewest Marshall has allowed since holding Rice to 180 yards in 2014. ECU passed for only 48 yards - the fewest Marshall has allowed in a game since UCF had just 29 pass yards in 2008.

Tight end Armani Levias got the first start of his Marshall career.

Notes from Miami

Malik Thompson got the first start of his Thundering Herd career.

Isaiah Green finished 24 of 37 passing for 272 yards and two touchdowns, an impressive showing for the 19-year-old college football rookie. That ranks as the third-most completions and fourth-most passing yards by a Marshall quarterback in his debut in program history.

Anthony Anderson scored twice in the first half - a 1-yard run in the first quarter and another 1-yard plunge in the second - for his first multi-touchdown game of his Herd career.

Senior receiver Tyre Brady, who began the season on the Biletnikoff Watch List, dazzled. He had game-highs in receptions (nine) and yards (116), and caught touchdown passes for 30 and 21 yards in the second half. It was Brady's third multi-touchdown game of his two-year MU career, and his fourth 100-yard receiving performance.

Miami's offense did not cross midfield until there was 11:30 left of the second quarter, and at one point in the first half Marshall held a 9-1 advantage in first downs and 180-13 edge in total offense.

The most points Marshall ever scored in a true season-opening road game was in the 42-27 win at Miami in 2014. The second-most was the 35 in Saturday's game.

Miami attempted five fourth-down conversions, the most by a Thundering Herd opponent since Southern Miss attempted six in a 31-10 Marshall win on Oct. 9, 2015.

Last Meeting vs. VT (9/21/13)

BLACKSBURG, Va. -- One of the longest games in Marshall football history took 3 hours and 57 minutes, but it will linger much longer.

In one of the more difficult major college football venues to play - Virginia Tech's Lane Stadium - and in a driving rain that was more persistent than either team's offense, the Thundering Herd came up oh-so-achingly short.

"We came here for a victory, but we didn't get one," Marshall senior defensive tackle James Rouse said after the Hokies outlasted the Herd 29-21 in the second three-overtime game in Herd history. "It was raining hard as heck and we've got to play better than that. We've just got to play better."

Tech (3-1) finally won it as three Rakeem Cato passes fell incomplete after Hokie quarterback Logan Thomas had run 2 yards for a touchdown and then added a two-point conversion.

For much of the game Cato outplayed Thomas before a soaked - near-capacity -- crowd of 64,060. Marshall led the game for more than 43 minutes of regulation, and had a chance to win it in the first OT when Justin Haig's 39-yard field goal attempt was blocked.

That kind of play was something of a theme of the afternoon, the Herd losing by a few fingertips:

*Tech's Derek DiNardo's 11-yard touchdown on Kyle Fuller's block of a punt by Marshall's Tyler Williams on the game's first series;

*The Hokies getting a 2-yard scoring catch from Willie Byrn to tie the game at 21 with only 3:09 left in regulation, but only after the ball tipped off a hand of Herd cornerback Darryl Roberts.

*Derrick Hopkins' middle-of-the-scrum block of Haig's first-OT field goal try. The very definition and reputation of "Beamer Ball."

Marshall (2-2) did more than take the battle to the hosts in a stadium where Tech is 50-5 in non-conference games since coach Frank Beamer's program began its run of 20 straight bowl seasons.

"I told our kids how well they played, but I think we all know we're not here for moral victories at Marshall," Herd coach Doc Holliday said. "We came here to win a football game but unfortunately Virginia Tech made one more play at the end, found a way to win it, and we didn't."

"They (the Hokies) came back and did what they have to do to win the game. We didn't come down here expecting to play with them."

The Herd's run game was impressive for the most part against the nation's No. 2-ranked defense, as Essray Taliaferro had his second career 100-yard game (105), as Holliday explained the senior was in the game for most snaps to offer additional protection for Cato.

Cato, who completed 19-of-41 for 228 yards and two scores to go with two interceptions, was successful with his feet, too. He ran for 79 yards, a number diminished by 46 in losses on four sacks.

"I think (his running) did surprise them," Cato said.

"They were moving around (Tech's defensive front) and I felt like we handled them pretty well, but we didn't do enough," said Herd redshirt junior center Chris Jasperse, who added that he wore cleats for the first time in his college career on the Lane grass field. "We knew what we wanted to do offensively and in the first half, we went out and did that."

"The second half, we moved the ball well but we didn't finish. Our defense played a great game tonight, but we've got to be able to finish."

Marshall last played a three-overtime game versus Western Carolina on Nov. 2, 1991, a game the Herd won 27-24 on homecoming.

The Herd was damaged by 11 penalties (66 yards), but the much improved Marshall defense showed its mettle again. The Hokies gained 382 yards, but went only 2-of-16 on third down conversions.

"At times we stopped the run for the most part," Holliday said. "I don't care about the stats, we lost the game. I did think we stopped the run for the most part, made two interceptions (corner Monterius Lovett, linebacker Neville Hewitt)."

"We played hard. I thought we tackled well for the most part and had some pressure on that big quarterback (Thomas), forced him to make some bad throws. We ran the ball well at times, but we've got to be more consistent with it."

"The punt block at the beginning of the game, that's just unacceptable."

By the soggy OT, Marshall went with three Taliaferro runs - three straight 1-yard gains -- to set up what could have been Haig's winning attempt.

"I thought - at that point - that it was sloppy out there," the Herd coach said. "I felt that (Haig) had been consistent from the 25-yard line (the try was from the 22) and we felt that he could put us in position to win the game, and unfortunately we couldn't get it done."

Herd slot receiver Tommy Shuler caught 10 passes - six more than any other receiver in the game and moved into the top 20 in Herd history in receiving yards. Marshall got double figures in tackles from Alex Bazzie (11), D.J. Hunter (10) and Hewitt (10), but landing a sixth win over a BCS conference team since that series was created in 1998 was elusive.

The best news for the Herd is that not only is there an open date this coming Saturday, but Holliday's team now plays only two games in a 32-day span - Oct. 5 for Homecoming and first-time meeting against UTSA and Oct. 12 at another conference USA newcomer, Florida Atlantic - before an Oct. 24 Thursday nighter at Middle Tennessee.

The Herd is expecting - and expected to, according to most prognosticators - to challenge for the league title.

"We've got an open date coming at the right time right now," Holliday said. "We've got to get back and get these guys healthy and we'll be fine. We haven't even started conference play yet. We've got a break here before conference play, which is the most important part of our schedule."



Doc Holliday Head Coach - Ninth Season (69-45 overall, 45-27 C-USA)

Coach John "Doc" Holliday, who has returned Marshall University football to the national picture, enters his ninth season leading the Thundering Herd.

Marshall has won six consecutive bowls – the current long streak in the FBS – with five of those triumphs coming under Holliday in the last seven seasons. Marshall's three straight 10-win seasons from 2013-15 were also a first in the 20-season history of Conference USA football.

Holliday led a resurgence in 2017, improving the Thundering Herd by five games to reach yet another bowl game under his watch.

His 2015 Herd finished 10-3 with a win over Connecticut in the St. Petersburg Bowl. His 2014 and '15 teams – with a combined mark of 23-4 – had the best record among the Group of Five programs in the two-year College Football Playoff era.

In Holliday's seven MU seasons, he has built the Herd into a perennial Conference USA contender. His teams have sported 26 All-C-USA first team selections, 22 second-teamers, 39 honorable mention picks and 22 All-Freshman team selections. He has had nine players selected for C-USA's top

individual player-of-the-year awards.

Holliday's 2014 Herd (13-1) grabbed the school's first C-USA Championship with a thrilling comeback, title-game win over Louisiana Tech. MU headed to the Boca Raton Bowl, where it routed Mid-American Conference champion Northern Illinois, 52-23. The Herd finished the season in the major polls – No. 22 in the USA Today Coaches poll and No. 23 in the Associated Press media poll. It was Marshall's first appearance in the final polls since 2002.

The Herd coach was named the 2014 Conference USA Coach of the Year in voting by his peers and Marshall boasted a C-USA-record 10 all-conference first team selections.

Holliday received a six-year contract extension (through July 2021) for \$755,500 annually on April 8, 2015.

The 2014 title season followed a successful 2013, as Marshall went 10-4, won the C-USA East Division crown and downed ACC member Maryland in the Military Bowl – the Terps' last game before heading to the Big Ten.

In December 2014, Holliday was named the 15th annual Gazette-Mail Sportsman of the Year by Charleston Newspapers. In April 2015, the Herd coach was honored as the 2014 Lowell Cade Sportsperson of the Year by The (Huntington) Herald-Dispatch.

And in concert with Herd Athletic Director Mike Hamrick, Holliday has helped bring about upgrades in the Marshall non-conference schedule, with home-and-homes against Louisville, Pitt, North Carolina State, Purdue, Navy, Boise State, Cincinnati, Appalachian State, East Carolina, Akron and Ohio and a 2018 game at South Carolina, which will yield the largest guarantee in school history (\$1.4 million).

Holliday, named as Herd coach on Dec. 17, 2009 in his first collegiate head coaching job, is widely regarded as one of the top recruiters in the nation. Since he has become a head coach, he has added a reputation for finding and hiring assistant coaches who have made a strong impact on his program. He has more than 30 years of collegiate coaching experience, including previous stops at Florida, North Carolina State and West Virginia, his alma mater.

In 2011, the Herd went 7-6 against the 16th-toughest schedule in the nation, a slate that was ranked second among non-BCS schools. Two of those victories came against eventual C-USA champion Southern Miss and Big East co-champ Louisville, the latter coming on the road for the program's first non-conference road win since the early 2000s. Marshall also won five Conference USA games, the most for the program since it had joined the league in 2005.

During his coaching career, Holliday has coached in 25 bowl games, three national championship games and coached 15 players who have gone on to the NFL. He also has coached five All-Americans.

A native of Hurricane, W.Va., Holliday was born April 21, 1957. He was a three-year letter winner as a linebacker at West Virginia (1976-78) and has earned bachelor's (1979) and master's (1981) degrees from WVU. He won a West Virginia state wrestling title at 175 pounds (all divisions) in 1975 at Hurricane High.

Holliday and his wife, Diana, have four children -- Meghan, Cade, Chase and Cody.
