Thundering Herd Fall Notes

Notes from Rice

The game captains for Marshall were sophomore running back Brenden Knox and senior lineman Levi Brown on offense, and senior linebacker Omari Cobb a senior lineman Marquis Couch on defense.

Marshall extended its win streak to four games, the longest since a five-game winning streak during the 2017 season.

The Thundering Herd reached six wins and bowl eligibility, the seventh time in the last nine seasons under Coach Doc Holliday the team is bowl eligible.

After the win, Marshall leads the all-time series with Rice, 5-2. The series is tied 2-2 at Rice Stadium.

Marshall junior tight end Xavier Gaines caught a 63-yard pass in the second quarter, a career long. That play also helped him set a new single-game career-high for receiving yards in a game, previously set against Eastern Kentucky on Sept. 8, 2018 (60 yards).

The 19-yard touchdown reception by freshman receiver Talik Keaton was the first of his Marshall career, but not his first touchdown at Marshall. Keaton returned a punt 67 yards for a touchdown in the season opener against VMI.

The 43-yard reception by Marshall junior receiver Willie Johnson is his fifth play of 40-plus yards this season.

Marshall sophomore defensive end Darius Hodge recorded a sack in the first half, his seventh of the season and first since a school record-tying 4.5 sacks against Old Dominion on Oct. 12.

Senior tight end Armani Levias set a career-high for receiving yards with 96. His previous best was 94 receiving yards at Middle Tennessee on Oct. 5.

Marshall sophomore running back Brenden Knox had his fourth 100-yard rushing game of the season. He has seven in his career.

Atop C-USA

In the team rankings, Marshall is leading the league in field goal percentage (.929), sacks (32) and fourth down percentage allowed (27.3).

School of Hard Knox

Brenden Knox has scored a rushing touchdown in six of nine games this season. He has 12 rushing touchdowns in 14 games at running back. Knox rushed for 220 yards at Florida Atlantic (the second-highest total in the nation that weekend). He also set a single game career high in rushing yards, besting the 205 he had at Virginia Tech last season. His 220 yards are now No. 8 on the Marshall list for most rushing yards in a game. With a 204-yard performance at Virginia Tech last season, he joins Ron Lear, Ron Darby, Chris Parker and Ahmad Bradshaw as the only Marshall players with multiple 200-yard games (nobody has had three 200-yard games for the Herd). His 226 all-purpose yards at Florida Atlantic are the most by a Marshall player since Tyre Brady had 248 yards at North Carolina State in 2017. Knox averaged 9.6 yards per carry at FAU. Among those with 20 or more carries in a game, that average is No. 7 on Marshall's career list. He ranks No. 12 nationally in rushes of 10+ yards with 30.

Groza Nominee

When Rice blocked Justin Rohrwasser's first field goal attempt, that snapped Rohrwasser's streak of 12 consecutive made field goals (his last one last season, then 11 straight this year). Rohrwasser's streak of 12 is tied for the second-longest streak by a Marshall place kicker. The longest streak of made field goals by a Marshall man is 16 by Craig Ratanamorn, who hit his last two in 2008 and then made his first 14 in 2009. Nick Smith also made 12 in a row in 2015. And now Rohrwasser has made two straight to begin a new streak. For his efforts, the Clifton Park, N.Y. native has been named a semifinalist for the Lou Groza Award.

Sack Attack

On the season, the Herd has 32 sacks, which is tied for eighth nationally. During Marshall's current four-game win streak, the Herd defense has logged 22 quarterback sacks - an average of 5.5 per game. The national leader for the season is Ohio State, who is averaging 4.56 per contest.

Pinning Them Back

On the season, punter Robert LeFevre has now pinned the opposition inside the 20 on 15 occasions, while suffering two touchbacks.

Holliday Moves to the Top

Marshall head coach Doc Holliday led the program for a school-record 125th time against Rice. The Herd's victory over the Hilltoppers was career win No. 76 for Holliday. He currently sits second on the school's all-time list behind Bob Pruett (94, 1996-2004). Holliday (69) is also two wins shy of breaking Pruett's (70) school record for victories over FBS programs.

First Quarter Dominance

Marshall's first quarter scoring advantage over the opposition since the beginning of the 2018 season is 173-80. Herd opponents have managed eight touchdowns and eight field goals during that stretch (22 games). The Thundering Herd has now won 24 of its last 25 games when scoring first and has won 14 of its last 15 when leading after the first quarter. Related: since the beginning of the 2013 season, the Herd is 44-2 (.957) when scoring first.

Marshall has not allowed a 100-yard individual rusher in 20 of its last 23 games.

Stingy D

The Herd has won 40 of its last 45 when holding offenses to 5.0 yards per play or fewer. The Herd has won 25 of its last 26 when allowing fewer than 300 yards. Sixteen (16) times in Doc Holliday's eight-plus seasons has the Herd allowed 125 yards passing or fewer. Marshall is 15-1 (.938) in those games. Marshall is 28-3 (.903) under Doc Holliday when the defense does not allow a rushing touchdown.

Feel the Rush

The Herd is now 42-6 (.875) in the last six-plus seasons when rushing for 150+ yards and 33-5 (.868) the last six-plus years with 200+ on the ground. All-time, Marshall is 11-0 under Doc Holliday when rushing for 300+ yards, as it did with 305 in the 33-31 win over Ohio. The Herd has 67 rushes of 10 or more yards, which ranks No. 17 nationally. Navy leads with 90 rushing plays of 10+ yards. The Herd is averaging 6.1 yards per rush attempt on first down, which ranks No. 12 nationally.

30+

Marshall's 36 points in the win over Florida Atlantic makes the Herd 43-3 (.935) in its last 46 games when scoring 30+ points. All of those games are under Doc Holliday.

50+

Marshall's 56-17 win over VMI in 2019 was the 17th time that the Thundering Herd has reached the 50+-point plateau under coach Doc Holliday, two more than Jim Donnan (1990-95) for the all-time school mark. Bob Pruett (1996-2004) reached that mark 14 times and Cam Henderson (1936-42, 1946-49) did it on 13 occasions.

Protecting the Home Turf

Marshall is nationally known for being one of the toughest places to play in college football. The program has won 82.3 percent (163-35) of its home games in Joan C. Edwards Stadium, the fourth-highest mark in the country.

Herd Finishes under Holliday

Since Doc Holliday became head coach in 2010, the Herd has an excellent record of finishing off its opponents once it takes the lead. Marshall is 59-8 (.881) when it scores first, 53-8 (.869) when leading after the first quarter, 62-4 (.939) when leading at halftime and 63-4 (.940) when leading after three quarters. In fact, Marshall has won 48 of its last 50 contests (2016 vs. Charlotte, 2018 vs.

Middle Tennessee) when it has the halftime lead.

Hang on!

It's easy to see why Herd Coach Doc Holliday talks about ball security so often. His ten Marshall teams have provided a strong indicator of why turnover margin is so important. Holliday's Herd teams have a combined 76-49 (.608) record. When Marshall has an edge in turnover margin, it is 41-9 (.820). When the turnover number is equal, Marshall is 19-7 (.731). When the opponent is more sure-handed, the Herd is 16-33 (.327).

Of Marshall's 125 games under Holliday, the Herd has played 63 while committing zero or one turnover, amassing a record of 48-15 (.762) in those games.

Marshall is 23-4 (.852) under Holliday when it has a turnover margin of +2 or better.

Marshall is 24-5 (.828) under Holliday when it has zero turnovers, and the Herd has won 11 of its last 12 when it does not make a miscue (Cincinnati, 2019). Marshall has won 12 of its last 13 (Cincinnati, 2019) when winning the turnover battle and the win over Ohio was the seventh straight win when the MU quarterbacks have two-plus touchdown passes without an interception.

The Thundering Herd had five takeaways in 2018 wins over Eastern Kentucky and Florida Atlantic, giving Holliday nine consecutive wins when his team forces four or more turnovers.

Feeling the Sunshine

Since the beginning of the 2013 season, Doc Holliday is 13-3 in games contested in the state of Florida and/or against Florida schools.

Perfect Versus Texas at Home

Interestingly enough, Marshall has never lost to a school from Texas at home. The Thundering Herd is a perfect 13-0 against Texas schools in games played in Huntington. Marshall owns two wins over North Texas (1988, 2015), two wins over Houston (2008, 2012), three wins over Rice (2007, 2011, 2014), two wins over SMU (2005, 2009), two wins over UTEP (2006, 2010) and two victories over UTSA (2013, 2018).

Bowl Prowess

Marshall enters 2019 featuring an .857 winning percentage (12-2) in all NCAA-sanctioned bowl games, the highest mark nationally among programs that have made at least five appearances. (The Thundering Herd also participated in the 1948 Tangerine Bowl, at which point it was not sanctioned). The leaders are below:

Doc Holliday is 6-0 in bowl games with the Thundering Herd and has appeared in 27 bowls since entering the coaching ranks.

Notes from Western Kentucky

The game captains for Marshall were sophomore running back Brenden Knox and senior lineman Levi Brown on offense, and senior linebacker Omari Cobb a senior lineman Channing Hames on defense.

With Saturday's win, Marshall leads the all-time series with Western Kentucky, 7-4. The Thundering Herd has won three consecutive games in the series.

Marshall senior kicker Justin Rohrwasser kicked a 53-yard field goal as time expired, the longest made field goal of his career. Rohrwasser had set a career long with a 46-yard field goal earlier

in the game.

Rohrwasser's 53-yard field goal is tied for the fourth-longest made kick in school history, and tied for the fourth-longest made kick in Joan C. Edwards Stadium history. The 53-yard field goal is the longest in 217 games at Marshall, since Curtis Head made a kick of the same distance against Buffalo in 2002.

Rohrwasser tied a school record with four made field goals, equaling the four made by David Merrick (East Tennessee State, 1993), Tim Openlander (The Citadel, 1995), Billy Malashevich (Miami, 1999) and Justin Haig (Louisiana Tech, 2014).

Rohrwasser scored 14 points, tied for the third-most in school history (four others).

The first quarter interception by Marshall defensive back Kereon Merrell is the first of his career. Merrell later added his first fumble recovery of the season (second of his career).

Merrell's interception is the first by the Marshall defense in the first half this season.

Marshall sophomore running back Sheldon Evans had a 21-yard run in the first quarter, which, at the moment was the first time this season the WKU defense had allowed a run longer than 20 yards. A 42-yard run by Willie Johnson in the second quarter then eclipsed that mark. It was also the longest run of Johnson's career.

The 4-yard touchdown run by Marshall sophomore quarterback Isaiah Green is the second rushing touchdown for him this season and third of his career.

Marshall senior tight end Armani Levias had a 25-yard touchdown reception in the first quarter, his third touchdown reception this season and sixth of his career. This is the second consecutive game he has scored a touchdown. For the game, he caught a career-high 10 passes for Marshall, a figure that stands third in Marshall's single-game records.

Marshall sophomore safety Naquan Renalds intercepted a pass at the end of the first half, his first career interception.

Senior linebacker Tyler Brown combined on a sack with fellow Marshall senior Omari Cobb, giving Brown a sack in three consecutive games.

Marshall senior defensive end Marquis Couch set a single-game career-high with three sacks.

Marshall freshman receiver Broc Thompson tied a career-high with 91 receiving yards.

Notes from Florida Atlantic

The game captains for Marshall were sophomore running back Brenden Knox and junior lineman Will Ulmer on offense, and senior linebacker Omari Cobb a junior linebacker Tavante Beckett on defense. This was Beckett's first time as a game captain at Marshall.

After Friday night's win, Marshall leads the all-time series vs. FAU, 6-1.

The 43-yard second quarter run by Marshall sophomore running back Brenden Knox is his longest rush of the season (previous long: 36 yards).

The 18-yard run by Marshall sophomore running back Sheldon Evans is the longest of his career. Evans' previous long was 17 yards.

The 60-yard fourth quarter touchdown reception by Marshall junior receiver Willie Johnson is a career long catch. His previous long came in the 2017 season (49 yards).

Armani Levias's 59-yard touchdown catch and run at Florida Atlantic marks the sixth-longest TD reception by a tight end in Marshall history. Couple that with his 75-yarder at Middle Tennessee and he has now has two of the top six.

Marshall senior linebacker Tyler Brown had two sacks, including one for a safety, for his first career multi-sack game. The safety was Marshall's first since the Eastern Kentucky game last year, when Malik Thompson sacked Colonels' QB Dakota Allen in the end zone.

The seven quarterback sacks against FAU are tied for eighth-most in a game in Marshall history. The 48 yards total on those sacks is tied for seventh most.

Notes from Old Dominion

The game captains for Marshall were sophomore running back Brenden Knox and junior lineman Alex Mollette on offense, and senior linebacker Omari Cobb a senior defensive back Kereon Merrell on defense.

The Marshall offense gained 236 yards on the ground – 105 more yards than the ODU defense had allowed in any game this season, including games against Virginia and Virginia Tech.

Marshall leads the all-time series with ODU, 5-1. Saturday's win is the third consecutive in the series for the Thundering Herd. Marshall is 3-0 against the Monarchs in Huntington.

Sophomore defensive end Darius Hodge had 4.5 of Marshall's season-high eight sacks.

Hodge tied a school record set by Cecil Fletcher on Sept. 13, 1986 at Ohio. He also tied two others for the third-most sacks in Conference USA history, equaling the 4.5 sacks by Louisiana Tech's Houston Bates against Illinois in 2014, and FAU's Martin Wright against FIU in 2013. The league record is six, held by Memphis' Keaton Cromartie (1997 vs. Memphis). Hodge's sack total is also the most by a Marshall player in Joan C. Edwards Stadium history. Hodge's 4.5 tackles for loss and 26 yards lost on those plays also tied for third in school history.

Marshall's eight team sacks are tied for the second-most in school history. Five other teams had eight-sack performances, most recently at Ohio in 2004. The record is 12, also at Ohio in 1986.

Senior kicker Justin Rohrwasser connected on a 45-yard field goal with 11 seconds left of the first half, his longest at Marshall (previous best: 40 yards). Rohrwasser has made six consecutive field goals dating back to last season. The boot was the Herd's longest since Kaare Vedvik made a 45-yarder at NC State in 2017. The last time a Marshall man made a longer field goal than Rohrwasser's 45-yarder was when Justin Haig hit one from 46 yards out against Louisiana Tech in the 2014 C-USA Championship Game.

In the first quarter, junior tight end Xavier Gaines connected with freshman Broc Thompson on a 33-yard pass, Gaines' first career completion.

Marshall true freshman Broc Thompson set a new career high in receptions (six) and receiving yards (91).

Armani Levias, a senior tight end for the Herd, tied a career high with five receptions (third time in his career with five receptions in a game).

Marshall quarterback Isaiah Green had a 17-yard touchdown run in the second quarter, his first rushing touchdown of the season.

Redshirt sophomore defensive lineman Jamare Edwards combined with senior defensive lineman Marquis Couch for a sack, a first for Edwards in his Marshall career.

Marshall junior linebacker Tavante Beckett set a career-high with 14 tackles.

Notes from Middle Tennessee

The game captains for Marshall were sophomore running back Brenden Knox and senior lineman Levi Brown on offense, and senior linebacker Omari Cobb a senior lineman Channing Hames on defense.

After Saturday's win, Middle Tennessee trails the all-time series with Marshall, 5-4.

Marshall senior offensive lineman Levi Brown started his 42nd career game, which pushes him into the top 25 in program history in career starts. Brown is tied with Ryan Bee (2015-2018), Darryl Roberts (2010-14), Charles Henry (1971-74), Mark Brookover (1972-75) and John Spellacy (1985-88).

After Saturday's loss, Doc Holliday is 7-3 in Conference USA openers in 10 seasons as Marshall's head coach.

Marshall quarterback Isaiah Green threw an interception in the first quarter, snapping a streak of 59 consecutive pass attempts without an interception.

Also in the first quarter, MU QB Isaiah Green connected with tight end Armani Levias for a 75-yard touchdown. The catch was Levias' first touchdown this season, the fourth of his career and the longest reception of his career. On the play, Levias surpassed his single-game best for receiving yards (previously 69 yards at Virginia Tech in 2018). The 75-yard play is also Marshall's longest this season.

Marshall junior Jackson White, a quarterback and holder on special teams, completed his first career pass after an errant snap on a field goal attempt. White's pass went 6 yards and gave Marshall a first down. In the fourth quarter, White attempted – and completed – another pass on a fake field goal attempt.

Marshall quarterback Isaiah Green set a new single-game career-high for rushing yards with 95. Green's previous best game came on Sept. 14 against Ohio (50 yards). Green's rushing total is the third-most by a quarterback in the Doc Holliday era (since 2010).

On a third quarter play, Marshall senior defensive back Kereon Merrell recorded a sack and forced fumble when he hit Middle Tennessee quarterback Asher O'Hara on third down. That was the first sack and forced fumble in Merrell's career at Marshall.

Redshirt junior Simino Walden rushed for 12 yards on a play in the third quarter, Walden's first career carry.

The 48-yard reception by Marshall junior receiver Willie Johnson in the fourth quarter was his longest reception of the season.

Marshall senior linebacker Omari Cobb set a new single-game career high for tackles with 12.

Notes from Cincinnati

The game captains for Marshall were sophomore quarterback Isaiah Green and junior offensive lineman Cain Madden on offense, and senior defensive lineman Marquis Couch and senior defensive lineman Channing Hames on defense. Green, Madden and Hames were captains for the first time.

The game against Cincinnati was the 120th in Doc Holliday's head coaching career at Marshall, making him the all-time leader in games coached in program history. Cam Henderson coached 119 games from 1935-1949.

After Saturday's win, Cincinnati leads the all-time series 9-4-1.

The official attendance was 32,192 – the 13th largest crowd in Joan C. Edwards Stadium history.

Cincinnati scored on its opening possession, the first time this season the Marshall defense allowed a first quarter touchdown.

The fourth quarter touchdown run by Marshall sophomore Sheldon Evans was the first of his career.

Junior receiver Willie Johnson scored on a 40-yard run in the fourth quarter, the longest rush by a Marshall player this season and the longest run of Johnson's career. It was also Johnson's first career touchdown run.

Marshall's Nazeeh Johnson (13) and Omari Cobb (11) each set career highs for tackles.

Sophomore linebacker Domenick Murphy had his first career fumble recovery.

Notes from Ohio

True freshman Broc Thompson and redshirt freshman Corey Gammage received their first career starts at wide receiver. Marshall started three freshmen receivers for the first time this season.

Junior tight end Xavier Gaines lined up at quarterback for one play in the first quarter, and raced 26 yards for a touchdown to open scoring. The run was Gaines' longest of his career. Gaines finished with a career-high 52 rushing yards and a season-high 53 receiving yards. Gaines became the first Marshall player to have a rushing and receiving touchdown in the same game since Hyleck Foster did so against Middle Tennessee in 2016.

Sophomore tight end Devin Miller caught his first collegiate touchdown pass. The 22-yard reception is also the longest of his college career.

Senior tight end Armani Levias tied a career-high with five receptions.

Brenden Knox led the way with 133 rushing yards. That's his fourth 100-yard rushing game in eight appearances carrying the ball. He has scored a rushing touchdown in five consecutive games. Knox's 100-yard effort is the 56th under Coach Doc Holliday. Devon Johnson had the most 100-yard rushing games under Holliday with 12.

Sophomore running back Sheldon Evans set a new career-high with 77 rushing yards. Sophomore quarterback Isaiah Green finished with 50 rushing yards, also a career best.

Senior linebacker Tyler Brown finished with seven tackles, his best single-game total in his collegiate career. He entered Saturday with seven career tackles.

Marshall was penalized only twice for a total of 20 yards - the two penalties are the fewest Marshall has incurred in a game since drawing only two flags against Miami (Ohio) in 2014.

Marshall had 305 rushing yards against the Bobcats, the 11th time the Herd has eclipsed 300 rushing yards as a team this decade. Marshall is 11-0 in those games.

The 5:42 that Marshall ate up in the final drive is the longest that the Herd has ever been able to ice the ball to protect a one-score lead. The 10 plays in that final drive matches the most Marshall has ever had in that same situation. That surpassed the previous mark of 4:56 that Marshall ate up at the end of the 27-21 win over Miami (Ohio) in 2001.

Notes From Boise State

The game captains were junior offensive lineman Alex Mollette and sophomore running back Brenden Knox on offense, and senior defensive back Chris Jackson and senior linebacker Omari Cobb on defense.

Marshall opened scoring with a touchdown run with 1:02 left of the first quarter, but the loss snaps the team's 19-game win streak when scoring first.

Senior linebacker Tyler Brown received his first career start. Friday night's game was Brown's 20th appearance at Marshall.

Sophomore running back Brenden Knox scored on a 13-yard run in the first quarter, extending his streak of consecutive games with a touchdown to four games, dating back to last season.

Senior defensive end Marquis Couch recorded his first sack of the season, which gave him 6.0 for his Marshall career.

The third quarter interception by senior linebacker Omari Cobb is

the first for him this season and the second of his career.

Fermin Silva, a senior playing in his second game at Marshall, was credited with his first sack with the Herd and forced a fumble on the same play that was recovered by fellow defensive lineman Sam Burton.

Boise State running back George Holani rushed for 103 yards, snapping Marshall's streak of not allowing an individual 100-yard rusher at 15 games.

Notes from VMI

Isaiah Green threw a career-high four touchdown passes against VMI. The last time a Marshall quarterback tossed more TD passes was when Chase Litton threw six against Morgan State in 2016. Green completed 18 of 28 passes for 238 yards with four scores and one interception. He also rushed eight times for 46 yards. Marshall's 56 points scored marked the Herd's most since that 62-0 win over Morgan State and the 620 yards of total offense were the Herd's most since gaining 630 yards at Charlotte in 2015.

Talik Keaton's 67-yard punt return (the 26th-longest in program history) for a touchdown against VMI was Marshall's first since Deandre Reaves' 69-yarder for a score against FIU in 2015 and also the longest punt return since that one by Reaves. Keaton's 109 punt return yards (5 att.) against the Keydets are the eighth-most in school history and were the most by a Marshall man since Damone Williams had five returns for 140 yards at Ohio in 1998.

Eleven different players had a reception and 29 players recorded a tackle.

The Herd did not allow a 100-yard rusher for the 15th consecutive game.

Running back Brenden Knox, who scored twice, has had at least one rushing touchdown in three consecutive games dating back to last season.

Linebacker Tyler Brown recorded his first career sack.

Artie Henry's 51-yard touchdown catch was the longest reception of his career.

Marshall had 35 first downs, its most since recording 31 against Akron on September 17, 2016.

Obialo Named to Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award Watch List

Marshall wide receiver Obi Obialo was named to the Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award Watch List.

The honor recognizes the top offensive player in Division I football who also exhibits the enduring characteristics that define Earl Campbell: integrity, performance, teamwork, sportsmanship, drive, community and tenacity; specifically, tenacity to persist and determination to overcome adversity and injury in pursuit of reaching goals. In addition, the nominee must meet one or more of the following criteria: born in Texas and/or graduated from a Texas High School and/or played at a Texas-based junior college or four-year college.

Obialo, a Coppell, Texas native, finished the season with 42 receptions for 505 yards and four touchdowns. In 2018, he was named a team captain four times and started all 13 games.

The Watch List announced today will be narrowed to up to 16 semifinalists in November and then up to 5 finalists in December. They will be selected by broadcasters, commentators, journalists, fans, and previous winners. The finalists will be brought to Tyler for The Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award Banquet scheduled for January 15, 2020.

Beardall Named to Patrick Mannelly Award, Senior Bowl Watch Lists

Matt Beardall has been selected to the Patrick Mannelly Award Watch List, an honor that is presented annually to the best long snapper in the FBS (Football Bowl Subdivision). Later in the fall, he

was named to the Senior Bowl Watch List as well.

Beardall was a preseason All-Conference USA selection this season after garnering first-team honors a year ago. He enters 2019 having made 34 consecutive starts at the position.

The winner must be of senior standing, have started 75% of games in his senior year, snap on punts and placements, and demonstrate a strong mentality, notable athleticism, as well as speed, accuracy and consistency in their snaps.

The award is determined by a committee comprised of former NFL long snappers, punters and kickers, special team coaches, as well as snapping instructors, NFL player agents and sportswriters.

Semifinalists are chosen on Monday, November 16 and finalists will be announced the following Monday.

The winner will be announced on Saturday, December 14.

Knox Named to Wuerffel Award Watch List

Marshall running back Brenden Knox was named to the 2019 Wuerffel Trophy Watch List.

It was the second preseason honor for the Columbus, Ohio native, who was previously named to the AFCA Good Works Team Nominee List earlier this summer.

The Wuerffel Trophy, known as "College Football's Premier Award for Community Service," is presented each February in Fort Walton Beach. Named after 1996 Heisman Trophy winning quarterback Danny Wuerffel from the University of Florida, the Wuerffel Trophy is awarded to the FBS player that best combines exemplary community service with athletic and academic achievement. Semifinalists for the award will be announced on November 5 and finalists will be announced on November 18. The formal announcement of the 2019 recipient will be made at the National Football Foundation's festivities in New York City on December 10. The presentation of the 2019 Wuerffel Trophy will occur at the 51st All Sports Association Awards Banquet on February 14, 2020 in Fort Walton Beach.

Knox, a second-team all-conference preseason pick by Athlon, exploded toward the end of 2018, ripping off 578 rushing yards and four touchdowns in the final five games of the season. In fact, his 297 rushing yards in December led all of college football. He averaged 115.6 yards per game in those final five games, which would have ranked No. 8 nationally for the entire season, but his rushing average includes production from all 13 games because he played on special teams.

Brown Adds Outland Trophy Honor

Marshall center Levi Brown was named to the Outland Trophy's Watch List on Tuesday. The honor is given annually to the nation's top interior lineman (offensive or defensive).

It was the second preseason honor for the Thundering Herd's Franklin, Georgia native after he was given a Rimington Trophy Watch List (top center) nod last week.

Brown was also named a preseason All-Conference USA selection by the league's coaches and Athlon earlier this summer.

The recipient of the 74th Outland Trophy will be announced during ESPN's The Home Depot College Football Awards on Dec. 12, live from the College Football Hall of Fame in Atlanta. The official presentation to the winner will be made at the NFID Outland Trophy Awards Dinner sponsored by Werner Enterprises and produced by the Greater Omaha Sports Committee on Jan. 15, 2020. Up to eight semifinalists will be named on Nov. 20 in Omaha and three finalists for the award will be announced on Nov. 25.

Jackson Named to Thorpe Award List

Marshall defensive back Chris Jackson was named to the Jim Thorpe Award Preseason Watch List.

The honor is given annually to the best defensive back in college football.

Jackson, who was a preseason all-Conference USA selection by the league's coaches and Athlon, earned postseason all-conference honors for the third consecutive season in 2018. He finished the year with 61 tackles (40 unassisted), one interception, 15 pass breakups and one fumble recovery.

The award recipient is selected by the Paycom Jim Thorpe Award National Selection Committee, which boasts members of the NCFAA, an Oklahoma Sports Hall of Fame in-house award committee, former Paycom Jim Thorpe Award recipients, and sportswriters and college football journalists throughout the country.

The 2019 Paycom Jim Thorpe Award winner is selected from three finalists and will be announced at The Home Depot College Football Awards Presented by Gildan on Thursday, December 12, 2019, on ESPN. The Paycom Jim Thorpe Award commemorative banquet will be held on Tuesday, February 4, 2020, in Oklahoma City.

Brown, Levias Named to Preseason Watch Lists

Marshall center Levi Brown (Rimington Trophy) and tight end Armani Levias (John Mackey Award) have each been named to preseason watch lists at their respective positions.

Brown, who has been named to the list three times, was named a preseason All-Conference USA selection by the league's coaches and Athlon this summer. Levias, who was named to Athlon's second team, caught 20 passes for 258 yards and three touchdowns in 2018.

Conference USA's media corps picked the Thundering Herd to win the East Division earlier this week, to the tune of 14 first-place votes. North Texas was the top selection in the West with 20.

Thundering Herd By The Numbers

125 – Marshall head coach Doc Holliday has led the Thundering Herd in a school-record 125 games.

51 – In the last six-plus seasons, the Marshall offense has scored 30 or more points 51 times. The Herd is 46-5 in those games, including 12 consecutive wins.

47 – The Marshall offensive line has allowed only 47 sacks in the last two-plus seasons (34 games), and ranked in the top 25 nationally in fewest sacks allowed in each of the past two years.

33 – The Marshall offense has scored 40 or more points 33 times since 2010, Doc Holliday's first year with the program. The Herd is 29-4 in those games.

32 – In the past six-plus seasons, Marshall quarterbacks have been interception-free 32 times. In those games, the Herd is 28-4.

26 – The Marshall defense has allowed only two runs of 50-plus yards in the last two-plus seasons and hasn't allowed a 50+ yard carry in 26 of its last 27 games.

24 – The Marshall football team has now won 24 of its last 25 games (at Boise State) when scoring first.

22 – Since Doc Holliday took over as head coach, Marshall has won 22 out of 23 games when rushing for at least 250 yards.

20 – The Marshall defense has not allowed a 100-yard rusher in 20 of its last 23 games (2019 at Boise State, Ohio, WKU).

15.5 – Senior defensive lineman Channing Hames currently boasts 15.5 career sacks, the most of any active Thundering Herd player. Hames, who was the New Mexico Bowl Defensive MVP in 2017, has 3.5 of his career sacks in Marshall's last two bowl games.

7 – Consecutive bowl wins by the Marshall football team, the longest active streak in college football.

4 – Marshall is one of four college football programs with bowl wins in five of the last six seasons, along with defending national champion Clemson and the Big Ten's Wisconsin.

3 – Only three schools have a better (current home stadium) winning percentage than Marshall: Alabama, Boise State and Georgia Southern. The Herd is 163-35 at Joan C. Edwards Stadium, which opened in 1991, winning at an .823 clip.

2 – Marshall head coach Doc Holliday currently has 69 victories over FBS schools (76 total wins) as head coach of the Thundering Herd, three shy of breaking Bob Pruett's (1996-2004) all-time MU mark of 70 (94 total wins).

1 – With seven consecutive bowl wins, the Marshall football program continues to rank No. 1 nationally in bowl winning percentage (minimum five bowls to qualify). The Herd is 12-2 (.857) all-time in bowl games.

Last Meeting vs. LA Tech (12/6/14)

HUNTINGTON, W.Va. – In these parts, December 2014 has yet to bring but a fleeting sliver of sunshine. But through the recurring raindrops, there was a distinct glow late Saturday afternoon, one that hadn't been seen in a dozen years at Joan C. Edwards Stadium.

It was the shiny reflection from a conference championship trophy.

With a wall-like defense, an uncanny MVP place-kicker and more resilience than reliability, Marshall won its first Conference USA football title with a come-from-behind, 26-23 triumph over visiting Louisiana Tech in the league championship game.

Through the gloom and the gloaming, the Thundering Herd (12-1) erased the biggest deficit in a C-USA final - 10 points - to win in the league's 10-season history of title games.

Marshall trailed for 50 minutes, 55 seconds before a soaked and hand-wringing crowd of 23,711.

"It was a real struggle," Herd senior linebacker Neville Hewitt said.

He wasn't referring to the wildly celebrating fans' attempt to get the south end zone goal post up the northwest end zone ramp and through the gates.

"I heard it's down on Fourth (Avenue) right now," Hewitt grinned about a half-hour after the post's quick removal.

Hewitt's game-sealing, first-down interception of Tech quarterback Cody Sokol with 1:35 left came only 15 seconds after a scrambling Rakeem Cato found an equally improvising Deon-Tay McManus on a 5-yard touchdown pass - their second scoring hookup of the game -- that gave the Herd its only lead.

Eight days after losing a 67-66 overtime stunner on the same field to Western Kentucky, this time Marshall and the Bulldogs (8-5) played a very different game. Eight days after allowing 738 yards, the Herd defense was masterful, especially in limiting Coach Skip Holtz's club to a 90-yard second half.

Those stoppers and Herd senior kicker Justin Haig - deservedly voted the game's Most Valuable Player - kept Marshall hopes alive for a first league title since the 2002 Mid-American crown.

Coach Doc Holliday's team had four turnovers (three fumbles and a Cato interception) and had a punt blocked, but still found a route to a 13th title in a fifth conference, dating to 1925.

"The defense was tremendous," Holliday said. "To turn the ball over like we did, to have the blocked punt like we did, and to find a way to win that football game ... I don't know if I've ever played or coached in a game where we made the mistakes that we made and still found a way to win, and that says so much about these kids."

"The way they fought ... Rev (Rev. Steve Harvey, the team chaplain), in Chapel this morning, used the word 'resolve.' And that means whatever it takes to get this done. And they did."

The Bulldogs were missing five academically ineligible starters, but they made it anything but easy for the hosts. The Herd overcame personnel issues, too. Star running back Devon Johnson played only a few second-half snaps. Starting right guard Michael Selby went out - again - with an ankle sprain. By the finish, with the Herd trying to run out the clock, Holliday had No. 4 running back Tony Pittman in the game.

On defense, redshirt freshman Raheem Huskey played alongside Hewitt for most of the game, with regular Jermaine Holmes nursing a hamstring he injured in the loss to WKU. Huskey had two sacks. Cornerback Keith Baxter started, but lasted only a few plays before leaving in pain.

At one point in the first half, with sophomore corner/nickel Corey Tindal out briefly after an injury, the Herd had sophomore Michael Johnson at corner - he played little on defense this season - and true freshman Antavis Rowe at nickel.

"Don't remind me, I know," Holliday said. "I was holding my breath, closing my eyes."

Haig had a career day as a fortuitous time. The Floridian was 4-for-4 on field goals, the first MU kicker with four in a game since Billy Malashevich was 4-for-4 in a 1999 win at Miami (Ohio). Haig's 46-yarder to send the teams to dry locker rooms at halftime was his career long try - and conversion.

He also had two 40-yarders and one from 24. He became the first kicker with three field goals of at least 40 yards in a C-USA title game, and his 14 kick points tied the C-USA Championship Game record. His four FGs were a C-USA game record, too.

"I told Haig ... the kicker gets the MVP of the game, I've never heard of that before," Holliday said with a grin. "He was special. He hadn't done that all year, but guess what, he did it when it mattered ... just another example of a senior on this football team playing his best football right now."

"That's the best game he's had since he's been here and to do it in a championship game means an awful lot."

Tech got plenty from running back Kenneth Dixon's 156 rushing yards and two touchdowns, but the Marshall defense took away Sokol's receivers and the graduate transfer QB from Iowa was only 7-of-20 for a paltry 72 yards. His pick to Hewitt - he led Marshall with 14 tackles and also mentored Huskey through the game - was the last gasp for the visitors.

"We made an unusual call there," Heater said. "It's a blitz with hardly anybody covering underneath, but he's (Hewitt) one of the guys that is and they just didn't see him. It's not a call you would typically make in that situation."

"But we did and we just got lucky. He threw the ball to the guy he didn't see, didn't think he'd be there, but he was. It was weird."

"That running back (Dixon) is a great player, and we didn't exactly take him away. Their receivers, we did a great job. There were times when our coverage was tilted totally one way, away from 'Swagg' (cornerback Darryl Roberts), and Swagg went 1-on-1 and did a phenomenal job. He won most of those battles. It might be overlooked by some, but Darryl Roberts holding up at the corner spot was huge for us."

Marshall forced 10 Tech punts - a title-game record - and limited the Bulldogs to 4-of-17 on third-down conversions. Tech went 0-for-6 on third down in the final half.

Offensively, Marshall had only 121 ground yards - its lowest rushing total in a victory since getting only 97 in a 38-28 triumph over Memphis in 2012 - but Cato had good enough protection (he was sacked twice and endured a career-high 14 hurries) against the constantly blitzing Bulldogs to go 25-of-46 for 308 yards and two scores. He was 16-of-26 in the second half.

"I told him after the game, he's got all these records and he's got everything that's happened here, but the one thing that was not on his resume was a championship," Holliday said of Cato. "And now, with him winning that championship, you can talk about him in the same breath as you do (Herd quarterback legends) Chad (Pennington) and Byron (Leftwich) because they did that."

"They got that done here. Now, he's done it. That kid has meant so much to this program. He's the quarterback who got it back to where it belonged, where it needs to be."

Cato's second-and-goal, 5-yard game-winner to McManus in the back of the end zone was more about protection than precision, and it ended an 11-play, 68-yard drive that took 3:11.

"The play was a quick slant," McManus said. "He's supposed to find me inside, but the defense played their part. I just never gave up on the play. I saw Cato scramble to the right, tried to get open and he saw me for the touchdown."

Cato said the Bulldogs "did a great job of covering the play. I just had to find time and use my feet. (McManus) made a great move and cut back and I delivered him a catchable ball. He made a great catch and that was the winning touchdown."

A week earlier, the Herd lost a game, a 12-game winning streak and a 13-game home winning streak. Getting a C-USA title to follow those in the WVAC, Buckeye, Southern and MAC seemed a soothing salve on a soggy Saturday.

"I can't say enough how proud I am of the coaching staff, proud of the football team," Holliday said. "We overcame a lot of stuff out there. I've never been associated with a team that overcame so much adversity as we did in that game, and found a way to win at the end."

"It's a special bunch. I told them this morning before we got on the bus, that I had an opportunity to win a bunch of championships, titles, but I've never been as proud of a football team as I have with this one. They've come so far."

"The culture is changed here at Marshall and as the head football coach, I'm just really excited to get this program back to where we wanted it - and that's to win championships for this fan base, this community, our school."

Head Coach - Tenth Season

(76-49 overall, 49-28 C-USA)

Coach John "Doc" Holliday, who has returned Marshall University football to the national picture, enters his 10th season leading the Thundering Herd.

Marshall protected its place as college football's winningest bowl program, by percentage, and extended the nation's longest bowl winning streak to seven games following its victory over USF in the 2018 Gasparilla Bowl. Six of those wins have come under Holliday, who has the most bowl wins by a coach in program history.

In 2018, the Thundering Herd won four of its last five games to finish 9-4, the 20th time in school history a team has won as many games. It has happened six times since the turn of the century, four in the last six seasons.

Marshall's three straight 10-win seasons from 2013-15 were also a first in the 20-season history of Conference USA football.

Holliday led a resurgence in 2017, improving the Thundering Herd by five games to reach yet another bowl game under his watch.

His 2015 Herd finished 10-3 with a win over Connecticut in the St. Petersburg Bowl. His 2014 and '15 teams – with a combined mark of 23-4 – had the best record among the Group of Five programs in the two-year College Football Playoff era.

In Holliday's seven MU seasons, he has built the Herd into a perennial Conference USA contender. His teams have sported 26 All-C-USA first team selections, 22 second-teamers, 39 honorable mention picks and 22 All-Freshman team selections. He has had nine players selected for C-USA's top individual player-of-the-year awards.

Holliday's 2014 Herd (13-1) grabbed the school's first C-USA Championship with a thrilling comeback, title-game win over Louisiana Tech. MU headed to the Boca Raton Bowl, where it routed Mid-American Conference champion Northern Illinois, 52-23. The Herd finished the season in the major polls – No. 22 in the USA Today Coaches poll and No. 23 in the Associated Press media poll. It was Marshall's first appearance in the final polls since 2002.

The Herd coach was named the 2014 Conference USA Coach of the Year in voting by his peers and Marshall boasted a C-USA-record 10 all-conference first team selections.

Holliday received a six-year contract extension (through July 2021) for \$755,500 annually on April 8, 2015.

The 2014 title season followed a successful 2013, as Marshall went 10-4, won the C-USA East Division crown and downed ACC member Maryland in the Military Bowl -- the Terps' last game before heading to the Big Ten.

In December 2014, Holliday was named the 15th annual Gazette-Mail Sportsman of the Year by Charleston Newspapers. In April 2015, the Herd coach was honored as the 2014 Lowell Cade Sportsperson of the Year by The (Huntington) Herald-Dispatch.

And in concert with Herd Athletic Director Mike Hamrick, Holliday has helped bring about upgrades in the Marshall non-conference schedule, with home-and-homes against Louisville, Pitt, North Carolina State, Purdue, Navy, Boise State, Cincinnati, Appalachian State, East Carolina, Akron and Ohio and a 2018 game at South Carolina, which will yield the largest guarantee in school history (\$1.4 million).

Holliday, named as Herd coach on Dec. 17, 2009 in his first collegiate head coaching job, is widely regarded as one of the top recruiters in the nation. Since he has become a head coach, he has added a reputation for finding and hiring assistant coaches who have made a strong impact on his program. He has more than 30 years of collegiate coaching experience, including previous stops at Florida, North Carolina State and West Virginia, his alma mater.

In 2011, the Herd went 7-6 against the 16th-toughest schedule in the nation, a slate that was ranked second among non-BCS schools. Two of those victories came against eventual C-USA champion Southern Miss and Big East co-champ Louisville, the latter coming on the road for the program's first non-conference road win since the early 2000s. Marshall also won five Conference USA games, the most for the program since it had joined the league in 2005.

During his coaching career, Holliday has coached in 26 bowl games and three national championship games. He also has coached five All-Americans.

A native of Hurricane, W.Va., Holliday was born April 21, 1957. He was a three-year letter winner as a linebacker at West Virginia (1976-78) and has earned bachelor's (1979) and master's (1981) degrees from WVU. He won a West Virginia state wrestling title at 175 pounds (all divisions) in 1975 at Hurricane High.

Holliday and his wife, Diana, have four children -- Meghan, Cade, Chase and Cody.
