Thundering Herd Fall Notes

Notes from VMI

Isaiah Green threw a career-high four touchdown passes against VMI. The last time a Marshall quarterback tossed more TD passes was when Chase Litton threw six against Morgan State in 2016. Green completed 18 of 28 passes for 238 yards with four scores and one interception. He also rushed eight times for 46 yards. Marshall's 56 points scored marked the Herd's most since that 62-0 win over Morgan State and the 620 yards of total offense were the Herd's most since gaining 630 yards at Charlotte in 2015.

Talik Keaton's 67-yard punt return (the 26th-longest in program history) for a touchdown against VMI was Marshall's first since Deandre Reaves' 69-yarder for a score against FIU in 2015 and also the longest punt return since that one by Reaves. Keaton's 109 punt return yards (5 att.) against the Keydets are the eighth-most in school history and were the most by a Marshall man since Damone Williams had five returns for 140 yards at Ohio in 1998.

Eleven different players had a reception and 29 players recorded a tackle.

The Herd did not allow a 100-yard rusher for the 15th consecutive game.

Running back Brenden Knox, who scored twice, has had at least one rushing touchdown in three consecutive games dating back to last season.

Linebacker Tyler Brown recorded his first career sack.

Artie Henry's 51-yard touchdown catch was the longest reception of his career.

Marshall had 35 first downs, its most since recording 31 against Akron on September 17, 2016.

Holliday Moves into Second

The Herd's victory over VMI was career win No. 71 for coach Doc Holliday. He currently sits second on the school's all-time list behind Bob Pruett (94, 1996-2004)

First Quarter Dominance

Marshall's first quarter scoring advantage over the opposition since the beginning of the 2018 season is 115-39. Herd opponents have managed just three touchdowns and six field goals during that stretch (14 games). The Thundering Herd has now won 19 consecutive games when scoring first and has won its last 10 when leading after the first quarter. Related: since the beginning of the 2013 season, the Herd is 39-1 when scoring first.

Marshall still has not allowed a 100-yard individual rusher in some time, a streak that is at 15 games. Only three other teams did not allow a 100-yard rusher last season: Clemson, Northern Illinois and Southern Miss.

Stingy D

The Herd has won 38 of its last 43 when holding offenses to 5.0 yards per play or fewer. The Herd has won 23 of its

last 24 when allowing fewer than 300 yards. Fourteen (14) times in Doc Holliday's eight-plus seasons has the Herd allowed 125 yards passing or fewer. Marshall is 13-1 (.929) in those games. Marshall is 27-3 (.900) under Doc Holliday when the defense does not allow a rushing touchdown.

Feel the Rush

The Herd is now 38-5 (.883) in the last six-plus seasons when rushing for 150+ yards and 30-4 (.882) the last six-plus years with 200+ on the ground. All-time, Marshall is 9-0 under Doc Holliday when rushing for 300+ yards.

30+

Marshall's 56 points in the win over VMI makes the Herd 40-3 (.930) in its last 43 games when scoring 30+ points. All of those games are under Doc Holliday.

50+

Marshall's 56-17 win over VMI in 2019 was the 17th time that the Thundering Herd has reached the 50+-point plateau under coach Doc Holliday, two more than Jim Donnan (1990-95) for the all-time school mark. Bob Pruett (1996-2004) reached that mark 14 times and Cam Henderson (1936-42, 1946-49) did it on 13 occasions.

Protecting the Home Turf

Marshall is nationally known for being one of the toughest places to play in college football. The program has won 82.5 percent (160-34) of its home games in Joan C. Edwards Stadium, the fourth-highest mark in the country among programs have played more than one game at their facility.

Herd Finishes under Holliday

Since Doc Holliday became head coach in 2010, the Herd has an excellent record of finishing off its opponents once it takes the lead. Marshall is 54-7 (.885) when it scores first, 49-7 (.875) when leading after the first quarter, 58-4 (.935) when leading at halftime and 58-4 (.935) when leading after three quarters. In fact, Marshall was won 44 of its last 46 contests (2016 vs. Charlotte, 2018 vs. Middle Tennessee) when it has the halftime lead.

Hang on!

It's easy to see why Herd Coach Doc Holliday talks about ball security so often. His ten Marshall teams have provided a strong indicator of why turnover margin is so important. Holliday's Herd teams have a combined 71-46 (.607) record. When Marshall has an edge in turnover margin, it is 39-8 (.830). When the turnover number is equal, Marshall is 16-6 (.727). When the opponent is more sure-handed, the Herd is 16-32 (.333).

Of Marshall's 117 games under Holliday, the Herd has played 57 while committing zero or one turnover, amassing a record of 43-14 (.754) in those games.

Marshall is 22-4 (.846) under Holliday when it has a turnover margin of +2 or better. In 2018, it was 9-0 when the margin was minus-1 or better.

The Thundering Herd had five takeaways in 2018 wins over Eastern Kentucky and Florida Atlantic, giving Holliday nine consecutive wins when his team forces four or more turnovers.

Marshall won the turnover battle against USF in the 2018 Gasparilla Bowl, the Herd's 10th consecutive win when coming out on the right side of that battle.

Perfect Versus Texas at Home

Interestingly enough, Marshall has never lost to a school from Texas at home. The Thundering Herd is a perfect 13-0 against Texas schools in games played in Huntington. Marshall owns two wins over North Texas (1988, 2015), two wins over Houston (2008, 2012), three wins over Rice (2007, 2011, 2014), two wins over SMU (2005, 2009), two wins over UTEP (2006, 2010) and two victories over UTSA (2013, 2018).

Bowl Prowess

Marshall enters 2018 featuring an .846 winning percentage (12-2) in all NCAA-sanctioned bowl games, the highest mark nationally among programs that have made at least five appearances. (The Thundering Herd also participated in the 1948 Tangerine Bowl, at which point it was not sanctioned). The leaders are below:

Doc Holliday is 6-0 in bowl games with the Thundering Herd and has appeared in 27 bowls since entering the coaching ranks.

Feeling the Sunshine

Since the beginning of the 2013 season, Doc Holliday is 12-3 in games contested in the state of Florida and/or against Florida schools.

Obialo Named to Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award Watch List

Marshall wide receiver Obi Obialo was named to the Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award Watch List.

The honor recognizes the top offensive player in Division I football who also exhibits the enduring characteristics that define Earl Campbell: integrity, performance, teamwork, sportsmanship, drive, community and tenacity; specifically, tenacity to persist and determination to overcome adversity and injury in pursuit of reaching goals. In addition, the nominee must meet one or more of the following criteria: born in Texas and/or graduated from a Texas High School and/or played at a Texas-based junior college or four-year college.

Obialo, a Coppell, Texas native, finished the season with 42 receptions for 505 yards and four touchdowns. In 2018, he was named a team captain four times and started all 13 games.

The Watch List announced today will be narrowed up to 16 semifinalists in November and then up to 5 finalists

in December. They will be selected by broadcasters, commentators, journalists, fans, and previous winners. The finalists will be brought to Tyler for The Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award Banquet scheduled for January 15, 2020.

Beardall Named to Patrick Mannelly Award, Senior Bowl Watch Lists

Matt Beardall has been selected to the Patrick Mannelly Award Watch List, an honor that is presented annually to the best long snapper in the FBS (Football Bowl Subdivision). Later in the fall, he was named to the Senior Bowl Watch List as well.

Beardall was a preseason All-Conference USA selection this season after garnering first-team honors a year ago. He enters 2019 having made 34 consecutive starts at the position.

The winner must be of senior standing, have started 75% of games in his senior year, snap on punts and placements, and demonstrate a strong mentality, notable athleticism, as well as speed, accuracy and consistency in their snaps.

The award is determined by a committee comprised of former NFL long snappers, punters and kickers, special team coaches, as well as snapping instructors, NFL player agents and sportswriters.

Semifinalists are chosen on Monday, November 16 and finalists will be announced the following Monday.

The winner will be announced on Saturday, December 14.

Knox Named to Wuerffel Award Watch List

Marshall running back Brenden Knox was named to the 2019 Wuerffel Trophy Watch List.

It was the second preseason honor for the Columbus, Ohio native, who was previously named to the AFCA Good Works Team Nominee List earlier this summer.

The Wuerffel Trophy, known as "College Football's Premier Award for Community Service," is presented each February in Fort Walton Beach. Named after 1996 Heisman Trophy winning quarterback Danny Wuerffel from the University of Florida, the Wuerffel Trophy is awarded to the FBS player that best combines exemplary community service with athletic and academic achievement.

Semifinalists for the award will be announced on November 5 and finalists will be announced on November 18. The formal announcement of the 2019 recipient will be made at the National Football Foundation's festivities in New York City on December 10. The presentation of the 2019 Wuerffel Trophy will occur at the 51st All Sports Association Awards Banquet on February 14, 2020 in Fort Walton Beach.

Knox, a second-team all-conference preseason pick by Athlon, exploded toward the end of 2018, ripping off 578 rushing yards and four touchdowns in the final five games of the season. In fact, his 297 rushing yards in December led all of college football. He averaged 115.6

yards per game in those final five games, which would have ranked No. 8 nationally for the entire season, but his rushing average includes production from all 13 games because he played on special teams.

Brown Adds Outland Trophy Honor

Marshall center Levi Brown was named to the Outland Trophy's Watch List on Tuesday. The honor is given annually to the nation's top interior lineman (offensive or defensive).

It was the second preseason honor for the Thundering Herd's Franklin, Georgia native after he was given a Rimington Trophy Watch List (top center) nod last week.

Brown was also named a preseason All-Conference USA selection by the league's coaches and Athlon earlier this summer.

The recipient of the 74th Outland Trophy will be announced during ESPN's The Home Depot College Football Awards on Dec. 12, live from the College Football Hall of Fame in Atlanta. The official presentation to the winner will be made at the NFID Outland Trophy Awards Dinner sponsored by Werner Enterprises and produced by the Greater Omaha Sports Committee on Jan. 15, 2020. Up to eight semifinalists will be named on Nov. 20 in Omaha and three finalists for the award will be announced on Nov. 25.

Jackson Named to Thorpe Award List

Marshall defensive back Chris Jackson was named to the Jim Thorpe Award Preseason Watch List.

The honor is given annually to the best defensive back in college football.

Jackson, who was a preseason all-Conference USA selection by the league's coaches and Athlon, earned postseason all-conference honors for the third consecutive season in 2018. He finished the year with 61 tackles (40 unassisted), one interception, 15 pass breakups and one fumble recovery.

The award recipient is selected by the Paycom Jim Thorpe Award National Selection Committee, which boasts members of the NCFAA, an Oklahoma Sports Hall of Fame in-house award committee, former Paycom Jim Thorpe Award recipients, and sportswriters and college football journalists throughout the country.

The 2019 Paycom Jim Thorpe Award winner is selected from three finalists and will be announced at The Home Depot College Football Awards Presented by Gildan on Thursday, December 12, 2019, on ESPN. The Paycom Jim Thorpe Award commemorative banquet will be held on Tuesday, February 4, 2020, in Oklahoma City.

Brown, Levias Named to Preseason Watch Lists

Marshall center Levi Brown (Rimington Trophy) and tight end Armani Levias (John Mackey Award) have each been named to preseason watch lists at their respective positions.

Brown, who has been named to the list three times, was named a preseason All-Conference USA selection by the league's coaches and Athlon this summer. Levias, who

was named to Athlon's second team, caught 20 passes for 258 yards and three touchdowns in 2018.

Conference USA's media corps picked the Thundering Herd to win the East Division earlier this week, to the tune of 14 first-place votes. North Texas was the top selection in the West with 20.

Marshall Picked First in C-USA's East Division

Marshall Football has been picked to win the East Division, according to a panel of media members in a poll conducted and released by the Conference USA office Tuesday afternoon.

The Thundering Herd welcomes back nine starters on offense and five on defense from a squad that finished 6-2 in the conference last season. Quarterback Isaiah Green was named co-Freshman of the Year after averaging 245 yards per game with 15 TD passes in 10 outings. In addition to four returning starters on the offensive line, led by senior All-C-USA C Levi Brown, the Herd brings back a pair of productive rushers in sophomore Brenden Knox (578 yards and 4 TDs in the final five games last year) and junior Tyler King (the team's leading rusher the last two seasons). The Marshall defense did not allow a 100-yard rusher all of last season and senior DL Channing Hames and LB Omari Cobb will lead the way up front, while CB Chris Jackson spearheads the secondary.

Marshall garnered 14 first-place votes, while FIU had nine and Florida Atlantic boasted three.

North Texas received 20 first-place votes in the West and is picked to win that division.

The 15th annual Conference USA Football Championship Game, pitting the champions of the East and West Divisions, will be held Saturday, Dec. 7.

Herd Has Four Named Preseason All-Conference

Marshall Football had four student-athletes named preseason All-Conference USA Monday in an announcement made by the league office.

Center Levi Brown, defensive lineman Channing Hames, defensive back Chris Jackson and long snapper Matt Beardall were all recognized by the league's 14 head coaches.

Brown was a first-team pick at the end of last season and Jackson made the second team. Beardall was also named a first-team 2018 selection and Hames was also selected as a 2019 preseason first-team pick by Athlon.

The Thundering Herd will kick off its 2019 season on August 31 against VMI in Joan C. Edwards Stadium.

Nine Named Preseason All-Conference USA by Athlon

Marshall Football boasted nine preseason All-Conference USA picks when Athlon Sports released its prognostications on Friday.

Thundering Herd center Levi Brown and defensive lineman Channing Hames were picked to the first team, while running back Brenden Knox, tight end Armani

Levias and defensive back Chris Jackson made the second team. Linebacker Omari Cobb and punt returner Tyler King represented Marshall on the third team and quarterback Isaiah Green and kick returner Willie Johnson were tabbed fourth-team selections.

Brown was a first-team pick at the end of last season in awards announced by the league office and Jackson made the second team. Leviás checked in with an honorable mention nod. Green made the conference's All-Freshman team.

The league office will release its 2019 preseason All-Conference USA team later this summer.

The Thundering Herd will open its 2019 slate at home against VMI on Saturday, August 31.

Marshall, Western Michigan Ink 2024, 2025 Football Games

Marshall and Western Michigan have agreed to face each other in football in 2024 and 2025, both schools announced Friday.

The Broncos will come to Huntington on September 14, 2024 and the Thundering Herd will travel to Kalamazoo, Michigan the following season on September 6, 2025.

Western Michigan leads the all-time series between the two institutions at 22-12, but Marshall won five of the last six before departing for Conference USA for the 2005 season.

The Thundering Herd enjoyed one of the program's defining moments against the Broncos in 1999 when tight end Eric Pinkerton hauled in the only touchdown catch of his career with four seconds left to down WMU 34-30 in Joan C. Edwards Stadium. The victory, which came after the Herd trailed 23-0 with six minutes left in the third quarter, preserved an unblemished season for Marshall, who went on to finish 13-0 with a postseason national ranking of tenth. That day, the Broncos' quarterback was Tim Lester, who has been the head coach of his alma mater for the past two seasons.

MU held off WMU for the league title again in 2000 when Thundering Herd Hall of Famer Dani Derricott intercepted a Jeff Welsh pass with 1:30 left to cement a 19-14 victory in Huntington.

Segler Named Marshall Tight Ends Coach

Kyle Segler will coach Marshall Football's tight ends, Thundering Herd head coach Doc Holliday has announced.

He comes to Huntington from ULM where he was tight ends coach and special teams coordinator for one season. Segler's special teams units were some of the best in the Sun Belt Conference, sporting net kickoff and punt return averages that ranked in the top 20 nationally.

Prior to that, Segler was an assistant coach at Sam Houston State for eight seasons, where he coached the offensive line and tight ends. In 2016, he added the duties of special teams coach.

At Sam Houston State, Segler helped develop four All-Americans (five selections overall): Chris Crockett (2011), Travis Watson (2011), Kaleb Hopson (2012) and Donald Jackson III (2014-15). He also tutored seven first-team All-Southland selections, including Crockett (2011), Watson (2011), Hopson (2012), tight end T.J. Jones (2012) and Jackson (2013-14-15). In 2015, Jackson also was selected Southland Offensive Tackle of the Year.

In his first two seasons at Sam Houston, Segler's offensive linemen paved the way for a unit that broke 35 school records.

Prior to returning to his alma mater, he spent the 2009 season coaching at Lon Morris College in Jacksonville, Texas, helping relaunch a football program that was discontinued in 1945.

Segler was an offensive lineman on Sam Houston's team that won a share of the Southland regular-season title, advanced to the FCS semifinals and finished 11-3. He earned two degrees from Sam Houston, receiving his bachelor's in kinesiology in 2006 and his Master's in sports management in 2010.

"It is hard to put into words how excited I am to be a part of one of the best programs in the country and the Marshall family," Segler said. "I'd like to thank Doc Holliday and Marshall Athletics for giving me an opportunity like this to join one of the most storied programs in college football. There is such a great staff and locker room here that I am looking forward to doing my part to help us win a championship here for the Herd."

Segler and his wife Ashley, who played softball for Sam Houston, have a daughter: Landry.

"We are excited to welcome Kyle, Ashley and Landry to Huntington," said Holliday. "Kyle will be a strong addition to our staff and he has been excited to begin working with our student-athletes."

Marshall will begin its 2019 season with a home date vs. VMI on August 31 in Joan C. Edwards Stadium.

Marshall Football to Play at Notre Dame in 2022

Marshall University will visit the University of Notre Dame for a football game to be played on Sept. 10, 2022, Director of Athletics Mike Hamrick announced Monday.

The one-game contract carries significant financial implications for the Thundering Herd, Hamrick said.

"Notre Dame is one of the most prestigious programs in all of college football and a trip to South Bend, Indiana, should be on every fan's bucket list," Hamrick said. "Notre Dame is very selective when it comes to football scheduling, but Marshall's national brand, history and passionate fan base made us an appealing addition to their home schedule."

"We look forward to the trip and the opportunity to showcase our football program on national television and in one of the most iconic venues college football has to offer."

Big Green members and season-ticket holders will have

the first chance to purchase tickets, Hamrick said.

The Fighting Irish play their home games at Notre Dame Stadium, which opened in 1930 and seats 80,795. NBC and Notre Dame have a broadcast agreement that runs through the 2025 season. NBC has held the school's football TV rights since 1991.

Notre Dame enters the 2019 season tied for sixth for most wins in college football history with 897. The Fighting Irish claim 11 national championships, and have the most individual Heisman Trophy winners (seven). Overall, Notre Dame has 101 consensus All-Americans and 34 unanimous All-Americans. The program has produced 52 players who became members of the College Football Hall of Fame and 13 former players were inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. The number of All-Americans and Hall of Famers are all NCAA records.

Notre Dame finished the 2018 season with a 12-1 record and ranked No. 5 in the final Associated Press poll. The Irish started the season 12-0 and reached the College Football Playoff before losing to eventual national champion Clemson.

Marshall now has two dates set for the 2022 season. The Herd previously announced a home game against Appalachian State, which is set for Sept. 17 – one week after the trip to South Bend.

Since Hamrick took over as athletic director in 2009, he has negotiated football contracts with Notre Dame, Louisville, North Carolina State, Pittsburgh, Navy, Boise State, Purdue, East Carolina, Cincinnati, Liberty, Akron, Miami (Ohio), Ohio, Kent State and Appalachian State. This past season, a one-game road trip to South Carolina was canceled because of the looming threat of a hurricane, and a road game against Virginia Tech replaced that game at the end of the season.

Marshall Football Announces Staff Additions

Marshall head football coach Doc Holliday has announced additions to the Thundering Herd's staff.

Defensive tackles coach J.C. Price has added the title of co-defensive coordinator. Chip West has joined the staff and will coach cornerbacks. Brad Lambert has returned to Huntington and is currently a volunteer defensive assistant. Mike Treier, who coached cornerbacks in 2018, will move over to safeties next season.

Additionally, Brad Bielaniec has returned to Marshall as the department's new Head Strength and Conditioning Coach. Bielaniec, who was on staff for the Thundering Herd during the 2017 season, was assistant strength and conditioning coach at Appalachian State last year.

Price, who has been on staff at Marshall since the 2012 season, coached first-team All-Conference USA pick James Rouse, who was named the league's 2014 preseason defensive player of the year by its coaches. Rouse was honored again by the league's all-conference list in the 2014 postseason honors. In 2015, Jarquez Samuel received second-team all-league honors. In 2017 and 2018, he coached two-time All-Conference USA second-team selection Ryan Bee.

Lambert, who was Charlotte's head coach for the past eight seasons, was an assistant coach at Marshall from 1990-95. He began his career as a graduate assistant at Oklahoma following his playing career at Kansas State (1983-86), where he was a defensive back for the Wildcats. He coached at Georgia from 1996-2000 before moving on to Wake Forest, where he coached from 2001-10, the final three years as the school's defensive coordinator.

West served as co-defensive coordinator on Lambert's 49ers staff in 2018 and coached corners there as well. He came to Charlotte from Howard, where he held the same position, following coaching stops at Virginia (where he coached for six seasons), James Madison, Fordham, Colgate and Old Dominion.

Last season, Lambert and West helped power a Charlotte defense that limited opponents to just 105.7 yards on the ground, the nation's ninth-best total. The unit also finished third in fourth down percentage allowed (29.41), ninth in first downs allowed (16.4) and 22nd in total defense (337.3).

"We're very excited to have these guys on our staff," said Holliday. "J.C. has been a big part of our success defensively for a number of years and we're happy that he's back. Chip and Brad Lambert were instrumental in the success that Charlotte had, defensively, and we saw that firsthand."

"We're also happy to have Brad Bielaniec back leading the strength and conditioning program at Marshall. His attention to detail and ability to motivate student-athletes to reach their potential, physically, is vital to our goal of becoming a better football team."

The Thundering Herd will open its 2019 slate against VMI on August 31.

Thundering Herd By The Numbers

48 – In the last six-plus seasons, the Marshall offense has scored 30 or more points 48 times. The Herd is 43-5 in those games, including nine consecutive wins.

44 – Since the beginning of the 2014 season, the Marshall football team has compiled 44 wins. That total is the most by any Conference USA team during that span.

33 – The Marshall offense has scored 40 or more points 33 times since 2010, Doc Holliday's first year with the program. The Herd is 29-4 in those games.

32 – The Marshall offensive line has allowed only 32 sacks in the last two-plus seasons (27 games), and ranked in the top 25 nationally in fewest sacks allowed in each of the past two years.

27 – In the past six-plus seasons, Marshall quarterbacks have been interception-free 27 times. In those games, the Herd is 24-3.

20 – Since Doc Holliday took over as head coach, Marshall has won 20 out of 21 games when rushing for at least 250 yards.

19 – The Marshall football team has now won 19 consecutive games when scoring first.

19 – The Marshall defense has allowed only one run of 50-plus yards in the last two-plus seasons, and currently has a streak of 19 consecutive games without allowing a 50-yard run.

15 – The Marshall defense currently has a streak of 15 consecutive games of not allowing a 100-yard rusher. Clemson has the nation's longest streak at 21 games.

14 – Senior defensive lineman Channing Hames currently boasts 14 career sacks, the most of any returning Thundering Herd player. Hames, who was the New Mexico Bowl Defensive MVP in 2017, has 3.5 of his career sacks in Marshall's last two bowl games.

7 – Consecutive bowl wins by the Marshall football team, the longest active streak in college football.

4 – Marshall is one of four college football programs with bowl wins in five of the last six seasons, along with defending national champion Clemson and the Big Ten's Wisconsin.

3 – Only three schools have a better home winning percentage than Marshall (among those who have played more than one season in their current stadium): Alabama, Georgia Southern and Boise State. The Herd is 160-34 at Joan C. Edwards Stadium, which opened in 1991, winning at an .825 clip.

1 – With seven consecutive bowl wins, the Marshall football program continues to rank No. 1 nationally in bowl winning percentage (minimum five bowls to qualify). The Herd is 12-2 all-time in bowl games.

Marshall vs. Ranked Opponents

Since moving to Division I-A (FBS) in 1997, the Herd has enjoyed a pair of landmark victories against nationally-ranked opponents. Last Meeting vs. Boise State

Boise State defeated Marshall 28-24 in Boise on December 10, 1994 in the semifinals of the I-AA playoffs. That contest is the only meeting between the two schools.



Doc Holliday Head Coach - Tenth Season (71-46 overall, 45-27 C-USA)

Coach John "Doc" Holliday, who has returned Marshall University football to the national picture, enters his 10th season leading the Thundering Herd.

Marshall protected its place as college football's winningest bowl program, by percentage, and extended the nation's longest bowl winning streak to seven games following its victory over USF in the 2018 Gasparilla Bowl. Six of those wins have come under Holliday, who has the most bowl wins by a coach in program history.

In 2018, the Thundering Herd won four of its last five games to finish 9-4, the 20th time in school history a team has won as many games. It has happened six times since the turn of the century, four in the last six seasons.

Marshall's three straight 10-win seasons from 2013-15 were also a first in the 20-season history of Conference USA football.

Holliday led a resurgence in 2017, improving the Thundering Herd by five games to reach yet another bowl game under his watch.

His 2015 Herd finished 10-3 with a win over Connecticut in the St. Petersburg Bowl. His 2014 and '15 teams – with a combined mark of 23-4 – had the best record among the Group of Five programs in the two-year College Football Playoff era.

In Holliday's seven MU seasons, he has built the Herd into a perennial Conference USA contender. His teams have sported 26 All-C-USA first team selections, 22 second-teamers, 39 honorable mention picks and 22 All-Freshman team selections. He has had nine players selected for C-USA's top individual player-of-the-year awards.

Holliday's 2014 Herd (13-1) grabbed the school's first C-USA Championship with a thrilling comeback, title-game win over Louisiana Tech. MU headed to the Boca Raton Bowl, where it routed Mid-American Conference champion Northern Illinois, 52-23. The Herd finished the season in the major polls – No. 22 in the USA Today Coaches poll and No. 23 in the Associated Press media poll. It was Marshall's first appearance in the final polls since 2002.

The Herd coach was named the 2014 Conference USA Coach of the Year in voting by his peers and Marshall boasted a C-USA-record 10 all-conference first team selections.

Holliday received a six-year contract extension (through July 2021) for \$755,500 annually on April 8, 2015.

The 2014 title season followed a successful 2013, as Marshall went 10-4, won the C-USA East Division crown and downed ACC member Maryland in the Military Bowl – the Terps' last game before heading to the Big Ten.

In December 2014, Holliday was named the 15th annual Gazette-Mail Sportsman of the Year by Charleston Newspapers. In April 2015, the Herd coach was honored as the 2014 Lowell Cade Sportsman of the Year by The (Huntington) Herald-Dispatch.

And in concert with Herd Athletic Director Mike Hamrick, Holliday has helped bring about upgrades in the Marshall non-conference schedule, with home-and-homes against Louisville, Pitt, North Carolina State, Purdue, Navy, Boise State, Cincinnati, Appalachian State, East Carolina, Akron and Ohio and a 2018 game at South Carolina, which will yield the largest guarantee in school history (\$1.4 million).

Holliday, named as Herd coach on Dec. 17, 2009 in his first collegiate head coaching job, is widely regarded as one of the top recruiters in the nation. Since he has become a head coach, he has added a reputation for finding and hiring assistant coaches who have made a strong impact on his program. He has more than 30 years of collegiate coaching experience, including previous stops at Florida, North Carolina State and West Virginia, his alma mater.

In 2011, the Herd went 7-6 against the 16th-toughest schedule in the nation, a slate that was ranked second among non-BCS schools. Two of those victories came against eventual C-USA champion Southern Miss and Big East co-champ Louisville, the latter coming on the road for the program's first non-conference road win since the early 2000s. Marshall also won five Conference USA games, the most for the program since it had joined the league in 2005.

During his coaching career, Holliday has coached in 26 bowl games and three national championship games. He also has coached five All-Americans.

A native of Hurricane, W.Va., Holliday was born April 21, 1957. He was a three-year letter winner as a linebacker at West Virginia (1976-78) and has earned bachelor's (1979) and master's (1981) degrees from WVU. He won a West Virginia state wrestling title at 175 pounds (all divisions) in 1975 at Hurricane High.

Holliday and his wife, Diana, have four children – Meghan, Cade, Chase and Cody.
