Thundering Herd Fall Notes

Marshall Football Dents Associated Press Top 25

Marshall Football found itself ranked 25th nationally on September 20, when the Associated Press released its weekly Top 25 rankings.

This is the first time that the Thundering Herd has reached the AP Poll since the 2014 season. That year, Marshall climbed as high as 18th before finishing 23rd in the final rankings, following its 52-23 victory over Northern Illinois in the inaugural Boca Raton Bowl.

On September 19, the Thundering Herd knocked off Appalachian State 17-7, who came into the contest ranked 23rd. The game was carried to a national audience, courtesy of CBS. Running back Brenden Knox ran for 138 yards and a touchdown, while linebacker Tavante Beckett posted a career-high 16 tackles, including one forced fumble to help secure the win.

The Thundering Herd also received 40 points in the Amway Coaches Poll that afternoon.

Notes versus Appalachian State

The game captains for Marshall were senior offensive lineman Will Ulmer and junior running back Sheldon Evans on offense, and junior defensive lineman Koby Cumberlander and senior linebacker Tavante Beckett on defense. This is Cumberlander's first time as a captain.

Saturday was the 23rd meeting in the long-running series between Marshall and Appalachian State. After the Thundering Herd's win, the Mountaineers lead the all-time series, 14-9.

Saturday's game was Marshall's 25th against a nationally ranked opponent, and the fifth time in 202 games that a Top 25 team has played at Joan C. Edwards Stadium, which opened in 1991. Marshall won against a Top 25 team for the first time in Joan C. Edwards Stadium history, the first time anywhere since 2003 and the first time in Huntington since 1976. MU snapped a 16-game losing streak to nationally ranked teams.

Marshall junior running back Brenden Knox eclipsed 100 rushing yards in a game for the 11th time in his career.

Knox moved up three spots on the Thundering Herd all-time rushing list, passing Stew Butler (2,063 career rushing yards), Llow Turner (2,090) and Orlando Hatchett (2,143) to move into 11th place on the career rushing list.

Knox's 21-yard run to open the game is his longest this season and the 16th rush of 20 or more yards in his career.

The first half interception by Steven Gilmore is his first of the season and third of his career.

Gilmore also set a career-high with three pass breakups.

Redshirt senior T.J. Johnson recorded his first career sack at Marshall in Saturday's first half.

Junior defensive end Darius Hodge had at least one sack

for the second consecutive game, the first time in his career he has had a sack in back-to-back games.

Senior defensive back Brandon Drayton had his first forced fumble of the season and second of his career.

Senior defensive back Nazeeh Johnson had his first fumble recovery of the season and second of his career.

Redshirt freshman quarterback Grant Wells scored his first rushing touchdown at Marshall. Wells also established a new career-best for rushing yards with 43.

Junior defensive back Derrek Pitts had a career-high nine tackles, the most for him since 2018 at WVU.

Atop the Nation

The Marshall defense has allowed a total of seven points through two games (its 3.5 scoring defense currently leads the nation). The last time that the Thundering Herd allowed fewer points in the first two games of a season was 1993, when the Herd opened with a 56-0 win over Morehead State and then beat Murray State 29-3.

Knox Climbs the Marshall Rushing List

Holliday Moves to the Top

Marshall head coach Doc Holliday led the program for a school-record 131st time against 23rd ranked Appalachian State. The Herd's 17-7 victory over the Mountaineers was Holliday's 72nd over an FBS opponent, two more than Bob Pruett (70) in that category for the school record. Holliday (80) currently sits second on the school's overall win list behind Pruett (94, 1996-2004).

Bowl Prowess

Marshall enters 2020 featuring an .800 winning percentage (12-3) in all NCAA-sanctioned bowl games, the highest mark nationally among programs that have made at least six appearances. (The Thundering Herd also participated in the 1948 Tangerine Bowl, at which point it was not sanctioned). The leaders are below:

Doc Holliday is 6-1 in bowl games with the Thundering Herd and has appeared in 28 bowls since entering the coaching ranks.

Feeling the Sunshine

Since the beginning of the 2013 season, Doc Holliday is 14-4 in games contested in the state of Florida and/or against Florida schools.

First Blood

The Thundering Herd has now won 27 of its last 29 games when scoring first and has won 15 of its last 17 when leading after the first quarter. Related: since the beginning of the 2013 season, the Herd is 47-3 (.940) when scoring first.

Stingy D

The Herd has won 43 of its last 48 when holding offenses to 5.0 yards per play or fewer. The Herd has won 27 of its last 28 when allowing fewer than 300 yards. Seventeen (17) times in Doc Holliday's 10-plus seasons has the Herd allowed 125 yards passing or fewer. Marshall is 16-1 (.941) in those games. Marshall is 30-3 (.909) under Doc Holliday when the defense does not allow a rushing touchdown.

Feel the Rush

The Herd is now 46-7 (.868) in the last seven-plus seasons when rushing for 150+ yards and 36-5 (.878) the last seven-plus years with 200+ on the ground. All-time, Marshall is 11-0 under Doc Holliday when rushing for 300+ yards, as it did with 305 in the 33-31 win over Ohio in 2019. Marshall's 20 rushing first downs in the 59-0 win over EKU was the most for the program since 24 versus Morris Harvey in 1925.

30+

Marshall's 59 points in the win over EKU makes the Herd 46-3 (.939) in its last 49 games when scoring 30+ points. All of those games are under Doc Holliday.

50+

Marshall's 59-0 win over EKU was the 18th time that the Thundering Herd has reached the 50+-point plateau under coach Doc Holliday, three more than Jim Donnan (1990-95) for the all-time school mark. Bob Pruett (1996-2004) reached that mark 14 times and Cam Henderson (1936-42, 1946-49) did it on 13 occasions.

Protecting the Home Turf

Marshall is nationally known for being one of the toughest places to play in college football. The program has won 82.7 percent (167-35) of its home games in Joan C. Edwards Stadium, the fourth-highest mark in the country.

Herd Finishes under Holliday

Since Doc Holliday became head coach in 2010, the Herd has an excellent record of finishing off its opponents once it takes the lead. Marshall is 62-9 (.873) when it scores first, 54-9 (.857) when leading after the first quarter, 66-5 (.930) when leading at halftime and 67-5 (.931) when leading after three quarters. In fact, Marshall has won 52 of its last

55 contests (2016 vs. Charlotte, 2018 vs. Middle Tennessee, 2019 at Charlotte) when it has the halftime lead.

Hang on!

It's easy to see why Herd Coach Doc Holliday talks about ball security so often. His 11 Marshall teams have provided a strong indicator of why turnover margin is so important. Holliday's Herd teams have a combined 80-51 (.611) record. When Marshall has an edge in turnover margin, it is 44-10 (.815). When the turnover number is equal, Marshall is 20-7 (.741). When the opponent is more sure-handed, the Herd is 16-34 (.320).

Of Marshall's 131 games under Holliday, the Herd has played 67 while committing zero or one turnover, amassing a record of 52-15 (.776) in those games.

Marshall is 23-4 (.852) under Holliday when it has a turnover margin of +2 or better.

Marshall is 25-5 (.833) under Holliday when it has zero turnovers, and the Herd has won 12 of its last 13 when it does not make a miscue (Cincinnati, 2019). Marshall has won 15 of its last 17 (Cincinnati and Charlotte, 2019) when winning the turnover battle and the 2020 win over EKU was the eighth straight win when the MU quarterbacks have two-plus touchdown passes without an interception.

The Thundering Herd had five takeaways in 2018 wins over Eastern Kentucky and Florida Atlantic, giving Holliday nine consecutive wins when his team forces four or more turnovers.

Perfect Versus Texas at Home

Interestingly enough, Marshall has never lost to a school from Texas at home. The Thundering Herd is a perfect 13-0 against Texas schools in games played in Huntington. Marshall owns two wins over North Texas (1988, 2015), two wins over Houston (2008, 2012), three wins over Rice (2007, 2011, 2014), two wins over SMU (2005, 2009), two wins over UTEP (2006, 2010) and two victories over UTSA (2013, 2018).

Beckett Named National Defensive Player of the Week

Marshall linebacker Tavante Beckett was named the Bronko Nagurski National Defensive Player of the Week on Tuesday.

The honor came one day after he was given Conference USA's Defensive Player of the Week award.

Beckett was all over the field Saturday for the Thundering Herd, amassing a career-high 16 tackles (eight solo) with one forced fumble in the 17-7 home win over 23rd-ranked App State. The 16 stops are the most by a Marshall man since Chase Hancock made 18 tackles against Southern Miss in 2017. Last season, App State averaged 231 rush yards per game, which ranked No. 16 in the country, and in the season opener the Mountaineers ran for 308 yards against Charlotte. On Saturday the Herd, led by co-captain Beckett, held them to 96 yards on 33 carries Saturday, App State's lowest total in a game since 2014.

Wells Racks up Honors after EKV Victory

Marshall quarterback Grant Wells racked up two more honors following the Thundering Herd's 59-0 blowout win over Eastern Kentucky.

The Charleston native was Pro Football Focus College's highest-graded player in the nation on the first weekend of play, recording a grade of 94.7 with five "big-time" throws and no turnover-worthy plays.

He was also one of eight Manning Award Stars of the Week for his performance, a 16-for-23 day with 307 passing, four touchdowns and no interceptions. He also posted 30 yards rushing on the afternoon. For his efforts, he earned Conference USA's Offensive Player of the Week honor.

Wells, who completed his first eight passes, became the first Marshall quarterback with 300-plus passing yards in a debut, exceeding the previous record of 292 by Stan Hill vs Miami (Ohio) on Nov. 11, 2002. He tied the school record for most passing touchdowns in a debut with four, equaling the mark set by Hill vs. Miami and Chase Litton vs. Norfolk State in 2015.

Notes Versus EKV

The game captains for Marshall were senior offensive lineman Alex Mollette and junior running back Sheldon Evans, and senior defensive back Nazeem Johnson and senior linebacker Tavante Beckett on defense. This is Evans' first time serving as a game captain.

After Saturday's win, Marshall leads the all-time series 12-8-1. The Thundering Herd has won four consecutive games in the series.

Saturday's win is Marshall's 10th in a row in home openers.

Two offensive players made their first career start for Marshall: Redshirt freshman quarterback Grant Wells and senior offensive lineman Alex Salguero.

Four defensive players made their first career start for the Herd: Junior defensive tackle Jamare Edwards, sophomore linebacker Eli Neal, junior linebacker Abraham Beauplan and junior safety Derrek Pitts.

Redshirt freshman quarterback Grant Wells became the first Marshall quarterback with 300-plus passing yards in a debut, passing for 307 yards. The previous record: Stan Hill vs Miami (Ohio) on Nov. 11, 2002 (292 passing yards).

Wells tied the record for most passing touchdowns in a debut with four, equaling the mark set by Hill vs. Miami and Chase Litton vs. Norfolk State in 2015.

Junior running back Brenden Knox reached a career milestone in the first half, surpassing 2,000 rushing yards. Knox also passed Keion Davis for No. 14 on the program's career rushing list.

Senior tight end Garet Morrell hauled in a 45-yard pass in the first half, a career long.

Sophomore receiver Talik Keaton established a new career-high for receiving yards in a single game. Keaton's 47-yard

reception in the second quarter is a career long.

Sophomore running back Knowledge McDaniel made his debut carrying the ball, rushing for a team-high 93 yards.

Senior receiver Jaron Woodyard caught his first collegiate touchdown.

Freshman tight end Amir Richardson caught his first collegiate touchdown.

Sophomore quarterback Luke Zban completed his first career pass and touchdown.

Junior defensive tackle Rodney Croom combined on a sack, the first of his career.

Sophomore linebacker Eli Neal set a new single game career high for tackles with eight (previous best: four vs. Cincinnati in 2019).

Junior defensive end Koby Cumberland established a new single game career high for tackles with five (previous best: four – accomplished three times in 2019).

Sophomore defensive end Owen Porter set a new single game career high with five tackles (previous best: two – twice in 2019).

Marshall tied the school record for fewest punts with zero, which has now been accomplished seven times. The most recent occurrence before Saturday: UAB in 2006.

Eastern Kentucky gained only 166 yards in the contest, the fewest for a Marshall opponent since UTSA gained only 137 in that 23-0 Herd win in 2018. EKV managed only seven first downs against Marshall, which is the fewest that MU has allowed in a game since SMU had seven in the Herd's 16-13 overtime win in 2005 - Marshall's very first C-USA victory.

Behind Wells and company, Marshall gained 627 yards of total offense - the Herd's most since gaining 630 at Charlotte in 2015.

The Luke Zban to Amir Richardson scoring strike marked the first pair of native West Virginians to connect on a touchdown pass since Mark Zban's 80-yard toss to Randy Moss at Central Michigan in 1997.

Marshall-East Carolina Game Postponed

Marshall Football's September 12 game at East Carolina has been postponed, due to the severity of the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic in the state of North Carolina.

Both schools will make every effort to reschedule the game on a date that has yet to be determined. This will be the third time the contest has been rescheduled this year.

Marshall and East Carolina have been forever linked since the tragic crash of Southern Airways Flight 932 on Nov. 14, 1970, which claimed the lives of all 75 aboard following ECU's 17-14 home victory earlier that afternoon.

The events of the day were depicted in the 2006 Warner

Bros. motion picture *We Are Marshall*, starring Matthew McConaughey.

The two schools have met 15 times previously, with ECU winning 10.

One of Marshall's victories was a thrilling comeback win in the 2001 GMAC Bowl, which saw the Herd emerge with a 64-61 double overtime victory on the arm of MVP Byron Leftwich, who passed for a bowl-record 576 yards to bring MU back from a 38-8 halftime deficit.

"East Carolina has indicated to us that it is not able to play the game on September 12," said Marshall Director of Athletics Mike Hamrick. "We'll get together with ECU and do everything within our power to reschedule the game at a later date."

Marshall and ECU are also set to meet three more times: September 18, 2021 in Huntington, September 9, 2023 in Greenville and September 13, 2025 in Huntington.

Thundering Herd Places Five on C-USA Preseason Football Teams

Marshall University had five student-athletes recognized on Conference USA's preseason football team, including its Most Valuable Player, when the honors were released.

Brenden Knox, who won the league's 2019 postseason MVP award, garnered this season's preseason honor as well. He was joined by offensive lineman Cain Madden, linebacker Tavante Beckett, defensive back Nazeem Johnson and punt returner Talik Keaton.

Knox was previously named to the watch lists for the Maxwell Award, Wuerffel Trophy and the Doak Walker Award this summer.

The Columbus, Ohio native has picked up a slew of preseason awards on the heels of a 2019 campaign that saw him earn Conference USA Most Valuable Player, Marshall team MVP and offensive MVP honors.

Last year, he amassed a league-high 1,387 yards and 11 touchdowns on 270 carries (also tops in C-USA). He also caught 14 passes for 129 yards. His rushing yardage total also ranked third nationally among sophomores. Based on 2019 statistics, Knox will enter the 2020 season as the sixth-leading rusher in college football behind the likes of Oklahoma State's Chuba Hubbard and Clemson's Travis Etienne. At 1,965 career rushing yards through two seasons, he ranks as the third-best two-season start to a career through a sophomore season for Marshall running backs behind Chris Parker and Doug Chapman.

Madden was also named to the Outland Trophy watch list, which is an award given to the nation's top interior lineman. He was a breakout player on the offensive side of the ball for Marshall in 2019, as he was part of a unit that helped power a running game that finished second in the league in rushing yards and rushing yards per game. At season's end, he earned second-team all-league honors, but, like Beckett, has been a first-team selection on Athlon and Phil Steele's all-conference lists.

Beckett was also selected to the watch list for the Bronko Nagurski Trophy, an honor that is given annually to nation's defensive player of the year. The Chesapeake, Virginia native amassed a league-high 121 tackles in 2019 en route to Conference USA first-team honors. He shared team defensive most valuable player honors with fellow linebacker Omari Cobb, as well.

Johnson was also an honorable mention all-league honoree, racking up 88 tackles and seven passes defended in 2019. This summer, Athlon also added him to its preseason all-conference team.

Keaton was Conference USA's top punt returner in 2019 and was the only freshman in the league to be named to C-USA's first team. A year ago, he returned 16 kicks for 202 yards and one touchdown. He was second nationally in punt return yards among freshmen. This summer, Phil Steele also added him to his preseason all-league squad.

Knox Picks Up Two More Watch List Honors

Marshall running back Brenden Knox continued to rack up the preseason honors when he was selected to the watch lists for the Maxwell Award and the Wuerffel Trophy.

The Maxwell Award is given annually to the most outstanding player in college football. Semifinalists will be announced November 3, 2020, while the three finalists will be unveiled November 23, 2020. The winner will be announced as part of the ESPN Home Depot College Football Awards Show held on December 10, 2020. The formal presentations of these awards will be made at the Maxwell Football Club Awards Gala hosted by Tropicana Hotel & Casino Atlantic City on March 12, 2021.

The Wuerffel Trophy, known as "College Football's Premier Award for Community Service," is presented each February in Fort Walton Beach. Named after 1996 Heisman Trophy winning quarterback from the University of Florida, Danny Wuerffel, the Wuerffel Trophy exists to honor college football players who serve others, celebrate their positive impact on society, and inspire greater service in the world. Semifinalists for the award will be announced on November 3 and finalists will be announced on November 23. The formal announcement of the 2020 recipient will be made at the National Football Foundation's festivities in New York City on December 8. The presentation of the 2020 Wuerffel Trophy will occur at the 52nd All Sports Association Awards Banquet on February 19, 2021 in Fort Walton Beach.

Knox was named to the Doak Walker Award Watch List last week. That honor is given to the nation's top running back.

Gaines Tabbed For Paul Hornung Award Watch List

Marshall tight end Xavier Gaines was selected to the Paul Hornung Award Watch List.

The award, now in its 11th season, is given annually to the most versatile player in major college football by the Louisville Sports Commission and football legend and Louisville native Paul Hornung. The winner and his family will be honored at the annual Paul Hornung Award dinner at the Galt House Hotel in downtown Louisville in March of 2021.

Gaines saw action at quarterback, running back and tight end/receiver for the Thundering Herd last season, finishing with 27 catches for 306 yards and three receiving touchdowns. On the ground, he ran the ball 26 times for 187 yards and two more scores. He was one of only two players in Conference USA with 150-plus rushing yards and 300 or more receiving yards.

Previously this summer, the Frostproof, Florida native was named a preseason all-Conference USA selection by Athlon and Phil Steele.

Beckett, Madden Named to Preseason Watch Lists

Marshall linebacker Tavante Beckett and offensive lineman Cain Madden were each named to national watch lists.

Beckett was selected to the watch list for the Bronko Nagurski Trophy, an honor that is given annually to nation's defensive player of the year. The Chesapeake, Virginia native amassed a league-high 121 tackles in 2019 en route to Conference USA first-team honors. He shared team defensive most valuable player honors with fellow linebacker Omari Cobb, as well.

Thus far this preseason, he has earned first-team all-conference acclaim from Athlon and Phil Steele.

Madden was named to the Outland Trophy watch list, which is an award given to the nation's top interior lineman. He was a breakout player on the offensive side of the ball for Marshall in 2019, as he was part of a unit that helped power a running game that finished second in the league in rushing yards and rushing yards per game. At season's end, he earned second-team all-league honors, but, like Beckett, has been a first-team selection on Athlon and Phil Steele's all-conference lists.

As in previous years, the Football Writers Association of America (FWAA) will announce a National Defensive Player of the Week each Tuesday this season. If not already on the watch list, each week's honored player will be added at that time. The FWAA and the Charlotte Touchdown Club will then announce five finalists.

The recipient of the 75th Outland Trophy will be announced in early December. The official presentation to the winner will be made in Omaha, Neb., at the Outland Trophy Awards Dinner sponsored by Werner Enterprises and produced by the Greater Omaha Sports Committee, scheduled for Jan. 13, 2021.

Thundering Herd By The Numbers

131 – Marshall head coach Doc Holliday has led the Thundering Herd in a school-record 131 games.

72 – Marshall head coach Doc Holliday currently has 72 victories over FBS schools (80 total wins) as head coach of the Thundering Herd, two more than Bob Pruett's (1996-2004) previous mark of 70 (94 total wins).

54 – In the last seven-plus seasons, the Marshall offense has scored 30 or more points 54 times. The Herd is 49-5 in those games, including 15 consecutive wins.

34 – The Marshall offense has scored 40 or more points 34 times since 2010, Doc Holliday's first year with the program. The Herd is 30-4 in those games.

34 – In the past seven-plus seasons, Marshall quarterbacks have been interception-free 34 times. In those games, the Herd is 30-4.

32 – The Marshall defense has allowed only two runs of 50-plus yards in the last three-plus seasons and hasn't allowed a 50+ yard carry in 32 of its last 33 games.

27 – The Marshall football team has now won 27 of its last 29 games (2019 at Boise State, 2019 at Charlotte) when scoring first.

23 – Since Doc Holliday took over as head coach, Marshall has won 23 out of 24 games when rushing for at least 250 yards.

3 – Only three schools have a better (current home stadium) winning percentage than Marshall: Alabama, Boise State and Georgia Southern. The Herd is 167-35 at Joan C. Edwards Stadium, which opened in 1991, winning at an .827 clip.

1 – The Marshall football program continues to rank No. 1 nationally in bowl winning percentage (minimum six bowls to qualify). The Herd is 12-3 (.800) all-time in bowl games.

Last Meeting vs. WKU (10/26/19) - By Chuck McGill, HerdZone.com

HUNTINGTON W.Va. – The game was tied, and with six seconds on the clock, Marshall football coach Doc Holliday looked at his kicker, Justin Rohrwasser.

The ball was on the 36-yard line, and a steady rain had been falling in the latter part of the fourth quarter. The ramifications of the kick – the winning team would wrest control of the Conference USA East Division – were significant. The conditions weren't ideal. The kick was lengthy – 7 yards longer than the career-long Rohrwasser had made earlier in the game. And, Western Kentucky coach Tyson Helton had a couple of timeouts to burn in the name of gamesmanship.

"He told me he was going to make it," Holliday said of Rohrwasser, "so I said 'Let's go win the game.'"

Rohrwasser unofficially made the kick two times as Helton was twice granted a timeout a moment before the snap, and then calmly drilled the third try as the final second ticked off the clock, giving Marshall a 26-23 win against WKU on Saturday. As the ball curved from right to left through the uprights in front of the Shewey Building, Thundering Herd players and coaches poured onto the field to celebrate. Rohrwasser was mobbed by teammates, and then surrounded by media. The senior kicker was the last player to leave the field after circling Joan C. Edwards Stadium and greeting every fan standing in the front row.

"Every bus ride to a game since you're in high school, as a kicker, this is what you dream about," Rohrwasser said. "I'm lucky it happened to me."

Rohrwasser is being modest, as he has proven his success has little to do with luck. The 6-foot-3, 220-pounder from Clifton Park, New York, made all four of his field goal attempts Saturday, and is now 11-for-11 on the season. He has made 12 consecutive field goals overall, connecting from distances of 46 yards, 31 yards, 43 yards and 53 yards against the Hilltoppers.

Marshall sophomore quarterback Isaiah Green scrambled for 6 yards on the previous play and stepped out of bounds at the WKU 36 to set up the final play. Green's savvy play stopped the clock, a heady move because the Herd had spent all three of its timeouts.

The Herd offense started the drive at its own 13 with 1:21 left, and gained 51 yards on 10 plays to give Rohrwasser a chance. Green completed 4 of 5 passes for 24 yards on the drive, and sophomore running back Brenden Knox carried twice for 21 yards. Green picked up the other 6 on his own.

"I thought our offense did a great job of getting that thing in field position where we could actually kick that field goal," Holliday said. "It was a little longer than I wanted to be; I wasn't sure he could kick it that far."

Rohrwasser did, and etched his name among the greatest kicking performances in school history.

The 53-yard field goal is tied for the fourth-longest made kick in school history, and tied for the fourth-longest made kick in stadium history. Rohrwasser tied a school record with four made field goals, equaling the four made by David Merrick (East Tennessee State, 1993), Tim Openlander (The Citadel, 1995), Billy Malashevich (Miami, 1999) and Justin Haig (Louisiana Tech, 2014). Rohrwasser scored 14 points, tied for the third-most in school history (four others).

Holliday presented Rohrwasser with the game ball in the locker room.

"He can have five game balls if he wants them," Holliday said. "That was special."

The end-game heroics came after Marshall squandered a 17-point first half lead and a 16-point lead as late as 6:23 left of the third quarter.

Marshall started fast, intercepting WKU quarterback Ty Storey on the opening drive and then scoring a touchdown on the ensuing possession. Senior defensive back Kereon Merrell intercepted his first pass at Marshall to give the Herd the ball, and then Green found senior tight end Armani Levias for a 25-yard touchdown to open scoring.

The Marshall offense padded the lead a few minutes later, going 56 yards on three plays, capped by a 4-yard touchdown run by Green to put the Herd up 14-0 with 6:56 left of the first quarter.

Rohrwasser made what was then a career-long 46-yard field goal early in the second quarter to give Marshall a 17-0 lead on Homecoming. He added a second field goal with 34 seconds left of the half to give the Herd a 20-7 advantage at intermission, and then his third quarter field goal pushed the lead to 16, 23-7, with 6:23 left of the third quarter.

WKU then made its comeback, scoring 16 unanswered points over the next 15:14 of the game. Storey scored on a 1-yard sneak with 45 seconds left of the third quarter, but after a penalty, the extra point was missed and Marshall held a 23-13 lead.

The Hilltoppers made it a one-possession game when kicker Cory Munson made a 27-yard field goal with 12:10 left of the fourth quarter. Then, junior running back Gaej Walker ran up the middle and dove into the end zone for a 16-yard touchdown on a third-and-four play with 6:19 left of the game. The extra point tied the game, 23-23.

"We knew going in that was going to be a game that came down to one or two plays," Holliday said, "and it came down to one."

The last three games in the series have been won by Marshall, but the margins were slim: 7 points in 2017; 3 points in 2018 and 3 points on Saturday.

"I'm proud of our team," Holliday said. "That's a big win for us."

The reason is simple: Marshall is now 5-3 overall and 3-1 in Conference USA, while WKU is 5-3 overall and 4-1 in league play. While the Hilltoppers have one more win, the teams are tied in the loss column and the Herd has the tiebreaker.

Statistically, Green finished 20 for 31 passing for 230 yards and one touchdown. Knox carried 19 times for 84 yards, helping the Herd to 170 rushing yards against a team ranked in the top 25 in rush defense. WKU entered Saturday's game allowing 2.96 yards per play, but Marshall gained 5.0 yards per rushing attempt. The Hilltoppers had not allowed a rush longer than 20 yards all season, and sophomore running back Sheldon Evans had a 21-yard gain, and then junior receiver Willie Johnson had a 42-yard run – the two longest the Hilltoppers have allowed in 2019.

Levias set a career-high with 10 receptions, gaining 77 yards. Freshman receiver Broc Thompson had three receptions for 91 yards.

Senior linebacker Omari Cobb finished with a team-high 13 tackles, which is also a new career-high for him. Merrell finished with 10 tackles – eight solo – an interception and a fumble recovery.

Senior defensive end Marquis Couch recorded a career-high three sacks and forced two fumbles.

Coach John "Doc" Holliday, who has returned Marshall University football to the national picture, enters his 11th season leading the Thundering Herd and his 129 games as head coach is a program record. With a 30-27 overtime win against FIU on November 30, 2019, he also became the program's all-time leader in coaching victories over FBS opponents (71), surpassing Bob Pruett's total of 70.

Marshall advanced to its seventh bowl under the veteran head coach with an appearance against UCF in the 2019 Gasparilla Bowl. Six of those wins have come under Holliday, who has the most bowl wins by a coach in program history.

In 2018, the Thundering Herd won four of its last five games to finish 9-4, the 20th time in school history a team has won as many games. It has happened six times since the turn of the century, four in the last six seasons.

Marshall's three straight 10-win seasons from 2013-15 were also a first in the 20-season history of Conference USA football.

Holliday led a resurgence in 2017, improving the Thundering Herd by five games to reach yet another bowl game under his watch.

His 2015 Herd finished 10-3 with a win over Connecticut in the St. Petersburg Bowl. His 2014 and '15 teams – with a combined mark of 23-4 – had the best record among the Group of Five programs in the two-year College Football Playoff era.

Holliday has built the Herd into a perennial Conference USA contender. His teams have sported 34 All-C-USA first team selections, 25 second-teamers, 41 honorable mention picks and 24 All-Freshman team selections. He has had 11 players selected for C-USA's top individual player-of-the-year awards.

Holliday's 2014 Herd (13-1) grabbed the school's first C-USA Championship with a thrilling comeback, title-game win over Louisiana Tech. MU headed to the Boca Raton Bowl, where it routed Mid-American Conference champion Northern Illinois, 52-23. The Herd finished the season in the major polls – No. 22 in the USA Today Coaches poll and No. 23 in the Associated Press media poll. It was Marshall's first appearance in the final polls since 2002.

The Herd coach was named the 2014 Conference USA Coach of the Year in voting by his peers and Marshall boasted a C-USA-record 10 all-conference first team selections.

Holliday received a six-year contract extension (through July 2021) for \$755,500 annually on April 8, 2015.

The 2014 title season followed a successful 2013, as Marshall went 10-4, won the C-USA East Division crown and downed ACC member Maryland in the Military Bowl – the Terps' last game before heading to the Big Ten.

In December 2014, Holliday was named the 15th annual Gazette-Mail Sportsman of the Year by Charleston Newspapers. In April 2015, the Herd coach was honored as the 2014 Lowell Cade Sportsman of the Year by The (Huntington) Herald-Dispatch.

And in concert with Herd Athletic Director Mike Hamrick, Holliday has helped bring about upgrades in the Marshall non-conference schedule, with home-and-homes against Louisville, Pitt, North Carolina State, Purdue, Navy, Boise State, Cincinnati, Appalachian State, East Carolina, Akron and Ohio and a 2018 game at South Carolina.

Holliday, named as Herd coach on Dec. 17, 2009 in his first collegiate head coaching job, is widely regarded as one of the top recruiters in the nation. Since he has become a head coach, he has added a reputation for finding and hiring assistant coaches who have made a strong impact on his program. He has more than 30 years of collegiate coaching experience, including previous stops at Florida, North Carolina State and West Virginia, his alma mater.

In 2011, the Herd went 7-6 against the 16th-toughest schedule in the nation, a slate that was ranked second among non-BCS schools. Two of those victories came against eventual C-USA champion Southern Miss and Big East co-champ Louisville, the latter coming on the road for the program's first non-conference road win since the early 2000s. Marshall also won five Conference USA games, the most for the program since it had joined the league in 2005.

During his coaching career, Holliday has coached in 27 bowl games and three national championship games. He also has coached five All-Americans.

A native of Hurricane, W.Va., Holliday was born April 21, 1957. He was a three-year letter winner as a linebacker at West Virginia (1976-78) and has earned bachelor's (1979) and master's (1981) degrees from WVU. He won a West Virginia state wrestling title at 175 pounds (all divisions) in 1975 at Hurricane High.

Holliday and his wife, Diana, have four children -- Meghan, Cade, Chase and Cody.
