Thundering Herd Fall Notes

Football Gameday Experience Upgraded for Thundering Herd

Marshall Athletics announced significant changes in and around Joan C. Edwards Stadium aimed at enhancing the football gameday atmosphere for fans.

Marshall's 2021 home opener is set for Saturday, Sept. 11 against North Carolina Central. Kickoff is set for 6:30 p.m.

"Our objective this offseason was to explore every opportunity to improve the gameday experience for the best fans in college football," said Jeff O'Malley, the Interim Director of Athletics. "We have implemented changes to the pre-game environment outside of the stadium and added elements to the in-game experience that we know our fans will appreciate."

A list of the gameday improvements follows:

Thunder Street

A concert stage and food vendors highlight a new area on 20th Street between 3rd and 5th Avenue. Although West Lot pass-holders will still be able to access parking via the two 20th Street entrances, the area between those two gates will be closed to through traffic. That area will feature a concert series sponsored by West Virginia Lottery, as well as multiple food vendors, beer and an inflatable 'M' for fan photos. The inflatable 'M' is sponsored by Mountain Health Network.

Thunder Street will open four hours prior to kickoff and close 45 minutes prior to the start of the game. Through traffic on 20th Street will reopen at approximately halftime of the game.

Concessions

A new point-of-sale system will be available at all food concession vendor stands inside Joan C. Edwards Stadium. With this new technology, as well as improved operational infrastructure, there will be a substantial increase in speed of service for stadium guests. Additionally, two

new vendors will occupy space within Joan C. Edwards Stadium this season: Midway Drive In, with its famous hot dogs and more, will occupy Stand No. 2 on the West concourse. Truckin' Cheesy, with its unique scrumptious fare, will be located at Stand No. 9 on the East concourse.

AT&T Tower

As part of its continuing network investment to support growing demand for advanced wireless devices and services, AT&T is installing a new cell tower on the east side of Joan C. Edwards Stadium. This tower, when operational, will improve AT&T's coverage throughout the stadium and in the surrounding community.

Fireworks

A new pre-game and in-game element will be fireworks and pyrotechnics. The displays will be included in the pre-game team entrance and following Thundering Herd touchdowns.

DJ Herd That

An exciting addition to the in-game environment is the debut of DJ Herd That, a student who won the opportunity to assist with in-game music selections. The DJ, sponsored by Dr. Pepper, will be located behind the student section on the walkway behind Section 119.

Additionally, the Thunder Walk will change slightly this season. Football players and staff will exit the buses on the corner of 20th Street and 3rd Avenue, walk down 20th Street toward the Thunder Street event area, and then enter the West Lot at the entrance closest to 3rd Avenue. The players will then walk through the West Lot, as in previous years, toward the northwest ramp and enter the stadium.

Re-entry will be allowed at Joan C. Edwards Stadium in 2021.

"We're really excited about the upcoming season, not only for a chance to hit the field but also the new fan engagement opportunities that we are rolling on this season," said Charles Huff, Marshall's first-year

head football coach. "These additions will help improve the gameday experience for all fans and make gameday here in Huntington an elite experience for everyone."

The Sept. 11 regular season home opener will be broadcast by ESPN+. The Thundering Herd will also host East Carolina (Saturday, Sept. 18), Old Dominion (Saturday, Oct. 9), FIU (Saturday, Oct. 30), UAB (Saturday, Nov. 13) and WKU (Saturday, Nov. 27).

Edwards Named to Lombardi Award Watch List

Marshall defensive lineman Jamare Edwards was named to the Lombardi Award Watch List in early August.

The honor goes annually to the college football offensive or defensive lineman, who in addition to outstanding performance and ability, best exemplifies the character and discipline of NFL Hall of Fame Head Coach Vince Lombardi.

It is the second such honor for the Miami native in as many weeks. He was also selected for the Bronko Nagurski Trophy Watch List.

Edwards was a second team All-Conference USA pick last year after amassing 30 tackles, 3.5 tackles for loss, two sacks, one pass breakup and a forced fumble. He also started all 10 games at defensive tackle for Marshall over the course of the 2020 season.

To be considered for the Lombardi Award, players must be an NCAA FBS team member and meet the following qualifications:

-Be a down Lineman, end to end, either on offense or defense, setting up no further than ten (10) yards to the left or right of the ball at the time of the snap.

-Be a Linebacker on defense, setting up no further than five (5) yards deep from the line of scrimmage.

-Must not come out of the offensive backfield and set up on the line of scrimmage as a

blocker or a receiver or listed in the program as an offensive back or receiver.

-Be eligible to participate in the current season.

Honorary Chair and Famed Green Bay Packer Jerry Kramer, 1987 Winner Chris Spielman, the four nominees, and their coaches will attend the award ceremony on December 8th event in Houston Texas.

Wells Named to CFPA National Performer of the Year Watch List

Marshall quarterback Grant Wells was named to the 2021 College Football Performance Awards (CFPA) Performer of the Year Trophy Watch List earlier this month.

The trophy is a 22-inch K-9 optic crystal tower with an eight-inch crystal football on top. All FBS players are eligible for the award. The winner will be announced January 12, 2022.

This is the third national preseason honor for the Charleston native. Last month, he was selected to the watch lists for the Davey O'Brien and Maxwell Awards.

He was picked for both of the latter lists during the course of the 2020 season, a campaign that saw him throw for 18 touchdowns (fourth nationally among freshmen) and 2,091 yards (fifth nationally among freshmen).

Last year, he was also the first Conference USA quarterback in history to early first team all-league honors, which was a driving force behind being tabbed the C-USA Freshman of the Year.

Gilmore Selected to Jim Thorpe Award Watch List

Marshall defensive back Steven Gilmore was named to the Jim Thorpe Award Preseason Watch List, the Oklahoma Sports Hall of Fame (OSHO) and Jim Thorpe Association announced earlier this month.

This list includes 40 of the nation's best defensive backs, representing 10 conferences

and one independent. The preseason watch list is selected by a screening committee whose members compile a list of up to 50 players. This list is not final, and players who have outstanding seasons may be added as the season progresses.

The Rock Hill, S.C. native started all 10 games for Marshall in 2020 and earned first team All-Conference USA honors at season's end. He finished the campaign with 39 tackles, 1.5 tackles for loss, 1.5 sacks, one interception and two forced fumbles, all of which earned him honorable mention All-America honors from Phil Steele.

A preseason watch list is compiled by the Oklahoma Sports Hall of Fame based on previous performance and preseason All-America lists. A screening committee consisting of OSHOF members monitor the watch list players and narrow the field to 10 to 15 semifinalists in October. This committee reconvenes on the Monday before Thanksgiving to select three award finalists. The three finalists are submitted to a national panel of over 250 sports writers, sportscasters, former players and coaches who vote to determine the winner of the award.

Ciucci Named to Preseason Academic Watch List

Marshall kicker Shane Ciucci was named to Conference USA's Preseason Academic Watch List, the league office announced.

The Livonia, Michigan native handled all field goal and extra point duties for the Thundering Herd in 2020. He made seven of 10 field goals, with a long of 43 yards, and all 36 extra point attempts. He finished the season second only to Brenden Knox (60) on the Marshall team with 57 points.

Ciucci transferred to the Thundering Herd from Fresno State following the 2018 season.

Thundering Herd Picked Atop East Division by C-USA Media

Marshall, the reigning Conference USA East Division champions, was selected to duplicate that feat in 2021 by a panel of the league's media members.

The Thundering Herd picked up 17 first-place votes, six more than Florida Atlantic in second and Western Kentucky, who had one, in third. Charlotte, Middle Tennessee, FIU and Old Dominion rounded out the East, in that order.

UAB was tabbed to repeat at West Division champions and garnered 15 first-place votes. UTSA was second with nine, followed by Louisiana Tech, Southern Miss, Rice, North Texas and UTEP.

The Thundering Herd, who went 7-3 and 4-1 in C-USA play in 2020, welcome back QB Grant Wells, who was the C-USA Freshman of the Year last season. Wells threw for 2,091 yards and 18 touchdowns in 10 appearances. The Herd returns six all-conference performers from 2020 in Wells, TE Xavier Gaines, OL Alex Mollette, DB Steven Gilmore, DT Jamare Edwards and DB Nazeeh Johnson.

The 17th annual Conference USA Football Championship Game, pitting the champions of the East and West Divisions, will be held in the first week of December.

Bowl Prowess

Marshall enters 2021 featuring a .750 winning percentage (12-4) in all NCAA-sanctioned bowl games, the highest mark nationally among programs that have made at least seven appearances. (The Thundering Herd also participated in the 1948 Tangerine Bowl, at which point it was not sanctioned). The leaders are below:

Spreading it Around

The Thundering Herd had 10 different receivers catch touchdown passes in 2020, tying the program for third with Florida. Texas led with 12 and Liberty checked in with 11.

Hang on!

Since the beginning of the 2010 season, the Thundering Herd has posted a combined 85-54 (.612) record. When Marshall has an edge in turnover margin, it is 47-11 (.811). When the turnover number is equal, Marshall is 20-8 (.714). When the opponent is more sure-handed, the Herd is 18-35 (.340).

Of Marshall's 139 games in that span, the Herd has played 72 while committing zero or one turnover, amassing a record of 55-17 (.764) in those games.

Marshall is 25-4 (.862) when it has a turnover margin of +2 or better.

Marshall has won nine in a row when winning the turnover battle by three or more.

Marshall is 27-6 (.818) when it has zero turnovers, and the Herd has won 14 of its last 16 when it does not make a miscue. Marshall has won 18 of its last 21 when winning the turnover battle and the 2020 win over Middle Tennessee was the 10th straight win when MU quarterbacks have two-plus touchdown passes without an interception.

The Thundering Herd had five takeaways in 2018 wins over Eastern Kentucky and Florida Atlantic, giving the program nine consecutive wins when it forces four or more turnovers.

First Blood

The Thundering Herd has now won 32 of its last 34 games when scoring first and has won 20 of its last 22 when leading after the first quarter. Related: since the beginning of the 2013 season, the Herd is 52-3 (.945) when scoring first.

Defensive Numbers to Know

The Herd has won 48 of its last 55 when holding offenses to 5.0 yards per play or fewer. The Herd has won 31 of its last 34 when allowing fewer than 300 yards. Eighteen (18) times in the last 11 seasons has the Herd allowed 125 yards passing or fewer. Marshall is 16-2 (.889) in those games. Marshall is 32-4 (.889) when the defense does not allow a rushing touchdown.

Feel the Rush

The Herd is now 50-7 (.877) in the last eight seasons when rushing for 150+ yards and 37-5 (.881) the last eight years with 200+ on the ground. All-time, Marshall is 11-0 since 2010 when rushing for 300+ yards, as it did with 305 in the 33-31 win over Ohio in 2019. Marshall's 20 rushing first downs in the 2020 59-0 win over EKU was the most for the program since 24 versus Morris Harvey in 1925.

30+

Marshall's 42 points in the 2020 win over Middle Tennessee makes the Herd 50-3 (.943) in its last 53 games when scoring 30+ points.

Protecting the Home Turf

Marshall is nationally known for being one of the toughest places to play in college football. The program has won 82.1 percent (170-37) of its home games in Joan C. Edwards Stadium, the fourth-highest mark in the country.

Herd Finishes

Since 2010, the Herd has an excellent record of finishing off its opponents once it takes the lead. Marshall is 67-9 (.882) when it scores first, 59-9 (.868) when leading after the first quarter, 71-5 (.934) when leading at halftime and 72-5 (.935) when leading after three quarters. In fact, Marshall has won 57 of its last 60 contests (2016 vs. Charlotte, 2018 vs.

Middle Tennessee, 2019 at Charlotte) when it has the halftime lead.

50+

Marshall's 51-10 win over UMass was the 19th time that the Thundering Herd has reached the 50+-point plateau under coach Doc Holliday, four more than Jim Donnan (1990-95) for the all-time school mark. Bob Pruett (1996-2004) reached that mark 14 times and Cam Henderson (1936-42, 1946-49) did it on 13 occasions.

Strong Versus Texas at Home

Interestingly enough, Marshall has lost just once to a school from Texas at home. The Thundering Herd is 13-1 against Texas schools in games played in Huntington (Rice, 2020). Marshall owns two wins over North Texas (1988, 2015), two wins over Houston (2008, 2012), three wins over Rice (2007, 2011, 2014), two wins over SMU (2005, 2009), two wins over UTEP (2006, 2010) and two victories over UTSA (2013, 2018).

Feeling the Sunshine

Since the beginning of the 2013 season, Marshall is 15-4 in games contested in the state of Florida and/or against Florida schools.

Thundering Herd By The Numbers

58 – In the last eight seasons, the Marshall offense has scored 30 or more points 58 times. The Herd is 53-5 in those games, including 19 consecutive wins.

57 – Marshall has won 57 of its last 60 games when holding the halftime lead.

52 – Since the beginning of the 2013 season, Marshall has won 52 of its last 55 games when scoring first.

48 – Marshall has won 48 of its last 55 contests when holding the opposition to 5.0 yards per play or fewer.

38 – In the past eight seasons, Marshall quarterbacks have been interception-free 38 times. In those games, the Herd is 33-5.

38 – The Marshall defense has allowed only two runs of 50-plus yards in the last four seasons and hasn't allowed a 50+ yard carry in 38 of its last 39 games.

36 – The Marshall offense has scored 40 or more points 36 times since 2010. The Herd is 32-4 in those games.

32 – The Marshall football team has now won 32 of its last 34 games (2019 at Boise State, 2019 at Charlotte) when scoring first.

24 – Marshall has won 24 out of its last 25 games when rushing for at least 250 yards.

20 – Marshall has won 20 of its last 22 games when leading after the first quarter.

14 – Marshall has won 14 consecutive games when holding the opposition under 100 rushing yards.

3 – Only three schools have a better (current home stadium) winning percentage than Marshall: Alabama, Georgia Southern and Boise State. The Herd is 170-37 at Joan C. Edwards Stadium, which opened in 1991, winning at an .821 clip.

1 – The Marshall football program continues to rank No. 1 nationally in bowl winning percentage (minimum six bowls to qualify). The Herd is 12-3 (.800) all-time in bowl games.

Marshall vs. Ranked Opponents

Since moving to Division I-A (FBS) in 1997, the Herd has enjoyed three landmark victories against nationally-ranked opponents. The following is the Marshall Thundering Herd's game-by-game results against NCAA FBS opponents ranked in the Associated Press (since 1936), UPI (1950-92), CNN (1993-96), ESPN/USA Today (1997-2004) or USA Today (since 2005) Top 25 polls since 1936.

Charles Huff Head Coach - 1st Season

Charles Huff was named Marshall's head football coach on January 17, 2021.

An elite recruiter and developer of talent, Huff's proven track record bolstered head coach Nick Saban's staff for the 2019 and 2020 seasons.

In his inaugural season in Tuscaloosa, Huff helped Najee Harris rush for a career-best 1,224 yards on 209 carries with 13 rushing touchdowns while catching 27 passes for 304 yards and seven more scores. Brian Robinson Jr. added 441 rushing yards and five scores while then-freshman Keilan Robinson added 254 yards and two touchdowns. In 2020, Harris was a consensus All-American who led the nation in total touchdowns (30), rushing touchdowns (26) and points (180). He also ranked third nationally in rushing yards (1,466) and holds the school record for total touchdowns (57), rushing touchdowns (46) and rushing yards (3,843).

Huff arrived in Tuscaloosa after one season (2018) as the assistant head coach, run-game coordinator and running backs coach at Mississippi State. He boasts 16 years of coaching experience on both the NFL and college levels with stops at Penn State (2014-17), Western Michigan (2013), the Buffalo Bills (2012), Vanderbilt (2011), Hampton (2010), Maryland (2009) and Tennessee State (2006-08).

His one season in Starkville produced an effective rushing attack that averaged 223.6 yards per game to rank second in the SEC and 20th nationally. Kylin Hill and Aeris Williams carried the load at running back, averaging 6.3 and 6.2 yards per carry, respectively, while quarterback Nick Fitzgerald led the team in rushing with 1,121 yards and 13 touchdowns.

A native of Denton, Maryland, Huff spent four seasons (2014-17) as Penn State's running backs coach and special teams coordinator. He recruited and developed one of the game's most electrifying players in running back Saquon Barkley, who in 2018 became the highest drafted NFL running back since Reggie Bush went No. 2 overall in 2006.

Barkley, who was called with the second overall pick by the New York Giants in the 2018 draft, produced a dynamic rookie season, rushing for 1,307 yards and 11 touchdowns. He added 91 receptions for 721 yards and four more scores to amass 2,028 yards from scrimmage on his way to Offensive Rookie of the Year honors at season's end.

Numerous records fell at the running back position and on special teams under Huff's guidance at Penn State. Barkley, a 2017 consensus All-American, became the first Big Ten running back in history to win Offensive Player of the Year honors twice. A Walter Camp National Player of the Year finalist, Barkley ranked second nationally in all-purpose yards in 2017 (2,329). He broke four school career records, including rushing touchdowns (43), total touchdowns (53), all-purpose yards (5,538) and consecutive games with a touchdown (15) in just three seasons.

The 2016 campaign saw the Nittany Lions claim the Big Ten Championship and it was Huff who mentored two record-breakers. Barkley broke the Penn State sophomore record for rushing yards (1,496), all-purpose yards (1,972) and points scored (132), while junior kicker Tyler Davis collected All-Big Ten first-team honors after tying the league's single-season record for kicking points (128) and breaking the school record for field goals by a junior (22) and consecutive field goals made (18).

Huff recruited Barkley to Penn State, and his freshman season of 2015 was spectacular. The Freshman All-American broke the school's single-season freshman rushing record with 1,076 yards. He was named the Big Ten Network's Big Ten Freshman of the Year in the process.

He spent the 2013 season at Western Michigan as the running backs coach and helped the unit nearly double its rushing yards from 2012. The Broncos ran for 1,394 yards in 2013 after running for just 735 yards the year before.

Huff spent the 2012 season in the NFL as the assistant running backs coach for the Buffalo Bills. He helped C.J. Spiller to his first career 1,000-yard rushing campaign and a Pro Bowl invitation.

In 2011, Huff was on James Franklin's 2011 staff at Vanderbilt as the offensive quality control coach. Huff and Franklin also worked together at Maryland in 2009, when Huff was the assistant offensive line coach. Huff also mentored NFL first-round pick Dominique Rodgers-Cromartie as the tight ends and special teams coach at Tennessee State from 2007-08.

Huff graduated in 2005 from Hampton University where he served as a team captain, starting 12 games at center as a senior in 2005. He also played guard, fullback and tight end in his career.

Huff will be joined in Huntington by his wife Jessica and son Bobby.
