Third Down Defense

On the season, Marshall opponents have converted only 27 first downs on their 131 third down snaps. Marshall's third down defense rate of 20.6% ranks No. 1 in the nation; Minnesota is No. 2 at 25.5%.

Over Marshall's last five games, the opposition has gained first downs on only 12 of 74 third down attempts, a rate of 16.2%.

The only Marshall opponent to convert third downs at even a 40% rate was Troy (8-of-19, 42.1%) - 54 FBS teams this season have allowed their opposition to convert more than 40% of their third downs on the year as a whole.

Due in large part to that third down rate, Thundering Herd opponents are averaging only 14 first downs per game - only four teams allow a lower rate.

This Week's Game



Saturday's game will be the 25th all-time football meeting between Marshall and Appalachian State, dating back to 1977. The Mountaineers lead the series, 15-9. In Huntington, the series is tied at six wins apiece.

Series Notes

The first football game between the Thundering Herd and Appalachian State was played in 1977, Marshall's first year of play in the Southern Conference. That game took place in Boone, N.C., and the Mountaineers won by a score of 28-20.

The Thundering Herd's first few years of Southern Conference play were a struggle for Marshall, which did not win any conference games in its first four years in that league. Marshall went 0-25-1 to start its life in the Southern Conference, with the only non-loss coming in a 13-13 tie at Western Carolina in 1980.

Marshall's Southern Conference futility ended at Appalachian State on Nov. 7, 1981, thanks to a then school-record 245-yard rushing performance by running back Larry Forqurean, who scored the game-winning touchdown midway through the fourth quarter as the Thundering Herd won, 17-10.

The Herd's program improved markedly over the next few seasons, which led to two meetings between these schools in 1987. Coach George Chaump's Marshall squad dropped a 17-10 regular season game in Boone, a loss that the Thundering Herd avenged a month later by beating the Mountaineers - again in Boone - 24-10 in the NCAA Division I-AA playoff semifinals. Marshall led a tightly-contested game 17-10 midway through the fourth quarter when Thundering Herd defensive back Von Woodson intercepted a pass that set the Herd up for a 6-yard touchdown by running back Ron Darby to advance Marshall to the National Championship game. Marshall fell in that contest in Pocatello, Idaho, 43-42, to Northeast Louisiana - which is now Sun Belt Conference member Louisiana-Monroe.

The score was also Marshall 24, Appalachian State 10 in 1996, the final meeting between the schools as Southern Conference rivals. Marshall again made it to the National Championship game that season, and finished a 15-0 campaign under Coach Bob Pruett when it defeated Montana, 49-29, in the season's final game.

Marshall and Appalachian State have played three times since they were last conference mates in 1996. The Thundering Herd won the 2002 season opener in Huntington, 50-17. In 2020, Marshall again beat the Mountaineers, who were ranked No. 23 in the nation, 17-7.

Last season in Boone, Appalachian State scored 10 unanswered points in the fourth quarter to defeat Marshall, 31-30.

Any credentials not picked up prior to game day will be at the media will call table, located at Gate B (west side, midfield) at Joan C. Edwards Stadium, starting two hours prior to kickoff.

Parking

Parking will be accommodated on a space-available basis. The media parking lot is on 18th Street, two blocks west of Joan C. Edwards Stadium. To reach the 18th Street Lot, travel west along Third Avenue (a one-way street) and make your way to the left lane. There's a traffic light at 18th Street - turn left at that light. This puts you into the 18th Street Lot. **These spaces are normally used for handicap parking on the Marshall campus. This is not the case on game day - media members can park in these handicap spaces by displaying their parking pass on GAME DAY ONLY.** This same pass gives access to the Third Avenue Parking Garage, located across Third Avenue from the Cam Henderson Center (right lane as you travel along Third Avenue), if the 18th Street Lot fills up or if you simply prefer to park in the garage.

Interview Availability

Monday - Coach Charles Huff and the other Sun Belt Conference head coaches will participate on a weekly news conference via Zoom, facilitated by the Sun Belt Conference. The entire news conference is scheduled to run from 11:30 a.m. to 1:08 p.m. eastern time, with Coach Huff's time slot from 12:54 to 1:04 p.m.

Tuesday - Marshall players are available for in-person interviews at noon in the team meeting room, located in the lower level of the Fred and Christine Shewey Building. Coach Charles Huff will then be available in the same room at 12:30 p.m.

Namesake: John Marshall, the fourth and longest serving (1801-1835) Chief Justice of the United States.

1961: Attained University status.



Thundering Herd

In the early 1900s, as Marshall established a varsity sports program, the school's teams were called the Big Green because of the color of their uniforms. In 1925, as Coach Trusty Tallman's powerful football team outscored the opposition by a combined 138-29 margin on its way to the inaugural West Virginia Conference championship, Huntington sportswriter Duke Ridgley dubbed the squad The Thundering Herd, based on a newly released novel by western adventure author Zane Grey.

Soon, rival sportswriter Doug Freutel countered by referring to Marshall teams as the Boogercats, which is what the Scottish immigrants in the Appalachian hills called mountain lions. Another movement sought to honor namesake John Marshall by calling the school's sports teams the Judges, but for the next 40 years most people used either the Big Green or the Thundering Herd when referring to Marshall.

In the fall of 1964, Marshall president Stewart Smith appointed a faculty-student committee to settle on an official school mascot. The final vote was taken on January 5, 1965, with 85 percent of the responses favoring Thundering Herd. The vote also set Kelly Green and White as the official school colors, while Big Green became the name of the athletic fundraising organization. Mercifully, Boogercats faded into obscurity.



Marco the Bison

Not long after Duke Ridgley dropped the "Thundering Herd" moniker on Marshall's teams, students began crafting bison costumes to wear to games and eventually cartoonists were creating their versions in the local newspapers. In 1954 the school yearbook, *The Chief Justice*, named the bison Marco - short for Marshall College.

When Thundering Herd became the official nickname in 1965, a bison costume was ordered and, even though Marshall had by then gained University status, the name Marco stuck. Charles Evans was the first to wear the official mascot costume, at a basketball game against Bowling Green on March 6th of that year.

For a brief period in the 1970s a live buffalo made appearances during home games at Huntington's Fairfield Stadium, but he proved to be a bit hard to handle - and he kept eating the artificial turf. In 1990, Marco (with Allen Young in the costume) won the Universal Cheerleader's Association National Champion Mascot competition in San Antonio, Texas.





Charles Huff is in his second season as Marshall's head football coach. He was named to the position on January 17, 2021. Huff led his first Marshall squad to a 7-6 record and berth in the New Orleans Bowl. His reputation as a developer of nationally prominent players grew with the Freshman All-American honors earned by record-breaking Thundering Herd running back Rasheen Ali and All-Conference USA recognition earned by Ali, offensive linemen Will Ulmer and Alex Mollette, defensive backs Steven Gilmore and Micah Abraham, linebacker Abraham Beauplan, kick returner Jayden Harrison and a dozen more players who received honorable mention recognition. Defensive back Nazeeh Johnson became a seventh round draft pick of the Kansas City Chiefs.

An elite recruiter and developer of talent, Huff's proven track record bolstered head coach Nick Saban's Alabama staff for the 2019 and 2020 seasons, helping the Crimson Tide to the 2020 National Championship. He was named the 2020 National Recruiter of the Year by 247 Sports.

In his inaugural season in Tuscaloosa, Huff helped Najee Harris rush for a career-best 1,224 yards on 209 carries with 13 rushing touchdowns while catching 27 passes for 304 yards and seven more scores. Brian Robinson Jr. added 441 rushing yards and five scores while then-freshman Keilan Robinson added 254 yards and two touchdowns. In 2020, Harris was a consensus All-American who led the nation in total touchdowns (30), rushing touchdowns (26) and points (180). He also ranked third nationally in rushing yards (1,466) and holds the school record for total touchdowns (57), rushing touchdowns (46) and rushing yards (3,843).

Huff arrived in Tuscaloosa after one season (2018) as the assistant head coach, run-game coordinator and running backs coach at Mississippi State. The native of Denton, Maryland, boasts 17 years of coaching experience on both the NFL and college levels with stops at Penn State (2014-17), Western Michigan (2013), the Buffalo Bills (2012), Vanderbilt (2011), Hampton (2010), Maryland (2009) and Tennessee State (2006-08).

Huff spent four seasons (2014-17) as Penn State's running backs coach and special teams coordinator. He recruited and developed one of the game's most electrifying players in running back Saquon Barkley, who in 2018 became the highest drafted NFL running back since Reggie Bush went No. 2 overall in 2006.

Barkley, who was called with the second overall pick by the New York Giants in the 2018 draft, produced a dynamic rookie season, rushing for 1,307 yards and 11 touchdowns. He added 91 receptions for 721 yards and four more scores to amass 2,028 yards from scrimmage on his way to Offensive Rookie of the Year honors at season's end.

Numerous records fell at the running back position and on special teams under Huff's guidance at Penn State. Barkley, a 2017 consensus All-American, became the first Big Ten running back in history to win Offensive Player of the Year honors twice. A Walter Camp National Player of the Year finalist, Barkley ranked second nationally in all-purpose yards in 2017 (2,329).

The 2016 campaign saw the Nittany Lions claim the Big Ten Championship and it was Huff who mentored two record-breakers. Barkley broke the Penn State sophomore record for rushing yards (1,496), all-purpose yards (1,972) and points scored (132), while junior kicker Tyler Davis collected All-Big Ten first-team honors after tying the league's single-season record for kicking points (128) and breaking the school record for field goals by a junior (22) and consecutive field goals made (18).

Huff recruited Barkley to Penn State, and his freshman season of 2015 was spectacular. The Freshman All-American broke the school's single-season freshman rushing record with 1,076 yards. He was named the Big Ten Network's Big Ten Freshman of the Year in the process.

Huff graduated in 2005 from Hampton University where he served as a team captain, starting 12 games at center as a senior in 2005. He also played guard, fullback and tight end in his career.

Huff resides in Huntington with his wife Jessica and their sons, BJ and Beau.

Winning without a touchdown

Marshall's 12-0 win at Old Dominion gave the Thundering Herd a pair of rarities that had not occurred in several decades.

The last time the Thundering Herd posted a shutout on the road was in 1983, when Coach Sonny Randle's team won at Morehead State, 35-0, behind two touchdowns apiece by Larry Fourqurean and Robert Surratt.

It had been even longer since Marshall won a football game without scoring a touchdown. The last time that had happened was on Oct. 16, 1976. Marshall place kicker Ed Hamrick knocked through field goals of 36, 34, and 33 yards at Fairfield Stadium as Coach Frank Ellwood's team shut out the University of Dayton, 9-0.

Prior to the win over Dayton in 1976, Marshall had not won a game in which it had not scored a touchdown since 1924, when the Big Green (the team was first referred to as the Thundering Herd the following year) won a 3-0 game at Muskingum on a short field goal by Marshall Hall of Famer Frank "Red" Crist.

Porter nabs Herd's first Sun Belt Player of the Week honor

After turning in one of the most dominating pass rushing performances in Marshall history at James Madison last weekend, junior defensive lineman **Owen Porter** earned the Sun Belt Conference Defensive Player of the Week Award, Marshall's first in its new league.

Porter made nine tackles against the Dukes, including 3.5 quarterback sacks, another tackle for loss, hurried the quarterback on four more occasions, and also batted down a pass.

"Touchdown on a try"

With 3:32 left in the Oct. 22 game at James Madison, the Dukes scored a touchdown to go up by the score of 9-0, and sent place kicker Camden Wise out to attempt the point after touchdown. Marshall's Damion Barber Jr. blocked the kick, which was picked up by Thundering Herd defensive back E.J. Jackson at the 15-yard line and returned the football to the other end zone for two points on what is technically called in the rule book a "touchdown on a try."

It marked the first time in more than ten years - a span of 127 games - since Marshall had recorded a defensive touchdown on a try. The last time it had happened was on Oct. 6, 2012, against Tulsa, when D.J. Hunter recovered and returned a bad snap to the Golden Hurricanes' holder and took it the distance.

Driving in South Bend

Notre Dame punter John Sot forced Marshall's **Talik Keaton** to call for a fair catch at the Marshall 6-yard line. The Fighting Irish led 15-12, with 10:32 remaining in the fourth quarter. Marshall embarked on one of the biggest drives in school history. On third-and-nine from the 7-yard line, **Henry Colombi** completed an 11-yard pass to tight end **Devin Miller** to move the chains.

Running back **Khalan Laborn** rushed for eight and then five yards for another Thundering Herd first down, then Colombi connected with Keaton for a 16-yard gain to the Marshall 47-yard line. Two plays later, Laborn broke free for a 42-yard run to make it first down and goal to go at the Fighting Irish 6-yard-line. On third down, from the the 3-yard line, Colombi was flushed out of the pocket to his left but set his feet and threw back to his right, where Miller had broken free from All-American safety Brandon Joseph to make the touchdown catch that put Marshall into the lead for good with 5:16 remaining in the game.

The drive covered 94 yards in 11 plays and took 5:16 off the clock - half of the time that remained when Marshall began the drive on its 6-yard line.

Colombi's fast start

Laborn's fast start

Sibling TDs - first time in more than a century

Sophomore running back **Ethan Payne** had career-high numbers of 11 carries, 110 yards, and two touchdowns in the season-opening win over Norfolk State. Then his younger brother, freshman tight end **Toby Payne**, caught a 12-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Cam Fancher.

That made the Payne brothers only the second set of Marshall siblings - and the first in more than 105 years - to score touchdowns in the same game. The Workman brothers - quarterback Bradley and wide receiver Noel - each scored touchdowns in the same game twice during the 1916 season (in a 26-12 win at Rio Grande, and again in a 19-19 tie at Transylvania).

Home-grown touchdowns

Three different native West Virginians scored touchdowns for Marshall during the season-opening win over Norfolk State. Running back **Ethan Payne** rushed for two touchdowns, tight end **Toby Payne** caught a touchdown pass, and defensive lineman **Owen Porter** recovered and returned a fumble for a score. The Payne brothers are from Poca, W.Va. (high school team - the Poca Dots) and Porter is a product of Spring Valley High School, which is located seven miles from the Marshall campus.

The last time that three West Virginia products scored touchdowns in the same game was during a 37-15 win at Northern Illinois in 2001. On that afternoon in DeKalb, Ill., safety Michael Owens (Logan, W.Va.) scored on a 25-yard interception return, wideout Deniero Marriott (Inwood, W.Va.) caught a 31-yard touchdown pass from Byron Leftwich, and defensive lineman Orlando Washington (Accoville, W.Va.) returned a fumble 25 yards for a score.

Norfolk, Virginia - A dominating performance by the Thundering Herd defense and record-setting day by true-freshman place kicker **Rece Verhoff** led the Thundering Herd to a 12-0 shutout win at Old Dominion in front of a crowd of 18,327 at S.B. Ballard Stadium.

After a scoreless first quarter, Marshall took a 3-0 lead when Verhoff capped off a 14-play, 76-yard drive with a 33-yard field goal. That would be all the points that Marshall needed, but Verhoff added another field goal (26 yards) before halftime and then tacked on a 30-yarder in the third quarter and a 23-yarder in the fourth. Verhoff's attempt at a fifth field goal was blocked by the Monarchs' Chazz Wallace.

Verhoff's four made field goals and five field goals attempted both tied the respective Marshall records.

Even though Marshall failed to score a touchdown, the Thundering Herd ran the football effectively. As running back **Khalan Laborn** (139 yards on 31 carries) and quarterback **Cam Fancher** (18 carries, 136 yards) each eclipsed the century mark, Marshall out-rushed the Monarchs 298 yards to 11. Marshall out-gained ODU 387 yards of total offense to 198.

The win improved Marshall's all-time record against Old Dominion to 7-1.

Offense

- » Fancher's 136 rushing yards were the most by a Marshall quarterback since Rakeem Cato gained 143 yards (on 9 carries) during a 48-7 win over Rhode Island in 2014. The 136 rushing yards were the seventh-most by a quarterback in program history.
- » Khalan Laborn failed to score a touchdown for the first time in Marshall's nine games. His streak of rushing for at least one touchdown in eight consecutive games leaves Laborn tied with Jackie Hunt (1940-41) and Chris Parker (1994-95) for the second-longest such streak in school history. Doug Chapman holds the school record by rushing for at least one touchdown in 10 consecutive games during the 1994-95 seasons.

Defense

Huntington, West Virginia - Coastal Carolina jumped out to a 21-0 first quarter lead and held on to defeat Marshall 24-13. The Chanticleers spoiled Marshall's homecoming game in front of a crowd of 24,954 at the Joan C. Edwards Stadium.

Coastal Carolina received the opening kickoff and immediately drove 76 yards in 11 plays to take a 7-0 lead when Grayson McCall - the two-time reigning Sun Belt Conference Offensive Player of the Year - scored on a 2-yard quarterback keeper. After Marshall committed an illegal block on the ensuing kickoff return and went three-and-out after beginning the drive on its own 8-yard line, the Chanticleers upped their lead to 14-0 when backup quarterback Bryce Carpenter scored on a 3-yard run to cap a 49-yard drive. Following another Marshall punt, McCall hit tight end Jacob Jenkins with a 37-yard touchdown pass to make it 21-0 with 1:03 remaining in the first quarter.

Following one quarter of play, Coastal Carolina had out-gained Marshall, with 175 yards of total offense to the Thundering Herd's 36 yards.

After the first quarter, Marshall out-gained the Chanticleers 371 yards to 96, but never came within eight points of Coastal Carolina on the scoreboard.

Marshall scored its first points of the night at the 7:17 mark of the second quarter when quarterback **Cam Fancher** hit wide receiver **Corey Gammage** with a deep pass, on which Gammage fumbled the football, but it was recovered by Thundering Herd wideout **Talik Keaton** and advanced to the CCU 2-yard line. The total play gained 61 yards. Two plays later, running back **Khalan Laborn** scored on a 2-yard run to make it a 21-7 game.

On Marshall's next possession, **Rece Verhoff** cut the Chanticleers' lead to 21-10 when he connected on a 40-yard field goal.

Midway through the third quarter, Verhoff had a 45-yard field goal attempt blocked, but then hit a 39-yarder to get Marshall back within 21-13.

The only score of the fourth quarter came on a 27-yard field goal by Coastal Carolina's Kade Hensley.

Harrisonburg, Virginia - Marshall nabbed the school's first Sun Belt Conference victory, in the process spoiling James Madison's homecoming game in front of a Bridgeforth Stadium record crowd of 26,159. The Dukes entered the contest with a 5-1 record and received votes in the most recent Associated Press Top 25 poll.

James Madison jumped out to a 12-2 first quarter lead, but the Dukes never scored again while Marshall rattled off 24 consecutive points.

Redshirt freshman quarterback **Cam Fancher** got his first career start and played the entire game for the Thundering Herd. Senior Henry Colombi, who had started every game this season, went through pregame warmups with the team, but then emerged from the lockerroom in street clothes prior to the opening coin toss.

Marshall cut the JMU advantage to 12-9 at halftime thanks to a 61-yard touchdown run by **Khalan Laborn**, then took a lead it would never relinquish early in the third quarter on a 57-yard touchdown pass from Fancher to junior wide receiver **Corey Gammage**.

Marshall added to its lead on a 38-yard field goal by Rece Verhoff midway through the third quarter, then set the final score with an 18-yard run by Laborn in the fourth quarter.

Offense

- » Laborn gained 151 yards and two touchdowns on 30 carries, surpassing the 1,000 yard mark for the season. This gave him seven consecutive games with at least 100 rushing yards and at least one rushing touchdown.
- » Laborn reached the 1,000-yard milestone quicker than anyone in school history. Ahmad Bradshaw (2006) and Devon Johnson (2014) had each hit 1,000 yards in Game 8.

Defense

- » Defensive End **Owen Porter** was credited with 3.5 sacks and four more hurries of JMU quarterback Billy Atkins. In all, Marshall sacked the Dukes' quarterback seven times.
- » Thundering Herd senior linebacker **Charlie Gray** intercepted the first two passes of his Marshall career.
- » Marshall intercepted four JMU passes, the most in a game since the Herd picked off four passes in a 31-7 win over Florida Atlantic in 2018.
- » Junior cornerback **Micah Abraham** intercepted his fourth pass of the season, the most for anyone at Marshall since Taj Letman and A.J. Leggett each intercepted four passes in 2014.

Special Teams

- » Following the JMU touchdown, Marshall's **Damion Barber Jr.** blocked Camden Wise's PAT attempt, and the football was recovered and returned 85-yards by **E.J. Jackson** for two Marshall points. The last time Marshall had returned an opposing team's point after try for a score was against Tulsa in 2012, when D.J. Hunter recovered a bad snap by Tulsa and took it the distance for the score.

Huntington, West Virginia - Defending league champion Louisiana scored 20 unanswered points to start the second half and defeated Marshall 23-13 to spoil the Thundering Herd's inaugural Sun Belt Conference home game. For the Wednesday night contest, Marshall held a blackout at Edwards Stadium and donned all-black uniforms for the game, including black helmets for the first time in school history.

The Ragin' Cajuns scored first, midway through the first quarter, when Kenneth Almendares connected on a 42-yard field goal, his first of three in the contest.

Marshall took its only lead of the game when running back **Khalan Laborn** capped a 10-play, 87-yard drive by scoring on a 1-yard run with 4:09 remaining in the second quarter.

As the teams were warming up prior to start of the second half, lightning strikes in the area caused a 30-minute delay.

When play resumed, Louisiana regained the lead at the 10:30 mark of third quarter, then extended its advantage to 23-7 on two more Almendares field goals (33 and 52 yards) and a 32-yard touchdown pass from Wooldridge to Michael Jefferson.

Marshall cut the Louisiana advantage to 23-13 midway through the fourth quarter, but a two-point conversion attempt failed and neither team scored again.

Offense

- » Running back Khalan Laborn rushed for 120 yards and two touchdowns, giving him six consecutive games of rushing for more than 100 yards and also of rushing for at least one touchdown. Both streaks are among the longest in Marshall history.

Huntington, West Virginia - The remnants of Hurricane Ian made for a soggy afternoon at the Joan C. Edwards Stadium, but Marshall managed a 28-7 win over the Runnin' Bulldogs of Gardner-Webb University.

Marshall scored first, capping its second possession of the game with a 24-yard touchdown pass from **Henry Colombi** to freshman running back **A.J. Turner**, who scored the first touchdown of his career.

After Gardner-Webb tied the game at 7-7 on a 45-yard interception return for a touchdown by linebacker Ty Anderson, the Thundering Herd regained the lead for good when Colombi his wide receiver **Corey Gammage** with a 10-yard touchdown pass.

Marshall extended its lead to 21-7 on a **Khalan Laborn** 1-yard run in the third quarter and set the final at 28-7 on a 78-yard Laborn run in the fourth quarter.

Offense

- » Running back Khalan Laborn carried the football 35 times for 191 yards in the game. His 35 carries are the most by a Marshall player since Ahmad Bradshaw carries 40 times (for 261 yards and five touchdowns) in a 49-21 win over Texas-El Paso in 2006.
- » Laborn's 78-yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter was Marshall's longest rush play in nearly five years - since Tyler King scored on a 90-yard touchdown run during a 31-28 win over Colorado State in the 2017 New Mexico Bowl.

Defense

- » For the second consecutive game, Marshall's defense did not allow a touchdown.
- » Gardner-Webb rushed the football only 19 times for a net of 19 yards. The 19 rushing yards are the fewest allowed by Marshall since the team held Louisiana Tech to 7 net yards (on 24 attempts) in a 35-17 win in Ruston in 2020.
- » The Thundering Herd intercepted three passes for the second time this season (Notre Dame).
- » **Steven Gilmore** intercepted two Gardner-Webb passes, making him the first Marshall player with multiple interceptions in the same game since Rodney Allen picked off two passes at Florida International in 2016. Gilmore now has nine career interceptions, which puts him in the Top 15 all-time at Marshall.
- » Senior defensive back **Joshua Bowers** intercepted the first pass of his Marshall career.

Troy, Alabama - Marshall went down to defeat in its inaugural Sun Belt Conference game, falling 16-7 at Troy's Veterans Memorial Stadium. The attendance was announced at 27,514.

In a game that was mostly controlled by the defenses, the Trojans' defense made the team's first big play - and scored Troy's only touchdown of the game. On Marshall's initial possession of the contest, Trojan defensive lineman T.J. Jackson sacked Marshall quarterback **Henry Colombi** and caused a fumble, which was recovered and returned 23 yards for a touchdown by Troy nose tackle Buddha Jones.

On Troy's next possession, the team connected on a 63-yard pass from quarterback Gunnar Watson to wideout Tez Johnson to set up Trojan place kicker Brooks Buce for a 40-yard field goal that gave Troy a 10-0 lead.

It remained a 10-0 game until the latter portion of the third quarter, when Marshall cornerback **Micah Abraham** intercepted a tipped pass at the Troy 16-yard line. It was Abraham's third interception in Marshall's four games.

Two plays later, Thundering Herd running back **Khalan Laborn** scored Marshall's only touchdown of the night on a 14-yard run.

Troy's Buce added two fourth-quarter field goals, of 25 and 28 yards, as the Trojans improved to 2-2 on the season, evened their Sun Belt Conference record at 1-1, and tied the all-time series with Marshall at 3-3.

Troy linebacker Carlton Martial was credited with 18 tackles, the most against Marshall since Norfolk State's Deon King made 21 stops against the Thundering Herd in 2015. Martial in the process became the Sun Belt Conference's all-time leader in career tackles, surpassing the previous record of 460 by Texas State's Bryan London (2015-19).

Offense

- » Running back Khalan Laborn, who had earlier in the season become the only player in Marshall history to rush for 100-plus yards in the first two games of his career, extended his streak to four consecutive games with 100-plus. Laborn rushed the football 30 times for 118 yards, including Marshall's lone touchdown of the contest.
- » Laborn's string of four straight games with 100 or more rushing yards tied him with four other players for the sixth-longest such stretch in school history.

Defense

- » Marshall cornerback Micah Abraham intercepted a tipped Troy pass, giving him his third interception in four games this season and five interceptions in his career.
- » Marshall sacked Troy quarterback Gunner Watson three times - once each by Sam Burton, Charlie Gray, and Damion Barber Jr., who made his first career start in the contest.

Bowling Green, Ohio - Bowling Green celebrated the school's 100th homecoming game with a 34-31 overtime victory in front of a crowd of 21,158 at Doyt Perry Stadium.

Marshall jumped to a 14-0 lead after only two minutes and 32 seconds of play in the first quarter on two touchdown passes by quarterback **Henry Colombi**, the first covering 51 yards to wide receiver **Corey Gammage** and the second 78 yards to wide receiver **Caleb McMillan**.

Bowling Green scored its first points of the game on a 25-yard touchdown pass from Matt McDonald to wide receiver Odieu Hiliare at the 12:30 mark of the second quarter, but Marshall answered immediately to go back up by 14 points when running back **Khalan Laborn** capped a 9-play, 69-yard drive with a 5-yard touchdown run. BGSU, however, rallied to tie the game before halftime on two more McDonald touchdown passes - 27 yards to Hiliare and 30 yards to wide receiver Cavon Croom.

The game remained tied 21-21 through the third quarter, then Bowling Green took its first lead of the contest on a 1-yard run by Harold Fannin at the 12:30 mark of the fourth quarter. The Thundering Herd tied the game on the second touchdown of the evening by Laborn, an 8-yard run with 5:43 left in the fourth quarter. The game remained tied 28-28 through regulation play.

Bowling Green won the overtime coin toss and elected to start on defense. Marshall's **Rece Verhoff** kicked a career-long 38-yard field goal on the Herd's overtime possession. Bowling Green's PaSean Wimberly rushed the ball for 23 yards to the 2-yard line on the Falcons' first play in overtime, then McDonald threw a 2-yard touchdown pass to running back Ta'Ron Keith to give the BGSU the 34-31 victory.

Marshall out-gained Bowling Green in total offense, 547 yards to 377 for the Falcons, but suffered three turnovers (2 fumbles, 1 interception) while Bowling Green played a turnover-free contest.

Overtime

- » The loss at Bowling Green dropped Marshall's all-time record in overtime games to 10-8.

Offense

- » Running Back Khalan Laborn carried the football 24 times for 157 yards. Combined with his 163 rushing yards at Notre Dame, Laborn became the tenth Marshall player to log back-to-back games with 150 or more rushing yards.
- » Quarterback Henry Colombi completed 23-of-34 passes for a career-high 338 yards.
- » Junior wide receiver Caleb McMillan scored his first career touchdown, catching a short pass from Colombi and outrunning the Bowling Green defense the rest of the way for a 78-yard score. The play was tied for the 29th-longest pass in Marshall history, and the longest since an 82-yard touchdown pass from Isaiah Green to Marcel Williams against North Carolina State in 2018.

Defense

- » Defensive lineman Damion Barber Jr. (2022 transfer from Austin Peay) recorded the first quarterback sack of his Marshall career.

South Bend, Indiana - Marshall notched one of the biggest wins in its history by going to South Bend, Indiana, and toppling No. 8 Notre Dame, 26-21, before a crowd of 77,622 at Notre Dame Stadium. The only time that Marshall has beaten a higher-ranked team was in 2003, when the Thundering Herd won 27-20 at No. 6 Kansas State.

The Thundering Herd out-gained Notre Dame 364 yards to 351 and out-rushed the Fighting Irish 219 yards to 130. Running back **Khalan Laborn** carried the football 31 times for 163 yards, including Marshall's first touchdown of the contest.

Marshall played a turnover-free game, while the Thundering Herd defense intercepted three Fighting Irish passes.

Marshall led the game 9-7 at halftime and 12-7 after three quarters before Notre Dame went up 15-12 on a one-yard quarterback sneak by Tyler Buchner, who then scored again on the two-point conversion.

The Thundering Herd regained the lead on a 3-yard touchdown pass from quarterback **Henry Colombi** to tight end **Devin Miller** with 5:16 left in the fourth quarter, then extended the lead to 26-15 when cornerback **Steven Gilmore** intercepted a Buchner pass and returned it 37 yards for a touchdown.

Notre Dame cut the Marshall advantage to 26-21 on a touchdown pass with 14 seconds left in the contest, but failed on a 2-point conversion try. The last chance for the Fighting Irish ended when Marshall's **Corey Gammage** recovered the Notre Dame onside kick.

Offense

» Khalan Laborn's 31 rushing attempts and 163 yards were both career highs. The 31 carries were the most by a Marshall running back since Brenden Knox carried 32 times against Louisiana Tech in 2020, and the 163 yards were the most since Rasheen Ali gained 203 yards at Charlotte in 2021.

Defense

» Steven Gilmore's 37-yard interception return for a touchdown was Marshall's first pick six since **Micah Abraham** returned one 75 yards for a score in the 2019 Gasparilla Bowl. It was Gilmore's seventh career interception.

» Abraham also snared an interception against Notre Dame, the fourth of his career and the second straight game in which he intercepted a pass after also picking one off against Norfolk State.

» Marshall's third interception of the game was taken by defensive end **Owen Porter** - Porter's second straight game with a takeaway after he returned a fumble 21 yards for a touchdown against Norfolk State.

Special Teams

» True freshman place kicker **Rece Verhoff** missed his first PAT attempt of the game, but bounced back to connect on two field goals and two PATs after that. Prior to the miss, Marshall had made 123 consecutive PATs, dating back to 2019. The streak of 123 ended as the third-longest in school history (160 straight from 2013-16 and 156 straight from 2010-13).

» Verhoff also registered four touchbacks on his six kickoffs, and Notre Dame's average starting field position on the six kickoffs was 26-yard line.

Fourth quarter comeback

» The game marked the 58th time in Marshall history that the Thundering Herd has mounted a fourth-quarter, come-from-behind victory, and the second under Coach Charles Huff (Old Dominion in 2021).

Huntington, West Virginia - Marshall won its tenth straight season opener in dominating fashion over Norfolk State, an FCS opponent from the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference. The game was played before a crowd of 24,607 at the Joan C. Edwards Stadium.

After being forced to punt on its first possession of the game, the Thundering Herd marched down the field to kick a field goal on its next possession. Marshall then scored touchdowns on seven of its next eight possessions before closing its scoring with a field goal at the 5:19 mark in the third quarter, making the score 55-0. Norfolk State kicked a field goal to make it 55-3 at the end of the third quarter. Marshall took a knee to end its final two possessions of the contest.

Offense

- » Marshall's 380 yards rushing against Norfolk State were the Thundering Herd's most since Marshall rushed for 432 yards in a 48-7 win over Rhode Island in 2014.
- » **Khalan Laborn** (12 carries, 102 yards) and **Ethan Payne** (11 carries, 110 yards) became the first pair of Marshall players to rush for 100-plus yards in the same game since the Herd's 31-28 win over Colorado State in the 2017 New Mexico Bowl (Keion Davis, 141 yards; Tyler King, 106 yards).
- » Quarterback **Henry Colombi** completed 24-of-26 passes in his Marshall debut, for 205 yards, one touchdown (13 yards to Corey Gammage) and one interception (in the end zone on a deflected pass). Colombi's .923 completion percentage is the second-highest in a game in school history (min. 10 passes thrown), topped only by Eric Kresser's 10-for-10 performance in a 56-25 win over The Citadel in 1996.
- » Colombi completed the first 13 passes he threw against Norfolk State, which ties him for the third-longest completion streak in school history (Grant Wells completed 18 consecutive passes at North Texas in 2021; Eric Kresser completed 14 consecutive passes over two games (The Citadel and East Tennessee State) in 1996; Byron Leftwich completed 13 consecutive passes against Buffalo in 2003).
- » **Ethan Payne** scored two touchdowns, then his younger brother **Toby Payne** caught his first career pass from Cam Fancher and took the ball into the end zone for a 12-yard touchdown. The Payne brothers became only the second set of siblings to score touchdowns in the same game for Marshall, and the first to do so in more than 105 years. The other combo was quarterback Bradley and wide receiver Noel Workman, each of whom scored touchdowns in the same game twice in the 1916 season - during a 26-12 win at Rio Grande on Sept. 29, and again during a 19-19 tie at Transylvania on Oct. 28.

» The Payne brothers are from Poca, W.Va., and they were joined in the Marshall touchdown column against Norfolk State by another native West Virginian when defensive lineman **Owen Porter** (Huntington) recovered and returned a fumble 21 yards for a touchdown. The last time that three West Virginians scored in the same game for the Herd was on Oct. 6, 2001, during a 37-15 Marshall win at Northern Illinois. On that day, defensive lineman Orlando Washington (Accoville, W.Va.) recovered and returned a fumble 25 yards for a touchdown, wideout Denero Marriott (Inwood, W.Va.) caught a 31-yard touchdown pass from Byron Leftwich, and safety Michael Owens (Logan, W.Va.) intercepted a pass and returned it 25 yards for a touchdown.

Defense

- » Marshall's defense smothered the Spartans, allowing only a field goal late in third quarter after the Thundering Herd had taken a 55-0 lead. The Herd held Norfolk State to 114 total yards, 30 yards rushing, and five first downs. The Spartans ran only 45 offensive plays.
- » Norfolk State's five first downs were the fewest allowed by Marshall since a 27-0 win over Ohio in 1997, in which the Bobcats gained two first downs.
- » That 1997 game against Ohio was the last time that a Marshall opponent ran fewer than the 45 plays that Norfolk State ran - Ohio snapped the football 41 times that night.
- » Norfolk State's 114 yards of total offense were the fewest allowed by Marshall since a 20-3 win over Central Florida in 2004, in which Central Florida gained 104 yards (on 49 plays).

Special Teams

- » True freshman kicker **Rece Verhoff** made his Marshall debut one to remember by making both of his field goal attempts (30 and 27 yards) and knocking through all seven of his PAT attempts. Verhoff's 13 points scored tied him with several Marshall kickers for the eighth-most points in a game in school history. David Merrick set the school record with 15 points against East Tennessee State in 1993 and J.R. Jenkins matched that 15 against Miami (Ohio) in 2000. Marshall kickers have scored 14 points in a game five times.

Joan C. Edwards Stadium (capacity 30,475) serves as the home of the Thundering Herd. Marshall is one of two FBS programs to have a stadium named for a woman (South Carolina - Martha Williams-Brice).

Mrs. Edwards and her husband James (for whom the playing surface is named) were philanthropists who gave generously to Marshall University, the city of Huntington, and countless other causes. Mrs. Edwards is also the namesake of Marshall's performing arts center as well as the cancer center at Cabell Huntington Hospital.

Mrs. Edwards was born in London, England, but her family moved to New Orleans when she was four years old. By the age of 11 she was singing on WWL radio and went on to a jazz singing career that saw her perform in places like New York and Chicago. She married James F. Edwards in 1937 and moved to Huntington, where she eventually became CEO of her husband's mattress manufacturing company.

Among their business ventures, the Edwards family got into thoroughbred horse racing; they owned four tracks themselves, and Mrs. Edwards took an active role in renovating the tracks after they purchased them. They raced their horses in Canada, England, and Ireland, as well as the United States.
