COACHING STAFF

LARRY WILLIAMS

HEAD COACH

Larry Williams enters his fourth season as the head coach of the Hinds football program in 2020. Williams was the defensive coordinator for the Eagles prior to being named the head coach in 2017.



In 2019, Williams led the Eagles to a bowl berth in the Graphic Edge Bowl in Cedar Falls, Iowa as the team finished the season ranked eighth in the nation, according to the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA). Ten Eagles were recognized by the NJCAA and the Mississippi Association of Community and Junior Colleges (MACJC) while 17 Eagles inked with a four-year university on signing day.

In 2018, the Eagles were ranked as high as 13th by the NJCAA. Under Williams' tutelage, 11 Hinds Community College football players were recognized by the MACJC and NJCAA for outstanding play on the field.

In his first season, Williams led Hinds to a 6-3 overall record and the Eagles' first berth in the MACJC playoffs since 2013, rebounding nicely from a 2-7 finish in 2016. Five players from his 2017 squad received MACJC First Team All-State honors, including four who were named to the NJCAA All-Region 23 team. Additionally, three players received Second Team MACJC All-State Honors and 14 received honorable mention. His 2017 team also finished in the top 25 in 19 team statistical categories, including yards per game, first downs, third down conversions, third down conversion percentage, kick return average and red zone percentage.

Williams is no stranger to Mississippi junior college football. As a player, he led Mississippi Delta Trojans to an undefeated season and the 1993 NJCAA national championship. He made second-team NJCAA All-American in the process. He continued his playing career at Mississippi State University as a defensive end under former head coach Jackie Sherrill, where he led the Bulldogs in sacks in both 1994 and 1995 and was selected as the

Bulldogs' Most Valuable Defensive Player in the Peach Bowl. In the game, he collected a sack as well as a forced fumble and fumble recovery against North Carolina State to finish with 12.5 sacks for this career in Starkville.

He earned his bachelor's degree in interdisciplinary studies from Mississippi State after spending time with the NFL's Baltimore Ravens and the Scottish Claymores of the World League of American Football.

After his playing days, Williams returned to MDCC to begin his coaching career. He served as the Trojans' defensive coordinator and defensive line coach from 1997 to 2002. He helped guide Delta to a pair of state runner-up finishes (1997 and 2001). After MDCC, Williams was the defensive coordinator at Hinds from 2003 to 2009, leading the Eagles to a state runner-up finish his first year.

In 2012, he served as defensive coordinator at Copiah-Lincoln Community College, helping lead the Wolfpack to the 2012 MACJC state championship. He had spent the 2010 season as the defensive line coach at East Mississippi Community College. Williams returned to Hinds in 2013 and had an immediate impact on the Hinds defense. In his first season back in Raymond, his defensive unit finished 14th in the nation in total defense.

Williams currently resides in Raymond with his wife, Diane.



COACHING STAFF**KELLY MURPHY****ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH/OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR/OFFENSIVE LINE COACH/SPECIAL TEAMS**

Kelly Murphy begins his 12th season with the Hinds football program and his 11th as offensive coordinator in 2020. Murphy also enters his second year as the associate head coach and is also responsible for coaching the offensive linemen.



Last season, the Eagles offense averaged 26.3 points per game to help guide Hinds to a 7-3 record and their first bowl game since 2013.

In 2018, the Hinds offense put up more than 3,100 total yards and averaged 345.1 yards per game. His offense also featured one of the best rushing attacks in the NJCAA, averaging 163.7 yards per game.

In 2017, the Eagles finished in the top 25 nationally in eight offensive categories including yards per game, touchdown passes, yards per rush, first downs, third down conversions, rushing yards per game, red zone percentage and time of possession.

Since 2012, his offenses have finished ranked in the top 25 nationally more than 80 times in several categories. In 2010, Murphy coordinated one of the nation's most explosive offenses. Running back Matthew Willis finished fifth in the country in total rushing yards while quarterback Anthony Sheppard was 10th in the country in individual passing, as well as 18th in total individual offense. Willis was later named to the NJCAA All-American team for his exploits.

Since 2010, Murphy has seen 13 of his offensive players receive First Team All-Mississippi Association of Community and Junior Colleges (MACJC) honors and eight offensive players be selected to the All-NCJAA Region 23 team. Six players Murphy has coached have made National Football League rosters. Those include John Hightower, Javon Wims, Norman Price, Deon Anthony, James Summers and Matt Willis.

Murphy played for Hinds in 1997 and 1998 before spending the 1999 and 2000 seasons as a graduate assistant coach. During his time at Hinds, he was a part of two state championship teams, one in 1997 as a player, and one in 2000 as a graduate assistant coach. The Central Hinds Academy graduate also was part of the 1999 state runner-up team as a coach.

Murphy came to Hinds from Wayne County High School, where he served as the defensive coordinator and linebackers coach for a program that won the 2002 (5A), 2003 and 2006 (4A) State Championships. Murphy also won a 2A State Championship at Ackerman High School in his lone year at AHS in 2001. Murphy received a bachelor's degree from Mississippi State University and a master's degree from the University of Southern Mississippi. He and his wife Katie, a former Hinds cheerleader, live in Madison with their two sons, Thomas and Rhett, and a daughter, Lainey Kate.



COACHING STAFF**KEVIE THOMPSON****DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR/DEFENSIVE BACKS COACH**

Kevie Thompson enters his second season as the defensive coordinator for the Hinds football program in 2020.

Thompson's first season with the Eagles in 2019 was a huge success. His defense thrived in making big-time plays and finished the season nationally ranked in multiple categories, including third in interception return average (34.8), fifth in interception returns (9) and 12th in defensive touchdowns (3).

He joined Hinds after a successful run at perennial prep powerhouse Starkville High School, where he served as defensive coordinator, recruiting coordinator and ninth grade head. There, his defense was known for its aggressive style.

In just his first year at Starkville High School, Thompson led a dominate defensive force that allowed 11 points per game forcing three shutouts, 36 turnovers and 40 sacks en route to a 6A North state championship crown. During springs and summers the past eight years, he has volunteered alongside coaching counterparts in NCAA Division I powerhouses in the Southeastern Conference, including Todd Grantham, of the University of Florida and Travaris Robinson, of the University of South Carolina, also his college coach at the University of Southern Mississippi.

He started his coaching career at his alma mater, Raleigh High School, where he coached several athletes who went on to play Division I ball at the next level, including future NFL players Donte Moncrief, Woodrow Hamilton, Zach Edwards and Jalil Clemons.

He coached two seasons at Bethany College, in West Virginia, as the defensive back coach. In 2011, he helped lead Bethany College to an eight-win season, which hadn't been done in nearly 10 years. Also while at Bethany College, Thompson led a secondary group that finished second in the conference and 13th in the nation in pass defense. The year prior to his arrival, Bethany College was 10th in their conference and 85th in the nation respectively, in those two defensive categories.

After leaving Bethany College, he returned to RHS as the defensive back/special teams coordinator before moving on to spend two years at Madison Central High School (2013-14).

During his stint at Madison Central, Thompson coached more than 24 student-athletes who went on to play college football. Some of the most notable players were Trey Smith (University of Louisville) and Keenan Barnes (University of Louisiana at Lafayette).

As a player himself, Thompson made the Mississippi Bernard Blackwell All-Star team as a senior at RHS. He landed a football scholarship to Jones College, then moved on to USM where he played for then-head coach Larry Fedora, Robinson and current MSU tight ends coach Tony Hughes. He graduated with a bachelor's degree in education, with a minor in history.

**CHRIS MATTOX****RECRUITING COORDINATOR/RUNNING BACKS COACH**

Chris Mattox is in his fifth season with the Hinds football program in 2020 and serves as the running backs coach. Mattox is also the Eagle football staff's recruiting coordinator.

Prior to becoming the running backs coach in 2019, Mattox served as the wide receiver's coach for one year and the cornerbacks coach for two seasons. As the cornerbacks coach, Mattox saw two of his players earn First Team honors at both the MACJC and NJCAA All-Region 23 levels.

Mattox, of Palm Harbor, Fla., graduated from Clearwater Central Catholic High School. He received his bachelor's degree from the University of Central Florida before starting his coaching career in 2009 at Long Island University Post. Mattox then spent one year with the U.S. Merchant Marine Academy as the director of Football Operations.

In 2012, Mattox arrived at Hinds as the safeties coach before moving to Coahoma Community College, where he coached the defensive backs in 2013-14. In 2015, he was the co-defensive coordinator at Coffeyville Community College in Kansas. While at Coffeyville, Mattox coached Jamarcus King, the top junior college cornerback in 2015, and a defense that had seven National

Collegiate Athletic Association Division I signees.

In 2017, Mattox helped coach an Eagle secondary that finished in the top 25 nationally for interceptions and interception return yards. Mattox resides in Ridgeland with his wife, Devynn.

**OMARR CONNER****QUARTERBACKS COACH**

Omarr Conner returns for his second season as the quarterbacks coach for Hinds in 2020 after having spent the previous three years at the college as wide receivers coach.

Conner, of Macon, Miss., graduated from Noxubee County High School. During his playing career at Noxubee County, Conner was named to the Dandy Dozen, as a Parade All-American and as the Mississippi Player of the Year.

He moved on to Mississippi State University, where he started at wide receiver his freshman season in 2003 before being moved to quarterback and starting the next three seasons. He returned to his high school alma mater to start his coaching career.

He served as Noxubee's quarterbacks coach for one season before becoming the receivers coach at Yazoo County High School for three seasons. Conner then moved on to Louisville High School where he served as the offensive coordinator for

three seasons. While there, his offense helped win a state championship, in 2014.

In 2015, Conner returned to the college coaching ranks, as wide receivers coach for Hinds. Conner coached six receivers and two running backs who went to Division I programs following their careers at Hinds. Conner and his wife, the former Ashley Conner, have one daughter, Laiyla.

TRACY LAMPLEY

WIDE RECEIVERS COACH

Tracy Lampley enters his second season with the Hinds Community College football program in 2020. Lampley serves as the wide receivers coach. Lampley came to Hinds from Petal High School, where he spent three seasons in the same capacity. Lampley helped lead Petal to the south state championship game where they finished runner-up in 2016.



Previously, Lampley coached the wide receivers at Laurel High School. He spent three seasons there and won a state championship, in 2014.

Lampley graduated from Wayne County High School in 2009 before he attended the University of Southern Mississippi. Lampley started all four years at USM, both as a running back and a wide receiver. Lampley also served the special teams unit as the kick returner on kickoffs and punts. In 2011, he helped lead the Golden Eagles to a Conference USA title and was honored as the game's MVP. He finished his collegiate career with 4,759 total yards from scrimmage to go along with 10 touchdowns. He also finished with 847 punt return yards and two punt return touchdowns.

Dillon's tenure at Hinds has seen a remarkable amount of success, including 43 individual national championships and more than 180 All-Americans.

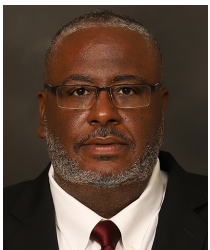
He was also named as the 2008 NJCAA Coach of the Year. Both his men's and women's teams have been ranked annually as one of the top programs in the nation.

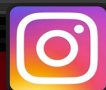

SEASON PREVIEW

The 2020 Hinds football program will look to build upon their successful 2019 campaign, where they competed in the Graphic Edge Bowl and finished ranked eighth in the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) with a 7-3 overall record.

OFFENSE

The Eagle's offense returns just eight players who were on the team last season. "This is a very young, but talented group of guys. We face a tough schedule to start the season, so it should be a good opportunity to introduce them to what Mississippi community college football is all about," said offensive coordinator Kelly Murphy.

The offense will be led by freshman dual-threat quarterback BeSean McCray (Orlando, Fla.). McCray is a transfer from the University of Central Arkansas. He will be backed up by freshman Kobe Dillon (Ferriday, La.).

At running back, the Eagles return sophomore Robert Jackson III (Lexington) who will split carries with freshman Dajon Richard (Patterson, La.). Richard is a transfer from the University of South Alabama.

At wide receiver, the Eagles return the dynamic talent of sophomores Jakarius Caston (Natchez) and Tabashi Thomas (Douglasville, Ga.). Caston will look to build upon his successful freshman campaign, where he tallied 208 receiving yards and hauled in two touchdowns. Thomas will also look to build upon his freshman season where he hauled in a team-leading four touchdowns and tallied 409 receiving yards. Caston and Thomas will be accompanied at wide receiver by freshmen Deontez White (Camden), and Jaiden Burns (Canton). Other receivers vying for time include freshmen Cade Shepherd (Flora), Jeffery Malone (Macon), Niselbyion Kirk

(Louisville), and Corey Wilson Jr. (Vicksburg).

Freshman Malik Banks (Yazoo City) and Sophomore Marquis Tenner (Flowood) will serve in the role of tight end/H-back for the Eagles in 2020.

The offensive line will be anchored by sophomores Ethan Boyd (Crystal Springs) and Jeremiah Brown (Canton). Freshmen Jonquez Roby (West Point), Chris Winston (Vicksburg), and Bryce Parkerson (Philadelphia) will look to fill the remainder of the starting line. Sophomores Antwuan Lampton (Lumberton) and Drake Diedrick (Florence) along with freshmen Joshua Johnson (Clarksdale), Braidron Hodo (Greenwood), and Justin Bryant (Pearl) will provide depth on the offensive line.

DEFENSE

The Eagle's defense also returns just eight players who were on the team last season. "We return a few leaders from our defense last season, but there will be a lot of new faces on the field for us this season. We look forward to being fast, physical, and aggressive," said defensive coordinator Kevie Thompson.

The defensive line will be led by sophomores Jaylen Heffner (Batesville), Jaylon Ned (Lake Charles, La.), and Stefon Smith (Indianola). The trio combined to collect 69 tackles and 8 ½ sacks in 2019. Freshman Jaylen Ware (Starkville) rounds out the projected starting defensive line. Sophomores JaQuez Jackson (Monroe, La.) and Vertez Shorter (Vicksburg) along with freshmen Reginald Barnes (Pascagoula) and Justin Lee (Columbia) will provide depth to Eagle's defensive line in 2020.

The linebacker corps will be led by sophomore Ryan Davis (Clinton) and freshman Malik Sims. As a freshman last season, Davis collected 15 tackles including one sack. Also vying for time at linebacker for the Eagles, will be sophomore Albert Day (Camden) and freshman Thaddeus Bishop (Jackson).

The Eagles secondary will feature just one returner in sophomore Artavious Washington (Lexington). Washington returns following a stellar freshman campaign, where he recorded 17 tackles and one interception. The other projected starters in the secondary include freshmen Khiry Gee (Starkville), Ta'Darrius Williams (Hollandale), Jaylen Knight (Hattiesburg), and Sharman Holmes (Madison). Depth will be provided in the secondary by freshmen Kaleb Mosley (Louisville), Emahd Dabney (Jackson), Anthony Bullock (Columbia), Erick Short (Jackson), and Austin Day (Philadelphia).

SPECIAL TEAMS

Two talented sophomores Connor Smith (Vicksburg) and Houston Smith (Flowood) will handle the kicking duties for the Eagles in 2020. Connor Smith will serve as the kicker following his freshman campaign, where he was perfect both on field goals and extra points in 2019. Houston Smith will serve as the punter following his breakout freshman season, where he averaged 39.2 yards per punt and tallied 1,801 total punting yards.

Cade Shepherd will serve as the holder and freshman Earnest Wade (Lexington) will serve as the long snapper.

The kickoff and punt returners for the Eagles will be Jakarius Caston and Dajon Richard. Caston looks to build upon his 2019 season where he averaged 29.9 yards per kick return.

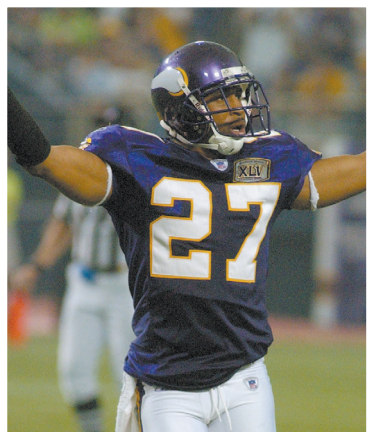

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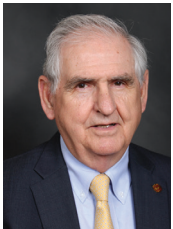
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As the largest community college in Mississippi and the fourth-largest institution of higher education in the state, Hinds Community College offers a full slate of varsity teams for student-athletes.

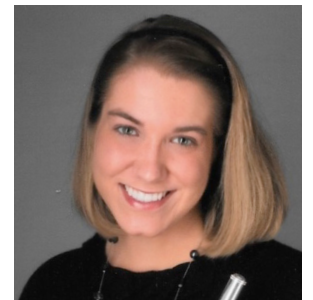

The Young Alumnus of the Year recognizes an alumnus of Hinds, under the age of 40, who has attained significant professional, personal or community success.

The recipients of the inaugural awards are President Emeritus Dr. Clyde Muse for the Foundation/Alumni Hall of Fame Award and Dr. Christy Granberry Barrick (2005) for the Young Alumnus of the Year.

Receiving the Alumnus of the Year Award is William Dunlap (1964). The Alumni Service Award recipient is Ken Coomes of Brandon.

Sports Hall of Fame inductees are Mike Burch, football, 1986-1987; Jeffrey Fields, football, 1986-1987; Dwayne Green, soccer, 1984-1987; Phyllis Rhodes Krebs, basketball, 1981-1983 and Jeff Long, baseball, 1987-1989.

Recipients will be recognized in a ceremony, 4 p.m., Oct. 29 at Cain-Cochran Hall on the Raymond Campus. The event is free and open to the public.

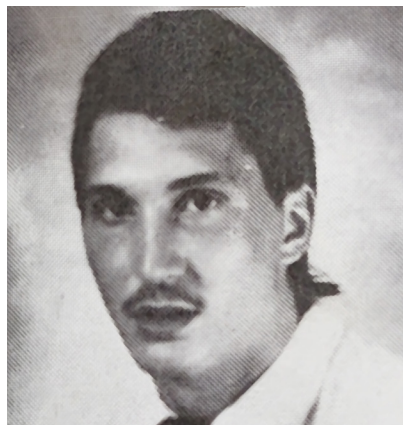
MIKE BURCH FOOTBALL, 1986-1987

Mobile, Ala., native Mike Burch led the Eagles back to prominence on the gridiron in the mid-1980s with both toughness and smarts.

Originally a signee of the University of Alabama, Burch transferred to Hinds in 1986. A season later, he led an offense that ranked among the best junior colleges in the nation. He helped account for 3,457 total yards, including 1,761 passing, during a 10-3 sophomore season that resulted in the college's first South State championship and first bowl berth in 30 years.

Athletic Director Gene Murphy, who at the time was in his first season as head coach, termed Burch as one of the toughest quarterbacks he ever coached – one that could beat a defense with his arm, his feet and his head. He was selected to both the first-team All-State and first-team All-Region 23, as well as an honorable mention on the junior college All-America team. The 5,218 total yards the offense racked up during Burch's two seasons in Raymond is still a record.

After Hinds, he transferred to Emporia State University, in Kansas, where in 1989 he led his team to the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) national championship game.

JEFFREY FIELDS FOOTBALL, 1986-1987

Along with his fellow 2020 Hinds Sports Hall of Fame inductee, Jeffrey Fields helped guide the Eagles back to football prominence during the mid-1980s.

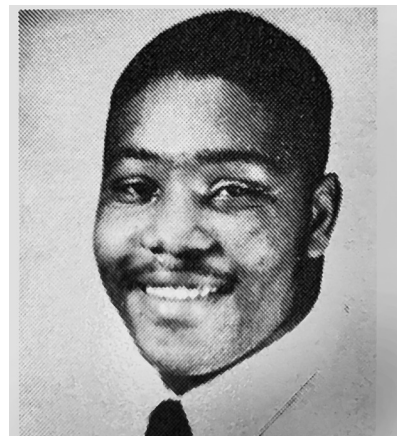
Fields, a Jackson native and Jim Hill High School product, helped anchor the defensive side of the ball from his defensive tackle position.

He was selected a team captain during his sophomore season, one in which the Eagles won 10 games overall and set several records. The team won its first South State championship and earned a spot in the Mid-America Bowl in Tulsa, Okla., which was the Eagles' first bowl game in 30 years up to then.

He finished the 1987 campaign with 65 tackles, with 42 of them solo – a spectacular total for a defensive lineman. His performance earned him first-team All-State, firstteam All-Region and second-team All-American, as well as being named defensive MVP.

His football career after Hinds took him to Jonesboro, Ark., where he played for Arkansas State University. In 1991, he was selected in the ninth round of the NFL Draft by the Los Angeles Rams, then spent three seasons in the Canadian Football League and one season each with the Carolina Panthers and New Orleans Saints.

Since 1996, he has worked with CN in Baton Rouge, where he is a locomotive engineer.

DWAYNE GREEN **SOCCER, 1984-1987**

Dwayne Green was a three-year letterman at Forest Hill High School in Jackson when recruited by Hinds soccer coach Tom Shepherd in 1984.

At Hinds, Green played three seasons on the club soccer team and led the team in goals, with 90 of them in 36 games. At the time, the club soccer team played both club and varsity squads from four-year schools. He continued his education and soccer career at Mississippi State University, where he was the Bulldogs' leading scorer on a soccer club team, was player-coach during his senior season and earned a bachelor's degree in electrical engineering.

Currently, he is employed with the Federal Aviation Administration in Fayetteville, Ga., as a lead program engineer. He's also a national troubleshooter for Instrumentation Landing Systems.

Since college, he has coached youth soccer teams in Mississippi and Georgia that have contended for regional and national titles.

PHYLLIS RHODES **KREBS** **BASKETBALL,** **1981-1983**

Pelahatchie native Phyllis Rhodes Krebs came to Hinds in 1981 as a three-time All Sub-District and All-District and All-State basketball standout at East Rankin Academy, where she also played softball and ran track. Her basketball upbringing in high school was shaped while playing for her father, head coach Billy Rhodes (1961), a 2013 inductee to the Hinds Sports Hall of Fame.

At Hinds, she played two years for the Lady Eagles hoopsters, averaging 14.5 points a game her first season and 10 points a game her second. She was the team's Most

Valuable Player and the first female recipient of the Eagle Award, the highest honor for a student athlete at the college.

She excelled in the classroom as well, serving as president of Phi Theta Kappa honor society and secretary of the student government programming committee. She was also named to the list of "Who's Who" among American junior college students.

After Hinds, she graduated with a degree in education from the University of Southern Mississippi and has been an educator herself, at both Pearl and Brandon high schools then at Hartfield Academy, where she is chair of the math department. She has been recognized as an outstanding teacher multiple times in her teaching career.

JEFF LONG **BASEBALL, 1987-1989**

A star performer on the diamond and off, Jeff Long was part of a history-making team of achievers during his time at Hinds. Long, of Meadville and a Clinton High School product, played shortstop and made All-State both of his seasons in Raymond. He was a team captain and part of history in 1989, when the Eagles won a fourth straight South Division title, their second Mississippi Association of Community and Junior Colleges title in a three-year span and took the college's first Region 23 championship.

The 1989 Eagle baseball team didn't stop there, as they became the first Mississippi community college team to play in the JUCO World Series, then held in Colorado. Long's production was key, as he hit .348, scored 72 runs, had a .511 on-base percentage and had 23 runs batted in.

He continued his collegiate baseball career at Delta State University, where he earned All-Gulf South Conference and All-Region honors in 1991 and played for former Hinds head baseball coach Bill Marchant. Later, he played semipro baseball for nine years and was inducted into the Mississippi Semipro Hall of Fame. He earned a master's degree in education from Delta State and in recent years has been a successful boys and girls soccer coach. His coaching stops include time at Warren Central, Clinton and, most recently, Franklin County high schools. In 2009, he was named Coach of the Year by the Clarion Ledger.

2020 YOUNG ALUMNUS OF THE YEAR

YOUNG ALUMNUS' STELLAR ACCOMPLISHMENTS BEGAN AT HINDS

Once upon a time as a little girl, **DR. CHRISTY GRANBERRY BARRICK (2005)** rode her bicycle on the Raymond Campus. She wasn't exactly born on the grounds, but Hinds Community College was in her blood from the beginning.

She said, laughing, "I grew up knowing I was going to go to Hinds. When my classmates dreamed of going on to a university, I knew that Hinds was absolutely, 100 percent where I would start my college education. It was not that I had to start at Hinds; I wanted to."

She finished her doctorate in nursing practice in 2019 while working and raising two children, Riley, 8, and Cooper, 5, with husband Dustin, a coach at Germantown High School. Now at age 35, she is an acute care nurse practitioner at the University of Mississippi Medical Center where she manages critically ill trauma and surgery patients at the state's only level 1 trauma center. The family is also very involved in Broadmoor Baptist Church.

She has authored and implemented a new protocol at UMMC that has changed certain aspects of care for ICU patients. This work has led to her being the primary author for three publications and she was asked to present at a national conference this year.

For her educational and career accomplishments, Barrick is the recipient of Hinds Community College's inaugural Young Alumnus of the Year Award.

Her work ethic won't be a surprise to anyone who knows her mother, Hinds Community College Foundation Executive Director Jackie Granberry.

"Hinds has always been a family to me, and the people that I met at Hinds are lifelong friends. I feel like I got the foundation I needed to be successful in college, but I also learned much more," she said. "I had some of the best instructors that I have had in my educational journey. They cared about me and encouraged me — Beverly Fatherree, Sharon Feaster, Jason Webb, and Coach Terri Black."

Another person was recruiting coordinator Reggie Harris, with whom she worked in Hinds Connection from 2003-2005.

The highlight of her Hinds experience was Hinds Connection, the college's student public relations and recruiting group that is highly visible at college events.

"Through Hinds Connection, I was able to meet a lot of people and be involved in a leadership role," she said.

Barrick first became a Hinds student when she dually enrolled as a high school junior. After graduating Magna Cum Laude in 2005, she went on to nursing school at Delta State University, also graduating Magna Cum Laude there in 2008 with a Bachelor of Science in Nursing. She received both her master and doctorate degrees at the University of Mississippi Medical Center in 2014 and 2019.

"Just learning to work hard and work well with others, working together as a team, and learning to work with people from different backgrounds, different ways of life, different personalities has helped me throughout my career," Barrick said. "I learned much of that at Hinds."

RETIRED PRESIDENT RECEIVES INAUGURAL HALL OF FAME AWARD

After a long and distinguished career serving Mississippi education and 42 years as Hinds Community College's leader, Dr. Clyde Muse retired on June 30. He now holds the distinguished title of President Emeritus.

He became president of Hinds on July 1, 1978, and led the college through both good and turbulent periods. The college flourished with an expansion of programs, facilities and campuses, but also dealt with dwindling state resources.

His unprecedented accomplishments and love for students have resulted in his being the recipient of the inaugural Foundation/Alumni Hall of Fame Award, which recognizes someone who has demonstrated genuine interest and support of the college over an extended period of time and is the highest honor presented by the Foundation and Alumni Association. However, this isn't the first alumni-related award presented to the Muse family. The late Vashti Muse in 2008 was the recipient of the Alumni Service Award. The Hall of Fame award is a tribute to both Muses' lifetime of service.

"To be given the opportunity over nearly 68 years of my life, to be in a position that I could be of service to others, was a great blessing to me," Dr.

Muse said. "I see this award as a testament for me in that my life has always been about service."

He began his college career at what is now East Central Community College with no money but a desire for an education and a job to pay his way.

"The thing I kept thinking in the back of my mind was, 'If you go to Hinds, you are going to have the opportunity over many occasions to help individuals go to school who don't have that opportunity because of the circumstances they find themselves in. They don't have the money, but they've got a desire to go,'" Dr. Muse said.

He is best known for his soft spot for students, always putting them at the center of decisions. "I came here to help to serve people and to serve those students that come to Hinds by putting them first," he said.

His dedication to providing opportunity to students inspired the creation of the Hinds Community College Foundation as a vehicle to accept donations.

"It is fitting that Dr. Muse be the first recipient of this new award, mainly because of his 42 years of service to the Hinds Foundation and Alumni but especially since he is responsible for starting the Hinds Community College Foundation," said Jackie Granberry, Foundation executive director.

The Foundation sponsored the Celebrating the Muse Legacy Luncheon on Feb. 20, a fundraiser for the Muse Legacy Endowment that will support projects dear to Dr. Muse's heart: scholarships, faculty and staff development, and community service. The COVID-19 pandemic forced the cancellation of subsequent events and the endowment fell short of its \$250,000 goal.

2020 ALUMNUS OF THE YEAR

BILL DUNLAP (1964) says his introduction to the Hinds family came as a result of a different art form than the one for which he's now internationally known.

"I was a lifeguard at Roosevelt State Park in Scott County during the summer of 1962, my senior year in high school," Dunlap said. "In mid-August, I got a fateful call from Al Rowan, the band director at Hinds at the time. He told me he could use a drummer for an upcoming trip to Atlantic City, New York and then on to Niagara Falls. Could I make it? I assured Mr. Rowan, who we were to affectionately call 'Daddio' that I wasn't too busy."

Dunlap, a Webster County native, who has been named 2020 Alumnus of the Year, graduated from Hinds in 1964, then earned a bachelor's degree from Mississippi College and a master's degree in fine arts from the University of Mississippi.

A lifetime of success in the art world hasn't dulled Dunlap's broad-stroked appreciation for his time at Hinds.

"My two years at Hinds were significant and crucial," he said. "I was to be taught by inspired scholars – grown-ups who cared about us and their areas of interest and subject matter. They were as good and dedicated as any teachers I was to have anywhere."

After college, he spent three years as a graduate assistant at Ole Miss, then an assistant art instructor at Hinds, teaching alongside longtime economics and art instructor Katherine Denton. "She was such a positive influence on me when I was a student," he said.

He began his career in art education in 1970 at Appalachian State University in North Carolina. He has also taught at Memphis State University and has lectured on art at universities and professional conferences nationwide while working as an exhibiting artist.

Since 1988, he has been arts commentator at WETA-TV, the PBS affiliate in Washington, D.C., where he has also hosted the network's Emmy award-winning cultural roundtable show "Around Town." He maintains art studios in McLean, Va., Coral Gables, Fla., and Mathiston, Miss.

His contemporaries in the extended community of arts instructors and graduates from Hinds includes Bob Dunaway, former Art Department chair and currently a professor emeritus at the college.

"Bill attended Mississippi College when I was teaching there," Dunaway noted in his nomination of Dunlap for the award. "Although he was enrolled in my class, it was a tossup as to who taught who what. His depth of respect for the medium in use at the time and the philosophical views he expressed in the work seemed to me far beyond the normal level of an undergraduate student."

His work, which he has dubbed Hypothetical Realism, has exhibited internationally and been included in numerous public and private collections near and far, including the Lauren Rogers Museum in Laurel, the Mississippi Museum of Art, Ogden Museum of Southern Art in New Orleans, the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York, the National Gallery of Art in D.C., the State Department and U.S. embassies around the world.

KEN COOMES grew up in Vicksburg as the third-oldest in a family of 12 children. At 14, Coomes went to work and gave his money to his family – the only way they could pay the bills.

“My mom used to tell me there were blessings in poverty,” said Coomes, who is the 2020 Alumni Service Award winner. “I would tell her she could have all of mine. My father worked several jobs for a beverage distribution company owned by my mom’s cousin and I asked him one time what success is. He said, ‘It’s being happy with where you are and what you have at the present time.’ I hold close to those words every day. Somehow, it keeps me focused.”

When any of the boys in the family turned eight, they went to work to help their father on the truck route. At 16, Coomes and his brothers went to work at a Jitney Jungle store in Vicksburg. All paychecks still went to dad so the bills could be paid.

“We didn’t have cellphones or computers, or games or air conditioners,” he said. “Some places we lived didn’t have running water. We had a well and we bathed in a washtub on the back porch. We didn’t have money for Christmas or birthdays, but we did have loving parents who taught us how to love and support one another.”

He felt college wasn’t an option for him due to cost, but he set out to fuel what he calls “a burning desire to get ahead in life” through hard work. The result has been a successful business career and a lifetime of service to Hinds Community College and education in general.

At 20, he bought an old truck and began a vending route. Persistence and hard work led to other routes and a growing business. Now, 46 years later, he owns Coomes Distributors Inc., in Brandon. Operating primarily in snack food vending, the company has annual revenues of more than \$1.5 million.

A member of the Hinds Community College Foundation Board of Directors, Coomes’ support for Hinds has involved ensuring the kinds of educational opportunities for children that didn’t come his way. Each of his five children, Jake, Jordan, Chris, Mindy and Monica, attended Hinds. Already the benefactor for the Ken Coomes Endowed Scholarship, he provided another scholarship in memory of his mother following her death in 2018.

“There are so many people who deserve this award, but it’s my honor to accept it this year,” Coomes said. “It has been rewarding to work with Hinds for the past 30 years because I’ve seen lives change.”

His participation in events to raise funds for scholarships through the Hinds Community College Foundation include placing teams each year in two golf tournament fundraisers, the Golf Fun Fest at Eagle Ridge and the Clyde Donnell and Othel Mendrop Memorial tournament at Clear Creek in Warren County.

FOWLER INDUCTED INTO MACJC SPORTS HALL OF FAME

Hinds retiree **DOUG FOWLER** is humble about the honors he's received after his long career at Hinds Community College.

"All the accolades I've received have happened because of Hinds Community College and having great athletes," Fowler said. "I've been at the right place at the right time, particularly being around good people like Bill Buckner, Dr. Clyde Muse and the rest of the Hinds family."

This past spring, Fowler was inducted into the Mississippi Association of Community and Junior Colleges Sports Hall of Fame. The April induction ceremony was cancelled because of statewide closures due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Fowler attended Grenada High School and studied pre-engineering at Holmes Junior College after serving in the U.S. Navy. He went on to earn a bachelor's degree in physical education with a minor in mathematics from Delta State University in 1966. His master's degree in physical education and athletic administration is from the University of Southern Mississippi. He also holds a master's certification in school administration from Mississippi College.

He taught math and driver's education and coached track, football and basketball at Philadelphia High School from 1967-1969, then spent 10 years at Quitman High School.

He began work at Hinds in 1979 wearing three hats in the coaching and instructing realm – as track and field coach, assistant football coach and math instructor.

His track and field teams from 1979-1984 developed the sport into a formidable program at Hinds, winning three state championships and competing in the National Junior College Championship. In his first year, he was named Coach of the Year by the Mississippi Association of Community and Junior Colleges.

His contemporaries remembered him as a resilient coach who was a mentor to his student-athletes.

"He's a great guy who always had a brilliant smile even if things got rough," said Lester Walls, an area representative with the Fellowship of Christian Athletes who succeeded Fowler as head track coach.

As an assistant football coach during the same period, he developed stellar student-athletes and was twice named to coach the Junior College All-Star team, in 1981 and 1983.

In 1981, Fowler took on the duties of district director of janitorial services, which later added the areas of energy and maintenance services. In 1987, he went full-time into administrative work as district director of facilities until he retired from Hinds in 1995.

He's also a past state director of the Mississippi Association of Coaches, from 1991-2002, and also served as director of janitorial services at Mississippi College for three years after retiring from Hinds. His work with the FCA includes service on its board of directors from 1985 to 2008.

In 2008, he was inducted into the Mississippi Association of Coaches Hall of Fame, then a year later was similarly inducted into the Hinds Sports Hall of Fame. In 2019, he was inducted into the National High School Coaches Association Hall of Fame.

His wife is the former Karen Truitt. They are the parents of William Bryan Fowler, Shelley Fowler McLeod and Bradley Edward Fowler. They have seven grandchildren.
