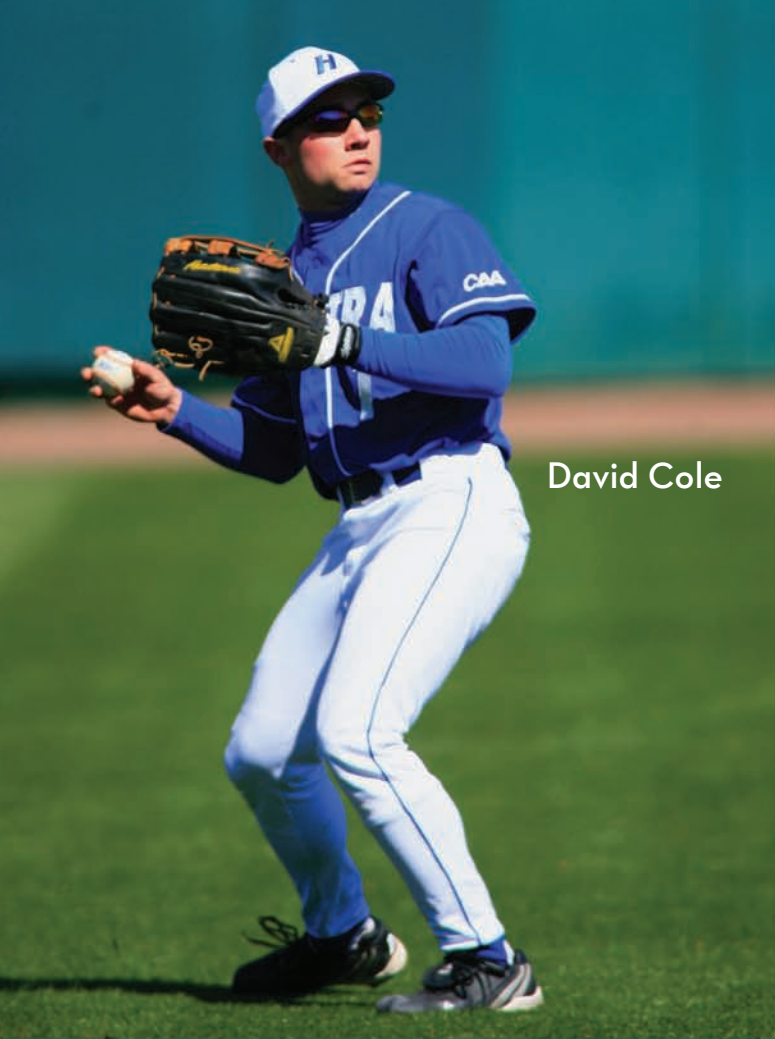

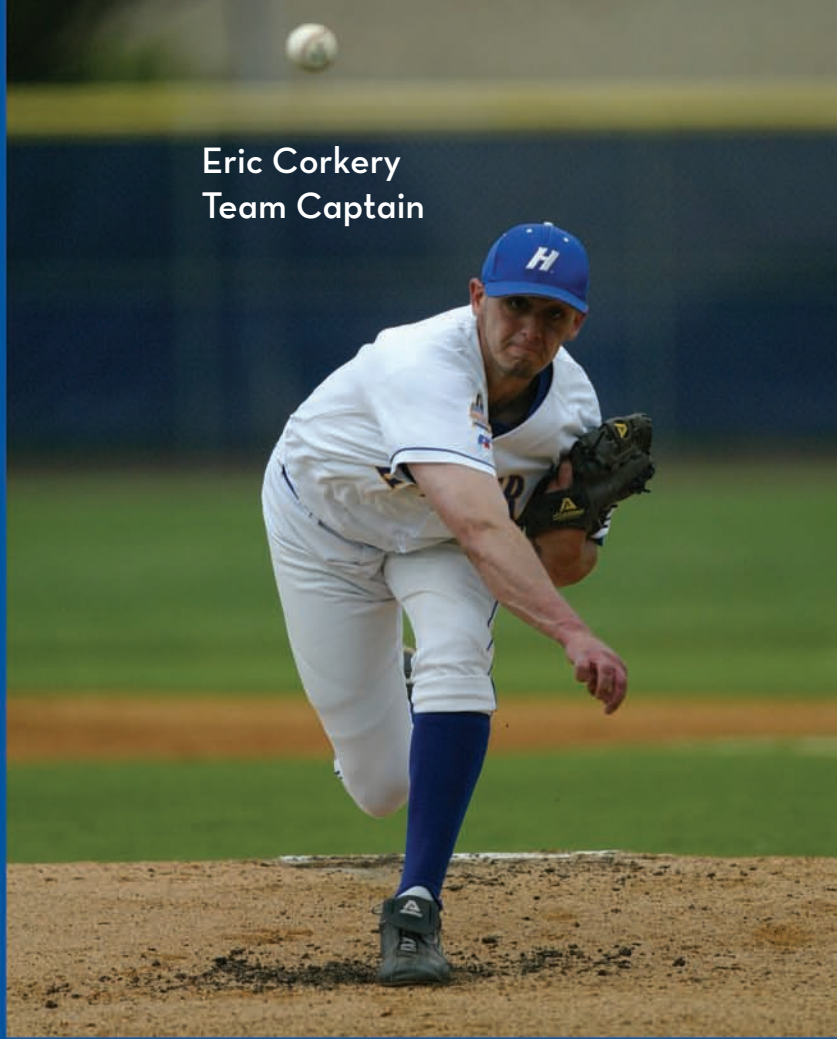

What has remained consistent throughout the years, however, is the sense of community on campus, the eagerness of our students to learn and the commitment of the Hofstra faculty and administration to provide a challenging education that encourages the pursuit of lifelong learning.

The Colleges and Schools of the University are: Hofstra College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, Frank G. Zarb School of Business, New College of Hofstra, School of Communication, School of Education and Allied Human Services, School of Law, School for University Studies, University College for Continuing Education, Honors College and Saturday College. Bachelor's degrees are offered in

Hofstra University provides a dynamic college experience tailored for innately ambitious, outcome-oriented individuals. Students find their edge at Hofstra, through small classes, a faculty whose primary concern is teaching, cutting edge technology, extensive library resources, internships, and special educational programs that appeal to their interests and abilities. The Hofstra community is driven, dynamic and energetic, helping students find and focus their strengths to prepare them for a successful future.

In its relatively short history, Hofstra has established itself as a world-class institution of higher education and cultural enterprise. Each academic year, the Hofstra campus and the programs offered grow and change

to meet the demands of our students and our community.

Hofstra opened in 1935 as a commuter school with all classes and offices housed in one building. Since those early days, Hofstra has evolved into an international institution with a student body hailing from 46 states and territories, and 65 countries around the world. The beautiful campus is an accredited arboretum with 113 buildings on 240 acres. There are approximately 4,200 students living on campus, and Hofstra offers them and all students an extensive array of academic and social activities. Additionally, Hofstra's close proximity to Manhattan means that students have easy access to the wondrous cultural, social and career offerings of the city.



140 areas of study. Graduate degrees are offered, including Ph.D., Ed.D., Psy.D., Au.D. and J.D. degrees, advanced certificates and professional diplomas, in more than 150 programs of study.

Recently, the University celebrated the opening of Hagedorn Hall, the new home of our School of Education and Allied Human Services. In 2001 Hofstra University Honors College welcomed its first class. This new division of the University proved to be an immediate success, not only with University faculty and administrators, but among the 93 inaugural



students. Every fall since, the number of entering freshmen has increased substantially.

Hofstra's School of Communication is one of the largest, most advanced non-commercial television facilities in the East. Students take classes and work in Dempster Hall, a sophisticated television production/post-production facility with two broadcast-quality studios and control rooms; two advanced online video edit suites; two Avid non-linear digital editing systems and several cuts-only video work stations. Two satellite dishes are available with one dish providing special news feeds for the broadcast journalism room, which also has access to *Associated Press*, *Lexis-Nexis* and *Dow Jones* services. In addition, the facility is capable of broadcasting student-produced programming to the entire campus on our own cable channels. Also located here is the University's radio station (WRHU/88.7-FM), audio production studios, a film/video screening room, film editing rooms, a computer laboratory, a speech performance studio and a large dance studio.

Hofstra's C.V. Starr Hall offers academic facilities that are among the most technologically advanced in the nation. Every seat in every classroom allows students direct access to the Internet and Hofstra network, including the resources of Hofstra's Axinn Library.

Hofstra's growing computer facilities offer extensive high-tech training opportunities. There are computer terminals throughout the campus for student and faculty use, with more

than 750 PC, Macintosh and UNIX workstations available in labs and classrooms. The University was ranked 14th in *Forbes'* list of Most Connected Campuses in 2004, up from 18 in 2003.

Hofstra hosts more than 500 cultural events annually, bringing thousands of scholars, dignitaries and other participants to campus. More than 200 musical and dramatic performances take place on campus each year.

The Hofstra Museum, which houses one of the largest art collections in the metropolitan area, coordinates approximately 12 exhibitions annually and offers exhibition areas and an extensive outdoor sculpture collection, with more than 65 pieces. The Hofstra Museum is accredited by the American Association of Museums – one of only 94 universities in the nation and one of six in New York to hold that distinction.

Hofstra also has seven theaters, a student newspaper, a lively student center, a recreation center and numerous athletic facilities, including the 13,000-seat James M. Shuart Stadium and the 5,046-seat David S. Mack Sports and Exhibition Complex. Hofstra also has an indoor, Olympic-sized (eight lane, 50-meter) swimming pool, one of the largest such facilities in the New York metropolitan area.

The Hofstra athletic program competes on the NCAA Division I level and is a member of the Colonial Athletic Association. The University sponsors 18 intercollegiate



programs – nine men's sports and nine women's sports. Hofstra has men's teams in basketball, football, baseball, lacrosse, golf, tennis, wrestling, soccer and cross country. Women's sports include basketball, volleyball, softball, tennis, soccer, field hockey, lacrosse, cross country and golf. The 18 men's and women's intercollegiate athletic teams compete in more than 150 home contests annually.

Hofstra's academic programs are accredited by numerous national agencies and the University is one of only 270 schools, out of more than 3,600 colleges and universities nationwide, with a chapter of the national honor society Phi Beta Kappa. Of Hofstra's 1,206 faculty members, 532 are full time and 90 percent hold the highest degree in their fields. The average undergraduate class size is 23 students, while student-faculty ratio is 14-to-1.

Hofstra University is 100-percent program accessible to persons with disabilities, and has been cited as a national model for this achievement.

HEAD BASEBALL COACH CHRIS DOTOLO



Chris Dotolo is now in his seventh season as head coach of the Hofstra Baseball program. Dotolo, the 12th baseball coach in Hofstra history, took over the reigns of the program when Hofstra joined the competitive Colonial Athletic Association in 2002. In his six seasons, Dotolo has posted a 106-208-1 record. Dotolo is just the third Hofstra coach to win 100 games for the Pride, a feat he accomplished with a 10-9 win over James Madison

on April 21, 2007, joining Jack Smith (179 wins) and Rich Martin (127 wins).

The Pride posted their third consecutive 20-win season in 2007 and their 11 CAA victories tied their best showing since joining the CAA in 2002, matching the mark set in 2006. Freshman Matt Prokopowicz starred for Dotolo, earning CAA Rookie of the Year honors while also garnering several Freshman All-America accolades, including *Baseball America*.

The 2006 season saw the Pride post a 24-31-1 record, the second consecutive 24-win campaign in Dotolo's tenure and the first time the Pride has won 24 games in back to back seasons since 1994 and 1995. The Pride also posted 11 conference victories, the most since joining the league in 2002. The 2006 season also saw one of Dotolo's first recruits – third baseman Ricky Caputo – get drafted by the Washington Nationals in the Major League Baseball Draft, marking the first time since 1995 that a Hofstra player has been selected in the MLB Draft (Mike Miller, Detroit Tigers).

In 2005 Dotolo led the Pride to a 24-32 overall record, a 10-14 conference record and the programs first trip to postseason since 1998 – a spot in the six-team Colonial Athletic Association Tournament. The 24 wins marked just the seventh time in 65 years that a Hofstra Baseball team has posted 20+ wins in a season and the teams overall seven game improvement from 2004's 14-36 record ranked 22nd in the nation. In addition, the 2005 squad broke eight team records and tied one other, while eight players set team individual single season records.

Dotolo has also increased the talent level of the Pride and in 2004, two of Dotolo's recruits – Mike Walsh and Caputo – were named to the All-CAA first and second teams, respectively, marking the first time that Hofstra had more than a single all-conference selection. The Pride followed that up with four second team selections – Caputo, Josh Stewart, Matt Kougasian and Jeff Denlea – in 2005. Kougasian was also named to the CAA All-Rookie squad.

Since his arrival at Hofstra, Dotolo has upgraded all facets of the program. The team plays a rigorous non-conference schedule that has included trips to Auburn, Florida, Florida State, North Carolina State and the College of Charleston. Dotolo spearheaded a renovation of University Field that resulted in sunken dugouts, a Competition Turf infield, an improved drainage system and a new scoreboard.



Dotolo brought an extensive baseball background to the Pride. He had been an assistant coach for seven years, including five on the Division I level, and also played four seasons of professional baseball. Before accepting his current position he spent two seasons as an assistant coach at St. John's University in Jamaica, New York. At St. John's, Dotolo worked with the catchers, outfielders and hitters, and served as the recruiting coordinator.

Before arriving at St. John's, Dotolo spent four years (1995-99) as an assistant coach at Dartmouth College in Hanover, New Hampshire. While with the Big Green, he worked with the infielders and outfielders in addition to coordinating all team travel, organizing practices and overseeing the ordering of equipment and maintenance of the baseball facility.

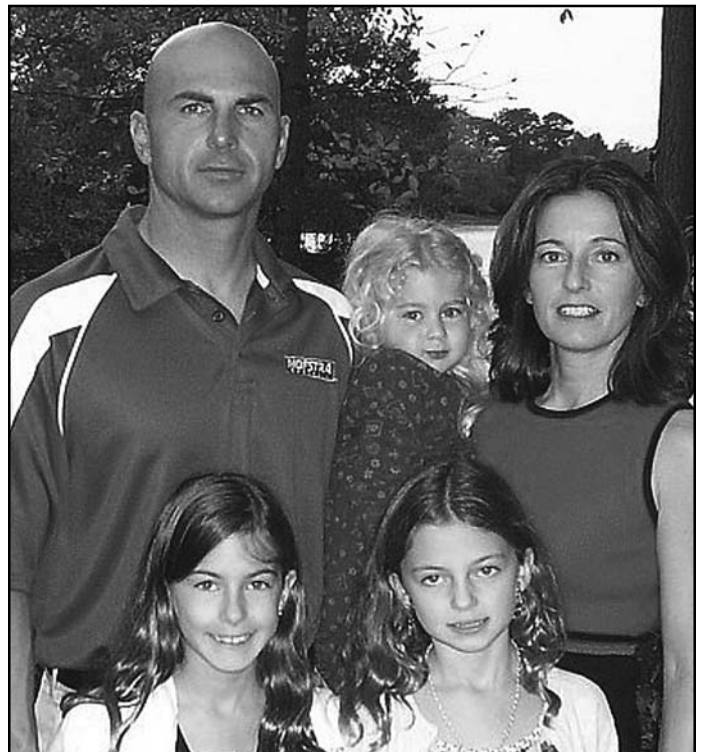
In addition to his Division I coaching experience, Dotolo served as an assistant coach for one season (1994-95) at Mary Washington College in Fredericksburg, Virginia and for one season (1995) at The Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C. He has also coached in the prestigious Cape Cod Baseball League, serving as assistant coach with the Harwich Mariners in the summer of 1995.



Prior to joining the coaching ranks, Dotolo played four seasons (1991-94) in the San Francisco Giants (MLB) organization, finishing his career in the Pacific Coast League (AAA) with the Phoenix Firebirds in 1994.

A former two-time all conference selection in the Old Dominion Athletic Conference, Dotolo graduated from Virginia Wesleyan College in Virginia Beach, Virginia in 1991 with a bachelor's in history. He also spent two years at Virginia Commonwealth University in Richmond, Virginia, and was a member of the 1988 squad that advanced to the NCAA Division I Regionals. Dotolo earned a master's in sports administration from George Mason University in 1997.

Dotolo and his wife, Lily, have three daughters – Gina (10), Savanna (8) and Maria (3).

ASSISTANT COACHES

ASA GRUNENWALD ASSISTANT COACH

Asa Grunenwald, a four-year letterwinner and two-year starter at St. John's University, is in his fifth season as an assistant coach at Hofstra University and his third as the Pride's lead assistant. Grunenwald coordinates Hofstra's recruiting efforts and coaches the Pride's pitchers and catchers.



Grunenwald's recruiting efforts have brought many talented players to the Pride, including 2007 CAA Rookie of the Year and Freshman All-American Matt Prokopowicz. Under his direction last season senior pitcher Charlie Frago turned in one of the finest seasons by a Pride pitcher, posting a 4-2 record and a 3.61 ERA. The 3.61 ERA ranked as the seventh best in Hofstra's single season record book and was the lowest mark since Justin Romano's 3.23 ERA in 1996.

Having played for the Red Storm from 1999 through 2003, Grunenwald was team captain as a senior and was rated the best defensive catcher in the Big East by *Baseball America* and *Collegiate Baseball*. He appeared in 129 games for St. John's, starting 98 and batted .248 for his career with 14 doubles, one triple, four home runs and 46 RBIs. In his career, Grunenwald posted a .974 fielding percentage. During his first two collegiate seasons, Grunenwald was coached by current Hofstra Coach Chris Dotolo.

A solid student, Grunenwald was a four-year member of the Big East Academic All-Star team and was awarded the St. Vincent DePaul Society Scholarship for Academic Excellence.

Prior to joining the Hofstra staff, Grunenwald served as assistant coach of the Vermont Mountaineers of the New England Collegiate Baseball League, as well as serving as the Mountaineer's Baseball Camp director.

In addition to his playing experience at St. John's, Grunenwald has played in the New England Collegiate Baseball League

(Manchester Silkworms), the Coastal Plains League (Outer banks Daredevils) and the Northeast Collegiate Baseball League (Wellsville Nitros).

Grunenwald, a native of Boalsburg, Pennsylvania, graduated from St. John's with a degree in mathematics in December 2003.

Grunenwald is engaged to Kerri Jantzen, a former Hofstra Field Hockey assistant coach and player, and resides in Forest Hills, New York.

JOSH STEWART ASSISTANT COACH

Josh Stewart, a three-year letterman for the Pride, is in his third season as an assistant coach at his alma mater. Stewart will work with the outfielders and assist Coach Dotolo in instructing the Pride's hitters.



Under Stewart's tutelage last season the Pride had five players bat over .300 including freshman Matt Prokopowicz, who batted .416 with a school record 82 hits (breaking Stewart's record of 77) and was named to several Freshman All-America teams, including *Baseball America* and *Collegiate Baseball*.

Stewart played in 147 games in his Hofstra career, starting 146, and compiled 194 hits, 50 doubles, eight triples, 17 home runs, 146 runs, 83 RBIs, 50 stolen bases and a .333 batting average. His 50 doubles rank second all-time at Hofstra, and he ranks fourth all-time in hits and runs, third in triples and fifth in stolen bases. As a senior, Stewart served as a team captain and led the squad with a .347 average, 60 runs, 77 hits, 23 doubles and 25 stolen bases. He earned second team American Baseball Coaches Association/Rawlings All-East Region and All-Colonial Athletic Association accolades following his senior season.

Stewart began his collegiate career at St. John's University in Jamaica, New York,

where he batted .284 in 35 games as a freshman in 2001.

After graduating in May 2005 with a degree in psychology, Stewart signed with the Evansville Otters of the independent Frontier League and played in 28 games. Stewart returned to the Otters in 2006 and played in 16 games. Stewart has also played for the Lenoir Oilers of the Southern Collegiate Baseball League and was a 2003 SCBL All-Tournament selection. During the summer of 2004 he played for the Asheboro Copperheads of the Coastal Plain League and batted .298 with 30 runs and a team-high 20 stolen bases.

A native of Bloomsburg, Pennsylvania, Stewart was an honorable mention All-Pennsylvania selection as a senior at Bloomsburg Area High School. He is single and resides in East Meadow, New York.

BOBBY CRUZ VOLUNTEER ASSISTANT COACH

Bobby Cruz is in his second season as a volunteer assistant coach for the Pride. Cruz joined the Hofstra staff after serving as an assistant coach at St. Francis College in Brooklyn, New York, for three seasons until the Terriers disbanded their baseball program at the end of the 2006 season.



Cruz, who was a four-year letterman at St. Francis from 1998 through 2001, coached at his alma mater from 2004 through 2006 serving as the recruiting coordinator as well as the hitting and outfielders coach.

Following graduation from St. Francis, Cruz served as an assistant coach at St. Francis Prep during the 2002 season before becoming head junior varsity coach at St. Dominic's High School in 2003.

Cruz is currently a middle school math teacher and is pursuing a master's degree at St. John's University.

2008 BASEBALL OUTLOOK

In 2007 the Hofstra Baseball team won 20 games for the third consecutive season, the first time since 1996 that that had happened. The team also won 11 conference games for the second straight year, tying the program's high for league wins since joining the Colonial Athletic Association in 2002. Considering the fact that only three years ago the Pride posted just three CAA wins, it is easy to see that the team is moving in the right direction.

As the Pride enter 2008, seventh-year Head Coach Chris Dotolo hopes that the team's journey leads them to Wilmington, North Carolina, in late May for a spot in the CAA Championship. To reach their destination, the Pride will need to find the right mix between its solid nucleus of veterans and a group of talented, but untested newcomers. If the team can gel, the Pride should be in contention for a conference playoff berth at the end of the season.

The Pride return 19 lettermen from last season, including sophomore preseason third team All-American Matt Prokopowicz and junior Chris Mentrasti, who hit over .300 last season and is the team's returning leader in stolen bases. The team adds 11 newcomers, including four junior college and one Division I transfer.

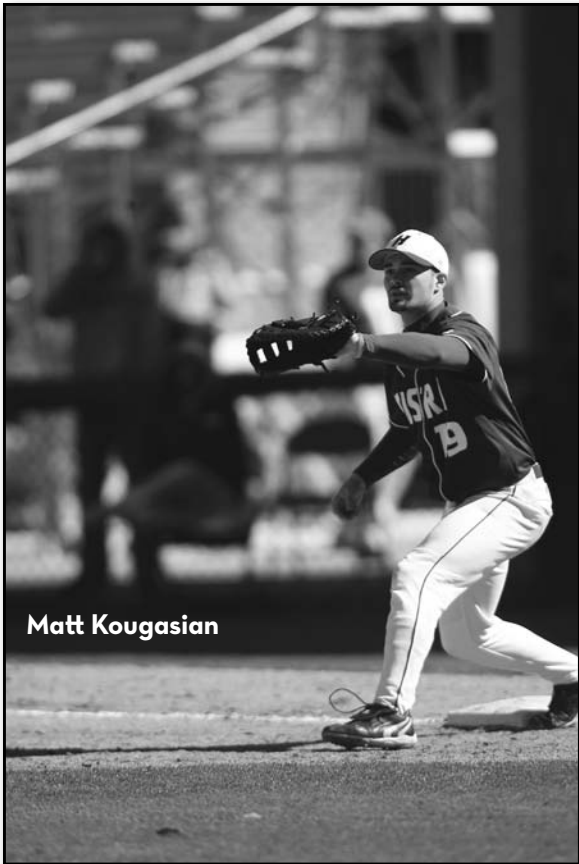
PITCHING

The Hofstra pitching staff is the biggest uncertainty going into the season. The team returns nine hurlers from last year, but not a lot of conference innings as graduation claimed most of the Pride's weekend starters including Charlie Frago and Will DeVito, who tallied five of the 11 CAA wins a season ago.

The untested staff will need to rise to the occasion in a hurry and with the rotation still to be determined, each pitcher will have a chance to win a spot. Senior Eric Corkery is Hofstra's top returnee, statistically, after posting a 2-0 record with a 4.50 ERA in seven appearances (four starts). Classmate Anthony Sarno, who is also a fixture in the batting order, also returns and Coach Dotolo intends to use the veteran on the hill more often than in past years. Sarno was 1-2 with a 5.70 in 11 appearances, 10 in relief.

Sophomore Drew Luedtke, a hard throwing lefty and junior Rob DiFalco, a side-arming righty, were effective relievers last season with Luedtke posting a 2-5 mark with 35 strikeouts in 36 1/3 innings, while DiFalco was 0-1 in 16 appearances. Sophomore Rob Kumbatovic made seven starts in 15 appearances and was 0-5 with 33 strikeouts.

Senior Brody Fontaine and sophomore Ryan Radke were also regulars on the mound as Fontaine played in 13 games and



Radke 10, including two starts. A lefty specialist, Fontaine did not have a decision in 10 innings, while Radke was 0-2 on the year. Junior Nick Panzarella, a starting outfielder, is also in line for additional innings in 2008. Senior Dan Lux, who missed all of last season, is healthy and ready to contribute as well.

Of the 11 newcomers, five are pitchers. Junior Bobby Neelon, a transfer from Wharton County Community College, is a big righty with a plenty of potential and will have a great opportunity to get innings. Neelon began his collegiate career at the Merchant Marine Academy and was 2-3 for the Mariners in 2005. Four freshmen round out the staff. Lefty Scott A'Hara, a reserve quarterback on the Pride football team, earned a spot on the squad. As a prep player, A'Hara was an all-league and all-area selection at Coatesville Area High School where he went 4-2 with a 3.01 ERA as a senior. Anthony Gionesi was a two-time All-Nassau County performer at Mepham High School. Kevin Rigopolous was an All-Massachusetts selection who posted a record of 9-2 with a 1.98 earned run average and 98 strikeouts during his senior year. Jeff Guthridge was a first team all-conference and All-Baltimore County selection as a senior at Calvert Hall High School.

CATCHER

Five players will vie for time behind the plate. Senior Tom Caltabiano has two years of experience with the program and is coming off a junior season where he batted .208 with 10 RBIs in 50

games (40 starts). Caltabiano is a good defensive backstop, compiling a .980 fielding percentage with just five errors in 248 chances and seven passed balls. Junior Adam Perlo, a transfer from Monroe Community College, batted .347 as a sophomore and was an all-region selection. Sophomore Elliot Hagburg joins the team after one season at New Jersey Institute of Technology, where he started 23 of 28 games and hit .244. Senior Matt Kougasian, who has been a regular in the Hofstra lineup the past three years at first base and designated hitter, has been working out at catcher as well. Kougasian started 37 of 50 games in 2007 and batted .297 with a team-high tying six home runs and 27 RBIs. Freshman Kurtis Smith, who prepped at Cary-Grove High School in Illinois, rounds out the position and will provide additional depth.

INFIELD

The infield is Hofstra's most experienced unit with six of the seven infielders possessing previous game experience. With seven players competing for four spots, Coach Dotolo has stated that offense will be the deciding factor, explaining, "Whoever is hitting well, will play."

One player who heeded that advice last season was Matt Prokopowicz. The sophomore became Hofstra's first *Baseball America* Freshman All-American last season as he batted .416 with a school record 82 hits to go along with 11 doubles, six home runs and 52 RBIs. The 2007 CAA Rookie of the Year and a second

team all-conference pick, Prokopowicz was named a preseason third team All-American by the National Collegiate Baseball Writers Association. Joining Prokopowicz in the infield are seniors Felix Adamkiewicz and Matt Kougasian, juniors Chris Mentrasti and Tom Legregni, sophomore Dion Pouncil and freshman Jeff Guthridge, who is also slated to pitch.

Adamkiewicz batted .111 in 27 games last season, while Mentrasti hit .301 with eight doubles and 13 stolen bases in 53 games last season. A top of the order hitter, Mentrasti scored 40 runs and had a .414 on-base percentage. Legregni started 43 of 49 games and hit .248 with six doubles, 20 RBIs and nine stolen bases. Pouncil had a productive freshman campaign, batting .313 in 41 games, including 17 starts, with three doubles and 16 RBIs.

OUTFIELD

The Hofstra outfield also has six players with game experience and adds two junior college transfers. Senior David Cole batted .280 and had a .453 slugging percentage as eight of his 21 hits went for extra bases. Classmate Anthony Sarno, who will also pitch and could see time at first base, batted .248 with a team-high tying 11 doubles. Junior Nick Panzarella will pitch as well, but will also be expected to provide offense after batting .273 with 23 RBIs in 53 games last season.

Junior Tony Schmitt and sophomore John Kenny played in 45 and 33 games, respectively, last season. Schmitt batted .238 with 13 RBIs, while Kenny had a .237 average one home run and eight RBIs. Sophomore Dion Pouncil could also play in the outfield.

Juniors Matt Wynn and Mark Stuckless and sophomore Roberto Muniz will look for playing time in their first season on the roster. Wynn played the last two seasons at Indian River Community College in Florida and is a former All-Nassau County selection at Oceanside High School. Stuckless spent the last two years at Monroe Community College in Rochester, New York, where he graduated as the programs all-time hits leader (142) and batted .379 in his two seasons. A two-time all-region choice, Stuckless hit .429 with 36 RBIs and 14 stolen bases last year. Muniz batted .416 as a senior at Masuk High School in Monroe, Connecticut, and was an all-state Class LL selection.

SCHEDULE

The Pride will test themselves early, opening the season with 12 straight road games. The trip includes a four-game series at Maryland and culminates with a three conference games at William & Mary. The Pride open at home on March 11 against Rider and host their first conference series March 14-16 against UNC Wilmington. In all, the team will play six CAA weekends at home and four on the road.

UNIVERSITY FIELD

The Pride call University Field, located on Hofstra's North Campus, their home. University Field is centrally located between two of the most frequented sites on campus, the Hofstra Recreation Center and the Mack Sports Complex. It is also just 25 yards from the Colonial Square residential complex.

University Field has undergone major renovations in recent years. The infield was skinned and a new drainage system was installed. This was followed by the installation of "Competition Turf" by Edel Grass. The artificial grass surface, which is similar to what is used at Veterans Stadium in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, was installed by Landtek of Amityville, New York. The new surface gives the Pride greater flexibility in playing during inclement weather and will also allow for greater use during the summer months. Other renovations included leveling the berm that was located behind the backstop, moving the backstop back 10 feet and installing new bleachers behind home plate. New fences were also installed along the right field and left field lines, and in

2006 the field received a new scoreboard in right centerfield. In 2002-03 the existing dugouts were replaced with sunken dugouts, measuring 70 feet in length, with protective fencing. During the summer of 2004, the outfield warning track was resurfaced with crushed gravel for better playability and drainage.

The recent renovations weren't the first done to University Field. In 1990 extensive outfield repair was done, including the installation of a wooden fence. In 1991 dugouts were constructed, new fencing was installed in foul territory and the bullpen areas were also enclosed with fencing.

University Field has dimensions of 331 feet down the left field line, 380 to center field and 340 down the right field line. There is ample parking adjacent to the field.

The team also has the use of a state-of-the-art weight training facility. Located in the Mack Sports Complex, the weight room is outfitted with the most advanced strength training and cardiovascular equipment available.

HOFSTRA PHYSICAL FITNESS CENTER/ NEW YORK JETS PRACTICE BUBBLE

Hofstra can avoid inclement weather by using the indoor Physical Fitness Center, which is equipped with pitching machines and batting cages. The Pride also has use of the New York Jets indoor practice bubble. The 50-yard turf field gives Hofstra a unique practice environment. The practice bubble is located on the North Campus, near the Mack Sports Complex.

The conference has produced 16 national team champions in five different sports, 33 individual national champions, 12 national players of the year, 11 national coaches of the year and 12 Honda Award winners. Even more impressive, however, are the honors accumulated away from competition, which include five Rhodes Scholars and 21 NCAA post-graduate scholars. In 2006-07, the CAA had six *ESPN the Magazine* Academic All-Americans and more than 1,600 of our 4,000 student-athletes received the Commissioner's Academic Award after posting at least a 3.2 grade point average while lettering in a varsity sport.

The landscape of the conference stretches along the majority of the East Coast, and includes six of the nation's top 25 media markets – New York (1), Philadelphia (4), Boston (5), Washington, D.C. (8), Atlanta (9) and Baltimore (23). The number of television homes in the CAA market exceeds 19 million.

The CAA now sponsors 22 sports with the addition of a 12-team football league in 2007. Male athletes compete for championships in baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, lacrosse, soccer, swimming & diving, tennis, track & field and wrestling. Female athletes battle for conference titles in basketball, cross country, field hockey, golf, lacrosse, soccer, softball, swimming & diving, tennis, track & field and volleyball. In 2006-07, a league-record 29 teams earned NCAA Tournament berths.

The conference has made its presence known nationally in men's basketball with four teams advancing to post-season play for the past three years. Conference champion VCU pulled the most noted upset of the NCAA first round last season with its 79-77 victory over Duke and Old Dominion became the second CAA team in as many years to receive an NCAA at-large bid. Hofstra returned to the NIT for the third straight season and Drexel made its fourth NIT appearance in the last five years. In 2006, George Mason became the first mid-

major program since 1979 to reach the Final Four, knocking off powerhouses Michigan State, North Carolina, Wichita State and Connecticut along the way. The Patriots were ranked No. 8 in the final ESPN/USA Today Top 25 poll, which was the highest ever for a CAA team.

In women's basketball, the CAA had three teams earn NCAA Tournament berths for the first time and four squads advanced to post-season play for the second straight year. Perennial power Old Dominion, which has captured three national championships (1979, 1980, 1985) and was national runner-up in 1997, captured its 16th consecutive conference title. James Madison returned to the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 1996 and Delaware made its second-ever trip to the NCAA's. Hofstra completed its most successful season in school history by advancing to the quarterfinals of the WNIT.



The conference also excels in many other sports. Delaware became the first CAA team to reach the Final Four of the NCAA Men's Lacrosse Championship in 2007. A league-record four men's soccer teams earned NCAA berths in 2006, with Towson and Old Dominion advancing to the round of 16. A league-high four teams also represented the conference in the NCAA Men's Tennis Championship. William & Mary reached the round of 16 in women's tennis and the Tribe tandem of Megan Moulton-Levy and Katarina Zoricic was ranked No. 1 in the nation and reached the finals of the NCAA Doubles Championship. CAA squads have won 10 field hockey national titles since the championship began in 1981, which is the most of any Division I conference. Hofstra finished seventh overall at the NCAA Wrestling Championship and William & Mary finished eighth nationally in men's cross country. In baseball, the league had 17 players chosen in the 2007 Major League

Baseball draft. There were 37 CAA student-athletes who received All-America honors.

CAA member institutions are committed to excellence in the classroom. The Colonial Academic Alliance was created in 2002 by the league's presidents with a goal of expanding their partnership to all aspects of university life outside of intercollegiate athletics. Among the programs already established are an undergraduate research conference, coordination of study abroad programs and granting visiting academic status to student-athletes traveling to an away contest so that they have access to libraries, academic resource centers and computer labs.

In 2002, two faculty members from CAA institutions were awarded academia's most coveted distinction – the Nobel Prize. John B. Fenn, a research professor in the Department of Chemistry at Virginia Commonwealth University, received the Nobel Prize for chemistry, and Vernon Smith, a professor of economics and law at George Mason University, shared the Nobel Prize in economic sciences.

Commissioner Thomas E. Yeager has guided the CAA since its inception. The conference traces its roots back to 1983 when three of its current members- George Mason University, James Madison University, and the College of William and Mary - were aligned with East Carolina University, the United States Naval Academy and the University of Richmond as a basketball league (ECAC South). During the next two years, the league added 11 sports, acquired two new members (the University of North Carolina at Wilmington and American University) and decided to form a new association. The transformation from ECAC South to CAA took place on June 6, 1985.

Charter members George Mason, James Madison, UNC Wilmington and William and Mary were joined by Old Dominion University in 1991 and by Virginia Commonwealth University in 1995. The conference added the University of Delaware, Drexel University, Hofstra University and Towson University in 2001. Georgia State University and Northeastern University became members of the conference on July 1, 2005.

From all-star athletes to Nobel Prize winning faculty, the CAA takes great pride in producing performers who stand out both on the playing field and in the classroom.

STUART RABINOWITZ PRESIDENT OF HOFSTRA UNIVERSITY

Stuart Rabinowitz was chosen by the Hofstra University Board of Trustees to serve as the eighth president of the University on December 20, 2000. Prior to his appointment, he served as dean of Hofstra University School of Law from September 1989 through June 2001. He joined the faculty of the School of Law in 1972. President Rabinowitz currently holds the Andrew M. Boas and Mark L. Claster Distinguished Professorship in Civil Procedure.

President Rabinowitz holds positions with a number of important government and community organizations, including the Judicial Advisory Council of the State of New York Unified Court System - County of Nassau, the Nassau County Health and Welfare Council. He serves on the Board of Directors for the Fair Media Council and the Long Island Technology Network. President Rabinowitz is a former member of the Nassau County Blue Ribbon Financial Review Panel, former Chair of the Nassau County Local Advisory Board, a former trustee of the Commission on Independent Colleges and Universities, and a former member of the Board of Directors of the Long Island Association. Additionally, President Rabinowitz served as a member of the Nassau County Commission on Government Revision, which was charged with drafting a new charter and a new form of government for the County. He is the recipient of the Martin Luther King Living the Dream Award, EOC; Distinguished Service in the Cause of Justice, Legal Aid Society; UJA Federation Leadership Award; the Bar Association of Nassau County Proclamation for Outstanding Service to both the Legal Profession and the Community; the Community Service Award from the Conference of Jewish Organizations of Nassau County; and the Alumni Association of the City College of New York 2005 Townsend Harris Medal.

President Rabinowitz received a juris doctor, magna cum laude, from Columbia University School of Law, where he was a member of the board of editors of the *Columbia Law Review* and a Harlan Fiske Stone Scholar. He graduated from City College of New York with honors, and is a member of Phi Beta Kappa and the American Law Institute.

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS JACK HAYES

Jack Hayes is in his fourth year as director of athletics at Hofstra University in 2007-08. Hayes was appointed by Hofstra President Stuart Rabinowitz as the University's director of athletics on October 4, 2004. Hayes came to Hofstra after serving as an associate director of athletics at the University of Connecticut for three years.

Hayes, the eighth director of athletics at Hofstra, oversees Hofstra's 18 Division I teams, an athletic administration of more than 70 professional staff, and 430 student-athletes.

Hayes' proven expertise in enhancing academic and athletic success of student-athletes, strategic planning, fund-raising, marketing, university relations, facility enhancement, budgetary management, and NCAA compliance will complement Hofstra University's athletic department in its quest to further enhance its athletic program, and assist Hofstra's student-athletes both on and off the field.

The Hofstra Athletic program has flourished under Hayes' leadership. The Pride captured Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) championships in volleyball, men's soccer, wrestling, softball and women's lacrosse in 2006-07. Those five programs competed in NCAA Championship competition, while the men and women's basketball programs were selected to compete in the National Invitation Tournament (NIT).

The five conference champions and seven postseason participants matched the Pride's total from 2005-06 as Hofstra won CAA championships in men's soccer, women's soccer, wrestling, softball and men's lacrosse and competed in NCAA Tournaments in each sport. In addition, the men and women's basketball teams were selected to play in the NIT.

In his first year (2004-05) as Hofstra's athletics director, the Pride captured three CAA championships and advanced to postseason play in four sports – men's soccer, wrestling and softball took part in the NCAA Tournament, while men's basketball participated in the NIT.

Hayes has placed a significant emphasis on fund-raising during his tenure. Pride Club membership reached all-time highs, both in terms of the number of contributors and funds raised. Resources generated through fund-raising efforts have been used to enhance programs and facilities available to student-athletes. Recent initiatives include the construction of Hofstra's new field hockey stadium, as well as the replacement of the artificial turf in Shuart Stadium. In the last three years there have also been renovations to the study lab in Margiotta Hall and construction of a new academic study area in the Physical Fitness Center.

Active on a national level, Hayes was selected to serve on the NCAA Division I Lacrosse Committee in September 2006.

Hayes came to Hofstra with more than 14 years of athletic administration experience, including management positions at four



Division I institutions. The three years prior to taking his current position were highlighted by leading the University of Connecticut Division of Athletics fund-raising efforts, where his responsibilities included managing the operations of the UConn Athletic Development Fund, implementing policies and procedures for the annual giving program, assisting with the cultivation and solicitation of major gift prospects, coordinating capital project campaigns, overseeing special events, and managing the athletic ticketing operation. While at UConn, he served as a senior staff member for a \$40 million program that supports 24 sports and 650 student-athletes.

From 1998 to 2001 Hayes served as director of athletic administration at Fordham University, where he was responsible for the comprehensive internal operations of the athletic department, including fiscal management, facilities management, staff training and development, ticket operations, and NCAA compliance initiatives.

Prior to his tenure at Fordham, Hayes served as assistant director of athletics at St. John's University, where he managed the fiscal operations of the athletic department and supervised the business office. Hayes began his professional career in college athletics at Fairfield University, where he served as assistant director of athletics. He oversaw the addition of four sports programs at Fairfield – football, women's rowing, women's lacrosse and women's golf.

Hayes received a master's degree in education in 1992 with a concentration in sport management from the University of Connecticut. He holds a bachelor's degree (1989) from Providence College, where he was a member of Providence's lacrosse team. He was also awarded a certificate of completion in 2001 from the Sports Management Institute, Consortium of the Universities of Michigan and Texas.

A native of Providence, Rhode Island, Hayes graduated from the Providence Country Day School where he lettered in football, basketball and lacrosse. He was inducted, as a member of his high school basketball team, into the Providence Country Day Athletic Hall of Fame in October 2004. He resides in East Northport, New York, with his wife Bridget, daughter Katie (5) and son Matt (2).

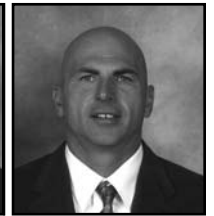

THE SYMBOLS OF HOFSTRA UNIVERSITY

THE SHIELD LOGO

In 2005 Hofstra introduced a new logo as part of a University-wide re-imaging. Both the University's logo as well as the Pride logo were designed by advertising agency Powell New York, a full-service branding and marketing agency, noted as one of the ten firms to watch in 2005 in *Advertising Age*.

The new University logo features an "H" within a shield design. Hofstra University has always been known for both a tradition of academic excellence and a willingness to evolve to meet the needs of students and the greater society. This shield represents the University's commitment to our heritage and a tradition of academic excellence, while the dynamic representation of the H within the shield embodies the evolutionary, changing nature of the University. Hofstra University has both honored its traditions and heritage while embracing changing disciplines, using new technology and remaining relevant to scholarly pursuits and the demands of industry.



THE SEAL



The Hofstra seal was designed from the royal Dutch emblem by art instructor Constant Van de Wall. The seal is modeled on the coat of arms of the House of Orange-Nassau. The round seal includes the coat of arms, flanked by lions on either side. A lion also stands in the center of the coat of arms, holding a sword in its right claw and a bundle of seven arrows, which represent the seven provinces of Holland, in its left. The seal also carries the motto of the House of Orange-Nassau in Old French: "Je maintiendray" (I stand steadfast). In 1988 one of the two lions on the seal was officially replaced with a lioness. The Hofstra seal is still in use today, though not as a logo. The seal will be affixed to formal documents, and used for official purposes such as commencement, convocations, and official University functions.

THE PRIDE

Hofstra's athletic teams are officially known as the Pride, providing our teams with a strong, consistent image that resonates with the Hofstra community. The new Hofstra Athletics logo consists of a graphic mark of a male and female lion in powerful, synchronized motion with the word mark of the Hofstra Pride or the specific sports team. This logo will be the only one used by Hofstra Athletics.

The Hofstra Pride refers to a pack of lions, male and female, which work together towards a common goal and symbolize determination and strength. The Pride conveys both the teamwork and togetherness that is a trait of lions living in prides, who have a close bond and work together for the good of the entire group. The teamwork evident in prides is a trait of Hofstra's student-athletes, who support each other in furtherance of a common goal, while working tirelessly to represent their teams and, in turn, the University. Lions also possess speed, tenacity, and agility, and are relentless in their pursuit of a goal, which are traits our student-athletes demonstrate both on and off the field.

The first consistent use of the word "Pride" relating to athletics was in 1989 when the University's athletic booster club was founded and called itself The Pride Club, which at the time simply referred to the pride that alumni and fans had for our teams. The Pride identity has progressed over the past decade in a more specific fashion than just the expression of a feeling. After one lion on the Hofstra seal was changed into a lioness to symbolize gender equity, the University mascots -- Kate and Willie Pride, a lioness and lion -- were introduced.



HOFSTRA HERITAGE

HOFSTRA'S DUTCH HERITAGE

Ties to Dutch heritage and the Netherlands began with William S. Hofstra, after whom the school is named and on whose property the University was started. William Hofstra died in 1932 and when his wife, Kate, died 16 months later, her Will provided that their house, 15-acre estate, and bulk of her inheritance were to be used for a "public, charitable, benevolent, or scientific purpose" as a memorial to her husband.

The idea for a college came from Truesdel Peck Calkins, former Hempstead superintendent of schools, who was then with New York University. He suggested that NYU might offer extension courses on the Hofstra property. Hofstra opened in September 1935, as a two-year extension branch of NYU; its official name was "Nassau College – Hofstra Memorial of New York University at Hempstead, Long Island." When the doors opened, the sole building on campus was Hofstra's mansion, which he had affectionately named the Netherlands after his homeland, and all classes were held there. The mansion, which houses administrative offices, is now the center of Hofstra's 240-acre campus, and has been renamed Hofstra Hall.



Hofstra University is committed to the pursuit of academic and athletic excellence. The University views participation in intercollegiate athletics as benefiting the student-athlete in an educationally enhancing experience beyond any other opportunity available. Hofstra also realizes the time commitment made by student-athletes and has committed the facilities and resources to support all students.

The University Tutorial Program (UTP) provides free tutoring in every subject area to any Hofstra student. Students are able to obtain up to 1 1/2 hours of individual tutorial assistance per week for each subject. They are also able to utilize the various help labs on campus, which specialize in providing



Area three is academic monitoring. The UTP counselor monitors the academic progress of student-athletes to ensure compliance with Hofstra University, NCAA and conference regulations. The counselor's regular communication with the faculty and coaches provide an opportunity for early intervention should academic difficulties arise.

Area four is study halls. The University Tutorial Program provides all athletic study halls with tutors in various subjects and assesses the needs of individual student-athletes to provide the most effective study environment. The assessment tool administered by the UTP is also used to provide various enrichment seminars for the student-athletes such as time management, writing skills, campus resources, and surviving the college transition.

assistance in writing, business and QM, and biology and chemistry. In addition to this service, student-athletes are assigned an academic advisor who helps address the various needs of student-athletes. The academic advisor emphasizes four areas in their efforts to ensure the academic success of Hofstra's student-athletes.

Area one is academic counseling. Services are provided in the areas of academic planning, career planning, personal counseling, and campus and community referrals. The counselor also meets with prospective student-athletes, at the coach's request, to share the many benefits of a Hofstra University education.

Area two is academic advising. In an effort to ease the demand on the Office of Advisement, the academic advisor also advises first-year and undecided student-athletes.

In the fall of 1999 a computer lab opened on the second floor of Margiotta Hall. Funded in part by proceeds from the Joe Gardi Golf Open, the state-of-the-art computer lab and learning center features a projection system and 18 computer workstations, which are connected to the University network for easy research access to the Internet. The room was refurbished in 2005 with new furniture and computers. In addition to the Margiotta Hall computer lab, a new study area was constructed in 2006, located in the Physical Fitness Center, which features numerous computer workstations and office space for University academic advisement personnel.

SPORTS MEDICINE/ATHLETIC TRAINING

Through a comprehensive athletic training program, Hofstra University student-athletes are provided excellent health care during their attendance at the University. A coordinated effort between the University Health and Wellness Center, the Athletic Department and outside health care providers ensures every student-athlete the best medical attention possible.

University student-athletes have direct access to a myriad of health care services. Managing the coverage of every practice and competition event is Hofstra University's athletic training staff, which is led by fifth-year Head Athletic Trainer Evan Malings and features eight full-time athletic trainers and numerous student athletic trainers. The athletic trainers provide injury management, rehabilitation and treatment to the entire Athletic program. Utilizing three state-of-the-art athletic training rooms, these professionals work tirelessly to ensure the safe participation of Hofstra's student-athletes and to return injured athletes to play quickly and safely.

Supporting the athletic trainers is team physician Dr. Damion Martins. Dr. Martins, a physician with Pro Health Care, Inc. in Lake Success, New York, is in his sixth year on Hofstra's medical team. Martins' experience in the sports medicine field includes serving as team physician for the University of Maryland, University of Maryland-Baltimore County and Coppin State University athletic departments. He was also on the medical staff of the National Football League's Baltimore Ravens.

Hofstra University sponsors a fully accredited, highly competitive undergraduate degree program for athletic training majors, in which Hofstra student athletic trainers participate in all aspects of the health care system.

GETTING TO HOFSTRA/CAMPUS MAP

From Southern New Jersey, Southeastern Pennsylvania, Maryland, Washington, D.C. and Virginia:

Take the New Jersey Turnpike to Exit 13. Cross the Goethals Bridge and continue on Route 278 to the Verrazano-Narrows Bridge. Stay in the left lane of the Bridge and take the Belt Parkway-East. The Belt Parkway becomes the Southern State Parkway at the Nassau County line. Take the Southern State Parkway to the Meadowbrook Parkway North (Exit 22). Exit the Meadowbrook Parkway at Exit M4 (Hempstead Turnpike Route 24). Head west to Hofstra (approximately 1 mile).

From Northwestern New Jersey, Northern Pennsylvania and the Middle States:

Take Interstate 78, Interstate 80, U.S. Route 22, New Jersey Route 4 or New Jersey Route 17 to the George Washington Bridge. Proceed over the bridge to the Cross Bronx Expressway. Take the Cross Bronx Expressway to the Throgs Neck Bridge. Follow directions from the Throgs Neck Bridge from this point.

From Upstate New York:

Take New York Thruway over the Tappan Zee Bridge to Cross Westchester Expressway (Interstate 287). Stay on the Expressway to the New England Thruway (Interstate 95). Proceed south on the Thruway to the Throgs Neck Bridge. Follow directions from the Throgs Neck Bridge from this point.

From the Throgs Neck Bridge:

Follow signs for Eastern Long Island. Take the Cross Island Parkway to the Grand Central Parkway-East. The Grand Central becomes the Northern State Parkway at the Nassau County line. Take the Northern State Parkway-East to the Meadowbrook Parkway-South (exit 31A). Take the Meadowbrook Parkway-South to Exit M4 West (Hempstead Turnpike Route 24). Follow Hempstead Turnpike West to Hofstra (approximately 1 mile).

For Team Travel Via Bus:

Commercial buses are not allowed on New York City (Belt, Grand Central or Cross Island) or Long Island (Southern State or Northern State) Parkways. Team buses should take the Brooklyn-Queens Expressway from the south, and the Clearview Expressway from the north, to get to the Long Island Expressway for the trip to Hofstra. Once on the Long Island Expressway (I-495), buses should proceed to Glen Cove Road-South (exit 39). Head south on Glen Cove Road for approximately eight miles to Hempstead Turnpike/Fulton Avenue and turn left (east). Hofstra University is approximately two miles east on Hempstead Turnpike.



Public Transportation from Airport:

If a visitor arrives at either La Guardia or Kennedy Airport, the most direct means of reaching the University is by one of three limousine companies that service both airports and the Hofstra University area. Larry's Taxi Service (516) 483-3333; Transport Limousine Service (800) 654-1164 (out of state) (800) 832-5466 (in New York state); Winston Limousine Service (800) 4-AIRPORT.

Railroads:

AMTRAK services Pennsylvania Station in Manhattan, approximately 30 miles from the Hofstra campus. To get to Hofstra from Penn Station, take the Long Island Rail Road to the Hempstead station. The Hofstra University Courtesy Bus and taxi services are available there. Hofstra is approximately 1.5 miles from the station.
