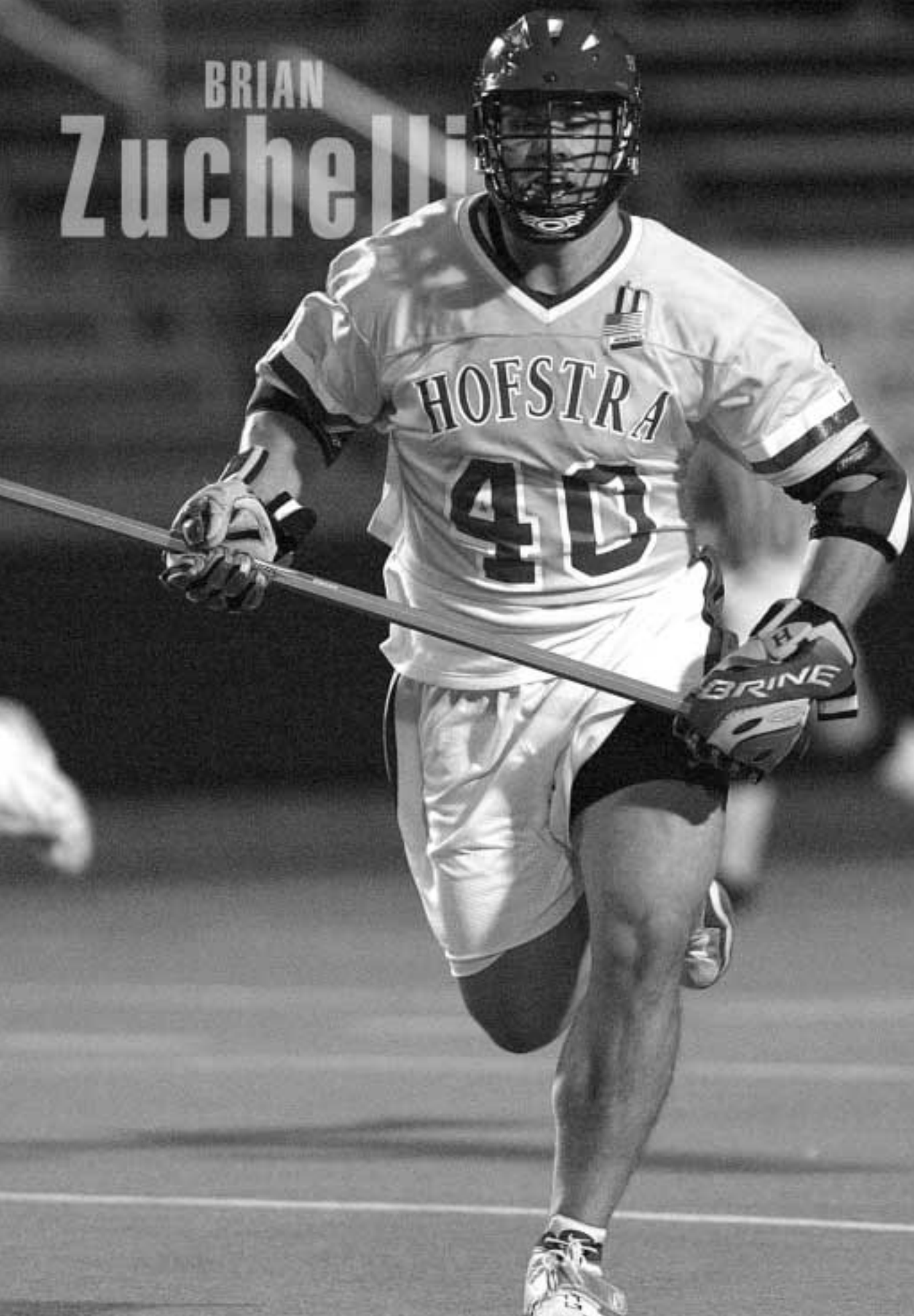

This is Hofstra

Founded in 1935 in one building on 15 acres in Hempstead, New York, Hofstra University today has approximately 130 buildings on 240 acres. Located on Long Island, 25 miles east of Manhattan, the Hofstra student body of approximately 13,400 comes from 44 states and 64 countries. The Colleges and Schools of the University are: Hofstra College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, the Frank G. Zarb School of Business, New College, School of Communication, School of Education and Allied Human Services, School of Law, School for University Studies, University College for Continuing Education, Honors College and Saturday College. Bachelor's degrees are offered in 130 areas of study. There are also approximately 130 graduate programs, including Ph.D., Ed.D., Psy.D. and J.D. degrees, advanced certificates and professional diplomas.

The George Dempster Hall for Communications is one of the largest, most advanced, non-commercial television facilities in the East. It houses a highly sophisticated television production/post-production facility with two broadcast quality studios and control rooms; two advanced online video edit suites; two Avid non-linear digital editing systems and several cuts-only video work stations. Two satellite dishes are available with one dish providing special news feeds for the broadcast journalism room, which also has access to *Associated Press*, *Nexis-Lexis* and *Dow Jones* services. In addition, the facility is capable of feeding student-produced programming to the entire campus on our own cable channels. Also located here is the University's radio station (WRHU/88.7-FM), audio production studios, a film/video screening room, film editing rooms, a computer laboratory, a speech performance studio and a large dance studio.

Hofstra's new C.V. Starr Hall offers academic facilities that are among the most technologically advanced in the nation. Every seat in every classroom allows students direct access

to the Internet and Hofstra network – including the resources of Hofstra's Axinn Library.

Hofstra's growing computer facilities offer extensive high-tech training opportunities. There are computer terminals throughout the campus for student and faculty use. The University was ranked as one of *Yahoo Internet Life's* "100 Most Wired Colleges" for 2001-2002, with more than 750 PC, Macintosh and UNIX workstations available in labs and classrooms.

The fully computerized Hofstra Libraries contain 1.6 million volumes for student use. Only about 5 percent of American colleges have collections as extensive, and 85 percent have fewer than half that number.

Hofstra sponsors 500 cultural events annually, bringing thousands of scholars, dignitaries and other participants to campus. Hofstra has more than 200 musical and dramatic performances on campus each year.



Hofstra has 12 galleries and exhibition areas and an extensive outdoor sculpture collection. Five of the galleries and exhibition areas and the outdoor sculpture collection are directly under the auspices of the Hofstra Museum. In

In addition, the entire 240-acre campus is used as an open-air gallery that includes more than 60 outdoor sculptures, acting as a showcase for the Hofstra Museum, which houses one of the largest art collections in the metropolitan area. The Hofstra Museum is accredited by the American Association of Museums, one of only 94 universities in the nation and one of six in New York with such credentials.

sponsors 18 intercollegiate programs – nine men's sports and nine women's sports. Hofstra has men's teams in basketball, football, baseball, lacrosse, golf, tennis, wrestling, soccer and cross country. Women's sports include basketball, volleyball, softball, tennis, soccer, field hockey, lacrosse, cross country and golf. The 18 men's and women's intercollegiate athletic teams account for more than 150 home contests annually.

With its beautiful landscaping, Hofstra has won national awards for campus beautification. It is a registered member of the American Association of Botanical Gardens and Arboreta, featuring approximately 8,000 trees representing 425 species.

Hofstra's academic programs are accredited by numerous national agencies and the University is one of only 262 schools, out of more than 3,600 colleges and universities nationwide, with a chapter of the national honor society Phi Beta Kappa. Of Hofstra's 1,272 faculty members, 493 are full time and 91 percent hold the highest degrees in their fields. The student/faculty ratio is 16-to-1.

Hofstra University is 100-percent program accessible to persons with disabilities, and has been cited as a national model for this achievement.



Hofstra also has seven theaters, a student newspaper, a Student Center, a recreation and center and numerous athletic facilities, including the 15,000-seat James M. Shuart Stadium and the 5,124-seat Hofstra Arena. Hofstra also has an indoor, Olympic-sized (eight lane, 50-meter) swimming pool, one of the largest such facilities in the New York metropolitan area.

The Hofstra athletic program competes on the NCAA Division I level and is a member of the Colonial Athletic Association and the Atlantic 10 Football Conference. The University

About Your Host: Jim Sheehan is in his 23rd year in the sports public relations profession and in his 15th year in charge of Hofstra University's athletic publicity. In November 1999, he was promoted to Associate Director of Athletics at the University. Sheehan came to Hofstra in 1988 after serving as Assistant Commissioner of the I-AA Gateway Collegiate Athletic Conference in St. Louis, Missouri from 1985 through 1988. Prior to his Gateway stint, he served as Coordinator of Media Relations for the Houston Gamblers of the United States Football League in 1984-85. Sheehan has also served as Director of Sports Information at the University of Tampa from 1982 through 1984; Assistant to the Commissioner/Information Director of the Sunshine State Conference from 1980 through 1984 and Director of Sports Information at his alma mater, Biscayne College in 1981-82. Jim and his wife, Maureen, have a daughter, Jillian (10). The Sheehan family resides in Middle Village, New York.

Press Box: The James M. Shuart Stadium press box, located on the fourth floor of the Shuart Stadium Building, is intended for working media and scouts. All media members, including radio and television stations will be seated on the fourth floor while video and television camera locations are located on the roof. All press box guests must have a pass, issued by the Hofstra Office of Athletic Communications, to gain entrance. Spouses, dates and non-workers are not permitted in the press box.

Credentials: Scouts and members of the press should contact the Office of Athletic Communications at least 48 hours before each game for press box space and credentials. Press passes will be left at the Will Call table between the statues on the west entrance of Shuart Stadium. Institutions utilizing independent scouts must fax a request letter for credentials to the Hofstra Office of Athletic Communications at (516) 463-5033.

Photographers: Photographers who intend to shoot from the field should request a sideline photo pass. Only press and staff photographers will be allowed on the sidelines. All members of the press photo corps are reminded to stay out of the bench areas during the course of the game. Photo sideline passes should always be visible when on the field.

Press Parking: Media parking passes should be requested at the same time press box/sideline passes are requested. The Media/VIP parking lot is located on the west side of Shuart Stadium on the corner of Belmont Place and Meadowbrook Place, across from the Stadium.

Game Services: Members of the media are asked to pick up their game

information packets consisting of media guides, programs, releases and notes, as they enter the press box. A play-by-play summary and a quickie statistics sheet will be distributed at halftime. Complete game statistical books will be available in the press box and in the lacrosse office in Margiotta Hall 20 minutes after each game.

Telephones: Hofstra University provides a limited number of telephones for use by the media in the press box. Please indicate your telephone need when you request your credentials.

Radio: The Hofstra Office of Athletic Communications will have touch-tone digital phone lines available for the opponent's commercial and student radio stations. Visiting teams will need to give the sports information office two weeks notice of their intention to broadcast. There will be a \$75.00 charge, which must be paid by game time, for use of the line. All calls must be made collect or direct dial from the radio station to Shuart Stadium.

Post-Game Interviews: Hofstra players and coaches will be available for post-game interviews after a 10-minute cooling off period in the Pride weight room in Margiotta Hall. Media with credentials should enter Margiotta Hall at the south side staircase. Please contact the visiting publicist concerning the visiting team's post-game policy.

Player Interviews: All requests for player interviews during the week should be made at least one day in advance with the Office of Athletic Communications. If you are requesting a phone interview, we will either put you through to the player requested or have the player return your call at a mutually convenient time. The best time to reach players is from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., or following practice (approximately 6:15 p.m.). Player home phone numbers will not be distributed. In-person interviews may be conducted in a number of locations in and around Margiotta Hall. However, we do request that interviews not be conducted in the locker room or the athletic training room.

Head Lacrosse Coach

John Danowski



Taking over a program that was 3-11 in 1985, Danowski turned the program around in a short time. He led Hofstra to a 12-3 record, a 6-0 conference mark and the East Coast Conference championship, and a 13th place national ranking by his third season (1988). In 1989 the Dutchmen were 11-4, captured their second straight ECC title with a 6-0 record and finished the season ranked 14th. In 1990, Hofstra posted a 9-5 overall mark, was 5-1 in conference action, and closed out the season with five straight wins

and a 19th place final national ranking.

In 1991 Hofstra played a top-notch schedule and closed out the season ranked 14th in the country with a 7-7 record. In 1993, the Flying Dutchmen posted a 10-6 mark, including nine consecutive regular season wins, and were ranked 11th by the USILA. Hofstra returned to the NCAA Championship that year for the first time since 1978 and advanced to the national quarterfinals before losing to eventual national champion, Syracuse. For his efforts, Danowski was named the 1993 F. Morris Touchstone Award winner as the United States Intercollegiate Lacrosse Association's Division I Coach of the Year.

After a 6-7 record in 1994, the Flying Dutchmen rebounded to post a 9-5 record, a perfect 5-0 mark and the North Atlantic Conference championship, and were ranked 17th in the final 1995 lacrosse poll. In 1996 Hofstra completed another undefeated season in the NAC and recorded two of the most exciting victories in the school's long lacrosse history. Hofstra posted victories in contests against fifth-ranked Johns Hopkins and second-ranked North Carolina on the way to a NCAA Tournament bid, a 12th place ranking and a final 9-5 record.

In 1997 the Flying Dutchmen, behind a defense that ranked second (6.93 GAA) in the nation, received their second consecutive NCAA Tournament bid. That season, Hofstra posted a 9-6 record, was ranked 12th in the country, and captured its third consecutive conference title with a perfect 6-0 America East mark. In 1998 Hofstra recorded its fourth 10-victory season under Danowski with a 10-4 mark, a 14th place national ranking and captured its fourth consecutive conference title.

In 1999 Hofstra, with its 13 victories, recorded the most wins since the 1955 team tallied 14, was ranked seventh in the country, received its third NCAA Championship bid in the last four years. The Flying Dutchmen advanced to the quarterfinals at Hofstra Stadium before dropping an 11-7 decision to Johns Hopkins before a record crowd of 12,292. In 2000 Hofstra posted an 11-5 final record, captured its fifth conference title in the last six seasons and received its fourth NCAA Tournament bid in the last five years. In the NCAA Tournament against Maryland, the Flying Dutchmen rallied from an early, four-goal deficit to tie the game twice, the latest at 11-11 in the fourth quarter, before dropping a 14-12 decision.

John Danowski is in his 18th season at the helm of the Pride Lacrosse team. In the University's 54-year lacrosse history, 24 Hofstra teams have recorded nine wins or more in a season. Teams coached by John Danowski have recorded that number 12 of the 24 times. In fact, the 1999 Hofstra team recorded the second most wins in a season when the Flying Dutchmen posted a 13-3 mark.

Only the fourth Head Lacrosse Coach in Hofstra history, following Al Brisotti, Howdy Myers and Harry Royle, Danowski has compiled a 152-97 (.610) record in 17 seasons at Hofstra to boost his 20-year career record to 179-113 (.613).

Under his guidance, the Flying Dutchmen have captured seven conference lacrosse titles including five of the last seven North Atlantic Conference-America East championships (1995-98 and 2000). The Flying Dutchmen have been nationally ranked in the final USILA poll 14 times during his 17 seasons at the Long Island-based campus. More importantly, Hofstra has also been a NCAA Division I Tournament participant in five of the last seven years and six times in the last 10 years.

On the personal front, Danowski was voted the NAC Lacrosse Coach of the Year in 1995 and 1996, the CAA Coach of the Year in 2002 and the USILA Division I Coach of the Year in 1993. In 2001, Danowski was inducted into the Long Island Lacrosse Hall of Fame.



In 2001, Hofstra posted a 10-7 record and advanced to the NCAA Quarterfinals after an overtime upset win over Virginia. In the semifinals Hofstra dropped an 18-13 decision to top-ranked Syracuse before a Hofstra Stadium crowd of 10,510. Last year the Pride posted nine consecutive victories, including wins over Duke and North Carolina, to end the season with an 11-3 record and a number six national ranking. But Hofstra did not receive an NCAA Tournament bid in a most controversial decision.

Prior to coaching at Hofstra, Danowski had a successful coaching stint at Long Island University-C.W. Post. He led LIU-C.W. Post to a 12th place national ranking in 1985 and had the Pioneers ranked as high as fourth in the country during the course of the season. He was also a finalist for the NCAA Division I Coach of the Year honors in 1984 and 1985 while compiling a 27-16 record at LIU-C.W. Post.

Danowski is a 1976 graduate of Rutgers University where he was a four-year standout in lacrosse and still holds several Scarlet Knight records. An excellent passer, Danowski set Rutgers records for



most points in a game with 14 against Penn State in 1974, most assists in a game with nine against the Nittany Lions in 1973 and most assists in a season with 54 in 1973. He ranks second on the Rutgers all-time assists list with 120 and eighth on the all-time scoring list with 57 goals and 120 assists for 177 points. He led the Knights to NCAA playoff appearances in 1973 and 1974 and was team captain and a North-South Game participant in 1976. Danowski was also a three-time (1973-75) recipient of Rutgers' Sasser Award, symbolic of the Scarlet Knights' top assist man.



He also served as an assistant lacrosse coach and defensive coordinator under current Towson University coach Tony Seamen at LIU-C.W. Post in 1982. Danowski, a featured speaker at numerous clinics and seminars, has also done televised lacrosse instructional pieces for ESPN's Sunkist Kids and Fox Television's Good Day New York. He also served on the USILA All-American Committee, the USILA Top 20 Poll, and served as

an assistant coach for the North squad in the annual North-South Senior All-Star game.

Danowski, who once served as graduate-assistant football coach at Columbia University, earned a master's degree in counseling and college student development from LIU-C.W. Post in 1978. He is currently working on a postgraduate degree in educational administration at Hofstra. John and his wife, Patricia, have two children, Kate (20), a sophomore lacrosse player at Quinnipiac University, and Matthew (17), a three-sport senior star at Farmingdale High School. The Danowski family resides in Farmingdale, New York.

Assistant Coach

Joe Amplo is in the first year of his second tenure on the Hofstra University Lacrosse staff. Amplo, a four-year letterman at Hofstra from 1996 through 1999, returns to Long Island after one year as an assistant coach at Pennsylvania. At Penn the Quakers posted their best

record in 13 years, recording the program's first winning season and first nine-win campaign since 1989, going 9-4 overall and 3-3 in the Ivy League in 2002.

Amplo began his college coaching career in the fall of 1999 as a defensive specialist with the Hofstra midfielders. He served two seasons as an assistant coach under John Danowski, with the Pride advancing to the NCAA Championship Tournament both years.

As a player, Amplo was a first team All-America East selection on defense as a senior in 1999. He played in 58 games during his Hofstra career and recorded 91 ground balls. In 1999, Amplo tallied 40 ground balls and registered an assist while starting all 16 games for Hofstra, which advanced to the NCAA Tournament quarterfinals that season. He played on three (1996, 1997 and 1999) NCAA Tournament teams as a Hofstra player.



The Farmingville, Long Island, native had a stellar scholastic career at Sachem High School in Lake Ronkonkoma, New York, where he was a four-time letterman in both lacrosse and football. As a senior captain, he tallied 20 goals and 15 assists at midfield and led Sachem to Suffolk County and Long Island championships and the New York State championship game. He was named to all-conference teams in both lacrosse and football.

Amplo, who graduated from Hofstra with a geography degree, is married to the former Jennifer Niemczyk. The Amplo's live in Sound Beach, New York.



Sean Smith

Assistant Coach

Sean Smith is in his sixth season on the Hofstra University Lacrosse staff. Smith came to Hofstra from Division Avenue High School in Levittown, New York. He served as the varsity head lacrosse coach and the junior varsity head football coach at Division Avenue from 1990 to 1997.

In addition to his Hofstra coaching duties, Smith is currently a teacher in the Levittown School District.

Smith began his coaching career in 1985 when he served as an assistant coach at Ohio Wesleyan University. While at Ohio Wesleyan, Smith also served as a physical education instructor, intramural director and ticket manager. In 1987 he joined the lacrosse staff at Army as an assistant and coached the Cadets from 1987 through 1990. Smith also served as a physical education instructor while at Army.

As a player at Roanoke College, Smith was named to the USILA Division III All-American team in 1982 and 1983. He tallied 50 goals in 1981 and 51 in 1982. Smith concluded his college career as Roanoke's career leader with 140 goals. He also ranks third in career scoring with 208 points and seventh in career assists with 63. In 1996 Smith was inducted into the Roanoke College Athletic Hall of Fame.



Smith holds a bachelor's degree in physical education from Roanoke College, a master's degree from the State University of New York at Stony Brook and a postgraduate degree in educational administration from Hofstra. Matt Reedy is in his third year as an Assistant Athletic Trainer and his third season as the athletic trainer for the Hofstra Men's Lacrosse program.

His duties include providing primary medical coverage to Hofstra student-athletes in Men's Lacrosse and Field Hockey, as well as assisting in the education and professional development of the University's student-athletic training staff.

The Middletown, Indiana, native came to Hofstra in 2000 as a graduate assistant athletic trainer and has worked with the Men's Lacrosse and Field Hockey programs since then. JOE RODGERS
STRENGTH, SPEED AND
CONDITIONING COACH

Joe Rodgers is in his second year as the Coordinator of the Strength, Speed and Conditioning Program at Hofstra University. Under his direction, Hofstra student-athletes have

become bigger, stronger and faster not only in lacrosse but in all sports.

Rodgers came to Hofstra in February 2001 from Illinois State University in Normal, Illinois, where he served as assistant strength and conditioning coach since May 1998. At ISU, he assisted head strength and conditioning coach Bob Lindsey with strength, conditioning and speed program development and implementation for football and men's basketball and served as the primary coordinator for developing flexibility, strength and conditioning programs for baseball, volleyball and women's basketball.

Rodgers, who was a four-year letterman and a second team all-conference selection at linebacker at Illinois Wesleyan, began his professional career at Illinois Wesleyan in January 1997 as assistant strength and conditioning coach working with the football, volleyball, soccer and golf programs. Eight months later, he moved across Illinois' twin cities (Bloomington-Normal) to Illinois State to accept a similar position working with the football, basketball, soccer, baseball and tennis programs.

In January 1998 Rodgers accepted a five-month internship at Brigham Young University where he worked with the football program and 12 men's and women's Olympic sports.

Rodgers, who earned a bachelor's in 1995 from Illinois Wesleyan University and a master's from Illinois State in 2000, holds numerous memberships including the National Strength and Conditioning Association, the American College of Sports Medicine and United States Weightlifting. He is also certified as a Strength and Conditioning Specialist and as a USA Weightlifting Level I coach.

Joe and his wife Carrie reside in Williston Park, New York.

As the 2002 college lacrosse season approached, Hofstra University Head Men's Lacrosse Coach John Danowski believed his Pride team had the depth, talent and experience to be successful. His only concern, and it was a minor one at that, was chemistry – to have the Pride play together as a team.

It was evident early in the season, even in one-goal losses to second-ranked Hopkins and number eight Loyola, that his beliefs were correct. For after a decisive loss at Princeton, the Pride TEAM rattled off a nine-game winning streak, including victories over No. 7 Duke, No. 12 North Carolina, No. 14 Towson and No. 18 Notre Dame, to finish the regular season with an 11-3 record.

That record, an exciting season and the nine-game winning streak to end the year would have to be enough reward for the Pride as they were snubbed at NCAA Tournament selection time in a most controversial decision.

The 2002 season is long gone now. All that remains are the bitter-sweet memories of what was and what could have been. "We don't talk about it, and no one really brings it up," Danowski says, "not because we are bitter, but because it is behind us. It's in the past so why dwell on it? Besides, most of the returnees this year either did not play or saw just a little action last year. So it doesn't have as much of an impact on this year's team as it did to the graduating players. 2003 is truly a new year with a new team."

There's the rub. Despite the fact that Danowski has 24 players returning from last season, only a handful have any extensive playing experience, except for four returning starters. "This year's team is unlike any other Hofstra team in recent years," Danowski said. "In the past, we had starters back, we had depth, we had experience, we had leaders and they knew what they had to do to win. We have a great bunch of men on this year's team. They work hard, they are very coachable but they are terribly inexperienced, even the upperclassmen. We will be using a lot of new faces this season. The measuring stick that we have used to gauge our success in the past is not applicable this year. We will measure our success in small victories of progress and improvements as the season goes on."

To bear out Danowski's contention, the Pride return only 57 of the team's 178 goals from last season. If you thought the playmakers were returning, guess again, as only 22 of the team's 100 assists are back. In goal, only Steve Izzo gives Hofstra any game time experience, and that was just 17 out of 840 minutes in 2002. The new season makes way for new groups of scorers, playmakers, defenders, goalies and stars to make a name for themselves. It will be the Pride coaching staff's job to mix and mold their young charges into a cohesive team. Danowski believes he has the talent but that it may take some time.

ATTACK

There is good news and bad news about the Pride attack this year. The bad news is that all three of the starting attackmen from 2002 have graduated and have taken their collective 73 goals and 51 assists with them. Hofstra career goal scoring record holder Tom Kessler (28G-21A last year), Scott Dooley (31G-14A) who tallied 157 points in his career, and Steve McTigue (14G-16A) have all departed. The good news is that the attack is the one area on this year's team that possesses the most playing experience. But Danowski cautions, "The attack is unbelievably young with very little chemistry of playing together."

With the move of senior Kevin Dougherty from midfield to attack, the return from injury of senior Joe Kostolansky and the return of reserve Jim Femminella, the Pride have a solid if not strong front line. Dougherty, who tallied 15 goals and four assists last year, was third on the team in shots and should get some better scoring opportunities on attack. Kostolansky tallied 37 goals and 23 assists in 2000 before suffering knee injuries that allowed him to play in just six games the past two seasons. Femminella (20G-4A) is the Pride's leading goal-scoring returnee after denting the twine 20 times in 2002. Sophomore James Morgan (1G-2A), who saw limited time in 12 games last year, and red-shirt freshman Ryan Lucas will be vying to break into the starting lineup.

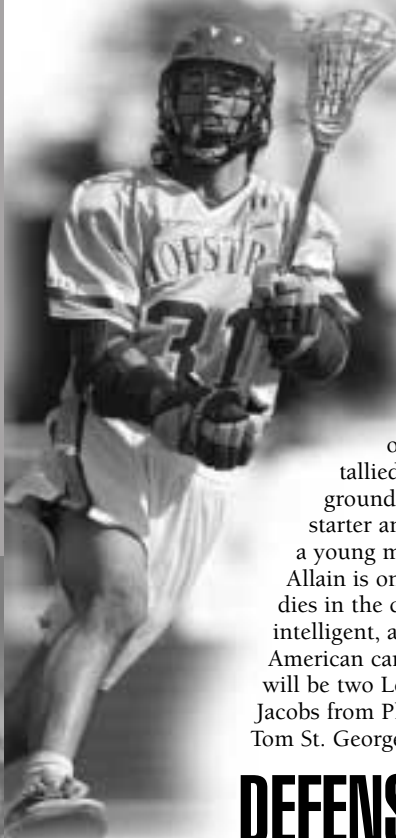
MIDFIELD

The midfield area is, without a doubt, the deepest area on the team with 19 players. "The midfield lines are really interchangeable," Danowski says. "They are in great shape with no real stand-out, which will make the battle for playing time competitive. I can see at least six freshmen stepping up into a playing rotation this season."

Leading the midfield are seniors Bryan Walker and Ryan O'Donnell. Walker started 12 of 14 games last year on the first midfield and tallied six goals and three assists. O'Donnell, who also played in all 14 games last year and posted one of the best fall seasons on the team, is expected to contribute more after scoring just twice in 2002. Junior twins Rich (3G, 3A) and Keith Mekeel, who red-shirted last year with an ankle injury, are two of the hardest workers on the team and should give the midfield a boost. Junior transfer Don Scott, a Long Island product who returns after two years at Johns Hopkins, will give the Pride some additional experience. Sophomores Ryan Vilar and Mike Morrison should also figure into the midfield mix. Vilar, who missed the 2002 season with a back injury, tallied five goals in 16 games as freshman in 2001. Morrison, who could also see action on attack in 2003, tallied two goals and five assists in limited action in 14 games last year.

But it's the newcomers who can figure in big at midfield. Leading the freshmen are Tim Treubig, an all-league selection at Farmingdale (NY) High School; Chris Unterstein, a scholastic All-American from New York State Champion Shoreham-Wading River High School; Brian Crichlow, a two-time Team Colorado

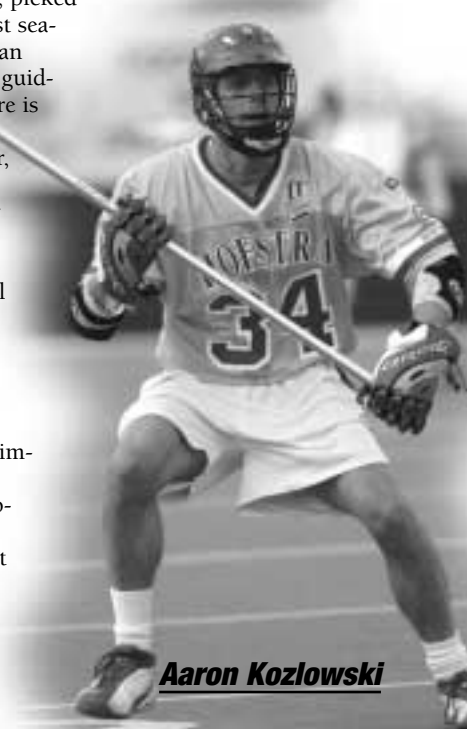


selection; John Orsen, a second team All-American from Cold Spring Harbor (NY) High School; Ryan Miller, an All-Nassau County selection out of Manhasset (NY) High School and the brother of former Hofstra standout and World Team member Blake Miller; and Caleb Miller, an all-county selection from Pikesville (MD) High School who was a finalist for the C. Markland Kelley Award last year.

At the pole, senior Mike Allain will relieve Danowski of any concern. Allain, who tallied five goals and picked up 47 ground balls last year, is a two-year starter and will bring poise and skill to a young midfield. "We think Mike Allain is one of the top long stick mid-dies in the country," Danowski said. "He's intelligent, a hard worker and a true All-American candidate." Backing up Allain will be two Long Island freshmen, Steve Jacobs from Plainview John F. Kennedy and Tom St. George from Baldwin.

DEFENSE

Junior Brian Zuchelli, who started all 13 games that he played in last season, anchors an inexperienced defense. Zuchelli, who is big and strong, picked up 46 ground balls last season and will be the man the others look to for guidance when the pressure is on around the cage. Freshman Brett Moyer, a two-time All-American from Ridley (PA) High School and a member of the 2003 United States National Team, has the size, speed and skills to have an immediate impact on the Pride team. Senior Aaron Kozlowski, who saw limited action in seven games last year, sophomore Jon Edwards, who saw action in just three games due to injury, and seniors Dave Sweeney, who played in 12 games, and Andris Dikmanis will battle it out for the last

starting spot. Newcomers Patrick Harnett, an All-Ohio pick from Worthington High School, Kevin McDonough, an all-county selection from Islip (NY) High School, and Bryan Read from St. Paul's School in Brooklandville, Maryland, as well as red-shirt freshman Bobby DePasquale will challenge for playing time.

GOAL

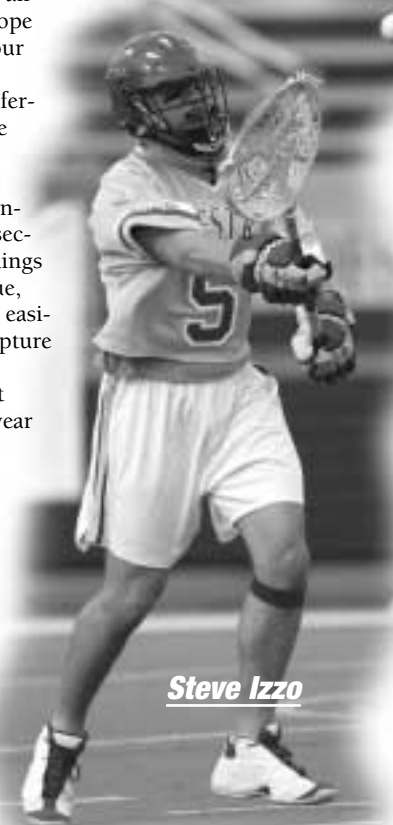
The goal area is the most inexperienced on the field and that, obviously, is not a good thing for the Pride. The two goalies have seen a total of 17 minutes of college action and all that time belongs to sophomore Steve Izzo. Izzo posted a 10.51 goals against average last year during that time but will face a stern test for the starting job by red-shirt freshman Matt Southard. Southard was a two-time honorable mention All-American at Baldwin High School.

THE SCHEDULE

Like the attack area, there is good news and bad news when talking about the 2003 Hofstra schedule. The good news is that the young Pride will play 10 of their 15 games this season at James M. Shuart Stadium (formerly Hofstra Stadium). Playing at home, especially for an inexperienced team, can help ease Hofstra's growing pains.

Unfortunately, the bad news is that the Pride will be playing one of the most ambitious schedules in school history. "The schedule is, without a doubt, the toughest in school history," Danowski says. "To start, we will be playing No. 1 (Syracuse) and No. 2 (Princeton) from last year. The schedule is loaded. Cornell, Fairfield, Princeton, Massachusetts and Syracuse were all tournament teams in 2002. We hope the tough schedule will prepare our team for the Colonial Athletic Association schedule and the conference tournament at the end of the season."

Speaking of the CAA, the Pride finished with a 5-1 record and was second to Loyola in the league standings last year. Loyola has left the league, but that won't make the road any easier for the Pride in the quest to capture a conference title and the NCAA Championship automatic bid that goes with it. "Our first goal this year is to qualify for the CAA Tournament," Danowski stated. "That means to finish in the top four in the six-team league. "Towson is the team to beat this year; Sacred Heart and Villanova are much better, as are Delaware and Drexel. If we make the CAA Tournament, our competition all season should better prepare us to play our best for an NCAA bid."

Hofstra's Tournament Seed:

In 1973, the Flying Dutchmen were ranked third in the eight-team tournament field and lost to Virginia, 12-5 in the first round. In 1971 Hofstra was seeded fifth and lost to Army, 19-3, in the first round. In 1975, 1993 and 1996, the Dutchmen were seeded sixth. In 1975 Hofstra lost to Maryland, 19-7. In 1993 Hofstra dumped Massachusetts, 9-8, in the first round of the field of 12 before losing to eventual national champion Syracuse, 20-8, in the quarterfinals. In 1996 Hofstra dropped a 15-12 decision to Harvard. In both 1974 and 1978, the Dutchmen were ranked seventh and dropped first round games to Johns Hopkins each year. In 1999 Hofstra earned the seventh seed and defeated Navy, 15-7, in the opening round before falling to Johns Hopkins in the quarterfinals. Hofstra did not receive one of the top eight seeds in 1997, 2000 or 2001.

Stuart Rabinowitz



Stuart Rabinowitz was chosen by the Hofstra University Board of Trustees to serve as the eighth President of the University on December 20, 2000. Prior to his appointment, he served as Dean of Hofstra University School of Law from September 1989 through June 2001. He joined the faculty of the Law School in 1972.

President Rabinowitz currently holds the Andrew M. Boas and Mark L. Claster Distinguished Professorship in Civil Procedure. His other areas of special academic interest include the federal system, federal courts, and the media and free speech.

President Rabinowitz holds positions with a number of important government and community organizations, including the Nassau County Health and Welfare Council, Cradle of Aviation Museum, Fund for Modern Courts, Holocaust Memorial & Educational Center of Nassau County, Long Island Association and the Long Island Coalition for Fair Broadcasting. He is a former member of the Nassau County Blue Ribbon Financial Review Panel and former chair of the

Nassau County Local Advisory Board. Additionally, President Rabinowitz served as a member of the Nassau County Commission on Government Revision, which was charged with drafting a new charter and a new form of government for the County. He is the recipient of numerous honors and awards, including the Martin Luther King Living the Dream Award, EOC; Award for Distinguished Service in

the Cause of Justice, Legal Aid Society; Leadership Award, UJA Federation; and the Bar Association of Nassau County Proclamation for Outstanding Service to both the Legal Profession and the Community.

President Rabinowitz received a juris doctor degree, magna cum laude, from Columbia University School of Law, where he was a member of the board of editors of the *Columbia Law Review* and a Harlan Fiske Stone Scholar. He graduated from City College of New York with honors, and is a member of Phi Beta Kappa and the American Law Institute.

Harry Royle

Harry Royle is in his sixth year as Director of Athletics at Hofstra University. After serving as Interim Director from June 1997 through February 1998, Royle, a longtime Hofstra University athletic administrator, was selected as the University's sixth Director of Athletics. In making the announcement, then-Hofstra President Dr. James M. Shuart said, "I am happy that the best person for the position of Director of Athletics was already here on campus in Harry Royle. He has served this University well for 27 years, and we are excited for him as he leads the Athletic Department into the 21st century."



Royle also served as an Assistant Lacrosse Coach under Myers from 1971 through 1975 before replacing the legendary Hall of Fame coach upon his retirement in 1976. He directed the Flying Dutchmen Lacrosse program as Head Coach from 1976 through 1985, compiling a 58-55 record and leading the program to a Top 13 ranking or better in five of those 10 years. In 1978 Royle led the Flying Dutchmen to an 8-5 record, an NCAA Championship Tournament bid and a seventh-place national ranking.

Royle became Hofstra's Assistant Director of Athletics in 1985, serving as team administrator for numerous programs, including Football and Lacrosse. In 1995 he was promoted to Associate Director of Athletics for Compliance and University Eligibility. Royle has served as tournament director for the highly successful NCAA Division I Men's Lacrosse Championship-Northern Quarterfinals at Hofstra Stadium in 1997 and 1998, and was a member of the NCAA Men's Lacrosse Committee. Royle and his wife of 36 years, Mary, have three children, Michael (35), Paul (30) and Danny (22), who is a member of the Hofstra Lacrosse team. The Royle family resides in Babylon, New York.

Royle, a Hofstra alumnus who received his bachelor's in history in 1970 and master's in educational administration in 1990, has worked in the Athletic Department at Hofstra for more than three decades. After a stellar four-year football playing career at Hofstra, where he was 1968 team captain and the third recipient of the Mayor's Trophy, Royle served as an Assistant Football Coach under three Head Coaches, Howard "Howdy" Myers, Bill Leete and Mickey Kwiatkowski, from 1969 through 1987. During this time, he served as a position coach and Defensive Coordinator with the Flying Dutchmen and made three NCAA Championship appearances.

James M. Shuart Stadium at Hofstra University

In February 2002 Hofstra University President Stuart Rabinowitz announced that the University's 15,000-seat stadium, home to Hofstra's Lacrosse (NCAA I), Football (NCAA Division I-AA) and Field Hockey (NCAA I) teams, would be named the James M. Shuart Stadium at Hofstra University.

"During Dr. James M. Shuart's 25 remarkable years as president of Hofstra University we grew from a fine regional institution to an internationally recognized university. Although every aspect of this University has benefitted immeasurably from Jim Shuart's leadership, we believe that his roots as a student athlete and his support of our fine athletic program makes the naming of the stadium particularly appropriate. By doing this we convey our admiration and respect for James Shuart to the thousands of individuals who use the James M. Shuart Stadium at Hofstra University each year," said President Rabinowitz.

"When President Emeritus James M. Shuart retired last spring, the Board of Trustees unanimously agreed that future generations of Hofstra students, faculty, alumni and visitors to our campus should be reminded of Jim's good work. Hofstra has achieved recognition for the successful integration of its outstanding academic and athletic programs. By naming the James M. Shuart Stadium at Hofstra University we provide an ongoing testamentary to Dr. Shuart's contribution to Hofstra, Long Island and the entire higher education community," said John J. Conefry, Jr., Chairman of the Hofstra University Board of Trustees.

"Many remarkable dreams become reality at Hofstra thanks to the dedication and hard work of the University's Trustees, administrators and faculty. As President I worked closely with my Hofstra colleagues on projects such as the stadium. Hofstra's marvelous stadium provides students, alumni, visitors and friends with a first-class venue. It is one of the top on campus intercollegiate sports facilities, indoor or outdoor, in the New York metropolitan area. I am truly honored that the Hofstra Board of Trustees has decided to name its stadium the James M. Shuart Stadium at Hofstra University," said Hofstra President Emeritus Dr. James M. Shuart.

James M. Shuart Stadium, then known as Hofstra Stadium, was the benefit of a major renovation and expansion plan that was completed in the fall of 1996, and has made James M. Shuart Stadium one of the premier facilities in the nation.

The \$9 million project included the expansion of the seating capacity from 7,000 to 15,000; the installation of a network-quality lighting system for television broadcasts; an Athletic Department office building, which includes a press level and a

club suite level; two entrance plazas on the south and west sides of the Stadium; a facade around the outside of the Stadium; additional parking and landscaping; a pavilion in the southeast corner of the Stadium; concession and souvenir areas; two locker rooms; the installation of a state-of-the-art scoreboard in the south end zone; and the reinstallation of a scoreboard in the north end zone. James M. Shuart Stadium is the largest outdoor sports and entertainment complex on Long Island.

"The renovation and expansion of the Stadium provides our students, alumni, visitors and friends with a first-class facility in which to practice, play or watch their favorite sport," stated then-President Shuart. "It is one of the top on-campus intercollegiate sports facilities, indoor or outdoor, in the New York metropolitan area."



Opened in 1963, Shuart Stadium has served as the site for NCAA Championships, Nassau County and New York State High School Championships in football and lacrosse, world championships in men's and women's lacrosse, professional soccer, commencement exercises and cultural events. In 1968 Hofstra Stadium became the third college facility in the nation to install an artificial playing surface, following the University of Houston (The Astrodome) and Indiana State University (Memorial Stadium).

Shuart Stadium has become a focal point of the Long Island sports scene, serving as the home of the NCAA Division I Men's Lacrosse Championship Quarterfinals, conference championships, the Outback Steakhouse Long Island All-Star Football Game, the Hero's Bowl, the Long Island Lizards of Major League Lacrosse, various Long Island High School and New York State championship games and the 1999 Empire State Games. The Stadium also served as a home for the Long Island Rough Riders of professional soccer's A-League.

The two largest crowds in Hofstra Stadium history occurred during the hosting of the NCAA Lacrosse Quarterfinals. A crowd of 12,292, an NCAA men's lacrosse championship quarterfinal record and the largest-ever lacrosse crowd on Long Island, witnessed the 1999 NCAA quarterfinals featuring Hofstra versus Johns Hopkins and Duke versus Georgetown, and 10,510 fans attended the 2001 quarterfinals that featured Hofstra against Syracuse.

In addition to the recent renovations, within the past decade the Stadium has received a new balsam turf playing surface, several sections of new chair-back seating, a new sound system and the \$3.8 million Joseph M. Margiotta Field House in the south end zone.

Margiotta Hall

Opened in 1992, Joseph M. Margiotta Hall, a magnificent three-story, 22,500-square-foot building, is the centerpiece of the Hofstra University Football and Lacrosse programs. The state-of-the-art field house, combined with Hofstra's 15,000-seat stadium and all-purpose artificial turf, has created one of the finest I-AA facilities in the nation.

Margiotta Hall, designed by Angelo F. Corva & Associates, features

a 3,500-square-foot weight room on the first floor. The weight room, often considered the showpiece of a football program, is outfitted with the most advanced strength training equipment available. The first floor also contains a spacious 2,600-square-foot Hofstra locker room that accommodates more than 100 student-athletes. The state-of-the-art athletic training room, also located on the first floor, has hydrotherapy and electrotherapy areas, cardiovascular and isokinetic equipment, as well as taping areas, a rehabilitation area, an aerobics room, and athletic trainer and physician offices.

On the second floor of the building, an attractive multi-purpose room, enclosed by a glass wall,

provides a panoramic view of James M. Shuart Stadium and its events. Meetings and receptions for alumni, parents and friends of the Hofstra Athletic program are held in this spacious area. This level also serves as headquarters for the Football and Men's Lacrosse coaching staffs, housing Head Coaches' and Assistant Coaches' offices, as well as meeting rooms. In

1999 the Pride Teaching and Learning Center opened on the second floor of Margiotta Hall. Funded in part by proceeds from

the Joe Gardi Golf Open, the state-of-the-art computer lab and learning center features a projection system and 18 computer work stations, which are connected to the University network for easy access to the Internet. Locker rooms for game officials and coaches and a state-of-the-art video room are also located on this level. The newest addition to the second floor of Margiotta Hall is the Hall of History, which commemorates the achievements of Hofstra's Football, Men's Lacrosse, Women's Lacrosse and Field

Hockey teams. Photos, trophies, plaques and other awards are on display in this area.

The lower level of Margiotta Hall contains spacious locker rooms for Hofstra's Field Hockey and Men's and Women's Lacrosse teams. Additional equipment, laundry and storage space can be found in this area as well. A 178-seat theater and additional meeting rooms are also located on the lower level.



The handsome lobby of Margiotta Hall contains an elegant commemorative plaque honoring donors who have contributed to this important addition to the Hofstra University campus. Those endowing scholarships and those who have dedicated a room in Margiotta Hall are also honored on the plaque.

The Howdy Myers Pavilion

In October 1998 Hofstra University President Emeritus Dr. James M. Shuart presided over the dedication ceremony for the Howdy Myers Pavilion in the south end zone of James M. Shuart Stadium. Howdy Myers served as Hofstra University's Director of Athletics, Head Men's Lacrosse Coach and Head Football Coach for a quarter of a century. His extraordinary coaching talents in both lacrosse and football from 1950 to 1975 made Howdy Myers a legend in both sports.

Myers was personally credited with the tremendous growth of lacrosse on Long Island, through the creation of scholastic clinics and demonstrations in the 1950s, and leading the Hofstra Lacrosse program to national prominence. He was years ahead of the intercollegiate athletic world with his use of many coaching innovations in both lacrosse and football.

As Hofstra Lacrosse Coach, Howdy Myers coached 26 seasons (1950-75) and recorded a 214-139-4 record. He coached Flying Dutchmen teams that captured eight divisional championships and made four NCAA Division I Championship Tournament appearances. In 1970 he received the F Morris Touchstone Award as the United States Intercollegiate Lacrosse Association (USILA) Division I Coach of the Year. In 1971 Howdy Myers received the Governor's Trophy for providing continuous and meaningful contributions to lacrosse. That same year he received lacrosse's highest honor when he was inducted into the United States Lacrosse Hall of Fame.

As Hofstra's Football Coach for 25 years (1950-74), Coach Myers recorded 15 winning seasons and a 141-98-4 record. In 1959 he led the Flying Dutchmen to the first undefeated (9-0-0) season in Hofstra Football history.

Dr. Shuart, who served as a team captain under Coach Myers in both football and lacrosse in the early 1950s, praised the coaching legend.

"Howdy Myers had a huge impact on intercollegiate and scholastic sports," Shuart said. "Renowned for his coaching abilities throughout collegiate sports, Coach Myers will always be a Hofstra legend."



Howard "Howdy" Myers passed away in 1980. Hofstra's connection to the Myers family includes his son, Howard Myers III, his daughter, Dorsey Donnelly, and his son-in-law, William Donnelly, who are all Hofstra alumni.

A portrait sculpture of Howdy Myers, created by artist Peter Homestead, stands in front of the Pavilion facing the Shuart Stadium field. In creating the sculpture, Mr.



Homestead worked from photographs and consultations with Coach Myers' family and friends. The completed sculpture captures the spirit and strength of Howdy Myers. Alumni and friends of Coach Myers have joined together to establish the Howard M. Myers Jr. Endowed Athletic Scholarship in his honor.

Hofstra University is committed to the pursuit of academic and athletic excellence. The University views participation in intercollegiate athletics as benefiting the student-athlete in an educationally enhancing experience beyond any other opportunity available. Hofstra also realizes the time commitment made by student-athletes and has committed the facilities and resources to support all students.

The University Tutorial Program (UTP) provides free tutoring in every subject area to any Hofstra student. In addition to this service, the UTP has an athletic component that addresses the academic needs of student-athletes. The UTP academic counselor administers this athletic component. The UTP emphasizes four areas in their efforts to ensure the academic success of Hofstra's student-athletes.

Area one is academic counseling. Services are provided in the areas of academic planning, career planning, personal counseling, and campus and community referrals. The counselor also meets with prospective student-athletes, at the coach's request, to share the many benefits of a Hofstra University education.

Area two is academic advising. In an effort to ease the demand on the Office of Advisement, the UTP academic counselor also advises first-year and undecided student-athletes.

Area three is academic monitoring. The UTP counselor monitors the academic progress of student-athletes to ensure compliance with Hofstra University, NCAA and conference regulations. The counselor's regular communication with the faculty and coaches provide an opportunity for early intervention should academic difficulties arise.

Area four is study halls. The University Tutorial Program provides all athletic study halls with tutors in various subjects and assesses the needs of individual student-athletes to provide the most effective study environment. The assessment tool administered by the UTP is also used to provide various enrichment seminars for the student-athletes such as time management, writing skills, campus resources, and surviving the college transition.

In the fall of 1999, the Pride Teaching and Learning Center opened on the second floor of Margiotta Hall. Funded in part by proceeds from the Joe Gardi Golf Open, the state-of-the-art computer lab and learning center features a projection system and 18 computer work stations, which are connected to the University network for easy research access to the Internet.



Sports Medicine / Athletic Training

Through a comprehensive athletic training program, Hofstra University student-athletes are provided excellent health care during their attendance at the University. A coordinated effort between the University Health and Wellness Center, the Athletic Department and outside health care providers ensures every student-athlete the best medical attention possible.

The cornerstone of this effort is the certified athletic training staff. Directed by Rick Zappala, Hofstra's Head Athletic Trainer for the past 21 years, and Assistant Athletic Trainers Christopher Grosskopf, Terry McLaughlin, Heather Clemons, Stacey Taradash, Matt Reedy and Paul Kinney, University student-athletes have direct access to a myriad of health care services. Managing the coverage of every practice and competition event, Hofstra University's Athletic Trainers provide injury management, rehabilitation and treatment to the entire Athletic program. Utilizing three state-of-the-art athletic training rooms, these professionals work tirelessly to ensure the safe participation of Hofstra's student-athletes and to return injured athletes to play quickly and safely.

Supporting the athletic trainers are team physicians Dr. Steve Nicholas and Dr. Damion Martins. Dr. Nicholas, who is in his eighth year at Hofstra, and his associates from Lenox Hill Hospital in New York City provide orthopedic care to Hofstra student-athletes. Dr. Nicholas, who also serves as a consultant to the New York Jets, runs two clinics every

week exclusively for Hofstra student-athletes. An outstanding orthopedic surgeon, Dr. Nicholas is world-renowned for his contributions to sports medicine through the Nicholas Institute of Sports and Athletic Trauma. Dr. Nicholas is supported by his associates, Dr. Michael Browne and Dr. Steve Lee, and several sports medicine fellows from Lenox Hill Hospital. Dr. Martins, a physician with Pro Health Care, Inc. in Lake Success, New York, is in his first year on Hofstra's medical team. Martins experience in the sports medicine field includes serving as team physician for the University of Maryland, University of Maryland-Baltimore County and Coppin State athletic departments. He was also on the medical staff of the National Football League's Baltimore Ravens.

Hofstra University sponsors a fully accredited, highly competitive undergraduate degree program for athletic training majors, in which Hofstra student athletic trainers participate in all aspects of the health care system.

The history of athletics at Hofstra is as old as the University itself, and is steeped in the Dutch heritage that helps to make Hofstra such a unique school.

Hofstra has always had strong roots in tradition. Ties to Dutch heritage and the Netherlands began with William S. Hofstra, after whom the school is named and on whose property the University was started. When the doors opened in 1935, the sole building on campus was Hofstra's mansion, which he had affectionately named the Netherlands after his homeland. The mansion, which houses administrative offices, is now the center of Hofstra's 240-acre campus, and has been renamed Hofstra Hall.

Also adopted in this early stage of Hofstra's history was the school alma mater, "The Netherlands." The lyrics were written by a faculty member to the music of the Dutch national anthem by the 16th-century Dutch composer Valerius.

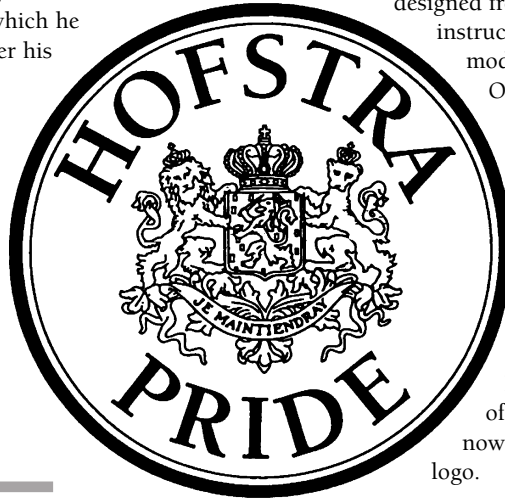
The Hofstra Flag

The Hofstra storm flag is modeled after an actual Dutch geus, a privateer's flag. In 1991 a representative of Holland's Queen Beatrix presented the banner to then Hofstra President (now President Emeritus) James M. Stuart. The history of the flag dates back to 1572, when a group of Dutch loyalists called Watergeuzen used the flag's mast to ram the gates of a Dutch city in their opposition to Spanish rule. While the Netherlands Royal Navy flies the original red, white and blue geus, the Hofstra version has been redesigned in the school colors of gold, white and blue.

The gold, white and blue Hofstra colors themselves spring from Dutch roots. The first official Hofstra flag appeared on April 19, 1940, when Dr. Alexander Loudon, an envoy for Queen Wilhelmina of the Netherlands, presented his country's flag to Hofstra in a special ceremony. However, the flag he presented was not the red, white and blue flag of the Netherlands, but the orange, white and blue banner of William of Nassau with a Hofstra emblem placed on the flag. The University has used the design ever since, although President Stuart, after researching the colors, replaced the orange hue with gold, making the flag truer to the original House of Nassau. The flag is one

of Hofstra's most recognizable symbols, utilized in publications, pins and souvenirs.

The Hofstra Seal



The Hofstra seal, another easily recognizable emblem, was designed from the royal Dutch emblem by art instructor Constant Van de Wall. The seal is modeled on the coat of arms of the House of Orange-Nassau. The round seal includes the coat of arms, flanked by lions on either side. A lion also stands in the center of the coat of arms, holding a sword in its right claw and a bundle of seven arrows, which represent the seven provinces of Holland, in its left. The seal also carries the motto of the House of Orange-Nassau in Old French: "Je maintiendray" (I stand steadfast). In 1988 one of the two lions on the seal was officially replaced with a lioness. The seal is now the focal point of the "Hofstra Pride" logo.

The Hofstra Nicknames

The Hofstra nickname has also evolved over the years. For decades, Hofstra athletic teams have used the nicknames Flying Dutchmen, Dutchmen, or Dutch. Recently, an additional nickname of The Pride has become popular. We have not changed our nickname. We are both the Dutch (and its variations) and the Pride.

The Pride nickname started during the University's dramatic recovery and growth in the mid to late '80's from a major fiscal crisis during the previous decade. The first consistent use of the word "Pride" relating to athletics started in 1989 when the University's athletic booster club was founded and called itself The Pride Club. At that time it had no meaning associated with our teams. It was simply consistent with a general feeling about all of our efforts.

The Pride nickname has also evolved over the past decade in a more specific fashion than just the expression of the feeling. The word pride is used to describe a sense of having strong self-respect or a sense of accomplishment. But in



1988 the lion on the right side of the shield on the Hofstra seal was changed into a lioness to symbolize gender equity. This, in turn, led to the development of the University mascots — Kate and Willie Pride, a lion and lioness. The two lions led to extensive use of the word “Pride” in talking about Hofstra, as a group of lions is called a pride. In 1995 bronze reproductions of the lion and lioness were added to the campus scenery. In fact, there are now four such pairs of sculptures on campus.

However, the evolution continues even further. In 1997, the University purchased a sculpture by Paul Manship of “Atalanta,” a figure from Greek mythology. It is an impressive 14-foot tall figure of a running woman. It is on the west side of Hofstra Stadium. To complement this figure, in 1998, the University commissioned Gregg Wyatt to sculpt a similarly sized figure of a running man. In this case it was a representation of “Hippomenes” who was a central figure in the myth. The myth of Atalanta and Hippomenes relates closely to Hofstra symbology.

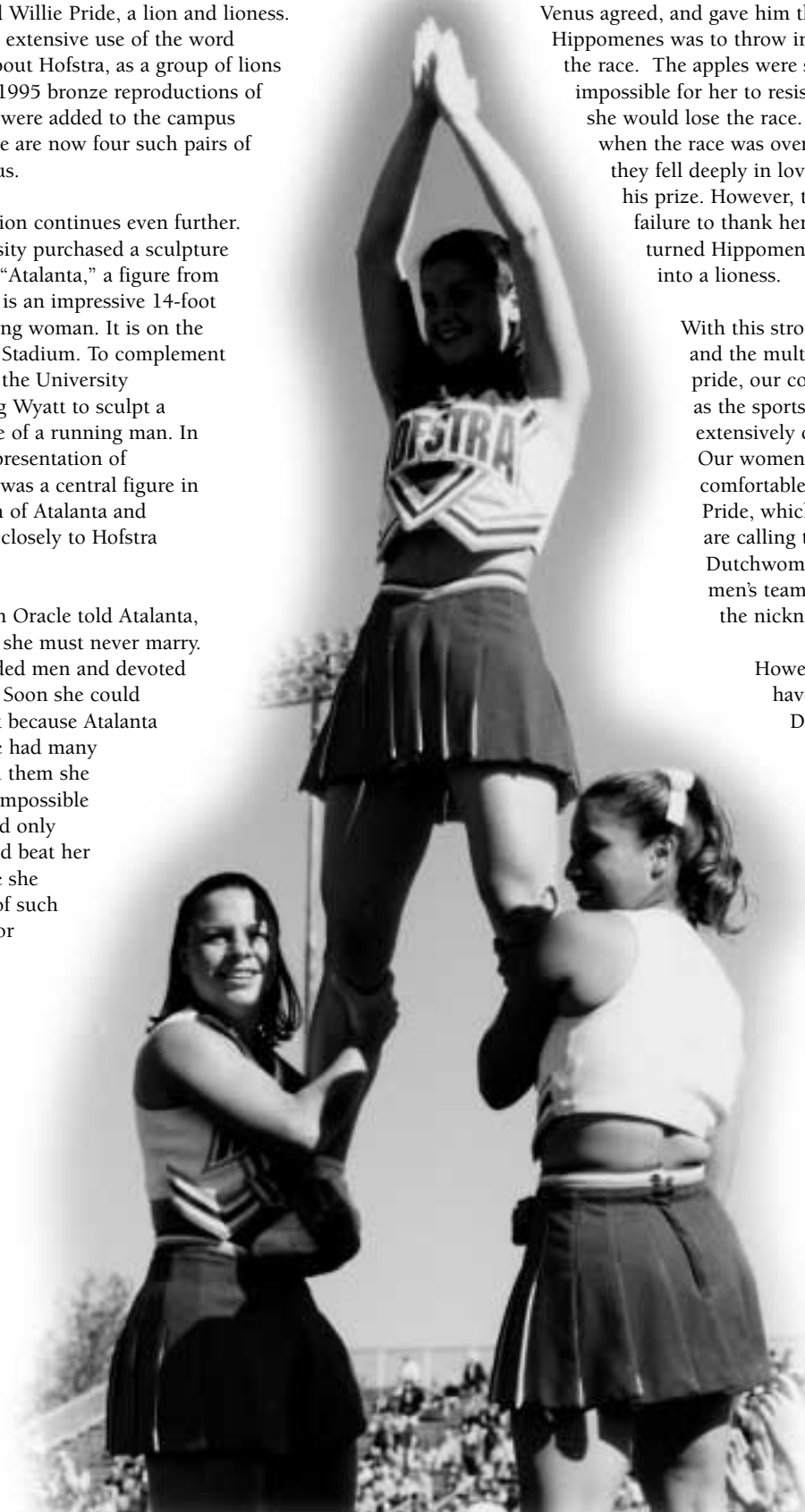
As the myth goes, an Oracle told Atalanta, as a young girl, that she must never marry. Thus, Atalanta avoided men and devoted herself to the chase. Soon she could outrun any man. Yet because Atalanta was so attractive she had many suitors. To deal with them she imposed an almost impossible condition. She would only marry one who could beat her in a foot race. While she would be the prize of such a race, the penalty for losing was death. Nonetheless there were suitors and there was need of a judge for such races. Hippomenes was chosen for this role. However, when he saw Atalanta he

immediately fell in love with her. Knowing he could never out run her, he sought the help of Venus.

Venus agreed, and gave him three golden apples, which Hippomenes was to throw in front of Atalanta during the race. The apples were so desirable it would be impossible for her to resist picking them up, and thus she would lose the race. All this came to pass, and when the race was over and won by Hippomenes, they fell deeply in love and the youth carried off his prize. However, they angered Venus for their failure to thank her. As punishment, she turned Hippomenes into a lion and Atalanta into a lioness.

With this strong identification with lions and the multiple meanings of the word pride, our coaches and players, as well as the sports media, have begun to use it extensively over the last several years. Our women’s teams especially are more comfortable calling themselves The Pride, which is genderless, than they are calling themselves The Flying Dutchwomen or the Lady Dutch. The men’s teams are also comfortable with the nickname Pride.

However, as noted earlier, we have not abandoned the Flying Dutchmen or formally adopted The Pride. There is nothing wrong with having more than one nickname. It is not uncommon for a school to have two nicknames as institutions such as Yale, Virginia, Georgia Tech and Army have multiple monikers. The bottom line is our name is HOFSTRA.



Long Island, New York

Long Island offers the best of both worlds: it is a suburban haven that is also convenient to New York City. Location, however, is just one of many assets that makes Long Island attractive to both native residents and visitors alike. The people, the sites and the unique geography of Long Island bring people back again and again.

Long Island is the largest island adjoining the continental United States. Twenty miles wide and approximately 118 miles long, Long Island is separated from the mainland on the north by the Long Island Sound and on the south by the Atlantic Ocean. It measures 100 miles from the Nassau-Queens border to Montauk Point, which lies on the eastern tip of the South Fork. The eastern tip of the North Fork is called Orient Point. The forks are separated by the beautiful waters of the Great Peconic Bay and Gardiner's Bay. Nestled in the bays between the two forks are Shelter Island and Gardiner's Island.

With a population of 2.6 million people, Long Island has a population larger than 20 states. It has 19 colleges and universities with 150,000 students, and 127 public school districts with more than 415,000 students. The region is considered one of the nation's wealthiest areas with a per household median income of \$52,000. The work force on Long Island now exceeds 1.4 million persons, and the region boasts one of the lowest unemployment rates in the nation. The economy is made up of more than 85,000 businesses, has 50 million square feet of office space, and has more than 1,000 shopping malls. Roosevelt Field is the premier mall on Long Island, featuring department stores and specialty shops, and is only minutes from the Hofstra University campus.

The most distinguishing features of Long Island, however, are its scenic beauty and its many sites and attractions. It has become a vacation spot for many, a "getaway" from big city hassles and distractions. People travel to enjoy the 1,100 square miles of shoreline on more than 150 different beaches. No area of the Island is more than 15 minutes from a world-class beach. Jones Beach, which lies on the south shore, is a 2,400-acre park with six miles of ocean beach, boardwalk, bay beach, pool, golf and outdoor concerts. It is 10 minutes from Hofstra and, in the summer, students can catch a Hofstra shuttle bus to the beach.

In addition, Long Island is home to 20 state parks, 100 golf courses, 100 tennis clubs and 400 yacht clubs. The active person can enjoy camping, canoeing, bicycling, water skiing, boating or fishing. Others might enjoy visiting any of the lighthouses, the millionaire mansions, the art galleries or one of Long Island's 14 wineries. The tourist may join the crowd at theaters and gourmet seafood restaurants, or hit one of the many exciting nightclubs. Families might cool off at the beach or the water park. The Hamptons, at the heart of the South Fork, are considered a summer resort area and are famous as the playground community of the rich and famous.

Long Island is the place for the sports fan, as well. The Nassau Veterans Memorial Coliseum, which is literally across the street from Hofstra, offers concerts, children's shows and is home to the National Hockey League's New York Islanders. Belmont Park, home of horse racing's Belmont Stakes,

offers the thoroughbred horse enthusiast an outlet in beautiful surroundings. Heading into Queens, there's Shea Stadium, home of the New York Mets. Further west, and a short ride via the Long

Island Rail Road, is New York City, where students can frequent museums, theaters, retailers, Madison Square Garden, South Street Seaport and more.

More than 24 million people visit Long Island each year pumping approximately \$7 billion into its

economy through tourism. Long Island is not merely a place for the tourist, however. Generations have settled down and made their living on Long Island, enjoying the benefits of moderate climate, miles of beautiful beaches, easy access to New York City, and a place to call home. With scores of major attractions and distinctive sites, Long Island has it all for the tourist, as well as the year-round resident.

The Colonial Athletic Association

Boasting a roster of 10 well-respected academic institutions, the Colonial Athletic Association continues to build on a proud history as one of the nation's top collegiate conferences.

With the addition of four new members last year, the CAA's geographic footprint stretches from the shadow of the Statue of Liberty to the beaches of North Carolina. The landscape of the CAA is dotted with major metropolitan areas that include four of the nation's top 25 media markets – New York (1), Philadelphia (4), Washington, D.C. (8) and Baltimore (24).

The CAA showcases the athletic and academic skills of some of the nation's top student-athletes. On the playing field, the conference has produced 15 national team champions in four different sports, 28 individual national champions, 11 national coaches of the year and nine national players of the year. In recent years, the CAA has ranked as the top Division I non-football conference in the Sears Directors Cup standings.

Even more impressive, however, are the honors accumulated away from competition, which include five Rhodes Scholars, 11 NCAA post-graduate scholars and 11 Honda Award winners. Annually, there are more than 600 CAA student-athletes who post at least a 3.2 grade point average and letter in a varsity sport to garner CAA Scholar-Athlete accolades.

Under the direction of Commissioner Thomas E. Yeager, who has guided the CAA since its inception, the league basked in the national spotlight on December 13, 2000. The University of Delaware, Drexel University, Hofstra University and Towson University were introduced as the conference's newest members during a live televised press conference from the MCI Center in Washington, D.C. The four new institutions joined George Mason University, James Madison University, University of North Carolina at Wilmington, Old Dominion University, Virginia Commonwealth University and the College of William & Mary, expanding the CAA to 10 members for the first time in its history.

The CAA conducts championships in 21 men's and women's sports. Male athletes compete for championships in baseball, basketball, cross country, golf, lacrosse, soccer, swimming & diving, tennis, track & field and wrestling. Female athletes battle for conference titles in basketball, cross country, field hockey, lacrosse, soccer, softball, swimming & diving, tennis, track & field, volleyball and golf.

The CAA traces its roots back to 1983 when three of its current members- George Mason, James Madison, and William

and Mary - were aligned with East Carolina University, the United States Naval Academy and the University of Richmond as a basketball league (ECAC South). During the next two years, the league added 11 sports, acquired two new members (UNC Wilmington and American) and decided to form a new association.

The transformation from ECAC South to CAA took place on June 6, 1985. A "Proclamation of Creation" was signed by representatives of the eight charter institutions and by members of the media assembled for the announcement. By the fall of 1986, the league gained automatic bids to NCAA Championships in men's basketball, soccer, baseball and women's basketball and formed an officials' bureau. Old Dominion became a member of the CAA in 1991-92 and Virginia Commonwealth University joined the conference in 1995-96.

In men's basketball, the CAA has earned a reputation as a "giant killer" in the NCAA Tournament. Since 1981, CAA schools have posted 12 wins over higher-seeded teams, including UNC Wilmington's upset of Southern California last March. Nine of the conference's 10 teams have made at least two NCAA Tournament appearances since 1990.

The tradition is equally as strong in women's basketball, where Old Dominion and James Madison represent two of the top 10 winningest teams in the history of Division I. The Lady Monarchs have captured three national championships (1979, 1980, 1985) and reached the title game in 1997.

Last season, ODU advanced to the Elite Eight before falling to eventual national champion Connecticut. JMU made four Sweet 16 appearances between 1986 and 1991.

The conference has also excelled in many other sports. CAA squads have won 10 field hockey national titles since the championship began in 1981, which is not only more than any other conference but represents nearly half of all titles won. In baseball, the CAA has ranked as one of the nation's top five conferences in four of the past five seasons, with six teams rated among the top 100 in Division I last season. The CAA is annually ranked among the nation's top 10 conferences in men's and women's soccer, and has traditionally sent multiple teams to the NCAA Tournament. The conference finished the 2001-02 campaign with teams ranked among the top 20 nationally in cross country, field hockey, soccer, women's basketball, wrestling, tennis and lacrosse.

From all-star athletes to Nobel Prize winning faculty, the CAA takes great pride in producing performers who not only stand out on the playing field, but also in the classroom.

GAME 1 AT MASSACHUSETTS:

Paul Rao scored 13 seconds into the first overtime to give the 10th-ranked Pride of Hofstra a 12-11 victory over the 12th-ranked Minutemen of Massachusetts at Garber Field. The overtime goal averted a Minutemen come-from-behind victory. Hofstra had built an 8-3 lead in the second quarter, only to see UMass rally back in the second half to tie the game at 10 on a goal by Dan Paccione with 4:23 in regulation and then take an 11-10 lead with 3:26 to play after a goal by Jeff Zywicki. But Hofstra was able to get the ball back in the waning seconds of regulation as Tom Kessler fed Steve McTigue, who fired a behind-the-head shot past UMass goalie Rob Schneider with 2.8 seconds remaining in regulation. In the overtime, Rao, in his Hofstra debut after transferring from Nassau Community College in January of 2001, won the face-off, scooped up the ground ball, ran down the right side and bounced a shot past UMass goalie Schneider to end the contest. Rao led the Pride with three goals in the contest. Tom Kessler, Jim Femminella and Steve McTigue each added two goals for Hofstra, while Kevin Dougherty chipped in with one goal and two assists. Leveille and Paccione, who each tallied three goals for the Minutemen, and Jeff Zywicki, who tallied two goals in the contest, scored unanswered goals in the fourth quarter to put UMass ahead. Leveille scored an unassisted goal 2:34 into the period while Paccione scored eight minutes later. In a very physical but evenly played game, UMass outshot Hofstra 33-22 while Hofstra picked up 52 ground balls to the Minutemen's 45. Hofstra goalie Jack Alaimo recorded 13 saves in the cage while Schneider posted eight saves.

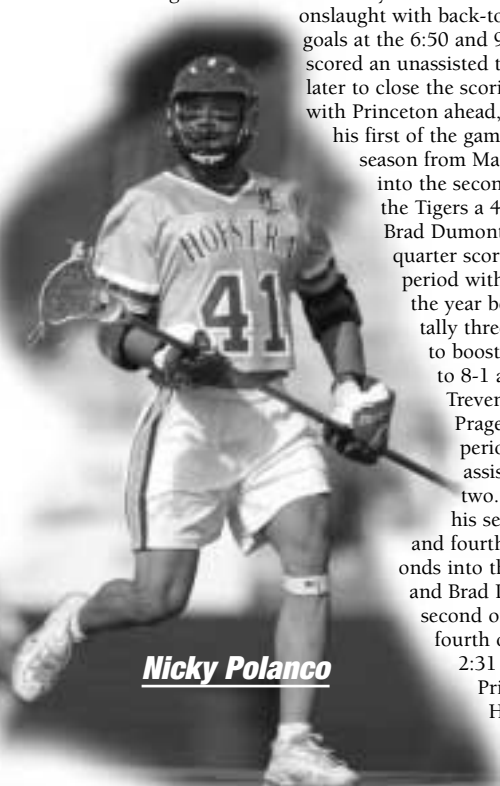

GAME 6 VS. FAIRFIELD:

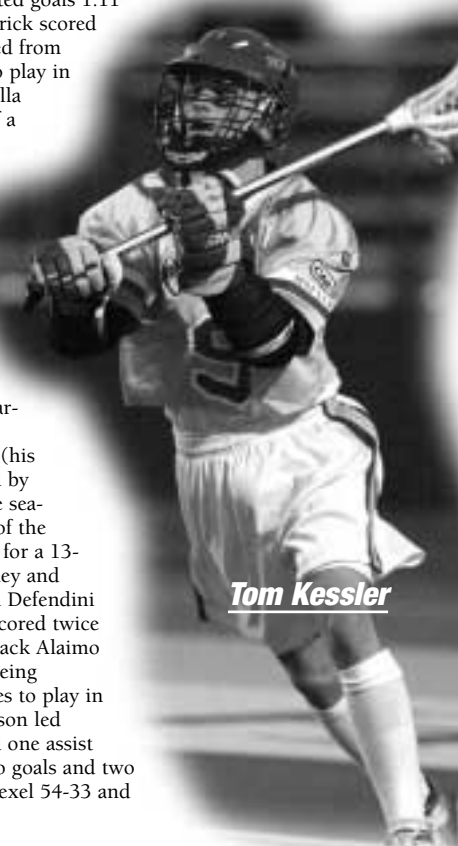

GAME 9 VS. ARMY:

Scott Dooley scored a career-high five goals and eight points and linemate Steve McTigue added a career-high six points on two goals and four assists to lead the 12th-ranked Hofstra Pride to a 16-9 victory over Army at Hofstra Stadium. Hofstra scored the first five goals of the game on the way to a 6-2 lead after one quarter and an 11-4 lead at halftime. McTigue opened the scoring 2:25 into the contest with his ninth goal of the year. Dooley followed with an unassisted tally, his 12th of the season, just 1:27 later. At the 5:32 mark, Jim Femminella took a pass from McTigue and scored his ninth of the year to give the Pride a 3-0 lead. 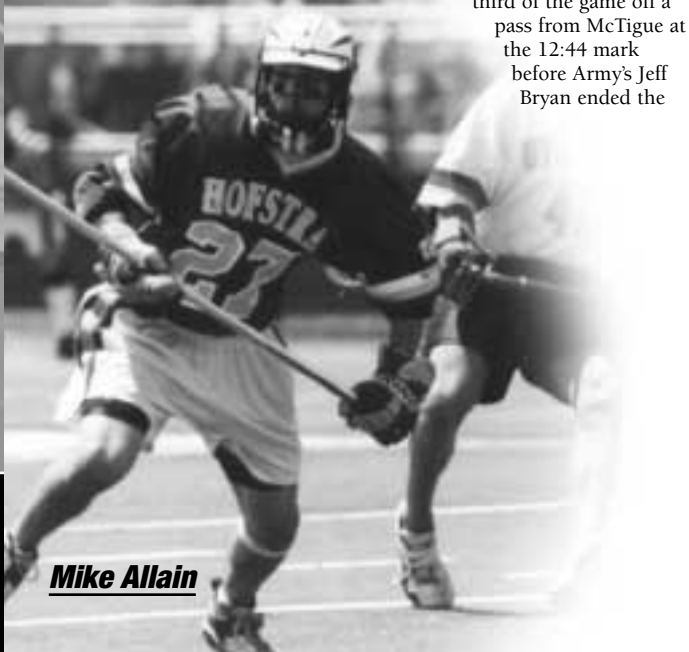

GAME 10 AT TOWSON:

Tom Kessler's second goal of the game and the record-setting 130th of his career broke a 7-7 tie 2:17 into the fourth quarter and propelled the 11th-ranked Hofstra Pride to a 13-7 Colonial Athletic Association victory over the 14th-ranked Towson Tigers at Minnegan Stadium. The Pride jumped on Towson early, building a 6-0 lead by halftime after two goals in the first quarter and four in the second. Kessler opened the scoring 7:12 into the contest off a feed from Steve McTigue. It was Kessler's 17th goal of the year. Just nine seconds before the end of the quarter, senior attack Scott Dooley scored his first of three goals on the day and the 17th of the season to give the Pride a 2-0 lead. GAME 11 AT DELAWARE:

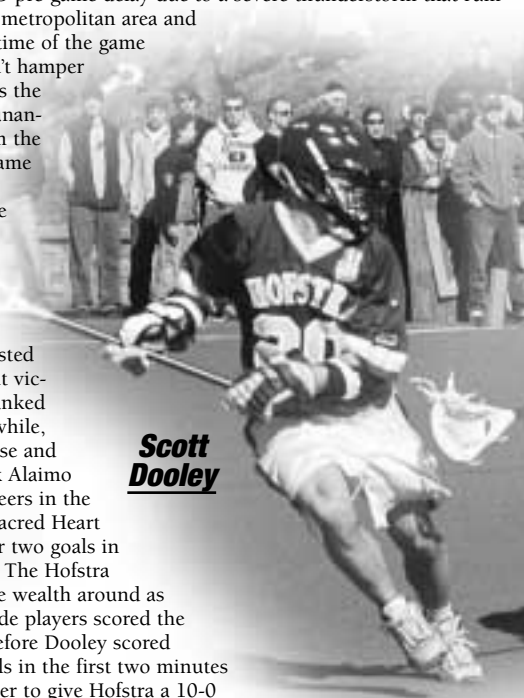

GAME 12 VS. SACRED HEART:

Scott Dooley recorded three goals and two assists, and Adam Hananel and Jim Femminella each added three goals and one assist to lead the ninth-ranked Hofstra Pride to a 19-5 Colonial Athletic Association victory over the Sacred Heart Pioneers at Hofstra Stadium. The victory is Hofstra's seventh consecutive win as the Pride produced their highest goal output of the season. A 1:45 pre-game delay due to a severe thunderstorm that rumbled through the metropolitan area and pushed the start time of the game

to 8:45 p.m. didn't hamper Hofstra's efforts as the Pride scored 10 unanswered goals from the start to put the game away early. The Pride scored three times in the first, five in the second, seven in the third quarter and four more in the fourth as they posted their 17th straight victory over an unranked opponent. Meanwhile, the Hofstra defense and senior goalie Jack Alaimo blanked the Pioneers in the first half before Sacred Heart broke through for two goals in the third quarter. The Hofstra offense spread the wealth around as nine different Pride players scored the first nine goals before Dooley scored back-to-back goals in the first two minutes of the third quarter to give Hofstra a 10-0 lead. GAME 13 VS. DUKE:

Scott Dooley scored two of his three goals in a 5-0 first half run, junior mid-die Paul Rao scored three goals, and the Pride defense clamped down on the Duke offense as ninth-ranked Hofstra posted a convincing 14-6 victory over seventh-ranked Duke at Hofstra Stadium. A crowd of 5,995 saw the Pride post their eighth consecutive victory and keep their hopes alive for an NCAA Tournament at-large bid. Hofstra freshman middie Mike Morrison tallied a goal and two assists, senior middie Adam Hananel added three assists, and senior goalie Jack Alaimo had to make only four saves as the Pride defense held Duke to 22 shots while Hofstra took 41. Duke junior middie Kevin Cassese led the Blue Devils with four goals and one assist while leading scorer Alex Lieske was held to a goal and an assist. Senior goalie A.J. Kincel posted 14 saves in the Duke cage. Duke jumped out to a 2-0 lead on goals by Kevin Brennan, his 15th of the year, at the 3:00 mark and Lieske, his 18th, nine minutes later. GAME 14 VS. NORTH CAROLINA:

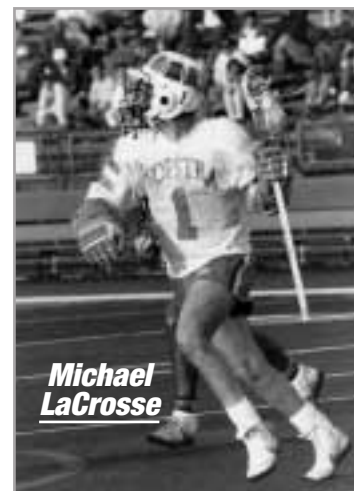

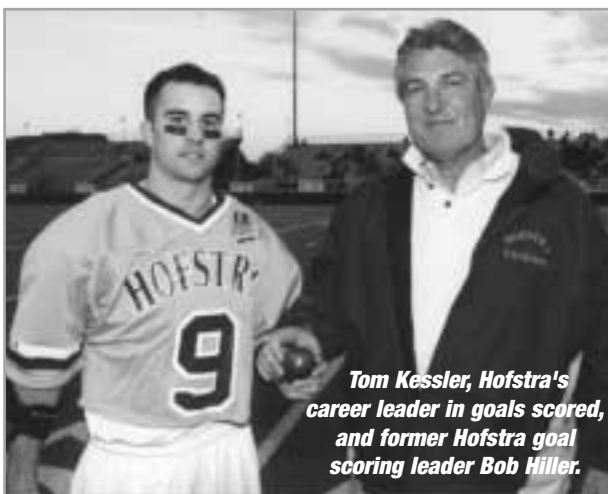

Doug Shanahan

Doug Shanahan

Every few years a student-athlete comes along with extraordinary talent and skill. Hofstra enjoyed the presence of such an athlete in Doug Shanahan from 1997 through 2001. The Farmingville, Long Island native was a two-sport standout, starring in lacrosse and football, and was the first two-sport, two-time All-American in Hofstra history. As a matter of fact, Shanahan received All-American honors three times in lacrosse.

Before one looks at Shanahan's lacrosse credentials, it should be remembered that he was a two-time I-AA All-American at safety for the Hofstra football team as the Pride made three NCAA I-AA Championship appearances during his four years in the secondary. His career was highlighted by big plays and he ended his college football career as one of the more prolific defensive scoring players in school history. During his tenure, he returned five interceptions or fumbles for touchdowns. In addition, Shanahan recorded 15 career interceptions and was among the team leader in tackles every season.

If Shanahan was outstanding in football, he excelled in lacrosse. In 1999, he received USILA All-America honorable mention honors after leading the team in scoring with 21 goals and 14 assists, ground balls with 106 and winning 101 of 181 face-offs (61.3).

As a junior in 2000, Shanahan's point production dipped slightly but his impact was just as large as he tallied 16 goals and eight assists, led the team in ground balls with 143 and was third in the country in face-off winning percentage with

a 64.2 mark, winning 181 of 282 draws. He was named to the USILA's All-America Second Team.

Shanahan saved his best for his senior season, recording 43 goals and 13 assists, once again led the team in ground balls with 125, ranked 14th in the country in face-offs winning 167 of 285 draws for a 56.6 percentage and led the Pride to the NCAA Tournament Quarterfinals for the second time in three years. His hard work and his impact on Hofstra and in the lacrosse world were recognized when he was named to the USILA All-America First Team; received the USILA's Lt. Donald McLaughlin Jr. Award as the Division I Midfielder of the Year; received the USILA's Lt. Raymond J. Enners Award as the Outstanding Lacrosse Player in



Division I; and received the 2001 Tewaaraton Trophy from the Washington, D.C. University Club as the Top Male Lacrosse Player in the country.



During his four-year career at Hofstra University, Shanahan played in 63 games and accumulated 95 goals, 44 assists, 139 points, a school-record 450 ground balls, 347 shots and won 528 of 868 face-offs for a winning percentage of 60.8. Although all of his career statistical numbers are not superior, his contributions to the Hofstra teams and the program during his tenure were.



It was an added bonus when he was invited to tryout last June and made the United States Team for the 2002 World Championships. Not one to miss an opportunity, Shanahan's fine play in leading the United States to the World title earned him the ILF World Championships Best and Fairest Award, which is the equivalent of the Championships' Most Valuable Player Award, as well as a spot on the 2002 International Lacrosse Federation's All-World Team.

Doug Shanahan is undeniably the most honored player in the history of Hofstra Lacrosse. He had the unique ability to make a play when the team needed one and his desire to compete and his will to win were second to no one.



A man with many options for his career path, Shanahan has been a member of the New York Jets of the NFL, the New York Dragons of the AFL, and the New York Saints of the MLL since the World Championships last Summer. His name and his successes have become synonymous with Hofstra Lacrosse. His impact will be felt for many years to come.

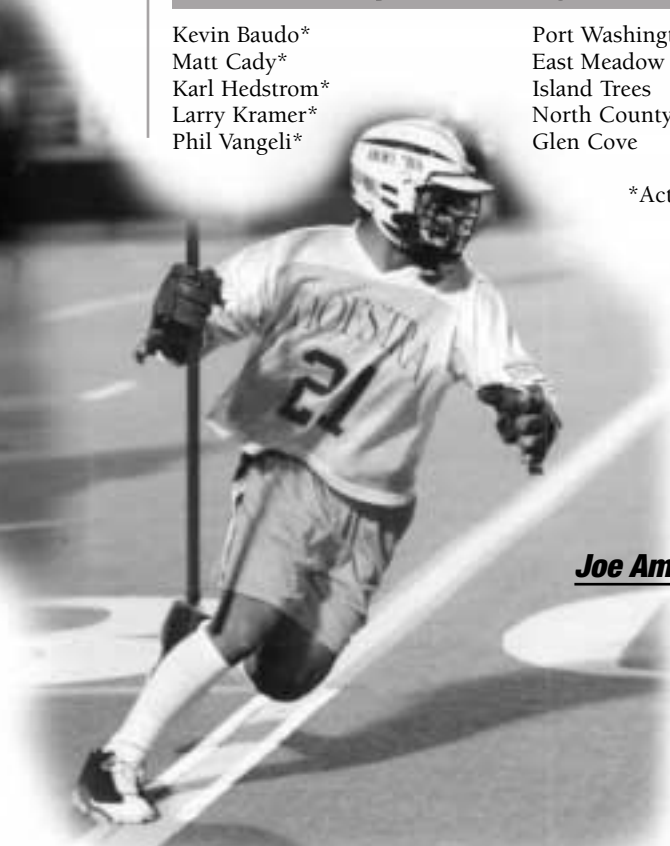

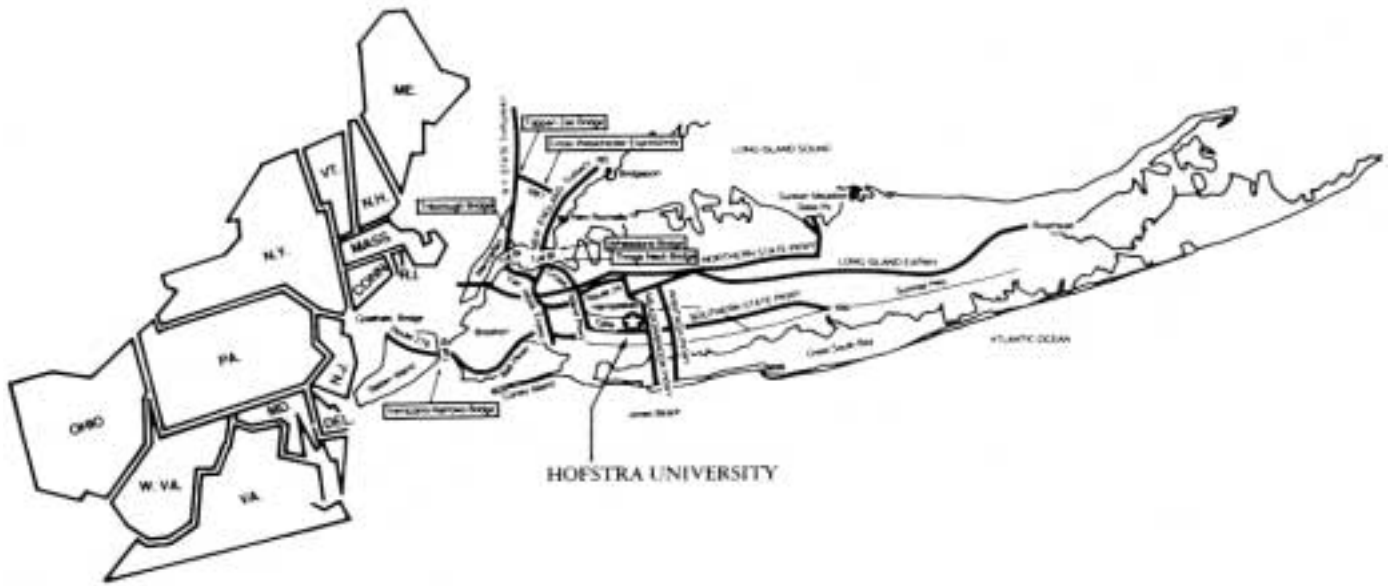

From Southern New Jersey, Southeastern Pennsylvania, Maryland, Washington, D.C. and Virginia:

Take the New Jersey Turnpike to Exit 13. Cross the Goethals Bridge and continue on Route 278 to the Verrazano-Narrows Bridge. Stay in the left lane of the Bridge and take the Belt Parkway-East. The Belt Parkway becomes the Southern State Parkway at the Nassau County line. Take the Southern State Parkway to the Meadowbrook Parkway North (Exit 22). Exit the Meadowbrook Parkway at Exit M4 (Hempstead Turnpike Route 24). Head west to Hofstra (approximately 1 mile).

From Northwestern New Jersey, Northern Pennsylvania and the Middle States:

Take Interstate 78, Interstate 80, U.S. Route 22, New Jersey Route 4 or New Jersey Route 17 to the George Washington Bridge. Proceed over the bridge to the Cross Bronx Expressway. Take the Cross Bronx Expressway to the Throgs Neck Bridge. Follow directions from the Throgs Neck Bridge from this point.

From Upstate New York:

Take New York Thruway over the Tappan Zee Bridge to Cross Westchester Expressway (Interstate 287). Stay on the Expressway to the New England Thruway (Interstate 95). Proceed south on the Thruway to the Throgs Neck Bridge. Follow directions from the Throgs Neck Bridge from this point.

From the Throgs Neck Bridge:

Follow signs for Eastern Long Island. Take the Cross Island Parkway to the Grand Central Parkway-East. The Grand Central becomes the Northern State Parkway at the Nassau County line. Take the Northern State Parkway-East to the Meadowbrook Parkway-South (exit 31A). Take the Meadowbrook Parkway-South to Exit M4 West (Hempstead Turnpike Route 24). Follow Hempstead Turnpike West to Hofstra (approximately 1 mile).

For Team Travel Via Bus:

Commercial buses are not allowed on New York City (Belt, Grand Central or Cross Island) or Long Island (Southern State or Northern State) Parkways. Team buses should take the Brooklyn-Queens Expressway from the south, and the Clearview Expressway from the north, to get to the Long Island Expressway for the trip to Hofstra. Once on the Long Island Expressway (I-495), buses should proceed to Glen Cove Road-South (exit 39). Head south on Glen Cove Road for approximately eight miles to Hempstead Turnpike/Fulton Avenue and turn left (east). Hofstra University is approximately two miles east on Hempstead Turnpike.

Public Transportation from Airport:

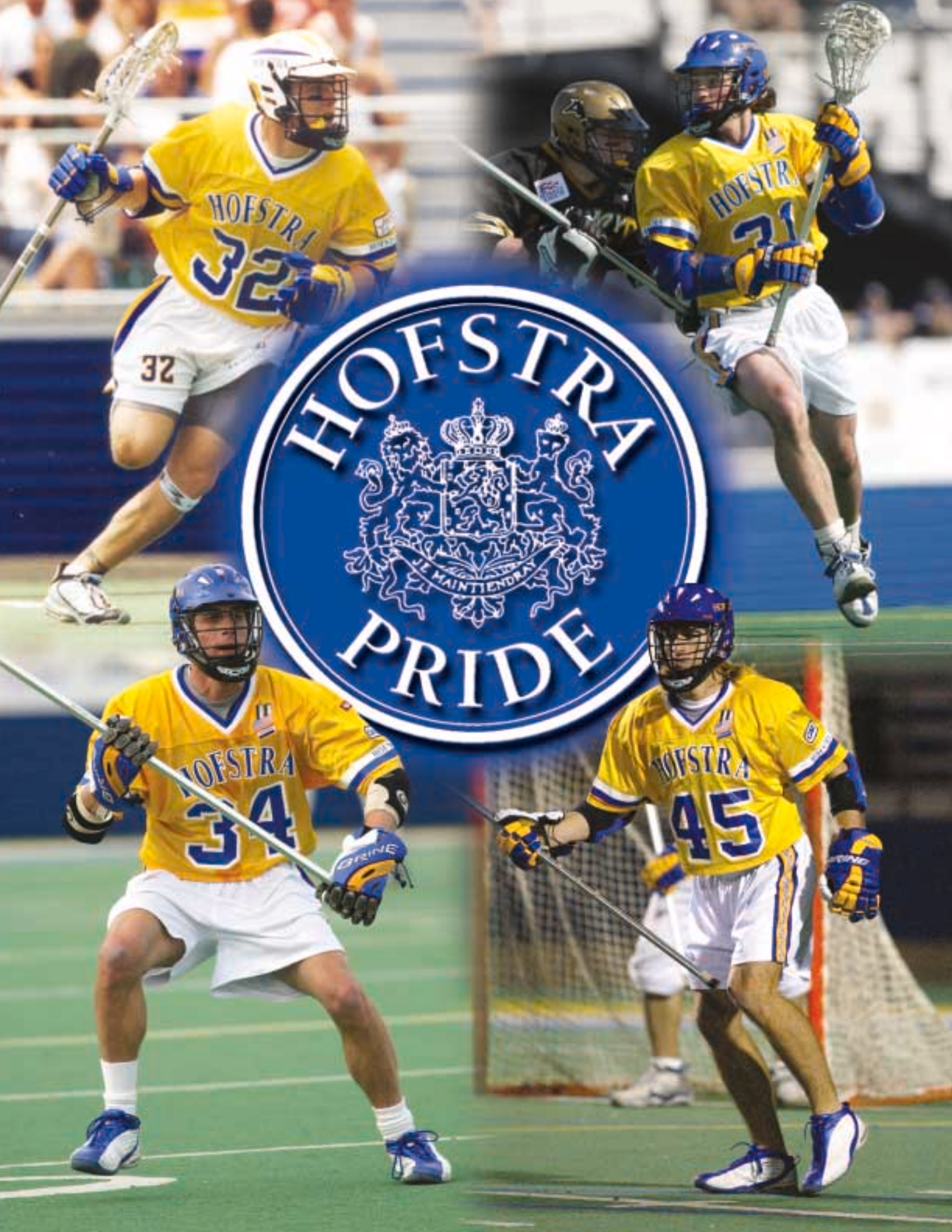
If a visitor arrives at either La Guardia or Kennedy Airport, the most direct means of reaching the University is by one of three limousine companies that service both airports and the Hofstra University area. Larry's Taxi Service (516) 483-3333; Transport Limousine Service (800) 654-1164 (out of state) (800) 832-5466 (in New York state); Winston Limousine Service (800) 4-AIR-PORT.

Railroads:

AMTRAK services Pennsylvania Station in Manhattan, approximately 30 miles from the Hofstra campus. To get to Hofstra from Penn Station, take the Long Island Rail Road to the Hempstead station. The Hofstra University Courtesy Bus and taxi services are available there. Hofstra is approximately 1.5 miles from the station.
