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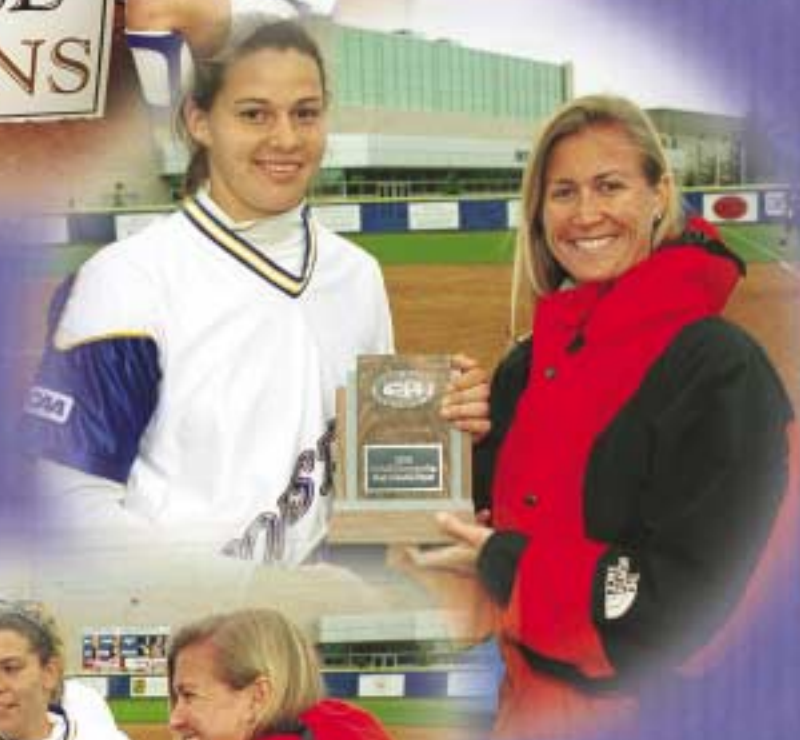

THIS IS HOFSTRA UNIVERSITY



Founded in 1935 in one building on 15 acres in Hempstead, New York, Hofstra University today has approximately 130 buildings on 240 acres. Located on Long Island, 25 miles east of Manhattan, the Hofstra student body of approximately 13,400 comes from 44 states and 64 countries. The Colleges and Schools of the University are: Hofstra College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, the Frank G. Zarb School of Business, New College, School of Communication, School of Education and Allied Human Services, School of Law, School for University Studies, University College for Continuing Education, Honors College and Saturday College. Bachelor's degrees are offered in 130 areas of study. There are also approximately 130 graduate programs, including Ph.D., Ed.D., Psy.D. and J.D. degrees, advanced certificates and professional diplomas.

The George Dempster Hall for Communications is one of the largest, most advanced, non-commercial television facilities in the East. It houses a highly sophisticated television production/post-production facility with two broadcast quality studios and control rooms; two advanced online video edit suites; two Avid non-linear digital editing systems and several cuts-only video work stations. Two satellite dishes are available with one dish providing special news feeds for the broadcast journalism room, which also has access to *Associated Press*, *Nexis-Lexis* and *Dow Jones* services. In addition, the facility is capable of feeding student-produced programming to the entire campus on our own cable channels. Also located here is the University's radio station

(WRHU/ 88.7-FM), audio production studios, a film/video screening room, film editing rooms, a computer laboratory, a speech performance studio and a large dance studio.



Hofstra's new C.V. Starr Hall offers academic facilities that are among the most technologically advanced in the nation. Every seat in every classroom allows students direct access to the Internet and Hofstra network – including the resources of Hofstra's Axinn Library.

Hofstra's growing computer facilities offer extensive high-tech training opportunities. There are computer terminals throughout the campus for student and faculty use. The University was ranked as one of *Yahoo Internet Life's* "100 Most Wired Colleges" for 2001-2002, with more than 750 PC, Macintosh and UNIX workstations available in labs and classrooms.

The fully computerized Hofstra Libraries contain 1.6 million volumes for student use. Only about 5 percent of American colleges have collections as extensive, and 85 percent have fewer than half that number.

Hofstra sponsors 500 cultural events annually, bringing thousands of scholars, dignitaries and other participants to campus. Hofstra has more than 200 musical and dramatic performances on campus each year.

Hofstra has 12 galleries and exhibition areas and an extensive outdoor sculpture collection. Five of the galleries and exhibition areas and the outdoor sculpture collection are directly under the auspices of the Hofstra Museum. In addition, the entire 240-acre campus is used as an open-air gallery that includes more than 60 outdoor sculptures, acting as a showcase for the Hofstra Museum, which houses one of the largest art collections in the metropolitan area. The Hofstra Museum is accredited by the American Association of Museums, one of only 94 universities in the nation and one of six in New York with such credentials.

Hofstra also has seven theaters, a student newspaper, a Student Center, a recreation and center and numerous athletic facilities, including the 15,000-seat James M. Shuart Stadium and the 5,124-seat Hofstra Arena. Hofstra also has an indoor, Olympic-sized (eight lane, 50-meter) swimming pool, one of the largest such facilities in the New York metropolitan area.

The Hofstra athletic program competes on the NCAA Division I level and is a member of the Colonial Athletic Association and the Atlantic 10 Football Conference. The University sponsors 18 intercollegiate programs – nine men's sports and nine women's sports. Hofstra has men's teams in basketball, football, baseball, lacrosse, golf, tennis, wrestling, soccer and cross country. Women's sports include basketball, volleyball, softball, tennis, soccer, field hockey, lacrosse, cross country and golf. The 18 men's and women's intercollegiate athletic teams account for more than 150 home contests annually.

With its beautiful landscaping, Hofstra has won national awards for campus beautification. It is a registered member of the American Association of Botanical Gardens and Arboreta, featuring approximately 8,000 trees representing 425 species.

Hofstra's academic programs are accredited by numerous national agencies and the University is one of only 262 schools, out of more than 3,600 colleges and universities nationwide, with a chapter of the national honor society Phi Beta Kappa. Of Hofstra's 1,272 faculty members, 493 are full time and 91 percent hold the highest degrees in their fields.



The student/faculty ratio is 16-to-1.

Hofstra University is 100-percent program accessible to persons with disabilities, and has been cited as a national model for this achievement.

BILL EDWARDS

HEAD SOFTBALL COACH

Bill Edwards, a 2002 inductee into the Amateur Softball Association (ASA) Long Island Hall of Honor, has completed 13 seasons as Hofstra University Head Softball Coach and has led the Pride to national prominence. Edwards and company have garnered five NCAA Tournament appearances (1993, 1995, 1999, 2000, 2001), one Colonial Athletic Association championship (2002), four America East championships (1998, 1999, 2000, 2001), a North Atlantic Conference championship (1995), two East Coast Conference championships (1992 and 1994), and an ECAC championship (1993), and have had winning seasons every year since Edwards took the reigns of the program.

Edwards also coached the team to a #20 ranking in the final 1994 NCAA Division I Softball Poll and to #1 rankings in the Northeast Region Poll in 1993, 1994 and 1997. Hofstra was recognized as one of the top Division I softball programs in the 1990's by the NCAA.

Edwards enters his 14th season after leading the 2002 Pride to a 28-25 record and a Colonial Athletic Association title in the teams first season in the league, although the CAA did not receive an automatic qualifier to the NCAA Tournament. The Pride finished the season with a 14-game winning streak, the longest in the nation, on its way to a fifth consecutive conference title.

2001 saw the Pride post a 37-26 record, win their fourth straight America East title in the teams final season in the conference and advance to NCAA Regionals for the third straight year. Edwards saw his star senior, Lisa Ciavardini, earn America East Player of the Year accolades. The 2000 season saw Edwards coach Hofstra to a school-record 42-21 mark, a third straight America East Championship and a second straight NCAA Regionals berth. The 42 wins gave the Pride back-to-back 40-win seasons for the first time and was the third 40-win season in school history. Other highlights of the 2000 season were upsets of then top-ranked UCLA and 19th-ranked Texas at the Paradise Classic and a win over Louisiana-Lafayette at the NCAA Regionals. Edwards also saw two of his players, Alicia Smith and Lisa Ciavardini, earn NFCA All-America honors, joining Crystal Boyd as the only Softball All-Americans in school history. Edwards, along with Assistant Coaches Bella Totino and Caryl Drohan, were named the Mid-Atlantic Region Coaching Staff of the Year for their efforts.



Edwards led the Dutchwomen to their second consecutive America East Championship in 1999, earning the conference's first automatic bid to NCAA Regionals. The Dutchwomen also posted their second 40-win season under Edwards, earning him America East Coach of the Year accolades. Hofstra's America East Championship win in 1998 was followed by a loss to Massachusetts in a play-in series to NCAA Regionals. In 1995, Hofstra's first season in the North Atlantic Conference, Edwards led the squad to a 41-21 record, the North Atlantic Conference Championship and a berth in Hofstra's second NCAA Tournament. For his efforts, Edwards was selected as the North Atlantic Conference Coach of the Year and Mid-Atlantic Region Coach of the Year.

During his tenure at Hofstra, Edwards has coached three All-Americans, three Academic All-Americans, 22 Regional All-Americans, an America East Player of the Year, a two-time America East pitcher of the Year, a conference rookie of the year and 32 all-conference selections. He was named East Coast Conference Coach of the Year in 1994, North Atlantic Conference Coach of the Year in 1995, America East Coach of the Year in 1999 and Regional Coach of the Year in 1993, 1994, 1995 and 1997.

Edwards has been involved with softball on Long Island for the past 35 years, including 23 years as a slow pitch player, 15 years as an umpire, 20 years as a coach and 20 years as a clinician. He played in 15 National Labor Day Championships and won a 1983 ASA National Championship. The 1983 season also saw awards named to the ASA All-World first team. He coached the PSI Couriers in the ASA Summer Fast

Pitch League from 1986 through 1989, capturing a Mid-Atlantic Region title in 1987 and becoming the first Long Island fast pitch team to reach the ASA National Tournament, where it placed fifth. Edwards is also a past president of the Suffolk County Softball Coaches Association.

Edwards came to Hofstra from Commack High School where he coached softball for nine years. During his tenure at Commack, his teams compiled a 118-61 record and reached the Suffolk County Class A playoffs in seven of those nine years. His 1988 squad captured the Suffolk County championship and the Long Island championship, and finished third in the New York State Tournament.

A teacher in the Commack School District from 1967 through 1999, Edwards worked and coached at John F. Kennedy Junior High School, Wood Park Elementary School and Commack High School. He served two stints as freshman football coach at Kennedy Junior High School, from 1972 through 1976, and 1979 through 1980, and was also the

freshman baseball coach from 1975 through 1980. When he moved on to Commack, Edwards served as offensive coordinator from 1981 through 1983. During those three years, Commack won three league titles, two conference championships and one Suffolk County championship. In 1993 he served as head football coach at Commack.

In addition, Edwards was also head ice hockey coach at Iona College from 1968 through 1979. At Iona, his teams posted a 174-58-14 record and captured four Metropolitan Collegiate championships. In 1988 Edwards was inducted into the Iona College Sports Hall of Fame.

Edwards and his wife, Janie, have two grown daughters, Shari, who played NCAA Division I softball at Northern Illinois University and coached at Hofstra, and Karen, a licensed practical nurse. The Edwards also have one grandson, Brenden (3). Edwards received a bachelor's in physical education from Northern Michigan University in 1967 and a master's from the University at Stony Brook in 1975. The Edwards reside in Nesconset, New York.

LARISSA S. ANDERSON ASSISTANT SOFTBALL COACH



Larissa S. Anderson is in her second season as Assistant Coach at Hofstra University. Anderson joined the Pride after spending two seasons as an assistant coach at the C.W. Post campus of Long Island University. Her responsibilities at Hofstra include coaching the pitchers and catchers and serving as the hitting instructor. She is also actively involved in the Pride's recruiting efforts.

During Anderson's tenure at C.W. Post, she helped the Pioneers to a combined 75-33 record, including a school record 42 wins during the 2000 season (42-18). While at C.W. Post, she assisted in all facets of the program and was in charge of coaching the pitchers, catchers and outfielders. Her efforts helped the Pioneers to the 13th best team earned run average (1.11) in Division II in 2001. She was also part of a C.W. Post staff that received the Northeast Region Division II Coaching Staff of the Year award from the National Fastpitch Coaches Association in 2000.

Before joining the C.W. Post staff, Anderson spent the 1998 season as an assistant coach at her alma mater, Gannon University, after being named a Regional All-American outfielder in 1997. She graduated from Gannon in 1997 with a bachelor's in therapeutic recreation.

No stranger to the Hofstra Athletic community, Anderson spent the 2000-2001 academic year as an Administrative Assistant to the Women's Basketball program in addition to her coaching duties at C.W. Post. She has also coached at Hofstra's Island All-Star Softball Camp the last four summers.

Anderson married former Hofstra Assistant Baseball Coach and current Kansas City Royals minor league hitting and catching instructor Patrick Anderson in October 2001. The couple resides in East Meadow, New York.



SCOTT COPPOLA ASSISTANT COACH



Scott Coppola, a 2002 graduate of Hofstra University and a former member of the Flying Dutchmen Baseball squad, is in his first season as an Assistant Softball Coach at his alma mater. Coppola joins the coaching staff after spending nearly two years as an Events Coordinator in the Hofstra Sports Facilities Department.

Coppola was a four-year letterwinner and two-year captain for the Dutchmen from 1996 through 1999. A third

baseman and pitcher, Coppola played in 129 career games including 37 appearances as a pitcher. Coppola compiled an 11-14 record with 140 strikeouts in 170 and 1/3 innings. At the plate, Coppola batted .254 with six doubles, six triples, three home runs and 28 RBIs.

A December 2002 graduate of Hofstra with a degree in marketing, Coppola has served as a coach and counselor at the All-Star Baseball Camp from 1995 through 2000.

Coppola and his wife Taraa reside in Farmingdale, New York.

PAUL KINNEY ASSISTANT ATHLETIC TRAINER

Paul Kinney is in his first year as an Assistant Athletic Trainer at Hofstra University. Kinney brought more than five years of athletic training experience to the University and has worked at all levels of the athletic training field.



Kinney joined the Hofstra staff after two years as the graduate assistant athletic trainer at Cal State University-Northridge in Northridge, California. At CSUN Kinney served as the head athletic trainer for the women's basketball and men's volleyball programs, while overseeing the men's soccer and women's volleyball programs. He also taught an athletic training education course and served as a mentor and clinical instructor in the school's kinesiology department.

Prior to his experience at Northridge, Kinney was the head athletic trainer at the Sequoia Hospital-Center for Sports Health in Redwood City, California. Kinney has also served as the head athletic trainer at Morro Bay High School in Morro Bay, California, and for the California Jaguars and the Central Coast Roadrunners of the USISL. He was also the assistant athletic trainer of Major League Soccer's San Jose Clash.

A 1997 graduate of Cal Poly San Luis Obispo with a degree in physical education and kinesiology, Kinney received his master's in recreation management from Cal State Northridge in 2002.

2003 HOFSTRA UNIVERSITY SOFTBALL PREVIEW

An up-and-down season for the Hofstra Softball team last year clearly ended on an up. The Pride closed out the 2002 campaign with a 14-game winning streak (the longest in the nation heading into the new season) and a Colonial Athletic Association championship, the program's fifth straight postseason league title. Unfortunately, Hofstra was unable to ride its late-season momentum into the NCAA Tournament as the CAA, which was in its first season of sponsoring softball, did not have an automatic bid to the postseason.

The good news for Hofstra is that nine of the 10 players who ended the year as regulars in the starting lineup are returning this spring, giving Head Coach Bill Edwards a veteran lineup to build on the late-season success from a year ago. The bad news is that the CAA still does not have an automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament.

However, Edwards is optimistic about his team's postseason prospects. "This year, the NCAA field is going up to 64 teams (from 48), he said, "so if we come out of the chute ready to play in February, our chances of getting a bid will be much better. We're in a little better situation this year, too. Last year, we had some young pitchers that we threw into the fire, but if we can have them pick up the way they left off last season, we could really get off to a good start, which could help our chances."

Overall, Edwards liked what he saw from his team during fall practice and is looking forward to the new season. "We have a talented, athletic group of freshmen coming in that we expect to contribute right away. They have the speed, athleticism and softball instincts to come in and play like sophomores and we'll need that to be successful this year. As a whole, this is probably the most athletic team we've had, so we may do a lot more bunting and running than we have in years past. A lot of our starting positions are up for grabs."

Here is a position-by-position look at Hofstra heading into the 2003 season.

FIRST BASE

Senior Amanda Hallaway has been a mainstay at first base in her first three seasons and enters her final year six home runs away from the school's all-time record of 23. She has been a first-team All-Conference selections all three seasons. "Amanda is the type of hitter who can change a game with one swing of the bat," said Edwards. "She's one of the top power hitters we've ever had."

Hallaway could also handle the designated player position much of the time, making room for sophomore Hailey Clark, who had an injury-filled season in right field last year. "We're looking to move Hailey to first base this season to save some of the wear and tear on her legs," said Edwards. "She played first base in the fall and probably made the adjustment to a new position faster than any player I've had. We need her bat in the middle of the lineup this season."

SECOND BASE

Senior Jessica Luna, who played first base and third base in her first two seasons, split time at second base last year with since-graduated Christine Moran and provided steady defense up the middle. "We think Jessica will have a big year and surprise some people. She's a senior and it's her last go-round and this could be the season where it all comes together for her."

Freshman Lisa Wambold will begin the year as Luna's backup, but has the potential to push her way into the lineup on a full-time basis. "Lisa looked great at second in the fall. She's a tremendous athlete who definitely should contribute for us this season."

THIRD BASE

This is the only position where Hofstra lost its regular starter from last year, as Mari Shepard, who played almost every position at some point in her career, settled in at third as a senior. Freshman Tara Ulrich emerged from the fall as the likely candidate to replace her. "Tara could step right in and be an impact player for us this year. She's a very talented hitter with great softball instincts. She was solid defensively in the fall and looks ready to be a starter." Hofstra could also move Luna back to third base, where she started for a year and a half, if needed.

SHORTSTOP

The Pride expects a big season from senior Danielle Stewart, who transferred from Briarcliffe College last year and was named second team All-CAA. An early season ankle injury set her back a year ago, and Edwards thinks she'll be more of a dominant player this spring. "Danielle is poised to have a monster year," he said. "If she keeps working hard, she has a chance to be one of the premier players in the country this year. She's that good."

Hofstra also thinks it has its shortstop of the future in the fold this year, as Laura Sweeney will back up Stewart for the time being. "Sweeney's ready to play right now, she just has an All-American candidate in front of her," Edwards said. "We'll definitely get her some experience this season, even if it isn't at shortstop. She's a great athlete and can play a variety of positions, so it'll be tough to keep her out of the lineup."

OUTFIELD

Hofstra returns its top player from a year ago in senior center fielder Heather Brousseau, who was named first team All-CAA and led the team in hitting at .333. Junior Lisa Torres is back in left field after having her second straight season cut short by an injury, while right field may be up for grabs if Hailey Clark indeed settles in at first base.

"Heather had a breakthrough season last year and we expect more of the same this season," said Edwards. "She's really playing with a lot of confidence and leading the team by example. She's one of those special five-tool players that doesn't come around very often. Lisa has had some bad luck, but we hope that she'll be able to make it through a full season. She's an experienced hitter and we need her in the lineup."

One candidate for right field is sophomore Adrienne Clark, who saw time at third base, left field and in the pitching circle last year. "Adrienne played a lot of right field in the fall, but we've also had her playing third and pitching. She did a great job last year in whatever we asked of her, and it is so valuable to have a player like her who can play all nine positions and play them well."

Freshman Ashley Tymbiski saw a lot of action in the outfield in the fall and could be a top candidate to start there this season. "Ashley gives us another great athlete to put in the lineup. We'll need her to contribute right away this year, but I think she's ready to handle it." Sophomore Kelly Morris is also back from last season after seeing action in nine games. "Kelly has really improved. She worked very hard in the off-season and just keeps getting better and better." Hofstra could also have

the option of moving one of its freshman infielders (Sweeney or Wambold) to right field to get them in the lineup.

CATCHER

Junior Meaghan Almon has caught in every single inning for the Pride in the last two seasons and was named second team All-CAA last spring. She hit three home runs last year, which came against Stanford, Hawaii, and eventual national-champion California. "Meaghan is just so good at handling the pitching staff and really improved as a

defensive catcher last season," said Edwards. "She had knee surgery in the off-season, so we're hoping to cut back on her workload behind the plate. We just have such a comfort level with her back there that it's been tough to get her out of the lineup."

Freshman Kristin Galeone may finally allow Almon to rest once in a while. "Kristin has looked very, very good so far. She'll make a great backup this year and she can really hit, so we may be able to give her some at-bats as a designated player at times."

PITCHER

Last year's pitching staff was a bit thin due to injury, forcing Sara DeAngelis and Stefanie Kenney to carry heavy workloads in their first year of Division I competition. That led to some

growing pains early in the year, when the Pride started out 0-10 and 9-24, but Hofstra is expecting to see some of the benefits of that experience this spring. Kenney, who serves as the team's designated player when she is not pitching, was the MVP of the CAA Tournament, and DeAngelis was named first team All-CAA.

"Stefanie gave us everything we could have possibly asked last season," said Edwards. "She really improved in the circle last year despite some injuries and really showed she could be one of the top monster hitters in the country. The sky's the limit with her potential. Meanwhile, Sara looked incredible in the fall. She was really throwing well and putting some great hop on her pitches. She learned a lot last season and knows what she has to do this year."

Adding to the team's depth is junior Alexis Alcantara, a walk-on who missed last season to concentrate on her academics.

"It's great to have Alexis back again this year," said Edwards. "She gives us a different look in the circle and adds some depth, which we were missing last year." Last year, Adrienne Clark was forced into the role of being the third pitcher unexpectedly mid-season, since she wasn't recruited as a pitcher and didn't throw at all in the fall season. Remarkably, she didn't allow an earned run in all six outings, including a combined three innings of work against California. "Adrienne really did a great job pitching last year, and this year we've had the

chance to work with her a lot more. She's putting a lot of movement on her ball."

Freshman Amy Belonick, a first-team all-state performer from Holy Cross High School in Connecticut, helps give the Pride as deep a staff as had in years. "Amy has a lot of promise," said Edwards. She throws the ball well and with good velocity, and if she keeps working hard, she could definitely develop into a valuable addition to our staff."

SCHEDULE

This year's schedule is once again full of some challenging early-season tournaments, as the Pride will meet up with Washington, Florida Atlantic, Notre Dame, North Carolina, Massachusetts, and South Florida, among others. Hofstra also faces Big East foes Connecticut, Syracuse, Boston College, Rutgers and St. John's in its non-conference schedule. Meanwhile, the Colonial Athletic Association figures to be a tight race this spring as James Madison is expected to improve significantly in its second year of varsity competition, while George Mason, Delaware and Towson will all be looking to knock Hofstra off its perch atop the conference standings.

STUART RABINOWITZ

PRESIDENT OF HOFSTRA UNIVERSITY

Stuart Rabinowitz was chosen by the Hofstra University Board of Trustees to serve as the eighth President of the University on December 20, 2000. Prior to his appointment, he served as Dean of Hofstra University School of Law from September 1989 through June 2001. He joined the faculty of the Law School in 1972. President Rabinowitz currently holds the Andrew M. Boas and Mark L. Claster Distinguished Professorship in Civil Procedure. His other areas of special academic interest include the federal system, federal courts, and the media and free speech.

President Rabinowitz holds positions with a number of important government and community organizations, including the Nassau County Health and Welfare Council, Cradle of Aviation Museum, Fund for Modern Courts, Holocaust Memorial & Educational Center of Nassau County, Long Island Association and the Long Island Coalition for Fair Broadcasting. He is a former member of the Nassau County Blue Ribbon Financial Review Panel and former chair of the Nassau County Local Advisory Board. Additionally, President Rabinowitz served as a member of the Nassau County Commission on Government Revision, which was charged with drafting a new charter and a new form of government for the County. He is the recipient of numerous honors and awards, including the Martin Luther King Living the Dream Award, EOC; Award for Distinguished Service in the Cause of Justice, Legal Aid Society; Leadership Award, UJA Federation; and the Bar Association of Nassau County Proclamation for Outstanding Service to both the Legal Profession and the Community.



President Rabinowitz received a juris doctor degree, magna cum laude, from Columbia University School of Law, where he was a member of the board of editors of the *Columbia Law Review* and a Harlan Fiske Stone Scholar. He graduated from City College of New York with honors, and is a member of Phi Beta Kappa and the American Law Institute.

ATHLETIC ADMINISTRATION

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS HARRY ROYLE

Harry Royle is in his sixth year as Director of Athletics at Hofstra University. After serving as Interim Director from June 1997 through February 1998, Royle, a longtime Hofstra University athletic administrator, was selected as the University's sixth Director of Athletics. In making the announcement, then-Hofstra President Dr. James M. Stuart said, "I am happy that the best person for the position of Director of Athletics was already here on campus in Harry Royle. He has served this University well for 27 years, and we are excited for him as he leads the Athletic Department into the 21st century."

Royle, a Hofstra alumnus who received his bachelor's in history in 1970 and master's in educational administration in 1990, has worked in the Athletic Department at Hofstra for more than three decades. After a stellar four-year football playing career at Hofstra, where he was 1968 team captain and the third recipient of the Mayor's Trophy, Royle served as an Assistant Football Coach under three Head Coaches, Howard "Howdy" Myers, Bill Leete and Mickey Kwiatkowski, from 1969 through 1987. During this time, he served as a position coach and Defensive Coordinator with the Flying Dutchmen and made three NCAA Championship appearances.

Royle also served as an Assistant Lacrosse Coach under Myers from 1971 through 1975 before replacing the legendary Hall of Fame coach upon his retirement in 1976. He directed the Flying Dutchmen Lacrosse program as Head Coach from 1976 through 1985, compiling a 58-55 record and leading the program to a Top 13 ranking or better in five of those 10 years. In 1978 Royle led the Flying Dutchmen to an 8-5 record, an NCAA Championship Tournament bid and a seventh-place national ranking.

Royle became Hofstra's Assistant Director of Athletics in 1985, serving as team administrator for numerous programs, including Football and Lacrosse. In 1995 he was promoted to Associate Director of Athletics for Compliance and University Eligibility. Royle has served as tournament director for the highly successful NCAA Division I Men's Lacrosse Championship-Northern Quarterfinals at Hofstra Stadium in 1997 and 1998, and was a member of the NCAA Men's Lacrosse Committee. Royle and his wife of 36 years, Mary, have three children, Michael (35), Paul (30) and Danny (22), who is a member of the Hofstra Lacrosse team. The Royle family resides in Babylon, New York.

HOFSTRA HERITAGE

The history of athletics at Hofstra is as old as the University itself, and is steeped in the Dutch heritage that helps to make Hofstra such a unique school.

Hofstra has always had strong roots in tradition. Ties to Dutch heritage and the Netherlands began with William S. Hofstra, after whom the school is named and on whose property the University was started. When the doors opened in 1935, the sole building on campus was Hofstra's mansion, which he had affectionately named the Netherlands after his homeland. The mansion, which houses administrative offices, is now the center of Hofstra's 240-acre campus, and has been renamed Hofstra Hall.

Also adopted in this early stage of Hofstra's history was the school alma mater, "The Netherlands." The lyrics were written by a faculty member to the music of the Dutch national anthem by the 16th-century Dutch composer Valerius.

THE HOFSTRA FLAG

The Hofstra storm flag is modeled after an actual Dutch geus, a privateer's flag. In 1991 a representative of Holland's Queen Beatrix presented the banner to then Hofstra President (now President Emeritus) James M. Shuart. The history of the flag dates back to 1572, when a group of Dutch loyalists called Watergeuzen used the flag's mast to ram the gates of a Dutch city in their opposition to Spanish rule. While the Netherlands Royal Navy flies the original red, white and blue geus, the Hofstra version has been redesigned in the school colors of gold, white and blue.

The gold, white and blue Hofstra colors themselves spring from Dutch roots. The first official Hofstra flag appeared on April 19, 1940, when Dr. Alexander Loudon, an envoy for Queen Wilhelmina of the Netherlands, presented his country's flag to Hofstra in a special ceremony. However, the flag he presented was not the red, white and blue flag of the Netherlands, but the orange, white and blue banner of William of Nassau with a Hofstra emblem placed on the flag. The University has used the design ever since, although President Shuart, after researching the colors, replaced



the orange hue with gold, making the flag truer to the original House of Nassau. The flag is one of Hofstra's most recognizable symbols, utilized in publications, pins and souvenirs.



THE HOFSTRA SEAL

The Hofstra seal, another easily recognizable emblem, was designed from the royal Dutch emblem by art instructor Constant Van de Wall. The seal is modeled on the coat of arms of the House of Orange-Nassau. The round seal includes the coat of arms, flanked by lions on either side. A lion also stands in the center of the coat of arms, holding a sword in its right claw and a bundle of seven arrows, which represent the seven provinces of Holland, in its left. The seal also carries the motto of the House of Orange-Nassau in Old French: "Je maintiendray" (I stand steadfast). In 1988 one of the two lions on the seal was officially replaced with a lioness. The seal is now the focal point of the "Hofstra Pride" logo.

THE HOFSTRA NICKNAMES

The Hofstra nickname has also evolved over the years. For decades, Hofstra athletic teams have used the nicknames Flying Dutchmen, Dutchmen, or Dutch. Recently, an additional nickname of The Pride has become popular. We have not changed our nickname. We are both the Dutch (and its variations) and the Pride.

The Pride nickname started during the University's dramatic recovery and growth in the mid to late '80's from a major fiscal crisis during the previous decade. The first consistent use of the word "Pride" relating to athletics started in 1989 when the University's athletic booster club was founded and called itself The Pride Club. At that time it had no meaning associated with our teams. It was simply consistent with a general feeling about all of our efforts.

The Pride nickname has also evolved over the past decade in a more specific fashion than just the expression of the feeling. The word pride is used to describe a sense of having strong self-respect or a sense of accomplishment. But in 1988 the lion on the right side of the shield on the Hofstra seal was changed into a lioness to symbolize gender equity. This, in turn, led to the development of the University mascots — Kate and Willie Pride, a lion and lioness. The two lions led to extensive use of the word "Pride" in talking about Hofstra, as a group of lions is called a pride. In 1995 bronze reproductions of the lion and lioness were added to the campus scenery. In fact, there are now four such pairs of sculptures on campus.

However, the evolution continues even further. In 1997, the University purchased a sculpture by Paul Manship of "Atalanta," a figure from Greek mythology. It is an impressive 14-foot tall figure of a running woman. It is on the west side of Hofstra Stadium. To complement this figure, in 1998, the University commissioned Gregg Wyatt to sculpt a similarly sized figure of a running man. In this case it was a representation of "Hippomenes" who was a central figure in the myth. The myth of Atalanta and Hippomenes relates closely to Hofstra symbology.

As the myth goes, an Oracle told Atalanta, as a young girl, that she must never marry. Thus, Atalanta avoided men and devoted herself to the chase. Soon she could outrun any man. Yet because Atalanta was so attractive she had many suitors. To deal with them she imposed an almost impossible condition. She would only marry one



who could beat her in a foot race. While she would be the prize of such a race, the penalty for losing was death. Nonetheless there were suitors and there was need of a judge for such races. Hippomenes was chosen for this role. However, when he saw Atalanta he immediately fell in love with her. Knowing he could never out run her, he sought the help of Venus.

Venus agreed, and gave him three golden apples, which Hippomenes was to throw in front of Atalanta during the race. The apples were so desirable it would be impossible for her to resist picking them up, and thus she would lose the race. All this came to pass, and when the race was over and won by Hippomenes, they fell deeply in love and the youth carried off his prize. However, they angered Venus for their failure to thank her. As punishment, she turned Hippomenes into a lion and Atalanta into a lioness.

With this strong identification with lions and the multiple meanings of the word pride, our coaches and players, as well as the sports media, have begun to use it extensively over the last several years. Our women's teams especially are more comfortable calling themselves The Pride, which is genderless, than they are calling themselves The Flying Dutchwomen or the Lady Dutch. The men's teams are also comfortable with the nickname Pride.

However, as noted earlier, we have not abandoned the Flying Dutchmen or formally adopted The Pride. There is nothing wrong with having more than one nickname. It is not uncommon for a school to have two nicknames as institutions such as Yale, Virginia, Georgia Tech and Army have multiple monikers. The bottom line is our name is HOFSTRA.

ACADEMIC SUPPORT

Hofstra University is committed to the pursuit of academic and athletic excellence. The University views participation in intercollegiate athletics as benefiting the student-athlete in an educationally enhancing experience beyond any other opportunity available. Hofstra also realizes the time commitment made by student-athletes and has committed the facilities and resources to support all students.

The University Tutorial Program (UTP) provides free tutoring in every subject area to any Hofstra student. In addition to this service, the UTP has an athletic component that addresses the academic needs of studentathletes. The UTP academic counselor administers this athletic component. The UTP emphasizes four areas in their efforts to ensure the academic success of Hofstra's student-athletes.

Area one is academic counseling. Services are provided in the areas of academic planning, career planning, personal counseling, and campus and community referrals. The counselor also meets with prospective student-athletes, at the coach's request, to share the many benefits of a Hofstra University education.

Area two is academic advising. In an effort to ease the demand on the Office of Advisement, the UTP academic counselor also advises first year and undecided student-athletes.

Area three is academic monitoring. The UTP counselor monitors the academic progress of student-athletes to ensure compliance with Hofstra University, NCAA and conference regulations. The counselor's regular communication with the faculty and coaches provide an opportunity for early intervention should academic difficulties arise.

Area four is study halls. The University Tutorial Program provides all athletic study halls with tutors in various subjects and assesses the needs of individual student-athletes to provide the most effective study environment. The assessment tool administered by the UTP is also used to provide various enrichment seminars for the student-athletes such as time management, writing skills, campus resources, and surviving the college transition.

In the fall of 1999, the Pride Teaching and Learning Center opened on the second floor of Margiotta Hall. Funded in part by proceeds from the Joe Gardi Golf Open, the state-of-the-art computer lab and learning center features a projection system and 18 computer work stations, which are connected to the University network for easy research access to the Internet.



SPORTS MEDICINE/ ATHLETIC TRAINING

Through a comprehensive athletic training program, Hofstra University student-athletes are provided excellent health care during their attendance at the University. A coordinated effort between the University Health and Wellness Center, the Athletic Department and outside health care providers ensures every student-athlete the best medical attention possible.



The cornerstone of this effort is the certified athletic training staff. Directed by Rick Zappala, Hofstra's Head Athletic Trainer for the past 21 years, and Assistant Athletic Trainers Christopher Grosskopf, Terry McLaughlin, Heather Clemons, Stacey Taradash, Matt Reedy and Paul Kinney, University student-athletes have direct access to a myriad of health care services. Managing the coverage of every practice and competition event, Hofstra University's Athletic Trainers provide injury management, rehabilitation and treatment to the entire Athletic program. Utilizing three state-of-the-art athletic training rooms, these professionals work tirelessly to ensure the safe participation of Hofstra's student-athletes and to return injured athletes to play quickly and safely.

Supporting the athletic trainers are team physicians Dr. Steve Nicholas and Dr. Damion Martins. Dr. Nicholas, who is in his eighth year at Hofstra, and his associates from Lenox Hill Hospital in New York City provide orthopedic care to Hofstra student-athletes. Dr. Nicholas, who also serves as a consultant to the New York Jets, runs two clinics every week exclusively for Hofstra student-athletes. An outstanding orthopedic surgeon, Dr. Nicholas is world-renowned for his contributions to sports medicine through the Nicholas Institute of Sports and Athletic Trauma. Dr. Nicholas is supported by his associates, Dr. Michael Browne and Dr. Steve Lee, and several sports medicine fellows from Lenox

Hill Hospital. Dr. Martins, a physician with Pro Health Care, Inc. in Lake Success, New York, is in his first year on Hofstra's medical team. Martins experience in the sports medicine field includes serving as team physician for the University of Maryland, University of Maryland-Baltimore County and Coppin State athletic departments. He was also on the medical staff of the National Football League's Baltimore Ravens.

Hofstra University sponsors a fully accredited, highly competitive undergraduate degree program for athletic training majors, in which Hofstra student athletic trainers participate in all aspects of the health care system.

LONG ISLAND, NEW YORK

Long Island offers the best of both worlds: it is a suburban haven that is also convenient to New York City. Location, however, is just one of many assets that makes Long Island attractive to both native residents and visitors alike. The people, the sites and the unique geography of Long Island bring people back again and again.

Long Island is the largest island adjoining the continental United States. Twenty miles wide and approximately 118 miles long, Long Island is separated from the mainland on the north by the Long Island Sound and on the south by the Atlantic Ocean. It measures 100 miles from the Nassau-Queens border to Montauk Point, which lies on the eastern tip of the South Fork. The eastern tip of the North Fork is called Orient Point. The forks are separated by the beautiful waters of the Great Peconic Bay and Gardiner's Bay. Nestled in the bays between the two forks are Shelter Island and Gardiner's Island.

With a population of 2.6 million people, Long Island has a population larger than 20 states. It has 19 colleges and universities with 150,000 students, and 127 public school districts with more than 415,000 students. The region is considered one of the nation's wealthiest areas with a per household median income of \$52,000. The work force on Long Island now exceeds 1.4 million persons, and the region boasts one of the lowest unemployment rates in the nation. The economy is made up of more than

85,000 businesses, has 50 million square feet of office space, and has more than 1,000 shopping malls. Roosevelt Field is the premier mall on Long Island, featuring department stores and specialty shops, and is only minutes from the Hofstra University campus.

The most distinguishing features of Long Island, however, are its scenic beauty and its many sites and attractions. It has become a vacation spot for many, a "getaway" from big city hassles and distractions. People travel to enjoy the 1,100 square miles of shoreline on more than 150 different beaches. No area of the Island is more than 15 minutes from a world-class beach. Jones Beach, which lies on the south shore, is a 2,400-acre park with six miles of ocean beach, boardwalk, bay beach, pool, golf and outdoor concerts. It is 10 minutes from Hofstra and, in the summer, students can catch a Hofstra shuttle bus to the beach.

In addition, Long Island is home to 20 state parks, 100 golf courses, 100 tennis clubs and 400 yacht clubs. The active person can enjoy camping, canoeing, bicycling, water skiing, boating or fishing. Others might enjoy visiting any of the lighthouses, the millionaire mansions, the art galleries or one of Long Island's 14 wineries. The tourist may join the crowd at theaters and gourmet seafood restaurants, or hit one of the many exciting nightclubs. Families might cool off at the beach or the water park. The Hamptons, at the heart of the South Fork,

are considered a summer resort area and are famous as the playground community of the rich and famous.

Long Island is the place for the sports fan, as well. The Nassau Veterans Memorial Coliseum, which is literally across the street from Hofstra, offers concerts, children's shows and is home to the National Hockey League's New York Islanders. Belmont Park, home of horse racing's Belmont Stakes, offers the thoroughbred horse enthusiast an outlet in beautiful surroundings. Heading into Queens, there's Shea Stadium, home of the New York Mets. Further west, and a short ride via the Long Island Rail Road, is New York City, where students can frequent museums, theaters, retailers, Madison Square Garden, South Street Seaport and more.

More than 24 million people visit Long Island each year pumping approximately \$7 billion into its economy through tourism. Long Island is not merely a place for the tourist, however. Generations have settled down and made their living on Long Island, enjoying the benefits of moderate climate, miles of beautiful beaches, easy access to New York City, and a place to call home. With scores of major attractions and distinctive sites, Long Island has it all for the tourist, as well as the year-round resident.

ATHLETIC FACILITIES

The Hofstra University Pride play and practice at the Hofstra Softball Stadium, located on the North Campus of Hofstra University. The Softball Stadium has been completely renovated and is located next to the Hofstra Arena and across from the Hofstra Recreation Center.



The Hofstra Softball Stadium, constructed in 2000, provides a fine setting for collegiate softball action. Recent construction included new sunken dugouts, new outfield sod, a press box on top of the bleachers behind home plate, batting cages next to the dugouts and a bullpen area. Bleacher seating behind home plate, from dugout to dugout, accommodates nearly 1,000 spectators. Field dimensions are 190 feet down the lines and 220 feet to centerfield. Banners commemorating Hofstra's team and individual achievements are displayed on the outfield fences.





Hofstra has hosted the Eastern College Athletic Conference Tournament in 1993 and 1994, an NCAA Division I Softball Regional in 1993 and is also the site of the Catholic League High School Softball Championship. One of the finest softball facilities on Long Island, Hofstra's Softball Stadium allows the University to continue to host such events in the future.

Hofstra can avoid inclement weather by using the indoor Physical Fitness Center, which is equipped with pitching machines and batting cages. The team also has a state-of-the-art weight training facility. Located in the

Hofstra Arena, the weight room is outfitted with the most advanced strength training and cardiovascular equipment available.

The Pride not only boast one of the better softball facilities in the Northeast, but also have a first-class locker room at their disposal. The locker room, located in the Physical Fitness Center, was recently renovated as well. Included in the improvements were plush, wall-to-wall carpeting, oak lockers and an entertainment center with a television and stereo.



HOFSTRA IN THE COMMUNITY

The Hofstra University Softball program believes it has a special responsibility to the community. Thus, whether it's the height of the season or those "slow" off-season months, the Hofstra Softball staff and student-athletes are always active in the area.

The Pride lend their time and efforts to charitable and educational causes. The team raised money for and participated in the American cancer Society's Walk for a Cure at Jones Beach. This past November and December each class sponsored a needy family – providing food, decorations and gifts to help brighten the Holiday season. The team is also involved with the Nassau County Social Services Foster Big Brother/Big Sister program and the Long Island Special Olympics, volunteering at the Nassau-Suffolk Special Olympics softball game held at the Hofstra Softball Stadium. The Hofstra Softball program is also involved with the Women's Sports Foundation and participates in WSF-sponsored clinics throughout the year. Several times each year, Pride players and coaches speak at schools and softball clinics. In addition to teaching softball skills, topics include academic preparation for college, time management, the physical and academic demands on student-athletes, and anti-drug and alcohol talks. The team also participates in a story-reading program with the Glen Cove Head Start day care program.



2002 SEASON IN REVIEW

Pride Claim Colonial Athletic Association

Championship: The Pride won the inaugural Colonial Athletic Association Softball Championship after defeating Towson University, 9-1, in the championship game of the CAA Softball Tournament at Hofstra Softball Stadium. With the win, Hofstra extended its conference championship streak to five after winning four straight America East titles.

Statistical Leaders: Junior Heather Brousseau led the team in batting with a .333 average and added a team-best 50 hits, 40 runs scored and 12 stolen bases. Freshman Stefanie Kenney batted .304 with a team-leading six home runs. Kenney added 27 RBIs, which ranked second on the team. Junior Amanda Hallaway batted .287 with three home runs and a team-high 29 RBIs. Sophomore Meaghan Almon contributed a team-best nine doubles and three triples to go with a .255 average. In the pitching circle, Kenney had a 15-7 record with a 2.68 ERA and 92 strikeouts. Junior Sara DeAngelis was 12-18 with a 2.72 ERA and 103 strikeouts.

Regional All-American: Freshman Stefanie Kenney was selected to the Mid-Atlantic Region All-American second team. Kenney's selection marked the 12th consecutive year that Hofstra has had at least one Regional All-American.

Seven Pride Players Honored By CAA: The Pride had seven players selected to the Colonial Athletic Association All-Conference team this spring in a vote of the league's coaches, including three first team selections. Junior outfielder Heather Brousseau was named first team All-CAA after hitting .345 overall, including .500 in conference games. Junior first baseman Amanda Hallaway earned her third straight first team all-conference honor after being named first team All-America East as a freshman and sophomore. Junior pitcher Sara DeAngelis was also named to the first team after finishing the season with a 4-2 record and a 1.51 ERA in conference games (11-18 with a 2.78 ERA overall). Chosen by the league coaches to the CAA's second team were sophomore catcher Meaghan Almon, junior shortstop Danielle Stewart, freshman outfielder Hailey Clark and freshman designated player Stefanie Kenney.

THE COLONIAL ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

Boasting a roster of 10 well-respected academic institutions, the Colonial Athletic Association continues to build on a proud history as one of the nation's top collegiate conferences.

With the addition of four new members last year, the CAA's geographic footprint stretches from the shadow of the Statue of Liberty to the beaches of North Carolina. The landscape of the CAA is dotted with major metropolitan areas that include four of the nation's top 25 media markets – New York (1), Philadelphia (4), Washington, D.C. (8) and Baltimore (24).

The CAA showcases the athletic and academic skills of some of the nation's top student-athletes. On the playing field, the conference has produced 15 national team champions in four different sports, 28 individual national champions, 11 national coaches of the year and nine national players of the year. In recent years, the CAA has ranked as the top Division I non-football conference in the Sears Directors Cup standings.

Even more impressive, however, are the honors accumulated away from competition, which include five Rhodes Scholars, 11 NCAA post-graduate scholars and 11 Honda Award winners. Annually, there are more than 600 CAA student-athletes who post at least a 3.2 grade point average and letter in a varsity sport to garner CAA Scholar-Athlete accolades.

Under the direction of Commissioner Thomas E. Yeager, who has guided the CAA since its inception, the league basked in the national spotlight on December 13, 2000. The University of Delaware, Drexel University, Hofstra University and Towson University were introduced as the conference's newest members during a live televised press conference from the MCI Center in Washington, D.C. The four new institutions joined George Mason University, James Madison University, University of North Carolina at



Wilmington, Old Dominion University, Virginia Commonwealth University and the College of William & Mary, expanding the CAA to 10 members for the first time in its history.

The CAA conducts championships in 21 men's and women's sports. Male athletes compete for championships in baseball, basketball, cross country, golf, lacrosse, soccer, swimming & diving, tennis, track & field and wrestling. Female athletes battle for conference titles in basketball, cross country, field hockey, lacrosse, soccer, softball, swimming & diving, tennis, track & field, volleyball and golf.

The CAA traces its roots back to 1983 when three of its current members—George Mason, James Madison, and William and Mary—were aligned with East Carolina University, the United States Naval Academy and the University of Richmond as a basketball league (ECAC South). During the next two years, the league added 11 sports, acquired two new members (UNC Wilmington and American) and decided to form a new association.

The transformation from ECAC South to CAA took place on June 6, 1985. A "Proclamation of Creation" was signed by representatives of the eight charter institutions and by members of the media assembled for the announcement. By the fall of 1986, the league gained automatic bids to NCAA Championships in men's basketball, soccer, baseball and women's basketball and formed an officials' bureau. Old Dominion became a

member of the CAA in 1991-92 and Virginia Commonwealth University joined the conference in 1995-96.

In men's basketball, the CAA has earned a reputation as a "giant killer" in the NCAA Tournament. Since 1981, CAA schools have posted 12 wins over higher-seeded teams, including UNC Wilmington's upset of Southern California last March. Nine of the conference's 10 teams have made at least two NCAA Tournament appearances since 1990.

The tradition is equally as strong in women's basketball, where Old Dominion and James Madison represent two of the top 10 winningest teams in the history of Division I. The Lady Monarchs have captured three national championships (1979, 1980, 1985) and reached the title game in 1997. Last season, ODU advanced to the Elite Eight before falling to eventual national champion Connecticut. JMU made four Sweet 16 appearances between 1986 and 1991.

The conference has also excelled in many other sports. CAA squads have won 10 field hockey national titles since the championship began in 1981, which is not only more than any other conference but represents nearly half of all titles won. In baseball, the CAA has ranked as one of the nation's top five conferences in four of the past five seasons, with six teams rated among the top 100 in Division I last season. The CAA is annually ranked among the nation's top 10 conferences in men's and women's soccer, and has traditionally sent multiple teams to the NCAA Tournament. The conference finished the 2001-02 campaign with teams ranked among the top 20 nationally in cross country, field hockey, soccer, women's basketball, wrestling, tennis and lacrosse.

From all-star athletes to Nobel Prize winning faculty, the CAA takes great pride in producing performers who not only stand out on the playing field, but also in the classroom.

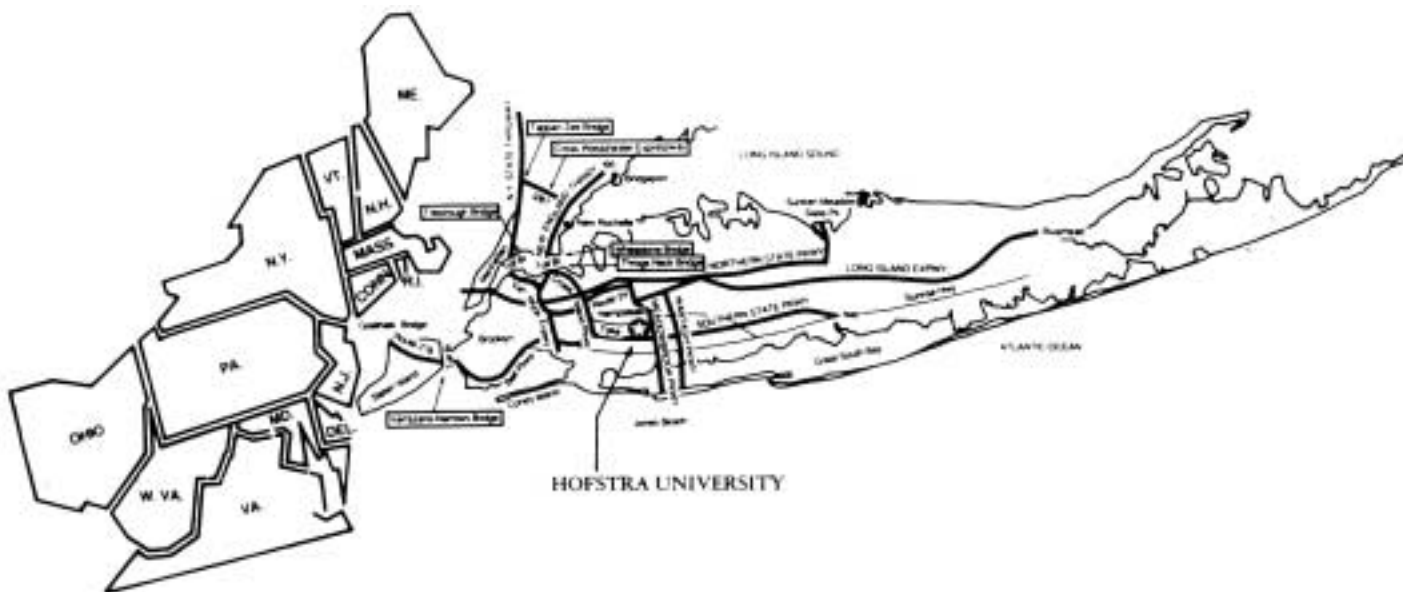

GETTING TO HOFSTRA



From Southern New Jersey, Southeastern Pennsylvania, Maryland, Washington, D.C. and Virginia:

Take the New Jersey Turnpike to Exit 13. Cross the Goethals Bridge and continue on Route 278 to the Verrazano-Narrows Bridge. Stay in the left lane of the Bridge and take the Belt Parkway-East. The Belt Parkway becomes the Southern State Parkway at the Nassau County line. Take the Southern State Parkway to the Meadowbrook Parkway North (Exit 22). Exit the Meadowbrook Parkway at Exit M4 (Hempstead Turnpike Route 24). Head west to Hofstra (approximately 1 mile).

From Northwestern New Jersey, Northern Pennsylvania and the Middle States:

Take Interstate 78, Interstate 80, U.S. Route 22, New Jersey Route 4 or New Jersey Route 17 to the George Washington Bridge. Proceed over the bridge to the Cross Bronx Expressway. Take the Cross Bronx Expressway to the Throgs Neck Bridge. Follow directions from the Throgs Neck Bridge from this point.

From Upstate New York:

Take New York Thruway over the Tappan Zee Bridge to Cross Westchester Expressway (Interstate 287). Stay on the Expressway to the New England Thruway (Interstate 95). Proceed south on the Thruway to the Throgs Neck Bridge. Follow directions from the Throgs Neck Bridge from this point.

From the Throgs Neck Bridge:

Follow signs for Eastern Long Island. Take the Cross Island Parkway to the Grand Central Parkway-East. The Grand Central becomes the Northern State Parkway at the Nassau County line. Take the Northern State Parkway-East to the Meadowbrook Parkway-South (exit 31A). Take the Meadowbrook Parkway-

South to Exit M4 West (Hempstead Turnpike Route 24). Follow Hempstead Turnpike West to Hofstra (approximately 1 mile).

For Team Travel Via Bus:

Commercial buses are not allowed on New York City (Belt, Grand Central or Cross Island) or Long Island (Southern State or Northern State) Parkways. Team buses should take the Brooklyn-Queens Expressway from the south, and the Clearview Expressway from the north, to get to the Long Island Expressway for the trip to Hofstra. Once on the Long Island Expressway (I-495), buses should proceed to Glen Cove Road-South (exit 39). Head south on Glen Cove Road for approximately eight miles to Hempstead Turnpike/Fulton Avenue and turn left (east). Hofstra University is approximately two miles east on Hempstead Turnpike.

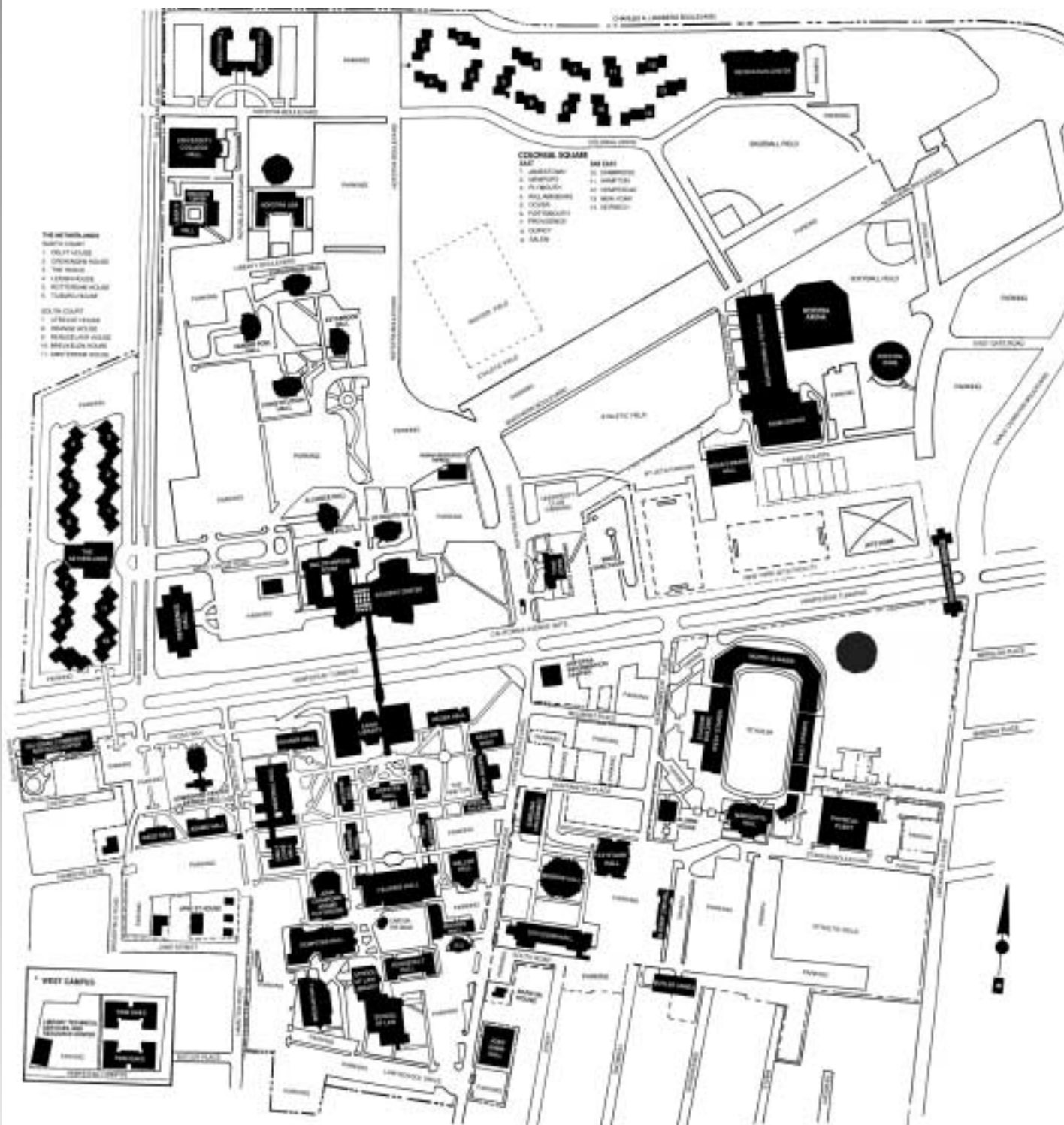
Public Transportation from Airport:

If a visitor arrives at either La Guardia or Kennedy Airport, the most direct means of reaching the University is by one of three limousine companies that service both airports and the Hofstra University area. Larry's Taxi Service (516) 483-3333; Transport Limousine Service (800) 654-1164 (out of state) (800) 832-5466 (in New York state); Winston Limousine Service (800) 4-AIRPORT.

Railroads:

AMTRAK services Pennsylvania Station in Manhattan, approximately 30 miles from the Hofstra campus. To get to Hofstra from Penn Station, take the Long Island Rail Road to the Hempstead station. The Hofstra University Courtesy Bus and taxi services are available there. Hofstra is approximately 1.5 miles from the station.
