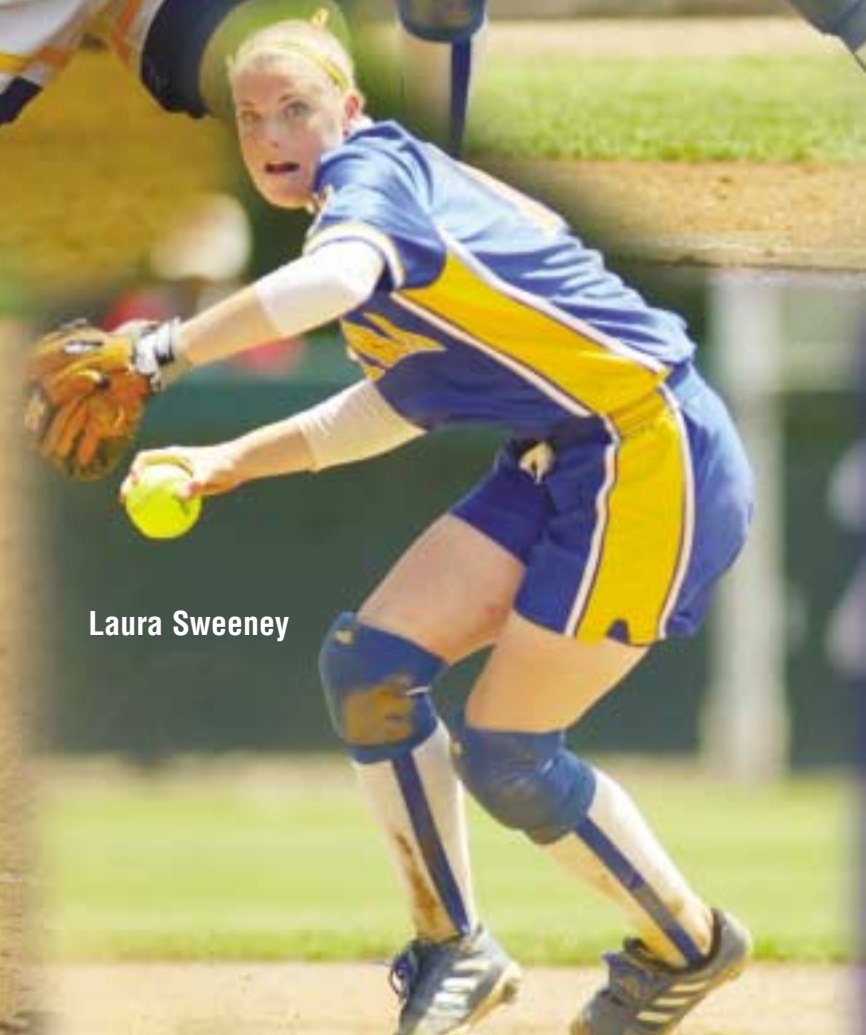

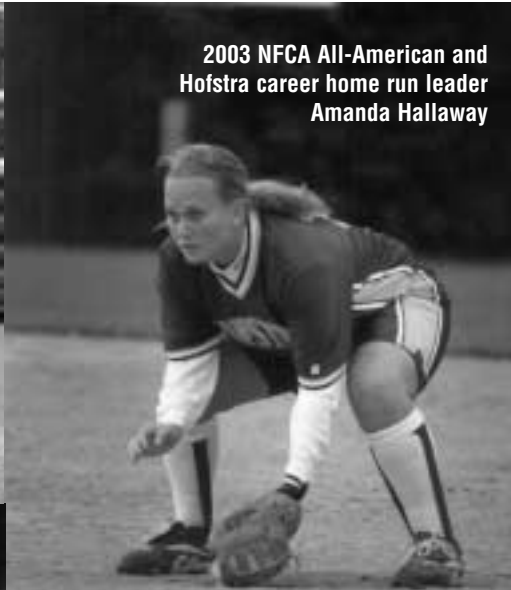

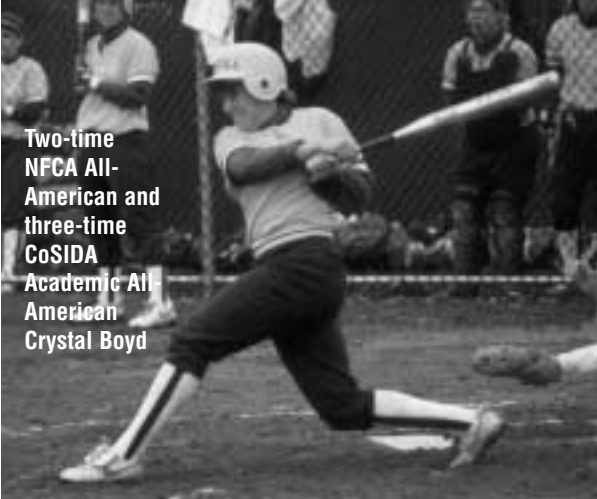

# THIS IS HOFSTRA UNIVERSITY

## THE FACTS

Hofstra offers bachelor's degrees in 130 areas of study.



The University offers approximately 140 graduate programs.



Hofstra was ranked 18th on *Forbes'* list of Most Connected Campuses in 2003.



Hofstra has 524 full-time faculty members and 1,325 total faculty members.



The student-faculty ratio is 14:1; average class size is 22 students.



Hofstra is one of only 270 institutions out of more than 3,600 nationwide with a chapter of Phi Beta Kappa.



The Hofstra Libraries are fully computerized and contain 1.2 million volumes for student use.



Hofstra's campus has 37 residence halls, housing about 4,200 students, and 13 dining facilities.



Hofstra has more than 140 student clubs and organizations, of which there are about 30 local and national fraternities and sororities.



In its relatively short history, Hofstra has established itself as a world-class institution of higher education and cultural enterprise. Each academic year, the Hofstra campus and the programs offered grow and change to meet the demands of our students and our community.

Hofstra opened in 1935 as a commuter school with all classes and offices housed in one building. Since those early days, Hofstra has evolved into an international institution with a student body hailing from 47 states and 78 countries around the world. The beautiful campus is an accredited arboretum with 113 buildings on 240 acres. There are more than 4,000 students living on campus, and Hofstra offers them and all students an extensive array of academic and social activities. Additionally, Hofstra's close proximity to Manhattan means that students have easy access to the wondrous cultural, social and career offerings of the city.

What has remained consistent throughout the years, however, is the sense of community on campus, the eagerness of our students to learn and the commitment of the Hofstra faculty and administration to provide a challenging education that encourages the pursuit of lifelong learning.

The Colleges and Schools of the University are: Hofstra College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, Frank G. Zarb School of Business, New College, School of Communication, School of Education and Allied Human Services, School of Law, School for University Studies, University College for Continuing Education, Honors College and Saturday

College. Bachelor's degrees are offered in 130 areas of study. There are also approximately 140 graduate programs, including Ph.D., Ed.D., Psy.D., and J.D. degrees, advanced certificates and professional diplomas.

Recently, the University celebrated the opening of Hagedorn Hall, the new home of our School of Education and Allied Human Services. In 2001 Hofstra University Honors College welcomed its first class. This new division of the University proved to be an immediate success, not only with University faculty and administrators, but among the 93 inaugural students. Every fall since, the number of entering freshmen has increased substantially.

Hofstra's School of Communication is one of the largest, most advanced non-commercial television facilities in the East. Students take classes and work in Dempster Hall, a sophisticated television production/post-production facility with two broadcast-quality studios and control rooms; two advanced online video edit suites; two Avid non-linear digital editing systems and several cuts-only video work stations. Two satellite dishes are available with one dish providing special news feeds for the broadcast journalism room, which also has access to *Associated Press*, *Lexis-Nexis* and *Dow Jones* services. In addition, the facility is capable of broadcasting student-produced programming to the entire campus on our own cable channels. Also located here is the University's radio station (WRHU/88.7-FM), audio production studios, a film/video screening room, film editing rooms, a computer laboratory, a speech performance studio and a large dance studio.

Hofstra's C.V. Starr Hall offers academic facilities that are among the most technologically advanced in the nation. Every seat in every classroom allows students direct access to the Internet and Hofstra network, including the resources of Hofstra's Axinn Library.

Hofstra's growing computer facilities offer extensive high-tech training opportunities. There are computer terminals throughout the campus for student and faculty use, with more than 750 PC, Macintosh and UNIX workstations available in labs and classrooms. The University was ranked 18th in Forbes' list of Most Connected Campuses in 2003, and was one of *Yahoo Internet Life's* "100 Most Wired Colleges" in 2001-2002.



The fully computerized Hofstra Libraries contain 1.2 million volumes for student use. Only about 5 percent of American colleges have collections as extensive, and 85 percent have fewer than half that number.

Hofstra hosts more than 500 cultural events annually, bringing thousands of scholars, dignitaries and other participants to campus. More than 200 musical and dramatic performances take place on campus each year.

The Hofstra Museum, which houses one of the largest art collections in the metropolitan area, coordinates approximately 12 exhibitions annually and offers exhibition areas and an extensive outdoor sculpture collection. The Hofstra Museum is accredited by the American Association of Museums – one of only 94 universities in the nation and one of six in New York to hold that distinction.

Hofstra also has seven theaters, a student newspaper, a lively student center, a

recreation center and numerous athletic facilities, including the 15,000-seat James M. Shuart Stadium and the 5,124-seat Hofstra University Arena. Hofstra also has an indoor, Olympic-sized (eight lane, 50-meter) swimming pool, one of the largest such facilities in the New York metropolitan area.

The Hofstra athletic program competes on the NCAA Division I level and is a member of the Colonial Athletic Association and the Atlantic 10 Football Conference. The University sponsors 18 intercollegiate programs – nine men's sports and nine women's sports. Hofstra has men's teams in basketball, football, baseball, lacrosse, golf, tennis, wrestling, soccer and cross country. Women's sports include basketball, volleyball, softball,



tennis, soccer, field hockey, lacrosse, cross country and golf. The 18 men's and women's intercollegiate athletic teams compete in more than 150 home contests annually.

Hofstra's academic programs are accredited by numerous national agencies and the University is one of only 270 schools, out of more than 3,600 colleges and universities nationwide, with a chapter of the national honor society Phi Beta Kappa. Of Hofstra's 1,325 faculty members, 524 are full time and 90 percent hold the highest degree in their fields. The student-faculty ratio is 14-to-1.

Hofstra University is 100-percent program accessible to persons with disabilities, and has been cited as a national model for this achievement.



# BILL EDWARDS

## HEAD SOFTBALL COACH

Bill Edwards, a 2002 inductee into the Amateur Softball Association (ASA) Long Island Hall of Honor, is entering his 16th season as Hofstra University Head Softball Coach and has led the Pride to national prominence. Edwards is coming off the greatest single season in his career, when he led Hofstra to the NCAA Regional finals at Stanford. The Pride became the lowest-seeded regional finalist in NCAA Tournament history and fell just one win shy of reaching the 2004 Women's College World Series.

The Hofstra Softball program has displayed consistent excellence over the last 15 years, including being recognized as one of the top Division I softball programs in the 1990's by the NCAA. Edwards and company have garnered seven NCAA Tournament appearances (1993, 1995, 1999, 2000, 2001, 2003, 2004), three Colonial Athletic Association championships (2002, 2003, 2004), four America East championships (1998, 1999, 2000, 2001), a North Atlantic Conference championship (1995), two East Coast Conference championships (1992 and 1994), and an ECAC championship (1993).

Edwards, who has been part of 15 consecutive winning seasons at Hofstra, also coached the Pride to a #21 ranking in the final 2004 NCAA Division I Softball Poll and a #20 ranking in the final 1994 poll. He has also led the Pride to #1 rankings in the Northeast Region Poll in 1993, 1994, 1997 and 2000.

During his tenure at Hofstra, Edwards has coached four All-Americans (Crystal Boyd (twice), Alicia Smith, Lisa Ciavardini and Amanda Hallaway), five Academic All-Americans, 29 All-Region selections, an America East Player of the Year, a two-time America East Pitcher of the Year, A Colonial Athletic Association Pitcher of the Year, three conference rookies of the year and 38 all-conference selections. He was named East Coast Conference Coach of the Year in 1994, North Atlantic Conference Coach of the Year in 1995, America East Coach of the Year in 1999 and Regional Coach of the Year in 1993, 1994, 1995, 1997, 2000, 2003 and 2004. Edwards has also seen five players – Crystal Boyd, Stacy Jackson, Erin Phillips, Alicia Smith and Jen Smith – play professional softball. Boyd was an original member of the now-defunct Women's Professional Fastpitch league, while Jackson and Phillips played overseas. Both Smiths were selected in the 2004 National Pro Fastpitch elite draft. Both players were selected by the New

York/New Jersey franchise, Alicia Smith in the second round and Jen Smith in the third round.

The 2004 season saw the Pride finish with a 38-21 record, a CAA regular season and postseason championship, and four wins in the NCAA Tournament. Hofstra defeated #12 Auburn and #7 Stanford at the NCAA's, while also winning two games against Southern Illinois, which ended the year ranked #24. Stanford was the second-highest ranked team that Hofstra has ever beaten (behind a win over #1 UCLA in 2000).

The 2003 season also saw a strong NCAA performance by the Pride. Hofstra finished the year 39-17 and earned an at-large bid into the NCAA Tournament. Hofstra went 2-2 at the regional in Lincoln, Nebraska, the first time that the Pride had won two games at an NCAA Regional. Edwards also saw one of his star players, Amanda Hallaway, earn National Fastpitch Coaches Association (NFCA) third team All-America accolades, becoming the fourth Hofstra player to be named an All-American.

Edwards led the 2002 Pride to a 28-25 record and a Colonial Athletic Association title in the teams first season in the league, although the CAA did not receive an automatic qualifier to the NCAA Tournament. The Pride finished the season with a 14-game winning streak, the longest in the nation, on its way to a fifth consecutive conference title. 2001 saw the Pride post a 37-26 record, win their fourth straight America East title in the team's final season in the conference and advance to NCAA



Regionals for the third straight year. Edwards saw his star senior, Lisa Ciavardini, earn America East Player of the Year accolades.

The 2000 season saw Edwards coach Hofstra to a school-record 42-21 mark, a third straight America East Championship and a second consecutive NCAA Regionals berth. The 42 wins gave the Pride back-to-back 40-win seasons for the first time and was the third 40-win season in school history. Other highlights of the 2000 season were upsets of top-ranked UCLA and 19th-ranked Texas at the Paradise Classic and a win over #18 Louisiana-Lafayette at the NCAA Regionals. Edwards also saw two of his players, Alicia Smith and Lisa Ciavardini, earn NFCA All-America honors.

Edwards led the Dutchwomen to their second consecutive America East Championship in 1999, earning the conference's first automatic bid to NCAA Regionals. The Dutchwomen also posted their second 40-win season under Edwards, earning him America East Coach of the Year accolades. Hofstra's America East



Championship win in 1998 was followed by a loss to Massachusetts in a NCAA play-in series. In 1995, Hofstra's first season in the North Atlantic Conference, Edwards led the squad to a 41-21 record, the North Atlantic Conference Championship and a berth in Hofstra's second NCAA Tournament. For his efforts, Edwards was selected as the North Atlantic Conference Coach of the Year and Mid-Atlantic Region Coach of the Year. Hofstra made its first trip to the NCAA Tournament in 1993 when it earned an at-large bid after a 37-10 mark during the regular season that included an ECAC Championship.

Edwards has been involved with softball on Long Island for the past 37 years, including 23 years as a slow pitch player, 15 years as an umpire, 21 years as a coach and 22 years as a clinician. He played in 15 National Labor Day Championships and won a 1983 ASA National Championship. The 1983 season also saw Edwards named to the ASA All-World first team. He coached the PSI Couriers in the ASA Summer Fast Pitch League from 1986 through 1989, capturing a Mid-Atlantic Region title in 1987 and becoming the first Long Island fast pitch team to reach the ASA National Tournament, where it placed fifth. Edwards is also a past president of the Suffolk County Softball Coaches Association.

Edwards came to Hofstra from Commack High School where he coached softball for nine years. During his tenure at Commack, his teams compiled a 118-61 record and reached the Suffolk County Class A playoffs in seven of those nine years. His 1988 squad captured the Suffolk County championship and the Long Island championship, and finished third in the New York State Tournament.

A teacher in the Commack School District from 1967 through 1999, Edwards worked and coached at John F. Kennedy Junior High School, Wood Park Elementary School and Commack High School. He served two stints as freshman football coach at Kennedy Junior High School, from 1972 through 1976, and 1979 through 1980, and was also the freshman baseball coach from 1975 through 1980. When he moved on to Commack, Edwards served as offensive coordinator from 1981 through 1983. During those three years, Commack won three league titles, two conference championships and one Suffolk County championship. In 1993 he served as head football coach at Commack.

In addition, Edwards was also head ice hockey coach at Iona College from 1968 through 1979. At Iona, his teams posted a 174-58-14 record and captured four Metropolitan Collegiate championships. In 1988 Edwards was inducted into the Iona College Sports Hall of Fame.

# LARISSA S. ANDERSON

## ASSOCIATE HEAD SOFTBALL COACH



Larissa S. Anderson is in her fourth season on the Hofstra Softball staff and her first year as associate head coach. Anderson joined the Pride after spending two seasons as an assistant coach at the C.W. Post campus of Long Island University.

Her responsibilities at Hofstra include coaching all aspects of the game. She is also actively involved in the Pride's recruiting efforts and scheduling. During her tenure at Hofstra, Anderson has been part of three Colonial Athletic Association championships and two NCAA Tournament teams.

Since joining the Hofstra staff in 2002, the Pride has posted a 105-63 record, won three consecutive Colonial Athletic Association championships and made two NCAA Tournament appearances. Her work with the Hofstra batters has resulted in

the Pride posting the top two single season home run totals in school history – 50 in 2003 and 43 in 2004. In 2004 the Pride ranked 23rd in the nation in doubles (1.37) and home runs (0.73) per game and ranked 42nd in slugging percentage (.407), while Hailey Clark was 15th in home runs per game (0.28).

Anderson was part of Hofstra's 2003 and 2004 National Fastpitch Coaches Association (NFCA) Mid-Atlantic Region Coaching Staff of the Year and was also part of a C.W. Post staff that was named the Northeast Region Division II Coaching Staff of the Year by the NFCA in 2000.

During Anderson's stint at C.W. Post, she helped the Pioneers to a combined 75-33 record, including a school record 42 wins during the 2000 season (42-18). While at C.W. Post, she assisted in all facets of the program and

was in charge of coaching the pitchers, catchers and outfielders. Her efforts helped the Pioneers to the 13th best team earned run average (1.11) in Division II in 2001.

Before joining the C.W. Post staff, Anderson spent the 1998 season as an assistant coach at her alma mater, Gannon University, after being named a Regional All-American outfielder in 1997. She graduated from Gannon in 1997 with a bachelor's in therapeutic recreation.

No stranger to the Hofstra Athletic community, Anderson spent the 2000-2001 academic year as an administrative assistant to the Women's Basketball program in addition to her coaching duties at C.W. Post. She has also coached at Hofstra's Softball Camp the last six summers.



# ASSISTANT COACHES



**LISA CIAVARDINI**  
ASSISTANT COACH

**L**isa Ciavardini, a four-year standout on the Hofstra Softball team from 1998 through 2001 and an assistant coach in 2002, returns to her alma mater for her second stint on the Pride coaching staff. Ciavardini returns to Hofstra after serving as an assistant softball coach at James Madison University in Harrisonburg, Virginia, for two years.

Ciavardini served as James Madison's hitting instructor during her tenure and also assisted with recruiting and practice planning. In her two years at James Madison the Dukes posted a 48-63 record, but won a school record 30 games in 2004.

Ciavardini was a NFCA third team All-American in 2000, and was a four-time Regional All-American and three-time first team All-America East selection as an outfielder for the Pride. Ciavardini earned America East Player of the Year accolades as a senior in 2001 after batting .332 with 13 doubles, seven triples, six home runs and 39 RBIs. For her career Ciavardini batted .319 with 46 doubles, 12 triples, 13 home runs and 146 RBIs. Her 146 RBIs is a school record and she ranks fourth in doubles and hits (212), ninth in home runs and second in games played (230).

Prior to joining the Hofstra staff in 2002, Ciavardini was an intern with Louisville Slugger's TPS fastpitch division in Louisville, Kentucky. She was responsible for marketing and promoting the new line of Louisville Slugger fastpitch equipment at various softball tournaments around the country, as well as testing new products and collecting feedback from users.

Ciavardini has also coached at various camps and clinics, including the Skyline Softball, Island All-Star and Pete Smith Camps.

Ciavardini graduated from Hofstra with a degree in English in May 2001 and earned a master's in early childhood education from James Madison in December 2004.



**BREANNE NASTI**  
ASSISTANT COACH

**B**reanne Nasti is in her first season as an assistant softball coach at Hofstra University. Nasti comes to Hofstra after a stellar career at the University at Buffalo, where she virtually owns every career Bulls offensive record.

Nasti was a four-year letterwinner and three-time Regional All-American, as well as a three-time All-Mid-American Conference selection. Nasti graduated as Buffalo's all-time leader in batting (.387), home runs (27), RBIs (113), hits (197), doubles (46), triples (7), runs (93) and walks (66). She holds the UB and MAC single season record with a .451 batting average, set in 2002. Nasti excelled in the classroom as well, earning Academic All-District I from 2002 through 2004, Academic All-MAC in 2003 and the State University of New York Chancellor's Scholar-Athlete Award in 2004. She was also a three-time UB Scholar-Athlete.

Nasti has coached at several camps and clinics, including the All-Star Softball Camp in Conklin, New York, Camp Lenox in Lee, Massachusetts, and various University at Buffalo camps. She has also served as a private hitting instructor on Long Island.

A native of Baldwin, New York, Nasti was a three-time high school All-American at Baldwin High School and holds the single-season national high school record with a .774 batting average.

Nasti graduated from Buffalo in May 2004 with a degree in psychology.



# 2005 HOFSTRA UNIVERSITY SOFTBALL OUTLOOK

The members of the Hofstra Softball team likely found themselves spending a lot of time daydreaming this past summer. Whether they were replaying key highlights or imagining what might have been had one or two plays turned out differently, the 2004 season provided plenty of material for reminiscing.

Those daydreams are the natural by-product of a magical NCAA Tournament run. The Pride went 4-2 at the NCAA Regionals last year, coming within one win of the Women's College World Series before finally falling to #7-ranked Stanford 3-1 in the regional championship game. Hofstra won three 1-0 games in their final at-bat at the regionals, including a nine-inning win over #12-ranked Auburn, a 12-inning win over Southern Illinois, and a seventh-inning win over Stanford to bring the Pride to the brink of a trip to Oklahoma City.

Hofstra, which earned the #21 spot in the final NFCA Coaches Poll, became the lowest-seeded team to ever reach a regional final. It was perhaps once clutch hit away from becoming one of the all-time Cinderella stories in college sports history by crashing the party at the Women's College World Series. Of course, it was also one less clutch hit away from finishing 0-2 at the Colonial Athletic Association Tournament and never even qualifying for the NCAA's.

Hofstra played 11 postseason games in the CAA and NCAA Tournaments, and nine of them ended with the go-ahead run on base or at the plate, while a tenth ended with the tying run at the plate. Just about every single Pride player had a clutch hit or a key play in a pressure situation that kept the postseason run going.

But the 2004 season is over, and as the cliché goes, everybody starts the 2005 season with the same 0-0 record. So perhaps one of the biggest challenges the coaching staff faces this season is simply getting the players refocused on a new journey and putting the memories of last season's run behind them.

"Last year was an incredible run and it was truly a remarkable experience for everyone," said Head Coach Bill Edwards. "But the NCAA doesn't let us pick up where we left off last year. We have to start from scratch along with everyone else. Our postseason success was the result of a ton of hard work from the start of fall practice straight through to May, and we'll have to work even harder this year to get back to that level again."

Hofstra has the advantage of entering the new season with almost all of its key players returning. Catcher Meaghan Almon (.275, 25 RBI) is the only member of the regular batting order to have graduated, while Alexis Alcantara (11-3, 2.12 ERA) was an important cog in the Pride's three-member pitching rotation.

However, the Pride can fill its batting order with nine players who started at least 37 games last season, and has two senior pitchers to anchor the staff. In addition, the program's newcomers are all expected to contribute and provide the Pride with the depth it lacked last year.

"We were pretty fortunate last year to accomplish what we did," said Edwards. "We had to replace an outstanding senior class from 2003, and we had almost no depth. We thought we were a year away from being able to compete at a national level, but our younger players really stepped up and we stayed relatively healthy, so we ended up a year ahead of schedule."

As strong as this year's team looks on paper, it remains to be seen if the players will have as much reason to daydream next summer.

Here is a position-by-position look at the Pride heading into the 2005 season:

## Pitcher

Hofstra has the luxury of turning to two senior pitchers this season, either of whom could be considered the staff ace. Callie Osborne transferred to Hofstra last season from Briarcliffe College and set a school record with an 0.79 ERA, while earning CAA Pitcher of the Year honors. Adrienne Clark, meanwhile, continued to cement her reputation as one of the best big game pitchers anywhere in the country, picking up three NCAA Tournament wins, all of which came in 1-0 games. In fact, her four career NCAA wins have all been in 1-0 games, including a 12-inning win over Southern Illinois last year and a nine-inning win over Creighton in 2003.

Osborne and Clark provide contrasting styles, which helps them complement each other. Osborne is a hard thrower, while Clark relies on pinpoint control and an array of sharp breaking balls. Junior Amy Belonick, meanwhile, has stepped up when called upon in her first two seasons, never more prominently than a 2-0 shutout win over Delaware in the championship round of the CAA Tournament last year. Following the graduation of Alcantara, Belonick may be asked to step up again and assume the role of the team's third starter.

The Pride also has a pair of newcomers looking to enter the mix. Freshman Courtney Oliver, a former Boston Globe Player of the Year who struck out 998 batters in her high school career, will get a chance to prove what she can do at the collegiate level. Jennifer Daddino, a sophomore transfer from Concordia, will also look to earn some time in the circle.

### Catcher

This is the one position that Hofstra has to worry about replacing this season, although it is a very important one. Graduated senior Meaghan Almon was the undisputed leader of last season's squad, and she caught every inning of every game. Sophomore Ashley Lane, the 2004 CAA Rookie of the Year, is a candidate to make the transition to catcher this season. A powerful lefty who became only the fourth player in Hofstra history to hit 10 homers in a season (and the first freshman), Lane has the arm strength and the athleticism to play

catcher, but will need to face the challenges of adjusting to a new position.

Junior Kristin Galeone, meanwhile, has backed up Almon for the last two seasons and has a head start on Lane defensively. If Galeone looks ready to handle the role on a full-time basis, Hofstra has the option of moving Lane back to the outfield. A catching platoon between both Galeone and Lane is also a strong possibility.

### First Base

Senior Stefanie Kenney began her career as a pitcher/designated player, but took over at first base last season and performed admirably. She has battled injuries in her career, including back surgery after her freshman campaign, but enters 2005 totally healthy and poised for a big year. Kenney has 16 career home runs, eight off the career record held by the player she replaced at first base, Amanda Hallaway.

### Second Base

Junior Lisa Wambold made a successful transition to second base from the outfield last season and should hold the position again this spring. The MVP of the Colonial Athletic Association Tournament, Wambold is on pace to become the school's all-time leader in career stolen bases (28 through two seasons) and helps provide the Pride with speed and versatility from the second spot in the batting order.

### Shortstop

Junior Laura Sweeney became the full-time shortstop last season and started every game for the Pride, batting .257 while earning second-team All-Mid Atlantic region honors. A terrific athlete with great range defensively, Sweeney is also a dangerous table setter at the top of the batting order (15 stolen bases).

### Third Base

Junior Tara Ulrich has been the team's mainstay at third base over her first two seasons. A powerful hitter with a quick glove and a tremendous arm, she can impact a game offensively or defensively. She is on pace to become the school's all-time leading home run hitter (14 in her first two seasons) and has been

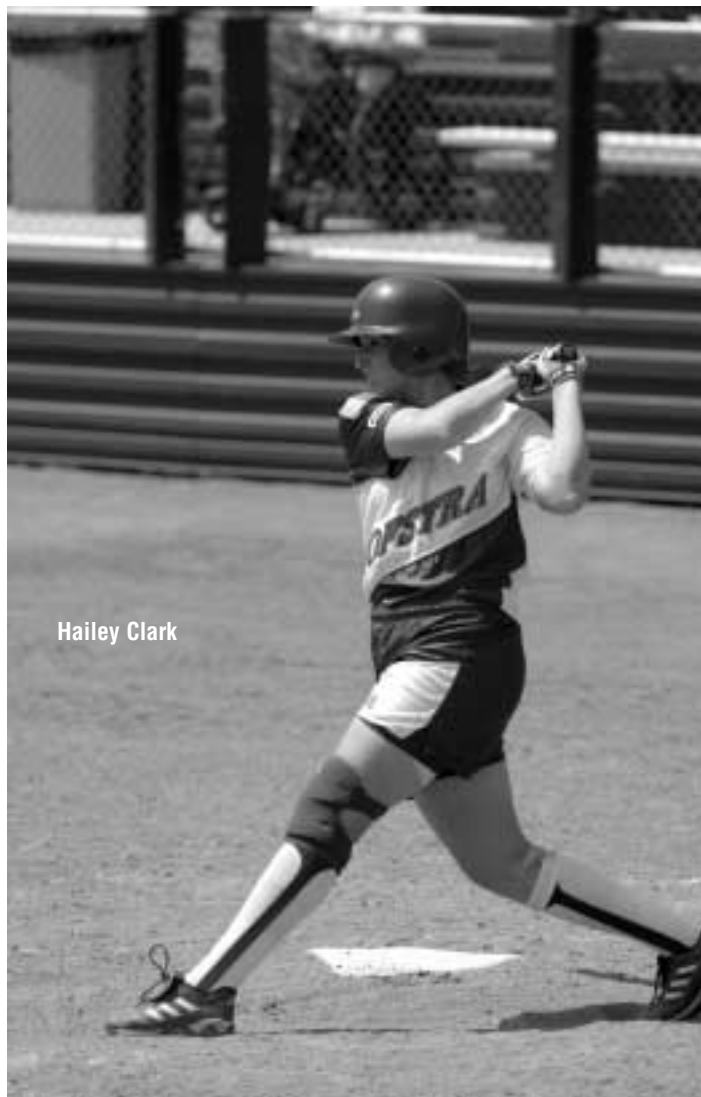
named All-Colonial Athletic Association as both a freshman and sophomore.

### Outfield

Hofstra enters 2005 looking at a possible all-senior outfield, with Lisa Torres in left, Kelly Morris in center and Hailey Clark in right. All three had breakthrough seasons last year in different ways. Torres made it through the full season after seeing injuries cut her first three springs short, earning all-tournament honors at the NCAA Regionals to cap off the year. Morris, a former walk-on, emerged as the full-time starting center fielder midway through the year and rattled off an 11-game hitting streak to close out the regular season. Hailey Clark, meanwhile, belted 16 homers, one shy of the school record, after hitting only two in her first two seasons. After two seasons of playing through injuries, Clark was healthy in 2004 and quickly became a feared power hitter (Stanford walked her four times in the championship round of the NCAA Regional).

### Utility/Designated Player

One of the big pluses Hofstra has this season is a wide variety of players who can play multiple positions. All three incoming freshmen can play almost anywhere on the field, which enables the Pride to withstand injuries and give players the occasional rest over the course of a long season. Freshman Pam Dreslinski played shortstop at Edgewood High School in Ashtabula, Ohio, where she batted .500 as a senior, and saw a lot of action in the outfield during the fall. Freshman Gen Haney is a terrific all-around athlete and could be used at the middle infield positions or the outfield. Courtney Oliver, who figures in the Pride's pitching plans, can also play either corner position or the outfield and is a powerful hitter who the coaching staff would love to work into the line-up. All three freshmen have the potential to push the veterans for playing time.

Amongst the returning players, Hailey Clark, a natural outfielder, was also used at first base and third base last season to give Hofstra depth on the corners. Adrienne Clark, who was originally recruited to be a utility player, could be used in the outfield or at third base, but will likely be restricted to pitching and designated player duty.

Hofstra also has the chance to platoon its utility players at the designated player position, to give the freshmen game experience or decrease the wear and tear on players nursing injuries. The designated player position may also simply be given to whoever happens to be swinging the hottest bat at the time.

### Schedule

The Pride once again will challenge itself in the early going, traveling to Florida for three tournaments. Hofstra will face a rematch with Stanford on the first day of the season at the Wilson Invitational at the University of South Florida, while also battling Illinois, South Florida, Florida Atlantic, Oklahoma State and Purdue. On the northern part of its schedule, Hofstra battles Seton Hall, Connecticut, St. John's and Rutgers from the Big East, as well as NCAA participants Long Island University, Maine and Lehigh. The CAA schedule once again should provide plenty of challenges as well, as the league's other six teams try to knock Hofstra from its perch as the three-time defending champions.

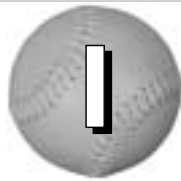

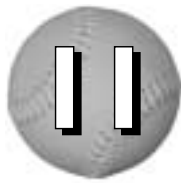

# STUART RABINOWITZ

## PRESIDENT OF HOFSTRA UNIVERSITY

Stuart Rabinowitz was chosen by the Hofstra University Board of Trustees to serve as the eighth President of the University on December 20, 2000. Prior to his appointment, he served as Dean of Hofstra University School of Law from September 1989 through June 2001. He joined the faculty of the Law School in 1972. President Rabinowitz currently holds the Andrew M. Boas and Mark L. Claster Distinguished Professorship in Civil Procedure.

President Rabinowitz holds positions with a number of important government and community organizations, including the Judicial Advisory Council of the State of New York Unified Court System - County of Nassau, the Nassau County Health and Welfare Council and the Holocaust Memorial & Educational Center of Nassau County. He serves on the Board of Directors for the Long Island Association, the Long Island Coalition for Fair Broadcasting, he Long Island Technology Network, Project GRAD of the Roosevelt Union Free School District as well as on the Board of Trustees of the Commission on Independent Colleges and Universities. President Rabinowitz is a former member of the Nassau County Blue Ribbon Financial Review Panel and former chair of the Nassau County Local Advisory Board. Additionally, President Rabinowitz served as a member of the Nassau County Commission on Government Revision, which was charged with drafting a new charter and a new form of government for the County. He is the recipient of the Martin Luther King Living the Dream Award, EOC; Distinguished Service in the Cause of Justice, Legal Aid Society; UJA Federation Leadership Award; and the Bar Association of Nassau County Proclamation for Outstanding Service to both the Legal Profession and the Community and the Community Service Award from the Conference of Jewish Organizations of Nassau County.

President Rabinowitz received a juris doctor, magna cum laude, from Columbia University School of Law, where he was a member of the board of editors of the *Columbia Law Review* and a Harlan Fiske Stone Scholar. He graduated from City College of New York with honors, and is a member of Phi Beta Kappa and the American Law Institute.

### JACK HAYES

Jack Hayes was appointed by Hofstra University President Stuart Rabinowitz as the University's new director of athletics on October 4, 2004. Hayes comes to Hofstra after serving as an associate director of athletics at the University of Connecticut, and replaces Harry Royle, who is heading the University's newly energized athletic fundraising effort as the executive director of athletic development and endowment.

Hayes, the eighth director of athletics at Hofstra, oversees Hofstra's 18 Division I teams, an athletic administration of more than 70 professional staff, and 430 student athletes.

Hayes' proven expertise in enhancing academic and athletic success of student-athletes, strategic planning, fundraising, marketing, university relations, facility enhancement, budgetary management, and NCAA compliance will complement Hofstra University's athletic department in its quest to further enhance its athletic program, and assist Hofstra's student-athletes both on and off the field.

"We are pleased that the national search we have conducted for our new athletic director has resulted in the appointment of someone of Jack Hayes' caliber," said President Rabinowitz. "At Hofstra University, student-athletes strive for excellence both on and off the field, and Jack's broad experience in athletic administration and as a former student-athlete will help Hofstra's Athletic Department continue its development as a national program which recognizes that student-athletes are students first."

"I want to be part of an institution that is well-respected academically and has a history of athletic success," said Hayes. "At Hofstra University, I have found an institution that combines an outstanding

reputation and the ability to succeed in athletics, and I am very excited about being a member of the Hofstra University community."

Hayes comes to Hofstra University with over 14 years of athletic administration experience, including management positions at four Division I institutions. His past three years have been highlighted by leading the University of Connecticut Division of Athletics fundraising efforts, where his responsibilities included managing the operations of the UConn Athletic Development Fund, implementing policies and procedures for the annual giving program, assisting with the cultivation and solicitation of major gift prospects, coordinating capital project campaigns, overseeing special events, and managing the athletic ticketing operation. While at UConn, he served as a senior staff member for a \$40 million program that supports 24 sports and 650 student-athletes.

From 1998 to 2001 Hayes served as director of athletic administration at Fordham University, where he was responsible for the comprehensive internal operations of the athletic department, including fiscal management, facilities management, staff training and development, ticket operations, and NCAA compliance initiatives.

Prior to his tenure at Fordham, Hayes served as assistant director of athletics at St. John's University, where he managed the fiscal operations of the athletic department and supervised the business office. Hayes began his professional career in college athletics at Fairfield University, where he served as assistant director of athletics. He oversaw the addition of four sports programs at Fairfield University – football, women's rowing, women's lacrosse and women's golf.



Hayes received a master's degree in education in 1992 with a concentration in sport management from the University of Connecticut. He holds a bachelor's degree (1989) from Providence College, where he was a member of Providence's NCAA Division I lacrosse team. He was also awarded a certificate of completion in 2001 from the Sports Management Institute, Consortium of the Universities of Michigan and Texas.

A native of Providence, Rhode Island, Hayes graduated from the Providence Country Day School where he lettered in football, basketball and lacrosse. He and his wife, Bridget, have been married since 1999, and they have a 2-year old daughter, Katie.

## THE HOFSTRA PRIDE CLUB

# HOFSTRA HERITAGE

The history of athletics at Hofstra is as old as the University itself, and is steeped in the Dutch heritage that helps to make Hofstra such a unique school.

Hofstra has always had strong roots in tradition. Ties to Dutch heritage and the Netherlands began with William S. Hofstra, after whom the school is named and on whose property the University was started. When the doors opened in 1935, the sole building on campus was Hofstra's mansion, which he had affectionately named the Netherlands after his homeland. The mansion, which houses administrative offices, is now the center of Hofstra's 240-acre campus, and has been renamed Hofstra Hall.

Also adopted in this early stage of Hofstra's history was the school alma mater, "The Netherlands." The lyrics were written by a faculty member to the music of the Dutch national anthem by the 16th-century Dutch composer Valerius.



## The Hofstra Flag

The Hofstra storm flag is modeled after an actual Dutch geus, a privateer's flag. In 1991 a representative of Holland's Queen Beatrix presented the banner to then Hofstra President (now President Emeritus) James M. Shuart. The history of the flag dates back to 1572, when a group of Dutch loyalists called Watergeuzen used the flag's mast to ram the gates of a Dutch city in their opposition to Spanish rule. While the Netherlands Royal Navy flies the original red, white and blue geus, the Hofstra version has been redesigned in the school colors of gold, white and blue.

The gold, white and blue Hofstra colors themselves spring from Dutch roots. The first official Hofstra flag appeared on April 19, 1940, when Dr. Alexander Loudon, an envoy for Queen Wilhelmina of the Netherlands, presented his country's flag to Hofstra in a special ceremony. However, the flag he presented was not the red, white and blue flag of the Netherlands, but the orange, white and blue banner of William of Nassau with a Hofstra emblem placed on the flag. The University has used the design ever since, although President Shuart, after researching the colors, replaced the orange hue with gold, making the flag truer to the original House of Nassau. The flag is one of Hofstra's most recognizable symbols, utilized in publications, pins and souvenirs.

## The Hofstra Seal

The Hofstra seal, another easily recognizable emblem, was designed from the royal Dutch emblem by art instructor Constant Van de Wall. The seal is modeled on the coat of arms of the House of Orange-Nassau. The round seal includes the coat of arms, flanked by lions on either side. A lion also stands in the center of the coat of arms, holding a sword in its right claw and a bundle of seven arrows, which represent the seven provinces of Holland, in its left. The seal also carries the motto of the House of Orange-Nassau in Old French:

"Je maintiendray" (I stand steadfast). In 1988 one of the two lions on the seal was officially replaced with a lioness. The seal is now the focal point of the "Hofstra Pride" logo.



## The Hofstra Nicknames

The Hofstra nickname has also evolved over the years. For decades, Hofstra athletic teams have used the nicknames Flying Dutchmen, Dutchmen, or Dutch. Recently, an additional nickname of The Pride has become popular. We have not changed our nickname. We are both the Dutch (and its variations) and the Pride.

The Pride nickname started during the University's dramatic recovery and growth in the mid to late '80's from a major fiscal crisis during the previous decade. The first consistent use of the word "Pride" relating to athletics started in 1989 when the University's athletic booster club was founded and called itself The Pride Club. At that time it had no meaning associated with our teams. It was simply consistent with a general feeling about all of our efforts.

The Pride nickname has also evolved over the past decade in a more specific fashion than just the expression of the feeling. The word pride is used to describe a sense of having strong self-respect or a sense of accomplishment. But in 1988 the lion on the right side of the shield on the Hofstra seal was changed into a lioness to symbolize gender equity. This, in turn, led to the development of the University mascots — Kate and Willie Pride, a lion and lioness. The two lions led to extensive use of the word "Pride" in talking about Hofstra, as a group of lions is called a pride. In 1995 bronze reproductions of the lion and lioness were added to the campus scenery. In fact, there are now four such pairs of sculptures on campus.

However, the evolution continues even further. In 1997, the University purchased a sculpture by Paul Manship of "Atalanta," a figure from Greek mythology. It is an impressive 14-foot tall figure of a running woman. It is on the west side of Hofstra Stadium. To complement this figure, in 1998, the University commissioned Gregg Wyatt to sculpt a similarly sized figure of a running man. In this case it was a representation of "Hippomenes" who was a central figure in the myth. The myth of Atalanta and Hippomenes relates closely to Hofstra symbology.

As the myth goes, an Oracle told Atalanta, as a young girl, that she must never marry. Thus, Atalanta avoided men and devoted herself to the chase. Soon she could outrun any man. Yet because Atalanta was so attractive she had many suitors. To deal with them she imposed an almost impossible condition. She would only marry one who could beat her in a foot race. While she would be the prize of such a race, the penalty for losing was death. Nonetheless there were suitors and there was need of a judge for such races. Hippomenes was chosen for this role. However, when he saw Atalanta he immediately fell in love with her. Knowing he could never out run her, he sought the help of Venus.

Venus agreed, and gave him three golden apples, which Hippomenes was to throw in front of Atalanta during the race. The apples were so desirable it would be impossible for her to resist picking them up, and thus she would lose the race. All this came to pass, and when the race was over and won by



Hippomenes, they fell deeply in love and the youth carried off his prize. However, they angered Venus for their failure to thank her. As punishment, she turned Hippomenes into a lion and Atalanta into a lioness.

With this strong identification with lions and the multiple meanings of the word pride, our coaches and players, as well as the sports media, have begun to use it extensively over the last several years. Our women's teams especially are more comfortable calling themselves The Pride, which is genderless, than they are calling themselves The Flying Dutchwomen or the Lady Dutch. The men's teams are also comfortable with the nickname Pride.

However, as noted earlier, we have not abandoned the Flying Dutchmen or formally adopted The Pride. There is nothing wrong with having more than one nickname. It is not uncommon for a school to have two nicknames as institutions such as Yale, Virginia, Georgia Tech and Army have multiple monikers. The bottom line is our name is HOFSTRA.



# ACADEMIC SUPPORT

Hofstra University is committed to the pursuit of academic and athletic excellence. The University views participation in intercollegiate athletics as benefiting the student-athlete in an educationally enhancing experience beyond any other opportunity available. Hofstra also realizes the time commitment made by student-athletes and has committed the facilities and resources to support all students.

The University Tutorial Program (UTP) provides free tutoring in every subject area to any Hofstra student. In addition to this service, the UTP has an athletic component that addresses the academic needs of student-athletes. The UTP academic counselor administers this athletic component. The UTP emphasizes four areas in their efforts to ensure the academic success of Hofstra's student-athletes.

Area one is academic counseling. Services are provided in the areas of academic planning, career planning, personal counseling, and campus and community referrals. The counselor also meets with prospective student-athletes, at the coach's request, to share the many benefits of a Hofstra University education.

Area two is academic advising. In an effort to ease the demand on the Office of Advisement, the UTP academic counselor also advises first-year and undecided student-athletes.

Area three is academic monitoring. The UTP counselor monitors the academic progress of student-athletes to ensure compliance with Hofstra University,



NCAA and conference regulations. The counselor's regular communication with the faculty and coaches provide an opportunity for early intervention should academic difficulties arise.

Area four is study halls. The University Tutorial Program provides all athletic study halls with tutors in various subjects and assesses the needs of individual student-athletes to provide the most effective study environment. The assessment tool administered by the UTP is also used to provide various enrichment seminars for the student-athletes such as time management, writing skills, campus resources, and surviving the college transition.

In the fall of 1999, the Pride Teaching and Learning Center opened on the second floor of Margiotta Hall. Funded in part by proceeds from the Joe Gardi Golf Open, the state-of-the-art computer lab and learning center features a projection system and 18 computer work stations, which are connected to the University network for easy research access to the Internet.

# SPORTS MEDICINE/ATHLETIC TRAINING

Through a comprehensive athletic training program, Hofstra University student-athletes are provided excellent health care during their attendance at the University. A coordinated effort between the University Health and Wellness Center, the Athletic Department and outside health care providers ensures every student-athlete the best medical attention possible.

University student-athletes have direct access to a myriad of health care services. Managing the coverage of every practice and competition event is Hofstra University's athletic training staff, which is headed by second-year Head Athletic Trainer Evan Malings and features eight full-time assistant athletic trainers and numerous student athletic trainers. The athletic trainers provide injury management, rehabilitation and treatment to the entire Athletic program. Utilizing three state-of-the-art athletic training rooms, these professionals work tirelessly to ensure the safe participation of Hofstra's student-athletes and to return injured athletes to play quickly and safely.

Supporting the athletic trainers is team physician Dr. Damion Martins. Dr. Martins, a physician with Pro Health Care, Inc. in Lake Success, New York, is in his third year on Hofstra's medical team. Martins experience in the sports medicine field includes serving as team physician for the University of Maryland, University of Maryland-Baltimore County and Coppin State athletic departments. He was also on the medical staff of the National Football League's Baltimore Ravens.

Hofstra University sponsors a fully accredited, highly competitive undergraduate degree program for athletic training majors, in which Hofstra student athletic trainers participate in all aspects of the health care system.



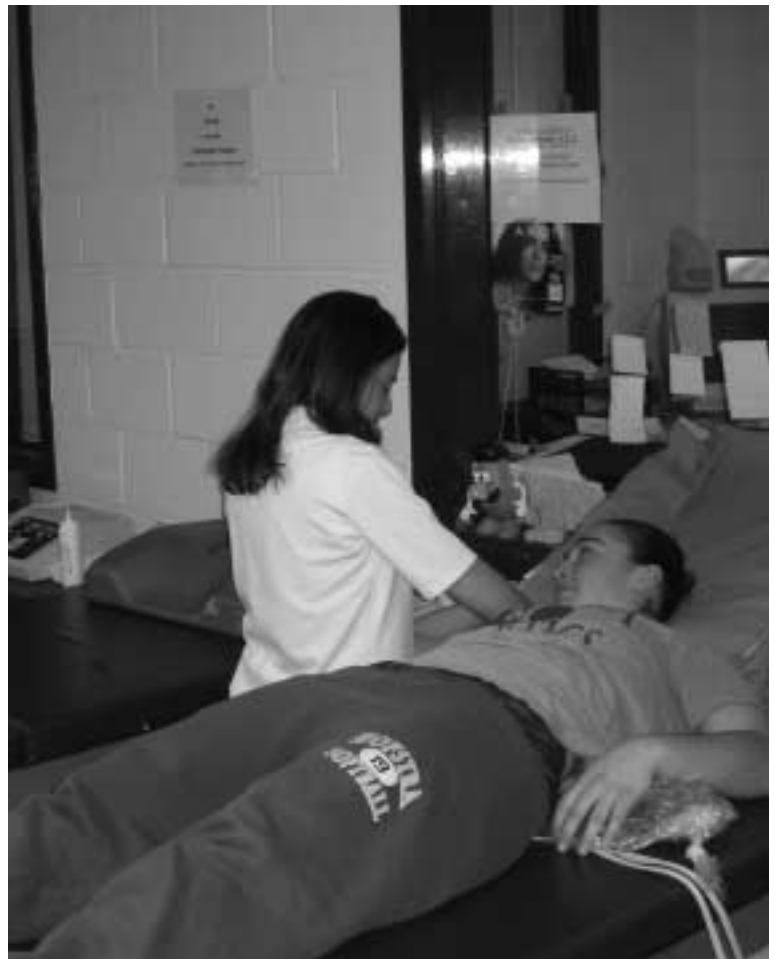

# LONG ISLAND, NEW YORK

Long Island offers the best of both worlds: it is a suburban haven that is also convenient to New York City. Location, however, is just one of many assets that makes Long Island attractive to both native residents and visitors alike. The people, the sites and the unique geography of Long Island bring people back again and again.

Long Island is the largest island adjoining the continental United States. Twenty miles wide and approximately 130 miles long, Long Island is separated from the mainland on the north by the Long Island Sound and on the south by the Atlantic Ocean. It measures 100 miles from the Nassau-Queens border to Montauk Point, which lies on the eastern tip of the South Fork. The eastern tip of the North Fork is called Orient Point. The forks are separated by the beautiful waters of the Great Peconic Bay and Gardiner's Bay. Nestled in the bays between the two forks are Shelter Island and Gardiner's Island.

With a population of 2.7 million people, Long Island has a population larger than 20 states. It has 23 colleges and universities

with more than 150,000 students, 127 public school districts with more than 405,000 students and 231 private schools with more than 52,000 students. The region is considered one of the nation's wealthiest areas with a per household median income of \$49,500. The work force on Long Island now exceeds 1.4 million persons, and the region boasts one of the lowest unemployment rates in the nation. The economy is made up of more than 84,000 businesses, has 50 million square feet of office space, and has more than 1,000 shopping malls. Roosevelt Field is the premier mall on Long Island, featuring department stores and specialty shops, and is only minutes from the Hofstra University campus.

The most distinguishing features of Long Island, however, are its scenic beauty and its

many sites and attractions. It has become a vacation spot for many, a "getaway" from big city hassles and distractions. People travel to enjoy the 1,100 square miles of shoreline on more than 150 different beaches. No area of the Island is more than 15 minutes from a world-class beach. Jones Beach, which lies on the south shore, is a 2,400-acre park with six miles of ocean beach, boardwalk, bay beach, pool, golf and outdoor concerts. It is 10 minutes from Hofstra and, in the summer, students can catch a Hofstra shuttle bus to the beach.

In addition, Long Island is home to 20 state parks, 115 golf courses, 95 tennis clubs and 429 yacht clubs and marinas. The active person can enjoy camping, canoeing, bicycling, water skiing, boating or fishing. Others might enjoy visiting any of the lighthouses, the millionaire mansions, the art galleries or one of Long Island's 14 wineries. The tourist may join the crowd at theaters and gourmet

seafood restaurants, or hit one of the many exciting nightclubs. Families might cool off at the beach or the water park. The Hamptons, at the heart of the South Fork, are considered a summer resort area and are famous as the playground community of the rich and famous.

Long Island is the place for the sports fan, as well. The Nassau Veterans Memorial Coliseum, which is literally across the street from Hofstra, offers concerts, children's shows and is home to the National Hockey League's New York Islanders. Belmont Park, home of horse racing's Belmont Stakes, offers the thoroughbred horse enthusiast an outlet in beautiful surroundings. The PGA staged its biggest tournament – the U.S. Open on Long Island in 2002 (Bethpage Black) and 2004 (Shinnecock). Heading into Queens, there's Shea Stadium, home of the New York Mets. Further west, and a short ride via the Long Island Rail Road, is New York City, where students can frequent museums, theaters, retailers, Madison Square Garden, South Street Seaport and more.

More than 25 million people visit Long Island each year pumping approximately \$2.5 billion into its economy through tourism. Long Island is not merely a place for the tourist, however. Generations have settled down and made their living on Long Island, enjoying the benefits of moderate climate, miles of beautiful beaches, easy access to New York City, and a place to call home. With scores of major attractions and distinctive sites, Long Island has it all for the tourist, as well as the year-round resident.

# HOFSTRA IN THE COMMUNITY

The Hofstra University Softball program believes it has a special responsibility to the community. Thus, whether it's the height of the season or those "slow" off-season months, the Hofstra Softball staff and student-athletes are always active in the area.

The Pride lend their time and efforts to charitable and educational causes. The team raised money for and participated in the American Cancer Society's Walk for a Cure at Jones Beach. This past November and December each class sponsored a needy family – providing food, decorations and gifts to help brighten the Holiday season. The team is also involved with the Nassau County Social Services Foster Big Brother/Big Sister program and the Long Island Special Olympics, volunteering at the Nassau-Suffolk Special Olympics softball game held at the Hofstra Softball Stadium. The Hofstra Softball program is also involved with the Women's Sports Foundation and participates in WSF-sponsored clinics throughout the year. Several times each year, Pride players and coaches speak at schools and softball clinics. The team also participates in a story-reading program with the Glen Cove Head Start day care program.



# HOFSTRA SOFTBALL STADIUM



The Hofstra University Pride play and practice at the Hofstra Softball Stadium, located on the North Campus of Hofstra University. The Softball Stadium is located next to the Hofstra Arena and across from the Hofstra Recreation Center. Since the Stadium opened, the Pride have a 123-18 record at home, including 31-2 against CAA opponents.

The Stadium, constructed in 2000, provides a fine setting for collegiate softball action. Construction included new sunken dugouts, new outfield sod, a press box on top of the bleachers behind home plate, batting cages next to the dugouts and a bullpen area. Bleacher seating behind home plate, from dugout to dugout, accommodates nearly 1,000 spectators. Field dimensions are 190 feet down the lines and 220 feet to centerfield. Banners commemorating Hofstra's team achievements are displayed on the outfield fences, while plaques mounted to the facade of the Stadium showcase individual awards won by Hofstra Softball players.

Hofstra Softball Stadium has hosted three Colonial Athletic Association Championships and is also the site of the Catholic League High School

Softball Championship. One of the finest softball facilities on Long Island, Hofstra's Softball Stadium allows the University to continue to host such events in the future.

Hofstra can avoid inclement weather and practice inside Physical Fitness Center, which is equipped with pitching machines and batting cages. The team also has a state-of-the-art weight training facility. Located in the Hofstra Arena, the weight room is outfitted with the most advanced strength training and cardiovascular equipment available.

The Pride not only boast one of the better softball facilities in the Northeast, but also have a first-class locker room at their disposal. The locker room, located in the Physical Fitness Center, includes plush, wall-to-wall carpeting, oak lockers and an entertainment center with a television and stereo.

# HOFSTRA SOFTBALL

## 2004 YEAR IN REVIEW

When the spring of 2004 began, conventional wisdom was that the Hofstra Softball team might suffer a bit of a down season. Conventional wisdom was wrong. When the spring of 2004 ended, the Pride improbably found itself with the winning run at the plate in the seventh inning against Stanford, just one big hit away from a trip to the Women's College World Series.

Hofstra entered the spring of 2004 on the heels of what was then considered its most memorable season in school history. The Pride won the 2003 regular season and postseason Colonial Athletic Association championships, but the league did not have an automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament, leaving the team's postseason hopes in doubt. Hofstra, though, was awarded the last available at-large bid to the NCAA Tournament, and proved itself worthy of the selection by winning two games at a regional for the first time, including a big 3-1 upset win over #11 Nebraska in the opening round.

However, Hofstra lost five seniors off that year's team, including three of the top four hitters in its batting order. The senior class also included the top two home run hitters in school history, the second-best base stealer in school history, three-fourths of its starting infield, its center fielder, and its top pitcher. The young team that was left behind in 2004, with only two seniors on the roster, appeared on paper to be as vulnerable as any Hofstra Softball team in recent memory.

Instead, the mantle of "most memorable season" lasted for only one year, as the 2004 Pride Softball team became the standard by which future Hofstra teams may very well be judged. Out of 64 teams to qualify for the NCAA's, Hofstra was one of only 12 to win at least four games, while becoming the lowest-seeded team to ever qualify for a regional final in the history of the tournament.

The path to the regional finals wasn't always a smooth one. It took the Pride until the very last game to secure the Colonial Athletic Association regular season title, earning the right to host the conference tournament. The Pride then lost its opening game of the CAA Tournament, 3-2, to Delaware, and had to fight its way through the loser's bracket just to make it to the NCAA's at all.

Once the conference title was captured and the bid to the NCAA's was secured, the Pride went on to make history, going further in the NCAA Tournament than any Hofstra team before it. The seventh-seeded Pride won its first two games at the NCAA Regionals at Stanford, upsetting #12 Auburn and Southern Illinois in a pair of 1-0, extra-inning games. After dropping a 7-1 decision to top-seeded Stanford, the Pride answered with another close win over Southern Illinois (3-1) to reach the regional final. Hofstra then turned heads around the country by defeating Stanford, 1-0, to force a second and deciding game for the regional championship, before falling just short in a dramatic 3-1 defeat.

The Pride's journey to Stanford began three thousand miles away in Florida. Hofstra Head Coach Bill Edwards has always believed in challenging his team in the early part of its schedule, and the 2004 season was no different. The Pride opened with two Florida trips, participating in the Wilson Invitational and the Best Western Invitational at the University of South Florida in February, and then traveling to the Speedline Invitational in Clearwater, Florida in March. Hofstra finished its three tournaments with a 6-11 record, but gained some valuable experience against top competition that would only serve to help the team thrive in the postseason.

The Pride also gave a sneak preview of how potent they could be at the Best Western Invitational from Feb. 20-22, when they won four straight games to advance to the championship round. The Pride defeated Maryland, 3-1, Temple, 8-3, Tulsa, 1-0 and North Carolina State, 5-1 to reach the title game, when it finally fell to host South Florida, 4-3.

"That was a big tournament for us," said Edwards. "We really saw for ourselves how good we could be when we put everything together. Reaching the championship and playing a hard-fought game with an outstanding program like South Florida really gave us some confidence that we could compete with anyone."

Junior Adrienne Clark continued her reputation as a big-game pitcher at the Best Western Invitational, coming on in relief in all five games. She threw a combined 18 innings in those five contests, without allowing a single earned run. Clark had closed out her sophomore season with 11



straight victories, tying a school record, and threw 15 innings without allowing a run in the 2003 NCAA Tournament. At the plate, freshman outfielder Ashley Lane burst onto the scene at the Best Western, hitting game-winning homers in the wins over Maryland and Tulsa, and adding a 4-for-4 effort in the win over N.C. State.

Hofstra was somewhat snakebitten at the Speedline Invitational, but still had a solid showing. The Pride had an excellent chance to upset Big 10 power Illinois, taking a 1-0 lead into the sixth inning before falling, 2-1. That came just one day after Illinois played the United States National team and lost only 3-2. Hofstra also lost close decisions to UNLV (1-0) and Villanova (3-1) at the Speedline Invitational.

The northern part of the Hofstra schedule had some ups and downs, as well as a lot of home runs from junior outfielder Hailey Clark, and a pair of no-hitters from junior pitcher Callie Osborne. Clark would finish the year with 16 round-trippers, one shy of the school record, including 14 in a stretch of 28 games. Osborne threw abbreviated no-hitters in CAA wins over Towson and Drexel and would end up setting a school record for the lowest ERA in a season (0.79).

The Pride entered the final weekend of the regular season needing to win two out of three games at James Madison to win its third straight regular season CAA Championship. The Dukes won the first game of the series 1-0 on a wild pitch, putting Hofstra's back to the wall. Osborne responded with a 2-0 shutout in the nightcap of the Saturday doubleheader, bringing the regular season down to one final game on Sunday.

In the regular season finale, junior first baseman Stefanie Kenney hit a key two-run double, and sophomore shortstop Laura Sweeney added an RBI single to stake Hofstra to a 4-0 lead. Senior pitcher Alexis Alcantara took a shutout into the sixth inning, and Osborne came in to get her first save of the season as the Pride held on, 4-3, to bring the CAA Tournament back to Hempstead.

Osborne's strong season earned her the Pitcher of the Year Award at the annual CAA Awards Banquet. Lane captured the CAA Rookie of the Year honor, while nine players in all were honored on the All-CAA teams. The first-teamers included Lane, Osborne, senior catcher Meaghan Almon, sophomore second baseman Lisa Wambold, Adrienne Clark (as a designated player) and Hailey Clark (as a utility player). Alcantara, Kenney and sophomore third baseman Tara Ulrich were on the second team.

Unlike the 2003 season, the CAA had an automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament, and the Pride entered the CAA's knowing that it needed to win the championship to make it back to the regionals. The task became even more difficult when Hofstra dropped the first game of the double-elimination tournament, 3-2, to Delaware, leaving the Pride in need of a four-game win streak to repeat as conference champions. Towson very nearly knocked Hofstra out in a loser's bracket game, carrying a 4-3 lead into the sixth inning. A two-run double from Wambold gave the Pride the lead for good, and Hofstra

held on to win, 7-5, when the Tigers left the bases loaded in the seventh.

The Pride advanced through to the championship round with a 3-0 win over James Madison in a game that was closer than the final score indicated. Junior left fielder Lisa Torres had a diving catch in the fifth inning to prevent two runs from scoring, and the Dukes, just like Towson had in the previous game, left the bases loaded in the seventh.

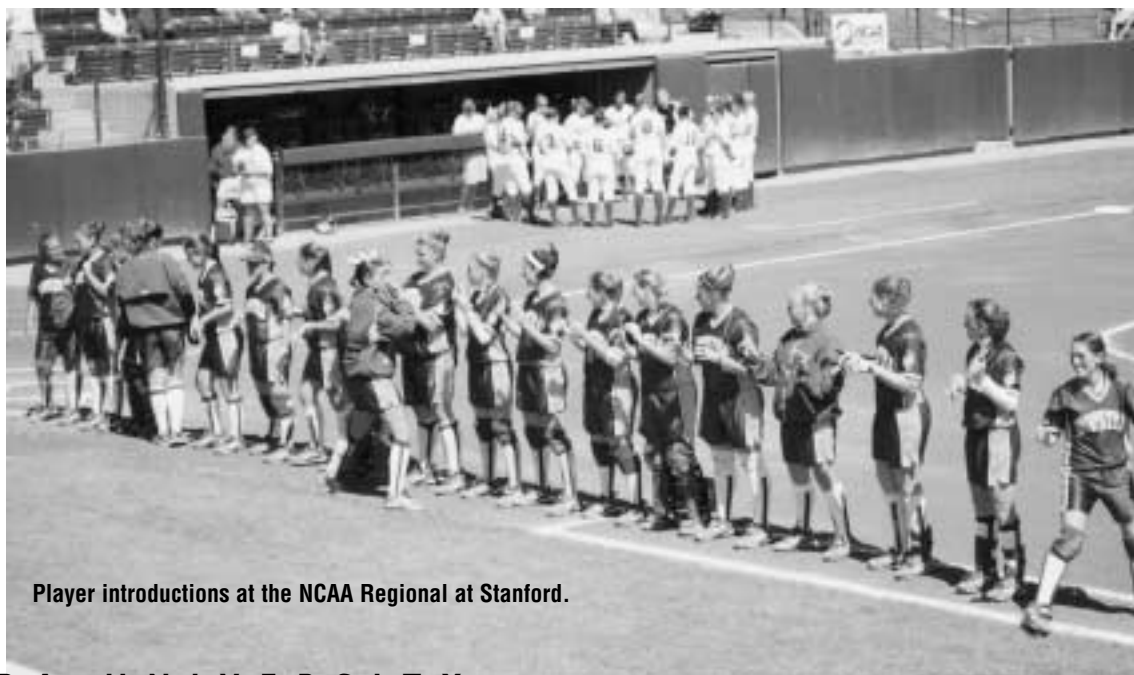
"That catch from Torres was the defensive play of the season," said Edwards. "If she doesn't come up with that catch, we lose the momentum and probably go on to lose the game."

The win over James Madison set up a rematch with Delaware in the championship round, and the Pride needed to defeat the Blue Hens twice in order to win the CAA Championship. Edwards made the surprise move of the tournament when he gave the starting pitching assignment to sophomore reliever Amy Belonick, whose previous appearances in the circle in her two seasons had all been in relief. Belonick responded to her first career start by throwing a two-hit shutout to force a second and deciding game. Hofstra took a 1-0 lead into the sixth inning before the Blue Hens tied it on a two-out RBI single, forcing extra innings. The 1-1 tie held until the ninth inning, when Wambold led off with a solo homer down the left field line, giving Hofstra the 2-1 win and its seventh straight postseason conference championship.

"We really had to earn that championship," said Edwards. "We were pushed to the limit, and I was really proud of how our kids responded. Just about every inning of the entire tournament was played under

intense pressure, and we managed to find a way to make the plays we needed to win.”

Wambold was named the MVP of the CAA Tournament, after an exceptional weekend which saw her bat .383 with four doubles and one homer, while picking up the game-winning RBI's in the wins over Towson and Delaware. Alcantara, Belonick, Adrienne Clark and senior catcher Meaghan Almon were named to the All-Tournament team.

Hofstra's reward for its CAA Championship was a trip to Palo Alto, where it would take part in the NCAA Regionals at Stanford. The Pride had already developed a reputation as a postseason giant-killer in recent seasons, and it cemented that reputation by stunning #12 Auburn, 1-0, in nine innings. Osborne started the game and allowed only two hits in 7.2 innings before giving way to Adrienne Clark. Clark then helped herself with an RBI double in the ninth, scoring Almon from first base. Hofstra then sealed the win in dramatic fashion as Lane threw the potential tying run out at the plate for the final out of the game.

The Pride's next task was a showdown with fellow mid-major giant killer Southern Illinois, a 2003 regional finalist that had upset #16 Fresno State in its opening round game in 2004. Clark was given the start, and she engaged in an epic duel with Saluki All-American Amy Harre. Inning after inning went by, and zero after zero went up on the scoreboard. The Pride dodged a bullet in the 10th inning, when the Salukis put a runner on third with nobody out but failed to score, thanks in large part to a diving catch from Wambold at second base. Southern Illinois finally blinked in the 12th inning, as Almon hit a clutch bases-loaded, two-out single to left field to give Hofstra another extra inning 1-0 victory.

The run through the winner's bracket was derailed in the third round on Saturday, as host Stanford captured a 7-1 win to move through to the regional championship. Hofstra had to come back and play that evening against revenge-minded Southern Illinois, and a two-run, two-out triple from Torres gave the Pride an early 2-0 lead. That would be all that Alcantara would need, as she allowed only four hits in seven innings in Hofstra's 3-1 win. Lane added a key solo homer in the sixth inning to give the Pride an insurance run.

The win enabled the Pride to become the lowest seeded team to ever reach a regional final, a standard previously shared by Southern Illinois (#6 in 2003). Hofstra was the longest of long shots, needing to defeat Stanford twice to make it through to the College World Series. However, Clark once again took the ball and outdueled an All-American, this time defeating the Cardinal's Dana Sorensen 1-0. Sorensen didn't surrender a hit until the seventh

inning (a single from Ulrich), but allowed the only run to score when she hit Torres with a pitch with the bases loaded to end the game in the bottom of the seventh.

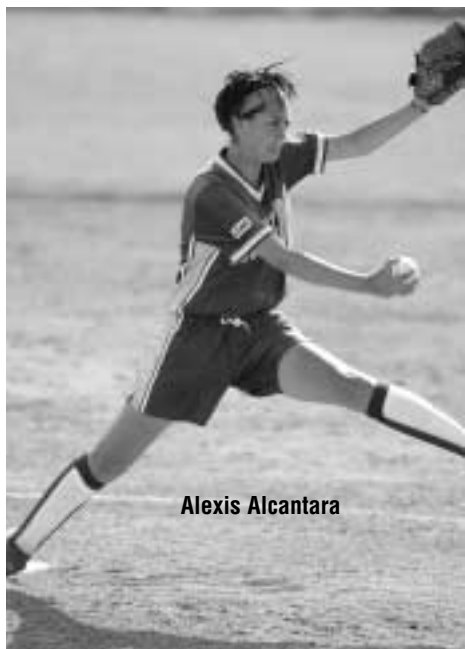
Clark and Sorensen faced off again in the second game, and the score stayed 0-0 until the fourth inning, when Stanford first baseman Leah Nelson led off with a solo homer. That homer ended Clark's remarkable streak of 31 straight shutout innings

as a starter in the NCAA Tournament. Her first three NCAA starts had all been 1-0 victories, including a nine-inning win over Creighton in 2003, the 12-inning win over Southern Illinois and the first seven-inning win over Stanford. She had also thrown 2.2 shutout innings of relief to get the save in 2003 against Nebraska and threw 1.1 shutout innings in relief to get the 1-0 win against Auburn. In her previous 31 innings as an NCAA starter, Clark never once took the mound with the lead, as all three games were won in "walk-off" fashion in the Pride's final at-bat.

Stanford added an insurance run later in the fourth and extended its lead to 3-0 on another solo homer in the fifth inning, but Hofstra kept fighting right down to the end. The Pride put two runners on base in the sixth but failed to score, and then loaded the bases with one out in the seventh, bringing the go-ahead run to the plate. Torres then hit a high-chopper that looked like a sure infield single, but a spectacular defensive play by Stanford shortstop Lauren Lappin earned a force out at third base for the second out of the inning. A sharp ground out to third later, and Hofstra's magical run had come to a close. The Pride walked off the Smith Family Center Field in Palo Alto one game shy of a trip to the College World Series, but certainly with the full respect and admiration of everyone who watched the team play over the weekend.

Adrienne Clark, Meaghan Almon and Lisa Torres were named to the all-tournament team at the regionals, capping off a season in which 12 different Pride players earned some sort of postseason award (All-Conference, All-Region or All-Tournament). It was fitting that so many players were honored, since the 2004 Hofstra Softball team didn't rely on one or two people to carry the load. It was a team effort from top to bottom. From the pivotal final regular season series with James Madison through the regional championship game against Stanford, only one game (out of 14) ended without the tying or go-ahead run at the plate. Along the way, just about every member of the Pride had a clutch hit or a clutch defensive play or a huge pitching performance under pressure.

"I was so proud of our kids," said Edwards. "There were so many times when we could have folded or we could have said it wasn't our year. But we just kept fighting and refusing to lose. Game after game, we took the field with the attitude that we were going to win, or we were going to do our absolute best trying, no matter who we were playing. They probably exceeded everyone's expectations, except maybe their own."

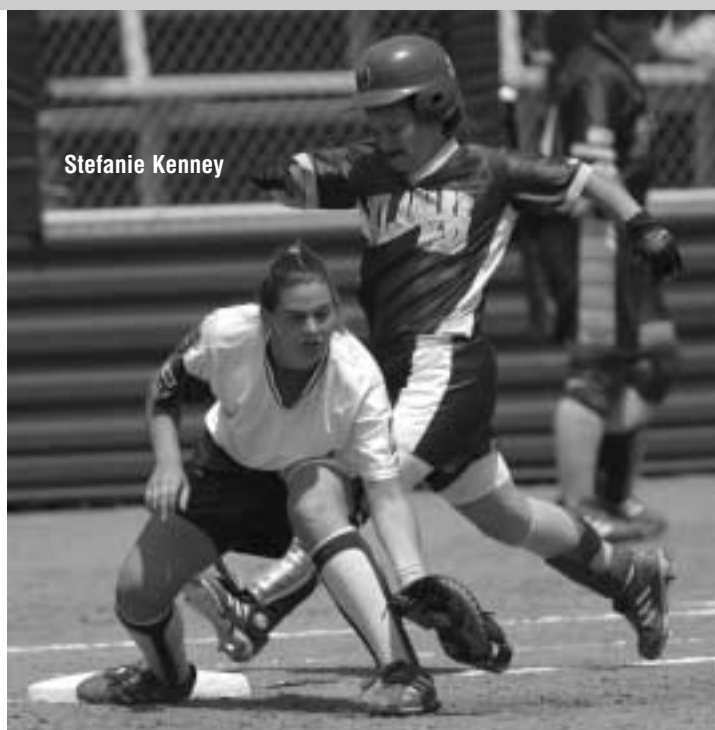

# THE COLONIAL ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

The Colonial Athletic Association celebrates its 20th Anniversary in 2004-05, proud of its past and excited about the future.

Boasting a roster of 10 (soon to be 12) well-respected academic institutions, the CAA has established itself as one of the nation's top collegiate conferences. On the playing field, the league has produced 16 national team champions in five different sports, 33 individual national champions, 11 national coaches of the year, 11 national players of the year and 12 Honda Award winners. The CAA has consistently ranked among the top 15 in the Sears Directors Cup standings and has been the nation's top-ranked Division I non-football conference in recent years.

Even more impressive, however, are the honors accumulated away from competition, which include five Rhodes Scholars and 16 NCAA post-graduate scholars. Last year, the CAA had eight CoSIDA Academic All-Americans, including five who were selected to the first team. Over 1,200 CAA student-athletes posted at least a 3.2 grade point average while lettering in a varsity sport and received the CAA Commissioner's Academic Award in 2003-04.

With a geographic footprint that currently stretches from the shadow of the Statue of Liberty to the beaches of North Carolina, the landscape of the conference includes four of the nation's top 25 media markets – New York (1), Philadelphia (4), Washington, D.C. (8) and Baltimore (24). That reach will expand even wider in 2006 with the addition of Georgia State University in Atlanta and Northeastern University in Boston, giving the CAA a presence in five of the nation's nine largest metropolitan areas.

The CAA conducts championships in 21 sports. Male athletes compete for championships in baseball, basketball, cross country, golf, lacrosse, soccer, swimming & diving, tennis, track & field and wrestling. Female athletes battle for conference titles in basketball, cross country, field hockey, golf, lacrosse, soccer, softball, swimming & diving, tennis, track & field and volleyball.

In men's basketball, the CAA has earned a reputation as a "giant killer" in the NCAA Tournament. Since 1981, CAA schools have posted 12 wins over higher-seeded teams. Last year, seven of the league's 10 teams were among the top 140 in the RPI and four were ranked in the top 100. In women's basketball, the CAA ranked ninth among the nation's 31 conferences in 2003-04. Perennial power Old Dominion has captured three national championships (1979, 1980, 1985) and reached the title game again in 1997.

The conference has also excelled in many other sports. CAA squads have won 10 field hockey national titles since the championship began in 1981, which is not only more than any other



conference but represents nearly half of all titles won. In baseball, at least two CAA teams have earned NCAA Tournament berths for seven consecutive seasons. The CAA is annually ranked among the nation's top 10 conferences in men's and women's soccer, and has traditionally sent multiple teams to the NCAA Tournament. The conference finished the 2003-04 campaign with teams ranked among the top 25 nationally in cross country, field hockey, men's soccer, wrestling, softball, men's and women's tennis and men's and women's lacrosse.

CAA member institutions are also committed to excellence in the classroom. The Colonial Academic Alliance was created in 2002 by the league's presidents with a goal of expanding their partnership to all aspects of university life outside of intercollegiate athletics. Among the programs already established are an undergraduate research conference, coordination of study abroad programs and

granting visiting academic status to student-athletes traveling to an away contest so that they have access to libraries, academic resource centers and computer labs.

In 2002, two faculty members from CAA institutions were awarded academia's most coveted distinction – the Nobel Prize. John B. Fenn, a research professor in the Department of Chemistry at Virginia Commonwealth University, received the Nobel Prize for chemistry, and Vernon Smith, a professor of economics and law at George Mason University, shared the Nobel Prize in economic sciences.

Under the direction of Commissioner Thomas E. Yeager, who has guided the CAA since its inception, the league currently includes 10 members and will expand to 12 in 2006. Core members George Mason University, James Madison University, the University of North Carolina at Wilmington, Old Dominion University, Virginia Commonwealth University and the College of William & Mary were joined by the University of Delaware, Drexel University, Hofstra University and Towson University in 2001. Georgia State University and Northeastern University will become members of the conference in July, 2006.

The CAA traces its roots back to 1983 when three of its current members- George Mason, James Madison, and William and Mary - were aligned with East Carolina University, the United States Naval Academy and the University of Richmond as a basketball league (ECAC South). During the next two years, the league added 11 sports, acquired two new members (UNC Wilmington and American University) and decided to form a new association. The transformation from ECAC South to CAA took place on June 6, 1985. By the fall of 1986, the league gained automatic bids to NCAA Championships in men's basketball, soccer, baseball and women's basketball and formed an officials' bureau. Old Dominion became a member of the CAA in 1991-92 and Virginia Commonwealth University joined the conference prior to the 1995-96 season.

From all-star athletes to Nobel Prize winning faculty, the CAA takes great pride in producing performers who stand out both on the playing field and in the classroom.

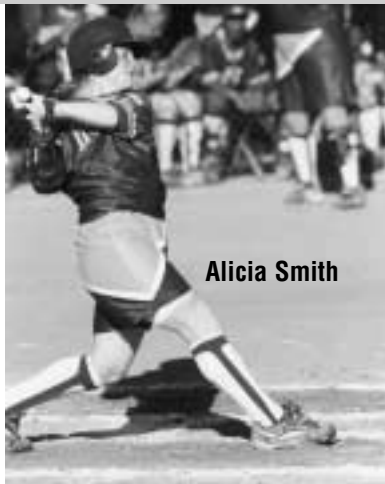

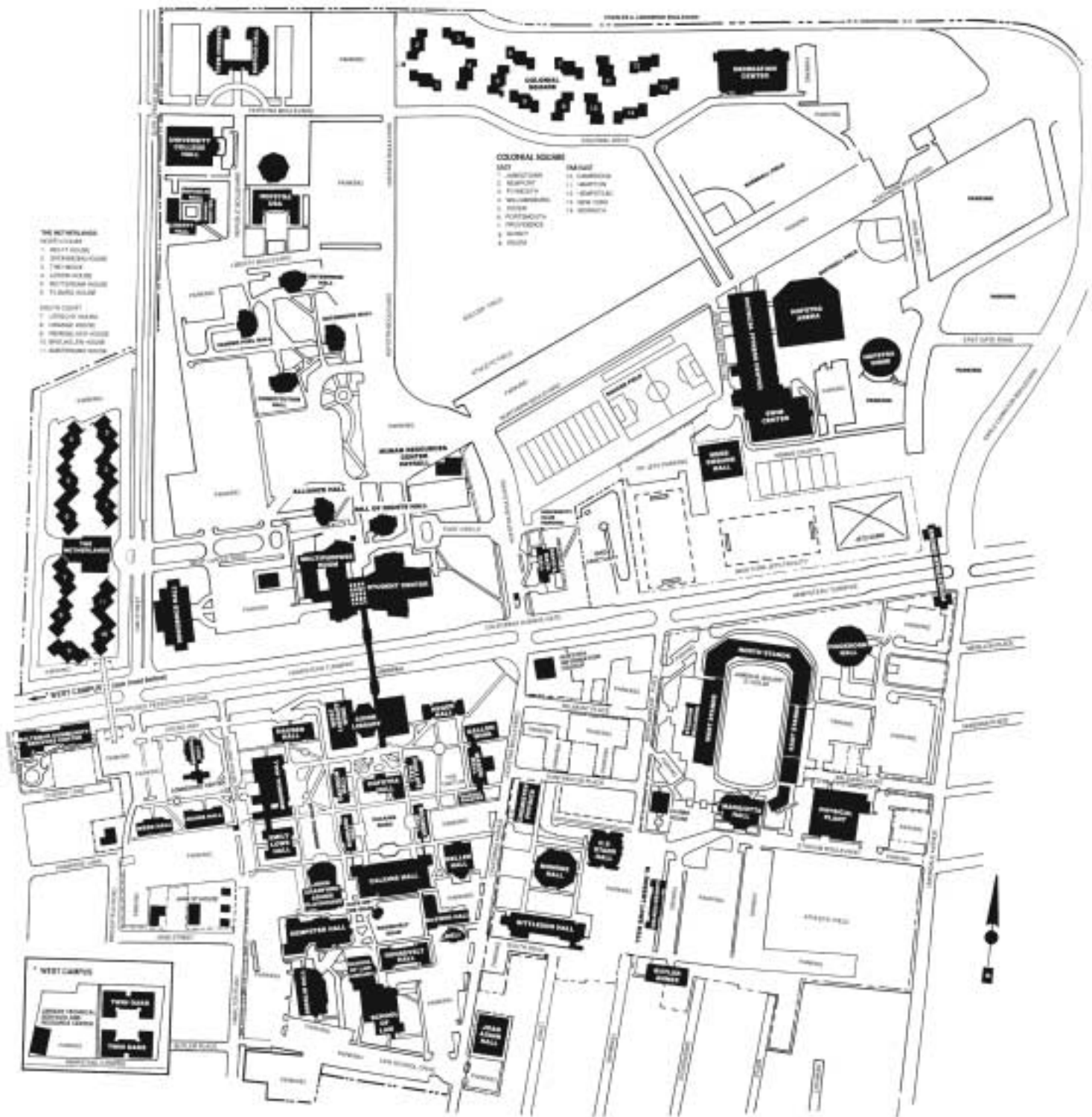

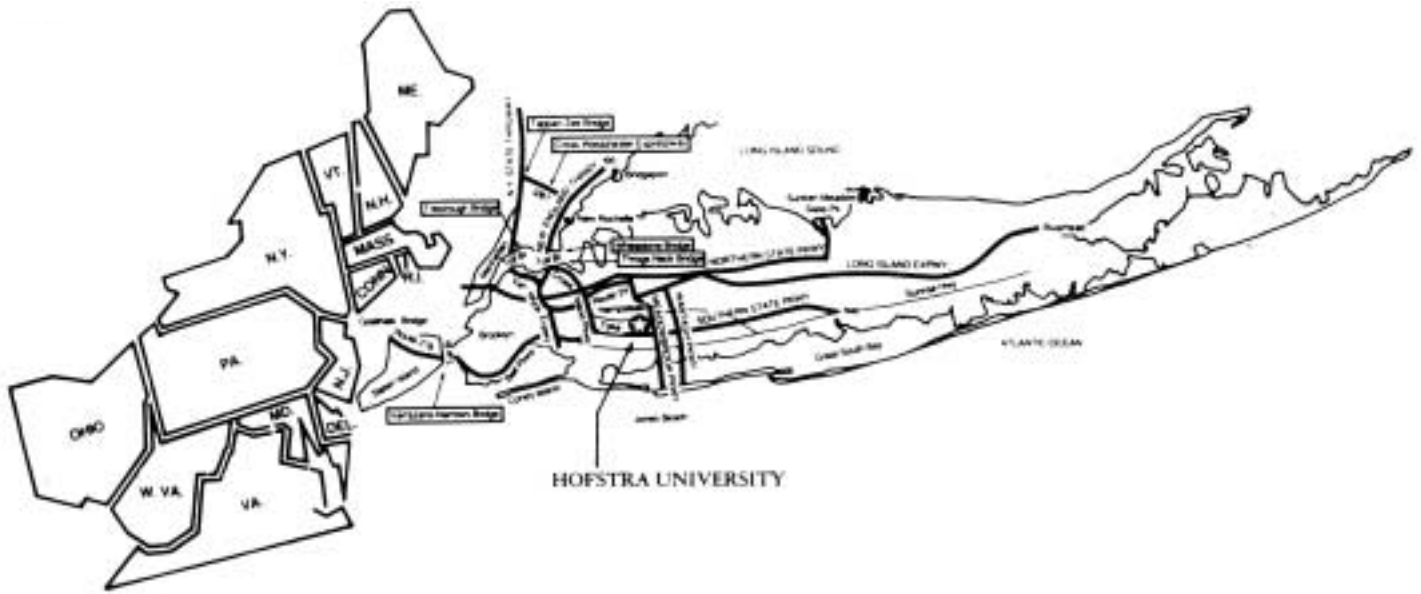

# GETTING TO HOFSTRA



## **From Southern New Jersey, Southeastern Pennsylvania, Maryland, Washington, D.C. and Virginia:**

Take the New Jersey Turnpike to Exit 13. Cross the Goethals Bridge and continue on Route 278 to the Verrazano-Narrows Bridge. Stay in the left lane of the Bridge and take the Belt Parkway-East. The Belt Parkway becomes the Southern State Parkway at the Nassau County line. Take the Southern State Parkway to the Meadowbrook Parkway North (Exit 22). Exit the Meadowbrook Parkway at Exit M4 (Hempstead Turnpike Route 24). Head west to Hofstra (approximately 1 mile).

## **From Northwestern New Jersey, Northern Pennsylvania and the Middle States:**

Take Interstate 78, Interstate 80, U.S. Route 22, New Jersey Route 4 or New Jersey Route 17 to the George Washington Bridge. Proceed over the bridge to the Cross Bronx Expressway. Take the Cross Bronx Expressway to the Throgs Neck Bridge. Follow directions from the Throgs Neck Bridge from this point.

## **From Upstate New York:**

Take New York Thruway over the Tappan Zee Bridge to Cross Westchester Expressway (Interstate 287). Stay on the Expressway to the New England Thruway (Interstate 95). Proceed south on the Thruway to the Throgs Neck Bridge. Follow directions from the Throgs Neck Bridge from this point.

## **From the Throgs Neck Bridge:**

Follow signs for Eastern Long Island. Take the Cross Island Parkway to the Grand Central Parkway-East. The Grand Central becomes the Northern State Parkway at the Nassau County line. Take the Northern State Parkway-East to the Meadowbrook Parkway-South (exit 31A). Take the

Meadowbrook Parkway-South to Exit M4 West (Hempstead Turnpike Route 24). Follow Hempstead Turnpike West to Hofstra (approximately 1 mile).

## **For Team Travel Via Bus:**

Commercial buses are not allowed on New York City (Belt, Grand Central or Cross Island) or Long Island (Southern State or Northern State) Parkways. Team buses should take the Brooklyn-Queens Expressway from the south, and the Clearview Expressway from the north, to get to the Long Island Expressway for the trip to Hofstra. Once on the Long Island Expressway (I-495), buses should proceed to Glen Cove Road-South (exit 39). Head south on Glen Cove Road for approximately eight miles to Hempstead Turnpike/Fulton Avenue and turn left (east). Hofstra University is approximately two miles east on Hempstead Turnpike.

## **Public Transportation from Airport:**

If a visitor arrives at either La Guardia or Kennedy Airport, the most direct means of reaching the University is by one of three limousine companies that service both airports and the Hofstra University area. Larry's Taxi Service (516) 483-3333; Transport Limousine Service (800) 654-1164 (out of state) (800) 832-5466 (in New York state); Winston Limousine Service (800) 4-AIRPORT.

## **Railroads:**

AMTRAK services Pennsylvania Station in Manhattan, approximately 30 miles from the Hofstra campus. To get to Hofstra from Penn Station, take the Long Island Rail Road to the Hempstead station. The Hofstra University Courtesy Bus and taxi services are available there. Hofstra is approximately 1.5 miles from the station.
