Directions To JHU Baseball Field

From the Northwest: Take I-83 South to Cold Spring Lane Exit. Go left off of the exit ramp, heading east onto Cold Spring. At the third light, turn right onto Roland Avenue. After about 1/2 mile, bear left at the fork in the road onto University Parkway. JHU Baseball Field/Newton White Athletic Center is about one mile ahead on the right.

From the South: Take I-95 North to I-395 (Downtown Baltimore). Exit onto Martin Luther King Boulevard and follow until street narrows to two lanes. Turn left onto Howard Street and follow until the road forks. Bear right at the fork onto Art Museum Drive (the Baltimore Museum of Art will be on your left). Follow Art Museum Drive until it ends at Charles Street. Go left onto Charles Street. At the third light, make a left onto University Parkway. JHU Baseball Field/Newton White Athletic Center is a block ahead on your left.

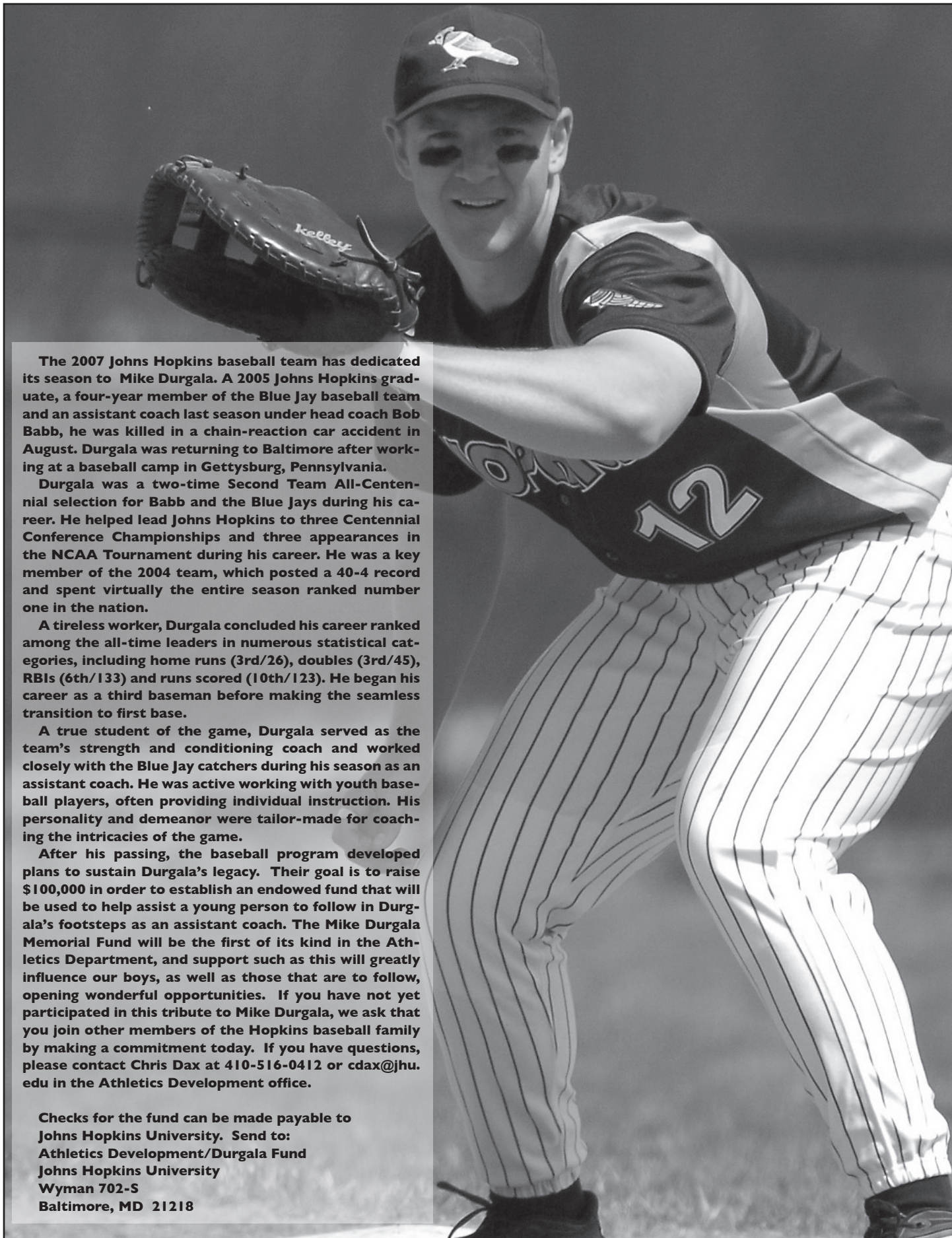
From the Northeast: Take I-95 South to I-695 West. Exit at I-83 South and follow I-83 to Cold Spring Lane Exit. Go left off of the exit ramp, heading east onto Cold Spring. At the third light, turn right onto Roland Avenue. After about 1/2 mile, bear left at the fork in the road onto University Parkway. JHU Baseball Field/Newton White Athletic Center is about one mile ahead on the right.

From the West: Take I-70 East to 695 North (towards Towson). Exit at I-83 South and follow I-83 to Cold Spring Lane Exit. Go left off of the exit ramp, heading east onto Cold Spring. At the third light, turn right onto Roland Avenue. After about 1/2 mile, bear left at the fork in the road onto University Parkway. JHU Baseball Field/Newton White Athletic Center is about a mile ahead on the right.

The 2007 Johns Hopkins baseball team has dedicated its season to Mike Durgala. A 2005 Johns Hopkins graduate, a four-year member of the Blue Jay baseball team and an assistant coach last season under head coach Bob Babb, he was killed in a chain-reaction car accident in August. Durgala was returning to Baltimore after working at a baseball camp in Gettysburg, Pennsylvania.

Durgala was a two-time Second Team All-Centennial selection for Babb and the Blue Jays during his career. He helped lead Johns Hopkins to three Centennial Conference Championships and three appearances in the NCAA Tournament during his career. He was a key member of the 2004 team, which posted a 40-4 record and spent virtually the entire season ranked number one in the nation.

A tireless worker, Durgala concluded his career ranked among the all-time leaders in numerous statistical categories, including home runs (3rd/26), doubles (3rd/45), RBIs (6th/133) and runs scored (10th/123). He began his career as a third baseman before making the seamless transition to first base.

A true student of the game, Durgala served as the team's strength and conditioning coach and worked closely with the Blue Jay catchers during his season as an assistant coach. He was active working with youth baseball players, often providing individual instruction. His personality and demeanor were tailor-made for coaching the intricacies of the game.

After his passing, the baseball program developed plans to sustain Durgala's legacy. Their goal is to raise \$100,000 in order to establish an endowed fund that will be used to help assist a young person to follow in Durgala's footsteps as an assistant coach. The Mike Durgala Memorial Fund will be the first of its kind in the Athletics Department, and support such as this will greatly influence our boys, as well as those that are to follow, opening wonderful opportunities. Bob Babb Head Coach • 28th Season

Entering his 28th season in the Johns Hopkins dugout, head coach Bob Babb continues to build the Blue Jays as one of the top teams in the East.

While guiding the program to a winning tradition, Babb has amassed a 749-269-10 (.733) record, 25th best in NCAA Baseball history, among all divisions. Among active head coaches in all divisions, Babb is the seventh winningest active skipper.

During his tenure at Hopkins, the Blue Jays have captured 10 Middle Atlantic Conference Southeast League titles, seven University Athletic Association titles, seven Centennial Conference championships and a total of 12 NCAA Division III Tournament appearances.

Over the last five seasons, Babb has picked up a pair of milestone victories. In 2002, he became the 14th active coach in Division III to win 600 career games with a 4-1 victory over Franklin & Marshall. Exactly three years later, Babb recorded his 700th win at home in a 7-5 triumph over Shenandoah. Babb enters the 2007 season just one win shy of 750.

In 1989, the Blue Jays had their most successful postseason ever, finishing with a 34-7 record and taking third place at the NCAA Division III World Series in their first and only trip to the final eight.

In 1998, Babb guided the Blue Jays to a then school-record 36 wins against just four losses. Hopkins was ranked as high as fourth in the nation during the regular season, won the Centennial Conference and UAA Championships and was the top seed in the 1998 NCAA III Mid-Atlantic Regional.

In 2003, Babb's team earned a sixth Centennial Conference Championship, its third straight, and won 25 or more games for the 11th consecutive season, finishing with a 34-7 record and a trip to the NCAA Regional Championships. He did this with a team that featured just two seniors in prominent roles.

Hopkins posted a record-setting 40-4 season in 2004, giving them the best record in NCAA Baseball, all divisions. The Blue Jays' .907 winning percentage was the third-best of any NCAA team in the 2000s. Hopkins mounted a 33-game winning streak to begin the 2004 season. That streak is the current NCAA record for consecutive victories to start a season. Babb's 2004 team advanced to the NCAA Mid-Atlantic Regional final before bowing to Rowan, a Division III CWS participant that year.

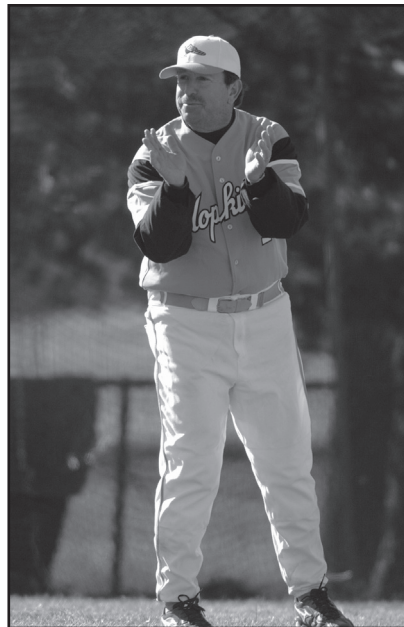
Babb has led the Blue Jays to 11 seasons with at least 30 wins. Last year's squad missed the 30-win plateau by just two.

In his time wearing the Columbia Blue and Black, Babb has coached five first-team All-Americans and nine of his players have gone on to play professionally. He was inducted into the Johns Hopkins

Athletic Hall of Fame in 1996.

Babb played baseball at Hopkins for four years from 1974 to 1977. The 1976 squad participated in the first NCAA Division III Championship Tournament, while the 1977 team won the Middle Atlantic Southeast title. Babb is still listed among the all-time leaders at Hopkins in doubles and stolen bases.

A 1977 graduate of Johns Hopkins, Babb taught social studies for two years at Lansdowne High School. During this time he served as assistant baseball and football coach at Hopkins under Dennis Cox, who is returning to the coaching ranks this year to serve as JHU's catchers coach. In 1980, he received his master's degree from Morgan State and also became the head baseball coach at JHU. Babb was an



assistant football coach at JHU from 1977 through 1998, having both coached current head coach Jim Margraff and later serving as one of Margraff's assistants. During his final four seasons as a member of the Blue Jay football staff (1995-98) he helped guide the team to a 27-12-1 (.688). At the time, this was the winningest four-year period in school history.

Additionally, Babb has been the director of the Johns Hopkins University Summer Sports Day Camp since 1982. He currently serves on the NCAA Mid-Atlantic Regional Baseball Committee, the Centennial Conference Baseball Coaches Committee and is a member of both the American Baseball Coaches Association, the editorial committee for the ABCA and the Maryland Old-Timers

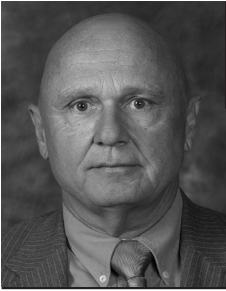
Baseball Association. Babb also participates on the board of directors of the Roland Park Little League.

The "Friends of Hopkins Baseball" organization, established to help raise funds for the baseball program, was founded by Babb in 1980. "Friends of Hopkins Baseball" is now under the Blue Jays Unlimited umbrella. A member of the Johns Hopkins Athletics Hall of Fame Committee, Babb was the director of the H-Club prior to the introduction of Blue Jays Unlimited in 1994. Babb also instituted the Johns Hopkins Baseball Old-Timers' Game in the early 1980's and has kept the tradition.

Jack Newell Assistant Coach • 13th Season

Jack Newell is entering his 13th season as an assistant coach with the Johns Hopkins baseball team. Newell came to Homewood in the fall of 1994 and has helped JHU to the NCAA Tournament six times.

Since his arrival at Hopkins, the Blue Jays have compiled a record of 371-122-3 (.751). Newell will work primarily with the Blue Jay pitching staff this year. In addition to his role on the baseball team, Newell

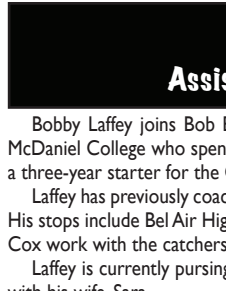
serves as the assistant director of the Hopkins Summer Sports Day Camp, working alongside Coach Babb.

Newell arrived at Hopkins after five years as the head coach at Franklin & Marshall, where he guided the Diplomats to a record of 70-55. He led F&M to a share of two MAC South-west titles and his 1992 team earned a bid to the ECAC Tournament.

Newell began his collegiate coaching career at Millersville (Pa.), where he served as the pitching coach in 1988 and 1989. In 1989, the Marauder pitching staff led the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference in team ERA.

Prior to working at Millersville, Newell was a highly-successful coach at the high school level in Lancaster County, Pa. He guided Manheim Township to a record of 110-40 during his tenure, while the team also won six divisional and three overall league championships.

Newell is in his 11th year as an adjunct lecturer of history at Essex Community College. He is the father of three: Allison of Owings Mills, and Amy Daveler and Kim Knier of Lancaster, Pa.



Bob Laffey Assistant Coach • First Season

Bobby Laffey joins Bob Babb's staff for the 2007 season. Laffey is a 2003 graduate of McDaniel College who spent his playing days as a catcher for the Green Terror. Laffey was a three-year starter for the Green Terror earning All-Centennial honors as a senior.

Laffey has previously coached on the high school level in both Pennsylvania and Maryland. His stops include Bel Air High School, where he is currently a teacher. Laffey will help coach Cox work with the catchers.

Laffey is currently pursuing his masters in special education at JHU and resides in Bel Air with his wife, Sara.



Jim Flannery Assistant Coach • First Season

Jim Flannery, a key member of last year's 28-9-2 squad, joins the coaching staff for the 2007 season. Flannery led the 2006 squad in wins (7) and finished his career with a record of 16-1 (.889). He ranks third in school history for winning percentage.

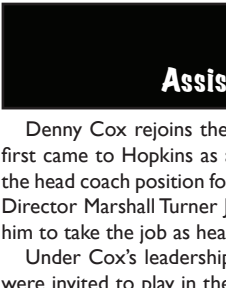
Flannery will help out with the pitchers and outfielders and provide some left-handed batting practice.



Ryan Lanpher Student Assistant • First Season

Ryan Lanpher, a member of the Blue Jays pitching staff the last three seasons, joins the coaching staff as a student assistant in 2007.

A broken ankle in November prevented Lanpher from playing this, his senior season.



Denny Cox Assistant Coach • First Season

Denny Cox rejoins the Blue Jays baseball staff after a lay-off of 27 years. Cox first came to Hopkins as an assistant football coach in 1969. He was elevated to the head coach position for football in the fall of 1971. During that fall, then Athletic Director Marshall Turner Jr. found out about Cox's baseball credentials and asked him to take the job as head coach of the baseball team.

Under Cox's leadership, the baseball team steadily improved. In 1976 the Jays were invited to play in the NCAA Division III regional playoffs, a historic first for the Hopkins baseball team. Current head coach Bob Babb was an integral part of that winning team.



Phil Newman Assistant Coach • First Season

Phil Newman is in his first season as a member of head coach Bob Babb's staff. Newman, who will serve as the varsity infield and hitting coach and head coach of the junior varsity team, comes to Hopkins from Dickinson College. He played his college ball at Dickinson for two years and helped lead the Red Devils to a Centennial Conference playoff appearance in 2004. Newman played the first two years of his college career at Mt. St. Mary's. Newman graduated from

Dickinson in 2004 with a degree in international business and management and a minor in Spanish. Since graduation he has been working to develop youth baseball programs.

Optimism Runs High

Hopkins brings good depth and experience to the field in its quest for another Centennial Title

Optimism is running high as the 2007 Johns Hopkins baseball Blue Jays prepare to take the field for another season under head coach **Bob Babb**.

Babb, entering his 28th season on the Blue Jay bench and just one win shy of 750 for his career, graduated 10 letter winners and five starters from last year's 28-9-2 squad, but returns a talent-laden roster this year. A deep junior class, that could provide six of the nine starting positions when the season begins, keeps Babb and the coaching staff optimistic about what this season could bring.

PITCHING

Babb believes this year's squad may have the greatest pitching depth of any team he's coached at Hopkins. A lot of that confidence begins with senior co-captain **Brian DeLeo**, the team's closer. DeLeo, seeing his first varsity action last year, stepped up and became the go-to hurler at the end of the game. In 14 appearances last year, DeLeo produced a 1.23 ERA with three saves and a 1-1 record. "Brian really stepped up and established himself in the closer position and I believe he can assume that role again for us," said Babb.

The starting rotation remains a question mark for Babb in terms of who will emerge and fill the top three spots in the rotation. Lost to graduation was the trio of Jim Flannery, Tim Denning and Jason Thayer, who combined to win 15 games for the Blue Jays last year. Babb will turn to his junior trio of **Patrick Steffee**, **Ryan Kuhlman** and **Brian Duddie** to fill their spots. Steffee went 4-2 in nine games last year and recorded the second lowest ERA in school history at 1.19. Kuhlman made seven starts and appeared in 11 games last year while recording a 5-0 record. Duddie made three starts while appearing in six games last year for the Blue Jays. Babb on his junior trio, "I believe Pat and Ryan can pick up where they left off last year and continue to do well for us, while Brian had a strong fall and hopefully can turn that into success this spring." Other players likely to see time in the starting rotation include junior **Joe Zaccaria** and sophomores **David Fioretti** and **Chez Angeloni**. Zaccaria who pitched for the Blue Jays in 2005 out of the bullpen, returns to Hopkins after pitching last year for the University of Maryland. Fioretti showed signs of coming on strong at the end of last season, and Babb is hopeful he can carry that over; while Angeloni who saw most of his time on JV last year, looks to build off a solid fall season.

DeLeo will be joined in the bullpen by senior **Jon Anderson**, juniors **Nick Erardi** and **Ryan Kealy** and a handful of young players ready to step up. Anderson is coming off what the coaching staff believes to be his best fall ever while Erardi appeared in eight games last year with a 2.53 ERA and nine strikeouts. Kealy is returning from an injury that cost him last season, but Babb feels the junior right-hander should be ready to contribute this year.

CATCHERS

The catching position will be once again be in the capable hands of senior co-captain **Rob Sanzillo**. Sanzillo hit .380 in 31 games last year with 29 RBI's and 15 stolen bases. He also excelled in the field with the best fielding percentage (.996) among any of the Blue Jay regulars, picked off two base runners and threw out 10 runners attempting to steal. "Rob is by far one of the most talented individuals I have coached," said Babb, "from fielding his position, to hitting and running the bases, Rob can do it all." Babb believes Sanzillo is a pro prospect and expects him to excel in all aspects this year.

Sharing the catching duties with Sanzillo will be junior **Tony Margve**. Margve appeared in 17 games in 2006 making nine starts and batted .289. "Tony gives us a capable option when Rob isn't out there as he has a good swing and an accurate throwing arm," remarked Babb.

The Blue Jays are likely to carry a third catcher during the

season and Babb believes one of the freshmen will be able to fill that role.

INFIELD

Babb boasts a deep and talented infield that should spearhead any success the Blue Jays enjoy this season. Handling first base for the Blue Jays this year should be junior **Matt Benchener**, who platooned with Tim Sliker last year. Benchener hit .278 in 24 games last year and had a fielding percentage of .970. "Matt is a kid with incredible power who worked extremely hard in the fall to improve his defense and that should show immediately," said Babb. Second base will be the responsibility of senior **Ian Christie**. Christie played in 27 games in 2006 and batted .354 while battling a nagging foot injury for the entire season. Off-season surgery has dealt with the problem and Babb expects Christie to return to his All-Centennial numbers of two years ago, when he hit .326 with 23 walks and made just four errors in 107 opportunities.

The other side of the infield will be manned by a pair of juniors as First Team All-Centennial selection **Jonas Fester** returns at shortstop and **Todd Emr** is back at third-base for the Blue Jays. Babb believes Fester to be one of the best defensive shortstops he's ever coached. He also contributed on the base paths last year stealing 36 bases, which tied the school single-season mark. Emr carries a team-best seven-game hitting streak into this season. A year ago he led the team with six home runs and hit .381 in 30 games. Babb on his third baseman, "Todd has tremendous hands which makes him an asset in the field, while he also has good power at the plate."

Backing up those four in the infield will be a mix of senior **Brett Izzo**, junior **Nate Adelman** and freshman **Lee Bolyard**. Izzo could see time at first base for the Blue Jays backing up Benchener and gives Babb a good left-handed power option. Adelman is the middle infield back-up and will see time at both second base and shortstop. Bolyard will also see some time in the infield this spring as he can play three of the four positions and was the leading hitter during fall ball for the Blue Jays.

OUTFIELD

The outfield is one of the question marks for Babb and his staff as the season begins. Gone are All-Centennial selection Gary Rosenberg and classmates Matt Scally and Bryce Baumann. The only returner with significant outfield experience is junior **Rob Pietroforte**, who was a First Team All-Centennial selection last year. However, Pietroforte did spend most of his time last year in the DH position. "Rob brings a good all-around game to the field, with good speed and a solid arm which could help the outfield this year," remarked Babb. With Pietroforte roaming in center field, it looks like the responsibilities in left field will fall to junior **Jon Solomon**. Solomon made the transition from the infield to the outfield during fall ball and gives Babb a solid switch hitter with speed and power. The battle for the starting spot in right field will be among three different players as senior **Nick Venezia**, Izzo and sophomore **Brian Youchak** could all win the job. Venezia brings a solid all-around game while Izzo could see some time in right field when he's not in the infield. Youchak, another infielder converted to the outfield during fall ball, could factor into the mix. He brings a strong throwing arm with lots of power to the game. All three of the players battling for time in the outfield could also see time at the DH position for the Blue Jays this year.

OUTLOOK

Babb has put together a challenging schedule for the Blue Jays this year. Four of the Blue Jays' opponents are ranked in the ABCA pre-season poll and three of those four are in the top ten. Hopkins opens with four games at home before its spring trip to Arizona begins. Matchups against Wheaton (MA) and TCNJ, both ranked in the top five in the preseason poll, highlight a 10-game schedule in Arizona. Upon returning from the west, Hopkins will tackle tough non-conference foes such as Salisbury, Mary Washington, York, Montclair State and TCNJ for a second time. A challenging Centennial Conference schedule also awaits the Blue Jays. "I believe this is by far one of the most challenging schedules that I have ever put together," remarked the Blue Jay leader.

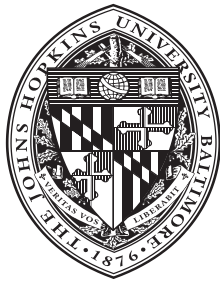
While a tough schedule awaits, Babb believes this team certainly has potential. "We have an outstanding offense, a solid defensive infield, deep pitching, hard throwers, solid catching and good team depth," said Babb.
