DIRECTIONS TO HOMEWOOD FIELD

From the Northwest: Take I-83 South to Cold Spring Lane Exit. Go left off of the exit ramp, heading east onto Cold Spring. At the third light, turn right onto Roland Avenue. After about 1/2 mile, bear left at the fork in the road onto University Parkway. Homewood Field/Newton White Athletic Center is about one mile ahead on the right.

From the South: Take I-95 North to I-395 (Downtown Baltimore). Exit onto Martin Luther King Boulevard and follow until street narrows to two lanes. Turn left onto Howard Street and follow until the road forks. Bear right at the fork onto Art Museum Drive (the Baltimore Museum of Art will be on your left). Follow Art Museum Drive until it ends at Charles Street. Go left onto Charles Street. At the third light, make a left onto University Parkway. Homewood Field/Newton White Athletic Center is a block ahead on your left.

From the Northeast: Take I-95 South to I-695 West. Exit at I-83 South and follow I-83 to Cold Spring Lane Exit. Go left off of the exit ramp, heading east onto Cold Spring. At the third light, turn right onto Roland Avenue. After about 1/2 mile, bear left at the fork in the road onto University Parkway. Homewood Field/Newton White Athletic Center is about one mile ahead on the right.

From the West: Take I-70 East to 695 North (towards Towson). Exit at I-83 South and follow I-83 to Cold Spring Lane Exit. Go left off of the exit ramp, heading east onto Cold Spring. At the third light, turn right onto Roland Avenue. After about 1/2 mile, bear left at the fork in the road onto University Parkway. Homewood Field/Newton White Athletic Center is about one mile ahead on the right.



Craig Appleby

Head Coach • 4th Season
UNC Charlotte '94



Craig Appleby became the 19th head coach in the history of the men's soccer program in July 2008 and promptly turned in one of the most successful seasons by a first-year head coach in program history.

He guided the Blue Jays to a 13-5-5 record, the Centennial Conference title game and the NCAA Sweet 16 in his first campaign. His 13 wins are the second most by a first-year head coach in school history. Only John Haus, who guided Hopkins to a 14-3-1 record in 1987, won more games as a first-year head coach. Appleby is the only coach in Johns Hopkins and Centennial Conference men's soccer history to guide his team to the NCAA Tournament in his first season.

Last season, Appleby led JHU to a 15-4-4 and the NCAA Sweet 16 for the third consecutive season. Hopkins made its 10th straight trip to the Centennial Conference Tournament, one of just two teams to make all 10 tournaments, falling in the semifinals. In Appleby's second season, the Blue Jays went 16-4-3, won their record eighth Centennial Conference title and advanced to the NCAA Sweet 16. Hopkins lost to the eventual national champion, Messiah, in double overtime on the road. In 2010, he guided the Blue Jays to the NCAA Sweet 16 for the third straight time and a final record of 15-4-4 with a pair of wins over top 10 teams. The three consecutive Sweet 16 appearances are a program first.

In his first three seasons, Appleby has coached 15 All-Centennial Conference selections, one Centennial Conference Player of the Year, six NSCAA All-Region picks and two NSCAA All-Americans.

Appleby came to Johns Hopkins after six years as the head coach at Emory & Henry (VA). Prior to his tenure with the Wasps, he was an assistant coach at both Wofford and Washington & Lee.

A 1994 graduate of UNC-Charlotte, Appleby played for the 49ers from 1990 to 1992. He earned

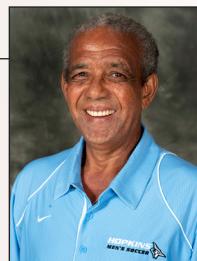
Second Team All-Metro Conference honors in 1992 and helped lead UNC-Charlotte to back-to-back NCAA Tournament appearances in 1991 and 1992. Appleby began his collegiate career at Wofford College, where he set a school freshman record with 16 goals and earned NSCAA First Team All-South honors.

Appleby continued his playing career in the German Third Division with Tus Celle. After a season in Germany, he returned to the United States to play in the USISL with the Raleigh Flyers (1995) and the National Champion Charleston Battery (1996). He then went on to play for the Richmond Kickers of the A-League (1997). Named the South Carolina Player of the Year after leading the state in scoring in 1989, Appleby led Irmo High School to three consecutive state championships from 1987 to 1989.

Appleby and his wife, Kelli, reside in nearby Mt. Washington with their son Luke (1).

Winston Earle

Assistant Coach
20th season



Winston Earle returns for his 20th season as an assistant coach at Johns Hopkins.

He began his coaching career in 1977 for the Bay College of Maryland and later set numerous junior college coaching records as the head coach of the Community College of Baltimore from 1980 to 1982.

Earle moved to Division I the following season, serving as the head coach at Morgan State in 1983 and 1984, and at Coppin State from 1985 to 1986.

A native of Kingston, Jamaica, Earle was a stand-out player at Division I Santos in Jamaica.

Max Venker

Asst. Coach • 2nd season
Johns Hopkins '10



Max Venker returns to his alma mater for his second season as an assistant coach. He is pursuing a Master of Science in Engineering Management at Johns Hopkins and is scheduled to finish in December.

Venker was a staple at center mid in his four seasons at Homewood, leading the Blue Jays to three Centennial Conference titles and four NCAA Tournament appearances in his career. He earned Second Team All-Centennial Conference honors as a senior, capping a career that saw him score 23 goals and tally 14 assists in 85 games. Venker was clutch in the postseason for the Blue Jays, scoring seven goals, including five game-winners.

Venker finished his career ranked second in school history in games played and in the top 20 in goals, assists and points. He graduated in 2010 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Materials Science and Engineering with a minor in Mathematics.

Jay Herford

Goalie Coach • 2nd season
Frostburg State '09



Jay Herford enters his second season on the Johns Hopkins staff as the goal-keeping coach.

Herford is a 2009 graduate of Frostburg State University, where he was a two-year starter for the Bobcats. As a junior, he led FSU to the ECAC South Region Tournament title game with a 12-9-1 record and earned All-Allegheny Mountain Collegiate Conference Honorable Mention honors. Herford earned second team all-conference honors as a senior after finishing second in goals against average (0.77) and third in save percentage (.797) and shutouts (7).

Following his collegiate career, Herford signed with the Harrisburg City Islanders of the USL Second Division. The City Islanders posted a 12-9-4 record in 2009 and advanced to the quarterfinals of the U.S. Open Cup before being knocked out by D.C. United, 2-1.

Randy Howell

Strength & Conditioning Coach • 4th season
Mercer '97

Randy Howell enters his third season on the Johns Hopkins staff. He spent his first two seasons coaching the Blue Jay keepers and will serve as the Strength & Conditioning Coach this season. Howell joined the Blue Jay staff after coaching stints with Parkwood High School and both the North Carolina and Georgia Olympic Development Programs.

A member of the North Carolina ODP team, Howell went on to play at Division I Mercer University. He graduated in 1997 with degrees in international business and Spanish and later trained with Real Betis of La Liga in Spain following his career at Mercer.

There's a lot of new faces on the Johns Hopkins men's soccer team this season with 12 newcomers, but there are still some familiar faces as head coach **Craig Appleby** returns six starters from last year's squad that went 15-4-4 and advanced to the NCAA Sweet 16. There are still some questions for the Blue Jays' head coach as he looks to fill the roles left open by the graduation of **Scott Bukoski, Ravi Gill, Kevin Hueber, Evan Kleinberg** and **Chris Wilson**.

Below is a position-by-position look at the 2011 Blue Jays.

Forward

The Blue Jays possess a lot of depth at the forward position, though Appleby is still working on the best fit.

"There's been a lot of competition up front," said Appleby. "I'm waiting to see who will step up and be the best fit. This group worked very hard in the offseason and has improved quite a bit."

Senior **Sean Duggan**, junior **Nick White**, sophomores **Sam Glassman** and **Alvin Onyewuenyi** are joined by freshman **Kyle Fischer** on the front line. Duggan has played in 48 games in the last two years and brings the most experience to the group. The hard-working senior had just one goal last season, but it was a big one as he scored in JHU's second round win over fourth-ranked Christopher Newport in the NCAA Tournament.

White, who made the move from the back line last season, scored a pair of goals and dished out three assists. He had a big outing in the Centennial Conference Quarterfinals, tying a conference program record with two assists in the Blue Jays' 4-1 win. Glassman led all freshmen last year with two goals and Onyewuenyi had one assist in six games in 2010.

Midfield

The midfield boasts a mix of returners and newcomers that bring a lot of talent to the field. Seniors **Sean Coleman** and **Tony Gass**, return along with junior **Brandon Sumpio** and sophomores **Birin Padam, Danny Reategui** and **Chris Douglas**. Joining them in the midfield are freshmen **Rob Heuler, Mark Spencer, Simon Rojas, Kotaro Mitsuhashi, Matt Carey** and **Andrew Clayton**.

Coleman led the Blue Jays in scoring last season in his first year in the Columbia Blue & Black, scoring 11 goals and adding a pair of assists to earn First Team All-Centennial and Second Team All-Mid-Atlantic honors. Gass, in his second year as a starter, will patrol the center with Coleman. Padam, Reategui and Douglas all saw a lot of action in their rookie seasons, with each scoring a goal as 16 different players scored at least one goal last season for the Blue Jays.

Defense

In the backfield, Appleby returns three starters from a year ago, including three-year starters **Corey Adams** and **Drew Holland**, and junior **Taylor Woodrum**, who has started 20 games in the last two seasons. Adams and Holland have anchored a defense over the last three years that has allowed just 0.647 goals per game with 35 shutouts, including six postseason shutouts.

There has been some tough competition at the right back spot as Appleby looks to replace Wilson in the lineup. Junior **Matt Dunne**, sophomore **Gus Ingaglio** and freshmen **Cameron Vit, Sam Austin, Dylan Howie** and **Ryan Walsh** add depth and talent to an already experienced Blue Jay backline.

Goalie

Returning this season in the goal is sophomore **John Belanger**, who saw action in five games as a rookie and will look to take over for Gill, a 2009 All-Mid-Atlantic selection. Competing with Belanger in the net will be freshman **Nick Cerrone**.

Another season, another NCAA Sweet 16 appearance. The Johns Hopkins men's soccer team went 15-4-4 in 2010 and advanced to the Sweet 16 for the third consecutive season and ninth overall.

Hopkins opened the season emphatically, scoring seven goals in a 7-0 rout of visiting Buffalo State in the Blue Jay Classic at Homewood Field. The Blue Jays got goals from six different players, while sophomore **Brandon Sumpio** had his first career multi-goal game with two strikes. In addition, four different players – **Sean Coleman**, **Birin Padam**, **Danny Reategui** and **Jun Park** – scored their first career goals. The following night, Hopkins got just one goal, in the 70th minute from freshman **Sam Glassman** as the Blue Jays blanked Catholic to win the Blue Jay Classic. Junior defender **Corey Adams** was named the tournaments MVP for leading a Hopkins defense that allowed just 11 total shots in two games.

The Blue Jays then hit the road, traveling to 10th-ranked York for the first of four straight games away from Homewood. Hopkins got on the board early, courtesy of a free kick goal from Coleman in just the 11th minute. But the potent Spartan attack answered in the 79th minute to tie the game and eventually force overtime. It was the third straight overtime game between the two with Hopkins prevailing in the 106th minute on a goal from freshman **Thomas Mourmouras**. The win snapped a five-game winless streak against the Spartans and was the first win over York since 1999. It was also just the third loss for York at Graham Field since the facility opened in 2006.

Hopkins then traveled to Camden, NJ for the 10th annual Cialella Soccer Classic. Hopkins won its third straight one-goal decision, topping New Jersey City, 1-0, on a **Nick White** goal in the 24th minute. The next afternoon, Hopkins fell behind early to host Rutgers-Camden before senior **Kevin Hueber** tied the game up in the 78th minute and forced another overtime. The Blue Jays outshot the Scarlet Raptors, 30-5, including a 4-1 advantage in overtime, but could not get another past goalie Tim VanLiew as the game ended in a 1-1 draw. Senior **Evan Kleinberg** was named the tournament's offensive MVP, while the Blue Jays and the Scarlet Raptors shared the tournament title.

The Hopkins offense got back in stride in its next outing, scoring three goals on just 16 shots en route to a 3-1 win over host Cabrini. Kleinberg put the Blue Jays on top in just the ninth minute, but Ryan Cerrato answered for the Cavaliers in the 61st to make it a 1-1 game. Coleman then came off the bench in the 78th minute and just 76 seconds later scored to put the Blue Jays ahead 2-1. Just over six minutes later, he scored again to give Hopkins an insurance goal.

Three days later, Hopkins returned home after a two-week absence to kick off Centennial Conference play against rival Swarthmore. The 13th-ranked Garnet scored a pair of first half goals and held off a furious second-half rally to hand the fifth-ranked Blue Jays their first loss of the season. Senior **Scott Bukoski** scored the Blue Jays only goal on a penalty kick in the 65th minute. Hopkins got back in the win column



the next week with a 2-0 shutout at Neumann. Junior **Tony Gass** scored what proved to be the game-winner in the fourth minute, followed by an insurance goal from Coleman exactly 18 minutes later.

Hopkins traveled to Haverford that weekend and despite outshooting host Haverford, 21-6, came away with a scoreless draw. The Blue Jays returned home to host the 17th-ranked Salisbury Sea Gulls in a rematch of last year's NCAA Second Round game, which ended in a 0-0 draw before Hopkins prevailed in a shootout. This time it was Salisbury's turn as Mike Napolitano scored the game's only goal in the 61st minute to give the Sea Gulls the win. Just two days later, Hopkins hosted McDaniel in a torrential downpour at Homewood Field. Play was slowed dramatically in the 60th minute when large puddles began forming on the field due to the heavy rains. It took until the 100th minute, but Hopkins finally ended the game when Coleman bent a free kick from 30 yards out around the Green Terror wall and just inside the right post. His goal ended a scoreless streak for the Blue Jays that had reached more than 368 minutes.

Hopkins followed that with a tough conference match-up against long-time rival Muhlenberg. As was the story in more than half of their games this season, the Blue Jays significantly outshot their opponent. However, the Mules' goalie, Jason Daniels, came up with 10 saves in goal to keep Hopkins off the board as the two teams battled through 110 scoreless minutes. It was the third straight overtime game and the sixth in the last 12 games between the two teams. After playing four games in just eight days, the Blue Jays had a week off before traveling to Carlisle, PA to take on the Dickinson Red Devils. Coleman scored in the 13th minute and the defense made it stand in a 1-0 win as Hopkins picked up a much-needed three points in the conference standings. Two days later, it was the same story as Coleman scored in the 10th minute and Hopkins allowed just four shots en route to a 1-0 win over visiting St. Mary's.

It was back to the road that weekend, as Hopkins traveled to Collegeville, PA and Ursinus on a blustery afternoon. The Blue Jays' offense finally came alive, scoring three goals in a span of 11 minutes to beat the host Bears, 3-0, behind goals from senior **Chris Wilson**, Hueber and Coleman. The following weekend, Hopkins suffered a tough set back, dropping a 2-1 decision to visiting Franklin & Marshall. The Diplomats got a pair of goals early in the second half to take a 2-0 lead that the Blue Jays could not overcome. Hueber and Bukoski would combine for a goal in the 84th minute to cut the deficit in half, but Hopkins could not find the equalizer.

With the season winding down, Hopkins needed wins in its final two games to secure its 10th straight Centennial Conference Tournament berth. First up, a trip to Gettysburg, PA where the Blue Jays hadn't won since 2003. Bukoski scored the game's only goal just 2:27 in and Hopkins picked up a much-needed 1-0 victory. Hopkins then returned home to close out the regular season against Washington College. Needing a win or a Haverford loss to advance to the conference tournament, Hopkins closed out the regular season the same way it began, with a 7-0 win. Five different Blue Jays scored in the win, led by Bukoski, who scored two goals, including the 50th of his career.

The win over the Shoremen secured the fourth seed in the conference tournament for the Blue Jays and set up a rematch with the Bullets in the first round. Just one week after scoring a single goal against Gettysburg, Hopkins punched up four goals on the way to a 4-1 win and the conference semifinals. Bukoski notched his second-straight two-goal outing to lead the Blue Jays' attack as Hopkins tied the conference tournament record with four goals. Hopkins then faced a tough task, traveling to Clothier Field where top-seeded Swarthmore had not lost since Nov. 22, 2008. Bukoski put Hopkins on the board first, one-timing a cross from Hueber, in the 37th minute. The Garnet, who had been shutout just once all year, would not be kept off the board. Philippe Celestine tied the game on a hard shot from 20 yards out in the 74th minute. Neither team could find the go-ahead goal over the next 37 minutes, so the game would be decided in a shootout. Swarthmore would prevail, 4-2, as Hopkins lost in a shootout in the conference tournament for the first time since 2005 – the only other time the Blue Jays were the four seed.

Fortunately for the Blue Jays, their season did not end that night in Swarthmore. Hopkins earned a bid to the NCAA Tournament for the fifth consecutive season and the 14th time in school history. The Blue Jays were slated to head to New-

port News, VA to face Richard Stockton in a regional that also featured fourth-ranked Christopher Newport and Neumann. Hopkins twice fell behind by a goal and twice rallied to eventually win on Bukoski's golden goal in the 97th minute. The Ospreys took one-goal leads in the 23rd and 48th minute, only to be answered by goals from Bukoski (42nd) and Coleman (73rd). It was Bukoski's second goal of the night that gave the Blue Jays their first and only lead of the game and sent them into the second round against the home-standing Captains.

The next night, Hopkins took on Christopher Newport with a bid to the Sweet 16 on the line. This time it was Hopkins that got on the board first as junior **Sean Duggan** redirected a Coleman free kick in the 28th minute to give the Blue Jays an early 1-0 lead. That lead lasted until the 64th minute, when the Captains, who had averaged nearly three goals per game, finally got on the board with a Danny Franklin goal. So for the second straight night, the game would be decided in overtime. And for the second straight night, a senior came through in the clutch for the Blue Jays. This time it was Hueber, who bent a beautiful free kick into the upper right 90 from 19 yards out in the 102nd minute, and sent Hopkins into the Sweet 16. The loss for the Captains was their first at home since November 23, 2008, also a 2-1 double overtime loss, snapping a 23-game unbeaten streak.

Hopkins would then travel to Delaware, OH for a match-up with host and second-ranked Ohio Wesleyan in the sectional semifinals. It was just the second meeting between the two teams and the first since the 1975 NCAA Third-Place game, won by the Battling Bishops, 1-0. Unfortunately, this meeting would be no different as Tyler Wall scored in the 14th minute and the Ohio Wesleyan defense made it hold as the Bishops went on to win 1-0 and end the Blue Jays' season.

ATHLETIC FACILITIES

Homewood Field - synonymous with the history and tradition of college lacrosse - celebrated its 100th anniversary in 2007. From its first event on October 12, 1907 (an 11-5 victory for the varsity men's lacrosse team over the alumni), to the first official varsity contest on October 26, 1907 (a 5-0 victory for Baltimore Medical over the Hopkins football team) to the 100th game in the storied men's lacrosse rivalry between Johns Hopkins and Maryland (a 14-10 JHU win on April 17, 2004 in front of a standing-room only crowd of over 10,500), the lore of Homewood Field has grown to the point where it is often referred to as the Yankee Stadium of college lacrosse.

In *Recreation and Athletics at Johns Hopkins - A One-Hundred Year History* by G. Wilson Shaffer it is noted: Through the efforts of then Johns Hopkins President Daniel Coit Gilman, the Homewood area became a gift by Mr. William Keyser and his cousin, Mr. Samuel Wyman. Though the financial position of the University did not allow full use of the new area for several years, by 1907 the northern tract of land had been drained and graded to provide an athletic field.

Homewood Field has been the definition of home field advantage for the Blue Jays' men's soccer program. The Blue Jays won 26 straight home games from September 14, 1996 to October 14, 1998, which is tied for the second longest home win streak in NCAA Division III history. In the last 18 seasons, Johns Hopkins is 158-19-14 (.864) at Homewood Field - including a school-record 43-game home unbeaten streak from August 31, 2002 to September 24, 2005. The men's soccer team has hosted numerous Centennial Conference



and NCAA Tournament games at Homewood. Most recently, the men's soccer team hosted an NCAA Tournament four-team regional in November 2007. In addition, Hopkins has hosted the Centennial Conference men's soccer final four, four times since the tournament's inception in 2001. The Blue Jays are 5-1-3 in conference tournament games at Homewood with three titles.

A grass playing surface was maintained at Homewood from its inception in 1907 until 1981, when an artificial turf playing surface was first installed on the field. That surface was replaced in 1989 and again in January, 1999. After nearly a quarter century of artificial turf, the field was transformed once again during the summer of 2005 when state-of-the-art Sportex Momentum Turf 151 was installed, enhancing the look and experience of Homewood Field.

Construction of the "stadium" at Homewood Field appears to have taken place in 1908, when permanent seating for 1,500 was added in time for football season. The seating capacity has grown substantially in the 100 years since. Temporary seating on the University Parkway side of Homewood Field was added during lacrosse season only for a number of years before a permanent grandstand on the University Parkway side of Homewood Field was completed in 1998 and brought the seating capacity to its current 8,500. Renovations on the home stands took place during the winter of 2002.

In the fall of 2007, signage was added on the home stands to highlight the conference championships and NCAA Tournament appearances for the men's and women's soccer, football, field hockey and women's lacrosse programs. In addition, signage was added on the University Parkway side of Homewood, spotlighting the men's lacrosse program's nine NCAA Championships. An integrated video board was installed at Homewood Field in the summer of 2011. The state-of-the-art video display measures approximately 14 feet high by 48 feet wide and features 15HD pixel layout. The display, which will be used for Johns Hopkins football, field hockey, lacrosse and soccer, is capable of showing one large image or being divided into separate windows to show live and recorded video as well as an array of vivid graphics, up-to-the-minute statistics, colorful animations and advertisements with incredible brightness and wide-angle visibility.

Homewood Field is home to the Blue Jays' highly successful football, field hockey, men's and women's lacrosse and men's and women's soccer programs. All of these programs have hosted postseason games at Homewood Field in recent years.



The Wall-O'Mahony Student-Athlete Lounge was dedicated in February 2011 and officially opened in August for use by all Johns Hopkins student-athletes. The lounge is located inside the Newton White Athletic Center, just off the main lobby, and is named in honor of men's basketball alumni Glen Wall and Matt O'Mahony, who were killed in the attacks on the World Trade Centers on September 11, 2001. Wall and O'Mahony were teammates on the Johns Hopkins basketball team from 1982 to 1984.

The lounge includes the most recent team photos of all 24 Johns Hopkins athletic teams on the back wall and a beautifully restored shot of Homewood Field, circa 1930. The lounge also features two 55-inch flat screen tvs, along with DirecTV and Xbox 360 setups. The rear wall of the Wall-O'Mahony Student-Athlete Lounge includes an en-cased pictorial history of Johns Hopkins Athletics that chronicles the origination dates of all 24 varsity athletic programs. The room includes new couches and chairs for comfortable seating and is also equipped with wireless internet service.
