2007 SEASON OUTLOOK

The Sacramento State women's soccer team is coming off of its most impressive season in program history. The Hornets posted a program record 10 victories a season ago, and traveled to the finals of the Big Sky Conference Tournament for the first time since joining the league in 1996.

After falling to Idaho State in heartbreaking fashion, a penalty shootout loss, the Hornets would undergo a change in the offseason. Head coach Katie Poynter, after three years at the helm of the Hornet program, stepped down and assistant Randy Dedini was promoted to head coach.

Dedini, who is making his first trek as a collegiate head coach this season, inherits a squad that returns 17 players from a season ago, including five all-conference selections. Also, a strong recruiting class will play a role in the team's success in the season to come, as for the third straight season, the Hornets recruiting class was named the second best in the Big Sky according to Soccer Buzz.

With the bevy of returners and talented newcomers the team possesses, the Hornets were picked to finish first by the Big Sky coaches in the league's preseason poll.

"Being picked to finish first in the Big Sky by the coaches is a great honor being that our conference has become so much stronger in recent years," Dedini said. "This will also be gratifying to our players who were here in 2005 when we were picked to finish dead last."

The race for the Big Sky crown will be a tight one. However, as the first place votes were spread out in the preseason poll. All told, five teams received first place votes, with Sacramento State, Montana, and Weber State each receiving two.

"Being picked to finish first does not guarantee anything," Dedini said. "We will stay focused on each game and hope to be there in the end."

Goalkeepers

The Hornets have three goalkeepers on the roster for the 2007 season, the most of any recent Hornet team. Junior Jenny Lawrence (Belmont, Calif.) and sophomore Mandy Trojan (Los Alamitos, Calif.) split time in goal a season ago.

Lawrence posted a 4-3-2 record in 10 starts and made 42 saves a season ago, while Trojan finished 6-3-2 in 11 starts and a program record 0.99 goals against average. Trojan will open the year as the Hornets starter.

"Mandy has sound technique and good size for the position," Dedini said. "She has been playing with great confidence in camp and has earned the starting spot for now. Jenny is athletic, fast on her feet and sure handed. I wouldn't hesitate to go to her if we needed."

The lone newcomer in goal is freshman Savannah Abercrombie (Sacramento, Calif.), who prepped at El Camino HS and played both in goal and as a striker for the Eagles.

"Savannah has raw talent, good size and sure hands," Dedini said. "She has been building confidence and adjusting to the speed and intensity of the game."

Defense

The Hornets backline will utilize a mixture of experience and youth on the field in 2007. Leading the charge is junior Kara Taylor (Eugene, Oregon), who has started all 40 matches of her two year career.

Following up a freshman season that saw her earn Big Sky co-Defensive MVP honors, Taylor was an honorable mention all-Big Sky selection and a member of the Big Sky all-tournament team during her sophomore campaign.

"Kara has been our sweeper and the center of our defense since she arrived on campus," Dedini said. "She is a consistently strong and dependable player who is always steady mentally and emotionally."

Returning to the defensive lineup following a medical redshirt season is junior Tiffany Fraser (Sunnyvale, Calif.). Fraser was a starter for the first three games in 2006 before a knee injury sidelined her for the remainder of the season.

"Tiffany has been playing great through double-days," Dedini said. "She came in as a forward and has become a steady and strong player on the back line."

Sophomore Christina Trenton (San Juan Capistrano, Calif.), who saw time in 10 matches during her freshman campaign while making one start, will also play a vital role for the Hornet defense.

"Christina has worked really hard to work her way into the starting lineup," Dedini said. "She may not be the biggest player, but she is very tenacious and reads the game well."

A pair of newcomers, freshmen Nicole Cristino (Apple Valley, Calif.) and Cori Shreve (Pleasanton, Calif.), will also be in the mix on the defensive half of the pitch.

Cristino, a product of Granite Hills HS, led her team to the CIF Division IV semifinals during her senior campaign, while earning first team all-CIF honors. The previous season, playing in Division V, Cristino was

named CIF Defensive Player of the Year after leading her team to the CIF co-championship.

"She is a very quick and tenacious back," Dedini said of Cristino. "She pushes herself all of the time and will continue to get better."

Shreve, who prepped at Foothill HS, was a first-team all-East Bay Athletic League selection during her senior campaign.

"Cori gives us a big physical presence on defense," Dedini said. "She is a very good freshman defender who is very strong technically and tactically."

The Hornets will be without the services of one of their defenders from a season ago, as junior Ashley Rosenberg (Orange, Calif.) will redshirt the season as she continues to recover from a knee injury suffered last year.

"Losing Ashley for the season was a blow for us," Dedini said. "She was a starter last season and is a very strong and fast player."

Midfielders

In the midfield, the Hornets return a strong nucleus that includes two all-Big Sky selections from a season ago.

Senior Katie Burton (Las Vegas, Nev..) was a second team all-Big Sky selection last season playing various roles in the Sacramento State midfield. Burton, who started 18 matches in 2006, scored her second career goal in the Hornets 3-2 victory over Menlo.

"Katie can play any position on the field and be one of our best players at any position," Dedini said. "She has a 'winner' mentality and her teammates follow her lead on the field."

Another all-conference selection a season ago, junior Sarah Howard (Chino, Calif.) earned honorable mention all-Big Sky honors after scoring four goals and collecting an assist last season. One of four Hornets to start all 21 games a season ago, Howard was also named to the Big Sky all-tournament team.

"Sarah is the rock in the middle of the field for our team," Dedini said. "She is a very crafty player who is dominant at winning balls in the air."

Junior Missy Matzen (Gold River, Calif.) started 15 matches a season ago for the Hornets, playing on both the backline and in the midfield. Matzen collected a goal and an assist during her sophomore campaign, and will see an increased role in the midfield.

"Missy brings physicality to the game, but she has also improved technically," Dedini said. "She covers a lot of ground and is a very strong player."

Junior Rebecca Phillips (Lake Forest, Calif.) continues to work her way back from a knee injury she suffered before the start of the 2006 season that caused her to take a medical redshirt. Phillips

has started 23 matches in her career as a Hornet, making her return to the lineup a welcomed one.

"Rebecca has done a really good job coming off of an ACL tear," Dedini said. "She is mentally tough and is one of our strongest technical players. She really understands her role as well as the midfield position."

Another experienced midfielder is sophomore Katelin Hopping (Livermore, Calif.), who appeared in 13 matches while recording one start during her freshman campaign.

"Katelin is a strong all-around midfielder who can play any of the midfield spots for us," Dedini said. "She is able to play in tight spaces and may have the best leg on the team with her left or her right foot."

A newcomer in the midfield for the Hornets is freshman Kylee Blatz (Brentwood, Calif.), who was a two time all-Bay Valley Athletic League selection while attending Liberty High School.

"Kylee gives us a good speedy option off our bench," Dedini said. "She has a great work rate and she will continue to improve."

Sophomore Kirsten Karl (Carlsbad, Calif.) continues to recover from a series of knee injuries that have kept her playing career at Sacramento State to just three games thus far.

"Kirsten is a naturally left-footed player who will contribute for us when she is healthy," Dedini said. "She is an intelligent player who has a ton of potential."

Forwards

The Hornets return two of the top goal scorers in the Big Sky on the forward line, but only one will see the field in 2007.

Senior Katie McCoy (La Mesa, Calif.), a three time all-Big Sky selection, returns to the field for her senior campaign. McCoy, who has been named first team all-Big Sky the past two seasons, ranks fourth

on the career point-list at Sacramento State with 41, while ranking fourth in career goals (13) and second in assists (15). Although most of her career she has seen time strictly as a striker, McCoy will also play closer to midfield at times this season for the Hornets.

"There is hardly anyone who can keep up with Katie's work rate," Dedini said. "She has been the team captain for the last couple years. She is always a dangerous player with the ball."

But senior Kayelyn Satkowski (Sacramento, Calif.), who led the team and ranked second in the Big Sky last season with 21 points, will miss the 2007 season due to a knee injury.

"Kayelyn tore her ACL in the spring," Dedini said. "She will take a medical redshirt and be back strong for her senior year."

The Hornets, however, do have plenty of experience up front to make up for the scoring loss.

Senior Amanda Gray (Chino, Calif.) has played in 37 matches during her career for the Hornets, and will look to make the most of her final year in the Green and Gold.

"Amanda has been playing the best soccer of her career this fall," Dedini said. "Her confidence level is high and she will make the most of her senior season."

After scoring two game-winning goals during her freshman campaign, sophomore Kim Kemper (Orangevale, Calif.) will look to continue her progression in 2007. Kemper saw time in all 21 matches a season ago, scoring four goals and adding one assist.

"Kim is one of our hardest working players," Dedini said. "When she's in the game, she doesn't get tired. She can play any of the front line positions for us, and even in the midfield if need be."

Another sophomore looking to make an impact in her second season is Ashley Forbes (Orange, Calif.). After taking a medical redshirt year following a knee

injury in 2005, Forbes spent most of the 2006 rehabbing her knee before appearing in three matches.

"Ashley is one of our most skilled players and one of our best finishers," Dedini said. "She has very good touch with the ball and is a nice option up top."

Sophomore Danielle Holloway (Albuquerque, N.M.) will suit up for the Hornets for the first time in 2007, and will be playing her first full season of collegiate soccer since 2004. Holloway earned Southland Conference Player and Freshman of the Year following a 2004 campaign at Texas State that included 16 goals and four assists. She has spent the past two seasons nursing a knee injury.

"Danielle is a very composed player with great vision who has a knack for being at the right place at the right time," Dedini said. "She is not 100 percent yet, but she is getting stronger by the week and will continue to get stronger as the season goes on."

Another forward coming off of a knee injury is freshman Erin Tarantino (Petaluma, Calif.), who took a medical redshirt in 2006. Tarantino, a product of Casa Grande HS, will see her first action as a Hornet this season.

"Erin is a very technical player with a good understanding of the game," Dedini said. "She has been coming on strong after her ACL tear and is a great team player."

Freshman Leah Larot (San Jose, Calif.) is a newcomer to the team who should factor into the Hornet front line right away. A graduate of Evergreen Valley HS, Larot was a four time first team all-Blossom Valley Athletic League selection who was named BVAL freshman, sophomore and junior of the year.

"Leah gives us a different dynamic," Dedini said. "She is so fast and quick, she can blow right by players with her dribble. She has room for growth and will be a strong forward for us the next four years."

RANDY DEDINI

**FOURTH SEASON AS HEAD COACH
SONOMA STATE, 1993**

Randy Dedini, the 2007 Big Sky Conference Coach of the Year, returns for his fourth season at the helm of the Hornet program. With a career record of 29-17-12, Dedini has never had a losing season on the Hornet sidelines and has coached 13 first- or second-team all-Big Sky selections, including offensive player of the year, Katie McCoy, in 2007.

Sacramento State went 8-5-5 in 2009 (3-2-2 Big Sky) in Dedini's third season as head coach. The Hornets had the stingiest defense in the conference, allowing just 13 total scores in '09 while netting 20 goals on offense. Savannah Abercrombie was named three-time Big Sky Defensive Player of the Week and seven players were given all-conference honors, including a first-team selection for Cori Shreve.

The Hornets produced their third straight winning season in 2008, the second straight with Dedini as head coach. The team finished with a 9-8-2 overall record, including a 3-3-1 mark inside of Big Sky play. Two Hornets, Kim Kemper and Kara Taylor, earned first team all-Big Sky honors, while Ashley Forbes, Sarah Howard, Shreve and Christina Trenton earned honorable mention honors. Kemper also became the second straight Hornet to win the Big Sky Golden Boot award, given to the league's leading scorer.

Under the guidance of Dedini in 2007, his first season as head coach, the Hornets made the NCAA Tournament for the first time in school history after collecting their first-ever Big Sky Tournament title. The Hornets also won the Big Sky regular season title for the first time in school history, while posting a program-record 12 wins. For his efforts, Dedini earned conference coach of the year honors, becoming the first coach in program history to do so.

Dedini oversaw nine Hornets who earned all-Big Sky honors during his first season, including Big Sky Offensive MVP Katie McCoy. McCoy was also named Big Sky Tournament MVP, and earned the conference's Golden Boot award.

As an assistant from 2004-06, Dedini oversaw the team's ascension into the top of the Big Sky standings. During the fall of 2006, the women's program reached the Big Sky Tournament championship game for the first time in program history. The team's 10-7-4 record was also a then program-best until the 2007 team bettered that mark.

In 2006, a highly-touted recruiting class made major contributions during the year. The program's 30 goals during the season were fueled by Dedini's aggressive offensive approach and the ability of the newcomers to contribute immediately. Sacramento State also outshot its opponents 172-106.

Dedini began in 2004 with the Hornets, serving as the goalkeeper coach. During that year, freshman keeper Brittany Auernig was named Rookie of the Year after making eight starts and 59 saves.

In 2005, Dedini made the move to top assistant. The Hornets' recruiting efforts and change in their philosophy of play paid off with a then program-best second place finish in the conference standings and an 8-8-3 overall record. The team also advanced to the Big Sky Tournament for the first time since 2001. Dedini's offensive approach meshed well with a young group of skilled players.

In addition to assisting in all aspects of the women's soccer program, Dedini was director of the women's soccer summer camps his last two years as an assistant.

Before coming to Sacramento State, Dedini spent five seasons as the assistant coach of the men's varsity soccer team for Quaker Valley High School in Pittsburgh, Pa. In 2002, the team won the state championship. Dedini also spent five years playing with the Pittsburgh Riverhounds of the A-League, winning awards such as team MVP, Iron Man and the century award for breaking the 100-cap mark. He began his 11-year professional career after playing two years at Sonoma State as the starting goalkeeper and graduating with a B.S. in kinesiology. In 1993, he was an All-American, and in 1992 and 1993, he received all-conference honors.

Dedini is a Northern California native, graduating from Vacaville High School in 1988 and playing for two seasons at American River College. He and his wife, Katie, have two daughters, Jordyn and Jaycie and one son, Jake.



MAUREEN WHITNEY

**EIGHTH SEASON AS ASSISTANT COACH
SACRAMENTO STATE, 2001**

Maureen Whitney will begin her fourth season as the top assistant under head coach Randy Dedini.

She is a familiar face to the women's soccer program, with a previous stint as an assistant from 2000-03. She also served as the co-camp director of the Hornets' summer soccer camps over those four years, a position she resumed from 2007-08. Whitney assists with the day-to-day duties of the women's soccer program, including recruiting and on field coaching.

In her eight seasons as an assistant coach, Whitney has helped coach Hornet players to 18 first- or second-team all-Big Sky Conference selections, in addition to 26 honorable mentions.

Whitney, who graduated from Sacramento State in 2001 with a bachelor's degree in criminal justice, was a two-sport athlete for the Hornets, competing from 1998-2000 in soccer and softball. As a defender for the women's soccer team, she was named Defensive MVP following her senior season, and during her two-year career, played in 24 matches, recording two goals and two assists.

She was an assistant coach on the under-18 National Championship squad at San Juan in 2006. All told, Whitney has spent the past seven years developing young talent throughout the local youth competitive soccer ranks.

An accomplished athlete, Whitney has spent nine seasons playing for the California Storm of the Women's Professional Soccer League. A five-time all-star, Whitney has captained the Storm along with Brazilian soccer icon, Sissi, and has played alongside former and current national team players such as Brandi Chastain and Leslie Osborne.

The Storm have reached the national championship match five times with Whitney on the field, winning the title twice, and in 2005, Whitney received the honor of WPSL MVP.

Whitney did not begin playing soccer until the age of 19. Already a two-sport athlete at Walla Walla Community College playing basketball and softball, Whitney was asked to join the soccer program in its first year of existence. She completed her eligibility at Walla Walla as a two-time NWACC all-star.

Whitney was also a three-sport athlete at Central Kitsap High School, graduating in 1995 after competing in volleyball, basketball and softball.



JENNIFER LAWRENCE

**SECOND SEASON AS VOLUNTEER ASSISTANT
SACRAMENTO STATE, 2008**

Jennifer Lawrence begins her second season as the volunteer assistant coach of the women's soccer team after playing four seasons with the Hornets from 2005-08.

Lawrence was a goalkeeper in her playing career and works with the current squad's netminders in a coaching role.

She completed her playing career in 2008 with 37 starts and 49 goals against in 3,522 minutes played. She started a career-high 19 games making 104 saves, the third highest total in school history, and tallying a 1.29 goals against average.

A native of Belmont, Calif. and graduate of Carlmont High School, Lawrence registered 183 career saves which ranks her third all-time in career stops for the Hornets.

About The University

- Sacramento State is the seventh largest university in the 23-campus CSU system, enrolling a multicultural student body of 28,529. The 300-acre campus is sheltered by more than 3,000 trees and dotted with flower gardens, including 3 million square feet of building space. Miles of trails stretch along the nearby river parkway, linking the University and student housing with recreational areas such as Folsom Lake and Old Sacramento.
- Quality teaching is a top priority, and classes are small and personalized. More than 80 percent of recent graduates say their professors were enthusiastic and genuinely enjoyed teaching.
- Preparing students for a career is a vital part of the education here. Thousands of students from all majors earn academic credit working internship and co-op positions, many of which are paid.
- Sacramento State, often called "Sac State," was founded as Sacramento State College in 1947 during a time of intense demand for higher education after World War II. We moved to our permanent location on the banks of the historic American River in 1953. In 1972, we were renamed California State University, Sacramento.
- The University is in the midst of an ambitious new master plan that will remake Sacramento State into a residential campus and add some 1.5 million square feet of building space. The plan, to guide campus growth in coming decades, includes housing for as many as 5,000 students and an arena and wellness center. It also envisions a performing arts center, new classroom buildings as high as eight stories, a space science center, parking structures and a green mall down the center of campus.
- Unlimited bus and light rail service throughout Sacramento is free for University students. Students may attend all home athletic events for free and attend other campus events for free or at a discount. More than half the students join one of the more than 200 student organizations, which include 35 fraternities and sororities.

- Sacramento State offers 60 undergraduate and 40 graduate degrees in eight Colleges. Teacher education is the largest academic program, followed by business, criminal justice, communication studies, psychology and computer science. The student-to-faculty ratio is 20 to 1; more than 70 percent of classes have fewer than 30 students.
- Attracting students from all over the world, the criminal justice program is one of the largest in the United States.
- One in 26 residents of the six-county Sacramento Region is a Sacramento State graduate. The University directly and indirectly contributes more than \$900 million to the region's economy annually.
- Almost 700 new school teachers graduate from Sacramento State each year.
- Seventy-eight percent of students say that Sacramento State was their first or only choice.
- Sacramento State was the site of the 2003, 2005, 2006 and 2007 NCAA Div. I Track & Field Championships, and the Sacramento State Aquatic Center was the site of the 1997, 1999, 2004 and 2005 NCAA Women's Rowing Championships. This year, Sacramento State will host the NCAA Div. I Women's Volleyball Final Four on Dec. 13-15 at Arco Arena.
- Sacramento State hosted the most successful U.S. Olympic Track and Field Trials ever in 2000, and hosted the event again in 2004.
- Famous Sacramento State alumni include actor Tom Hanks, Grammy award winner Bobby McFerrin, former co-host of *Good Morning America* Joan Lunden, former host of the *Early Show* Rene Syler, stand-up comedian Brian Posehn, actor Carlos Alazraqui, film director Joe Carnahan, Stockton mayor Edward Chavez, famous economist and author Richard J. Maybury, former *KTLA Morning News* Giselle Fernández and founding member of the Village People David Hodo.
- Famous Sacramento State athletics alumni include retired nine-year NFL offensive lineman and two-time Super Bowl winner John Gesek, Oakland Raiders offensive coordinator Greg Knapp, 10-year NFL fullback Daimon Shelton, seven-year New England Patriots long snapper and three-time Super Bowl winner Lonie Paxton, former 12-year NFL defensive back Lorenzo Lynch, New York Jets offensive lineman Marko Cavka, CFL Edmonton Eskimos quarterback Ricky Ray, CFL Winnipeg Blue Bombers running back Charles Roberts, and longtime Arena Football League quarterback Aaron Garcia.

- Sacramento is part of a Capital Region with nearly 2 million people in the heart of Northern California, one of the country's most beautiful areas. Within easy driving distance are San Francisco, the Napa and Sonoma valleys, the historic gold country and the Lake Tahoe region's ski slopes.

It has also become a tourist center with attractions including the State Capitol building, North America's largest railroad museum, the Old Sacramento historic area, the California State History Museum and the Crocker Art Museum.
- Founded in 1849, Sacramento is the cultural, education, business and governmental center of a four-county metropolitan region.

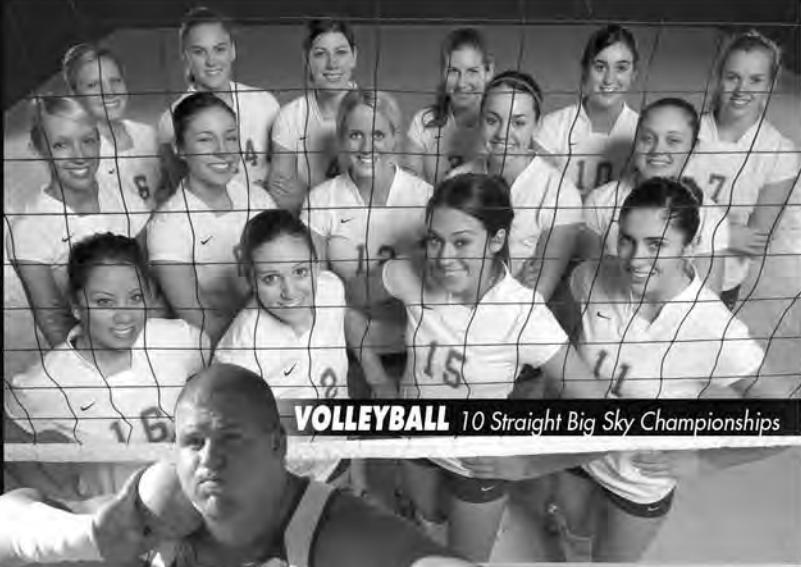

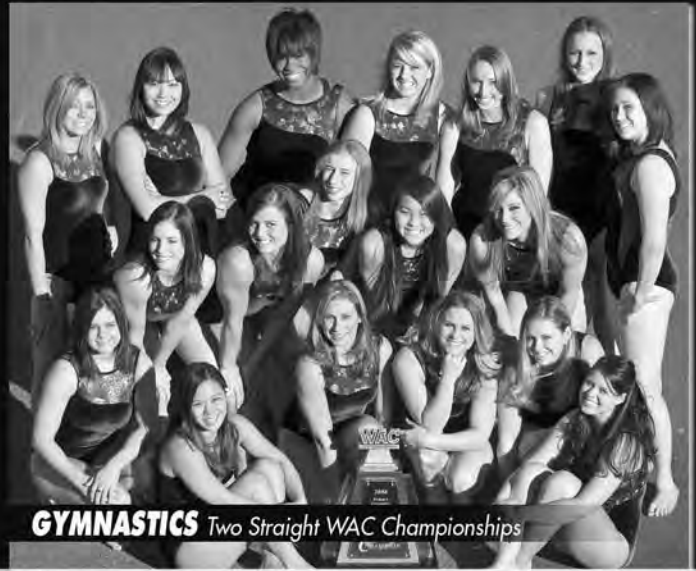

ALEXANDER GONZALEZ

UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT

Dr. Alexander Gonzalez is the 11th president of California State University, Sacramento – the capital city's only comprehensive university and one of the largest campuses in the California State University system.

Dr. Gonzalez was appointed President of Sacramento State in 2003, bringing new energy and a focused vision to the University. He is overseeing an initiative known as Destination 2010, which is designed to make Sacramento State a premier metropolitan university and a destination campus for the West. Among the priorities are enhancing academic programs and student services; new academic buildings; new on- and near-campus student housing; a faculty and staff village near campus; and a new Recreation and Wellness Center.

Before coming to Sacramento, Dr. Gonzalez served from 1997 to 2003 as President of Cal State San Marcos. At San Marcos, he oversaw a period of rapid growth as well as many successful fundraising campaigns. He also spent 18 years at Fresno State, starting as a faculty member in the Psychology Department, which he later chaired. From 1991 to 1997, he served as the university's Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs.

Dr. Gonzalez is a member of the Board of Trustees at Pomona College. He also serves on the Sutter Health Board of Directors and the Board of Directors for Valley Vision.

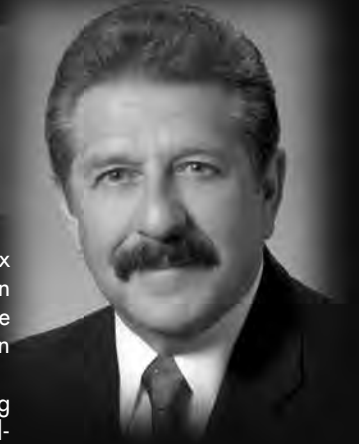
Dr. Gonzalez previously served on President Bush's Advisory Commission on Educational Excellence for Hispanic Americans. His service on a number of

other boards and commissions includes six years as a Commissioner for the Western Association of Schools and Colleges, the agency that accredits higher education institutions in the western United States.

He also served as Chair of the Governing Board of the Hispanic Association of Colleges and Universities. His service to the CSU system includes serving on a work group that reviewed and recommended action on remedial education, and, more recently, as a member of a committee of presidents considering policy on enrollment management, the CSU's Technology Steering Committee, and the Institute for Teaching and Learning.

Dr. Gonzalez holds a doctorate and master's degree in Psychology from UC Santa Cruz. He received his bachelor's degree in history from Pomona College, where he graduated with honors and was elected to Phi Beta Kappa. He spent a year at Stanford University as a postdoctoral fellow of the Ford Foundation and the National Research Council conducting research on the psychology of time. He also attended Harvard Law School.

Dr. Gonzalez and his wife Gloria have been married for more than 35 years. They are the parents of two adult sons.



TERRY WANLESS

ATHLETICS DIRECTOR

Dr. Terry Wanless' five-year tenure as Sacramento State's Director of Athletics has seen growth unparalleled in the school's 16-year Division I history. His vision of broad success in the department came to fruition in the 2006-07 academic year where the Hornets claimed an unprecedented eight conference championships. That total included an amazing four titles which came in a four-hour span on May 29.

Wanless has also overseen significant facility enhancement to the athletic facilities. The biggest change will come in early 2008 with the opening of the Broad Athletic Facility. The building will serve as the home to the Hornet football and track and field programs as well as athletic training and strength and conditioning.

The Broad Athletic Facility is the first step of an elaborate plan that began with the passing of a referendum by the Sacramento State student body. That vote will also lead to the creation of a recreation and wellness center which will benefit the entire student body.

Wanless, who is entering his sixth year with the Hornets, has been a visible member of the Sacramento State athletics family, constantly representing the University and department at public outings and speaking engagements. His commitment to the student-athlete has also been clear as both he and his wife, Joanne, attend the majority of Hornet home athletic events and support several teams on the road.

His leadership and academic support have been evident to the student-athletes in other ways as well. The department's Life Skills Program has seen rapid growth, significantly increasing the number of summer and fifth-year scholarships available to Hornet student-athletes. The Life Skills program has also launched the program's first computer lab and offers Hornet student-athletes tutoring as well as academic counseling.

Additionally, Wanless instituted a number of new programs, including the Athletics Director's Academic Achievement Award – presented to each student-athlete that achieves a term GPA of 3.0 or higher. Those academic efforts have paid early dividends. Over the last five years, Sacramento State student-athletes have posted over 1,300 term GPAs of 3.0 or above. Additionally, over 300 Hornets have earned conference all-academic honors during that same time period.

His efforts in restoring the department's booster club structure as well as aggressively improving the University's collegiate licensing program, while not readily

visible, are projects that will surely enhance the program's financial footing in years to come.

Athletically, the Hornets have also seen continued growth and success on the field of play. During his five years at Sacramento State, 21 teams and 43 individuals have advanced to conference and NCAA postseason competition. In addition, the 2006-07 season saw eight sports (volleyball, gymnastics, men's indoor track and field, women's tennis, men's tennis, women's golf, men's golf and rowing) win their conference title.

Wanless' efforts to put the Hornets on the map have been instrumental in helping make Sacramento State the unofficial "home of NCAA Championships". The Hornets have been tabbed to serve as the host institution for 2007 Div. I Volleyball Championships as well as the 2008 Div. I Women's Golf West Regional.

Additionally, Sacramento State has served as host to six NCAA championships (four track, two rowing) as well as the 2004 U.S. Olympic Trials for Track and Field during Wanless' first five years of leadership.

Prior to Sacramento State, Wanless served as athletics director at the University of North Dakota from 1990-1999, guiding the program to one of its most successful decades in school history. During that time, North Dakota enjoyed strong competitive success, winning four NCAA national championships and 36 conference titles. Additionally, 25 other teams finished second in their respective conference standings.

Before his position at North Dakota, Wanless was director of intercollegiate athletics at Western Carolina for four years and held a variety of positions, including director of intercollegiate athletics, at Towson University in Maryland.

Wanless earned a bachelor's degree in physical education from Black Hills State, a master's degree in physical education from Northern Illinois and a doctorate in athletics administration from Temple. He and his wife, Joanne, are the parents of two children. Their daughter, Heather, and her husband, Chad Collins, reside in Lexington, Ky., with their daughter Hadley. Their son Troy, and his wife, Jesi, live in Minneapolis.



ACADEMIC & COMPLIANCE

The Student-Athlete Resource Center

The Student-Athlete Resource Center offers academic advising, tutoring and mentoring, NCAA rules education and compliance, athletic financial services support, and life skills programming for all student-athletes of Sacramento State's Division I Intercollegiate Athletics program.

The S.A.R.C.'s services and programming are provided in an assortment of ways including individual advising, orientations, group and team meetings, coaches' compliance and rules education sessions, freshmen seminar classes, and a variety of student development and academic workshops. S.A.R.C. Director Paul Edwards and Academic Athletic Services Coordinator Laurie Dahlberg serve as the primary advisors to the student-athletes.

Under the direction of Life Skills and Student-Athlete Development Coordinator Mark McGushin, the Student-Athlete Academic & Life Skills Lab is available to student-athletes as a study area and to meet with tutors.

Additionally, McGushin coordinates the mentoring program which addresses student-athletes experiencing academic difficulties. The S.A.R.C. also provides additional services, guest speak-

ers and work shops related to finding information on campus, in the community and NCAA resources in a variety of areas related to student life, welfare and career opportunities.

Athletic Compliance and Financial Services Director Katherine Zedonis and Compliance Coordinator Tina Westerhold are responsible for the administration of NCAA eligibility rules education and compliance for all intercollegiate teams, including issues related to athletic financial aid of student-athletes. The Athletic Compliance Office is responsible for developing, monitoring and enforcing a compliance program that ensures the integrity of the institution within the guidelines of the NCAA, Big Sky Conference and the University.

Admission Counselor/NCAA Initial Eligibility Coordinator Josh Collins services Sacramento State student-athletes with admission processing responsibilities and monitoring of NCAA initial-eligibility requirements. Collins works closely with both new transfer and incoming freshmen student-athletes. He is the main contact at Sacramento State for student-athletes working with NCAA Clearinghouse procedures.

The goal of the athletic training staff is to provide all Sacramento State student-athletes with high quality health care. Headed by full-time certified athletic trainers, the Hornets' athletic training facility provides state-of-the-art support and the services of highly trained sports medicine and health care professionals.

Should an injury occur, student-athletes are seen immediately by their sport's specific athletic trainer, and are referred, when necessary, to the appropriate medical provider or facility.

Sacramento State boasts three training facilities (two located in the physical education complex and one at the Hornet Stadium fieldhouse). All training facilities are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabilitative apparatus.

A staff of three team physicians (Dr. Alan Hirahara, Dr. Ronald Sockolov, Dr. Harold Strauch) and a skillful and talented athletic training staff tend to the medical and rehabilitative needs of each and every student-athlete. Also assisting in the health of the student-athletes is a Kaiser physician, two dentists, a physical therapist and a chiropractor.

Sacramento State's athletic training staff consists of three full-time certified athletic trainers, three graduate assistants and more than 15 athletic training students preparing for a career in sports medicine.
