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2007 Season Outlook

Always an exciting brand of volleyball to watch, the 2007 edition of the Sacramento State volleyball squad will give its fans even more reasons to keep a close eye on the winning ways of the Hornets.

The first and most intriguing reason is that longtime head coach Debby Colberg, entering her 32nd season with the Hornets, announced in August that she will retire at the conclusion of this season. Winner of 799 matches, two national titles, 17 conference championships and 15 coach of the year awards, Colberg has been the face of Sacramento State volleyball for 31 years and her teams have almost always been successful – 19 NCAA Tournament appearances and 29 winning seasons.

Secondly, the Hornets will attempt to win their unprecedented 11th consecutive Big Sky Conference championship. Since joining the conference in 1996, Sacramento State has won either the league's regular season and/or tournament championship each of the last 10 years, including eight conference tournament crowns (1997-98, 2000, 2002-06) and seven regular season titles (1997-01, 2005-06).

Third, Sacramento State enters the year with a roster that, according to Colberg, could be the best that she has ever put on the court. Highlighted by the most impressive combination of middle hitters to ever wear the Hornet Green and Gold in seniors **Lindsay Haupt** and **Michelle Franz**, not to mention a three-time all-conference outside hitter in **Missie Stidham** who transferred from Saint Mary's to Sacramento State during the offseason, the Hornets find themselves primed to make a sixth straight and 10th NCAA Tournament appearance in the last 11 years.

"If we stay healthy, this team could be the best we've ever had here at Sacramento State," Colberg said. "The experience, the quality of middles, the addition of a very strong outside in Missie Stidham, and our passing and defense make us a very strong team. We have all the major components with no glaring weaknesses, and I look forward to putting this team on the floor."

A total of nine Hornets return for the 2007 campaign, and that list includes senior team captain **Jennifer Ferguson** who is slated to start at one of the team's outside hitter positions. In addition, the team welcomes back setters **Rose Burke** and **Melissa Melcher**, who combined to effectively run the first 6-2 offense that Colberg has ever employed at Sacramento State. Also returning are outside hitters **Brittany Ferguson** and **Desirée Hoyum**, right-side hitter **Anna Schoener** and defensive specialist **Alexandra Vidal**. Schoener will most likely red-shirt after undergoing offseason shoulder surgery.

The Hornets will have to compensate for two glaring losses from last year's team in outside hitter **Atlee Hubbard** and libero **Kristin Lutes**. Both were all-conference selections in 2006, with Hubbard garnering first team honors and Lutes being named all-Pacific Region not to mention achieving Big Sky Libero of the Year accolades for the third time of her career.

"Both Kristin and Atlee always gave everything in practice and in games, and you don't replace the type of work ethic that Kristin had," Colberg said. "Not only did Atlee bring offensive skills, but combined with Kristin, they were two of our primary passers. That is my biggest concern as far as replacing both players."

Stidham will most likely take Hubbard's starting spot at outside hitter, but the libero and right-side hitter starting positions are up for grabs. That is where the team's recruiting class of six players could come into play. The most likely player to take over for Lutes at libero is freshman **Chelsea Goodsell**, who spent the last nine years playing for club volleyball powerhouse Saddleback Valley.

With Schoener likely to sit out the 2007 season, the right-side hitter spot is wide open with five players all vying for the spot. Returners **Brittany Ferguson** and **Hoyum**, along with freshmen **Whitney Mendivil**, **Cayti Crowton** and **Maddison Thivierge** could each find time on the right side, according to Colberg.

Combining the strength of the returners with the talented incoming class of players, the Hornets should be right back in the thick of things to capture another Big Sky title. Two big reasons for Sacramento State's success over the years has been the team's experience (especially in the big matches) and a defense that is always impressive.

Defensively, the Hornets have been the only team in the nation to rank among the country's top 20 in both blocks and digs per game each of the last two years. Last season, Sacramento State ranked third in blocks (3.59 per game) and 14th in digs (19.37 per game). The Hornets have made a habit over the years of frustrating teams by returning nearly every ball hit their way.

"We put more emphasis on defense than many teams do, and that seems to show every year," Colberg said. "I'm not sure how we dug so many balls last season because I didn't feel like that was our strength."

Experience and stability in the program also continue to be a major factor every year. Success breeds success, according to Colberg, and going into a match expecting to win goes a long way into actually pulling out the victory.

"There have been times when we've had less talent than our opponent, but we find ways to win those matches," Colberg said. "We always seem to come together well as a team and play strong at the end of the season. Our players just have it in their heads that they will not be beat."

"We also continue to get quality kids to come here, and haven't sustained a drop-off in recruiting. We don't have that big star, or that go-to player that will dominate the floor. We have players willing to buy into the system and the team concept. Our players play for the good of the team more than for themselves, and that goes a long way towards establishing a winning tradition."

That could partially explain how the Hornets have reeled off 13 straight seasons with at least 20 victories and 12 straight years of double figure-conference wins, including a 30-6 overall record

and a 15-1 mark in the Big Sky last season. In addition, Sacramento State has won 55 straight regular season home matches against Big Sky competition, a streak which dates all the way back to 1999.

That level of success will have to be continued this season despite facing arguably one of the toughest schedules in recent memory. On the Hornets' schedule this year are matches against six opponents that reached last year's NCAA Tournament, including Santa Clara, Cal Poly, Mississippi, Alabama, UAB and Missouri State.

The Big Sky portion of the schedule will have a different look than in years past as both the second (Portland State) and third place (Eastern Washington) teams in last year's conference standings enter 2007 with new head coaches. Gone are longtime Portland State head coach Jeff Mozzochi (who stepped down to be a Vikings assistant) and Eastern Washington head coach Wade Benson. Sacramento State and Eastern Washington have faced each other in the Big Sky Tournament championship match seven consecutive years, with the Hornets coming out on top six times during that span.

MIDDLE HITTERS

Like last season, the strength of this year's Sacramento State team starts with the middle hitter tandem of Haupt and Franz. In 2006, the pair combined for a .335 hitting percentage to go along with 5.48 kills and 3.30 blocks per game. Actually, both players hit .335 which tied for top hitting percentage marks in the Big Sky last season.

"Together, Michelle and Lindsay are two of the best middles we've ever had here, and they bring very good skill on both the offensive and defensive sides of the net," Colberg said. "When we rotate and the other comes to the front row, we don't lose any level of play. We are very strong in the middle during all rotations of a match because of them."

The more decorated of the bunch over the years has been Haupt, who is already a two-time Big Sky Tournament MVP, first team all-conference and Big Sky all-academic selection. Since joining the Hornets as a relatively raw freshman with tremendous athletic ability in 2004, Haupt has improved her numbers every year, culminating in 3.07 kills and 1.50 blocks per game last season. She hit at least .348 in 16 of her final 19 matches of the 2006 season while posting double figures in kills a career-best 24 times.

"Lindsay brings so many good attributes to the court, and her ability to block and attack in the front row are obviously very good," Colberg said. "But she also brings this intensity and competitiveness to the court that I really like. She has been, and will continue to be, a force that other teams will have to reckon with."

After transferring from Oregon State prior to her sophomore season (2005), Franz has established herself as one of the best blockers in Sacramento State program history. In fact, she ranked fourth in the nation with 1.80 blocks per game last



season, and her 221 blocks were the second-best mark in school single-season history. That doesn't even account for the 2.41 kills per game and .335 hitting percentage she brought on offense despite battling shin splints for a good portion of the year. Over her two-year career with the Hornets, Franz is now hitting .337, the third-best mark in program history.

"Michelle is such a natural blocker in that she is very quick moving along the net, has the ability to get squared up better than most middles, and has great timing and vision," Colberg said. "There is nothing more we can teach Michelle. The only thing we need to worry about is keeping her healthy (shin splints)."

Backing up Franz and Haupt is Thivierge, who Colberg expects will be one of the team's starting middle hitters from 2008-10. Thivierge (pronounced TEE-verge) recently graduated from Oregon's Ashland High School where she was a three-time first team all-conference selection. As a junior in 2005, Thivierge earned third team all-state accolades after helping lead the team to a state championship and a 34-1 record. She was still a first team all-conference selection despite breaking her foot midway through her senior season.

"Maddison is the most natural athlete of this year's incoming players," Colberg said. "Her front row hitting and blocking will help us immediately. She will do things on the court you can't teach, and already has a very good arm swing."

OUTSIDE HITTERS

Sacramento State's roster features seven players who could each see time at outside hitter this season. Headlining that list are Jennifer Ferguson and Stidham, as both will more than likely open the year as the team's starting outsiders.

Ferguson has already overcome a back injury that put her volleyball future in doubt and forced her to redshirt the 2004 season. Since that time, however, she has shown no ill effects of the injury, posting 1.70 kills and 3.09 digs per game as a sophomore in 2005, and 1.82 kills and 2.71 digs per game last season. Also in 2006, she played in every match, and in 122 of the team's 123 games. She had seven double-doubles (kills and digs), including five in her last nine matches.

"Jenny does everything in that she can serve, pass and play great defense. She is small, but hits a pretty good ball," Colberg said. "She has a great attitude and is the ultimate team player."

"I am positive she will be a very good team captain and serve as a good extension of us on the court. Jenny is a coach on the floor, she knows the game well, and does a very nice job of giving instruction to her teammates."

Stidham played each of the last three seasons at Saint Mary's where she was a three-time all-league selection in the volleyball rich West Coast Conference. The Fresno, Calif., native was a three-year starter at outside hitter for the Gaels and posted combined totals of 3.26 kills, 3.31 digs, 0.54 blocks and 0.32 aces per game over that stretch. A powerful jump server, Stidham had 12 kills, 24 digs and four blocks in a 3-1 win over Sacramento State in the first round of the 2004 NCAA Tournament.

"Missie will be an outstanding player who brings

very good skill, and we've never had anyone with the quality of jump serve that she possesses," Colberg said. "She brings the whole package in that she hits a good ball, swing blocks well, she'll play good defense and she can pass."

Hoyum, who could be asked to play rightside hitter this season, begins her second season with the Hornets. The sophomore appeared in 19 matches during her freshman year, averaging 0.74 kills and 0.56 digs per game.

"We expect Dez to see a lot of playing time this year," Colberg said. "We will put our best hitters on the court, and if need be, we will put her on the right side to get her in a match."

Brittany Ferguson enters her third season with the Hornets. The Strathmore, Alberta, native has appeared in 34 matches and 53 games during the first two seasons of her career, averaging 0.74 kills over that span. A high flyer with a good wing span, Ferguson can touch 10 feet with her approach jump.

"We played Brittany on the right side during the spring and she showed some promise," Colberg said. "She can also play the left side and I see her in a backup role on either the left or right side."

After appearing in all 36 matches during her freshman season, including seven starts as the team's rightside hitter, Schoener will more than likely redshirt after undergoing surgery on her right (hitting) shoulder. The Placerville, Calif., native averaged 0.97 kills and 0.69 blocks per game in 2006.

Crowton enters her first season with the Hornets after a career at Golden Sierra High School that saw her named to the all-conference team four times. She helped lead the team to four consecutive Golden Empire League championships, including a combined 129-0 league record. In addition, she played for the Gold Cal club that placed 11th at the Junior Nationals in the summer of 2006 and was coached by current Hornet associate head coach Ruben Volta.

A native of Lindon, Utah, Mendivil enters her freshman season with Sacramento State after prepping at Pleasant Grove High School, where she started at three positions (outside, middle and rightside hitter) during her four years of varsity volleyball. She was a first team all-state, all-region and all-Valley selection, team captain and team MVP during her senior season after averaging 2.70 kills, 2.00 digs and 0.90 aces per game.

"Both Cayti and Whitney are very similar in that they can pass and hit well, and possess a good serve," Colberg said. "Once we get Cayti to hit with a little more power and be a bit more assertive, she will be a very nice player. Whitney has a tremendous attitude and is the type of player that will jump off a cliff for you to get a win."

SETTERS

For the second straight year, two setters dot the Hornets' roster, and they will again be Burke and Melcher. Together, the two effectively ran the 6-2 offense for a good portion of last season, and that should be the case again in 2007, according to Colberg.

Burke enters her third year with the program after a 2006 season in which she appeared in all 123 games, including 34 starts. The Gainesville, Fla., native averaged 8.87 assists and 2.68 digs

per game. Burke, who was tied for second in the Big Sky with 19 double-doubles (assists and digs), had at least 10 digs in 12 of the final 16 matches of the season, including a career-high 18 in the Big Sky Tournament championship victory over Eastern Washington.

"With two years under her belt, Rose now has a lot of experience and shows good composure," Colberg said. "She has come a long way with her leadership qualities and we were very pleased with her play last season."

Melcher begins her second year with the Hornets after posting 4.60 assists and 1.52 digs per game in 2006 as a freshman. She was third on the Hornets with a .278 hitting percentage and was a Big Sky All-Academic selection with a 3.72 gpa.

"Melissa did a nice job last year as a freshman, and she will come back with that much more confidence this season," Colberg said. "She has good location on her sets, nice hands, she's quick and has a nice demeanor on the court."

DEFENSIVE SPECIALIST/LIBERO

Goodsell, Vidal, returning redshirt freshman Chara DeLoney and Solano Junior College transfer Katie Van Der Wende could each see time at defensive specialist and/or libero this season.

Goodsell is the most likely candidate to take over the libero spot vacated by Lutes. A 5-4 freshman from Laguna Niguel, Calif., Goodsell was the starting libero for Saddleback Valley club teams that finished no worse than second at three straight Volleyball Festivals (2004-06). That included a first place finish in 2004.

"Chelsea is a very good libero who will be filling some big shoes (Kristin Lutes)," Colberg said. "We don't want to put too much pressure on her, but she is a very confident player. She is left-handed, has a nice serve and does not get rattled on the floor."

DeLoney returns for her second season after taking a redshirt in 2006. A graduate of Sacramento's Rio Americano High School, DeLoney was a three-time first team all-Capital Athletic League selection (2003-05).

"Chara has worked very hard on her game and has gotten much better with the redshirt year," Colberg said. "We like the improvement she has made, and she has shown the tenacity that will allow her to get better every year."

Van Der Wende played the 2005 and 2006 seasons for Fairfield's Solano Community College. A two-time first team all-Bay Valley Conference selection while also earning league MVP honors as a sophomore in 2006, Van Der Wende set the Solano CC career record for both digs (565) and aces (93).

"Katie is a very good passer and defensive player who can also play at outside hitter," Colberg said. "She is a very smart player with good knowledge of the game and I think I will like having her on the court."

Vidal walked on to the team last season, and appeared in seven matches for the Hornets in 2006. She finished the season with 1.29 digs per game.

"Alex is another player with a great attitude and she has worked very hard for her playing time," Colberg said. "She plays good defense, has nice reflexes and a good serve."

A Legend Bids Farewell

DEBBY COLBERG

After 31 years, nearly 800 victories, a .738 winning percentage, two national titles, 19 NCAA Tournament appearances, 17 conference championships, 15 coach of the year awards and 29 winning seasons, Colberg will retire after the 2007 season.

After 31 years at Sacramento State which include 799 victories, two national titles, 19 NCAA Tournament appearances, 17 conference championships and 15 coach of the year awards, head coach Debby Colberg announced in August that the 2007 season will mark the end of her illustrious career.

Currently fourth among active Div. I coaches with a 799-284 record (.738 winning percentage), Colberg has coached just two losing squads during her 31-year tenure and her teams have averaged 25.8 wins per season during that span.

The coach with the best career winning percentage in any sport at Sacramento State, Colberg begins her 17th season as a Division I coach. The long coaching sojourn has taken Colberg through the ranks, from AIAW play (1976-80), through Division II (1981-90) and currently Division I (1991-pres.).

She has led Sacramento State to winning seasons in 15 of the 16 Division I years, and has compiled a 379-166 (.695) record over that span. That includes five straight and nine NCAA Div. I Tournament appearances in the

last 10 years (1997-00, 2002-06). The Hornets have now rattled off 12 consecutive 20-win seasons and 26 overall seasons with at least 20 victories.

The recipient of 15 coach of the year awards (one national, four regional and 10 conference), Colberg also had the added responsibility of serving as Sacramento State's Athletics Director, a position she held from February of 1999 until June of 2002.

Since the program joined the Big Sky Conference in 1996, Colberg has led the Hornets to seven regular season titles (1997-01, 2005-06) and eight conference tournament crowns (1997-98, 2000, 2002-06). For her efforts, she has been named the Big Sky Coach of the Year seven times in the last 10 years.

The program has posted a 139-27 conference record since becoming a member of the Big Sky, easily the best winning percentage (.837) among the league's nine teams over that span. In addition, Sacramento State has placed at least four players on the all-conference team each of the last nine years, including Big Sky MVPs in 1999, 2001, 2003 and 2005.

Last year, the Hornets went 30-6 overall, 15-1 in the Big Sky, and had three first team all-conference selections (middle hitters Lindsay Haupt and Michelle Franz, and outside hitter Atlee Hubbard) and one second team selection (libero Kristin Lutes). Moreover, the Hornets have not lost a Big Sky regular-season home match since 1999, a span of 55 consecutive victories on the home floor.

In addition to her teams consistently being successful on the floor, Colberg's teams have also shown impressively in the classroom. In fact, at least three Sacramento State players have been named to the Big Sky Conference All-Academic team each year since joining the league. Nine members of the team received at least a 3.0 gpa during this past spring semester and six of those student-athletes had gpa's of 3.5 or better.

Colberg has been honored 10 times as a league coach of the year in addition to being selected NCAA Northwest Region Coach of the Year four times. She was the 1989 AVCA Div. II National Coach of the Year, and also served as a head coach at the 1981 National Sports Festival, leading the West team to a gold medal.

Besides being just one victory shy of becoming the fourth active Div. I coach with 800 wins, she is currently 16th among active coaches in winning percentage. The team has increased its win total each of the four years from 23 in 2003, 25 in 2004, 26 in 2005, and 30 last season.

The only time in the last 10 years that Sacramento State did not reach the NCAA Tournament was 2001, when the team was upset by Eastern Washington in the Big Sky Tournament championship match.

No matter what division the Hornets have been a part of over the years, the team consistently has reached the NCAA Tournament. In fact, during the Div. II era (1981-90), the team had five top five finishes while reaching the Final Four in 1981, 1982, 1984 and 1989. That included a national championship in 1981 and a national runner-up finish in 1989. The 1981 championship was the second national crown in as many years for Sacramento State volleyball as the team won the AIAW Div. II national crown in 1980 (the NCAA did not sanction women's sports until 1981).

During the Div. I era, the Hornets have been a victim of their proximity on the West Coast, as the team has repeatedly had to play some of the toughest teams in the nation in the first round of the NCAA Tournament. In fact, Sacramento State has opened the tournament at volleyball powerhouse Stanford three times in the last five years (2002-03, 2006). The other two years saw the Hornets play Santa Clara (2005) and Saint Mary's (2004) in the first round. Santa Clara finished the season ranked fourth in the nation in 2005, and Saint Mary's was ranked 13th in 2004.

Sacramento State was able to get out of the first round of the Big Dance in 1998 after sweeping Houston in the first round. Unfortunately, the team had to play 10th-ranked Pacific in Stockton in the second round where the Hornets eventually lost.

Prior to the current run of NCAA Tournament appearances, the Hornets' 1992 National Invitational Volleyball Championships appearance marked the first postseason competition ever by a Sacramento State athletics team in the Division I era (1991-pres.).

Colberg began her teaching and coaching career shortly after graduation from Sacramento State in 1970. She received her teaching credential in 1971, then taught part-time for one year before spending the next four years teaching and coaching at Churchill Intermediate School in the San Juan Unified School District in Sacramento. In 1975, she was hired to coach varsity volleyball at Rio Americano High School. She spent three years there and led her teams to three league championships and a pair of section titles. She began her coaching career at Sacramento State in 1976 while still at Rio Americano High School. Her first two years at Sacramento State, she doubled as volleyball coach at both schools.

Her accomplishments have not gone unnoticed on the local or national scene. The *Collegiate Volleyball Update* magazine featured her in the 2004 fall preview issue. *Sacramento Magazine* featured her in a 1990 fall issue, and she was featured in a cover story in the October/November 1989 issue of *Coaching Volleyball*. She also received the prestigious Distinguished Service Award and Outstanding Alumni Award from the University, and is a former member of the Sacramento State Athletic Advisory Board and the Sacramento State Faculty Senate.

Colberg graduated from Sacramento State with a bachelor's degree in physical education in 1970. A student-athlete herself, Colberg was a member of the inaugural volleyball, women's basketball and softball teams at Sacramento State. She continued her education, earning a master's degree in physical education in 1977.

She and her husband, Gary, have a 23-year old son, Casey. Gary was an internationally certified volleyball official who officiated several international competitions, including the 1984 Olympic Games, the Goodwill Games in Moscow and Seattle, and the 1991 NORCECA Championships in Canada. He was also in charge of coordinating all officials for the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta.

Q&A WITH DEBBY COLBERG

1. Why did you decide to get into coaching?

"We all come into life with natural talents and I was athletic. But, it was much more than having skills come easily. I was absolutely passionate about any activity that remotely resembled a sport. I can't recall a time when I did not know what I wanted to do in life. At the youngest age, it was clear in my mind that I wanted to teach physical education at the secondary school level."

I loved physical education while in junior high and high school because it was the only opportunity I had to be active in sports. It was not until I began college that I was able to compete on an actual athletic team. I thought I had died and gone to heaven.

After I obtained my teaching credential, opportunities to coach were directly tied to teaching positions. Even when I was first hired at Sacramento State, I taught 5-7 classes each semester in addition to my coaching responsibilities. And, while I liked teaching, I found that I absolutely loved coaching no matter what the age level of the athletes. So, when the position turned into full-time coaching, I was very happy."

2. Years from now, when people look back on your career, what do you want them to remember most about you?

"I would like to be remembered for being ethical. There are so many aspects to athletics where it is easy to put winning ahead of ethics. When my team won, I always wanted it to be because we played better than our opponents on that day; not because we cheated recruiting, practiced longer hours than allowed, or decided to delay a game tying our shoe."

3. What is the fondest memory you will take from your 31 years of coaching at Sacramento State?

"There are absolutely hundreds of good memories, too many to recount. The totality of the experience coaching at Sacramento State is absolutely part of my soul. It is the combination of my experiences with the players, my assistant coaches, the staff in the athletics department, my coaching colleagues, and our supporters over the years that allow me to leave having the most fulfilled feeling about my career."

4. What has been the most rewarding aspect of coaching collegiate volleyball?

"The most rewarding aspect of collegiate coaching has been the opportunity to work with young, talented and intelligent women. As coaches, we like to think we have influenced our players to be better people, but my players have had a profound effect on me as well. Their essence as individuals and teams has always motivated me to be a better coach."

5. You've won 10 straight conference championships, and 17 total conference championships. What are the main reasons for the continued success of the program over the years?

"Good athletes with good attitudes."

6. If you could sum up your coaching career in one paragraph, what would you say?

"I feel like I am the luckiest person to have a career where I absolutely love coming to work every day. I have been blessed with so many athletes who have been delightful to know and work with. And, to the few who have been less than delightful, there was always something to like about them. There is so much truth in the saying that 'the journey is much more important than the destination.' I take much more pride in the manner in which my teams trained and competed than I do in any championships."

7. If you needed one swing to win a match, which of your former or current players would you turn to?

"No question.....(All-American outside hitter) Jill Haas."

8. What's next for Debby Colberg?

"I don't have a specific plan. I want to try my hand at some hobbies that I never had a chance to pursue and I want to volunteer my time in the community. I am especially interested in working with either young kids or adults who need help with reading. And, I just might keep my hand in coaching and grab myself a junior team. Essentially, I am going to try a few different things and see what I enjoy."



Ruben Volta



Associate Head Coach • Eighth Season • Sacramento State, '93

Ruben Volta enters his eighth season on the volleyball coaching staff and first as the team's associate head coach. A familiar face for Sacramento State volleyball, Volta will take over the team's head coaching duties in 2008 as current head coach Debby Colberg announced she will retire after the 2007 season.

For the fifth straight year, Volta will serve as the Hornets' recruiting and travel coordinator, while also working with the setters, scouting the opposition and on-floor coaching.

A graduate of Sacramento State in 1993 with a degree in physical education, Volta starred for the men's club team that went undefeated and won the National Club Championship in 1995. That same season, Volta earned All-America honors as a setter and was named all-tourney at the Big 10 Tournament.

In 1995, he opened the High Voltage volleyball facility in Sacramento, and began running a juniors club. During one point in 1997, the club operated 18 juniors teams of different age groups.

In the seven years of High Voltage's existence, the team qualified for the junior nationals (18-open division) five times, including an 11th-place finish in 1996. The junior nationals include the top 32 teams in the country.

Some of his former club players with High Voltage include past Hornets Tasman Dwyer, Brenda Moorlag, Korri Kuelper, Sharon Stutts, Kazmiera Imrie, Holly Olmsted, Sandra Bandimere, Jackie Coudert and current Hornet Michelle Franz. In 2006, he coached the Gold Cal (18-under) Juniors club volleyball team to an 11th-place finish at the junior nationals. That team featured current Hornets Anna Schoener and Cayti Crowton.

He also spent the 2001 season coaching the 18-under Davis club team and spent time as an assistant coach at Rio Americano High School for one season (1999) where he helped guide the Raiders to the Sac-Joaquin Section championship. Prior to that, Volta spent two seasons as the varsity head coach at Country Day High School (1998-99) where the team finished third in the section championships. He started his coaching career at Grant High School in 1992, spending two years as the varsity head coach for the boys and girls teams.

Volta, who resides in Sacramento, also taught physical education at Sacramento's St. Philomenes School from 1999-2002.

Weidi Zhang



Assistant Coach • 21st Season • Shanghai Institute, '66

Weidi Zhang begins his 21st season as a Hornet assistant under Debby Colberg. A 14-year international coaching veteran with 15 years of playing experience, his varied coaching duties include stints as head coach of both the Shanghai women's professional team (1985-87) and the men's professional team (1980-83, 1985-87) as well as the Nigerian National Team (1979-80). Additionally, Zhang spent time as an assistant coach with the Chinese National Team (1983-85).

In 1983, Zhang helped coach the Chinese Men's Olympic Team to a second-place finish at the Asian Volleyball Championships, held in Japan. One year later, that same team placed sixth in the Japan Cup and second in the Christmas Tournament in Holland.

He also coached the Sacramento State men's club team for 13 seasons (1989-2001). During that time, Zhang led the men's team to numerous top 10 finishes and two NIRSA Div. I national titles (1995, 1997).

Zhang was the starting setter and captain of the Chinese National Team in 1975. He helped lead the squad to a third-place finish at the Asian Volleyball Championship that year. Prior to that, he played competitively with a local team from Shanghai (1966-74) which won the national championship on four occasions.

During the course of his playing career (1961-75), Zhang was the starting setter and team captain for all three teams in which he played (Shanghai Youth Volleyball Team, Shanghai Volleyball Team and the Chinese National Team).

Zhang earned a bachelor's degree from the Shanghai Institute of Physical Education in 1966. He has been teaching volleyball classes at Sacramento State for the past 21 years. Weidi and his wife, Xiaoping, have a 33-year old son, Yu Zhang.

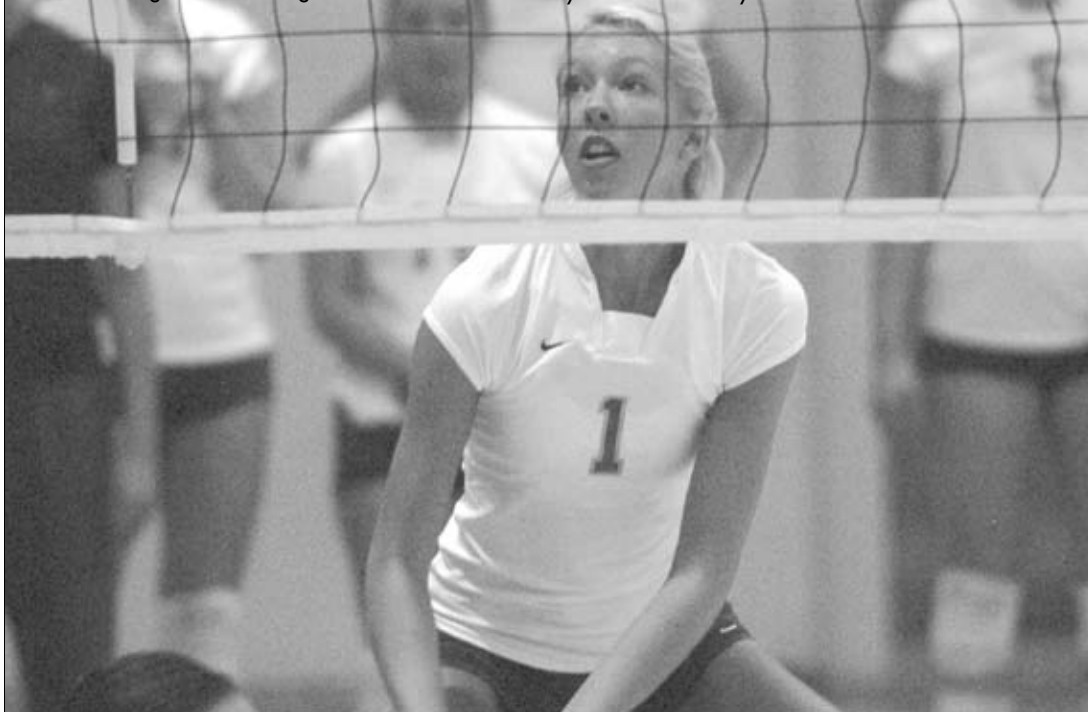

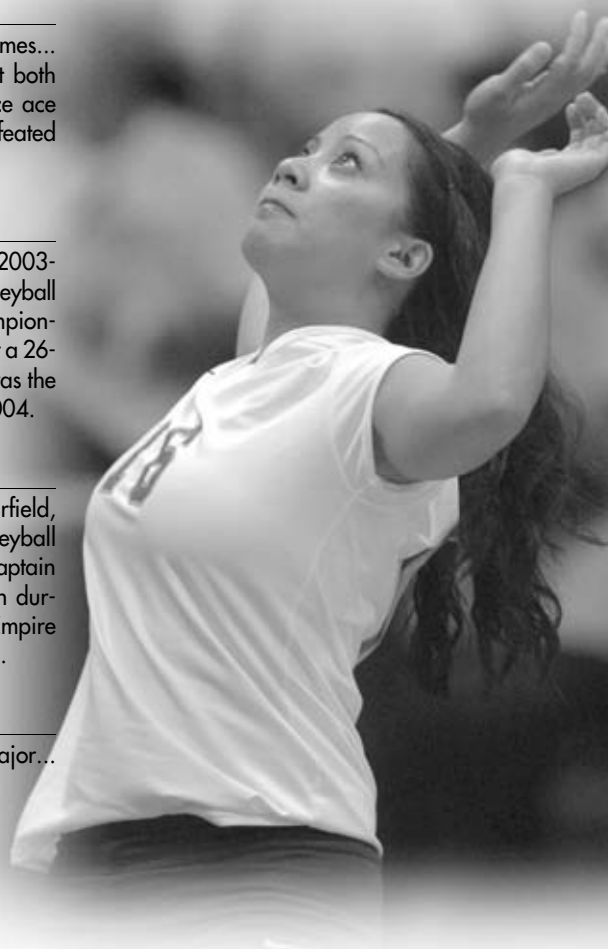

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Big Sky Conference

The Big Sky Conference enters its 45th year of athletic competition in 2007-08. The Big Sky is an NCAA Division I member in all sports, with member institutions classified in the Football Championship Subdivision (formally I-AA). The Big Sky returned to a nine-team format in 2006 with the addition of Northern Colorado.

The current lineup includes Eastern Washington, Idaho State, Montana, Montana State, Northern Arizona, Northern Colorado, Portland State, Sacramento State and Weber State. The league has become one of the strongest Division I conferences in the West and is a national leader in the Football Championship Subdivision.

The Big Sky Conference was established in 1963 by six charter members – Idaho, Idaho State, Gonzaga, Montana, Montana State and Weber State. Those six schools formed the foundation of the Big Sky before the league expanded in 1970 by adding Boise State and Northern Arizona. Gonzaga left the Sky in 1979 and was replaced by Nevada, which gave the league eight members. The conference grew to nine schools in 1987 with the addition of Eastern Washington.

The 1990s saw change in the makeup of the league, beginning in 1992 when Nevada departed and put the Big Sky back at eight teams. In 1996, Boise State and Idaho left and at the same time, the conference added Portland State, Sacramento State and Cal State Northridge. The Big Sky maintained nine teams for five years before Cal State Northridge departed in the spring of 2001.

With the addition of Northern Colorado in 2006-07, the Big Sky spreads across eight states spanning from the Pacific Ocean to the Rocky Mountain Front. The Big Sky is represented along the entire west coast with schools in Washington, Oregon and California. League schools also range up and down the Rocky Mountains with institutions in Montana, Idaho, Utah, Arizona, and now Colorado.

Of the eight western-most states in the contiguous United States, only one, Nevada, is not represented in the Big Sky.

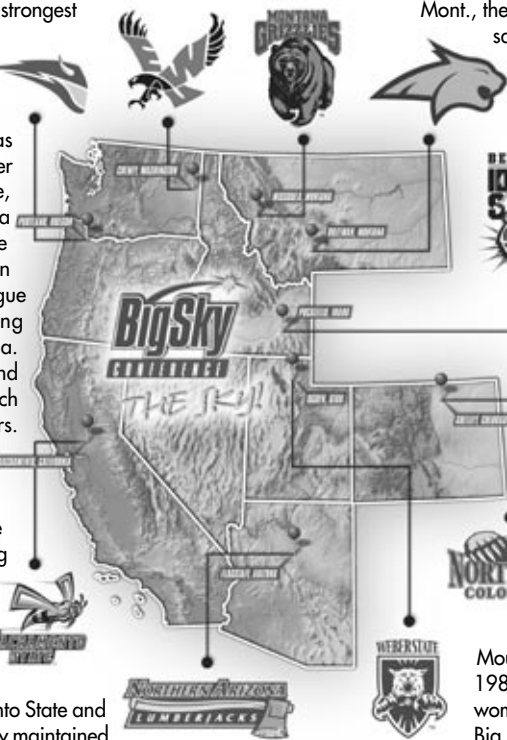
On Feb 25, 1963, the name Big Sky was adopted by the six presidents of the charter members as the name of the new conference. The name Big Sky originated in a novel written by the late A.B. (Bud) Guthrie of Great Falls, Mont., in 1947 entitled "The Big Sky." Jack Hollowell, a former Montana advertising director, promoted the Big Sky theme for the Treasure State. While on a track and field trip from Pocatello, Idaho, to Missoula, Mont., the legendary Dubby Holt of Idaho State saw a "Welcome to Big Sky Country" sign as his team entered Montana.

Holt, and his athletes thought "Big Sky" would be a perfect name for the new conference. Harry Missildine of the Spokane Spokesman-Review called for the newly formed league to be named the Big Sky Conference in his column dated Feb. 20, 1963.

The Big Sky sponsors championships in 14 sports, including men's and women's cross country, indoor and outdoor track and field, basketball and tennis. In addition, there are also championships in football, and women's volleyball, golf and soccer.

The 2007-08 season will mark the 20th year that the Big Sky Conference will sponsor championships in women's sports. The former Mountain West Conference existed from 1982-88, sponsoring championships for women's sports at the same institutions the Big Sky had men's programs. The Big Sky merged with the Mountain West in 1988, forming one league for both men and women.

Doug Fullerton, the fifth commissioner of the Big Sky Conference, will enter his 13th year at the helm. Fullerton took over the Big Sky on July 1, 1995, replacing longtime commissioner Ron Stephenson. Stephenson served the league for 14 years. Steve Belko was the commissioner from 1977-81 while John Roning held the post from 1971-77. The first league commissioner was Jack Friel, who served from 1963-71.

- Sacramento State is the seventh largest university in the 23-campus CSU system, enrolling a multicultural student body of 28,529. The 300-acre campus is sheltered by more than 3,000 trees and dotted with flower gardens.
- The University is in the midst of an ambitious new master plan that will remake Sacramento State into a residential campus and add some 1.5 million square feet of building space. The plan, to guide campus growth in coming decades, includes housing for as many as 5,000 students and an arena and wellness center. It also envisions a performing arts center, new classroom buildings as high as eight stories, a space science center, parking structures and a green mall down the center of campus.
- One in 26 residents of the six-county Sacramento Region is a Sacramento State graduate. The University directly and indirectly contributes more than \$900 million to the region's economy annually.
- Unlimited bus and light rail service throughout Sacramento is free for University students. Students may attend all home athletic events for free and attend other campus events for free or at a discount. More than half the students join one of the more than 200 student organizations, which include 35 fraternities and sororities.
- Sacramento State offers 60 undergraduate and 40 graduate degrees in eight Colleges. Teacher education is the largest academic program, followed by business, criminal justice, communication studies, psychology and computer science. The student-to-faculty ratio is 20 to 1; more than 70 percent of classes have fewer than 30 students.
- Full-time undergraduate fees for the 2007-08 academic year are \$1,642 each semester, well below the national average for four-year public institutions. Two-thirds of students receive some form of financial aid, and more than 70 percent of Sacramento State students work.

- The criminal justice program, which attracts students from all over the world, is one of the largest in the United States.
- About 36 percent of Sacramento State students do volunteer work, gaining valuable work experience while helping their community. Hundreds of students work in government-related internships and fellowships. Others earn academic credit while working in paid positions through the cooperative education program, which is the largest in California.
- Almost 700 new school teachers graduate from Sacramento State each year.
- Seventy-eight percent of students say that Sacramento State was their first or only choice.
- Sacramento State was the site of the 2003, 2005, 2006 and 2007 NCAA Div. I Track & Field Championships, and the Sacramento State Aquatic Center was the site of the 1997, 1999, 2004 and 2005 NCAA Women's Rowing Championships. This year, Sacramento State will host the NCAA Div. I Women's Volleyball Final Four on Dec. 13-15 at Arco Arena.
- Sacramento State hosted the most successful U.S. Olympic Track and Field Trials ever in 2000, and hosted the event again in 2004.
- Famous Sacramento State alumni include actor Tom Hanks, Grammy award winner Bobby McFerrin, former co-host of *Good Morning America* Joan Lunden, former host of the *Early Show* Rene Syler, stand-up comedian Brian Posehn, actor Carlos Alazraqui, film director Joe Carnahan, Stockton mayor Edward Chavez, famous economist and author Richard J. Maybury, former *KTLA Morning News* Giselle Fernández and founding member of the Village People David Hodo.
- Famous Sacramento State athletics alumni include retired nine-year NFL offensive lineman and two-time Super Bowl winner John Gesek, Oakland Raiders offensive coordinator Greg Knapp, 10-year NFL fullback Daimon Shelton, seven-year New England Patriots long snapper and three-time Super Bowl winner Lonie Paxton, former 12-year NFL defensive back Lorenzo Lynch, New York Jets offensive lineman Marko Cavka, CFL Edmonton Eskimos quarterback Ricky Ray, CFL Winnipeg Blue Bombers running back Charles Roberts, and longtime Arena Football League quarterback Aaron Garcia.

It has also become a tourist center with attractions including the State Capitol building, North America's largest railroad museum, the Old Sacramento historic area, the California State History Museum and the Crocker Art Museum.

• Founded in 1849, Sacramento is the cultural, education, business and governmental center of a four-county metropolitan region.

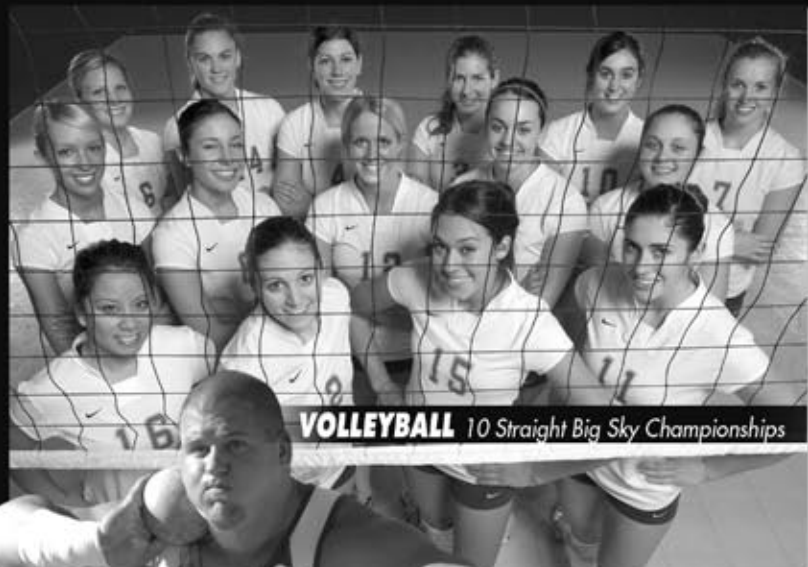

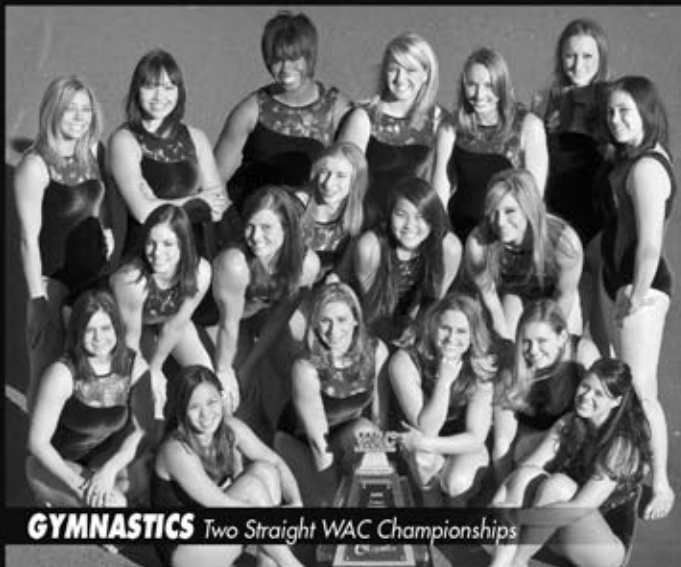

ALEXANDER GONZALEZ

UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT

Dr. Alexander Gonzalez is the 11th president of California State University, Sacramento – the capital city's only comprehensive university and one of the largest campuses in the California State University system.

Dr. Gonzalez was appointed President of Sacramento State in 2003, bringing new energy and a focused vision to the University. He is overseeing an initiative known as Destination 2010, which is designed to make Sacramento State a premier metropolitan university and a destination campus for the West. Among the priorities are enhancing academic programs and student services; new academic buildings; new on- and near-campus student housing; a faculty and staff village near campus; and a new Recreation and Wellness Center.

Before coming to Sacramento, Dr. Gonzalez served from 1997 to 2003 as President of Cal State San Marcos. At San Marcos, he oversaw a period of rapid growth as well as many successful fundraising campaigns. He also spent 18 years at Fresno State, starting as a faculty member in the Psychology Department, which he later chaired. From 1991 to 1997, he served as the university's Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs.

Dr. Gonzalez is a member of the Board of Trustees at Pomona College. He also serves on the Sutter Health Board of Directors and the Board of Directors for Valley Vision.

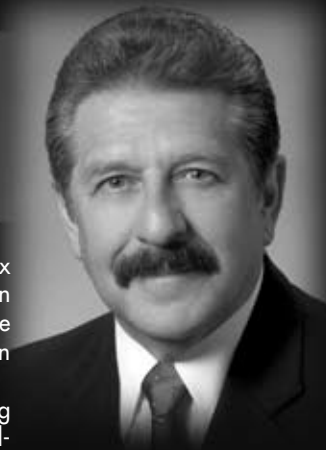
Dr. Gonzalez previously served on President Bush's Advisory Commission on Educational Excellence for Hispanic Americans. His service on a number of

other boards and commissions includes six years as a Commissioner for the Western Association of Schools and Colleges, the agency that accredits higher education institutions in the western United States.

He also served as Chair of the Governing Board of the Hispanic Association of Colleges and Universities. His service to the CSU system includes serving on a work group that reviewed and recommended action on remedial education, and, more recently, as a member of a committee of presidents considering policy on enrollment management, the CSU's Technology Steering Committee, and the Institute for Teaching and Learning.

Dr. Gonzalez holds a doctorate and master's degree in Psychology from UC Santa Cruz. He received his bachelor's degree in history from Pomona College, where he graduated with honors and was elected to Phi Beta Kappa. He spent a year at Stanford University as a postdoctoral fellow of the Ford Foundation and the National Research Council conducting research on the psychology of time. He also attended Harvard Law School.

Dr. Gonzalez and his wife Gloria have been married for more than 35 years. They are the parents of two adult sons.



TERRY WANLESS

ATHLETICS DIRECTOR

Dr. Terry Wanless' five-year tenure as Sacramento State's Director of Athletics has seen growth unparalleled in the school's 16-year Division I history. His vision of broad success in the department came to fruition in the 2006-07 academic year where the Hornets claimed an unprecedented eight conference championships. That total included an amazing four titles which came in a four-hour span on May 29.

Wanless has also overseen significant facility enhancement to the athletic facilities. The biggest change will come in early 2008 with the opening of the Broad Athletic Facility. The building will serve as the home to the Hornet football and track and field programs as well as athletic training and strength and conditioning.

The Broad Athletic Facility is the first step of an elaborate plan that began with the passing of a referendum by the Sacramento State student body. That vote will also lead to the creation of a recreation and wellness center which will benefit the entire student body.

Wanless, who is entering his sixth year with the Hornets, has been a visible member of the Sacramento State athletics family, constantly representing the University and department at public outings and speaking engagements. His commitment to the student-athlete has also been clear as both he and his wife, Joanne, attend the majority of Hornet home athletic events and support several teams on the road.

His leadership and academic support have been evident to the student-athletes in other ways as well. The department's Life Skills Program has seen rapid growth, significantly increasing the number of summer and fifth-year scholarships available to Hornet student-athletes. The Life Skills program has also launched the program's first computer lab and offers Hornet student-athletes tutoring as well as academic counseling.

Additionally, Wanless instituted a number of new programs, including the Athletics Director's Academic Achievement Award – presented to each student-athlete that achieves a term GPA of 3.0 or higher. Those academic efforts have paid early dividends. Over the last five years, Sacramento State student-athletes have posted over 1,300 term GPAs of 3.0 or above. Additionally, over 300 Hornets have earned conference all-academic honors during that same time period.

His efforts in restoring the department's booster club structure as well as aggressively improving the University's collegiate licensing program, while not readily

visible, are projects that will surely enhance the program's financial footing in years to come.

Athletically, the Hornets have also seen continued growth and success on the field of play. During his five years at Sacramento State, 21 teams and 43 individuals have advanced to conference and NCAA postseason competition. In addition, the 2006-07 season saw eight sports (volleyball, gymnastics, men's indoor track and field, women's tennis, men's tennis, women's golf, men's golf and rowing) win their conference title.

Wanless' efforts to put the Hornets on the map have been instrumental in helping make Sacramento State the unofficial "home of NCAA Championships". The Hornets have been tabbed to serve as the host institution for 2007 Div. I Volleyball Championships as well as the 2008 Div. I Women's Golf West Regional.

Additionally, Sacramento State has served as host to six NCAA championships (four track, two rowing) as well as the 2004 U.S. Olympic Trials for Track and Field during Wanless' first five years of leadership.

Prior to Sacramento State, Wanless served as athletics director at the University of North Dakota from 1990-1999, guiding the program to one of its most successful decades in school history. During that time, North Dakota enjoyed strong competitive success, winning four NCAA national championships and 36 conference titles. Additionally, 25 other teams finished second in their respective conference standings.

Before his position at North Dakota, Wanless was director of intercollegiate athletics at Western Carolina for four years and held a variety of positions, including director of intercollegiate athletics, at Towson University in Maryland.

Wanless earned a bachelor's degree in physical education from Black Hills State, a master's degree in physical education from Northern Illinois and a doctorate in athletics administration from Temple. He and his wife, Joanne, are the parents of two children. Their daughter, Heather, and her husband, Chad Collins, reside in Lexington, Ky., with their daughter Hadley. Their son Troy, and his wife, Jesi, live in Minneapolis.



ACADEMIC & COMPLIANCE

The Student-Athlete Resource Center

The Student-Athlete Resource Center offers academic advising, tutoring and mentoring, NCAA rules education and compliance, athletic financial services support, and life skills programming for all student-athletes of Sacramento State's Division I Intercollegiate Athletics program.

The S.A.R.C.'s services and programming are provided in an assortment of ways including individual advising, orientations, group and team meetings, coaches' compliance and rules education sessions, freshmen seminar classes, and a variety of student development and academic workshops. S.A.R.C. Director Paul Edwards and Academic Athletic Services Coordinator Laurie Dahlberg serve as the primary advisors to the student-athletes.

Under the direction of Life Skills and Student-Athlete Development Coordinator Mark McGushin, the Student-Athlete Academic & Life Skills Lab is available to student-athletes as a study area and to meet with tutors.

Additionally, McGushin coordinates the mentoring program which addresses student-athletes experiencing academic difficulties. The S.A.R.C. also provides additional services, guest speakers

and work shops related to finding information on campus, in the community and NCAA resources in a variety of areas related to student life, welfare and career opportunities.

Athletic Compliance and Financial Services Director Katherine Zedonis and Compliance Coordinator Tina Westerhold are responsible for the administration of NCAA eligibility rules education and compliance for all intercollegiate teams, including issues related to athletic financial aid of student-athletes. The Athletic Compliance Office is responsible for developing, monitoring and enforcing a compliance program that ensures the integrity of the institution within the guidelines of the NCAA, Big Sky Conference and the University.

Admission Counselor/NCAA Initial Eligibility Coordinator Josh Collins services Sacramento State student-athletes with admission processing responsibilities and monitoring of NCAA initial-eligibility requirements. Collins works closely with both new transfer and incoming freshmen student-athletes. He is the main contact at Sacramento State for student-athletes working with NCAA Clearinghouse procedures.

The goal of the athletic training staff is to provide all Sacramento State student-athletes with high quality health care. Headed by full-time certified athletic trainers, the Hornets' athletic training facility provides state-of-the-art support and the services of highly trained sports medicine and health care professionals.

Should an injury occur, student-athletes are seen immediately by their sport's specific athletic trainer, and are referred, when necessary, to the appropriate medical provider or facility.

Sacramento State boasts three training facilities (two located in the physical education complex and one at the Hornet Stadium fieldhouse). All training facilities are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabilitative apparatus.

A staff of three team physicians (Dr. Alan Hirahara, Dr. Ronald Sockolov, Dr. Harold Strauch) and a skillful and talented athletic training staff tend to the medical and rehabilitative needs of each and every student-athlete. Also assisting in the health of the student-athletes is a Kaiser physician, two dentists, a physical therapist and a chiropractor.

Sacramento State's athletic training staff consists of three full-time certified athletic trainers, three graduate assistants and more than 15 athletic training students preparing for a career in sports medicine.
