REDDIES FACE EMPORIA STATE IN NCAA PLAYOFFS

Henderson State will play host to Emporia State in the second round of the NCAA Division II Football Playoffs. The Reddies recorded their first-ever NCAA playoff win with a 23-16 victory over Sioux Falls last weekend.



Henderson State, ranked No. 8 in the AFCA Coaches Poll, have won 10 straight games and have improved to 11-1 on the season.

REDDIE REPORT

Henderson State is the first team as members of the Great American Conference to record a playoff win. The conference was winless in five tries prior to last week's win by the Reddies.

Henderson's has been superb defensively all season allowing opponents to score just 14.8 points per game which ranks third nationally. The Reddies surrendered 422 yards to Sioux Falls last week, however the Cougars were only able to reach pay dirt once.

Henderson will have to contain Harlon Hill candidate quarterback **Brent Wilson**. Opponents have totaled just nine touchdowns passing this season. Henderson allows 189.2 yards passing per game and has recorded a national-leading 27 interceptions.

Thirteen different Reddies have recorded interceptions this season led by **Gary Vines**, **Tavares Garner** and **Darius Thomas** with four picks each.

Linebackers **Josh Davis** and **Lawson Schulz** lead the Reddie defense with Davis having 94 tackles along with a team-best 12.5 tackles for lost yardage. The junior from El Dorado, Ark. also had a team-best 11 tackles last weekend against Sioux Falls.

Schulz has totaled 90 tackles after 10 stops a week ago. The junior from Atlanta, Texas has 9.0 tackles for lost yardage as well as seven pass break-ups and five quarterback hurries.

Henderson's offense averages just 372.5 yards per contest which ranks 10th in the GAC.

Dallas Hardison did not have a huge passing day last week, but moved the Reddies down the field when it counted. The junior from Bentonville has completed 199-of-324 passes for 2213 yards for a 61.5 percentage. Hardison's passing yardage this season ranks eighth in HSU history.

Jaquan Cole went over the 1,000 yard mark last week having 144 yards to run his total to 1119 yards on 204 carries.

Seven Reddie receivers have 100 or more yards this season led by **JaVante Mack** who has totaled 44 receptions for 481 yards and four touchdowns.

Corey Chappell follows with 408 yards on 26 receptions.

ABOUT EMPORIA STATE

Emporia State is ranked 18th nationally and enters the game with a 10-2 record following a thrilling 51-49 win over Minnesota State-Mankato in the opening round of the playoffs last week.

The Hornets average 36.9 points and 329.6 yards passing per game. Quarterback **Brent Wilson** was named the Offensive Player of the Year in the MIAA. The senior from Ponca City, Okla. is ranked second among active players in NCAA Division II in passing yards per attempt, fourth in completion percentage, fifth passing efficiency, seventh in touchdown passes, and eighth in total offense per play. Wilson has completed 308-of-470 passes for 3,420 yards and 39 touchdowns. Last week against MSU-Mankato, Wilson completed 27-of-48 passes for a season-best 437 yards and five touchdowns.

Kavaski Ervin was a second-team All-MIAA performer at wide receiver despite leading the MIAA in receiving yards, receptions and ranking second in touchdown catches. Ervin has 1101 yards on 75 receptions and 11 touchdowns. Last week Ervin had 6 catches for 139 yards and three touchdowns. **Mitchell Foote** is also a prime target and is a first-team All-MIAA pick. Foote leads the MIAA in touchdown catches with 12 and has compiled 837 yards on 75 receptions.

Antonio Brown leads the ESU ground game having 586 yards on 153 carries.

Defensively, the Hornets have totaled 34.0 sacks and 88.0 tackles for loss. **Josh Monteaquedo** leads the team with 93 tackles along with 8.0 tackles for loss. Monteaquedo also has four pass breakups.

Linebacker **Jason Tetuan** was an honorable mention All-MIAA pick after having 81 total tackles and a team best 14.5 tackles for loss.

Also a big performer on defense is **Kole Schankie** who has 92 tackles which includes 13.0 tackles for loss and four sacks.

REDDIES PICK UP FIRST PLAYOFF WIN

The third time was a charm for Henderson State as the Reddies won their first-ever NCAA playoff game with a 23-16 victory over No. 16 Sioux Falls. The No. 8 Reddies picked off Harlon Hill Candidate quarterback Luke Papillion three times including one on USF's final drive to secure the victory for Henderson.

Henderson scored on its opening possession as Jaquan Cole broke free for a 10 yard run around right end to put the Reddies on top 7-0.

Sioux Falls moved the ball down field on its opening drive, but the Reddie defense held strong and forced a 31-yard field goal by Brett Garner as the Cougars cut the Reddie lead to 7-3 with 7:59 left in the first quarter.

Henderson would stop a USF drive late in the quarter when Gary Vines intercepted a Luke Papillion pass and returned it to the Reddie 24.

USF would advance the ball to midfield but be forced to punt. Darion Gray would take Stuart Vanden-Heuval's kick and return it 51 yards to the USF 40 to set up Henderson's next score. On 3rd-and-10, Hardison would hit Joseph Snapp on a crossing route for 38 yards down to the Cougar 2. Two plays later, Hardison would score from the 1 to put HSU on top 14-3.

USF would add a 21-yard field goal by Garner, and score its only touchdown of the game late in the half on a 3-yard plunge by Papillion to make the score 14-13 at the break.

Midway through the third quarter, Henderson would put together a 12-play, 69-yard drive with Hardison finding Mark Czaus on the sidelines for an 18-yard touchdown to increase the Reddie lead to 21-13.

Henderson's defense would put the next points on the board as Jordan Dominguez along with several other Reddies chased Papillion back into his own end zone where he attempted to get rid of the football. However, Papillion's pass never cross the line of scrimmage and was penalized for intentional grounding which resulted in a safety to increase the HSU lead to 23-13.

Sioux Falls would make it a one possession game with 5:32 remaining as Garner booted a 25-yard field goal to make the score 23-16.

The Cougars had one last chance getting the ball back with 1:57 remaining and starting from their own 18-yardline.

Papillion began moving his team down field and converted on a 3rd-and-7 and a 4th-and -6 to keep the drive alive. With time ticking away and USF facing a 2nd-and-5 from the Reddie 24, Papillion was again under pressure by the Reddie defense and threw an errant pass that was picked off by Tiyun Avery with 10 seconds left in the game.

Cole ended the game with 147 yards rushing on 31 attempts becoming the 10th player in HSU history to rush for 1,000 yards in a single season.

ELEVEN AGAIN

Henderson State recorded its 11th win of the season last week against Sioux Falls. It is the fourth time in school history that a Reddie team has totaled 11 wins in a season. Henderson was 11-2 in 1974 and followed with an 11-1 record in 1975. The Reddies were 11-1 most recently in 2013. No team in HSU history has won 12 games.

WINNING THE CLOSE ONES

The Reddies have played their fair share of close games this season. Eight of Henderson's 12 games have been decided by one possession or less. In those eight games, Henderson is 7-1 with the lone loss being a 35-28 setback to East Central the second week of the season.

HENDERSON STATE PLAYOFF HISTORY

Henderson State will play its fourth NCAA Division II playoff game on Saturday. The Reddies have advanced to the NCAA Playoffs three times in the last four years, winning their first game last week against Sioux Falls.

All of Henderson's playoff games have been played at Carpenter-Haygood Stadium.

Henderson made the jump to the NCAA Division II in 1993 following a successful stint at the NAIA level.

The 2015 NCAA Division II playoff game will mark only the fifth time in Henderson history that the Reddies have appeared in any type of playoff.

Henderson State first appeared in a post-season playoff game in 1974 when the Reddies played in the NAIA playoffs. The Reddies defeated Elon 21-7 in the opening round game, but lost in the NAIA National Championship to Texas A&M Commerce (formerly Texas A&I) 34-23.

Henderson's also made a post-season appearance in 1975 when the Reddies faced East Central (Oklahoma) in the Bicentennial Bowl at War Memorial Stadium. The Reddies won the game 27-14.

In 1985, the Reddies opened the NAIA playoffs with an 18-15 win over Central State (Oklahoma), before losing in the semifinals to Central Arkansas 21-9.

The Reddies first appeared in the **NCAA Division II** playoffs for the first time in 2012. Henderson State earned a bye in the first round and played host to Missouri Western in the second round. The Reddies lost to the Griffons 45-21. In that game against Missouri Western, the Reddies kept the game close early but the Griffins scored twice before the half and built a 31-14 halftime lead.

Kevin Rodgers ended the game completing 37-of-65 passes for 412 yards but was picked off four times. **Robert Jordan** caught nine passes for 125 yards and became only the third player in Henderson State history to end the year with more than 1,000 yards receiving. **Dustin Holland** went over 100 yards for the third time this season having 10 receptions for 103 yards.

Keaton Stigger led Henderson's defense with 16 tackles including 10 solo stops, while **Maxie Graham** ended the game with 13 tackles.

Henderson hosted an opening round game in 2013 as the Reddies played host to St. Cloud State.

Three first-half turnovers proved costly for Henderson as No. 12 St. Cloud State upended the No. 4 Reddies 40-35, in the first round of the NCAA Division II Playoffs.

The Reddies totaled four turnovers which led to 13 points for St. Cloud State. Rodgers, the two-time Great American Conference Offensive Player of the Year, completed 41-of-54 passes for 567 yards and four touchdowns. The Rockwall, Texas product went over the 10,000-yard career passing mark as he finished the season with a HSU and GAC record 4,807 yards to run his career total to 10,076 yards and 90 touchdowns in 30 games played.

Darius Davis also made Reddie history setting the HSU single-season receiving record after having 10 catches for 213. Davis ended the season with 1597 yards surpassing the previous HSU record of 1505 yards set by Chad Luttrell in 2000.

15 NAMED TO ALL-GAC TEAM, COLE OFFENSIVE POY



For the fourth consecutive year, a Henderson State player has been named the GAC Offensive Player of the Year as running back **Jaquan Cole** earned the honor this season. A total of 15 Reddies earned all-conference honors including nine first-team honorees.

Cole has rushed for 972 yards in nine games this season averaging 108 yards per contest.

Earning first-team offensive honors along with Cole is wide receiver **JaVante Mack** and center **Cory Stittle**.

Mack is Henderson's top receiver having 42 receptions for 452 yards and four touchdowns, while Stittle has started all 11 games at center for the Reddies and has graded out as one of Henderson's best lineman each week.

Four defensive players garnered first-team honors including outside linebacker **Josh Davis**, defensive tackle **Grady Ollison**, and safeties **Gary Vines** and **Kenrick Burns**.

Davis is HSU's top defender with 83 tackles along with a team-best 11.5 tackles for lost yardage. The junior from El Dorado, Ark. also has seven pass break-ups and seven quarterback hurries.

Ollison has compiled 34 tackles including 6.0 stops for lost yardage.

Vines and Burns have played a big role in the Reddies leading the nation in interceptions.

Vines has 61 stops this year with 3 interceptions to his credit. Burns also has three picks this season to go along with 39 tackles and 6 break-ups.

On special teams, **Houston Ray** was selected as the league's top kicker, with **James Jackson** also earning first-team specialist honors.

Ray leads the team in scoring with 81 points from 15 of 19 FG's and 36 of 38 PAT's. A 3-time GAC Player of the Week selection, Ray leads the GAC and ranks fourth in Division II in field goals per game.

Jackson has played an instrumental role on Henderson's special teams.

Five Reddies were selected to the All-GAC Second-Team including fullback **Ryan McDonald**, defensive end **Trevon Del Rio**, inside linebacker **Lawson Schulz**, corner back **Tavares Garner** and offensive lineman **Lawrence Willis**.

McDonald has been the Reddies' short yardage guy this season. The Charleston, Ark. product has scored nine touchdowns this season.

Del Rio has been solid on the defensive front with 19 stops including 4.5 tackles for lost yardage.

Schulz is second on the team in tackles with 80 stops along with 9.0 tackles for lost yardage. The junior from Atlanta, Texas also has six pass break-ups and five quarterback hurries.

Garner is one of the league's best corner backs having 12 pass break ups and four interceptions. The junior from Missouri City, Texas has compiled 42 tackles on the year.

Return specialist **Darion Gray** was an honorable mention pick having totaled 196 yards on 12 punt returns this season.

Since the inception of the GAC in 2011, Henderson has totaled 66 All-GAC selections including 36 first-team honorees.

Coach Scott Maxfield has compiled 79 wins at HSU and has 108 career coaching victories. Maxfield's 79 wins are second most in program history. **Sporty Carpenter** holds the all-time record for wins with 119 in 19 seasons at Henderson.

Since 2010, the winningest coach in GAC history has led his teams to three conference championships, three NCAA postseason appearances, and have compiled a 53-13 record, the best among all four-year Arkansas institutions. Maxfield has also led the Reddies to a 40-4 Great American Conference record which included a streak of 27 straight games.

ANOTHER WINNING SEASON

With Henderson's 41-3 win over Arkansas-Monticello on Oct. 17, the Reddies clinched their sixth straight winning season. The accomplishment has only been done once before from 1973 to 1978 when Sporty Carpenter led the Reddies to six straight winning seasons and four AIC Championships.

In his 11 years, coach **Scott Maxfield** has recorded nine non-losing seasons with the Reddies only having losing records in 2005 (3-8) and 2009 (3-7). Only Sporty Carpenter has more non-losing seasons with 12 in 19 years.

THE HENDERSON STATE SPORTS NETWORK

Henderson State University Athletics has once again joined with Southwest Arkansas Media for radio broadcasts of Reddie Athletics in 2015-16. The Henderson State Sports Network will include the flagships station of 100.9 FM KDEL in Arkadelphia, covering all of southwest Arkansas; 100.7 FM and 1310 AM in Malvern, which also covers Hot Springs, and 103.3 FM and 690 AM in Benton, Ark. In addition to the Southwest Arkansas Media stations, HSSN will also include 920 AM, The Sports Animal in Little Rock for the 2015 football season.

Phil Elson begins his fifth season as the Voice of the Reddies with **RJ Hawk** providing color commentary. Elson is also the Voice of the University of Arkansas Women's Basketball and Razorback Baseball.

Hawk, who serves as the Voice of Reddie Basketball, handles the Buzz football broadcasts of the High School Game of the Week as well as the High School football, basketball and baseball State Championships. HSU sports information assistant **Hunter Lively** provides sideline reports throughout the broadcast.

TALKING ABOUT DALLAS: NOT THE COWBOYS

Reddie quarterback **Dallas Hardison** has led Henderson to nine straight wins entering the playoffs. The junior struggled a bit to begin the season completing 94-of-154 passes for 888 yards with 5 interceptions and 5 touchdowns in the first five game. The Bentonville product has made vast improvement and completing 105-of-170 (62%) for 1,325 yards, 8 touchdowns and just two picks. Hardison's last interception came against Southern Arkansas on Oct. 24. He has thrown 93 passes with out an interception and just one pick in the last 160 attempts.

FORCING THOSE TURNOVERS

Henderson leads the GAC in turnover margin and ranks fifth nationally having a turnover margin of +17. Shippensburg and Slippery Rock leads the nation with a turnover margin of +20. The Reddies have forced 27 interceptions and recovered seven fumbles while the Henderson offense has turned the ball over 17 times.

PICKIN' AND GRINNIN'

Henderson's defense not only leads the GAC but also leads the nation in interceptions with 27. The Reddies had three picks last week against Sioux Falls. HSU had a season best five picks in games against Northwestern Okla. and Southwestern Okla. Stevenson of NCAA Division III leads all of NCAA Football with 29 interceptions. Arkansas State leads in the FBS ranks with 21 picks, while Jacksonville is top in FCS with 19.

IN THE RED ZONE

Henderson State's RED ZONE defense ranks first in the Great American Conference and 26th nationally. Opponents have a success rate of just 72.2 percent in the RED ZONE against the Reddies scoring 26 of 36 times. Opponents have scored 18 touchdowns and eight field goals within the RED ZONE.

Offensively, the Reddies rank third in the GAC in RED ZONE scoring converting 86.0 percent (43-of-50) including 32 touchdowns.

LIFE BEGINS AT 40

Henderson State has won 36 straight games when scoring 40 or more points in a game. The last time Henderson State eclipsed the 40-point plateau and lost was on September 20, 2008 when the Reddies suffered a 51-48 setback to Arkansas-Monticello. Henderson State has a 95-3 record all-time when scoring 40 points or more in a game. The other losses include a defeat by UAM in 2003 (55-50) and to Arkansas Tech in 2000 (42-40).

FIRST AND TEN

- Henderson State has recorded at least nine wins each of the last four seasons. It is only the first time that the feat has occurred in HSU history.
- The Reddies have won 22 straight road games dating back to a 28-3 loss to South Alabama in Mobile, Ala. on Oct. 29, 2011.
- Henderson has scored in 121 of 140 quarters played in the last 35 games. The Reddies have scored in 36 of 48 quarters this season.
- The Reddies have not been shutout in 136 games dating back to a 42-0 loss to McNeese State on August 30, 2003.

FIFTY IS FIFTY

Since 2012 Henderson has scored 50 or more points in 15 of 35 games. Since Scott Maxfield's arrival in 2005, the Reddies are 20-0 when hitting the half-century mark. All-time, HSU is 38-1 when scoring 50 or more points in a game. The lone loss was a 55-50 setback to Arkansas-Monticello in 2003.

HOME SWEET HOME

Since Coach Scott Maxfield's arrival, the Reddies have a 42-15 (.737) record at home including a 5-0 record in 2006 and 2010 at Carpenter-Haygood Stadium. The Reddies have a 26-7 record over the past six years at CHS.

In Maxfield's 11 years at Henderson, 2008 was the only season the Reddies failed to go .500 or better at home. In fact, the Reddies have not lost three straight home games in any one season since 2004.

GAME 1: Henderson State 23, Southeastern 16 Sept. 3, 2015 • Durant, Okla. • 2,515

Kenrick Burns' pass break-up with 52 seconds left in the game, helped lead Henderson State to a 23-16 win over Southeastern Oklahoma.

Southeastern began the final drive at its own 33 with 7:08 to play in the game and slowly moved the ball into Henderson territory. With under two minutes to play, the Storm faced 4th-and-10 at the HSU 30. Quarterback Ryan Polite was able to connect with Kaymon Farmer for a 25-yard pick up down to the Reddies 5-yardline to set up 1st-and-goal. Defensive tackles Henry Davis and Trevon Del Rio stopped Nelson Akinwande for no gain. On 2nd-and-goal, Polite hit Farmer in the flats but Gary Vines stopped the SOSU receiver at the HSU 3.

After an incomplete pass and three consecutive timeouts, Polite tried to connect with Franky Okafor in the end zone, but Burns batted the ball down to secure the win. Trailing 3-0, Dallas Hardison would orchestrate a 7-play, 65-yard drive that would result in Henderson's first points of the new season. The junior from Bentonville, Ark. made key throws to JaVante Mack for 9 yards and Jalen Jones for 15 yards, moving the ball down to the SOSU 25-yardline. JaQuan Cole then broke free behind left tackle for a 22-yard pick-up down to the Storm 3, before Ryan McDonald punched it in on the next play to put Henderson on top 7-3.

The Reddies defense would come up big late in the second quarter to set up Henderson's next score. With SOSU driving into the "red zone", Burns forced a Devlon Wortham fumble which was taken by linebacker Donovan McLeod and returned 71 yards down to the Storm 10-yardline. On the next play, Hardison connected with Mack for a 10-yard score putting the Reddies on top 14-3.

With Henderson leading 14-9 in the third quarter, Cole bounced his way into the end zone for a 10-yard score. Houston Ray's point after attempt was blocked and the score stood at 20-9 with 8:31 left in the third quarter.

Henderson's final points came on a 30-yard field goal by Ray to increase the Reddies lead to 23-9 with 11:32 to play in the game.

Offensively, Henderson State finished with 272 yards of total offense on 63 plays while the Storm totaled 407 yards on 79 attempts. Cole led the Reddie ground game with 84 yards rushing while Hardison completed 19-28 for 160 yards.

Defensively, Lawson Schulz had a career-high 13 tackles to lead the Reddies while Tiyun Avery had seven tackles.

GAME 2: East Central 35, Henderson State 28 Sept. 10, 2015 • Arkadelphia, Ark. • 4,358

Henderson State's late rally fell short as East Central upended the Reddies 35-28.

After ECU took the lead with 3:15 to play, Dallas Hardison completed five consecutive passes including a 24-yard circus catch by Mark Czaus down to the Tiger 29. It appeared that the Reddies scored when Hardison hit Corey Chappell in the back of the end zone on 2nd-and-15. However, the play was nullified as Henderson was guilty of a holding penalty. Two plays later, the Reddies faced 3rd-and-19 from the 25. Hardison would find Chappell on a crossing pattern for 21 yards but Jameel Whitney made a touchdown saving tackle at the 4. The game would end with Hardison slipping on the turf attempting to avoid the Tiger defense.

The Reddies jumped out to a quick 7-0 lead as Dallas Hardison connected with Jacoby Lewis from 55 yards out in the opening two minutes of the game.

ECU would tie the game on its opening possession before Hardison orchestrated a 9-play, 75-yard drive capped off by a 1-yard plunge by Ryan McDonald.

Hardison later found JaVante Mack in the flats for a 54-yard touchdown as Henderson increased its lead to 21-7.

After ECU tied the game at 21-21, the Reddies would regain the lead just before half as Hardison threw his third touchdown pass of the game as Lewis came across the middle for a 14-yard score.

ECU would tie the score on the opening possession of the second half as the Tigers drove the ball 72 yards on 11 plays capped off by a 12 pass from Rocky Moore to David Moore.

After totaling 329 yards of offense in the opening half, the Tiger defense limited Henderson to 139 yards in the second half with 51 yards coming on the final drive. The Reddies finished with 468 total yards including 375 yards passing.

Hardison completed 28-of-44 for a career-high 375 yards and three touchdowns.

Chappell caught six passes for 138 yards, while Mack had 10 catches for 84 yards and Lewis four receptions for 82 yards.

JaQuan Cole had 72 yards on 13 rushing attempts to lead the Henderson ground game. Josh Davis led Henderson's defense with 12 tackles, while Donovan McLeod had seven stops.

Henderson State scored nearly every way possible as the Reddies beat Northwestern Oklahoma 25-17. Coach Scott Maxfield reached a milestone as he picked up his 100th career coaching win including 71 at Henderson State.

The Reddies held a 25-3 lead midway through the fourth quarter but had to hold off a furious charge by NWOSU as the Rangers got an interception return for a touchdown by Jordan Norris and then got a 55-yard touchdown pass from Reid Miller to Arte' Miura taking advantage of a HSU defender falling down.

The Reddie defense would then take over the rest of the way getting a sack by Grady Ollison while Lawson Schulz pressured Miller and had a key tackle down the stretch for a 3-yard loss. Kenrick Burns came up with the final big defensive play with an interception to end the game.

Corey Chappell opened the game with a record-setting 103-yard kickoff return for a touchdown. The Reddies made the score 8-0 as Mark Czaus ran for the extra point following Chappell's big return.

Northwestern Oklahoma got on the board late in the first quarter on a 35-yard field goal by Will Hawkins, but the Reddies would answer as Houston Ray kicked a 26-yarder of his own with 13:13 left in the second quarter to make the score 11-3.

Henderson's defense, which limited the Rangers to just 100 yards of offense in the first-half, put points on the board midway through the second half.

With NWOSU's Miller getting pressure from the Reddie defensive line, the Ranger signal caller forced a pass that was deflected by corner Tavares Garner and ended in the hands of Schulz who then went 45-yards for the score to make the score 18-3.

NWOSU got the ball to begin the second half, but on the second play from scrimmage Garner intercepted a Miller pass to give Henderson the ball on the NWOSU 33.

The Reddie offense would finally put points on the board as Henderson ran the ball three consecutive plays with JaQuan Cole breaking free for an 18 yard score with 12:52 left in the third quarter.

Henderson State's offense finished the game with 330 yards of total offense with Dallas Hardison completing 26-of-41 passes for 207 yards.

The Reddie defense pressured Miller the entire game forcing five interceptions with Gary Vines along with Garner, Schulz, Avery and Burns.

Vines led Henderson with nine tackles while also having three pass break-ups.

Henderson State slowed down a high-powered Southwestern Oklahoma offense as the Reddies shutout the Bulldogs 33-0. Southwestern Oklahoma averaged 439.4 yards and 44 points per game entering the contest with the Reddies. This Saturday belonged to the Henderson State defense. The Reddies were stellar in pitching a shutout while allowing just 220 yards of offense. Equally impressive was the five interceptions recorded by the Reddies.

Henderson State would get on the board early in the second quarter when JaQuan Cole bounced off several SWOSU defenders and broke free for a 72-yard touchdown scamper with 10:10 left in the half.

It didn't take long for the Reddie defense to get the ball back for the offense as Tavares Garner recorded his third interception of the year and returned it 12 yards to the Bulldog 33. It would take Henderson seven plays to capitalize on the SWOSU miscue as Cole caught an 11-yard screen pass from Dallas Hardison and crossed the goal line to increase the Reddie lead to 14-0 with 3:56 left in the half. On SWOSU's next possession, Evans would be picked off again as Donovan McLeod tipped the ball in the air and came down with it at the SWOSU 41. HSU would settle for a 23-yard field goal by Houston Ray to make the score 17-0.

The Bulldog offense could do little against the Henderson defense in the second half as SWOSU totaled just 86 yards in the final 30 minutes. Christian Love and Kenrick Burns had interceptions in the second half, while Houston Ray added field goals of 36, 44, and 34 yards to increase the Reddies lead to 26-0.

Henderson State got the ball one last time and began the drive on the SWOSU 25 following a 22-yard punt return by Darion Gray.

The Reddies would score their only touchdown in the second half as Calen Peters plunged in from six yards out for the final score.

Henderson State totaled 323 yards of offense with 227 yards coming on the ground. Cole had a career-high rushing, going over 100 yards for the first time in his career with 143 yards on 21 attempts.

Lawson Schulz led the Henderson State defense with seven tackles including 1 1/2 stops for lost yardage. Schulz also had two pass breakups and a quarterback hurry. Garner also had a big game with six stops, and interception and a pair of pass breakups, while Vines ended the game with 5 stops and two interceptions.

GAME RECAPS

GAME 5: Henderson St. 17, Arkansas Tech 7
Oct. 3, 2015 • Arkadelphia, Ark. • 6,507

For the second consecutive week, Henderson State slowed down one of the top offensive teams in the GAC as the Reddies defeated Arkansas Tech 17-7.

The Reddies nearly picked up their second consecutive shutout but ATU scored with 1:06 left in the game when Michael Fine caught a 3-yard pass from Arsenio Favor. Henderson got out of the gates quick as Jaquan Cole took the opening play from scrimmage and raced 65 yards down to the Arkansas Tech 10.

Two plays later, Ryan McDonald rushed in from 3 yards out to put the Reddies on top 7-0 with 13:55 left in the opening quarter.

Both teams struggled offensively for a majority of the quarter until Tech finally began moving the ball courtesy of the ground game. Kristian Thompson and JaMarcus Walker helped move the ball down to the Reddie 7-yardline to set up 1st-and-goal. Josh Davis, however, was in the ATU backfield the next two plays dropping Walker for losses of 1 and 6 yards to set up 3rd-and-goal at the 14.

Favor's third-down pass fell incomplete and ATU was forced to attempt a 32-yard field goal. Eric Perez's attempt was wide right and the Reddies took over at the 20. The Reddies then would drive deep into ATU territory, but the drive was halted as Cua' Rose intercepted a Andrew Black at the 6-yardline.

ATU would then drive down to the Henderson 18 where Perez would have to attempt a 35-yard field goal. The Reddies kept the Wonder Boys off the board as Perez's kick was blocked by Kenrick Burns to keep the score 7-0 in favor of Henderson. Henderson picked off a Favor pass to begin the second half as Adrian Tucker came away with his first pick of the year at the ATU 45. The Reddies would settle for a 35-yard field goal by Houston Ray to make the score 10-0 early in the third quarter. Meanwhile, linebackers Lawson Schulz and Josh Davis continued to make things difficult for the Wonder Boy offense as the two combined for 24 tackles and 5 1/2 tackles for lost yardage. Schulz had a career-high 15 stops and a pair of quarterback hurries, while Davis totaled a career-best four tackles for lost yardage including two pass breakups.

Henderson's ground game punished the ATU defense moving the ball consistently but not able to put points on the board. However, with 2:03 left in the third quarter, Cole broke free again and scampered a career-long 88 yards for a touchdown to put Henderson on top 17-0.

Cole ended the game with 245 yards on 27 carries to record his second consecutive 100-plus yard game.

GAME 6: Henderson St. 22, No. 22 Harding 17
Oct. 10, 2015 • Searcy, Ark. • 6,507

Andrew Black's first career touchdown run helped propel Henderson State to a 22-17 win over No. 22 Harding.

Trailing 17-16, the Reddie defense forced a Tristan Parsley punt midway through the fourth quarter. Darion Gray then made the most of his first punt return of the season returning the ball 46 yards down to the Bisons 9-yardline.

On 3rd-and-goal from the 10, Black faked a handoff and scooted into the end zone to put Henderson on top 22-17.

Henderson's defense forced another punt on Harding's next possession with the Reddies setting up shop on their own 33. The Reddies would advance the ball down to the Harding 30-yardline on nine plays. The drive would stall and Evan Lassiter's punt would roll into the end zone giving the ball back to the Bisons at the 20 with 1:05 left. On Harding's first play, Park Parish's pass was intercepted by Trevon Del Rio to secure the win for the Reddies.

Henderson took the early lead with a 24-yard field goal by Houston Ray at the 10:26 mark in the opening quarter.

The Bisons would fumble on their first possession as Josh Davis jarred the ball loose from Parish with Dondre Wright recovering at the Harding 38. The Reddies took advantage of the gift going 38 yards on five plays with Ryan McDonald plunging in from two-yards out.

Harding then put together an impressive drive going 77 yards on 11 plays with Parish scoring from a yard out.

Henderson would turn the ball over on its next possession as Hardison was intercepted by DeAndre Baines at the HSU 26. The Bisons would be held to a Parsley 22-yard field goal to make the score 10-9 with 12:50 left in the half.

Henderson would get a break midway through the second-quarter as a botched snap on a Harding punt attempt would allow the Reddies to take over at the Harding 27. Corey Chappell would then catch a 27-yard pass from Hardison to put Henderson back on top 16-10 just before half.

In the third quarter, the Bisons would put together another lengthy drive going 61 yards on seven plays with Matt Tension scoring on a 7-yard run with 5:32 left.

Henderson ended the game with 313 yards of offense including 223 yards passing. JaQuan Cole totaled 62 yards on 19 carries to lead the Reddie ground game.

The Henderson defense was again superb limiting the Bisons to 281 yards of offense while forcing three turnovers. Josh Davis led the Reddies with 10 tackles, while Lawson Schulz had eight stops.

Henderson State used an explosive second half to beat Arkansas-Monticello 41-3. The Reddies used another balanced offensive attack coupled with a suburb defensive performance as Henderson totaled 420 yards of offensive. Meanwhile, the defense stone-walled the UAM offense as the Boll Weevils managed just 254 yards on offense. Henderson limited the top passing offensive team in the GAC to nearly 200 yards below their average as the Boll Weevils managed just 154 yards passing. The Reddies got on the board first as Jaquan Cole broke free for an 80-yard run on the first play of Henderson's second offensive possession. Henderson increased its lead to 14-0 at the 9:31 mark in the second quarter as Ryan McDonald plunged in from three yards out to cap off an 11-play, 46 yard drive. Houston Ray connected on field goals of 38 and 44 yards, to start the scoring in the final 30 minutes. The Reddies then scored three touchdowns in the final 6:52 as Rodney Bryson scored on an eight-yard run following Cole gaining 34 yards on three carries and a 23-yard pass reception by JaVante Mack from Dallas Hardison. The Henderson defense set up the next score as Cameron Sonnier picked off a Hunter Leppert pass and returned it 39 yards down to the UAM 4. Calen Peters would later score on a 1-yard run to make the score 34-3. Henderson's final score came with 2:24 remaining as Andrew Black threw his first touchdown pass of the season with Peters on the receiving end of the 25-yard scoring toss. UAM's last chance of getting into the end zone fell short as Jonathan Edouard picked off Leppert on the final play of the game. Cole ended the day with 157 yards on 16 carries to lead the Reddie ground game, while Hardison had a solid day passing completing 16-of-25 attempts for 187 yards. Mack led all Reddie receivers with four catches for 55 yards. Joseph Snapp had one reception for 39 yards, while Mark Czaus had three catches for 34 yards. The Reddie defense was led by Josh Davis who had 10 tackles including eight solo stops, while Gary Vines had six tackles.

Dallas Hardison's 6-yard touchdown run on the last play of the game lifted No.14 Henderson State to a 29-28 win over Southern Arkansas. Hardison orchestrated a 15-play, 94-yard drive in the final 1:40 to lead the Reddies to their sixth straight win. With Henderson trailing 28-23 and the Reddies without a timeout, Hardison worked the sidelines with numerous short passes to Corey Chappell and Mark Czaus. After Hardison converted a 4th-down on a six yard run, he hit JaVante Mack on a 28-yard crossing route down to the SAU 38. Under pressure, Hardison later found Joseph Snapp for a 20 yard gain down to the Mulerider 12. Hardison would then try to connect with Czaus in the end zone, but SAU's Chris Wilson would be called for a defensive hold which would move the ball down to the 6. With 6 seconds remaining, Hardison tried to hit Chappell on a crossing route but was nearly picked off by Q'Niko Thomas. The Reddies had time for one more play as 3 seconds remained. With Henderson in a five receiver set and the field spread, Hardison was flushed out of the pocket but saw daylight to his left and raced for the pylon crossing the goal line as time expired. The Reddies scored on their opening possession of the game moving the ball 69 yards on 16 plays with Houston Ray finishing the drive with a 20-yard field goal to put Henderson on top 3-0 with 7:01 left in the opening quarter. Southern Arkansas also scored on its opening drive as the Muleriders drove 73 yards on 13 plays with Michael Nunnery plunging in from 1-yard out. HSU regained the lead early in the second quarter when Cole scored on a 1-yard run. Henderson had the Muleriders stopped on their next possession, but Hudson's punt was mishandled by Darion Gray with SAU's Gabriel Joslyn recovering on the Reddie 20. It took SAU three plays to score as Renner hit William McKnight for an 8-yard touchdown to put the Muleriders on top 14-10 with 9:10 left in the half. SAU would make the score 21-10 late in the half as McKnight rushed in from the 5-yardline to cap off an 11-play, 78-yard drive. On the ensuing kickoff, Jacoby Lewis returned Bradford Grems kick 75 yards to the SAU 18. The Reddies would settle for a 41-yard field goal by Ray. The only scoring in the third quarter came on a 42-yard field goal by Ray. SAU would again put together another lengthy drive covering 82 yards on 17 plays with Renner hitting Garrett Turnbull for a 2-yard score to put the Muleriders up 28-16. Henderson would quickly move the ball down field on its next possession with Cole scoring his second touchdown of the game from 5 yards out to cut the deficit to 28-23 with 11:21 to play.

The Reddies scored on all 11 offensive possessions including eight possessions in the first half in route to a 63-0 lead. HSU totaled 408 yards in the half, while the defensive unit limited SNU to just 31 yards on 28 plays.

Reddies got on the board quickly scoring on their first possession when **Dallas Hardison** connected with **Jacoby Lewis** for a 17-yard touchdown with just 1:21 taken off the clock.

Hardison would go on to throw two more touchdown passes including a 24-yard score to **Mark Czaus** and a 10-yard strike to **James Jackson** before exiting the game in the first half.

Ryan McDonald rushed for scores of 5, 2 and 2 yards in the opening half, while both **Andrew Black** and **Calen Peters** scored on 7-yard runs in the first 30 minutes.

HSU's other score in the first half was provided by the defense as **Camron Sonnier** picked off a Jacob Spady pass and returned it 37 yards to pay dirt.

Black came in for Hardison and completed 11-of-18 passes for 96 yards including a 7-yard touchdown pass to **Ben Johnson** who recorded his first career touchdown. Black also led the Reddie ground game carrying the ball six times for 73 yards.

Houston Ray, who was 10-for-10 on extra-points, added two field goals in the fourth quarter including kicks of 36 and 31 yards to total 16 points.

A total of 12 different players caught passes for the Reddies led by Johnson's five receptions for 79 yards.

Jacoby Lewis totaled 71 yards on five catches in the first half, while **Darion Gray** had three grabs for 47 yards.

Aside from Black's rushing total, Calen Peters carried the ball eight times for 56 yards, with Rodney Bryson totaling 53 yards on five attempts.

Henderson ran its NCAA national leading interception total to 22 with three picks. Also having interceptions were Christian Love and Darius Thomas.

Henderson State claimed its third Great American Conference title as the No. 9 Reddies beat Oklahoma Baptist 22-14. Henderson's win clinched the Reddies' third GAC title in four years.

Henderson benefitted from four Oklahoma Baptist turnovers including the Reddie secondary adding to their NCAA Division II leading 24 interceptions with two Saturday afternoon.

OBU began the third quarter leading the Reddies 7-0. The Bison drove the ball down deep into Henderson territory on their first possession of the half before Segall coughed up the football with Josh Davis recovering at the Reddie 23.

On Henderson's first offensive play of the half, Joseph Snapp recorded his longest reception of his career as Hardison connected for 69 yards down to the Bison 8.

Following a sack of Hardison for an 8-yard loss, the junior from Bentonville hit JaVante Mack for a 16 yard touchdown.

Mark Czaus then connected with AJ Smith for the two-point conversion to give Henderson an 8-7 lead with 11:13 left in the third quarter.

Hardison would later hit Mack for a 25-yard touchdown strike to increase the lead to 15-7 with 5:17 left in the third quarter.

In the fourth quarter with the Bison driving again, Sheldon Watson picked off a Stegall pass and raced 100 yards for a touchdown to increase the lead to 22-7 with 13:00 left in the game.

Henderson's defense would hold strong and get the ball back to secure the win and championship.

Henderson would total 341 yards of offense with Bryson leading the Reddie ground game with 99 yards on 25 carries.

Peters would also have a solid game rushing with 74 yards on 9 attempts. Hardison finished with 183 yards passing completing 12 of 20 passes including a pair of scoring strikes.

Mack had three catches for 49 yards to lead the Henderson receivers, while Czaus totaling 46 yards on three receptions.

Lawson Schulz led the Reddie defense with nine tackles including two tackles for lost yardage, while Josh Davis had eight tackles and a fumble recovery.

Henderson State's defensive unit played a stellar second half as the Reddies claimed the 89th Battle of the Ravine in beating Ouachita Baptist 21-17.

A crowd of 9,868 witnessed a HSU defense limit the Tigers to just 237 yards of offense as the Reddies snapped OBU's 10-game home conference win streak. Henderson would strike first on its first possession as the Reddies drove 84 yards on 13 plays as Ryan McDonald recorded his 22nd career touchdown with a 1-yard plunge.

The Reddies would convert on a pair of third down conversions on the drive as Dallas Hardison hit Jaquan Cole for a 10-yard gain and then later found Joseph Snapp in the flats for 17 yards.

OBU would then put together a drive of its own as Austin Warford would score on a 7-yard jaunt to cap off a 12-play, 74-yard drive.

Henderson would regain the lead midway through the second quarter as Mark Czaus made a one handed catch from Hardison for a 5-yard score with 8:26 remaining in the half. The big play of seven-play, 80-yard drive was a 42-yard connection from Hardison to Corey Chappell.

Again OBU would put together a drive late in the half, but the Reddie defense held on a 3rd-and-5 at the 8 and the Tigers had to settle for a 25-yard field goal by Cole Antley to make the score 14-10 at the break.

The Reddies would take the opening possession of the second half and go 75 yards on 13 plays with Rodney Bryson scoring on a 15-yard run.

The Tigers, however, would respond on their first drive of the second half as Kris Oliver scored on a 2-yard run with 4:51 left in the third quarter.

The OBU drive covered 90 yards on 13 plays with the Tigers benefitting from a pair of 15 yard penalties by the Reddies including an unsportsmanlike penalty on 4th-and-8 to keep the drive alive.

It was all defense the remainder of the game as the Tigers struggled to move the ball. The Reddie defense held OBU to just 7 yards on 9 plays in the 4th quarter with Tigers managing just 72 yards in the second half.

Henderson would finish the game with 360 yards of offense with the Reddies converting on an astounding 13-of-18 third-downs.

Hardison had another solid game completing 22-of-30 passes for 229 yards with Corey Chappell leading the receivers with five catches for 89 yards. Joseph Snapp had 3 receptions for 54 yards.

After sitting out last week, Jaquan Cole returned to rush for 89 yards on 25 carries to lead the Reddie ground game.

Defensively Gary Vines had eight tackles including seven solo stops, while Ilya Petrosyan had six tackles with two for lost yardage.

The third time was a charm for Henderson State as the Reddies won their first-ever NCAA playoff game with a 23-16 victory over No. 16 Sioux Falls.

The No. 8 Reddies picked off Harlon Hill Candidate quarterback Luke Papillion three times including one on USF's final drive to secure the victory for Henderson.

Henderson scored on its opening possession as Jaquan Cole broke free for a 10 yard run around right end to put the Reddies on top 7-0.

Sioux Falls moved the ball down field on its opening drive, but the Reddie defense held strong and forced a 31-yard field goal by Brett Garner as the Cougars cut the Reddie lead to 7-3 with 7:59 left in the first quarter.

Henderson would stop a USF drive late in the quarter when Gary Vines intercepted a Luke Papillion pass and returned it to the Reddie 24.

USF would advance the ball to midfield but be forced to punt. Darion Gray would take Stuart Vanden-Heuval's kick and return it 51 yards to the USF 40 to set up Henderson's next score. On 3rd-and-10, Hardison would hit Joseph Snapp on a crossing route for 38 yards down to the Cougar 2. Two plays later, Hardison would score from the 1 to put HSU on top 14-3.

USF would add a 21-yard field goal by Garner, and score its only touchdown of the game late in the half on a 3-yard plunge by Papillion to make the score 14-13 at the break.

Midway through the third quarter, Henderson would put together a 12-play, 69-yard drive with Hardison finding Mark Czaus on the sidelines for an 18-yard touchdown to increase the Reddie lead to 21-13.

Henderson's defense would put the next points on the board as Jordan Dominguez along with several other Reddies chased Papillion back into his own end zone where he attempted to get rid of the football. However, Papillion's pass never cross the line of scrimmage and was penalized for intentional grounding which resulted in a safety to increase the HSU lead to 23-13.

Sioux Falls would make it a one possession game with 5:32 remaining as Garner booted a 25-yard field goal to make the score 23-16.

The Cougars had one last chance getting the ball back with 1:57 remaining and starting from their own 18-yardline.

Papillion began moving his team down field and converted on a 3rd-and-7 and a 4th-and-6 to keep the drive alive. With time ticking away and USF facing a 2nd-and-5 from the Reddie 24, Papillion was again under pressure by the Reddie defense and threw an errant pass that was picked off by Tiyun Avery with 10 seconds left in the game. Cole ended the game with 147 yards rushing on 31 attempts becoming the 10th player in HSU history to rush for 1,000 yards in a single season.

SCOTT MAXFIELD

LOUISIANA TECH • 1984

11th Year at HSU: 80-39

15th Year Overall: 109-50

Head Coach Scott Maxfield has built a program at Henderson State that has garnered national attention.

In his 11 seasons at Henderson, Maxfield has compiled a 80-39 record and has coached 101 all-conference honorees, 52 all-region selections, 19 All-Americans and four Harlon Hill Trophy finalists.

The winningest coach in Great American Conference history, Maxfield's 80 wins is second in HSU history. Sporty Carpenter, who won five Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference titles, has the record with 119 wins (119-76-7) from 1971 to 1989.

Maxfield has also compiled a 7-3 record against Ouachita Baptist in the Battle of the Ravine including winning four straight against the Tigers from 2010 to 2013. Only Carpenter (8-9-2) and Jimmy Haygood (8-8-2) have more wins over OBU.

In the last five seasons, Maxfield's teams have claimed three conference championships, made three postseason appearances, and have compiled a 54-13 record, the best among all four-year Arkansas institutions.

Maxfield has also led the Reddies to a 40-4 Great American Conference record which included a streak of 27 straight games.

The Reddies claimed back-to-back GAC championships (2012 & 2013), earned a share of the Gulf South Conference title in 2010 and have hosted the NCAA Division II playoffs in 2012 and 2013 with Maxfield at the helm.

Along the way, Maxfield earned AFCA Super Region 3 Coach of the Year honors in 2013 after leading the Reddies to a school-record 11 wins and their second straight undefeated regular-season. Maxfield also garnered GAC Coach of the Year honors in 2012 and 2013, was also one of five finalists for the 2012 and 2013 Liberty Mutual National Coach of the Year, and was GSC co-Coach of the Year in 2010.

In 2013, the Reddies earned their highest-ever national ranking since becoming a member of the NCAA in 1993. Henderson State was ranked in the AFCA Top 25 Poll for the entire season and ranked No. 4 the final four weeks of the regular-season.

That season saw the Reddies go 11-1 including a 10-0 mark in GAC play. Henderson State was tops in the nation in scoring offense (53.5 points per game), total offense (576.6 ypg) and passing offense (428.4 ypg).

Throughout the course of the season, 13 Reddies earned national player of the week honors, while 12 earned GAC Player of the Week accolades.

One product of Maxfield was Kevin Rodgers who earned GAC Offensive Player of the Year honors three straight years as well as being named the GAC Male Athlete of the Year twice.

Henderson also had the 2013 GAC Defensive Player of the Year for the second straight season as linebacker Keaton Stigger grabbed the honor. Maxie Graham was touted as the league's best defensive player in 2012.

In 2012, Henderson State finished the regular-season undefeated/untied for the first time in school history as the Reddies were 10-0 overall including an 8-0 record in the GAC. That season also saw the Reddies advance to the NCAA Division II playoffs for the first time in school history.

A record 19 players earned All-GAC honors and 10 Reddies were named First-Team All-GAC.

The Reddies led the nation in scoring (50.36 points per game), were third in total offense (516.82 ypg), third in passing offense (377.64 ypg), and third in passing efficiency (172.79). Henderson State also outscored its opponents by an average of 29 points per game.

Maxfield and his teams have generated a great deal of excitement over the past several years with numerous alums and supporters filling the stands at Carpenter-Haygood Stadium. In 2014, Henderson State finished 10th in the nation in attendance among all NCAA Division II institutions averaging 7,181 fan per game.

From 2012 to 2014, 106,462 fans have passed through the gates of Carpenter-Haygood Stadium, an average of 6,262 fans in a span of 17 games.

Aside from the success on the field, Maxfield, his staff and the Reddies work extensively off the field, in the classroom as well as within the community.

Since Maxfield's arrival, the academic standards within the Reddie football program have made a significant improvement. The team cumulative grade point average in past three years is 2.8 with 65 players earning academic all-conference honors.

Rodgers earned the Capitol One Academic All-American Scholar Athlete of the Year. A year earlier, Kelton Hays became the first Reddie since Lee Daily in 1998 to earn Capitol One Academic All-American First-Team honors. Prior to Maxfield's arrival, Henderson State struggled to make the transition from the NAIA to the NCAA Division II level.

From 1993 to 2004, Henderson State had just one winning season and a combined record of 35-90-1 in those 12 seasons.

After a rebuilding year in 2005, Maxfield led the Reddies to an 8-3 record in 2006, and a 7-3 mark in 2007. The Reddies finished with a 6-2 record in the Gulf South Conference both seasons finishing tied for second.

The 8-3 finish in 2006 ranked as the best turnarounds in the nation, as the Reddies were just 3-8 in Maxfield's first season. Henderson State ranked in the top 25 in several polls throughout the season.

In 2007, the Reddies finished with a 7-3 record and finished the season ranked 23rd in College Sports Report Top 25. Henderson State recorded its third straight winning season at home, completing back-to-back winning seasons for the first time since 1989 and 1990, and turned in an 18-0 shutout against in-town rival Ouachita Baptist.

The 2008 season showed a versatile Reddie team with one of the most prolific offenses in HSU history averaging 32.8 points per game while totaling 448.1 yards of offense including 330.1 yards passing. The Reddies finished 5-5 losing three games late in the fourth quarter which left Maxfield and the rest of Reddies wondering what could have been.

Despite the 5-5 season, it was the third straight non-losing year for the Reddies, the most since Henderson recorded seven straight non-losing seasons from 1973 to 1979 under legendary coach Sporty Carpenter.

In 2010, Maxfield led the Reddies to their first conference championship in 25 years as Henderson State claimed a share of the Gulf South Conference title.

Despite being limited to just five conference games, the 2011 Reddies finished second in their first year in the Great American Conference recording a 4-1 conference record including a 41-36 victory over Ouachita Baptist. Henderson State was the only Division II team in the nation to play two games against NCAA Division I opponents.

A proven winner, Maxfield led Blinn College to back-to-back playoff appearances prior to his arrival at Henderson State.

During his three years at the Brenham, Texas school, Maxfield compiled a 21-10 record and a pair of playoff appearances.



Blinn finished with a 9-2 record in 2004, finishing ranked No. 7 nationally, and advancing to the Southwest Junior College Conference semifinals before losing to Tyler Junior College.

The Buccaneers ranked second nationally in total offense averaging 469.9 yards per game, including 269 yards passing per game which ranked fifth in the nation.

Maxfield's offense also lit up the scoreboard at Blinn averaging 46.1 points per game.

After posting a 5-5 mark in his first year at Blinn, Maxfield kick-started the Bucs' offense in 2003 and carried the Buccaneers to the playoffs for the first time in three years. Blinn finished the 2003 season with an overall record of 7-3, but it was the Bucs' offense that caught the nation's attention.

Blinn fielded one of the most dangerous offensive attacks in junior college history, averaging 558 yards and 52 points a game. The Bucs had three All-Americans on offense and sent four offensive players on to the Division I level.

The former Offensive Coordinator of the Year spent one year as head football coach at Pearl River Community College in Mississippi, before taking the job at Blinn.

At Pearl River, Maxfield guided the Wildcats to a 7-2 finish, the first winning season for the school since 1995. The offense finished first in the National Junior College Athletic Association in total team offense, averaging 460.5 yards per game, and was also first in passing offense, averaging 315.8 yards per game.

His previous five seasons were spent with Northwest Mississippi Community College in Senatobia where he was the offensive coordinator.

Maxfield, who holds a bachelor's degree from Louisiana Tech and his master's from the United States Sports Academy, was named Offensive Coordinator of the Year for Community and Junior Colleges in 1999 by American Football Coach Magazine.

His 30 years of coaching experience includes five years as an assistant at Northwestern State University in Natchitoches, La.

Working under former HSU Athletic Director and then coach of the Demons Sam Goodwin, Maxfield was defensive line coach from 1991-94, before becoming Goodwin's defensive coordinator from 1994 to 1996.

Maxfield also spent a total of 10 years (1986-1990 and 1996-2001) at Northwest Mississippi Community College.

A graduate of John Tyler High School in Tyler, Texas, Maxfield was a four-year letterman at Louisiana Tech University where he played offensive guard and center.

After his eligibility was finished, Maxfield served as a student assistant for the Bulldogs before becoming a graduate assistant at Ole Miss.

Coach Maxfield and wife Beth Ann have assisted with several charitable organizations donating their time as well as providing financial support to such organizations as the Make-A-Wish Foundation, the Humane Society, United Way, Relay for Life, and the Red Cross to name a few.

Each January, Maxfield, his staff and the Reddies conduct an on campus blood drive with the entire staff and players donating blood which amounts to over 60 pints each year.

Throughout the year, Reddie players take turns in assisting at the local humane society.

Maxfield and the Reddies also take part in the Reddie to Read program. This program involves the team visiting the local elementary schools in the area and reading to children.

The Reddie to Serve program is a program in which the Reddies assist the elderly or handicapped within the community by doing yard work, painting, conducting household chores, etc.

Every year Maxfield and his staff take part in the AFCA Coach To Cure MD to raise money to help defeat Duchenne.

Also a supporter of the local law enforcement, Maxfield annually sponsors the Arkadelphia Police Department lift-a-thon.

Maxfield is also a featured speaker at several civic group luncheons and meetings as well as numerous sports banquets among other events throughout the state.

Maxfield and his wife Beth Ann, who holds a doctorate in English, have one daughter, Alexandra Hailey.

SLIPPERY ROCK • 1982

Jeff McInerney begins his second season as Henderson State's defensive line coach and co-defensive coordinator.

McInerney came to Henderson after spending eight years as the head football coach at Central Connecticut State University.

During his tenure at CCSU, McInerney compiled a record of 48-41. He led the Blue Devils to a pair of Northeast Conference titles and his 48 wins are the second-highest total in school history.

McInerney was named the NEC Coach of the Year in 2009. The Blue Devils won their first outright NEC title in school history and advanced to their first-ever Division I postseason game.

In 2009 the Blue Devils matched the school-record for victories with a 9-3 overall mark, including a 7-1 record in NEC action. Central clinched the title with a 14-13 win over St. Francis (Pennsylvania) in the final regular season game of the season. Central's six-straight wins from Sept. 26 until Oct. 31 marked the longest win streak in its Division I history.

Additional stops for McInerney included two seasons as the defensive coordinator at the University of Rhode Island. He also worked as an assistant coach at Tulsa, UNLV, Oregon State, Georgia Southern and Southern California.

The South Windsor High School graduate received his bachelor's degree from Slippery Rock University in 1982 and his master's degree from Troy State University in 1984. His first coaching job came at Slippery Rock as an undergraduate in 1981 and then as a graduate assistant coach in 1982.

McInerney has seen plenty of success in his coaching career, including being a part of a staff that won a National Championships at Troy State (1984 and 1987) and Georgia Southern (1990).

McInerney and his wife, Leslie, have two children. Ryan is a 2009 graduate of Pittsburg State and Amy is a 2013 graduate of CCSU.

Darren Drago is in his first season as coach of the Reddie inside linebackers as well as special teams coach.

Drago has 11 years of coaching experience in the college ranks including stops at Northwestern State, Stephen F. Austin, LSU and Louisiana College.

Drago most recently coached at Evangel High School in Shreveport. In 2009 he returned to his alma mater at Northwestern State where he coached linebackers and served as recruiting coordinator.

Drago served as an assistant to the defensive coordinator at LSU in 2008 following two years as defensive line coach and defensive coordinator in 2007 at Stephen F. Austin.

Drago previously coached at Northwestern State from 2000 to 2005 where he helped assemble one of the most intimidating defenses, not only in the Southland Conference, but in the nation. Drago helped guide the Demons to three NCAA Division I-AA playoff appearances (2001, 2002 and 2004) as well as the 2004 SLC title.

Under Drago's tutelage, the Northwestern State defensive line tied a single-season school record with 43 sacks in 2002. The Demons once again led the league and finished the season ranked 15th nationally in total defense (276.6 ypg), while holding opponents to a league-best 99.4 rushing yards per game.

Drago spent his playing days at Northwestern State, as one of the top fullbacks in the league. He was a key figure in the Demons run to back-to-back NCAA Division I-AA playoff appearances and two SLC Championship teams (1997 and 1998). The Demons finished the 1998 season with a school-record 11 wins and a No. 3 national ranking after reaching the I-AA semifinals.

Drago received his bachelor's degree from Northwestern State in 1998.

In his 11th season at Henderson State, Matt Gordon serves as Henderson's co-defensive coordinator and secondary coach after serving the past three seasons as the defensive line coach. Gordon also serves as Henderson's recruiting coordinator.

Six defensive linemen have earned All-GAC honors with Robbie Aldridge and Glennon Bobo garnering all-region honors.

Gordon has coached 17 all-conference selections including three-time All-American Devon Hughes who led the nation three straight seasons in passes defended.

Gordon came to Henderson State after spending 2004 at Blinn Junior College as defensive secondary coach.

While at Blinn, the Bucs had one of the best pass defenses in the Southwest Junior College Conference allowing just 141 passing yards per game.

Gordon also spent two seasons at Cisco Junior College as linebackers coach, defensive line coach and strength and conditioning coach.

Gordon has worked numerous camps including the Elite Sports - Pigskin Classic in Honolulu, Hawaii, The O-D Camp at Sam Houston State University and the ASC Contact Camp at Texas State University.

A 2002 graduate of Concord University, Gordon earned his degree in sports management/physical education and a master's degree in physical education from Tarleton State.

While at Concord, Gordon was an All-Conference linebacker and was invited to play in the college All-Star while recording 16 career sacks.

A native of Charlottesville, Va., Gordon also attended Fork Union Military Academy and is a graduate of Western Albermarle High School where he was a First-Team All-Conference football and lacrosse player.

Gordon is a member of the American Football Coaches Association.

Josh Jones begins his first year as part of the Henderson State staff and will coach defensive corners and also serve as the Reddie video coordinator.

Jones spent the 2014 season as a graduate assistant at Missouri Western State. He then moved on to as a graduate assistant coach at Troy University until he is hired at Henderson.

Prior to working at MWSU, Jones was a graduate assistant at Arkansas Tech where he worked with the cornerbacks and was also on the strength and conditioning staff.

He played the 2009 season at Harding University, where he led the Bisons with 94 tackles, eight interceptions, and 11 pass breakups en route to being named a consensus All-American.

Before his year at Harding, Jones was a three-year letter winner at Minnesota State-Moorhead where he earned first team all-America honors as a sophomore, leading Division II with 10 interceptions.

Jones has also coached at his high school, Bishop Montgomery High School in Torrance, Calif., where he spent the 2010 season as the junior varsity defensive coordinator and varsity defensive assistant before becoming the junior varsity head coach in 2011, while coaching the varsity defensive backs.

Jones earned his bachelor of professional studies in 2013 from Arkansas Tech and is pursuing his master of science degree.

Jeremiah Fiscus is in his fourth year at Henderson State and will serve as the Reddies' offensive line coach.

Since his arrival, Fiscus has coached All-American's Kelton Hays and Doug Despain, had five players earn all-region honors and eight linemen earn All-GAC honors.

The 2013 offensive line earned National Offensive Line of the Week for its performance against Southern Nazarene as the Reddies totaled a record 855 yards of offense while scoring 82 points. The Reddie offense led the nation in total offense (576.6 ypg), passing offense (428.4 ypg) and scoring 53.3 ppg).

Fiscus had an immediate impact in 2012 as five Reddie linemen earned All-GAC honors. Henderson State's offense led the nation in scoring (50.36 points per game), were third in total offense (516.82 ypg), third in passing offense (377.64 ypg), and third in passing efficiency (172.79).

Fiscus spent two seasons at Texas Christian University.

Fiscus first arrived at TCU as a video/recruiting graduate assistant in June 2010. He was named assistant offensive line coach in 2011. He received his master's degree in education administration from TCU.

Fiscus also worked two years at Northwestern State. He was a graduate assistant and assistant offensive line coach in 2008 before becoming the Demons' running backs coach in 2009. He received a master's degree in sports administration from Northwestern State.

A native of Stafford, Kan., Fiscus played two seasons at Dodge City Community College before transferring to McPherson College, where he was a team captain.

Fiscus started all four years at center for both schools, giving him a streak of 41 consecutive starts during his collegiate playing career.

As a sophomore, he helped lead Dodge City to the Heart of Texas Bowl in Copperas Cove, Texas, against Cisco Junior College.

Fiscus is a 2008 graduate of McPherson with a degree in elementary education. He and his wife, Jessie, were married on July 2, 2011.

RUNNING BACKS

FIRST YEAR

AUBURN • 2014

Carnell "Cadillac" Williams joins the Henderson State Football coaching staff as part of NFL Players Association Coaching Internship program.

Williams will spend the 2015 season coaching on the sidelines at Henderson State and will serve as the Reddies running back coach.

Williams finished his collegiate career with 3,831 yards on 741 attempts (5.2 yards per attempt) and 45 touchdowns, breaking the all-time Auburn career records of most rushing attempts (657), and most touchdowns (43), while finishing second in total offense. He also has the distinction of earning nine SEC Player of the Week honors in his career, the most in conference history.

Williams was the fifth overall pick in the 2005 NFL draft by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, signing a five-year contract.

Williams spent six seasons with Tampa (2005-2010) and one year with the St. Louis Rams (2011).

In his rookie season with Tampa, Williams tallied six 100-yard games in 14 starts, and led all rookies in total rushing yards (1,178), rookie of the week honors (3), and finished second for rushing touchdowns (6).

He was awarded the Associated Press NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year Award and was also selected as NFL Rookie of the Year.

Williams finished his NFL career with 4,047 yards rushing on 1055 carries while scoring 21 touchdowns. He also compiled 1004 yards receiving on 148 receptions.

Following his playing days, Williams and former Buccaneer teammate Earnest Graham went into business together starting Pro Player Insurance Group.

Wanting to coach, preferably on the college or the high school level, Williams returned to Auburn and graduated with a degree in sociology in December of 2014.

Williams and his wife, Evan Christina, have a one-year old son, Cole.

RECRUITING COORD./OUTSIDE WR

FIRST YEAR

HENDERSON STATE • 1993

Dean Norsworthy enters his first season as wide receivers coach at Henderson State.

A 1993 graduate of Henderson, Norsworthy returns to his alma mater after one year as head freshman coach of the Russellville Whirlwinds and varsity Quarterback coach for the Russellville Cyclones.

From 2011 to 2013, Norsworthy was offensive coordinator and quarterback coach at Arkansas Tech. During his time at the school, ATU's offense improved from seventh in the Great American Conference in 2011 to third in 2012 & 2013. (265.8 yards per game) and posted the second-best red zone offense in the GAC. During the 2012 season Norsworthy groomed Tanner Marsh at QB who set numerous single season passing and total offense records for the Wonder Boys.

Norsworthy was named offensive coordinator at Midwestern State University in 2008 and spent three years in Wichita Falls, Texas.

During his three seasons at MWSU, Norsworthy helped lead the program to 23-11 record with the team setting several school records, including passing yards in a season (3,390) and touchdowns (29).

Norsworthy spent the previous three seasons at Southeastern Oklahoma State where he gained a promotion each season while helping the Savage Storm to three-straight Lone Star Conference North Division titles.

Norsworthy was hired at SOSU as quarterback and running back coach in 2005, was promoted to offensive coordinator in 2006 and earned the title of assistant head coach in 2007.

He played a key role in the development of two-time LSC North Offensive Back of the Year Justin Pitrucha as the Savage Storm finished seventh in the nation in passing yardage and 34th in total offense in his first season as a coordinator.

Norsworthy additionally served as recruiting coordinator at Southeastern where he also played a hand in the development of 2006 LSC North Freshman of the Year in wideout Daniel Nichols.

From 2002 to 2005 served as quarterbacks coach at Irving (Texas) High School where he four players that would later start as collegiate signal callers.

He guided Irving High School to a school-record three consecutive trips to the state playoffs culminating in the Tigers deepest playoff run in 2004 as the team advanced to the Class 5A Division II state quarterfinals.

Prior to his three-year stint in Irving, Norsworthy served as cornerbacks coach at one of most acclaimed prep programs in the nation at Southlake's Carroll High School. In two seasons with the Dragons, he coached two teams that finished no worse than state quarterfinalists.

Following graduation from Henderson State, Norsworthy spent one year as quarterback coach at Arkadelphia High School and also coached at Hot Springs Lakeside High School.

Ryan Lusby enters his first season as an Assistant Inside Wide Receivers Coach.
