JOHN P. BOUCHER FIELD: HOME TO THE EAGLES SINCE 2009

The John P. Boucher Field, home to our men's & women's soccer and lacrosse programs, was built in 2001 through a generous donation by Husson alumnus John Boucher '66.

In 2007, the field underwent a facelift. Once again, with Mr. Boucher's generous support, the field lost its natural grass and was converted to FieldTurf. The \$650,000 renovation made the John P. Boucher Soccer Field one of the finest collegiate fields in New England.

With the help from yet another donation in the fall of 2011, Boucher Field went through another fantastic upgrade with the addition of the gorgeous press box and lights. Night contests at Boucher are truly spectacular with the campus backdrop set against this beautiful facility.

In the summer of 2020, Boucher Field was once again refitted with a new FieldTurf artificial surface to the tune of \$800,000.

Granite and iron fences and bench enclosures surround the field, giving the complex that "old world" feel which makes it a very special place to play.

John Boucher played three sports at Husson: baseball, soccer, and golf. He has been inducted into both the Husson Sports Hall of Fame and the Husson Alumni Hall of Fame and is very involved with Husson as a member of the Board of Trustees.

A soccer coach for more than 20 years, John began his coaching career as the coach of a premier under-12 team in the Granite State Girls Soccer League. He became President of that league and during his tenure, the league grew to 1,800 players (ranging in age from 8-19) with more than 100 teams. He went on to coach girls soccer at Souhegan High School located in Amherst, New Hampshire. Under his direction, Souhegan High School Girls Soccer won eight state championships in a row. The school holds a national record for consecutive state championships with 10 in a row (two coming prior to Coach Boucher's arrival). Boucher retired from coaching with a career record of 175-15-5. His record in postseason play was 38-2, with both losses occurring in the New Hampshire Division I finals.

Boucher served as the head coach in 1997 and 2000 for the New Hampshire vs. Vermont Lions Cup game. In 1999, John was voted New Hampshire Coach of the Year for Class I and NSCAA Regional Coach of the Year for the northeast. The following year he was honored by the NSCAA as the Division I National Coach of the Year.

John graduated from Husson in 1966 with a Bachelor of Science in Business Administration. After a successful career with Exxon, he went into business for himself. He owned and operated a retail motor fuel and convenience store located in southern New Hampshire called Stalee and JPB Fuels. He and his wife, Judy, are the parents of two daughters and live in New Castle, N.H.

Wight's Strength & Conditioning Facility



Husson opened the brand new Wight's Strength & Conditioning Facility in conjunction with the start of 2016 fall athletic practices.

This 2,200 square foot facility serves Husson's 22 intercollegiate sports and 500-plus student-athletes under the direction of multiple strength & conditioning certified coaches.

It is equipped primarily with free weights in combination with half rack platforms and accessories. This allows our athletes to do a variety of exercises and adds safety and quality to our workouts.

William P. Newman Athletic Facility

The William P. Newman Athletic Facility is one of the original structures built on campus in 1968 when Husson moved to this location. Named after William Newman, Husson trustee and prominent Maine banker, this facility serves students, faculty, and the community.

The maple center court of William P. Newman Gymnasium is home to volleyball, basketball, intramurals, classes and special events, as it seats 1,200. Locker rooms, an athletic training facility, a free weight room, classrooms, coaches' offices, and athletic administration offices are also part of this busy building.



The Webber Pool, Swan Center, D. Bruce MacGregor Sports Hall of Fame, Kenduskeag Human Performance Institute, Trott Fitness Center and Wadleigh Academic Center are all a part of the Newman Athletic Facility.

William P. Newman Gymnasium

The William P. Newman Gymnasium, home to Husson's men's and women's basketball and women's volleyball programs, was completed in 1968 and named in honor of former Husson Trustee and prominent Maine Banker, William P. Newman. It is one of the original structures built on campus when Husson moved to 1 College Circle in 1968.



The Gym seats approximately 1,200 spectators. In addition to being used for all-campus events, the gymnasium has hosted several North Atlantic Conference, Maine Athletic Conference, Sunrise Conference, Northeast Collegiate Conference, National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics, and Eastern College Athletic Conference Tournament basketball and volleyball games.

In the summer of 2020, the floor in Newman Gym was resurfaced.



Dr. John W. Winkin Sports Complex



The Dr. John W. Winkin Sports Complex is home to Husson baseball, field hockey, and football teams and is one of the best facilities in all of New England. The vision of legendary baseball coach Dr. John W. Winkin helped transform Husson's baseball field into a multisport complex, complete with FieldTurf, dugouts, and a press box. Dr. Winkin got the project off the ground by donating his summer camp to the school, and the proceeds from it jump-started the project. His gift inspired long-time friend Harold Alfond to make a \$1,000,000 donation to Husson to help fund "The Harold Alfond Diamond", FieldTurf, and a drainage system to be installed. The stadium seats 3,000 spectators.

Dr. Winkin served as the head baseball coach at Husson, Colby College, and the University of Maine at Orono. He also served as the Athletic Director at Colby and spent time working for both the Red Sox and Yankees baseball franchises. Dr. Winkin was inducted into the College Baseball Hall of Fame in 2013.

Sadly, Dr. Winkin passed away on July 19, 2014. However, his contributions to athletics and baseball at Husson and the state of Maine will be enjoyed by young athletes for years to come.

Winkin Sports Complex has been the host site for many prestigious baseball tournaments, including the Maine American Legion Baseball Zone 1 and State Tournaments, Sunrise Athletic Conference Baseball Tournament, the North Eastern Athletic Conference East Division Baseball Tournament and the Maine High School Baseball All-Star Games. It has also been the host site for NCAA DIII Football Championship First Round games, Maine High School Football State Tournament and regular season games, as well as North Atlantic Conference Field Hockey Championship Tournament games.

In the fall of 2015, Winkin Sports Complex underwent a facelift with the addition of a press box for football and field hockey.

In the spring of 2016, Winkin Sports Complex experienced more renovations with the replacement of the FieldTurf surface, updated drainage system, fencing and scoreboard.

Clara Swan Center & Trott Fitness Studios

The Swan Center bears the name of legendary Clara Swan; Husson student '32, professor, coach, and Dean. At the age of 104, Swan attended Husson basketball games and remained a faithful supporter of the University up until she passed away on January 7th, 2017.

The Swan Center houses The Richard '65 and Alice Trott Fitness Studio, a state-of-the-art fitness center with twenty cardiovascular fitness machines, a set of selectorized weight equipment for every major muscle group and a full range of free weight equipment. This facility is climate-controlled, has 3,000 square feet with four TVs and a sound system.



Primary benefactors of the Swan Center were Husson alumnus Richard Trott '65 and his wife, Alice. Built in 2001 as a fitness and performance testing center for students, the facility housed the Kenduskeag Research Center until the Fall of 2019 and the Richard '65 and Alice Trott Fitness Studio. This facility previously offered research equipment for performance testing for the departments of Kinesiology, Physical Therapy and Physical Education. The research center was funded by Hilda Hutchins and allowed multiple uses across the curriculum.



Bangor Municipal Golf Course

The Bangor Municipal Golf Course, home to Husson men's & women's golf teams, is a 27-Hole Championship Course designed by Geoffrey Cornish.

Located minutes away from major attractions such as The Bangor Mall, historic downtown Bangor, the Cross Insurance Center, and Hollywood Casino, Bangor Municipal Golf Course is a great golf course for players of all abilities.

In addition to the 27-hole golf course, there is also a grass tee driving range, two practice greens, a shortgame practice facility, a fully stocked pro shop, and a staff of PGA Professionals that offer a wide variety of instructional programs. Webber Pool

The Webber Pool is located in the William P. Newman Athletic Facility. It is a 25-yard, six-lane, competitive pool and is home to the Husson men's & women's swimming & diving programs.

The pool is also used by the Bangor High School swim & dive teams, Hurricane Swim Club, Husson students for recreation, conditioning, and injury rehabilitation, as well as by Husson faculty/staff and members of the community. Balcony seating capable of hosting over 500 spectators makes this facility one of the finest in the Eastern Maine area.

Extensive renovations have been maintained to the pool's structure, roof, and side walls. New signage, timing and pace clocks, lane lines, and flags have been added.

Webber Pool has hosted several prestigious events, including Maine YMCA, Maine USA Swimming, Maine High School State and North Atlantic Conference Championship meets.



Wadleigh Academic Center



The Wadleigh Academic Center was built in 2015 through a generous donation from Husson alumnus and the President and Chief Executive Officer of Governor's Restaurant, Randy Wadleigh '87, and his wife, Angela.

The center is located in the Newman Athletic Facility, immediately adjacent to the lobby, and was designed to help student-athletes better prepare for academic success. It has a comfortable adaptable design that encourages student collaboration and learning.

Wadleigh is a 1987 graduate of Husson University where he majored in Business Administration. He was also a member of the Husson men's basketball team and understood, first-hand, the challenges that student-athletes experience in trying to strike a balance between athletics and academics. In 1999, Wadleigh was inducted into the Husson Sports Hall of Fame.



Armstrong Tennis Center



The Armstrong Tennis Center is the indoor home to the Husson women's tennis program and is located in Hampden, Maine.

The facility is used for both practices and matches in the fall and spring when there is inclement weather and during the winter months.

The Armstrong Tennis Center has four indoor tennis courts. The owner, Dean Armstrong, is a Husson alumnus.

Bangor High School Tennis Courts



The Bangor High School Tennis Courts is home to the Husson women's tennis team and is located right behind Bangor High School on Hobart Street in Bangor, Maine.

The Tennis Courts are also home to the Bangor High School men's & women's tennis teams. The team hosts practices and matches during their fall and spring season at the Bangor High School tennis courts.

The four courts are in two banks of two and are within a five-minute drive from Husson University.

Bangor High has hosted several Maine High School State Championship Matches.

Saxl Park

Saxl Park, home to the Husson women's and men's cross country teams, officially dedicated in 1984, was named for Joseph Saxl, superintendent of the psychiatric hospital from 1974 to 1981. During his tenure, Saxl decided to put to use the overgrown former farmland on hospital grounds. He initiated extensive landscaping to convert the park into a recreation and leisure area for patients and the public. It is located between State Street and Mount Hope Avenue in Bangor, Maine.

This very pleasant trail system is a series of loops going through a large field with a small pond near the northern end. Some sections have stone dust surface, others are simply mowed paths. There are several benches for those who want to rest and enjoy the surroundings. Bobolinks nest in the field. The approximately 75 acres of undeveloped land along the western boundary, provides habitat for birds and other wildlife that can be viewed from the park.





D. Bruce MacGregor Sports Hall of Fame Room

The D. Bruce MacGregor Sports Hall of Fame Room was established in 1998 by the support of Warren Caruso '89, '03G, '18G and his wife, Nicole. It is home to the Husson Sports Hall of Fame.

The Hall of Fame Room is named after Sports Hall of Fame Committee Chairman, Bruce MacGregor, who is also a 1998 inductee. Coach MacGregor was a storied men's basketball, baseball and men's golf coach at Husson who amassed over 1,000 career wins. He remains active in Husson Athletics to this day.

Newly renovated in 2012, the room reopened over Husson's Homecoming weekend in October. The Hall of Fame Room is used for athletic receptions, press conferences, and additional events and meetings.

The Husson University Sports Hall of Fame was established in 1985 to honor outstanding student-athletes, athletic administrators, coaches, and teams for their athletic performances, leadership, and contributions to their programs while at Husson University, Husson College, Bangor Maine School of Commerce, Maine School of Commerce - Bangor Branch and Shaw Business School.



Robert & Frances O'Keefe Softball Field

The Robert & Frances O'Keefe Softball Field is the home to Husson's softball team since 2005 and was made possible by the generous gift from the O'Keefe's. Located in the shadow of John P. Boucher Field, the softball field has undergone several renovations in the last few years, making it one of the finest fields in New England.

Recently, a press box with storage and two additional bleachers were added in 2013, increasing the capacity to nearly 400, while also making O'Keefe Field handicap accessible.

In 2011, O'Keefe Field went under another renovation with a new stone backstop and netting system, as well as rebuilt bullpens and a new set of bleachers.

The field was built in the fall of 2004. It was built to NCAA regulation as it measures 200 feet down the left and right field lines and 210 in center. The field has a grass outfield with a dirt infield, the playing area is completely fenced in and it has an excellent drainage system.

O'Keefe Field hosted its first varsity softball game against Maine Maritime on April 5, 2005. The Eagles defeated the Mariners, 7-3, in game one of their North Atlantic Conference doubleheader.

O'Keefe Field has been the host site for the for NAC Softball Championship Tournament from 2008-14,17, 21. In 2021, it was the host site of the 2021 NCAA Division III National Championship Bangor, Maine Regionals.

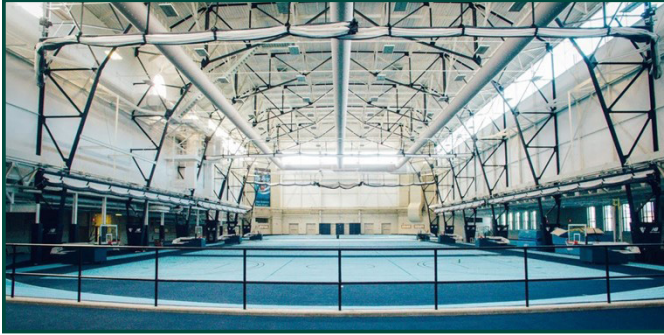
Robert (Bob) O'Keefe graduated from Husson in 1967 with a BS in Business Administration. He earned an MS in Management from SUNY Albany in 1985. He had a long and successful career in sales, beginning with Shell Oil Company in 1967 and the Angelica Corporation in 1979. Bob retired from his position as the Angelica Corporation Northeastern US Regional Manager of Sales in 1995 but continued to work for Angelica as a consultant until his full retirement in 2007.

O'Keefe is a proud member of both the Husson Alumni and Sports Hall of Fames.





New Balance Field House



Originally opened in 1926, the newly named New Balance Field House underwent a \$6 million renovation project.

The field house reopened in late January of 2014 for use by the University of Maine track & field team and the Husson University track & field team, as well as more than 500 students from 17 high schools in the Penobscot Valley Conference – Eastern Maine Indoor Track League.

Among the renovation highlights: Newly surfaced track (shortened from 218 meters to 191 meters to meet NCAA requirements) with a fourth running lane and a second long jump/triple jump pit added. Updated mechanical, lighting, life safety and ADA accessibility. New spectator area with bleachers. New press/operations area for event management. Permanent throwing circle, with a retractable throwing cage. New sports netting system to enclose the entire infield. UMaine-branded color scheme on walls, trusses and floor

Brewer Community School Track & Field Complex



Brewer Community School Track & Field Complex is the outdoor home for the Husson men's and women's track & field teams and is located behind the Brewer Community School on Pendleton Street in Brewer, Maine.

Built in 2010, the facility houses a multi-use athletic field and Brewer's only walking and running track.

Mike O'Neill

Head Coach • 3rd Season at Husson • 10-15 (.400) at Husson • 85-71 (.545) overall head coach record



Mike O'Neill has served as the head coach of the Husson men's lacrosse program since January 2021 and led the Eagles to a North Atlantic Conference East Division Title in his first season at the helm.

Prior to Husson, O'Neill spent five seasons (2013-17) as the head coach at the University of California at Santa Cruz, where he guided the Banana Slugs to five consecutive Western Collegiate Lacrosse League Tournament appearances, including the league title in 2013. The 2017 WCLL Division II Coach of the Year recipient led the University of California at Santa Cruz to a 35-42 overall record during his time on the Banana Slugs sidelines.

O'Neill served as an assistant coach at Ohio Wesleyan University from 1991-93 helping the Battling Bishops to a 49-15 overall record with three North Coast Athletic Conference Championships (1991-93), two NCAA Tournament final four appearances (1991 and 1993), including finishing as the National

Runner-up in 1993 to Hobart.

Previously, O'Neill served as the head coach at the University of Vermont (1983-86) and guided the Catamounts to four consecutive winning seasons, a feat that has not been accomplished since the O'Neill era in Burlington. Upon leaving Vermont, O'Neill was the program's all-time career leader in wins (40) and winning percentage (.741). To this day, he still remains the all-time leader in winning percentage. Additionally, he served as an assistant at the Ohio State University for two years (1981-82) and helped the team make a pair of Midwest Lacrosse Association tournament appearances, including finishing as the MLA runner-up in 1981.

A 1980 graduate of Vermont, O'Neill earned a bachelors of science degree in physical education before earning his masters degree in education from Ohio State in 1981. Additionally, he completed all, but his dissertation for a PhD in athletic administration from Ohio State in 1987 and earned a juris doctor degree from Capital University in 1990.

A native of Redding, Conn., O'Neill resides in Ellsworth, Maine.

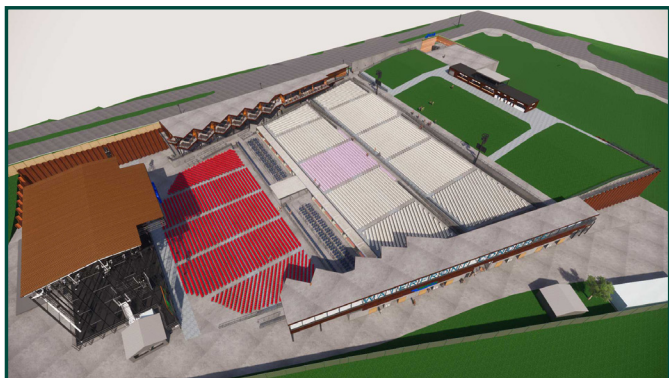

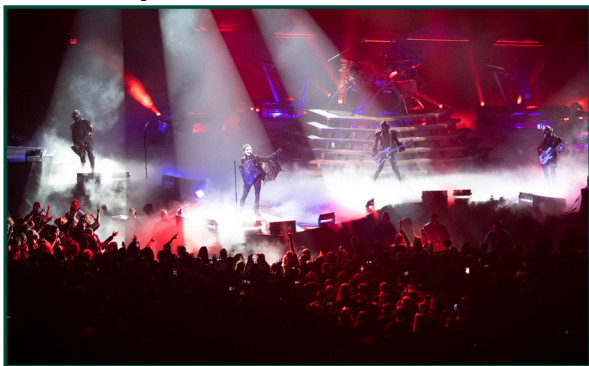

Founded in 1898 as the Shaw Business School on the second floor of a building in downtown Bangor, Husson is one of the northeast's leading institutions of higher learning, a midsize, private comprehensive research university that emphasizes undergraduate learning and living experiences.



Members of the 2022-23 undergraduate student body, including Husson student-athletes, are outstanding academic achievers and active participants in the campuses' many organizations and activities. President Robert A. Clark was raised in Albion, Maine, where he spent many afternoons watching the great Carl Yastrzemski of the Red Sox slugging hits in Fenway Park.

Named Husson's sixth president in 2010, Clark has taken a keen interest in athletics at Husson during his ten years at the University. His appreciation for athletics and his commitment to the success of the Eagles, have seen Husson capture 57 conference championships, while making 45 NCAA Division III National Championship Tournament Appearances during his tenure as President of Husson University. Clark also served as the chair of the North Atlantic Conference (NAC) Presidents' Council from 2014-2016.

This support has included the endorsement of an athletics capital improvement plan that has surpassed \$20 million, which orchestrates efforts to improve the student experience for athletes and assists with recruiting.

Prior to the Husson presidency, Clark served as the Vice President of Strategic Initiatives and Dean of the Schroeder Family School of Business Administration at the University of Evansville in Indiana. He also was the founding executive director of the University's Institute for Global Enterprise in Indiana. He has held academic appointments as a faculty member in Finance and Global Business at Butler University, the University of Tampa, and the University of Vermont.

Clark has led a number of important initiatives at Husson, including the creation of the Edward O. and Mary Ellen Darling Learning Center, the Ronan Center for Financial Technology, the Wadleigh Academic Center and the Center for Business (Opening in the Fall of 2021). He also helped secure a \$1 million gift to create the Dr. Phil Grant Distinguished Professorship in Management and Economics and increased the endowment by over \$6.5 million. During Clark's tenure, Husson has witnessed the graduation of the first class from the School of Pharmacy, received ACPE accreditation, received CACREP accreditation for two graduate counseling programs, integrated the New England School of Communications into the institution and received National Recognition for the university's Internship Program.

In addition, he has experience as a United States Army Administrative Officer, Consultant, Pension Administrator and Controller. Clark has served as a Fulbright Scholar at the Norwegian School of Management and as a guest faculty member at the Business and Economics University in Vienna. He has published articles on securities market regulation and emerging markets in a number of refereed academic journals, authored major grants from the Lilly Foundation, U.S. Department of Education, and the Kemper Foundation, and currently serves on the Bloomberg Businessweek's Academic Advisory Panel.



Clark earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in Spanish in 1976, a Bachelor of Science degree in Business Administration in 1977 and a Master's degree in Business Administration in 1983 from the University of Maine. Clark was awarded a Doctor of Philosophy in Finance with a minor in Economics and also earned the Chartered Financial Analyst (CFA) professional designation from Purdue University in 1989.

The Albion native attended Lawrence High School and has two children, Sarah and Elizabeth, and three grandchildren, Oliver, Logan and Quinn.

Since 2013, Frank Pergolizzi has guided Husson to significant levels of accomplishment as the university's director of athletics.

Pergolizzi occupies an important leadership role on campus, serving in numerous capacities since arriving in Bangor in October 2013. From his role in Newman Gymnasium, Pergolizzi serves on the senior cabinet for the university and the husson sports hall of fame committee. He has chaired five different personnel searches for significant roles on campus. He also is active within the North Atlantic Conference.

In his 10 years in Bangor, Pergolizzi has placed his stamp on the program, positioning Husson athletics among NCAA Division III's most successful in the nation. Under his leadership, four varsity sports (women's golf, women's tennis, men's indoor track & field and men's outdoor track & field) have been added, bringing the department's total number to 22 sports. He has witnessed Husson teams win 39 total conference championships in football (5), men's golf (6), men's basketball (5), field hockey (5), softball (5), women's basketball (4), women's tennis (3), women's outdoor track & field (3), men's outdoor track & field, men's soccer, baseball (2), and men's cross country. In 2017, football recorded a first round NCAA victory over nationally ranked Springfield College while

field hockey earned a first round win over nationally ranked Babson College and golfer Eric Dugas made the cut to the final rounds at the NCAA Championship and finished tied for 12th in the nation.

In 2014, Pergolizzi secured an exclusive apparel deal for the entire eagle athletics department with Adidas.

The cumulative grade point average for Husson student-athletes has continued at high levels throughout Pergolizzi's tenure. Competitive successes, such as a school-record eight-straight NAC men's golf championships from 2006-13 and eight-straight regular season and seven straight NAC tournament titles for softball from 2008-15, are an expectation on campus. Individual accomplishments have also become the norm, with 23 Husson student-athletes being named to an All-American team and over 250 earning All-Conference accolades.

Pergolizzi has addressed numerous facility upgrades, including the creation of the Wadleigh Academic Center and the Wight's Sporting Goods Strength & Conditioning Facility. A pressbox for football and field hockey was constructed in the Dr. John W. Winkin Complex, while the playing surface in the Winkin complex has been completely replaced and upgraded to a state-of-the-art facility.

Pergolizzi joined Husson from West Virginia University Institute of Technology where he served as athletics director beginning in 2009. He is currently in his 26th year as a collegiate director of athletics having also served at Saint Francis University (Pa.), East Tennessee State University and Southeastern Louisiana University. During his time at Saint Francis, Pergolizzi also served as the head football coach.

Pergolizzi serves on the town of Hampden Recreation Committee.

A native of Brooklyn, New York, Pergolizzi received a bachelor of arts in american civilization from Williams College and master of arts in physical education and sport administration from Western Michigan University.

NORTH ATLANTIC CONFERENCE 2023



The conference was formed in 1996 when Bay Path College, Lesley University, Lasell College, Maine Maritime Academy, Wheelock College and Massachusetts College of Pharmacy agreed to form the North Atlantic Women's Conference. In 1999, Elms College, Becker College and Mount Ida College joined the conference and the conference was renamed the North Atlantic Conference (NAC). From this point forward the NAC held championships for both women and men. In 2001, the NAC added Castleton University and Northern Vermont University-Johnson and three associate members Thomas College, **Husson University** and the University of Maine at Farmington bring the NAC membership to ten full members and five associate members. In 2002, NAC expands once again by adding Thomas College, **Husson University** and UMaine-Farmington to full time status. This was NAC's second major expansion in three years, bringing the NAC membership to 13 full members and two associate members.

In 2004, the NAC received their first NCAA Championship automatic qualifiers for field hockey, men's and women's soccer, women's volleyball and women's and men's Basketball. On May 1st, 2005 Julie Muller became the commissioner of the NAC. Inheriting the title from Mount Ida Athletic Director, Dr. Jacqueline Palmer, she became the first person to hold the sole title of commissioner for the 13-member NCAA Division III conference. In 2006, the NAC lost two full time members in Mount Ida College and Lasell College and lost one associate member. In 2007, the NAC received their first NCAA automatic qualifier in men's lacrosse, baseball and men's golf and lost five full time members: Bay Path College, Becker College, Elms College, Lesley University and Wheelock College. In 2008, the NAC expanded once again by adding two new full time members: Green Mountain College and Northern Vermont University-Lyndon. In 2010, the NAC partnered with the North Eastern Athletic Conference (NEAC) in four sports: baseball, women's lacrosse, men's and women's tennis, but the partnership ended for baseball and women's lacrosse in the spring of 2012 and men's and women's tennis in fall of 2017.

In 2012, the NAC added two new full time members New England College and Colby-Sawyer College and two associate members: Salem State University and Massachusetts College of Liberal Arts, bringing the NAC membership to ten full members and six associate members. In 2014, the NAC lost four long time field hockey associate members, bringing the NAC membership to ten full members and two associate members. In 2015, the NAC form a partnership with the NEAC once again, bringing together nine member schools that sponsor field hockey to compete within the NAC. In 2016, the NAC added the University of Maine at Presque Isle as an associate member in cross country and women's volleyball, bring the NAC membership to ten full members and seven associate members. Marcella Zalot became the second commissioner of the NAC on June 13, 2016. Inheriting the title from Julie Muller, who served as the NAC's first full-time commissioner. Castleton University, Colby-Sawyer College, New England College and Green Mountain College left the conference after the 2017-18 season. The State University of New York at Canton and the University of Maine at Presque Isle joined the conference as full time members on July 1, 2018. The State University of New York at Delhi joined the conference as a full time member during the 2019-20 season.

The NAC expand by three members in 2020-21 with the addition of Cazenovia College, State University of New York of Agriculture and Technology at Cobleskill, and The State University of New York Polytechnic Institute. The new members bought the total number of full institutional members to twelve, and allows for an east-west divisional competition schedule in most sports while shoring up access to the NCAA automatic qualification bid for several sports. In 2021-22, the NAC celebrated their 25th Anniversary. In the spring of 2022, Lesley University and SUNY Morrisville are announced as the newest members of the NAC, to begin competition in 2023-24. These additions expand east and west divisions to seven schools each. Lesley is an associate member for outdoor track & field this spring. In the winter of 2023, the NAC welcomed Eastern Nazarene College as a full conference member starting July 1, 2023, as the NAC expands to 14 institutions for the 2023-24 academic year after Cazenovia College announced that they will be closing down.
