INDIANA STATE TEACHERS COLLEGE

Indiana State Teachers College was created on December 20, 1865, when an Act of the General Assembly provided for the founding of a teacher training institution. This institution has grown to an evaluation in excess of six million dollars in physical plant alone, and the enrollment has increased from the original twenty-three students to an average of more than three thousand different students served in a calendar year.

The chief function of Indiana State Teachers College is to prepare teachers and other employees for the public schools. To this end four major curricula are outlined: one for elementary teachers, one for secondary teachers, one for administrators and other school employees, and one for nurses.

In addition, pre-professional courses are given in medicine, law, dentistry, and engineering. Several short term curricula are offered in the commerce department to train secretaries, stenographers, and bookkeepers. Other combinations of courses to meet the needs of special students also can be selected.

The College occupies a campus of approximately seventeen acres in the heart of Terre Haute, a ten acre plot of ground at Allendale where the college lodge is located, and a thirty-seven acre physical education field on East Wabash, where a proposed field house and athletic plant is to be erected.

There are fifteen buildings on the compact campus including the Fine Arts and Commerce Building and the Student Union Building which cost approximately \$2,000,000, and the new Administration and Health Center Building and new Communications and Mathematics Building recently completed at a cost of approximately \$2,500,000. The old Main Building, constructed in 1888, has been razed to make way for the new campus improvement plan.

Last year the College made an addition of 91 new and modern rooms to Parsons Hall, dormitory for men, and completed a new Power and Storage Plant, a short distance off the campus. At the present, a new class room building is under construction and should be completed in the near future.

The College athletic teams in football, basketball, golf, baseball, tennis, and track participate in varsity intercollegiate competition.

Indiana State joined the Indiana Collegiate Conference in 1950, a six-team loop of Hoosier colleges. Members of the two-year old circuit include Butler, Ball State, Valparaiso, St. Joseph's, Evansville, and Indiana State. Full schedules in all sports are slated for the conference members throughout the 1952-53 season.

COACHING STAFF SKETCHES

MARK E. DEAN -- Head Football Coach (Northern Illinois '38)

Coach Mark Dean is starting his second year as head football coach of the Indiana State eleven this fall. A '38 graduate of Northern Illinois State Teachers College at DeKalb, Ill., Dean has 14 years of successful coaching experience. He spent three years at Wisconsin State Teachers College, Superior, Wis., before taking the post at Indiana State last year.

The young coach began his gridiron coaching career as a physical education instructor and coach in the West Des Moines, Iowa, school system. Moving to Roodhouse, Ill., high school in 1942, he won eight consecutive games and a championship in a single year's stay. The next year at Jacksonville, Ill., Dean molded another championship squad as his team won six and lost two.

Dean, a U.S. Navy veteran, spent the next two years in the service and immediately after being discharged he took the head coaching post at Austin Junior College in Austin, Minn. His teams at Austin compiled a phenomenal record of 13 victories, two defeats, and one tie for two seasons and walked off with a championship.

In 1948, Dean was appointed head of the football coaching staff at Superior State. In three seasons at the Wisconsin college, his aggregations won 11, lost 13, and tied two games.

Coach Dean's all-time record lists 66 victories, 32 losses, and four ties. His football teams have grabbed four championships, the last being at Austin Junior College in 1947.

Dean uses a diversified offensive attack, but favors the T and split-T formations. He also utilizes a single-wing attack. As in the past, he will conform his attack to suit his material.

COACHING STAFF SKETCHES (CONT.)

DR. WALTER E. MARKS -- Backfield Coach (Chicago '27)

Although Dr. Walter Marks resigned the head coaching job at Indiana State just three years ago, he will be back on the scene for the second year as backfield coach under Dean. He retired after a 24-year reign as the head Sycamore football coach and concentrates on the teaching of physical education and coaching the Indiana State baseball squad.

Marks, now a Big Ten basketball and football official, was one of Amos Alonzo Stagg's greatest athletics at Chicago University. During his sophomore year, the Chicago Maroons walked off with their last Big Ten gridiron championship. "Wally" also starred on the baseball diamond and hardwood at Chicago.

He came to Indiana State immediately following his graduation in 1927 and compiled an impressive record in coaching all sports at State.

ROBERT L. HOLLAR -- Line Coach (Manchester '41)

Another member of the Indiana State coaching staff who is starting his second season, Robert L. Holler came to State in 1950 as an instructor in physical education in the Indiana State Teachers College Laboratory School. Last year he moved up to help Dean shape the football team and will again work as line coach this year.

A '41 Manchester graduate, Hollar has served as a coach in various Indiana high schools before accepting a position at State. He was coach at Van Buren, 1941-42; Hanover instructor and coach in 1947; and New Paris coach, 1948-50.

OUTLOOK FOR THE 1952 SEASON

Coach Mark Dean, in his second year at Indiana State, has put together what seems to be a good ball club. The Sycamores are looking forward to the 1952 grid season with hopes of greatly improving their record over the last three campaigns. State has won only two games in the last three years. The nucleus of this year's squad will be formed around 15 returning letter winners of last season, and one from the year before.

Out of the 26 lettermen on last year's aggregation, one was graduated from college, six were called for duty in different branches of our armed forces, four did not report for gridiron practice this fall, and the remaining 15 are in Sycamore uniforms.

The 16 lettermen on this year's squad include John Arzumanian, center; Jack Brown, halfback; Jim Cox, quarterback; John Gainey, guard; Pete Kokinda, end; Louis Lambdin, tackle; Bob Masulovich, guard; Jack Moon, center; Jim Morefield, halfback; John Parker, halfback; Eddie Robertson, halfback; Dave Schaeffer, tackle; Louis Scott, end; Glenn Tyler, end; Don Vrabel, halfback; and Arvin Workman, fullback.

Along with these returning veterans is a large crop of freshmen prospects which is expected to give the Sycamore squad a great deal more depth than it had last season. A couple of outstanding transfer students who reported for drills at Indiana State this fall should also provide the Sycamores with some valuable aid.

OUTLOOK FOR THE 1952 SEASON (CONT.)

Indiana State, with 60 candidates out for grid practice this season, has the largest turnout in some years. About 30 of the 60 members in the Sycamore camp are freshmen, but the State crew is not as young as this indicates. Coach Mark Dean has 16 returning lettermen and four or five other tried hands.

Heading the Sycamore attack this season will be Halfback Eddie Robertson, last year's most valuable player award winner; John Gainey, All-Conference guard on the I.C.C. second team last year; and Halfback Don Vrabel, last season's leading ground gainer. Along with these standouts of last year, will be Scatback Jack Brown, Sophomore Quarterback Jim Cox, End Pete Kokinda, and Arvin Workman, who did not play last season because of a bad leg. Workman is expected to see a lot of action in the fullback spot.

One of the prize catches of freshmen is Paul Lemont, who was All-Wabash Valley Conference fullback at Terre Haute Gerstneyer last year. The 195-pound yearling will probably be a starter this season. Don Collins is another first year prospect who was All-Wabash Valley. He is a big 6-4, 220 pound end from Gerstneyer. Jack Griffith, transfer student from Indiana University, is a pretty sure bet for a tackle slot. Several other newcomers at State will also be near the first eleven.
