INDIANA STATE TEACHERS COLLEGE

Indiana State Teachers College in Terre Haute, Indiana, is one of four state-supported colleges and universities in the State of Indiana, the others being Ball State Teachers College, Indiana University, and Purdue University. Indiana State was created on December 20, 1865, when an act of the General Assembly provided for the founding of a teacher training institution. The doors of the college were first opened to students on January 6, 1870. In its ensuing 85-year history, the college has established itself as one of the finest teacher training colleges in the nation. The physical plant has grown to an evaluation exceeding eleven million dollars, and the enrollment has increased from the original 23 students to an average yearly student enrollment of over 3000 different students.

The chief function of the College is to prepare students for positions as teachers, administrators, and other employees in the public schools. To this end, four major courses of study in this field are offered: one for elementary teachers, one for secondary school teachers, one for administrators and other special school employees, and one for nurses.

While the emphasis is on public school teaching and administration, Indiana State does, however, offer a wide variety of courses of study in other-than-teaching fields to meet the needs of the students. Those not preparing for the teaching profession may pursue regular four-year courses of study in art, secretarial science, accounting-business administration, merchandising-business administration, general business administration, journalism, medical technology, professional music, radio, social welfare, or theatre. The regular four-year liberal arts degree may be earned at the college. Four-year pre-professional courses are offered in pre-dental and pre-engineering and two year (non-degree) short course in business is offered to prepare students in either accounting or secretarial skills.

Indiana State occupies a quadrangular-shaped campus of some 17 or more acres in the heart of the City of Terre Haute in southwestern Indiana. The College's Allendale Lodge is maintained in the city's southern suburban area. The new Physical Education Field, one-half sodded and the other half taken over by six tennis courts, is just one block west of the campus and was opened in June, 1956.

Thirteen buildings are situated on the compact campus area. All the buildings are relatively new and modern structures. The new Home Economics Building was completed in the summer of 1956 and was opened for the first time in the fall of 1956. An addition to the Industrial Education Building was also completed last summer. This addition houses the college's printing and auto mechanics shops. The entire Industrial Education Building was recently remodeled, as was the Library last spring. The 25-classroom Education-Social Studies Building was first opened in January, 1954. Three years ago, 91 rooms were added to Parsons Hall for men and in 1955 a 76-room addition was completed to the Women's Residence Hall. The twin Administration-Health Center Building and Language-Mathematics Building were completed at a

cost of almost two million dollars and opened in 1950. College officials are now planning an addition to the Student Union Building, a new Science Hall, and a new girl's dormitory.

Indiana State football, basketball, golf, baseball, tennis, track, and swimming teams participate and maintain schedules in intercollegiate competition. Freshmen are not eligible for varsity competition. Fresh schedules will be maintained against other college fresh teams.

Indiana State and five other Indiana colleges and universities officially organized the Indiana Collegiate Conference in 1950. DePauw University was accepted as a seventh loop member in 1953, and the ICC has been operating as a seven-team conference since 1954. Full schedules in all sports are slated for conference members throughout the 1956-57 college year. Current members of the five-year old conference include: Ball State, Butler, DePauw, Evansville, Indiana State, St. Joseph's, and Valparaiso.

The Sycamore football team will play its first night game in many seasons when it opens the season against Eastern Illinois under the lights.....a special feature is being planned for that night in that Bill Jones may be honored at the same time by his Sullivan friends.....also, the Student Council is promoting the game as it did last spring's baseball game between Indiana State and DePauw....it drew over 600 fans out on a week night just for a baseball game....Student Council also is all but for sports this year and plans to have special committees formed to inaugurate special days, ie, High School Day, Band Day, etc....these features are just a part of the ever-expanding athletic program at Indiana State and everyone connected with the school is looking forward to more successes and setps forward in years to come.....one day---- the Sycamores shall be one of the top college outfits in the nation and when that day comes, everyone here will be happy.

ABOUT OUR COACHING STAFF.....

BILL JONES, HEAD COACH -- Bill Jones, a graduate of Ohio Wesleyan, starts his first season as head football coach at Indiana State this fall. Jones comes from Sullivan High School, where his grid teams lost only four games in the past four seasons. During those four years, he racked up two 20-game winning streaks.

Jones played high school football at Clinton (Ind.) where he was named to the Indiana mythical all-star team in his senior season. At Ohio Wesleyan, he also was named the most valuable player by his teammates in his senior year. He played fullback at both schools. Jones earned the masters degree at Indiana State.

Jones, who comes from a mining family, got his first jobs in automobile plants and then went to Sullivan for his first high school job. He was there for 13 years before coming to Indiana State this summer. Besides being head football coach at the school, he was athletic director and was head basketball coach last season. In his first and only year as hardwood coach, he broke a "county school" reign on the Sullivan sectional title and took his Golden Arrow team to the regionals, where it was defeated by highly-ranked Sandborn. (One of his hardwood predecessors at the school was John Longfellow, Jr., present Muncie coach.)

In summing up his philosophy of coaching, Jones is sincere in saying that the fundamental aim of his coaching is to instill the correct attitude towards athletics into his players. "We have three main aims in coaching: (1) to satisfy the natural desire to participate; (2) to develop a sportsmanlike attitude; (3) to be glad in winning but always striving for better things and to be able to accept criticism," he says. This is Bill Jones' attitude and philosophy and upon this keynote rests the success of future Sycamore football fortunes.

ABOUT OUR COACHING STAFF (Cont.).....

ROBERT HOLLAR, FRESHMAN COACH (Manchester '41) -- Robert L. Hollar will assist Bill Jones in varsity football until September 11 when he will assume his duties as head freshman coach and coach the frosh in all sports. Hollar, however, is no newcomer to the varsity coaching staff, as he coached the linemen in football for Mark Dean in 1951 and 1952 and for Paul Selge in 1955. He has been a member of the Indiana State faculty since 1950 and has been Dean of the Indiana State Teachers Laboratory School. He has helped coach all sports in the Lab School, and was named to the college coaching staff as freshman coach in the spring of '55.

A '43 Manchester grad, Hollar served as coach in several Indiana high schools before coming to the campus in 1950. He was coach at Van Buren, Hanover College and New Paris.

ROBERT MEYNE, ASSISTANT AND BACKFIELD COACH (Hanover '48) -- Another new name on the Sycamore coaching staff this seasons is Robert Meyne, who comes from Earlham College where he was head football and track coach, besides being athletic director.

At Indiana State, Meyne, a native Chicagoan and graduate of Hanover College, will serve as an assistant in football and be head track coach. He also will be in charge of instruction dealing with instructional recreation.

Meyne earned his master's degree at Indiana University, where he also has completed the course work for the doctorate in physical education. He replaces Mark Dean on the physical education staff.

ABOUT OUR COACHING STAFF (Cont.).....

PAUL SELGE, LINE COACH (Indiana State, '43)-- One of the oldtimers on the Sycamore coaching staff is Paul Selge, who also is head swimming mentor and assistant in track. Selge has spent three years in the Navy during World War 11 and returned in 1951 for a two-year stint.

Selge played three years of varsity ball at Indiana State under coach Wally Marks. He is ranked as one of the all-time Sycamore greats during the past twenty years. In 1943, he was named as center on the all-state collegiate eleven.

He first started his coaching duties at Indiana State in 1947, and has been line coach in football every season except for 1955, when he was acting head coach in Mark Dean's absence. He also was head track coach until last summer, when Robert Meyne relieved him of those duties.

Selge is a native of South Bend and graduated from Washington-Clay High School. He received his B.S. and M.S. degrees from Indiana State.

DUANE KLUEH, ASSISTANT COACH IN FOOTBALL (Indiana State, '49) -- Duane Klueh came to Indiana State in 1955 to be head coach in basketball and to assist in football. He has coached the ends for the past two seasons. He will do the same this season and also coach tennis again. He was an All-American basketball player at Indiana State in 1948 and graduated the following spring. A former Fowler High School coach, 1951-55, Klueh was appointed head coach in the spring of '55 to succeed John Longfellow as head basketball coach.

PROSPECTS FOR THE 1957 INDIANA STATE FOOTBALL SEASON

The 1957 edition of the Fighting Sycamore football team will be under the tutelage of a new coach, will have 17 letterwinners in it, and will have a "new kind of spirit" abounding on it. The new coach is Bill Jones, a man who has been at Sullivan High School for the last 13 years and who has established himself as a coach to be respected.

Coming back to bolster the Sycamore attack will be letterwinners or good sophomores at nearly every position. Coach Jones said earlier in practice, "We might be weak in a couple of positions, but if the boys work as faithfully in the games as they have in practice, we might surprise a team or two."

Any victory that the Sycamores can give to their fans will be a very pleasant one, as the ISTC gridsters have only won two Indiana Collegiate Conference games in the past three seasons, and only four games in the past two. Most of the ICC teams lost some from last year's teams and the Sycamores do have experience on their side, even if they don't have as much material. This factor may give the blue-clads the edge in some of the games. Last year, the Sycamores defeated Eastern Illinois and Anderson, both at home.

The gridsters did lose three men from last year's team who will be hard to replace. They are: Bill Griffith, two-time All-ICC selection at end; Bob Wilbur, leading scorer at halfback for the past two years; and Vern Ketner, last year's most valuable player. He was a center and guard.

In conclusion, Coach Jones says: "We will make our mistakes--but I think they will be honest ones. We haven't had much preparation for the season--at least, not as much as I would have liked. However, I feel that we (the team) will have a little fun and maybe give some trouble to some of those teams who think we are only pushovers."
