INDIANA STATE TEACHERS COLLEGE

Indiana State Teachers College located in Terre Haute, Indiana, is one of four state-supported colleges and universities in the State of Indiana. The others are Ball State Teachers College, Indiana University, and Purdue University. Indiana State was created on December 20, 1865, when an act of the General Assembly provided for the founding of a teacher training institution. The doors were first opened to twenty-three students on January 6, 1870. In the following 88-year period, the College became firmly established and recognized as one of the nation's finest teacher education colleges.

The physical plant has grown to an evaluation exceeding 13 million dollars, and the enrollment increased from the original 23 students to an enrollment of over 3500 on-campus students and an additional 1500 to 2000 students enrolled in extension and correspondence study. Termed one of the "fastest-growing colleges in the Midwest," enrollment increased 83 per cent for the four-year period, 1953 to 1957, and a 100 per cent increase is predicted for the five-year period, 1953 to 1958.

Major emphasis in the College's instructional program is to prepare students for positions as teachers, administrators, and other public school positions. To this end, courses of study are offered for elementary teachers, secondary teachers, school administrators and other special school employees, and nurses.

While major emphasis is on preparation of students for the teaching profession, Indiana State does, however, offer a strong and well-received program of study in many other-than-teaching fields. A regular four-year liberal arts degree program is offered. Also, students not preparing for the teaching profession may select four-year degree programs in art, secretarial science, accounting-business administration, merchandising-business administration, general business administration, journalism, medical technology, professional music, radio-television, pre-social work, or theatre. Four-year pre-professional degree courses are offered in pre-law and pre-medicine, and two-year (non-degree) courses are offered in pre-dentistry and pre-engineering. A two-year (non-degree) short course in business is offered to prepare students for positions in either accounting or secretarial work.

Indiana State occupies a campus area of some 37 or more acres in the heart of the City of Terre Haute which is located in southwestern Indiana along the famous "Banks of the Wabash." The College's Allendale Lodge is maintained in the city's southern suburban Allendale area. The Physical Education Field, one-half sodded and the other half taken over by six lighted grasstex tennis courts is just one block west of the campus quadrangle. More physical education areas are now being completed. Home football and baseball games are played in Terre Haute's Memorial Stadium. Terre Haute is also the home of two other fine colleges, Rose Polytechnic Institute (an engineering college for men) and St. Mary-of-the-Woods College (a Catholic girls' college).

Thirteen campus buildings are situated on the compact downtown Indiana State campus area. A new Home Economics Building and a new

addition to the Industrial Education Building housing printing and auto mechanics shops were opened in 1956. The entire three-story Industrial Education Building was completely remodeled and newly-equipped and opened in the Fall of 1957. The College Library was re-modeled and a new six-story air-conditioned addition was completed in 1957. The 25-classroom Education-Social Studies Building was first opened in January, 1954. Four years ago, 91 rooms were added to Parsons Hall for men, and three years ago, a 76-room addition was completed to the Women's Residence Hall. The twin Administration-Health Center and Language-Mathematics Buildings were completed at a cost of almost two million dollars in 1950.

Now under construction are a new six-story women's residence hall and an addition to the Student Union Building. Both are due for completion in 1959. A new \$2,500,000 science building will be put under construction in 1959 and completed in 1960.

Future building plans include a new men's physical education building.

Indiana State football, basketball, baseball, golf, tennis, track cross country, and swimming teams participate and maintain schedules in intercollegiate competition. Freshmen are not eligible to compete on varsity teams, but frosh schedules are maintained in most all athletics.

Indiana State and five other Indiana colleges and universities officially organized the Indiana Collegiate Conference in 1950. DePauw University was accepted as a seventh loop member in 1953, and the ICC has been operating as a seven-team conference since 1954. Full schedules in all sports are slated for all conference members throughout the 1958-59 year. Current members of the eight-year old conference include: Ball State, Butler, DePauw, Evansville, Indiana State, St. Joseph's, and Valparaiso.

Jones came from Sullivan High School, where his grid team lost only four games in the past four seasons. During those four years, he racked up two 20-game winning streaks.

Jones played high school football at Clinton (Ind.) where he was named to the Indiana mythical all-star team in his senior season. At Ohio Wesleyan, he also was named the most valuable player by his team mates in his senior year. He played fullback at both schools. Jones earned the master's degree at Indiana State.

Coming from a mining family, Jones got his first jobs in automobile plants and then went to Sullivan for his first high school coaching position. He was there for 13 years before coming to Indiana State. Besides being head football coach at the Sullivan High School, he served as athletic director and was head basketball coach last season. In his first and only year as hardwood coach, he broke a "county-school" reign on the Sullivan sectional title and took his Golden Arrow team to the regionals only to meet defeat by a highly-ranked Sandborn team.

In summing up his philosophy of coaching, Jones is sincere in saying that the fundamental aim of his coaching is to instill the correct attitude towards athletics into his players. "We have three main aims in coaching; (1) to satisfy the natural desire to participate; (2) to develop a sportsmanlike attitude; (3) to be glad in winning, but always striving for better things and to be able to accept criticism," he says. This is Bill Jones' philosophy and upon this keynote rests the success of future Sycamore football fortunes.

ABOUT OUR COACHING STAFF (cont.).....

PAUL SELGE, LINE COACH (Indiana State, '43) -- One of the old-timers on the Sycamore coaching staff is Paul Selge, who also is head swimming mentor. Selge spent three years in the Navy during World War II and returned in 1951 for a two-year stint.

Selge played three years of varsity ball at Indiana State under coach Wally Marks. He is ranked as one of the all-time Sycamore greats during the past twenty years. In 1943, he was named as center on the all-state collegiate eleven.

He first started his coaching duties at Indiana State in 1947, and has been line coach in football every season except for 1955, when he was acting head coach in Mark Dean's absence. He also has been head track coach.

Selge is a native of South Bend and graduated from Washington-Clay High School. He earned the B.S. and M.S. degrees from Indiana State.

DUANE KLUUEH, ASSISTANT COACH IN FOOTBALL (Indiana State, '49)
Duane Klueh came to Indiana State in 1955 to be head coach in basketball and to assist in football. He has coached the ends for the past three seasons. He will do the same this season and also coach tennis again. He was an All-American basketball player at Indiana State in 1948 and graduated the following spring. A former Fowler High School coach, 1951-55, Klueh was appointed head basketball coach in the spring of '55 to succeed John Longfellow.

ROBERT HOLLAR, FRESHMAN COACH (Manchester '41) -- Robert L. Hollar will assist Bill Jones in varsity football until the middle of September when he will assume his duties as head freshman coach and coach the frosh in all sports. Hollar, however, is no newcomer to the varsity coaching staff, as he coached the linemen in football for Mark Dean in 1951 and 1952 and for Paul Selge in 1955. He has been a member of the Indiana State faculty since 1950 and has been Dean of the Indiana State Teachers Laboratory School. He has helped coach all sports in the Lab School, and was named to the college coaching staff as freshman coach in the spring of '55.

A '43 Manchester grad, Hollar served as coach in several Indiana high schools before coming to the campus in 1950. He was coach at Van Buren, Hanover College and New Paris.

ROBERT MEYNE, ASSISTANT AND BACKFIELD COACH (Hanover '48) -- Also starting his second season on the Sycamore coaching staff this season is Robert Meyne, who comes from Earlham College where he served as head football and track coach, besides being athletic director.

At Indiana State, Meyne, a native Chicagoan and graduate of Hanover College, serves as an assistant in football and head track coach. He also is in charge of instruction dealing with instructional recreation.

Meyne earned his master's degree at Indiana University, where he also has completed the course work for the doctorate in physical education.

PROSPECTS FOR THE 1958 FOOTBALL SEASON

According to Head Coach Bill Jones this will be a building year at Indiana State as he has only six seniors on the small squad of 33. In viewing the prospects, as compared to last year at this time, coach Jones says, "we will be strong in the backfield, but much weaker in the line."

The Sycamores have only three starters back from last year's squad, which won one of seven games, none in the ICC. Quarterback Tad Morlock, a natural halfback, converted to quarter last year out of necessity, will remain at this position. The other backfield regular returning is fullback Jim Waugh, the team's leading rusher and the best punter in the ICC last year. The lone starter in the line is tackle Emmett Stimac, who will again anchor one side of the line. The Sycamores lost a total of 14 lettermen from last year, and have only 12 returning.

The reason for the bright outlook in the backfield picture is the return to form of Jay Barrett, who in 1956 was the leading rusher as a sophomore; and the appearance of Larry Sweatt, an all-state halfback at Terre Haute Wiley.

Up front State can count on: ends, Wally Webb, Bob Belcher, and Tom Helmick; tackles, (besides Stimac) Gene Wilson and Ed Rusk; guard, Claude Sanders; and center, John Clements. This is our "thin Blue line."

The Sycamores will be in there fighting every game with the emphasis on improving last years record.
