OTHER ATHLETIC UNITS -- Indiana State put into service this fall its new \$161,721 athletic field which will include a bituminous material track, fully turfed football field, and lighted football practice field. Track has already been selected as site of 1965 ICC Meet. New 5,424-seat ISC Arena opened in February, 1962. Building includes three basketball floors, a 25 meter Olympic type swimming pool, weight room, wrestling room, gymnastics room and indoor practice facilities for track and baseball. Arena selected as site of 1965 NAIA National Wrestling Tournament.

INDIANA STATE COLLEGE

Located on more than 50 acres in the heart of the City of Terre Haute, Indiana, near the famous "Banks of the Wabash," Indiana State College is a public, state-supported, multi-purpose college offering undergraduate and graduate study in the arts and sciences, professional-vocational education, and teacher education and school administration. Created by an Act of the Indiana General Assembly on December 20, 1865, the College first opened its doors on January 6, 1870, to 23 students.

Known as Indiana State Normal School from 1870 to 1927, the name was changed to Indiana State Teachers College in 1927 and then to Indiana State College on July 7, 1961. Each name change was in recognition of greater educational offerings of the College.

Called one of the "fastest growing colleges in the Midwest," Indiana State's enrollment over the 1953 to 1963 decade increased from 1,867 to 6,835 students. Enrollment for the fall of 1964 was expected to be 8,092 students.

The growth of the College is evidenced not only by the larger student body, but with a continually increasing number of campus buildings and a bigger campus area.

Over the last 14 years, buildings have been erected at a rapid pace, and 26 are now located on the main campus. A women's housing complex of three six-story halls included the completion of Burford Hall in 1959, Erickson Hall in 1962, and Pickerl Hall in 1963. Two nine-story men's residence halls were also completed. Sandison Hall was opened in 1962, and Gillum Hall was finished in 1963. In the fall of 1964, two 12-story residence halls--Blumberg Hall for women and Beecher Cromwell Hall for men--were opened for the first time. Two similar 12-story residence halls are now under construction and will be opened in September, 1965. The nine above halls will provide housing for 3,300 students.

Other construction completed in the 1960's include the Science Building in 1961 and Bookstore Building and Indiana State College Arena in 1962. The old Science Building was remodeled and completed in 1962 as the new home of the School of Business.

The outstanding Indiana State College Arena was put into use for the first time in February, 1962, and officially dedicated in December, 1962. This building has a large gymnasium area which can be used as three gyms or converted into one large gym floor for basketball games and other events. The gym is serviced by two sections (one on east and one on west) of 30-row mechanized, folding bleachers which provide seating for over 5,000 persons. These bleachers, in a retracted position, take up only five or six feet of floor space. When extended, the bleachers take up about 60 feet of floor space. Additional end bleachers used in the gym increase the seating capacity to about 6,000 persons.

The Indiana State College Arena also has a gymnastics room, wrestling room, several dressing rooms, a trainer's room, an equipment room, an Olympic type swimming pool with 1-meter and 3-meter diving boards, a suite of faculty offices, and three classrooms. The lower level of the building, the area directly under the huge Arena gym, is a dirt-covered area providing facilities for indoor track practice, baseball batting and pitching cages, and golf practice cages. Along side this dirt covered area are various types of body conditioning equipment and locker facilities.

Just south of the Arena are the six outdoor, grasstex-type tennis courts. In the summer of 1964, the new track and practice football field was completed on property on the west side of the Arena. The 30-foot wide track is a quarter mile with eight lanes and is of bituminous material--there are 100-yard straightaways. The broad jump and pole vault run-up ramps are also made of the special type bituminous material, and the shotput and discus throw points are constructed of concrete. Only special type short-spiked or rubber soled shoes will be used on the bituminous material.

Construction started in the summer of 1964 on a new classroom building and a Married Students Apartment Building. The classroom building will have 32 classrooms, two 250-seat lecture rooms, two School of Nursing laboratories, a library reading room, and 98 faculty offices. The apartment building, the first of four to be constructed, will be a four-story, three-wing building with a total of 80 apartments--48 two-bedroom and 32 one-bedroom units. Both of the buildings will be ready for use in September, 1965.

College officials are now planning an addition to the new Science Building and a new Student Health Center Building.

Academic reorganization and growth came with the establishment of the School of Education in 1960, School of Graduate Studies in 1961, College of Arts and Sciences and School of Nursing in 1962, Psychology Research Center, Computer Center, and Bureau of Business Research in 1963, and the School of Business in 1964. Plans are to soon establish a School of Health, Physical Education, and Recreation and a School of Industry. Doctor's degree programs leading to the Ed.D. and Ph.D. will be launched in 1965 with the first programs being the Ph.D. in biology and Ed.D. in guidance and elementary education.

Indiana State has varsity teams in football, basketball, baseball, golf, tennis, track, cross country, wrestling, swimming, and gymnastics and inter-collegiate schedules are maintained each year in these sports. Freshman students are not eligible to compete on any varsity teams, but there are freshman teams in most sports with limited schedules for these teams planned. Wrestling was added to the program four years ago, and gymnastics became a varsity sport two years ago.

Indiana State and five other Indiana colleges and universities officially organized the Indiana Collegiate Conference (ICC) in 1950. DePauw University was accepted as a seventh loop member in 1953. The ICC has been operating as a seven-team conference since 1954, and full schedule in all sports for all ICC schools were first slated in the 1959-60 year.

Indiana State College is also a member of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (N.A.I.A.) and the National Collegiate Athletic Association (N.C.A.A.).

BILL JONES, Head Football Coach (Ohio Wesleyan, '39)

Indiana State's head football coach Bill Jones is one of college football's most original thinkers, and since coming to State in 1957, he's used his originality along with a sound knowledge of football fundamentals to build a program which has turned out consistently tough, exciting Sycamore gridiron elevens.

His feats in molding raw talent into solid teams at Indiana State twice won for him the honor of being named Indiana Collegiate Conference Coach-of-the-Year. He first was accorded the distinction in 1959, and then again in 1962.

The originality of Jones, who introduced the Lonesome End at State a year before Red Blaik did at Army, again showed through when he developed an unbalanced line wing-T set-up which proved to be devastating. Though new in appearances, the system was as old as football in that it relied on plain, old-fashion blocking in accepted conventional patterns to make it work.

It is only fitting that Jones has been in recent years getting some satisfaction from his work at State, for he has faced a monumental task in raising the Sycamores' football fortunes from the greatest depths of their history.

It's been an uphill fight, but Jones has been winning his battles. His first two seasons here (1957 and 1958) found him compiling a cumulative 3-12 record. Then, with the players getting adjusted to his system, a 5-3 season resulted in 1959. In 1960, the Sycamores captured the last three tilts of the season after losing the first four by close scores.

Jones hit a temporary snag in 1961 when a combination of things--including an abnormal number of injuries--resulted in a disappointing 2-6 record. Then in 1962, without some 46 players from the 1961 varsity and freshmen teams and with a solid pre-season vote for last place in the ICC, Jones and his charges pulled a walloping surprise on everyone, including themselves, by fighting for the ICC crown right up to the final weekend of the season. The Sycamores finished with a 5-3 mark, and tied Valparaiso for second in the conference.

Last season, the Sycamores easily handled four opponents, and were so close to the other four, that it easily could have been an undefeated season. Valpo knocked off State on a last quarter TD pass. A missed run for a TD conversion kept Indiana State from edging Butler, undefeated in ICC play, and both the Ball State and DePauw games could have gone either way in the closing minutes.

Jones came to Indiana State in 1957 after an amazing record at Sullivan, Ind. High School. From 1952 through 1956, his Sullivan elevens lost only four games and had two 20-game winning streaks. He was at Sullivan High School for 13 years and also served as athletic director. He coached the Sullivan basketball team for the 1956-57 season. His father was a coal miner, but Jones had his first jobs in automobile manufacturing plants.

Jones hopes to instill in young men the correct attitude toward athletics. He wants to satisfy the natural desire to participate, develop sportsmanlike attitudes, and create a striving for victory; however, always working harder to improve skills and accept criticism. With such noteworthy aims, Jones-coached young men are certain to be better players and better citizens.

JOHN L. LONGFELLOW, Athletic Director (Manchester, '28)

Regarded as one of Indiana's finest basketball coaches, John L. Longfellow joined the ISC staff as head basketball coach and athletic director in 1948. In six seasons, 1948-54, he piloted ISC basketball teams to 12 assorted championships, the top title being the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics crown in 1950. Named Indiana's 1950 college Coach of the Year, he co-coached the U.S. Olympic basketball team that won the Pan American Games basketball title in Buenos Aires, Argentina, in 1951. Seven of his ISC players were on that U.S. Olympic team. A heart attack in 1955 forced him to quit coaching basketball, but he continues as the athletic director.

As head coach at Elkhart, Ind. High School, Longfellow's teams over a 19-year period won 24 championships and 113 of 165 N.I.H.S.C. games. He served as president of the N.A.I.A. and has been a member of the N.A.I.A. executive board for a number of years.

In 1958, he was sent by the U.S. State Department as an American specialist to the Republic of Haiti to supervise a program of athletics from the university level on down through the secondary and elementary schools. He also spent some time assisting Haitian coaches in preparing Haitian athletes for competition in the Olympics and Pan American games.

CHESTER E. SANDERS, Head Backfield and Defensive (Indiana U., '48)

In his fourth year on the ISC coaching staff, Chester E. Sanders was assistant football and golf coach and head wrestling coach at Wabash (Ind.) College from 1955-59. He is recognized as one of the finest defensive coaches in the Midwest. A graduate of Brazil, Ind., High School, he earned the B.S. and M.S. degrees at Indiana University and he was named on the 1945 Big Ten Team. Sanders coached at high schools in Hobart, Ind., 1948-50, East Gary, Ind., 1950-53, and Clinton, Ind., 1953-55, before going to Wabash College in 1955.

PAUL E. SELGE, Head line coach (Indiana State, '43)

A veteran and versatile member of the Indiana State coaching staff since 1946, except for a two-year period 1951-52 when he was recalled for a tour of duty with the U.S. Navy, Paul E. Selge has been Head Line Coach every season since he joined the staff. In 1955, he was the acting Head Football Coach.

An Indiana State graduate, Selge, a native of South Bend, Ind., is a Woodrow Wilson High School (South Bend) graduate. He did not play high school football, but ranks as one of all-time outstanding Indiana State football players. He was a varsity center under Sycamore Coach Walter E. Marks for three seasons and was named at the center position on the 1941 and 1942 Indiana All-State Collegiate teams. He earned the M.S. degree at Indiana State.

He serves as the college's Head Swimming Coach and has also been Head Track Coach.

ROBERT L. HOLLAR, Assistant Football Coach (Manchester, '41)

Robert L. Hollar assists coaching the varsity linemen until the middle of September and then he devotes his efforts to freshmen football players. He is head coach of the freshman basketball team also.

A member of the ISC staff since 1950, Hollar is the former Dean of the ISC Laboratory School and coached varsity linemen during the 1951, 1952, and 1955 seasons. He was named as a full-time member of the college coaching staff in 1955, and will take over as head golf coach for the 1965 season.

Before joining the ISC staff in 1950, Hollar was coach at Van Buren (Ind.) and New Paris (Ind.) high schools and Hanover College.

GEORGE OBERLE, Assistant Football Coach (Earlham, '52)

Beginning his third year as a member of the Sycamore coaching staff, George Oberle, like Hollar, will be working with the varsity squad candidates until mid-September, when he will begin working with the freshman crop of gridgers.

Also head freshman baseball coach, Oberle came to Indiana State after acting as Director of Athletics for the Marion, Ind., public school system for two years. He has served as coach at Mooresville and North Central high schools and at Earlham College.

He received his B.S. degree in Physical Education from Earlham College in 1952 and his M.S. from Butler University in 1956.

DAVID HATFIELD, Graduate Assistant Football Coach (Eastern Kentucky, '62)

A 1962 graduate of Eastern Kentucky, David Hatfield will spend this year working on his masters at Indiana State and will assist Bill Jones with the varsity linemen.

Dave lettered four years at a tackle slot for Eastern, doing all the place kicking during his last two years, and played pro football for a year with the Louisville Raiders of the United Football League. While with the Raiders, he started every game at either offensive tackle or center and did all the Raiders' place kicking.

Also during the past two years, he has taught school at Jeffersonville High School and was assistant line coach at Jeffersonville under Indiana State graduate William "Doc" Bolton.

THE 1964 OUTLOOK

If coach Bill Jones were running his 1964 Sycamore football team like a string of 11 motels, he would have the vacancy sign out at most of his establishments. Between the loss of such outstanding performers from last year as Walley Geib and Rolland Beckham, both All-ICC linemen, scholastic difficulties, which took two lettermen and the top three prospects from the sophomore crop, and those who just didn't come back, Jones has been left with a roster of inexperienced players of unknown quality.

The Sycamores have back only 14 lettermen, and one of those, two-year letterman quarterback Clarence Reedy, got a broken finger on his passing hand before the season was within a month of starting. Help will be sought from five junior college transfers.

With Reedy, a Terre Haute product, incapacitated for the first part of the season, Jones has been forced to move two-year letterman halfback Don Pope to the signal calling slot. Pope got his monograms at defensive halfback, but he played quarterback in high school, and Jones feels that he needs the Plainfield senior's experience. Fighting for the spot with him will be letterman Gary Page from Angola, and Scott Riley from Evansville.

The rest of the backfield is even foggier. With Pope out of the picture as a running back until Reedy returns, Pat Tuttle from Casey, Ill., is left as the only letterman in the backfield. He'll probably start at tight halfback, with Manny Stover, Marshall, Ill., and Winfrey Madison, Waukegan, Ill., both sophomores, and junior college transfer Richard Cosby from Jonestown, Miss., behind him.

The other halfback slot is wide open, with junior Jim Bracey from Flint, Mich., joining sophomores Joe Ross from Indianapolis, Wayne Cramer from Martinsville, and Jim Greer from Jeffersonville, in a fight for the starting berth.

If any position is more wide open than the wingback slot, it would be fullback. Hopefuls include junior college transfer John Hesbitt from New York, juniors Emmitt Tyler from Terre Haute, and Gary Walters from New Albany, and sophomore Phil Newhouse from Lebanon.

The line presents a slightly brighter picture, with nine lettermen available for duty. Here the Sycamores will have back starters Art Fallon, Edgar Freeze, Joe Mervar, and John Allen, and Willie Smith, who saw considerable action at the end of last year's disappointing 4-4 season.

Smith, from Patterson, J.J., is expected to nail down a starting end slot, and has worked most at the tight end position. However, Duke University transfer John Truitt, a sophomore who moved to Terre Haute when his father, Dean John Truitt, joined the State staff, may be switched to the tight end position. He spent the first week at wide end, but he is bigger than Smith, a senior, and the Patterson junior college transfer may move outside.

Other candidates for the tight position are two-year letterman Mervar, from Indianapolis, and John Connelly, a junior from Lafayette. Backing up at the outside position will be junior letterman Jim Lowe from Merrillville, and Rod Sanders, a sophomore from Knox.

Fallon, who didn't play high school ball at Quincy, Mass., and senior Jerry Espy from Bedford, are expected to nail down the starting tackle berths. Backing them will be junior college transfer Ken Opple from Grand Rapids, Mich., sophomore Richard Mamolite from Brooklyn, and junior Jim Brown from Ambia.

Along with Freeze, an Indianapolis junior, will probably be joined at the starting guard posts by either Dan McGrath, a Cleveland junior, or Terre Haute junior Jack Coats, both of whom are lettermen. Backing them up will be Jamaica E. State, New York, sophomore Robert Antonito, junior letterman Larry Cunningham from Lowell, and sophomore Robert Pychinka from Allentown, Pa.

Providing he avoids injuries, Allen, a Terre Haute senior, will solve Jones' problems at center. The two-year letterman will be backed up by sophomore Joe Fiedler from Greenport Long Island, New York, and junior Bernard Heins, a junior college transfer from Chicago.

Newhouse will take over for departed John Bush as punter, and Jones expects him to be every bit as good as Bush, who led the ICC during his junior and senior years. The place kicking spot is still wide open.

From the overall viewpoint, Jones will constantly be worried by injuries. Once he fields a starting team, he'll be faced with the problem of developing adequate reserves. Injuries to key personnel could cripple the ball club.

But, it is very similar to the situation that faced Jones in 1962, when 46 boys were lost from his 1961 varsity and freshmen squads. The Sycamores were picked for last place in the conference, but when the dust settled, State found itself with a 5-3 slate and a share of second place in the league standings.

If the Sycamores are to come out of this fall's fracas with a respectable record, lightning would almost have to strike twice in the same place. However, State has the same fine coaching staff of that year, and with 51 candidates, some real sleepers could come through as happened in '62.

Only time will tell.

According to Coach Robert Meyne, Valparaiso, defending Indiana Collegiate Conference champion, will again be the team to beat in the conference meet, hosted by Indiana State Nov. 7. But, Meyne would be the first to state that the 1964 Sycamore harriers could be the team to dethrone the Crusaders.

The sophomores, up from the freshman team which captured first, second, third, fourth, and sixth in the ICC rhinie meet, are Dick Woodbury, from Indianapolis, who was first, second best frosh in the ICC Jim White, from Westfield, Fred Draper, from South Bend, Dave Hoffman, from Gary, and Ron Beehler, from Kingsbury.

Top 1964 freshman known to be coming to State are Valparaiso-native Earl Deal, two time state champion prep miler and one of the greatest distance runners in Indiana high school history, Bob Hochstetler, from North Central of Sullivan County, and Bob King, from Terre Haute, 1-2 finishers in the Terre Haute sectional of the state high school cross country meet, and Roy Jones and Lynn Alexander, who helped lead Brazil to a state record for consecutive dual meet wins.
