Our President

Alan C. Rankin officially took the office of President of Indiana State University July 1, 1965. He holds a Doctor of Social Science degree and a Master of Arts degree in Political Science from Syracuse University. His undergraduate degrees (B.S. and B.A.) were earned at Fort Hayes Kansas



State College, where he ranked academically first in his class, was president of the student body and editor of the yearbook.

Dr. Rankin came to ISU from the University of Pittsburgh, where he was Vice Chancellor for Student and General Affairs. He had also served as Acting Chancellor of the University. In addition to his responsibilities in the student affairs at Pittsburgh, he had administrative responsibility for the University's cultural and educational exchange programs, overseas programs in Latin America, the University Press, the equal opportunities program, continuing education for women and the office of educational resources and services.

He is an expert in foreign affairs, having served in the Panama Canal Zone from 1940-45, worked in the reorganization of the Japanese Civil Service out of General Douglas MacArthur's headquarters following the war, studying the Marshall Plan in Europe under a program sponsored by the University of Vermont in 1948, participated in a public administration study in Indochina in 1954 for the Ford Foundation and Cornell University, and an internship in government in the office of the late Senator Robert H. Taft.

The community-minded ISU President currently is the President of the Board for the Terre Haute Committee for Area Progress; and a member of the boards for the Governmental Affairs Institute and the Swope Art Gallery. Among his community endeavors while in Pittsburgh, Dr. Rankin served on the World Affairs Council, the Pittsburgh Chamber Music Society and the Pittsburgh Playhouse.

He has written for the *National Municipal Review*, the *Administrative Science Quarterly*, *Personnel Administration*, and other journals.

He and his wife, also a graduate of Fort Hayes Kansas State College, has one daughter, Lynn, born in 1949.

Athletic Director

Robert L. Hollar was appointed acting Athletic Director at Indiana State July 29, 1966, succeeding his long-time colleague, John L. Longfellow.



He joined the ISU staff in 1950 and has been associated with the University as both a teacher and a coach since that time. Prior to coming to Indiana State, Hollar had served on the faculties and coaching staff's at Van Buren High School, New Paris High School and Hanover College.

At the time of his appointment, Hollar was the head golf coach for the Sycamores, and this past spring his linksters won the Indiana Collegiate Conference title. He was also serving as freshman basketball coach and assistant to head coach Duane Klueh. From 1955 until 1964, Hollar was the freshman coach in all sports at Indiana State.

He was first assigned as Dean of Students at the University's Laboratory School and he also served as the football line coach for Indiana State's varsity grid-ders.

Hollar is a native of New Paris, Indiana, and a graduate of the New Paris High School. He was graduated from Manchester College in 1941 and started his teaching-coaching career at Van Buren High School that year. He won varsity letters in football and basketball while at Manchester College.

After serving his country with the U.S. Army in the Pacific Theatre in World War II, Hollar returned home and earned his master's degree at Indiana University in 1946. He joined the Hanover College staff in 1947 and then moved to the New Paris High School faculty in 1948. In addition to his master's degree, he has completed additional post-graduate work at Indiana State University.

He holds the academic rank of associate professor of physical education at the University.

Athletic Trainer

Mel Blickenstaff joined the Indiana State University staff five years ago as athletic trainer and he has been an invaluable help to the Sycamores' athletic program ever since that time.

His previous experience includes nine years of service as a coach in Northern Indiana high schools, three years as a physical reconditioning instructor in the Air Force hospitals during World War Two, and eleven years as athletic trainer at Columbus High School at Columbus, Indiana.

"Blick" as he is known by ISU athletes and coaches, earned his bachelor of science degree at Manchester College, his master of science degree at Indiana University and has specialized in instructions in physical education and athletic training at Indiana University.

His wife Mary is a physical education teacher at McLean Junior High School in Terre Haute, while his oldest son, Jim, is a teacher and diving coach at Evans-ton High School. His other two sons are still in school. John is a junior at Indiana State and a member of the ISU golf squad, while Bill is a ninth grader at Glenn Junior High School.



Coach Huntsman

Jerry Huntsman moves into the head coaching spot for the Indiana State University football teams after serving last fall as backfield coach under Bill Jones.



In nine years of coaching, at both the high school and college level, Huntsman's teams had racked up a 62-15-3 record. Three of his teams, two in high school and one in college, were undefeated. In addition, he was named the NATA District 21 College Coach-of-the-Year at Earlham in 1964, after his team there was unbeaten.

Huntsman is a graduate of Richmond High School and Wabash College. While at Wabash, he was named as the All-State quarterback for the small college elevens in 1951. After serving a tour of duty with the U.S. Army, where he was named to the All-Army track team as a javelin thrower, Huntsman got into coaching. After one-year stints at Waveland and Covington, the ISU head coach moved to Crawfordsville where during his three years there, the teams went to a 14-12-2 mark. Moving then to Huntington, Huntsman-coached squads were undefeated in his two years there, playing to a 19-0-1 record.

In 1961, Jerry moved into the college ranks, taking over the reins at Earlham, and he left a record there that will be hard to beat. In his four years at Earlham, the gridgers racked up a 29-3 record.

Huntsman is from a family of coaches, his father serving as coach at Wabash College, and his brother Stan holds the track coaching position at Ohio University.

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Origin of "Sycamores"

The name "Sycamores" was adopted by a student body general election in 1921. A contest was started that year for a school name to be selected on Blue and White day, a forerunner of Homecoming. The names were to be submitted to a committee of four, with their three choices being given a vote. The name Sycamores was among the three finalists submitted. Although it was roundly booed when placed on the ballot, the students, in an apparent joke, gave the name a one-sided victory in the election. The winner of the contest received \$3 as first prize for his entry. The name was first used January 3, 1922 in the Normal Advance, predecessor of the Statesman, campus newspaper.

Football



LOU "BIMBO" CECCONI, Offense Coach—"Bimbo" is an all time great from that Eastern football power, the University of Pittsburgh. While there, he gained enough yards to rank third among all-time Pitt backs and was named to the All-East team in 1948 and 1949. He was also mentioned on several all American teams his senior year and played in the North-South game at Miami in 1950. Named to the all time Pitt team for the first half of the century, Cecconi was an assistant coach at Pittsburgh before coming to Indiana State.

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PAUL SELGE, Line Coach—Dean of the ISU coaches in terms of service, Selge has been line coach here since 1946, with the exception of a two-year period of duty with the U.S. Navy and 1955, when he was the acting head coach. Selge is a graduate of Indiana State and was varsity center for the Sycamores for three years. He was named as center for the Indiana All-State Collegiate teams in 1941 and 1942. He has also served as head track coach and resigned his post as head swimming coach two years ago to devote more time to football.

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DAVE DUNKELBERGER, Defense Coach—"Dunk" comes to Indiana State after serving as assistant freshman football and head track coach at the University of Cincinnati for three years. Prior to that he had been head football and track coach at Leipsic High School near Lima, Ohio. The new ISU coach earned six letters while in school at DePauw, three each in football and track. He was a halfback on the 58-61 Tiger football teams. He is a native of Miamisburg, Ohio.

Staff



BILL JONES, Head Freshman Coach—Jones will work with the freshman grid teams after being head coach at ISU the past nine years. He came to State in 1957, when the Sycamores were at one of the lowest points in history. In his last four years on the staff, the State teams won 19 of 29 games, and two years ago, with a 6-2 slate, captured its first share of a conference title. He was twice named Conference Coach-of-the-Year. Jones introduced the Lonesome End at State a year before Red Blaik made it popular at Army. Before coming to State, the 1939 Ohio Wesleyan graduate had coached at Sullivan for 13 years. During his last four years there, his teams lost only four games and had two 20-game winning streaks.

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DUANE BARROWS, Freshman Line Coach—Barrows is in his second year at Indiana State as head swimming and assistant football coach. Prior to coming to State, Barrows was line coach at Columbus, Indiana, where the high school teams there won three of four Southern Indiana Conference championships. While at Columbus, Barrows also coached the swimming teams that won seven state titles and compiled ten consecutive undefeated dual meet seasons.

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DICK McCLURE, Graduate Assistant—The former Terre Haute Wiley High School star footballer comes to Indiana State on a graduate assistantship and will spend a major portion of his time working with the ends. It was as an end that he gained honors at Wiley and Earlham College.

Sycamore Outlook

This a football rebuilding year at Indiana State, but a rebuilding year that could surprise a lot of people. A great deal depends on how well sophomores and inexperienced juniors come through for the Blue and White.

Coach Jerry Huntsman, in his first year as head coach at Indiana State, has 17 lettermen to work with in building this year's squad, but many of them didn't see that much action last fall. In addition, there are only seven experienced seniors on the ball club and this is indicative of the burden being placed on the shoulders of the juniors and sophomores.

Bright spots in the picture include the ends, linebackers and quarterback spots, where veterans are back to man the positions. In Bob Pyhinka and Don Wright, the Sycamores will have what could prove to be two of the best linebackers in the conference. Pyhinka, the team captain, was all conference last year.

John Truitt and John Grimes give the Sycamores a pair of veteran ends, both with good size and both good receivers. Truitt has the size, speed and hands to become a great end and he is a possible Little All American choice. The pros are interested in the 6-5, 225-pound senior.

Mike Hoke returns for his junior year after being the regular quarterback last fall. Hoke is considered a fine passer, but leaves something to be desired as a runner. Randy Payne showed well in spring practice, and the coaching staff feels he may push Hoke for a starting berth.

State will look somewhat different this year with new offensive and defensive formations being installed by the new coaching staff. The offense, under former University of Pittsburgh star Lou "Bimbo" Ceconi, will run from a wing-T with open formations set-up, while the defense, under Dave Dunkelberger, will employ basically a five-man front with a "monster" man. In the past several years, the Sycamores have run from an unbalanced line on offense and used basically a six-man front on defense.

Some of the problems facing the coaches at State include a lack of speed and size in the backfield, lack of experience in the interior line, and a lack of good

depth throughout the squad. If any of these problems can be solved, or at least compensated for, then the season could be fair at Indiana State.

Injuries, suffered before practice started and in the first few days of fall camp, have hurt the Sycamores a great deal. Bill Byers, a sophomore from Indianapolis that was counted on to play defensive end was seriously injured in a car wreck four days before football camp and will be out the entire year.

Dave Matz, junior tackle from Sullivan, and whom the Indiana State coaching staff felt would be one of the best tacklers in the conference, sustained a knee injury in the first practice and will be out for the entire season.

There have been, and as always, continue to be the minor injuries from day to day . . . the type injuries that will slow a player down . . . maybe keep him from the line-up for only two or three days . . . but the depth problem at Indiana State is critical to the point that even these minor injuries give the Sycamores a big blow.

Looking ahead to the season, Coach Huntsman feels that Ball State must be the team to beat in the Indiana Collegiate Conference. Butler will be real tough, particularly if they come up with a quarterback . . . and they always do. St. Joseph's and Valparaiso should be tremendously improved ball clubs and must be considered darkhorses. DePauw and Evansville will be improved over last year, and they were much better teams than their records indicate.

Says Huntsman, "We're going out to win every game . . . we have never gone into a game with the idea of losing it, but we have never gone into a game sure of a win."

Because of the inexperienced personnel being counted on this fall, the squad presents a question mark. Its a team that could finish with any kind of record . . . from a highly-successful season to a nearly disastrous one.

A lot depends on how well the seniors lead the squad and how well the inexperience matures under game conditions.

Sycamore Profiles

JOHN GRIMES, end, 6-0, 195, sr.—Grimes is regarded as a good pass-catcher by the State coaching staff. The former Terre Haute Gerstmeyer athlete has good hands and experience, and while lacking great speed, runs on a good pass pattern.

DAN BATES, tackle, 6-0, 220, jr.—Being counted upon offensively by Coach Huntsman. Bates, who played his high school ball at Kokomo is strong and should improve with experience.

MARTY FRIEDMAN, guard, 5-10, 195, jr.—Considered a real "tough" football player by the ISU coaching staff. He is expected to go both on offense and defense for the Sycamores this fall.

JOE FIEDLER, center, 5-10, 200, sr.—This veteran center is not as large as some, but offers a great deal of experience to the State squad this fall. Is only center, one of two interior linemen, with experience.

ED McGRATH, guard, 5-10, 215, so.—One of several "key" sophomores on the State team, McGrath made a very good showing in spring practice. His value to the team will depend on how quickly he matures under fire.

JOHN TRUITT, end, 6-5, 225, sr.—Has all the physical assets—hands, size, speed—to be a great end. Pros are interested. Teaming with Grimes, gives ISU good set of ends.

MIKE HOKE, quarterback, 6-0, 185, jr.—Veteran quarterback who gained his experience as starter last year. Considered a good passer but not an outstanding runner.

RICH BORTONE, halfback, 5-10, 170, jr.—Another contribution from Mishawaka High School to the Indiana State squad, the coaches are hoping Bortone can escape injuries this year. If he does, could be the breakaway threat in ISU's offense.

WINFREY MADISON, halfback, 5-10, 170, sr.—The two-year letterman can go both ways for State and might have to. Has good speed, but lacks size.

DEAN KLINK, fullback, 6-0, 210, so.—Another sophomore being counted upon by State's coaches. Was one of the outstanding frosh players last fall. Has size and speed to be great fullback.

DAVE PARKHURST, tackle, 6-1, 216, so.—Another promising sophomore lineman. Coaches feel he could play offense as a sophomore if he develops as expected.

ROBERT ATTONITO, guard, 5-9, 180, sr.—A late developer that has come along fast. Could play both ways with his aggressiveness. Quickness offsets lack of size.

BOB PYCHINKA, guard, 5-9, 170, sr.—Team captain this year and a two-year veteran. Was all-ICC as linebacker last fall, should repeat. Expected to lead defensive unit this fall. Also two-time conference wrestling champion.

DOUG STAREWICZ, tackle, 6-3, 225, so.—Although young and inexperienced, had a good spring. Coaches feel he could develop into an outstanding tackle.

DENNIS HOLMES, end, 5-11, 190, jr.—A hard hitter with fair size, Holmes could play either defensive end or linebacker. Coaches feel he will play regularly at one of the two posts.

RANDY PAYNE, quarterback, 6-0, 195, so.—Was a spring surprise. He is fast and strong. Staff feels he could push for starting berth.

RICH ATTONITO, halfback, 5-9, 180, sr.—A twin brother to Robert, he is returning regular safety. Not fast, but real aggressive, he may be moved to offense this fall.

Coach Malloy

Bill Malloy is another new face on the Indiana State University coaching staff. Bill will coach cross country and assist track coach Bob Meyne.

Malloy brings an enviable record to ISU with him. In his 13 years as cross country and track coach at Terre Haute's Wiley High School, his teams won some 43 major championships while losing only five dual meets over the entire span.

He is a native of Terre Haute, having graduated from Wiley High School in 1946. His senior year in high school, Malloy was honored with the LaVerne K. McMillan Award, given annually to the outstanding senior athlete in Terre Haute.

The new cross country coach holds bachelor's and master's degrees from Indiana State University. He started his teaching-coaching career at Poseyville in 1950. While there, he was the coach of the school's baseball team. Malloy joined the Terre Haute school system the following year, becoming a teacher at Woodrow Wilson Junior High School.

From there, he moved to Wiley the following year and started racking up what must be one of the best track and cross country records in the state. His teams won nine city-county championships, nine Western Indiana Conference championships, seven Wabash Valley titles, six sectional crowns, four regional championships and were the victors in at least 12 major relays throughout the two-state area.

Malloy also was the football backfield coach and assisted in the coaching of basketball at Wiley for eight years. In addition, he has been a basketball and track official, refereeing some 40 games per season, since 1949. He has worked high school basketball sectionals and regionals in the state for the past seven years.

He left the teaching field a year ago to become a field manager for Reader's Digest, but gets back into the educational and coaching jobs this fall at State.



Sycamores' Cross Country



Indiana State's cross country prospects look good this fall, with four returning lettermen and several sophomores that led State's frosh to a conference crown last fall.

Coach Bill Malloy feels that it will possibly be a team that lacks an outstanding runner . . . a boy that will win most meets . . . but the team will be well-balanced in that there will be several strong runners who should finish close to the top, giving the Sycamores top team scores.

Seniors Fred Draper and Jim White, along with junior letter-winners John King and Larry Andrews, will give the State harriers the experience they need. They will be joined by Bill Donnelly, a transfer student from Taylor, and junior Mick Stewart.

In addition, State will have four of the five sophomores that placed in the top ten of the Indiana Collegiate Conference meet last fall. They are Fred Pietrzak, 2nd; Tom Clark, 3rd; Dave Pond, 7th; and Larry White, 10th. This group will also be joined by sophomores Dave Smith and Harold Hickman.

Indiana State won the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) District 21 meet last year, third in the conference, fourth in the Little State meet and fifth in the Big State gathering.

Last year's record was 2-2-1, and one of the losses, to Indiana University, was by a single point. This year, the Sycamores have a ten-meet schedule and the prospects are bright to improve over last year's respectable showing.

Arena

Indiana State's outstanding Arena was put into use for the first time in February, 1962, and officially dedicated in December, 1962. This building has a large gymnasium which can be used as three gyms or converted into one large gym for basketball games and other events.

The Arena is unique in that the roof is the largest single span, poured cement roof in the world. The huge mechanized bleacher system also represents one of the largest systems of its type found anywhere in the world.

The gym is serviced by two sections of 30-row mechanized, folding bleachers which provide seating for some 5,000 persons. These bleachers, in a retracted position, take up only five or six feet of floor space. When extended, the bleachers take up about 60 feet of floor space. Additional end bleachers used in the gym increase the seating capacity to nearly 6,000 persons.

The Indiana State University Arena also has a gymnastics room, wrestling room, several dressing rooms, a trainer's room, an equipment room, an Olympic-type swimming pool with one-meter and three-meter diving boards, a suite of faculty offices and three classrooms.

The lower level of the building, the area directly under the huge Arena gym, is a dirt-covered area providing facilities for indoor track practice, baseball batting and pitching cages and golf practice cages. Along side this dirt-covered area are various types of body-conditioning equipment, including weight-lifting room and a steam room, and locker facilities.



Today, Indiana State University is being called one of the "fastest growing universities in the Midwest." There is good reason for this. Just two years ago, in the fall of 1964, the enrollment at ISU was 7,777. This year, it will be near the 11,000 mark and the end isn't even in sight.

In its relatively new university status, Indiana State is adding new courses of study, beefing up existing programs, creating new service and academic units, increasing its strong faculty, and building new buildings and facilities as fast as possible to cope with the continuing spiraling enrollment.

Residence hall construction has been extremely rapid with two new residence halls rushed to completion in each of the last five years. Two 10-story units opened this year to provide the University with 14 residence halls housing about 5,200 students.

The present Science Building, opened in 1960, is presently undergoing a \$4.2 million addition, more than doubling the size. Other new buildings in the last 5-10 years include Holmstedt Hall, opened in January, 1966, the Home Economics Building, opened in 1957, and the Arena, opened in 1962.

Educational offerings have increased at Indiana State with the same rapid pace. There are now Schools of Education, Arts and Sciences, Business, Health, Physical Education and Recreation, and Nursing.

State's ever-growing campus is located in downtown Terre Haute, Indiana, near the "Crossroads of America."

ISU

History

Indiana State University was created by an Act of the Indiana General Assembly on December 20, 1865, and opened its doors to 21 students (13 women and eight men) on January 6, 1870.

The announced purpose of forming the University at that time was an institution that would "be to teachers what law school is to lawyers and medical school is to doctors."

The Act of 1865 did not provide a site for the newly-created school, but a board of trustees, appointed later, were requested to locate in an Indiana town or city cooperating with at least \$50,000. Terre Haute was the only town or city in the state to come forth with an offer and it was better than originally requested. A committee from Terre Haute offered the \$50,000 and in addition, real estate valued at \$25,000.

The cornerstone for the original building was laid August 13, 1867. The cost of that building was some \$100,000. The building later burned to the ground April 9, 1888.

The school was known as Indiana State Normal School from 1870 until 1927, when the name was changed to Indiana State Teachers College. In 1961, the name was again changed, this time to Indiana State College. The latest, and probably the final name change came in the spring of 1965 when the Indiana Legislature renamed the school Indiana State University.

Called one of the fastest growing colleges in the Midwest, State's enrollment has nearly doubled since 1963. There were some 6,800 students on campus in 1963, and enrollment during September 1966 was just shy of 11,000. Only 13 years ago, in 1953, enrollment at Indiana State was less than 1,900.
