Our President



Alan C. Rankin officially took the office of President of Indiana State University July 1, 1965. He holds a Doctor of Social Science degree and a Master of Arts degree in Political Science from Syracuse University. His undergraduate degrees (B.S. and B.A.) were earned at Fort Hayes Kansas State College, where he ranked academically

first in his class, was president of the student body and editor of the yearbook.

In June, 1967, he was bestowed with an Honorary Doctor of Letters degree from Terre Haute's Rose Polytechnic Institute.

Dr. Rankin came to ISU from the University of Pittsburgh, where he was Vice Chancellor for Student and General Affairs. He had also served as Acting Chancellor of the University. In addition to his responsibilities in the student affairs at Pittsburgh, he had administrative responsibility for the University's cultural and educational exchange programs, overseas programs in Latin America continuing education for women and the office of educational resources and services.

He is an expert in foreign affairs, having served in the Panama Canal Zone from 1940-45, worked in the reorganization of the Japanese Civil Service out of General Douglas MacArthur's headquarters following the war, studying the Marshall Plan in Europe under a program sponsored by the University of Vermont in 1948, participated in a public administration study in Indochina in 1954 for the Ford Foundation and Cornell University, and an internship in government in the office of the late Senator Robert H. Taft.

The community-minded ISU President currently is the President of the Board for the Terre Haute Committee for Area Progress; and a member of the boards for the Governmental Affairs Institute and the Swope Art Gallery. Among his community endeavors while in Pittsburgh, Dr. Rankin served on the World Affairs Council, the Pittsburgh Chamber Music Society and the Pittsburgh Playhouse.

He has written for the *National Municipal Review*, the *Administrative Science Quarterly*, *Personnel Administration*, and other journals.

Athletic Director



Gordon H. Chalmers assumed the position as Director of Athletics at Indiana State this past June, coming from Iowa State University, where he was Athletic Director and head of Physical Education since 1959.

Prior to that, he was Assistant Athletic Director at the U.S. Military Academy at

West Point, N. Y., from 1952-58 and swimming coach there from 1946 until his acceptance of the top position at Iowa State.

Under Chalmers' direction at Iowa State, two seating additions and a press box were added to the football stadium, a new \$1.6 million physical education building was completed and tennis courts, practice football fields and outdoor basketball courts were added to the facilities.

He designed the Ames, Iowa, community indoor swimming pool and assisted Miami University of Ohio in the building of a swimming pool. He has assisted numerous colleges and universities in designing new athletic facilities for their campuses.

Chalmers is a former national collegiate swimming champion and a member of the 1932 American Olympic swimming team. He captained the varsity swimming team at his alma mater, Franklin & Marshall College in Lancaster, Pa., and also was a varsity soccer and baseball player there.

His coaching career began in 1940 as head swimming coach at Lafayette College and the following year at Lehigh University. He served as an athletic officer with the United States Navy during WW II and was honorably discharged as a Lieutenant Commander.

Nationally known and respected, Chalmers has served as chairman of the NCAA Olympic Committee, NCAA Committee On Committees, on the Board of Directors of the United States Olympic Committee, on the Executive Committee of the National Athletic Directors Association and President of the College Swimming Coaches Association. He is still on the Swimming Hall of Fame Committee.

Chalmers is married and the father of two children.

Assistant Ath. Director



C. Kim Tidd joins the Indiana State athletic staff this year as assistant athletic director. Tidd, a graduate of Iowa State, served the last five years as business manager of athletics at Iowa State, under Indiana State's new athletic director, Gordon H. Chalmers.

Tidd earned three varsity football letters as an undergraduate at Iowa State. Prior to joining the Iowa State staff, he was employed by Lennox Industries in Marshalltown, Iowa, and served three years as an officer in the United States Air Force.

Currently, he is serving as 3rd Vice President of the College Athletic Business Managers Association, a position that will lead to the presidency of that organization in three years.

Athletic Publicity



Bill Linson became the Director of Athletic Publicity at Indiana State University in June 1966.

A graduate of Indiana State, Linson served in all three major news media (newspaper, radio and television) prior to coming to ISU. He has served as sports editor and photographer in the newspaper field; sports and newscaster in both the radio and television industry and has shot sports film for television.

Jerry Huntsman

Jerry Huntsman, rapidly building the outstanding collegiate coaching record in the Midwest, starts his second year as head coach at Indiana State. In his first season at the helm of the Sycamores last fall, Huntsman guided the Blue & White to a 6-2 record, a second-place tie in the conference and was

With a collegiate coaching record of 35-5, Huntsman's overall coaching record, spanning ten years in high school and college, is a tremendous 68-17-3. Three of his teams, two in high school and one in college, were undefeated.

Prior to coming to Indiana State as backfield coach under Bill Jones in 1965, Jerry headed the Earlham elevens for four years, where he compiled a 29-3 record, including an undefeated season in 1964, and was named the NAIA District 21 College Coach-of-the-Year that same year.

Huntsman is a graduate of Richmond High School and Wabash College. While at Wabash, he was named as the All-State quarterback for the small college elevens in 1951. After serving a tour of duty with the U.S. Army, where he was named to the All-Army track team as a javelin thrower Huntsman got into coaching. After one-year stints at Waveland and Covington, the ISU head coach moved to Crawfordsville where during his three years there, the teams went to a 14-12-2 mark. Moving then to Huntington, Huntsman-coached squads were undefeated in his two years there, playing to a 19-0-1 record.

In 1961, Jerry moved into the college ranks, taking over the reins at Earlham, and he left a record there that will be hard to beat. In his four years at Earlham, the gridders racked up a 29-3 record.

Huntsman is from a family of coaches, his father serving as coach at Wabash College, and his brother Stan holds the track coaching position at Ohio University.

LOU "BIMBO" CECONI, Offense Coach—"Bimbo" is an all time great from that Eastern football power, the University of Pittsburgh. While there, he gained enough yards to rank third among all-time Pitt backs and was named to the All-East team in 1948 and 1949. He was also mentioned on several All American teams his senior year and played in the North-South game at Miami in 1950. Named to the all time Pitt team for the first half of the century, Ceconi was an assistant coach at Pittsburgh before coming to Indiana State in 1966.

PAUL SELGE, Line Coach—Dean of the ISU coaches in terms of service, Selge has been line coach here since 1946, with the exception of a two-year period of duty with the U.S. Navy and 1955, when he was the acting head coach. Selge is a graduate of Indiana State and was varsity center for the Sycamores for three years. He was named as center for the Indiana All-State Collegiate teams in 1941 and 1942. He has also served as head track coach and resigned his post as head swimming coach in 1965 to devote more time to football.

BILL JONES, Freshman Coach—Jones will work with the freshman grid teams for the second straight year after being head coach at ISU from 1957 to 1966. He came to State in 1957, when the Sycamores were at one of the lowest points in history. In his last four years on the staff, the State teams won 19 of 29 games, and two years ago, with a 6-2 slate, captured its first share of a conference title. He was twice named Conference Coach-of-the-Year. Jones introduced the Lone-some End at State a year before Red Blaik made it popular at Army. Before coming to State, the 1939 Ohio Wesleyan graduate had coached at Sullivan for 13 years. During his last four years there, his teams lost only four games and had two 20-game winning streaks.

DOUG KAY, Defense Coach—This will be Doug's first year at Indiana State after enjoying outstanding success as head coach of Deerfield High School in Chicago's Central Suburban League. His overall record there was 30-16-2, but eight of those losses came during the school's first year of varsity football. Kay's teams won the league title the last two years and he was named Coach-of-the-Year in the league both seasons. Doug played his college ball under Lou Saban at Western Illinois and was a regular on teams that won 19 straight. Also served as an assistant coach at Western Illinois his first year out of college.

DAVE DUNKELBERGER, Defensive Secondary Coach—"Dunk" came to Indiana State in 1966 after serving as assistant freshman football and head track coach at the University of Cincinnati for three years. Prior to that he had been head football and track coach at Leipsic High School near Lima, Ohio. Dunkelberger earned six letters while in school at DePauw, three each in football and track. He was a halfback on the 58-61 Tiger football teams. Dave is a native of Miamisburg, Ohio.

DAVE BLOSSOM, Defensive Line Coach—Dave is a graduate of Duke (1961) where he was Coaches' All American, playing in the East-West Game, and All Atlantic Coast Conference. He was also a member of the Duke squad that won the 1961 Cotton Bowl. He played professional football with Ottawa and British Columbia in the Canadian League and the New York Titans (now the Jets) in the AFL. He also served as assistant coach at Duke one year and last fall was head line coach at Montclair State in his native Montclair, New Jersey.

Athletic Trainer



Mel Blickenstaff joined the Indiana State University staff six years ago as athletic trainer and he has been an invaluable help to the Sycamores' athletic program ever since that time.

His previous experience includes nine years of service as a coach in Northern Indiana high schools, three years as a physical reconditioning in-

structor in the Air Force hospitals during World War Two, and eleven years as athletic trainer at Columbus High School at Columbus, Indiana.

"Blick" as he is known by ISU athletes and coaches, earned his bachelor of science degree at Manchester College, his master of science degree at Indiana University and has specialized in instructions in physical education and athletic training at Indiana University.

Assistant Trainer



Ray Baggett brings in 10 years of collegiate training with him in this first year at Indiana State where he will serve as assistant trainer. He will work with Trainer Mel Blickenstaff in the Athletic Training curriculum, serve as trainer for bas-

ketball and assist with training in all other sports.

He comes to ISU after serving as trainer at the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, N.Y., for three years. Prior to that, he was a trainer at Indiana University for seven years.

Baggett has a B.S. degree from Troy College in Alabama, an M.S. degree from Indiana University and a Director of Health degree, with specialization in athletic training from Indiana.

Faculty Representative



Woody Suttle, a member of the Indiana State University faculty since 1948, is the chairman of the Faculty Athletic Committee.

He is a graduate of ISU, where he lettered three years as a football fullback. Woody has been a member of the Faculty Athletic Commission for some 12 years and chairman of the group the past six years.

The former Air Force pilot is an Associate Professor of Life Sciences at Indiana State.

Origin of "Sycamores"

The name "Sycamores" was adopted by a student body general election in 1921. A contest was started that year for a school name to be selected on Blue and White day, a forerunner of Homecoming. The names were to be submitted to a committee of four, with their three choices being given a vote. The name Sycamores was among the three finalists submitted. Although it was roundly booed when placed on the ballot, the students, in an apparent joke gave the name a one-sided victory in the election. The winner of the contest received \$3 as first prize for his entry. The name was first used January 3, 1922 in the Normal Advance, predecessor of the Statesman, campus newspaper.

PRESS BOX ACCOMMODATIONS—Space limitations make it mandatory that only **working** newsmen, radio announcers, technicians and others whose duties make necessary the use of the press box be allowed in the facility.

WOMEN AND CHILDREN NOT ADMITTED.

Press and radio requests for credentials should be directed to Bill Linson, Athletic Publicity Director, ISU Arena, Indiana State University, Terre Haute, Indiana 47809. Tickets will be mailed if there is time, otherwise they may be picked up at the ticket office on the left of the main entrance to the stadium.

PARKING—Parking permits for a special parking area next to the entrance of the stadium will be issued upon request to **working** members of the press.

DRESSING ROOM LOCATIONS—Halftime rooms for both teams are located at the west end of the stadium. However, both Indiana State and its opponents will dress in the ISU Arena at Fifth and Chestnut Streets, on the downtown campus.

PRESS BOX SERVICES—We will provide programs, three-deep charts on Indiana State and when possible on the opponents, information concerning any special event, cumulative statistics and series scores prior to the game. At the half we will give abbreviated statistics. Following the game, we will have complete team and individual statistics. Play-by-play sheets will also be available. Through the game, we will also provide injury reports as soon as they are available from the sideline and periodic scores from other games of interest.

Runners will be available to procure coffee, soft drinks and hot dogs for you during the game.

INTERVIEWS—Indiana State coach Jerry Huntsman and the visiting coach may be reached for comments concerning the game, following each contest in the ISU Arena on the downtown campus. Huntsman will be available in the football offices, at the north-west edge of the Arena, while the visiting coach may be reached outside the visiting team dressing room in the basement of the Arena.

Sycamore

"Football 67" at Indiana State University should prove to be an interesting year with a veteran team returning, a stadium renovation underway and a highly successful coach at the helm.

Sixteen lettermen return to Coach Jerry Huntsman and his staff this fall as the Sycamores prepare for their 10-game schedule that includes some of the best College Division teams in the country.

State's schedule will be one of the toughest ever, featuring such teams as Tampa, Northern Illinois and Ball State in addition to the usual "toughies" including Butler, Valparaiso, St. Joseph's, Evansville, DePauw, Western Illinois and Eastern Illinois.

Adding impetus for Indiana State football fans comes from the fact that ISU is installing AstroTurf, a synthetic playing field much similar to that in Houston's Astrodome. In addition, Memorial Stadium, home of the Sycamores for years, is being changed from a baseball stadium into a strictly football facility, and although the work is just getting a good start, fans attending the Sycamore games will notice vastly improved seating arrangements for watching football.

Turning to the team prospects, the Sycamores should have a strong team this fall, but so should everyone else on the schedule. At least three conference teams, including league champ Ball State, Evansville and DePauw have veteran teams returning as do non-league foes Tampa, Northern Illinois, Western Illinois and Eastern Illinois.

Indiana State's lettermen contingent is headed by last year's starting offensive backfield intact. This group includes quarterback Ron Overton, who led the state in touchdown passes with 15 in just seven games; all ICC-halfback Randy Payne, the second-leading pass receiver on last year's 6-2 squad; fullback Dean Klink, an ICC honorable mention who led the Sycamores in rushing; and halfback Randy Lynch, whose 6.2 yards-per-carry was tops among the ISU regulars.

From the rest of the offensive team, one end, both tackles and a guard are back, although the guard and one of the tackles are in new positions this fall. John Grimes, senior co-captain, is the returning end, while senior Dan Bates is one of the tackles. The other tackle, Dave Parkhurst, is making a switch to guard, while regular offensive guard Jerry Chitwood is switching to defensive linebacker.

Other probable starters on the offensive include

sophomore tackle Greg Matafin, sophomore center Timon Kendall, senior guard Jeff Rudolph and junior end Ron Majewski. This starting line would give the Sycamores an average of 218 from end to end with good speed across the line.

Newcomers given the best chance of cracking the offensive starting lineup are halfback Jim Brumfield, a 195-pounder who is a sub-ten-second 100 dash man and 230-pound guard Stan Worrall, both sophomores.

A note of cautiousness slips into the Indiana State picture when looking at the defense, simply because of inexperience. Only senior co-captain Terry Kennedy at end and Doug Starewicz at tackle provide more than nominal experience from last year.

Junior Dave Matz could be a key in the defensive line. A regular two years ago, Matz sat out all last year with a knee injury. If he's ready to move into the nose spot on the defensive line, he would lend size, speed and experience. Worrall is another possibility here.

Dan Bizik, a transfer student from Florida State, projects as the other defensive tackle, while sophomore Jeff Keller reports to camp as the other starting defensive end. Bizik is the quickest big man on the squad, but has a lot of catching up to do after the year's lay-off. Worrall could move into a defensive end position.

No varsity experience is available at the linebacking posts, although ISU coaches feel they have several good prospects. Running ahead of the pack at the present for the starting roles are 230-pound sophomore Butch Penn and Chitwood. Don Dunkerley and Mike Ensminger also looked good at the spot during the spring.

Defensive secondary spots are wide open, and it appears that sophomores will nail most of them down. Competing for the four spots will be lettermen Rich Attonito and Dave Lecklitner, junior Terry Ogle and sophomores Ron Smith, Mike Russell, Rich Galbraith and Don Dunkerley.

The key to the State gridiron picture this season will quite possibly be how quick the youngsters, particularly on defense, mature and become "game-wise." With last year's potent offense returning almost intact, the Sycamores should be able to move the ball, but the weight of stopping the opponents will fall on the shoulders of many newcomers.

Player

14 Norm Pellegrini, quarterback, 5-10, 170, SO.—Norm is from that hotbed of football, Pennsylvania. He is a good passer and considered a fine young prospect. Was first-string quarterback on undefeated freshman team last year. Gained honors at Elizabeth, Pa., in high school.

16 Ron Overton, quarterback, 5-11, 180, JR.—Led state in touchdown passes last year with 15 in seven games after starting fall practice as fifth-stringer. Was honorable mention as all conference quarterback with a 55 percent completion record. Led team in total offense. Gaining poise needed to be outstanding signal-caller.

19 Rich Galbraith, quarterback, 6-0, 195, SO.—From Bethal Park, Pa., Rich is strong runner and could well earn a starting role in defensive secondary this fall. Was all state footballer and trackman in high school. Father was his high school coach. Rich likes to hunt and fish for recreation.

21 Ron Smith, halfback, 5-9, 180 SO.—Ron, from Jeffersonville, Ind., is considered an outstanding defensive prospect, should start in secondary this fall. Probably one of surest tacklers in secondary, Ron could also be "swing man" and play some offense. Is a consistent runner.

24 Rich Attonito, halfback, 5-8, 180, SR.—Two-year letterman should provide experience in defensive backfield. Has great desire. Can also go offensively. From Jamaica Estates, N. Y., he was the 167-pound conference wrestling champion this past winter.

27 Randy Lynch, halfback, 6-0, 205, JR.—Played his way into a starting role last fall and ended up leading team in yards-per-try with a 6.2 average. A punishing-type runner, he gives Sycamores power from backfield. A continuance of improvement shown last fall and through spring could make him one of best in the league.

28 Jim Brumfield, halfback, 6-1, 195, SO.—Leading runner on frosh team last fall, "Brummy" combines good size with great speed. Could be the real break-away threat ISU has lacked in past. Considered a good chance to break into starting backfield that was among best in league last fall.

30 Bob Komara, fullback, 5-11, 200, JR.—Bob has developed into a good powerful runner. Still needs work on blocking. Hard to bring down, could press for starting role.

Profiles

35 Dean Klink, fullback 6-1, 215, JR.—Leading rusher in all sophomore backfield last year, Klink has surprising speed for big man. Was honorable mention as all league fullback last year. Was also one of baseball team's leading pitchers through the spring.

36 Don Dunkerley, fullback, 6-1, 195, SO.—Played both ways on undefeated freshman team last fall. Is a halfback-type fullback and one of better blockers on team. With size and speed, could well move into starting role on defense as sophomore.

37 Ed LeBlanc, fullback, 6-0, 195, JR.—Lettered as defensive ballplayer last year after moving into starting role in third game. Played "monster" and linebacker last fall, stayed at linebacker during spring.

41 Dave Lecklitner, halfback 5-9, 175, SR.—Another two-year letterman on defensive squad, a veteran of two campaigns. Could also work as a flanker-type halfback. Leading hitter on baseball team in spring.

42 Jim Bartolomeo, Halfback, 5-11, 190, SO.—Had a good spring practice after injury sidelined him all last fall. Scored twice in spring game, coaches feel he could be strong runner.

43 Terry Ogle, halfback, 5-11, 180, JR.—Did not play last fall, but looked good enough in spring to report as starter in defensive backfield this fall. Is quick and also projects as open end.

44 Randy Payne, halfback 6-1, 210, SR.—Was an all conference halfback last year and second leading pass receiver on squad. One-handed pass reception won Valpo game last fall. "Boom Boom" is a "cute" type runner rather than power type.

Cross Country

Bill Malloy, in his first year at Indiana State, guided the Sycamore cross country team to a 6-3 record last fall. He also was assistant track coach for the team that won the conference crown.

Malloy had an outstanding high school cross country and track coaching record at Terre Haute's Wiley High School, winning some 43 major championships and losing only five dual meets in a 13-year span at the helm of Wiley's track and cross country squads.

During that same 13 years, his teams won nine city-county championships, nine Western Indiana Conference titles, seven Wabash Valley crowns, six sectional championships, four regional titles and were the victors in at least 12 major relays throughout the Indiana-Illinois area.

A graduate of Wiley High School, Malloy holds bachelor's and master's degrees from Indiana State University.

The ISU cross country team placed third in the Indiana Collegiate Conference meet and 11th among the 43 teams entered in the NCAA College Division Nationals at Wheaton, Illinois.

In addition to his coaching duties, Malloy is a basketball and track official and has refereed some 40 games per year since 1949. He has worked high school basketball sectionals and regionals in the state for the past seven years.

1967 Cross Country Prospects

This year's cross country team at Indiana State should be tougher than last fall's crew, which compiled a 6-3 dual meet record and placed 12th in the nationals, simply because five members of last year's squad are back along with the top three freshman runners of a year ago.

Seniors Mick Stewart, John King and Larry Andrews will lead the squad this fall as they, along with Tom Clark, were all under the 21-minute mark, considered a good time for the four miles over hill and dale.

Five sophomores, all members of the frosh team a year ago, return this fall and all could provide that needed depth. They include Dave Busby, Dick Christensen, Tom Spurgeon, Larry Hitz and Don McKinney. Rounding out the squad will be junior Dave Smith.

Memorial Stadium

Memorial Stadium, recently acquired by Indiana State University on a long-term lease, is undergoing a three-phase complete renovation and remodeling, which will basically change it from a combination football and baseball facility to a strictly football stadium.

The field is AstroTurf, a plastic grass much similar to that used in Houston's famed Astrodome. Indiana State is the first university in the world to own and make outdoor application of a field of this type. Plus factors for the synthetic field include durability (some 20 college and high school games per year will be played on this field), a constant surface will provide sure footing regardless of weather and experience at the Astrodome has proven a substantial decrease in knee and ankle injuries.

Each blade of grass is $\frac{3}{4}$ inches long and it is attached to a sponge-rubber pad $\frac{1}{4}$ inches thick. This is then set on a fiber pad, $\frac{1}{2}$ inch thick and both are set on a two-inch thick layer of asphalt.

Phase One, completed this summer, includes the re-orientation of the field from a northerly-southerly direction to an easterly-westerly line, the installation of the AstroTurf and the erection of some 5,000 temporary bleacher seats. This bleacher section, combined with the roofed portion of the original stadium, provides seating, from goal-line to goal-line on either side of the field, with a total capacity of over 10,000 persons.

Phase Two, to be completed within the next year or so, calls for the razing of the roofed portion of the stadium and the erection of a 12-14,000 seat bleacher section on the south side of the field, complete with modern press box. Phase Three, or the ultimate development under the present planning, calls for another 12-14,000 seat bleacher section on the opposite side of the field. Capacity for the stadium after Phase Two will be over 16,000 and the capacity following the ultimate development will be 24-27,000 persons.

University Today



Today, Indiana State University is being called one of the "fastest growing universities in the Midwest." There is good reason for this. Just three years ago, in the fall of 1964, the enrollment at ISU was 7,777. This year, it will be near the 11,500 mark and the end isn't even in sight.

In its relatively new university status, ISU is adding new courses of study, beefing up existing programs, creating new service and academic units, increasing its already strong faculty and building new buildings and facilities as fast as possible to cope with the continuing spiralling enrollment.

In July, 1967, major building projects underway, not including smaller construction jobs, amounted to \$15.2 million. These major projects included a \$4.3 million Science Building addition due for completion in December, 1967, two 15-story residence halls, costing \$8.7 million to build and expected to be ready in 1968, a \$1.7 million second Married Student Apartment Building, and a \$500,000 boiler installation at the Power Plant.

Plans are being prepared for a new \$4.6 million University library on a site to be chosen. Plans are also designed for a \$500,000 Nurses Clinical Education Building which will be located near Terre Haute's Union Hospital.

Other major building projects contemplated are a new School of Nursing Building, a Student Health and Counseling Center Building, more residence halls and academic buildings and facilities and permanent bleacher seating at Memorial Stadium.

Educational offerings have increased at ISU with the same rapid pace. There are now Schools of Education; Arts and Sciences; Business; Health, Physical Education and Recreation; and Nursing.



History

Indiana State University was created by an Act of the Indiana General Assembly on December 20, 1865, and opened its doors to 21 students (13 women and eight men) on January 6, 1870.

The announced purpose of forming the University at that time was an institution that would "be to teachers what law school is to lawyers and medical school is to doctors."

The Act of 1865 did not provide a site for the newly-created school, but a board of trustees, appointed later, were requested to locate in an Indiana town or city cooperating with at least \$50,000. Terre Haute was the only town or city in the state to come forth with an offer and it was better than originally requested. A committee from Terre Haute offered the \$50,000 and in addition, real estate valued at \$25,000.

The cornerstone for the original building was laid August 13, 1867. The cost of that building was some \$100,000. The building later burned to the ground April 9, 1888.

The school was known as Indiana State Normal School from 1870 until 1927, when the name was changed to Indiana State Teachers College. In 1961, the name was again changed, this time to Indiana State College. The latest, and probably the final name change came in the spring of 1965 when the Indiana Legislature renamed the school Indiana State University.

Called one of the fastest growing colleges in the Midwest, State's enrollment has nearly doubled since 1963. There were some 6,800 students on campus in 1963, and enrollment during September 1967 was over 11,000. Only 13 years ago, in 1953, enrollment at Indiana State was less than 1,900.
