Our President



Alan C. Rankin officially took the office of President of Indiana State University July 1, 1965. He holds a Doctor of Social Science degree and a Master of Arts degree in Political Science from Syracuse University. His undergraduate degrees (B.S. and B.A.) were earned at Fort Hays Kansas State College, where he ranked academically

first in his class, was president of the student body and editor of the yearbook.

In June, 1967, he received an Honorary Doctor of Letters degree from Terre Haute's Rose Polytechnic Institute.

Dr. Rankin came to ISU from the University of Pittsburgh, where he was Vice Chancellor for Student and General Affairs. He had also served as Acting Chancellor of the University. In addition to his responsibilities for student affairs at Pittsburgh, he had administrative responsibility for the University's libraries, cultural and educational exchange programs, overseas programs in Latin America, continuing education for women and the University Press.

Interested in foreign affairs, he served in the Panama Canal Zone from 1940-45, assisted in the reorganization of the Japanese Civil Service out of General Douglas MacArthur's headquarters following the war, studying the Marshall Plan in Europe under a program sponsored by the University of Vermont in 1948, participated in a public administration study in Indonesia in 1954 for the Ford Foundation and Cornell University, and an internship in government in the office of the late Senator Robert H. Taft.

The community-minded ISU President currently is the President of the Terre Haute Committee for Area Progress; and a member of the board of the Swope Art Gallery. Among his community endeavors while in Pittsburgh, Dr. Rankin served on the World Affairs Council, the Pittsburgh Chamber Music Society and the Pittsburgh Playhouse. He is also a member of the Board of Governmental Affairs Institute of Washington, D. C.

He has written for the *National Municipal Review*, the *Administrative Science Quarterly*, *Personnel Administration*, and other journals.

Athletic Director



Gordon H. Chalmers assumed the position as Director of Athletics at Indiana State in June 1967, coming from Iowa State University, where he was Athletic Director and head of Physical Education since 1959.

Prior to that, he was Assistant Athletic Director at the U.S. Military Academy at

West Point, N. Y., from 1952-58 and swimming coach there from 1946 until his acceptance of the top position at Iowa State.

Under Chalmers' direction at Iowa State, two seating additions and a press box were added to the football stadium, a new \$1.6 million physical education building was completed and tennis courts, practice football fields and outdoor basketball courts were added to the facilities.

He designed the Ames, Iowa, community indoor swimming pool and assisted Miami University of Ohio in the building of a swimming pool. He has assisted numerous colleges and universities in designing new athletic facilities for their campuses.

Chalmers is a former national collegiate swimming champion and a member of the 1932 American Olympic swimming team. He captained the varsity swimming team at his alma mater, Franklin & Marshall College in Lancaster, Pa., and also was a varsity soccer and baseball player there.

His coaching career began in 1940 as head swimming coach at Lafayette College and the following year at Lehigh University. He served as an athletic officer with the United States Navy during WW II and was honorably discharged as a Lieutenant Commander.

Nationally known and respected, Chalmers is a member of the NCAA's Gymnastics Rules Committee and one of the four NCAA representatives to the United States Gymnastics Federation. He has also served as chairman of the NCAA Olympic Committee, NCAA Committee On Committees, on the Board of Directors of the United States Olympic Committee, on the Executive Committee of the National Athletic Directors Association and President of the College Swimming Coaches Association. He is still on the Swimming Hall of Fame Committee.

Chalmers is married and the father of two children.

Assistant Ath. Director



C. Kim Tidd joined the Indiana State athletic staff in June, 1966, as assistant athletic director. Tidd, a graduate of Iowa State, served the five years before that as business manager of athletics at Iowa State, under Indiana State's athletic director, Gordon H. Chalmers.

Tidd earned three varsity football letters as an undergraduate at Iowa State. Prior to joining the Iowa State staff, he was employed by Lennox Industries in Marshalltown, Iowa, and served three years as an officer in the United States Air Force.

Currently, he is serving as 2nd Vice President of the College Athletic Business Managers Association, a position that will lead to the presidency of that organization in two years.

Sports Information



Bill Linson became the Director of Sports Information at Indiana State University in June 1966.

A graduate of Indiana State, Linson served in all three major news media (newspaper, radio and television) prior to coming to ISU. He has served as sports editor and photographer in the newspaper field; sports and newscaster in both the radio and television industry and has shot sports film for television.

Coach Huntsman



Jerry Huntsman, head football coach at Indiana State for the past two seasons, is rapidly building one of the outstanding collegiate coaching records in the Midwest. In two years at ISU, both classed as rebuilding years for the Sycamores, Huntsman has guided the Sycamore gridgers to a 12-6 record and second

and third place finishes in the Indiana Collegiate Conference. Two years ago, he was named the league's Football Coach-of-the-Year.

With a collegiate coaching record of 41-9, Huntsman's overall coaching record, spanning 11 years in high school and college, is a tremendous 74-21-3. Three of his teams, two in high school and one in college, were undefeated.

Prior to coming to ISU as backfield coach in 1965, Jerry headed the Earlham College elevens for four years, where he compiled a 29-3 record, including an undefeated season in 1964, and was named the NAIA District 21 College Coach-of-the-Year that season.

He is a graduate of Richmond (Ind.) High School and Wabash College. While at Wabash, he was named All-State quarterback for the small college elevens in 1951. After serving a tour of duty with the U.S. Army, where he was named to the All-Army track team as a javelin thrower, Huntsman got into coaching.

Following one-year stints at Waveland and Covington, the ISU head coach then moved to Crawfordsville, where during his three years there, his teams went to a 14-12-2 mark. Moving then to Huntington, Huntsman-coached squads were undefeated in his two years there, playing to a 19-0-1 record. In 1961 he moved to Earlham.

Huntsman is from a family of coaches, his father, Owen, serving as track coach at Wabash College, and his brother, Stan, holding the position as track coach at Ohio University.

Jerry and his wife, Cora Lee, have three children, all boys.

LOU "BIMBO" CECONI, Offense Coach—"Bimbo" is an all time great from that Eastern football power, the University of Pittsburgh. While there, he gained enough yards to rank third among all-time Pitt backs and was named to the All-East team in 1948 and 1949. He was also mentioned on several All American teams his senior year and played in the North-South game at Miami in 1950. Named to the all time Pitt team for the first half of the century, Ceconi was an assistant coach at Pittsburgh before coming to Indiana State in 1966.

DOUG KAY, Defense Coach—This will be Doug's second year at Indiana State after enjoying outstanding success as head coach of Deerfield High School in Chicago's Central Suburban League. His overall record there was 30-16-2, but eight of those losses came during the school's first year of varsity football. Kay's teams won the league title the last two years and he was named Coach-of-the-Year in the league both seasons. Doug played his college ball under Lou Saban at Western Illinois and was a regular on teams that won 19 straight. Also served as an assistant coach at Western Illinois his first year out of college.

DAVE DUNKELBERGER, Defensive Secondary Coach—"Dunk" came to Indiana State in 1966 after serving as assistant freshman football and head track coach at the University of Cincinnati for three years.

Prior to that he had been head football and track coach at Leipsic High School near Lima, Ohio. Dunkelberger earned six letters while in school at DePauw, three each in football and track. He was a halfback on the 58-61 Tiger football teams. Dave is a native of Miamisburg, Ohio.

BILL QUINTER, Line Coach — Bill is the newest member of the Indiana State football coaching staff and brings with him professional playing experience. He played with the Dallas Cowboys and the Atlanta Falcons in the National Football League in 1967 and had five years' experience with Ottawa of the Canadian Football League prior to that. A graduate of Indiana University, where he played linebacker for the Hoosiers, Quinter helped the IU gridiron staff during spring practice the two years before he came to I-State.

BERNARD "BUCKY" HAAG, Freshman Coach — Bucky is another of the newest members of the ISU staff and brings a winning high school record with him in his new assignment. For the past three years, he has been athletic director, football and track coach at Ft. Wayne Dwenger High School, compiling a 19-9 football record. Prior to that, the former Purdue defensive halfback had been an assistant coach at South Bend St. Joseph's and head coach at Three Oaks, Mich., where his teams compiled a 15-3 record in two seasons. After lettering at Purdue as a junior in '56, he served as freshman backfield coach following a first-game injury during his senior year in '57.

Athletic Trainer



Mel Blickenstaff joined the Indiana State University staff seven years ago as athletic trainer and he has been an invaluable help to the Sycamores' athletic program ever since that time.

His previous experience includes nine years of service as a coach in Northern Indiana high schools, three years as a physical reconditioning in-

structor in the Air Force hospitals during World War Two, and eleven years as athletic trainer at Columbus High School at Columbus, Indiana.

"Blick" as he is known by ISU athletes and coaches, earned his bachelor of science degree at Manchester College, his master of science degree at Indiana University and has specialized in instructions in physical education and athletic training at Indiana University.

Assistant Trainer



Ray Baggett brings in 11 years of collegiate training with him in this second year at Indiana State where he serves as assistant trainer. He works with Trainer Mel Blickenstaff in the Athletic Training curriculum, serves as trainer for basket-

ball and assists with training in all other sports.

He came to ISU in 1967 after serving as trainer at the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, N. Y., for three years. Prior to that, he was a trainer at Indiana University for seven years.

Baggett has a B.S. degree from Troy College in Alabama, an M.S. degree from Indiana University and a Director of Health degree, with specialization in athletic training from Indiana.

Faculty Representative



Woody Suttle, a member of the Indiana State University faculty since 1948, is the chairman of the Faculty Athletic Committee.

He is a graduate of ISU, where he lettered three years as a football fullback. Woody has been a member of the Faculty Athletic Commission

for some 13 years and chairman of the group the past seven years.

The former Air Force pilot is an Associate Professor of Life Sciences at Indiana State.

Origin of "Sycamores"

The name "Sycamores" was adopted by a student body general election in 1921. A contest was started that year for a school name to be selected on Blue and White day, a forerunner of Homecoming. The names were to be submitted to a committee of four, with their three choices being given a vote. The name Sycamores was among the three finalists submitted. Although it was roundly booed when placed on the ballot, the students, in an apparent joke gave the name a one-sided victory in the election. The winner of the contest received \$3 as first prize for his entry. The name was first used January 3, 1922 in the Normal Advance, predecessor of the Statesman, campus newspaper.

PRESS BOX ACCOMMODATIONS—Space limitations made it mandatory that only working newsmen, radio announcers, technicians and others whose duties make necessary the use of the press box be allowed in the facility.

WOMEN AND CHILDREN NOT ADMITTED.

Press and radio requests for credentials should be directed to Bill Linson, Sports Information, ISU Arena, Indiana State University, Terre Haute, Indiana 47809. Tickets will be mailed if there is time, otherwise they may be picked up at the ticket office on the left of the main entrance to the stadium.

PARKING—Parking permits for a special parking area next to the entrance of the stadium will be issued upon request to working members of the press.

DRESSING ROOM LOCATIONS—Halftime rooms for both teams are located at the west end of the stadium. However, both Indiana State and its opponents will dress in the ISU Arena at Fifth and Chestnut Streets, on the downtown campus.

PRESS BOX SERVICES—We will provide programs, three-deep charts on Indiana State and when possible on the opponents, information concerning any special event, cumulative statistics and series scores prior to the game. At the half we will give abbreviated statistics. Following the game, we will have complete team and individual statistics. Play-by-play sheets will also be available. Through the game, we will also provide injury reports as soon as they are available from the sideline and periodic scores from other games of interest.

Runners will be available to procure coffee, soft drinks and hot dogs for you during the game.

INTERVIEWS—Indiana State coach Jerry Huntsman and the visiting coach may be reached for comments concerning the game following each contest in the ISU Arena on the downtown campus. Huntsman will be available in the football offices, at the northwest edge of the Arena, while the visiting coach may be reached outside the visiting team dressing room in the basement of the Arena.

Sycamore

Coach Jerry Huntsman starts his third year as head coach at Indiana State with 27 lettermen returning. As impressive as this figure may seem, all is not peace and content in the ISU football camp since the graduation losses of seven players took six starters, including the entire right side of the offensive line.

In addition, the Sycamores are facing a tough ten-game schedule, headed by Northern Illinois, Akron, Ball State and Butler. The I-State gridders will be playing without conference affiliation for the first time in some 16 years since Indiana State University has resigned from the Indiana Collegiate Conference, as has Ball State.

Even with the sizable number of returnees, there are several sophomores up from last year's 1-1-1 frosh squad who are battling for first team berths. One of the biggest battles is at quarterback where two-year veteran Ron Overton is getting a strong challenge from no less than three aspiring signal-callers.

Juniors Norm Pellegrini and Verbie Walder (a junior college transfer) as well as sophomore Steve Oglesby are all getting long looks behind the center, and the decision may not be made until shortly before the September 14 opener at Eastern Illinois.

Elsewhere in the offensive backfield, it appears that leading scorer Jim Brumfield, the league's 100-yard-dash champion with a time of :09.7, will again be at left halfback. The junior scored 48 points last fall, including a 64-yard punt return and a 94-yard kickoff return for touchdowns. Dean Klink, ISU's leading rusher for the past two years, will return to his fullback's slot.

At right half, a battle looms and any one of several candidates could get the position. Two-year veteran and co-captain, Randy Lynch, might end up at right half, although the coaches would prefer to play him in the defensive secondary. Junior Ron Smith, who was a regular defensive halfback last year, will get a shot at the job along with sophomores Jesse Ealy, Dean Cappel and Pete Thompson.

The left side of the offensive line is intact. Steve Schmid, who set a record at State with 37 receptions last year, will be the left end, while Greg Matafin and senior co-captain Dave Parkhurst will be at tackle and guard. Matafin was a second team all conference choice last year as a sophomore, while this marks Parkhurst's third season as a starter.

Timon Kendall, junior center who was all league last year and kicked a 32-yard field goal to win the Tampa game, returns at that spot and leaves it in exceptionally good hands.

Outlook

The right side of the line presents the problem. Graduation losses took three-year veteran and co-captain John Grimes at end, three-year regular Dan Bates at tackle and two-year veteran Jeff Rudolph at guard. To bolster the right side, the Sycamore staff has taken two all-league defensive performers and shifted them to the offensive interior.

Junior Stan Worrall, all conference defensive guard has been shifted to offensive guard, while second team defensive tackle choice Doug Starewicz has been switched to offensive tackle. The right, or tight, end job is still up for grabs, although senior Tom Majewski and sophomore Larry Szezechowski would seem to have the inside track.

A sophomore and a transfer are the reasons that ISU's coaches felt they could switch Worrall and Starewicz to offense. Sophomore Kent Manwaring, the biggest man on the team at 255 and Kansas State transfer Bill Denny will man the defensive tackle spots. They offer size, speed and mobility, and in Denny's case, experience.

The defensive end spots are in good hands with juniors Jeff Keller and John Knox holding down the spots. Keller was second team all league last year and just may be the best around, while roommate Knox is a solid performer. Both offer size (6-3 and 210), speed and range.

Two linebackers return in Butch Penn and Chuck McDonough. They were the starters at the end of last year. In addition, junior Don Dunkerley is being switched from a cornerback's position and Rich Galbraith is coming over to the defense from an offensive quarterback's slot. Sophomore Eric Skinner was looking good at linebacker in spring practice until a knee injury stopped him and a speedy and complete recovery could win him a starting nod. In addition, Oglesby will get a try at linebacker should he fail to make it as a quarterback, so this may make this position as solid as any on the squad.

Lettermen are back at all spots in the defensive secondary and include senior Terry Ogle along with juniors Mike Russell and Ron Smith. Lynch may also be moved to the defensive secondary (will be if ISU can find a running back to team with Brumfield) and sophomore Mike Blackwell is given a good chance at cracking the starting lineup.

In summary, a lot of lettermen return to the ISU football squad, but an unproven right offensive line, a question about the quarterbacking and several new faces in the defensive lineup are killing any over-optimism that otherwise might be prevalent in the Sycamore camp.

Player

14 Norm Pellegrini, QB, 5-10, 170, Jr.—Considered a good passer, possibly the best on team. Completed 12 of 24 for 106 yards in reserve role last fall. Was first-string quarterback on undefeated frosh team two years ago. Needs a lot of game experience.

15 Verbie Walder, QB, 5-10, 170, Jr.—A junior college transfer from Sacramento State, where he was MVP last fall. Has good quickness for quarterback and considered better-than-average passer. Will be top challenger for starting quarterback's role.

16 Ron Overton, QB, 5-11, 180, Sr.—Two year veteran who led state in TD passes as soph with 15. Tossed six "bombs" last year and led team in total offense for second straight year. Coaches would like to see him regain form he had as sophomore when he completed 55% of his passes. The QB the youngsters will have to beat out for starting berth.

17 Steve Oglesby, QB, 5-11, 185, So.—Staff feels Oglesby will play somewhere because of aggressiveness and desire. Played linebacker with frosh team last fall and looked impressive at quarterback during spring practice. Will see a lot of action at one of the two spots.

18 Mike Kujawski, HB, 5-11, 175, So.—Is quick and aggressive. Played QB on frosh team last fall, but saw action primarily as defensive back during spring practice. Will probably stay in defensive secondary. Needs varsity experience but has ability to push veterans for position.

19 Rich Galbraith, LB, 6-0, 210, Jr.—Switched from QB to linebacker during spring and should be starter. As QB last fall, was second in team scoring, fourth in total offense and third in passing. Has size, aggressiveness to become outstanding linebacker.

20 Jesse Ealy, HB, 6-0, 170, So.—Among running leaders on frosh team last fall. Considered among top sophomore backs. Has speed and movement to become fine running back. Like all sophs, needs game experience.

21 Ron Smith, FB, 5-9, 180, Jr.—Will get a shot at both offense and defense. Was regular defensive half-back last fall, but was impressive carrying the ball in

spring game. Has good speed and among the "quickest" backs on team at "hitting the hole."

22 Jim Brumfield, HB, 6-1, 190, Jr.—Leading scorer on team last year, second-leading rusher. Has good size and fastest man on squad. Scoring threat every time he gets hand on ball as a TD each on kickoff and punt return last fall will attest. Has been timed at :09.7 in 100, won conference 100 yard dash. Could well be finest running back in ISU history.

23 Randy Lynch, HB, 6-0, 205, Sr.—Co-captain this year. Among leading rushers in each of last two years. Is being switched to defensive halfback this year, where he played in goal-line situations a year ago. Could go both ways this fall. Coaches hope for early maturity of soph running backs so Lynch can stay on defense.

25 Mike Blackwell, HB, 5-11, 180, So.—A good smart ballplayer who had a good spring, particularly as a defensive halfback. One of top sophomore prospects to break into starting lineup.

30 Bob Komara, FB, 5-10, 195, Sr.—Best blocking back on team. Had a 3.6 yards-per-carry average in reserve role last year. Also scored 14 points. Speed hampers break-away threat, but will get two-four yards every time he carries ball. Will see a lot of action in final season.

31 Jim Bartolomeo, HB, 5-11, 200, Sr.—Has good size and is quick. Injuries during both sophomore and junior years have kept him from gaining experience he should have as a senior. Coaches feel he could be an outstanding running back, but needs an injury-free season.

32 Ed LeBlanc, LB, 6-0, 195, Sr.—A two-year veteran who will be used at any one of several positions because of experience and aggressiveness. May not start but will see great deal of action as reserve in defensive backfield.

33 Gerald North, FB, 6-2, 210, So.—Another promising sophomore back who impresses coaches with running ability, desire. Was among leading ground-gainers in spring game. Needs experience but is top

candidate for starting FB spot in another year after Klink graduates.

34 Mike Rusnak, FB, 5-11, 200, So.—Runs well with football, but needs work on blocking. Improved blocking would make him a top challenger for FB spot, next year if not this season.

Memorial Stadium



Memorial Stadium, acquired in 1967 by Indiana State University on a long-term lease, is undergoing a three-phase complete renovation and remodeling, which will basically change it from a combination football and baseball facility to a strictly football stadium.

Phase One, completed during the summer of 1967, included the reorientation of the field from a northerly-southerly direction to an easterly-westerly line, the installation of AstroTurf and the erection of some 4,500 temporary bleacher seats. It has been used for football only since the installation of the AstroTurf with the ISU baseball nine moving to another site in the city.

Another addition of temporary bleachers was made this summer, and now the seating capacity of the stadium, including the roofed portion of the original stadium, provides seating for some 13,000 spectators.

Phase Two, to be completed within the next year, calls for the razing of the roofed portion of the stadium (leaving the arch intact) and the construction of a 12,000 seat grandstand, complete with modern press box. The second phase of the stadium renovation also calls for permanent dressing rooms to be built at the stadium. The completion of Phase Two would bring the seating capacity of the stadium to nearly 20,000.

Phase Three, or the ultimate development under present planning, calls for another 12,000-seat grandstand on the opposite side of the field and would bring the total seating capacity to 24-27,000 persons.

AstroTurf

AstroTurf, the playing surface at Memorial Stadium (the home of the Sycamores), is much similar to that used in Houston's famed Astrodome. Plus factors for the synthetic field include durability (some 20 college and high school football games per year are played on the field), a constant surface will provide sure footing regardless of weather and experience has proven a substantial decrease in knee and ankle injuries.

Each blade of grass is $\frac{3}{4}$ inches long and is attached to a sponge-rubber pad $\frac{1}{4}$ inches thick. This is then set on a fiber pad, $\frac{1}{2}$ inches thick and quite similar to the carpeting pads used in homes, and both are set on a two-inch thick layer of asphalt.

Indiana State was the first University in the world to own and make outdoor application of a field of this type. The Sycamores' home game with Eastern Illinois, September 16, 1967, was the first football game ever played on AstroTurf out-of-doors.

A graduate of Wiley High School, Malloy holds bachelor's and master's degrees from Indiana State University.

Coach Draper



Fred Draper starts his first year at Indiana State as a fulltime coach this fall as assistant track and cross country coach.

The former ISU track and cross country star was a graduate assistant in both programs here in 1967-68. While an undergraduate at I-State, Draper earned three letters each in

cross country and track and was named all conference in track three years and to the same honor in cross country one season.

Draper was graduated with a B.S. degree from Indiana State in 1967 and with an M.S. degree from Indiana State in 1968.

University Today



Today, Indiana State University is being called one of the "fastest growing universities in the Midwest." There is good reason for this. Just four years ago, in the fall of 1964, the enrollment at ISU was 7,777. This year, there will be nearly 13,000 fulltime students on campus and the end isn't even in sight. This does not include the some 1,000 students at the ISU Evansville campus nor the some 2,000 night and extension students.

In its relatively new university status ISU is adding new courses of study, beefing up existing programs, creating new service and academic units, increasing its already strong faculty and building new buildings and facilities as fast as possible to cope with the continuing spiralling enrollment.

Major construction projects completed in the last year include a \$4.3 million Science Building addition, opened early in 1968, and two buildings housing four residence halls, costing some \$8.7 million and ready for occupancy in the fall of 1968.

Projects of major construction underway include a third Married Student Apartment building, with 112-units and a \$500,000 Nurses Clinical Education Building to be located near Terre Haute's Union Hospital. In addition, ground was broken and construction started in the summer of 1968 for the first building on the 250-acre Indiana State campus at Evansville. This building, to be a classroom and administration complex, is scheduled for completion in 1969.

Plans are progressing on a proposed \$4.6 million University library, while other building projects contemplated include a Student Health and Counseling Center Building, a School of Nurses Building, additional residence halls and academic buildings and facilities and permanent grandstand seating at Memorial Stadium.

Educational offerings have increased at ISU with the same rapid pace. There are now Schools of Education; Arts and Sciences; Business; Health, Physical Education and Recreation; Nursing; and Technology.



History

Indiana State University was created by an Act of the Indiana General Assembly on December 20, 1865, and opened its doors to 21 students (13 women and eight men) on January 6, 1870.

The announced purpose of forming the University at that time was an institution that would "be to teachers what law school is to lawyers and medical school is to doctors."

The Act of 1865 did not provide a site for the newly-created school, but a board of trustees, appointed later, were requested to locate in an Indiana town or city cooperating with at least \$50,000. Terre Haute was the only town or city in the state to come forth with an offer and it was better than originally requested. A committee from Terre Haute offered the \$50,000 and in addition, real estate valued at \$25,000.

The cornerstone for the original building was laid August 13, 1867. The cost of that building was some \$100,000. The building later burned to the ground April 9, 1888.

The school was known as Indiana State Normal School from 1870 until 1927, when the name was changed to Indiana State Teachers College. In 1961, the name was again changed, this time to Indiana State College. The latest, and probably the final name change came in the spring of 1965 when the Indiana Legislature renamed the school Indiana State University.

Called one of the fastest growing colleges in the Midwest, State's enrollment has nearly doubled since 1963. There were some 6,800 students on campus in 1963, and enrollment during September 1968 was over 13,000. Only 15 years ago, in 1953, enrollment at Indiana State was less than 1,900.
