**Dr. Alan C. Rankin**  
President, Indiana State University

Alan C. Rankin officially took the office of President of Indiana State July 1, 1965. He holds a Doctor of Social Science degree and a Master of Arts degree in Political Science from Syracuse University. His undergraduate degrees (B.S. and B.A.) were earned at Fort Hays Kansas State College, where he ranked first in his class, was president of the student body and editor of the yearbook.

In June, 1967, he received an honorary Doctor of Letters degree from Rose Polytechnic Institute here in Terre Haute.

Dr. Rankin came to Indiana State University from the University of Pittsburgh, where he was Vice Chancellor for Student and General Affairs. He had also served as Acting Chancellor of the University.

Interested in foreign affairs, Dr. Rankin served in the Panama Canal Zone from 1940-46, assisted in the reorganization of the Japanese Civil Service out of General Douglas MacArthur's headquarters following the war, studied the Marshall Plan in Europe under a program sponsored by the University of Vermont in 1948, participated in a public administration study in Indonesia in 1954 for the Ford Foundation and Cornell University, and held an internship in government in the office of the late Senator Robert H. Taft.

The community-minded Indiana State University President is currently the President of the Terre Haute Committee for Area Progress; the President of the Indiana Conference on Higher Education; a member of the Constitutional Revision Commission in Indiana; and a member of the board of the Swope Art Gallery in Terre Haute. Dr. Rankin is also a member of the Board of Governmental Affairs Institute of Washington, D.C.

## ISU History

Indiana State University was created by an Act of the Indiana General Assembly on December 20, 1865, and opened its doors to 21 students (13 women and eight men) on January 6, 1870.

The announced purpose of forming the University at that time was an institution that would "be to teachers what law school is to lawyers and medical school is to doctors."

The Act of 1865 did not provide a site for the newly-created school, but a board of trustees, appointed later, were requested to locate in an Indiana town or city cooperating with at least \$50,000. Terre Haute was the only town or city in the state to come forth with an offer, and it was better than originally requested. A committee from Terre Haute offered the \$50,000, and in addition, real estate valued at \$25,000.

The cornerstone for the original building was laid August 13, 1867. The cost of that building was some \$100,000. The building later burned to the ground on April 9, 1888.

The school was known as Indiana State Normal School from 1870 until 1927,

when the name was changed to Indiana State Teachers College. In 1961, the name was again changed, this time to Indiana State College. The latest, and probably the final, name change came in the spring of 1965 when the Indiana Legislature renamed the school Indiana State University.

Called one of the fastest growing universities in the Midwest, State's enrollment has doubled since 1963. There were some 6,800 students on campus in 1963, and enrollment in September, 1969, was at the 13,800 mark. Only 16 years ago, in 1953, enrollment at Indiana State was less than 1,900.

## The University Today

The dynamic growth of Indiana State University, the second oldest state university in Indiana, has never been more evident than at the present. Just five years ago, in the fall of 1964, the enrollment at ISU was 7,777. This year there will be some 13,400 students on campus and the end isn't even in sight. This figure does not include some 1,700 students at the ISU-Evansville campus, nor the some 2,000 night and extension students.

Several recently completed major construction projects are scheduled to open this fall. They include a third Married Student Housing building, which houses 112 units; a \$630,000 Nurses' Clinical Education Building located near Terre Haute's Union Hospital; the Lincoln Quadrangles dormitory unit, with a capacity of 800 persons and built at a cost of \$6 million; the first building on the 300-acre campus at Evansville, which is a classroom and administration complex; and the Driver and Traffic Safety Education Demonstration Center, built at the county fairgrounds at a cost of \$215,000.

Just one year ago, in the fall of 1968, a \$4.3 million addition to the Science Building was opened, as was an \$8.7 million complex of two buildings housing four residence halls.

Work is continuing this school year on the \$3.4 million expansion of the boiler plant; the addition of a fifth floor on the building housing the School of Business; the fourth Married Student Housing building with another 112 units; and work will start on Phase Two of the Memorial Stadium renovation immediately after this season is completed. Phase Two calls for the razing of the present grandstand and the erection of a 13,000-seat football grandstand complete with press box and dressing room facilities.

Plans are progressing on a proposed \$6 million University library; a Student Health and Counseling Center building; a School of Nurses building and another unit in the Lincoln Quadrangles complex. Other projects contemplated include additional residence halls and academic buildings as well as the expansion of the present Tiley Memorial Union Building.

Educational offerings have increased at ISU with the same rapid pace. There are now Schools of Education; Arts and Sciences; Business; Health, Physical Education and Recreation; Nursing; and Technology.

## CHIEF OUBACHI



Indiana State's athletic teams have a new mascot this season, an Indian known as Chief Oubachi (pronounced wee-BOTCH-ee). The need for a mascot was voiced by the ISU Board of Trustees and the Athletic Department, and the Student Government Association named a committee headed by SGA member Robert W. Green, a junior history major from West Lafayette, to come up with a suitable mascot.

After several months of study and consideration of most animals and symbols used as mascots; the committee decided that an Indian would be the most appropriate mascot for the Sycamore athletic teams. The decision was based primarily on the historical significance of Indians in the Wabash Valley.

Oubachi was the name chosen by the committee. The name appears in some early writings of the famous explorer, LaSalle, back in the early 1700s. It was his (the French) way of spelling the name (Wabash) given to a federation of Indians along the river valley made up of Miami, Wea and Kickapoo tribes.

Following the committee's study, a resolution adopting Chief Oubachi as the official Indiana State mascot was passed by the Student Government Association. It was also decided that the team name of "Sycamores" would not change, but only a mascot would be added.

Drawings were then submitted to the committee in a campus-wide contest to design the clothes and war bonnet to be worn by Chief Oubachi. The winning drawing was submitted by Brian Easton, a junior economics major from Bicknell, and he was awarded a \$50 cash prize for his effort. The drawing will also serve as the basis from which the decals and uniform patches will be made.

Next came the selection of the person to be Chief Oubachi, and again, a campus-wide contest was conducted. The eventual winner of the contest was John Mellinger, a junior theatre major from Veedersburg. An alternate, to appear in the event that Mellinger can not, is Brady Lawrence, a sophomore pre-law major from Fort Wayne.

Chief Oubachi will appear at every Indiana State football and basketball game, home and away, and make other appearances at such functions as parades and pep rallies.

## ORIGIN OF SYCAMORES

The name "Sycamores" was adopted by a student body general election in 1921. A contest was started that year for a school name to be selected on Blue and White Day, a forerunner to Homecoming. The names were to be submitted to a committee of four, with that group's top three choices being placed before the student body in a campus-wide election. The name Sycamores was among the three finalists submitted. Although it was roundly booed when placed on the ballot, the students, in an apparent joke, gave the name a one-sided victory in the election. The winner of the contest received \$3 as first prize for his entry. The name was first used January 3, 1922, in the Normal Advance, predecessor of The Statesman, present campus newspaper.

## DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Gordon H. Chalmers



Gordon H. Chalmers assumed the position of Director of Athletics at Indiana State University in June, 1967, coming to ISU from Iowa State University, where he had been Director of Athletics and head of Physical Education since 1959.

Prior to that, he had been Assistant Athletic Director at the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, N.Y., from 1952-58, and swimming coach there from 1946 until his acceptance of the top position at Iowa State.

Under Chalmers' direction at Iowa State, two seating additions and a press box were added to the football stadium, a new \$1.6 million physical education

building was completed and tennis courts, practice football fields and outdoor basketball courts were added to the facilities.

He designed the Ames, Iowa, community indoor swimming pool and assisted Miami University of Ohio in the building of a swimming pool. He has aided numerous colleges and universities in designing new athletic facilities for their campuses.

Chalmers is a former national collegiate swimming champion and a member of the 1932 American Olympic swimming team. He captained the varsity swimming team at his alma mater, Franklin & Marshall College in Lancaster, Pa., and also was a varsity soccer and baseball player there.

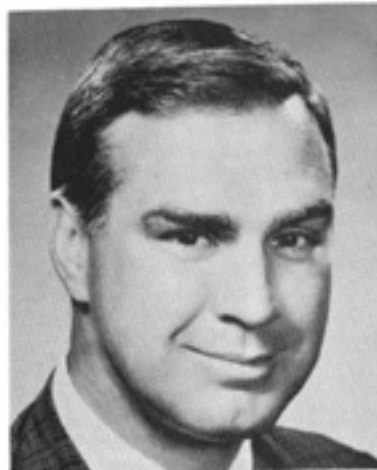
His coaching career began in 1940 as head swimming coach at Lafayette College and the following year at Lehigh University. He served as an athletic officer during World War II, and was honorably discharged as a Lieutenant Commander.

Nationally known and respected, Chalmers is a member of the NCAA's Gymnastics Rules Committee and one of the four NCAA representatives to the United States Gymnastics Federation. He has also served as chairman of the NCAA Olympic Committee, NCAA Committee on Committees, on the Board of Directors of the United States Olympic Committee and President of the College Swimming Coaches Association. He is still on the Swimming Hall of Fame Committee.

Chalmers and his wife, Helen, have two daughters, Margo and Donna.

## HEAD FOOTBALL COACH

Jerry Huntsman



Jerry Huntsman, head football coach at Indiana State for the past three seasons, is rapidly building one of the outstanding collegiate coaching records in the country.

In three seasons at ISU, with at least two of them classed as rebuilding years, Huntsman has led the Sycamores to a 21-7 record, with last fall's 9-1 slate establishing several records.

The nine victories by last year's team mark the most ever won in a single season by an Indiana State football team and the eight straight wins in games three through ten is also an all-time record for the longest winning streak of any Indiana State team.

Huntsman's achievements at Indiana State were recognized by his peers last fall as the American Football Coaches Association nominated him as one of eight NCAA College Division Coaches-of-the-Year throughout the nation. The personable ISU gridiron mentor represented the Midwestern area in the national balloting.

In his first two seasons here, Huntsman coached the Sycamores to 6-2 and 6-4 records, winning second and third respectively in the Indiana Collegiate Conference. He was named the league's Coach-of-the-Year for his efforts in his first year here. Last season, Indiana State wasn't a member of the conference, but defeated every other school in the league as it was the previous season.

With a collegiate coaching record of 50-10, Huntsman's overall coaching record, spanning 12 years in high school and college, is a tremendous 83-22-3. Ten of those 22 losses came in just two years, once in high school where his team lost six games and once in college, two years ago, when his squad lost four contests. Three of his teams, two in high school and one in college, have been undefeated.

Prior to coming to ISU as backfield coach in 1965, Jerry headed the Earlham College elevens for four years, where he compiled a 29-3 record, including an undefeated season in 1962, and was named the NAIA District 21 College Coach-of-the-Year in 1963.

He is a graduate of Richmond (Ind.) High School and Wabash College. While at Wabash, he was named All State quarterback for the small college elevens in 1951. After serving a tour of duty with the U.S. Army, where he was named to the All-Army track team as a javelin thrower, Huntsman got into coaching.

Following one-year stints at Waveland (Ind.) and Covington (Ind.), the ISU head coach moved to Crawfordsville (Ind.), where during his three years there, his teams went to a 14-12-2 mark. Moving then to Huntington (Ind.), Huntsman-coached squads were undefeated in his two years there, playing to a 19-0-1 record. In 1961, he moved to Earlham.

Jerry is from a family of coaches, his father Owen serving as track and cross country coach at Wabash College, and his brother Stan holding a similar position at Ohio University. The three Huntsmans have a combined total of some 73 years in coaching.

Huntsman and his wife, Cora Lee, have three sons, Brent, Jerry and Scott.



**Doug Kay**

**Defense Coach**

Success seems to follow Doug Kay wherever he goes. He joined the Indiana State football coaching staff two years ago as the defense coach after enjoying outstanding success as a high school coach in the Chicago area.

He started the football program at Deerfield High School in the Central Suburban League and during his five years there, his gridiron squads compiled a 30-16-2 record, but eight of those losses came in that initial year of the program. His teams won the league title in each of his last two seasons at the helm and he was named the loop's Coach-of-the-Year both seasons.

Kay played his college football under

Lou Saban at Western Illinois, and was the quarterback and a linebacker on the WIU teams that won 19 straight games.

In addition to his high school coaching experience, this former Paramarine with combat jumps in Korea, was an assistant coach at Western Illinois for one season before taking the head position at Deerfield High School.

He and his wife, Connie, have two children, Kimber and Bart.



**Bucky Haag**

**Defensive Secondary Coach**

Bucky Haag will coach the defensive secondary this season after guiding the Indiana State freshman team to a perfect 3-0 mark last fall in his first season with the Sycamore coaching staff.

Prior to coming to Indiana State, Haag had been athletic director, head football and track coach at Dwenger High School in Fort Wayne, where his gridiron teams compiled a 19-9 record in three seasons. He also had head football coaching experience at Three Oaks, Mich., where his teams had a 15-3 record in two seasons, giving Haag a high school coaching record of 34-12 in five seasons.

In addition to his head coaching experience at the two schools, Haag has served as assistant coach at South Bend St. Joseph's High School.

Bucky played his college football at Purdue University, and lettered as a defensive halfback in 1956, his junior year. Following a first-game injury during his senior year in 1957, Haag served as freshman backfield coach for the Boilermakers.

Bucky and his wife, Karel, have two daughters, Jennifer and Beth.



**Larry Van Der Hayden**

**Offensive Line Coach**

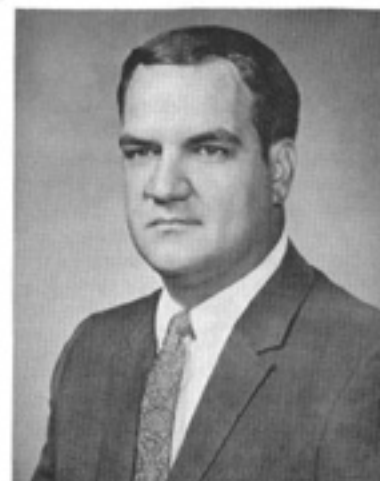
Larry Van Der Hayden brings seven years of coaching experience with him, five in the collegiate ranks, in this first year at Indiana State.

"Vandy" comes to Indiana State from Drake, where he was defensive line coach last year. Prior to that, he spent four years at his alma mater, Iowa State, as defensive line coach. In his first coaching assignment out of college, he was line coach at Lake City, Iowa, High School.

Larry earned six varsity letters during his undergraduate days at Iowa State, three each in football and baseball. As a member of the Cyclones in 1959-1961, he played offensive tackle and defensive guard.

At Indiana State, Van Der Hayden will coach the offensive line, which faces one of the major rebuilding tasks on the Sycamore squad this fall. Although this is his first year at ISU, he did arrive on the scene in early spring and worked with the line during spring drills.

**Carol Purichia**

**Offensive Backs Coach**

Carol Purichia is the newest member of the I-State coaching staff, having joined the group right after spring drills.

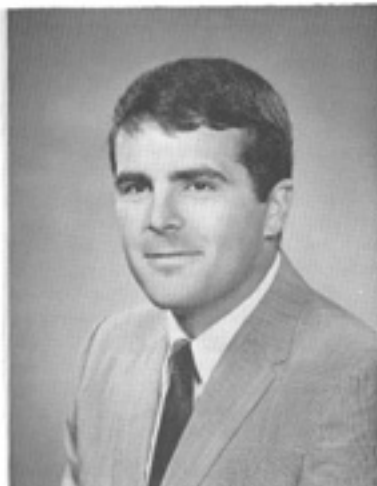
Purichia came to Indiana State from Chatard High School in his native Indianapolis, where he had been the head football and wrestling coach for five years.

His five-year football record at Chatard was 36-13-1, and his teams won two city titles ('67 and '68) as well as three Capitol District Conference crowns ('65, '66 and '67). In addition, his team last fall was unbeaten in ten games and ranked third in the state.

Prior to moving to Chatard, Carol was reserve football coach at Cathedral High School in Indianapolis, where his teams had a combined 30-0-0 record.

He is a graduate of Indiana Central, where he lettered four years in football, and was All Conference quarterback in 1960. That same season, he was 11th in the nation in passing for small college quarterbacks. He played with the Warriors of Indianapolis in the Continental Football League one season. As a prepster, he was All City quarterback with the Indianapolis Washington H.S. eleven.

Carol and his wife, Donna, have one daughter, Angela.



**Mike Flaherty**

**Freshman Coach**

Mike Flaherty comes to Indiana State from the University of Cincinnati, where he was a graduate assistant last fall.

He will coach the freshman football teams at Indiana State, and work with the varsity defensive secondary in the spring and fall before the freshmen report. As freshman coach, he will also handle a bulk of the scouting chores for the Sycamores.

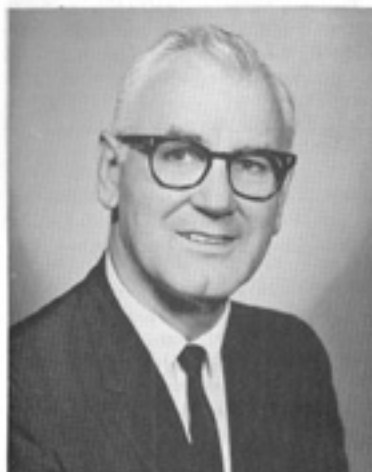

## INDIANA STATE FOOTBALL OUTLOOK FOR 1969

Indiana State coach Jerry Huntsman states flatly, "We have what we feel will be the best team ever at Indiana State University, but we are also facing without a doubt the toughest schedule ever presented to a Sycamore football team."

Heading that "toughest ever" schedule are powerhouse football teams from Eastern Kentucky, Western Kentucky, Southern Illinois and Eastern Michigan. In addition, two more of the ISU opponents are coming off successful seasons with veteran teams. They are Illinois State and Central Michigan. Eastern Illinois and Evansville are headed for what their people call "...maybe the finest seasons ever." Ball State has almost everyone back from a 5-4-0 team and are looking forward to a fine season, while Butler has a veteran team that boasts enough speed and depth that they are talking in terms of "...returning to football prominence." So Huntsman has a valid point when speaking of the toughest ever schedule.

### Offense

Virtually the same offense that set nearly every school scoring and yardage record last fall is back, including diminutive **Verbie Walder**, the quarterback who is given a major portion of the credit for ISU's 9-1-0 record last fall. **Walder**, who set a school mark for single season total offense and was named "Most Valuable" by his teammates, is joined by record-breaking running back **Jim Brumfield** and pass receiver **Steve Schmid**, who owns most of the reception records at State. Other returnees include tackle **Timon Kendall**, guard **Sam Marra**, center **Frank Crossland** as well as tackle-guard **Greg Matafin**, back after almost a year's layoff due to injuries sustained in an auto accident. **Pete Thompson**, the regular flanker last fall, also returns but is likely to see action at an end spot this season in place of **Schmid**, who is being moved back to flanker.

Tackle **Stan Worrall**, a two-year regular who played offensive tackle last fall, is being switched back to defense where he was all conference as a sophomore. The top two fullbacks, the tight end and the left guard are gone through graduation and will have to be replaced. Letterman **Jerry Surdy** seems to be the answer at tight end, while **Matafin** will probably play a guard spot. Current thinking has newcomer **Terry McGrath** as the tackle replacement for **Worrall**. Two non-letting juniors, **Kent Drew** and **Dean Cappel**, are battling for the top fullback's role. **Cappel** is the rugged "workhorse" type of runner, while the quicker **Drew** is an explosive runner much like **Brumfield**.

In **Walder**, **Brumfield** and **Schmid**, the Sycamores have the most potent weapons back in the attack. **Brumfield** owns nearly every single game, single season and career record in rushing and scoring. The same holds true for **Schmid** in pass receiving. **Walder** is a scrambler, who runs both the option and sprint-out plays quite well.

Several new faces could break into the starting lineup on offense. Flanker **John Cassidy** proved in the spring that he can catch the ball and he has more size than does **Schmid**. Little **Dave Mock** probably had the best spring of any receiver in the ISU camp and could win a starting flanker or end spot. Guard **Steve Balash**, selected as the "Outstanding Freshman" on an unbeaten frosh team last fall, could well break into a starting role in the interior line, as could possibly even **Jerry Gelling**, at 6-6 and 240, the biggest player on the squad.

The Sycamore coaching staff feels like the interior line and the fullback spots are the keys in the offense picture this fall. If the line can open the holes to establish the running game, and if the line and fullback can give **Walder** the protection for the passing game, the attacking unit of the Indiana State football team will give a good account of itself.

## Defense

The defensive unit was hit less by graduation than was the offense last fall, and on the basis of experience and past performance, this will probably be the "bread-and-butter" unit of the team this fall. The mirrored "Ks", **John Knox** and **Jeff Keller**, are back to roam at will and in general create havoc from the defensive end spots. In these two 6-3, 210-pound roommates, the ISU staff feels they have two of the best anywhere. Back after a fine sophomore season is 240-pound defensive tackle **Kent Marwaring**, who Huntsman calls, "...the best lineman I have ever coached at this stage of the game." **Worrall**, of course, was all conference as a defensive guard two years ago, so he should prove quite capable, if not outstanding as a defensive tackle. Sophomore **Willie Clemmons** is a "super-quick" noseman and should anchor what is undoubtedly the finest defensive line ever put together at Indiana State.

Four lettermen return at the linebacker's spot, led by regulars **Don Dunkerley** and **Butch Penn**. Joining these two are **Rich Galbraith**, who had a great spring and may have won a starting berth, and **Chuck McDonough**, a part-time starter for the past two seasons. This is probably the deepest position on the team in terms of proven, experienced talent.

Cornerback is a different story. The two regulars from the last two seasons have picked up their diplomas and left a void that Huntsman and his staff will have to fill if the Sycamores are to be successful. At the present, five players are being counted on to fill the four defensive secondary spots, and there are four lettermen among that group, although one of them, **Jesse Ealy**, won his monogram as an offensive back last fall. Safety **Mike Russell** set a school mark for pass interceptions last fall and will undoubtedly be back at the same spot. **Mike Kujawski** and **Mike Blackwell** both started as safeties on occasion and one of the two juniors will probably move to cornerback. **Ealy** is being thought of in terms of cornerback, while sophomore **Bob Turner**, who had a good spring, could play at either or both spots.

Early season prognosis is that the defensive line is solid...the linebacking corps is both experienced and talented, but the cornerback problems have to be solved.

## Summary

A solid, veteran ballclub, with explosive running, fine passing and outstanding receiving returns, backed up by a defensive crew that has won its spurs on the gridiron. There are some problems that have to be solved, namely finding an offensive tackle, an offensive guard, a fullback and two cornerbacks. But the biggest problem is the schedule, which provides Indiana State with no "breather" in which the Sycamores can rest possible injuries or build up confidence. Nobody around ISU is predicting another season like last year's 9-1-0, as nice as it would be.

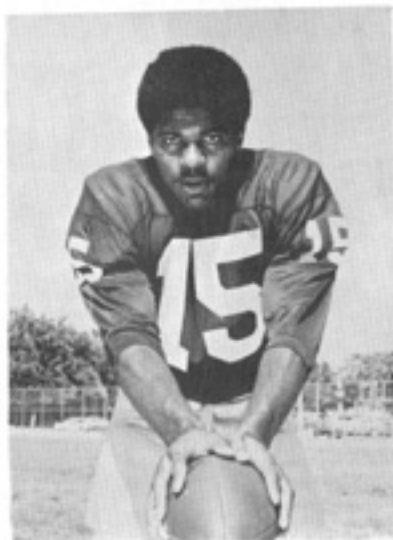

**VERBIE WALDER, 5-8, 165, Quarterback, Sr., Dayton, Ohio**

Consensus is that the "little guy" was basically the difference between the 6-4 season of two years ago and the standout 9-1 record last fall. Walder led the team in total offense with a record-setting 1,102 yards... in passing with 55 of 120 for 908 yards and eight TDs...and scored four TDs himself. He threw the winning TD pass in the final 32 seconds against Ball State, and heaved two scoring strikes in the 14-10 win over Western Illinois in a quagmire. Verbie is a sprint-out type QB and a scrambler in a passing situation. His scrambling set up all the scores in the 19-7 upset win over Northern Illinois. He was selected by his teammates as the year's "Most Valuable" last fall and elected as a co-captain for this fall.

**JIM BRUMFIELD, 6-1, 190, Running Back, Sr., Elizabeth, Pa.**

Name the Indiana State rushing or scoring record, and a good bet is that Jim Brumfield holds it. He holds the single game rushing record (185 yards), the single season rushing record (916 yards), the single season scoring record (66 points), the career scoring record (114 points), and is just 165 yards short of the career rushing record. Other school marks include the most TDs in a single season (11) and a career (19), most carries in a single season (185), and most yards on kickoff returns for both a single season (246) and career (415). In addition to his football exploits, Brumfield holds the ICC record in the 100 dash, winning the event in :09.7 as a sophomore. This speed plus his size make him a valid top-notch pro prospect. He is an "explosive" rather than a "cute" type runner and has great acceleration.

Steve "Lap" Schmid is to the ISU pass receiving corps what Brumfield is to the rushing game. Schmid already holds the career records for the most receptions (68), most yards via receiving (1,029) and most TD passes caught (10). In addition, he holds the single season records for the most receptions (37), the most yards receiving (580) and the most TD passes caught (8). He caught the winning pass against Ball State in the final 32 seconds last fall and sidestepped the last defender to score and caught both aerial bombs in the 14-10 win over Western Illinois. He came to ISU as a golfer (scratch golfer) and tried out for football as a quarterback in frosh year. Moved from fourth string QB to first string split end during sophomore fall.

**84** **JERRY SURDY, 6-3, 210, Sr., Whiting**—Jerry is a returning letterman who started to come along last season late in the year following a knee injury that hampered him most of the season. He had a fine spring practice and has won the tight end spot. Surdy is being looked to for blocking by the Sycamore coaching staff. Last year, he caught two passes for a total of 29 yards for the Sycamores.

**45** **PETE THOMPSON, 6-1, 185, Jr., Indianapolis**—Pete is another top natural athlete on the Sycamore squad this fall, and another offensive regular switching positions. After having a fine season as a flanker last fall, Thompson is being switched to end to try and offset some of the graduation losses there. Last fall, he caught 12 passes for 153 yards and one TD, and gained another 58 yards in ten carries on the ground. He could also see action as a defensive cornerback.

**80** **RON WATSON, 6-3, 195, So. Ames, Iowa**—Ron is a big, rangy type of player that coaches look for in a tight end. Towards the end of spring practice, he started showing some promise as an offensive end. He missed freshman football at Indiana State and this hampered his progress early in the spring. Coaches are also thinking of Watson as possibly an offensive tackle, and he will be played wherever his presence is needed.

**83** **JERRY NORTH, 6-2, 210, Jr., Oak Lawn, Ill.**—Jerry is being converted from fullback to an end position to provide the Sycamores additional size and speed at this position. He was a regular fullback on the I-State frosh team two years ago, and as the number two fullback last year, had a 3.9 yards-per-carry average on 43 yards in 11 carries. Coaches were impressed with his improvement at the new position during spring practice.

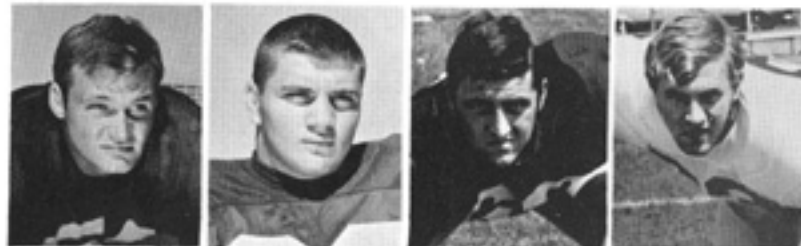
## TACKLES

**74** **GREG MATAFIN, 6-2, 220, Sr., South Bend**—Greg was injured in an auto accident following State's third game last season and sat out the remainder of the year, including spring practice. But he's been given the okay by the doctors for this fall, and if he can regain the form he had as a sophomore and the first three contests last fall, he will again be the best offensive lineman on the team. He has great desire and a compelling will to dominate his opponent at all times.

**75** **TIMON KENDALL, 6-0, 235, Sr., South Bend**—Timon is a two-year regular, who ranks as the best blocking lineman on the team. He came to ISU as a "walk-on" and has started every game in the past two years. Originally a center, Kendall was switched to tackle following the loss of Matafin last year. He also handles the place-kicking chores, and his 32-yard field goal won the Tampa game two years ago, while his record-setting 39-yarder against Northern Illinois last year put that game on ice for ISU in an upset victory.

**76** **DUANE HOSIMER, 6-4, 235, Sr., Palatine, Ill.**—At 6-4 and 235, Duane is one of the biggest players on the club, and yet, he retains good speed. He is slated for backup duty behind Matafin and Kendall, but has all the tools to be a fine tackle. As a senior, he provides some experience and stability to the second offensive unit.

**77** **JERRY GELLING, 6-6, 235, So., Waukegan, Ill.**—This youngster is the biggest member of the Sycamore team this fall and has all the potential to become an outstanding tackle. Has good speed for his size and was a regular tackle on the Indiana State frosh team that played to a 3-0 record last fall. He could well push for a starting berth before the end of the season.

**54** **FRANK CROSSLAND, 6-1, 200, Jr., Indianapolis**—Frank moved into a starting role as a center last fall after Timon Kendall was switched to tackle and handled the job admirably. A strong and aggressive player, Crossland is being moved to a guard spot this season to fill the hole created by the graduation of co-captain Dave Parkhurst. His move is predicated on the idea that newcomer Terry McGrath can handle the center chores, but will move back if that move fails to pan out. One thing is certain, a healthy Crossland will play.

**62** **SAM MARRA, 5-9, 200, Jr., Washington, Pa.**—Sam, who was the year's surprise last fall, is a returning regular at the right guard position. In Coach Jerry Huntsman's words, "He comes to play." Marra is a tenacious competitor who doesn't allow his apparent lack of size hamper him. He weekly graded among the highest offensive linemen throughout the season last fall.

**61** **STEVE BALASH, 6-0, 210, So., Hobart**—Steve was selected as the outstanding freshman football player at Indiana State last year. Strength and hard work are his attributes and he is one of the top two or three sophomore prospects to win a starting role. He had a fine spring practice and will be the top offensive line replacement if he doesn't win a starter's spot.

**63** **BOB PATTEE, 6-0, 195, So., East Tipton**—This sophomore comes from East Tipton High School in Tippecanoe County where he was "Mr. Everything" and has a great deal of ability. **50** **TERRY McGRATH, 6-2, 215, So., Cleveland, Ohio**—This transfer from Iowa State could be the key to the entire ISU offensive line this year. If he can make it at center, it will allow the moving of last year's regular center to a guard hole and leave two veteran tackles at their familiar spots. He has the ability, but missed almost all of spring practice with a non-football-associated injury and that coupled with his transfer waiting period gives him over a year of inactivity. He will be the fourth brother from the same family to play at State.

**51** **JAY SEIDER, 6-2, 235, Sr., Springville, N.Y.**—This senior will see a lot of action, even if not in a starting role, this season due to his familiarity with several positions. Although he is slated as the backup center, he will provide depth at center and offensive tackle, as well as defensive middle guard and defensive tackle.

## QUARTERBACKS

**14** **NORM PELLEGRINI, 5-10, 165, Sr., Elizabeth, Pa.**—This senior, who led the ISU freshman team to an undefeated season three years ago, had a good spring practice. He too, is an outstanding passer, who would see a great deal of action should the Sycamores take to the air route. As the backup man to Verbie Walder last year, he completed 13 of 25 aerial attempts for 206 yards and three touchdowns. His game experience makes him a valuable "spot" player.

**16** **RAY VOKISH, 6-2, 190, So., Natrona Heights, Pa.**—This young quarterback has a good arm, maybe the best on the team. While he lacks the speed to be a great sprint-out signal-caller, he could develop into a fine dropback quarterback. He made great strides in improvement during spring practice and will see considerable action in the passing game.

## RUNNING BACKS

**31** **RICH RENN, 5-9, 185, So., Gary**—Richie was the outstanding back on the undefeated freshman team last year, and this sophomore has all the ability to be a game-breaking runner. He has outstanding speed and great balance and is almost impossible to stop with a single tackler in the open field. His blocking needs work. He could become an ISU great before he's done.

## FLANKERS

**24** **DAVE MOCK, 5-10, 175, Jr., Cincinnati, Ohio**—Dave is a scrapper who looked good in brief appearances last fall and then had an outstanding spring practice highlighted by the game's winning touchdown catch between two defenders in the Blue and White game. Last year, playing behind Steve Schmid at split end, he made only three catches, good for 71 yards, but two of them were touchdown grabs. He will push for a starting spot in the passing game.

## FULLBACKS

**40** **KENT DREW, 5-11, 185, Jr., Detroit, Mich.**—Drew is potentially probably as good a running back as has ever played at ISU. He has the power and speed to be an outstanding fullback. He spent the spring working as a defensive cornerback, but the coaches are giving him a shot at the fullback's position, where he would provide a great compliment to the running of Jim Brumfield. In limited action last year, he averaged 5.7 yards-per-carry with 86 yards in 15 tries and he scored a touchdown.

**30** **DEAN CAPPEL, 6-1, 190, Jr., Tinley Park, Ill.**—Dean is a rugged type runner who has a lot of raw potential but needs a great deal of work. He has the size and good speed and could be a fine running back, but has to make up for lost time after missing most of last year with a leg injury. He did see enough game action last fall to gain 48 yards in 14 tries for an average of 3.4 yards-per-carry.

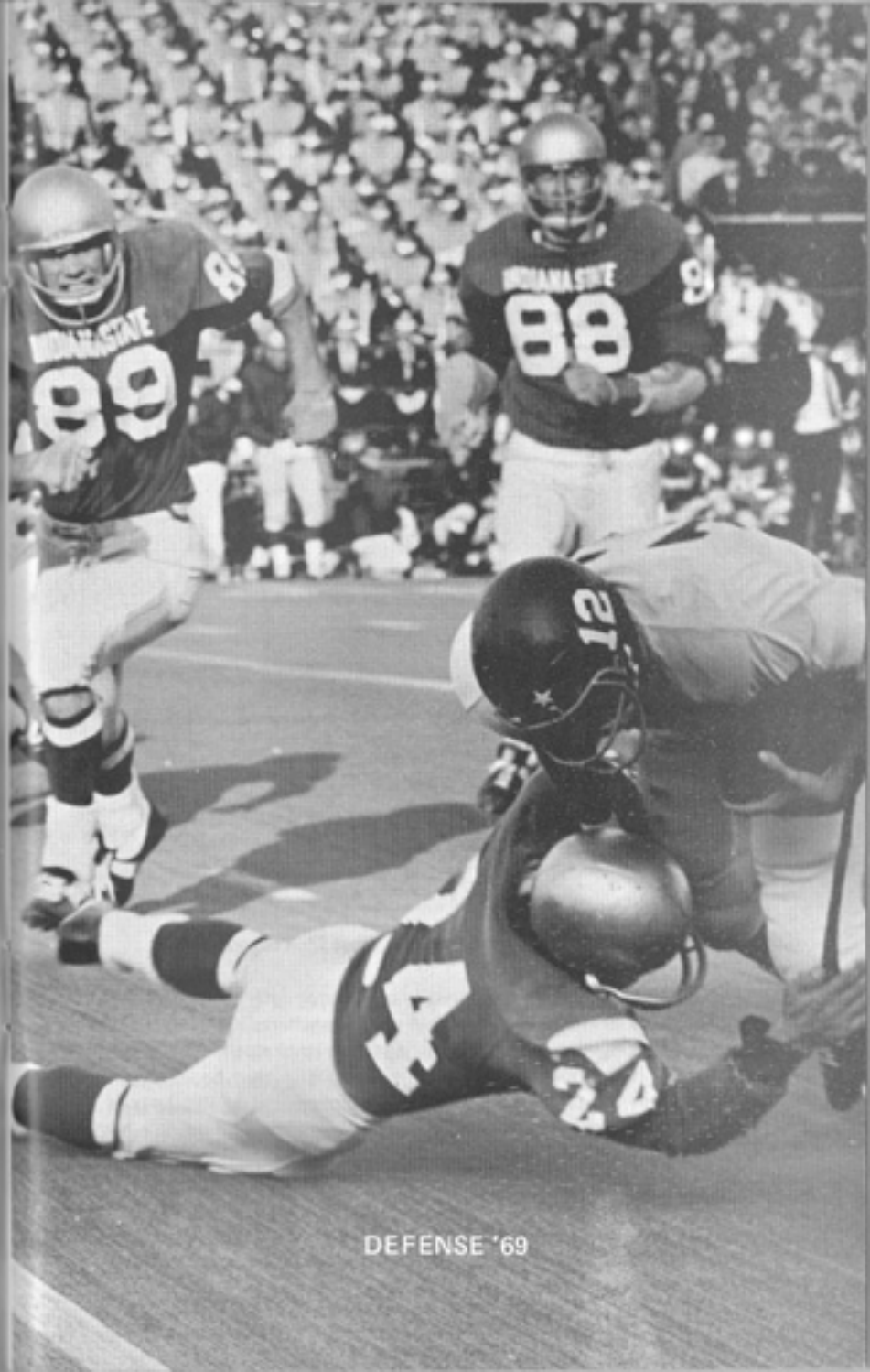

**79** **KENT MANWARING, 6-2, 240, Jr., Opp, Ala.**—"Bama" has been called by ISU Coach Jerry Huntsman, "...the finest lineman I have ever coached at this stage of the game." At 240, he will be the biggest regular in the I-State lineup. He is surprisingly quick and has good agility for his size, and if his improvement continues, will be one of the outstanding defensive linemen to ever wear an ISU uniform.

**70** **STAN WORRALL, 6-3, 225, Sr., Duquesne, Pa.**—Stan is being switched back to the defensive unit this fall after excelling as an offensive tackle last fall. As a sophomore, he was named all-conference as a defensive guard, so there is no doubt as to his ability to play the position. He had a weight problem during spring ball and has been ordered to trim down over the summer. A streamlined Worrall could help anchor what should be an outstanding line.

**71** **CURT REMUS, 6-1, 215, Sr., Hobart**—This steady senior has played almost every defensive line position for the Sycamores and he quite probably will see action at more than one spot again this year. His versatility finds him seeing nearly as much action as a starter, although he seldom starts a game. While he lacks the size of Manwaring and the speed of Worrall, he is a solid player.

**73** **MIKE COSTOLO, 6-4, 225, So., Pittsburgh, Pa.**—Mike is being called the "surprise" of the spring. He is considered an outstanding sophomore prospect and the Sycamore coaching staff is very high on him following his outstanding spring. He is strong and aggressive and will see a lot of action in a reserve role.

## LINEBACKERS

**34** **BUTCH PENN, 6-1, 225, Sr., New Eagle, Pa.**—A two-year regular as a linebacker, Penn will be a regular at that position again this fall. He may also see some action as an offensive end, a position he played in high school and as a freshman here. One of the top athletes on the Sycamore team, Penn was among the leading tacklers for ISU last fall and his 95-yard runback of a pass interception against Evansville set a school record and turned that game into a rout.

**35** **RICH GALBRAITH, 6-0, 205, Sr., Bethel Park, Pa.**—Rich is coming off a season-long injury, but if he's recovered, he could be the strong linebacker needed to allow the switch of Penn to offensive end. Rich is probably the strongest member of the entire squad and loves contact. He had an outstanding spring game, and the only question mark as to his playing the post is his health.

**36** **DON DUNKERLEY, 6-1, 190, Sr., Glassport, Pa.**—Don has outstanding natural athletic ability, and after two years of shifting around at various positions, should feel quite comfortable at linebacker. He hits with as much velocity as anyone on the team. He was originally recruited as a fullback, but has spent his entire varsity career playing on defense. He is the quickest of the linebackers on the team and should be outstanding on a fine defensive unit.

**60** **CHUCK McDONOUGH, 5-10, 180, Sr., Indianapolis**—This two-year letterwinner always plays a lot of football for Indiana State. He is a "quickie" type of linebacker rather than a strong one, and he gives the Sycamore defense a lot of diversification when he's in the lineup. He will be doing a lot of "stunting" from his position when he's in the game.

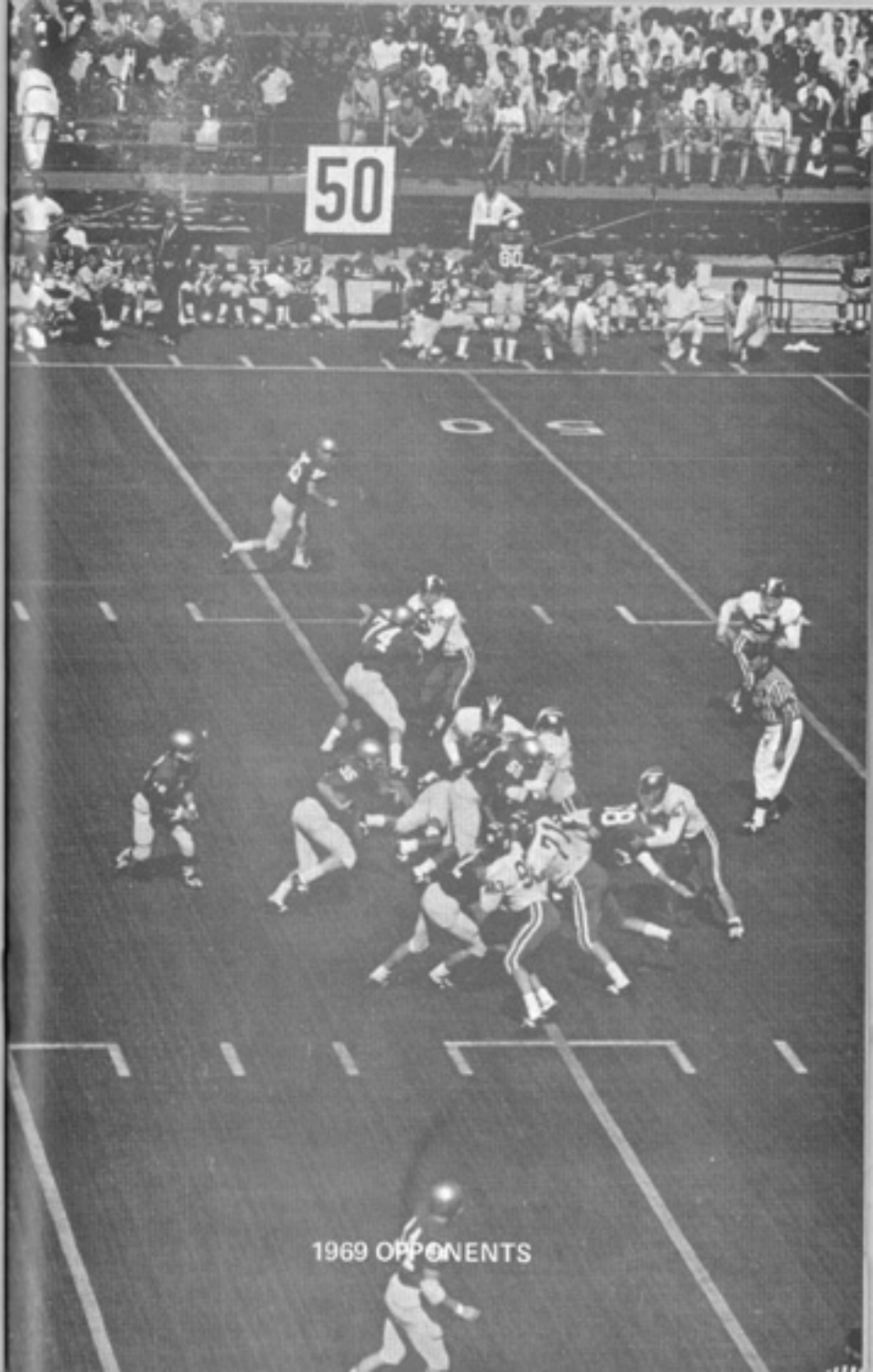
### SAFETIES

**Verbie Walder**, junior quarterback from Dayton, Ohio, was the second winner of the award. "The Little Guy" transferred to ISU from a junior college on the West Coast and promptly led the Sycamores to a 9-1-0 record, the best in the school's history, setting a school record for total offense in the process. He will be back at the controls of the I-State attack again this fall.

## MEMORIAL STADIUM

This is the final season that Indiana State will play its football games in Memorial Stadium as it stands. Immediately following the completion of this season, the existing grandstand will be razed, and a 13,000 seat stand, complete with modern press box, will be constructed in its place. At the same time, permanent dressing facilities will also be erected. This is Phase Two of a three-phase renovation project started two years ago with the installation of the world's first outdoor and also first university-owned AstroTurf playing field. Phase Two will be completed in time for the season next fall. In accordance with terms of a long-term lease held by ISU, the memorial arch portion of the existing stadium will remain intact.

The stadium was acquired by the University in 1967 and at that time was used for both football and baseball. Since the installation of the synthetic playing surface, however, the field has been used for just football and an occasional soccer contest.

Phase One of the renovation project, completed in the summer of 1967, included the reorientation of the field from a northerly-southerly direction to an easterly-westerly line; the installation of the AstroTurf; and the erection of some 4,500 bleacher seats on the north side of the field. Another addition of bleacher seats was made on the north side in 1968, bringing the seating capacity of the current stadium to some 13,500. The completion of Phase Two will bring the seating capacity to some 20,500.

Phase Three, or the ultimate development under present planning, calls for another 12-13,000 seat grandstand on the north side of the field and would bring the total stadium seating capacity to some 26,000.

## ASTROTURF

AstroTurf, the playing surface at Memorial Stadium (the home of the Sycamores), is much similar to that used in Houston's famed Astrodome. Plus factors for the synthetic field include durability (some 20 college and high school football games are played on the field each year, and in addition the ISU gridders hold all their practice sessions on the field); a constant surface which will provide sure footing regardless of weather; and experience with the field has proven a substantial decrease in knee and ankle injuries.

Each blade of grass is 3/8 inches long and is attached to a sponge-rubber pad 1/4 inches thick. This is then set on a fiber pad, 1/2 inches thick and quite similar to the pads used under carpeting in homes. Both the sponge-rubber pad and the fiber pad are then set on a two-inch thick layer of asphalt.

Indiana State was the first university in the world to own and make outdoor application of a field of this type. The Sycamores' home game against Eastern Illinois, September 16, 1967, was the first football game ever played on AstroTurf out-of-doors.

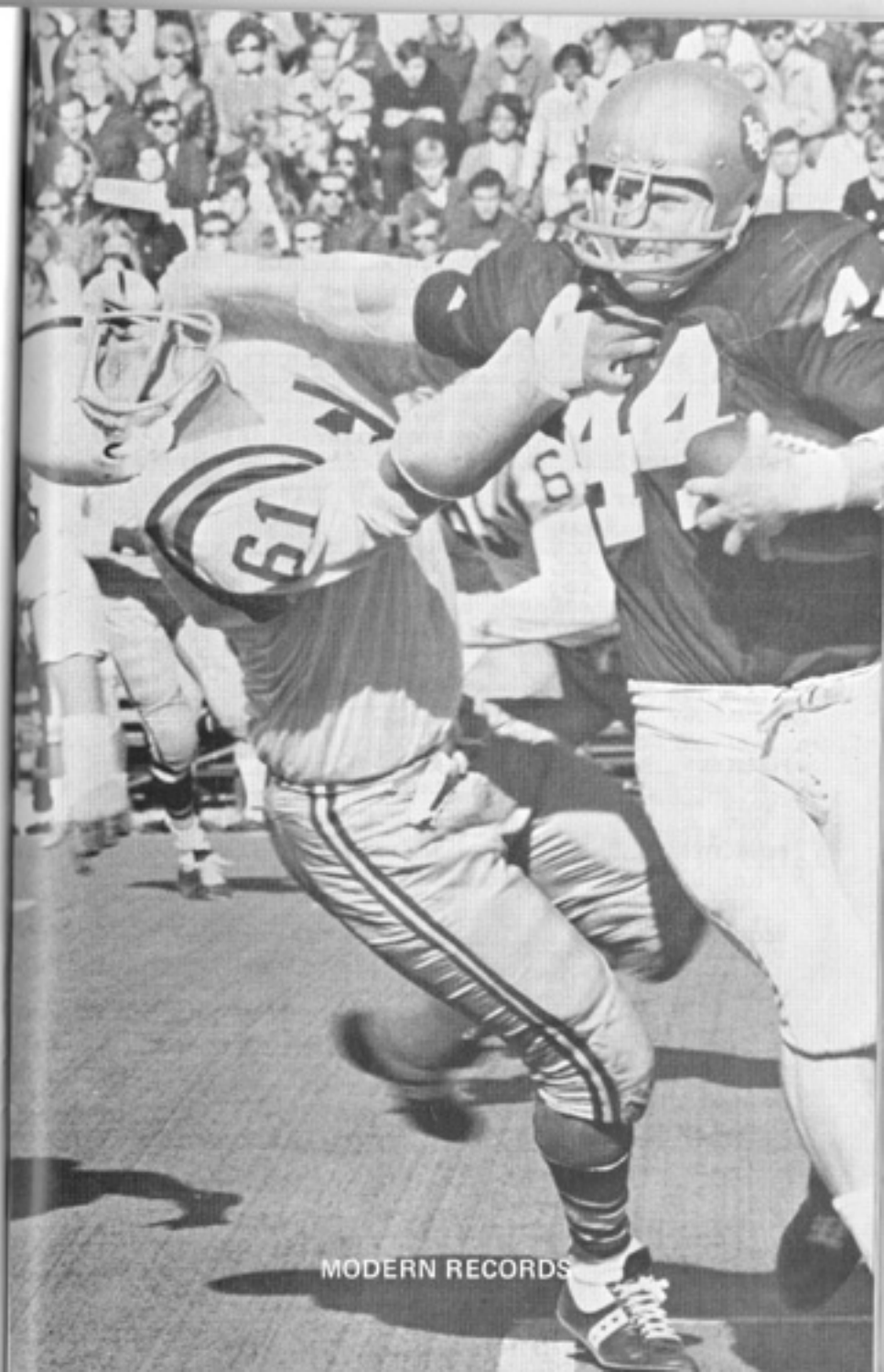

## LOOKING BACK ON '68; ISU's GREATEST SEASON

### INDIANA STATE OPENS 1968 SEASON WITH 23-0 VICTORY OVER EASTERN ILLINOIS; SCHMID SCORES TWO TIMES

CHARLESTON, Ill. (Sept. 14)—Indiana State opened its 1968 season with a 23-0 victory over Eastern Illinois here in a game that was closer than the final score indicates. Jim Brumfield scored the season's first touchdown on a four-yard run in the first period, and then Ron Overton hit Steve Schmid with a 13-yard scoring pass in the second quarter to give I-State a 14-0 halftime lead. Norm Pellegrini connected with Schmid on a seven-yard aerial toss in the fourth quarter, and later in the final stanza, Dan Bizik dropped the EIU punter in the end zone to account for the Sycamore scoring.

### AKRON HANDS SYCAMORES 41-13 SETBACK BEFORE 43,000 IN ANNUAL ACME-ZIP GAME; STATE NOW HAS 1-1 RECORD

AKRON, Ohio (Sept. 21)—Playing before a record crowd of 43,068 at the annual Acme-Zip game, it was all Akron as the hometowners walloped Indiana State, 41-13. Akron scored with just 28 seconds gone following an ISU fumble, and took a 6-0 lead. State came back to go ahead, 7-6, on a 49-yard scoring pass from Verbie Walder to Steve Schmid, but that was short-lived as the hosts then took a 13-7 lead. The Sycamores came as close as 20-14 when Jim Brumfield hit paydirt from one-yard out in the second period, but Akron had a 27-13 lead at the half and built the margin from there.

### I-STATE SCORES THREE TIMES IN SECOND HALF TO HAND BUTLER 28-12 LOSS; SECOND STRAIGHT OVER BULLDOGS

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. (Sept. 28)—A 21-point second half brought Indiana State from a 12-7 deficit and gave the Sycamores a 28-12 victory over Butler University here. State scored on the first play of the second quarter with Jim Brumfield scoring from five yards out, but the Bulldogs came back with TDs in the second and third periods to take a 12-7 lead. Verbie Walder then hit Steve Schmid and Pete Thompson with TD passes of 18 and 16 yards and Ron Smith punched across a score from the one to give ISU the victory.

### INDIANA STATE UPSETS NORTHERN ILLINOIS, 19-7, AT MEMORIAL STADIUM; WALDER STARS IN VICTORY

TERRE HAUTE, Ind. (Oct. 5)—In one of the most thrilling games of the year and undoubtedly the "biggest" win, the Sycamores upset highly-touted Northern Illinois here after spotting the visitors a 7-0 first period lead. The Huskies scored following the opening kickoff and then penetrated to the Sycamore 13-yard-line, before ISU held. Early in the second period, State went 80 yards in seven plays, with a Verbie Walder-to-Steve Schmid pass for 40 yards being the key play. Dean Klink scored from the one-yard-line. Late in the third quarter, Bob Komara scored on a four-yard run that gave ISU a 14-7 lead, and then Timon Kendall kicked a record-setting 39-yard field goal in the fourth stanza to up that margin to 17-7. Right after the kickoff following Kendall's field goal, Doug Starewicz and Jeff Keller tackled the NIU quarterback in the end zone for the final two points and State had the 19-7 victory.

### SYCAMORES TAKE 48-6 HOMECOMING WIN OVER PUMAS OF ST. JOSEPH'S BEFORE RECORD CROWD OF 14,000

TERRE HAUTE, Ind. (Oct. 12)—Over 14,000 fans, a record-setting crowd, jammed into Memorial Stadium for the annual Homecoming battle and watched the Sycamores throttle St. Joseph's, 48-6. State built up a 27-0 lead as the ISU eleven scored the first four times it had its hands on the ball. The I-State gridders had their 48 points before St. Joseph's ever hit paydirt. Jim Brumfield passed to Steve Schmid for one touchdown, and scored one himself. Verbie Walder passed to Tom Majewski for a TD and scored one on a run. Norm Pellegrini hit Dave Mock for two touchdowns and Bob Komara scored once on a run. It was ISU's third straight win of the season after splitting in the first two games.

### SYCAMORES EXTEND WINNING STREAK TO FOUR STRAIGHT; SPOIL VALPARAISO HOMECOMING WITH 28-0 VICTORY

VALPARAISO, Ind. (Oct. 19)—Even though Indiana State completely dominated the game here, it wasn't until the final period the Sycamores finally iced the 28-0 victory over Valparaiso in the Crusaders' Homecoming game. Almost the entire first quarter was played in Valpo territory, but it wasn't until the second period that Bob Komara blasted over from the three to give State the 7-0 lead. Later in the quarter, Jesse Ealy scored on a nine-yard run and ISU took a 14-0 lead to the dressing room at halftime. After a scoreless third quarter, Jim Brumfield scored on a five-yard run, and on the next series, Randy Lynch returned an intercepted pass for 33 yards and the touchdown. The victory extended the Indiana State winning streak to four straight and gave the Sycamores a 5-1 record after six games.

**PENN'S RECORD-SETTING 95-YARD INTERCEPTION RETURN HALTS UPSET-MINDED EVANSVILLE; STATE WINS 40-14**

TERRE HAUTE, Ind. (Oct. 26)—Sycamore linebacker Butch Penn turned a threatened upset by Evansville into an Indiana State rout (40-14) here when he intercepted a Craig Blackford pass and returned it 95 yards for the game-tying touchdown. The Aces had taken a 7-0 lead and were driving for their second score when Penn came up with his heroics. Jimmy Brumfield scored on runs of 41 and 3 yards, while Dean Klink, Verbie Walder and a Ron Overton-to-Dave Mock pass accounted for the other touchdowns.

**WALDER-TO-SCHMID PASS WITH 32 SECONDS GIVES I-STATE 20-14 WIN AT BALL STATE; WINNING STREAK NOW AT SIX**

MUNCIE, Ind. (Nov. 2)—With the scoreboard showing just 32 seconds remaining and the score between ISU and Ball State knotted at 14-14, I-State's Verbie Walder rolled to his left, and then passed back across the field to split end Steve Schmid for the game-winning 37-yard touchdown play. Schmid gathered in the ball on the ten-yard-line and sidestepped the only defender to hit paydirt unmolested. The victory was ISU's sixth straight, broke a three-game losing streak to the Cardinals and brought the Victory Bell back home. Jim Brumfield also scored on a 4-yard run and Walder on a 3-yarder for the other ISU scores.

**INDIANA STATE WINS SEVENTH STRAIGHT AS SYCAMORES DEFEAT DePAUW, 41-17, IN FINAL HOME GAME OF SEASON**

TERRE HAUTE, Ind. (Nov. 9)—Jim Brumfield and Jesse Ealy scored the first two times Indiana State had the ball and the Sycamores went on to defeat DePauw, 41-17, in the final home game of the season. It was the seventh straight win of the season for ISU and avenged a 17-14 setback at DePauw the previous year. Brumfield scored on runs of 71 and three yards, while Ealy had scoring jaunts of 19 and eight yards. Verbie Walder scored on a seven-yard scamper and passed to tight end Tom Majewski for a 35-yard scoring play. The Sycamores were never seriously threatened as they held leads of 19-0 and 35-9 at various times during the game.

**EIGHT STRAIGHT! WALDER-TO-SCHMID TD PASSES GIVE ISU 14-10 WIN OVER WESTERN ILLINOIS IN QUAGMIRE**

MACOMB, Ill. (Nov. 16)—Verbie Walder and Steve Schmid connected for touchdown passes in each the first and fourth quarters here to give Indiana State a 14-10 victory in a quagmire for State's ninth win of the season, and the eighth straight of the season. Western Illinois had taken a 10-7 lead on a field goal and a 99-yard kickoff return at the start of the second half on a field covered by six inches of water. The first Sycamore scoring pass covered 17 yards, while the winning TD aerial was a 21-yard play.
