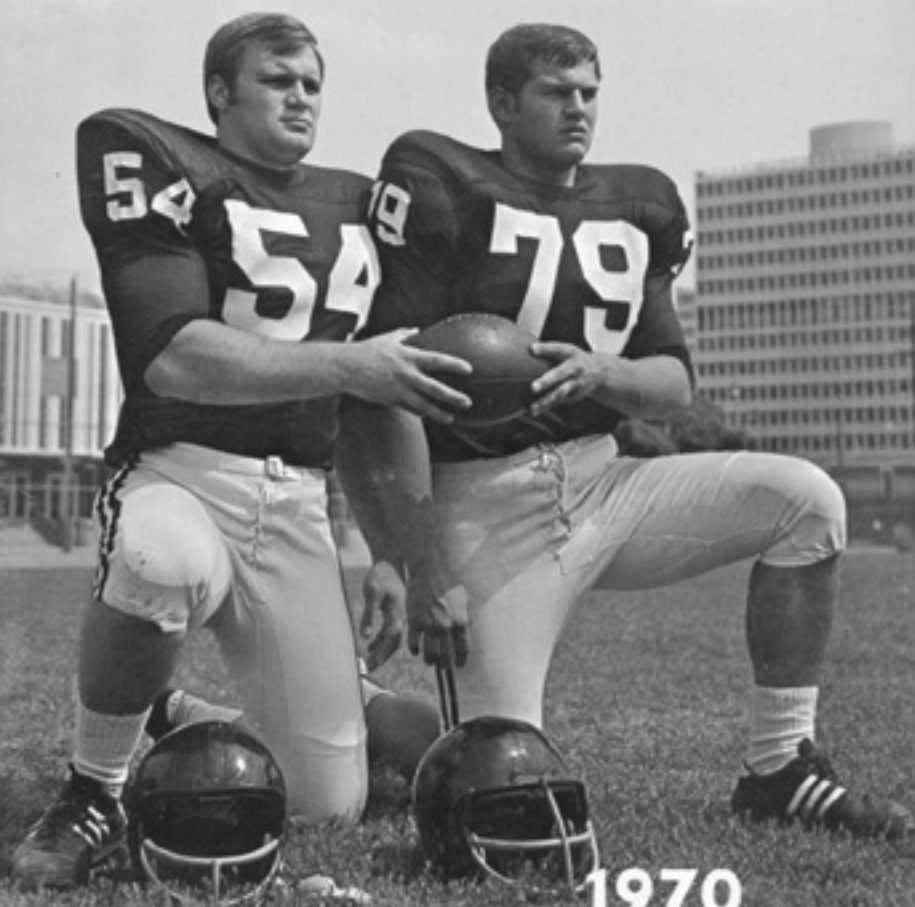

**Dr. Alan C. Rankin**  
**President, Indiana State University**

Alan C. Rankin became President of Indiana State University July 1, 1965. He holds a Doctor of Social Science degree and a Master of Arts degree in Political Science from Syracuse University. His undergraduate degrees (B.S. and B.A.) were earned at Fort Hays Kansas State College, where he ranked first in his class, was president of the student body and editor of the yearbook.

Rose Polytechnic Institute awarded him the honorary Doctor of Letters degree in 1967.

Dr. Rankin came to Indiana State University from the University of Pittsburgh, where he was Vice Chancellor for Student and General Affairs. He was

taught at Cornell University and Miami of Ohio.

Interested in foreign affairs, Dr. Rankin has served in the Panama Canal Zone, assisted in the reorganization of the Japanese Civil Service, and participated in a public administration study in Indonesia for the Ford Foundation and Cornell University. As an intern in government, he was assigned to the office of the late Senator Robert H. Taft and the U.S. Housing Authority. He was in the United States Army in World War II.

President Rankin is currently the President of the Terre Haute Committee for Area Progress; former President of the Indiana Conference on Higher Education; a member of the Constitutional Revision Commission in Indiana; and a member of the board of the Swope Art Gallery in Terre Haute. Dr. Rankin is also a member of the Board of Governmental Affairs Institute of Washington, D.C., and the Public Administration Service in Chicago.

## ISU History

Indiana State University is celebrating its 100th anniversary this year. The University was created by an Act of the Indiana General Assembly on December 20, 1865, and opened its doors to 21 students (13 women and eight men) on January 6, 1870.

The announced purpose of forming the University at that time was an institution that would "be to teachers what law school is to lawyers and medical school is to doctors."

The Act of 1865 did not provide a site for the newly-created school, but a board of trustees, appointed later, were requested to locate in an Indiana town or city cooperating with at least \$50,000. Terre Haute was the only town or city in the state to come forth with an offer, and it was better than originally requested. A committee from Terre Haute offered the \$50,000, and in addition, real estate valued at \$25,000.

The cornerstone for the original building was laid August 13, 1867. The cost

of that building was some \$100,000. The building later burned to the ground on April 9, 1888.

The school was known as Indiana State Normal School from 1870 until 1927, when the name was changed to Indiana State Teachers College. In 1961, the name was again changed, this time to Indiana State College. The latest, and probably the final, name change came in the spring of 1965 when the Indiana Legislature renamed the school Indiana State University.

Called one of the fastest growing universities in the Midwest, Indiana State's enrollment has nearly doubled since 1963. There were some 6,800 students in school in 1963, and the enrollment in September, 1970, was nearly 19,000. Only 17 years ago, in 1953, the enrollment at Indiana State was less than 1,900.

## The University Today

On the threshold of a second century of service in higher education and with the challenge of "Excellence in New Dimensions," Indiana State University's dramatic growth and development ranks it among the top six emerging universities in the nation. The second oldest and third largest of Indiana's state universities, Indiana State celebrates its 100th anniversary marking 59 years of service as Indiana State Normal School, 32 years as Indiana State Teachers College, 3½ years as Indiana State College, and since February 8, 1965, as Indiana State University.

The exciting and continuing growth and development of academic programs and physical plant and facilities has attracted record enrollments. This year the University will be serving about 19,000 or nearly 1,000 more than last year. The Terre Haute campus enrollment which swelled from 1,873 in 1953 to 7,777 in 1964 will be about 13,400. The Evansville campus which started with an enrollment of 413 in 1965 is expected to have about 2,000 students. Other students will be served by correspondence and extension courses.

Over \$30 million in major construction projects recently completed, underway, or soon to be started will greatly add to University facilities. A \$260,000 Driver and Traffic Safety Educational Demonstration Center with accompanying driving course was dedicated in June, 1970; a \$325,000 fifth floor addition to the School of Business was opened this September.

Phase II remodeling of Memorial Stadium completed for this fall is a \$2 million project which included the razing of an old curved seating section for 5,500 people and the erection of a permanent 13,000-seat section.

Currently under construction are a \$1.4 million School of Nursing Building on the east side of the main campus (to be completed during the 1970-71 year); a second 112-unit married student apartment building costing \$2.9 million on the South Campus where buildings were opened in 1965, 1967 and 1969 (to be ready in September, 1971); a \$3.4 million boiler plant addition on North Eighth Street (to be completed during this year); and a \$2.3 million Student Health and Counseling Center on the north side of the Main Campus (scheduled for completion in July, 1971).

Three other significant building projects to be started before the end of 1970 include the \$8 million multi-purpose University-Civic Amphitheater with seating for 12,000 people on the east side of the Main Campus (set for completion in November, 1972); a new \$6.5 million University library on the north side of the Main Campus (to be ready in September, 1972); and a \$3 million project to rehabilitate and expand Tiley Memorial Union facilities (to be completed in May, 1972).

Academic programs and services are continually being strengthened and enlarged. The current major units of the University include Schools of Business; Education; Graduate Studies; Health, Physical Education and Recreation; Nursing; and Technology.

## CHIEF OUIBACHI



Indiana State's athletic team mascot is an Indian known as Chief Ouibachi (pronounced wee-BOTCH-ee). This is the second season for the mascot after the need for one was voiced by the ISU Board of Trustees and the Athletic Department. Then the I-State Student Government Association named a committee headed by SGA member Robert W. Green, a junior history major from West Lafayette, to come up with a suitable mascot.

After several months of study and consideration of most animals and symbols used as mascots, the committee decided that an Indian would be the most appropriate mascot for the ISU athletic teams. The decision was based

primarily on the historical significance of Indians in the Wabash Valley.

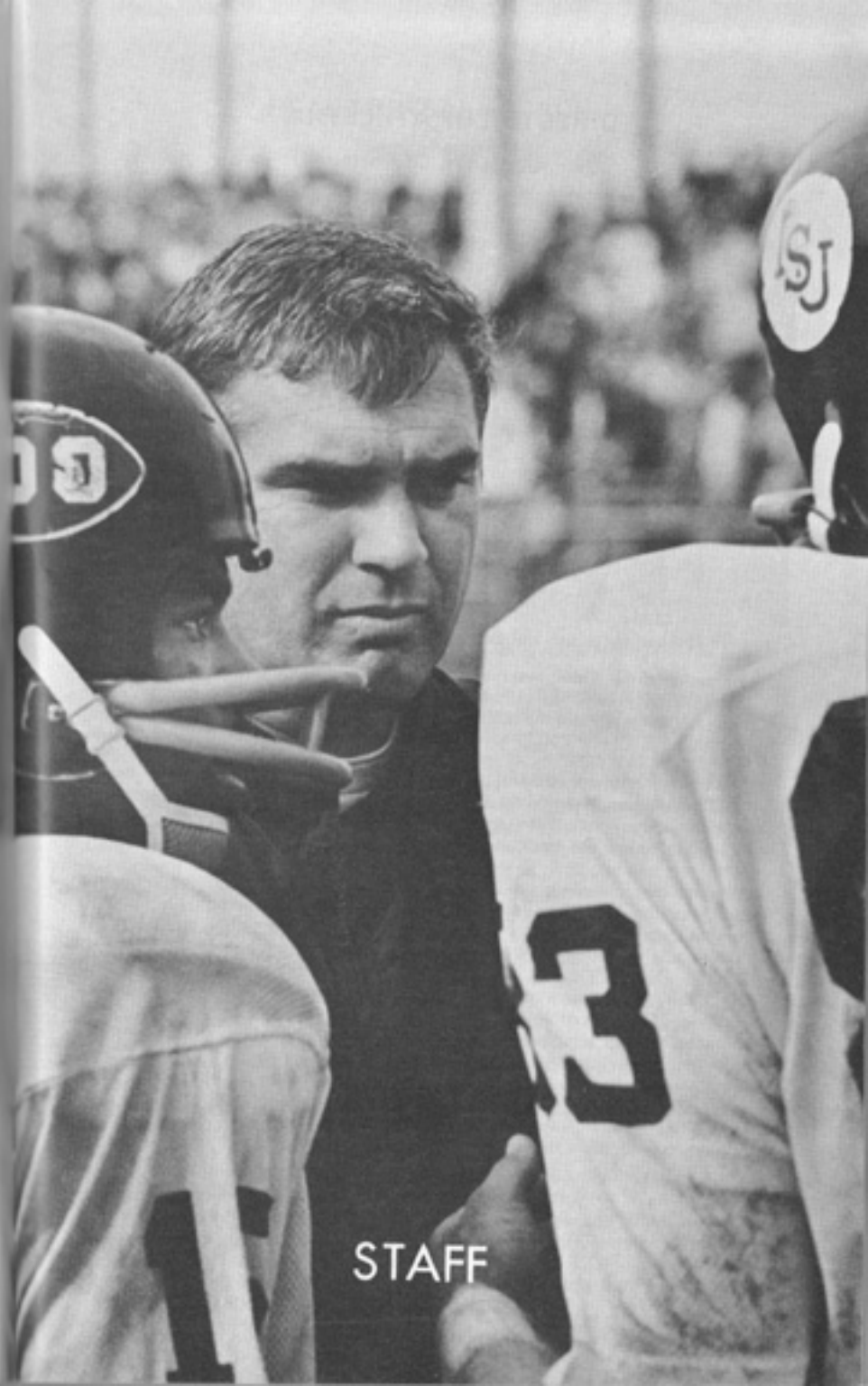
Ouibachi was the name chosen by the committee. The name appears in some early writings of the famous explorer, LaSalle, back in the early 1700s. It was his (the French) way of spelling the name (Wabash) given to a federation of Indians along the river valley made up of Miami, Wea and Kickapoo tribes.

Following the committee's study, a resolution adopting Chief Ouibachi as the official Indiana State mascot was passed by the Student Government Association. It was also decided that the team name of "Sycamores" would not change, but only a mascot would be added.

Drawings were then submitted to the committee in a campus-wide contest to design the clothes and war bonnet to be worn by Chief Ouibachi. The winning drawing was submitted by Brian Easton, a junior economics major from Bicknell, and he was awarded a \$50 cash prize for his effort. The drawing also served as the basis from which the decals and uniform patches were made.

Chief Ouibachi is selected in a campus-wide contest, and this year's Chief Ouibachi is a Viet Nam war veteran and former football player, John Maurer. Maurer was a freshman football player at ISU until sidelined by injuries. The Garrett native served one year in Viet Nam as a gunner on a 155 mm self-propelled Howitzer. An alternate has also been selected. He is Peter Silet, an Indianapolis native who graduated from North Central High School. Silet is an anthropology major and geology minor. Silet is part Indian, being connected with the Navajo and Kiowa tribes. Both Maurer, who is an elementary education major and physical education minor, and Silet are juniors this year.

The Indiana State mascot will appear at every Indiana State football and basketball game and make other appearances at such functions as parades and pep rallies.

## DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Gordon H. Chalmers



Gordon H. Chalmers assumed the position of Director of Athletics at Indiana State University in June, 1967, coming to ISU from Iowa State University, where he had been Director of Athletics and head of Physical Education since 1959.

Prior to that, he had been Assistant Athletic Director at the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, N.Y., from 1952-58, and swimming coach there from 1946 until his acceptance of the top position at Iowa State.

Under Chalmers' direction at Iowa State, two seating additions and a press box were added to the football stadium, a new \$1.6 million physical education building was built, and tennis courts,

practice football fields and outdoor basketball courts were added to the facilities.

He designed the Ames, Iowa, community indoor swimming pool and assisted Miami University of Ohio in the building of a swimming pool. He has aided numerous colleges and universities in designing new athletic facilities for their campuses.

Chalmers is a former national collegiate swimming champion and a member of the 1932 American Olympic swimming team. He captained the varsity swimming team at his alma mater, Franklin & Marshall College in Lancaster, Pa., and also was a varsity soccer and baseball player there.

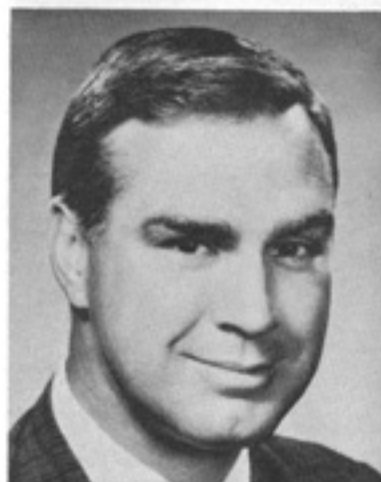
His coaching career began in 1940 as head swimming coach at Lafayette College and the following year at Lehigh University. He served as an athletic officer during World War II, and was honorably discharged as a Lieutenant Commander.

Nationally known and respected, Chalmers is President of the United States Gymnastics Federation and a member of the NCAA's Gymnastics Rules Committee. He has also served as chairman of the NCAA Olympic Committee, NCAA Committee on Committees, on the Board of Directors of the United States Olympic Committee and President of the College Swimming Coaches Association. He is still on the Swimming Hall of Fame Committee.

Chalmers and his wife, Helen, have two daughters, Margo and Donna.

## HEAD FOOTBALL COACH

Jerry Huntsman



Jerry Huntsman, head football coach at Indiana State for the past four years, ranks second in the nation among the active coaches with five or more years of college experience in terms of winning percentage. His college coaching record of 56-13-1 is good for a percentage of .807, which tops all the major college coaches and all but one college division coach in the country, according to statistics released by the NCAA.

In four seasons at ISU, with at least two of them classed as rebuilding years, Huntsman has led the Sycamores to a 27-10-1 record, with the 1968 team's mark of 9-1-0 establishing several records.

The nine wins by that 1968 team mark the most ever won in a single season by an Indiana State football team and the nine straight wins over two seasons is an all-time record for the longest winning streak of any Indiana State team.

Huntsman's achievements at Indiana State in 1968 were recognized by his peers as the American Football Coaches Association nominated him as one of eight NCAA College Division Coaches-of-the-Year throughout the nation. The personable ISU gridiron mentor represented the Midwestern area in the national balloting.

In his first two seasons here, Huntsman coached the Sycamores to 6-2 and 6-4 records, winning second and third respectively in the Indiana Collegiate Conference. He was named the league's Coach-of-the-Year for his efforts in his first year here, Indiana State has been an independent the past two seasons.

With a collegiate coaching record of 56-13-1, Huntsman's overall coaching record, spanning 13 years in high school and college, is a tremendous 89-25-4. Ten of those 25 losses came in just two years, once in high school where his team lost six games and once in college, three years ago, when his squad lost four contests. Three of his teams, two in high school and one in college, have been undefeated.

Prior to coming to ISU as backfield coach in 1965, Jerry headed the Earlham College elevens for four years, where he compiled a 29-3-0 record, including an undefeated season in 1962, and was named the NAIA District 21 College Coach-of-the-Year in 1963.

He is a graduate of Richmond (Ind.) High School and Wabash College. While at Wabash, he was named All State quarterback for the small college elevens in 1951.

Following one-year stints at Waveland (Ind.) and Covington (Ind.), the ISU head coach moved to Crawfordsville (Ind.), where during his three years there, his teams went to a 14-12-2 mark. Moving then to Huntington (Ind.), Huntsman-coached squads were undefeated in his two years there, playing to a 19-0-1 record. In 1961, he moved to Earlham.

Huntsman and his wife, Cora Lee, have three sons, Brent, Jerry and Scott.



**Doug Kay**  
Defense Coach

Success seems to follow Doug Kay wherever he goes. He joined the Indiana State football coaching staff three years ago as the defense coach after enjoying outstanding success as a high school coach in the Chicago area.

He started the football program at Deerfield High School in the Central Suburban League and during his five years there, his gridiron squads compiled a 30-16-2 record, but eight of those losses came in that initial year of the program. His teams won the league title in each of his last two seasons at the helm and he was named the loop's Coach-of-the-Year both seasons.

Kay played his college football under Lou Saban at Western Illinois, and was the quarterback and linebacker on the WIU teams that won 19 straight games.

In addition to his high school coaching experience, this former Paramarine with combat jumps in Korea, was an assistant coach at Western Illinois for one season before taking the head position at Deerfield High School.

He and his wife, Connie, have two children, Kimber and Bart.



**Carol Purichia**  
Offensive Backs Coach

Carol Purichia is starting his second season as a member of the I-State grid coaching staff.

Purichia came to Indiana State from Chatard High School in his native Indianapolis, where he had been the head football and wrestling coach for five years.

His five-year football record at Chatard was 36-13-1, and his teams won two city titles ('67 and '68) as well as three Capitol District Conference crowns ('65, '66 and '67). In addition, his team two years ago was unbeaten in ten games and ranked third in the state.

Prior to moving to Chatard, Carol was reserve football coach at Cathedral High School in Indianapolis, where his teams had a combined 30-0-0 record.

He is a graduate of Indiana Central, where he lettered four years in football, and was All Conference quarterback in 1960. That same season, he was 11th in the nation in passing for small college quarterbacks. He played with the Warriors of Indianapolis in the Continental Football League one season. As a prepster, he was All City quarterback with the Indianapolis Washington H.S. eleven.

Carol and his wife, Donna, have one daughter, Angela.



**Larry Van Der Hayden**  
Offensive Line Coach

Larry Van Der Hayden is starting his second season as the offensive line coach at Indiana State. Prior to coming here from Drake last year, he had seven years experience, five in the collegiate ranks.

Prior to his one year at Drake as the defensive line coach, "Vandy" had spent four years at Iowa State as defensive line coach. In his first coaching assignment out of college, he was line coach at Lake City, Iowa, High School.

Larry earned six varsity letters during his undergraduate days at Iowa State, three each in football and baseball. As a member of the Cyclones in 1959-1961, he played offensive tackle and defensive guard.

At Indiana State, Van Der Hayden coaches the offensive line, which faces one of the major rebuilding tasks on the Sycamore squad this fall.

Larry and his wife, Lois, have two children, Mike and Laurann.



**Mike Flaherty**  
Defensive Secondary Coach

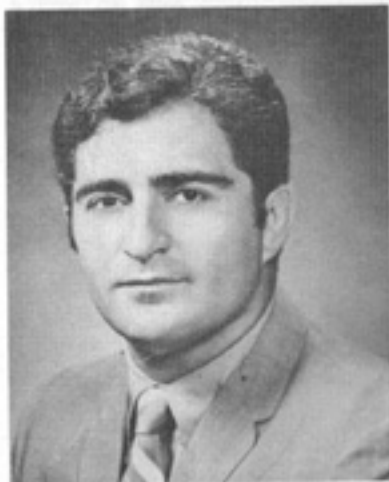
Mike Flaherty is starting his second year at Indiana State, after coming to ISU from the University of Cincinnati, where he was a graduate assistant in the Fall of 1968.

He coached the Sycamore freshman team to a 2-3-0 record last fall, and this year, he moves up to the varsity, where he will work with the I-State defensive secondary. He will also work with the receiving corps.

The Erie, Pa., native started college at the University of Detroit, where as a freshman, he broke all of Jerry Gross' records. The quarterback then transferred to Cincinnati in 1965, after Detroit dropped football.

Mike is a graduate of Cincinnati, and then went immediately into the graduate school there on the graduate assistant program and worked with the Bearcat gridiron teams two years ago.

Mike and his wife, Ruth, have two sons, Christopher and Brendan.



**Bob Pychinka**  
Freshman Coach

Bob Pychinka is the newest member of the Indiana State University coaching staff, having joined the Sycamores just this summer.

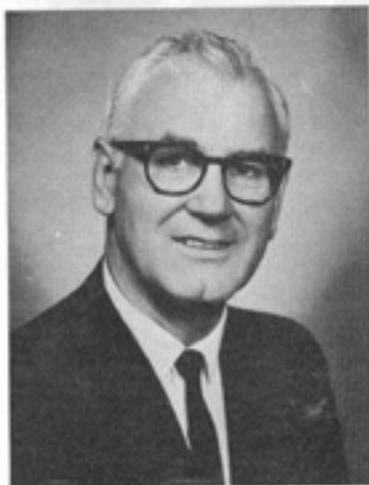
"Chico" is a graduate of ISU, and was one of the great athletes to ever attend Indiana State.

He won three letters in football, where he started as a linebacker, and he was twice named to the Indiana Collegiate Conference All Star team. In addition, he was a standout wrestler, winning three conference titles.

Bob will be the freshman coach for the Sycamores this fall, and in addition, he will work with the defensive line.

Since graduating two years ago, he has served as an assistant football and assistant wrestling coach at Calumet High School, and last fall, his frosh team at Calumet compiled a 5-2-1 record. He is the only single member of the ISU football coaching staff.

**S. Woodrow Suttle**

S. Woodrow "Woody" Suttle is the chairman of the Indiana State University Faculty Athletic Committee. Suttle has been a member of the ISU faculty since 1948 and holds the rank of Associate Professor in Biology.

He is a graduate of ISU, where he earned three football letters as a fullback with the Sycamore gridiron team.

The former U.S. Air Force pilot has been a member of the Faculty Athletic Committee for some 15 years and chairman of that group for the past nine years.

### ATHLETIC BUSINESS MANAGER

**Pierre V. Burke**



Pierre Burke is in his second year as the Athletic Business Manager with the ISU Athletic Department after serving one year with the Admissions Office at the University.

Burke is a graduate of Indiana State, earning his bachelors degree here in 1964 and his masters degree here in 1966.

Ray Baggett

Ray Baggett is in his fourth year as assistant trainer at Indiana State, and has some 13 years experience behind him. He works with trainer Mel Blickenstaff in the Athletic Training curriculum, serves as trainer for basketball and assists with training in all other sports.

He came to ISU in 1967 after serving as trainer at the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, N.Y., for three years. Prior to that, he was a trainer at Indiana University for seven years.

Baggett has a B.S. degree from Troy College in Alabama, an M.S. degree from Indiana University and a Director of Health degree, with specialization in athletic training from Indiana.

## INDIANA STATE FOOTBALL OUTLOOK FOR 1970

Youth is the one single word that must be used when describing the 1970 version of the Indiana State University football team. The Sycamores this season will be inexperienced at several key spots including quarterback, the offensive line, the defensive ends and the linebackers. Coach Jerry Huntsman says, "This will be a season of young ballplayers getting themselves ready to play a tough schedule...just how quickly they mature will show up in the record." The schedule is about the same as last year with the exception that Akron replaces Southern Illinois. Other teams appearing on the ISU slate this fall include football powers Eastern and Western Kentucky of the Ohio Valley Conference, national powerhouse Eastern Michigan, always-tough Illinois State and Central Michigan of the now defunct Interstate Intercollegiate Athletic Conference, and long-time arch-rivals Ball State, Butler, Evansville and Eastern Illinois.

### Offense

Talented running backs and receivers with an inexperienced quarterback and interior line is the capsule report of the Sycamore offense this season.

The running backs will be led this fall by veteran fullback Jesse Ealy, who averaged 4.1 yards-per-carry last fall and 5.4 yards-per-try the year before that. He will be joined by Gary Brown, a speedster who is eligible after sitting out the required year following transfer, and junior Rich Reen, who gained 373 yards in 65 carries last fall for an average of 5.7 yards-per-carry in a relief role.

State's receiving corps also appears to be in good shape with veteran Pete Thompson operating out of the split end position and speedster Lenny Cannon, being moved over from a defensive cornerback spot, working out of the flanker spot. The tight end spot is boiling down to a battle between Jim Shaughnessy, Mike Vance and Bill D'Andrea.

The only other veteran on the offensive unit will be center Frank Crossland, the co-captain who has been a starter the past two years. But Crossland will be flanked on either side by players who have not seen one minute of varsity playing time. The top four guard prospects are all newcomers, and battling for those two starting roles will be Bob Pattee, back after a years' layoff with illness; Jim Novak, Bob Poss and Bob Foster. Only one of the top five tackle prospects has seen any varsity playing time, and that's Terry McGrath. The other four prospects are Dave McKenney, Jerry Gelling, Ron Watson and Dan Galbraith.

Two of last year's mainstays in the offensive line have been moved to defense to help bolster a unit riddled by graduation, Steve Balash and Sam Marra have both been moved to the defensive unit, Balash as a linebacker and Marra to the defensive interior.

The quarterback spot comes down to a three-way battle between junior Ray Vokish, junior college transfer Kenny Baker and sophomore Roger Voorhis, who was a leader on the ISU frosh team last year until an injury sidelined him. Vokish, a strong passer, played behind Verbie Walder and Norm Pellegrini last fall and got very little experience, while Baker comes to the Sycamores with good credentials.

Once again, Coach Huntsman points to the inexperience. He says, "We feel we are talented in the running backs and pass receiving spots, but the receivers have to get the ball and the backs have to have the holes up front, so again, a great deal depends on just how quickly our younger ballplayers mature."

## Defense

The defensive picture is much similar to the offensive outlook this season with a blend of veterans and youngsters. The defensive interior will be able to call on veterans as will be the cornerback and safety positions. But the key spots of defensive end and linebacker will be manned by inexperienced, at least at their respective positions, personnel.

Co-captain Kent Manwaring leads the four defensive interior people coming back with prior experience. Manwaring has been a standout defensive tackle for the Sycamores the past two seasons, and there is no reason to suspect he will be otherwise this fall. He is joined by returning regular Willie Clemmons, who was the regular middle guard as a sophomore last season until sidelined by an injury late in the season; Mike Costolo, who had an outstanding sophomore season as a defensive tackle; and Sam Marra, who looked good in the middle guard spot after moving over from the offensive side of the line.

Two veteran cornerbacks return in Kent Drew and Bob Turner. Turner tied the school record for the number of pass interceptions in a single season (9) as a sophomore last fall, while Drew was a starter when he wasn't injured. Two more veterans are back at the safety spot with Mike Blackwell and Mike Kujawski coming back. Both are seniors, and both have played a great deal of football in the defensive secondary for Indiana State the past two years.

Blackwell and Kujawski will be joined by newcomers Tom Thompson, up from the freshman team along with John Karaszia, and junior Doug Garrard, being switched to defense after seeing a lot of action in a reserve role with the offense last fall.

Turner and Drew will receive a stiff challenge for their spots from sophomore Dewey Norton, who was quite impressive on defense after playing flanker for the freshman team last fall.

Four newcomers are being tried at the defensive end spot. They include Willie Lee, who was named the Outstanding Freshman Football Player last year; Charles Karaszia, a twin brother to John; John Walter and Tom Kelley, who is also being tried at linebacker.

Eric Skinner, a senior, is the only Sycamore with varsity playing time at linebacker, and he saw considerable action in a reserve role a year ago. He will be joined by junior Steve Balash, being moved over from offensive guard, newcomer Stan Mish, and Kelley. None of the latter three have as much as one minute varsity playing time at linebacker.

Not to belabor the point, but Huntsman again says the key is the maturity of the newcomers. He states, "If the youngsters at defensive end and linebacker come along quickly, then our defense should be in pretty good shape...but those are key positions."

## Summary

This team will go as the youngsters grow. There is a blending of veteran and rookie players, but many of the inexperienced ballplayers are in key positions. How quickly these youngsters mature under fire will determine to a great extent the fortunes of the Indiana State football team this fall. The team has quickness and some size, although it is not awesome in the size department. It has the possibility of being an explosive offensive machine and could well become a solid defensive squad. It all goes back to that one word...youth!

At the end of the game, we will have complete individual and team statistics, as well as a complete play-by-play. We will also have comments from each dressing room.

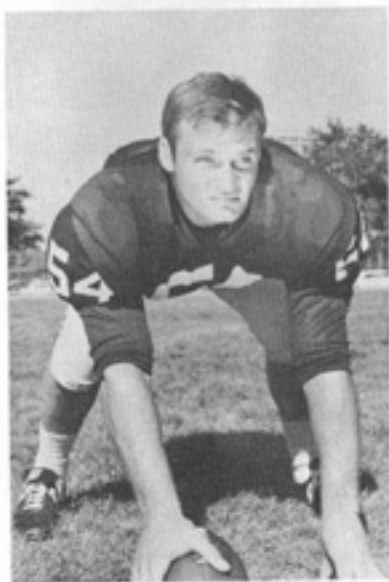
Throughout the game, we will provide information concerning records tied or broken, injury reports from the sidelines, and periodic scores from other games of interest.

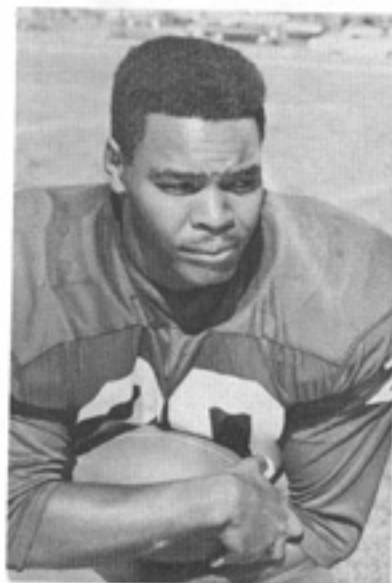

He is also a pass catching threat as his eight receptions for 110 yards last year will attest. Only his size keeps him from being one of the great fullbacks in the country, and the Indiana State coaching staff still considers him one of the finest anywhere around.

**70** **TERRY McGRATH**, 6-2, 215, Jr., Cleveland, Ohio—Terry is a veteran lineman who was injured a great portion of last season. The coaching staff is looking forward to him being healthy this season, and if he is, he should have a fine year. He could well be a starting offensive tackle. Terry is the fourth of a group of brothers to win varsity football letters at Indiana State.

**71** **DAVE McKENNEY**, 6-1, 220, So., Evansville—Dave is one of the outstanding sophomore linemen ability-wise. He looked good during spring practice and the coaching staff feels he has a good chance at cracking the starting lineup on offense as either a guard or tackle this season for the Sycamores.

**24** DAVE MOCK, 5-9, 180, Sr., Cincinnati, Ohio—Dave is another returning letterman, and even though he is small, he is quick and has fantastic hands. Last fall, he caught 13 passes for 175 yards and two touchdowns, and in addition, returned 11 kickoffs for 274 yards, which is a single season school record. He will be used at any one of three positions, tight end, split end or flanker, because of his pass-catching ability.

## MEMORIAL STADIUM

This is the first season that Indiana State University is playing in the brand new Memorial Stadium as it now stands. Prior to this season, a horseshoe-type baseball stand stood in the place where this new, 13,000-seat grandstand is now standing, and it held some 5,500 people. For the past three seasons, there have been no dressing facilities in the stadium, and the teams had to dress at the ISU Arena on the downtown campus. The press box was completely inadequate in size.

But that stand and press box were razed at the completion of last fall's schedule, and this completely modern grandstand, with a new press box and 200 Club facilities along with the dressing rooms at the west end of the field were constructed.

This is Phase Two of a three-phase renovation project started three years ago with the installation of the world's first outdoor and university-owned AstroTurf playing field.

The stadium was acquired by the University in 1967 and at that time was used for both football and baseball. Since the installation of the synthetic playing surface, however, the field has been used for just football and an occasional soccer game.

Phase One of the renovation project, completed in the summer of 1967, included the reorientation of the field from a northerly-southerly direction to the easterly-westerly line; installation of the AstroTurf; and the erection of some 4,500 bleacher seats on the north side of the field. Another addition of bleacher seats was made on the north side in 1968, bringing the seating capacity to some 13,500. The completion of Phase Two brings the current seating capacity to 20,500.

Phase Three, or the ultimate development under present planning, calls for another 12-13,000-seat grandstand on the north side of the field and would bring the total stadium seating capacity to some 26,000.

## ASTROTURF

AstroTurf, the playing surface at Memorial Stadium (the home of the Sycamores), is much similar to that used in Houston's famed Astrodome. Plus factors for the synthetic field include durability (some 20 college and high school football games are played on the field each year, and in addition the ISU gridgers hold all their practice sessions on the field); a constant surface which will provide sure footing regardless of weather; and experience with the field has proven a substantial decrease in knee and ankle injuries.

Each blade of grass is 3/8 inches long and is attached to a sponge-rubber pad 1/4 inches thick. This is then set on a fiber pad, 1/2 inches thick and quite similar to the pads used under carpeting in homes. Both the sponge-rubber pad and the fiber pad are then set on a two-inch thick layer of asphalt.

Indiana State was the first university in the world to own and make outdoor application of a field of this type. The Sycamores' home game against Eastern Illinois, September 16, 1967, was the first football game ever played on AstroTurf out-of-doors.

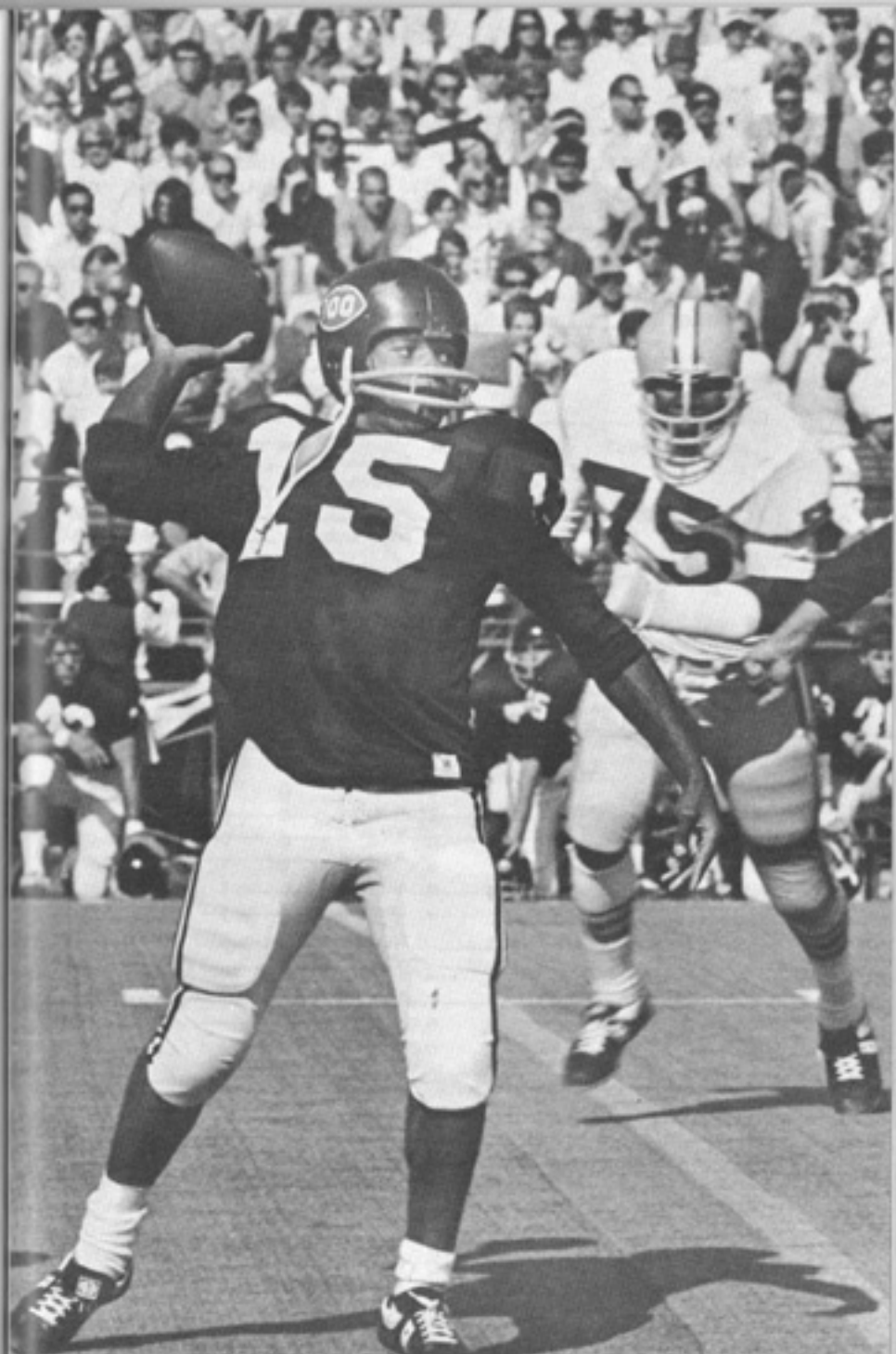

## MOST VALUABLE FOOTBALL PLAYER

The Bob Adamson Memorial Award is given annually to the Most Valuable varsity football player. The award is named in honor of the late Bob Adamson, an outstanding basketball player at Terre Haute's Wiley High School, a member of the Indiana State Varsity Club, a Sycamore booster and an avid sports fan. The award was started in 1967 and has been made an annual presentation at the All Sports Banquet in the spring of the year. Winners of the award are listed below.



1967

**Rich Attonito**, a senior defensive halfback from Jamaica Estates, N.Y., was the winner of the first Bob Adamson Memorial Award in 1967. Rich, who played along with his twin brother, Bob, at Indiana State, was a two-year regular in the defensive secondary and led the squad in interceptions his senior year.



1968

**Verbie Walder**, junior quarterback from Dayton, Ohio, was the second winner of the award. "The Little Guy" transferred to ISU from a junior college on the West Coast and promptly led the Sycamores to a 9-1-0 record, the best in the school's history, setting a school record for total offense in the process.



1969

**Verbie Walder**, senior quarterback from Dayton, Ohio, tied for this award with **Mike Russell**, and Walder becomes the first two-time winner of the honor. He had another outstanding season for ISU, establishing school records in total offense and passing. During his senior year, Verbie also served as team co-captain, having been elected to the honor by his teammates.

**Mike Russell**, senior defensive safety from Seymour, tied with **Verbie Walder** as the winner of this award in 1969. Russell was a three-year starter at Indiana State, and he holds the record for career pass interceptions with 17. Mike was named the Outstanding Defensive Player for the second straight season. In addition to his pass interceptions, he was a leading punt returner.

## ORIGIN OF SYCAMORES

The name "Sycamores" was adopted by a student body general election in 1921. A contest was started that year for a school name to be selected on Blue and White Day, a forerunner to Homecoming. The names were to be submitted to a committee of four, with that group's top three choices being placed before the student body in a campus-wide election. The name Sycamores was among the three finalists submitted. Although it was roundly booed when placed on the ballot, the students, in an apparent joke, gave the name a one-sided victory in the election. The winner of the contest received \$3 as first prize for his entry. The name was first used January 3, 1922, in the Normal Advance, predecessor of The Statesman, present campus newspaper.

## CONFERENCE OF MIDWEST UNIVERSITIES



Commissioner McClelland

Indiana State University has joined with four other emerging Midwest Universities to form a new conference.

Joining with ISU were Ball State University, Southern Illinois University, Northern Illinois University and Illinois State University.

The new conference has been named Conference of Midwest Universities, and Jack McClelland, who had served as the Commissioner of the North Central Conference for two years prior to coming to the CMU in July of 1970, has been named Commissioner of the new league.

Competition in the CMU starts this fall with a cross country meet, and will continue through the school year with champions being named in eight other

sports. Only in football will there not be a conference title-holder this year, and this is due to the advanced scheduling of the schools in the gridiron sport. Not all the five schools in the league are scheduled to play each other in football, so the first conference champion in the gridiron sport will be crowned in 1974, the first year that all schools can schedule each other.

Champions in basketball, baseball and football will be selected on a round robin basis, while the conference winners in cross country, wrestling, gymnastics, swimming, tennis, golf and track will be decided at an annual conference meet.

At the present time, all five members of the new conference are University Division in all sports except football, and Northern Illinois University is University Division in football as well. But all members are committed to adjust their football schedules to conform with University Division criteria.

In making the announcement of the formation of the conference in September of 1969, the statement issued by conference officials read, "All five schools are similar in size, with mutual interests in educational programs and emphasis upon graduate-level studies. While the intercollegiate athletic program will draw the major attention, it is by no means the only cooperative effort in which we will engage. Other areas in which we will participate on an interinstitutional basis include cooperative educational programs, academic credit exchange, cooperative research projects, faculty and student exchanges, legislative efforts, and any other areas of mutual interest. The [formation] is the culmination of a study which was conducted during the past two years."

McClelland, 50, opened the North Central Conference office in 1968, and was that league's only commissioner. Prior to taking that post, he had been the Director of Athletics and Men's Physical Education at Drake University, which included the promotion and administration of the famed Drake Relays. His coaching experience includes eight years as head basketball coach at Drake, three years as head baseball coach and two years as an assistant in football. He is a native of Newton, Iowa, and other than three years when he entered private business, McClelland has been connected with school coaching or administration. He and his wife, Helan, have two sons, John 19, and Paul 17.
