Dr. Alan C. Rankin

Dr. Alan C. Rankin
President, Indiana State University

Alan C. Rankin became President of Indiana State University on July 1, 1965. He holds a Doctor of Social Science degree from Syracuse University. His undergraduate degrees (B.S. and B.A.) were earned at Fort Hays, Kansas, State College where he ranked first in his class, was president of the student body and was editor of the yearbook.

Rose-Hulman Institute awarded

him the honorary Doctor of Letters degree in 1967.

Dr. Rankin came to Indiana State from the University of Pittsburgh, where he was Vice Chancellor for Student and General Affairs and has served as Acting Chancellor. He previously had served on the faculties of Cornell University and Miami University of Ohio.

Interested in foreign affairs, Dr. Rankin served in the Panama Canal Zone, assisted in the reorganization of the Japanese Civil Service, and participated in a public administration study in Indonesia for the Ford Foundation and Cornell University. As an intern in government, he served in the office of the late Senator Robert Taft of Ohio, with the United States Civil Service Commission.

President Rankin is the current president of the Terre Haute Committee for Area Progress and also the Community Foundation of the Wabash Valley, Inc.; former president (1968-69) of the Indiana Conference of Higher Education; a member of the boards of the Terre Haute Chamber of Commerce, Terre Haute's Swope Art Gallery, and the Indianapolis Symphonic Choir; the boards of the Governmental Affairs Institute and the Public Administration Service, and a member of the Constitutional Revision Commission of Indiana.

ISU History

Indiana State University now is in its 101st year of operation. The University was created by an Act of the Indiana General Assembly on Dec. 20, 1865, and opened its doors to 21 students (13 women and eight men) on Jan. 6, 1870.

The announced purpose of forming the University at that time was an institution that would "be to teachers what law school is to lawyers and medical school is to doctors."

The Act of 1865 did not provide a site for the new school, but a board of trustees, appointed later, was requested to locate an Indiana town or city cooperating with at least \$50,000. Terre Haute was the only town or city in the state to come forth with an offer, and it was better than originally requested. A committee from Terre Haute offered the \$50,000 and, in addition, real estate valued at \$25,000.

The cornerstone for the original building was laid Aug. 13, 1867. The cost of that building was some \$100,000. The building later burned to the ground on April 9, 1888.

The school was known as Indiana State Normal School from 1870 until 1927, when the name was changed to Indiana State Teachers College. In 1961, the name again changed, this time to Indiana State College. The latest, and probably the final, name change came in the spring of 1965 when the Indiana Legislature renamed the school Indiana State University.

Called one of the fastest growing universities in the Midwest, ISU's enrollment has nearly tripled since 1963. There were some 6,800 students in school in 1963, and the enrollment in September, 1971, was nearly 18,000. Only 18 years ago, in 1953, the enrollment at Indiana State was less than 1,900.

The University Today

Now in its second century of service and with a challenge of "Excellence in New Dimensions," Indiana State currently ranks among the top twelve "emerging universities."

The University's dramatic growth and development have extended the burgeoning Terre Haute campus areas to new boundaries, created

greater educational opportunities and services, attracted record enrollments and resulted in the construction of many new facilities.

Total enrollment in the fall of 1970 swelled to 18,600 students—double the 1964 total enrollment of 9,284. The Terre Haute campus enrollment which was 1,886 in 1953 increased to 7,777 in 1964 and to 13,533 in 1970. The ISU Evansville campus enrollment rose from an opening enrollment of 413 in 1965 to 2,171 in the fall of 1970. About 3,000 students are served through off-campus extension and correspondence study courses.

Over \$30-million in construction projects—recently completed, underway or soon-to-be-started—enhance the Terre Haute campus facilities. These projects include a \$2.9-million, 112-apartment building for married students (completion, September, 1971) on the South Campus where 80-apartment buildings were completed in 1965 and 1967 and a 112-apartment building was opened in 1969; a \$2.3-million Student Health and Counseling Center (completion, December, 1971); a \$4.5-million boiler plant expansion project (completion, April, 1972); a one-million volume, \$6.5-million library (completion, December, 1972) and a \$3-million Tiley Memorial Union expansion project (completion December, 1972.)

A new 10,000-seat University-Civic Amphitheater with construction costs estimated at \$8-million will be started this year on the east side of the main campus and will be completed by December, 1973.

Earlier this year the University opened a \$1.5-million School of Nursing Building. In 1970, the unique \$260,000 Driver and Traffic Safety Educational Demonstration was opened at the Vigo County Fairgrounds on the south side of the city, a \$325,000 fifth floor addition was completed to the School of Business, and the \$2-million Phase II Memorial Stadium work was completed.

Phase II work included razing of an old curved Stadium seating section and replacement with a permanent, concrete 13,000-seat section to go with a 7,500-seat semi-permanent bleacher section on the opposite side of the field.

Under study for future use is the new 90-acre River Campus area on the northwest side of the main campus.

A new academic program being offered is the medical education program through the Terre Haute Center for Medical Education, which is on the Terre Haute main campus. This program, in cooperation with the Indiana University School of Medicine, and one of seven centers started in Indiana, offers study opportunities for college graduates planning to prepare for careers in medicine.



MEMORIAL STADIUM: 1971

MEMORIAL STADIUM

This is the second season that Indiana State University is playing in Memorial Stadium as it now stands. Prior to the 1970 season, a horseshoe-type baseball stand stood in the place where the 13,000-seat grandstand is now standing.

The old stand and press box were razed at the completion of the 1969 schedule and the completely modern grandstand (with a new press box and 200 Club facilities) and dressing rooms at the west end of the field were constructed.

This completed Phase Two of a three-phase renovation project which began four years ago with the installation of the world's first outdoor and university-owned AstroTurf playing field.

Phase One of the renovation project, completed in the summer of 1967, included the reorientation of the field from a northerly-southerly direction to the easterly-westerly line; installation of the AstroTurf, and the erection of 4,500 bleacher seats on the north side of the field. Another addition of bleacher seats was made on the north side in 1968, bringing the seating capacity to 13,500. The completion of Phase Two brought the current seating capacity to 20,500.

Phase Three, the ultimate development under present planning, calls for another grandstand on the north side of the field and would bring the total stadium seating capacity to approximately 26,000.

The stadium was acquired by the university in 1967 and at that time was used for both football and baseball. Since the installation of the synthetic playing surface, however, the field has been used only for football and an occasional soccer game.

ASTROTURF

AstroTurf, the playing surface at Indiana State's Memorial Stadium, is much similar to that used in Houston's famed Astrodome.

Indiana State was the first university in the world to own and make outdoor application of a field of this type. The Sycamores' home game against Eastern Illinois September 16, 1967, was the first football game ever played on AstroTurf out-of-doors. By the way, it helped—as we romped to a 41-6 victory over the Panthers.

One plus factor for the synthetic field is its durability. Some 20 college and high school football games are played on the field each year and ISU gridders hold all their practice sessions on the field. A second plus factor is a constant surface which will provide sure footing regardless of weather.

PRESS BOX INFORMATION

Press Box Accommodations—Space makes it mandatory that only **WORKING** newsmen, radio announcers, technicians and others whose duties make necessary the use of the press box be allowed in the facility.

ADMISSION TO PRESS BOX IS BY PASS ONLY

The elevator, which serves both the press box and the 200 Club areas, will be reserved for those entering the press box until 30 minutes before game time. Those final 30 minutes prior to kickoff will find the elevator in use to take members of the 200 Club to their seats and will be available on a first-come, first-serve basis.

If there is time, tickets will be mailed. Otherwise, they may be picked up at the ticket office on the left side of the main entrance to the stadium.

Parking—Parking permits for a special parking area next to the entrance of the stadium will be issued upon request to **WORKING** members of the press. The press passes also will permit the bearer to park in this reserved area.

Press Box Services—We will provide programs, two-deep charts on Indiana State and when possible on the opponents, information concerning any special event, cumulative statistics and series scores prior to the game.

At halftime, we will supply abbreviated stats, with play-by-play being available following each quarter.

At the end of the game, we will have complete individual and team stats, as well as play-by-play. We also will have comments from each dressing room.

Throughout the game, we will provide information concerning records tied or broken, injury reports from the sidelines and periodic scores from other games of interest.

Runners will be available to procure coffee, soft drinks and sandwiches for you during the game.

**GORDON H. CHALMERS
DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS**

Gordon Chalmers became Director of Athletics at Indiana State in June, 1967, coming from Iowa State University, where he had been Director of Athletics and head of Physical Education since 1959.

Prior to that, he had been Assistant AD at the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, N.Y., from 1952-58, and swimming coach there from 1946 until his acceptance of the top position at Iowa State.

Under Chalmers' direction at Iowa State, two seating additions and a pressbox were added to the football stadium, a new \$1.6-million physical education building was built, and tennis courts, practice football fields and outdoor basketball courts were added to the facilities.

He designed the Ames, Iowa, community indoor swimming pool and assisted Miami University (Ohio) in the building of a pool. He also has aided other colleges and universities in designing new athletic facilities for their campuses.

A former national collegiate swimming champion and a member of the 1932 U.S. Olympic swimming team, "Slim" captained the varsity swimming team at his alma mater, Franklin & Marshall ('35) in Lancaster, Pa., and also was a varsity soccer and baseball player there.

His coaching career began in 1940 as head swimming coach at Lafayette College and the following year at Lehigh University. He served as an athletic officer during World War II, and was honorably discharged as a Lieutenant Commander.

Nationally known and respected, Chalmers is:

- a member of the United States Olympic committee.
- president of the U. S. Gymnasts Federation.
- chairman of the NCAA high school all-star game selection committee.
- a member of the NCAA Gymnastics Rules committee.
- a member of the Swimming Hall of Fame committee.

He also has served as chairman of the NCAA Olympic committee, on the NCAA Committee on committees, on the Board of Directors of the U.S. Olympic committee and as president of the College Swimming Coaches Association.

**JERRY HUNTSMAN
HEAD FOOTBALL COACH**

Going into last season, Jerry Huntsman ranked second in the nation among active coaches with five or more years of college experience in terms of winning percentage.

A 5-5 campaign didn't help his percentage any, as it dropped from .807 (56-13-1) to .769 (61-18-1).

Still, the percentage is sixth best in the NCAA College Division—which includes another 355 coaches—and

it rates eighth among all 450 NCAA institutions.

The only major college coaches with better winning percentages than 41-year-old Huntsman are Joe Paterno of Penn State and Bob Devaney of Nebraska.

Huntsman, who is in his sixth year as head coach at Indiana State, has a five year mark of 32-15-1 at the Terre Haute school. Three of those seasons—at their beginnings—were classified as "rebuilding years."

Nine victories by Huntsman's 1968 team is the most ever won in one season by an ISU football team and the nine straight wins over two years is an all-time record for the longest winning streak by any Indiana State grid team.

Huntsman's achievements in 1968 were recognized by his peers as the American Football Coaches Association nominated him as one of eight NCAA College Division Coaches-of-the-Year throughout the nation.

In his first season as head coach here in 1966, Huntsman coached the Sycamores to a 6-2 mark, winning second place in the Indiana Collegiate Conference and being named the loop's Coach-of-the-Year.

Huntsman's overall coaching record—spanning 14 years in high school and college—is a tremendous 94-30-4 (.754). Prior to coming to ISU as backfield coach in 1965, Jerry headed Earlham College for four years, compiling a 29-3-0 record—including an undefeated season in 1962. He was named NAIA District 21 Coach-of-the-Year in 1963.

A native of Richmond, Ind., and a 1952 graduate of Wabash College, Huntsman earned a master's degree in physical education from Purdue in 1958. As a player at Wabash, he was named All-State quarterback for Indiana small colleges in 1951.

Following coaching stints at high schools in Waveland, Covington, Crawfordsville and Huntington, Ind., Huntsman moved to Earlham in 1961.

Huntsman and his wife, Cora Lee, have three children, Brent, 14, Jerry, 12, and Scott, 9.

**LARRY VAN DER HEYDEN
OFFENSIVE LINE COACH**

Larry Van Der Heyden, like Coaches Purichia and Flaherty, is starting his third season as a coach at Indiana State.

"Vandy," who is the offensive line coach, came here in 1969 from Drake, where he spent a year as a defensive line coach.

Before moving to the Des Moines school he spent four years at Iowa State as defensive line coach.

In addition to his five years of collegiate football coaching experience, he also spent two years as line coach at Lake City, Iowa, High School in his first coaching assignment following college.

As an athlete at Iowa State, Larry earned six varsity letters, three each in football and baseball. As a member of the Cyclones' grid squad in 1959-61, he played offensive tackle and defensive guard.

Larry and his wife, Lois, have two children, Mike, 8, and Laurann, 6.

**MIKE FLAHERTY
DEFENSIVE SECONDARY COACH**

Beginning his third season with the Sycamores is defensive secondary coach Mike Flaherty, who came here from the University of Cincinnati in 1969.

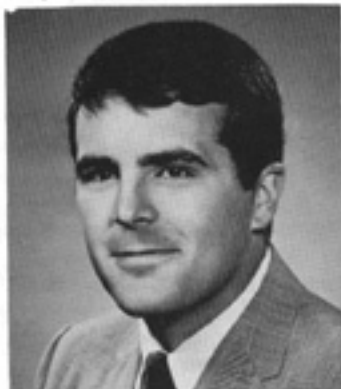
After a year as freshman coach, he moved to the varsity last fall, where he took up his present duties, as well as helping ISU receivers.

The Erie, Pa., native started college as a quarterback at the University of Detroit, where—as a freshman—he broke all of U-D All-America Jerry Gross' records.

However, he transferred to Cincinnati in 1965 when Detroit dropped intercollegiate football.

After graduating from Cincy, he immediately went into the graduate school there for two years, while continuing to work with Bearcat gridiron teams.

Mike and his wife, Ruth, have three children, Christopher, 3, Brendan, 2, and Ruth, seven months.

**BOB PYCHINKA
FRESHMAN COACH**

Bob Pychinka, a 1968 Indiana State graduate and one of the best athletes ever to attend the university, is in his second year as a member of the Sycamore coaching staff.

"Chico" won three letters in football, starring at linebacker, and twice was named to the Indiana Collegiate Conference all-star team. He also was an outstanding wrestler, winning three conference mat titles.

Pychinka, who coached the freshman football team to a 3-1 record last year, will be freshman coach again this fall. He also will work with varsity defensive linemen.

Since graduating three years ago, he served as an assistant football and assistant wrestling coach at Calumet High School, and in 1969 his freshman team compiled a 5-2-1 record.

Pychinka—whose younger brother, Dennis, is a member of the Sycamore varsity—is the only single coach on the ISU football staff.

**CAROL PURICHIA
OFFENSIVE BACK COACH**

Carol is starting his third season as a member of the Sycamore grid coaching staff.

"Rico" came to Indiana State from Chatard High in his native Indianapolis, where he had been head football and wrestling coach for five years. There his teams won two city titles and three Capitol District Conference crowns.

Prior to Chatard, Carol was reserve grid coach at Indy Cathedral High, where his teams had a combined record of 30-0-0.

Rico is a graduate of Indiana Central, lettering all four years in football. All-ICC quarterback in 1960, he was 11th in the nation in passing for small college quarterbacks.

He also played one season in the Continental Football League.

Purichia and his wife, Donna, have one daughter, Angela, 2½.

GENE STAUBER DEFENSE COACH

Newest member of the Indiana State coaching staff is Gene Stauber, the Sycamores' defense coach.

Stauber joined the ISU staff last spring after 11 years as an assistant coach at the University of Illinois.

An Indianapolis native and graduate of Shortridge High there, he played college football at Toledo, lettering two years—despite the fact his career was interrupted by World War II.

After 1947 graduation from Toledo, he remained at the school to coach Rocket freshman football and varsity baseball teams for the next four years. In 1951 he earned a master of science degree in physical education at the University of Michigan, where he also helped coach.

The next six years were hectic ones for Stauber as he put in stints at Stetson, Delaware, Idaho and Nebraska before settling down for three years at California—Berkeley. While there as offensive and defensive backfield coach, the Golden Bears played in the 1959 Rose Bowl.

Stauber, who was defensive backfield coach, and then defensive coordinator with the Illini, has coached such gridiron luminaries as Jerry Kramer and Wayne Walker at Idaho, Joe Kapp at California and Dick Butkus, Bill Brown, Ernie McMillan and Mike Taliaferro at Illinois.

Gene and his wife, Eileen, have an 18-year-old daughter, Susan, and a 16-year-old son, Rory.

S. WOODROW SUTTLE FACULTY COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN

Woody Suttle, a member of the Faculty Athletic Committee for 16 years, has been chairman of that group for the past 10 years.

A graduate of ISU and a former U.S. Air Force pilot, he has been a faculty member here since 1948.

An Associate Professor in Biology, Woody earned three grid letters as a Sycamore fullback.

MEL BLICKENSTAFF ATHLETIC TRAINER

Mel Blickenstaff joined the Indiana State University staff 10 years ago as athletic trainer and has been an invaluable help to the Sycamores' athletic program.

His previous experience includes nine years of service as a coach in Northern Indiana high schools, three years as a physical reconditioning instructor in the Air Force hospitals during World War II, and eleven years as athletic trainer at Colum-

bus (Ind.) High School.

"Blick," as he is known by I-State athletes and coaches, earned his bachelor of science degree at Manchester College in 1938, his master of science degree at Indiana University in 1947 and has specialized in instructions in physical education and athletic training at Indiana.

Mel and his wife, Mary, have three sons, Jim, 26, John, 23, and Bill, 18.

RAY BAGGETT ASSISTANT TRAINER

Ray Baggett is in his fifth year as assistant trainer at Indiana State, and has some 14 years experience behind him. He works with trainer Mel Blickenstaff in the Athletic Training curriculum, serves as trainer for basketball and assists with training in all other sports.

He came to ISU in 1967 after serving as trainer at the U. S. Military Academy at West Point, N. Y., for three years. Before that, he was a trainer at Indiana University for seven years.

Pierre Burke—as his title of Assistant Director of Athletics indicates—is Gordon (Slim) Chalmers' "right hand man."

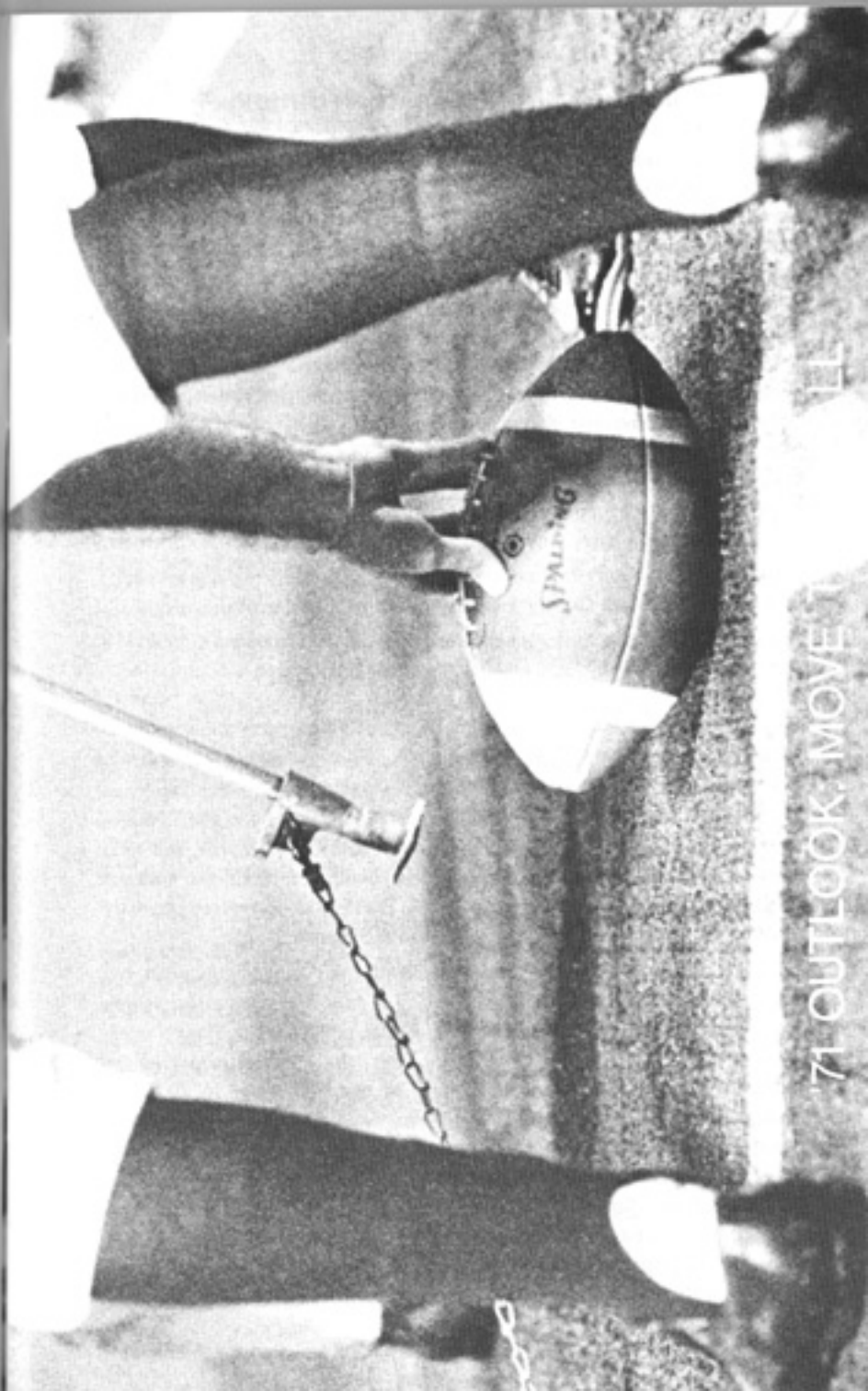

A 1964 graduate of ISU who gained his master's degree here two years later, Burke has a diversified athletic background—ranging from being team trainer of the ABA's Miami Floridians to holding the dual posts of assistant AD and assistant basketball coach at Florida Presbyterian College for two years.

INDIANA STATE FOOTBALL '71 OUTLOOK

Indiana State's football staff is counting on a blend of youth and maturity this season to improve on 1970's 5-5 record. Head Coach Jerry Huntsman has 26 lettermen returning, although only 21 of the 70-man squad are seniors. Those 26 lettermen include 15 returning starters. The Sycamores have a schedule break this year, playing six games at home and only four on the road, and ISU will face one new opponent and two others who weren't on the Sycamore schedule in 1970. The opener is Sept. 11 at Western Illinois, the first meeting of the two schools since 1968 and the first time since 1953 the Sycamores haven't opened against Eastern Illinois. ISU's other three road games will be intrastate trips against traditional rivals Evansville, Butler and Ball State. Eastern Illinois will be the opponent for the home opener Sept. 18, with other home opponents including Central Michigan, Illinois State and three powerhouses in the last three games, Southern Illinois, Akron (both ranked in the College Division top 10 in 1970) and Missouri Valley Conference powerhouse Drake, meeting the Sycamores for the first time in the final game of the season Nov. 13.

Offense

ISU's offense in '71 will feature a deep, talented backfield, a strong but possibly shallow interior line and a less experienced receiving corps.

Quantity and quality are available in the ranks of the ISU running backs. Milt Allen, the 1970 leading rusher, and Gary Brown, the 1970 state of Indiana collegiate scoring leader, return to split the tailback position with two-year letterman Rich Renn and converted slotback Willie Lee ready to battle for the fullback post.

Quarterback is also a stronger position than a year ago with two lettermen and two more sophs creating a four-deep situation (something needed last year when two QBs broke collarbones). Ray Vokish, who started 1970 as a third stringer, won the starting nod with an excellent spring. The senior took over in the fifth game in 1970 and guided the Sycamores to three wins in five games, including a 17-8 upset of Akron. Backing up Vokish will be junior Roger Voorhis, who played less than five games in 1970 but still managed to lead the team in total offense. Sophs available are Dale Cromling and Mike Smutney.

Center could be a question mark but starters return to the other four interior line positions. Co-captain Steve Balash, a 1969 starter, returns to left guard after a year on defense and will team with tough junior Bob

Poss, while massive Dan Galbraith and two-time letterman Terry McGrath will start at the tackles. Coach Huntsman already considers Galbraith one of the best he has ever coached.

Junior Jim Novack will start at center, replacing 1970 co-captain Frank Crossland, and the ISU coaches feel the 6-2, 222-pounder has the speed and muscle to do the job.

Tight end is another deep position, with junior letterman Charlie Karaszia starting after beating out two-year letterman Mike Vance in spring practice. Karaszia, a 226-pound speedster, played both ways in 1970, when Vance was the Sycamores' number two receiver.

Last year's leading receiver, slotback Lenny Cannon, will be the only wide receiver with varsity experience at his position in 1971. Junior Tommy Thompson, who played safety and quarterback in 1970, and Glenn Damato, the 1970 Outstanding Freshman Award winner, will be fighting for the split end position and Florida speedster Dave Travers, a sophomore, will back up Cannon.

Defense

Position switches and a new defensive system cause an element of uncertainty about the defense, but 10 lettermen figure to start and the athletic ability is there for the makings of an outstanding unit.

Experience is available in the secondary, where lettermen Doug Garrard and John Barro will man the corners and two-year starter Bob Turner will be the single safety. Letterman Dewey Norton and two good sophomores, Joe Cougill and Buddie Robertson, are in reserve.

Converted defensive end Jim Shaughnessy is expected to be one of ISU's top defenders in his new linebacking position, where he will team

with 1970 starter John Karaszia. No experienced depth is available, but sophs Dennis Pychinka, Dike Dastillung, Roger Owens and Bob Proctor all have shown promise.

Defensive co-captain Mike Costolo, a two-year letterman at defensive tackle, has switched to defensive guard and should be the standout on the Sycamore line. A big key to the ISU defense will be his running

mate, 6-5, 254-pound senior Jerry Gelling, who had a good spring.

Ability but not experience is available at tackle. Dave McKenney, a 1970 offensive guard, and Bob Foster, a converted linebacker, have the physical ability and need only game experience, according to Sycamore coaches.

Defensive end could be a question mark, although both probable starters, Bob Pattee and John Walter, started several games in 1970.

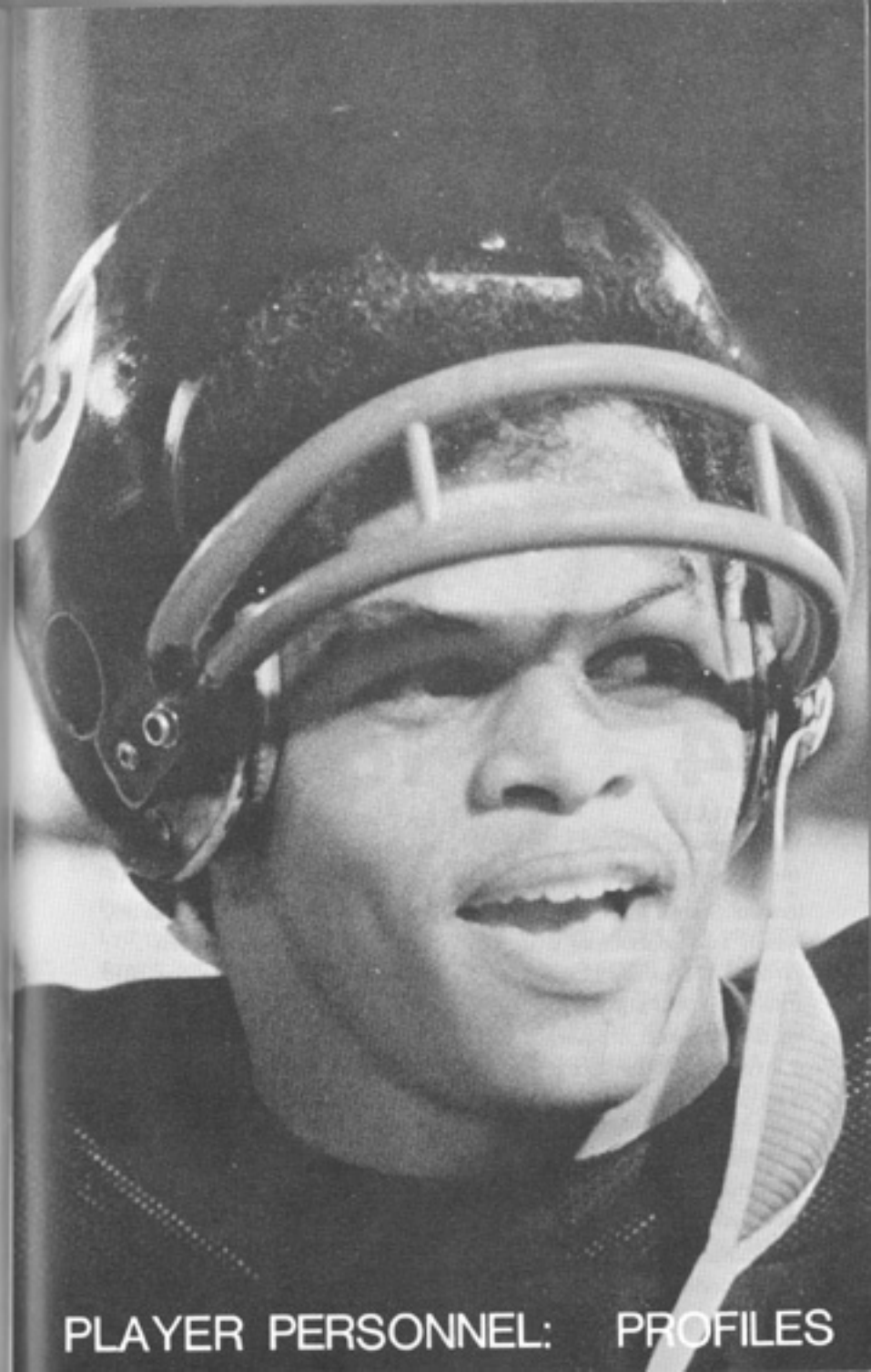

1971 Spring Game Review

Ray Vokish, Lenny Cannon, Rich Renn and Tommy Thompson starred as White dumped Blue 40-7 in the annual Blue-White scrimmage May 8.

White, composed of the first offensive and defensive units as determined by spring practice, scored the first three times it had the ball and rolled up 513 yards to 169 for Blue.

Vokish completed seven of seven passes for 204 yards in the first half and finished with 10 of 16 for 229 yards and two TDs.

Cannon caught two passes for 71 yards, ran six times for 59 yards, scored three touchdowns and kicked three extra points.

Renn led all rushers with 103 yards in 27 carries and Thompson caught five passes for 85 yards.

Ray Gessler provided the Blue team with most of its offense, carrying 20 times for 94 yards.

Blue's touchdown came on a three-yard third-quarter pass from Roger Voorhis to Mike Vance.

Coach Huntsman said he was pleased with overall performances in the game and added that the running back position would be deeper in the fall with Milt Allen, Tommy Lenz, Dave Milovac and Gary Brown available.

Allen, Lenz and Milovac all missed the spring game due to injuries and Brown was a member of the ISU track team.

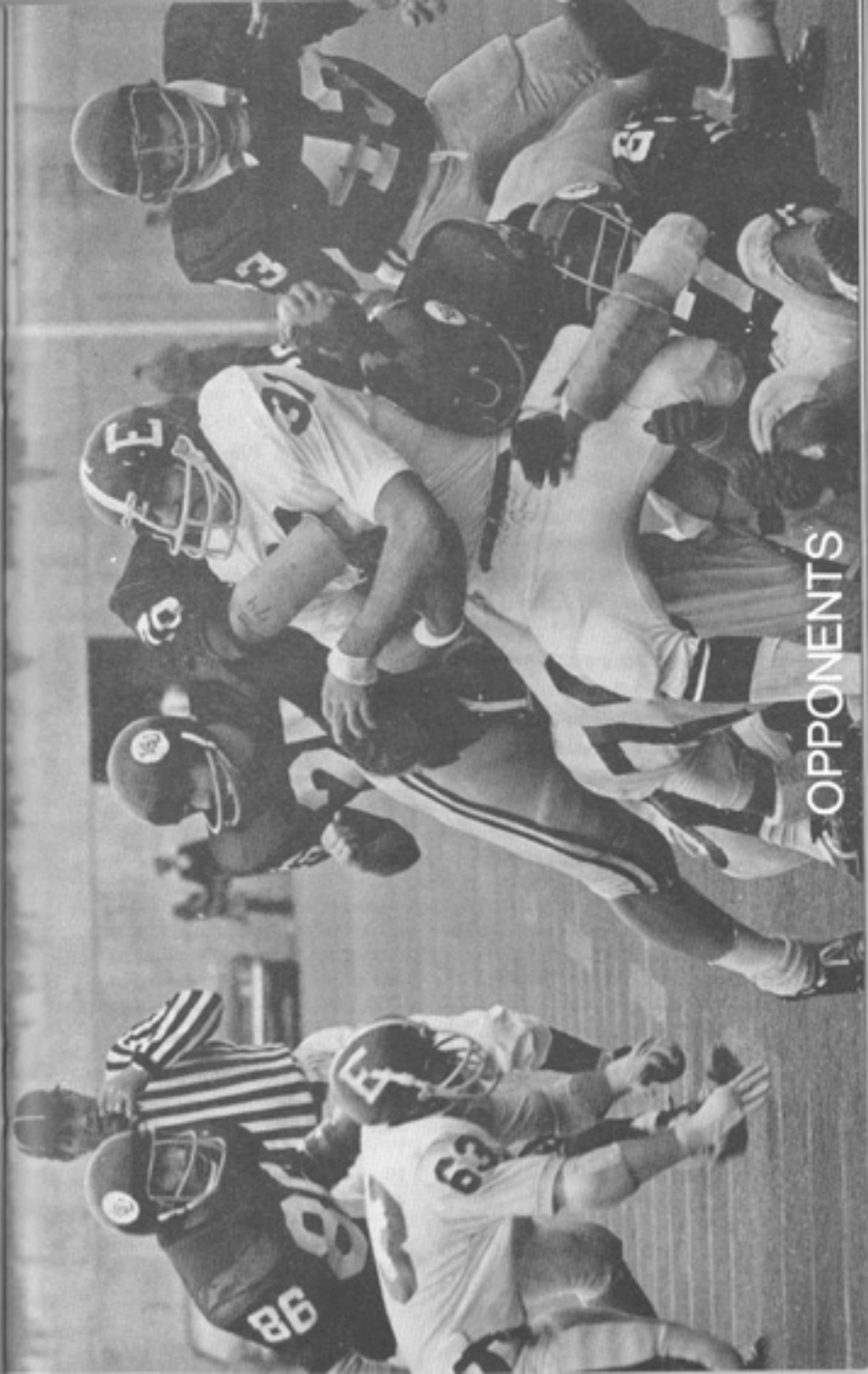

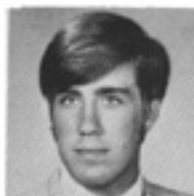

Mike Stover and Dale Freeman. If ISU has a healthy quarterback and gets effective
muscle from its young offensive line, the Redbird attack could be explosive.

SYCAMORE SLUGS

If the Sycamores win all 20 of their games over the next two seasons, that would give them a 200-197 record in 56 seasons of competition.

Should ISU lose three games this season, it'll be forced to absorb the 200th loss of its 55 years of grid history.

The first five football seasons in ISU history were bleak ones—the Sycamores didn't win any games and managed only one tie, while losing 10. Whether the school's administration was swayed by this or not is unknown. However, after the 1907 season, football was dropped for 12 years before being resumed in 1920. ISU's wait for its first victory was a long one—22 years.

Wonder if 1952 ISU grid coach Mark Dean could untie his shoes effectively that season. That season's team was the only one in Sycamore history to tie three games, while winning four and losing one.

As of August 1, two former Sycamore standouts were on rosters of National Football League teams. Jim Brumfield, ISU's all-time rushing and scoring leader, was fighting for a running back position with the Pittsburgh Steelers and Kent Drew, a 1970 Sycamore All-America, was attempting to win a cornerback berth with the Dallas Cowboys.

CHIEF OUIBACHI

Mascot of Indiana State's athletic teams is an Indian known as Chief Ouibachi (pronounced "wee-BOTCH-ee.")

This is the third season for the mascot after the need for one was voiced by the ISU Board of Trustees and the Athletic Department. I—State Student Government Association named a committee headed by SGA member Robert W. Green, a junior history major from West Lafayette, to find a suitable mascot.

After several months of study and consideration of most animals and symbols used as mascots, the committee decided that an Indian would be the most appropriate mascot for the ISU athletic teams. The decision was based primarily on the historical significance of Indians in the Wabash Valley.

Ouibachi was the name chosen by the committee. The name appears in some early writings of the famous explorer, LaSalle, back in the early 1700s. It was his (the French) way of spelling the name (Wabash) given

to a federation of Indians along the river valley made up of Miami, Wea and Kickapoo tribes.

Following the committee's study, a resolution adopting Chief Ouibachi as the official Indiana State mascot was passed by the Student Government Association. It also was decided that the team name of "Sycamores" would not change, but only a mascot would be added.

Chief Ouibachi will appear at every Indiana State football and basketball game and will make other appearances at such functions as parades and pep rallies.

A Viet Nam war veteran and former football player, John Maurer, is in his second year of serving as Chief Ouibachi. A freshman football player at ISU until sidelined by injuries, Maurer served one year in Viet Nam as a gunner on a 155 mm self-propelled Howitzer. The senior from Garrett is majoring in elementary education.

The high-pitched, spirited cries of Chief Ouibachi have become an integral part of Indiana State athletic events and add an additional element of enthusiasm for ISU fans.

BOB ADAMSON MEMORIAL AWARD (ISU Football's Most Valuable Player)

The Bob Adamson Memorial Award is given annually to the Most Valuable varsity football player. The award is named in honor of the late Bob Adamson, an outstanding basketball player at Terre Haute's Wiley High School, a member of the Indiana State Varsity Club, a Sycamore booster and an avid sports fan. The award was started in 1967 and has been made an annual presentation at the All Sports Banquet every spring. Winners of the award are listed below.

Rich Attonito, a senior defensive halfback from Jamaica Estates, N.Y., was the winner of the first Bob Adamson Memorial Award in 1967. Rich, who played along with his twin brother, Bob, at Indiana State, was a two-year regular in the defensive secondary and led the squad in interceptions his senior year.

Verbie Walder, junior quarterback from Dayton, Ohio, was the second winner of the award. "The Little Guy" transferred to ISU from Sacramento Junior College and promptly led the Sycamores to a 9-1-0 record, the best in the school's history, setting a school record for total offense in the process.

Verbie Walder, 1968 winner, and **Mike Russell**, senior safety from Seymour, tied as winners of this award in 1969.

Walder, who served as co-captain, established school records in total offense and passing in '69, despite playing much of the season with an injured shoulder that hampered his throwing.

Russell, a three-year starter at ISU, holds the record for career pass interceptions with 17. In '69 he was named "Outstanding Defensive Player" for the second straight season. He also was a leading punt returner.

1970 Winners of Adamson MVP Award

Defensive tackle **Kent Manwaring**, a senior from Opp, Ala., and fullback **Jesse Ealy**, a senior from Indianapolis Tech, tied for the award in 1970.

Manwaring, a co-captain in 1970, started 30 consecutive games in his three years as ISU. Coach Huntsman considered Manwaring one of the best linemen he had ever coached, and the import from Alabama was also one of ISU's most inspirational players.

Ealy began his ISU career as a backup to Jim Brumfield, the Sycamores' all-time rushing leader, and was so impressive in relief roles that he pushed a two-year regular out of the fullback slot. He stayed there long enough to letter three times, and although the 170-pounder was one of the smallest at his position in the Midwest he was a tough runner and perhaps the best blocking back in ISU history.

How We Became the Sycamores

The name "Sycamores" was adopted by a student body general election in 1921. A contest was started that year for a school name to be selected on Blue and White Day, a forerunner to Homecoming. The names were to be submitted to a committee of four, with that group's top three choices being placed before the student body in a campus-wide election. The name Sycamores was among the three finalists submitted. Although it was roundly booed when placed on the ballot the students, in an apparent joke, gave the name a one-sided victory in the election. The winner of the contest received \$3 as first prize for his entry. The name was first used January 3, 1922, in the Normal Advance, predecessor of The Statesman, present campus newspaper.

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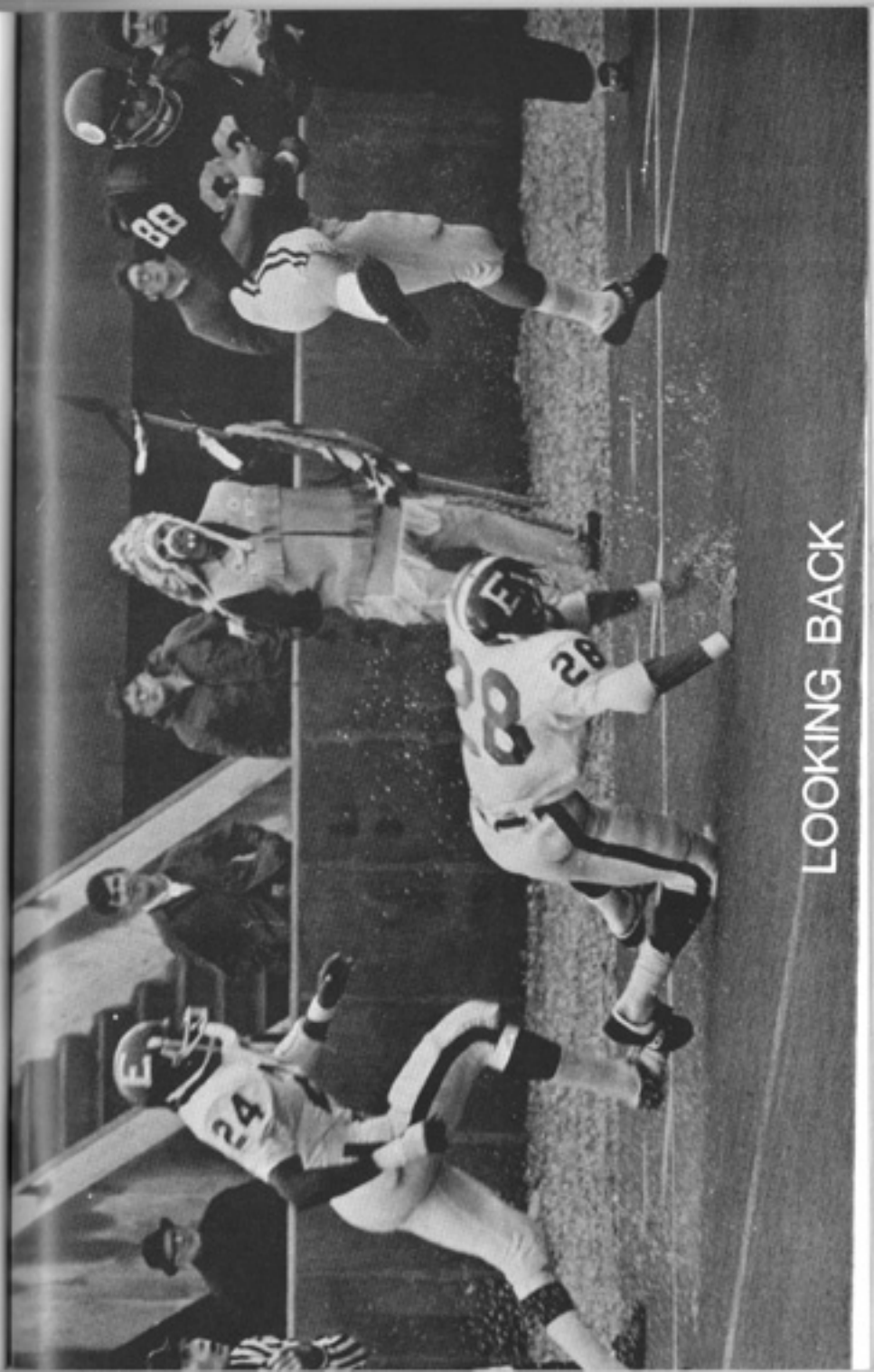
