Dr. Alan C. Rankin

Dr. Alan C. Rankin
President, Indiana State University

Alan C. Rankin became President of Indiana State University on July 1, 1965. He holds a Doctor of Social Science degree from Syracuse University. His undergraduate degrees (B.S. and B.A.) were earned at Fort Hays, Kansas, State College where he ranked first in his class, was president of the student body and was editor of the yearbook.

Rose-Hulman Institute awarded

him the honorary Doctor of Letters degree in 1967.

Dr. Rankin came to Indiana State from the University of Pittsburgh, where he was Vice Chancellor for Student and General Affairs and has served as Acting Chancellor. He previously had served on the faculties of Cornell University and Miami University of Ohio.

Interested in foreign affairs, Dr. Rankin served in the Panama Canal Zone, assisted in the reorganization of the Japanese Civil Service, and participated in a public administration study in Indonesia for the Ford Foundation and Cornell University. As an intern in government, he served in the office of the late Senator Robert Taft of Ohio, with the United States Civil Service Commission.

President Rankin is the current president of the Terre Haute Committee for Area Progress and also the Community Foundation of the Wabash Valley, Inc.; former president (1968-69) of the Indiana Conference of Higher Education; a member of the boards of the Terre Haute Chamber of Commerce, Terre Haute's Swope Art Gallery, and the Indianapolis Symphonic Choir; an elder in the Central Presbyterian Church; a member of the Terre Haute Rotary Club, and a member of the Constitutional Revision Commission of Indiana.

ISU History

Indiana State University now is in its 101st year of operation. The University was created by an Act of the Indiana General Assembly on Dec. 20, 1865, and opened its doors to 21 students (13 women and eight men) on Jan. 6, 1870.

The announced purpose of forming the University at that time was an institution that would "be to teachers what law school is to lawyers and medical school is to doctors."

The Act of 1865 did not provide a site for the new school, but a board of trustees, appointed later, was requested to locate an Indiana town or city cooperating with at least \$50,000. Terre Haute was the only town or city in the state to come forth with an offer, and it was better than originally requested. A committee from Terre Haute offered the \$50,000 and, in addition, real estate valued at \$25,000.

The cornerstone for the original building was laid Aug. 13, 1867. The cost of that building was some \$100,000. The building later burned to the ground on April 9, 1888.

The school was known as Indiana State Normal School from 1870 until 1927, when the name was changed to Indiana State Teachers College. In 1961, the name again changed, this time to Indiana State College. The latest, and probably the final, name change came in the spring of 1965 when the Indiana Legislature renamed the school Indiana State University.

One of the fastest growing universities in the Midwest, Indiana State's campus enrollment has doubled since 1963. There were some 6,800 students in 1963, and campus enrollment for this year is estimated at over 13,500. Students in extension and correspondence classes bring the total enrollment to nearly 19,000.

The University Today

Now in its second century of service and with a challenge of "Excellence in New Dimensions," Indiana State currently ranks among the top twelve "emerging universities."

The University's dramatic growth and development have extended the burgeoning Terre Haute campus areas to new boundaries, created

greater educational opportunities and services, attracted record enrollments and resulted in the construction of many new facilities.

Of the total enrollment of 18,898 students in the fall of 1971, there were 13,508 on the Terre Haute campus; 2,624 on the Evansville campus, and 2,766 in extension and correspondence study. Total enrollment ten years previously for the fall semester (1961) was 6,372. In addition, the University 1971 summer session enrollments were 6,777 for the first summer session and 5,681 for the second summer session.

Construction projects totalling \$30 million are underway or have recently been completed to enhance the Terre Haute campus facilities. These projects included a \$2.9-million, 112-apartment building for married students completed on the South Campus in September, 1971. Buildings with 80 apartments each had been opened in 1965 and 1967 and a 112-apartment building was opened there in 1969. Other projects included a \$2.3-million Student Health and Counseling Center completed in December, 1971; a \$4.5-million boiler plant expansion project completed in April; a one-million-volume, \$6.5-million library scheduled for completion in December, and a \$3-million Tirey Memorial Union expansion project also due to be finished in December.

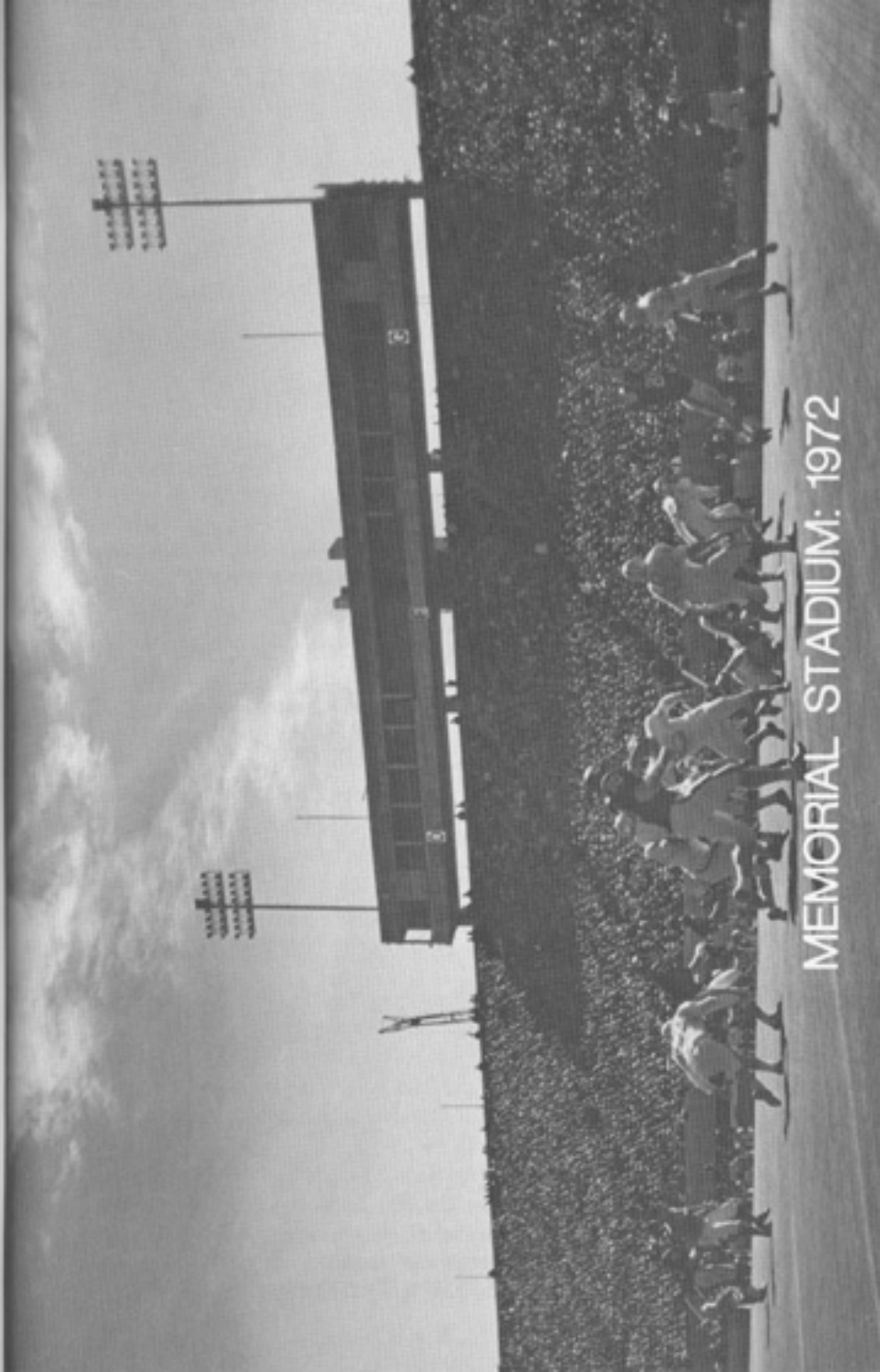
Construction work has also begun on the new 11,000-seat University-Civic Amphitheater on the east side of the main campus. This \$8-million project is due for completion in December of 1973.

Last year the University opened a \$1.5-million School of Nursing Building, and in 1970 a unique \$260,000 Driver and Traffic Safety Educational Demonstration was opened at the Vigo County Fairgrounds, on the south side of the city. Also in 1970 a \$325,000 fifth-floor addition was completed to the School of Business and the \$2-million Phase II Memorial Stadium work was completed.

Phase II work included razing of an old curved Stadium seating section and replacement with a permanent, concrete 13,000-seat section to go with a 7,500-seat semi-permanent bleacher section on the opposite side of the field.

Under study for future use is the new 90-acre River Campus area on the northwest side of the main campus.

Indiana State now offers a medical education program through the Terre Haute Center for Medical Education, which is on the Terre Haute main campus. This program, in cooperation with the Indiana University School of Medicine and one of seven centers started in Indiana, offers study opportunities for college graduates planning to prepare for careers in medicine.





Located beneath the south stands of Memorial Stadium is the 200 Club Room. There is no college or university the size of ISU (and few larger institutions) that have such a smartly decorated building.

INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY'S 200 CLUB

Indiana State University's 200 Club began with a nucleus of 35 people and about 100 fans became involved during Gordon Chalmers' first few years here.

But since ISU proposed and constructed its 200 Club facility beneath Memorial Stadium, membership has jumped to well over 200 fans, and the club is expected to hit the 250 mark soon.

The purpose of the facility is to give the fans who support ISU's grant-in-aid program a "classy" meeting area. Club members are doing more than just donating money. They're getting their money's worth, and more.

For \$200 annually members receive two football and two basketball season tickets and parking privileges for both sports.

Stadium seating for football games is on the 50-yard line. Last season there were 440 chairback seats and 180 more have been added for this year. All are beneath the stadium's lengthy press box, which provides a natural shelter from inclement weather.

All are serviced by an elevator (with a capacity of 20) which brings passengers to or takes them from the 200 Club's ground-level entrance.

The subterranean structure—which has a normal football game capacity of 300 and a "sitdown dinner" capacity of 125—is a popular meeting place for women fans during late fall football Saturdays. There

also is a strong possibility of the future installation of closed circuit television.

The wall-to-wall red carpeted room is not only unique—it's quite flexible. Adjoined by a furniture storage area, it is equipped with a 27-ton air conditioner that keeps room temperature at a constant level. The smartly decorated room also has a concession stand and rest rooms.

There is plenty of use for the building after the football season has ended, too, since it is open for both athletic and non-athletic university functions. In addition, 200 Club members may rent the room for private gatherings.

MEMORIAL STADIUM

This is the third season that Indiana State University is playing in Memorial Stadium as it now stands. Prior to the 1970 season, a horseshoe-type baseball stand stood in the place where the 13,000-seat grandstand is now standing.

The old stand and press box were razed at the completion of the 1969 schedule and the completely modern grandstand (with a new press box and 200 Club facilities) and dressing rooms at the west end of the field were constructed.

This completed Phase Two of a three-phase renovation project which began four years ago with the installation of the world's first outdoor and university-owned AstroTurf playing field.

Phase One of the renovation project, completed in the summer of 1967, included the reorientation of the field from a northerly-southerly direction to the easterly-westerly line; installation of the AstroTurf, and the erection of 4,500 bleacher seats on the north side of the field. Another addition of bleacher seats was made on the north side in 1968, bringing the seating capacity to 13,500. The completion of Phase Two brought the current seating capacity to 20,500.

Phase Three, the ultimate development under present planning, calls for another grandstand on the north side of the field and would bring the total stadium seating capacity to approximately 26,000.

The stadium was acquired by the university in 1967 and at that time was used for both football and baseball. Since the installation of the synthetic playing surface, however, the field has been used only for football and an occasional soccer game.

ASTROTURF

AstroTurf, the playing surface at Indiana State's Memorial Stadium, is much similar to that used in Houston's famed Astrodome.

Indiana State was the first university in the world to own and make outdoor application of a field of this type. The Sycamores' home game against Eastern Illinois September 16, 1967, was the first football game ever played on AstroTurf out-of-doors. By the way, it helped—as we romped to a 41-6 victory over the Panthers.

One plus factor for the synthetic field is its durability. Some 20 college and high school football games are played on the field each year and ISU gridders hold all their practice sessions on the field. A second plus factor is a constant surface which will provide sure footing regardless of weather.

PRESS BOX INFORMATION

Press Box Accommodations—Space makes it mandatory that only **WORKING** newsmen, radio announcers, technicians and others whose duties make necessary the use of the press box be allowed in the facility.

ADMISSION TO PRESS BOX IS BY PASS ONLY

The elevator, which serves both the press box and the 200 Club areas, will be reserved for those entering the press box until 30 minutes before game time. Those final 30 minutes prior to kickoff will find the elevator in use to take members of the 200 Club to their seats and will be available on a first-come, first-serve basis.

If there is time, tickets will be mailed. Otherwise, they may be picked up at the ticket office on the left side of the main entrance to the stadium.

Parking—We have no reserved parking for press, radio and TV personnel, but there is plenty of space available and you will have no problems finding a spot.

Press Box Services—We will provide programs, two-deep charts on Indiana State and when possible on the opponents, information concerning any special event, cumulative statistics and series scores prior to the game.

At halftime, we will supply abbreviated stats, with play-by-play being available following each quarter.

At the end of the game, we will have complete individual and team stats as well as play-by-play. UPI and AP wirephoto service is also available.

Throughout the game, we will provide information concerning records tied or broken, injury reports from the sidelines and periodic scores from other games of interest.

Hostesses will provide you with soft drinks, coffee, soup and sandwiches.

GORDON H. CHALMERS
DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Gordon Chalmers became Director of Athletics at Indiana State in June, 1967, coming from Iowa State University, where he had been Director of Athletics and head of Physical Education since 1959.

Prior to that, he had been Assistant AD at the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, N.Y., from 1952-58, and swimming coach there from 1946 until his acceptance of the top position at Iowa State.

Under Chalmers' direction at Iowa State, two seating additions and a pressbox were added to the football stadium, a new \$1.6-million physical education building was built, and tennis courts, practice football fields and outdoor basketball courts were added to the facilities.

He designed the Ames, Iowa, community indoor swimming pool and assisted Miami University (Ohio) in the building of a pool. He also has aided other colleges and universities in designing new athletic facilities for their campuses.

A former national collegiate swimming champion and a member of the 1932 U.S. Olympic swimming team, "Slim" captained the varsity swimming team at his alma mater, Franklin & Marshall ('35) in Lancaster, Pa., and also was a varsity soccer and baseball player there.

His coaching career began in 1940 as head swimming coach at Lafayette College and the following year at Lehigh University. He served as an athletic officer during World War II, and was honorably discharged as a Lieutenant Commander.

Nationally known and respected, Chalmers is:

- a member of the United States Olympic committee.
- President of the U.S. Gymnasts Federation
- Chairman of the NCAA high school all-star game selection committee.
- a member of the NCAA Gymnastics Rules committee.
- a member of the Swimming Hall of Fame committee.

He also has served as chairman of the NCAA Olympic committee, on the NCAA Committee on committees, on the Board of Directors of the U.S. Olympic committee and as president of the College Swimming Coaches Association.

JERRY HUNTSMAN
HEAD FOOTBALL COACH

Jerry Huntsman, 42, is entering his seventh season as head football coach at Indiana State University.

In six campaigns as mentor of the Sycamores, his teams have compiled a record of 36-21-1, for a winning percentage of .629. Three of those seasons—at their beginnings—were classified as "rebuilding years."

Nine victories by Huntsman's 1968 team—quarterbacked by his newest assistant coach, Verbie Wal-

der—is the most ever won in one season by an ISU football team and the nine straight wins over two years is an all-time record for the longest winning streak by any Indiana State grid team.

In his first season as head coach here in 1966, Huntsman coached the Sycamores to a 6-2 mark, winning second place in the Indiana Collegiate Conference and being named the loop's Coach-of-the-Year.

Huntsman's overall record, spanning 15 years in high school and college, is a tremendous 99-36-4 (.727). Three of his teams, two in high school and one in college, have been undefeated.

Prior to coming to I-State as backfield coach in 1965, Jerry headed the Earlham College elevens for four years, where he compiled a 29-3-0 record, including an undefeated season in 1962, and was named the NAIA District 21 College Coach-of-the-Year in 1963.

A native of Richmond, Ind., and a 1952 graduate of Wabash College, Huntsman earned a master's degree in physical education from Purdue in 1958. As a player at Wabash, he was named All-State quarterback for Indiana small colleges in 1951.

Following one-year stints at Waveland and Covington High Schools, the ISU head coach moved to Crawfordsville, where during his three years there his teams went to a 14-12-2 mark. Moving then to Huntington, Huntsman-coached squads were undefeated in his two years there, playing to a 19-0-1 record. In 1961 he moved to Earlham.

Huntsman is from a family of coaches. His father, Owen, retired as cross country coach at Wabash College last November, wrapping up 46 years of coaching. His brother, Stan, currently is track coach at the University of Tennessee.

On the subject of families, Jerry and his wife, Cora Lee, have three sons—Brent, 15, Jerry, 13, and Scott, 10.

CAROL PURICHIA
DEFENSIVE BACK COACH

This is Carol Purichia's fourth campaign as a member of the Sycamore grid coaching staff.

"Rico" came to Indiana State from Chatard High in his native Indianapolis, where he had been head football and wrestling coach for five years. There his teams won two city titles and three Capitol District

Conference crowns.

Prior to Chatard, Carol was reserve grid coach at Indy Cathedral High, where his teams had a combined record of 30-0-0.

Rico is a graduate of Indiana Central, lettering all four years in football. All-ICC quarterback in 1960, he was 11th in the nation in passing for small college quarterbacks.

He also played one season in the Continental Football League.

Purichia and his wife, Donna, have one daughter, Angela, 3½.

BOB PYCHINKA
DEFENSIVE LINE COACH

Bob Pychinka, a 1968 Indiana State graduate and one of the best athletes ever to attend the university, is in his third year as a member of the Sycamore coaching staff.

"Chico" won three letters in football, starring at linebacker, and twice was named to the Indiana Collegiate Conference all-star team. He also was an outstanding wrestler, winning three conference mat titles.

Pychinka, who coached the 1970 and 1971 freshman football teams to a combined record of 6-2, is the I-State defensive line coach.

Since graduating four years ago, he served as an assistant football and assistant wrestling coach at Calumet High School, and in 1969 his frosh team compiled a 5-2-1 record.

Pychinka is the only single coach on the ISU football staff.

GENE STAUBER
DEFENSE COACH

Gene Stauber, in his second season at Indiana State, is the defensive coordinator who basically works with linebackers and defensive ends.

Stauber joined the ISU staff last season after 11 campaigns as an assistant coach at the University of Illinois.

An Indianapolis native and graduate of Shortridge High there, he played college football at Toledo.

After 1947 graduation from Toledo, he remained at the school to coach Rocket freshman football and varsity baseball teams for the next four years. In 1951 he earned a master of science degree in physical education at the University of Michigan, where he also helped coach.

The next six years were hectic ones for Stauber as he put in stints at Stetson, Delaware, Idaho and Nebraska before settling down for three years at California-Berkeley. While there as offensive and defensive backfield coach, the Golden Bears played in the 1959 Rose Bowl.

Gene and his wife, Eileen, have a 19-year-old daughter, Susan, and a 17-year-old son, Rory.

LARRY VAN DER HEYDEN
OFFENSIVE LINE COACH

Larry Van Der Heyden is in his fourth season as an ISU assistant coach.

"Vandy," who is the offensive line coach, came here in 1969 from Drake, where he spent a year as a defensive line coach.

Before moving to the Des Moines school he spent four years at Iowa State as defensive line coach.

As an athlete at Iowa State, Larry earned six varsity letters, three each in football and baseball. As a member of the Cyclones' grid squad in 1959-61, he played offensive tackle and defensive guard.

Larry and his wife, Lois, have two children, Mike, 9, and Laurann, 7.

**VERBIE WALDER
OFFENSIVE BACK COACH**

"The Little Guy" is back!

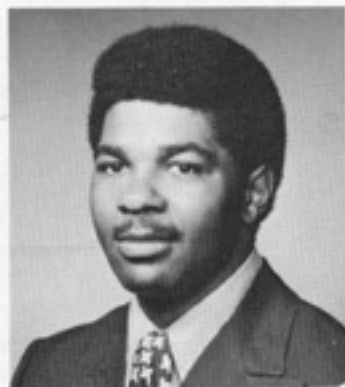
Verbie Walder, one of the best and most exciting quarterbacks in Indiana State history, returned to ISU in late March as the school's offensive backfield coach.

The diminutive (5-8, 160) signal caller led the Sycamores to their best record ever—9-1 in 1968—after transferring from Sacramento Junior College. He also piloted the Sycamores to a 6-3-1 mark in 1970.

The scrambler from Dayton was selected the team's Most Valuable Player both seasons, the only Indiana State gridder to win two such awards. He holds single-game records in total offense and passing yardage, the season mark for passing yardage and the career record for total offense at ISU.

Before returning to ISU, Walder was receiver coach at Ball State for a season, which followed an assistant coaching job at Fort Wayne North High School.

Walder and his wife, Dorothy, have a two-year-old daughter, Shaun.

**MEL BLICKENSTAFF
ATHLETIC TRAINER**

Mel Blickenstaff joined the Indiana State University staff 11 years ago as athletic trainer and has been an invaluable help to the Sycamores' athletic program.

His previous experience includes nine years of service as a coach in Northern Indiana high schools, three years as a physical conditioning instructor in the Air Force hospitals during World War II, and eleven years as athletic trainer at Colum-

bus (Ind.) High School.

"Blick," as he is known by I-State athletes and coaches, earned his bachelor of science degree at Manchester College in 1938, his master of science degree at Indiana University in 1947 and has specialized in instructions in physical education and athletic training at Indiana.

Mel and his wife, Mary, have three sons, Jim, 27, John, 24, and Bill, 19.

Tidd had been assistant athletic director at ISU for two years prior to that after serving as athletic business manager at Iowa State for five years.

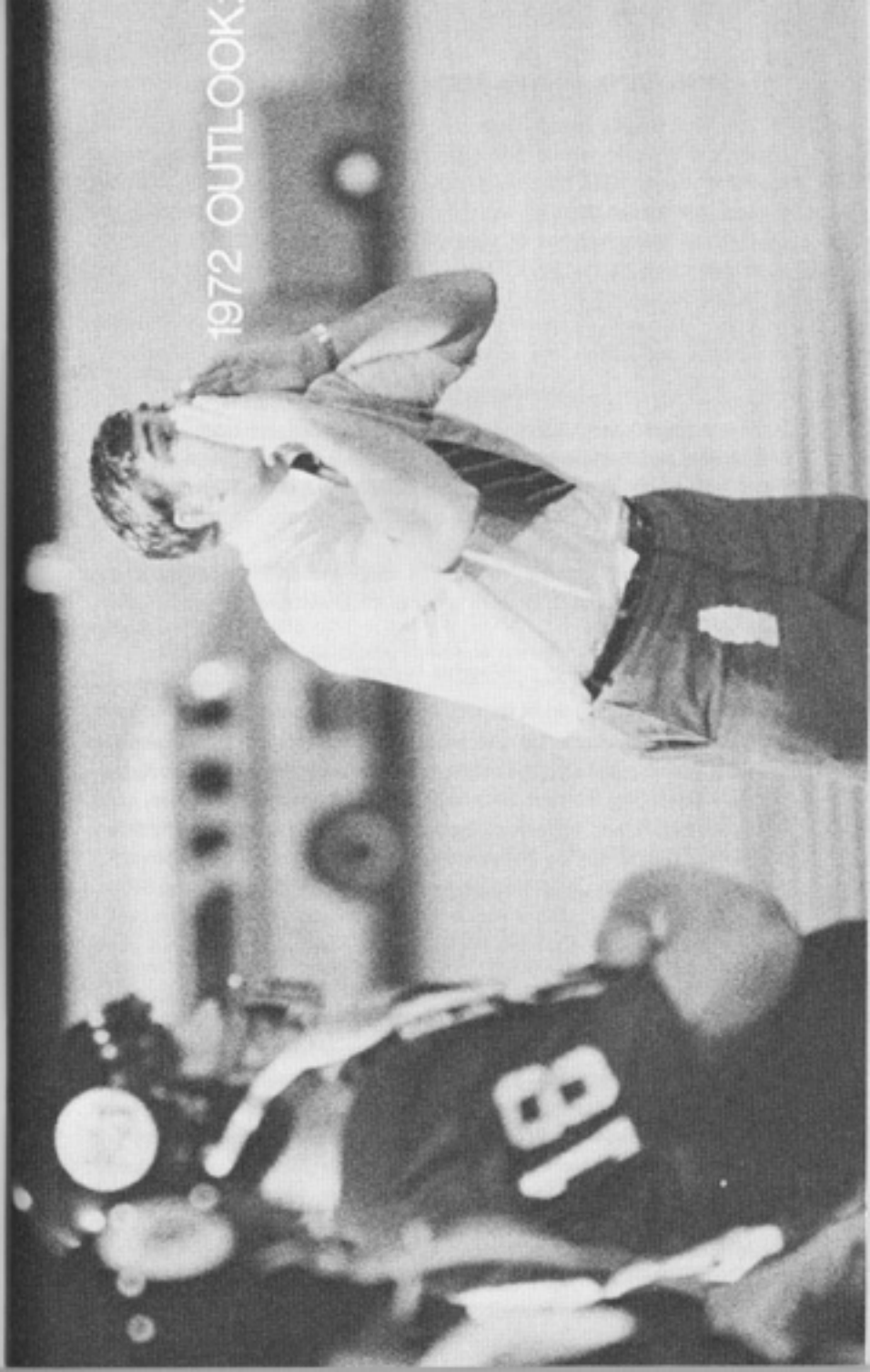
A past president of the College Athletic Business Managers Association, Tidd is a 1954 graduate of Iowa State, where he earned three varsity football letters.

1972 OUTLOOK



INDIANA STATE FOOTBALL '72 OUTLOOK

The first losing season ever for head coach Jerry Huntsman, last season's 4-6, is hopefully going to be the last one. Returning are 28 lettermen from 1971 plus three other players who lettered in 1970 but missed last season. Not all will be in the lineup, however, because the 1971 frosh team was one of the best in ISU history and sent a flock of good prospects to the 1972 varsity. And freshmen, eligible for the first time this season, could also find spots. For the second straight year ISU will play six games at home and only four on the road, but considering the home opposition the schedule could hardly be considered easy.

Sycamores Open With Cincy

State opens with Cincinnati, perhaps the strongest team yet on an Indiana State schedule (the Bearcats visit Colorado the next week). The other home opponents are Evansville, Ball State, Butler, Western Illinois and Akron, while the Sycamores visit Eastern Illinois, Central Michigan, Illinois State and Southern Illinois.

The Sycamores appear to have a flock of talented runners this season, but depth could present a problem elsewhere on the offensive unit.

Voorhis Is Pilot

Leading the backfield is quarterback Roger Voorhis, a clever runner and good passer who's led the team in total offense for the past two seasons. The number two spot will probably fall to either Mike Smutney or Dale Cromling, neither of whom has yet completed a varsity pass, with two sophs and a flock of freshmen also available at the position.

Passing might not be necessary though, since runners are plentiful. Milt Allen, the team's rushing leader the past two years, had the busiest season ever for a Sycamore runner last year with 197 carries in only a little more than eight games. He suffered a knee injury, but has come back phenomenally.

Aid for Allen

Allen shouldn't have to carry the ball so often this year, since so many other runners are available. Lenny Cannon, a speedster who didn't play last year, and bullish Ray Gessler are listed as probables at the other backfield posts, with veterans Tom Lenz, Dave Travers and Willie Lee and sophs Craig Riley and Ken Monroe also capable.

The two starting ends are good ones—last year's leading receiver Glenn Damato and tight end Charlie Karazsia, who was leading in receptions until injured. But the only experienced reserves are split end Tom Thompson and tight end Tom Herold, and soph John Yogan and

junior squadman Mark Maley are bidding strongly for the number two spots.

Poss Anchors Line

The offensive line is likewise strong but thin. All-America Bob Poss is the key man at right guard, right tackle Dan Galbraith is starting for the third straight year, center Bill D'Andrea and left tackle Jim Novack were starters last year and left guard John Brewer was the 1971 Most Valuable Freshman. But freshmen and sophomores are being counted on for depth, with tackle Phil DeLong the only letterman available in reserve.

Specialty teams have been traditionally strong at ISU, and 1972 should be no exception. Punter Damato and kicker Lenz were good as sophomores and should improve, and Sycamore tacklers yielded few long returns of any kind in 1971.

Defense Should Be Strong Point

The line is strong and deep, the linebackers are talented and there is experience and talented youth in the secondary, so the defensive unit could be the strength of the team in 1972.

Four lettermen, three starters and one part-time starter, return to the line and are backed up by a fifth letterman and a flock of sophomores. Tackles Dave McKenney and Bob Foster were the starting tackles in 1971 and Bob Pattee was a starting guard (after seeing action at end), and Dick Meyer had a great spring after lettering for the first time last year. In reserve are letterman Jay Berk and sophs Steve Stanfield, Mike Keglovits and twins Mike and Martin Matyas. Two-year letterman Willie Clemmons, an academic casualty last year, might also be available.

All-America at Monster Linebacker

All-America John Karazsia will return to the monster linebacker post with junior Dike Dastillung ready to resume at middle linebacker after taking over there midway through last season. No lettermen are available in reserve, but junior Brian Hebert and soph Ed Boswell appear capable on the basis of their spring performances.

Hard-hitting Reggie Richard will be the rover again, backed up by tough soph Howard Holmes, and sophomore Jerry Williams will get the first crack at weakside end over fellow sophs Dave Clark and Dave Bundalo.

Secondary Young but Talented

Two-year lettermen Dewey Norton and John Barro will lead the secondary from safety and right cornerback, with soph Ron Kennedy

given an early shot at left corner. Also in the secondary picture are lettermen Joe Cougill and Rick Murphy and sophomore Joe Koval.

Murphy will be used more as a return specialist after ranking third in the nation in kickoff returns in 1971. Barro and possibly Norton will help return punts and Kennedy and Williams were the leading runback specialists with the 1971 freshmen.

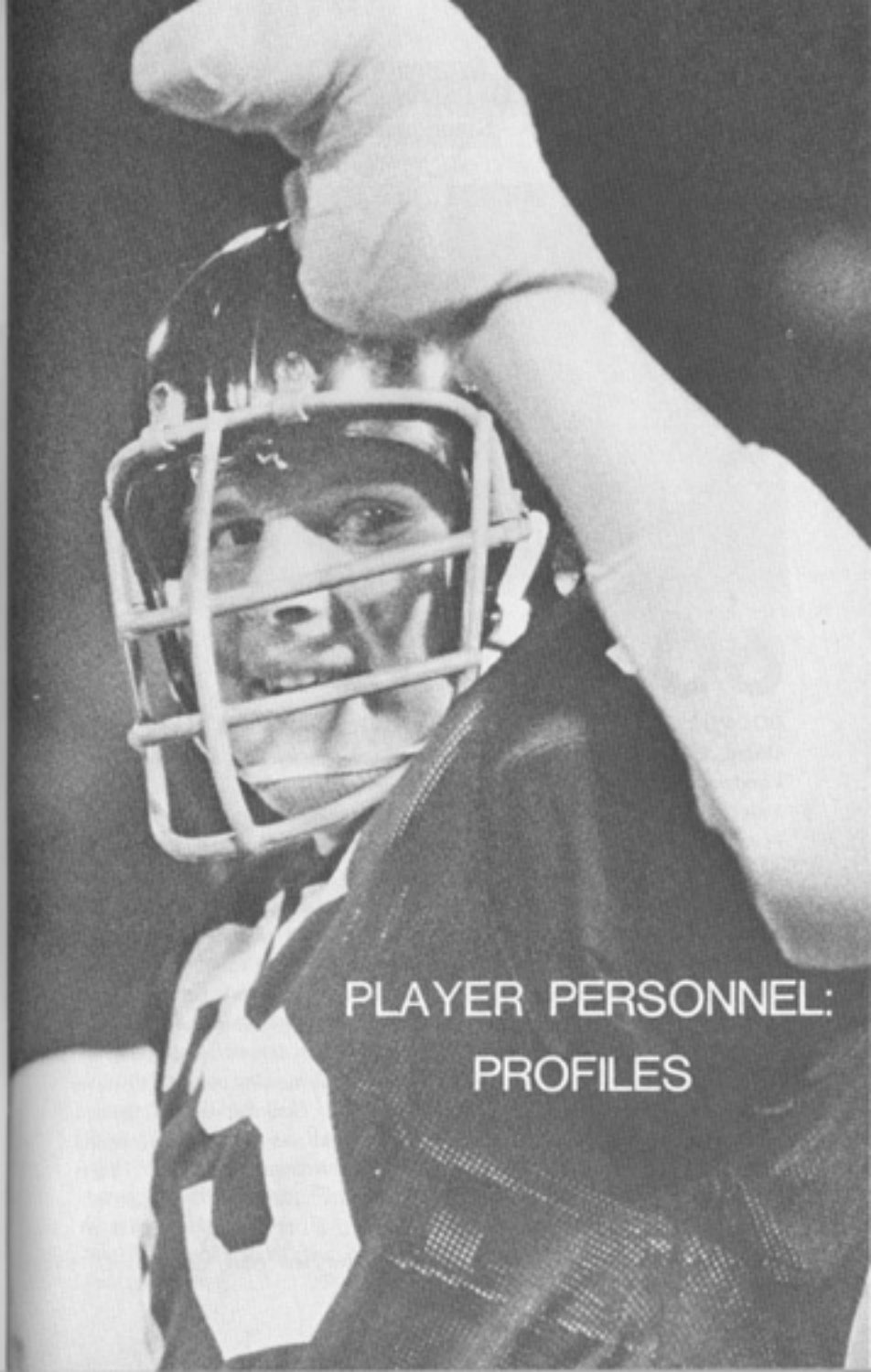
INTERVIEWS

Sycamore players also may be interviewed following the game in the dressing room—after a short cooling-off period.

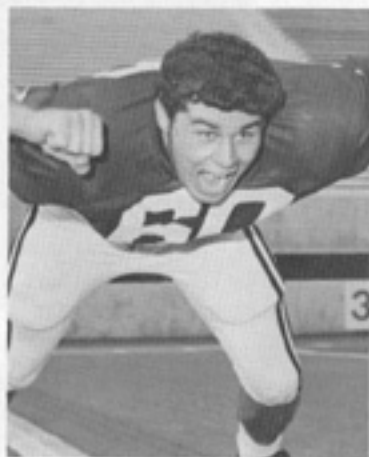

1972 Spring Game Review

Defense was dominant as Blue recorded a 10-0 win over White May 6 in the annual Blue-White scrimmage.

Dike Dastillung's interception and 26-yard return on White's first series of downs set up the game's only touchdown, with Mike Smutney directing a 33-yard drive in five plays.

His 17-yard pass to Charlie Karazsia set up the TD, a one-yard plunge by Smutney.

White drove to the five-yard line late in the first quarter but lost the ball on downs, and Blue marched back down the field to a 21-yard field goal by Dan Arbogast with 9:30 left in the half that ended all scoring.

While White actually had the statistical edge, interceptions by Joe Koval and Rick Murphy, the fierce pass rush of Bob Pattee and a goalline tackle on fourth down by Howard Holmes kept them off the scoreboard.

Roger Voorhis led all rushers with 61 yards and Ken Monroe added 56 in 10 carries for White. Dave Travers gained 56 for Blue.

Passing was a disappointment in the game with only 13 completions in 43 attempts and a lot of dropped balls by receivers.

Squads were split evenly for the 1972 game in contrast to the usual practice of keeping the first and second units intact.

BOB ADAMSON MEMORIAL AWARD (ISU Football's Most Valuable Player)

The Bob Adamson Memorial Award is given annually to the Most Valuable varsity football player. The award is named in honor of the late Bob Adamson, an outstanding basketball player at Terre Haute's Wiley High School, a member of the Indiana State Varsity Club, a Sycamore booster and an avid sports fan. The award was started in 1967 and has been made an annual presentation at the All Sports Banquet every spring. Winners of the award are listed below.

1967—**Rich Attonito**, a senior defensive halfback from Jamaica Estates, N.Y., was the first winner of the award. Rich, who played with his twin brother, Bob, was a two-year regular in the defensive secondary and led the squad in interceptions his senior year.

1968—**Verbie Walder**, junior quarterback from Dayton, Ohio, directed the Sycamores to nine victories in 10 games, the best record in the school's 55-year grid history.

1969—**Verbie Walder**, '68 winner, and **Mike Russell**, senior safety from Seymour, tied for the award. As a senior co-captain, Walder led ISU to a 6-3-1 mark, despite playing much of the campaign with an injured shoulder. Russell, a three-year starter, holds ISU's career pass interception mark with 17. Named the squad's top defender in '69, he also was a leading punt returner.

1970—**Jesse Ealy**, senior fullback from Indianapolis Tech, and **Kent Manwaring**, senior defensive tackle, tied for the award. A three-year letterman, Ealy played backup to Jim Brumfield, ISU's all-time rushing leader, for two years before getting a real shot at a starting berth. He really came through in his senior year. Manwaring, senior co-captain from Opp, Ala., started 30 consecutive games in three varsity seasons, and was considered one of Coach Huntsman's finest linemen ever.

BOB ADAMSON MVP AWARD

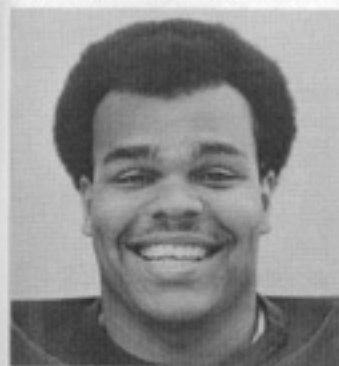
Doug Garrard, senior cornerback from Avon High School, was presented with the '71 MVP award last spring. A three-year letterman, this 5-8, 185-pounder led Sycamore grid defenders last fall with 39 unassisted tackles, three of which were for losses, and 11 passes broken up. He also assisted on 47 tackles, intercepted two passes and recovered one fumble.

MVP FRESHMAN FOOTBALLER

The final "Outstanding Freshman Football Player" award was presented last spring at Indiana State's All-Sports Banquet to 6-1, 250-pound lineman **John Brewer** of Richmond. Initiated in the spring of 1969 and given to the outstanding yearling grinder, it will be discontinued because of the NCAA's ruling that freshmen are eligible for varsity play. Previous recipients of the award were: 1968—**Steve Balash**, guard, Hobart; 1969—**Willie Lee**, end, South Bend Riley, and 1970—**Glenn Damato**, split end, Roselle, Ill.

How We Became the Sycamores

The name "Sycamores" was adopted by a student body general election in 1921. A contest was started that year for a school name to be selected on Blue and White Day, a forerunner to Homecoming. The names were to be submitted to a committee of four, with that group's top three choices being placed before the student body in a campus-wide election. The name Sycamores was among the three finalists submitted. Although it was roundly booed when placed on the ballot the students, in an apparent joke, gave the name a one-sided victory in the election. The winner of the contest received \$3 as first prize for his entry. The name was first used January 3, 1922, in the Normal Advance, predecessor of The Statesman, present campus newspaper.
