**Dr. Alan C. Rankin
President, Indiana State University**

Alan C. Rankin became President of Indiana State University on July 1, 1965. He holds a Doctor of Social Science degree from Syracuse University. His undergraduate degrees (B.S. and B.A.) were earned at Fort Hays, Kansas, State College where he ranked first in his class, was president of the student body and was editor of the yearbook.

Rose-Hulman Institute awarded

him the honorary Doctor of Letters degree in 1967.

Dr. Rankin came to Indiana State from the University of Pittsburgh, where he was Vice Chancellor for Student and General Affairs and has served as Acting Chancellor. He previously had served on the faculties of Cornell University and Miami University of Ohio.

Interested in foreign affairs, Dr. Rankin served in the Panama Canal Zone, assisted in the reorganization of the Japanese Civil Service, and participated in a public administration study in Indonesia for the Ford Foundation and Cornell University. As an intern in government, he served in the office of the late Senator Robert Taft of Ohio, with the United States Civil Service Commission.

President Rankin is the current president of the Terre Haute Committee for Area Progress and also the Community Foundation of the Wabash Valley, Inc.; former president (1968-69) of the Indiana Conference of Higher Education; a member of the boards of the Terre Haute Chamber of Commerce, Terre Haute's Swope Art Gallery, and the Indianapolis Symphonic Choir; an elder in the Central Presbyterian Church; a member of the Terre Haute Rotary Club, and a member of the Constitutional Revision Commission of Indiana.

ISU History

Indiana State University now is in its 104th year of operation. The University was created by an Act of the Indiana General Assembly on Dec. 20, 1865, and opened its doors to 21 students (13 women and eight men) on Jan. 6, 1870.

The announced purpose of forming the University at that time was an institution that would "be to teachers what law school is to lawyers and medical school is to doctors."

The Act of 1865 did not provide a site for the new school, but a board of trustees, appointed later, was requested to locate an Indiana town or city cooperating with at least \$50,000. Terre Haute was the only town or city in the state to come forth with an offer, and it was better than originally requested. A committee from Terre Haute offered the \$50,000 and, in addition, real estate valued at \$25,000.

The cornerstone for the original building was laid Aug. 13, 1867. The cost of that building was some \$100,000. The building later burned to the ground on April 9, 1888.

The school was known as Indiana State Normal School from 1870 until 1927, when the name was changed to Indiana State Teachers College. In 1961, the name again changed, this time to Indiana State College. The latest, and probably the final, name change came in the spring of 1965 when the Indiana Legislature renamed the school Indiana State University.

The University Today

In September, 1973, Indiana State in Terre Haute is expected to service 12,500 students. This enrollment is more than six times the enrollment of 1,886 in September, 1953.

The composition of the Terre Haute campus enrollment in September, 1972, was as follows: 3,331 freshmen, 2,627 sophomores, 2,554 juniors, 2,889 seniors, 1,597 graduate students and 14 auditors. The 13,014 total figure included 7,007 men (54%) and 6,007 women (46%).

Twenty-two per cent of ISU students came from Vigo County and other counties sending the largest delegations in the fall of 1972 were Marion, Lake, Clay, Sullivan, Vanderburgh, Knox, Vermillion, Hen-

dricks, Parke and Greene. Top out-of-state enrollments came from Illinois, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania and Ohio, in that order.

Indiana State offers two regular 18-week semesters, a three-week spring intersession, and two five-week summer sessions in the academic year. The first semester starts in late August and ends in December. The second semester starts in January and ends in early May. The spring intersession, starting in May, was established on an experimental basis for 1973 and 1974. Summer sessions start in June and July.

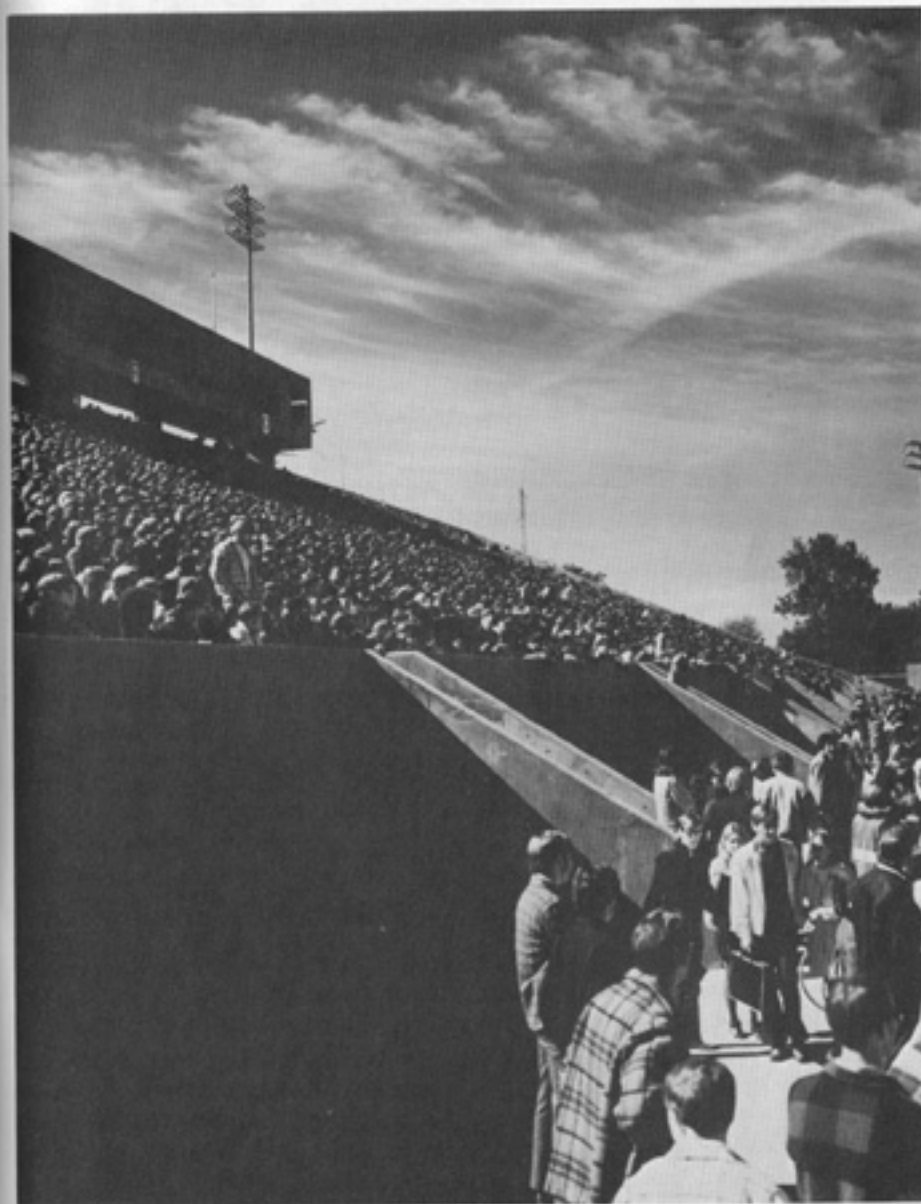


Indiana's tradition as a racing state is borne out by ISU's Homecoming trike race.

As of September, the Terre Haute campus had a regular faculty of 784 with 60 of this number on the Laboratory School faculty and 33 on the library staff. The Evansville campus had a faculty of 87. The Terre Haute campus had about 1,350 other employees including administrative, supervisory, and non-academic staff members.

In Terre Haute, the University has a main campus of 91 acres with more than 60 buildings adjoining the city. In all, 441.35 acres serve the University in Terre Haute.

The Terre Haute main campus, besides the many academic buildings, has such structures as the one-million volume Cunningham Memorial Library, a Laboratory School, 17 residence halls (capacity about 6,100), the Administration Building, Alumni Center, Condit House-President's Residence, Tiley Memorial Union, Hulman Center, Student Health and Counseling Center, two bookstores, and a senior women's housing unit.

Located beneath the south stands of Memorial Stadium is the 200 Club Room. There is no college or university the size of ISU (and few larger institutions) that have such a smartly decorated building.

INDIANA STATE UNIVERSITY'S 200 CLUB

Indiana State University's 200 Club began with a nucleus of 35 people and about 100 fans became involved during Gordon Chalmers' first few years here.

But since ISU proposed and constructed its 200 Club facility beneath Memorial Stadium, membership has jumped to over 250 fans, and the club will hopefully hit the 350 mark soon.

The purpose of the facility is to give the fans who support ISU's grant-in-aid program a "classy" meeting area. Club members are doing more than just donating money. They're getting their money's worth, and more.

For \$200 annually members receive two football and two basketball season tickets and parking privileges for both sports.

Stadium seating for football games is on the 50-yard line. Last season there were 440 chairback seats and 180 more have been added for this year. All are beneath the stadium's lengthy press box, which provides a natural shelter from inclement weather.

All are serviced by an elevator (with a capacity of 20) which brings passengers to or takes them from the 200 Club's ground-level entrance.

The subterranean structure—which has a normal football game capacity of 300 and a "sitdown dinner" capacity of 125—is a popular meeting place for women fans during late fall football Saturdays. There

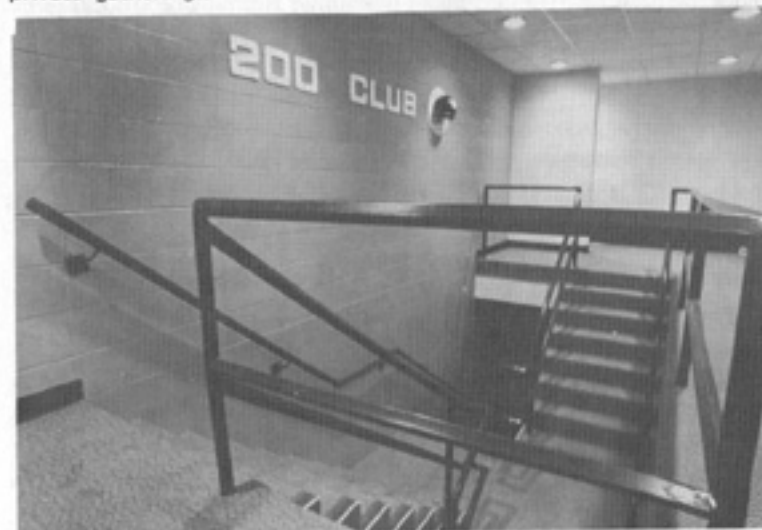


Topside is spirited gridiron action on a crisp autumn afternoon—provided by Indiana State University football.

also is a strong possibility of the future installation of closed circuit television.

The wall-to-wall red carpeted room is not only unique—it's quite flexible. Adjoined by a furniture storage area, it is equipped with a 27-ton air conditioner that keeps room temperature at a constant level. The smartly decorated room also has a concession stand and rest rooms.

There is plenty of use for the building after the football season has ended, too, since it is open for both athletic and non-athletic university functions. In addition, 200 Club members may rent the room for private gatherings.

MEMORIAL STADIUM

This is the fourth season that Indiana State University is playing in Memorial Stadium as it now stands. Prior to the 1970 season, a horseshoe-type baseball stand stood in the place where the 13,000-seat grandstand is now standing.

The old stand and press box were razed at the completion of the 1969 schedule and the completely modern grandstand (with a new press box and 200 Club facilities) and dressing rooms at the west end of the field were constructed.

This completed Phase Two of a three-phase renovation project which began six years ago with the installation of the world's first outdoor and university-owned AstroTurf playing field.

Phase One of the renovation project, completed in the summer of 1967, included the reorientation of the field from a northerly-southerly direction to the easterly-westerly line; installation of the AstroTurf, and the erection of 4,500 bleacher seats on the north side of the field. Another addition of bleacher seats was made on the north side in 1968, bringing the seating capacity to 13,500. The completion of Phase Two brought the current seating capacity to 20,500.

Phase Three, the ultimate development under present planning, calls for another grandstand on the north side of the field and would bring the total stadium seating capacity to approximately 26,000.

The stadium was acquired by the university in 1967 and at that time was used for both football and baseball. Since the installation of the synthetic playing surface, however, the field has been used only for football and an occasional soccer game.

ASTROTURF

AstroTurf, the playing surface at Indiana State's Memorial Stadium, is much similar to that used in Houston's famed Astrodome.

Indiana State was the first university in the world to own and make outdoor application of a field of this type. The Sycamores' home game against Eastern Illinois September 16, 1967, was the first football game ever played on AstroTurf out-of-doors. By the way, it helped—as we romped to a 41-6 victory over the Panthers.

One plus factor for the synthetic field is its durability. In addition to all home games being played on the "mod sod," ISU gridders hold all their practice sessions on it.

GORDON H. CHALMERS DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Gordon Chalmers became Director of Athletics at Indiana State in June, 1967, coming from Iowa State University, where he had been Director of Athletics and head of Physical Education since 1959.

Prior to that, he had been Assistant AD at the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, N.Y., from 1952-58, and swimming coach there from 1946 until his acceptance of the top position at Iowa State.

Under Chalmers' direction at Iowa State, two seating additions and a pressbox were added to the football stadium, a new \$1.6-million physical education building was built, and tennis courts, practice football fields and outdoor basketball courts were added to the facilities.

He designed the Ames, Iowa, community indoor swimming pool and assisted Miami University (Ohio) in the building of a pool. He also has aided other colleges and universities in designing new athletic facilities for their campuses.

A former national collegiate swimming champion and a member of the 1932 U.S. Olympic swimming team, "Slim" captained the varsity swimming team at his alma mater, Franklin & Marshall ('35) in Lancaster, Pa., and also was a varsity soccer and baseball player there.

His coaching career began in 1940 as head swimming coach at Lafayette College and the following year at Lehigh University. He served as an athletic officer during World War II, and was honorably discharged as a Lieutenant Commander.

Nationally known and respected, Chalmers is on the Board of Directors of the U.S. Olympic Committee and is a member of the NCAA Gymnastics Rules Committee, Swimming Hall of Fame Committee, chairman of the NCAA high school all-star games committee and President of the U.S. Gymnastics Federation. He also was one of the first Executive Committee members of NACDA (National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics) and is a past president of the College Swimming Coaches Association.

**JERRY HUNTSMAN
ASSISTANT
ATHLETIC DIRECTOR**

Jerry Huntsman exited from the football coaching profession a winner. Following a 7-3 campaign in 1972, Huntsman was elevated to assistant athletic director last winter after seven years as head coach of the Sycamores. His seven-year mark here was 43-24-1 (.639).

Prior to coming to ISU as back-field coach in 1965, Jerry guided Earlham College to a 29-3 record in four years. His 1962 team was

undefeated. Huntsman's Indiana high school coaching experience was gained at Waveland, Covington, Crawfordsville and Huntington. His final coaching record was 105-39-4 (.723).

A native of Richmond, Ind., and a 1952 graduate of Wabash College, Huntsman earned a master's degree from Purdue in '58. As a quarterback at Wabash he was named an all-state small college gridder in 1951.

Jerry and his wife, Coralee, have three sons—Brent, 16, Jerry, 14, and Scott, 11.

FACULTY ATHLETIC COMMITTEE

Indiana State's Faculty Athletic Committee is responsible for some areas of athletic policy at the university, and from the committee a representative will be chosen who will represent ISU at the NCAA convention.

Chairman of the committee for the 1973-74 school year is Dr. John C. Jessell, director of the division of guidance and counseling.

Other members are J. Kenneth Moulton, vice president for business affairs; Dr. John W. Truitt, vice president for student affairs; Dr. Howard Richardson, dean of the School of HPER; Gordon Chalmers, athletic director; Dale McKee, director of alumni affairs; Dr. William R. Osmon, dean of student administrative services; Carl E. Parks, executive director of the ISU Foundation; Paul Steward, associate director of student financial aids; Dr. Clarence E. Vincent, chairman of the department of marketing; Dr. Larry R. Bruce, assistant professor of science education; Dr. Levon E. Garrison, professor of women's physical education; Susanne Pernice, assistant professor of women's physical education; Dr. Marcus E. Riedel, chairman of the department of philosophy; Dr. Curtis R. Osburn, associate professor of elementary education, and Student Government Association President Gary Coffman.

**TOM HARP
HEAD FOOTBALL COACH**

Tom Harp is in his initial year at the helm of the Indiana State football program.

An offensive assistant under Rick Forzano at Navy last season, Harp accepted the head coaching job at ISU late last February.

A head coaching post is nothing new to the 45-year-old Harp. He has held that position in 15 of his 21 years of coaching.

He was head man at Duke from 1966 through 1970, following five campaigns at Cornell (1961-65).

Harp, who played football for Sid Gillman at Miami of Ohio for one season (1945), was graduated cum laude from Muskingum (Ohio) College in 1951. While there, he played for coach Ed Sherman and quarterbacked the school to a pair of Ohio Conference titles (1949 and 1950).

His coaching experience dates back to 1951 when he became head coach at Carrollton (Ohio) High School. After three seasons, he moved to a similar post at prestigious Massillon (Ohio) High School. In two seasons there he won the Ohio prep championship in 1954 and was state runnerup in 1955.

He moved to the collegiate coaching ranks the following season, becoming backfield coach and chief scout for Earl (Red) Blaik at Army. During his five seasons at West Point, Army's 1958 club was unbeaten, ranked third nationally and produced Heisman Trophy winner Pete Dawkins.

Tapped as Cornell mentor in '61, Harp's Big Red teams produced three Ivy League rushing leaders in five years. Appointed head coach at Duke in '66, he led the Blue Devils to a 5-5 season and a 41-25 victory over arch-rival North Carolina in his first year. His last squad at the Durham school finished second in the ACC.

The Barnesville, Ohio, native was out of coaching for a year between Duke and the Naval Academy. He sold insurance and reported sports on a Durham, N.C., television station in 1971.

Harp, who brings with him a high-scoring multiple-I offense, has a career coaching mark of 79-59-6. He replaces Jerry Huntsman, who was elevated to assistant athletic director after guiding the Sycamores to a 43-24-1 mark in seven years.

BILL DOLE
OFFENSIVE LINE COACH

Bill Dole is in his first season as offensive line coach at Indiana State. He came here last spring from North Carolina, where he had been a graduate assistant for two years and last year served as an assistant coach.

A 1964 graduate of Davidson, where he was an outstanding offensive and defensive tackle, Dole received a military commission following college and spent six years as a captain in the U.S. Army before being released from active duty in July, 1970.

The 31-year-old Dole, who holds a master's degree in communication, is a product of a coaching family. His late father, Bill Sr., was head grid coach at East Carolina and Davidson.

Dole is married to the former Kathleen Cole.

BOB PYCHINKA
DEFENSIVE LINE COACH

Bob Pychinka, a 1968 Indiana State graduate and one of the best athletes ever to attend the university, is in his fourth year as a member of the Sycamore coaching staff.

"Chico" won three letters in football, starring at linebacker, and twice was named to the Indiana Collegiate Conference all-star team. He also was an outstanding wrestler, winning three conference mat titles.

Pychinka, who coached the 1970 and 1971 freshman football teams to a combined record of 6-2, is the I-State defensive line coach.

Prior to becoming a member of the ISU staff, he served as assistant football and assistant wrestling coach at Calumet High School, and in 1969 his frosh team compiled a 5-2-1 record.

Pychinka is the only single coach on the ISU football staff.

GENE STAUBER
DEFENSE COACH

Gene Stauber, in his third season at Indiana State, is the defensive coordinator who basically works with linebackers and defensive ends.

Stauber joined the ISU staff after 11 campaigns as an assistant coach at the University of Illinois.

An Indianapolis native and graduate of Shortridge High there, he played college football at Toledo.

After 1947 graduation from Toledo, he remained there to coach freshman football and varsity baseball for four years. He earned a master's degree in 1951 at the University of Michigan, where he also helped coach.

Stauber coached at Stetson, Delaware, Idaho, Nebraska and California during the next nine seasons. While he was at California, the Golden Bears appeared in the 1959 Rose Bowl.

Gene and his wife, Eileen, have a 20-year-old daughter, Susan, and an 18-year-old son, Rory.

VERBIE WALDER
OFFENSIVE BACK COACH

Verbie Walder, probably the best quarterback in ISU history, is in his second year as the school's offensive backfield coach.

He led the Sycamores to their best record ever—9-1 in 1968—after transferring from Sacramento Junior College, then piloted ISU to a 6-3-1 mark in 1970.

The scrambler from Dayton was selected the team's MVP both years, the only Indiana State gridder to win two such awards. He currently holds four offensive records at ISU.

Before returning to Indiana State, Walder was receiver coach at Ball State for a season, following an assistant coaching job at Fort Wayne North High School.

Walder and his wife, Denise, have a three-year-old daughter, Shaun.

BOB WARREN
DEFENSIVE BACKFIELD COACH

Newest member of the Sycamore coaching staff is Bob Warren, who arrived in late March. Warren, who is defensive backfield coach, came here from Heidelberg College at Tiffin, Ohio, where he was defensive coordinator since 1969.

While at Heidelberg—his alma mater ('54)—the Student Princes won their last 13 games, including an 11-0 season last fall and a victorious appearance in the Stagg Bowl.

A native of Mt. Cory, Ohio, Warren spent two years in the Army before embarking on his coaching career. In 1964, after eight years of high school coaching at three Buckeye schools—Arcadia, Clyde and Paulding—he moved to Bluffton (Ohio) College as assistant coach. From '67 through '69 he was head coach at Bluffton, then went to Heidelberg.

Warren, 40, earned a master's degree from Bowling Green and a director's degree from Indiana. He was also track coach at Heidelberg.

He and his wife, Joan (pronounced Jo Ann), have three daughters—Jean, 15, and twins Carol and Cathy, 13—and one son, Richie, 8.

JOHN WOLF
EQUIPMENT MANAGER

John Wolf is in his eighth year as athletic equipment manager at Indiana State. He joined the university staff in June, 1966, after industrial supply stints with the Columbia Record Club and the Allis-Chalmers Company.

A native of Terre Haute, Wolf is a graduate of Wiley High School and attended ISU for two years following his honorable discharge from the U.S. Army in 1946.

ED McKEE
SPORTS INFORMATION
DIRECTOR

Having survived the "sophomore jinx," Ed McKee is back for his third year as SID at Indiana State.

McKee joined the Sycamore staff in June, 1971, after having worked for Goodyear's corporate public relations department in Akron, O., for three years. He also was a part-time sportswriter for the Akron BEACON JOURNAL in 1970-71.

A native of St. Louis and a graduate of Rockhurst College in Kansas City, Mo., he played two seasons of AAU basketball with the Akron Goodyears before settling down to his full-time PR post there.

The SID post at Terre Haute has been a homecoming of sorts for the 6-8 former center, who was selected by the Indiana Pacers in the ABA's first draft in 1967.

A member of the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA), the U.S. Basketball Writers Association and the Football Writers Association of America (FWAA), McKee is also an ex-jock.

INDIANA STATE FOOTBALL '73 OUTLOOK

New head coach Tom Harp inherits a young team in 1973, but hopefully one that can continue the winning streak started by the 1972 Sycamores, who won their last five games for a 7-3 mark.

Harp, who took over in March after former ISU mentor Jerry Huntsman stepped up to the post of assistant athletic director, will install a new multiple-I offense and has switched several players to different positions to help make that offense click.

ISU will use basically the same multiple defensive setup that was used in the past two seasons, and there's more experience on this unit than on the attacking side.

New Offense

The new offense will need a good quarterback to run it, and that position was still up for grabs when the Sycamores returned for fall drills. Junior John Griggs, who saw little action in 1972, had a slight edge over senior Mike Smutney, and sophomores Brad Smrcina and Mike Sotak could still sneak into the picture. Fortunately, though, the spring game showed that all four seem capable of leading the team.

Quality runners are available, although State might not have the depth it has enjoyed in past seasons. Sophs Rip Warren and Ernie Hauser had good springs while letterman Ken Monroe was injured, so they ranked ahead of him at tailback after spring practice. Veteran Tom Lenz has been switched to fullback, where he has the edge over steady Mark McIntosh and bullish Ray Gessler.

Good receivers are available too, and the Sycamores appear more likely to utilize their talents this season. Glenn Damato is a possible high professional draft choice at split end, where he's caught 53 passes in two seasons with running teams. Mark Maley is a dependable blocker at tight end, and slender flanker Larry Brumfield is probably ISU's fastest and quickest player. John Yogan and Rick Carr back up Damato, with Randy Reeser behind Brumfield and Dennis Haygood and Tom Herold subbing for Maley.

Turner Seems Set

Only junior guard Steve Turner seems set on the offensive line. Junior John Brewer had a good sophomore year at both guard and tackle, and has been tentatively switched to center for this fall. He'll probably be in the lineup somewhere.

Sophomore Pete Totin is a probable starter opposite Turner, with converted defensive linemen Jay Berk and Ed Riddle given the first crack at the tackle positions. Also in the picture are converted

linebacker Dave Bundalo and letterman Tom Brantner at center, converted defenders Chris Hicks and Ray Kennedy at guard and walk-on Mike Cocanower, former defensive lineman Bob Steiner and junior Ed Foy at tackle.

Co-captain Dike Dastillung will spearhead the defense from the middle linebacker post he's held since midway through his sophomore year, and he's likely to be surrounded by four other returning starters and three other lettermen.

Junior Steve Stanfield was too good to be kept out of the lineup last year, and now he'll be expected to be the leader of the defensive line from his left tackle post. The Matyas twins, Mike and Martin, will man the right side of the line after lettering in reserve roles last year and Mike Keglovits, who missed his sophomore season with an injury, is the tentative starter next to Stanfield. Five sophs—Pat Teefey, Chuck Williams, Mike Sharkey, Jim Myers and Bob Radzis—are in reserve.

Williams Switched

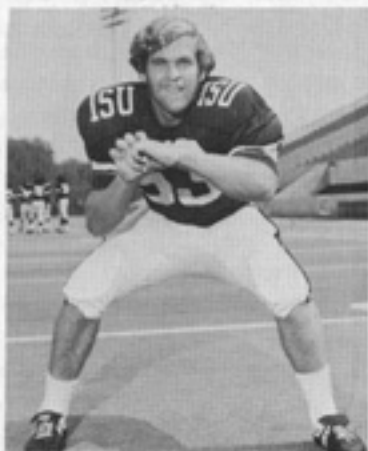
Jerry Williams, another soph standout last year, has been switched to rover and letterman Dave Clark will take over at weakside end. Transfer Elmer Olson will replace his former high school teammate, All-America John Karaszia, at monster linebacker. Reserves at these spots include letterman Howard Holmes and sophs Chuck Drewry, Kirk Kusmiz and Ron Fullman, while seniors Brian Hebert and Bob Proctor will relieve Dastillung.

Injuries have muddled the secondary outlook, but Ron Kennedy seems set at left cornerback and Rick Murphy is the probable safety. Sophomore Jim Piepenbrink gets the first chance at right cornerback, but lettermen Joe Cougill and Joe Koval and sophomore Stan Garrard were injured during the spring and could create some changes if healthy.

Specialty squads should be strong in 1973. Murphy led all collegiate kickoff returners in 1972 with a 32.1-yard average, and has a good shot at the all-time College Division record for return yardage. Damato and Lenz are seasoned as punter and placekicker, respectively, and Warren and Brumfield could add speed to the return units.

New additions to the coaching staff, in addition to Harp, are Bill Dole (Davidson '64), a former aide at the University of North Carolina, who will be coaching the offensive line, and Bob Warren (Heidelberg '54), former defensive coordinator at his alma mater, who'll be defensive backfield coach. They join returning assistant coaches Bob Pychinka (fourth year), Gene Stauber (third year) and Verbie Walder (second year).

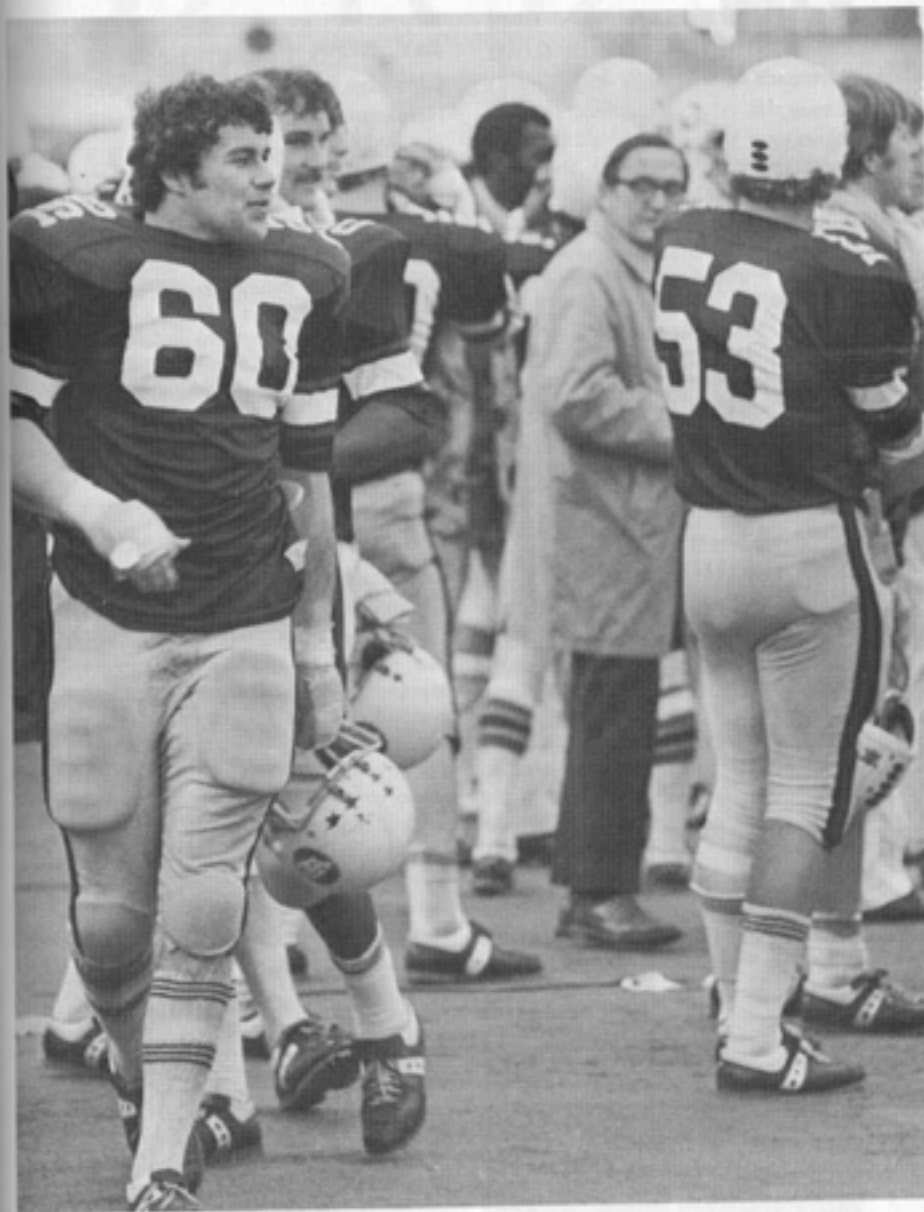

WHY SYCAMORES



The name "Sycamores" was adopted by a student body general election in 1921. A contest was started that year for a school name to be selected on Blue and White Day, a forerunner to Homecoming. The names were to be submitted to a committee of four, with that group's top three choices being placed before the student body in a campus-wide election. The name Sycamores was among the three submitted. Although it was roundly booed when placed on the ballot the students, in an apparent joke, gave the name a one-sided victory in the election. The winner of the contest received \$3 as first prize for his entry. The name was first used January 3, 1922, in the Normal Advance, predecessor of The Statesman, present campus newspaper.

BOB ADAMSON MEMORIAL AWARD

(ISU Football's Most Valuable Player)

The Bob Adamson Memorial Award is given annually to the Most Valuable varsity football player. The award is named in honor of the late Bob Adamson, an outstanding basketball player at Terre Haute's Wiley High School, a member of the Indiana State Varsity Club, a Sycamore booster and an avid sports fan. The award was started in 1967 and has been made an annual presentation at the All Sports Banquet every spring. Winners of the award are listed below.

1967—**Rich Attonito**, a senior defensive halfback from Jamaica Estates, N.Y., was the first winner of the award. Rich, who played with his twin brother, Bob, was a two-year regular in the defensive secondary and led the squad in interceptions his senior year.

1968—**Verbie Walder**, junior quarterback from Dayton, Ohio, directed the Sycamores to nine victories in 10 games, the best record in the school's 55-year grid history.

1969—**Verbie Walder**, '68 winner, and **Mike Russell**, senior safety from Seymour, tied for the award. As a senior co-captain, Walder led ISU to a 6-3-1 mark, despite playing much of the campaign with an injured shoulder. Russell, a three-year starter, holds ISU's career pass interception mark with 17. Named the squad's top defender in '69, he also was a leading punt returner.

1970—**Jesse Ealy**, senior fullback from Indianapolis Tech, and **Kent Manwaring**, senior defensive tackle, tied for the award. A three-year letterman, Ealy played backup to Jim Brumfield, ISU's all-time rushing leader, for two years before getting a real shot at a starting berth. He really came through in his senior year. Manwaring, senior co-captain from Opp, Ala., started 30 consecutive games in three varsity seasons, and was considered one of Coach Huntsman's finest linemen ever.

1971—**Doug Garrard**, senior cornerback from Avon High School, was presented with the 1971 Most Valuable Player award. A three-year letterman, the 5-8, 185-pounder led Sycamore grid defenders in 1971 with 39 unassisted tackles, three of which were for losses, and 11 passes broken up. He also assisted on 47 tackles, intercepted two passes and recovered one fumble.

1972 AWARD WINNERS

BOB ADAMSON MVP AWARD

Willie Lee, senior fullback from South Bend Riley, was named the 1972 MVP after a record-breaking season. The 6-1, 190-pounder set school records for yards rushing (957), points (78) and touchdowns (13), led Indiana collegiate scorers and was the key as ISU's wishbone offense set a school rushing mark. The Sycamores finished the season with a 7-3 mark, winning their last five games and narrowly missing an invitation to the Boardwalk Bowl. Lee was a 12th-round draft choice of the Pittsburgh Steelers of the NFL, but signed instead with the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the CFL.



THREE ALL-AMERICAS IN '72

Indiana State, for the second year in a row, produced three NCAA College Division All-Americans. **Bob Poss**, who earned honorable mention in 1971, was named second team Associated Press offensive guard. Fullback **Willie Lee** and monster linebacker **John Karaszia** were named honorable mention by AP. **Karaszia**, along with **Poss** and middle linebacker **Jim Shaughnessy**, earned the same honor in '71.

MURPHY LEADS THE NATION

Junior safety **Rick Murphy** returned 22 kickoffs for 707 yards in 1972, a 32.1-yard average that led all NCAA return specialists. Murphy, who took over return duties midway through his sophomore season, has a two-season total of 1,144 yards and needs 698 yards this year to become the all-time NCAA leader. Surprisingly, Murphy hasn't returned a kickoff for a touchdown since a freshman game at Illinois State, although his 84-yard sprint set up the winning score at Eastern Illinois last year (since he caught the ball in the end zone, that return was actually closer to 90 yards).
