SYCAMORE FOOTBALL "MAJOR" IN 1976

Indiana State University's football team, which rose to both wire services' Division II Top Ten last fall (see below) before falling upon hard times, is competing as a "small college" for the final time in '75.

Hoping to go out high in the rankings this fall, it will be easier said than done with a schedule such as the Sycamores are playing.

In any case, the Sycamores' major football status in September, 1976, will make all 10 intercollegiate sports at ISU Division 1.

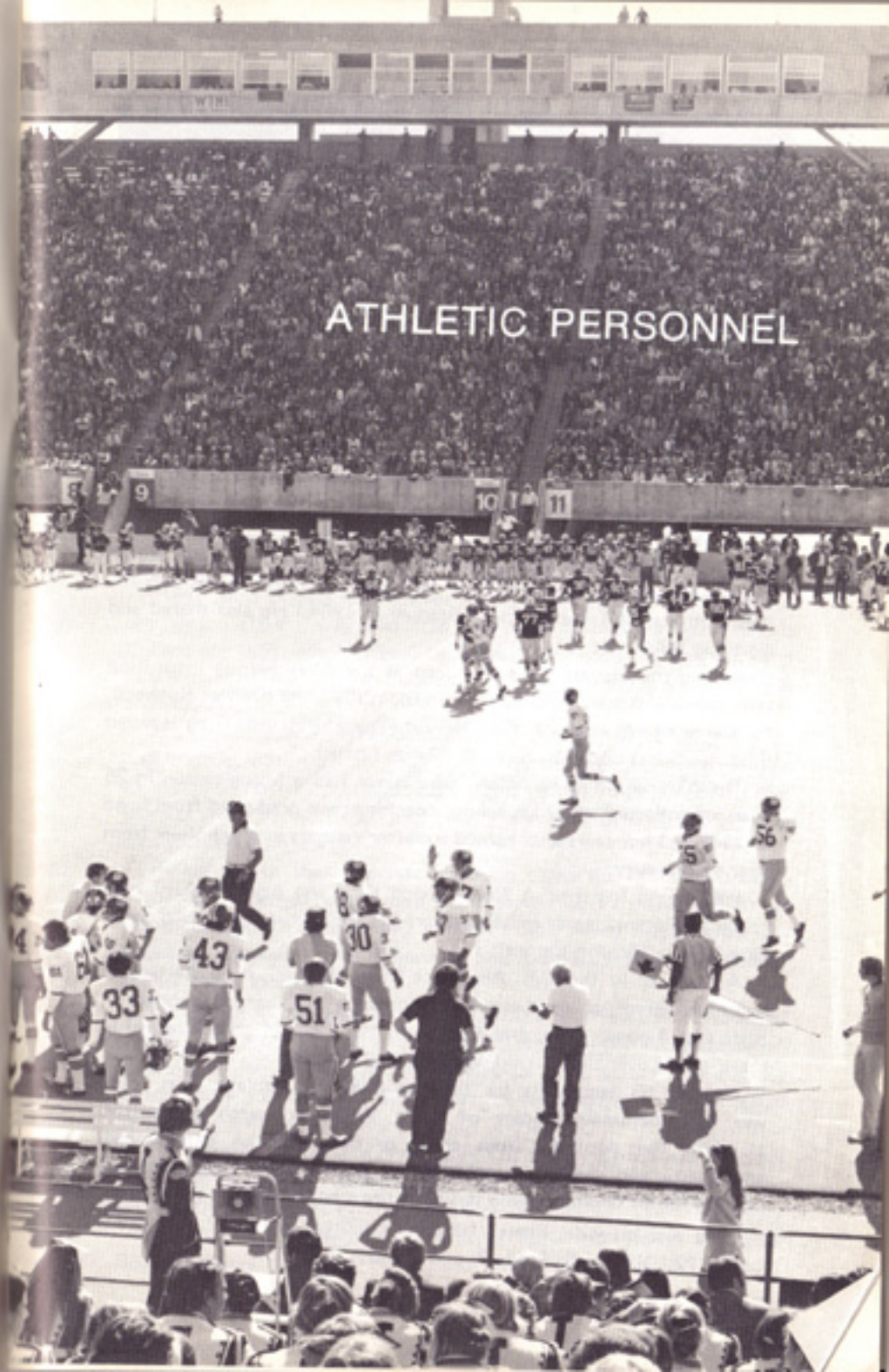

Bob King

**BOB KING
DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS
BASKETBALL COACH**

Bob King is in his second year as director of athletics and first as basketball coach at Indiana State University.

Before moving here in the spring of 1974, King had been at the University of New Mexico for 12 years, the last two as associate athletic director.

His primary notoriety at UNM, though, came between 1962 and

'72 when he served as Lobo basketball coach. His 10-year record was 175-89 (.663).

During that decade at New Mexico, four of his clubs went on to post-season activity—three NITs in New York and one NCAA playoff. (His club was NIT runnerup to Bradley in 1964.) He also shared and won one WAC title.

Among the players King produced at the Albuquerque institution were pros Mel Daniels (Memphis Sounds), Willie Long (Denver Rockets), Ira Harge (ABA veteran), Ron Nelson (The Floridians), Greg Howard (Phoenix Suns) and Ron Sanford (Dallas Chaps).

The 51-year-old Iowa native, who never had a losing season in 25 years of collegiate and high school coaching, was graduated from Iowa in 1947 and ten years later earned a master's degree in psychology from Drake University.

Previous to his stint at New Mexico King was head assistant cage coach at his alma mater for three years ('59-62), where he helped coach Don Nelson (Boston Celtics).

An officer in the U.S. Air Force from 1943-46, King started his coaching career at the prep level, spending 13 years at schools at Britt and Algona, Iowa, and Rockford, Ill. His high school record in three sports over that period was 363-124 (.745).

One of 55 applicants for the top Sycamore athletic post, King was the unanimous choice of ISU's 10-person search committee, a group that looked "from coast to coast for an experienced, enthusiastic and highly respected athletic administrator." He succeeded Gordon (Slim) Chalmers, who served as the school's AD for seven years.

King and his wife, Sharel, have six children: Chris, 27; Gary, 23; Larry, 22; Dianne, 5; Brad, 3; and Randy, 1.

**TOM HARP
HEAD FOOTBALL COACH**

Tom Harp is in his 18th season as a head coach, and third at the helm of the Indiana State University program.

His club ranked seventh nationally (AP poll) after the first month last season, Harp's Sycamores have a 9-12 record during his first two seasons, with campaigns of 4-7 and 5-5.

Harp, an effervescent 47, has been a head coach 17 of his previous 23 seasons. Besides a year here, he was head man at Duke from 1966 through 1970, following five campaigns at Cornell (1961-65). His last assistant post was at Navy in 1972, and his career record is 88-71-6.

Harp, who played football for Sid Gillman at Miami of Ohio for one season (1945), was graduated cum laude from Muskingum (Ohio) College in 1951. While there, he played for coach Ed Sherman and quarterbacked the school to a pair of Ohio Conference titles (1949 and 1950).

His coaching experience dates back to 1951 when he became head coach at Carrollton (Ohio) High School. After three seasons, he moved to a similar post at prestigious Massillon (Ohio) High School. In two seasons there he won the Ohio prep championship in 1954 and was state runnerup in 1955.

He moved to the collegiate coaching ranks the following season, becoming backfield coach and chief scout for Earl (Red) Blaik at Army. During his five seasons at West Point, Army's 1958 club was unbeaten, ranked third nationally and produced Heisman Trophy winner Pete Dawkins.

Tapped as Cornell mentor in '61, Harp's Big Red teams produced three Ivy League rushing leaders in five years. Appointed head coach at Duke in '66, he led the Blue Devils to a 5-5 season and a 41-25 victory over arch-rival North Carolina in his first year. His last squad at the Durham school finished second in the ACC.

The Barnesville, Ohio, native was out of coaching for a year between Duke and the Naval Academy. He sold insurance and reported sports on a Durham, N.C., television station in 1971.

Harp has three daughters, Marcey, Peggy and Molly. His wife, Barbara, has a daughter, Betsy, and a son, Cam.

**GENE STAUBER
DEFENSE COACH**

Gene Stauber, in his fifth season at Indiana State, is the defensive coordinator who basically works with linebackers and defensive ends.

Stauber joined the ISU staff after 11 campaigns as an assistant coach at the University of Illinois.

An Indianapolis native and graduate of Shortridge High there, he played college football at Toledo.

After 1947 graduation from Tol-

edo, he remained there to coach freshman football and varsity baseball for four years. He earned a master's degree in 1951 at the University of Michigan, where he also helped coach.

Stauber coached at Stetson, Delaware, Idaho, Nebraska and California during the next nine seasons. While he was at California, the Golden Bears appeared in the 1959 Rose Bowl.

Gene and his wife, Eileen, have a 22-year-old daughter, Susan, and a 20-year-old son, Rory.

**BOB PYCHINKA
DEFENSIVE LINE COACH**

Bob Pychinka, a 1968 Indiana State graduate and one of the best athletes ever to attend the university, is in his sixth year as a member of the Sycamore grid staff.

"Chico" won three letters in football, starring at linebacker, and twice was named to the Indiana Collegiate Conference all-star team. He also was an outstanding wrestler, winning three conference mat titles.

Pychinka, who coached the 1970 and 1971 freshman football teams to a combined record of 6-2, is the I-State defensive line coach.

Prior to becoming a member of the ISU staff, he served as assistant football and assistant wrestling coach at Calumet High School, and in 1969 his frosh team compiled a 5-2-1 record.

The 30-year-old Allentown, Pa., native is single.



**BILL DOLE
OFFENSIVE LINE COACH**

Bill Dole is in his third season as offensive line coach at ISU. He came here in 1973 from North Carolina, where he had been a graduate assistant for two years and in 1972 served as an assistant coach.

A 1964 graduate of Davidson, where he was an outstanding offensive and defensive tackle, Dole received a military commission following college and spent six years as a captain in the U.S. Army before being released from active duty in July, 1970.

The 33-year-old Dole, who holds a master's degree in communication, is a product of a coaching family. His late father, Bill Sr., was head grid coach at East Carolina and Davidson.

Dole is married to the former Kathy Cole, who also is employed by the university.

**BOB WARREN
DEFENSIVE BACK COACH**

Bob Warren, defensive backfield coach, is in his third year as a member of the ISU staff.

The 41-year-old coach came here in 1973 from Heidelberg College at Tiffin, Ohio, where he had been defensive coordinator since 1969.

While at Heidelberg—his alma mater ('54)—the Student Princes won their last 13 games, including an 11-0 1972 season and a victorious appearance in the Stagg Bowl.

The Mt. Cory, Ohio, native spent eight years at Arcadia, Clyde and Paulding High Schools before moving to Bluffton College as assistant coach. He was head coach there from 1967-69, then went to Heidelberg.

Also track coach at Heidelberg, Warren and his wife, Joan, have four children—Jean, 17, twins Carol and Cathy, 15, and Richie, 10.

BOB TURNER OFFENSIVE BACK COACH

Bob Turner, who starred in Indiana State's defensive backfield for three seasons, is in his first year as ISU's backfield coach.

A '72 graduate, Turner tied a Sycamore record by intercepting nine passes during his sophomore year, and picked off a total of 16 aeriels for 219 yards in three campaigns. He also returned 22 punts for 250 yards and a TD during his career.

Before joining the staff at his alma mater, Turner was assistant football and basketball coach at Kokomo Haworth for three years ('73-75).

The 26-year-old East Chicago Washington product is married to the former Sheryl Oliver.

DR. R. S. ROGERS Team Physician

Dr. Shirrell Rogers is in his ninth season as ISU athletic and staff physician.

Rogers attended Franklin College and Mississippi before being graduated from the Medical University of South Carolina in 1942.

"Doc" was in private practice in West Terre Haute from 1954 through 1966 before joining the Sycamore staff.

He and his wife, Virginia, have five children.

JIM KEISTER Senior Student Manager

Jim Keister, an important part of the Indiana State football operation, is in his fourth year as student manager of Sycamore grid team.

Keister, who hails from Plymouth, is an elementary education major at ISU. The 21-year-old bachelor hopes to land a grade school teaching position next year and possibly combine it with a football coaching job at the junior high level.

JERRY HUNTSMAN ASSISTANT ATHLETIC DIRECTOR

Jerry Huntsman, who left the football coaching profession a winner (7-3) in 1972, is assistant athletic director, and served as acting director of athletics prior to the arrival of Bob King.

Huntsman, whose seven-year record here was 43-24-1 (.639), is in his third campaign as an athletic

administrator. Prior to coming to ISU as backfield coach in 1965, Jerry guided Earlham College to 29 victories in 32 games through four seasons. (His 1962 club was undefeated.) His prep coaching experience was gained at Waveland, Covington, Crawfordsville and Huntington and his final coaching mark was 105-39-4 (.723).

A native of Richmond, Ind., and a 1952 graduate of Wabash College, Huntsman earned a master's degree from Purdue in 1958. As a quarterback at Wabash he was named an all-state small college griddier in 1951.

Jerry and his wife, Coralee, have three sons--Brent, 18, Jerry, 16, and Scott, 13.

FACULTY ATHLETIC COMMITTEE

Indiana State's Faculty Athletic Committee is responsible for some areas of athletic policy, and from this group comes an ISU representative to the annual NCAA convention.

Mel Blickenstaff joined the Indiana State University staff 14 years ago as athletic trainer and has been an invaluable help to the Sycamores' athletic program.

His previous experience includes nine years of service as a coach in Northern Indiana high schools, three years as a physical reconditioning instructor in the Air Force hospitals during World War II, and eleven years as athletic trainer at Colum-

bus (Ind.) High School.

"Blick," as he is known by I-State athletes and coaches, earned his bachelor of science degree at Manchester College in 1938, his master of science degree at Indiana University in 1947 and has specialized in instructions in physical education and athletic training at Indiana.

Mel and his wife, Mary, have three grown sons--Jim, John, and Bill.

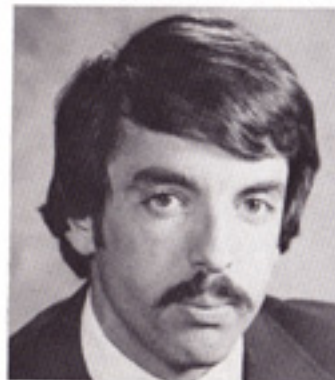
**JOE MacISAAC

'75 OUTLOOK AND PLAYER PROFILES

INDIANA STATE FOOTBALL '75 OUTLOOK

If one player made a football team successful, Indiana State University's grid prospects for 1975 certainly would be to knock 'em dead this fall.

But--although ISU has Vincent Allen, one of the top runningbacks in the nation--the Sycamores are no cinch to win all 10 games.

Not that head coach Tom Harp, Allen and his Terre Haute teammates won't be trying. Indeed they will--against what Harp terms "the most difficult schedule the school has ever faced."

Foes include two Missouri Valley Conference schools--including MVC champ Tulsa, three Mid-American Conference institutions and NCAA Division II runnerup Delaware. Other opponents include Dayton, a major independent, and Akron, a consistent Division II stalwart.

And while a number of important figures from last year's 5-5 squad are gone, 31 lettermen return, including eight offensive starters and seven defensive first teamers.

The list of returnees is headed by junior tailback Vincent Allen (5-8, 175), an Associated Press second team All-America as a sophomore. Allen holds six school rushing and total offense marks (largely on the strength of 14 consecutive 100 yard games over two seasons.)

Harp, entering his third campaign with the Sycamores, says his '75 club probably will add several variations to his year's offense so as to utilize a pair of quick quarterback returnees. Soph Greg Washington (6-0, 170) showed signs of brilliance as a replacement for injured Mike Sotak (6-0, 175 jr.) last year. Washington and Sotak will battle for the starting job.

Pile driver Mel Burks (6-2, 220 sr.) saw extensive action at fullback last year and will get the first shot at the spot vacated by St. Louis Cardinal draftee Ken Monroe.

Senior Rick Carr (5-11, 185), who had 22 receptions for 435 yards, is back at split end position, with a pair of seasoned veterans, Rip Warren (6-0, 180 sr.) and Ernie Hauser (5-8, 175 sr.) set at flanker. Junior Dennis Wilkerson (6-2, 210) and soph Jim Kapitan (6-4, 215) both figure in the club's tight end plans.

The hub of the offensive line returns with junior Ron Carpenter (6-4, 220) at center and co-captain starter Chris Hicks (6-5, 250 sr.) at guard and Doug Miller (6-1, 235 jr.) at tackle.

Harp says one of his top priorities is replacing his graduated guards (John Brewer and Steve Turner), and lists four prime candidates for the two positions: Tony Suriano (5-11, 234 so.), Pete Totin (6-0, 230 sr.), Pete Pokrajac (6-2, 235 jr.) and junior college transfer Larry Fitz-

gerald (6-1, 265 jr.).

Defensively, Sycamore linemen will combat lost quickness with more size, and, again, a good crop of returnees. Four senior interior linemen started at one time or another last season--Jim Myers (6-4, 230); Bob Radzis (6-4, 228); Mike Sharkey (6-3, 222); and co-captain Pat Teefey (6-2, 200). Seniors Ed Riddle (6-2, 260) and Leonard Sanderson (6-3, 230) also saw extensive action a year ago.

Another priority lies in the replacement of both ends and a pair of linebackers. Veteran Kirk Kusmiz (6-2, 210 jr.) should be a weakside end with Chuck Drewry (5-11, 200 jr.), Jim Novakovich (6-0, 215 jr.), and specialty team leader Marty Murray (6-2, 220 so.) likely to fit in somewhere.

The Sycamore secondary, which allowed the long pass too many times to please Harp last season, returns with added depth. Senior safety Larry Brumfield (6-2, 160) led the team in interceptions (4) and ranked third in tackles (47) and two-year starters Stan Garrard (5-8, 175 sr.) and Jim Piepenbrink (6-2, 185 sr.) will be at the corners.

In the kicking game, soph Kelvin Riley, (6-1, 185)--the team's 2nd leading scorer with 41 points in '74--solved Sycamores placement problems last fall converting 23 consecutive extra points and six of 12 field goals. Senior Rick Carr, top split end, was ISU's punter last year. Key kickoff and punt returner is versatile Allen, who picked up nearly 400 yards in those two categories last year, in addition to 1,221 yards rushing.

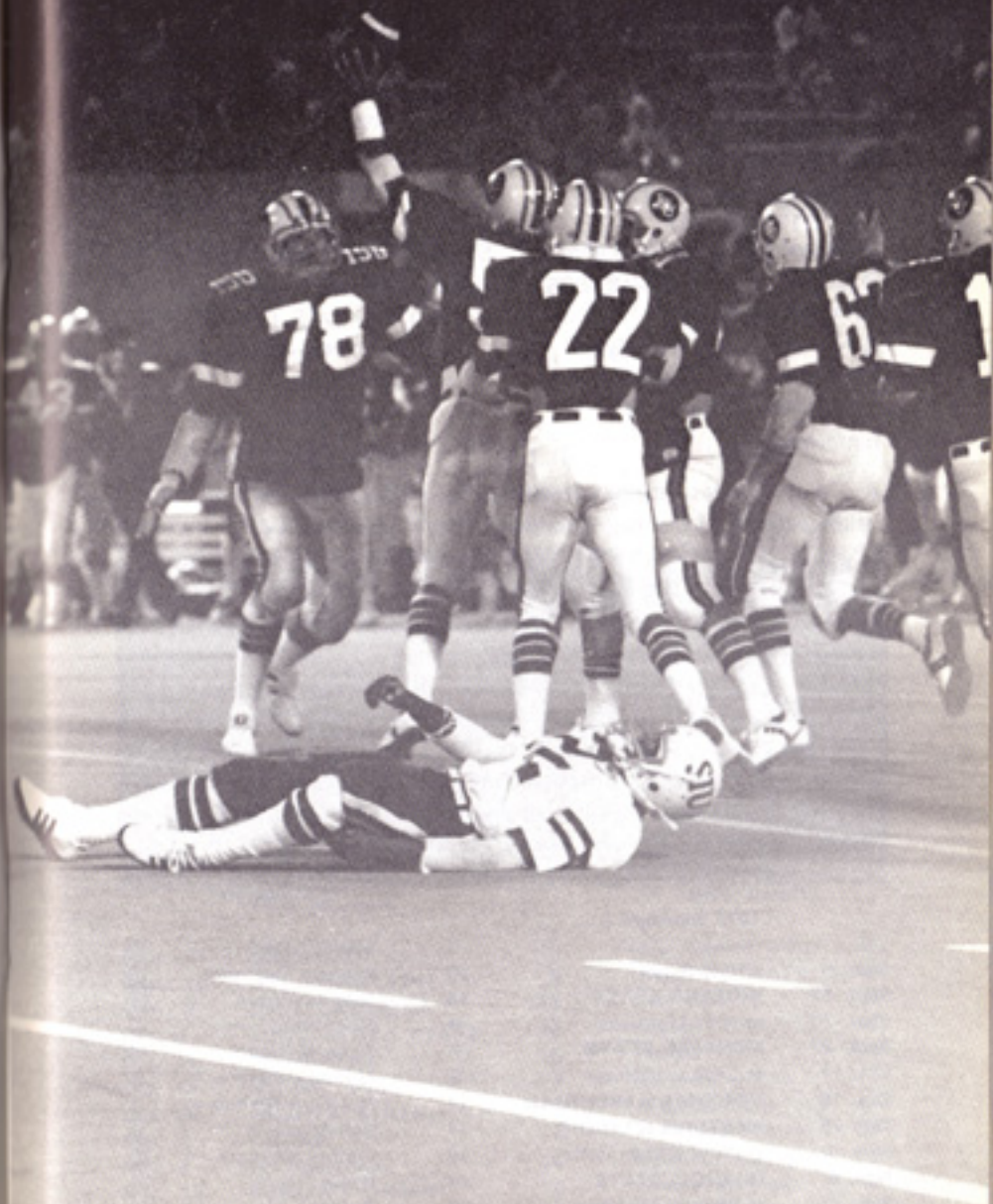

WHY SYCAMORES



The name "Sycamores" was adopted by a student body general election in 1921. A contest was started that year for a school name to be selected on Blue and White Day, a forerunner to Homecoming. The names were to be submitted to a committee of four, with that group's top three choices being placed before the student body in a campus-wide election. The name Sycamores was among the three submitted. Although it was roundly booed when placed on the ballot the students, in an apparent joke, gave the name a one-sided victory in the election. The winner of the contest received \$3 as first prize for his entry. The name was first used January 3, 1922, in the Normal Advance, predecessor of The Statesman, present campus newspaper.

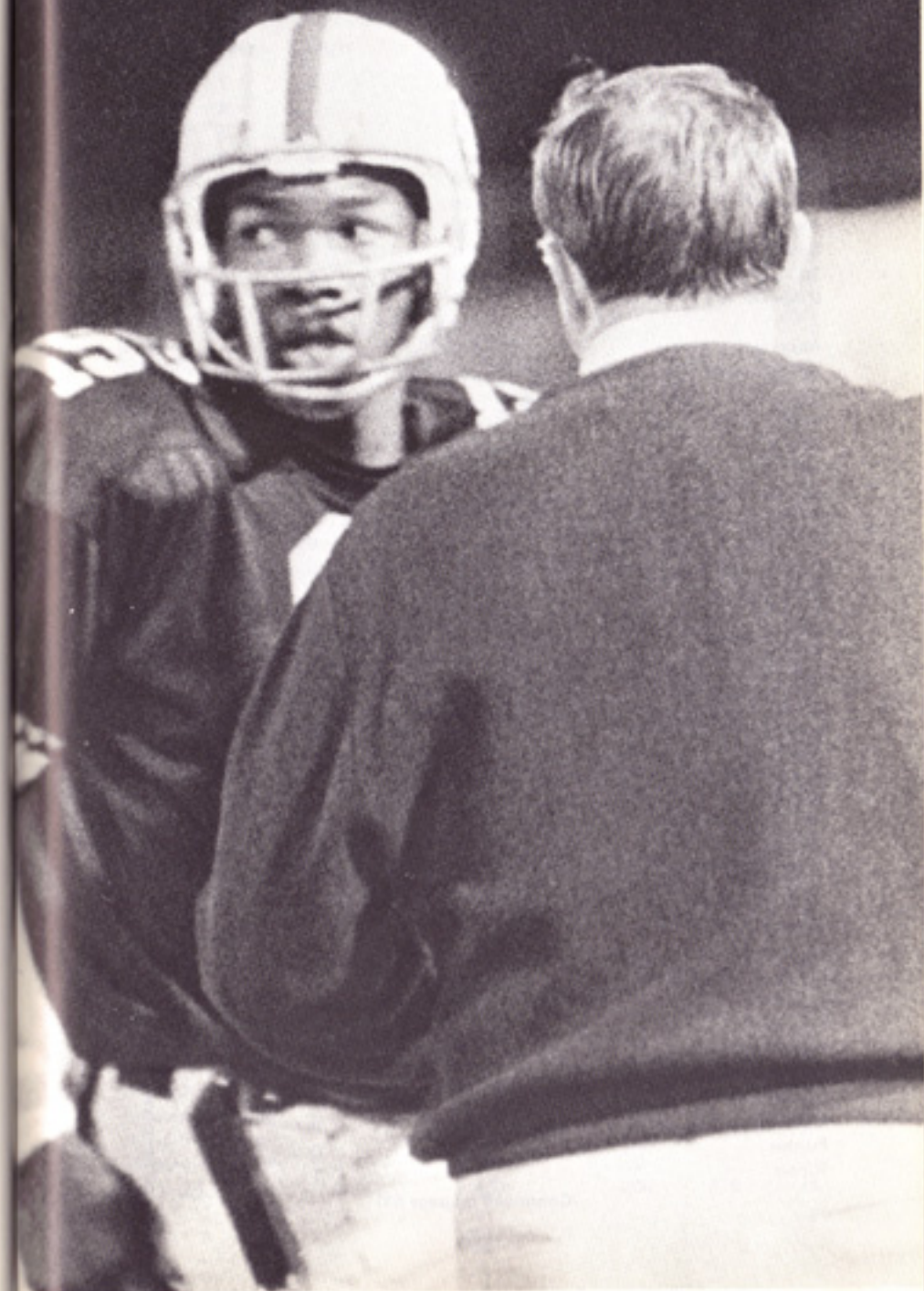

INDIANA STATE GAME-BY-GAME AWARDS

The Indiana State University football coaching staff presents a number of awards following each game, the purpose of the honors being to reward outstanding effort and to provide incentive for future effort.

After grading the game films, the coaches present awards to the Offensive Back of the Week, Offensive Lineman of the Week, Defensive Back of the Week, Defensive Lineman of the Week and Linebacker of the Week (which includes the rover and weakside end). These awards are determined by the film grades and reward the players in those categories who have the best efficiency percentages.

Hatchet Awards are presented weekly to back and lineman players, who in the opinion of the coaching staff, inflicted the most damage on the opponent. Winners may have had key fumble recoveries or interceptions, a long run at a crucial time, etc.

Mr. Boo Awards are presented in conjunction with the local night club of the same name. Two players are honored, usually (but not always) an offensive and a defensive player. The awards are made as a combination of the other two awards, and the players honored have their pictures posted in the night club the following week.

Individual awards are also presented weekly for big plays, such as a scoring run or pass, a key block on a scoring play, a tackle behind the line of scrimmage, etc. Winners of these awards receive decorations for their helmets that they wear the remainder of the season.

ISU History

Indiana State University now is in its 106th year of operation. The University was created by an Act of the Indiana General Assembly on Dec. 20, 1865, and opened its doors to 21 students (13 women and eight men) on Jan. 6, 1870.

The announced purpose of forming the University at that time was an institution that would "be to teachers what law school is to lawyers and medical school is to doctors."

The Act of 1865 did not provide a site for the new school, but a board of trustees, appointed later, was requested to locate an Indiana town or city cooperating with at least \$50,000. Terre Haute was the only town or city in the state to come forth with an offer, and it was better than originally requested. A committee from Terre Haute offered the \$50,000 and, in addition, real estate valued at \$25,000.

The cornerstone for the original building was laid Aug. 13, 1867.

The cost of that building was some \$100,000. The building later burned to the ground on April 9, 1888.

The school was known as Indiana State Normal School from 1870 until 1927, when the name was changed to Indiana State Teachers College. In 1961, the name again changed, this time to Indiana State College. The latest, and probably the final, name change came in the spring of 1965 when the Indiana Legislature renamed the school Indiana State University.

In Terre Haute, the University has a main campus of 91 acres with more than 60 buildings adjoining the city. In all, 441.35 acres serve the University in Terre Haute.

Indiana State offers two regular 18-week semesters, a three-week spring intersession, and two five-week summer sessions in the academic year. The first semester starts in late August and ends in December. The second semester starts in January and ends in early May.
